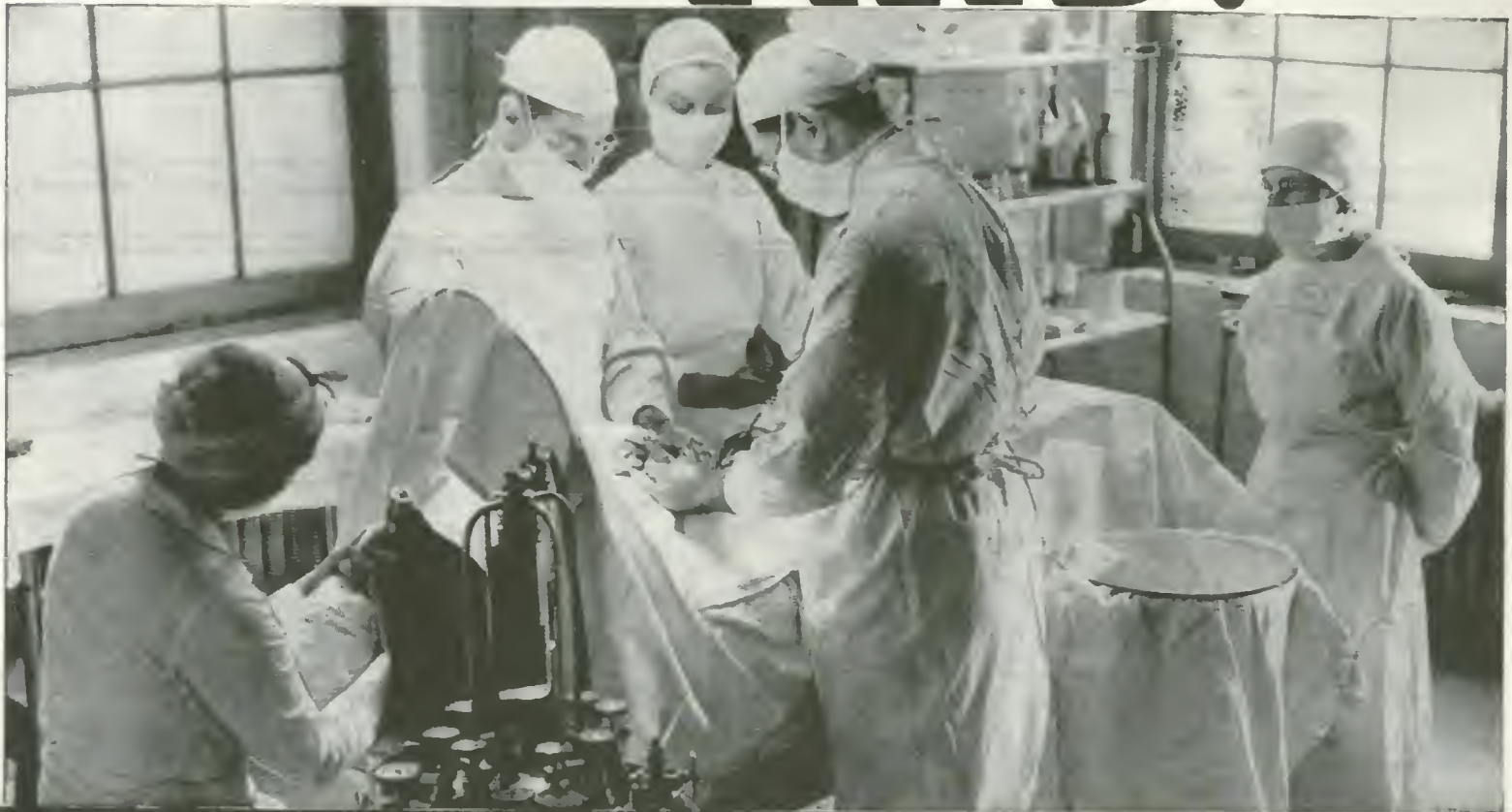

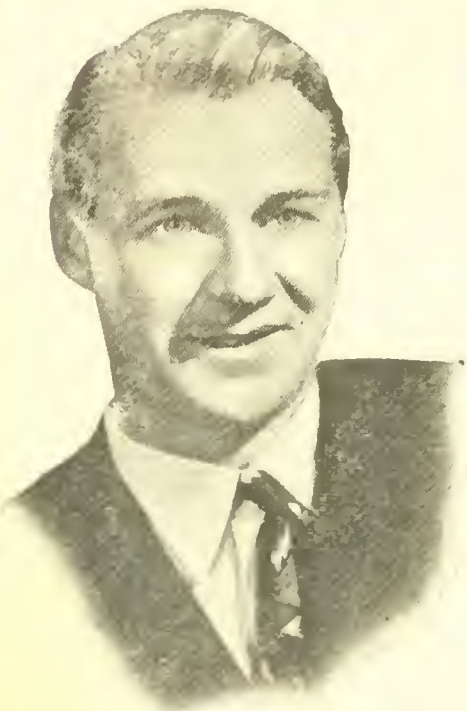

FOOTBALL IN WARTIME

By Bill Stern

Wartime Football a Morale Builder and Body Builder, Says NBC Sports Director

ONE of the most widely discussed subjects today is the place of football in wartime. A year ago, when we broadcast the Rose Bowl game, if anyone had asked me about the future of football for the coming year, I would have been very pessimistic. Now, however, I can reverse that stand and be a bit more optimistic. There is going to be football this year and a great deal of it, but before we begin to talk about the kind of football we are going to have this year, let's summarize the situation.

When war was first declared a little over a year and a half ago, there were those who immediately cried, "Well, this means the end of amateur sports, for what with all the young men being taken into the Army there will be no time for collegiate competition." And in the beginning this was our attitude because we were suddenly drawn into a war where all our manpower was needed and needed quickly. But after we settled down to the business of fighting, we soon found out that, while war is very demanding upon the youth of the country, it does not necessarily take up all the time of every boy who can and likes to play the game.

England went through the same period. In the early stages of the war the English people cut down sports to a practically non-existent status. But soon the English people made an interesting discovery, one which we are in the process of making now—that sports have a definite wartime value. They bolster morale and, equally important, they fit our men for the rigors of warfare. Now, football definitely falls into this category. There are few sports that fit a man better for actual hand-to-hand combat than does the rough-and-ready game of football. Here body contact is used just as it often is in actual warfare. And so we slowly began to change our viewpoint—and by "we" I mean the country at large. We found that certain sports could be continued.

Right off the bat, we ran into a peculiar situation where the Army refused to allow its trainees on the college campuses to participate in collegiate football, but the Navy took the opposite view and encouraged its collegiate trainees to participate. This meant that colleges which had Army trainees were hard put to field football teams, but schools with Navy or Marine trainees found the going a great deal simpler.

Next we found still another ingredient to complicate the situation. Cer-

tain schools had among their Navy and Marine trainees football players who had formerly played for another college, or in some cases had even played professional football. That immediately raised the question as to whether these gentlemen would be allowed to represent their new alma maters even though they were sent to these schools only for military training. That was solved by an almost blanket approval allowing these transferees to play at whatever institution they found themselves. This gave added impetus to the football picture for this fall. Later a great many conferences dropped almost all eligibility rules, such as the restrictions of freshmen playing varsity football, and this decision made still more men available for collegiate football. All in all, these changes have presented a somewhat peculiar but nevertheless concrete picture of 1943's football season.

Now, with all these decisions behind us, we can look forward with some degree of certainty to what we are going to have in football this coming fall.

To present an accurate picture, however, I must first say that quite a number of colleges have given up football for this coming season. These colleges have been forced into this decision by lack of men and by long dormant battles between certain members of the faculty and athletic officials. By that, I mean there has been for many years a bitter rivalry in many colleges between certain members of the faculty who, while supporting football on the surface, actually were very jealous of the game. Many of these faculty members, I suppose, sincerely believed that football was overemphasized and they have taken these perilous times to bring pressure to bear to eliminate football, using, as their excuse, the war. Actually they have been trying for a number of years to find a way to eliminate football. It is regrettable that these certain groups, who could never hurt football before, had to seize upon

the war as an excuse to do so now. But be that as it may, football will survive as it always has, for this is not the first time that strong elements in colleges have tried to do away with the game. A concerted effort was made back in 1927, and at that time a group of coaches headed by Knute Rockne, Howard Jones and others were able to prevail.

Enough of the background for why this football season will be an unusual one. Now let us discuss just what we may expect to see this coming fall. Football will be stronger in the Midwest and some of the midwestern teams, such as Michigan, Northwestern and Notre Dame, will

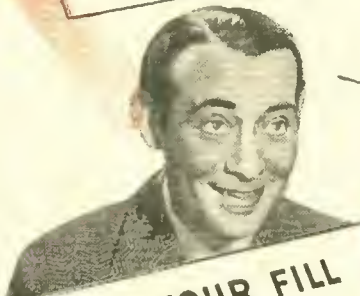

SOMETIMES, when Judy Garland starts from an uneasy sleep these nights, she lies quietly, eyes wide in the dark, telling herself not to be afraid, for the deep rumble of distant guns comes only from night firing-practise on the coast, four miles distant. "Most everybody gets used to it—like the rumble of the subway," she explains, "but it is the uncertainty of never knowing whether this time it's real or practise sort of gets you. I'll wager that folks in my neighborhood all put more than ten percent of their salaries in war bonds."

Understand, this is a story about Judy, and a rather intimate one, not a lecture on bond-buying; but so much of this young actress' time is spent in the war that no reporter can ignore the effect the conflict is obviously having on the girl's life. She is in the war, uniformed or not, just as surely as the fighting men to whom she sings her love-songs. And it's good for her.

When I first met Judy five years ago, she still wore ribbons in her hair, and on being introduced to strangers looked as though she were about to cry. More often than not, she was. For Judy, at an age when high-school children her age were taking their first lessons in sophistication—dating every night they could get away with it and freely en-

gaging in a certain amount of questionably harmless necking, was working like a truck-horse.

Perversely, Judy even then was thinking about marriage. She had been so long associated with youngsters her own age were a little boring. No longer sixteen, but still a sweeter person than any girl so long disciplined in acting has a right to be. Judy passed her twenty-first birthday on June 10 of this year separated from her soldier husband, musician Dave Rose.

"There's nothing to say," she told me when news

of their break-up came. She was right. Judy had wanted marriage too much. The private opinion of some of her friends is that had she experienced the silly frivolities of teen-age girls she would have been able to surmount the problem of incompatibility. This leads to a conclusion that Judy had a yearning for frivolities.

I doubt it. On one occasion I went with Judy to an old-fashioned county fair, speeding through the country in Dave's low-slung English roadster. Judy had a gay time on outlandish rides, such as The Whip and

The Tunnel of Love, but she was singularly quiet the rest of the time. If it were not for the fact that they were newlyweds one would have suspected that the only time these two were really interested in each other was during a discussion of music. Judy apparently had her emotions confused with intense admiration of her husband's great talent. There may be better explanations, but that will do until a better one comes along.

A few days ago I sat talking with Judy in her Westwood home, once occupied by another fine singer, Mary Martin, when the telephone inter-

rupted. A maid announced the name of one of Hollywood's fast-disappearing swains. With a faint grimace, Judy said, "Tell him I'm not in."

We were discussing an event to which Judy was looking forward with considerable anticipation. "I've never met Bing Crosby," she said. "Oh, we said hello when we passed, but now I'm going to sing with him on 'Command Performance.' We'll do *People Will Say We're in Love*. I haven't looked forward to anything so much for a long time—to me, Crosby is the master."

SONNY TUFTS

A Boston Bean Whose Ancestors Founded Tufts College, Sonny Was Supposed to Go to Harvard But Chose Yale, and Movies Instead of Banking

BOSTON-BORN Sonny was christened Bowen Tufts III, but no one ever has called him that. Natural blond hair, bright-blue eyes and a fair skin are probably responsible for the nickname which he answered to all through prep school, football and crew days at Yale and a successful career as a night-club singer in the East. But don't let the name Sonny give you an idea that he is slight and small. He stands six feet four inches and weighs a neat two hundred pounds. Injury sustained during college-athlete days keeps him out of the armed forces.

Sonny's father was a prominent Boston banker, and the Tufts family have lived in the "Hub of the Universe" since 1638. One of his forebears founded Tufts College. Tufts men usually went to Harvard. Sonny proved an exception by going to Yale because all his football pals at Phillips-Exeter prep school were going there.

While in prep school, his fine baritone voice got him into music and led eventually to the forming of his own orchestra. The first year he organized

his musical group, a steamship line offered them a job on one of its boats which made summer tours to Europe and Sonny accepted. That was the start of a cross-Atlantic record for young Tufts. Each summer, until he graduated from Yale, he signed for summer cruises.

During his senior year at Yale he studied seriously for grand opera, and after graduation went to Paris for six months of voice training. His audition at the Metropolitan in New York put him in line for an operatic debut in 1936. But the smallness of the salary as a beginner swung him to a singing spot in a Broadway musical at a flattering sum.

From song spots in Broadway shows he went into night-club singing. This earned him fame and a neat living. Also the often-repeated exclamation, "You should be in the movies!"

Finally Sonny became convinced that he should try to get into pictures. In the fall of 1942 he applied at Paramount for a job and got it—along with a contract. His first role was that of a marine in "So Proudly We Hail."

His next big break will be opposite Olivia de Havilland in RKO's "Government Girl." From present indications, friends were right when they said, "You should be in the movies."

SHIRLEY MITCHELL

Accent on Accents Is Shirley's Strong Point. She Hurdles Southern, Brooklyn, Greek Dialects With Ease on Radio, Sometimes Sans Rehearsal

RADIO'S Shirley Mitchell was born in Toledo, Ohio, twenty-three years ago. She never has been south of South Chicago, yet her southern accent, when a radio role demands it, is thicker than that of roommate Dinah Shore, who hails from the deep South. Shirley won her first radio role with a Brooklyn dialect, and she's never been in Brooklyn, either!

A few months ago she was called at the last minute to pinch hit for Katina Paxinou on a Greek-relief show. Miss Paxinou, on location "For Whom the Bell Tolls," hadn't been able to get back to Hollywood. Shirley rushed from her home, arrived at NBC just a few minutes before the show was to go on the air. The producer thrust a script into her hands, told her to be dramatic and use a Greek accent. And the little girl from Toledo, who never had been to Greece, either, went through the half-hour broadcast without a hitch and delivered a Greek accent to boot. Certainly it was her most dramatic performance to date. Nothing seems to faze Shirley, who has had top roles on Arch Oboler's "Lights Out," appeared on Lux Radio Theater and "Dr. Christian" broadcasts, and done comedy roles for Rudy Vallee, Red Skelton, The Great Gildersleeve, and Groucho Marx.

That assurance probably dates back to Toledo, when Shirley, at the age of six, entertained her parents' friends with her impersonations. They laughed at her antics and dubbed her "a little sweetheart." Today, in radio, she's been the sweetheart of more stars than any other player on the air.

Shirley made her radio debut in Chicago, and landed in Hollywood with Ransom Sherman when he went west to replace Fibber McGee for the summer. She's been in Movietown ever since.

At present, Shirley lives with Dinah Shore and Kitty Kallen, singer with Jimmy Dorsey's band, in a big old house just off Sunset Boulevard. Exceedingly pretty, Shirley is a natural blonde, and so good-natured that one producer asked her if she could play a part that called for a real mad. He soon found out. Shirley staged a tantrum, right then and there, gave him a dressing-down that left him flabbergasted, and walked off the stage. Even then she was playing a joke, but she showed him that she could act!

THIS is a story about a young man with a voice you've heard much of but never really heard. You turn the radio on and hear a terrifying coloratura squeal that splits the mike like an air-raid siren. Just as you're about to run for cover the siren stops and an excited announcer tells you that you've just heard Frank Sinatra.

Well, after covering him for weeks, I can tell you he is super.

Reports haven't come in, but I must be No. 1 on the Hit Parade. For I have been hit from every angle, jammed in between jivers, swooned on by stacks of sweaters. And let me tell you the graceful art of swooning loses its appeal when you're always on the bottom of the stack.

Even now in my dreams I see oceans of fleecy sweaters and count bobby socks at night instead of sheep. I feel as though I've been rubbed the wrong way with rock salt. So you can see I was in no mood to be convinced.

When I started trailing Sinatra to get this story I was determined that I'd know all or nothing at all. And the whole thing has been a process of break-downs from the start. First it was interviewing him with other reporters in a garage in Pasadena, and the mob outside trying to break through the garage doors. Next at the Hollywood Bowl when we were riding in his car and thousands of fans spilled all over the car with the car near the breaking-down point. Next it was at rehearsal—just listening to him sing—and me breaking down.

Like many others before me, I went to scoff and remained to swoon.

A negative attitude nets you nothing. It's like refusing a chocolate when you're on a diet and winding up by eating the whole box. That I-wonder-what-he's-got-he-won't-get-me attitude is pretty fatal.

You look at the thin, boyish figure with the black tousled hair, hollow cheeks, blue eyes and startling smile who holds onto the mike, takes a deep breath that caves in his stomach, gives a

friendly glance at the crowd and takes off.

You stick your chin out and hang onto both arms of the seat determinedly, muttering, "I won't let him get me . . . he won't get me . . ." Then the soft baritone voice slides down on a long note, lingers a little and skis on down to another one. And there you are slumped down and misty-eyed.

Before you know it, you've been definitely got.

Frank Sinatra's voice is dreamy dynamite. Sweet sin.

And now that that's over, I give you my story of Sinatra's invasion of Hollywood. Blow by blow. Swoon by swoon.

The Sinatra offensive actually began long before he stepped off the train in placid, peaceful Pasadena, city of flowers, millionaires and Rose Bowls. And, on that morning, city of slick chicks and hepped hens.

At the unheard-of hour of nine a.m., RKO studios, who signed him to play in "Higher and Higher," were higher than the picture of the same name. There was bedlam in every direction as reporters gathered to go meet the train. Studio secretaries borrowed sweaters from the wardrobe department and drew lots for the privilege to go meet him. Calls flooding the switchboard from all over Hollywood to find out if the "Sinatra Special" was on time.

At nine a.m. all Hollywood was agog. And normally, Hollywood never agogs before noon.

The Pasadena station platform seethed with thousands of fans. Little mothers in bobby socks, chewing gum and carrying infants who blinked their blue eyes wonderingly at the sun. Beautiful girls in peasant dresses (Continued on Page 55)

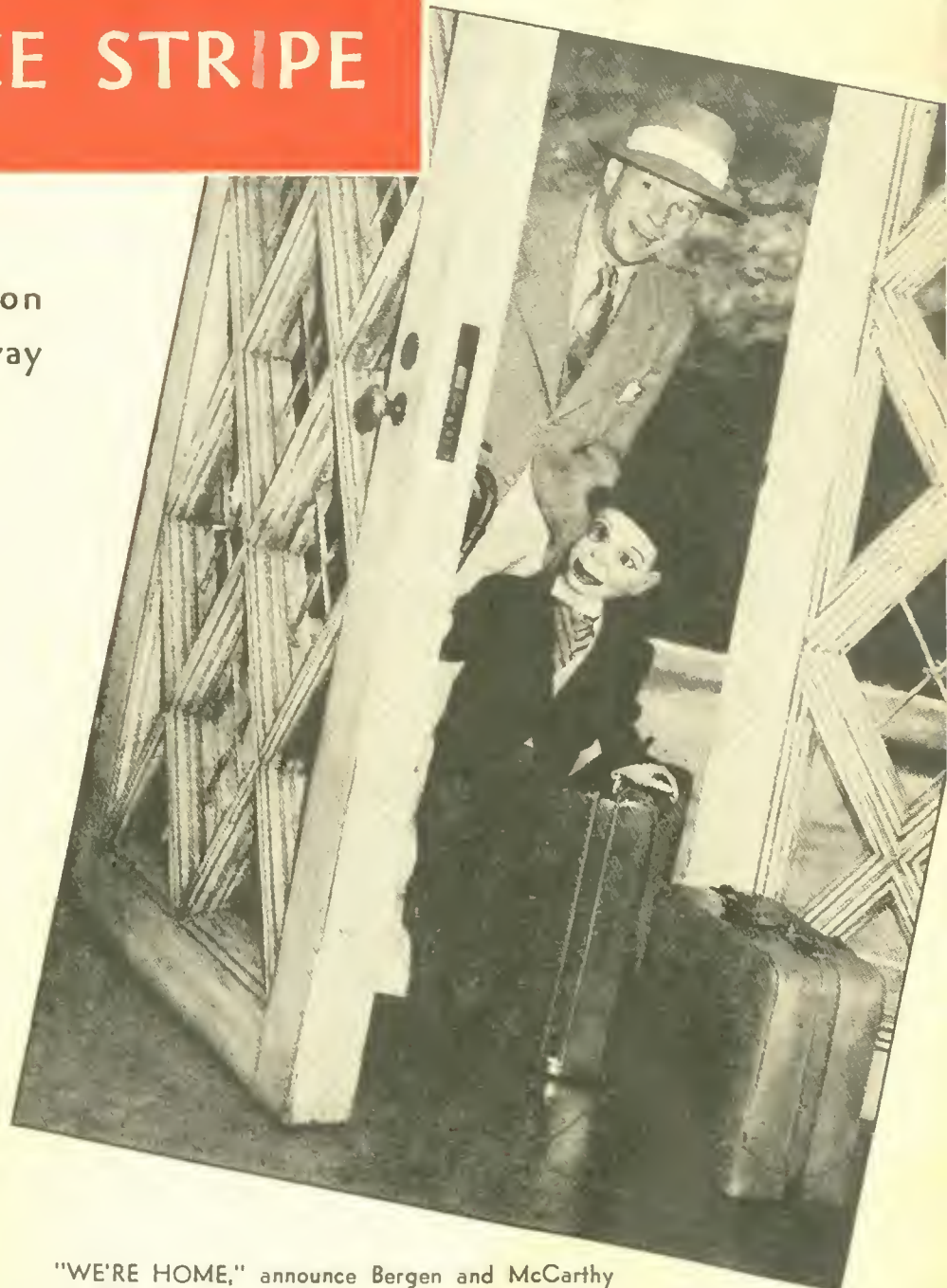

"GUADALCANAL DIARY" is history in the making. It is America's first picture about America's first victorious offensive in World War II—the initial one by U. S. Five thousand Marines, fifteen hundred soldiers and three hundred sailors make up the cast. Between the opening shot of a peaceful Sunday afternoon aboard a transport "somewhere in the South Pacific" and the final scene of a dozen men receiving decorations while down on the beach the Army moves in and the Marines move out, there is presented a grimly tragic picture that is amazingly stirring.

"Victory Through Air Power"

A Walt Disney production, released through United Artists. Picture, which combines Disney's cartoon wizardry with live characters, is based on Major Alexander de Seversky's book "Victory Through Air Power." It was directed by H. C. Potter and Perce Pearce.

ANY movie-goer interested in the explanation of the basic principles of modern warfare will find this picture fascinating. They will leave the theater with the feeling that "air power is swiftly emerging as the dominating factor in war and in peace." The film is dedicated to America's airmen, and following that, General "Billy" Mitchell speaks from the screen about the coming role of air power. Had Mitchell's warnings been backed by the Disney picture as De Seversky's are, he would not have died a heartbroken and discredited prophet; for the film shows what air power has done to date in World War II, and portrays what it is capable of doing tomorrow. The sequences in which Seversky appears on the screen in person and explains through a series of animated maps how supply lines can—and must—be kept open, drive home the idea of victory through air power.

WHAT MOVIE-GOERS CAN EXPECT: Significant document of war which is informative and vitally important, along with being engrossing entertainment. Role American eagle plays in attacking Japanese octopus packs a wallop!

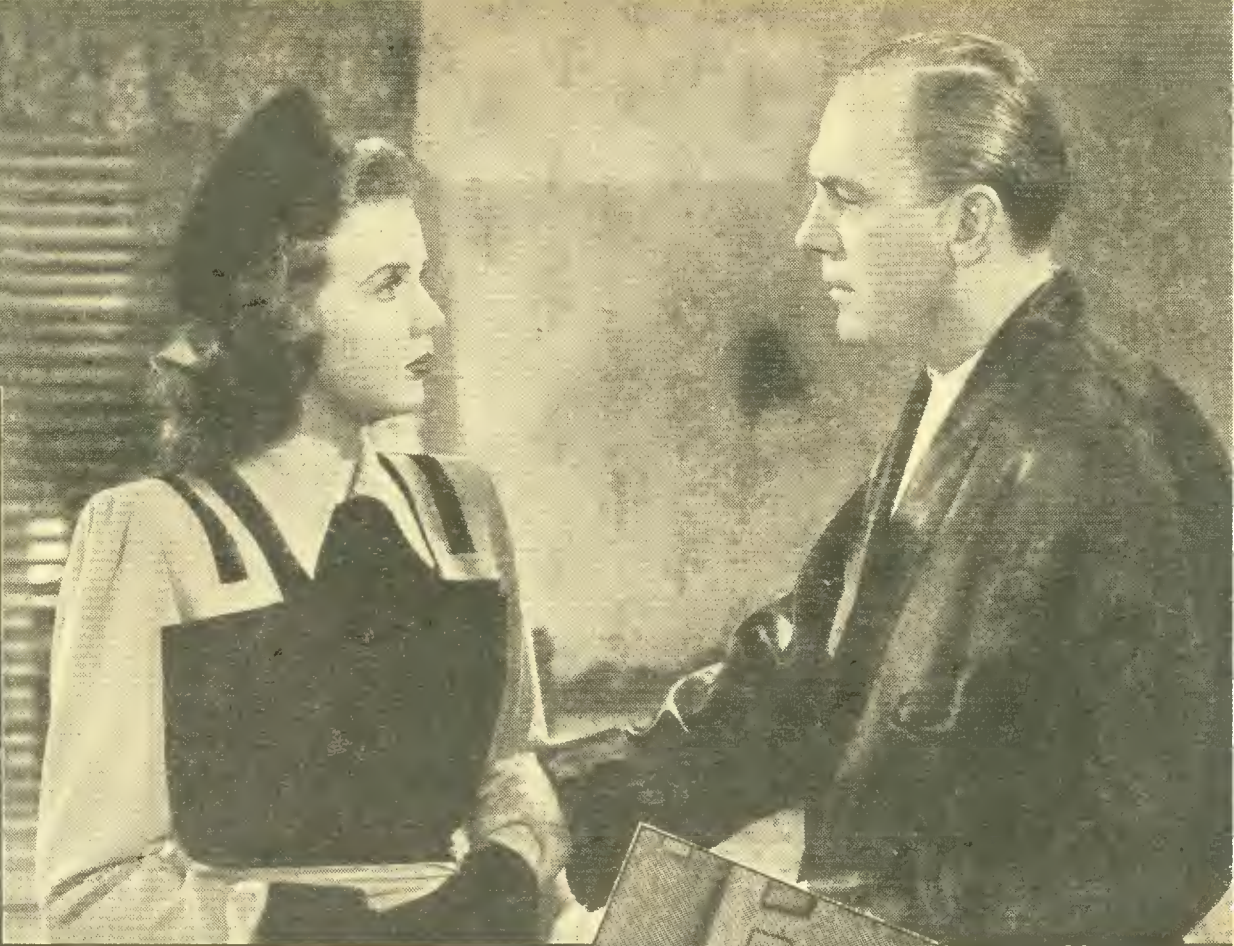

WHEN the laugh scores for the year are counted, "Princess O'Rourke" will probably be found near the top of the list. With its principal setting the nation's White House, it presents a daring and hilarious comedy, in which wartime politics and international relationships are aired through a romance between an American plane pilot and a European princess. Olivia de Havilland, in the princess role, comes to America with uncle (Charles Coburn), who wants to arrange a marriage for her with some "eligible" American. Scenes where pilot (Robert Cummings) is asked to give up American citizenship are priceless. However, "the best laid plans o' mice and men gang aft agley." 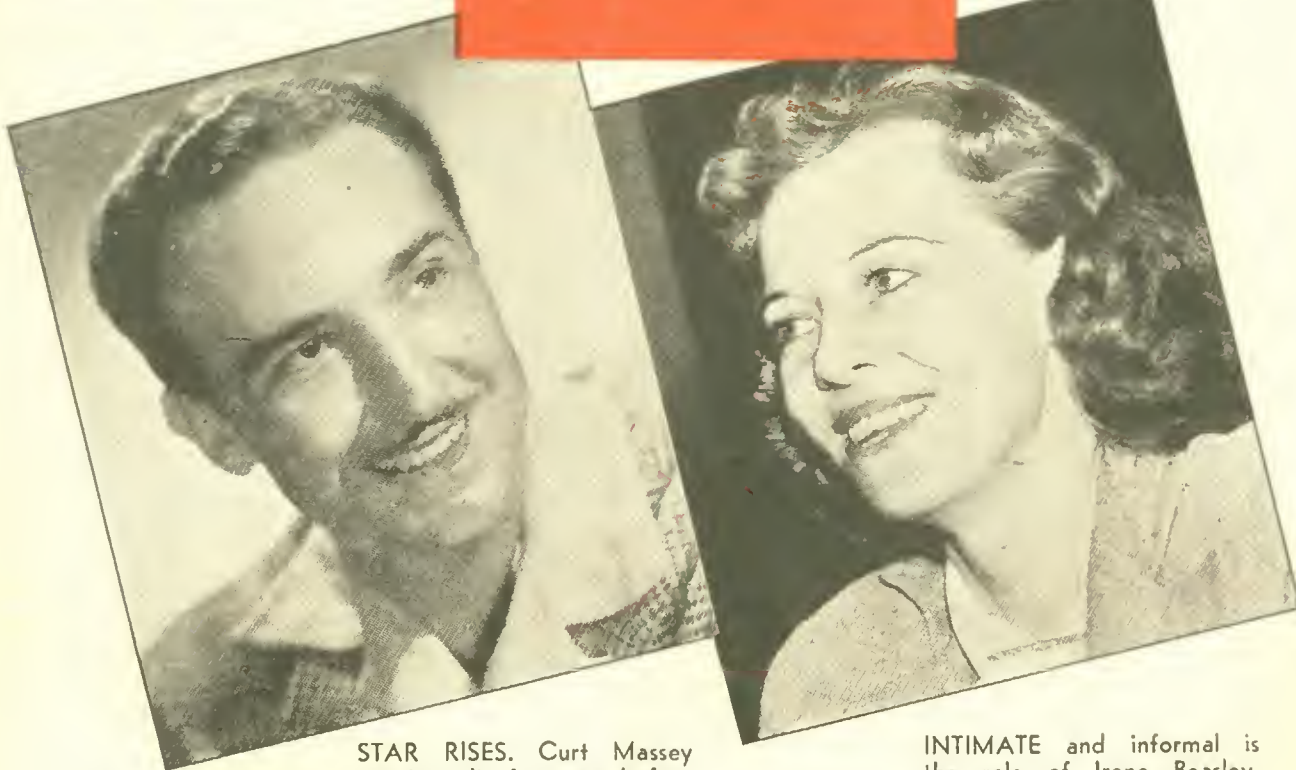

Spare-Time War Jobs for BBC Workers; New San Salvador Station

IN LONDON recently, when some firms making small parts for big bombers made an urgent call for spare-time workers, the response from members of the BBC was on such a scale that the workshop was brought to the BBC. And now, in one of its buildings, the staff, men and women alike, is helping to bomb Germany—quite literally. From seven to ten o'clock on any evening of the week, it is possible to see people whose regular job may be producing programs, translating foreign broadcasts, secretarial work or message-carrying, sitting side by side at a bench assembling small electrical accessories for the outfitting of bomber aircraft.

A high BBC official has been seen to glow with pride when praised for a neat bit of assembly involving six or seven tricky operations. The men complain that the women can beat them in output because they can handle some of the tiny screws and washers better.

Stars and Stripes in Britain

Major Ben Lyon, who with his wife Bebe Daniels, has been emceeing BBC's popular "Stars and Stripes in Britain" program since its inception, told friends during his recent visit in this country that "Stars and Stripes in Britain" had many heartening memories. Many families, said the Major, have heard from their boys and girls overseas in messages that have meant more than all the letters in the world. More than 1300 servicemen have broadcast over this popular program since it was started over a year ago.

News of Overseas Stations

ZLT7 (6.715), Wellington, New Zealand, broadcasts a program of English news for listeners and troops in New Zealand, Australia, and the Pacific islands, daily at 5:30 or 6:00 a.m. EWT . . . Clarence Hartzell of Jeannette, Pa., reports XGOY (9.635), Chungking, China, is now coming in with fair signals from around 7:45 a.m. EWT when they start calling San Francisco, through their news period for CBS which goes on almost daily at 8:04 a.m. EWT.

"Radio France" (12.12), Algiers, Algeria, has an English news period at 4:00 p.m. EWT. This period is also carried irregularly by "Radio Maroc" (8.035), Rabat, Morocco . . . FZI (11.97), Brazzaville, Middle Congo, broadcasts English news daily at 2:45, 4:45 and 7:45 p.m. EWT, according to a report from John Wilson of Wilmington, Dela.

Berlin's morning program for North America, is now heard from 7:00 to 9:45 a.m. EWT, over DXL6 (15.13) only. DJB (15.20) is not in use for this transmission currently . . . Tommy Jones of St. Petersburg, Florida, writes that HAT4, Budapest, Hungary, normally operating on 9.125 megs, often jumps to 9.145 or 9.225 for its 9:00 p.m. EWT transmission to North America.

YSO (7.295), "The Voice of Democracy," is a new San Salvador, El Salvador, station which comes on the air nightly at 7:55 p.m. EWT, according to the National Radio Club.

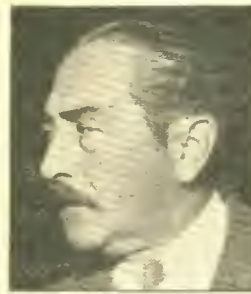

Portrait of a Singer Who Knew She Had a Place in the World of Music, and Proved It

MARIA KURENKO stood before a huge audience of Russian workers. She sang for them. It was in the early days of New Russia, in the year 1924, when a new government and a new philosophy were beginning to take hold of the people. Maria Kurenko sang with great freedom, fine style. She sang a coloratura passage in an aria from an opera and her tones described arabesques against the grim vaulted roof of steel girders under the gray of huge windows. She reached a high note . . . The huge throng laughed. She went higher . . . The throng laughed louder. She sang a whole succession of trills and sudden figures up and down and then the voice rose and rose and rose and the higher it rose the louder the gathering laughed. She stopped. Abruptly. She gave her hearers the fiercest glare a kindly face with deep-set, kindly eyes could give. And she walked away—away from those horrible, common, cruel people who had dared to laugh at an artist who was singing for them.

She was all for packing up right then and there, firing her accompanist, who had had the temerity to grin in sympathy with the listeners. He tried to explain, to reason . . . well, he tried to get in one word—unavailing. Finally, the manager of the plant got an opportunity to put in a phrase. "It was a cat," he said. "They laughed at a cat."

"A cat?" she asked incredulously. "A cat? What cat? Where?"

Slowly the manager explained that as she was standing on the platform, "giving so generously of her art," a cat and its family of half a dozen kittens walked leisurely from one side of the platform to the other, just beneath her on a lower step. "That is what they were laughing at, a cat." He implored her to go on, to repeat that "so magnificent selection that soared and soared to the sky, like the very dreams of the Russian workers."

Then Maria Kurenko began to laugh, a long, loud uncontrollable laugh, and everyone around her laughed, too. And when the hysteria had subsided—for that was what it was—she stood erect, called her accompanist and said, "Come, we shall sing and play for our audience. We shall sing and play as we have never done before."

Needless to say, her performance was a sensational success. She sang encore after encore and seemed never to want to stop. But she did, at last, because this was a factory and the workers had their tasks to go back to.

Yet, much as Maria Kurenko would have liked to remain in Russia, she could not, because to one artist, at least, the future seemed precarious. She left Russia, her native land. She was born in Moscow, educated at the Music Conservatory there and she had also taken a degree in law at the Moscow University. And she arrived in Paris an unknown, but a hard-working, self-effacing singer who believed that there was something she could do in the world of music.

She made her debut in opera in this country in a performance of the Los Angeles Opera Company. Her role was Gilda in *Rigoletto* and great were the tributes paid her the next day in the newspapers. Without friends, without means, she had faced a strange audience in a strange land and she had

conquered. Not long after that, on the strength of her American debut, she gave a recital in the same city and the results were the same.

Naturally, such achievements aroused the music-lovers of eastern cities. She made her New York debut at Carnegie Hall and, again, there was a completely won-over attendance. Then came radio appearances, other concerts, tours. Today Maria Kurenko is ranked as one of the world's great interpreters of song, for she has given most of her time to recital programs of the finest devising.

You may hear her now by way of CBS, late on Sunday evenings, singing the great songs of all time, the songs of this country and of Russia and France and Italy and Germany. Hers is an extraordinary artistry. In these days when youngsters climb to the top much too soon for their artistic good and when these same youngsters achieve reputations that are disproportion-

ate to their gifts (for many do have gifts), it is a comfort and a revelation to listen to the singing of this superior performer. For hers is the art that comes with understanding and with years of fighting the battle of life, the art that makes no compromise, that flies out of the heart and the soul of one who has known torment and disappointment and human frailty, the art that expresses the universal urges of humanity, its hopes and fears and its emotional rises and falls.

Maria Kurenko is happy here in America, a country she learned about, while young, through reading *Uncle Tom's Cabin*, the works of Jack London, Poe, Thoreau, Whitman. And she sings for us, content that here we understand her and her purposes. "Do not listen to me," she says in that crisply enunciated English of hers, "but listen to what the great minds of music say, for it is their thoughts I endeavor to express."

POPULAR MUSIC

JIMMY LYTELL, clarinetist par excellence in many styles and genres, is celebrating his third year as a bandleader. Yet he has been a top-flight performer for many years. You will remember him as the boy wonder of the Original Dixieland Jazz Band of fond memory. The recordings of that organization are still obtainable. You can hear his clarinet coruscations on those records, or you can hear them now on the radio, via the Blue Network, as he eggs his men on with his electrical playing.

Not long ago Jimmy finished an air date in front of his band in a New York spot, then hopped into a taxi and made a bee-line for the NBC, where he leaped into a chair surrounded by many other chairs containing members of the National Broadcasting Symphony. The conductor, if you please, was Arturo Toscanini.

That is going from one extreme to the other, but Jimmy Lytell took it all in stride. "It's music, isn't it?" he says. And one can't answer him back on that.

Radio has been very kind to Jimmy, and it is right that he should consider radio as providing the "greatest opportunity for musicians."

He has good, solid reasons for those opinions. "Gone are the endless one-night stands, the days when you ate and slept whenever and wherever you could, when you groped your way to a 3 a.m. train after a night of blowing for tomorrow's breakfast, let alone lunch or supper."

He continues, "Now we eat regularly, keep regular hours and, better still, have plenty of time for bettering ourselves as artists."

Gas rationing and the travel situations being what they are, many musicians formerly connected with Tommy Dorsey, Jimmy Dorsey, Benny Goodman, Artie Shaw aren't doing much touring these days. Hence, they are only too glad to play for Jimmy Lytell over the radio, as well as for other studio bandleaders. Consequently, a roll-call of his men would read like a *Who's Who in Jazz*.

The radio listeners, the ones whose memories go as far back as Original Dixieland days, should listen to Lytell and his forces. There is the same esprit in the leader's clarinet work, the same point and thrust to his rolling cadenzas and breaks, as the experts call them; to his velvety tone and soaring musicianship. He will bring back reminiscences, never fear. And because there is no progress in art, but only change, they may think that Jimmy Lytell has progressed into higher spheres of music. That is not so.

Lytell has kept pace with the changes in taste, in styles, perhaps, and he may now phrase certain notes or clusters of them differently from the way he once would have done. But occasionally the old Lytell comes out, the Lytell who used to execute brilliant, if endless, runs and trills and leaps of all kinds, like some frenzied coloratura.

The point is, music goes on and its interpreters go on with it, which is good for the art and for the artist and, last but certainly not least, good for the listener.

Jimmy Lytell's orchestra may be heard Saturdays on the Blue Network.

He called the principals in his sketch Vic and Sade because these names were short, easy to remember and fun to say. In short order his scripts in the hands of Art Van Harvey and Bernardine Flynn won a distinctive

place in radio. Because two voices were not enough to carry the show, he added Rush, as the Gooks' son, and Uncle Fletcher. Meanwhile numerous other characters, such as Hank Gutstop, Y, I, I, Y Skeeber and Bluetooth Johnson, though

never heard, became an integral part of the show.

It is interesting to note that "Vic and Sade," frequently voted "the best daytime serial on the air," does not conform to the usual daytime serial pattern. This may be attributed to the fact that the author has never resorted to sob-stuff or the cliff-hanger technique. It's easy enough, he says, to find drama in flood, famine and fire, but infinitely harder to build a plot around such ordinary happenings as the arrival of the garbage-man or the purchase of a head of cabbage. Paul Rhymer took the hard way, according to his own definition, and the result has been a program that grasps the hearts of millions of radio listeners.

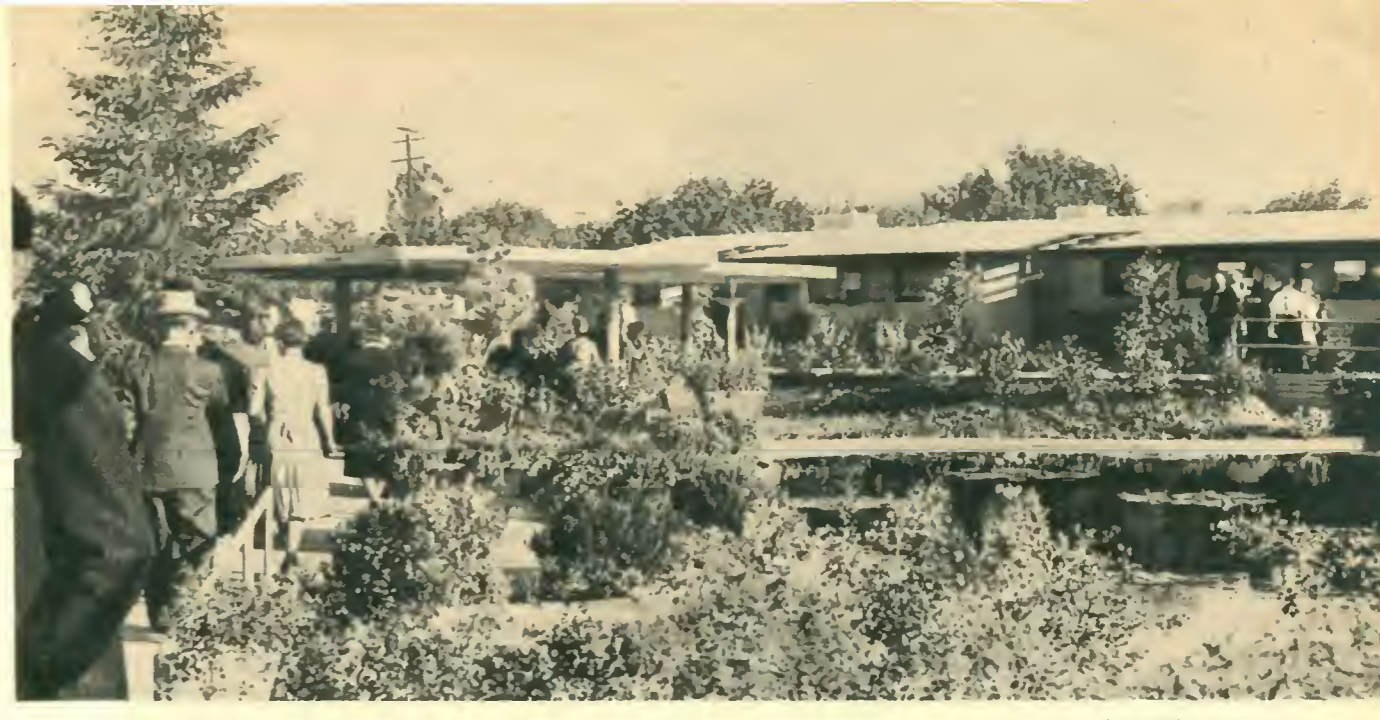

Unique Is the Word For Radio's "Screen Guild Players," Where Top Stars Combine Gay Raillery With Truly Serious Purpose

IT HAS been said that any successful enterprise is but the lengthened shadow of a single man. In great measure that is true of radio's "Screen Guild Players," formerly sponsored by Gulf Oil, and now by Lady Esther products over CBS. For the phenomenal success of the "Guild Players" is due primarily to Jean Hersholt, who became president of the Motion Picture Relief Fund in 1937. His tireless efforts made the realization of a twenty-two-year-old dream come true in the dedication of the Motion Picture Country House—the film industry's tribute to those of their members no longer able to work.

Back of that occasion, which took place in September, 1942, lies a story of hard work and infinite patience on the part of those who visioned the project. Before "Dr. Christian" Hersholt and his associates took over, ambitious plans had been only put on paper. They proceeded to put them on a sound, business-like basis.

"We must take care of our own," was the cry that Mr. Hersholt and his staff sent echoing through Hollywood as an opening gun. Contributions poured in; still they didn't represent enough to build the home and maintain it.

But where there is a will, there's a way. Hersholt found the answer for both the home and its maintenance through the Screen Guild radio show. Working in close cooperation with the Screen Actors, Directors, and Writers Guilds, a talent alliance was

formed that supplied a happy airline sponsor with the most important film names of the day. These players would give their services free on the programs; the sums they would ordinarily receive for a radio appearance were turned over to the relief fund.

Returns from that plan netted more than \$750,000, a substantial nucleus toward the erection of the home and its maintenance as well as establishing a large sinking-fund for future improvements.

This Country House, located some twenty miles from the heart of Hollywood, is a cheery, spacious group of buildings, made up of forty bungalow units, an up-to-date clinic, dining-hall and administration building, all situated on a forty-one-acre property which is beautifully improved, even to fruit-bearing trees.

In addition to those in the home, the Motion Picture Relief Fund took care of 20,000 other needy cases in 1942 alone. "Screen Guild Players" broadcasts made much of that help possible. And that same spirit of helpfulness is apparent in every group of stars that appears on the program. The tenseness so evident around most radio rehearsals is lacking. The headliners clown around during, and after, rehearsals, to the great delight of everyone present, including stagehands, who usually sit around bored through the regular paid performances. There's something about the for-good, for-free and for-fun spirit that gets them all!

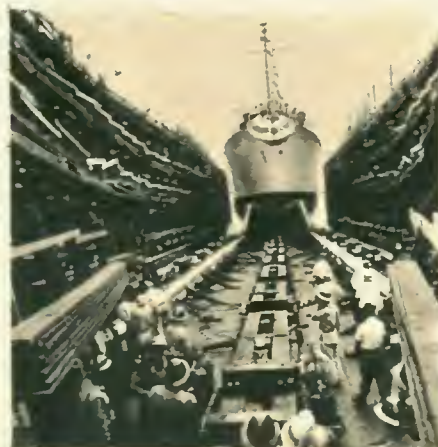

HAIR DO'S and DON'TS

Wear a Coiffure That Suits
You and Your Personality

HAVE you ever stopped to consider what your hair-do does? A coiffure that makes the girl next door a knockout might serve only to put you in the back row of popularity—for the right hair-do for her may easily be the wrong one for you.

Before adopting any hair style you

must take into consideration these three important factors: Personality, facial contour and finally the coif itself. All three must blend harmoniously if you're anxious to achieve the most striking effect.

Study, for example, the model who posed for the above hair pictures. One of New York's clever hair stylists

(M. Louis) took her under his wing to set a style that would be most becoming to her type.

He took into careful consideration the three fundamentals we discussed above. One of her outstanding facial qualities is piquancy, but when she wears her hair in the long bob, that charm is completely lost. The fuzzy

mass of hair around the neck and shoulders conceals the model's attractive facial contour and features while the top hair is badly arranged so that it exaggerates a rather high brow.

When M. Louis began to restyle the hair he carefully considered the coif that would highlight the best features of her face—her high forehead, the angular bone structure and the breadth of her temples. Combined with that, he tried to catch the unique quality of her personality. And in the short hair-do, he did just that. The hair has been softly combed to one side, slightly covering the forehead. You will find a variation of the same hair style in the top picture, where soft bangs cover the high forehead.

So remember when you crave a new hairdress that you must consider all these things.

We have stressed over and over again the importance of clean and lustrous locks. The slick effect of any chic hair-do can be completely ruined if the hair that forms it is dull and lifeless. Shampoo your hair when it needs it and as often as it needs it. If you live in the city you'll probably need weekly shampoos because of a dusty atmosphere. Choose a shampoo that conditions your hair as well as cleans it—one with hair conditioner added. Brush your tresses nightly. In other words, give your hair all the care you possibly can and you'll notice that your coiffure will take on added "oomph."

Every woman realizes that her hair is the deciding factor of good grooming. You may be a smart dresser, apply your make-up perfectly, but if your hair isn't painstakingly groomed all the good is lost. Just a little patience, time and lots of care will bring about the impression you desire—that of a charming, well-groomed person.

yelling "Chiseler!" angrily as some bobby sock nudged them an inch farther back. An old gray-haired woman rushed in asking breathlessly, "Have I missed him?"

Her daughter worked at a defense plant and couldn't be there and had commanded her mother to go report in her place. We asked one middle-aged, dowdily dressed woman why she'd come. "I think he sings bootiful!" she said.

Off to one side, completely alone and puzzled but unafraid, stood a lone Marine, Sergeant Bill Tate of the Marine Raiders. Three times wounded, he had seen action on Bataan, Guadalcanal and received the Purple Heart for bravery under fire at Attu. Sergeant Tate had his first liberty in many a moon and had thumbed a ride to Pasadena because he'd once gone to school there. Never in all the wars had he seen a battle like this.

"Who's coming in?" he asked somebody. And when the reply was, "Frank Sinatra," Bill said, "Who's he? Never heard of the guy." He'd been gone from the United States four years.

Several days later he visited the singer backstage at CBS studios and asked for his autograph. Frank took one look at his chest covered with ribbons and said, "What the h—! You give me YOURS!" Then signed a copy of "All or Nothing at All" for Tojo from the Marines.

Our first view of Sinatra was seeing him standing in a doorway of the train, wearing his best tan gabardine suit, a red polkadot tie and an amazed look. He stood there holding onto the handles of the car, took one startled stare at the crowd and said, "Gosh!"

Our second view was in the garage, with cops guarding the doors against the mob, and Frank, his foot on the fender of an old jalopy, giving his first official interview to the West Coast press.

The garage doors creaked warningly as the cops tried to hold them against the mob. It reminded one a little of those necktie parties in westerns. Except that this one was polkadot. The doors kept bending but Frank didn't notice. He's always calmest under pressure. Which, in his case, is a good thing.

Pressure hit an all-time high at the Hollywood Bowl, and he was by far the calmest one there then. Though, as he'll tell you, "It was the most important event in my life."

Everything happened that night. Consider, for one thing, the case of the elusive boutonniere. Frank was dressed to kill, but had no flower for his buttonhole, and, wanting to look his very best on such a great occasion, sent CBS page-boys scouring the neighborhood for a florist shop. It was during the broadcast of "Hit Parade," and he came back into the wings after every number to find out whether the boys had found him a blue cornflower.

"Don't worry, there'll be plenty of corn there without the flowers," one pal kidded him.

When the number 2 song came on, a perspiring page-boy sprinted in with a very wilted flower, and Frank dashed from the wings to put it on.

Funny, thinking of little things like that. Late, when I was standing at the back of the first tier out front in the Bowl, straining my eyes in the direction of the thin, white-coated figure almost lost within the shell of the Bowl below, staring to see if the cornflower would even show.

A very distinguished-looking gentleman next to me handed me his binoculars. "Here, young lady," he said pityingly, "these'll put him right in your lap!"

We picked up the binoculars. The cornflower was wilted and drooping but doing its best to last out the deal.

Frank Sinatra will never forget walking out onto the Bowl stage that night, looking at an audience that reached clear up to Heaven and back. They were hanging from the stars—hanging from the boxes—they were hanging. Period. They'd moved down

from the upper tiers and were draped on the aisles, leaning back ecstatically, and the ghosts of Beethoven and Bach must have shivered just a little at the cries of "Sing to me, Frankie!" "You're wonderful, darling!"

Sinatra will always remember doing a double take when he first saw the crowd. And the thirty photographers who flashed blinding bulbs at him, saying, "Smile, Frankie. SMILE!" And him right in the middle of *Old Man River*.

Backstage Vladimir Bakaleinikoff, Russian conductor, who had conducted the first half of the program and just

finished with the *Nutcracker Suite*, thought there were some there nuttier than the suite. "Never—in the Russian Revolution, even—haf I seen this!" he said laughing and shaking his head. And went on to say that of all popular singers he thought Sinatra sang beautifully. "He sings with great taste and great feeling," he said.

Frank is very proud of singing in the Hollywood Bowl, but is especially proud of the \$12,500 he raised to help get the Bowl out of the red and keep the skilled batons waving.

FREQUENCY MODULATION

New Call Letter System Goes Into Effect; Networks Eye FM's Future; Newspaper Publishers File FM Applications

MOST FM listeners will probably be surprised to hear their favorite frequency modulation stations identifying themselves with new call letters after November 1. A recent ruling by the Federal Communications Commission abolishes the type of call letters that have been used by FM outlets for the past two years and replaces the numeral-letter combinations (like W49FW or K45LA) with straight alphabetical call letters such as regular amplitude modulation (AM) broadcasters employ.

The change was authorized in response to a petition by the FM stations themselves, which, through their national trade association, advised the FCC that they thought the original system possessed a number of bad drawbacks.

Henceforth, FM stations will identify themselves in one of two ways:

(1) If the FM outlet is operated by a broadcasting company that already has a station on the AM broadcast band, the same AM call letters may also be used on FM, followed by the letters "FM." (In other words, W71NY in New York City is owned by WOR. It may now be known as "WOR-FM" if its management so desires.)

(2) When the FM outlet is not connected with an AM station (or if the AM owner doesn't care to duplicate his call letters on both AM and FM), the FCC will assign a new four-letter call sign to replace the old, abandoned numeral-letter combination. As in ordinary broadcasting, the prefix "W" will indicate east and the "K" west of the Mississippi River.

Washington reports that there are still about 4,000 four-letter combinations that haven't been assigned to any radio service. (Three-letter ones are all in use.) Of these, approximately 1,100 start with "W" and 2,900 with "K." FM broadcasters have been permitted to inspect the list and choose which of the combinations they prefer to have assigned to them.

The Reasons

The system now discarded was based upon an arrangement devised several years ago by our South American neighbor, Chile. The numbers in the call sign gave a clew to the channel on which the station operated, while the final letter or letters provided an abbreviation of the city which it happened to serve. The "W" or "K" prefix had the same significance that it does now. Thus, the call letters K49KC identified a station as west of the Mississippi operating on a channel of 44.9 megacycles and located in Kansas City.

The FM broadcasters, as stated on this page several months ago, had found many faults with such a cumbersome arrangement ever since its original adoption on January 1, 1941, when FM first went on a commercial basis. These faults were carefully itemized in a petition sent to the Federal Communications Commission during July.

Briefly, it was stated that two and a half years' experience shows public acceptance of the numeral-letter combinations has been poor; that each time a station makes a minor shift to another place on the dial, its call letters must be changed, with the result that many people fail to recognize it again; that with the increase of FM stations it will become impossible to find suitable and unduplicated abbreviations for all the cities where they're located, causing confusion for everyone, including broadcasters and listeners. It was felt, furthermore, that the change should be made now, during war-time, rather than later when FM development has progressed so far as to make it highly difficult.

At this writing—which is in advance of the November 1 date when use of the new call letters begins—it is not possible to compile a full list of the new designations. These will appear, however, in an early issue of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE.

It is important for FM listeners to note that the change will not affect the place on the dial where they regularly tune in their favorite FM stations.

The Networks Know . . .

Indicative of the growing interest which America's major radio networks place in the future of frequency modulation is a report that the Blue Network, recently purchased by Edward J. Noble for \$8,000,000, is preparing to file applications at Washington for FM stations in New York, Chicago, Washington, San Francisco, Los Angeles and "other cities."

The Mutual Broadcasting System recently appointed a special committee to investigate more fully the post-war potentialities of FM with an eye to network operations. Many of the key stations on the MBS chain already own FM outlets—notably WGN in Chicago, the Don Lee Broadcasting System on the West Coast, and WOR, New York City.

Both the Columbia Broadcasting System and the National Broadcasting Company now have FM transmitters on the air. CBS maintains W67NY in New York City and W67C in Chicago, also has applications pending for large stations to serve considerable areas in

southern California and central New England. NBC transmits FM regularly from its W2XWG atop the Empire State Building in New York City, and before the war planned construction of a station for Chicago.

These already-existing networks will undoubtedly have to face the competition of new FM chains springing up in the post-war period.

For Best Results

Visitors at W45CM, Columbus, Ohio, get a preview of what the radio studio of tomorrow may be like when they see the special facilities installed by W45CM engineers to provide full-fidelity FM microphone pick-ups. The carefully designed studio (shown in the illustration above) can be adjusted quickly to allow varying degrees of acoustics, depending on the program being broadcast. Its ceiling, to prevent troublesome echoes, pitches upward about 12 inches to a "V" in the center. For the same reason, the end walls slope outward 18 inches between ceiling and floor, while the side walls have a zig zag pattern, slanting in and out every six feet.

A perforated facing on the walls can be easily removed and acoustic blocks placed under it wherever needed to give the best reverberation and minimum distortion of sound.

The floor is also unique. Since the precise placement of microphones, musicians and musical instruments is quite critical to obtain best tonal results, large rubber tiles permit mapping out the studio floor area on a "set-up sheet" so that a record may be kept and identical pick-up conditions duplicated whenever desired. W45CM is so satisfied with the tonal fidelity made possible by the studio that the station plans to pattern future ones along the same lines.

More When Peace Comes

Among the latest applications filed at Washington for permission to construct new FM stations as soon as the war ends are three that represent newspaper publishers in Georgia, Nebraska and Michigan.

The *Atlanta Constitution*, one of the largest and most famous newspapers in the South, wants to operate an FM outlet on 45.3 megacycles, serving an area of 7,380 square miles around Atlanta. In Omaha, Neb., the World Publishing Company plans a station on 45.5 megacycles, covering 11,660 square miles. And the *Times-Herald* Company of Port Huron, Mich., seeks approval for a transmitter on 47.7 megacycles to serve 5,600 square miles.

SWEET SIN-ATRA

wood was (and still is) trying to figure the whole thing out. Doctors held scientific discussions and looked in their medical journals and were a little stumped. The Sinatra craze was apparently the first mass epidemic of this period that a sulfa drug wouldn't cure.

And Hollywood citizenry was puzzled, too. "I don't see it," "I can't see what he's got," "What's he got, anyway?" they'd repeat over and over. Until finally one sage one advised them to "quit worrying about what Sinatra's got. Believe me, brother, he's got it!"

Hollywood sat back on its props and stared.

All of the stars with teen-age children heard Sinatra records at home all day. It was a little embarrassing to a few. Such as Allan Jones, who loves to tell this one on himself.

Allan and Irene Hervey Jones' thirteen-year-old daughter had just heard Sinatra's air show. "Daddy," she said sagely, "when you can sing half as well as he can you'll get some place." Allan doesn't dare vocalize around his own home. Couldn't anyway, unless he wants to sing a duet with Sinatra. She plays his records all day.

Orson Welles, who has listened to Sinatra ever since he sang with Tommy Dorsey's band, is one of his most loyal fans. He tells the one about the two girls walking out of the tent of his own "Mercury Wonder Production" magic show, just at the crucial moment when he was sawing the woman in half. "We thought Frank Sinatra was going to be here," they said. Welles thought it was so funny he planted it in the show from then on. And of course came the night at that moment when Frank did walk in.

Another moot question around Hollywood about this time was that of "being sent." It became a byword all over Movietown. Are you being sent? Does he send you? Everybody sarcastically asking everybody else. Soon the transportation problem was well settled. Everybody but the diehards and those with ulcers were being "sent." I gave my landlady broadcast tickets and he even "sent" her. I'm convinced.

The boys like his voice, too. Singing at the Hollywood Canteen proved that. It was Harry James' night at the Canteen and the first reunion of Sinatra and James since they worked together some four years back. The brass section got their first vacation in years as the violins swung out sweetly and Sinatra gave out with *Embraceable You*.

Sinatra sends and James sends. And together they go faster than air mail.

The Canteen was jammed that night with soldiers, sailors and Marines who sat down cross-legged on the floor in front of the bandstand and listened to Frank. He sent them too—right back to their own gals in Oshkosh and Kalamazoo. After the encores, they hoisted him to their shoulders and carried him all over the Canteen. More than they've ever done for anybody, including Betty Grable.

About this time a reactionary wave sprang up of the I-like-Bing-Crosby-better school of thought. Immediately, for no good reason, people started heatedly taking sides. That didn't trouble Frank. He agreed with those who favored Bing. He'd turn himself off any time to hear Bing sing.

"Bing was my first ideal and still is," he'll tell you. "We don't sing alike at all. Besides, there's plenty

of room for four or five popular singers."

He'll remind you that it was Bing who first started him off. Way back years ago when he himself was a cub sports reporter on the *Jersey Observer* and he had taken his best girl, Nancy, (who's now his wife) to a concert to hear Bing sing.

If it hadn't been for Crosby he would probably still be beating out columns on the *Observer* and watching the city editor cut them down to a line. Journalism is his second love, and even now when something exciting is happening to him he'll say, "Wait till the *Joisey Observer* hears about this."

The real comparison between Bing Crosby and Frank Sinatra lies not in their songs but in their shirts. And, so far, Frank wins by a wild plaid. He loves loud shirts, blue checkered ones, and those in which red and yellow crossfire. Remark about them and Frank says, "Oh, I left my really wild ones in New York," and looks down apologetically at a little number that's all but putting out your eyes.

HE LOVES sports coats of any kind, especially the famous corduroy jackets he wears. His favorites are a cream-colored one and a deep brown. He pays plenty for them and has them made to order by a famous tailor in New York. He loves—as who doesn't know?—bow ties. Particularly polka-dot ones. Once made news headlines in the Hollywood trade papers when he appeared at the Canteen in a four-in-hand.

He likes sporty convertibles. At home he drives a handsome Chrysler. In Hollywood he rented a battered Ford convertible for forty-two bucks a week.

He's almost child-like in his enthusiasm about anything. He likes sports of all kinds—swimming, badminton, and particularly prize-fights. A jiver at heart, when in Hollywood he likes to go to the old hangouts, especially the Palladium, and get hep with the rest of the mob.

Although twenty-five years old he looks more like nineteen. He resembles the boy you should have married back home and Nancy did. His most attractive features are his vivid blue eyes and a smile bigger than Roosevelt's. His face always lights up when he sings.

Sinatra loves to laugh. He loves crowds, excitement, and things constantly happening. The only time he's on edge is when things quiet down. Highstrung and restless by nature, he can't stand to wait for anything, and loves to keep the gong kicking around.

Of very friendly disposition, he always likes to have crowds around him. Didn't need to worry in Hollywood on that score. One week here and he had a longer yes-line than DeMille. He was the Pied Piper of Song. Stringing along behind him were the boys from all the different bands, agents, song pluggers and I-knew-him-whens. Something like a snake-dance in a football rally in school, the way it kept building up. When he walked down Vine Street the Sinatra Special stretched from the Brown Derby to Hollywood Boulevard.

He has a terrific sense of humor and likes jokes on himself when they don't hit below the belt. He laughed long and hard when "Archie" Gardner on a "Command Performance" broadcast called him "a piccolo with a bow-tie." But Archie didn't laugh. Sinatra's fans out front resented the remark so much Archie wanted a bodyguard to take him home.

On one occasion a Hollywood critic

who doesn't sing called Sinatra's singing "off-key." Later he visited him at RKO over on the picture set. "You're the guy who panned the dickens out of me, aren't you?" said Frankie, smiling and not upset. "Tell you what we'll do," he went on. "I'll get the Hollywood Bowl for you and you sing and I'll write your column. I understand you sing in your shower. A couple of people next door say you're pretty bad. Even worse than me."

The critic laughed. But they didn't rent the Bowl.

His fans have gone to his heart but not to his head. He's very proud of the some four thousand fan letters a week that kept attractive blond Grace Clarke of CBS dizzy taking them in, considers each fan a personal friend.

He never refuses an autograph-seeker and always stops to talk to them whenever he can. He talks to them at the broadcasts, answering all the questions they ask. He's the only one who can "shush" the squeals of admirers at all. He raises a hand and the squealing stops. And now and then he smiles and shakes his head puzzledly when they get completely out of bounds.

His first "Hit Parade" show from the West Coast was a fairly quiet affair. The sirens didn't wail so loudly. And one of his pals in the wings kidded him, saying, "Oh, well, Frankie, it's the California sun. It just beats everything out of them."

Sinatra smiled. "Gee," he said, "it's wonderful to be able to sing a song once all the way through."

In New York they say you can't hear him at all. Well, the next broadcast in Hollywood you could hear him twice as much as you could hear him in Manhattan. The feminine comman-does really closed in.

The fan clubs picked up out here, too. To the "Sighing Society of Sinatra Swooners," "Moonlight Sinatras," "Slaves of Sinatra," and "Girls Who Would Lay Down Their Lives and Die for Frank Sinatra Club," was added a lively West Coast chapter, "The Swimming Society of Sinatra Swooners—We'd DROWN For You" girls.

IN HOLLYWOOD the kids stand in line for eight hours before a show. Always out in front are his most loyal fans—two cute little Chinese girls—Maxine and Leatrice Lue—who will stand those eight hours holding Sinatra scrapbooks bigger than they are. One day they pooled their money and bought him a white-linen monogrammed handkerchief and sent it backstage at the "Broadway Band-box" rehearsal. With it went a note asking him to wear it that night at the show. When he came on stage he had the handkerchief sticking up so high out of his pocket the audience thought he was waving a banner. Just so the kids out front could see.

There were times during the first hectic Hollywood days when he didn't even have time to eat. I've seen him rehearsing with a chicken sandwich in one side of his mouth and a straw full of milk chocolate sticking out the other. And even with his mouth full he sings swell.

Sinatra has a passionate love for three things—music, spaghetti and banana splits.

We found this out between rehearsals when we were all in Mike Lyman's restaurant next door to the CBS Vine Street Theater and Frank was polishing off coffee and lemon-cream pie.

We were a little concerned about how the hunk of pie would affect one of those long notes.

"Huh," said Frank, "you should see me polishing off banana splits in New

York. I'm at my best after three splits."

George Evans, his press-agent, who always has the job of finding a place where you can get banana splits, bore him out on it. George said they used to pound the pavement after every show at the Paramount Theater looking for a place where you could get them. Finally Evans found a little Greek joint on Seventy-Second Street where they had them. He wanted Sinatra (who hates to sit still) to pose for three hours for pictures that afternoon. In return he would divulge the hiding-place of the bananas. "You're on!" said Frank. And whenever he could get away Evans would find him down at the Greek joint downing those splits.

He's also in good voice after spaghetti. He can eat it for breakfast and three times a day. And his first official act the day he landed in Hollywood was to visit an old spaghetti haunt on Calhenga Avenue where the band boys all go. It's called "Casa D'Amore," after the showman and proprietor, Frank D'Amore. But Sinatra and all the boys usually refer to it as "Patsy's" (D'Amore's brother and the chef). This was his first stop en route from the train.

"Well, boys, I finally made it," Sinatra said to the proprietors, taking his old place in one of the blue booths. "Yes-a, you deed!" they chorused. Then all of them celebrated by opening a bottle of wine and eating quantities of pizzas and spaghetti with Marinara sauce.

Over the spaghetti they rehashed old times and remarked about the difference in Sinatra's Hollywood entrance this time and that some four years ago when the Harry James gang landed here only to find the Palomar (where they had bookings) burned, and went on to the Victor Hugo just in time to close it down. No money. No nothing. And Frank's wife, Nancy, with little Nancy Sandra on the way.

There's a big red juke-box in the corner of the spaghetti parlor that usually has, for business reasons, selections played by all the bands who come into the place. But when Sinatra is in town it plays nothing but his records.

Sinatra doesn't read a note of music, but hopes to learn some day when he has time. He considers the lyrics by far the most important part of a song. "A singer is a story-teller," he says. "Music is just a backdrop to a very pretty poem. Songs are poetry set to music."

He reads the lyrics and if he likes them he has his companion and pianist, Hank Sanicola, run over the song with him.

Night and Day is still his all-time favorite, although *I'll Never Smile Again* is pretty close to his heart.

All the boys in Tommy Dorsey's band knew Ruth Lowe, who wrote the lyrics to *I'll Never Smile Again* after her fiance had just died. They thought the song was terrific. Several bands recorded it, and when the Dorsey gang listened to them they shuddered and said, "They're killing the tune."

They were way down south somewhere playing an engagement when they decided to dash back to New York and record it before the song was too far gone. They canceled a date, loaded into a bus, and rode day and night, rehearsing on the bus as they rode. They arrived in New York around 10:00 a.m., got off the bus, and, without any sleep or food, Sinatra

made the record that sold close to a million. One of the biggest hits ever made.

"Higher and Higher" is Sinatra's fourth film, having been preceded by "Ship Ahoy" at M-G-M, "Las Vegas Nights" at Universal and "Reveille With Beverly" at Columbia. But he did next to nothing in any of them.

He is very happy over his career, now that his contract difficulties with Dorsey are settled, and he can see himself maybe keeping some of the half-million he'll make this year. At present Sinatra's worth more than his 136 pounds in gold, what with the three picture deal at RKO, two radio shows and personal appearances.

He's very enthused about "Higher and Higher," in which he co-stars with Jack Haley and Michele Morgan. He loves the songs in the film—*The Music Stopped, I Couldn't Sleep a Wink Last Night, You Belong in a Love Song*, with lyrics all tailor-made for the Sinatra style.

Back East he lives in a ten-room home in Hasbrouck Heights with his wife, Nancy, and their three-year-old daughter, Nancy Sandra, a beautiful child with brown curls and blue eyes. His parents live in Hoboken, where his dad is a member of the Hoboken Fire Department, and although a good fireman, can't begin to put out the fires started by his own son.

HIS wife is the little girl next door he grew up wanting to marry. She's the stabilizing influence in his life. After the first Hollywood Bandbox show she wired him, "Congratulations, darling, you've done it again!" She takes care of some of the fan mail, especially all the proposals of marriage, to which she answers, "Rejected—with thanks."

According to those who know him back home Frank is a completely swoonless sort of guy, who spends most of his time in the workshop fitted up in his basement, surrounded by creations which he paints in his best imitation of a Rube Goldberg.

The two Nancys adore their Frankie, but refuse to be too overly impressed. After they've braved one of the swoon sessions at a broadcast and are pulling away from the mob, his wife will nudge him and say, "You big CELEBRITY you!" And Sinatra, rettying his tie and reassembling himself, will grin. "Gee, Ma, I can't help it."

When in Hollywood he usually stays in a small apartment at the Garden of Allah. Near by you'll always find his four faithfuls—George Evans, press-agent; Hank Sanicola, accompanist; Axel Stordahl, conductor; and Little Frankie, his cousin—all of them most loyal Sinatra fans. George Evans, top New York publicist, will admit under very heavy pressure that publicity has helped, but will tell you that no amount of fainting and squealing could do the job if Sinatra didn't have what it takes when he sings.

Song-writers bear him out on this, saying that Sinatra is unquestionably the number 1 singer of the nation, because he sings with so much feeling. "He sings every song as though it were a part of him," they declare.

So don't sell Sinatra short. Those long, sliding, trombone-effect notes are the result of six years of very hard work in perfecting this style.

Now, I think this just about covers the case of Sinatra. At least I'm all covered again. As this goes to press, it's time for another Sinatra broadcast. We just left Lyman's for the theater, and the siren is starting up again, and I'm being swoon-stampeded all over. It's getting very dark. I can't see a thing. This must be where I came in. At the bottom of the stack.

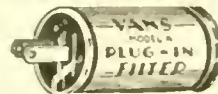

come up with the strongest teams in the country. But it is not only in the Midwest where good football will be played. Down south a great many colleges are looking forward to the best season they have had in many years and some new names to big-time football will be appearing. Out on the Pacific Coast the football picture looks scrambled but interesting.

The National Broadcasting Company is making its plans to cover the biggest and best games, wherever they occur, each Saturday afternoon. We opened our season on the 25th of August with the All-Star game in Chicago, and will conclude it on January 1 with the Rose Bowl game in Pasadena, California.

There is another new element to be considered this year and that is the millions of servicemen overseas who are vitally interested in these broadcasts, and the National Broadcasting Company has made special arrangements with the Office of War Information that each football game broadcast by NBC will be followed by a complete resume, which will be recorded and short-waved to our troops around the world.

Another thing which will make this football season more interesting will be the ascendancy of certain service teams, such as the preflight schools, Camp Grant and Great Lakes, not to mention the other service teams which are bound to spring up.

Looking over the national picture, I would say that not only will we have plenty of football this fall but, because of the experience of some of the transferees who will be playing for new colleges, and also because of the inexperience of the freshmen who will be playing in varsity competition, we will see in general a wide-open brand of football with emphasis on the scoring, and more forward passing and less emphasis on the old style of power football. The teams will, in general, play stronger offensive games and weaker defensive games, which will bring higher scores, which should be in the public's favor; for, thanks to the Southwest, the public has learned to love a wide-open game. Don't worry about the future of football. We will have plenty of good football this year; as good as we have ever had and maybe a little better. It will be played under unusual circumstances, but football has always been an unusual game.

of his dad, a gentleman who owned a ranch and wore custom-made cowboy boots. That opportunity, coupled with the fact that Tom Mix, Buck Jones and Ken Maynard always had been young Roy's heroes, planted the seed of ambition to become a movie star. But in between the planting of that seed and its flowering in his present success lay a trail of eatless days.

The year 1929 was not a good one to go job-hunting in California, or anywhere else, for that matter. And that was the one that Roy arrived on the Coast. He picked fruit, drove trucks, helped build part of the state highway between Newhall and Castaic, California—the same route over which he travels nowadays to get to location spots.

Radio gave him his first real shove toward success. He entered an amateur contest sponsored by a small station in Inglewood, California, and although he didn't win the prize, it gave him courage to make a beginning as an entertainer.

A young man who had heard him sing at the station asked him if he would be interested in forming a cowboy band. Roy would, and the "International Cowboys" were launched. They weren't "international" and they weren't "cowboys," but they had a lot of fun. One of the boys was married and the four others boarded with him, paying what they could—when they could.

It was during these lean days that Roy met Arlene Wilkins, the Roswell, New Mexico, girl who became his wife in 1936. Roy and his troupe found themselves broke in Roswell, went to the local radio station and made a deal to sing for their auto-court bill. But that didn't solve the problem of eating. When they told over the radio what they were hungry for, the townspeople began bringing food to the station. Among them was lovely, brown-haired Arlene, who brought two lemon pies especially for Roy because he had announced that they were his favorite dish.

After the Roswell episode, Roy and his troupe broke up and returned to Los Angeles, and Roy spent the next year on a Montana ranch. Here he learned all the chores he had been singing about as a "cowboy tenor," and gained the practical experience that fitted him for movie stardom as "King of the Cowboys."

Sinatra?" The question was strictly unfair. Judy knew its intent.

"You can't compare the two. Bing is an institution. Sinatra is a fine singer—maybe he's even wonderful, but he's just beginning."

Then we fell to talking about the insulting things that people are saying about Frankie Sinatra. The lad can't open his mouth without someone twisting his words to give him an edge of conceit. "I'm not an expert," Judy volunteered, "but I understand he's a nice person. I think a lot of people make a target of him because he's had the courage to sing with symphony orchestras. He did that to help people who needed it, and he probably knew that it wouldn't be like singing with bands used to the type of songs he does. I admire his fortitude."

JUDY has considerable fortitude of her own. She proved that vividly when after two years of urging she dared to sing—where no Hollywood actress had sung before—in Philadelphia's Robin Hood Dell. While ten thousand people were turned away, Judy sang a medley of Gershwin tunes, accompanied by the great Andre Kostelanetz and the ninety-piece Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra. The affair was a rhythmic riot. While Judy encored with such favorites of her own as *Embraceable You* and *Bidin' My Time*, babies were lost, police bounced gate-crashers, the crowd crushed toward the stage demanding more, and high-minded music critics sat entranced.

Judy didn't tell me this. The next morning's Philadelphia papers told the story.

That same morning, Judy was already in New York prowling around music publishers, buying up standard music sheets on all the popular songs. Few people are aware that Judy sings always to special arrangements in her pictures. Because she does little radio work, she doesn't know all the popular songs, and she didn't want to let her soldier audience down. In a couple of days, she had all the lyrics pat. She was ready for anything and she got it.

Army camps are no novelty to Judy. She was at Fort Ord on December 7, 1941, when the Pearl Harbor news broke. This last jaunt took her through Pennsylvania, Indiana and Illinois, and there never has been a more triumphant tour. Beginning at ten in the morning, she worked shows until nine at night, doing sixty songs a day. She had packed a supply of vitamin pills to keep her energy up, but she forgot them in a hotel en route.

"It didn't make any difference. I imagine I'm the only actress who actually gained weight during one of these tours. I took all my meals in the mess halls and there never was enough notice for them to cook up anything special. I hope the boys who write home and say 'Dear Mom, Judy Garland had lunch with us today,' will mention my appetite."

In some camps, the only way Judy could keep from being mobbed on entering the mess halls was to yell to all the men to sit on the floor so they could have a community sing.

"I suppose that knowing me for some time you'll be writing some things I don't like," Judy told me gravely. "but do me one favor. I know that I'm just a young actress and that outside the theater that doesn't in itself amount to much. But I am a young American, too. I've just

returned from traveling a good many hundreds of miles on all sorts of trains, jam packed. I've talked with soldiers who couldn't get home on leave because the trains were full. I know you hear it on the radio and read it in advertisements, but isn't there any way to convince people who haven't any real reason for traveling to stay home? I wish everyone taking an idle trip could have this refrain stamped into their heads: *This trip may cost some soldier the last sight he could ever have of his loved ones!*"

Whether you like it or not, Judy is genuinely concerned. Too many Americans, she thinks, have an "except me" attitude about these things.

Judy thinks that girls are going to find their young men a great deal changed when they come home on furlough. For instance, while Army life may make the man more courteous and thoughtful, it will also make him impatient of the shallow type whose home-town dates get more or less serious. He wants all his cards on the table. He doesn't mind competition, but he won't take it just to please a girl's vanity. Not having much money to spend, he'll be impatient at waste of it, and he'll like as not be buying more war bonds in proportion to his income than his friends back home, because a war bond is a weapon to him, not just a patriotic gesture.

When it comes to songs, Judy has lined up a hit parade of her own. These are the songs the men like most to hear:

We're Off to See the Wizard
You Made Me Love You
You'll Never Know
As Time Goes By
Don't Get Around Much Anymore
Over the Rainbow

"And one that really sends them," Judy enthuses, "is *It's a Great Day for the Irish*."

A mere man usually fails miserably to reveal the feminine side of a star to the distaff portion of his audience, but in this case an exception is claimed, for Judy has female companions who readily reveal a splendid collection of confidential notes.

Whoever said Judy doesn't go to beauty parlors is wrong. She doesn't like to have people fuss with her hair, but she has long since given up setting her own. Judy has as much trouble as anyone else these days in getting clothes cleaned. On her trips she has several muslin linings made and simply changes them instead of sending her clothes out to be cleaned. Furthermore, she's discovered that girls buy too many clothes on the theory that a plentiful wardrobe will make her popular with men. Out of a dozen new creations, she discovered only three soldiers really liked and she stuck with those. One was a simple afternoon frock, another a close-fitting suit with frilly blouse, and the last a demure, high-neck evening gown.

Her one big trouble has been that people who knew her as Judy the little girl keep on treating her that way. She has to let them know that she's on a par with other adult stars on her studio lot and nobody to be "coddled" in conversation. This, of course, sometimes results in people thinking she's slightly impressed with herself—which isn't so.

Judy does know who she is, though. She'd be a dope if she didn't.

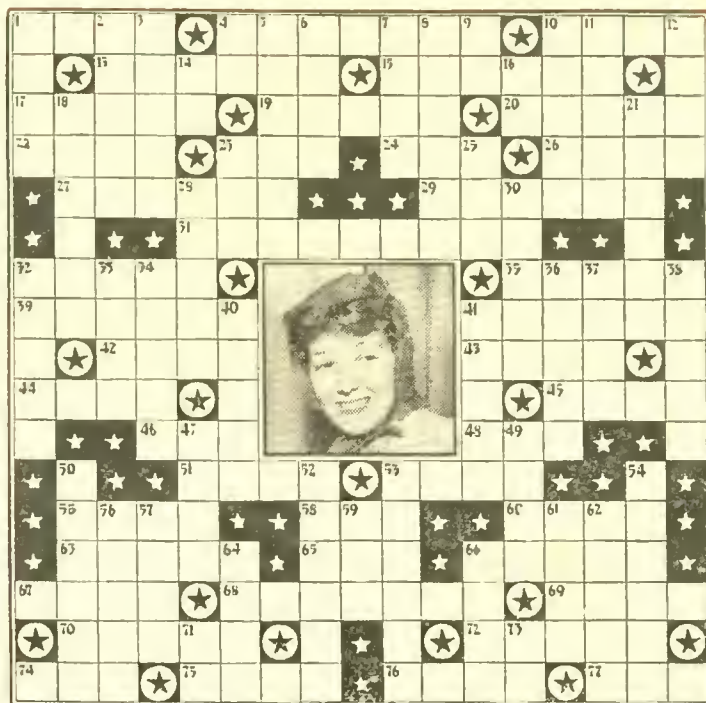

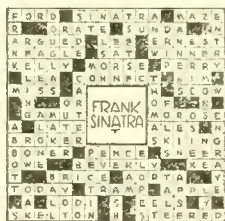

and skins can be easily removed. Shell, remove skins, and cook gently in enough boiling, salted water to cover, 20 minutes. Drain and chop fine. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well.

Cranberry Mold

- 1 package lemon Jell-O
- 1½ cups warm water
- ½ cup celery, finely cut
- ½ cup canned crushed pineapple
- 1 cup thick cranberry sauce, sweetened

Dissolve Jell-O in warm water. Chill. When slightly thickened, add celery, pineapple, and cranberry sauce. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise. Or serve plain as relish. Serves 6.

Down-South Biscuits

- 4 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¾ cup lard
- ¾ cup buttermilk or sour milk

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, and salt and sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk gradually until soft dough is formed. Turn on floured board and knead lightly 2 minutes. Roll ¼ inch thick; cut with small floured cutter. Bake in shallow pan in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 12 minutes. Makes 2½ dozen biscuits.

Cranberry and Raisin Tapioca

- ½ cup seedless raisins
- 1 cup water
- 1½ cups halved, raw cranberries
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- 1 cup water
- 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt

Cook raisins and 1 cup water over direct heat 5 minutes. Wash cranberries. Add cranberries and 4 tablespoons sugar to raisins; cover and cook 5 minutes longer, or until done. Place 1 cup water in top of double boiler and bring to a boil over direct heat. Combine tapioca, remaining 4 tablespoons sugar, and salt; add gradually to water and bring to a brisk boil, stirring constantly. Place immediately over rapidly boiling water and cook 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool; mixture clears and thickens as it cools. When slightly cool, add cranberry mixture. Chill. Serve in sherbet glasses with plain or whipped cream. Serves 6.

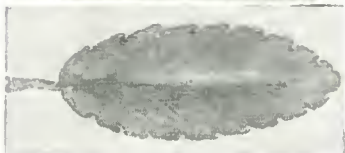

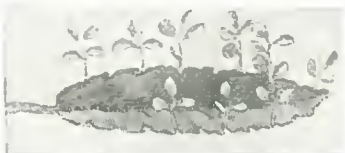

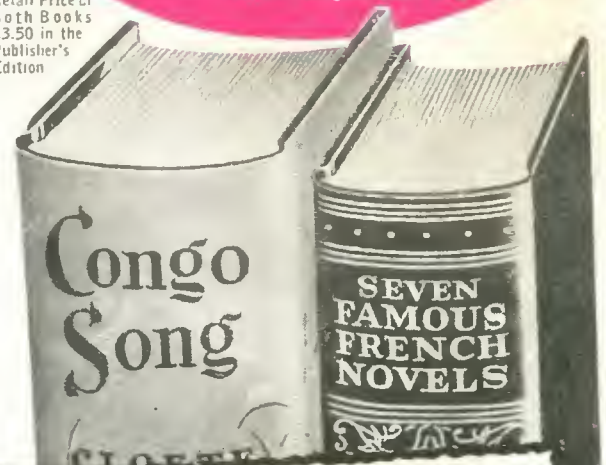
