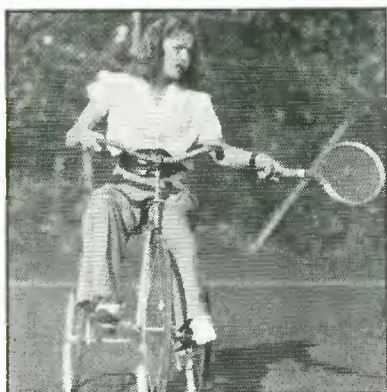

A Movie Star's Invitation to WAR!

PICTURED here is MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE's exclusive photograph of Wayne Morris and his fiancée, Patricia Stewart, snapped at Charlie Foy's just as Wayne received his call from the Navy Department—via airmail—ordering him to report for active duty. Wayne appears genuinely happy over the prospect of Uncle Sam's summons, while Patricia's best effort seems only half-hearted. With Morris having reported for duty on June 26, the wedding plans of this love-locked couple are pretty indefinite. Between Uncle Sam and the fact that Wayne's divorce from Lenora "Bubbles" Schinasi, cigarette heiress, does not become final until September, the aisle-traipsing ceremony leaves a lot to the future.

Wayne reported for duty as an ensign in the Naval Reserve and has been assigned to the aviation selection procurement division of the Naval Base at Long Beach, Calif. He had just completed the picture, "The Smiling Ghost," for Warner Bros. Since 1936, when he made his first picture, "China Clipper," Morris has continuously been a box-office asset to the Warner Bros.' studios. One of his most popular films was "Submarine D-1," which may give an inkling as to how he will fare in Uncle Sam's Navy even though his actual activities will be in the air corps. At any rate, it's the salt air for that salt of the earth guy—Wayne Morris. So now it will be the theme "Anchors Aweigh!"

ACTING on your assignment, I packed my cameras out to the Metro lot, stage 10, and after going through the swinging doors of Brazos Hearn's Placer Saloon and Gambling Emporium, I found what you had expected—that Clark Gable had donned a costume almost identical to the one he wore in "Gone With the Wind." Only this time, in M-G-M's "Honky Tonk," he's a sort of frontier Rhett Butler.

Director Jack Conway was studying a scene with Gable and Albert Dekker. Gable was in a genial mood (they say he always is), and was all for playing practical jokes. In this scene, Dekker, who plays Hearn in the picture, has a minor shooting scrape with Clark and comes out second best. I took pictures showing how the sequence works out.

Gable Has His Joke

When they rehearsed, Gable kept ribbing. Pointing his six-shooter at Dekker, he

chortled, "Ain't it fun pretendin'?" Conway had them go through the action several times and worked out just how Gable was to outdraw Dekker. When they were ready to shoot the scene, Gable cracked, "After this, I suppose we'll get the chase—gallop, gallop!" and he slapped his thighs for sound-effects.

One trick Gable set up for Dekker failed to click. He loaded a blank into a tiny lady's single-shot pistol and concealed the midget weapon in his palm. During dress rehearsal of the scene he tried to fire it at Dekker, but he couldn't get his finger around the little trigger. The joke was on Gable.

Gable Talks Hunting

There was a lot of red-blooded hunting talk on this set. Everyone knows what a huntsman Gable is. Devoted to the sport also are Jack Conway, the director, and Frank Morgan, who plays the role of Lana Turner's drunken father. Gable and his wife, Carole Lombard, had returned from a hunting-trip to the Northwest just prior to

the start of the filming of this picture, and Gable's whole appearance was a credit to the great outdoors.

Gable Spikes Rumor

And incidentally, if there happen to be any of those vicious Hollywood rumors filtering their way around to the effect that all is not well in the Gable-Lombard household, there were a few remarks overheard that should spike all such rumors. Seems that Gable belongs to an exclusive duck club near Hollywood. However, the membership is strictly for males. On the set Gable was offering to sell his membership to Frank Morgan. Clark enjoys his hunting, but he enjoys it most with his wife, and that's the way it is going to be!

Gable Kisses; Actress Blushes!

One of Gable's favorite hunting-partners is also taking part in this picture. He's Harry Fleischmann of the Fleischmann's Yeast family. The Gables are frequent visitors at his hunting-lodge near Bakersfield,

California. Harry Fleischmann has his first motion-picture role, as a barkeeper, in this film.

Also working in her first picture, a young actress got the thrill of her life. Cleo Manning of Youngstown, N. Y., was the girl, and here's how it happened: In her part she's in the Placer Saloon when Gable ambles in to call on Brazos Hearn (Dekker). Clark is supposed to recognize her in the story and he does so by going over and planting a kiss on her lips. So beginner Cleo got kissed by the screen's greatest two-fisted lover in her very first picture! When it happened she blushed as prettily as any young schoolgirl in her first game of post-office. And one of the cameramen on the Metro sound-stage commented, "It's a good thing this picture isn't in Technicolor!"

The exclusive pictures I took ought to show a good sample of Clark Gable as a frontier Rhett Butler in "Honky Tonk"—with plenty of man-size action and plenty of roguish romance. —L. R.

SPOTLIGHT: *Rita Hayworth Proves*
SHE CAN DANCE!

RITA HAYWORTH, who originally was signed by the movies because a 20th Century-Fox executive saw her dancing at Agua Caliente, and then put one of her pretty feet down on dancing roles in pictures, dances, but good, with the great Fred Astaire in her new Columbia picture, "You'll Never Get Rich." Yet how could Rita be any less than a good dancer, considering the fact that she is the third generation of the famous family known as the Dancing Cansinos?

Rita had a natural background as an expert rumba and tango dancer, but this she wanted to forget in order to become a dramatic actress. She proved her dramatic ability beyond a doubt during the past year in "Angels Over Broadway," "Strawberry Blonde" and "Blood and Sand." But when the opportunity came for her to be co-starred with Fred Astaire in "You'll Never Get Rich," Rita jumped at the opportunity, and it was perhaps Mr. Astaire who viewed the prospect of his new partner with trepidation.

Astaire Worried at First

Astaire checked into the Columbia lot ten weeks ahead of the start of the picture in order to limber up and rehearse. There isn't any doubt that he was worried about Miss Hayworth. Fred confided to friends that there are a great many actresses who can dance but are not natural rhythmic dancers, as he likes his partners to be.

For five weeks Fred practised by himself and started working with Hayworth into double numbers he had worked out. Within two or three days after Fred began working with Rita, he and Bob Alton, dance director of the picture, were enthusiastic about the lady's ability.

He found that whereas it ordinarily takes him about ten days to two weeks to work out a double number with a girl, it required but five days to work out the big rumba number with Rita.

Finds Rita No Quitter

Probably the one quality Fred has discovered and admires most about Hayworth is that she never calls quits or admits she is tired out after rehearsing or dancing five to six hours at a time.

Despite the tiresome work, however, Rita has gone right along taking her dramatic lessons at night, even after grueling days on the dance-rehearsal stage. She intends to improve her acting until she is acknowledged a great actress—and already it is easy to see that Fred Astaire thinks she is a great dancer. In the new picture there are three big numbers where the pair work together. Each one is long. They prove that Rita can do not only her natural rumba and tango but tap, boogie-woogie, riff and ballet steps.

Her first double number is "Boogie Barcarole," pictured in part on this page. Second is a rumba, danced to Cole Porter's "So Near and Yet So Far." The third—grand finale—is the "Wedding Cake Walk"; it lasts six and one-half minutes.

Yes, in "You'll Never Get Rich" Rita Hayworth will prove to you that she is a great dancer. She has already convinced Fred, and her Grandpa Cansino is a happy old man. —C. S.

SPOTLIGHT: *Eleanor Powell Proves*
SHE CAN ACT!

ELEANOR POWELL has long been acknowledged as an expert dancer of tap and ballet, and as such has been a valuable asset to the M-G-M Studios for the past six years. But Metro's publicity department is frank to confess that Miss Powell is "hard to sell." That means top-ranking syndicate columnists and magazine writers are disinterested in writing stories about her.

The reason is twofold. First, while Eleanor is a sweet girl and a good friend, she is shy and retiring. That doesn't get her publicity. Second, many critics have become convinced that Eleanor can't act. Maybe she couldn't up to now, but times have changed.

In "Lady Be Good," which will carve a new notch in Ann ("Maisie") Sothorn's career because of her excellent singing, Miss Powell likewise demonstrates that she has learned something more about acting. In fact, in talking to M-G-M executives about Eleanor's future, I learned that not only have they become convinced by "Lady Be Good" that she has acting talents hitherto unrevealed but that they intend to make the most of them in her next starring picture, "I'll Take Manila."

Dancing a Shyness-Remedy

Miss Powell's shyness goes back to her childhood. Strangely enough, her exaggerated modesty was the underlying cause of her dancing-career!

Shortly after her birth, Eleanor's father died, and her mother soon found that her quiet, studious child was afraid of other youngsters and of life in general. Realizing the handicap must be overcome, her mother sent Eleanor, when she was six years old, to Ralph McKernan's dancing-school in Springfield, Mass. Gradually Eleanor lost her self-consciousness.

When Eleanor was thirteen years old, Mrs. Powell took her to Atlantic City for a vacation, and the child was spotted by Gus Edwards as she was doing an acrobatic dance on the beach. That was the accidental manner in which her career began.

But despite the many Broadway hits and motion pictures in which she was given star billing since that time, much of her childhood shyness remained.

Dog Convinces Eleanor

Eleanor Powell knows she is a good dancer, but she hasn't been too sure of her acting. A romantic interest recently (Merrill Pye), which is budding into matrimony, and the sideline cheering she has been receiving while making "Lady Be Good" are helping to make her more certain of her dramatic ability.

And her working with such intrepid scene-stealers as Ann Sothorn, Robert Young, John Carroll and Red Skelton—in the cast of "Lady Be Good"—has likewise built up her confidence.

Perhaps another convincer that clinched the argument and made her realize that good acting is easy was the performance of the screen's first acting-dancing dog, Buttons. The dog didn't mind the directors, script-girls, extras or camera a bit, but went right through its bag of tricks for a sensational scene with Eleanor.—E. P.

The Greatest Child Star Since Shirley Temple



CAROLYN REALLY likes milk. Remember, in "Virginia" she said to her black sheep, "Don't drink so fast, Blackie, or I'll have to burp you"? If you've forgotten, Carolyn hasn't. She drinks ten, Carolyn said, and once ate her milk slowly and once ate spinach with relish because director Edward Griffith told her it would give her blond hair like Madeleine Carroll. To date the formula has failed, she says.

To Feature Desk:
CAROLYN LEE Copp, who dropped her last name for Paramount Studios but copped "Virginia" away from Madeleine Carroll, Fred MacMurray and Stirling Hayden, had just completed "Birth of the Blues" with Bing Crosby and Mary Martin when your reporter received her invitation to visit with her.

And since Carolyn, who turned seven years of age on June 5, had smashed so many box-office records with her second picture (her first was "Honeymoon in Bali," made at the age of five), I accepted most enthusiastically.

You see, Miss Lee is a young lady who is difficult to catch in Hollywood. As soon as she finishes a picture, her mother, Evelyn Landers Copp, packs her back to Martins Ferry, Ohio, right across the river from Wheeling, West Virginia, where Daddy Warren Copp is an engineer with a steel company. That really makes it nice two ways—Daddy Copp doesn't get so lonely and Carolyn doesn't "go Hollywood!"

Eye for Business
"How do you do, Mr. Plummer," the unspoiled youngster returned our introduction. "Do you know anything about farms?" I didn't know enough, so I refused to be trapped. "She's figuring out a money-making scheme," her mother explained.

"Carolyn thought first she could get a dog and sell puppies, but Butch, our mongrel, didn't have any, so next she heard that bunnies multiply rapidly. However, she coaxed the manager of the apartment hotel into letting her turn it into a rabbit farm. Then someone else told Carolyn that guinea pigs have larger families—so they're next."

What Carolyn does not know is that she's guaranteed \$1,250 a week for thirty weeks annually by Paramount—and nearly every untaxed cent of it is being held in trust for her. Carolyn's contract was approved by the Superior Court in Los Angeles and permits her to spend six weeks after each picture with her parents.

Dad Relents
The pretty little seven-year-old youngster's screen career began three years ago when a friend sent her picture to Y. Frank Freeman, Paramount executive, who arranged an interview, a test and a contract. Carolyn dazzled one and all by her performance and her ability to recite lines. After her first film Mr. Copp took his daughter home and said, "To blazes with Hollywood's fame and gold." He wanted her home with him. However, Edward H. Griffith, director of "Virginia," after a long argument, succeeded in persuading Carolyn's parents into letting her return to the screen.

Carolyn has been treated like an adult all her short life and has done a great deal of traveling. This, plus her camera-like recording eyes and steel-trap brain that snares every new word no matter how big, has raised her intelligence to at least a twelve-year-old's level.

Relaxes With Make-Believe
Despite Carolyn's fame, she's still a typical seven-year-old. Though it's hard work to make movies, once she returns home she sheds her acting worries immediately and starts playing "house" in the most traditional make-believe spirit. This relaxes her and keeps her natural. She has never seen "Honeymoon in Bali" and not even a frame of "Virginia." She is afraid she won't like herself (like Bette Davis and Margaret Sullavan).

Oh, yes, she's left handed. But I have to stop here. Carolyn just asked me, "How big does a chimpanzee grow?" and I don't know... By the way, how big does one grow? —E. P.

HOLLYWOOD has had its Shirley Temples, Garbos, Gables, Hedy Lamarrs, but never has there been such an utter phenomenon as the team of Abbott and Costello. In answer to a deluge of requests, MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE tells the story of the two crazy men who are bringing the public back to movie houses.

The Abbott-Costello act was born of a ten-year rummy game. They met in Brooklyn's Empire Theater. Bud was cashier and Lou an actor. Friendly gab led to rummy and it became an interminable game.

Their constant state of conversational upheaval in early games drew them together. They got a kick out of seeing people misled by their squabbles. This brought the realization that their pointless, endless arguments might be the making of a fine vaudeville act. It was!

Costello's straight man took ill and Abbott was drafted. Despite the brief rehearsal, they clicked so well that Lou had no trouble persuading

Bud to join him in his act.

It happened after the 1929 era, when Costello was cased out of movies with the birth of talkies and Abbott lost his shirt in the depression. For seven years they kicked about "small time" with the same acts which later became their fortune. Previously when off the payroll they usually rehearsed near Times Square, offering their act to passers-by gratis!

Finally Dame Fortune smiled. Jesse Kaye, booker of New York City's Roxy's Theater, after availing Abbott and Costello, took a chance on their low-born comedy. Since then—that was three years ago—it's been a regular comic invasion for Abbott and Costello. Star billing in their first film wasn't the first time they grabbed the spotlight for an initial endeavor. They were starred in their first legitimate Broadway effort, then on the radio with Kate Smith—now in the movies as the "stars of the year"!

This Is the Story: Mrs. Gladney (Greer Garson), terribly hurt by the loss of her own young son, starts the Texas Children's Home and Aid Society with the aid of her husband (Walter Pidgeon). Despite various heartbreaks and setbacks, the Home grows into a large institution. However, illegitimacy and the fact that it plagues children through life because such information appears on the certification of birth causes Mrs. Gladney to campaign until the brand "illegitimate" no longer is included on birth certificates in Texas. Thus, instead of the child suffering through life because of "illegitimate parents," as Mrs. Gladney puts it, he is able to face life without the prodigious

mental handicaps which are produced by a bigoted world.

It is truly a heart-filling, moving story—a real tribute to a woman who has served society to the utmost. Every parent in the country will be moved and impressed. Every married couple who cannot decide whether or not to adopt a child because of background and heredity should be required to see the picture.

Verdict: Movie-Radio Guide frequently has taken movie-makers to task for their inability to produce constructive pictures that are really entertaining. Fully aware that many a critic may scoff at this film as a tear-jerker, your editors recommend it without hesitation as one of 1941's best pictures. It is adult, yes—for all adults who have a heart, from the ages of sixteen and beyond.—C. S. and L. R.

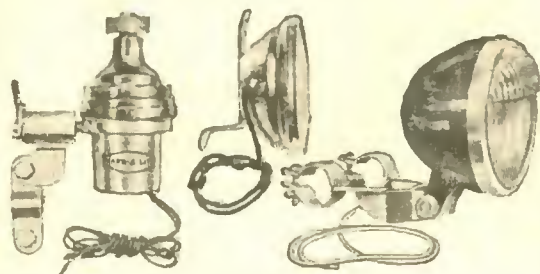

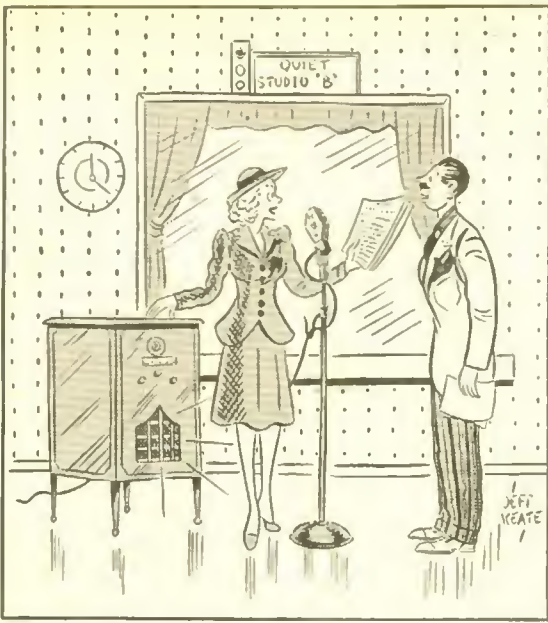

RADIO VIEWS by Martin Lewis

THE movie men are not happy men these days. One of the reasons for their despondency is because of the poor showings which musicals have been making at the box-office lately. The fact that these pictures have gone into a decline is heart-breaking to the movie moguls, for even during the depression a musical could always be counted upon to return its makers a

handsome profit.

This slump which musicals have taken of late is due almost entirely to the current network war against ASCAP. Whether or not the radio chain's ban on ASCAP music has hurt that organization yet remains to be seen. But one thing is certain, it has hurt the movies.

The picture men are frank to admit this. They, more than anyone else, are aware that in order for a musical to be successful, the public must first hear its tunes—get to humming and whistling them. Then, and only then, will they flock to see the picture. The trouble, however, is that practically all movie song-writers are members of ASCAP. And ASCAP songs at present are tabu on the country's two largest networks. The return of ASCAP music to the Mutual network hasn't helped much.

A song hit of today is dependent for its success not so much upon originality or genuine artistic merit as it is upon widespread plugging. Almost any tune, provided it fulfills certain minimum requirements, can be made into a hit song. This is done by having it constantly played on the air, etc. Therefore, if for any reason a song is denied an opportunity to be heard it cannot hope to become popular. This truism is something which the movie moguls are keenly aware of. And as a result they are hoping with might and main that ASCAP and the two networks will soon come to some sort of agreement which will again permit the broadcasting of ASCAP songs. Until then their musicals with their ASCAP tunes will suffer. And when

a musical suffers, then men in Hollywood who made it suffer also!

Negotiations between ASCAP and the networks are still under way, and for the benefit of all concerned we hope it won't be too long before an agreement is reached.

GENERAL

"Hams" Get Sliced

WASHINGTON.—Because they violated the emergency injunction against communicating with radio stations in foreign countries, the licenses of thirteen American amateurs have been suspended by the F.C.C. for a period of sixty days. The commission also announced that its fleet of mobile patrols had spotted illegal stations operating in Portland, Ore., Los Angeles, Calif., and Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.

Commentators Win Awards

NEW YORK.—Two commentators, Helen Hiatt of NBC and William L. Shirer of CBS, have been presented with awards by the Headliners Club for their brilliant reportorial work in foreign fields. Miss Hiatt received her award for her brilliant scoop in broadcasting her impressions of the bombing of Gibraltar last September. Shirer's was a special award, given for an outstanding achievement over a period of time as a Berlin correspondent.

TO COMPLETELY reverse the direction of a propaganda campaign overnight is as difficult as to stop a steamroller running down-hill and then make it immediately back up the slope. This is, in effect, just what Berlin and Moscow radio propagandists had to do when Hitler suddenly gave the word that sent his panzer divisions scurrying against Red Russia—his former ally. A period of spluttering, evasion and general nonsense prevailed before Lord Haw Haw, Kaltenbach, Ward and company could get their bearings. Democ and Nazi, creators of "America Asks, Germany Answers," wisely choose this time for their vacation. Jane Anderson, Catholic fireball, didn't mention the invasion of Russia which had then started, but

did tell England that they would be better off with Capone in the saddle than Churchill, for at least Capone didn't try to preach from the pulpit. "America," she said, "is young, fine and clean, but not its government. Better for America to be sold into slavery than become a gem in a British harem." Lord Haw Haw read Hitler's declaration of war against Russia but made no comments.

Russia wasted no time in reversing its propaganda machine: "War has been thrust upon us. We must thrust this insatiable Hitler and his gangster invaders from our country" . . . Churchill in his speech called Hitler a monster of wickedness, insatiable for blood . . . Lord Haw Haw countered with, "Churchill has the impudence to pick those he once described as bloody vassals for his new allies" . . . Berlin's Fred Kaltenbach said, "Toughie (Duff) Cooper, Grand Mogul of Churchill's Department of 'Misinformation,' has hitched his wagon to a Soviet star. England is not choosey. 'Come be our ally,' she says to Comrade Stalin, 'and all will be forgiven and no questions asked'" . . . "We have no enmity against the Russian people," the German propagandists state, "we only wish to destroy this nest of Jewish rulers in Moscow" . . . Moscow parries with, "Hitler, like a vicious jackal, is insatiable in his desire for conquest and war." Moscow, never one to mince words or to sweeten up a horror story, recently introduced a man who had just escaped from Warsaw. His purpose, he said, was to tell the world about true conditions in that city of terror

and disease. "The people are starving; Polish residents are persecuted; the Jews are in complete degradation. Rickshaws loaded down with German soldiers are being pulled by emaciated Polish and Jewish youths; bread crumbs are being licked up from the streets; women are made to disrobe for refusing to obey minor orders. In front of my eyes, a small child was kicked to death. The world will never know peace until Hitler and his bandits are driven from the earth" . . . Ian Finlay, broadcasting from London in "Britain Speaks," stated, "You are not facing Germans, you are facing Nazis. Hitler is without scruple or thought. If he wins, Germany too will be in the wilderness where all starve; where men with dripping chops will snarl at each other like beasts and twilight will descend upon civilization" . . . Moscow promises, "Hitler will never lay his filthy hands on the land of Russia. His greedy brain has become feverish with the thoughts of Russia's great wealth."

So at last the bars are down and radio propagandists are baring their fangs and hurling such a barrage of naked fury in words at each other as has never been known in the history of man.

Russia is best from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon EDT over RV96 (15.18).

Wodehouse Joins Goebbels' Gabblers

Goebbels' bag of propaganda tricks is apparently inexhaustible. In the

form of a surprise announcement, the Berlin announcer introduced a new speaker on Friday evening, June 27, with these words: "You are now about to listen to the famous writer and humorist, P. G. Wodehouse, who up to now has been in a German internment camp. Mr. Wodehouse has just completed a new novel which we understand is on its way to a publisher in the United States. He will tell you about his experiences and give you some of his impressions of Nazi Germany."

Mr. Wodehouse's little talk was quite humorous, but oh, so carefully edited by Nazi censors! He gave the impression that life in a German prison camp was not at all a bad experience; that the guards were only big, gruff boys who on the way to the camp actually allowed them to stop and buy cigarettes and to drink a couple of bottles of red wine. The writer opened his talk by saying that if he sounded a bit goofy he was actually screwy enough to stick straws in his ears because he had just been released from forty-nine weeks in a German camp—the "local lunatic asylum in northern Silesia." "There is an advantage in being in a prison camp," he said; "it keeps you out of local saloons and allows one to catch up on one's reading . . ."

WHERE does a national hero spend his time off? What sort of home life has a singing cowboy whose annual movie audience is forty million, whose radio listeners (Sunday, CBS) run in the millions, whose fan mail tops any other star's, ranging up to twelve thousand letters a week? To get the answer, MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE sent cameraman Bruce Bailey out to 10983 Bluffside Drive in North Hollywood, where Gene Autry lives. Gene at home, he found, is surprisingly like Gene in the movies—cool, smiling and a little bit awkward. He lives with his wife Ina, whom he married when she was sixteen, in a luxuriously rambling house of nine rooms situated on a three-acre plot of ground bounded on the southeast by the Los Angeles River. Gene also owns a two-hundred-acre ranch three and a half miles northwest of San Fernando, but most of the time he's not at Republic Studios making westerns, or on tour, or preparing his "Melody Ranch" show, is spent at the Hollywood home. Here this grandson of a Baptist preacher, who learned to sing in church, enjoys the rich rewards of a career which is founded on a clean-cut, wholesome character (in real life as well as in publicity stories), who can sing, ride and act. And enjoy is the word, because, if he's anything, Gene Autry is a real home-body.

GENE IS EASY TO SEE, receptive to new ideas. Interviewed here by writer James Street, he spends much of his free time in this home office. Walls are covered with pictures of Gene's friends, from F. D. R. down, autographed to him. The massive desk of Tennessee red cedar is his favorite

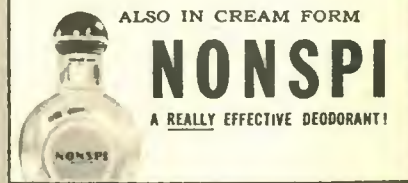

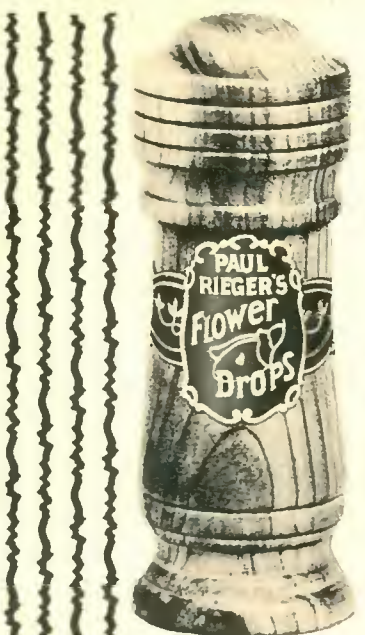
