WHEN the President urged a wartime \$25,000 limit on incomes, he sent shudders along many famous Hollywood spines. Pencils squeaked far into the night as name stars tried to squeeze six-figure budgets under the \$25,000 ceiling.

But Bing Crosby can take the cut without a whimper. His huge income has never turned his head. He's a regular fellow with a sincere love of simple things.

Bing's non-working life centers around his family, his home, his horses and his wide range of sports interests. He lives well and owns two comfortable houses. Wife Dixie Lee manages them with very few servants, for home to the Crosbys is not a cross between Grand Hotel and Buckingham Palace. Bing and Dixie are home bodies, and the bright spots see them seldom.

Bing wants his four boys to be real kids. He may splurge in such matters as playground equipment for them, but he keeps them in public school.

Bing's strictly an "old hat and slacks" dresser. He dresses for comfort, not splendor. It's the same with cars. The singer drives his own, an old convertible. The family's other car is a Ford station-wagon.

The horses sound like an expensive hobby, but they aren't to Bing. His stable (KMH cracks to the contrary notwithstanding) pays its own way. His \$400,000 investment in Del Mar Race Track has paid dividends, though these may disappear for the duration.

When Bing seeks amusement outside his home, he's usually to be found at the ball park or the boxing-arena or the golf course. It's a pleasure to sit near Bing at the ball park and hear him explain the fine points of the game to a couple of his boys.

Bing is a golfer of near-championship caliber. When he and his pal and fellow comedian, Bob Hope, played benefit matches to aid the Army-Navy Emergency Relief, the fans came out for laughs and stayed to watch fine golf. Fortunately for Bing, baseball and golf are luxuries well within the range of a \$25,000 income.

In the past Bing has been a heavy contributor to many charities. If the ceiling is slapped down, his time may have to replace his money gifts, but the charities benefiting from Bing's appearances won't be losers.

All in all, Bing should make out all right, ceiling or no ceiling. If his radio and record earnings and his salary for such movies as "Road to Morocco" should be taxed to the bone, the regular fellow who lives at Rancho Santa Fe will grin and bear it. He'll still have his home, his family, and the same comfortable old clothes.

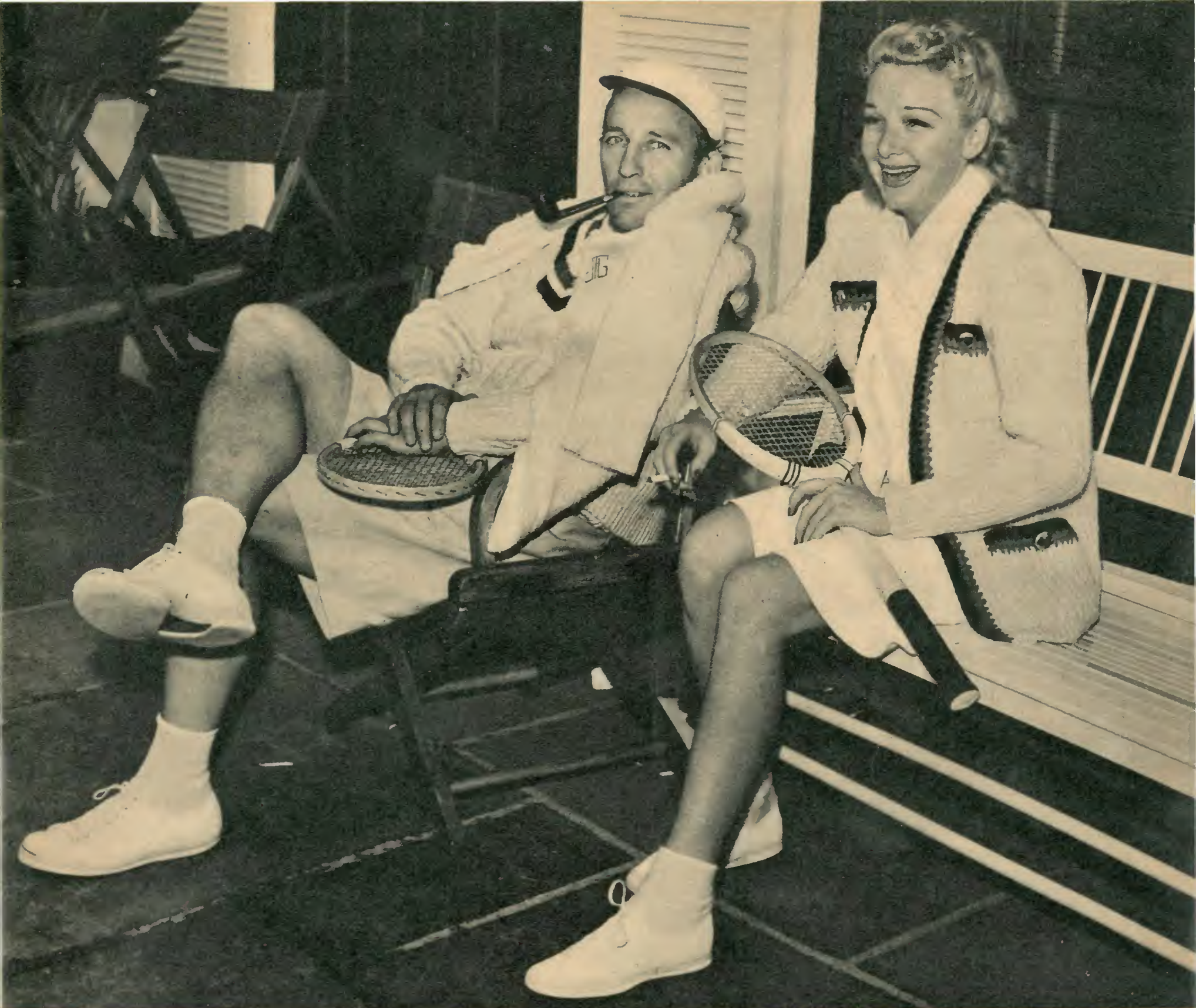

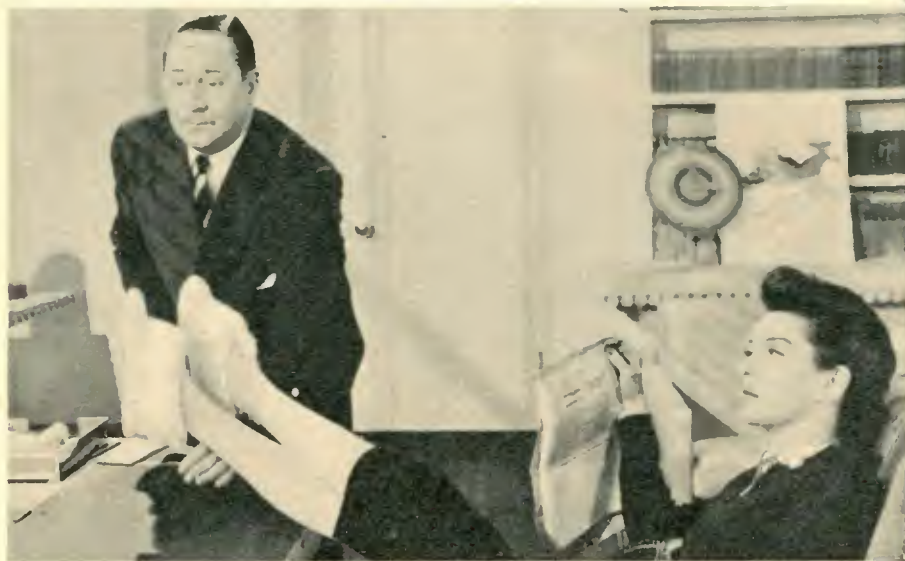
SHE SAYS:

But I also want to state—and emphatically—that they are in the minority. And that flat statement stems from the fact that I have known and observed women in business from Coast to Coast. They have reached the top in a man's world for the most part because they had the patience to handle details scorned by the majority of men. Too, many of these women have carried the burden of supporting dependents. Furthermore, when you talk to these women away from their slick offices and glass-topped desks, those who wouldn't exchange both for a home and children are as scarce as the proverbial hen's teeth.

LONELY WOMEN

Split Seconds—or Long Years—of Aloneness Are a Woman's Lot; Here Is a Story Throbbing With the Pain of Loneliness

IRNA PHILLIPS is one of radio's most famous writers. Since 1930 her serials have thrilled radio listeners. Just turning forty, Miss Phillips is probably the highest-paid woman in the radio industry. For years she has been turning out more than two million words of serial copy each year—enough to make twenty good-size novels.

At present Miss Phillips is supervising the writing of four famous dramatic programs. They are "Road of Life," "Guiding Light," "Woman in White" and "Right to Happiness."

To these is now added the new serial, "Lonely Women." On this page is the author's introduction.

Next week meet some of the women whose lives are traced in "Lonely Women," a new serial to be heard on NBC beginning June 29.

WITHIN the cycle of the hours there comes to each one of us, consciously or subconsciously, a split second in which we experience a sense of aloneness—undefinable, indescribable, yet so poignantly real—that split second of aloneness which can never be shared with anyone. But because of the complexities of life, this split second of aloneness for hundreds of thousands of men and women has extended itself into hours, days, years.

We've all heard at one time or another the expression "I never feel so alone as when I'm in a crowd." We've laughed at the facetious remark "When I'm with you I'm alone." "You can't know how I feel—how can you, you've never been in my shoes?"—"I wish you could have been with me"—"I wish you could have seen"—"If only you'd been there"—"It's no fun doing things alone" . . . common, everyday expressions that each one of us uses, hardly knowing that we do, not recognizing at the moment the universal theme that underlies these common, every-day expressions—the theme of loneliness.

Thousands upon thousands of men and women have remained within the bonds of matrimony because they were afraid—are afraid of starting over again, alone. The mere physical presence of the other is enough to satisfy at least a small part of the need for some sort of human communion that is so necessary to make us comfortable.

Whether we should blame civilization with its repetition of wars for the ratio that exists between men and women today is a little difficult to decide. However, we do know that there are more women than men in the world.

Out of curiosity I called upon Webster to define the word "alone," and this is Webster's definition: "Unaccompanied; solitary; single; unmarried"; and he adds, "Usually of women, with humorous or pathetic implication; as a poor lone woman."

Perhaps because there is no one as concerned with woman's destiny as a woman, it occurred to me that an audience primarily made up of women would be interested today, of all times, when men—husbands, brothers, sweethearts,

sons—are leaving their homes to defend those homes . . . it occurred to me that these women would be interested in a story of lonely women.

Perhaps, too, I felt the woman who from time to time feels that hers is a humdrum existence of rearing a family, of preparing three meals a day, of waiting for the children, for the husband—the woman who believes she sees glamour in the lives of thousands of women who are making their way, alone—who have careers, who are in constant touch with the outside world . . . perhaps I felt there was a message that could be given to these wives, these mothers, these homemakers, in the story of "LONELY WOMEN."

AT FIRST glance it might seem that being alone—feeling a sense of aloneness—implies depression, futility, unhappiness. This is not necessarily true. In fact, the sense, the feeling of aloneness can and often is an inexhaustible source from which come some of the most worth-while contributions to mankind. The scientist, the artist, the musician, the literary men and women throughout the ages have not been, as we so often think, alone. They have found an outlet for their aloneness in putting to work their God-given talents in something that could be shared by others.

Neither you nor I nor hundreds of thousands like us have been given a divine talent; but in our daily existence we, too, can use our aloneness as an impetus to contribute something worth while to others. We may not be a Michelangelo, a Tschaiakowsky, an Einstein, a George Sand, an Eleonora Duse, an Elizabeth Browning; but we can create—we can express—we can give of ourselves . . . we can share with others those things that make up our daily existence.

We women are in the majority. The effect that we can have on others can be as great if not greater at times than the contributions that have been made by men and women in the arts and sciences. In other words, we need not be alone—except in that split second that comes to each of us—that split second of aloneness which can never be shared with anyone.

The thrilling story of the radio program "Joyce Jordan," fictionized by Wiley Maloney, is broadcast Monday through Friday over CBS at 2:15 p.m. EWT, 1:15 p.m. CWT, 1:30 p.m. MWT, 12:30 p.m. PWT, under the sponsorship of General Foods Corp. for *Satina*, *La France* and *Postum*. A tragic episode in the life of Dr. Joyce Jordan begins when she and her husband, Paul Sherwood, bring Margot, Paul's neurotic sister, home from the sanitarium to live with them. Their attempt to bring Margot back to a normal life fails miserably when Margot's mind snaps under the strain of an unsuccessful romance with Chester Hedgerow, and she attempts to kill Joyce. Paul blames Joyce for the whole affair and, when Margot returns to the sanitarium, he goes to the city to live. His success as a columnist attracts the attention of Sheila Brand, who invites him to help her with a book she is writing. When Paul learns that Joyce is going to have a baby he attempts a reconciliation but she refuses.

Paul is stricken in Sheila's apartment with the disease he contracted while covering the war in Ethiopia, and Joyce is called in to handle the case. Ignoring her orders before he is well, Paul suffers a relapse. Prescribing emergency treatment over the phone, Joyce rushes to his bedside for the second time by plane in the face of a raging storm. The pilot attempts to land on an ice-bound field, at Joyce's insistence, but the plane noses over and she is injured. At the hospital she undergoes an unsuccessful operation to save the life of her unborn child. Paul, meanwhile, has recovered and rushes to her bedside, where they are reconciled.

When Joyce recovers she takes a position on the hospital's staff and asks for the help of Dr. Alan Webster, with whom she became acquainted while convalescing. They become close friends and Joyce learns of the young doctor's fear of his father—stern, old Dr. Thomas Webster. Alan's father feels that Joyce is exerting un-

due influence on his son and threatens to expose her as the daughter of the disgraced Dr. Walton if she does not leave.

Joyce hadn't told Paul about her father, whom she hasn't seen since she was a child, and is very disturbed one night shortly after leaving the hospital when Paul brings home to dinner a mysterious Mr. Walton. The elderly man proves to Joyce that he is her father and seeks forgiveness. Taken completely by surprise, Joyce begs him to leave, then tells Paul about her childhood.

Visited one day, at her office by Alan, Joyce learns of the young doctor's wish to be reconciled with his father. He tells her of his plan to risk his life in an experiment his father is working on. When Alan volunteers the next day, old Dr. Webster is furious and accuses Joyce of plotting against him. But finally, after a bitter argument, he inoculates his son with the deadly disease and Alan sinks into a coma from which he won't recover if his father's serum is a failure. The experiment is a success, and father and son are reconciled and Joyce wins the confidence of the old doctor.

At Paul's insistence, Joyce reluctantly forgives her father. But she becomes suspicious a short time later when he introduces her to youthful, pretty Myra Lee, tells her that they are to be married. Joyce is astonished at the strange match and isn't surprised when Myra and Alan Webster fall in love, and her engagement to Walton is broken. Courtney Lee, Myra's wealthy father, is strangely antagonistic to her proposed marriage to the young doctor, but Joyce encourages the young couple.

But the day they were to pick out the engagement ring, Myra rushes into Joyce's apartment on the verge of hysteria. "Joyce," she confides, "my engagement to Alan is broken. Daddy says that Mother was insane and that I, too, have inherited the strain." Now go on with the story.—The Editors.

Second, the War Production Board or somebody has set his foot down on the spending of huge sums of money for new movie sets, or even the use of paint to freshen up the old ones. The maximum to be permitted on single picture budgets for sets or scenery is to be \$5,000—for the duration, or until cut down more—so the scenery warehouses will be inventoried carefully from here on. The movie queens and princes, too, will be

making most of their love out of doors (no scenery required) and the great day of westerns galore, which many kids have hoped for, is on the threshold . . .

The tire situation, though, and gas rationing are the two things that really have Hollywood groggy. The mystery thrillers will suffer for want of cobwebs (spun of rubber cement) and it may be they'll have to hire real union spiders, hereafter, to do the job. This is tough on Hollywood, as it does not like to do anything except

Jeanette MacDonald sat in my office the other day in a simple, tailored suit with a fur collar. She was dressed very un-Hollywoodish and except for the flaming red hair, which is her trade-mark, she seemed much more like a young American housewife.

Most of her talk was of Lieutenant Gene Raymond, who is in Washington en route to wherever the Air Force decides to send him. But her visit to the War Department was to offer her services to Army Emergency Relief.

The most sensationally successful concerts of any artist in the United States have been those of Miss MacDonald. She has toured the country regularly for several years and met with acclaim. Jolson leaves soon for Alaska. After the Jap attack on Dutch Harbor, one might think twice before taking that trip. Al insists on going. His schedule will be to appear twice a day before our soldiers up there. His only support will be a pianist, and he will sing all of the songs the boys want.

They'll want plenty!

VERSATILE GENEVIEVE ROWE HEADED FOR THE OPERA STAGE VIA RADIO

Frank Black Directs Howard Hanson's "Romantic" Symphony Saturday;
Dennis Day Guest of Kostelanetz; Melton on "Telephone Hour," Monday

GENEVIEVE ROWE won an Atwater-Kent contest some years ago, and that made her a big fish in a little pond back home in Wooster, Ohio. She was now very definitely a somebody, you see. Miss Rowe had studied piano under her father's watchful care at the Wooster Conservatory—director, Rowe pere—but winning that top prize in a rather difficult competition convinced him that hers was to be a singer's career.

Miss Rowe, a tall, willowy—that's the word—brunette, confessed, "Mother and Dad thought that I might become a concert pianist. I knew, however, that it wouldn't be so, though I didn't tell them for a long time how I felt.

"Studying piano with my father was a hard assignment. He gave me lessons in theory and organ besides, which didn't make a daughter-student's life easier. Probably because I was his daughter he went all-out on the severity. But, please understand, these weren't the reasons for my wanting to study voice. That was something deep inside." As Miss Rowe spoke those words, there was the slightest trace of irony in her smile.

The Atwater-Kent award brought her prominence in spheres outside of Wooster, so that presently she was doing sustaining programs for NBC. She had the foresight to finish her

studies, however, and then came to New York.

"And in New York," she explained, "I became the little fish in the big pond. But that's retributive justice for you. In the meantime, I waded into the contest thing for all I was worth and, I'm glad to say, I took first honors in a couple of other ones. There was the competition conducted by the National Federation of Music Clubs, some time ago, which brought me a neat \$500—the Atwater-Kent amounted to \$6,000, you know—and then a contest sponsored by the MacDowell Club gave me the chance to make my recital debut at the MacDowell Club in New York.

"So much for the contest thing. But here's an amusing side-light on all that money. I lost it during depression days. And what a story I could tell of hardships in the big city!

"However," Miss Rowe continued, "I began to get around, as they say. I started in with a recital at the Town Hall, which, thanks be, got me some good notices. After that I was engaged to sing with a fairly light radio program that was under the direction of Alfred Wallenstein.

"I must have made good on that or I shouldn't have been given important roles to sing in Mr. Wallenstein's Bach Cantata Series. Later I also appeared in his Mozart opera cycle, doing such roles as the Queen of the Night in 'The Magic Flute,' Constanca in 'The Abduction from the Seraglio' and others. And in Mr. Wallenstein's latest innovation, his 'First American Opera Festival,' I sang the soprano part in 'The Devil and Daniel Webster.'"

Miss Rowe doesn't disguise the fact that opera is her chief goal. So far she has learned the coloratura parts in "Rigoletto," "Lucia di Lammermoor," "Lakme," "The Barber of Seville," and she is now working on "La Traviata" and "Mignon."

As Jenny Lynn, on the CBS "Gay Nineties Revue," Miss Rowe is called upon to sing pieces of an altogether different sort. Syrupy ballads of the 90's vintage are the thing there, and it isn't unusual for her to have to deliver in tearful tones such delicacies as "Just a Bird in a Gilded Cage" and kindred matters. On one occasion—this has to do with a different program, which she wouldn't identify—she sang Bishop's "Lo, Here the Gentle Lark" and right after that a coloratura version of "The Hut-Sut Song," all of which gives you an idea of her versatility.

The one thing that Miss Rowe would like to do more than anything else is to "act up" the way the important divas do. She would like to go into beautiful tantrums, throw things around, and so on, but, as she says, "I'm too darned normal, I guess."

Nothing ever happens to her, she avers. For instance, there has never been a faux pas that she can recall with pleasure, no contretemps, no grotesqueries.

Confidentially, it's the first time we have heard of a singer having those ambitions. All the vocal personalities we have talked to freeze stiff at the mere thought of such things.

"I wish I could crack on a high note, sometime, or give out a juicy hiccough at a dramatic moment. You see, that

would then make me feel as if I were part of the legend of bad moments in great lives. Is it wrong to hope for such things?"

Dear reader, do we need to remark that Miss Rowe is a terrific kidder, or is that being too obvious?

A Modern Romantic

Howard Hanson, director of the Eastman School of Music at Rochester, N. Y., composed his second symphony, which he subtitled "Romantic," for the Boston Symphony Orchestra. The work was given its first performance by that organization under Serge Koussevitzky's direction on November 28, 1930.

For that premiere Dr. Howard wrote an explanatory comment of the work, which was printed in the program. We quote a portion of it below:

"Concerning my second symphony, as the subtitle implies, it represents for me a definite and acknowledged embracing of the romantic phase. I recognize, of course, that romanticism is, at the present time, the poor stepchild, without the social standing of her elder sister, neoclassicism. Nevertheless, I embrace her all the more fervently, believing, as I do, that romanticism will find in this country rich soil for a new, young and vigorous growth."

Dr. Hanson's views are refreshing, to say the least. Here is one composer, at any rate, who doesn't feel it obligatory to listen to the siren voice of *le dernier cri*. It would take too much space to write about such things now, but there does seem to be a great deal of talk, among composers, as to what kind of music to write, what gods to

follow and all that.

Perhaps, the same sort of thing existed in earlier times and, perhaps, too, it may have wielded its influence in giving to the world the masterpieces we now take for granted.

The important thing, it appears to this watcher of the musical skies, should be the inner urge to compose, to express what is in one's mind or heart, without restricting oneself by following the customs of any special cult.

Dr. Hanson, as he expresses in his own words, has attempted to write something he wanted very much to write. That is an uncommon thing in these times. Regardless of the worth of his music one may be thankful for the sincerity and personal urge that went into the writing. There should be more such creators. It would clear the atmosphere of much confusion.

(Howard Hanson's "Symphony No. 2" will be presented by the NBC Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Frank Black, on Saturday, June 20, Blue Network.)

Concert Records

The Columbia list for the month is impressive, considering the WPB curtailment. The disks we have heard, which are listed herewith, have several things in common: First-rate tonal qualities, mechanical finish and effective interpretations.

They are the Mendelssohn "Midsummer Night's Dream," played by Artur Rodzinski and the Cleveland Orchestra; an album of Bach pieces, transcribed by Leopold Stokowski and played by the All-American Orchestra, which he directs; the Second Symphony of Robert Schumann, played by Dimitri Mitropoulos and the Minneapolis Symphony, and the Mozart "Piano Concerto in B Flat" (K. 595), played by Robert Casadesu, as soloist, and the Philharmonic-Symphony conducted by John Barbirolli.

The "Recordrama" idea, which Victor featured in conjunction with its Maurice Evans-Judith Anderson abbreviated version of "Macbeth," is this time carried out with respect to Rossini's "Barber of Seville." The album is of particular value to students, though the Rossinian initiates will find little fault with the singing of Bruno Landi, Hilde Reggiani, Carlos Ramirez, Lucielle Browning and the others assembled in a well-balanced cast. The Victor Symphony and a chorus take part in the performance, which is under the direction of Giuseppe Bamboschek.

POPULAR MUSIC

Few radio fans associate Margo, singing star of the "Cugat Rumba Revue"—heard over the Blue Network every Tuesday evening—with the Margo whose few appearances on the stage and the screen occasioned much favorable comment. Her performances, for instance, in "Lost Horizon" and "Winterset" won plaudits from critics and public alike.

However, the deep beat of Mexican music and, as a matter of fact, the pulsating and colorful rhythms of all Hispanic music are things to which she has been heir. It is easy to understand how she could give up the role of tragedienne because it meant that in being one she could not give voice to these strong musical impulses.

When she was four years old she manifested her first interest in dancing. Two years later her grandmother placed her in a dancing school over the protests of her parents. Leaving her native Mexico, she went with her family to Spain, where dancing and singing are so much a part of the lives of the people.

She returned to Mexico an accomplished artist in her respective field and she was lauded as a national heroine might be lauded. She even appeared with the National Symphony Orchestra of Mexico, under the leadership of the noted Carlos Chavez.

Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur were responsible for launching her theater career. They had scoured Hollywood, New York and London for a girl to play in their new picture, "Crime Without Passion." They fortunately came upon Margo in a New York movie studio, where she had gone to accompany a friend. To make the story brief, she was engaged. There followed her work in the theater and on the screen, which finally ended with her appearance in Sidney Kingsley's "The World We Make."

She joined the forces of Xavier Cugat—he happens to be her uncle—and with this organization she found the outlet for her musical heritage.

Usually it is the other way round. Some of the greatest of theater and screen personalities began as singers or dancers. We know also that a number of eminent opera singers got their start in the world of popular song and dance. Margo represents, perhaps, the only instance of the reverse being true. She is to be congratulated for following her self-selected star.

ITALY'S FOOD SHORTAGE REVEALED ... NEW BBC FREQUENCIES

China Resumes Broadcasts From Chungking; Japs Pose as Filipinos' "Protectors"; London Airs Special Show for AEF in Great Britain

Italy's Food Situation

ACCORDING to David Colin, NBC foreign correspondent who was interned in Italy since the entry of America into the war and who just recently returned to this country, most of the general discontent in the Fascist country is due to the ever increasing food shortage. While Italians cinch up their belts and enjoy one meat meal a week—Saturday noon—Germans in Rome's Deutschesheim glory in meat every meal, with unlimited quantities of bread. Butter, he said, has disappeared from the Italian table and eggs command a farm price of from twenty to twenty-five cents each. Italians, muttering in their synthetic coffee, find the real article priced at \$20 a pound, tea at \$40.

In England, according to a talk from London by Lord Wilton, Minister of Food Supply, there is plenty of food but of the simpler kinds. There is no rationing of the important foods such as potatoes and other vegetables, bread and flour. Items such as fresh fruit and coffee are definitely rationed. Meat, butter and sugar are not available in the ample quantities of peace times. The Ministry of Food Supply, realizing the importance of good health for its workers and fighting forces, has planned the distribution of available foods in a scientific manner so that everyone—even the poorest—will have a sufficient quantity of the proper calories and vitamins. Workers doing excessively hard work are given double rations in many instances. Government canteens have been installed in all parts of the country where a hearty, nourishing meal of plain foods may be had at the uniform price of about ten pence (approximately ten cents). No one willing to eat good, simple foods is likely to go hungry in Britain.

Show the world that our flag is not to be trifled with by the white race. Asia for the Asiatics. It is the path of wisdom to throw aside partitions and personal feelings and rally to the support of the glorious cause of a Greater New Asia . . ." Which all reminds me of the old saw: "You can lead a horse to water but you can't make him drink."

Public Radio Circuits Closed

The Defense Communications Board has directed the closure of all public domestic point-to-point radio circuits within the continental limits of the United States, effective midnight, June 30. Transmission of private messages over domestic radio circuits can be heard and easily monitored outside the United States. In many instances the nature of these private messages can give information of value to the enemy. The burden of possible censorship has been deemed insoluble within reasonable limits of available manpower and funds. In any event, the censorship which would be necessary if these circuits remained would involve a delay in transmission not necessarily found in the case of domestic wire circuits.

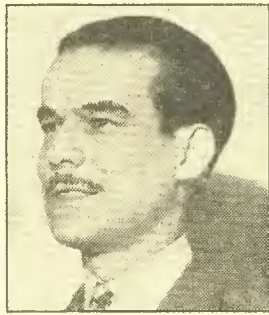

FM CLAIMS 1,500,000 LISTENERS IN U. S. . . . RECEIVER PURCHASING TIPS

Essential Parts Every Frequency Modulation Receiver Should Have; Trouble With Sets When Manufacturers Short-Cut Design

FM Grows Up

ALTHOUGH it has been increasingly difficult to make any precise census of the FM receivers in the United States today, due to the inability of war-deluged manufacturers to take time out for a complete inventory of their recent sales, it seems safe to estimate that the national total stands today somewhere in the neighborhood of a half-million sets.

Latest figures secured by FM Broadcasters, Inc., national trade association of frequency-modulation stations, tends to confirm this estimate.

Of the grand total the greatest percentage may be found within the 8,500 square miles of area served by New York City FM stations and probably amounts to more than 80,000 receivers. Although some of these are located in New Jersey and Connecticut towns up to fifty miles from the center of New York, the metropolitan stations are easily heard.

The total of FM receivers within the Chicago area has risen steeply in a relatively short time, and now we find noise-free, full-fidelity reception available in about 42,000 radio homes within sixty-five miles. The assigned range of Chicago stations is somewhat greater than that of New York, since the assigned coverage area is computed at 10,800 square miles—some 2,300 square miles larger than New York's.

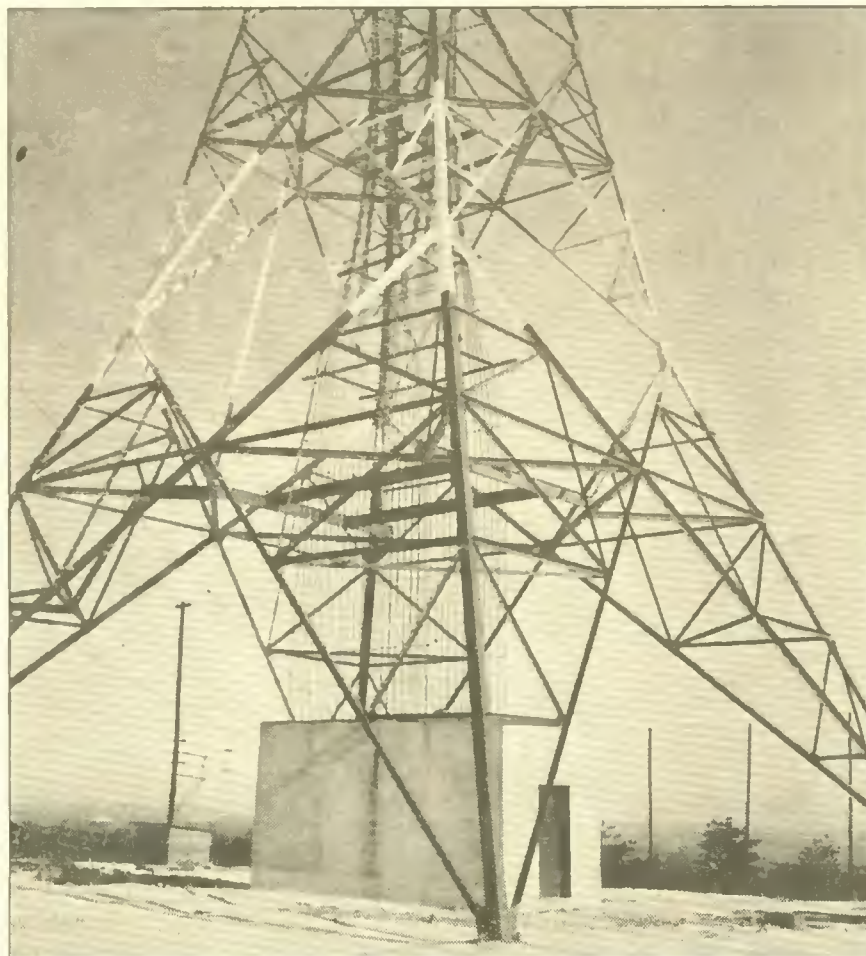
The New England region, where FM reception has become so commonplace in every corner of the six states (except northern Maine), now has almost as many sets in its combined cities as Chicago. Boston leads the New England parade with approximately 10,000 FM homes. Other large groups of listeners are found in Hartford and New Haven, Conn., Providence, R. I., and Worcester and Springfield, Mass. The tally for all New England is put at 35,000 sets.

Philadelphia, as one of the more recent cities turning to FM, has about 17,000 receivers. Pittsburgh claims 10,000. The Detroit total is around 16,000; Milwaukee, 10,000; Los Angeles, 13,000; San Francisco, 6,500; Cleveland, 5,000; Kansas City, 3,000.

Based on the conservative estimate of three listeners to each set, the potential FM audience for the whole nation may now be reckoned at a million and a half persons. This gives startling contrast to the 50,000 pioneer listeners who had made FM's acquaintance by January 1, 1941.

The Short Cut Artists

It's unfortunate that of all the FM receivers in the nation, a certain percentage does not really deserve the

privilege of being called frequency-modulation sets. They tune in FM stations and, under optimum conditions, give satisfactory reception. But when the going gets rough—when there's heavy electrical interference near by or the receiver is located at some distance from the station to be heard—these sets fall down miserably. Reception will be noisy, programs become marred by the ignition of every passing car, while the background rush and crackles are consistently objectionable.

This happens because the maker of the set was unscrupulous enough to take a short cut when he designed it—leaving out one or more of the essential parts that every real frequency-modulation receiver must have, including a "limiter" circuit.

The "limiter" consists of a vacuum tube, or series of tubes, actuated when an FM signal of a certain minimum strength is picked up by the antenna and fed into the set. It serves as a kind of straining device. If unwanted noises—crackles, pops, buzzes, static bursts and other reception-busters—

are mixed with the FM signal itself, the "limiter" goes to work and blocks out the interference, letting only the pure music or voices through. In the finest FM sets this limiter is extremely sensitive and operates on the weakest signals so that satisfactory reception may be enjoyed at surprising distances from FM stations. Less expensive FM sets have limiters that require correspondingly stronger signals before they function. Any orthodox frequency-modulation receiver, however, should provide suitable reception when within the mileage range assigned to the desired station.

The Penalty of Inferiority

A manufacturer who takes this short cut by leaving the "limiter" out of his so-called FM set is courting trouble. People find that their reception is not "noise-free" and, in most cases, noticeably inferior to ordinary broadcast reception. This is because electrical interference itself can be far more acute and annoying on the ultra-high frequencies where FM operates

than on the long wave-lengths of regular broadcasting. Complaints and disappointments are voiced by many people who buy these pseudo-FM sets, and it seems hard to believe that any reputable manufacturer would offer the public—which has been told to expect certain things of FM—such an obviously inferior product.

Furthermore, the short-cutting didn't stop with simply leaving out the basic FM "limiter." The manufacturer also decided to skip another important gadget called the "discriminator." This again is a vacuum tube device whose duty it is to see that you receive only one station at a time—the strongest one on any given channel (or spot on the dial). This will be of mounting importance as more and more FM stations get on the air, using identical channels in neighboring towns. The "discriminator" eliminates squeals, the unpleasantness of stations fading out to be replaced by other stations (as on winter nights) and the reception of two and sometimes three stations all at once in a hash of sound.

Leaving these two vital ingredients—the "limiter" and the "discriminator"—out of an FM receiver is like building an automobile without a carburetor and an oil pump.

Let the Buyer Beware

If you're thinking of buying an FM receiver—providing your local radio dealer has some in stock or can get any—there are certain things you should look for when making your purchase. Ask, of course, if the set has a "limiter" and "discriminator." Then a satisfactory FM set must have a good amplifying system and a quality loudspeaker that can faithfully reproduce, in perfect proportions, all the tones you might expect from a good orchestra. Without it you won't get the color and brilliance that FM stations are able to broadcast. The high notes will be lopped off, the low ones muffled.

Also, check to see if the set reproduces dead silence in the pauses between music and announcements. A rushing or humming background noise either means that the set is inferior or your dealer is so indifferent he hasn't bothered to put up a suitable antenna—which may be necessary because of your distance from the station to which the receiver is tuned.

I'm waiting to see Courtney. I—I didn't expect to see both of you tonight. This is better than I bargained for. I heard you had become his friend—the coward and the man of evil. How to "Glamour - Eyes"

IF YOUR eyes give you away, don't fret! . . . that is, unless you're downright ashamed of the *real* you. Eyes that express "what goes on within" add dynamic voltage to your charm and personality. Enlist your eyes for the duration. Let them reflect the courage of 120,000,000 American people. Look ahead—eyes alert and alive—to the time when men beat their planes into plowshares and "Johnny comes marching home again."

Unfortunately, although the majority of us are granted God-given powers to look—few of us see! We're as blind as the proverbial bat! Your keen observation of people, places and the commonplace things surrounding us will cultivate the magnificent habit of seeing with your mind's eye.

To begin with, turn eyesight on full-faucet—but for eyestrain sake don't "ogle" people. Look frankly, with concentrated interest, at your speaker. Men folks, by their own admission, appreciate this all-too-seldom "talk to me" quality in women. But if you're merely letting your eyelids flutter in a breeze of coquetry, he's sure to detect your studied shallowness. Don't "make with the eyes" . . . make them up instead!

Skilful eye make-up can do much to perk up your peepers and dramatize the story behind the "headlines." If you aim for professional perfection study your eyes intently. Note their color, size, contour and proportion to the rest of your features. Once eye inventory is taken, haul out the mascara, brow pencil, eye-shadow and cream—and paint away!

Start out with cream-clean lashes and brows. Apply your eye-shadow before all else, or they're sure to smudge when you mascara your "swooped-up" lashes. Creamy Maybelline eye-shadow has a glamour sheen, but if you're eager for a glass-lidded appearance, mix it with cold-cream just before shadow-painting. Use light-toned shadow, blended from the center of your lid, if you're the small-eyed type. And a faint shadow line, along the eyelash ledge, will draw out deep or closely set peepers.

You can lean heavily on shadow—especially on the lower half of your lid—if you're a wide-eyed lass. But always blend shadow (as all of your cosmetics) up and out toward the line of your brow.

Brush your eyebrows into a neat, natural arch that frames your eyes becomingly. Constant "bristling" attention will keep them sleek, train them to stay put. And if you pluck your brows 'cuz they're oh-so-bushy, be sure you're only removing excess hairs. A sliver-slim line where your brows should be is terribly tabu! If your brows play short-stop—need patching or darkening—an eyebrow pencil will prove a trusty tool to have around. Adding depth to your eyes, a penciled brow should blend with nature's very own. Short staccato strokes, applied with a deft touch, will achieve that deceiving "and she never uses cosmetics" look.

Whether you use cream, cake or liquid mascara, one rule applies—distribute coloring evenly, with meticulous strokes, and tend each lash individually. Use an upward swoop-stroke, curling your lashes while you work. And never overload your brush—return applications are always preferable for that fringe effect. Continued lash care will stimulate a healthy growth and before long even the skimpiest lashes "glamour-eyes."

Mascara, contrary to bad-rumor mongers, is neither dye nor tint. The Pure Food and Drug Act is your guarantee of that! A pure coloring with a base that holds colors together, advertised brands are definitely harmless. And an oil base recently added to Maybelline mascara products is an aid to boot—it prevents lash dryness.

If you think of your eyes as a camera taking pictures for you, you'll will the "dreamer squint" to your less fortunate myopic friends. Strain, worry, improper foods and too much work or play make Jill a dull gal—with an off-focus impression of a pretty wonderful world. Recommended: Rose-colored spectacles—the kind your ophthalmologist (eye doctor to us un-medical people) prescribes!

How to Get Rid of an INCENDIARY BOMB

3. THEN SLIDE the shovel carefully under the bomb and lift it into the pail. Be sure to stand well back for your safety's sake



4. INSERT the scoop of the shovel under the handle of the pail and carry it outside where it can burn out without damage

Have You Hidden Hunger?

WHEN you realize that forty percent of the American public is actually starved for a healthy, vitamin-right meal (in spite of the fact that our country has the richest food resources in the world), you'll deem it ripe prime for a food-for-health conversation. You may not have noticed it, but an alarming number of lads—though A1 in your heart—were tagged 4F by the Army medics. Their physical tabus were directly tracked to "hidden hunger"—malnutrition to you!

Food lost for Germany in World War I. Strategic military objectives were undermined along with the decline in health on the home and the fighting front. And all because the required protective foods—eggs, meats, green and yellow vegetables, whole-grain cereals, milk fruits and "enriched" products were entirely lacking in the German diet. Well, it can't happen here!

Military powers that be are proving that the Army rides on its stomach. And take it from me, the American civilian population would do well to thumb a ride on the road to health. Food—or, to be more specific, Victory Vittles—will help win this war, even as bonds, bombs, bullets and lease-lend aid. Now, more than ever before, lunch-box deficiencies for children or war-workers are deplorable. And the on-the-run sandwich and soft-drink lunch, a favorite with the American Kitty Foyle, is downright sabotage. It's up to all of us to lead with our stom-

achs and fight this war with food ammunition.

A properly balanced variety of foods—rich in vital vitamins, proteins, carbohydrates and fats—is the essential key to our national well-being. The gross lack of fruits and leafy vegetables in the American diet is tied up, but directly, with mental and physical fatigue—a war-time luxury. Vigor and morale grow prosperous or lean in proportion to a nutritive diet of greens and citrus fruits. And nature has conveniently stored everything our body needs for nourishment in fruits. Grapes, for potent example, contain minerals in a balanced degree that equals the content in the human blood. And the sugars of ripe fruit are easily digested to boot. Start serving more raw vegetables! Play up the infrequent guests—chicory, watercress, escarole, spinach and parsley. Let a tempting fruit-bowl mark the mouth-watering finale to your well-balanced menus.

The quantity of food you consume depends on your activity, size and—of all things—the weather. Children require more food in proportion to their size than do their parents, simply because they're growing and using up a terrific amount of energy in doing it. And as you may have noticed, you're bound to attack the ice-box with greater vigor when wintry weather calls, simply because your body is burning up its own tissues just to keep you warm.

Bread and potatoes, contrary to all

you've heard rumored, will not dub you candidate for the stout-but-stylish-dress department. As a matter of proven food-fact, it's not what you eat but "how much" that really adds poundage where leanness is far more flattering. Tasting the tempting tuber will not put on waistline "tubeage," since it's three-quarters water and is actually equal, in calory content, to an average-size apple or orange.

"Enriched" (in minerals) and "irradiated" (with sunshine) foods, still test-tube new, are proud proof of the pages of progress we've added to America's food history within the past two decades. Yet each one of us has a tremendous job that we're individually responsible for. See to it that you and your family put a tabu on gulp meals. Encourage 'tween-meals snacks that provide added energy and stamina for these stomach-sinking days. And cook according to nutrition Hoyle—as quickly as possible and in as little water as is absolutely necessary! Never add soda to vegetables for artificial coloring. Cook in vegetable "jackets" or peel close to skin. Serve outer leaves and bread crusts and—for Henderson's sake—cut down on food "throw-aways."
