Connie was being bribed with an unusually large piece of Mike Lyman's tangy lemon pie to tell tales out of school about her bosses, Abbott and Costello.

"Gee," she smiled, "they're such fine fellows, I could spend all of my time telling you about their thoughtfulness—or the swell things they do for everybody—or how they never forget people."

The little songstress, who was recently voted by a group of fighter pilots in the South Pacific "the gal we'd like most to share a chocolate soda with," has been with the number one comedy team since the debut of their own air show three years ago. "We're just like one big family," she concluded, wrinkling her nose and taking another bite.

"Of course Bud and Lou are as different as hot and cold water. Lou loves to talk and is always cutting-up. He usually greets me with a little kiss on the cheek and the only time he ever failed to do it was the day before he came down with rheumatic fever. We knew something was wrong then," she shuddered.

**A**NDY RUSSELL relaxed his 160-pound, six-foot frame behind a table at the Brown Derby and talked with mounting enthusiasm about his new Saturday night show on the Blue Network.

"It's a musical program," he emphasized. "I don't want to try to be funny on it. Singers should sing." Cast of the new Andy Russell show includes songbird Connie Haines, Mel Torme and his Meltones, a twenty-one piece orchestra conducted by Lou Bring, and Michael Roy as announcer-emcee. Listeners to the broadcast hear the mellow voice of Andy Russell delivering romantic ballads in the way that has made him the nation's newest singing sensation.

The fan idolatry that is synonymous with the name of Frank Sinatra has spread to this friendly dark-haired Los Angeles youth who used to beat the drums in the bands of Gus Arnheim, Johnny Richards and Alvino Rey.

Last year, while he was playing his very first theater date, in the middle of one of his numbers, one of his youthful feminine admirers in the audience flung herself from the balcony above him in a "swooning" display of her adoration. Panic-stricken at the sight of the falling body, Russell rushed from the stage to where the girl lay in the aisle. Her face was badly cut, and blood smeared the front of his coat when he lifted her into a car to be taken to the hospital. Later, when the girl had regained consciousness under treatment, the doctor reprimanded her for committing such a rash and foolish act. "Aren't you ashamed?" he scolded.

"No," the girl replied blandly. "I'm only sorry that I can't remember when Andy Russell put his arms around me."

*KFI Move*

Last week, KFI surprised Radio Row by handing down an edict that commentators on the station could no longer express personal opinions on the news. Wire reports, said KFI, would be supplemented by analysis of the news, but as for expression of the speakers' own ideas, KFI listeners could look, instead, to qualified commentators on NBC, with which network the station is affiliated.

Reasoning behind the final decision of the KFI management to discontinue news commentators revolved around two major issues.

One, said KFI, was the great difficulty of the station to obtain commentators of sufficient background to qualify as experts and who would comment on the news objectively. The second factor was that the station management was of the belief that news commentators should not be subject to sponsorship.

Change, so pointed out KFI, applied only to commentary programs originating at KFI. For the present at least, the station will continue to release sponsored commentators fed it by the network.

Operative March 1, the edict will effect such well-knowns as Peter de Lima, Manchester Boddy, Alvin Wiedner, Sam Balter and Rodriguez and Sutherland. Remaining, according to KFI, will be Fleetwood Lawton and Edward Jorgenson, broadcasting as news analysts presenting both sides of a question and leaving the listener free to formulate his own opinion.

KFI's move follows the stand which has always been taken by CBS, which claims to air only news analysts, not commentators. Opinions of those broadcasting cannot be aired on the Columbia network in line with the belief that the best procedure is to give both sides of a story and let the dialer form his own opinion. "Ours has always been one of straight down-the-middle of the road, unopinionated comment," said CBS's head of news and public relations, Fox Case, as he recalled that about two years ago, Cecil Brown and the network parted company because Brown went counter to network policy.

With KFI clamping down on opinions, it remained a matter for speculation last week whether or when NBC or other networks might follow suit

in declaring opinions on news issues out of bounds.

### B. M. B.

Hugh Feltis, president of BMB—Broadcast Measurement Bureau, Inc.—has announced that his organization is ready to operate if it receives the financial endorsement (to the tune of from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000) of at least 50% of the nation's nine hundred radio stations. With that sum to manage expenses, Feltis contemplates immediate action in lining up market research organizations for a nationwide checkup on radio listening by means of a postcard ballot, mailed in selected areas to selected income groups. The plan is to check the nation's radio audience, a field in which there are estimated to be 30,000,000 sets, by using 1,000,000 ballots.

The proposed standard will be once-a-week listening, with a 50% response giving a station primary rating. The survey is to be undertaken every two years.

fans swamped him with expensive gifts — robes, gloves, neckties. He auctioned them off with autographs to war bond-buyers.

### Is Angeleno

Andy Russell's "Cinderella" story started right here in Los Angeles, where he was born, as Andrew Rabago, twenty-four years ago on the East side. He attended Roosevelt High School, was president of the student body and excelled in sports. He was junior handball champion of Southern California, and fought in exhibition boxing matches.

At sixteen, however, his love of music impelled him to join Gus Arnheim's band as drummer and singer. From then on, the wheels of Fate worked swiftly, and after just a few years of barnstorming with several top-flight bands, Andy Russell was "discovered" as a potential swoon-crooner and made his bow on local Blue sustaining airshows. Many will remember him as "the boy" on "A Boy, A Girl and A Band." Network audiences were entertained by his ballads when he joined the crew of the "Old Gold Show" after Bob Crosby's departure for the Marines. Meanwhile, his recordings of such hits as "Amor" and "Besame Mucho" were selling like hotcakes, and the rhythm-rabid younger generation was heralding a new idol.

Six months ago, when he took his very first train ride to do broadcasts emanating from New York City, he was mobbed by youngsters everywhere he went. Now, back home in California as the local boy who made good, he's being groomed for stardom on the screen.

### "Home Again!"

But his biggest thrills are doing things like sitting in at the drums with Gene Krupa's band at the Palladium, appearing as a guest star on the stage of the Orpheum Theater and hearing his fellow Angelenos tear down the house for more ballads by Russell, and returning to his own Roosevelt High School to sing at a student war bond rally.

"It gives me a good feeling," Andy told us. "I'm home again."

He gets a kick out of the way his listeners like to hear him sing Spanish. "I used to fight against it when I was with Arnheim," he admitted. "I didn't want to sing in Spanish.

Now, his best-selling records are those on which he does a chorus or two in the language of Latin America—records such as "Magic is the Moonlight" and his newest, "Negra Concentida" (which means, "My Pet Brunette").

At this writing, Andy lives at the Knickerbocker Hotel, is planning to move into an apartment in Beverly Hills. He still loves sports — espe-

cially handball and boxing. He goes to the fights every chance he gets, and shadow-boxes in his seat all during the bouts.

He doesn't drink or smoke, and never has. He doesn't like night-clubbing and doesn't dance. "I'm a dull fellow," he grinned at this point. "Eating," he added, "that's my hobby."

He has eight brothers and two sisters, none of whom is in the entertainment field or the least bit glamor-conscious. "They're proud of me," said Andy, "but they say, 'we wouldn't want to be in your spot for the world.'"

The singer hopes to stay in California for awhile now; he wants to learn to act, but not too fast. On the screen, he plans on being just himself.

The movie makeup men encountered a novel problem when Andy showed up for his screen debut. About an inch of hair had to be plucked from his forehead. "For once," laughed Andy, "they've found somebody with *too much* hair! I have to get a haircut every six days or I go crazy."

### Reaction of F. S. Fans

Many of Andy Russell's admirers are Sinatra devotees. The first time Andy made an appearance, they regarded him with suspicion. "Who's this guy?" they asked themselves. "Is he trying to take Frankie's place?"

"Sometimes," Andy told us, "while I was playing the Paramount in New York, Frankie's fans would come to the theater in groups, and when I made my appearance on-stage, they'd get up and walk out with their noses in the air. I'd get a big bang out of it and smile at them, and later, I'd get a letter from them, telling me they were sorry."

Since Andy's fan-mail has soared to thousands of letters weekly (it averages 3500 a week) he finds it completely impossible to answer them all personally as he once did, so he employs a personal secretary. "She reads the good ones," he explained, "and I read the bad"

He told us that he frequently gets letters of criticism from bobby-sockers who remain exclusively loyal to their Frankie. "I usually send them a picture of me," said Andy, "and autograph it. To a very devoted Sinatra fan—Always, Andy Russell."

**L**ONG LINES of eager-faced youngsters, in saddle-shoes and bobby-socks, were forming at the theater's entrance. Any of you who may find yourselves sometimes flinching at the thought of the current-day fads and fancies of our younger generation, can take comfort in the revelation of what this novel airshow has brought about. American youth which dresses in shapeless, oversized flannel shirts and delights in "cutting a rug" to the thin tunes of a nickel-a-platter juke-box, is equally prone to sit in thrilled ecstasy as the inspired strains of great symphonic melodies are given majestic life and beauty by the skilled fingers of gifted concert artists.

## Pack Auditorium

Los Angeles' Philharmonic Auditorium, from which the "Symphonies for Youth" program emanates, has a seating capacity of 2666. Every Saturday the huge amphitheater is crowded beyond capacity with music-loving youngsters. All seats are reserved, but every week literally hundreds of youngsters flock to the downtown auditorium with the hope that additional tickets can be obtained. On a recent Saturday, no less than 2200 youthful ticket-seekers had to be turned away!

These Saturday morning symphonic broadcasts, planned in appreciation and encouragement of young people's interest in classical music, are alternately presented for children of elementary school age and for students of junior and senior high schools. Girls and boys from schools in the Los Angeles vicinity attend, and five of the students, selected by the vote of their classmates, participate in the musical quiz which is a weekly feature of the hour-long broadcasts.

Questions concerning classical music, its artists and composers—submitted by youngsters in the listening audience—are answered by the youthful contestants in an informal ten-minute period of quizzing, conducted by Thomas Freebairn-Smith. Albums of classical recordings, books on symphonic music and war bonds are awarded as prizes to the quiz participants and to those who submit the questions that are used during the quizzing.

## Aids to Enjoyment

In addition, detailed study guides, ten to twelve pages in length, are mailed weekly to the musical directors and teachers of the schools. These contain biographical material on the noted composers whose works are presented on the weekly programs, the stories behind the birth of their famed compositions, reading references and lists of symphonic recordings obtainable, and reproductions of the most interesting pas-

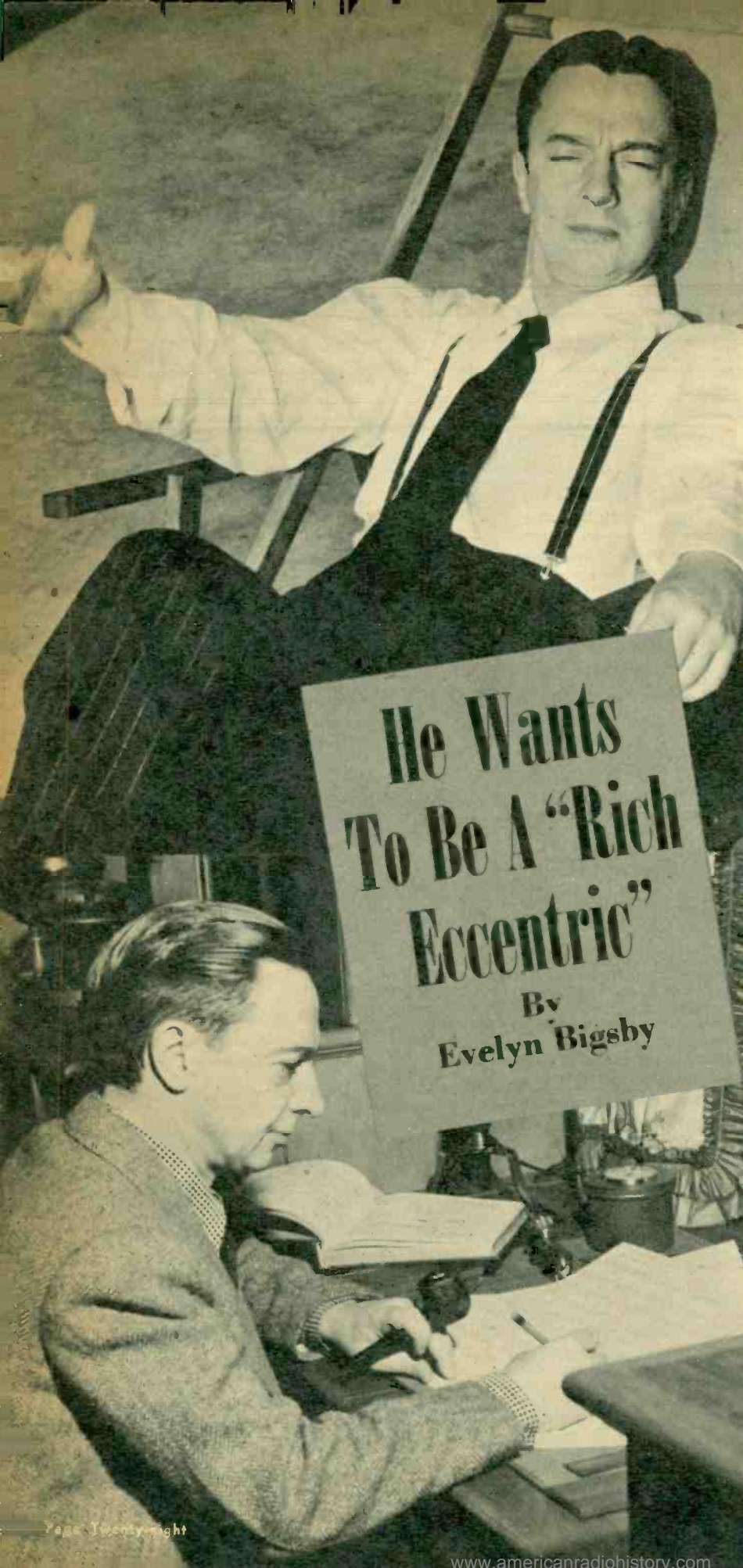

**J**NDEFATIGUABLE Robert Armbruster, who directs music for Nelson Eddy's fifty piece "Electric Hour" orchestra, is musical supervisor for "This Is My Best," and "Cavalcade of America" has an unfulfilled lifetime ambition.

"I want to be a rich eccentric," he remarked whimsically the other day, "and when I am, I'll build a small theater the size of the court theater in Mozart's day and do a Mozart operetta. I'll play the harpsichord and conduct for scale. The singers will be young American artists and the treatment of the music and the theater will be as if Mozart were still alive and had just written the operetta—in other words, not jazzed up. I'll either make a fortune or lose my shirt."

Before Radio Life's interview with Armbruster, we had often noted him quietly going in or out of his office in the Oleson building, his slight (five foot six) figure topped by a small, dark face, with a pipe, and a black felt hat. But as soon as he surveyed a Derby menu, he revealed himself as a delightful conversationalist and a lively wit.

"I'm still on a diet," he observed wistfully. "Of course I love chocolate parfaits and chocolate sodas, but our cook was responsible for my gaining weight. I looked like a dissipated gnome. I don't know how much I lost, but my waist went from thirty-six-and-a-half inches to thirty-one."

"What I really need," he chuckled softly, "is a hobby. The trouble with me is all I do is work. Yesterday I sneaked a day off and stayed in a horizontal position. Fresh air and exercise I avoid sedulously."

In the next breath after using his four syllable word, Armbruster confided that he'd never received a high school diploma. At West Philadelphia High School he was so busy conducting the orchestra, serving as president of the glee club, and furnishing choruses for the town that he didn't have time to apply himself to the customary studies.

"I sat on the stage at graduation, conducted the orchestra, and played a piano solo, but got no diploma," he remarked regretfully. "Of course father worried when it looked as if I was going to be a musician. I was

an only child and I wasn't spoiled—I was ruined."

**How He Started**

Young Robert, who had started to play the piano without lessons when he was four, completed his formal education at the feet of his piano

teacher, Constantin von Sternberg, who knew, besides his keyboard, six languages and a staggering amount of history and literature. Despite his marked musical talent, Armbruster, nevertheless, made an honest attempt to enter business and side-

track music into avocation. As sales manager of a machinery firm in Philadelphia he plodded along unhappily for two years, finally accepted a position at Aeolian as "general factotum" of the recording

*Lillian Randolph Is "Birdie", "Madame Queen", Disney's "Mammy", Busy Screen Actress; In Spare Moments, She Likes To Sing, Cook, Go Walking in the Rain*



**TALENT RUNS** in Lillian Randolph's family. Her sister is Amanda Randolph, accomplished actress featured prominently on top New York radio shows. Lillian, better known as "Birdie", has two children—an eleven-year-old son who aspires to be a singer, and a nineteen-year-old daughter, a graceful dancer.

Birdie: I ain't talkin' about the court, I'm talkin' about Mr. Gilsleeve. And he's a fine man!

The other afternoon, when your Radio Life reporter encountered the laughable, lovable "Birdie" in the corridor at NBC, we welcomed the chance to become better acquainted with one of our favorite radio personalities. "Birdie," in the person of actress Lillian Randolph, is just as one would picture her—a tall, broad-smiling colored woman with a benevolent air and an habitual hearty laugh.

#### Insistent

When, in the course of our conversation, we asked her which was her favorite airshow, she answered with a wide grin, "The Great Gildersleeve"—and he's a fine man!"

(On the air, she pronounces the

name as "Gilsleeve." It is written that way in her script.)

In addition to her portrayal of "Birdie," Miss Randolph is "Madame Queen" of the "Amos 'n' Andy" program, the voice of "Mammy" in Walt Disney's popular kitten cartoons, and appears frequently in major motion pictures. Her most recent film appearances were in "Three Little Sisters," "Dark Waters" and "Song for Miss Julie." She is also scheduled to supply singing and speaking voices for a new series of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer cartoons soon to be filmed.

When not busy fulfilling her many radio and screen assignments, the actress performs at service hospitals and for war loan drives. When the colored contingent of the Elks Club gave their show at Pershing Square to promote the sale of war bonds, Lillian Randolph opened the program, singing "The Star Spangled Banner." On Sundays, she frequently sings solos at church.

She loves music—"all kinds," and she greatly admires the artistry of Ethel Waters. "Ethel Waters is my boon companion," she told us. "I

staff. Of course he has found his business training handy in subsequent years.

Armbruster started with NBC in New York when radio was just a fad. "Imagine my surprise to find out that a stop watch was used for something else than horse races!" he exclaimed. Commercial radio arrived and bang! Armbruster was in. "Next to retirement, radio is best," he commented in reference to the two stage shows for which he directed the music.

During the summer of 1937 when he and his wife, Betty, were relaxing at their Connecticut farm, Armbruster received a wire asking him to come to Hollywood to direct the music on what was supposed to be the last eight weeks of Chase and Sanborn's first thirteen-week cycle. "As you see, my eight weeks have stretched to eight years in California," the maestro laughed.

The Armbrusters eventually sold all but twenty-five acres of their property at Newtown, and now occupy a charming Colonial hillside home next to Dorothy Lamour in Coldwater Canyon. Mrs. A. labels her mate as very companionable and easy to get along with. He does most of his work in the Early American den overlooking a view of the ocean and mountains. "If a week goes by and I don't learn something new about music, I'm worried," he said. He arranges only when he becomes ridiculously ambitious or when his four arrangers are stuck. The last time he scored a duet from "Rose Marie" he woke up in the middle of the night realizing that he'd left out sixteen bars. After tossing a few hours he rushed into Hollywood and scored the neglected bars at 7 a.m. Armbruster confessed that he kibitzes his arrangers. "I want to know what noise is going to come out," he said in self-defense.

### Smokes Pipe

Admittedly very catholic in his personal musical tastes, he is always careful not to learn any of the works he really enjoys. While laboring over his yellow score sheets, he likes to smoke a pipe from his collection of two dozen. "I never smoke cigars," he divulged. "I always have the feeling they should have keys on them and I should be playing, especially those B-flat cigars."

Later visiting the crack pianist at home, we found that Armbruster likes to wheedle enchanting music from the beautiful grand piano which occupies the big window in the living room, but skimming over the keys while waiting for the photographer to pop his flash bulb, the musical artist remarked, "It's a good thing you can't photograph a piano out of tune!"

Faithful companion of the conductor-arranger is his twelve-year-old Doberman, Katie, whose toothless smile amuses the Armbrusters. Katie, whose discipline is best administered by dosages of violent baby talk, climbed in bed with her master the last time Southern California had a thunder storm. "I had to hold the big baby all the rest of the night," he sighed.

The maestro admits that his mildness to a dog and a man is a carefully acquired trait. "Temperamental?" he paused to ponder a question. "Yes, I guess I am temperamental, because all musicians are supposed to be. I used to get mad and break batons, become excited and get nervous indigestion. It took \$50 for the doctor to tell me I was a fool."

The Armbrusters have moved much of their furniture from the East to their Coldwater Canyon place, which Mrs. Armbruster has decorated with admirable taste and cleverness. They love it here and will probably make this their home when, as, and if "Bobby" ever does achieve his "rich eccentric" status.

The only thing he regrets about leaving the East is that he had bought a trombone when summer, 1937, started. "I planned to master it 'way off in the woods," he lamented. "Then I rushed out here and now I've never gotten to learn it."

Her daughter, Evelyn, is an accomplished dancer, but has no theatrical ambitions. She works as an inspector of shortwave sets and radios which are to be shipped overseas. Her son, Joe, is a student at "The Little Red Schoolhouse" in New York City. "He has a beautiful voice," Miss Randolph said with parental pride. "He's always taking part in the school programs. At Christmas time, he played 'Joseph'."

Lillian Randolph lives in "a little white house" in Los Angeles. She has no particular desire to travel, loves California, and thinks "home is the best place of all." She seldom goes out, and usually only to the theater or to church. She is a rabid fight fan, however, and when she's at the ringside, she yells herself hoarse. She reads a great deal (books-of-the-month and weird mysteries, finds enjoyment in the opera, and likes to listen to the radio. She never

wears a hat, and finds it fun to walk in the rain.

She loves to cook, *can* cook, and eats "everything!" Hot breads are her culinary specialty. She has a baby grand piano in her home and passes many pleasant hours playing it. "I spend a lot of time singing," she smiled.

She likes to "get up early and do things," and considers herself "quite ordinary." She is her own housekeeper. Her house has seven rooms—one of which she calls "my den." On its walls are hung the many photographs she has collected throughout her long theatrical career which began in 1922, when, at the age of seventeen, she left school to go on the stage as a member of "Lucky Sambo's Show," playing out of New York. 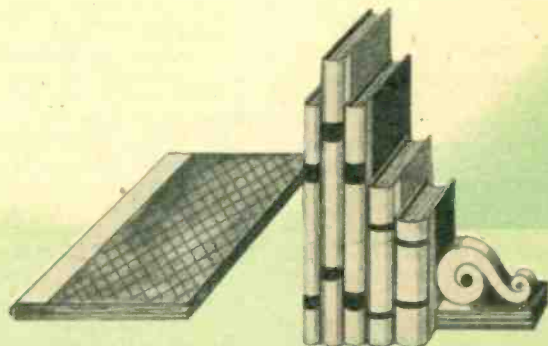
