At the end of the script a son is born to "Mrs. Gadis," and the listener realizes suddenly that he's just heard a heart-warming modern counterpart of the Nativity.

Well, ten years ago, in Pine Ridge, Arkansas, a midwife was called from a Christmas celebration to attend the birth of a baby. The expectant parents, a Mr and Mrs. Garrett, were living in a barn that Christmas because their house had burned down and they had nowhere else to go. At 6:30 p.m., as "Lum and Abner's" Christmas story was going off the air—a boy was born to the Garretts!

"He's ten years old this Christmas," Chet Lauck and Norris Goff told us, "and you know what his name is?—Chester Norris Garrett!"

Murray Burnett, writer-producer of Mutual's "True Detective Mysteries"

and "Special Investigator," sends us a Christmas tale as exciting as any he's brought to the air: "It happened when I was a junior at Cornell University. Christmas was coming up and the bank balance wouldn't permit a visit home. I was particularly pleased therefore, when my roommate invited me to have Christmas dinner with some friends of his in a neighboring town. (Forty-five miles seemed like next door.) We went, we ate, we sang and then we thought about returning to school. We had little choice but to hitchhike. With one rousing chorus, we left, our hearts bent on a Lincoln, Cadillac or Buick. After two hours, we happily accepted a ride in an old truck. The friendly driver had little to say about the Christmas season. He was full of tales about an escaped homicidal maniac. The reward was \$1,000. The maniac was in the area. The driver was out to fill his stocking with the cash and we were bent on helping him.

"Here's our guy," our driver exclaimed, and with that he pulled out a placard—WANTED—and a large

picture of the criminal. My blood turned cold. There could be no mistake. The driver's face was on the placard. I yelled, 'Stop, I see him—up on that hill!' The brakes screeched. The driver picked up a shotgun and pointed it at us. 'Come on, we'll all go get him. He's up on the hill just like you said.' It was a big gun, so we went.

"And I spent three hours on Christmas night frantically running through the hills of Elmira, New York, chased by a mad man with a big gun. We finally got him back to the truck and we happy three started on our way. At the first red light, we tore the door open, and ran for the nearest police station. Noel . . . Noel . . . Joyous Noel!"

Pert GeGe Pearson, who is Mrs. Hal Gerard, told us of her most memorable Christmas in few words. "It was the Christmas Day that Hal proposed," smiled GeGe. "And the following New Year's Eve we were married."

Radio's popular husband and wife team, Ozzie Nelson and Harriet Hilliard, co-stars of Columbia's "The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet," want to celebrate their 1946 Christmas in Hollywood with their two sons, David and Ricky. Ozzie and Harriet can call to mind altogether too many Christmas holidays which were spent on the road—while Ozzie was trouping with his orchestra and Harriet was vocalizing. The Nelsons want their Christmas tree, Harriet wants the fun of preparing Christmas dinner for Ozzie and the boys . . . and throughout the celebrating there'll be the comforting thought that they'll not have to move on that night to the next spot! Barbara's large assailant paused long enough in her arguing to wave affectionately at the float and cry, "Oh, there goes 'One Man's Family.' Oh, I just love every one of 'em!"

Dennis Day says the Christmas he'll always remember was the year before last when he was serving with the Navy in Honolulu. "I was entertaining the boys," recalled Dennis, "doing six, seven and sometimes eight shows a day. The two numbers they most requested me to sing were 'White Christmas' and 'I'll Be Home for Christmas.' The more I sang those songs the more homesick I became, until I felt like bawling in a corner!"

This Christmas is going to be the most memorable one for NBC's Kay Kyser. Kay and wife Georgia Carroll are the proud new parents of little Kimberly Ann Kyser and they're looking forward to celebrating her first Christmas. In fact, Kay has been looking forward to it for a long time. Last summer, Kay got the Christmas spirit in the middle of July and undaunted by New York heat he went shopping for Christmas presents for Georgia and little Kim!

Monica Lewis is now the singing star of her own Mutual program, "Monica Makes Music," but Monica tells us: "Just a few Decembers ago I was an aspiring teen-age singer with the usual combination of great ambition and no experience. I walked the same icy pavements others walked, rang the same door bells and had the same doors closed in my face. I wrote ardent letters to all my favorite orchestra leaders, begging for a chance. I found the same empty mailbox the next morning and the morning after that.

"When Christmas day rolled around, I had few thoughts left for the good old Yuletide, good will toward men, etc. My folks thought it would pep me up to have turkey dinner at the Stork Club. The Stork was gay and full of Christmas cheer, and when Sherman Billingsley stopped at our table to greet my mother, who promptly informed him of my ambition, I accepted his offer to sing a chorus with the band. Did I say accepted? I ran. I don't remember what words came out. It seemed like a dream, but apparently I mustered up enough courage to get through two songs. Much to my amazement, the dinner audience was tremendously generous with their applause, and I had to do a couple of encores!

"It took me two whole months to find my courage again. When I did, I went back to see Mr. Billingsley, reminded him of my inauspicious debut and coyly asked him for a job. He remembered my songs of Christmas night.

We don't think we're the least bit priggish or narrow-minded, and we well know that comedians have a hard time delivering gags without offending somebody or other. We do think, nevertheless, that the continual haranguing on the subject of mothers-in-law is not in good taste.

No—we aren't in that category ourselves (yet!) but the mothers-in-law we know are the nicest people in the world.

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

Pronounce It

Whether or not you are as fascinated with words as we are, you're sure to enjoy the program called "How Do You Pronounce It?", over ABC-KECA Tuesdays at 6:00 p.m. Basic idea of the show is to take a dozen or so words, spell them, pronounce them and define them. What naturally results, however, is an embellishment of humorous banter and intellectual tidbits delivered engrossingly by the program's personnel. The latter includes Professor George William Smith of the McCormack Theological Seminary as moderator, Doctor Robert Worth Frank of the same institution, as word authority (Dr. Frank oversees the program, armed with six dictionaries), and a quartet of guests who "make with the words." These four people are always chosen with the following prerequisites in mind—they must be interesting but "ordinary" folks, they have usually made somewhat of a name for themselves in some field of endeavor, and they should have a sense of humor. "Stuffed shirts" are not wanted.

Persons who have been heard on the show include such varied personalities as "Breakfast Clubber" Sam Cowling, Montana ranch woman Mrs. Delilah Horn, the woman editor of Chicago's "This Week" magazine, and the author of "The Greeks Have a Word for It," Mr. Peter S. Lambros.

Words discussed are "everyday," non-technical words—*decadent*, *epitaph*, *hosiery*, *assuage*, for example. These words are submitted to the show by its listeners so you dialers are given an opportunity to join in the fun!

A Chicago man wants to know what happened to Dr. Johnson's teapot during the London blitz. A Hollywood stunt-girl asks if there are any regular stunt-women in British films. A little girl in London wonders if there are any gypsies in the United States. A housewife in Scotland wonders where Americans go on their vacations.

These are just a few of the questions, some funny, some foolish, others intelligent, a few poignant, that the citizens of the United States and Great Britain can ask each other via CBS and the BBC on the fascinating program, "Yours Sincerely." (KNX, 9:30 a.m., Sunday).

Pleasant-mannered Charles Collingwood reads the letters containing questions from Americans all over the country. Across the Atlantic is Lionel Gamelin, who is ready with letters written by his countrymen to the people of our country.

On subsequent broadcasts the people of both countries write to the broadcast giving the answers to questions

previously asked. Happily, no questions seem to be taboo. Touchy subjects to the people of both countries have been aired and answered—not by professional politicians or newspaper columnists—but by the people they directly concern, you and your counterpart in Britain. Also, no question is too unimportant or obscure. Somewhere there is someone who knows exactly what you're asking about and is able to give you a satisfactory answer. Witness the case of the Chicago man who was worried about Dr. Johnson's teapot. People from many parts of England wrote to the program with information on not just one teapot which had belonged to the good Doctor, but the other nine he happened to own as well!

Much of the success of the program should be credited to the manner in which Collingwood and Gamelin handle their chores. They are friendly, anxious to help everyone with their requests and full of good humor. Lionel Gamelin, in his own quiet British way, supplies some of the most whimsical and spontaneous wit to be heard on the air.

The reception is generally good and there are no delays during the broadcast, a tribute to the good production on both sides of the Atlantic.

We don't think the value of this simple Sunday morning program can be overestimated. In a world full of tensions and doubts it is very reassuring to know that someone is discussing gardens with a citizen of another country half-way round the world.

It's too bad that language barriers keep us from having programs like this exchanged with many other countries.

Radio In Review

"American Forum"

For worthwhile listening, we highly recommend the weekly "American Forum" (Mutual, Tuesdays, 6:30 p.m.). Originated eighteen years ago by Theodore Granik, a Washington, D.C., lawyer, it makes the claim of being radio's oldest public service program.

It is a forty-five-minute period of lively debate on timely and controversial topics of the day, with a board of four experts presenting firm arguments for both the positive and negative sides of the issue.

In addition to the opinions aired on the show, a mail poll is taken and a telephone survey made in a key city of the country, tabulating public opinion on the subject being discussed—all of which makes for an interesting and informative, as well as entertaining, parcel for the show's listening audience.

Your Servant

To our way of thinking, public service programs are among the best things which radio has to offer. KGFJ's "The Law Is Your Servant" (Tuesday and Thursday, 5:45 p.m.), is no exception. Both the station and the Los Angeles Bar Association (which comes to the air for the first time with this now-thirteen-weeks-old series) are to be commended for bringing this interesting and helpfully informative program to the listeners.

Vital technicalities of the law are relayed to the public on this show, in narrative stories of people with problems. Just for example, one broadcast told the story of a couple who had worked hard for their home and were suddenly overcome with the fear that they would now lose it because of debts they were unable to pay. A visit to a lawyer informed them of the Homestead Act which protects houses against the claims of creditors up to five thousand dollars. Another in the series told of a couple who purchased a refrigerator but didn't have any place to put it at the time of purchase, so left it in the home of the seller. Later, the seller, in great debt, had all of the furniture in his house attached—including the refrigerator! The couple who paid for the refrigerator then experienced a surprising loss, through ignorance of a law technicality!

These are just two of many examples of points of law which have been emphasized on this program. Writer Les Eckland is given sample cases, which he weaves into homespun tales involving fictional people. These are narrated in this fifteen-minute period by David Ballard.

Some use of dramatic inserts to highlight the narration might be interesting, and, if it were possible, discussion by members of the Bar Association on the law technicalities outlined would undoubtedly intrigue.

"P.S.: A few days later, I started singing with the band at the Stork Club, and my professional career was launched. Santa Claus has been good to me ever since, but surely that Christmas was my most memorable one."

Kenny Baker recalls most fondly the Christmas that he and his family spent in New York, when Kenny was starring in "One Touch of Venus" on Broadway. "The kids were in bed, their presents were all ready and Geraldine (Mrs. Baker) and I confessed to each other that we hadn't gotten presents for each other. That was the year that things were so hard to get and we just hadn't been able to decide on anything. 'Never mind,' my wife said, 'having you for a husband is the nicest present any girl could have at Christmastime.' What better Christmas present could a guy have than that?"

Actress Agnes Moorehead, "Marilyn" of Columbia's "The Mayor of the Town," thinks of the Christmas season in connection with snows and cold weather—as so many of us do. Agnes and husband Jack Lee own a farm, a favorite retreat for both of them, located in the wilds of New Concord, Ohio—and it's there they would like to celebrate Christmas 1946. However, Agnes is busy with her "Marilyn" characterization—and is presently working in a picture—so Christmas traveling is out of the question. Here's the happy solution at which she has arrived: Mrs. John Moorehead, her mother, will come to Hollywood from Wisconsin, as she has done in past years, and will bring the cheer of mid-western Christmas to daughter Agnes and son-in-law Jack.

Cowboy star Roy Rogers says he remembers the Christmas he was twelve years old. Roy lived in the little village of Duck Run, Ohio, and dreamed of the day when he would be grown up so he could fulfill his ambition of being a western star. That Christmas he was given a real shotgun for a Christmas present! "Gosh," Roy recalls, "that meant so much to me. It signified that I was a grownup man who was trustworthy enough to be allowed to own a real gun and that I was on my way to fulfilling that ambition!"

Other people may be sentimental about white Christmases in the East, but not Sam "Schlepperman" Hearn. When we asked him for a Christmas experience for this issue he smiled and said, "For four years I've been on the road at Christmastime. All I did was sit in a hotel room and play the radio."

"What about New York?" we persisted, recalling that last year when Fred Allen knocked at "Mrs. Nussbaum's" door in "Allen's Alley" that none other than "Schlepp" answered it.

Sam shook his head. "In New York, if you go out on the streets on Christmas Eve you get crushed to death. I think New Yorkers just stand around waiting for something to celebrate. When Christmas comes along they go mad."

We persisted, "Don't you have even one Christmas you remember?"

"Yes," smiled Sam, who confesses to being a sentimentalist. "It's this one. When I looked down Hollywood Boulevard the other day and saw the decorations going up, I got a lump in my throat. Hollywood is most beautiful at Christmas time—and this year I'm going to be here!"

When we asked Rosemary DeCamp she related:

"The many, many happy Christmases I've had all seem to blend into a rosy montage of pleasant times, all the more appreciated because of the vivid memory of the lonely Christmas I once spent in New York. I hadn't been out of college very long and was a comparative newcomer to show business, my chief experience having been a six-month tour with "The Drunkard," which concluded in miserable defeat, leaving me both broken in spirit and broke—literally. Nevertheless, I made New York my next goal and was fortunate enough to wangle a walk-on role in the Broadway production of "Merrily We Roll Along." The part wasn't anything to satisfy my artistic aspirations, my pocketbook was still sagging sadly, and I was very alone and very lonely. My family was clear across the country in California, and I was destined for a forlorn Christmas in Manhattan. And that's exactly what it was, brightened only by a tiny Christmas tree which the chorus girls in the show set up in their dressing room, and the packages of dime-store candy which we all exchanged as Yuletide gifts!"

Christmases can be memorable for more reasons than the traditional ones. Actor John Griggs of Mutual's "House of Mystery" sends us this tale of an actor's Christmas:

"Back in 1930, I was the juvenile member of Jessie Bonstelle's famous stock company in Detroit. Christmas day was like any other day for stock actors. We were playing in 'Remote Control,' a mystery play about radio.

"It was about an occult, 'Dr. Zizka,' who held seances over the air. In the first act, 'Dr. Zizka' is supposedly shot while performing a seance in a radio studio. No one was to know 'who done it.' The remaining two acts, with clues, clues and cues, would reveal the murderer.

"On this memorable Christmas night, the gun which was to shoot 'Dr. Zizka' didn't go off. Now, an experienced actor knows how to handle that one. He simply ad libs:

'He's been shot! It must have been a gun with a Maxim silencer!' But, at this performance, an over-anxious young actor yelled into the audience: 'I got him. I got him with a knife!'

"As the solution to the mystery hinged entirely on powder burns, the direction of the fired shot, etc., this was not the choice ad lib of the year. Everyone tried to correct the situation, or at least help it by saying: 'You mean he's been shot.' But no, the young actor insisted with his former zeal that he'd been *knifed*.

"Well, the rest of the play was exquisite torture. I'll never know how we made it, as we had to rewrite the play as we went along, substituting a knife wound and its clues for the gun shot clues. We all grew old that Christmas!

"The guilty young actor? He's in radio now—John Griggs!"

Don Wilson calls Christmas, two years ago, his most memorable one. Don was a member of a troupe entertaining at a veterans' hospital. Before the performance, the Chaplain had told Don that some of the boys who would be witnessing the show would never live to see another Christmas.

"We tried to give the best show that was in us," says Don, "without letting the boys know how we felt. It was the most dramatic experience I've ever had, and I'll never forget it—but I wouldn't like to do it again."

Sammy Kaye prizes the Christmas he was twelve years old. The Kayes senior had discouraged his musical bent and his desire to be a band leader. So, when young Sammy came downstairs on Christmas morning and found a piano, drums and saxophone, "it was not only my most memorable Christmas," says Sammy, "it was also the beginning of 'swing and sway.'"

Happy Felton, of ABC's "Pot O' Gold," calls the Christmas of 1934 his most memorable "no-Christmas". It seems that at the time, Happy was a band leader, and Christmas for him and his boys consisted of driving from a Christmas Eve engagement in Springfield, Massachusetts to a Christmas Day date in Wheeling, West Virginia—a distance of 650 miles through a blinding blizzard.

Ever meet a real life Santa Claus? No? Well, hardly anybody does. Andy Mansfield, now on KWKW and formerly half of the popular team of "Andy and Virginia," once did, and this real life Santa more than lived up to expectations.

It started several years ago when Andy and his wife, Virginia, had a program on KMPC together. One morning as they finished their broadcast, a huge bouquet of roses arrived for Virginia. The card said, "From your greatest admirer." On subsequent days gifts of fruits, choc-

I HAVE never gotten over being a little girl about opening packages. Christmas Customs Around the World

CHRISTMAS—What a wonderful word that is—Christmas . . . "Peace on earth . . . Good will toward men."

This year of 1946 it means even more than it did last year . . . or the year before . . . or the year before that. For the world is now at peace once again . . . the cannons are silenced . . . bombers no longer drone overhead, leaving death and destruction in their wake. And a new organization—the U.N.O.—is trying to build up a better understanding between nations—to build up good will toward all men.

Yes, this Christmas of 1946 we can look forward to a festive season; Christmas trees, Santa Claus, stockings hanging over the fireplace and all of the other customs that have been built up around this happy season.

Last year in Radio Life I told the story of a visit I made to the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem one Christmas Eve a number of years ago. It was a wonderful and unforgettable experience. And as is my usual yearly custom, I will retell that beautiful story on my program the Sunday before Christmas.

This year I would like to write about Christmas customs as I have observed them around the world.

Wherever you go in the Christian world you will hear carollers singing "Star of Bethlehem," "Silent Night," "Peace on Earth . . . Good Will to Men" and countless others, for the language of music is universal and it seems fitting for everyone to give thanks and praise in song at this season of the year.

But when you travel, you soon discover that most of our customs are practiced in only limited areas and that still others replace them elsewhere.

No Trees

To us a Christmas without a decorated tree would seem as if some-

thing were lacking, they are so much a part of our celebrations. Yet strange but true, only a very few countries include trees in their Christmas ceremonies, in fact, for the most part Germany and England are the only two where it is a regular feature.

Even our Santa Claus is unknown in many Christian countries, and in others he is known by different names. In most countries it is Saint Nicholas, although he is depicted in a very similar way, with white whiskers, red coat and a tasseled cap. As a matter of fact, the name Santa Claus originated in Holland. The Dutch children found it difficult to say Saint Nicholas, so they shortened it to Santa Klaus, but I can assure you that by whatever name Santa is known, they always welcome him into their homes; although not always on Christmas Day. For in many countries he arrives on December sixth and presents are exchanged on that date, for that is Saint Nicholas' Day.

In Russia, however, Santa Claus is replaced by a lady named Babouska. She was a good and kind woman who was supposed to have lived somewhere along the highways between Jerusalem and Bethlehem, at the time the three Wise Men were travelling on their way, following the Star, to the manger of the infant Christ. When they approached Babouska's home, they found her busy cleaning. When she learned that they were on their way to pay homage to the newborn King of the Jews she was very anxious to accompany them, but she wished to finish her cleaning first. The three Wise Men continued on their way, and when Babouska had completed her work she set out to overtake them. She failed, however, and is supposed to have been wandering all over the world ever since, seeking the Christ Child, Jesus. So in Russia and several other European countries the children still believe that it is Babouska who comes down the chimney and leaves gifts for them, yet strangely enough she

comes on January the sixth instead of December the twenty-fifth. Because it was on January the sixth that the Wise Men found the manger.

Holy Religions

In Italy they spend their Christmas Day in worship. Each church has a little waxen effigy, made to represent the Christ Child. It is dressed in its finest clothes and then placed in a tiny cradle—the children call him "Il Bambino." The most famous one is in a church in Rome. As the children mount the steps past the cradle on Christmas Day they recite the story of the birth and childhood of Christ. It is a very wonderful and impressive sight.

However, the Italian children are lucky because they get two lots of presents, for they also believe in Babouska like the Russians, whom they call Befana. So on the night of the fifth of January the Italian children can be seen emptying all their pockets and hanging their clothes around the fireplace, very much as American children (and often grownups too) hang up their stockings on Christmas Eve. However, although Befana fills the pockets of the good children with candy and other presents, she fills those of naughty children with pieces of wood and dust. But I imagine that in Italy they are all good at that season just as they are in America.

Christmas or Noel is a very solemn

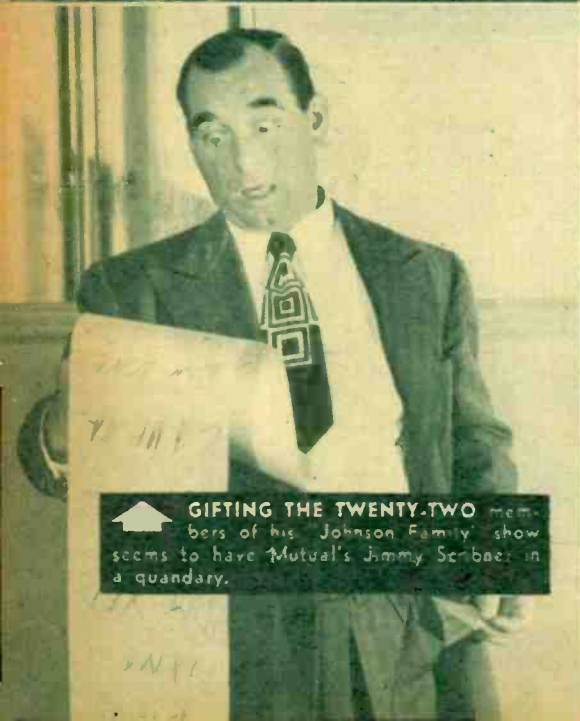

day in France. The children put their shoes around the fireplace the night before and the following morning they find them filled with gifts. The rest of the day, however, is spent at church or quietly sitting at home. On the other hand, January the sixth is a day of fun. In each household a cake is baked, big enough to divide among the entire family and all the guests. Sometimes hidden in that cake is a bean, and whoever gets it become king or queen for the evening and can choose someone as his or her consort.

Candle Ritual

And so it is that each country has its own customs. In Croatia, Yugoslavia, the finest part of every crop is saved for Christmas—wine, fruit, flour . . . in fact the best of everything. Then an enormous log is brought in from the forest, and it is only burned after wine has been sprinkled over it. Two loaves of bread are also baked to represent the Old and the New Testament. At exactly midnight on Christmas Eve the church bells ring out. Then it is that the head of the family lights one of three candles that have been standing on the table and it is passed around to each member, then extinguished. At noon the next day the second candle is lighted, allowed to burn for a few minutes, then blown out and the soft end is pushed into a cup containing wheat, barley and other grain. Those sticking to it are then carefully counted because these industrious Croatian farmers believe that whichever kind of grain has the most kernels sticking to the candle will yield the biggest crop for the coming year. The third candle stands on the table till New Year's Day when it is lighted to signify the end of the holiday season.

In Germany, Santa Claus is known as Kris Kringle and as I stated before, the Christmas tree is found in every home, for it was in Germany that this custom was first used.

Although the name Santa Klaus originated in Holland and he is depicted there very much as he is in America, instead of driving reindeer he is pictured as riding a white horse. And strange but true, Dutch children actually place hay, oats and carrots in their wooden shoes for the horse. The shoes are then locked in a room, so that the children know that Santa must have ridden his steed down the chimney, for who else but the horse could have taken the oats and carrots?

A feast is held on Christmas Eve in the country regions of Norway and Sweden. Then early in the morning the whole family gets into a sled and with jingling bells goes

happily on its way to church, where services are held at four o'clock in the morning. Every farmer places a sheaf of corn on a pile in front of his house for the birds. And also it was in the Scandinavian countries that mistletoe was first used.

English Yule

Strangely enough, although the tree now plays an important part in the celebrations in England, it was long after the California gold rush before a Christmas tree appeared in that country. Only during the last fifty years has it become a regular part of the festivities. In England Santa Claus is known as Father Christmas. Presents are now exchanged on Christmas Day but the day following is still a holiday called "Boxing Day." Few people now remember the origin. Originally Christmas was given up entirely to church services and meditation and the following day was devoted to celebrating and feasting. Storekeepers gave their customers boxes of candles and the churches put out boxes in which to receive alms for the poor. Sometime later people started to give each other gifts, and as these were always placed in boxes and wrapped, it became known as Boxing Day.

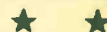
Many people, of course, do eat turkey in England, but most enjoy roast beef or a goose in its place. Following this, the Christmas pudding is brought in all ablaze . . . rum or brandy having been poured over it and set on fire. Often little silver miniature charms are cooked in the pudding and everyone searches in the hope of finding something, but not the silver bachelor's button, for that denotes that the finder will not get married.

After dinner is over, the lights are turned out and the whole family gathers in front of the large Yule fire and watches the flames as stories are told.

So it appears as if we here in America have taken the best out of

the customs of other countries and turned them to our use to make Christmas an outstandingly happy season.

Let us this year, while we enjoy ourselves, think of all those people, all over the world, also celebrating Christmas. In many lands many people are still near starvation, many are uncertain about the future. So let us pray this Christmas that long before another year rolls around all nations will have found a way of guaranteeing lasting peace on earth . . . and everlasting goodwill toward all men and women and children in the world.
