Editorially Speaking . . .

ALREADY women are taking the places of men in many industries vital to defense. Dresses are making way for slacks. Uniforms are becoming the order of the day. This is total war, and such work by women is necessary. More and more, women will do men's work on the home front as the war goes on.

We need not go into the old discussion of "stronger sex" or "weaker sex" here. The advisability of women in war industry is not the problem under consideration. But what we are concerned with is the personalities and futures of the women and girls who are finding something new in the increased responsibility they are taking on in aiding this country's defense.

There's a danger which all of them must watch.

It was nicely expressed in a recent interview by Ona Munson, who said:

"The trouble with most career women is that they lose their charm when they acquire efficiency."

Miss Munson really ought to know whereof she speaks, since she has been a career girl in the true sense of the word for quite some time. She's heard on the air as Lorelei, the demon girl reporter of Edward G. Robinson's "Big Town" radio programs. She also appears regularly on the screen, recently was seen as Madam Gin Sling in "Shanghai Gesture."

Although Miss Munson's past efforts on the stage, the air and on the screen are not comparable to war work in the present emergency, many women who otherwise would not have sought a career in the

business or production world now will be doing so. That's why a word of warning from Miss Munson, who already has built—and held—a career, is significant:

"It's absolutely essential to be efficient, of course," Miss Munson says, "but too many girls forget to be charmingly feminine at the same time. They feel that since they're in a man's world they must take on qualities which are a part of the successful male.

"And that," she explains, "is where they make their mistake. Because, whereas a man gets away with those characteristics, they only make a woman hard and unattractive."

Concludes Miss Munson: "Don't submerge your personality; improve it if it needs improvement, but don't lose the best thing about you—your charm."

What Miss Munson has to say about career women in general holds true for every feminine defense worker.

So don't hesitate on those defense jobs, girls. Do the work for which you're best fitted, whether it is in office or factory. Wear uniforms and slacks if you find them more practical.

But don't forget to go to the beauty shop and keep well groomed. You'll be happier—and more efficient—if you do!

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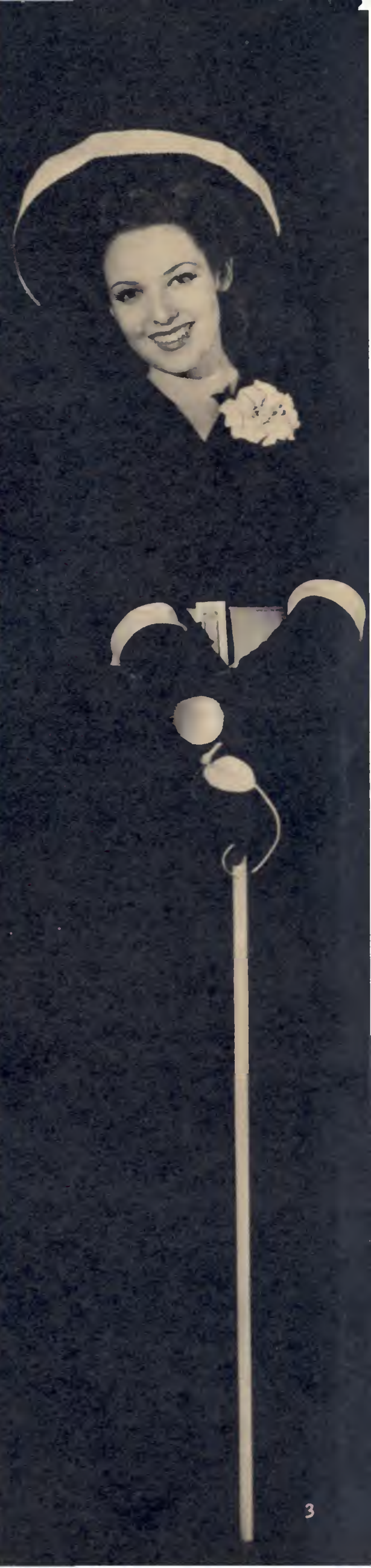

"ARE YOU A MISSING HEIR?"

One Man's Dream, Backed by a Knowledge of the Law and Aided by Expert Detective Work, Brings a Grippingly Dramatic Program to the Airlanes!

Here is the story of Jim Waters, a man whose love for a good human-interest yarn gave birth to a unique radio program that has brought joy to men and women in many walks of life. YOU may be one of them!—The Editors.

WHEN the death of their aunt in 1931 made Mary, Charlie, Henry and James Schultz heirs to \$4,000, the administrator of the estate tried in vain to find the girl and her brothers. Their whereabouts and even their given names were unknown. Ten years went by and the money was still unclaimed. Then, last summer, the "Are You a Missing Heir?" (formerly "Court of Missing Heirs") program of the Columbia Broadcasting System told what was known of their story.

When their mother died in 1903 the Schultz children—two, four, six and eight years of age—were placed by their father in foster homes and orphanages, after which he devoted himself to his bottle and his housekeeper, and forgot them. The children grew up and scattered.

Henry Schultz, a fireman in Ozone Park, Long Island, heard the broadcast and furnished the given names of his sister and brothers. Forty-five Mary Schultzes responded to the next broadcast. A week later the director of the program sent for Henry. "I think I've found the right Mary—she's on relief here in New York," he said. "Talk to her on the phone." In a few moments Henry rushed back. "God be praised," he shouted, "it's my sister all right—I'm off to see her!"

A James Schultz of Stroudsburg, Pa., had been located as a result of

the broadcast, and the family birth certificates, which Mary possessed, identified him. Someone reported that a sailor named Charles Schultz might be the third brother. The name and whereabouts of his ship was learned through the Maritime Union. Police in Houston, Texas, were asked to notify him when the ship made port there. "I don't believe it," Charlie declared. He virtually had to be shanghaied from the ship.

Still incredulous, the hard-boiled sailor was brought face to face with the other three Schultzes in the "Are You a Missing Heir?" office. Convinced, he suddenly softened and put his arms around Mary. "I never did nothin' for nobody," he gulped, "but I'm goin' to take care of Mary the rest of my life. I'm all choked up!" So was the office staff; the program director told me that none of them did a stroke of work the rest of the day.

The story of the "Are You a Missing Heir?" program goes back to the time when Jim Waters, the creator and director of the show, was graduated from law school in 1928 and got a job with a probate attorney in Chicago. Always more interested in a good human-interest yarn than in the law, he made it a hobby to collect stories of unclaimed estates.

He found that in seventy percent of unclaimed estates no will had been made. By state laws, unwilled property descends first to the husband or wife; next to children, then to brothers and sisters, aunts and uncles, and first cousins. Hence most missing heirs were missing because they had no idea that the law was passing on to them the estates of relatives whom they had known slightly or not at all.

It was ironic and dramatic, Jim Waters reflected, that all over the country these distant—and often destitute—heirs lived on, never dreaming that a fortune was theirs for the asking.

In 1932, filling a brief-case with the most striking stories he had unearthed, he made the round of New York book publishers, but none was willing to gamble on the book he proposed to write. Returning to Chicago, he found his job gone.

Waters then tried to get a radio hearing for his idea, but there were no takers. Twice he crossed the country in an old jalopy, picking up new cases from dusty probate files along the route and vainly interviewing prospective sponsors. Paradoxically broke while trying to give away millions, he pawned his typewriter more than once while waiting for cash answers to telegrams to friends. Finally, after five years of discouragement, he got an Oklahoma oil firm to sponsor the program and the first show went on the air in October, 1937.

His worries were over—but a prodigious amount of work had just begun.

THE first time the program went on the air, over twenty-nine Midwest stations, Waters listened, pale and apprehensive, as actors portrayed events in the life of one George Henry Wilkins, who died intestate leaving an unclaimed \$9,000. Suppose no listener sent in a clue and no missing heir was turned up; would the program be a flop? Would his ten years of combing probate records, of hawking his idea, of hunger and of hoping, go for nothing? To Jim Waters' despair, no heir was found in time for the sec-

ond broadcast, held a week later.

That night audiences heard the story of an aged recluse who died in a shack and left a bank-book showing deposits of \$18,000. A listener in Topeka, Kansas, recognized the miser as an eccentric uncle who had disappeared. He received the estate, and the third broadcast happily told of his good fortune. From then on, heirs continued to be found in a steady stream that insured the program's success, and moved it to its present spot on Columbia's Coast-to-Coast network.

Today, from a New York office, Waters supervises four trained investigators who search out unclaimed estates from the probate records of the 3,070 counties in the U. S. A staff of seven persons is required to read, sort and answer the five thousand to ten thousand letters and telegrams that pour in each week from claimants and informants.

From then on it's straight detective work. Often the only clue is years old. Take the case of Charles P. Richmond, a murdered ex-miner. A listener wrote in that he possessed an old paper which indicated that the son of a man of that name had attended a school at 102nd St. and Amsterdam Ave., New York City, in 1916. Waters' investigators knocked on door after door of the shabby flats in that neighborhood, asking, "Did you ever know a Mrs. Richmond who once lived around here?" until the widow, a tired-out, elderly dressmaker, and her son, a post-office employe, were located and their \$30,000 was turned over to them.

Sometimes finding a missing heir involves a long process of elimination, in which Waters' legal training stands

him in good stead. When Frank Harmon, heir to \$5,000, was sought, five hundred people put in claims. Each was sent a questionnaire asking detailed information about intimate family affairs. Only one reply—that of a night watchman in a woolen mill in Rockville, Conn.—proved to be correct.

When Waters is convinced that a person has established his claim, he turns all the data over to the administrator of the estate, who determines the legal aspects of the case. His program gives no legal advice and refuses any compensation.

Possibly what Waters enjoys most is playing host to the found heirs, who come to New York as his guests to broadcast their story on the "Are You a Missing Heir?" program. That, and the reunion of broken families which is often a by-product of the program.

Many located heirs are orphans who are amazed to learn their identities. The majority of missing-heir mysteries, Waters has found, originate in a quarrel. "Keep a civil tongue in your head!" barked a father when his son stated his intention of going to work instead of finishing school. "You'll never hear me talk again!" shouted the son, who was recently located as a missing heir.

Abandoned spouses often obliterate the memory of the other parent from their children's minds. Hope Lindo Strahan of Sioux Falls, S. Dak., learned through a "Are You a Missing Heir?" broadcast that she had inherited \$8,000 from a father she had never known because, during her infancy, her mother had left him in a fit of jealousy.

Louise Phillips left her husband, Harry, and went away with her little son, Rawlins, when Harry refused to give up the itinerant life of a train steward for a settled job in a club. Rawlins grew up a wandering Jack of all trades. Meanwhile, the father prospered during the Prohibition era. He died in 1934, and when the "Are You a Missing Heir?" program sought his son to give him \$85,000, Rawlins was found living in a Chicago basement flat earning \$18 a week as a cement mixer.

FREQUENTLY, a sense of inferiority makes people drop out of sight. Such a case was Helen Herrold, who was sought by the "Are You a Missing Heir?" program to claim the \$14,000 trust fund her father had willed when she became of age. Orphaned at seven, Helen was brought up by well-meaning but strict aunts who had children of their own. She always felt that her cousins "belonged" while she didn't, and finally ran away when she was sixteen, thumbed her way from Ohio to Florida, and when Waters traced her five years later she was working at a bus stop roadside restaurant.

Many lost legatees are middle-class Americans leading average lives; some hold positions of responsibility. John P. Snyder, mayor of Clay Center, Kansas, was one of fourteen surprised heirs to the \$50,000 estate of an aunt. Sheriff Guy C. Wood of Calipatria, Calif., got a \$5,500 share in \$40,000 from an uncle in Iowa he had never met and who had died intestate. Mrs. Leona U. Burke of Beulah, Wis., widowed and remarried, was calmly milking cows when a friend who listened to the "Are You a Missing

Heir?" broadcasts brought the news that she had inherited \$3,500 from an uncle of her first husband. "They can't mean me," she said. "It must be somebody else by the same name." Her reaction was typical, even when missing heirs themselves hear their case broadcast, they usually think it "too good to be true" and have to be coaxed by friends into communicating with Waters.

Sometimes Waters' search-party takes on the breathless character of an old-fashioned pursuit and capture movie. The hunt for Birdie Mae Larise was one of these. According to Georgia law, only twenty-four days remained between the broadcast and the date she had to claim her money—\$10,000 and a valuable farm left by her husband. When he had become hopelessly insane from shell shock, she had been forced to leave him in a veterans' hospital and to support herself and her son. To get food for herself and John, her boy, she ran concessions for tent shows and danced.

Following the broadcast, informants gave Waters the name of the widow's show. He learned its route and inserted a notice in *Billboard*, the gazette of the show business, that urgent letters awaited her at their next stop. Meanwhile, the show had broken up; Birdie Mae and little John were left stranded in an old trailer. Just one day before the time limit for filing her claim was up, the letter caught up with her.

"It's a real satisfaction to help people come into their own!" Jim Waters told me. "But it's maddening to think of all the countless missing heirs who might claim their fortunes if only they knew that money awaited them. Right

now my files show that there are \$20,000,000 waiting for the asking!"

Perhaps you know one of the thousands of people with fortunes to collect. Clair Neal, for instance. His mother, Margaret Ahlness, left him \$18,000. He was born in Madelia, Minn., worked in banks in Minneapolis and in Lathgate, S. Dak., was honorably discharged from the Army on July 1, 1919, roomed with a family at 5330 Crystal Street, Chicago, until 1936. The only later trace of him is that he was working in a Florida CCC camp in 1938.

Do you know George Howard Wood, Boston tailor and merchant, established a \$21,800 trust fund for his only child, William Wood? William hasn't been heard from since 1913 when, after a quarrel with his father, he wrote from Cuba that he was leaving for Guatemala. Or Allan Leo Williams, last heard of in 1916 when he cooked for a lumber camp in Troy, Idaho? Now fifty-two years old, he is heir to a trust fund of \$250,000. The estate was left by one James Armstrong, who ran away to sea as a boy and ended up a well-to-do plantation owner in Hawaii. Williams is the nephew of Armstrong's sister.

To date, "Are You a Missing Heir?", which has placed more than \$810,090 in the surprised hands of 155 missing heirs, has proved that hidden treasure, melodramatic reunions and nick-of-time rescue from desperate situations are not fairy-tales but stranger-than-fiction reality in these United States.

The Movie Front

Ann Sheridan Gives Her Share to Red Cross Plasma Bank; Joe E. Brown Flies to Alaska to Entertain Boys in Service; Hollywood Awards Annual "Oscars"

HOLLYWOOD

MOST dramatic award banquet yet of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences was the fourteenth, staged last fortnight, after once being called off on account of the war, then being staged informally, and to add fire to the confusion, bringing about the competition of two sisters, Joan Fontaine and Olivia de Havilland, for the best-actress award. To our observing editorial mind, it was the dramatic competition of these two ladies of the screen that overshadowed all other nominations, voting, or awards to others. Neither Joan nor Olivia knew when they went to the banquet together—sat at the same table—whether either would win for their respective nominated pictures, "Suspicion" and "Hold Back the Dawn." But Joan won, Olivia didn't. And a rivalry of years' standing brought the great reward to the "little sister" who once was almost obscure in the shadow of Olivia's limelight.

Gary Cooper was named best actor for his Sergeant York in that picture; Mary Astor was given the supporting actress palm for her role in "The Great Lie," and Donald Crisp won the supporting actor award for his part as the father in "How Green Was My Valley."

That picture practically swept the remaining award classifications—to John Ford, as best director, for "Valley"; to the production itself, as best production, and other titles. But MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE, in announcing its "Elmer" awards of several weeks ago, did not consider "How Green Was My Valley" as a 1941 release; nationally, it will be seen most everywhere in 1942. That MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE believes it to be a great picture, nevertheless, is shown by this weekly's "Brief Guide" rating (see facing page) wherein "Valley" scores five Vs—VVVVV—the highest rating possible. Only one other picture has ever been so recognized—"One Foot in Heaven"—for whose role in which Fredric March was awarded an "Elmer" . . .

Two days after the banquet, to which he escorted Olivia de Havilland, actor Burgess Meredith answered his selectee call—much in the same way that his chum, Jimmy Stewart, now a lieutenant, did one year ago. Meredith asks no favors; went into the service just the same as your brother or my son did and will. And that is good. Hollywood is setting a proper example. Another answerer of the call to arms last week was Dick Paxton, former Mickey Rooney stand-in, who only recently got his first chance at screen acting. But such are the fortunes of

war for others in all walks of life . . .

Along the Hollywood war front, Ensign Wayne Morris, U. S. N., took time off February 25 to wed socialite-actress Pat Stewart (O'Rourke). Ann Sheridan (Mrs. George Brent, remember?) gave a pint of "oomph" blood to the Red Cross plasma bank, as did likewise Fay Holden, Andy Hardy's screen mother. Joe E. Brown flew off to Anchorage, Alaska, at his own expense to entertain and show the lads in the camps way up North that all haven't forgotten them, and Kay Kyser announced a \$500,000 self-financed trip of the nation's military camps and bases that ordinarily are too far off the beaten track for entertainers to get to—or at least are passed up for one reason or another . . .

The point is, Hollywood is not convinced that the Treasury Department's slogan, "Buy Defense Bonds and Do Your Bit," is quite enough to win a war, at least not this one, which got far out of control before the extinguisher was turned on . . .

Jane Withers and Freddie Bartholomew, for example, headed a juvenile picture kids' committee of thirteen who swarmed down onto the platform of the Hollywood High School auditorium last week and told the boys and girls that they were not too young to help win the war by (1) doing

odd jobs to earn quarters with which to buy defense stamps, (2) learning first-aid principles, (3) directing one's education toward an occupation necessary to the war effort, (4) saving paper, lead, tinfoil and cardboard cartons and (5) planting defense gardens in vacant spaces . . .

How honeycombed the country and particularly notables' homes have been with spies was demonstrated last week, too, when a thirty-three-year-old German-born engineer, an illegally entered, non-registered alien, pleaded guilty when apprehended in Detroit. The German had been employed in the past as a butler and chauffeur in the homes of Mischa Auer, Herbert Marshall and Sir Cedric Hardwicke. Many of film-land's notables thought it was smart to employ Japanese chauffeurs and houseboys—until December 7 . . .

Priorities made two threats at pictures last week. The first was the proposed reduction of features to one hundred a year. But producers of western screen plays are planning to appeal to Washington for a reasonable exemption from the expected edict. They point out that the gunpowder used in fight sequences is a very small matter, that the sidearms used are generally obsolete models in keeping with the western periods, that the scenery required is merely good old

MOVIE REVIEW

"The Invaders"

Cast: Laurence Olivier, Leslie Howard, Raymond Massey, Glynis Johns, Anton Walbrook, Eric Portman, et al. Columbia release of an Ortos British picture produced and directed by Michael Powell, with original story and screen play by Emeric Pressburger.

Type of Picture: Current war-time melodrama based on misadventures of remaining members of a crew of a Nazi "pig boat" bombed to the bottom of Hudson Bay by R. C. A. F. planes.

This is the Story: Nazi U-boat 37, before sinking off Canadian shores, lands a party of six men to reconnoiter; they capture a two-man Hudson Bay post at Wolstenholme and slay trapper Johnnie Barras (Olivier) when he shouts for help over the post's radio transmitter. An emergency plane sent to investigate is captured by the Nazis, who are but four when they arrive in a crash landing at a Hutterite settlement. The German-descended Hutterites, though preached Nazism, help the four but are not converted. Instead, they switch Catholic Vogel of the U-boat survivors to their beliefs. He is sentenced to die and is shot by the party commander, Hirth, who is then turned out of the settlement with the two men he has left. They pawn and steal their way across Canada, always in jeopardy, hoping to catch a Japanese boat to Russia and thence to Germany. However, their devout Nazi fanaticisms are being dissolved by the freedom of Canada they see about them. Indians capture Kranz; now Hirth and Lohrmann meet writer Philip Scott (Leslie Howard) in the British Columbia wilderness where he is studying Indian tribal customs. He befriends them; they pay back with hatred and violence. In a showdown, Scott captures Lohrmann. Hirth remains free but is apprehended by American customs guards, who return him to Canadian officials as "improperly manifested freight"—and Raymond Massey beats the tar out of him.

Verdict: This story is entirely possible of becoming true—and is an interesting study of the reaction of barbaric Nazism to superior democracy; how the "blind obedience" of the Nazi fails in a pinch. Olivier, Howard and Massey are splendid indeed, and Glynis Johns establishes herself as an actress. Four-V fare.

WASHINGTON

The good old American system of "argufying" will not be curtailed during this war. We have the word of Mr. Archibald MacLeish, director of the Government's Office of Facts and Figures. Any radio listener can find assurance in that statement, for Mr. MacLeish is not only a splendid poet and writer as well as the Librarian of Congress; he is also the voice of the White House.

It was a cheery Sunday morning here in Washington when Mr. MacLeish and Mr. Harold Lasswell went to the NBC studios on a downtown corner and sat down to broadcast on a "University of Chicago Round Table." The past week had been choked with stirring events. The Japs had got into Java. The British had raided France. Subs had raided the Caribbean. There was still no visible hope for the relief of MacArthur. Armchair strategists were crying for action by the Army, by the Fleet, by the Commander-in-Chief.

Here was a time when faith in our leaders was needed. If ever in our history, here was a moment when men at the head of this nation might have said, "This nation is endangered by too much loose talk. We must shut it off."

If ever you wonder at the strength of democracy, examine the hearts and minds of the men being attacked daily in our press. They have the power, some of them, to stop critical talk. But not one of them has done so. Not one has even thought that anything but free expression of opinion is the

way to run this Government. As Mr. MacLeish pointed out on that Sunday program, now is a time when we need constructive critical comment more than ever. For criticism blows new life into old ideas and old routines . . .

That same Sunday evening the Mutual system produced a typical sample of American free-thinking and free-talking. It was Theodore Granik's "American Forum of the Air" and the subject discussed was American air power. I went to that broadcast to watch democracy in action.

To those who don't know Washington, this program is a Sunday night feature at the Shoreham Hotel. Diplomats, soldiers, businessmen and Government officials who are in town make a habit of dropping into the Shoreham's ballroom to see and hear the fun.

The speakers sit on a raised platform at one side of the room. Five mikes and four gooseneck reading-lamps, a water-pitcher and glasses and manuscripts litter the surface. This night two Congressmen, Melvin J. Maas and D. W. Harter, were pitted against critics airplane designer Alexander deSeversky and publisher William Ziff . . .

The real fun begins when the prepared speeches are finished and each expert leans toward his mike to make some special point. Interruptions pile up. Ted Granik needs all his skill as a chairman to keep the voices clear and intelligible. The forty-five-minute period is speeding toward its close. Each man is eager now to talk, is less courteous, is more assertive. The audience leans forward. This is the fun they have been expecting. Some of them are regulars and remember the

night one visitor swung a punch at his confrere. Sometimes the distinguished gentlemen at the mikes won't speak to each other after the sign-off . . .

Then a surprising thing happens. The audience divides into two parts. One half goes to the stairs and home. The other half moves on the speakers. About the speaker's table they split into a quartet of tightly knotted groups. Voices rise. Words bounce hard against walls. In a minute the quiet of the broadcast has been succeeded by bedlam as the good old American pastime of "argufying" holds full sway. It will be hours before some of those critics go to bed . . .

The right to criticize is one which is held by all free people. The right to give freely of one's faith to chosen leaders is also a right. In these times, radio gives all of us much on which to think. No other people has ever had so much to ponder on, or so great a responsibility for making the right decision. God grant that we measure up to our opportunity.

NEW YORK

There's a lot more to radio than meets the eye—or the car, as it were. Consider all the people and departments that make radio shows possible, for apart from the actors, there are the directors, producers, authors, musicians, engineers and sound-effects men. Finally there are the censors, for all scripts (except speeches by the President) must be passed upon be-

fore they are aired. A sound-effects man must have a wonderful imagination—for often he is called upon to reproduce quite outlandish sounds. An amusing story is the one about the sound-effects man who tried to simulate the sound of water being poured into a glass. Finally, after hours of experimenting, he found that the only way to do it was to pour water into a glass. It's not always so easy, though. The mike is very sensitive and magnifies most sounds, so that munching a hard candy in front of a mike would sound to listeners like a head-on collision between two crack express trains. Recently the sound-effects man on the "Ellery Queen" show had to manufacture the sound of a creaky rocking-chair. Classical Music

Final Broadcast of the Operatic Season Direct From the Metropolitan Will Be "Faust", Brought Back to the Repertory After a Long Absence

GOUNOD'S "Faust" will be the last opera broadcast this season directly from the Metropolitan. Briefly, a review of the series shows a generally well-rounded grouping of the company's repertory. There have been the staples, the revivals; in short, the situation has mirrored the bustling, progressive activity of the Metropolitan management. There is no denying the fact that what they aimed to do was to present their radio listeners with a comprehensive survey of the scene, as it is exemplified in America's—and now the world's—operatic stronghold.

Unquestionably there have been performances of dubious worth, but just so there have been others of special appeal. What we must be thankful for is the Metropolitan's willingness to experiment. There is no better method than that of trial and error. Over a long period of time it always proves best.

"Faust" is one of the operas brought back into the repertory after an absence of several seasons. Time was when the Met's schedules groaned with the weight of "Fausts," when a discerning and learned writer like the late William J. Henderson could call the venerable auditorium the "Faustspielhaus." Of late years it appears several times a season, makes its bid for attention, and all without too much glamour, without fanfare. "Faust" is that kind of opera.

Yet when it was first produced at the Theatre Lyrique, Paris, on March

19, 1859, it was considered a daringly original work. It made its successful way, notwithstanding, and the first flushes of German criticism could not stop its advance. The graver scholars in Germany saw the opera as a sensualization of Goethe's highly spiritual and philosophical subject. But the H. F. Chorley, distinguished writer of the period, could forego making such

successes in other fields, a "Divertissement" for orchestra, played at one of the "Concerts Populaires" in 1872, occasioning favorable comment. There was still greater triumph for him with the introductory performance of a violin concerto, dedicated to and first played by Sarasate. Lalo continued along these lines, bringing out the present work in 1875, and, later, a "Fantasie Norvegienne" for violin and orchestra, a cello concerto, and so on.

But his operatic urgings had by no means left him. He started work on his "Le Roi d'Ys" in 1875, though that was not completed till 1887. The opera was given its world premiere at the Opera Comique in 1888. He wrote further pieces for the stage, but he is best known for the "Symphonie Espagnole" and "Le Roi d'Ys" (which used to be heard with some regularity).

Zino Francescatti, who will play the solo violin in the "Symphonie," is a native of Marseilles. He was one of a group of young artists of military age who were exempted from military service in order that they might act as "unofficial ambassadors of goodwill for France and its culture." He is mostly self-taught, though his father, a well-known musician in France, had given him his first lessons. Mr. Francescatti was a boy prodigy, giving a first recital at the age of five and playing the Beethoven Violin Concerto with orchestra at the age of ten. He has performed all through Europe, South America and this country.

distinctions. He said of the love duet that it was one of "... those inspirations which might have been born among the dews of a summer twilight, and the scent of flowers, and the musical falling of distant waters. The brief *adagio*, which contains the full confessions of the pair, has a luxury of tenderness and beauty which are unsurpassable."

ERNEST NEWMAN, contemporary musicologist and biographer of Richard Wagner, contrasts this with, "Our modern conception of love-music has been altered by the duet in the second act of 'Tristan.' In comparison with the terrible fire of that, the love-music of 'Faust' may seem to us today to inhabit a world of a rather lower temperature; but Chorley was right—at the time when 'Faust' appeared there was no operatic love-music to compare with this either for sweetness or for depth of passion."

The story of this opera, of course, doesn't hope to convey all the spiritual and moral thought of Goethe's masterpiece. Actually it is more concerned with active plot than with the upper reaches of logic. The librettists, Jules Barbier and Michael Carre, after all, were men of the theater and as such they constructed an adequate operatic book.

Belated Success

Edouard Lalo, whose "Symphonie Espagnole" is listed for the Philharmonic-Symphony broadcast, was born at Lille, France, on January 27, 1823, though his family was of purely Spanish origin. He obtained some lessons from the German cellist Baumann, then, at the age of sixteen, entered the Paris Conservatoire, where he studied violin with Francois Anton Habeneck and piano with Jules Schulhoff. Conditions at home made it imperative that he contribute to his own up-keep, so he began his career by playing at chamber-music performances. He even wrote a couple of songs, but they brought him little remuneration.

The composition of chamber-music next interested him. That was in 1855. France, however, was anything but receptive to that type, so in disgust he gave up, swearing that he would never put pen to paper again. That vow was broken some ten years later when he turned to opera composing. A piece called "Fiesque" was the result of this new ambition. He entered it in the competition held at the Opera Comique in 1867. It took only third place. This was a major disappointment, for Lalo wanted very much to become a successful opera composer. However, he obtained his initial

Guide to This Week's Fine Music Programs

Prokofieff "Classical" Symphony over MBS on Friday, which bears testimony to the work's popularity.

Prokofieff, one of the great musical figures in Soviet culture, aimed at nothing more than the creation of a work in the so-called classic vein. That is, he wrote a symphony that Mozart himself might have written, had he lived in our time. There is scarcely anything like propaganda in this music. In fact, the composer bent over backward in order to produce a work devoid of the "Prokofieffian" idiom, which would be, so to speak, an idiom tinged with mockery, or with the lampooning of modern bourgeois customs and the like.

In the "Classical" Symphony the listener will find a certain veneration, to call it that, of the Mozartean spirit. Perhaps certain phrases or turns of phrases will seem to have the certain flavor that could be associated only with Mozart's style. Yet the symphony is suffused with Prokofieffian traits.

The piece is dedicated to Boris Asafieff, a writer on music. It was given its first performance in Leningrad on April 21, 1918. Prokofieff himself conducted, and he also conducted the first American performance, which took place under the auspices of the Russian Symphony Society in Carnegie Hall on December 18 of that year. Practically every major orchestra numbers the symphony among its most-favored compositions.

There is one special point of structural interest to it, instead of a minuet the composer wrote a gavotte. This type of dance music was introduced at the French Court by a group of native provincial dancers. With the passing of time it assumed the proportions of the "dignified, pompous and chaste dance of the eighteenth century, with slow and measured postures and low bows and curtsies."

POPULAR MUSIC

STATISTICS are dry, uncommunicative matters to most people, but occasionally the average person finds interest in such things. So to some there may be useful information in the fact that Jimmy Dorsey's records sold well over the 5,000,000 figure during 1941. Not a bad number, considering that the whole record industry, in the same period, reached the colossal total of 100,000,000 disks.

Strangely enough, every one of his top sellers has been a Latin-American or quasi-Latin-American tune. The sudden rise began with his recording of "Six Lessons from Madame La Zonga," a little more than a year ago. Then followed "The Breeze and I," a fox-trot adaptation of "Andalucia," "Amapola," "Maria Elena," "Green Eyes," "Time Was," "Perfidia," and "Donna Maria." In other words, Jimmy Dorsey & Co. have been good-will ambassadors all by themselves.

Popular Records

An attractive album of musical novelties has just been issued by Victor. The set (P-112) contains excerpts from Prokofieff's "Peter and the Wolf," "On the Trail" from Ferde Grofe's "Grand Canyon Suite," Saint-Saens' "Danse Macabre," and other items. The pieces are performed sympathetically on the organ by Lew White, who arranged them for that instrument.

One of the up-and-coming hits is "Deep in the Heart of Texas," which is given good treatment by Tommy Tucker and his orchestra, vocal choruses and all. The companion item is "Tangerine" (Okeh 6583). The way Artie Shaw and his orchestra play "Somebody Nobody Loves" bodes well for the success of the song. Coupled with it is an old favorite, "Hindustan" (Victor 27798).

Earl Hines and his orchestra give one of their typical "hot" performances in a composition of Eddie Durham's titled "Swingin' on C." For contrast the other side of the disk offers a ballad "I Never Dreamt" (Bluebird B-11465). In the meantime Woody Herman and his coterie converge, and good, too, on an interesting Mexican item, "Las Chiapanecas," with the Hispanic rhythm going full tilt. Bracketed with it is a melody tune, "A String of Pearls" (Decca 4176).

Short Waves

Hong Kong and Manila on Air Again; San Francisco to Have New Station

Our Nazi Enemies

LINDLEY FRASER, speaking from the London Shortwave Station, made an important report on the present morale of the German civilian population. The winter has been very severe in Germany, he said, there has not been enough coal, there has been a shortage of warm clothing, the people are dirty, for there has been insufficient soap to keep their bodies clean. They are tired and their vitality has been lowered considerably. While there are no general epidemics, there is some typhus. All this has tended to lower civilian morale perceptibly. On the other hand the long winter is past and it will be several months before another winter, so spirits are rising. Many Germans are hoping that Hitler may somehow win the war before another winter. Those at home are pinning all their hopes on Hitler's great spring offensive. The German people have no understanding at all of the true state of affairs in Russia; don't know that the Nazi troops have been retreating all winter. The German home radio has insisted that the Germans have been repulsing Soviet attacks, that Nazi lines are holding while wave after wave of Russians have been thrown back. While some rumors of reverses are bound to have been circulated in Germany, the people as a whole haven't placed too much reliance in them, wishing to believe good news, not bad news. The British Broadcasting Corporation in its broadcasts to Germany has continually told its listeners the true state of affairs, but the great majority do not have access to a short-wave receiving-set, and if they do hear of German defeats discount much of it as British propaganda. To summarize the present morale of our Nazi enemies, it can be said that a hard winter and attendant hardships have considerably lowered the German civilian morale, but coming spring and hopes of a great and successful offensive in the near future have tended to counteract the deterioration of morale so that on a whole it might be said that those at home in Germany are still optimistic and still convinced of the inevitability of an eventual Nazi triumph.

New Short-Wave Station

O. F. Walker, radio engineer of the General Electric Company at Schenectady, New York, is now in San Francisco supervising the installation of a giant 100,000-watt short-wave transmitter, which will be another gun in a kilocycle battery "shooting" from the United States across the Pacific in the propaganda war with Japan.

This powerful transmitter, built by General Electric and operated previously at Schenectady for short-wave broadcasts to Europe and Latin America, will be operated in San Francisco under the call letters KWID. The operators of this station will be Associated Broadcasters, Inc., also operators of standard broadcast station KSFO. General Electric is completing another 100,000-watt transmitter at Schenectady, and meanwhile is on the

air there with two other short-wave transmitters (WGEO, WGEA).

KWID, which will have studios and offices at the Hotel Mark Hopkins, will render additional short-wave service to that now being given by General Electric's 50,000-watt San Francisco station KGEI, with studios and offices at the Fairmont Hotel. KGEI has been broadcasting to Latin America, Asia, the Antipodes and Africa for more than three years, and is at present the only United States short-wave station west of the Mississippi. KGEI is now broadcasting in eight languages and two foreign dialects.

Notes About Programs

Portions of the "London Calling" periods at 8:15 and 10:30 p.m. EWT are now being set aside for answers to letters sent in by listeners to the North American transmission. These periods can be heard over GSC (9.58) and GSD (11.75), and GSC (9.58) and GSL (6.11), respectively. . . . The "Mailbag Club," for years one of the most popular features of standard broadcast station WLW, Cincinnati, now goes on the air also for an international audience each Saturday at 9:00 a.m. EWT over WLWO (15.25) . . . The most lovable couple of the air, Fibber McGee and Molly, are now being heard by our troops in all

parts of the world by means of special rebroadcasts which are made each Sunday morning at 9:30 a.m. EWT over United States short-wave stations WRCA (15.15), WNBI (17.78), WBOS (15.15) and KGEI (7.25).

In a recent issue of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE we had a little item headed "Horse for Dogs," which, quoting E. D. Ward of Berlin Shortwave Station, stated that horse meat was available in Berlin for food for dogs but that it wasn't nor never had been for sale for human consumption. Leo Herz, one of our readers, of Chicago, Illinois, says this statement is the rankest kind of a lie, since as a former resident of Berlin he can vouch for the fact that it was sold for human consumption during the last war and up until he came to this country a few years ago, and that he has it first-hand from friends who have escaped from Germany since the present war began that it is not only available but being used daily for human food at present.

Yanks in Ireland

Corporal Long from Duluth, Minnesota, told about the Yanks in Ireland the other night from London. Among the first American soldiers to land in Ireland, Corporal Long was very much impressed with the enthusiastic wel-

come they were given by the natives of County Ulster. Out of every window hung men, women and children, each with their thumbs up—a British victory salute. An English guard of honor had everything in readiness at the new camp; everything had been done to make it pleasant for the lads from America—even to a big cake with welcome on it which graced the center table in the mess hall. The American boys had a hard time supplying extra buttons as souvenirs to the local townspeople. A dance was given each night in the little Ulster town near the camp so that the lads from the U. S. A. might find it possible to get acquainted with the Irish lassies. Corporal Long said he and the other boys had left America ankle-deep in snow; expected to find the snow neck-deep in Ireland, which is much farther north than the United States; instead found the crops growing, the fields green. All in all, speaking for our troops, he said he wishes those at home to know the lads are happy, that they liked the cordiality and sincerity of the Irish people, the green of the rolling hills.

Hong Kong and Manila

August Balbi of Los Angeles, California, informs me that the Hong Kong short-wave transmitter is back on the air again under Japanese sponsorship and using the Japanese call letters JZHA. Using its same old frequency of 9.525 megs, the Japanese station is on the air daily from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m. EWT. An English news bulletin is read at 9:15 a.m. EWT. Mr. Balbi is also hearing weak signals from a station on 6.14 megs daily to about 10:00 a.m. EWT, which gives its location as Manila. This is the identical frequency which was formerly used by KZRF. It seems possible that the Japanese may have actually seized the KZRF transmitter before it could be destroyed.

The new Shanghai station on 9.66 megs, heard from 8:00 to 11:00 a.m. EWT, is XGRI. News in English at 10:10 a.m. EWT.

Frequency Modulation

Progress of a Year Shows That FM Boosters Have Accomplished Much Since First Chain Organization Was Founded Under Leadership of John Shepard III, Yankee Network Head

Networks for FM?

THE development of frequency-modulation networks, linking FM stations across the country in the same manner that regular stations are combined into Coast-to-Coast networks now seems one of the next and most ambitious steps in the further growth of FM.

There's been a surprising amount of inaccurate talk from time to time based on the fallacy that FM networks can never be practical—except at staggering expense—because telephone-wire lines just won't handle the full-fidelity tonal range of which FM is so proud. Like so many other tidbits of stray information, this bears no resemblance to the truth.

The usual procedure with radio networks, as you probably know, is for the broadcasting companies to lease telephone wires which carry your favorite programs from Hollywood or New York straight across the country, stopping off at every station in that particular network. Individual stations then broadcast the network program for their local listeners.

FM networks are not only quite feasible but have already been operated on a test basis with a remarkable amount of success. It must be remembered that little more than a year has passed since FM stations were first granted the privilege of operating on a commercial basis, with sponsored programs. In that period, FM has confined itself largely to local service, with each station originating most of its own programs. Now, however, the number of FM transmitters regularly on the air has increased to such an extent that it becomes time to give serious thought to hooking many of these up permanently into networks.

With just such a project in view, the American Network, Inc.—FM's first chain organization—was founded last year under the leadership of John Shepard III, head of the Yankee Network in New England and one of FM's most ardent boosters. It was his enthusiasm for FM that led to the construction of W43B and W39B, in Boston and atop Mount Washington, N. H., respectively.

Blueprint for Progress

Ultimate plans of the American Network call for outlets in forty-five of the nation's biggest cities, Atlantic to Pacific. About seventy-five percent of the national population would live within ample reception range of these stations. First, however, steps are now being taken to establish an FM network service up and down the Atlantic seaboard that will provide chain programs for FM listeners in all New England, inland to the Hudson Valley, throughout the Central Atlantic states,

and as far south as Delaware. W41MM, the new mountain peak station in North Carolina designed to bring FM reception into seven different states of the South, will be an American Network affiliate. Operation of W41MM is expected to start in late spring. Other outlets, yet to be linked up, are located in such cities as Columbus, Nashville, Milwaukee, Atlanta, Houston and other leading centers.

Two Kinds of Networks

The mistaken notion that telephone wires cannot be used to carry full-fidelity programs has no basis in fact. Suitable wires can be installed to permit transmission of the 30-to-15,000-cycle tone range which FM demands. Such lines are not common today but will be installed as soon as FM networks have widespread need for them. Their cost, naturally enough, will be quite a bit more than is the case with ordinary network wires.

An alternate method of network operation—and one which has worked out to perfection in practice—is to have the stations in the chain successively pick up and rebroadcast each other right across the country. The absence of background noise in FM makes it possible for a program to be relayed through a great many stations without any appreciable loss of tone quality.

Last fall a temporary network of this type was set up as part of dedicatory ceremonies for W71NY's new high-power FM transmitter in New York. Participating were W65H, Hartford; W53PH, Philadelphia; W43B, Boston; W39B, Mount Washington; W47A, Schenectady; W71NY, New York, and W2XMN, Alpine, N. J. Programs originated in New York, Hartford and Boston and were relayed back and forth between these stations for more than five hours without a hitch. (New York, for example, was picked up by Philadelphia and Hartford; Hartford rebroadcast to Boston; Boston rebroadcast to Mount Washington and Schenectady. In similar fashion, both Hartford and Boston also "fed" the network their own special programs.) Listeners could not distinguish between rebroadcast programs coming from distant cities and those which originated with their local stations.

PROBABLY the single civilian question asked most throughout the length and breadth of America today, as the nation swings into the grim stride of war, is "What can I do?"

On the radio front there is one vital answer that **MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE** offers to every one of the fifty-seven million owners of radio sets in America:

"Give your radio war-time care."

In this way each will be cooperating with the War Production Board. For the board, while warning of curtailment of production, even stoppage by April 1, promises replacement of parts, and puts special emphasis on "the maintenance of existing equipment." Some of them concern operation of your radio, some enjoyment, and how you may double it; others warn against carelessness, but all are necessary if you desire to get dollar for dollar on your radio investment.

First a word about the legion of jitterbugs who

cut rugs, cavorting to airplane music, just in case there happens to be one or several in your family: Don't let them turn down the low bass and step up the volume. Such procedure sets up extraordinary vibrations that hurt the speaker.

If Junior has a habit of playing with the switch that controls your radio, break him of it by explaining that throwing the switch on and off quickly releases surges of power through the tubes. This weakens them and cuts down power output in both power and rectifier tubes. Which, in turn, forces you to use increasing volume in order to get the normal power output of the set, and helps bring down all the tubes.

It's part of the fun to take a portable radio set out canoeing, and on beach parties; but keep in mind that moisture is the worst enemy to good reception on your set. It corrodes vital unseen parts, does other damage. At such times your radio may need more frequent check-ups by a competent service man.

Another essential in war-time care, or any other time for that matter, is ordinary protection from dust and dirt. But overzealous, poison-particular housewives can do more harm than good if they attempt to dust the inside of the home set.

Should you be one of those fortunate folk who own a combination radio-phonograph, remember that up-to-date record-changers are built for new

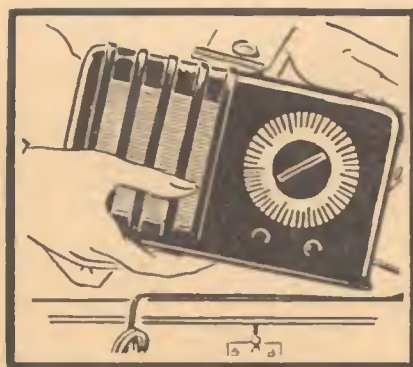
records. These have different sized diameters in center holes, and very often are of different thicknesses. For this reason, don't blame your instrument if it gives an uneven performance.

Last, but vastly important, don't yield to the temptation of tinkering with your radio set. Of course there can be rare exceptions to this rule, but, by and large, a regular six-month service plan from a reputable service man (with emphasis on reputable for your protection) will bring the best results. In this way, too, you will guard against tone loss, which becomes evident after more than eighteen months of use.

Following the foregoing ideas consistently and carefully, each radio owner can lighten tremendously the burden of the radio industry, faced with producing two billion dollars worth of equipment for the armed forces of the nation—more than ten times the entire production of the industry last year.

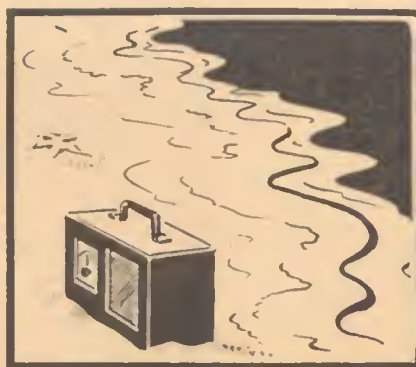

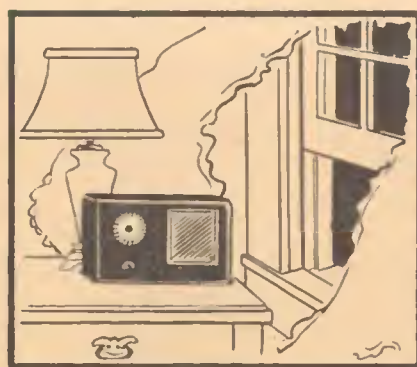

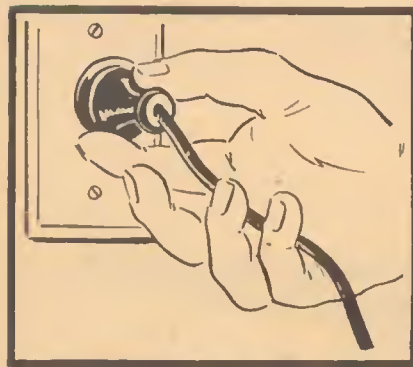

DON'T



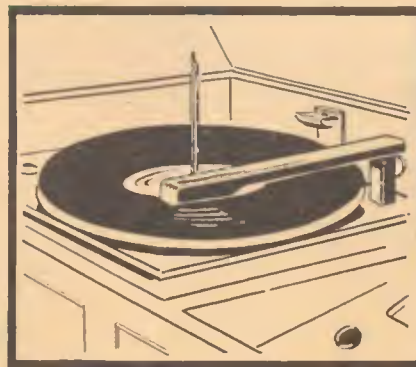

DO BE careful in way you remove cord plug in wall when using a movable radio. Rubber-covered plugs are precious, and yanking helps build bad connections, possible noise. Further, it may leave you stranded without any means of getting power to your radio

DO



IF YOU OWN a combination radio-phonograph, remember never to touch phonograph arm while it is in motion. By doing so it may be bent or broken, and it is going to be very difficult to replace. The same caution applies to record-changer when it is in motion

DO



INSURE YOUR records against warping, keep them away from hot places. To avoid pancaking, remember not to leave them suspended in the automatic record-changers. Too, replace pilot lights. If you don't, other tubes are carrying a life-shortening extra burden

DO



YOU DO EXPECT dividends in enjoyment on your radio. To obtain the highest, phone a trustworthy service man to go over your set every six months, to keep it toned and tuned. It will save you money. Tinkering may be fun; but unless you're an expert, it's bad business

The Brave and the Clean

AMERICA can be very happy about one important thing in these perilous times—we're not going to be soap-rationed. Aside from the fact that our Government places a high premium upon sanitation and cleanliness, there is the additional important factor that glycerin is a by-product of soap manufacture—and glycerin is a necessary ingredient of high explosives.

So we can go right on holding up our heads, proud of the fact that America is and will continue to be the cleanest country in the world. In Europe soap is rationed; even people of wealth can't get enough soap. I don't think anyone will argue the statement that uncleanness and crushed morale go together. You don't have to look to conquered European countries to see that; doctors will tell you that the sick, the despairing have little regard for personal hygiene.

And because we are so clean, we have become acutely aware of offensive odors. Somebody could probably write a very interesting article on the history of American progress in relation to evil smells. The article might start back in Grandmother's time, back on the farm somewhere, where, thanks to plenty of wholesome sun, fresh air, absence of coal soot and the like, a person could be clean without benefit of store-bought aids. And the article could go on to show how gradually with the introduction of factories, the swift-pacing of modern life, personal habits had to change with the time.

Well, we're not going to write that article here, but it could be done. It's enough to point out that nowadays if a woman is going to be really clean, Grandmother's habits, fitting to her own time, no longer hold. Fastidious modern women welcome all the new aids to personal cleanliness.

The introduction of deodorants and

non-perspirants was a tremendously important event. At the time, however, which was only about thirty years ago or so, the idea of a non-perspirant was frowned upon as being injurious to health; women were afraid to use it. However, science long has disproved any belief that the checking of underarm perspiration could be harmful. Now deodorants and non-perspirants, or both combined, are to be found on almost every bathroom shelf.

Aside from the important social angle of preventing offensive perspiration, another equally important item is the fact that clothing can be irreparably damaged by the acids contained in perspiration. The Arrid Laboratories recently conducted a wardrobe survey and made the discovery that the average American woman lost as much as \$39.50 annually in clothing because of perspiration.

NOW with all our minds turned toward economy, with all of us trying to make clothes last longer, and with many of us actually in uniform or going to be, a deodorant and non-perspirant become essential items.

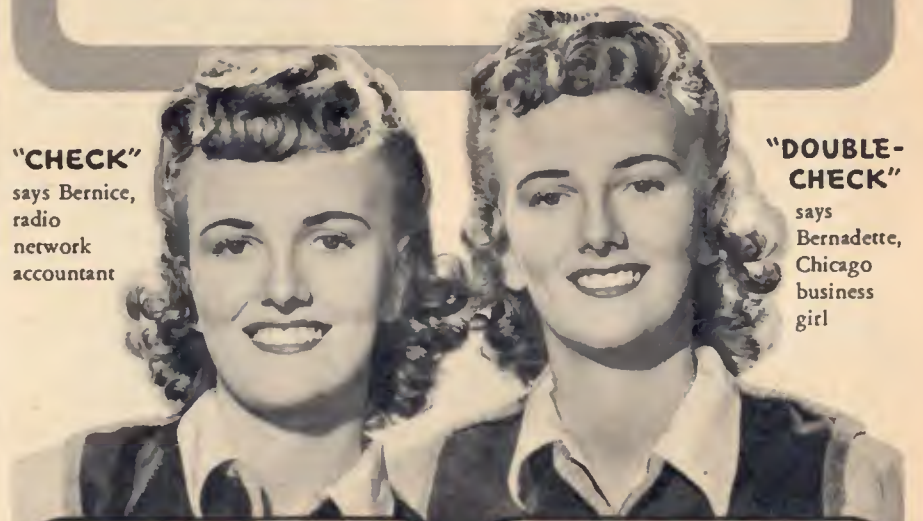

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WHAT'S COOKING!

By GEORGIA SCOTT

"Let 'Em Eat Pie"

BUSY ILKA CHASE (Sat., NBC) finds time to win medals as hostess, often serves lemon-chiffon pie

IT TAKES a brave woman to make her first pie—not because it's a terribly difficult job but because there's the image of "the way mother used to" in the bride's mind—and this can be a fearful hazard.

I slaved for hours over my first pie; I pinched it and I slapped it until I was as tired as that crust. When I finally had it ready for the oven it looked all right; and even though the apple and sugar filling had spilled over, it still looked good when I took it out of the oven.

I put it on a window-sill to cool, fluttered about it like an old mother hen. I was glad, too, that I didn't live on the ground floor. That pie looked so tempting to me, I was sure some tramp or small boy would have made off with it.

Maybe it would have been better if that had happened. When I served it to my husband, and beamingly asked how it was, he replied, "Well, it's all right, but . . ." He was being kind. This pie of mine that looked so wonderful had a crust like a strip of soggy felt.

I am indebted to a little old lady who lived in the next apartment for my final conquest of the pie bugaboo. She brought me in half of one of her pies one day. I marveled at it and she let me in on her secret—no secret—any experienced maker of pie-crusts knows it. I didn't know about using cold ingredients and about handling the dough as little as possible (when I think how I beat and kneaded my first dough!).

Flour ought to be sifted twice, she told me—before and after adding your salt. She cut in her shortening with a fork until the flour and shortening were about the size of small peas; then she added ice-water, a small amount at a time, mixing lightly with the fork only enough to make the flour hold together. She continued this process

until all the flour was mixed in separate portions, neither sticky nor crumbly. She then wrapped it in wax paper and put it in the ice-box to chill before she rolled it.

It's no wonder I made a mess of that first pie. That chilling process is so important. Another smart, time-saving secret she told me was to prepare an extra amount of dough for another occasion—the dough will keep indefinitely in the ice-box. All you have to do is roll out the left-over dough next time you're ready to prepare a pie.

The only other upset I had was with a lemon-meringue pie. I used My-T-Fine lemon filling, and mighty fine it is, too, if you read the directions. I didn't. Yours truly threw the lemon-concentrate capsule into the garbage pail, because it didn't dissolve quickly enough to suit me. You can imagine what that pie tasted like!

Fillings—what a variety there are to choose from! Apple is a favorite, of course; then, too, the Jell-O and My-T-Fine companies make butterscotch and chocolate puddings which are grand pie-fillings. Fresh fruit with Jell-O is another favorite of mine. Here is a good recipe for lemon-chiffon pie:

| 1/2 cup lemon juice | 1 teaspoonful grated |
| 3/4 cup cold water | lemon rind |
| 4 eggs | 1 envelope Knox gelatin |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | 1 cup sugar |

Beat the egg yolks and add your sugar, lemon juice and salt. Cook this in a double boiler until it begins to

thicken a bit. After you soften the gelatine in cold water, add it to the hot custard, stirring it in until it's completely dissolved. Add the grated lemon rind and let the whole cool. Beat egg whites until stiff, gradually adding the other half-cup of sugar while you're beating. Fold this into the custard mixture. Fill your baked pie crust and chill. Before serving, spread a thin layer of whipped cream over pie.

Not too good for the figure perhaps, but a wow of a way to get plenty of compliments on your baking ability.

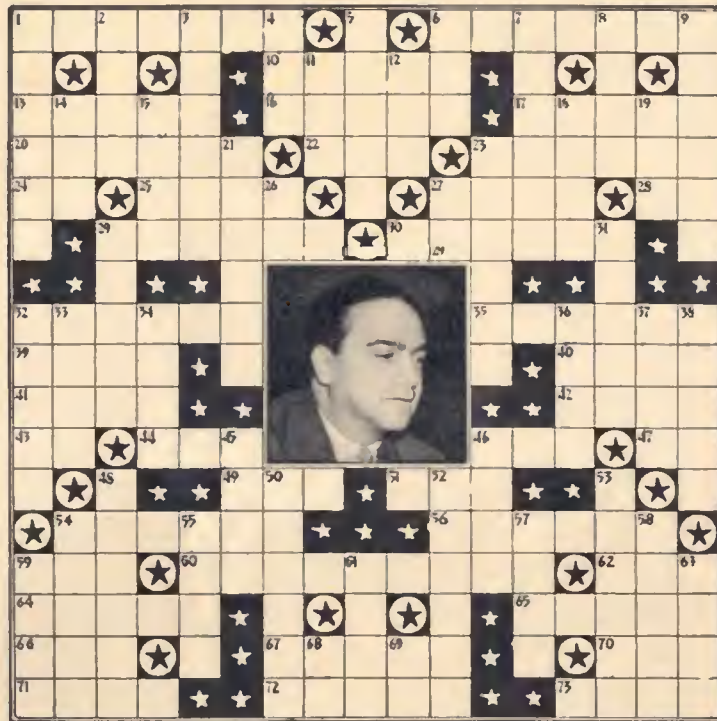

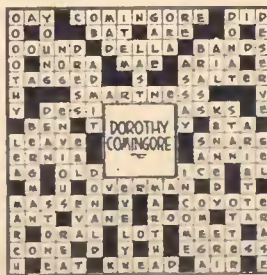

Pathos clutched at the throats of radio people in Chicago when lovely young actress Dorothy Gregory died at Wesley Memorial Hospital after an illness of several weeks, Friday, February 27. Dorothy was only eighteen and had been in radio only a couple of years. She had played in a number of the dramatic serials, was currently portraying Eloise Comstock in CBS' "Scattergood Baines." Soon after Dorothy graduated from high school in Park Ridge, Ill., she crashed an audition at the CBS studios and won a dramatic role. In spite of this exhibition of professional aggressiveness, Dorothy's was an extremely unassuming and wholly charming personality. Everybody from executive to studio guide liked her . . .

"Guiding Light" emerges from its temporary blackout this week. The serial story of Dr. John Ruthledge and the people of his congregation and his community of Five Points goes back on the air with the same author, Irna Phillips, and the same cast. To wit: Young character actor Arthur Peterson as Dr. Ruthledge, Marvin Mueller as Ellis Smith, Reese Taylor as Edward Greenman, Eloise Kummer as Mrs. Greenman, Beverly Ruby as Joan Greenman, Ruth Bailey as Rose Kransky, Mignon Schreiber as Mrs. Kransky, Seymour Young as Jacob Kransky, Sarajane Wells as Mary Ruthledge Holden and Ed Prentiss as Ned Holden. Guilbert Gibbons directs. Since "Guiding Light" left the air in December some seventy-five thousand listeners wrote, phoned and wired objections, indicating perhaps that people think there's more than ever a need for emphasis on spiritual values. They'll get a double torch now, for "Guiding Light" immediately follows the "Light of the World" broadcast . . .

That jalopy that Bud Barton won at a movie (in "The Bartons") is going to stay in Bud's hands—but only to be driven within the confines of an enclosed field. Author Harlan Ware decided some time ago to let listeners decide whether the thirteen-year-old boy should be allowed to drive the car. Listeners have let it be known how they felt. highway. Child psychologist Angelo Patri gave substantially the same opinion. So Bud keeps the car and drives the car. But tires don't wear so well in a field, and maybe listeners can also tell Bud how to replace the ones on his jalopy! . . .

Eloise Kummer (Carolyn Kramer in "Right to Happiness") has a special incentive for her Red Cross knitting. Her husband, Dr. Wayne Cameron, is

on active duty as a lieutenant in the U. S. Army . . . Jane Webb isn't too busy with her roles in "The Bartons" and "Tom Mix" to win honors outside radio. Young Miss Webb, who will be graduated in June at the age of sixteen, has been awarded the gold badge of Quill and Scroll, highest honor in high-school journalism, and has also been elected president of the student council at the Central Y. M. C. A. High School.

Accounts of the modus operandi of the Broadwayites who practically live in telephone booths are laugh-lines all . . .

After his trip to Mexico this summer, the Vice President brought back to Washington a collection of Mexican records. He and Mrs. Wallace would play them and accompany the vocalists with the aid of English versions of the lyrics. This hastened his understanding of the Spanish language, and now the recording companies are cooperating in the furtherance of this combined entertainment and educational idea.

Your Radio Requires War-Time Care

Should you be looking forward to buying a new radio in the near future, the first and foremost fact to keep in mind is to buy carefully. That is vitally important. There is more handwork in the average radio than in any other device you purchase today, and cheap workmanship won't guarantee the long-time pull that lies ahead. So buy a set that will last for the duration of the war.

To that end, scrutinize the reputation of the manufacturer and the dealer from whom you buy. See that both have earned the right to be called dependable. Be particularly careful, too, of merchandise carrying a bargain stamp. In times of shortage, a bargain can sometimes turn out to be a bad investment.

Next in importance, when your radio set is delivered and set up, is to

follow the manufacturer's instructions which always accompany the set on the operation and tuning of the instrument. If the instructions tell you that you need an aerial, you need one. Your radio may work without it, but it won't be giving the service that it could with an aerial.

If the manufacturer explains how you should tune your set, don't nonchalantly assume you know how to do it until you practise a few times. In the treatment of a new radio, like that of a new car, it's better to be safe than sorry, especially in these troublesome times. And that goes, too, for shutting off your radio before removing the baseboard plug, if the instructions on operation tell you to.

Give your radio decent consideration. If it's an old one, keep it in repair. If it's brand-new, use care in adjustment. By so doing, you will be cooperating—and definitely—with the

War Production Board in speeding up production of materials from radio manufacturers for all-out war.

In giving your radio set war-time care, it would be wise to follow the Chinese doctor's policy of guarding the health of his patients rather than waiting until they are ill to call.

Simple check-ups and repairs by one good service man is worth a heap more than a consultation of experts after a complete breakdown. And they will add years of service to your radio set.

Too, in war time your radio set carries responsibilities more vital to the family welfare than even the healthy laughter a Bob Hope or Charlie McCarthy broadcast brings into your home.

Getting the correct information via radio from official sources during blackouts and air raids may mean the difference between proper prepared-

ness for an emergency and disaster to you and yours.

And when it comes to correcting something really wrong with your radio mechanism, the place for the adjustment of the difficulty, if possible, should be a repair shop that knows your radio, and the service man one who knows your radio habits—good and bad. He will be better able to cope with them than a stranger.

Last, if for no other reason, war-time care of your radio should be considered a rare privilege as you look forward to that glorious moment when a voice coming through it will announce to all radio listeners everywhere, "Peace has been declared!"
