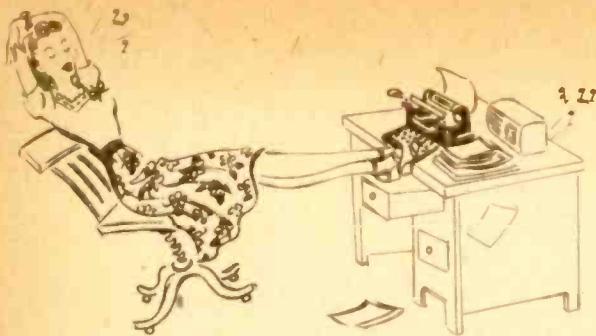

HEDDA HOPPER'S hats may be bizarre. Her reports on Hollywood may be sophisticated. But her heart is as tender as a baby's.

She always weeps when a movie is sentimental and at the office, they have to keep the fan mail away from her lest she disperse lavish and indiscriminate donations to persons claiming distress.

So says the woman who knows Hedda Hopper better than anyone else — her frank, straight-shooting, much-respected manager, Dema Harshbarger. Deliberately, Dema has gone about the business of making Hedda Hopper successful by making her disliked.

Eight years ago, Hedda burst into Dema's new-in-Hollywood office after the stout, gray-haired executive had avoided talking with her on the phone. "I had her confused with Edna Wallace Hopper," explains Dema deprecatingly.

Hedda, patently annoyed at the brush-off, hitched her dazzling red leather coat and demanded: "Who do you think you are? A gawdness?"

"She didn't wait to see who I thought I was," chuckles Dema. "Instead, she came right to the point."

"I wanna get on that air!"

Hedda Tells Story

Intrigued by Miss Hopper's candor, Dema listened to her story. "In two hours," she recalls, "Hedda had told me what it would have taken me five years to learn about Hollywood.

"What are you doing with your knowledge," I demanded," continued Dema. "And when I found it wasn't bringing her a dime—that she was trying to make a living selling real estate for the Frank Meline Company, I said, 'You are a high class servant for Hollywood. You help the wives of the big executives pick out their clothes. The men want you to, because you've got chic. You help them plan their smart parties because you're a clever hostess. You rate the social register, but no parts in pictures. You're giving away your charm, your talents, and your savoir faire. The trouble with you is, you're sweet to everybody and everybody likes you!"

"What you've got to do is make some people dislike you. Instead of being sweet and sugar-coating the news, write the news as it is, even if it makes 'em sore. Folks may not like the truth, but they'll respect you. And if you want to be in a position to pull no punches, don't accept any presents that will obligate you!"

It took a year to sell Hedda Hopper for an airshow, six months to launch her on her Hollywood column. Today, that column, "Hedda Hopper's Hollywood," is syndicated in more than eighty-two metropolitan dailies and 5,000 other weekly sheets throughout the United States. Her new airshow, sponsored by Ar-

mour and Company ("I've been roasting hams, now I'll try selling 'em") carries her voice coast to coast for a quarter-hour every Monday through more than 141 outlets of the Columbia Broadcasting System. She owns her own eight-room home in Beverly Hills, three annuities, and drags down a yearly income crowding six figures. Dema estimates that sixty per cent of the people dislike Hedda; forty per cent like her.

"If it goes too far, say thirty-five who like and sixty-five who dislike, we can swing the balance back," commented the jovial manager assuredly. "Hedda has charm," she added significantly.

Shortly after starting her column, Miss Hopper became used to being confronted by angry stars gasping, "Hedda, how dare you print what you did about me!"

"Didn't Make Rules"

"I didn't make the rules," she shrugs neutrally, and proceeds to "dish it out," piping hot. "I try to write more good than bad," she commented, "but good isn't news. It's much easier to write about El-

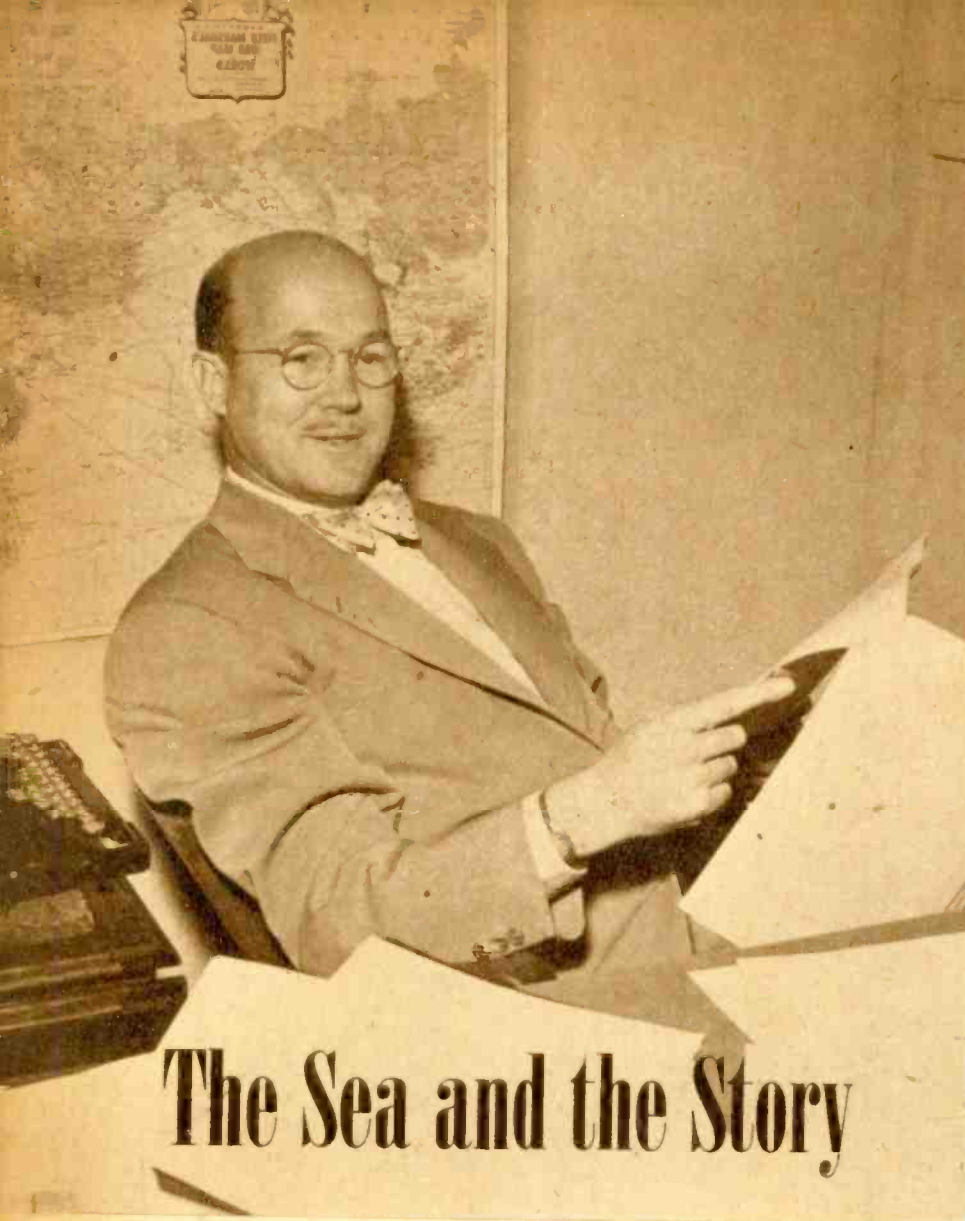

The Sea and the Story

Big Political, Social, Economic Factors of Pacific Are Dealt with On This Informative NBC Program

ARNOLD MARQUIS has run the gamut from foreign correspondent, to director and producer of stage productions, to his present job as top-notch NBC author and producer. The bespectacled radio personality with a special liking for yellow bow-ties not only writes NBC's famous "Pacific Story," but he also produces it every Sunday night over a transcontinental hook-up.

"Pacific Story" grew out of talk concerning the importance of the

Pacific in the world picture. The general feeling when it began was that, with Europe devastated, a new and promising world will be built up around the Pacific. With this in mind, "Pacific Story" saw the light of a studio "On the Air" signal. The basic plan of the program at its inception was to inform people of factors in the Pacific as well as to show them the relationship of these same factors to life in this country. The plan has not changed, although events have.

Formation of the program took many months. It was conceived by Jennings Pierce, director of public service programs for NBC on the

West Coast and Inez Richardson, of Stanford university.

No Over-All Experts

Making contacts with experts on different phases of life in the Pacific was in itself a major job. It was soon discovered, moreover, that there are no over-all experts on the Pacific. Either a man has a smattering of information about the whole thing or else he is an expert on one part of the Pacific, and then often on only one aspect of that.

Many outstanding experts in the country were contacted, says Marquis. This group was comprised entirely of men and women of recognized position and respected judgment. For the first thirteen weeks Owen Lattimore acted as counselor for the then new series. Mr. Lattimore was President Roosevelt's emissary to Chiang Kai-Shek when the war broke out and he is recognized as a foremost authority on China.

And as the programs began to unfold and pile up—the first, the second, the third—only then did Marquis actually visualize the series in its true perspective. Only then could he be dazzled by the tremendous project he had undertaken, and say, almost fervently, "What a terrific job!"

At the end of the first thirteen weeks a number of leading experts on a number of different subjects were invited to participate on "Pacific Story." Two of the most well-known of these were Pearl S. Buck, author of "Dragon Seed" and "The Good Earth" and Henry Luce, publisher of Time, Life and Fortune.

Pacific's Importance

"We are interested," says Marquis, "in the big political, social and economic factors that will determine the kind of world there will be in the Pacific, as well as our own future in regard to it. Without pride or prejudice we lay all of our cards right on the table. We can only say 'This is all the situation on one point.' We could never attempt to draw any conclusions. We let the listener figure out his own conclusions after he has heard all the facts on an issue."

Today "Pacific Story" is set up three months in advance of the actual broadcast time of a program. This is to enable anticipation of military operations. Marquis likes to dramatize a part of the Pacific, or a problem of the Pacific, just before it comes into the focus of wide public attention.

In fact, "Pacific Story" featured a story about the Caroline Islands on the very day before they were bombed. Up to that time they had

been considered impregnable. New York papers called Marquis long-distance the next day to ask him his source of information!

But Marquis' source of information is his own enormous pool of facts from which he may draw at any time. He inspects the facts at his fingertips and proceeds to figure out the way events are going, along with probable future action. His guesses are not guesswork; they are scientific. And they are accurate because of the tremendous amount of research backing up each performance of "Pacific Story."

Marquis has an assistant, Mary Behner, whose job it is to follow his leads and assignments on research. He tells her specifically what facts he wants and which angle to follow in digging them up. Delving into information about the Pacific is extremely difficult because data is so closely interwoven. Sufficient research time must be allowed for untangling the facts, one from the other.

Incidentally, all the research material accumulated by Marquis for "Pacific Story" is now in the master files of NBC. This data being on hand, it may be used for background material at any time. NBC contacts throughout the world have access to this vitally important information. Even in Guam, newsmen would be unable to accumulate as much news about Guam as Marquis has gathered together in the master files in the process of his studies.

"Unlimited Horizons," an NBC public service program about American scientists and their work for humanity, was written and produced by Marquis before his present project. The series attracted nationwide attention and acclaim, and was discontinued for the duration only because scientists, along with everybody else in the country, have gone to war.

Research Trips Difficult

Likewise, transportation is on wartime footing, making research trips by Marquis difficult, if not entirely impossible. After the start of the war, and before the science series was discontinued, it was not at all unusual for Marquis to find himself stranded in small towns in Texas, Arizona and Nevada. Big shows, endless assignments and the midnight oil were awaiting him in Hollywood, yet he would be stranded on just one lap of a gruelling research trip.

Today Marquis states that he definitely does not have time for any other writing above and beyond his immediate assignments. In his own words, he is "just keeping a step ahead of a tidal wave." He does, how-

ever, have an idea book crammed full of script, show and radio-technique suggestions. He hopes someday to find time to sit down with this idea book and work out some of his favorite schemes.

In the meantime, in addition to "Pacific Story," Marquis does special services for NBC. Whenever there arise special jobs involving direction and writing, or both, they fall his way. Also, whenever New York NBC shows are switched to Hollywood, Marquis produces them at first, launching them under the careful surveillance of an acknowledged master at his business.

In Other War

During World War I, when Mar-

He Calls His Shots

Larry Smith Uses No Crystal Ball, But His Predictions of Things to Come in Pacific War Have Been Phenomenally Correct

WHEN I ENTERED the office of Larry Smith, NBC's commentator and expert on Far Eastern affairs, I expected to find a crystal ball, a copper bowl with the false bottom, or at least some of the accoutrements of a

Japanese fortune teller. Smith's predictions of things to come in Japan and in the Pacific war have been that phenomenally correct. Instead I found an office with the walls covered by war maps, most of them lined by arrows and trails made by colored pencils. Larry calls them his "guessing lines," but his record of analysis proves them to be far more than that. They are actually his working chart, upon which are superimposed not only logical military moves, but Japanese moves dictated by the various idiosyncrasies, the warped psychologies, and the traditional fetishes of the Nipponese, learned by his close contact with the little brown people over a period of years.

Larry started out more than a year ago calling the turn of war's Wheel of Fortune in the Pacific, well in advance of the actual happenings. Two months ago, in early May to be exact, he said that the Tojo government would not last out the month of July. In May, he predicted that the main islands would be bombed before the end of June. The B-29 bombers struck Yamata the first time June 15. In early June he predicted that Admiral Nimitz' force would invade some island of the Marianas. A few days later American Marines landed on Saipan. While that military move was in its early days, Smith reasoned, on the air, that Saipan offered only one harbor, Magicienne Bay, which was literally a graveyard for ships during the typhoon season, and foresaw an invasion of either Truk or Guam to furnish a naval base needed for our westward progress toward Manila or the coast of China. We all know that that too, was correct. Backing up a little, Smith predicted a landing on Biak island, off the north coast of New Guinea and, in his prediction, specified the very day on which the invasion actually occurred. Still earlier than that, he missed the invasion of Munda, on New Georgia, by exactly eighteen minutes.

Not Pacific Expert Only

But Smith's foresight is not confined to the Pacific area. He called the turn on the first invasion of Italy; missed the fall of Rome by

The Past!—A Few of Smith's Predictions:

May 26: "MacArthur is ready for another move. This time perhaps to some island in the Geelvink Bay area. It could be Biak, and it would not surprise me to see it happen this week-end!"

May 29. "American Marines are today smoking cigarets less than a thousand miles from Mindanao, in the Philippines. They landed Saturday on Biak island!"

May 10. "Admiral Nimitz will hardly launch a frontal attack on Truk. More likely he will by-pass that power house of the Japs and reach out for Guam, or some other island of the western Carolines or the Marianas."

June 9. "There is every indication that Admiral Nimitz has his eye on some island of the Marianas, perhaps Guam, Tinfal or Saipan, as stepping stones to Manila and to Japan proper."

June 14. "American Marines and soldiers are fighting on the beaches of Saipan!"

July 18. "The ousting of Admiral Shimada as the Jap navy chief, despite reports to the contrary, is the beginning of the collapse of the Tojo cabinet. No Japanese leader can sit at the top of the totem pole after he loses face. Tojo's hours are numbered, despite the experts' insistence that all is well in Tokyo."

July 20. "Tojo's cabinet collapses, and with it goes all his stooges!"

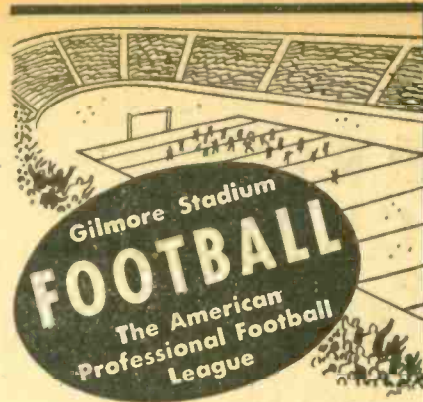

August 28. "Sir Bruce Fraser's appointment to the British Far Eastern fleet means new action in the Indian ocean, and new raids on Sumatra. It can also mean a three-pronged attack against the Japs. Nimitz from the Marianas, MacArthur from New Guinea and Fraser from India. From Sumatra his job will be to flush the Japanese Navy into the Pacific!"

August 29. "The big naval battle of the Pacific will be fought to the west of the Bonins, and it will be a part of our battle to take those bases. Once there, our bombers will be daily callers on the Japanese corridor of war industries, that narrow corridor which strings itself out between Tokyo on the north and Kobe on the south."

September 1. "The monsoons are wringing themselves out in Burma. It should be a sign, with the drying winds due soon, that Fraser and Mountbatten are cooking up something for Hirohito, and it isn't sukuyakil!"

nine days; predicted that Heinrich Himmler would be the number one man of Nazi Germany even before the fall of Hitler, and that Germany would attempt to split the allies by seeking a separate peace with Soviet Russia. This peace move, he says, is doomed to failure, because Stalin is an opportunist, and because Russia in her newfound dignity among nations, is going to take full advantage of her standing in a post-war world with all of its commercial possibilities.

Russia will also come into the war against Japan, Smith believes further, because on a trip to Vladivostok, Siberia, he heard the Russians precede each drink with the toast "To Dairen," the all-year port which Japan obtained in the peace conferences following the Russo-Jap war. Russia knows that to have a voice at the Pacific peace table, she must have something by which she can ask for, and bargain for, the return of her lost Port Arthur peninsula.

As to the war in the Pacific, the crack commentator says that the greatest danger lies not in the winning of the war, but in the winning of the peace, which he says is the absolute defeat of Japan, the elimination of Shintoism and the upheaval of the royal family, from Hirohito on down.

Basis For Conviction

The reason, Smith says, is that Hirohito is the symbol of Shintoism, and under the so-called religion, which he contends is not a religion at all, he maintains the theory that Japan is destined to be the ruling nation and the Japanese the ruling people of all the world. Only through proving to the Japanese people that Hirohito's feet are made of clay, that Shintoism is only cohesive force to bind the people blindly to the will of the ruling class, can the Japanese be made ca-

pable of taking their place in a civilized world.

Those remarks, made in Salt Lake City during a recent Bond Selling tour in which Larry toured three western states, Utah, Wyoming and Colorado, brought out a lead editorial in the Salt Lake City TELEGRAM, which read in part:

"The most important statements Larry Smith makes concerning the war in the Pacific are not his amazingly correct predictions as to the course of the war, but rather his forecast that Japan will not be defeated before 1947, and his warning that military victory over Japan will not be enough—that we must win a moral victory over the Japanese national spirit of ruthlessness and aggression as well.

"They are worth thinking about. We must prepare ourselves for a long, tough fight—three years or more of bloody conflict, with the Japs likely becoming more fanatical in their resistance as the end approaches. We must prepare ourselves also not to heave too big a sigh of relief and wash our hands of the Japanese problem when that long bitter war ends. We will still have a job of spiritual conquest to do in Japan if peace in the Pacific is to be more than a temporary illusion."

Describes Work

It was rather enlightening too, to hear a radio commentator describe himself and his job on the NBC network. Smith contends that a commentator is, first, a man qualified by experience, and second, a man who can spend all of his day reading the thousands and thousands of words which come in over the three major news services . . . words which never reach the newspapers because of lack of paper and space, and through reading continuously and thoroughly, sits down and does the condensing for his listeners. That's a good definition of a commentator's job, but it does not tell how Smith can predict so accurately the events which pop up day by

quils was fifteen years old, he enlisted in the Navy. Before that time, he had been a sophomore in high school. When he returned home from the war, he was only seventeen and, out of his uniform, he looked like a kid, too. Working as a delivery boy, he tried his hand at writing on his own time, doing short stories and all kinds of articles—most of which earned him absolutely no money.

When he wanted to enter the University of Wisconsin, he was unable to matriculate because of his lack of a high school degree. He refused to go back into high school as a sophomore and so he enrolled in a little college upstate in Wisconsin. He became editor of the campus newspaper, was elected president of a literary club, joined the debating team and extemporaneous speaking group and wrote a eulogy for the

day inside Japan, as well as in the war.

Before I met Larry I expected to find a much older man, a scholarly type, but instead I found the typical newspaper man . . . the foreign correspondent, a man just over middle age I'd say, a little less than fifty; a man crammed full of nervous energy, wanting to be busy all of the time. His friends tell of how, at one hundred and fifty words a minute speaking rate, he spoke more than 58,000 words in one day during his bond selling campaign, in which, incidentally he sold more than \$5,000,000 in bonds. There's a devilish twinkle in his brown eyes, and an impish smile on his lips most of the time, and he is happily married to a wife who traipses all over the world with him and likes it.

Maybe, I summed up, those colored lines and arrows on the maps of Larry's office are "guess lines" as he says, but hereafter I'll get the Pacific war lowdown from his NBC program each morning at 9:15 o'clock Pacific time, and figure I'm pretty well informed.

He has been a prospector in the Siskiyou, a South Seas trader, a gold miner in British Columbia, a country newspaper editor, a syndicated columnist and a radio commentator.



Twenty Minutes with Nelson Eddy

BECAUSE he feels that he has fared badly at the hands of many a publicist, Nelson Eddy asked that Radio Life interview him on impersonal territory—his office on Canon Drive in Beverly Hills. "His home in Brentwood Heights," we were told, "is his sanctuary and just about the only thing left that hasn't been pried open for the satisfaction of public curiosity. "Besides," Nelson says, "his place might be disappointing—no pool, no barbecue, just an unpretentious home."

When we arrived at the Eddy suite, he had stepped out for a few minutes. His secretary tried to fill the gap by waving her hand toward two stacks of fan mail. "Lots of it is coming in from overseas," she explained as she examined a strange, brilliant stamp. "Then that Lux broadcast the other night with Jeanette MacDonald has brought a fresh bunch of mail."

Enter Eddy

The door opened and in strode Eddy—smiling and ready to grasp

our hand as if hoping this interview was to be on the level. Our time, it was soon obvious, was to be limited; both interviewer and interviewee were anxious to knuckle down to solid talk.

"Mr. Eddy," your reporter struck out, "we understand you worked for five months for the N. W. Ayer Agency in Philadelphia and that this same advertising company is the one handling your new 'Electric Hour' program on CBS. Can you recall any incidents when you were in the office? Did you get fired because you were always singing at your desk and annoying the other employes?"

Eddy's eyes, whose blue was accentuated by his blue shirt, suit, and blue-splashed tie, took on a clouded look and the marked furrow between them deepened. "Do you want a story or do you want the truth?," he demanded nicely.

Upon being informed that Radio Life wasn't interested in anything but the truth, the singer relaxed slightly and continued: "It's a legend that I was fired because I sang while I worked. The real reason was I wanted to be a copywriter, but

was assigned to do publicity and I wasn't as good a publicity writer as I should have been. I didn't sing in the office, but I had music on my mind constantly. Whenever the company had a party and needed talent, they sent for me. At church I sang in the oratorios. The boss thought I was splitting my gods, dividing my interest between his job and music.

Wrote Copy Five Years

"But I made out well in the advertising business, doing copywriting for five years. In fact I was in the business on the Saturday I made my debut in grand opera, I remember we were launching a big spaghetti and macaroni advertising campaign and I was late getting to the Met in Philadelphia because I had to stay at the office and finish up the copy. I threw on my make-up and made my debut in 'Pagliacci.' The next day was Sunday. I sang in church as usual."

It was a logical question to ask next whether Eddy, who has become "America's Number One Box Office Singer," has used his advertising experience to advantage. "Of course," he replied energetically. "I've used my business background to push my music. I can sit down and write my biography easier than telling it to someone. But the last time I did, and told the truth, the girl reporter threw it in the basket, claiming it was too fantastic!"

Home On the Range

What's Cooking on the
Stoves of Radio Stars

ONE OF RADIO'S most beloved characters is Mirandy, whose salty philosophy and keen common sense have endeared her to millions who listen to her every morning on the "Farm and Home Makers Hour" over the Blue-KECA at 5:30 a.m. and also on KECA, Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 1:50 p.m.

Mirandy is a very busy lady. In addition to writing and delivering her own radio program, she keeps house, runs Mirandy's Emporium at the Farmers Market, and is raising a boy and a girl. Needless to say, cooking is right up her alley, but let Mirandy speak for herself.

"It is the hardest thing in the world for me to give a receipt—I belong to the school of 'pinch and taste' cooks. Besides I think cooking is kinda like religion—what we need is not more preachers but more settin' of a good example—and it ain't more receipts we need but more people with tasty faculty enough

to know when vittles taste good and when they don't.

"I think wimmen has overdone the garnishing. I like things served tasty and all that, but after all, they are to eat, not to look at, and I have eat some mighty purty lookin' dishes that didn't taste like nothin'. They reminded me of a fifty dollar saddle on a ten dollar nag.

"My maw was the best cook I ever eat after—how she did usta love to cook for the preacher, I remember one time we reely put the pig pot in the little one. Maw had a plate of ham-meat a foot high, and her stacked pies was higher than that. She had sweet 'taters and Irish 'taters, and gritter bread, and chicken and dumplin's . . . and she had all kind of garden sass and gravy and fixin's, and eight kinds of jell and preserve and six kinds of pickles all ranged down the middle of the table.

"I tell you, by the time we got all them vittles served up maw's face was shining like she had basted it with the ham gravy. She was trying so hard to have everything nice . . . she had on her bleached table cloth and napkins to every place. The twins both had them a peach tree switch to keep the flies offen the table. And then Maw went to the door, kinda polite like and mannerly, and asked everbody to step out and have a bite of what there was—but she was so mortified at Paw—he just jumps up and

says, 'Well, folks, we don't stand on no ceremony 'round hyar . . . my jaws is just like a trap ready to spring . . . hit's ever' man for hisself and the devil take the hindmost. So shove up and reach out, and if you don't see what you want, don't ask for it, I done et it myself.'

"I don't reckon there is any one dish cooked in more different ways than fried chicken. I dearly dees-pize it to be dipped in aig and crumbs, and I think it is a crime to add onions or tomatoes or anything to drownd the good chicken taste.

"Down home we think a frying chicken hadn't ought to be over two pounds, but after all, chickens will grow—I have fried them at five pounds that were just as good, but I'll tell you my secret. I never do put a lid on. Anybody can cook a chicken tender by putting a tight lid on after you have it browned, and steaming it. They are good that way but they loose that fried chicken taste. I cook mine in a big cast-iron skillet and I set that on a iron lid to come as nigh to a old wood-stove as I can. I brown it fairly fast and then turn the fire down way low and cook it a good hour or more.

"But it never stops frying, that's the secret, and it will be crisp on the outside and juicy on the inside—just about the best thing that ever went down your gullet. I salt, pepper and flour it first, of course—and about the grease—I have it come up about a half inch in the

bottom of the skillet, and use part shortening, part bacon grease and part BUTTER.

Mirandy's Buttermilk Pie

Cream 1 cup sugar with 1 table-spoon butter. Add beaten yolks of three big fresh "aigs." Season with vanilla, a pinch of salt, and little nutmeg or any spice that suits your taster.

Beat well to mix, then add 1 cup nice fresh-churned buttermilk, and last of all the egg whites, beat up stiff. Mix together easy and pour into your crust and bake slow till the custard sets. You can add raisins or nut-goodies if you want to

and it looks nice to sprinkle a little spice over the top. This is an open-faced pie.

Now about the crust—you know how to make that, but to keep it from soaking I always bake mine about 8 minutes in a hot oven (450) then pour in the custard and bake about half an hour at (350).

Mirandy's Buttermilk Rolls

- 2 cups buttermilk
- ¼ cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- ¼ cup melted shortening
- ½ teaspoon soda
- 1 cake yeast
- 4½ cups sifted flour

Seal your buttermilk, add sugar, salt, shortening and soda. When cooled to luke-warm, crumble in yeast. Stir up good and add flour enough to make a soft dough. Knead it till smooth using rest of flour. Pinch off rolls and put in pans—brush tops with melted shortening.

Cover with a clean tea-towel and let rise in a warm place till doubled in size. Bake in a medium oven (425) 15 or 20 minutes. These are not as fine-grained as if they had "riz" twice, but they sure are tasty, and you can have them on the table two hours from the time you start them.

KGFJ, THE biggest little station" in Los Angeles is one of the thirty-three radio stations of 100 watts remaining in the entire United States. But this powerful little public service entertaining unit lays claim to a long list of "firsts" in radio broadcasting, the main "first" that of being the original twenty-four hour station anywhere in the world. Back in 1927, owner Ben S. McGlashan, began broadcasting every hour of the day in order to give Los Angelans "entertainment twenty-four hours a day." The title, "The twenty-four-hour station" was a byword in radio all over the nation, just as the longest all night radio show, "Hank, the Nightwatchman" (Radio Life, July 16) is known from coast to coast.

Thelma Kirchner, General Manager, has firmly convinced her program staff that anything that can be done with live talent can be done with records. The outcome of this belief has been "The Junior Night Club," "Calling All Zones," "Gashouse Concert," and "Musical Digest." All shows must be not only entertaining but informative. In striving to be continually of service to the community, talk of unnecessary nature has been cut to a minimum on all programs. Even commercials are sold on a maximum basis with no possible chance of exceeding the allowed wordage.

Junior Night Club

"The Junior Night Club" for 'teen-aged youngsters was a successful effort on the part of KGFJ to combat juvenile delinquency. Each Saturday night from the Boys' Club of Hollywood, a broadcast was produced with all the fanfare of a remote control from Ciro's or the Trocadero, giving "The Junior Night Club" glamor in the Hollywood style. At first only recorded music was used, but before the final broadcasts of the school season, high school bands and 'teen-aged jive combinations were given opportunities to gain experience and prove their ability to the public. Many of the aggregations played the well known summer resorts in Califor-

nia, and earned funds to further their education.

When producing public service programs, KGFJ is anxious and willing to offer aid. But the program, as mentioned above, must be not only informative, but entertaining, this sugar coating of public service broadcasts has served to make shows that might otherwise be dry and uninteresting into highly active productions.

For instance: "Blood Goes to War" is a completely ad-lib broadcast direct from the Red Cross Blood Bank at 925 South Western Avenue in Los Angeles. Interviewing the donors while they are giving their pint of blood, the program has been so successful in drawing much-needed donors that recently forty eight men from a local service organization heard the broadcast and promptly made appointments which resulted in forty eight pints of blood being added to the life-saving total. Returning servicemen tell the actual uses they've seen of blood plasma.

Famous guests such as Governor and Mrs. Warren, Mrs. Ray Milland, Mrs. Leo Carrillo and daughter Antoinette, John B. Hughes, and Father Bernard Hubbard have appeared. Father Bernard Hubbard, the glacier priest, made such a hit that KGFJ was forced to transcribe the program twice afterwards to satisfy the requests of the listeners.

When postal zoning needed a radio campaign to emphasize the necessity of zoning all mail, KGFJ popped up with a postal zone quiz approved by the Postal authorities. "Calling All Zones" is a telephone quiz which advises people of their zone numbers, gives them \$1.00 in Victory Stamps for answering questions correctly. The money not won is divided between the Hollywood Guild Canteen and the Crippled Childrens' Society of Los Angeles County. Thereby KGFJ does a public service, gives funds to needy and worthy organizations, promotes the sale of War Bonds, and entertains in one swoop.

Famous Alumni

These few points may give you an idea why so many of America's top radio men and entertainers have graduated from "The Biggest Little Station." Mulling over memories of seventeen years' association with KGFJ from the time when she started as publicity director, attractive Thelma Kirchner recalls when such announcers as Lou Crosby, John Kennedy, Truman Bradley, Russ Johnston, Nelson Case and Harold Isabel worked at KGFJ. And she enjoys telling how she auditioned Hanley Stafford and gave him a mark of "very good." In the musical field Les Hite and his orchestra were heard often. Sol Hoppli and his musicians followed Lani McIntyre and his Harmony Hawaiians as staff orchestra. William Sabransky, now at NBC, was studio accompanist. Fern Buckner, famed-featured violinist with Fred Waring, was a member of the Staff orchestra. Nat Winecoff, Manager of Southern Music Company, Peggy Price, now wife

She likes all shapes of headgear, has no favorites as to colors, but selects her bonnet to suit her mood. Waking in the morning, she chooses her costume first, considering her hat afterward. But she finds that one hat will go well with more than one outfit. Mornings when she doesn't sparkle as brightly, she prefers something that will shade her face, "if it's too weatherbeaten."

Uses Hats

For the Republican Convention in Chicago this year, la Hopper carted back fifteen devastating numbers for a four days' stay. She derives extensive pleasure from her collection, but now and then uses a hat to get even with someone she doesn't fancy. Those who know Hedda best claim that De Wolfe Hopper has been the only real heart interest in her life and that although she has had frequent and flattering matrimonial offers, she still remains true to the love, who left her after six years of wedded life to take a sixth mate.

Personal Life

She is ashamed of things sentimental, hides all evidence of her true feelings. This may be attributed to her strict Quaker upbringing and serves as a defense mechanism to cover a very emotional nature.

For twelve years she has had the same maid, Degmar, who yields indulgently to her mistress' whims to raid the refrigerator, to diet for losing weight, or to promote impromptu parties. Miss Harshbarger handles all of her client's money and doles out twenty-five dollars weekly for Hedda's pin money. She found she had to after attending her first public preview with the columnist. Walking to the parking lot after the curtain, the pair was accosted by a down-and-out looking man, who started to reminisce about former movie days with Miss Hopper. Dema saw her protegee open her handbag and slip a bill into the fellow's hand.

On Christmas Day last, KGFJ pulled a fast one by rounding up two R.A.F. flyers visiting from Canada. The two talented boys, Leading Aircraftsman Ivar Shield and Aircraftsman Buddy Logan, nephew of Ella Logan, put on a fifty minute musical program designed to sell bonds to folks sporting Christmas gift checks. "I understand layouts and posing," Eddy continued, then answering a question: "My favorite magazines to look over are Harper's, and then Vogue. All right, accuse me of being effeminate: But I do think the color and art work in them are superb. The faces of the women are so interesting. One of my hobbies is sculpting and I like to study different expressions."

Eddy turned his blond-grey head and added with virility: "Of course for real reading, I turn to Time, Life, and the Washington Letter."

Your reporter was becoming frankly disarmed by Mr. Eddy's own frankness. It may have been an over-active imagination on our part, but we thought we saw the singer in a hunted light. "So many wrong things have been written about me. Writers have interviewed me and promised to submit their copy. One man did, but he disregarded every correction I had made and ran the story, greatly distorted. He came back again the other day and wanted another interview. 'Let by-gones be by-gones,' he said, but I refused. It may not make such a good story," Eddy emphasized, "but I'll always tell the truth!" And immediately there flashed to mind the tall tale about Eddy going blind, one of the less vicious rumors to have floated around during the past few years. Eddy's hurt and his anxiousness to avoid such publicity could be understood.

a coke in a well-known establishment near Sunset and Vine. Glancing around the room, he spotted two WACS.

"My, but they're fine-looking girls," he remarked to his companions. "I wish they would autograph my short-snorter bill."

Himself, too unassuming to approach the young ladies, Eddy prevailed upon one of his feminine friends to obtain the desired signatures. Needless to mention, when the WACS discovered a celebrity turned humble autograph seeker, they were amazed, but later were delighted when the singer walked over to their table to thank them for their kindness.

Eddy is always listening to persons' voices, thinking he may discover a bright new star. Our interview had just detoured to the spot where we were going to ask him about the little waitress he had heard humming to herself, when there was a peremptory knock on the closed door, and our time was up.

Nelson threw us a quizzical look. "I don't know what you're going to write!" he exclaimed.

"We want to come back for more, so it'll be the truth," we averred.

"But you've been sitting there with a laughing look in your eye," he insisted.

"Mr. Eddy," we countered, "don't worry. We always have that look."

Satisfied that we might be partially trusted, he proffered a parting hand-shake. As his paw gripped ours, we felt the large strip of adhesive tape covering the palm near his thumb. He had been picking at the tape almost constantly during our conversation.

Curiosity welling beyond our control we chirped: "What did you do to yourself?"

deceased president of the university. In two-and-a-half years, when he had completed a four-year course with the exception of one semester, Marquis quit college.

From that time until he joined NBC, Marquis' life knew every possible experience. In Chicago, he donated book reviews to a newspaper in return for the by-line. Although he received no payment, in this way his name was brought to the attention of numerous editors. And, because of it, he landed a small newspaper job. Once he spent two weeks slaving over a new book on technical military tactics. When he finished the review, although it saw print, Marquis did not have enough money to ride the streetcar downtown. For days at a time he subsisted on coffee alone.

Marquis worked for several years as a newspaperman, writing fea-

tures about the theater. After a while he went abroad as a foreign correspondent. Then, as an outgrowth of his writing about the theater, Marquis drifted into writing his own theatrical productions and directing them. He toured the entire country with productions of one kind or another.

One morning Marquis walked into the offices of KPO, in San Francisco, and said to the manager: "I have never seen a radio show, nor written a radio script, nor have I ever been in a station before, but I think I can write better stuff than is on the air now."

The manager showed Marquis a script. After quickly grasping radio writing technique, he wrote a drama which an advertising agency bought immediately. From that time until today he has been with NBC, first in San Francisco, and now in Hollywood.

As Professor

At the NBC Radio Institute, held in the NBC studios for six weeks this summer in conjunction with UCLA as a course for educators and radio people, Marquis was easily one of the favorite "professors." His writing class was jammed. The prize script of a class competition was broadcast coast-to-coast. For two years Marquis has followed his "professorial" career at the Institute.

Thereon hangs a tale. In every lecture—and he delivered three each week—Marquis invariably used the expression "You're a dead duck!" He used it in different ways. He might say, "If you don't hand in that script on time, you're a dead duck." Or, he might point to himself, saying "When I missed that ride, I was a dead duck."

So when Ed Egen, new sales-promotion manager of the Blue network on the West Coast and himself a "student" in the Institute, produced a gag show as the closing event of the summer session, he remembered Marquis' pet remark, "You're a dead duck." But Egen didn't stop there. He actually imported a duck. It was used as part of the program and afterwards Art Brearley, head NBC engineer, took it home by mistake.

Marquis wanted that duck, however, and he tracked it down. When Brearley found out that he had taken it by mistake, he returned the duck immediately to NBC. But when Marquis' secretary asked an NBC page to take the duck "to my office," events reached a peak of hilarity. The page thought she was from the J. Walter Thompson agency and he took the duck to the Thompson offices.

Before a general ironing out occurred, the duck went on a rampage in the agency offices, scattering papers and being very audible.

Postscript: the duck is now living peacefully at the Marquis residence, along with Mr. Marquis, Mrs. Marquis, and little Sandra, aged two. It creates a disturbance only when it bites the nose of the Marquis' pet dog.
