Shakespeare Didn't Think It Could Happen

SHAKESPEARE, who wrote play or two and died in 1616, was lucky. His nightly audience for "Romeo and Juliet" and "Hamlet" was a thousand persons. He was a man of great imagination, but he never dreamed that drama would outgrow his theater. Today's radio dramatist never touches pen to paper for an audience smaller than a million.

Consider this: more people now listen to drama on the air each night than lived in the whole of England in Shakespeare's time. More people now listen to drama than to any other single form of radio entertainment.

Without drama, how poor our listening would be; with it, how rich it is. Most popular of all is the "Lux Radio Theater." Others come close behind: "Great Plays," the "Screen Guild Theater," "Campbell Playhouse," "Silver Theater," "Big Town," "First Nighter," "Knickerbocker Playhouse," "Cavalcade of America," and all the others.

We have been told by our readers that they would like to know more about the plays and more about the players. We know that radio's play-listening audience is both eager and enthusiastic. We have introduced, therefore, a department which will attempt to give more complete information than anything ever published. We ask you to sample it. We hope you will find much of importance in our "March of Drama." It's on page 13 of this number.

COMES the Resolution!

On January first a great leveling and human process occurs. It begins with the invariable phrase "Resolved that," and by its mysterious abracadabra makes the actor living in his luxurious mansion in Hollywood one with the merchant, the butcher, the baker of Podunk or Centerville. The birth of a new year is a time for planning, for putting into words the hidden dreams and ambitions. And the urge is universal.

We might go further. Come the first of July and the chances are neither the star nor the merchant, the butcher nor the baker will be able to recall the fine resolves made at the year's birth without referring back to articles like this. Somehow that seems comparatively unimportant. What is important is that, in this moment, New Year's resolutions become windows through which we may peer into the very souls of those who daily move about us; they are perhaps the best character-revealing institution we have devised. Let's look at what the stars wish for and dream of as the old year dies and a new one begins.

To almost all who have seen her on

the screen as well as many who know her personally in Hollywood, Rosalind Russell is one of Hollywood's foremost screwballs. Yet Miss Russell's undying ambition—and a resolution she hopes to keep, if not this year, then next—is to be so fixed financially that she can build and operate a home away from the city for children who are sick or crippled. Artistically, Miss Russell's resolves to play "the real American businessgirl as she really is" as soon as some script-writer succeeds in capturing that important American lady in ink. On the personal side, Miss Russell said, "I'd like to live on a desert island in the middle of Beverly Hills." But she qualified that by adding, "I'd like a direct telephone wire connecting me with all my friends, though."

A resolution obviously made to be broken—and all the more human for that very reason—is that of Claude Rains, who this year resolves not to talk so much about his small daughter, Jennifer. Rains is so much the doting father, his life is so wrapped up in the tiny youngster with the wide brown eyes and the curly hair that such a resolution becomes impossible from

the start. However, one of Claude's resolutions made at the birth of Jennifer and which is still in effect is noteworthy. He resolved that he would never spoil his daughter, and this little rich girl has never had too much of anything. She has a few toys, a simple bedroom, simple food and she is dressed without too much folderol.

Some resolutions, made entirely independent of each other, reveal odd quirks. On the 20th Century-Fox lot, for example, Dean Jagger, star of "Brigham Young" who is now making "Western Union," resolves that he will never play Romeo. A few sound-stages away, on the same lot, Gene Tierney, lovely romantic lead of "Hudson's Bay," resolves that some day she will play Juliet in "Romeo and Juliet." Which leaves Mr. Jagger not only out on the proverbial limb but surely in a mood to repent his just-expressed resolution. Jagger also wants to have enough money to raise fine horses some day, but his very personal resolution is to stay married to Antoinette Jagger and have six children!

Miss Tierney's personal ambitions run to farms, too, and she hopes to own her own farm in Connecticut and raise hogs, vegetables and hens. She also hopes that she will get married in 1941 . . . but she won't marry at all until Mr. Right comes along.

Don Ameche emphatically denies that he has made or will make any

resolutions this New Year, but Mrs. Ameche explained that that is because Don has no bad habits. "Whenever he discovers that he is doing something he doesn't like, then he cures himself. I guess any time of the year is resolution-making time for Don." But Don does have a couple of ambitions over and above just going along his happy domestic way and doing all right for himself in films and radio. He wants to play a role similar to that played by Paul Muni in "Hudson's Bay." In fact, he wanted to do that part but didn't get it. Also he wants to own and fly his own airplane, but the nearest he's come to achieving that is the toy plane with a gasoline motor he plays with in the back yard.

CARY GRANT is another who doesn't believe in New Year's resolutions. "Why make 'em the first of January?" he asked. "It's silly. I'm going to wait until the Fourth of July and then make a resolution not to make any New Year's resolutions." He also plans to poll his friends on July Fourth and see how many of them kept how many resolutions.

The resolution of Ingrid Bergman, lovely Swedish star, is perhaps expressive of a great many resolutions which will be made in the United States this year. She resolves to do everything in her power to reunite her family this year. Her husband is still

Any SOUVENIRS TODAY daddy?

Real trinkets of the stars at nominal prices by mail order is a different idea in giving

IF YOU'RE planning a trip to Hollywood; if you're a movie enthusiast interested in owning trinkets, *objets d'art*, other personal items belonging to your screen favorite; if you'd like to bring back from the land of celluloid and celebrities a monogrammed nightshirt belonging to Orson Welles or some equally intimate and personal relic of a star to make your friends' and neighbors' eyes bulge with surprise and grow green with envy, then your first stop will be at the "Attle of the Stars" in the Memento Mart, adjoining the Beverly Tropics at 427 Rodeo Drive, Beverly Hills, Calif.

We give the address because, even if you aren't planning such a pilgrimage, you can still do business with this unique business house through the mails. And what a business house! And for what a cause!

"The Attle of the Stars" is a Hollywood version of the old church rummage sale, the salesroom of a pawnshop and a de luxe second-hand store. The point of distinction between the "attle" and the foregoing institutions, however, lies in the fact that you can look long and hard in the former places to find some object which once belonged to a temporarily embarrassed gentleman or lady of distinction, while in the latter you'll have to look long and hard—and finally give up—to find some piece which did not belong to a screen celebrity, past or present.

For example, here you'll find make-up cases used by Charles Chaplin while filming "The Great Dictator"; cartridges from the blazing guns of Gene Autry; hose worn by Marlene Dietrich; a bed jacket worn in "Dark Victory" by Bette Davis; a negligee which once adorned—or was adorned by—Rita Hayworth. The prices are nominal, usually only a fraction of the original cost. The Mart is able to do this sort of business—and throw in a personally signed certification of each piece's authenticity from the star to boot—because the objects are given by the stars for a worthy cause.

Back of the Memento Mart stands one of the oldest and most respected of Hollywood charities—The Hollywood Guild. Purpose of the Guild from the day it was started was to

take the heartbreak out of heartbreak town, and while it hasn't succeeded in entirely accomplishing its aims, it has gone a long way toward that end.

The Guild was the brain-child of Mrs. Abraham Lehr, long engaged in charitable undertakings in the film metropolis. It grew of her realization that here, where so many youngsters, fired with ambition, come to seek fame and fortune and stay to exist in abject poverty rather than return to their homes and admit a failure they do not yet admit to themselves, there was a standing need for an organization set up to alleviate a condition which Hollywood, feeding upon new talent and ideas, must recognize as permanent.

First Mrs. Lehr contacted her successful friends in Hollywood, asking them for contributions of ten dollars a month to start this work. The response was heartening. Eddie Cantor and Ronald Colman each sent checks for \$250. Others followed. Within the first year the Guild moved twice to larger quarters. Today it carries on a far-flung work. Actors and actresses who earn just enough money to make them ineligible for aid at other agencies but not enough to provide them with the necessities of life are partially cared for until they either make their mark or admit failure. Milk is delivered to homes where there are children or invalids. Rents and past-due utility bills are paid in emergency cases. Necessary medical and dental work is provided. The Guild operates four houses, one a home for working mothers where children are cared for expertly at a small percentage of the mother's working wage.

In addition to the contributions, the Guild raises funds for its work by luncheons, garden parties and other means. Latest addition to the Guild's fund-raising activities—and perhaps the most popular—is the Memento Mart, which was the particular idea of Ron Ferguson, who is in charge of it. The Mart provides, for the first time, a place where fans may secure bona-fide objects used and owned by the stars at a price well within range.

Bang! The movies go military!
Madeleine Carroll to wed soon

HOLLYWOOD is in the Army' (and Navy) now! With everyone conscription-minded and the re-release of Warners' six-year-old "Here Comes the Navy" doing a record-breaking business throughout the land, movie lots are rushing to the sound-stages with military and naval scripts. Twentieth Century-Fox' "Tin Pan Alley"

already is on the screen, and that lot is readying "Rise and Shine," which deals with the draft. "He's My Uncle," a conscription musical, and "Trinidad," a story of American soldiers on the British island, are Columbia's contributions. Universal is filming "Buck Privates," with Abbott and Costello and the Andrews Sisters,

and the same lot's "Sky Raiders" serial, too, deals with national defense. Paramount practically has completed "I Wanted Wings" and is dickering with Fred Astaire for a revue-film embracing entertainment offered soldiers at army camps. Warner Bros. will star Eddie Albert in an army comedy entitled "Captain Ulysses Smith," and also has purchased a service story, "Navy Blues," by Arthur Horman. Republic Pictures is preparing to shoot "Rookie's Roost" . . . Call out the guard!

MOVIE-GOERS who crave to see something different will love "The Trail of the Vigilantes." It's a travesty on westerns and it's plenty amusing.

The unrestricted kidding of the familiar bang-bang horse-operas provides plenty of opportunity for broad comedy, and Universal hasn't missed a trick in putting the idea over. It's one of the funniest pictures made in a long time and is certain to amuse practically anyone.

Franchot Tone is cast as the city slicker who goes "out west" from Kansas City to solve a murder. His change in character begins when he arrives at "Peaceful Valley" and is met by flying bullets, bandits chasing people through the streets at gunpoint, runaway horses careening around corners, and an old-timer who says that things are "too quiet!" Really they don't ever calm down. It's Tone's first western role and his characterization is excellent.

Broderick Crawford carries on as a two-fisted ranch-hand, Mischa Auer is an actor-cowboy with unlimited accomplishments, and Andy Devine plays a valet-cowboy, descended from a long line of valets. The rancher's

daughter (Peggy Moran) introduces herself by leaping into Tone's arms and then tries to convince him that he needs her. He disagrees, but she won't give up. Warren William is a villain who runs away with the rancher's daughter as a hostage, but is caught.

"The Trail of the Vigilantes" is directed by Allan Dwan, famed director of old-time silent westerns. He uses many of the time-tried tricks of suspense and thrill technique.

Background scenes of the picture are the beautiful natural setting of the California Sierra mountains and foothills, all of which lend authenticity to the spectacular chase scenes.

"CHAD HANNA" is a colorful story of early American circus-makers, and as such will be enjoyed by every youngster and oldster who gets a kick out of the "big top." Indeed it is colorful, for the picture is photographed in Technicolor, and what could be more flamboyant than a circus, even one of the 1841 vintage, in which a lion was a novelty and an elephant something very few people even knew about?

Henry Fonda plays the role of Chad Hanna in perhaps the usual Fonda manner, and Dorothy Lamour is sexily revealed as a circus high-rider, whose glamour attracts clod Chad to join the circus. It is one of Miss Lamour's best acting jobs to date, and that goes double for Linda Darnell, who, as a runaway from a cruel father, is concealed by Miss Lamour and becomes an apprentice circus-rider. Guy Kibbee and Jane Darwell, as Mr. and Mrs. Huguenine, owners of the struggling little circus, practically steal the picture.

Circus history is brushed over lightly but interestingly to tell the

story of Chad and his unreciprocated infatuation for Albany Yates (Miss Lamour), which she conscientiously guides into true love for Caroline (Miss Darnell). Chad marries Caroline, but in his mind has the reservation that he really is in love with Albany. So, when he has an argument and quits Huguenine's circus because of the death of its lion, he hunts up Albany, and in a bedroom scene with few holds barred he discovers that really he is in love with his wife, Caroline. So, to return to her, Chad makes good by finding an elephant for Huguenine's show and saving it from financial disaster at a crucial moment.

"Chad Hanna" is a good picture, thrilling and romantic.

"Go West"

THIS Marx Brothers' effort should put them back to their old standing with their many fans, for it is undoubtedly the best picture they have made in some years. It is mirthquakingly funny in spots.

The story concerns the misadventures of the three brothers as they go west to find gold. Groucho's wit is pitted against Chico and Harpo, who meet in a railroad station. In trying to outwit the other two boys, Groucho finds himself stranded on the station platform. Harpo and Chico arrive out west and come into possession of a deed to property which the railroad wants to buy for a big price. They trade the deed as an I O U for a short beer. Groucho arrives on the scene, and when they all find out what the property is worth they try to get the deed back into their hands. Chico steals it from the cash-register.

The boys become involved with villains Robert Barrat and Walter Woolf King, who outwit them and obtain the deed again when they learn of its value. Then the boys think up another plan. They enter Barrat's apartment at night and blow his safe

open with a blast of dynamite but not without a lot of side-splitting antics. They finally get the deed and bring the crooks to justice.

Through all this nonsensical story John Carroll and Diana Lewis (Mrs. Bill Powell) provide the romance. For one of the few sane moments John Carroll, accompanied by the Marx Brothers, sings a beautiful number, "Ridin' the Range." High-spots in music are Harpo's harp solo, "From the Land of the Sky Blue Water," and a piano number by Groucho.

Typical gag: When confronted with Indian trouble, Groucho casually remarks to the chief, "Are you the chief that runs between New York and Los Angeles in thirty-nine hours?"

"Victory"

JOSEPH CONRAD'S "Victory" becomes a stirring melodrama with high emotional peaks, thanks to the suppressed acting and finesse of its leads, Fredric March and Betty Field, in this movie of the widely read novel.

There is, unfortunately, at times a noticeable lack of the Conrad fire; there is also sufficient action to dispute any charge that it is boring.

Set in the Dutch East Indies, "Victory" tells the story of an almost hermit-like Dutchman, Hendrik Heyst, played by Fredric March, of his failure to keep the world from seeking him out and hurting him and his inability to bar love from his island retreat. Romance is personified by Miss Field, as Alma, a pianist in a touring girls' orchestra, who is being pushed about considerably by the orchestra's leader, Mekanoff (Fritz Feld), and who is sought as his mistress by the greedy, pig-like Innkeeper, Schomberg, a part handled most expertly by Sig Rumann. Alma repulses the advances of Schomberg, and aided by the suspecting Mrs. Schomberg seeks out Heyst as her champion and escapes with him.

Enter as horrible a trio of villains as ever has been portrayed on the screen—Mr. Jones, a renegade Englishman superbly characterized by Sir Cedric Hardwicke; Ricardo, his cockney English cutthroat secretary, most convincingly brought to life by Jerome Cowan, and a mute Zombie-like East Indian, played by Lionel Royce. The three blow into Sourabaya and register at Schomberg's hotel where they stay and bilk townsfolk at crooked card games until the panicky Schomberg thinks of a way to rid himself of them. This he does by setting them in pursuit of Heyst whom he describes as a wealthy man.

How Heyst and Alma rise to the threat of the unholy three is the climax of the drama.

Humphrey Bogart, Hollywood's bogieman de luxe, hasn't what most actors have—and therein lies his real success

HUMPHREY BOGART is not in the Hollywood groove. He is a non-conformist, a free-thinking gent, and a very arbitrary guy. The differential might be emphasized further by saying that bad man Bogie is on the intellectual side, and boasts of such pals as John Chapman, Jimmy Cagney and Dave Chasen. There's a rumor about Hollywood that he has few friends. Perhaps that's true, but the friends he does select and the friendships he maintains are true.

A fellow can't go around giving people advice and keeping friends. Bogie has found that out. Nevertheless, he is forever advising his actor and actress co-workers (including even Bette Davis) how they should act a scene. His leer scares others away. He likes to talk to people, but his in-born sarcasm riles up ill-will in almost every lengthy conversation, and his contrary thoughts, which make people disagree with him, likewise cause them to think he is a very disagreeable guy, which really is the exact opposite of what he is.

However, Bogart's lack of popularity doesn't bother him in the least, for among the friends he does have he is known as a most interesting and amusing companion. He has a great sense of humor and doesn't take himself seriously, although he does take his work seriously and does a good job always on the stage or set. He is intelligent. He is a champion of the underdog, has many secret pet charities.

Bogie has his own philosophy of how to get along in Hollywood. To quote him, it is "Read all you can, hear as much as possible, say very little, and deny nothing. People get tired very quickly of talking about anyone who can't be bothered enough to deny even the wildest rumors about himself." So the columnists and busy-bodies don't talk about Humphrey Bogart and his wife, Mayo Methot.

Bogart is perhaps best described by what he has NOT. He boasts that for all the years he has been in and out of New York City, he never (1) visited the Statue of Liberty or the Aquarium, (2) went atop the Empire State Building, (3) saw "Abie's Irish Rose," (4) had his photograph taken by Grant's Tomb. Neither has he ever (1) listened to Amos 'n' Andy, (2) read "Anthony Adverse" or "Gone

With the Wind," (3) played Mah Jong, monopoly, Chinese checkers, backgammon or gin rummy, or (4) read any of the verses of Edgar Guest.

He sums up the above entertainment and accomplishments thus: "Those all come under the head of 'mass activities.' I like to conquer my own worlds, not those that Errol Flynn has subdued before me!"

Incidentally, Bogie has a particular aversion to Errol Flynn's tall tales. In reality, the actors are good friends, but still Bogart is a tall-tale teller himself, who finds few to believe him, while nearly everyone accepts Flynn's yarns without question. That annoys Bogie.

Bogart likes villain roles because they are exciting. He enjoys a good fight and quick fadeout. Then, too, he says, "When the heavy, full of crime and bitterness, grabs his wounds and talks about death and taxes in a husky voice, the audience is his and his alone."

However, Bogie would like a bit of sympathy or love-life added to his baddie roles, even though he is convinced that no one loves a bad man. Says he, tossing one of his favorite darts at a pal, "It's a penalty for not being as beautiful as Wayne Morris!" Take that all with a grain of salt, for Bogart still knows that people love to have someone to hate.

BOIE came to Hollywood first in 1931, made some westerns and several bad starts. His first screen break occurred several years later when he played the villain opposite Leslie Howard in "The Petrified Forest," and from that time on he hasn't been able to leave the Warner Bros. lot, where he's just finishing up "High Sierra," a bang-up picture from all reports.

Out there the boys in the publicity department call him the "press agent's delight." He thinks up good stories about things that either he really has done, that he hasn't done but should have, or he might have done. All of which usually come out in print as things he really did do!

Whenever the boys in the publicity department are stuck for a story to give to the newspapers, they page Bogie and get one right out of his sleeve.

His salary, not divulged by Warner Bros., probably runs somewhere between \$1,500 and \$2,000 a week.

That's not a lisp you frequently hear on the Bogart sound-track, but a mannerism he has of sucking his words through his front teeth. He elps his words and syllables incessantly in heavy parts and scenes, and his stiff lip and short haircut have become his definite bad-man trademark.

Bogart and his wife like to nightclub at good eating- and drinking-spots, such as Don, the Beachcomber's, and Dave Chasen's restaurant. When the Bogarts go out for an evening, Humphrey has a habit of picking up paper matches in each spot they visit as a morning reminder to where they were the night before. Which recalls an experience they had in Chicago while on the legitimate stage. He was living at the Congress Hotel, and one morning after a particularly big night of celebrating following the final curtain, he awakened to hear cooing and billing. Slowly winking one eye open, he surveyed the situation; saw a row of pigeons on his bed footboard, and glancing up, saw another row roosted on the headboard of his bed. "Shoo, go away," he said. "Don't try to make me believe you are really here!"

When a circus is in town he has another favorite recreation—attending every moment he can. "Dumb animals are the best actors in the world," he says.

The late Maud Humphrey, the artist, who passed away at the age of seventy-five on November 22, was his mother. He inherited some of her ability, and sketches for his own amusement. His favorite sport is golf, which he shoots in the 70's, although he tells his friends he's a 90 man in order to save betting-money. He has several hole-in-one notches on his driver, and his golfing cronies at Lakeside Country Club in North Hollywood are Bing Crosby and Henry

O'Neill. Although he plays tennis a bit, he hates tennis and tennis rackets because of his early stage experience with walk-on roles. In those he was always given a racket and a line to accompany it to the effect, "How about a game of tennis?" And then he made his exit, no longer to be seen on the stage for that particular play. At any rate, that is one of his favorite stories and aversions.

His wardrobe is predominantly gray and black. Very seldom does he wear blue except in a picture gangster role. His taste is really ultra-conservative and unspectacular. He never wears gloves off stage because they have become a symbol of lawlessness to him. All of his screen villains wear gloves to conceal their finger-prints.

HIS shirt-tail is just as apt to be out as tucked into his trousers, depending upon how the spirit moves him.

His home servant staff includes a cook and a maid, but on the cook's night out he helps wife Mayo Methot wipe the dishes. He owns two very conservative-appearing cars, rents the home in which they live, and it has no swimming-pool. His ambition, since he claims he is a very lazy man, is to make and save enough money to retire and loaf forever. His advice on saving money is amusing. He claims he buys annuities as often and as substantially as his bank account will permit, and does not buy stocks on margin. (He once worked with an investment house.) He recommends to his fellow actors and actresses to swim in a bathtub instead of in a swimming-pool, and believes that this would save the average actor an investment of \$20,000 plus at least \$600 a year for water. He caps his saving advice with, "I ought to be rich by now, but I'm not. Still, I have the rent paid a month in advance."

Although bad-man Bogie, or Bogieman if you prefer, is a man of strong likes and dislikes, despite his reputation he has had few arguments with his studio. One recent one occurred over his wardrobe required for "It All Came True." Since stars are supposed to supply their own wardrobe for modern settings, he was asked to bring his own pajamas for one particular scene. "But," he explained grimly, "I sleep nude!"

(The studio bought the pajamas!)

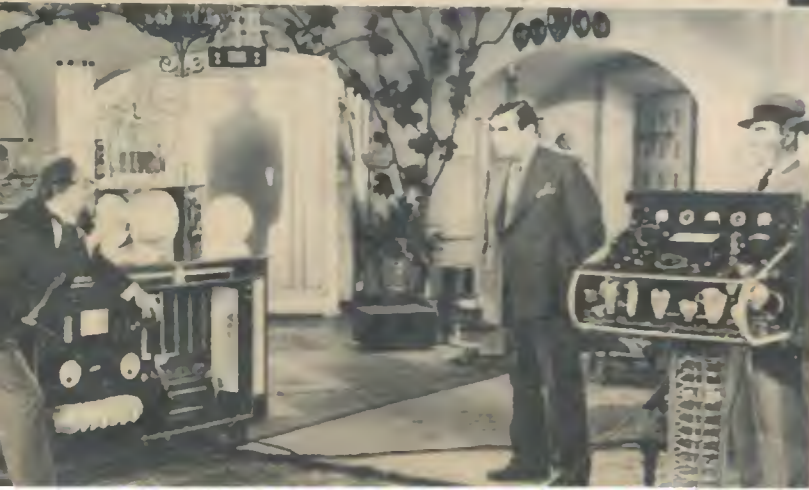

Here is another lively and humorous opera by Donizetti, whom most people usually think of only as the composer of the gloomy "Lucia." "The Daughter of the Regiment," with its light, tuneful music, is almost an operetta. The scene is laid in the time of the Napoleonic wars and opens in a Tyrolean village, where the French Twenty-First Regiment of Grenadiers is billeted. Marie, the spoiled darling of the regiment, is the adopted daughter of Sergeant Sulpice, who had found her years before abandoned on a battlefield. She dresses in the uniform of the regiment and loves to play the drum. She has fallen in love with a young Tyrolean, Tonlo, who saved her life. He is dragged in by soldiers who suspect him of spying. Marie begs for his release and he decides to join the regiment and marry Marie. Meanwhile, the old Marquise de Birkenfeld discovers through papers shown her by the Sergeant that

Marie is her niece, and takes her away to her castle. The second act shows Marie trying to learn how to be a lady and hating it. The Marquise plans to marry her to a nobleman. The regiment arrives, Tonlo is now a captain, and Marie decides to run away with him. But then the Marquise is revealed as Marie's mother, and in order not to hurt her, Marie promises to stay. She sings a farewell to her old life which so moves the Marquise that she consents to Marie's marriage with Tonlo, and the opera ends with a brilliant "Salute to France" sung by the whole ensemble.

There is that sublimely serious spirit in his Mass. He was not a church-goer, but he was sincerely religious. True devotion sounds in the music, imbued also with deep human feeling.

The separate parts are those of the conventional Mass form, the Kyrie, Gloria, etc., ending with the Agnus Dei. Beethoven sets his soloists and massed voices a formidable task, for this composition is probably the most difficult of all choral works, and on that account rarely performed.

In listening to it, you might remember that when Beethoven finished the Mass, he wrote on the manuscript, "From the heart—may it go to the heart."

News from the Music Front

IN SPITE of wars and elections and other upsets, composers keep right on composing and word comes to this department that Rachmaninoff is completing a new symphonic score; that Charles Wakefield ("Waters of the Minnetonka") Cadman has finished a new composition for piano and orchestra; that Igor Stravinsky's new symphony is ready to be heard; that Shostakovich of Russia, whose Sixth Symphony was premiered on the air some weeks ago by Leopold Stokowski and the Philadelphia Orchestra, has just written a seventh, dedicated to Lenin; that Alec Templeton has a concert piece to his credit and will compose the entire score for the musical play given annually by the Bohemian Club of San Francisco during its summer high-links in the red-wood forests; and that Walt Disney's next full-length feature film will be "Alice in Wonderland," with music especially written by Deems Taylor, who will not use his "Through the Looking Glass Suite" but will create a new and original score.

Toscanini's contract with NBC comes up for renewal this season and there is a question as to whether or not he will re-sign for another three years. He has had offers from Buenos Aires and other South American cities, and is said to be thinking them over. In spite of our declared Good Neighbor policy, we can't afford to spare Toscanini, and this writer for one hopes that his name will soon go on the dotted line for another NBC contract.

A new and different sort of music encyclopedia has just appeared called "Who's Who in Music." Published by the Lee Stern Press, 10 South La Salle Street, Chicago, and priced at \$5.00. It is subtitled "A Complete Presentation of the Contemporary Musical Scene." The book gives as thorough a picture as can be found anywhere of what is going on in music today. Among other features it includes short biographies of most of the outstanding living musicians; a section on contemporary musical literature; a musical quiz section; hundreds of photographs of musicians; over a hundred articles and editorials by foremost authorities, covering every phase of music written; a five-foot

shelf of recorded musical masterpieces; and a master record catalog with a complete list of the recordings of the domestic companies.

Members of the editorial board include Leonard Lieblich, Hans Rosenwald, Rudolph Ganz, Pitts Sanborn, Joseph Maddy, etc., and among its contributors are John Barbrohl, Oscar Thompson, Lauritz Melchior, Tommy Dorsey, Serge Koussevitzky, Benny Goodman, Deems Taylor and Walter Damrosch.

Certainly no music library is complete without this book, not only for the information it contains but also for its exceptionally interesting reading matter. And of course the record catalog is invaluable.

Record Review

Three new Columbia releases just received are the "Haensel and Gretel" Suite (Humperdinck), played by Howard Barlow and the Columbia Symphony Orchestra (M-424); Symphony No. 2 (Sibelius), by the New York Philharmonic Orchestra under John Barbrohl (M-423); and the Quartet in F (Ravel), by the Budapest String Quartet (M-425).

Of the three, the Ravel Quartet is by far the best recording. This is Ravel's only quartet, and although modern in idiom and feeling, it is music of great charm and delicacy. The Budapest Quartet plays it superbly well in this recording.

The "Haensel and Gretel" Suite consists of excerpts from the well-known children's opera. Including the Dream Pantomime scene. Howard Barlow conducts it with tenderness and grace, and the recording is unusually good.

Least successful of the three releases is the Sibelius symphony, which lacks brilliance. The recording is technically fine, but the work has been played and conducted better in other versions which have been available for some time.

(Correction: Under last week's review the Tschalkowsky Fifth Symphony was wrongly mentioned as a recording of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. This should have read the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Artur Rodzinski. Excuse it, please.) —V. L.

Musician of the Week Lily Pons

Portrait of Mrs. K., who has a husband and a career, and is pleased with both

MRS. ANDRE KOSTELANETZ has a terrible time keeping candy away from her husband. As he is more than slightly inclined toward plumpness, candy is very bad for him.

"An' he love it," declares his doting wife, otherwise known as Miss Lily Pons. "He see a box of bonbons and r-r-right away he put his han' in and he push all the top away, like a little boy to see what is under."

Mrs. K. is very happily married, which should come as no surprise to anyone, considering the miles of print that have appeared about this particular matrimony.

"Nous sommes un bon ménage," she says with pride. Freely translated this means "We are a satisfactory household," which is the most complimentary thing a French person can say about a marriage. It means that they are content with each other, that their house and their garden, and their food and their wine and life in general satisfy them. Mrs. K. is very proud of all this and likes to talk about it. In fact, it's difficult to make her talk about anything else.

The Metropolitan is reviving a cheery Donizetti opera for her this Saturday. In it, she is happy to inform you, "I mar-r-ry the man I love at the end, and they don't mur-r-der me." She also admires the costumes designed for it. She dresses up as a sort of lady-corporal of Napoleon's army, complete with cockaded hat and epaulettes. She goes into ecstasies over the color of the uniform, a brilliant hussar-blue with bright crimson trimmings, and wishes passionately for Technicolor television so that radio audiences might see the colorful production instead of merely hearing it. Having dutifully mentioned these details, Miss Pons went happily on about how Kostl "love to r-r-read. He has a bibliotheque—you know, a library—full of travel books, hundreds of them, about Africa, South America, India. Eve-r-r-y minute he

come in with another one.

"He is what we call 'une bonne fourchette,' or 'a good fork,' you would say. That mean' he like to eat. An' the food mus' be good . . . and he like a nice wine to go with it. He play tennis a lot, and swims, an' he help me with the garden at home (in Con-

necticut). He cut the gr-r-ass.

When she talks, Miss Pons is relaxed and composed. She uses none of the fluttering gestures usually associated with her tiny, bird-like type. But her face is extraordinarily mobile and changing. Only once did it become clouded and sad, when she mentioned the war. Her mother, fortunately, is here with her but her two sisters are still in France. The husband of one is in a German prison camp, and Miss Pons has brought their child over here. But she didn't stay sad very long. Her eyes lighted up with a sparkle of pure rage when she mentioned the causes of France's fall, and it is evident that Hitler would suffer some slight damage if Miss Pons could get her small but capable hands on him.

"Kostl, too, you know, lose his country Russia after the revolution. An' how strange is the world. All his family went separate ways. An' finally they all arrive in New York. An' they only find it out much later. A few weeks ago I was on Kostl's new show (Coca-Cola) that he is so proud of. It was ver-r-y moving, because I had just receive' my American citizenship. Mr. Spalding make a beautiful speech. And Hendrik Willem van Loon, you know, the writer, who live not so far from me, send me a drawing all in color for 'The Daughter of the Regiment,' and under the name he put a whole regiment carrying all the American flags from the beginning of America till now. An' I think how this country is a paradise for people, how they look toward it as heaven. Now, I am an American, and so ver-r-y proud and thankful."—V. L.

So, since "We, the Abbotts" made listeners' acquaintance last fall, there has been a continuing series of complications. Mr. Abbott (played by John McIntire), as superintendent of schools, already has brought to justice a corrupt politician. Mrs. Abbott's (Ethel Everett) sister, Madelyn Ordway (Esther

Ralston), who arrived at the Abbott household to spend some time while divorce proceedings against her husband are developing, becomes a problem aunt. As though she didn't have enough to worry her already, she immediately—and innocently—precipitates a conflict between her niece, Barbara (Audrey Egan), and Bill Morgan, a newspaper editor (House Jameson). And son Jack (Cliff Carpenter) keeps things from getting dull—if that is a possibility—by falling in love with Trudy Campbell (Virginia Kaye), daughter of his own father's most bitter enemy. Here is a program that is out to prove how great an institution is the American home. Tempests—either of the teapot or tragic variety—may beset this family, but family ties always hold. Fortunately, "We, the Abbotts" has proved, too, how interesting is the American home.

I BOMBED BRINDISI

BY MARTIN AGRONSKY

You'll get a jarring sense of closeness to the war in Europe from this actual experience of a radio reporter

Only once or twice during the course of a war does a reporter succeed in capturing the real, stomach-turning reality of the many horrible moments experienced by those who pass through war. One of those rare occasions was when Martin Agronsky, newest addition to the European news staff of NBC, flew over the Italian base of Brindisi in a British bomber on a deadly mission and gave to the listening world an account of his experience, which will not soon be forgotten. We are proud to reprint this standout piece of war-reporting here.

In 1938 Agronsky went to Italy to do a series of articles for Foreign Affairs magazine, then served in the Paris bureau of International News Service. He covered the Spanish Civil War as a free-lance, covered the Palestine Conference in London for Time magazine and, in December, 1939, did his first NBC broadcast from Geneva, Switzerland. Early this year, with events shifting rapidly to Central Europe, he transferred his activities for the broadcasting company to that area.—Editor.

NO MORE than twenty-four hours ago I stood beneath the great, flat, whalelike nose of a British night bomber at a moonlit airdrome somewhere in the Middle East. I stared about the landing-field in the calm, peaceful rays of the moon, murderously grim with the rest of the bombers with whom I was to fly over the Mediterranean to Greece, from Greece to the Aegean, over it to the Italian target at Brindisi. The zero hour is ten minutes off. From a seat in the glass nose in back the second pilot yelled, "Contact." The giant propellers slowly swung over; great gobs of orange flame spat forth from the exhaust pipe and the motors gave a deafening roar. The ground trembled beneath my feet with vibration. With the rest of the crew I checked over my equipment. Flying-jacket buttoned tight, helmet, with respirator and ear-phones okay, flying-boots on, parachute-harness clipped and buckled and parachute tack ready.

We looked like men from Mars. The rest of our crew tested their buckles and straps. The first pilot yelled, "Is the ear flap of my helmet okay? Don't forget, if you have to jump, count three, pull the ring and pray like hell."

I yelled back, "Okay." He smacked me on the back, smiled and threw his fist in the air, the pilot's gesture of thumbs up, and made a motion to climb the ladder in the plane's belly.

IHAD to crouch in the low gangway behind the pilot's seat. I squeezed through, turned over the water-tank and stood up in the platform and put my head in the glass dome in the center, the astral hatch they call it. I plugged my ear-phones in the communication system; up in the pilot's seat I could hear Mac checking his instruments. The engine gave a deafening scream, the great plane quivered. We began to move, slowly at first, and then faster and faster. Our bomb load was so heavy we needed a very long run, and at last we flashed past the boundary lights; we were in the air. From the post in the astral hatch in the center of the fuselage I could see the airdrome lights dropping away astern. We climbed steadily up, right in the rays of the moon, two thousand, three, five, ten; at fifteen thousand feet we leveled off. In a few minutes we were over the Mediterranean. It was flat, a dead calm, the water black, glassy-looking, not a ripple. I looked over my shoulder along the fuselage. I felt as if I were riding in some prehistoric monster, a great, fat, tapering cigar-like back, a giant tail, squat, stubby side-flippers.

We droned on over the sea. In an hour I heard in my ear-phones, "There is Greece." I looked over the wing and saw the Greek coast, then the rough, flat mountains, high, sharp and forbidding. We were over the mountains now, and then over the sea again, this time the Aegean.

Four hours had passed. I slept a little on the navigator's cot. Now he came back and took me by the shoul-

der. He leaned down and yelled into my ear, "Okay, America, get up. They have got the barrage up."

I climbed up into the astral hatch again. Directly ahead I could see the Italian coast, and it really looked like a boot, as I have been told in a geography book. There was a cloud over Brindisi. We were the fourth plane on the target and the Italians had been thoroughly waked up. Up through the cloud bank a terrible rain of steel was searching us out. I could see it exploding, a deathlike blanket over Brindisi. There would be first a red burst, then a green one, then an orange one, white and black puffs of smoke floated everywhere; weaving a crimson pattern through the whole field of fire came the red and orange tracer-bullets of the pompom guns. I was scared, terribly scared. My stomach dropped sickeningly when I realized we had to go through that hellish curtain. In a few minutes we were in it. All around us the bursts began to come thicker and faster. We rocked from side to side with the force of the explosions as they came nearer. I could see them bursting right beside us, the fiery belch of lead and orange flame. Now we were over the target. Up in the nose the observer lay flat on his belly beside the bomb release, waiting to drop our cargo of destruction.

Through the ear-phones I could hear him shriek at the pilot to find a break in the cloud blanket. I had to hold with all my strength to the roof straps as we dived and swerved and circled through the barrage, looking for a hole in the clouds. I had lost my fear. Death was too near to worry about it. Another yell in the ear-phones, "Steady, Mac, I see the hangar."

I looked down through the cloud gap. I could see the airdrome of Brindisi. Suddenly I felt the plane shoot up into the air. The first stick of bombs was gone. Down through the hole in the clouds I watched them go. Then in quick succession four great orange bursts of flame light up the ground. Beneath us the white clouds went

golden when the bombs burst. The first stick was on the target. Still we circled and the barrage was getting thicker and closer. The air was filled with metal, with greasy, black high-explosive puffs of smoke, but we weren't out to bomb civilians; we were after the target, the military target, and we had to stay there until we could see it. It seemed hours in that awful barrage. Once more I heard the navigator yell, "Steady it, Mac." Once more I felt the leap into the air as the second stick of bombs went hurtling down onto the target, and once more the clouds lit up with the orange flame of our bursting bombs. At last we had done our job, all the bombs were gone. The great wings dropped toward the earth as we swung round in a sharp turn toward home.

BACK through the barrage and out through the night thick around us. Just over my head the shell of a naval gun exploded in a fiery crimson burst. I felt like I could put out my hand and touch it. It was too near. I was scared again and dived off my platform in the plane. We still rocked in the air-pockets from the explosions. At last we were through it. I climbed up again and looked back. We were past the curtain of fire. Over the cloud bank I could see the Italian guns were still searching for us, hunting for us. The sky was still filled with hurtling steel, through which we had just come. For half an hour we droned homeward. We could see the shell-puffs behind us, and I was deathly tired now. I climbed down and slept again on the navigator's cot. When I awoke I climbed up in the hatch again. We were over the sea. Behind us the night was blue black. Dead ahead the first pale red glow of the rising sun turned the night stars golden. We flew on into the dawn, out of the darkness, toward the sun, toward light.

Then Mac came back and patted me on the shoulder and yelled once more in my ear, "Okay now, America. You may write about this one."

BONNIE BAKER is in the movies now, playing a picture written around her in a part tailored to her pint-size. Pint-size physically, you understand, as there is nothing pee-wee about Bonnie's personality or performance. And decidedly nothing lightweight about her sense of loyalty. It's an accepted fact around Hollywood now that there's no chance to separate Bonnie from Orrin Tucker's band. She feels that Orrin is responsible for anything she has accomplished and even puts the blame for her amazing success with "Oh Johnny" on his shoulders. Because "he picked the song for me."

The great difference between Bonnie Baker and the hundreds of motion-picture stars and near-stars the writer has known can't be measured in inches or pounds. Only a self-approval meter could gauge such dissimilarity.

The other day I stood beside Paramount's tiny discovery, watching thirty odd dogs of all sizes and colors skidding across the waxed floor of a "You're The One" set, yelping for fresh hamburger that was sending them on an imaginary coon-hunt.

While Jerry Colonna and others as screwy raced about with butterfly nets, trying to spear the dogs, one strange, hairy little mutt that looked like a discouraged floor-mop stood in a confused daze throughout the entire four "takes."

"I call that one 'Bonnie,'" she confided, "because he's just like me. He's out there in the center of everything and doesn't know what it's all about. I don't believe he even smells the meat."

"They tell me this picture is a natural for me—that the part I'm playing is Bonnie Baker to a 'T'. I certainly hope so, because I'm in as much of a daze as that little pooch. But everybody on the picture seems to have an awful lot of confidence in something. I hope it's in the director, because I've never had any experience in acting, I've never danced and nobody has ever accused me of being a glamour girl. All I've ever done is sing."

Sing and sigh, Bonnie. Don't forget that million-dollar sigh.

And, Bonnie, they say that because vanity and conceit are the tinliest part of your tiny self, every actor in the picture is personally seeing to it that you click. Maybe they've taken over the Galahad role those tough gamblers used to play when they made sure you got home safely after singing in their night-clubs.

With no temperament to battle, director Ralph Murphy is just sailing along, shaking hands with himself.

"I don't know how we can miss with this kid," Ralph says. "All the camera has to do is pick up her personality and it's in the bag. And I'm not even figuring on the dynamite she packs in her songs. You can say for me that this girl really has something."

WITH no theatrical experience, no dramatic coaching, no dance training—where did she get it?

All over the country. You see, it's like this with Bonnie—

Born in Houston, Texas, April 1, 1918, Bonnie was soon moving about in a big way. Her stepfather, of whom she is unusually fond, was district manager of a drug-store chain. He traveled about his territory a great deal, and, as Bonnie wasn't much bigger than a dollar watch, usually took her along.

So she happened to be attending the Mt. DeSales Academy in Macon, Georgia, when that school decided to put on a little musical show in the basement of the church. Bonnie played the part of a singing celebrity over

whom the gilded youth of the community were stumbling, a characterization that was a trifle handicapped by her size and the moral restrictions of the academy.

But as small as Bonnie was, she managed to catch the eye of band-leader Monk McAllister, who had dropped in to see his little niece in the play.

Soon Bonnie was singing for his band Friday and Saturday nights at the Macon Country Club. So, at fourteen, she had started her professional career—at five dollars a week.

When school was out Bonnie returned to Houston, and at fifteen was making fourteen dollars a week, singing in the various spots around her home town. She was quite a fixture in the cafeteria at the Rice Hotel,

experiencing the coldest weather since Valley Forge.

"That was in St. Louis at fifteen above. We started driving north, and every mile we drove I knew I was getting at least a league closer to North Pole. We hit zero—and a blizzard—in Iowa. We had to abandon our cars in Waterloo. They held the train there for us for twenty-five minutes while we loaded our stuff from the truck into the baggage car.

"Through the blinding snow I counted three engines on our train. And still we got into St. Paul three hours late—and missed our luncheon and afternoon show. St. Paul has always been a kind of hoodoo to me. The next time we went there we had a wreck. There were five of us in the car: Orrin, his mother and three girls.

Bonnie Baker still sings—and
sighs her million-dollar sigh

where the orchestra performed during luncheon. In the summer the orchestra went up on the roof and Bonnie was the "top" singer in town.

Soon she was making excursions into the hinterland of Texas. An agent friend took care of her bookings—without charge. He'd find out where a singing job was to be had and sic Bonnie on it. And if she didn't get her meals where she sang, her salary zoomed from fourteen to twenty-five dollars a week.

It was at this period that our half-pint heroine left the orchestras to go on her own as a singing act in floor shows.

Bonnie was seventeen when Orrin Tucker saw her act in a floor show in St. Louis. One look and one listen, and Orrin asked her to join his band at the Claridge Hotel in that city. This coming January they will have been together for five years.

"One of the first things I did with the band," says Bonnie, "was to take a little ride. From St. Louis to St. Paul. I'd never been north before and my thin blood resembled a raspberry sherbert after a few days in St. Louis. I would have bet we were ex-

I was the only one who got hurt.

Without attempting to follow the fortunes and travels of the small-time band and its tiny singer during the next couple of years, we'll pick them up in the Palmer House in Chicago, where they were rated as sufficient if not sensational.

Came then Old Chicago week—inspired by the motion picture "In Old Chicago." Bonnie, who had just been singing with the band, was put in the big show the Palmer House was staging, and for which Orrin and his orchestra were playing. Dressed in the costume of the day, Bonnie was to sing an old-time song—one with plenty of swing that the large chorus of girls in costume could go to town in.

After much digging in the old files of the music publishers, Orrin came up with a song Abe Olman had written some twenty years ago. It was called "Oh Johnny."

Since everybody else in Chicago seemed to be outdoing himself for the big week, Bonnie decided she should give the song some sort of a catchy little twist.

"I tried all sorts of things," says Bonnie, "but nothing seemed to be

just right. The song was so catchy and snappy in itself there wasn't much you could do to pep it up. When I was about to give it up I suddenly remembered how, when I was a kid in school and an exceptionally good looking boy would go by, we girls would sigh and say: "Oh, he's a darling."

"It suddenly struck me that nobody knew how much heart a girl could put into a sigh like that. So I decided I'd show 'em by polishing off the last 'Oh Johnny' in the song with a sigh like that.

"I tried it that night in the show, but nobody seemed to notice it. Probably because the chorus of girls came in just as my song ended.

"Then we went into the Chicago Theater. Not having any other old song to replace it, I sang 'Oh Johnny' there, too. Feeling I was stuck with the song, the sigh at the end really came from my heart. And, as the band faded to just a whisper and there was no girl chorus galloping in on the last bar, that sigh sorta—well, it kinda—anyhow, somebody out in the audience yelled 'Eeyoweeeee!' and that's how it started."

FROM that moment "Oh Johnny" started to build the popularity of Orrin Tucker's band. But it wasn't until months later that the band made a recording of it for Columbia records that the lid was blown off.

Orrin Tucker and Bonnie were at the Cocoanut Grove when they made the recording in Hollywood. The record was released a month later while they were playing at the Mark Hopkins hotel in San Francisco. The response was instantaneous and amazing. The rather conservative Mark Hopkins became the center of San Francisco activity. The place was packed. Everyone in town seemed to flock to the hotel. They filled the dining-rooms and cocktail lounge to overflowing. They sat on the floor all around the band and Bonnie.

Then the band started east—breaking records left and right. "Oh Johnny's" amazing success brought offers from Lucky Strike's "Hit Parade"—one of the finest plums radio can offer a singer.

Bonnie was too hot for even radio to dally with. Orrin Tucker's band and she were to do a "Hit Parade" show en route to Chicago. They were playing El Paso, after stopping off in Hollywood and recording all night long, from eight p.m. until six a.m. As CBS had no outlet in El Paso, Columbia flew in an engineer with equipment. He connected them with the closest CBS outlet, and that night Bonnie heard Lucky Strike's "Hit Parade" master of ceremonies call "Okay El Paso," and "Oh Johnny" was on the air.

"When we reached the Palmer House in Chicago," Bonnie recalls, "our contracts were waiting for us and the Empire Room was wired for our broadcast. That night I was officially made a radio star. They gave me a lovely bouquet of rose-buds, with ribbon streamers. At the end of all but one of the ribbons were tiny rose-buds. Attached to that one ribbon was a gold heart, engraved with my name and the date, January 14, 1940. I'll never forget that night."

Hollywood says she's going to top that experience when she attends the preview of her starring picture "You're The One."

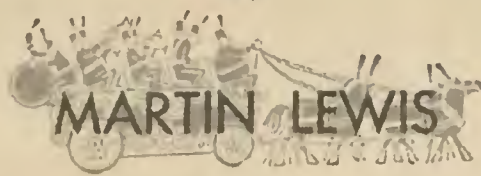
HENRY BUSSE, the "man with the talking trumpet" who got his start with Paul Whiteman, heads the perennially popular orchestra nomi-

WHEN Henry Busse, the "man with the talking trumpet," landed on these shores from Holland, he had only three dollars in cash and the clothes he wore on his back. And, oh yes, a trumpet. It was that trumpet, incidentally, which was to provide him with a passport to fame, for with it he has acquired a nation-wide reputation as a trumpeter de luxe. Busse, soon after his arrival in New York, obtained a job in a movie house. Later he organized a five-piece band and started out on a tour that was eventually to land him in San Francisco, where Opportunity was to knock. Busse's good luck was in the shape of Paul Whiteman, just out of the navy and anxious to achieve fame himself. The two formed an immediate friendship, with Busse joining Whiteman's band, where he remained for ten years perfecting his trumpet technique. In 1928 he again organized his own orchestra and opened at the Hotel New Yorker, his "limited engagement" being extended to a year and a half. Later Busse was booked into the Chez Paree in Chicago, where he almost became a fixture, due to his long playing engagements. Has written several song hits, notably "Hot Lips," "Wang Wang Blues," "Horn Tooth' Fool," and "Pieta"—also made a number of movie shorts. The Busse music has also been heard via radio and phonograph. Moylan Sisters Go West

The Moylan Sisters, Peggy Joan and Marianne, head for Hollywood late in January to appear in a movie with Mickey Rooney and Judy Garland . . . The Eric Rolfs (she is Ruth Warrick), actors, expect to become parents in March . . . It will cost Beechnut gum \$900,000 to sponsor John W. Vandercook and foreign news pick-ups for a year. Program will be six nights a week starting January 1 . . . Dinah Shore has a bid from Warner Bros. for a screen test. It becomes easy for her as Eddie Cantor, her boss, is moving his entire program to Hollywood. Dinah is enthusiastic, remembering that Eddie's other vocal discoveries, Bobby Breen and Deanna Durbin, made good in the movies . . . Parks Johnson and Wally Butterworth figure their "Vox Pop" has traveled 52,000 miles during 1940 . . . CBS becomes the first international network with signing to a five-year contract of HJCS, Bogota, Colombia, to receive regular CBS programs.

Major Bowes' Spending

Major Bowes has purchased, at a price reputed to be above \$150,000, an original sixteenth-century painting, "Holy Family With St. John and St. Elizabeth," by Andrea del Sarto, one of the five paintings by this artist in America. The Major has also aug-

If I could take an aspirin and lie down for the afternoon I'm sure I would feel all right. But I can't. I have to prepare my script, do a rehearsal, then give a broadcast. Then I have a two-hour

wait for the repeat show for West Coast listeners. That two hours doesn't allow enough time to go home and rest."

Fred Bate Recovers

Fred Bate, NBC London correspondent, is again at work after ten days in a hospital as a result of flying bomb fragments when NBC's and CBS' London offices were bombed. Both networks have offices near the British Broadcasting Corporation, a likely Nazi target . . . Henry Levine plays trumpet for Toscanini on Saturdays, a program of the best in music. On Mondays he directs "The Chamber Music Society of Lower Basin Street," burlesquing that same fine music . . . New York's smallest Santa Claus was Johnny the Call Boy, who dressed the part for a party for "Johnny Presents" cast members . . . James Melton bought his mother a new car for Christmas, and she bought him an old one. James has a collection of ancient autos which he values more than any new car on the market . . . The night Fred Allen presented eleven-year-old Adelaide Bishop, soprano, on his program he broke an important radio rule and had men in the control-room in a hot sweat. He called the little girl back to acknowledge applause, causing the program to run overtime.

"Information, Please" Trades

When "Information, Please" moved to its cigarette sponsorship it took along its trade-mark, a crowing rooster. It also kept its old Tuesday night spot by the use of recordings on a local station. The new sponsor didn't like the rooster. The program's owner and manager didn't like the use of recordings on another station. So a trade was made and both the rooster and the records were dropped.

A Stunt Backfires

TOKYO EXPANDS OVERSEAS PROGRAM SERVICE

WITH the joint purpose of intensifying its propaganda broadcasts and at the same time commemorating the 2,600th anniversary of the enthronement of Jimmu Tenno at the Kashiwara Palace in Yamato and the founding of the Japanese Empire, the Broadcasting Corporation of Japan has expanded its overseas service to such an extent that broadcasts are now being sent out on almost a twenty-four-hour daily basis. As part of this expansion program, powerful new 100,000-watt short-wave transmitters are now on the air which, with the increased power that they radiate, make it possible for listeners in the United States and Canada to hear Tokyo with the same regularity and signal strength that they hear Berlin and London.

The overseas broadcasts for listeners in the eastern part of North America is now a two-hour program, broadcast daily from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. CST, over two of the new stations JLG4 (15.105) and JVZ (11.815). JLG4 is being heard with tremendous volume. In fact, you can't miss it for it is about the only station audible on the 19-meter band at that hour. The program opens with the playing of the national anthem, "Kimigaya," followed by a playing of the first four bars of the same song on chimes. Then these words by a woman announcer, "This is Tokyo—the metropolis of the Far East. It is now 10:00 a.m. in Tokyo, and we are commencing our regular overseas broadcast for listeners in the eastern parts of North America," Pro-

gram announcements follow and then the daily news bulletin in English is read (this is strongly anti-United States in character at present). The balance of the program is made up of a well-balanced variety of both Japanese- and western-type music, topical talks and special features.

The overseas broadcast for western North America is now a three-hour feature, heard daily from 9:30 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. CST, over JZJ (11.80) and JZI (9.535). Program follows about the same formula as that for the eastern broadcast.

The complete new schedule of Japanese overseas broadcasts which becomes officially effective on Wednesday, January 1, 1941, follows (time is CST):

- 1:00 to 2:30 a.m. for Hawaii over JZI (9.535)
- 4:30 to 5:25 a.m. for Australia-New Zealand over JZJ (11.80)
- 5:30 to 8:30 a.m. for China and South Seas over JZI (9.535) and JZJ (11.80)
- 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. for Southwestern Asia over JZI (9.535) and JZJ (11.80)
- 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. for Europe over JVW (7.257) and JZI (9.535)
- 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. for South America over JZI (9.535) and JZJ (11.80)
- 5:00 to 6:30 p.m. (Japanese) over JZI (9.535) and JZJ (11.80)
- 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. for Eastern North America over JLG4 (15.105) and JVZ (11.815)
- 9:30 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. for Western North America over JZI (9.535) and JZJ (11.80)

GENERAL NOTES: Germany now broadcasts to North America as follows: 5 to 8, 10:30 to 10:45, 11:30 to 11:45 a.m. and 12:30 to 12:45 p.m. over DJB (15.20); 2:30 to 3 p.m. over DJZ (11.80); 3:50 to 10 p.m. over DJD (11.77) and DXB (9.61), and 7 p.m. to 12 mid. CST, over DJC (6.02). Station Y (9.52) of Paris is also carrying the Berlin Programs daily from 3:50 to 10 p.m. CST . . . Lord Haw Haw may be heard Sundays at 11:30 a.m. CST, over DJB (15.20). At the conclusion of his talk he reads the names of some live or six British soldiers who are being held as prisoners of war in Germany . . . Best reception of the nightly London broadcast for North America, 4:42 to 10:35 p.m. CST, is now being accorded by GSC (9.58) . . . According to Norman Kriebel of Ambler, Pennsylvania, FGA (9.41), Dakar, Senegal, may now be heard daily from 2:15 to 3:30 p.m.; occasionally as late as 3:50 p.m. CST, with the news in Arabic or Senegalese. English broadcasts are made on Tuesdays and Fridays, from 3 to 3:15 p.m. CST. Roy Waite of Ballston Spa, New York, informs me that his air-mail report of Oct. 7,

addressed to FGA, Dakar, bounced back to him on Dec. 5, with the following notation: "No service—return to sender" . . . Afternoon broadcasts from "Radio Brazzaville" (11.97) and CNR2 (11.94), Rabat, Morocco, are being badly cut up by deliberately imposed interference . . . John Kernan of Boston, Mass., has received a letter from Denis M. Gick, station manager of ZQ1 (4.70), the Government Broadcasting Station, 112 East Street, Kingston, Jamaica, British West Indies, which states that this 200-watt short-wave transmitter is now in operation weekdays from 5 to 5:30 p.m. CST. On Thursdays the broadcast commences at 4:30 p.m. CST. Reports from United States listeners are eagerly welcomed and will be verified promptly with the station's verification card . . . The last broadcast to the Byrd Expedition in Antarctica will be made on Friday, January 3, at 10:30 p.m. CST, over WGED (9.52) at Schenectady, New York. Dr. Paul A. Siple and his group of men will leave "Little America," the West Base camp of the expedition, on Saturday, January 11.

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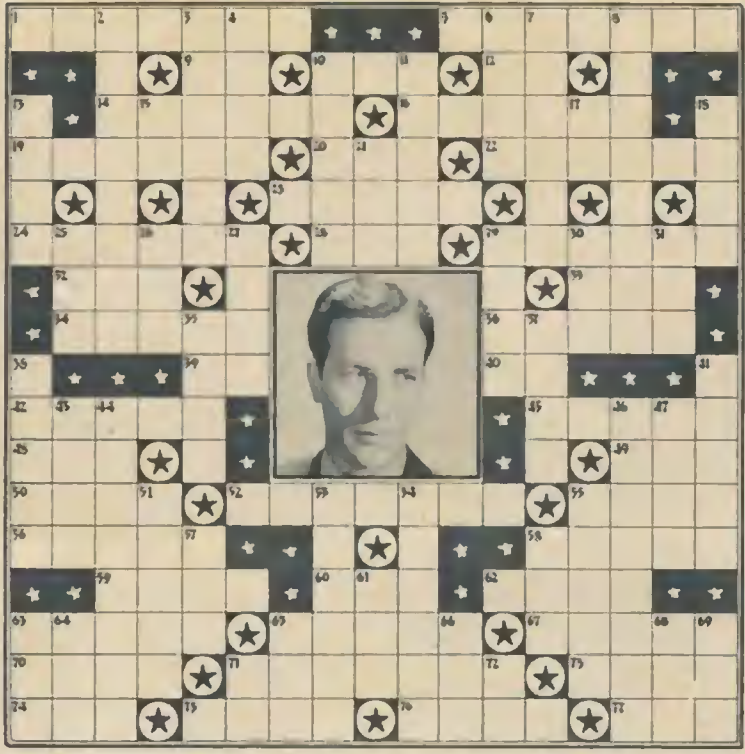
