ON THAT gray September day in 1849 when Mlle. Henriette Desportes (Bette Davis), new French teacher at Miss Haines' School for Young Ladies, arrived in New York to take up her work, she had put the past behind her. Warner Bros.' "All This and Heaven Too" starts on such a hopeful note.

But it was not to be as simple as that. Although the young clergyman (Jeffrey Lynn) who had recommended her to the post had told her that she could find a new life in America, the cruel, pointed questions which were leveled at her by young girls in her class that first day made her aware that forgetting the past was not to be an easy task. So Mlle. Desportes decided to tell her students the true story.

It was not a pleasant story. It was the story of a young governess, just out of school, who had gone to the household of the Duc and Duchesse de Prasline (Charles Boyer and Barbara O'Neil) in Paris to take up her new duties. There she found children starved for the love their mother had never given them. Out of pity at first, and then because she grew to love them devotedly. She became the first real mother they had ever known.

Henriette was too occupied with her work of giving to the children the attentions they had been lacking to notice that the Duc was spending more and more time in the nursery; that the Duc was falling hopelessly in love with her. Tragic consequences followed.

The Duchesse, insanely jealous, bitterly quarreled with the Duc, and as their passions rose, the Duc, enraged, murdered her. All of the scandal that follows such a situation was brought down upon the innocent Henriette. When the Duc, taking full blame for the murder, committed suicide, Paris became a hopeless place for Henriette.

It was then that she came to America to try to recapture some sort of happiness.

As she finished her story and glanced about the room, she saw tears rolling down the cheeks of her young pupils and she knew that her dreams had not been in vain; that here in America she could begin life anew.

ONE MAN

TWO WIVES

UNINTENTIONAL bigamy, patterned after the classic Alfred Lord Tennyson poem, "Enoch Arden," has become Hollywood's favorite theme for motion pictures, and this, "My Favorite Wife," is the latest of the cycle, and in many ways the best yet made. Movie-goers who still remember "The Awful Truth" for the smash hit it proved to be will delight in the knowledge that "My Favorite Wife" not only brings together Cary Grant and Irene Dunne for the first time since that memorable film but it is produced by Leo McCarey, who produced and directed "The Awful Truth" and who gives to this production the same deft and sparkling handling. The troubles of a husband with two wives on his hands form the theme around

which this gay, romantic comedy is woven. Believing his first wife was drowned seven years earlier, the husband (Cary Grant) has her declared legally dead and starts off on his honeymoon with a second wife (Gail Patrick). Then he discovers that he is a bigamist as well as the storm-center of a subtle but bewildering battle of feminine wits as his first wife (Irene Dunne) returns and the two women maneuver for sole possession of their mutual spouse. How the unique situation works out, aided and abetted by the husband's jealousy when he learns that another man (Randolph Scott) was alone with his first wife on the desert island for all these seven years makes a hilarious climax to a sparkling comedy-drama.

TWO Happy People

Squire Gable, masculine half of this Gable-Lombard love story, is a mule, mutt and musket man

CLARK GABLE, ESQ., the mule, mutt and musket man, was standing there in a tub of bona-fide Hollywood mud which was just like any other mud until he sloshed his feet in it. Then it became royal mud, as sacred to the Gable subjects as the Ganges is to the Hindus. For Clark Gable, the kid from Cadiz, is the crown prince of the fantastic kingdom of Graustark, where producers are kings and where mud often is used to throw at folks as well as to stand in.

The crown prince was ankle deep in the mud for a scene in "Boom Town," M-G-M's current chore for its most valuable star. Mr. Gable and Miss Claudette Colbert, his running-mate in the mud of "Boom Town," were all set to go before the camera when someone remarked that Mr. Gable should have mud on his boots on account of he was supposed to have been wading in it. It was a good suggestion. Everybody agreed that if a fellow had been wading in mud he would have mud on his boots. So a hired hand fetched a tub of good old juicy California mud and stooped before the crown prince and began dabbing the mess on Mr. Gable's tootsies.

The squire suddenly realized that it's a dirty job rubbing mud on a man's feet, so he leaned over quickly and told the hired hand, "Here, I've got a better way." He poked his boots into

the mud and scrouged them around. The hired hand was grateful. The yes-hands were flabbergasted. Every hair on the squire's head is worth a fortune to his studio, and yet there he was sloshing his feet in mud to save a fellow man an unpleasant job.

The crown prince is as democratic as hash.

He could not be otherwise and hold the respect of his wife, Miss Carole Lombard, the firecracker girl and the jester of the realm. And if all the signs are right he has the love, respect and loyalty of his wife, which, after all, is the maximum any man, even a crown prince, can expect from life.

If the Gables are not happy people, then this investigator and nose-poker is willing to concede what many people contend—that Hollywood is froth. But so long as there are Gables in Hollywood, so long as there is one pair of reasonably dignified and completely honest people in the den, then I am holding to the premise that it is entirely possible for glamour boys and girls to set up housekeeping and make a go of it.

I saw Mr. Gable first on the "Boom Town" set, and after a few words of byplay we found our common denominators for conversation—dogs and guns and mules. Mr. Gable loves horses, but he is a respecter of mules.

"We've got a good mule on our farm at Encino," he said enthusiastically. "Name of Judy. I like mules. They know how to work. There's an affinity between a mule and the land."

Your correspondent was surprised and skeptical. What knew this grease-paint-and-glamour man of land and mules? A few days later I was to learn that Mr. Gable not only loves and understands the land but that he can make a mule gee and haw and run a middlebuster down a furrow; that he can make things grow and that he can build things with his hands and repair such unglamorous things as plumbing.

They have tried to build Mr. Gable up as a man's man. We hazard the suggestion that that is trite and superfluous. That's one way of coating a man with Hollywood glamour. Mr. Gable is the kind of fellow who likes old shoes and old sweaters, good tobacco, a good gun and good conversation.

He walked off of the set and sat on a trunk, refused a cigarette and began smoking his own brand.

"I thought you smoked a pipe," I suggested.

"I do, sometimes. But hate to carry them around. Too bulky."

A visiting fireman from the East approached Mr. Gable and presented a rather wild-eyed young lady to him. The crown prince got to his feet and bowed. The young lady took his hand and seemed to freeze. She held to his hand until Mr. Gable rather adroitly and inoffensively withdrew his big mitt. Now, gentlemen, that's my idea of a job. Here most of us go through life trying to hold pretty girls' hands, but this Gable's biggest problem is to keep girls from holding his hands too long!

ANYWAY, the crown prince grinned at his entranced subject and said, "I've met you before."

The girl almost collapsed. So did I. Frankly, I didn't believe it. It was a gag, I thought. And then I got the surprise of my life. When the girl regained her senses, she spluttered, "Oh, Clark, do you remember that?"

"Sure, I remember," he said. "It was about three years ago. In New York."

The fellow can remember faces like

a G-man. He's a glamorous edition of Jim Farley when it comes to names and faces.

He came back and sat on the trunk again and got to talking about dogs, particularly bird-dogs. "I haven't had time to do much shooting lately. Been too busy with this picture. Know what I'd like to do one of these days? Get down to south Georgia and shoot birds. Those birds are game down there. These out here run too much. They won't get up. I naturally like that Georgia, anyway."

Then he launched into one of the favorite conversations of the Gable family—their treatment in Atlanta at the premiere of "Gone With the Wind."

YOUR correspondent next suggested that perhaps it was not wise for Mr. Gable to discuss politics.

"Why can't I discuss politics?" he demanded. "I'm an American citizen and have the right to say and think what I please."

Here, indeed, was something to write home about. Your correspondent had been in Hollywood for several days and not once had he heard such trivial matters as the war, politics and unemployment mentioned. He had got his bait of glamour and goo and had despaired of hearing anything except prattle about Hollywood and the goings-on in Graustark. But the crown prince of the kingdom not only was willing but anxious to discuss world events and forget the movies.

"I believe F. D. R. will be nominated for a third term," Mr. Gable said.

"Will he be elected?"

"That depends on many things that can happen between now and fall. But only a fool will sell that man short."

They called Mr. Gable back to work and it was then that he poked his feet in the mud to save a fellow man an unpleasant task.

I congratulated Mr. Gable on his thoughtfulness and he glared at me. "Listen, mister," he said, "why shouldn't I do a little thing like that? I'm a hired hand myself and I've battled this business from the bottom." There was no conceit in his tone. It was simply a statement of fact, for the crown prince has been through the mill. The studio doesn't announce that Mr. Gable is in his fortieth year, and that he is graying a bit around the

temples. The studio apparently fears that such information will deglamourize Mr. Gable. Poppycock! The fact that this man is thirty-nine years old and happily married is his biggest asset. It has taken the movies a long time to learn that the American public is sick of bunk, and such people as Clark Gable and Carole Lombard, who hate bunk more than they do anything else, partly are responsible for the new era in Hollywood, an era that shows promise of the movies telling the truth.

"Of course I'm thirty-nine," Mr. Gable said. "So what? Sure I've got a few gray hairs. A lot of hard work helped make me gray. I just hope that I've got a little gray matter in this old head of mine. I've been lucky, I've got a good job, a good wife and a good home. What else does a man want?"

MR. GABLE was born in Cadiz, Ohio, on February 1, 1901. His mother died when he was seven months old and his grandparents and a stepmother reared him. The boy loved his stepmother, and that's a tribute to him and to her. He lived on a farm and did all of the things any other boy did. He finished high school in Claremont, Ohio, and wanted to be a doctor, but his father couldn't afford the expense of educating him. He decided to educate himself in the pre-medical school of the University of Akron. He worked all day and studied half the night and then happened to bump into a bunch of actors and a bug bit him. He got a few bit parts in legitimate shows. He didn't miss many meals but he postponed a heap of them. For years he bummed around the country trying to get show jobs, and between paydays he took whatever jobs he could get—a hitch in the Oklahoma oil fields, a turn with a timber gang in Oregon.

In Portland he became affiliated with a Little Theater movement, and in 1924 he went to Hollywood and into bit parts. Mr. Gable flopped in the movies at first and went to the stage. He had married Josephine Dillon, a teacher of dramatics, and without doubt she must be given much of the credit for his success. The legitimate theater was kind to the kid from Cadiz and he was on his way to stardom, and

Crawford dates Franchot as their divorce becomes final; Ameche is sued on refusal to appear in film role

DON AMECHE is facing a \$170,000 damage suit filed by Paramount pictures for his failure to appear in "The Night of January 16" on a loan-out from 20th Century-Fox. Ameche didn't like the story and refused to appear in it and suffered a suspension from his home studio as a result. He was restored to the pay-roll only when he was needed for retakes on "Lillian Russell." Paramount contends that since Ameche was at Paramount on a loan-out, he would have had to appear in any picture Paramount chose to cast him in, but Ameche believed differently and expressed his belief by walking out. The story will now probably be rewritten at Paramount, but there is little likelihood Ameche will appear in it because of the bad feeling all around. Don, speaking of the suit on the set of "Four Sons," where he is now working, has a new idea of his importance. Quotes: "I'm flattered they put the price so high."

SONJA HENIE'S Honolulu trip nearly ended in tragedy. The actress became ill shortly after she boarded the *Lurline* to return to Hollywood, and during the trip submitted to an operation for abscessed tonsils. Fortunately for Sonja, Dr. M. W. Brachvogel, a throat specialist, was on board. Otherwise there might have been serious consequences from the infection. There were really three operations

performed, two others following the original one. Sonja stayed in bed during the entire voyage, leaving her stateroom for the first time when the boat docked in San Pedro, and then only after all the other passengers had left. Twentieth Century-Fox officials found her deeply tanned but ten pounds thinner and very weak. After a day or two in her Hollywood home, the actress will go to a desert resort for a month to recuperate. She is due to start ice-skating rehearsals in a month's time for her next picture, "A Passport to Love." Romance note: Sonja's illness will delay any plans she and Dan Topping may be hatching.

LAURENCE OLIVIER and BRIAN AHERNE, not Errol Flynn, as rumored, are the stars in the running for the most-wanted role of Captain Horatio Hornblower, which Warners will make

from the book of that title. Author C. E. Forester, learning that Clark Gable was so disappointed when Warners bought the novel before M-G-M could bid it in, is going to write an original sea tale for him. Forester, getting in an eight-hour day at Warners writing the script, brought his wife to the writers' table in the Green Room for lunch. He introduced her to the gentlemen present with the remark: "I want my wife to see what REAL writers look like."

EDDIE ROBINSON was clipped on the chin recently for the first time in his long picture career. Jack Woody, stuntman, who was showing Humphrey Bogart how to hit Robinson for a fight scene in Warners' "Brother Orchid," accidentally connected with the actor's jaw. As Robinson fell, he yelled: "I've really been hit." He was off the set an hour in a huddle with

first-aid men. Although badly shaken up, he proved to be a trouper. He came back and did the scene over. Director Lloyd Bacon admonished: "Watch your timing, Eddie. It looks as though you were trying to rush through it." Memory: In a reverse situation, Clark Gable once accidentally knocked out stuntman Allen Pomeroy during the making of "Cain and Mable."

KEN MURRAY, who tries hard but never gets his girl, may have better luck after the build-up Paramount is starting. Signed for a five-year period, the radio gagster will be turned into a comic Cary Grant, with his familiar cigar and turned-up collegiate hat conspicuous by their absence. Question: Will Paramount make Grant into a straight Ken Murray???

"The Dark Command" is grand historical epic of "Bloody Kansas"; "Son of the Navy" is smart comedy with James Dunn, Jean Parker

Ann Sheridan and Humphrey Bogart vie for acting honors in "It All Came True"; Backstage comedy romance, "Curtain Call," is good fun

"The Dark Command"

"THE DARK COMMAND," jammed with action, fairly accurate history and more romance than usually marks epics of this type is a magnificently produced tale of guerrilla warfare in the bloody, pre-Civil War days of Kansas. It is a fine film to mark Republic Pictures' debut into the ranks of major studios and a film that will satisfy almost every type of theater-goer.

"The Dark Command" is the story of William Cantrell, whose dark star cast a grim shadow over a state hopelessly split between abolitionist and slave elements. It is even more the story of Mary McCloud (Claire Trevor), torn between her love for the rabble-rousing-by-night, school-teaching-by-day Cantrell (Walter Pidgeon); and her love for a happy, stalwart marshal from Texas, Bob Seton (John Wayne). Mary's wedding to Cantrell is followed almost immediately by the revelation that her new husband is the leader of the guerrilla band which is terrorizing the state.

This revelation brings open strife between Seton and Cantrell, and Mary is now torn between her loyalty to her husband and her respect for the forces of law and order. In the furious action which follows Cantrell's discovery, Mary is allied with Seton and when the ill-starred Cantrell is at last

wiped out, Mary and Bob find happiness together. The burning of Lawrence, Kansas, by Cantrell's murderous gang is a highlight of the film. Fifteen hundred gallons of gasoline, piped through one-inch mains, regulated the burning which extended over seven days. Cost of the scene, which lasts a bare eight minutes on the screen, was \$225,000. One hundred and fifty beards per day were applied by the make-up department at a cost of \$30 per beard for twenty-eight days. The beards were made of cellophane, rope, seaweed and human hair. Five writers and a staff of forty researchers were used in making language and gadgets in the film historically accurate in every respect.

WHEN a runaway orphan and his pup, seeking a mom and a pop to adopt, choose the navy-hating daughter of a naval captain as the mom and a battleship's gunnery mate as the pop, you have a situation which can be complicated and laugh-provoking or just complicated. Thanks to fine acting, deft direction and good scripting, "Son of the Navy" is a laugh-getter.

Adapted from a radio play presented on "Silver Theater," this film has James Dunn as the unwilling father who winds up liking it; Jean Parker as the fussy but lovely adopted mother, and Martin Spellman as the orphaned lad. Twelve-year-old Martin is three-fifths of the entire show. Two Christmases back, Clark Gable picked up the newsboy outside of the M-G-M studios and, as a Christmas present, got him two days' work as an extra in "Test Pilot." Although it was difficult for Martin to believe that he was really in pictures (his mother couldn't get him to give up the newspaper business for several months), he was almost immediately chosen for a bit in "Boys Town" and, overnight, he was a star. His performance in this is a good explanation of why Martin clicked.

"It All Came True"

HERE is a sparkling comedy-drama which will be remembered largely as the film in which Ann Sheridan was permitted to forget her "oomph" and get down to the business of doing some acting. In fact, when you see Ann in this, you'll wonder why they haven't given her more meaty parts in past films, for she does a nice job of making Maggie Ryan come alive in a film in which Humphrey Bogart steals almost every scene except these in which Miss Sheridan appears.

"It All Came True" is the story of two old family retainers of a now extinct wealthy family. As a reward for their faithful services, the pair is left the family house, which they immediately convert into a boarding-house. At the time the film opens, the house is infested with vaudevillians out of jobs and a mortgage which threatens to have the two faithful servants out on the street in no time at all.

Ann is the daughter of one of the servants, just home after the show in which she had a bit has flopped. Jeffrey Lynn is the son of the other faithful servant, home with his employer, Humphrey Bogart, a notorious gangster seeking a hideout. Bogart, learning of the difficulties which beset the aged pair and wanting to repay them for not turning him in when they learn who he is, turns the place into a night-club with the vaudevillians as

singing waiters and entertainers to pay for their board. There is a happy ending which logically follows the sequence of the story.

Ann, as a singing entertainer, does a nice job of both acting and singing although the low pitch of her voice is a surprise. Humphrey Bogart, as the soft-hearted bad man, steals all of the comedy scenes, even from no less a veteran than Zasu Pitts, housemaid who falls in love with him. Only in one scene—where Ann wears a streamlined pair of corsets—do the producers permit her "oomph" to come to the foreground, but the whole tone of the film is light and wholesome and good for the entire family.

FOR a pleasant backstage picture of the New York theater which does not go off the deep end for tragedy and heartbreak but concentrates on laughs, "Curtain Call" adequately fills the bill. A rather hilarious story, terribly complicated, it is filled with clever lines and gives a good picture of what goes on in producers' offices during the making of a Broadway hit.

The story revolves about a famous producer who, in seeking some way of bringing his star to terms, decides to buy a hopelessly amateurish play (by Miss Read), convinced that his star (Helen Vinson) will agree to anything rather than appear in it. The producer, Alan Mowbray, is dismayed when the star reads the script and becomes enthusiastic about it. Miss Read then leaves her home town and her home town sweetheart, John Archer (discovered in radio's "Gateway to Hollywood" program), to follow her career. The star, of course, is just pretending to like the play, and the producer, bound by contracts, now faces ruin if he produces the play, bankruptcy if he doesn't. How he untangles his troubled affairs affords a pleasant hour and a half of screen entertainment.

DERBY DAY AGAIN

Sidelights on the great Kentucky Derby—hear it Saturday over CBS

ON SATURDAY, May 4, America's greatest horse-race will be run at Churchill Downs, a rambling old track in Louisville, Ky., which once a year snaps out of slumber and becomes a sporting Mecca.

Over a mile and a quarter of romance-steeped ground a dozen three-year-old thoroughbreds will race for a \$75,000 purse and the right to have the name of one of them inscribed on turfdom's highest honor roll, that of Kentucky Derby winners.

Probably the most magnetic of all sporting lures is the Derby's uncertainty. Not until the winner's last twenty-foot stride has gained the wire and radio's broadcasters have shouted his name across the ether waves to race-horse immortality can anybody be sure. At press-time we are hearing a fathom chorus that threatens to drown all else:

"It's Bimelech . . . Bradley's Bimelech! Can't miss. Bradley does it again . . . wins his fifth Derby. Who's to defeat Bimelech?"

Well, Bimelech might defeat himself. He might not even get to post, and, if he does, might run afoul of any number of the 5,321 recorded ways a race-horse can muff. Once a 1-to-10 shot was leading his field down the stretch by open daylight when a newspaper blew out of the stands and wrapped itself around the "sure thing's" head, causing him to stop dead in his tracks.

Remember Brevity, owned by Joseph D. Widener, which went into the 1936 Derby regarded by the betting fraternity as a virtual "cinch"? He had raced well as a two-year-old and had proved himself magnificently by romping off with the Florida Derby a few weeks previously. Churchill's huge crowd bombarded the mutuels with Brevity support, backing him down to odds of 4 to 5, among the shortest in Kentucky Derby history. All others in the thirteen-horse field were longshots, most of them sky-high. That's what they thought of Brevity—lest we forget, what they're thinking now of Bimelech.

But at the start Brevity streaked from his No. 10 post position toward the advantageous inner track. Other horses plowed into him and down he went. As he struggled up, the pack was gone and winging.

But Brevity was not through. Not him. He set out in pursuit. Within half a mile he had caught the rear guard, but wise little Wright knew better than to attempt to weave through that football scrimmage crowd. Brevity had to take the long way around, with many lengths still to be made up. All the heart that was in him poured out through thudding hoofs. Stride by stride Brevity gained, passing them by, one by one. But not even a Brevity could completely overcome the handicap of that disastrous start. Flashing across the finish line, he was in second place.

Brevity, we repeat, was as courageous and deserving a colt as ever ran in the Derby. But they paid off on somebody else—Bold Venture, paid to the tinkling tune of \$43 for \$2!

ANYTHING can happen in a race toward which all turfmen point, not for a few days but for years on end, and that's probably why the Kentucky Derby intrigues us so. Take this year's class. The few satin-skinned runners that actually get to post are survivors of an original "hopelul" field that may have numbered thousands.

There's no telling how many lively little foals were "dropped" way back in

1937. These long-legged babes capered about their nursery pastures during the suckling months until on January 1, 1938, all became one-year-olds. (Each January 1 is race-horsedom's universal birthday.) By then they were taking on flesh and stature, and for another year their Derby "pointing" continued with preliminary training, gallops, and finally the breaking to saddle. Came 1939 and our present Derby class had reached freshman status. They were ready to go to the races, but already the ranks had thinned greatly. Only a few hundred remained after sickness, accidents and general failure to develop had taken toll. These hundreds had their tests as two-year-olds last year, and again many of the weak had to fall out as a few of the strong went on. When the 1940 Kentucky Derby entries closed in February, there were just 126 horses remaining which owners considered promising enough to justify payment

of a twenty-five-dollar nomination fee!

Now the elimination is in its final stages. Workouts and preparatory races will determine between now and the final entry deadline, Friday, May 3, which eighteen or twenty still are judged of Derby caliber. Changing track conditions—from fast to slow, or vice versa—may whittle off a few more before post-time on Derby day, as it costs the owner \$500 to start his horse, and this is no spot to shoot at the moon.

You can see, then, what a long and hazardous process it is nursing the Derby dream that is born with a likely foal to its day of materialization, three years later, at Churchill Downs.

SUCH a dream is that of Colonel E. R. Bradley, owner of Bimelech. From the day in 1937 that the brood mare La Troienne dropped Black Tony's foal and attendants raced away to the big mansion on the Lexington plantation to announce, "Colonel, he's a good 'un," Bradley has dreamed of winning one more Derby—his fifth.

Bradley, now aged and feeble, already established as all-time champion winner of Kentucky Derbys with victories by his Behave Yourself in 1921, Bubbling Over in 1926, Burgoo King in 1932 and Brokers Tip in 1933. But memories are not enough for the patriarch who now is practically invalidated on his Idle Hour Farm. He waits impatiently for the Derby day coming up.

Bimelech . . . It would be a romantic story if he could win, but we must not blot that angle of uncertainty from our minds. Between now and post-time a slump in training might throw him out.

Mishaps of one kind or another have been very prevalent with the horses which early-bird bettors of the winter books decide are the ones that "cannot lose." A winter-book favorite has not won the Derby since Gallant Fox came

THE NBC SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA, NBC. Arturo Toscanini, conductor; Vladimir Horowitz, pianist. All-Brahms program. Serenade in D, Piano Concerto No. 2 in B Flat, Symphony No. 1 in C Minor.

To me there is no question that of all of Brahms' larger creations the most directly appealing are his C Minor (first) symphony, the violin concerto and the B Flat (second) piano concerto. The greatest performance I have heard of them were all under Toscanini, with Heifetz as soloist in the violin work and Horowitz in that for piano.

Today the B Flat concerto, Toscanini and Horowitz are united again and I am waiting with eager anticipation for the lovely horn opening, and the immediate entrance of the solo instrument with its beatific announcement and rapturous continuation. Where, in all piano literature, is there a nobler beginning?

From the first to the last note, this truly inspired composition is one long—but not too long—symphonic outburst of lyricism, drama, jubilation, poetry and passion. Do I exaggerate my adjectives? Listen and you will agree that beauty and power consort in these four movements of continuous fervor and ecstasy.

The reason lies perhaps in the fact that Brahms began the score in 1878 and finished it in 1881—those years marking his visits to Italy, both in springtime, when he was bewitched with the suffused loveliness and vernal gladness of what he saw and heard.

The slow second movement, with its amorous cello song and brooding harmonies and the rhythmic charm of the saucy scherzo and exultant finale, are musical experiences that, once evoked, cannot come again too often for the listener with a responsive mind and heart.

This concert should prove to be the high point of the entire winter season of broadcasting. Do not forget that it takes place on a Monday night instead of the usual Saturday, and at 9 p.m. EDT instead of 10:00!

What Happens to a Judge

By Leonard Lieblich

COLUMBIA BROADCASTING SYSTEM has had many letters from readers of this department saying kind things about the Sunday night broadcast quiz on which I am a judge. I take this opportunity to thank the writers most warmly.

The broadcast itself, "So You Think You Know Music," is a source of much pleasure to me, as its staff and the participants keep up an intimate and informal atmosphere, and no Sunday passes without some special feature and fun that do not get on the air.

A number of inquirers have asked whether the program is rehearsed in advance, and it seems hardly necessary for me to assure them that it is not. It stands to reason that we cannot prepare the contestants with any hints; and Ted Cott (the master of ceremonies) and I have only one preliminary discussion several days before the broadcast, when we agree on the questions to be asked. After that we do not meet again until a few minutes before the show goes on the air.

Each week brings some surprise to our staff, whether from the amateurs in answering difficult questions or the professionals in missing them. For instance, one sixteen-year-old college student attained practically a perfect score, while the son of a great pianist (Ferruccio Busoni) gave not one correct answer and failed to recognize even such familiar keyboard music as Liszt's "Liebestraum" and Chopin's E Flat Nocturne. On the other hand, Moriz Rosenthal, famed piano virtuoso, knew even the opus numbers of rarely played works but looked blank when such a familiar piece as "The Glow Worm" was played for him and he was asked to give its title. Incidentally, Rosenthal is seventy-eight years old, our oldest contestant so far, while we also had one aged exactly five. Allan Bendiner is his name and he knew nearly every tune we gave him from the classical and romantic repertoire.

The wittiest of our guests were two singers, Reinald Werrenrath and Norman Cordon, but only the former was a winner. When Werrenrath was asked to name three noted sopranos who had sung the role of "Carmen" at the Metropolitan, he answered, "I ought to know that, for I had to flirt with a lot of Carmens when I was a member there

and sang the role of the Torreador."

That radio veteran, Professor Quiz, who invented the "questioning" type of broadcast, offered to come on my program. "Do you know anything about music?" I asked him. "No," he replied, "but I would like to see how it feels to stand on the other side, facing the inquisitor." Later he said (wiping off the perspiration): "Well, I found out, and I never was more nervous in my life." Nevertheless the Professor made an unexpectedly good showing.

Deems Taylor, of course, won first prize—a pair of tickets to the Philharmonic concert.

Yes, there are lots of unexpected happenings at "So You Think You Know Music." For instance, when the judge announced Werrenrath's appearance for the following week and added, "He made his debut at the Metropolitan as Canio in 'Pagliacci,'" Werrenrath came on the program and I had to correct myself and say, "It was Tonio that our guest sang at his debut." Werrenrath spoke up quietly, "It was Silvio."

New Books and Records Reviewed

BOLERO. The Life of Maurice Ravel. By Madeleine B. Goss. Henry Holt and Co. \$3.00.

This is the first biography in English of Maurice Ravel, and a worthy one it is. To make an absorbing story of the mysterious and reticent little man who created some of the most exquisite music ever written was no small task, but Mrs. Goss has done it. With grace, charm and admirable clarity and simplicity, she has told as much as is possible about Ravel, from earliest childhood to his tragic death. She has explored his background, his familiar haunts, has spoken at length with friends and family, and the result is a lucid and endearing picture of the man.

For one who is not familiar with Maurice Ravel's music, this book should serve as a splendid introduction. For those who already know the music, it will heighten their enjoyment and give them an insight into the rare and lovely soul of the composer.

AVE MARIA (Schubert): GRETCHEN AM SPINNRADE (Gretchen at the Spinning Wheel) (Schubert). Dorothy Maynor, soprano. Victor. One twelve-inch record (15752).

It is incredible to believe that the same voice recorded both those songs, so well done is one and so badly done is the other. Dorothy Maynor, the sensational Negro soprano who leaped to fame after her discovery last year by Serge Koussevitzky, sings the "Ave Maria" beautifully and the recording is good, but in the "Gretchen" she sounds nervous and unsure and the recording leaves much to be desired. However, the "Ave Maria" is worth owning, if for nothing more than to become familiar with a voice which is acclaimed as one of the great ones of our time.

CONCERTO NO. 1 IN B FLAT (for oboe and orchestra) (Handel). Leon Goossens, oboist with the London Philharmonic conducted by Eugene Goossens. Victor.

This is not Handel at his best, but it is a wonderful show-piece for the foremost oboist of the world and brother of Eugene Goossens. He is, incidentally, the teacher of Evelyn (Mrs. John) Barbirolli, who is herself a top-ranking oboist.

Musician of the Week

James Melton

JAMES MELTON is an Irish tenor who does not depend on good old Irish charm to put him over—although he has plenty of it. He also has the ability to relax an audience, to make them settle back in their seats with a sigh of anticipation and murmur, "Now we're really going to enjoy ourselves." But underneath the charm and the audience contact is good, sound training, dependable musicianship and a serious approach to his work.

It's astonishing to find just how serious he is. When he sings his famous encore, "Shortenin' Bread," one gets the

recently James Melton. For after several years of good, hard work, Melton graduated from small opera companies into the bigtime of the Chicago Opera Company, which plans to star him next season. And critics finally had to admit that Melton knew his opera.

"I had a lot of fun while I was doing it," Melton says. "I like to sing opera the best. It's a thrill—the contact with the other singers, the chorus, the orchestra, the costumes. It's a big hunk of music, something you can get your teeth into." His dark and very Irish eyes shine when he talks about it. How-

impression of a light-hearted, happy-go-lucky soul with not a worry in the world.

"I used to be that way," he admits, "when I came 'up no'th' from Georgia, fresh from leading a college band, and Roxy put me on as a star at the Roxy Theater. I thought I was sitting on top of the world." A sensational hit on radio, several successful movies and a lot of money went to his head. He was just at the age where it was inevitable. But instead of climbing to dizzying heights of conceit and dropping down with a loud thud, he stopped himself on the edge of the precipice and took stock. What he saw disgusted him.

"I made up my mind to stop all the foolishness," he says, "and get to work and make a serious career."

He knew what faced him. All his previous success on radio and in the movies was more of a handicap than an advantage. The critics just lie in wait for a popular singer who dares to break into the serious field. With their fatal tendency to type every artist, they seem to feel that once a jazz singer, always a jazz singer. Only a few singers have overcome the "handicap" and earned critical respect. Grace Moore is one, Nino Martini another, Helen Jepson, John Charles Thomas, and most

ever, he never completely forsook radio, although the quality of songs that he sang improved. Last summer he was the star of the "Ford Summer Hour" and is now on the new "Telephone Hour" on Monday nights, with Franca White and a sixty-piece symphony orchestra conducted by Don Voorhees.

Melton lives in a 200-year-old house in Connecticut, with thirty acres of ground and a view of Long Island Sound. He is married to a girl from Detroit, who he thinks is pretty nice. He is six feet three, weighs 196 pounds, and spends his spare time collecting old automobiles. He started his collection with an old White, because as a little boy he admired a White that his uncle owned and always considered it a mark of success to possess such a sumptuous car. With the years the White lost its value as a sign of prosperity, but Melton still wanted to own one and looked for six months until he found it. His great joy is to drive along Connecticut back roads in one of the jalopies. He also likes baseball, movies and current-event magazines, which he studies carefully.

"COK—O. K. BATISTA"

A POWERFUL new Cuban station is on the air. This station is unique in several ways. It is, so far as I know, the first short-wave station to be owned and operated by a political candidate and dedicated primarily to the task of elevating that candidate to office; it is the only Cuban station whose program material and announcements are in English, and one of the very few Latin stations that do not advertise commercial products. This station went on the air on April 6, using the call letters COCSO—the CSO standing for Conjunto Socialista Democrático, a union of several political groups who are sponsoring Colonel Fulgencio Batista for the presidency of Cuba. On April 15 the call letters of the station were changed to "COK—O. K. Batista," this call and slogan being announced frequently. COK operates on a frequency of 11.57 megacycles, a little lower than the usual frequency coupled with its loud signals and frequent English announcements, readily identify the station.

COK (11.57) broadcasts nightly from 7:30 to 11:30 p.m. EST. The programs include popular and dance selections as well as native Cuban music played by leading artists. Between musical numbers two- or three-minute talks in English give much interesting and val-

uable information about life in Cuba. I have often said that the Cuban stations were missing a big bet in not broadcasting regular English talks designed to lure more American tourists to their beautiful tropical isle. COK is doing this very thing and the announcer promises to answer promptly any questions that listeners may have regarding Cuba. Each listener reporting reception of the station will receive an attractive souvenir commemorative QSL card as well as twelve beautiful Cuban scenic postal cards. It isn't necessary to include return postage or an international reply coupon. The souvenirs are free. Address your letters to Colonel Fulgencio Batista, Estacion COK, Ave. de Belgica, Reparto Kohly, Havana, Cuba. Colonel Batista has also printed a special issue of initial stamps bearing his likeness which are available to any listener interested in the station. Batista's qualifications for office I can say that thousands of United States listeners are indebted to him for these English broadcasts which are bringing to us in such an interesting manner the culture, music, history and tourist attractions of our little tropical neighbor. I hope COK will continue to operate regardless of the outcome of the impending presidential elections.

REBROADCASTING OF NONPROFIT INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS AUTHORIZED. The Federal Communications Commission has amended its rules and regulations to permit standard and non-commercial educational broadcast stations to pick up and rebroadcast the non-commercial programs of international broadcast stations. It was specified, however, that such rebroadcasting shall be on a non-commercial basis.

Briefly, this means that any broadcast station or a non-commercial educational station in the United States may, upon authority of the station originating the international program, pick up and retransmit the same for the benefit of its listeners. This applies to the program of any short-wave broadcast station, whether it is located within or outside of the United States.

This is one of the most significant rulings in the history of short-wave broadcasting in the United States, since with one sweep it eliminates for all time the experimental status of short-wave broadcasting and makes it possible for even the tiniest local broadcast station to pick up and rebroadcast cultural and educational programs from, say, WRUL in Boston, or the NBC and CBS international stations in New York City. It makes it possible

also, as I understand it, for any local broadcast station in this country to pick up, say, the opera from Milan, the English newscast from Stockholm or a marimba concert from Guatemala City. All progressive broadcast stations will probably set up their own short-wave listening posts ready to render, when practical, a splendid international as well as local service to their listeners.

LATEST FROM EUROPE: As predicted in last issue of Movie and Radio Guide, a Nazi broadcast is now being radiated daily from 9:30 to 11:00 a.m. EST on a frequency of 15.32 megs, the old channel of OZH, Denmark, and presumably using this station's transmitter. . . . Switzerland's programs for North America, Monday and Wednesday nights from 8:45 to 10:15 p.m. EST, are now being radiated over HBJ (14.535). . . . Don't miss Marion Oia's interviews with famous Americans living in or visiting Paris on Sundays at 11:40 a.m. EST over Paris Mondial (15.13 or 11.845). . . . Budapest is not getting through to United States listeners on its new frequency of HAT5 (9.625). I suggest the North American program radiated nightly from 6:35 to 8:00 p.m. EST be shifted at once to 11.85 megs, Budapest frequency in 25-meter band.

through in 1930. Five of the last nine have not even started in the race!

That's just another reason why we must hold off from going completely overboard for Bimelech. That's why we must remind ourselves there are other horses in this race—Mioland, Carrier Pigeon, Pictor, Fenelon, Roman, Red Dock, Gen'l Manager, Super Chief, Andy K. Ah, yes, Andy K. A horse that runs like the wind but, alas, just as unpredictably. Winds veer in direction, and so does Andy. He has the bad habit of running wide, losing ground around the turns. When running straight, he is all race-horse—running out, he is a rank pushover.

The Kentucky Derby is a he-horse's race, because only one filly ever has won it—Regret in 1915. Yet it is a race fraught with the proverbial "woman's angle." No fashion-fest of the year can exceed Derby day for bringing out the lovelies attired in an array of finery

calculated to wow the most exacting masculine eye. And in recent years the ladies have been playing an increasingly important part in the competition to produce Derby winners.

It was a woman who scored the most smashing victory of all, Mrs. Payne Whitney, whose Twenty Grand in 1931 hung up a record of 2 minutes, 1 4/5 seconds that still stands. Twenty Grand leveled out and fairly flew for his lady fair, averaging approximately thirty-eight miles an hour over the long route. (At sprint distances, horses have been clocked at 42.3 miles per hour.)

Mrs. Isabel Dodge Sloane's Brookmeade Stable colors were carried triumphantly by Cavalcade in 1934, and a Chicagoan, Mrs. John D. Hertz, scored with Reigh Count in 1928. And it was still another woman, Mrs. R. H. Hoots, who sent little Black Gold, the Cinderella horse, out to climax his amazing rise from obscurity to fame by winning turfdom's most coveted classic in 1924.

Women who have their "hats" in the

Derby ring this time are Mrs. Payne Whitney, with Red Dock; Mrs. E. G. Lewis, with Gen'l Manager and Jacomar, and Mrs. Emil Denmark, with Super Chief.

Conceded the best outside chance to upset the he-man's and he-horse's race is Mrs. E. G. Lewis, who in professional life is Elizabeth Arden, noted cosmetics queen. Here is a feminine threat all the way, Gen'l Manager and Jacomar not only being owned by a woman but being trained by one, Mrs. Elizabeth Bosley!

Surely you understand fully by now what we mean by the "uncertainty" of horse racing. Still, it is this very element of suspense which gives the Kentucky Derby its mass appeal. Between the starting and stopping of presses the entire picture can be changed. The Bimelech which all turfdom is talking about today may be a non-starter by tomorrow. A rival so far overlooked up to now as to be not yet mentioned may be the winner when the payoff comes.

Nobody can know in advance, not even the men who breed the horses, watch their training, literally live with them from day to day. Colonel Bradley could tell you about that. He had a fine-looking horse named Brother Joe entered in the 1932 Derby. The Colonel was "high" on Joe, as was all the stable help. Also entered by Bradley was Burgoo King, a "fair sort of horse."

Given his choice of mounts, Laverne Fator, No. 1 Bradley jockey, selected Brother Joe. The kid understudying Fator, Eugene James, was given Burgoo King. The result: Burgoo King the winner; Brother Joe finished nineteenth.

The Met

FIGHTS for its LIFE

Read how Grand Opera got into its unhappy fix and how you may help save it for yourself and America



HERE IN THE DUSTY SPLENDOR of the Metropolitan Opera House, New York's glittering "400" once forged the famous Golden Horseshoe, lavishly supported opera. But today the Met turns in desperation to the common people—to radio listeners—for the \$1,000,000 it needs to keep alive

EVIL days have fallen upon the Metropolitan Opera—blackest in its long and colorful career of fifty-seven years as the shrine of American music-lovers. They are embarrassing, hectic days in which one of the best-known musical institutions in the world must fight for its own survival.

And—transcending the standards of art and tradition—the guiding factor between continued existence and ignominious end is the cold and unmusical dollar mark.

Only with new funds, a new financial set-up, can the Metropolitan hope to continue. In desperation its directors have turned to the first line of support—the music-lovers of America—and fervently asked them for assistance—one million dollars' worth of it!

Raising such a sum, say they, is the difference between life and death to the Metropolitan. Without it the old New York opera house will remain perennially dark, a rambling monstrosity of barn-like proportions filled merely with memories and no longer the perfect voices of the world's best singers.

That's quite a bit of money—\$1,000,000. Not, of course, if you're building a destroyer or buying a squadron of bombing planes. It's a nominal sum for floating a bond issue or constructing a new steel plant. But for culture? It looms high as a financial Himalaya.

May 1 was set as the deadline. The appeal for funds was voiced over

the radio, through the public press, to wealthy patrons of art—everywhere, in fact, that a few more dollars might be harvested. The tally mounted. At midpoint, half of the coveted sum had been realized. But then the drive began to bog down; the sledding grew harder. Those who wanted most to help already had done so; the slackers required more and more persuasion. The last quarter-million has been trickling in with diminished velocity. And so, if May 1 sees the Met going over the top in its drive for life, it will be by a narrow, razor-like margin.

What happens, however, when \$1,000,000 jingles with full symphonic force in the coffers of the famous opera house?

A lot of people want to know the same thing. There are practical dissenters—even opera devotees—who feel that the Metropolitan has had no right to make such an appeal, particularly to millions of radio listeners who will never sit under its hallowed roof, without more convincing proof that the Metropolitan is not going to slide right back into an economic morass.

The money must be used wisely. There must be careful administration of every penny if the Met is to keep faith with the middle-class listeners in Oregon and Texas, Maine and Georgia, who have hurried their dollars to what

they steadfastly believe is a good cause.

Ethically it is a good cause—albeit a complex one.

How the emergency came about is another matter, and one not too commonly understood. In the words of George A. Sloan, chairman of the fund campaign, "It does not arise because of any deficit in the actual production of opera. The Metropolitan Opera is a non-profit institution."

The trouble, you see, pivots on the fact that the opera house itself has been owned by a group titled the Metropolitan Opera and Real Estate Company and its stockholders are the owners of swanky parterre boxes around the Golden Horseshoe.

Operas, on the other hand, are produced by the Metropolitan Opera Association which is—as Mr. Sloan points out—a non-profit membership corporation.

The relationship between these two, therefore, has been the same as that between a landlord and tenant.

But the Opera Association has paid no actual cash rental. Instead the stockholders of the Real Estate Company have reserved the right in the past to occupy their boxes at performances, being assessed in return when the payment of taxes and other property expenses came up.

These assessments have not, in recent years, been light ones. During the palmy days before the Great Depression and back into the illustrious history of the Met, the stockholders represented the elite of New York society. They were the patrons of art—their donations gave the Metropolitan its aura of culture, good living and the fullness of life that was New York's in the days of diamond tiaras and Delmonico's.

But today many of the stockholders are dead. Their stock has passed into the hands of estates and the grim legal papers lying in safe deposit vaults care little for Bizet or Wagner.

And so these estates began to contemplate a liquidation of the Real Estate Company and sale of the opera house—a move which would have left the Metropolitan itself out on the sidewalk with no place to hold up its head. What to do?

Raise \$1,000,000, decided the directors, and buy the opera house from the realtors. And, since a large quota of the Met's public is the radio audience, the services of the National Broadcasting Company were enrolled. One-third of the sum thus far secured has come from radio listeners.

It's going to take \$1,970,000 to buy the building. That's a good bit cheaper than erecting a new opera house, estimated at a cost somewhere in the shadow of \$10,000,000. A total of \$500,000 has to be paid upon the option before May 31 of this year. The rest of the burden will be dissipated in

bonds secured via the grand old American institution of the mortgage.

So, when the Opera Association can walk through the lobby of the building and say "this is ours"—its troubles will still rise like a glowering Gibraltar. The opera house must be brought up to date—and in doing so, American opera is attempting a transition from the darling of aristocracy to the practical status of a business run on democratic principles.

Let's look at a few figures. There are, in the present house, a total of 3,358 seats whose prices range from \$1 to a top of \$7. If every seat in the many-tiered structure is sold, plus standees, the Opera Association grosses \$11,500 on a single performance.

The average cost of staging an opera during the 1938-39 season was \$11,426. Put your arithmetic to work and you'll see that when they refer to this organization as "non-profit making" they're not kidding.

It isn't like operating a regular Broadway play that uses the same costumes, scenery and actors night after night. A normal Metropolitan season, running sixteen weeks, features eight performances every seven days. Rehearsals are as continuous as a double-feature movie—always with a full orchestra. Expenses soar. The Met has 6,500 costumes always ready in its wardrobe rooms. Each opera, including lightly paid supernumeraries (spear-bearers of the chorus, in case you didn't know) requires about 200 varied costumes. And new operas must be added constantly to this free-wheeling repertoire.

There are yet other headaches. The opera house is mechanically obsolete because, after all, backstage technique has altered mightily since 1883 when the great, rambling structure was built on an unimportant plot at the corner of 39th Street and Broadway. A tremendous stage crew is needed—there are labor unions now, electricians instead of gas-lights, more and more scenery, provisions for radio pick-ups so that a national audience may eavesdrop and—this is important—an astounding quantity of architectural errors which make about 300 seats in the vast auditorium worthless.

Present plans call for earmarking some \$500,000 which will be used to modernize the Met. "Modernizing" really means a compromise between what the building ought to be, and what is physically possible under the circumstances.

The problem is not one merely of paying for the revamping of the building. Operas must still be produced, and operas still cost in the neighborhood of \$11,000 a throw.

HERE'S a breakdown of where the annual expenditures go: 30% is for artists and conductors, 29% for orchestra, chorus and ballet, 22% for stage department, crews, engineers, ushers, porters, etc., 5% for administrative staff, 5% for trucking, printing, rent and supernumeraries, with the remaining 9% scattered among taxes, light, insurance and other incidentals. It's a tight budget.

Another little dilemma revolves around the fact that radio, motion pictures and even the concert stage can pay more for the talents of artists today than the venerable Metropolitan. The cachet of singers at present is well below what it has been in the mellow past and the days when favorites such as Caruso received \$6,000 and even \$8,000 for a single performance are merely something for the historian.

And yet one fact must be borne in mind. Opera in America has always been dependent upon general public support or the contributions of

wealthy music-lovers. In most countries abroad it has pursued its career as a subsidized ward of government.

And so we find the situation today, when reduced to the lowest common denominator, is dependent upon the response of a broadened public support. The aristocracy which once was willing to pay for the privilege of displaying its finery and social eclat in the glittering Golden Horseshoe has now scampered. Opera becomes democratic. The question: Can democracy support opera—and does it want to?

THE answer is a little more than supposition. "Dollar seat" operas with inferior artists and a lack of polished finesse, such as have graced the stage of the Hippodrome and toured other theaters in recent seasons, were a financial success. But they were also nowhere near so expensive as the Met standards of production. Will public support stretch itself to maintain these standards? Or, as many people think has already happened, will the Met drop its standards to meet the level of public support?

Where do radio and its monetary aid fit into this uneasy picture? A good many thousand people have the right to ask because they have been solicited for funds over the air. Their love of opera and the weekly Metro-

politan broadcasts has been strong enough for them to mail a flood of contributions toward that \$1,000,000 mark. Mid-April, for example, found approximately 150,000 contributions from the radio audience swelling the tally as it strained toward the final goal. And, considering that most of

these contributions represent families rather than individuals, the fund committee likes to think that more than half a million listeners have been swayed by the Met's radio pleas.

There are other sources of annual income, too, for a certain \$100,000 is forthcoming each year from NBC in

return for the privilege of sequestering microphones on the Met stage. Nor let us forget still another stipend received from the Metropolitan Auditions of the Air, now eminently sponsored by a paint manufacturer.

The significant fact revealed by the flood of radio contributions is that America seems to possess a deep-rooted attachment for grand opera. It is safe to assume that not one-tenth of the persons sending donations from the tiniest hamlets and most distant cities have ever sat in the Family Circle and peered down at the great stage of the Metropolitan.

Their offerings, then, are not to save the Metropolitan alone. They are sent to save what the Metropolitan represents—good music performed in the best traditions by world-renowned artists.

More than three-quarters of these letters that reveal so strongly the generous, warm heart of the American people are from persons in moderate circumstances. Many tell of personal sacrifice, even physical discomfort, so that the great national institution of grand opera may continue.

Abroad, in the home of opera, the world is aflame with war. America has an opportunity to capture cultural crowns.

Whether it does or not lies pretty much with the gentlemen who rule the fortunes of the Met. The radio public has certainly done its share.

Listener Tures to Murder

OTTAWA, ILL.—Thirteen-year-old William Jackson IV of Ottawa, Ill., had just finished listening to the radio sketch, "Mr. District Attorney," and was listening to the next one, "I Love a Mystery," Thursday evening, April 18. Suddenly he left the room and when he returned in a few minutes he shot at his grandmother with a rifle. Then the junior Jekyll-Hyde went completely berserk, shot his grandmother in the leg with a shotgun, clubbed her on the head with it, shook off his grandfather and escaped into the country with two pistols. He returned the next day and gave himself up, saying he didn't know what happened, but admitting he got a big thrill from air thrillers, though they made him nervous. The boy's parents had been separated for a number of years.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—To "honor the youth of each radio station's service area and of America," an elaborate "National Radio Festival," sponsored by the National Association of Broadcasters, is being planned for probably the early part of June. Job campaigns for high-school seniors, essay contests for students, invitations for young America to visit the studios and become better acquainted with radio are some of the activities which will receive emphasis.

CHICAGO, ILL.—Bill Stern, NBC sports announcer, was one of the passengers aboard the train that cracked up in a disastrous wreck at Little Falls, N. Y., April 19. The sports expert escaped with only minor bruises and wrenches, and arrived in Chicago to do his broadcast of Sunday, April 21.

TOLEDO, OHIO.—Jack Benny's feigned penny-pinching had a real repercussion recently. Stopping over in Toledo, Ohio, on his way to New York, Benny appeared on a program celebrating an anniversary of WSPD. He cracked: "Toledo—that reminds me of the time I put a penny in a scale in Chicago. I didn't get my weight and I didn't get my penny back. Who do I complain to?" The Toledo Scale Company heard about it. Although they no longer manufacture person-weighers,

they felt the honor of the whole industry and of the city was involved, so they wired their New York office and upon Benny's arrival in New York he was presented a refund check of one cent.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—"Pot o' Gold" seems to be settling down to a more gentle simmer in its legal difficulties. The Department of Justice has practically given the program clean bill of health, and other similar game shows which were examined will all probably receive the same green-light treatment.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The organized women of the country have agreed to several propositions outlined by broadcasters for better children's programs, and have thus taken an important step in clarifying and improving the situation, which has previously found women's clubs and radio officials at variance over standards of juvenile pro-

grams and what should or could be done to elevate them. The proposed plan suggests a more liberal basis for an intensive study of children's shows in general, with the women agreeing to endorse not only the programs judged meritorious but also the sponsors' products.

Kolfeborn in Europe

NEW YORK, N. Y.—H. V. Kaltenborn, now in the midst of an on-the-scenes tour to gather news of the European situation, is doing his regular NBC broadcasts on Saturday and Sunday from abroad. The commentator is visiting countries involved or likely to be involved in the war. It is his twenty-sixth trip to Europe in the last twenty-seven years, and he is accompanied as usual by his wife, who acts as his secretary.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Chase and Sanborn's concession at the 1940 New York World's Fair will feature a pup-

pet show timed to recordings of the voices of their Sunday air-show personalities—Bergen with McCarthy and Snerd; Donald Dickson and Vera Vague.

Pat O'Malley Gets Film Role

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF.—Pat O'Malley, "Alec Templeton Time" humorous monologist, has been signed by Hal Roach studios for his first Hollywood picture, "Captain Caution," possibly featuring Leo Carrillo. Pat's role will be that of a Cockney sailor captured during the War of 1812.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The Metropolitan Opera campaign for funds to maintain its existence has netted \$785,708. Of this total, \$267,679 was donated by the radio listeners in response to broadcast appeals during the intermissions of the Saturday opera matinees.

Eddie Cantor Gets Fred Allen Spot

Eddie Cantor will replace Fred Allen in the fall. Amplifying my report of last week, here is the real inside story of this scoop. On April 12 a half-dozen new shows were auditioned for Allen's sponsor. Of that group, Cantor doing his typical half-hour funfest came out number one. Accordingly, the sponsor took an option on him and later signed him. There are two reasons for the change—sales and cost per listener. The sale of the product Allen advertises has been "pretty good," but all admit it could be much better. As to cost, it is agreed that Allen is costing twice as much as Benny, which is too much. This "twice as much" figure is arrived at as follows: The talent cost for Allen is the same as for Benny; the network time cost for Allen is twice Benny's because it is an hour show; and Allen has only half as many listeners as Benny, which means the cost of reaching each listener is twice as much. What will happen to Allen when he goes off July 1? I definitely know that he has had six offers, at least one of which was for \$15,000 weekly. One of the offers came from Texaco.

BEHIND THE SCENES with

Mr. Big

Our 33rd President must be
master of black radio magic!

By Walter Compton

Presidential Announcer of the Mutual
Broadcasting System

PRESIDENTIAL BROADCASTING, under Franklin Roosevelt, has become so important that every candidate—including Jim Farley (center) and Jack Garner—must count on an Oval Room rendezvous with the American people

COME July, gentlemen of many political faiths will be straining for the highest office of our land. Come July, the platitudes will flow like water. So now is a specially good time to look into the quaint American habit of presidential broadcasting to see how it works and to conjecture whether or not it will be continued into 1941, provided the present occupant of the White House is no longer in residence.

But first we observe that Europe's rulers seem to have a far different conception of their broadcasting responsibilities or opportunities. Herr Hitler, for example, has never spoken from a room in the chancellery, be it oval or otherwise. He speaks on short notice and behind a picket fence of human protection. Neville Chamberlain has made one address from 10 Downing Street, but we do not recall any talk in support of, let us say, the Boy Scouts. Nor has he made any public utterances upon the occasion of library dedications, holiday festivals, or corner-stone laying.

Apparently the human and happy knack of friendly broadcasting from chief executive to people is reserved for these democratic states of ours. It is a knack which has gained great momentum under the present administration. No one will deny its mass effectiveness.

OF COURSE, there were other broadcasts from the White House before Roosevelt II became tenant. But they were undramatic affairs which smacked of the vocal conservatism of Herbert Hoover. Mr. Roosevelt's first fireside chat changed all that. It may have saved our nation. Like any other broadcast, a White House talk must have glamour. We have no laws of listening here. The moment a presidential utterance loses its "oomph," it also loses its audience.

Let's look into these broadcasts that

come "from the Oval Room."

The three major radio networks have set up their equipment at least four hours ahead of the scheduled speech. The Oval Room, which in more formal moments is referred to as a diplomatic reception-room, is actually egg-shaped. In the far left-hand corner is the presidential desk; in the three other corners of the room, in recessed doorways, are the improvised announcers' booths. A President, in surveying the scene before broadcast time, may look upon a room done in cream with maroon carpet and gold chairs. He may look upon portraits of his predecessors and their ladies, upon a battery of newsreel cameras whose operators look strangely inanimate during the course of the broadcast. They do not go into action until after the speech has been aired. Then are taken the excerpts which are shown on movie screens throughout the world.

THOUGH one may have been present for innumerable presidential addresses over the past few years, each has offered a new angle, for Mr. Roosevelt is no conformer. Always present is the buzzer which announces his arrival, the line of White House guards stationed twenty-four hours a day along the corridor of the basement in which the Oval Room is located. Always present is Nixon, a Negro butler resplendent in two shades of blue and brass buttons, who brings the silver caraffe and glasses. And always present is the inevitable presidential holder and cigarettes, which he chain-smokes with nonchalance that would do credit to Murads, which they are not.

Guests may vary from the First Lady to a room filled with movie stars, depending on the occasion. No matter what their identities, each of them gazes with awe at the eclat with which the President swings into form. Speaking before a microphone certainly does

not appal Mrs. Roosevelt, but once she opined that she couldn't help but marvel at the way the President works before the cameras. It would seem that he comes out just as he goes in!

As to the stars, the least impressed of all, to date, has been Mickey Rooney, who would have been quite floored had it not been that the gentleman next to him had a chronic cough. Young Mr. Rooney smirked and fidgeted and did the best he could under the circumstances, but it was almost too much for him. Second honors this year went to Dorothy Lamour, lovely to look at in aquamarine and a new coiffure. Doty would have come through with flying colors had they not seated her before the big gold mirror.

Above in the Blue, Red, Green and East rooms, the formal functions and larger receptions are held. But the Man of November, 1940, had best realize that the Oval Room is actually the focal point of the nation.

Currently, the procedure before each fireside chat moves with maximum precision. The three presidential announcers, Carleton Smith (NBC), Bob

Trout or John Charles Daly (CBS), and the writer (MBS), have checked their copy and agreed upon a stipulated number of seconds for their simultaneous introductions. Newsreel men and still photographers have completed their preparations, decided on angles and intensity of light. When the President enters, there is much bustle as he greets those he knows by name, little sub-rosa conversations with those he is more acquainted with.

Radio's toughest assignment even for an experienced man is ad-libbing—an ability to extemporize as the occasion demands. Any candidate will surely find that an inability to digress from the written manuscript will leave him amidst a human forest of yawns and restlessness. Franklin Roosevelt is least guilty on that score. As with most public officials today, the President furnishes confidential manuscript of the address. To follow that script one needs more than a little literary acrobatic ability. From the moment that we presidential announcers have introduced him, it is catch-as-catch-

Hollywood offered him another chance. Mr. Gable flipped a penny—"heads, the movies; tails, the stage." It came up heads. Mr. Gable still has the penny.

"So you see," said the crown prince, "it was luck."

Mr. Gable has a seven-year contract with M-G-M for \$2,000,000. He has Carole Lombard! Gentlemen, if luck does that to a man, then here's one fellow who begins today to make his troth with Lady Luck. We have an idea that ability and hard work had something to do with Mr. Gable's success. Luck may get a man to the top, but luck can't keep him there.

"HAVE you met Mrs. G?" Mr. Gable asked. "She's not working right now. You ought to go out to the farm and see her."

He was very serious. "I hope you understand one thing and that is that Mrs. G. and I want to live our own lives. We're rather proud of our home. We've never allowed a picture to be taken inside of our house. You understand, I hope. That's our home and we don't care to have our personal belongings spread before the eyes of the world."

And Mr. Gable meant it. That's another thing I like about the family. After all, a couple has a right to privacy.

Everybody who works with Mr. Gable calls him Clark. Even the man who fetched the mud called him by his first name. Mr. Gable will lean over backwards to give an extra a break. And why shouldn't he? He was an extra so long that they called him Ex for short. The first time he ever got any attention in the movies was as an extra. Extras are supposed never to get their faces before the camera. They might take some of the light from the stars. But many years ago, Mr. Gable almost stole a scene as an extra. He swears he didn't intend to. They never allow themselves to become bored.

"Boredom is the greatest sin in the world," Mr. Gable said. "And the only cure for boredom is hard work and an understanding marriage."

He and Mrs. Gable click because they never do the same things every day. They make life interesting. They entertain very little and have been to only two hot-spots during the first year of their marriage. They read a lot—good books.

ONE of Mr. Gable's favorite books is "Captain Horatio Hornblower," by T. S. Forester. One gathers the impression from Mr. Gable that he would like to play Hornblower, but another studio owns the rights. He never works in a story that he hasn't read. He and his wife usually get books before they are published and they really read them.

As a kid, Gable devoured tons of Alger books. It's a shame that Mr. Alger didn't know Mr. Gable, for the neurotic, hero-loving Mr. Alger could have done a humdinger called "The Kid From Cadiz."

"Be sure to come out to the farm," Mr. Gable said when we left him with his feet in the mud. "I'll show you some dogs and I'll show you a few tricks about plowing. We hope you like the farm. We have twenty acres and our house was built to be lived in—and not to show off."

The Gables are quite like their home. They want to live and not show off.

can. This man feels an audience. He finds a point here that needs clarification, and a moment or two later he may skip two sentences entirely, but each addition or deletion is vital to the delivery of the moment.

The gentleman with executive aspirations had best have a clear head. Mr. Roosevelt is not lacking on this score, either. Nothing shakes his equilibrium—not even a telephone which, in maddening proximity, rang loudly and long in the midst of his paragraphs. We later learned that it was a wrong number.

In the days before Hollywood, in his capacity as his father's secretary, James Roosevelt usually was present. One night Jimmy, who had a habit of resting one foot on a chair, found no empty chairs. He utilized the next best thing at hand, one of the boxes in which the networks bring their operating equipment. In the midst of the presidential address, the lid came down with a sharp, muffled crack on the parqueted floor. The secret-service men moved forward; the three announcers stepped from their booths; Jimmy looked sheepish. The President went right on talking.

These things, Mr. Nominee, are cases in point! At the Jackson Day dinners, the humor that is prevalent frequently is centered in the official statement, which more often than not is just a dash facetious. Perhaps 1941's bang-up political rally will fall on February 12 rather than January 8. Come what may, however, that rally will be the spot where extempore abilities show to the best advantage. For instance, that much-quoted remark in 1939, in which the tall wagged the dog, was an ad-lib affair—at least the writer can recall no mention of dogs or their posteriors in the manuscript release. In like manner, the now-famous "you can't have your cake and eat it" remark which took the wind from the sails of the now-assembled Congress. In so far as the official version was concerned, Marie Antoinette was the only person who had made any statements anent baking.

There is little audience response in the Oval Room, gentlemen. We are a tough audience. But before a crowd, no President with a flair for facility will kill a laugh. And there will be laughs, if the speaker is smart, for in times like these a light heart is vital.

The current administration makes every effort to cooperate with the three major networks. The broadcasting companies are advised that the President would like to speak on a specified date from a specified point. And if the White House chooses the time, you can rest assured that it will be at an hour when the majority of stations involved are non-commercial. For cancellations of commercial programs require rebates to advertisers, and the White House is well aware of the fact.

Such is the stuff of which Presidents are made. In our more than hundred and fifty years of existence as a nation, we have had thirty-two chief executives. At no time in our history has a fireside received more publicity than it has during the past seven years. Let no man with aspirations forget or overlook the fact that it has become a community mantle. Let him not forget or overlook the manner in which the medium through which it was popularized should be treated. Radio, as it is conducted in the United States today, is ready, willing and able to serve as a potent force in welding a nation. But the shrewdest blacksmith uses the truest steel.

WHICH returns us to the political tornadoes which are already beginning to blow across the country. Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Dewey are out ahead. Each is a resourceful advocate of the art of black radio magic.

Our 33rd President will be a talker. That is certain. Almost positively he will take his people into his confidence and consult with them by means of network broadcasts. If he is a doer as well as a talker, he will find a ready welcome. Only one among our many presidential hopefuls has thus far been present at a broadcast from the Oval Room. He has announced that he wants to be President, and he undoubtedly studied the situation with more than ordinary interest as he watched Franklin Delano Roosevelt these last eight years. He is in a position to evaluate craftsmanship. His name is Genial Jim Farley.

Third term or first term, we Americans like to talk things out. Most important, we can talk things out. We can say what we want to say as publicly as we wish. We can listen to words that come from the Oval Room. Or we can refuse to listen.

This system—call it American—must be pretty good.

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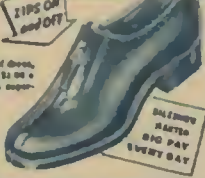
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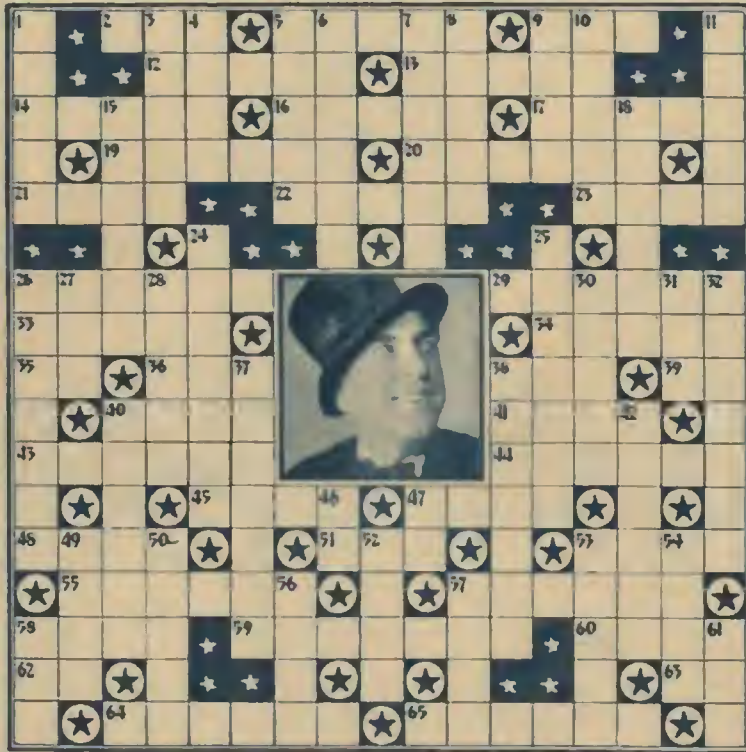
