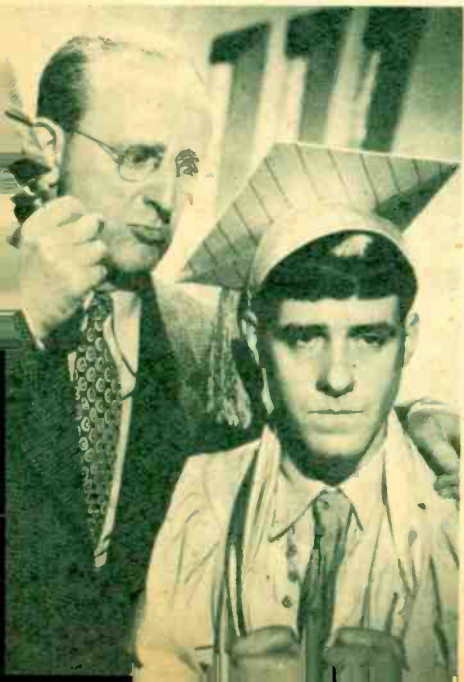

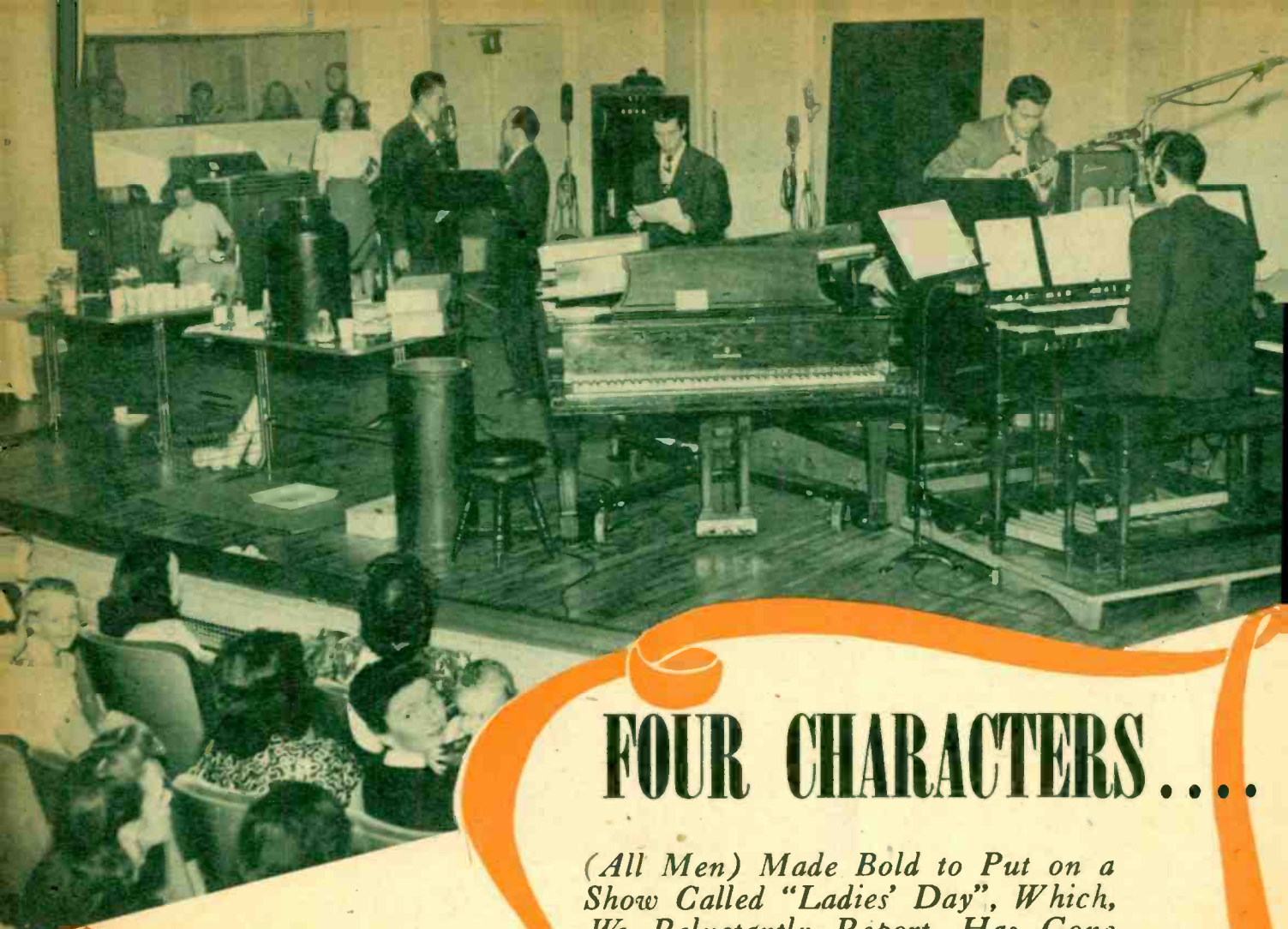

Now, you may wonder what all this is leading up to. It's this. KFI offers a program each morning, called "Ladies' Day"—three-quarters of an hour of just plain good entertainment. The show is written by Bill Stulla, who also acts as host and emcee.

Bill is a happy character with soft brown eyes and a cheerful disposition that he's willing to share with everyone. He pokes a little fun at men in general and a lot at himself, much to the gals' delight. On the musical portion of the show you'll find three amiable fellows—Bob Mitchell, Bill Shirley, and the newest member of the cast, Sidney "Buddy" Jobe. Mitchell, founder of the famed Mitchell "Boychoir," offers, each day, a piano solo and several selections on the electric organ, of which he is a master. As if this weren't enough, he also adds many a bright quip to the dialogue.

Versatile

Bill Shirley, handsome young tenor singing star of the show, croons (swoon-type) romantic ballads directly to the ladies and everything from boogie-woogie through grand

gluttons for PUNISHMENT

Babes in the Comedy Woods, Allen & Noble, Finding Way

EVER since the morning two years ago when West Coast dialers were introduced to a pair of madmen with a new approach to radio comedy, there have been those who have followed the course of these two newcomers with a loving and faithful eye. For, scarcely had Steve Allen and Wendell Noble introduced their "Smile Time" show on the Don Lee net when hundreds of fans began flocking to their mail-boxes to register whole-hearted approval of such features as the "Nitwit Network."

This stout and ever-growing band of followers has cheered in rapid progression the first time-change that brought "Smile Time" from the early morning to a mid-day broadcast spot, the show's graduation from Don Lee to coast-to-coast release, and now the new opportunity accorded Allen and Noble on their soon-to-be-heard night-time show.

Any regular "Smile Time" fan can give you a score of reasons for the steady climb to success of two comparative babes-in-the-comedy-woods,

but probably only the most discerning listener would be able to inform you that Steve Allen and Wendell Noble got where they are by a rare combination of talent and hard work.

The boys themselves are the first to admit this. They shy away from any discussion of their talent, but they'll talk for hours about how overworked they are, and when you listen to their story, it's hard to disagree with them.

Closed Corporation

"Look at your average radio comic," says tall, nervous Steve Allen, who does most of the writing for the team. "He has four other guys turning out the material that makes him funny, a producer to worry about details, a flock of musicians, singers, and an agent or two to see that all goes well. All well and good, but the guy can't really claim he's overworked. Now you take Noble and Allen. They also have two writers

working for them; a couple of guys named Noble and Allen, turning out scripts five days a week. Then they have a nice singer (a fella named Noble) and a piano player by the name of Allen. When they needed a theme song for the "Smile Time" show, by the way, a composer known as Steve Allen was called in for the job. Rather than hold auditions to select actors for the roles of 'Manuel Labor' and 'Horney Hasenpfeffer,' two walk-on characters, we just assigned a couple of performers known as Allen and Noble to the job."

From all this you get some idea of the versatility of Mutual's young problem-children, but even here, there's more than meets the eye. Aside from his duties as funnyman, Wendell performs creditably on other radio shows in straight dramatic roles, and can play a mean sax and clarinet, while his surprising partner

It's the season of the year when Saturday mornings mean Metropolitan Opera to thousands of fans across the nation. And in Southern California, KECA-ABC present this world renowned opera series, under sponsorship of The Texas Company, for the sixth consecutive season. Starting at 11 o'clock in the morning, the "Met's" program includes an outstanding array of talent, and the best loved operas in the world.

In the lineup of operas for the season are included the six works chosen by you, the radio audience, in the popular voting last spring. new to add to the well-established reputation of "Fibber and Molly." We still miss "Beulah" after all this time, but Arthur Q. Bryan as "Doc Gamble," Bill Thompson as the "Old Timer" and Gale Gordon as "La-Trivia" still amuse us. Music man Billy Mills and announcer Harlow Wilcox still do their jobs effectively. Writers Don Quinn and Phil Leslie are still turning out good scripts.

"Fibber and Molly" have been around so long, now, that it's possible you've tired of them and have taken them for granted. If that's true, take a vacation from them for a while (let's hope it's not the night Mr. Hooper calls you to check on their rating!) You'll come back to their program newly charmed by their folksy ways and family humor.

They may not have the freshness that was once theirs, but they're still fine troupers.

Date With Judy

Occupying a choice page in our mental album of special radio friends—like the Barbours, Vic and Sade and the Easy Aces, for instance—is the Foster family, heard weekly (NBC, Tuesday, 5:30 p.m.) on "A Date with Judy."

The program's teen-age heroine, enchantingly portrayed by youthful radio veteran Louise Erickson, is the feminine counterpart of radio's most famous teen-age hero, "Henry Aldrich." Like "Henry," "Judy" is an irrepressible, entertaining and thoroughly charming replica of today's typical teen-ager. Where "Henry's" chief concern is girls, "Judy's" is boys. Where "Henry's" home-life revolves around three delightful family members—mother, father and sister, "Judy's" family is likewise composed of three delightful people—an indulgent mother (Myra Marsh), a harrassed father (John Brown) and a caustic-tongued twelve-year-old brother.

To be credited equally are writer Aileen Leslie for her sparkling happy dialogue, and the show's cast members whose long years at the microphone enable each of them to make the most of his Foster family characterization. Sandra Gould as "Mitzi" and Dick Crenna as "Oogie" also capably contribute to the half-hour of amusing goings-on. Hal Borne conducts the musical accompaniment to the proceedings, and Doug Gourlay delivers the commercials in a pleasant, unobtrusive manner. Helen Mack directs the entire production with her customary competency and is responsible to a considerable extent for the program's consistently good quality.

Love Dat Leyden

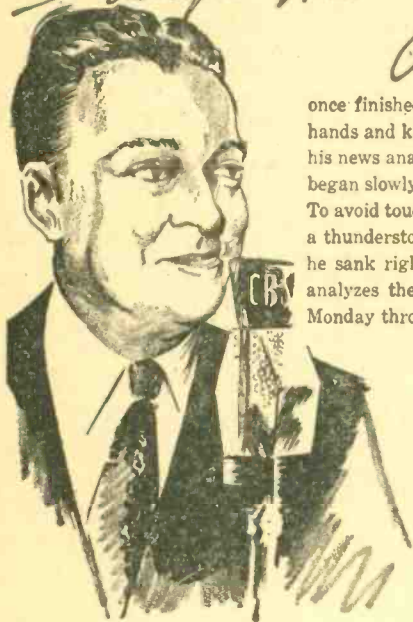
Informality on the air—if you have the talent and personality to back it up—is most delightful on a record program. Bill Leyden is our favorite example of this healthy

trend, and if you've been missing his 10:05 a.m. broadcast on KMPC, one hearing will convince you that you've found a radio friend.

Bill has a nice voice and, if he wanted to, could probably be a stuffy big-name announcer on the networks. His ambitions lie in other directions, however. He's out to extract the starch from commercial radio. He gives you the commercials on his program in his own words, and Leyden's words are much more to the point than the usual apoplectic announcements that punctuate many record sessions.

His taste in records is good, and his comments on them, whether humorous or informative, are pertinent.

We've heard many fans liken Bill to ABC's whirlwind, Henry Morgan. Maybe—but Bill's a little kinder than Morgan. He makes the listener feel like a friend, not the other half of a duel of wits. Many times lately we've heard the comment, "Yeah, Morgan's wonderful all right—but say, have you heard this guy Leyden?"

There's only one thing we have against Bill—we keep running into him in Thrifty's and he never says "hello." Of course, we've never met him—but we know who he is.

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

Red Skelton

There are two things we have against the opening of the Red Skelton show (NBC, Tuesday, 7:30 p.m.)—the comedian's "gag" monologue and the current "903" stunt. The former doesn't last very long, fortunately, but the latter continues throughout the whole show. We hope it isn't intended to extend the entire season! Repetition, whether it be Luckies' "LSMFT" or Raleigh's "903", is grating on our ears—and our curiosity is far outdistanced by our annoyance.

The "903" girl's voice, on the Skelton show, is pleasant enough, in a sultry way, to be put to a more satisfying and demanding use than the infantile chore which has given it birth.

As for Skelton's comedy monologue, it isn't anything that we have against Red. His material is equal to that monologued by any other air funster, and his delivery better than some. It's just that we are seldom very amused by a comedian's "gag"

monologue. We like it much better when the gagster delivers his laughs amid situations and "straight men."

That's why we settle back and really begin to enjoy the Skelton show after its opening is over. Everything else, we like: the comedy skits, scripted by Edna Skelton, John Murray and Ben Freedman, and starring Red in any one of his half-dozen crazy characterizations (Junior, the Mean Wittle Kid; Clem Kadiddlehopper; Willie Lump-Lump; Bolivar Shagnasty; Dead Eye; J. Newton Numbskull); the skillful support of such radio veterans as Verna Felton, GeGe Pearson, and Pat McGeehan; the wistful comedy and resonant voice of wonderful Wonderful Smith; the "effects" supplied by soundmen Jack Robinson and Fred Cole; the music of David Forester, the singing of Anita Ellis and the announcing by Red O'Connor.

We also are always pleasantly surprised when Skelton and company present such serious and semi-serious pieces as "Junior's" recent visit to Storkland. With these, Red proves himself an effective scripter, as he pens these more somber sessions himself.

As long as all of the above are prominently on display on the Skelton show, "903" notwithstanding, we'll continue to dial 640 at 7:30.

Radio Lifelines

SOME CHANGES HAVE BEEN MADE on Bing's show. No more *Lina Romay*. *Peggy Lee* will appear "semi-regularly" (she should fit into that spot like a loud shirt on Crosby) and negotiations are underway to sign *The Andrews Sisters* for "semi-regular" guest shots. Understand *Skitch Henderson* stays, and that being the case, we hope he really does his stuff, for whether it's his selections, or not enough of him and too much orchestra, or what, we've found none of his solos to be comparable to his recorded pianoizing on "Five Minutes More." Also, since Bing's rating nose-dived to almost half of its opening 24, the powers that be prescribed bigger and better guest stars—maybe Heifetz, Benny, Jolson. That should help. It also might help not to repeat the same songs on the show within a period of six weeks. Surely there are plenty to use, or is Bing that lazy?

INCIDENTALLY, speaking of ratings, explain this: "*The Hunting and Fishing Club*" (which precedes Crosby's transcription) chalked up a 3.4 before Bing came back on the air, but the night he returned and got a 2.4, *The Club* tottered to 2.0. I know seven others besides myself who listened to *Hunting and Fishing Club* for the first time the night Bingsday first happened!

HEAR THAT ARLENE FRANCIS is going to transcribe her "*Affairs of Ann Scotland*" so that she'll still continue to air when her baby debuts early next year. . . . *Bill Anson* seems to be winning more and more fans all the time. The kids like the stuff he plays: "It's not what he wants to hear but what he knows we want," they tell me. . . . Glad the *Henry Russells* (he's musical director for NBC) have a baby girl. Their other small daughter was drowned about a year ago and they didn't care much about anything for awhile. . . .

ISN'T IT FUNNY how folks will stick around waiting for a break and then finally go to town when a record happens to hit? *Betty Rhodes*, who used to be Mutual's standby and more recently warbled on the *Parkyakarkus* show, is the latest to greet long-deserved success. Her RCA-Victor record of "Rumors Are Flying" seems to have turned the trick. . . .

WHAT'S A SHOW THEME MEAN TO YOU? To us each one is indelibly identified with the program it heralds and oddly enough, it is reminiscent of only the best the show has aired. That's why we don't like *Fibber* and *Molly's* rah-rah football type of theme this season. Let the summer replacement, *Fred Waring*, use it if he

wants to, but let *Billy Mills'* tune that we associated for years with *Wistful Vista*, set the stage for the winter series. *Fibber* and *Molly* aren't the same without it. And that goes for all the shows that change off just as soon as you've come to know the theme. No show should change theme, unless, of course, the show itself is changed importantly.

EVERY RADIO STATION IS SUPPOSED to devote a certain amount of time to public service programs. Some do an excellent job in this respect. Others make an effort, if for no other reason than to assure renewal of their license by the FCC. Not complying with the spirit of the law, they refuse to realize that radio, though run by private enterprise, is also the most potent medium of public dissemination and as such, should measure up more adequately to public needs.

No one expects radio to devote huge hunks of valuable time in an attempt to "elevate" the public. The public doesn't like to have "it's-good-for-you" stuff crammed down its throat. It has to be done subtly and whatever is done has to be given good writing, adequate casting, experienced production, and decent time for airing. Else why bat your brains out?

Even as fine a program as "*Pacific Story*" misses the boat when it's put on the air at a time like Sunday night at 11:30. With commercial competition what it is, one network or station can't successfully undertake a lone wolf schedule in putting on better and more informative programs in the public interest. It has to be a joint undertaking by an awakened radio, which realizes that it had better beat the critics by organizing or take a beating.

HAVE TO HAND IT to *Jack Benny* for being big enough (and smart showman enough) to let the *Ronald Colmans* (and *Leo Durocher*) get in their guest whacks so tellingly. Although Benny didn't have every other line to say, his personality dominated the whole show and the result was great. Why don't more stars take the tip? And why wouldn't the Colmans make a good starring team for their own air show (if they could get writers like Benny's!)

reveals a serious side in telling us that poetry is his intellectual hobby and proudly exhibiting a recently published volume called "Windfall" to prove it.

There seems to be no denying then that the boys are gluttons for punishment, and by way of added confirmation they point to their new "Noble and Allen Show," the broad, cast time of which had not been established as this article went to press.

How did they get that way? Well, Allen, younger of the team, comes naturally by a will to do or die in the field of comedy, since he's the son of Belle Montrose and Billy Allen, well known vaudeville stars of another era. Noble, on the other hand, attributes his work-horse capabilities to years of rise-and-shine announcing at stations in Phoenix and Hollywood. "That's work in anybody's language," he frankly admits.

What next for these fast-rising comics? It's hard to say. They're under seven-year contract to Mutual, and there are those who feel that MBS network bigwigs, openly admitting the net's deficiency in the comedy field, are grooming the boys for still bigger things, meanwhile warding off the other networks, who, it is known, have cast covetous eyes upon one of the most promising comedy teams to originate in radio in the past ten years. Our guess is that Allen and Noble still have a long way to go, but they've got their sights on the top, and with their exceptional talent, they'll get there no matter how hard the climb. After all, they are gluttons for punishment!

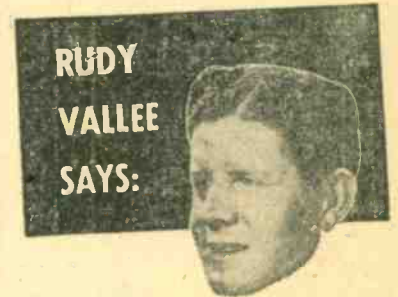

IN OUR line of duty as a Radio Life reporter, we have often experienced what we consider must be the ultimate in thrills to excite the feminine fancy. For instance, there was the time that Clark Gable creased his manly cheeks with those world-famous dimples just for our benefit alone, when he appeared as guest of an airshow and we were introduced to him. Then, there was the morning that we breakfasted with Tony Martin and he crooned French love songs to us over our grapefruit. Still again, there was the time that . . .

But why go on? These memories, thrilling as they once were, pall beside our glowing experience of a recent afternoon when, again for the sake of dear old R.L., we found ourselves sharing a Farmers Market lime chiffon pie with Fred Beck!

The purpose of our tete-a-tete with Beck, of course, was to learn what we could about this whimsical connoisseur of cabbages and kings who has created an oft-quoted newspaper column (see the L. A. Times) and a widely-sold book (see "Second Carrot from the End") out of such things as succotash and squash, and is also now being heard, delivering his capricious discourses, Monday through Friday mornings over CBS.

"That Is . . ."

One thing we learned immediately about Beck—and it came as no surprise—is his love and appreciation of people. "I like everybody," he stated with sincerity, then reconsidered this blanket declaration and quickly added, "That is, everybody except stars."

"Stars make me uncomfortable and self-conscious," he explained. "They may be nice people underneath it all, but their giant egos overwhelm me."

Beck readily admitted to some exceptions — "like Dinah Shore," he smiled. "She's always so natural and friendly and down-to-earth."

Fred Beck certainly has no "star" complex about himself. Of his newly reinitiated radio career, he smilingly remarked, "I'm not good, but what have I got to lose?"

He reminisced sardonically about his first radio show. "They got a lot of men together, and somebody to wave a stick at them so they would make a lot of noise, and in the brief moments of quiet, I sat at a little microphone and talked about something or other," was Fred's caustic commentary on this program in his past. "They put me on the show because they liked the way I write — then they hired somebody else to write my scripts!"

But Fred's new show contains a peck of pure Beck—and his listeners love it! "Got a new gimmick on the show," the writer advised us. "The listeners are asked to send in any word in the English language

and I guarantee to tell them what's wrong with it. I can't miss." Neither can his listeners, because Beck's debunking is delightful.

Tells About Son

"My favorite program," commented Mr. B. at that point, "is Frank Bull. Not particularly by choice, but because my son, Junior, loves the show dearly and his radio is the loudest in the house. He sits huddled up by the loudspeaker and plays an imaginary set of trap drums during the show. It's quite wearing on him — not to mention everyone else."

"How old is your little boy?" was naturally our next query.

"Well, that would indicate the age of five," replied Beck, "but actually, he is old enough to have been in and out of the Navy."

Junior's father has also been "in and out of the Navy." "I got tired of hearing civilians kick about the butter shortage," related Fred, "so in December of 1943, I went down to the Navy recruiting office and asked them how old they took 'em in. Fat and forty, I somehow qualified and was sent to boot camp, where I jumped over things built for seventeen-year-olds."

From then on, Beck's record of service, as he amusingly recounted, consisted of writing recruiting publicity for Wave enlistments, wished-for overseas orders turning out to be a transfer from downtown Los Angeles to downtown Hollywood, and standing for fifteen-minute waits in the chow line at the Brown Derby. Two years after his enlistment, on December 7, 1945, Beck received his "ruptured duck."

While in the Navy, Beck also scripted the Dinah Shore AFRS shows

for overseas. Today, he scripts his own airshow two or three days in advance as a rule, working on it and his column in an office on the grounds of the Farmers Market—"which has cost me forty pounds," he commented dryly, "on my avoir-dupois."

Beck goes directly to his office to settle down to his writing tasks after the completion of his morning broadcast—"but I always manage to get home by five or six for cocktails with the family, a quiet dinner (except for Frank Bull, Junior and his trap drums), a little reading and so to bed. It's not exactly a strenuous life," he maintained. But considering both the quantity and quality of Beck-isms which Fred pounds out on his typewriter every day, we would consider it far from a life of leisure, too.

On the first and third Tuesdays of the month, we were further informed, Beck's daily routine varies. On these days, he has his hair cut. "My barber, Leo, is a great guy with a flair for words," he beamed. "The other day, Leo says to me, 'You know, all the fellows in this place except me are xenophobes.'"

"Oh, really," I replied, assuming an intellectual air," Beck went on with his narrative. "Then, as soon as I got the hot towel off my face, I beat it home to my wife, who knows everything. She told me what a xenophobe is."

Before we took our leave, while wiping the lime chiffon pie crumbs off our chin, we wondered aloud about the myth of Fred Beck.

"It's a myth," smiled Fred. "I'm just an ad writer who writes what he wants to write."

And we might add — Beck is no xenophobe, either.

RadiOasis KCMJ May Be Small but What a Wallop It Packs for Palm Springs' Increasing Ether Fans

itself as RadiOasis, the only station covering that region and serving a basic audience of 17,713.

Co-owned by two veteran radioites, Announcer Dick Joy and ex-radio engineer Don McBain (hence KCMJ), the station is staffed by eight able air technicians who run the daily seventeen-and-a-half-hour operating schedule. By popular demand, Saturday night's listeners receive an hour and a half Bonus Edition when the station remains on the air until 1:30 a.m.

Headed by General Manager Clinton Jones, former head of CBS' West Coast News Bureau, the crew includes Russ Ehresman, Promotion Manager; Jack Donahue, Traffic Manager and Music Librarian; George Irwin, Sales Manager; Bob Jones, Assistant Chief Engineer; Harold Leland, Announcer-Engineer; Roland Vaile, Sports Announcer and Continuity Editor; Sheldon Bren, Announcer of News and Special Events; Carson Pinkley (affectionately titled "Jughead"), Disc Jockey and Announcer, and Kay Davis, Secretary.

The staff, composed of many ex-servicemen friends of Joy and McBain, has an aggregate of sixty years' total experience in all phases of radio, including announcing,

NESTLED beneath the San Jacinto Mountains and basking in the luxury of glamorous Palm Springs is the dream of two lifetime friends. Only the dream isn't wrapped in pink clouds and bearing the hopeful label of "someday." It's a very much down-to-earth modernistic, two-toned green stucco radio station boasting the call letters KCMJ.

Operating on 250 watts, KCMJ is a Columbia Broadcasting affiliate and can be heard via 1340 on the dial—if you are in Palm Springs or a neighboring community. "MJ" tags

newscasting, sales, promotion, copy-writing and engineering.

Relaxed Atmosphere

Last week, KCMJ and her smart staff stepped out of the aforementioned descriptions and proved themselves to be far more fascinating than their modest publicity. Radio Life's overnight visit to RadiOasis was such a jolly one that Monday found us back at our typewriter trying to segregate our potpourri of pleasant memories. And we came to the conclusion that the easy-going atmosphere of Palm Springs fosters the easy-going camaraderie of "MJ."

One soon learns that "informality" is the keyword of the station in everything from the presentation of shows to the staff's manner of dress. And at the risk of trading upon co-owner Joy's penchant for puns, we'd like to mention that KCMJ provides a share of "joy" for each of its members.

Cornering Dick (McBain is at present an airline pilot and usually away from the station), we made a tour of RadiOasis and plagued its co-owner with a myriad of questions about its operations. Joy, who can be heard as announcer for CBS' "Sam Spade" and NBC's coast-airing of the "Telephone Hour," confessed that the station is in the midst of growing pains which include imminent plans for moving business offices into new studios in Palm Springs proper, as well as enlargement of KCMJ's present site.

McBain and Joy materialized their dream station during 1944 and 1945, and with the emanation of the CBS Frank Sinatra Show on February 12, 1945, from RadiOasis, the station was in operation. Like everything worth fighting for, KCMJ has presented its share of major broadcasting and building problems to its energetic young owners, who confess that there are still obstacles to be overcome, and kinks to be ironed out.

Business Good

"But we can see the road ahead,"

proudly relates Joy, who spends as much spare time as possible at the station. "Why, we did two-thirds of our regular air business during the slack summer season here. We have a wonderful staff just as interested as Don and I in the welfare of 'MJ.'"

Since its inaugural broadcast, the station has endeavored to present a well-balanced schedule of network shows, news and sportscasts, programs of civic interest, and platter shows. Heading the latter department is Carson Pinkley, who as disc jockey opens the day with his "Sundialer's Club" and signs off with "Music for the Party." In addition to having dubbed himself "Jughead," Pinkley has built up a fan following who drive out to RadiOasis to visit him while his shows are in progress. And in honor of his popular Saturday night Bonus Edition, a local fountain named a sundae, the "Pinkley Special."

Saturday night also finds another session of "MJ's" newest ailer, "Speak Up, Listener." Something new in a radio open forum, "Speak Up, Listener" offers two average listeners an opportunity to debate ether subjects with two radio experts. (Editor Evelyn dropped in on that week's discussion of soap operas.) To date, guests have included producer Diana Bourbon, director George Allen, emcees Wes Battersea and Harry Mitchell, Ozzie and Harriet, and John Guedel.

Local sportscasts are handled by Roland Vaile (announcer Dave's younger brother) and Sheldon Bren. Newscasts are divided among announcers Pinkley, Donahue and Le-land.

Perusing KCMJ's crowded agenda, we ran across a daily noonday show appropriately entitled "Siesta Time." "Brought about by popular demand," smiled Joy, "and typical of life here. But don't let the easy-going atmosphere deceive you. Keep an eye on KCMJ and watch us grow."

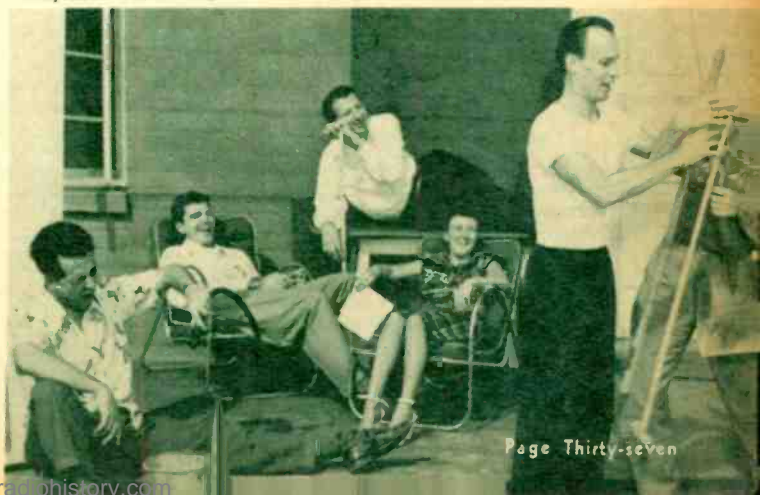

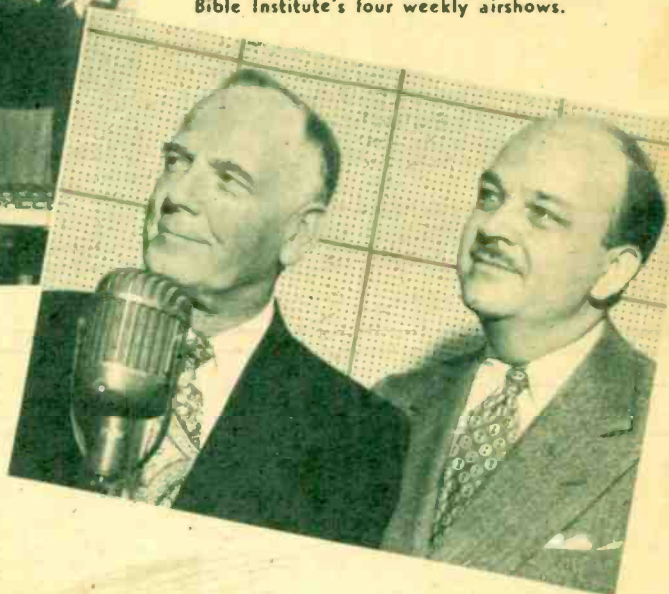

The Bible Institute of Los Angeles Dramatizes True Experiences of its Evangelistic Students and Graduates.

SINCE September 29, the Bible Institute of Los Angeles has presented its first half-hour transcontinental program over the Mutual Broadcasting System.

In addition to sacred musical selections sung by the student musical choir, the program offers personal interviews, dramatic skits and testimonies of members of the student body in training for missionary work.

The students at the Bible Institute come from all over the United States. Thirty states are represented in this year's enrollment of over eight hundred students. Although the approximate cost for each student enrolled in the Bible Institute is \$125 each year, there has never been any tuition charged for any of the courses.

Perhaps one of the most valuable courses taught at BIOLA is the Medical Missionary Course. Feeling that radio listeners would benefit from the experiences of its students and graduates, director Dr. Louis T. Talbot presents true dramatized experiences each week on the air.

One True Story

On October 20th's broadcast, twen-

ty-four-year-old Benjamin Arroz, born in the Philippines, told how he happened to be a student at BIOLA.

He first learned of Christian religion through attending Sunday school taught by missionary nurse Elsie Fay. When the war broke out, Ben joined the guerilla army. Miss Fay was not captured by the invading Japanese and worked long hours every day nursing the wounded American and Filipino boys who escaped. When she was desperately ill with malaria, Ben used to conceal her in the bushes from the Japanese who made regular inspections. If she were delirious, he would have to gag her to keep her quiet. After the war, they were married and returned to America. Ben is now enrolled at the Bible Institute of Los Angeles to train for missionary service and both he and Elsie are awaiting the day when they can return to the Philippines as medical missionaries.

Another student, Jesse Miller of Hollydale, California, told how he happened to be at BIOLA. Miller

was stationed in the Philippines and was captured by the Japanese. He participated in the infamous Bataan Death March and barely escaped being killed numerous times.

Upon his release, he stated that he felt it was God's will that he live and complete his plans of becoming a missionary. After graduating he will return to the Philippines to serve in the country where his life was spared.

Japanese-born William Hirose of Los Angeles grew to feel there was a definite need for Christian teachers in Japan while serving there in the United States Army. Bill is now in his second year at the Bible Institute and upon graduation plans to sail for Japan to spend his life in service for the people of his own race.

Or, perhaps you met him first in Metro's "Bataan." That was Desi Arnaz's last film assignment before his departure for Army service, and one of his favorite picture parts because it afforded him an opportunity to delve into drama.

Winningly modest and amazed by his success of the last several months, he shook his head in wonderment over the crowning triumphal occurrence—his band's assignment on the Hope show. "It ees wonderful!" he enthused. "After I got out of the Army, I had expected to sit around for a couple of years doing nothing. It's happened to others, you know," he pointed out, "but I've been so lucky."

Night-Club Successes

Its assignment to the Hope show is not the only achievement of the new Desi Arnaz band. In the few months of its existence, its fourteen-week engagement at New York's Copacabana was the longest for any band there, and its stage stint at the Chicago Theater broke all band records established at that Windy City show-spot in the past two years. Local nightery-fanciers who fancy the Arnaz brand of rhythm crowded Ciro's during its stay there, and record connoisseurs are collecting Arnaz waxings being turned out by the band under the Victor banner.

House of Congress. That was until 1933," Desi recalled. "Then, there was the revolution. We had been one of the wealthiest families in our town. We suddenly found ourselves penniless."

Desi was sixteen at that time and had studied music as a child, first the piano, then the guitar. "My mother, when she was first lady of the town, gave many charity benefits," the band man reminisced, "and I usually entertained at them."

But following the revolution, Desi and his family migrated to Miami, Florida, where each of them took whatever jobs they could find. "I did just about everything," the star remembered. "I drove taxicabs and things like that—and once, I had to clean out bird cages in a drug store. I think that was the worst job I have ever had."

After this period, Desi turned to his first love, music, joining a Miami rumba band as guitarist and singer, "against my father's wishes," smiled Arnaz. "But I earned forty dollars a week, and to me, it was like stealing money."

At the same time, he was completing his high school studies. Then, after his stint with the rumba band, he joined Xavier Cugat's larger organization, and in 1937, branched out on his own, introduced to dance-lovers the South American craze, the Conga, and opened a New York nightery called "La Conga."

"Too Many Girls" came next.

Needless to say, Desi's father has become reconciled to his son's career in music. "My father is still in Miami, doing very well for himself, too—in the cigar business," Arnaz replied in our inquiry about his parents' whereabouts, "and just now, my mother is enjoying a return visit to Cuba."

All of which provides a happy ending to the saga of the Arnaz clan of Cuba. As for Desi himself, the success of his new band makes his contentment complete. "I think I organized eet, just because I like music so much," he concluded. "I am never happier than when I am working with my music."

that plays good Latin music loses the melodic quality of the American orchestras. With my band, I hope to combine the Latin rhythm with that melodic quality. It ees another happy medium," he smiled.

The actor-musician lives with his screen actress-wife, Lucille Ball, on a five-acre Northridge "ranch." "In Texas," he grinned charmingly, "they would murder you eef you call that a ranch."

Sports-Minded

A grove of three hundred orange trees, a variety of other fruits, and chickens are currently the chief mainstays of the Arnaz ranch. The cows and horses were sold during the war. When his schedule permits, Desi enjoys working on the ranch, and also actively participates in sports, favoring fishing, tennis and swimming. He formerly played football until he broke his knee. "Then, in basic training for the Army," he added, "I broke the other one."

He was given a limited service assignment in the Army, in the entertainment division. "I worked in the radio department," he told us, "and believe me, that experience ees coming in handy now." The Hope show is Arnaz's first regular radio assignment. But he and Hope have worked together before—with the Hollywood Victory Caravan and on camp shows. "He ees a *travelin' man!*" Desi smilingly commented about Hope.

Arnaz, too, has done some traveling for himself. His journeys began in Cuba, where he was born, and where his father was prominent in politics. "He was mayor of my home town, and a representative to the

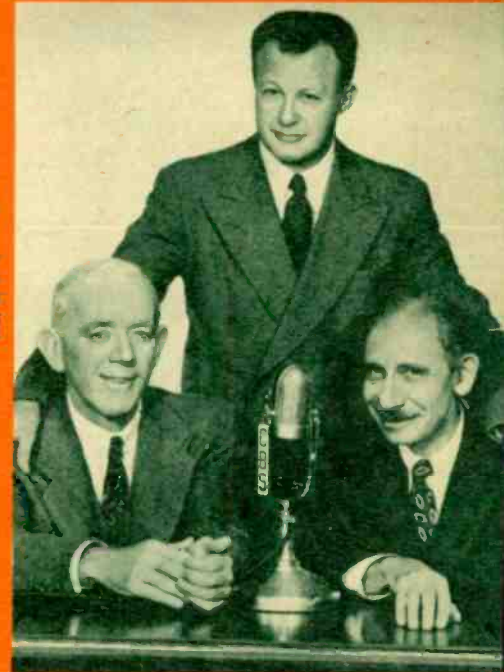
