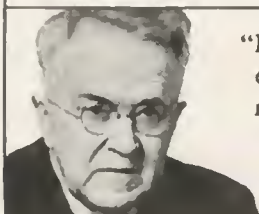

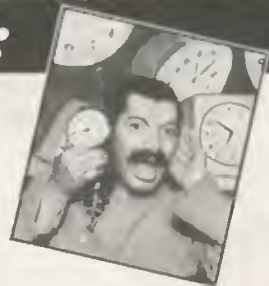

The Editors' Note:

JERRY COLONNA, the gent whose mug is reproduced on the cover, photographed in natural color by Jack Albin, started his career as a trombone-player. His clowning—plus flourishing mustachio and bushy eyebrows—put him into comedy spots on Fred Allen's, other shows. Currently Mr. Colonna is a big moment of the Bob Hope laughfest.



THE voice that shouted "Hi-yo Silver! Away!" is silenced forever. Tiny ears which have been glued to the loudspeakers in eager anticipation of the galloping horse's hoofs, the breathless command to a faithful horse, may never know the difference. But the Lone Ranger is dead. Ironically, this famous radio horseman met death in an automobile accident near Farmington, Mich. Also, ironically, this man whose voice is better known than the President's received his first widespread newspaper stories on the occasion of his death. Except for his voice, Earle W. Graser was a nonentity. Modest, retiring, he lived a quiet life with his family and not even his next-door neighbors knew that he was the far-famed Lone Ranger. They put a mask on his face, made him a man of mystery, and children of all ages and all countries idolized him for his heroic qualities, his Robin Hood characteristics.

Children may never know that the Lone Ranger met an untimely death. They may not know it because the Lone Ranger will ride on. The show was soon to get a new sponsor on a large network. Before that it had been sponsored locally in some sections.

News of the death of Graser came as a thunderbolt to its producers.

Already a successor has been selected. His name is Brace Beemer. He played the part for a short while after the program's origin some years ago. We express our hope that children, anyway, may never detect the slight differences which may occur. There is no tragedy to equal that of youth upon the death of an idol. In this case, through the magic of radio, youth may be spared that knowledge.

Neither will it be a matter of deceit. For youth, the Lone Ranger still lives. He is alive in the toys and hats and paraphernalia that line toy counters; he is alive in the films which bear his name and thrill Saturday matinee crowds. But mostly he lives on the air—and in the hearts of all children, from six to sixty.

But the Lone Ranger is more than a radio character. He is a symbol of the courage and the hardihood and the justice which is a part of America. And as such a symbol he will never die. He will live through the fine qualities of artistry Earle Graser breathed into him and because of the work of producers who made him a living, idolized piece of Americana.—The Editors.

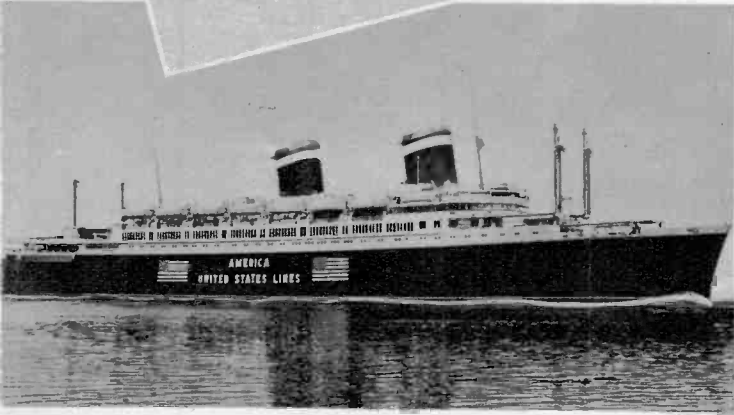
Look who's here! Paulette Goddard and Gene Markey

Movie Party on

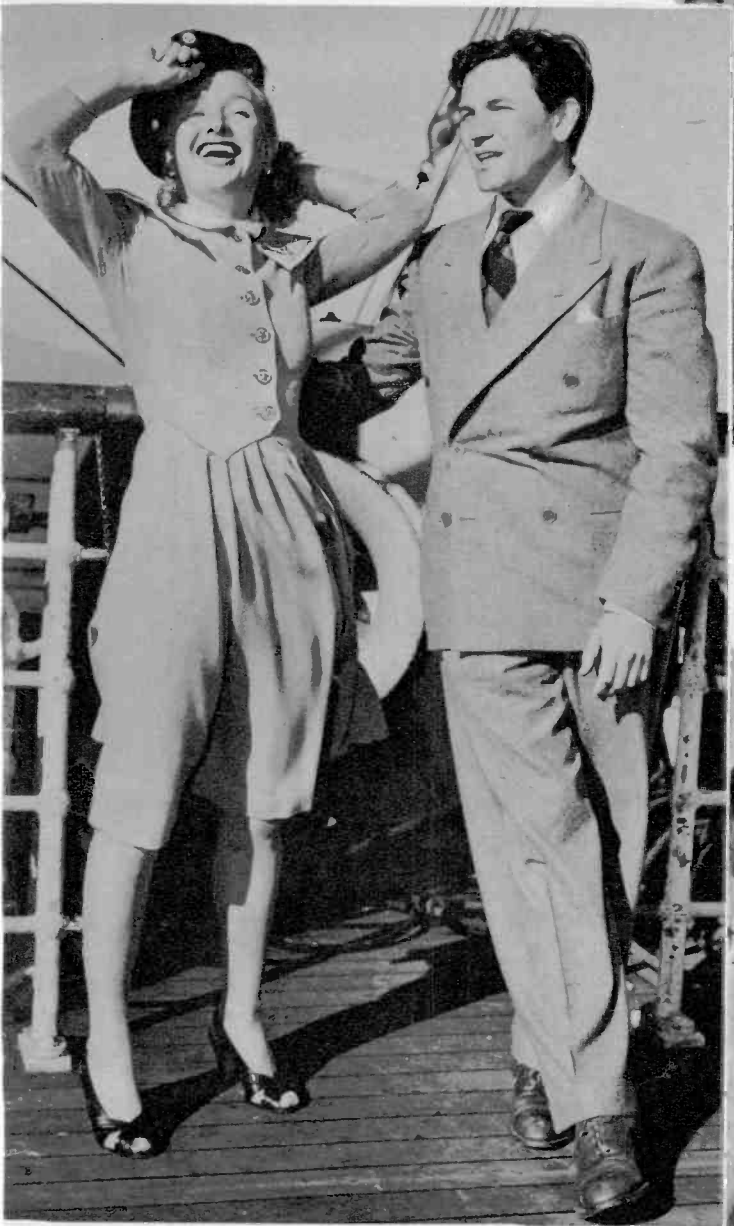


THE S. S. AMERICA, of the United States Lines, normally plies between New York City and the Caribbean, has been kept from transatlantic service by the war. March 21 it carried a Hollywood party for an ocean premiere of "The Sea Wolf"

OUT to sea went "The Sea Wolf" for its world premiere. Along went a score of Hollywood celebrities and a hundred pressmen and cameramen to see, celebrate and record. This trip, March 21, aboard the liner *S. S. America*, with the auxiliary aid of buses and planes, brought the world-premiere custom right up to the minute and gave Warner Bros. claim to another first—the first premiere at sea—in the joust with junkets. Fittingly so, Warner Bros. has spe-

cialized in streamlining the old trade trick of first-showing ballyhoo and in making the transplanted premiere more than a publicizing, merchandising stunt—establishing it as a colorful filmland institution. Their pioneering junket to "Dodge City"; their splurge in "Virginia City"; their "Knut Rockne" celebration in South Bend, Ind.; their "Fighting 69th" festivities in New York—these, with others, have dotted the country. So now the Warner studio goes ultrarealistic,

ringing up the curtain on "The Sea Wolf" in the lounge of a ship at sea. In fact, so realistic was the stunt that about one-third of the guests had to give up and go to their staterooms because of the rough-water-rolling of the boat! Nevertheless, the overnight trip from Los Angeles to San Francisco was a success, for there was much besides the screening of the new picture to make the cruise momentous and pleasurable. The S. S. America, a 40,000-ton luxury liner, sports eleva-

tors, a blue-tiled swimming-pool, nine bars, a newsroom, special broadcast facilities, and all kinds of sports and music opportunities were provided. There was also plenty of Hollywood glamour around the swimming-pool. The trip featured as its climax a tour to the Valley of the Moon ranch, near San Francisco, home of Jack London, famous author of "The Sea Wolf." It all added up to an appropriate and imaginative—if just short of colossal—world premiere.

Movie-Radio Guide Proudly Presents:

A New Star—

MOST girls seeking stardom in films strive for years, perhaps never achieve their goal. At sixteen, Joan Leslie—born Joan Brodell—faces almost certain stardom as the result of a series of fine film portrayals and particularly because of her pathos-filled delineation of the club-footed girl of "High Sierra."

The Background:

As a matter of fact, Joan cut her eyeteeth in pictures, under her own name appeared in a long list of films as a child star before emerging in full-blown adult roles. Before coming to Hollywood she was a member of an acrobatic dancing-team consisting of herself and her two sisters, Mary and Betty. If you ask Joan the cause of her success, she will tell you "the bank holiday." Perhaps she's correct. **MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE** feels she would have found stardom if there had never been a depression and a bank holiday to throw her father, John Brodell, out of a job.

The Brodells lived quietly, simply in Highland Park, Detroit, where their father worked as a cashier in a bank. When the bank holiday put him out of work, more fortunate than other depression victims, Mr. Brodell had three talented daughters who rallied to the family cause. They formed a dance-team, worked the local theaters, eventually went on tour, thought they had reached the peak that day—five years ago—when they were booked into the Paradise Club in New York.

The Break:

It was only the beginning. An M-G-M talent-scout saw Joan there, tested her, had her assigned to work in "Camille," with Greta Garbo and Robert Taylor. To the youthful, screen-struck youngster, Garbo was something a little less than a goddess. Her most thrilling moment, she recounts with a smile, was when she chatted with the famous Garbo. The chat consisted of an "Oh, excuse me," when she got in Garbo's path, and a deeper "Pardon!" from the Garbo.

Joan—who changed her name from Brodell to Leslie to avoid confusion with Joan Blondell—lives with her family in a modest Hollywood apartment. Now that Joan's future has become more definite and since the other girls are also signed to term contracts in Hollywood, the family plans a house in the film center.

The Lowdown:

Joan looks older than her sixteen years. She is tall for her age, five feet four inches, and weighs 118 pounds. Her hair is auburn, her eyes hazel, her personality effervescent and Irish. But when she talks it is evident she is still a little girl. She is wholly unspoiled, sweet-tempered, and a striking quality is her loyalty to the family group—a loyalty shared by all and a family group so closely knit as to be inseparable.

Next to chatting with Garbo, Joan lists her first evening gown—purchased only a few months ago—as her most

thrilling moment. But despite the evening gown Joan has few boy friends, many girl friends of her own age. Mickey Rooney is the most interesting person she has ever met, but he's not her "big moment." He is one of her favorite actors. Charles Boyer is the other. Garbo and Bette Davis are her favorite actresses. She is a sports enthusiast, plays a bang-up game of badminton and ping-pong, a fair game of tennis. Her favorite extravagance is dime-store shopping.

Her home life is simple, unaffected. Mrs. Brodell rules the household and Joan and her sisters share in the labors and chores of keeping it. Mr. Brodell manages the girls' business affairs.

MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE feels that stardom will never alter the realness of Joan just as it feels her role in "Sergeant York," now being made, will establish her as a star of importance in films.

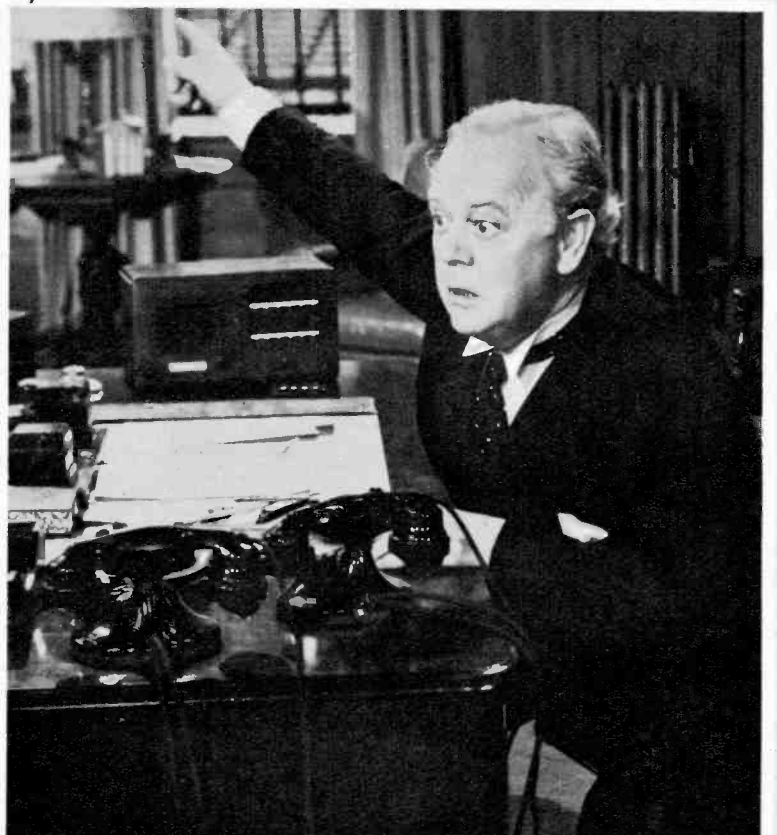

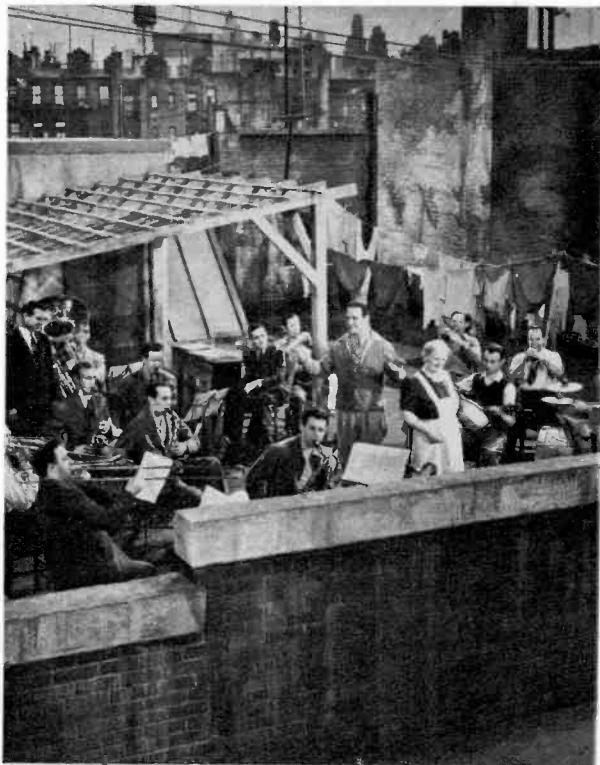

He also is sore at the girl and her mother because they refuse to kick Heidt's band out into the street or to silence them. The boy adds to the complications by going into the girl's boarding-house when he hears the music which—unknown to him—has brought his uncle's temper to breaking-point



4. THIS IS THE BAND that particularly irks Uncle—although thousands of listeners all over the country pay thousands of dollars to hear Horace Heidt and his lads bear down on a tune. 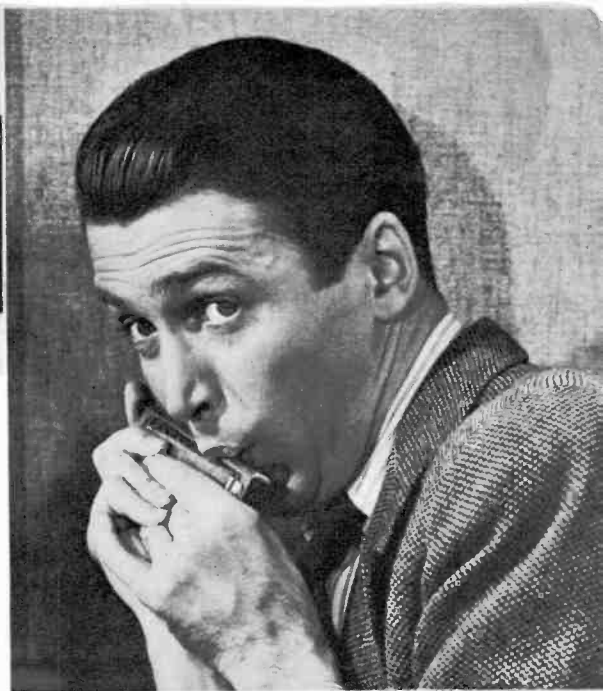

Only fly in the ointment is that the girl hates everything connected with Uncle's clan—and the boy is a member of that clan, unknown to her. Meanwhile, they have their fun—in blissful ignorance while the sun shines

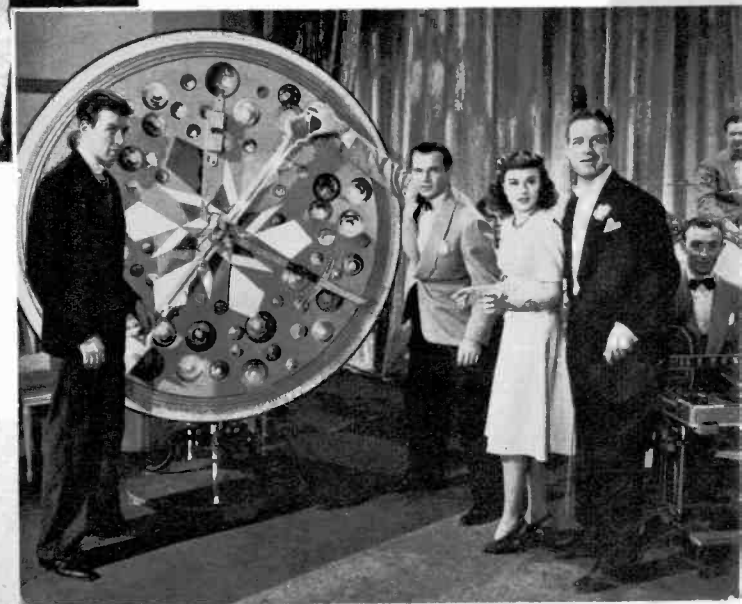

JIMMY STEWART'S last picture before entering the army was the just-completed "Pot o' Gold," produced by F. D. R.'s son, Jimmy Roosevelt. By the time the last trumpet blare of Horace Heidt's band, also featured in the film, died away in the rafters of the rented studio at RKO, Jimmy was en route to Fort MacArthur to appear in the biggest show of our times—America's mobilization of her army for defense. "Pot o' Gold" is Jimmy Roosevelt's first production, following a year of tutelage under the Great Goldwyn. He started from scratch—no story, no stars, no studio, no dough and no release. United Artists agreed to release it, money was raised, a stage rented, stars (Jimmy Stewart and Paulette Goddard, no less) hired, work was ready to commence. Then director George Marshall was rushed to a hospital for an emergency operation; when Marshall recovered, Stewart wasn't available; when Stewart was available again, Goddard wasn't. But the cameras started rolling on December 9, the film was completed six weeks later. Cut and edited now, Jimmy Roosevelt's "Pot o' Gold" will be seen soon throughout the country.

Gloria Swanson Comes Back

Seven years absent from the screen, former screen glamour queen Gloria Swanson was signed last week by RKO-Radio Pictures to co-star with Adolphe Menjou in "Father Takes a Wife," the Dorothy and Herbert Fields play. During her absence from films, Miss Swanson, who is generally conceded to be the first movie actress to make women clothes-conscious, has been traveling in Europe and living in New York City. "The Affairs of Anatol," "Zaza," "The Humming Bird" and "Manhandled" were among her standout pictures. Question first asked by all Swanson fans, "Is she still young looking?" is easily answered. Gloria looks ten years younger than her real age; has kept herself in the pink.

Cary Grant in Whiskers?

Much to do during the week over Cary Grant's impending playing of the title role in Warners' production of "The Man Who Came to Dinner." 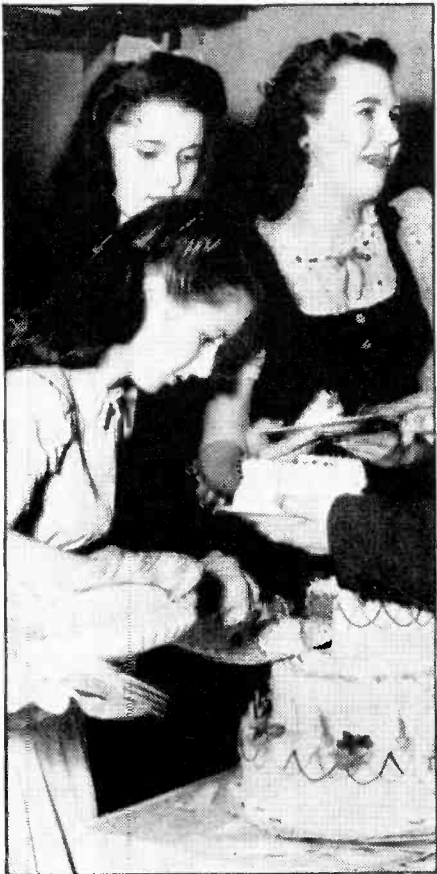

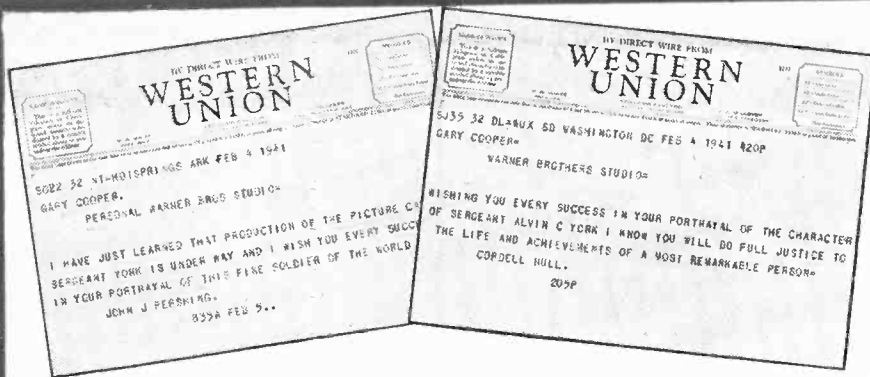

Messages From Nation's Leaders Urge Gary Cooper on in Great Role

NO MOVIE set in Hollywood was more besieged by visitors this week than sound-stage number 7, where "Sergeant York" is being filmed. Producers Warner insist that it will be the most exciting picture of 1941, and Gary Cooper personally told *Movie-Radio Guide* reporter that it is the first film in years that really has him moved to vast enthusiasm.

Cooper plays the title role as Alvin C. York, a Tennessee mountain boy from the Valley of the Three Forks of the Wolf. Drafted in the first World War, this real-life hero was a conscientious objector. Cooper, over selective service age, will probably never serve in the Army, but his performance is already an inspiration to young men, even before it reaches the screen.

"THIS STUDIO IS HOT," our press agent friend pointed out as we walked into the Green Room. The Green Room is the studio commissary, most important function of which is to feed actors and give gentlemen of the press free meals. On this particular day the customers were run through the place in four shifts. Warner Bros. had hit an all-time high with 5,027 employes on the payroll. Cagily the press-agent would give no figures as to salaries being paid, but the stars alone could receive no less than \$75,000 for a week's work.

After luncheon we walked onto every one of eight sets, were as bowled over as the greenest tourist. In the space of three hours we watched Gary Cooper, Dietrich, Eddie Robinson, Errol Flynn, Fred MacMurray, Ida Lupino and a dozen other familiar but lesser lights at work. We noted that crowded living conditions on the studio lot have Dietrich living in Cagney's dressing-room while he's on lay-off, George Raft parking his feet on Bette Davis' divan while she's

away in the East. Some switch! These are the pictures: Lupino and John Garfield in "Gentle People," Gary Cooper in "Sergeant York," Errol Flynn in "Dive Bomber." These are the biggies, with "Manpower," starring Dietrich, "Underground," "Bad Man of Missouri," and "The Flight Patrol" being far from "smallies."

Hot? We'll say Warners is hot! The studio even has had to fall to and build its own airplanes for two war pictures—dive bombers, Hurricanes, Spitfires. None could be borrowed, so the craft shop built them, complete with propellers and motors. We couldn't tell them from the real thing, but being useless for actual fighting we wished there were some way the studio could pass them on to the Axis when through with them—just for a lark! Our personal recommendation for this week is to keep all of the \$10,000,000 worth of pictures mentioned here on your list—it's a load of entertainment dynamite!

CAUGHT AT DEADLINE—"Reaching for the Sun": This Paramount picture, with Joel McCrea, Ellen Drew and Eddie Bracken, is good entertainment but it doesn't solve any social problems. Satire, properly placed, was the saving factor of the production, and director Bill Wellman did a mighty good job of putting it in—with the aid of Bracken, mainly, and both McCrea and Miss Drew.

"Citizen Kane"

"THIS is not the story of any man, be he living or dead. Kane and all other characters involved are wholly imaginary." This is the waiver which appeared at the close of Orson Welles' picture. It is the artistic approach to saying, "It ain't so." Whatever it means, this critic takes Mr. Welles at his word, reviews his much-discussed effort on that basis.

"Citizen Kane" is a biography. Its subject is a poor boy who inherits great wealth, in his manhood becomes a newspaper publisher. Under guise of being a people's champion, Kane uses his wealth for his own unholy devices. The film's announced purpose is to find just why Kane uttered the one word, "Rosebud," when he died. Actually, no two people will agree on Welles' purpose. Did he intend to expose the malpractices of great wealth? Did he try to show that no one can force his fellow men to love him? Or was he simply concocting a film version of his Mars broadcast?

VERDICT: Whatever Orson Welles intended he did achieve this: The necessity for every critic with a normal I. Q. to admit that he is a great actor. That other producers, steeped in finesse and "knowledge" of the picture business, can take lessons from Mr. Welles. That Mr. Welles, if he ever tackles a picture that is really basically constructive, will become the most important man in Hollywood. P. S. He hopes not! —C. S.

"The Reluctant Dragon"

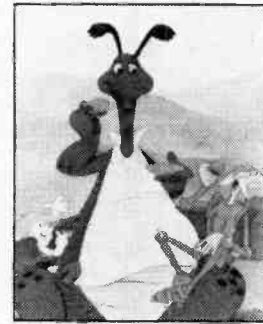

DESPITE the fabulous intake of "Snow White," Walt Disney must be pretty well convinced by now that feature-length cartoons as a whole lack the punch to make them box-office hits. They are the cocktail before dinner, or the mint after coffee—not enough for a completely satisfying entree.

Disney's latest, "The Reluctant Dragon," is as pleasing as any cartoon Mickey's master mind has turned out. Praise of its beauty in color, story and animation cannot be too high. But even with the introduction of human characters into about half of the film, it still lacks the bango with which a Coney Island barker lures the customers.

The picture opens with Bob Benchley—who does a great job—having a brainstorm which he thinks will make a good cartoon. He goes to the Disney lot, and en route to the boss' office gets lost in various buildings. His adventures are amusing as he conceives the idea of the verse-writing dragon who hates to fight and who sounds like Ed Wynn when he says so. The cartoon itself, i. e., "The Reluctant Dragon," is every bit as good as one of Disney's Mickey Mouse or Donald Duck cartoons—and that's good!

VERDICT: If you want to learn how to make a cartoon go see "The Reluctant Dragon." If you don't want to learn how, go see it anyway. It's worth a look.—D. R.

RADIO VIEWS by Martin Lewis

SUMMERTIME usually is a time of peace and quiet along the broadcasting front. Along with many of radio's listeners, most of the big network programs are on vacation. Those programs which take their place are usually low-budgeted affairs, designed to fill in until the resumption of normal broadcasting activity in the fall. Radio in summer merely marks time.

Is this a true picture? Perhaps it used to be, but it isn't any more. Of late years the broadcasters, and the networks in particular, have become increasingly aware of the importance of continuing the high quality of entertainment afforded by the more costly winter programs. Since the advent of portable radios, thousands of listeners now are able to continue their radio listening from vacation spots. Good reception afforded by radios in automobiles is another factor. Today, wherever they may be, most radio listeners can tune in.

Many of the new programs which you will hear on the air this summer will be given extraordinary care and attention, particularly in the matter of direction and production, for the networks are more than ever aware of this increased summertime listening. They also are aware that these sustaining programs, if properly designed, may become tomorrow's big-time sponsored shows. Remember when "Information, Please" and "Truth or Consequences" were on sustaining?

IN connection with the latter thought, the editors of *MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE* long have had the opinion that the networks, by their improper regard for the possibilities of sustaining shows, were passing up many good opportunities to develop commercially profitable programs. Now that they are beginning to see the light, listeners should hear better sustaining shows. Some of these sustainers now on the air already appear to possess commercial possibilities. "Deadline Dramas," "Joe and Mabel" and "Gold If You Find It" are three whose prospects seem very bright at this writing.

Incidentally, it might be a good idea for the broadcasting systems to employ talent-scouts, such as big-league baseball and the movies have. They could tour the country's radio stations seeking outstanding local talent and programs and would undoubtedly pay for their keep many times over.

Whether this suggestion is accepted or not, we believe that your summertime listening should be better than ever this year. So don't forget to take along that portable radio when you go off to the mountains or the seashore. Summertime now is "good listening" time.

HEADLINE NEWS

Frederick W. Wile Dies

WASHINGTON.—One of radio's pioneer newscasters and commentators, Frederick William Wile, died April 7 at the age of sixty-eight. Wile was the first American commentator to cover by radio an international event, the Five Power Naval Conference in London. He began broadcasting in 1923 on a Washington, D. C., station, later became known particularly for his political campaign analyses.

Nets Fight Over Fights

NEW YORK.—The National Broadcasting Company has announced suit against Twentieth Century Sporting Club, the Mutual Broadcasting System and Gillette Safety Razor Company in the New York Supreme Court. NBC claims the right-by agreement with Twentieth Century to broadcast boxing-bouts exhibited in Madison Square Garden between October 1, 1941, and June 1, 1942, as it has broadcast them for the past four years. It had been announced that, effective June 1, 1941, MBS would get exclusive right to the Garden broadcasts under the sponsorship of the safety-razor concern, through a contract with Mike Jacobs, veteran fight promoter of most major boxing-bouts.

Louella Parsons Withdraws

HOLLYWOOD.—The fight of the Screen Actors Guild to eliminate free appearances of name talent on radio shows resulted in Louella Parsons, Hollywood columnist, announcing that her new radio program, utilizing movie stars, would be terminated after June 20, 1941. The Guild itself produces "Screen Guild Theater" for the benefit of its own charity activities and considers as competition other shows using free movie talent. Miss Parsons said that for twenty-five years she

had worked to further the interests of the Guild's relief fund, and, having been informed of the objections, she would withdraw her radio program at the expiration of the current contract.

Newscaster Goes Abroad

NEW YORK.—Following the example set by Wendell Willkie and Harry Hopkins, Elmer Davis, CBS' news analyst, took a Clipper plane for England to look over the war situation first-hand. He expects to return about the first of June.

BACKSTAGE

Garbo Shuns Mike

HOLLYWOOD.—Mystery woman Greta Garbo, the elusive great actress, almost was heard on the Gulf Screen Guild Theater season-closer Sunday, April 20, but she weakened and pleaded microphone fright. Garbo, who never yet has broadcast in a radio drama certainly, and probably never has said even as much as a "Hello" into a microphone, was approached by Conrad Nagel and Roger Pryor, m.c. of the Screen Guild series. First she said yes, she would volunteer her services for this program, the proceeds of which go to a motion-picture charity. Then, even as they were talking, she changed her mind and said no, she would be too nervous to broadcast. Nagel assured her that she could broadcast in the privacy of her own home; that radio wires would be run to her home and thus she might overcome her microphone fright. She wavered, said yes, and then almost as rapidly changed her mind again. Garbo, who has turned down \$10,000 fee offers to go on the air a single time, was afraid to break the ice.

Singer Making Comeback

NEW YORK.—Bobby Gibson, young brother of song stylist Fredda Gibson, has resumed his radio career after a recovery from a sinus ailment which forced him off the air over a year ago.

"Every time I hear you over the air," the fan in Richlands, Va., wrote, "I think of an old friend who moved to England eight years ago. The bracelet is a keepsake from her. It was an heirloom given her by her grandmother."

Post-Curtain Comedy

NEW YORK.—Something new is being introduced to studio audiences at "Truth or Consequences" these days. The very popular stunt-show offers a fifteen-minute impromptu post-broadcast session of the game, with Ralph Edwards carrying on his emcee job after airtime.

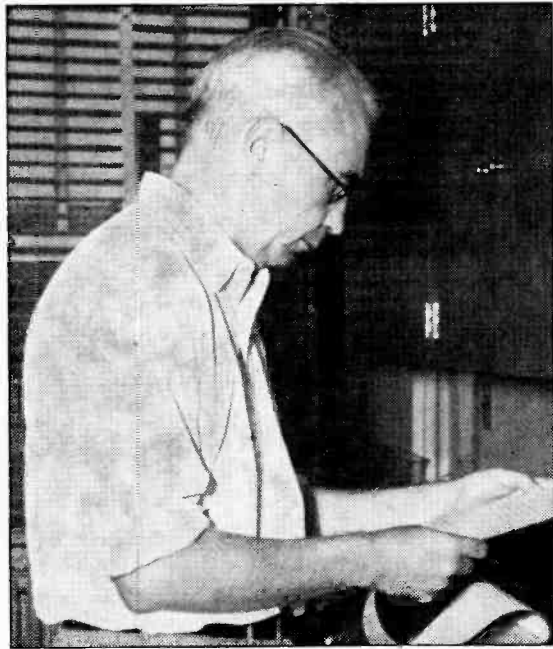

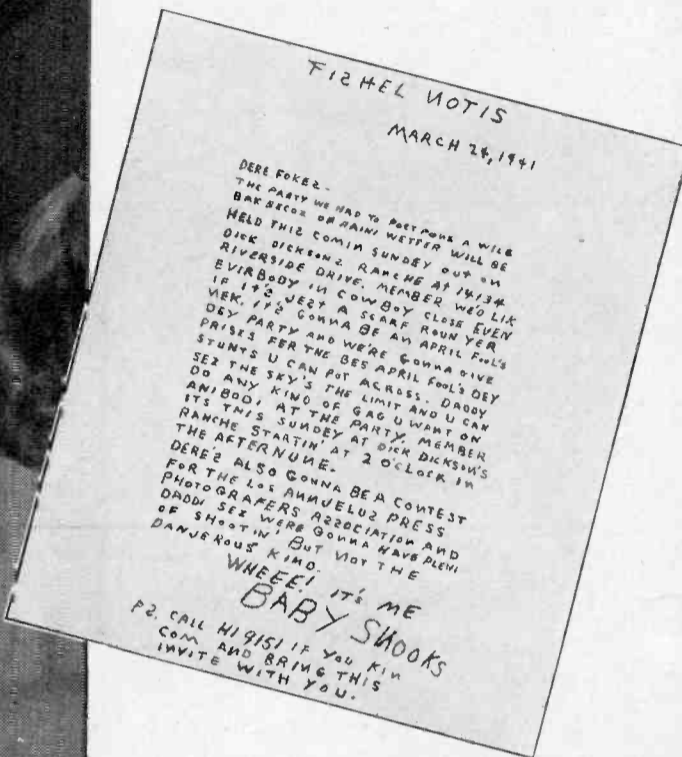

The three, left to right, are Lansing Hatfield, Mary Van Kirk, Mona Paulee. Hatfield is a twenty-nine-year-old Virginian, a Peabody Institute man who's sung with several minor opera companies. Miss Van Kirk, daughter of an Akron, Ohio, policeman, ruined a children's choir with her loud voice but is now a star contralto at Cleveland Institute of Music. And Mona Paulee, who boasts of her "good peasant stock," started as a night-club singer, later won understudy opera roles. For them the event was a real triumph. They were chosen from an original list of 700 singers. They passed preliminary auditions to get a hearing on the program. They survived stiff competition. Now, on the final broadcast, they stand on the threshold of fame—a grand-opera career!

The Songbird of the South,



WITH a deep, confident "Hello, everybody," Kate Smith, best-loved woman in broadcasting, sweeps you each Friday night over CBS into an hour of grand entertainment. This week MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE takes you on a behind-the-scenes visit to Columbia Playhouse No. 2 on 45th Street in New York, where her broadcasts originate. There is nothing of glamour or sophistication in Kate Smith. Nor is there in her radio show. Her personal popularity—Kate again was voted best popular songstress in MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE's 1941 Star of Stars Poll—and the popularity of her show alike are based on friendliness, simplicity and outstanding talent. With ten years of broadcasting behind her, Kate is today an impressive figure in radio. She came to CBS as a singing-dancing girl of twenty-one, fresh from a Broadway show. Then for three big-time sponsors she lassoed listeners with "When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain" and programs which she and her manager-mentor, Ted Collins, developed into great audience magnets. "The Kate Smith Hour" is now in its third year for the same sponsor. It has introduced to listeners such stars as Abbott and Costello, Henry Aldrich, and, this year, Charlie and Min (Charlie Cantor and Minerva Pious). It has featured guest stars from the front ranks of screen and stage. It has previewed many outstanding motion pictures. On the broadcast which MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE visited, Susanna Foster, amazing new sixteen-year-old film singer, and Allan Jones were guests in a presentation of their new picture, "There's Magic in Music." By 8 p.m. EDT on show nights several hundred persons are crowded into the Playhouse. They have been arriving since 6:45. At 7:55 announcer Ernest Chappell makes his appearance, gives a little speech of welcome and instructions for applause. Ted Collins, in midnight-blue tuxedo, steps to the microphone—after Jack Miller's band plays the theme song—and opens the show, concluding with, "And here is Kate Smith!" Kate, Ted Collins, Ernest Chappell and the orchestra remain on the stage during the entire broadcast. Other performers—guests, actors, Charlie and Min, Ted Straeter and chorus—are spectators off-stage while not actually doing their acts. Jammed into the narrow wings on both sides, they enjoy themselves, dance when the orchestra plays, comment on parts of the show. On cue from Ted Collins they walk briskly on stage and to the mikes. There are two complete dressing-rooms. One is Kate's private room, a home-like, comfortable spot, shared by Kate with her dog, Scottie. The other room is communal. Cluttered with mirrors and make-up kits, it's the place where Ted Straeter's girls primp and the men lounge. No one may leave the studio until the show is over, since all are included in the grand finale, when Kate sings "We're All Americans." Leaving the stage she shakes hands with whoever is in her path, reminds them not to be late for the repeat broadcast at 12 midnight. The atmosphere is as friendly actually as it seems on the air!

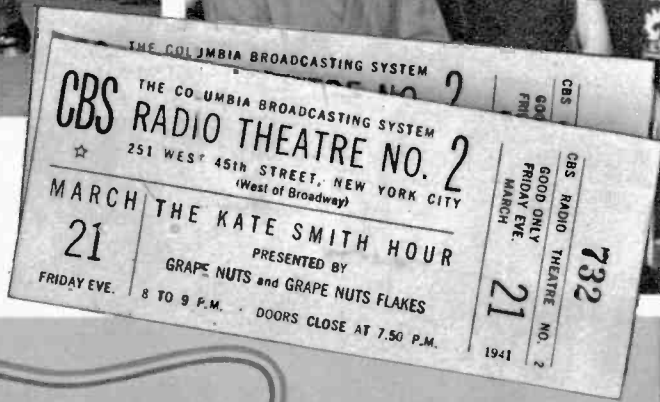

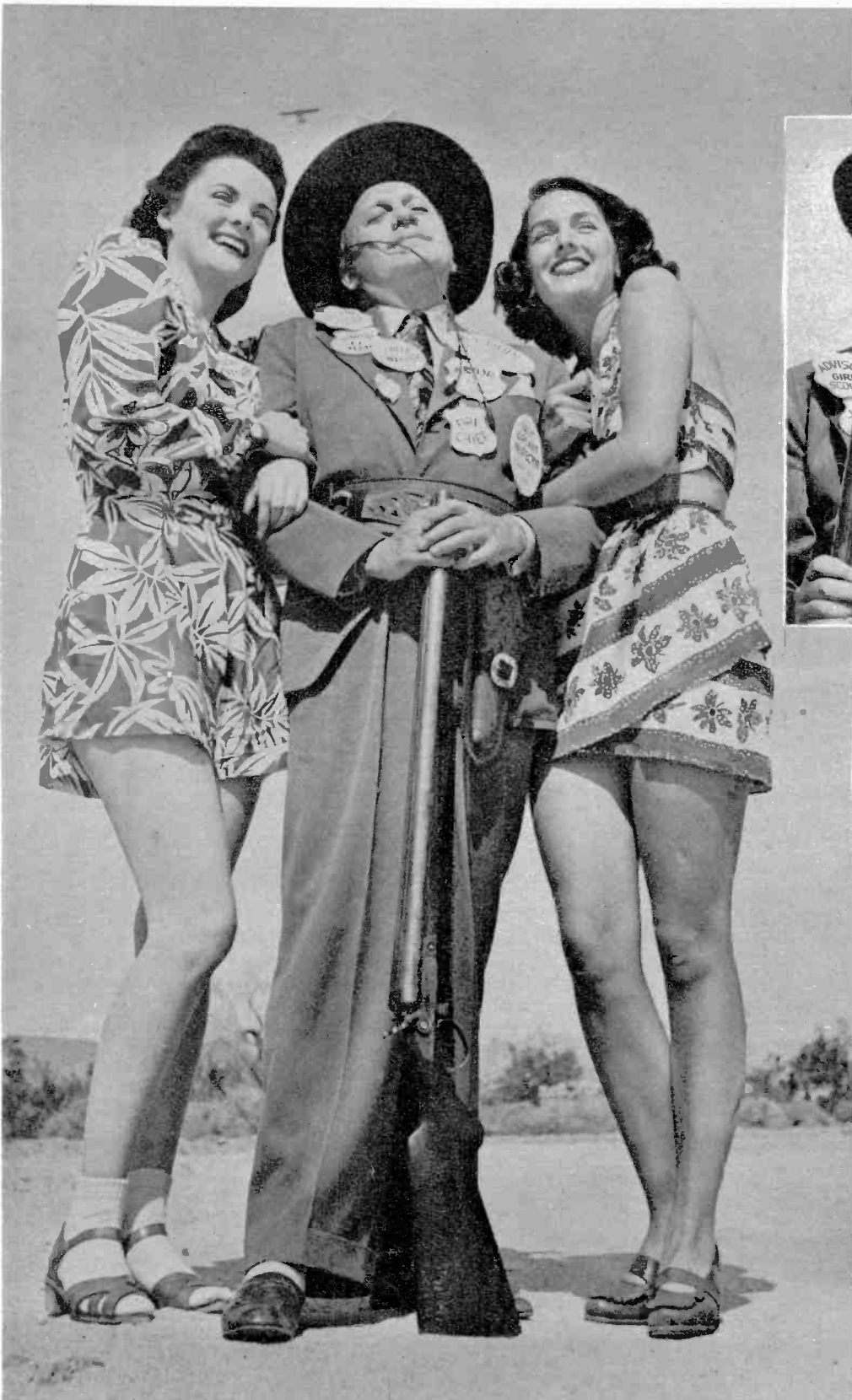

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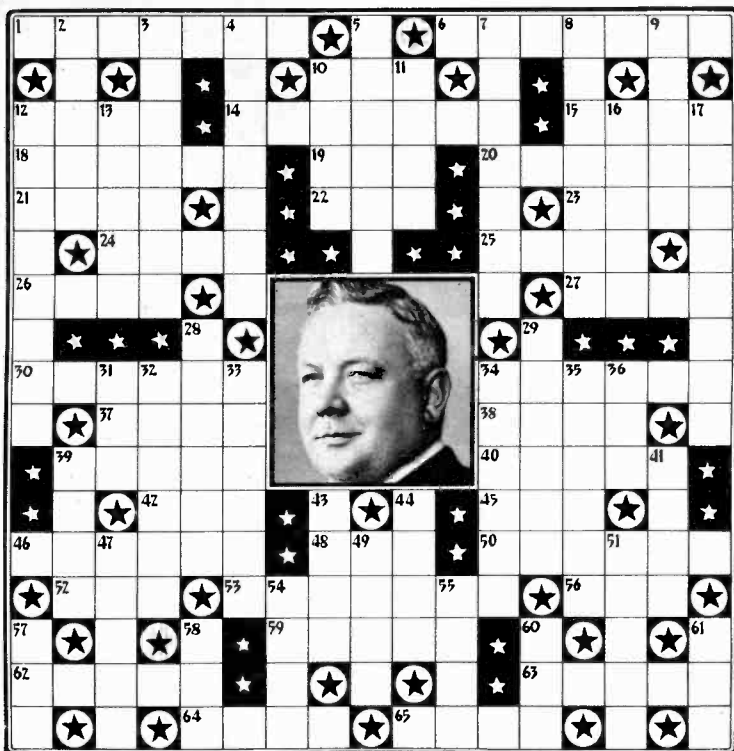

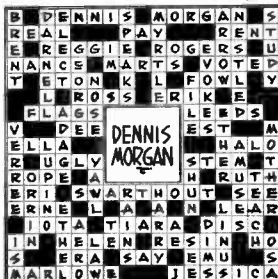
