SO HELP ME—I'll never do that again!"

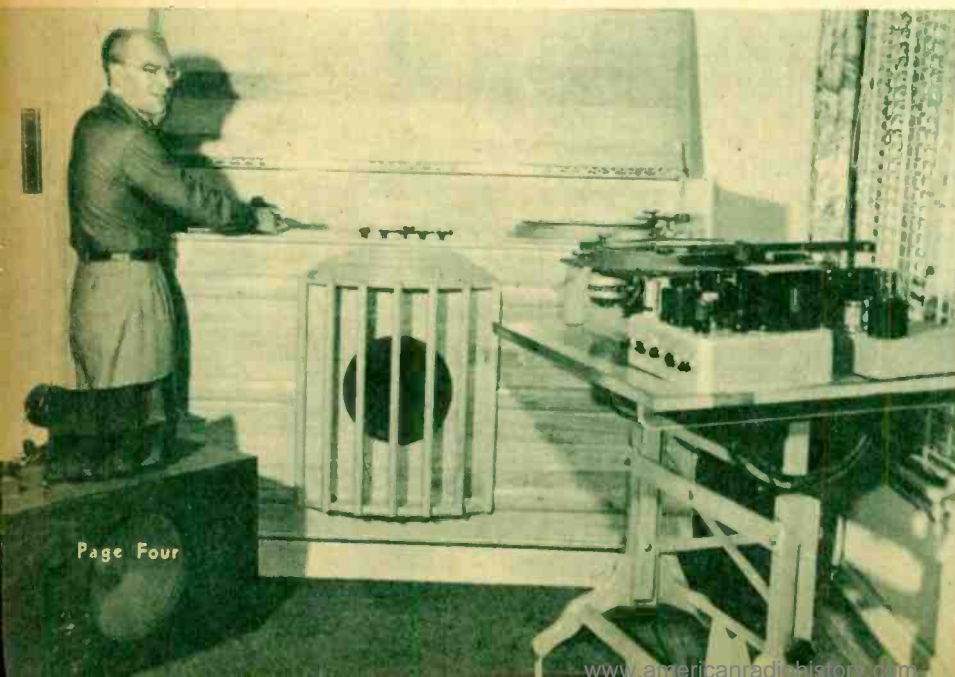

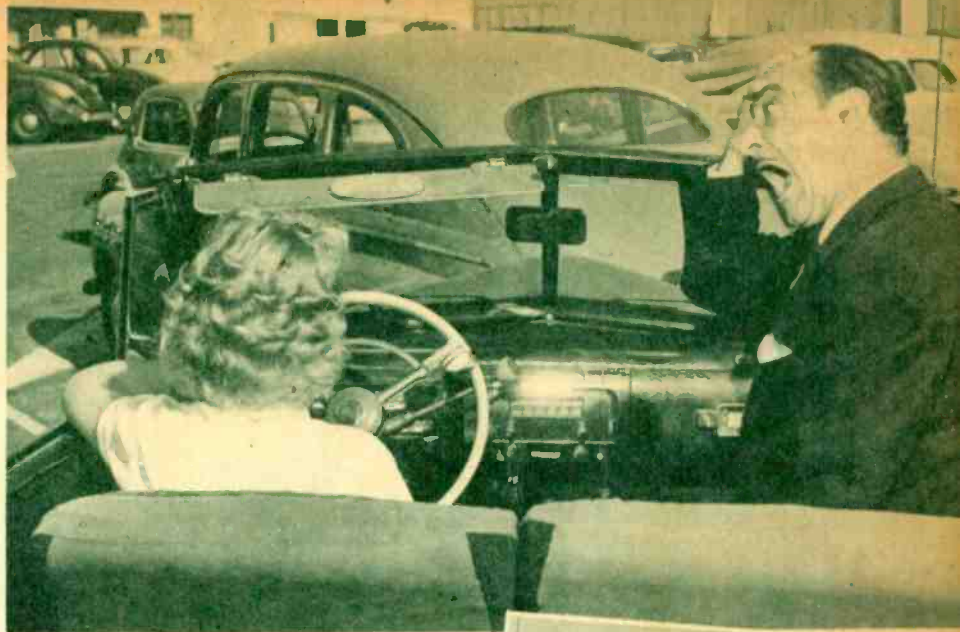

Dennis Reveals in His Own Half-Hour That Singing Is Not Only Achievement

ONE OF THE brightest half hours on the kilocycles this season is being chalked up by young Dennis Day. Radioites knew he had it all the time, but Dennis himself is overwhelmed by the magnanimous response.

"Sure, every fellow dreams of a show of his own," he confided, "but they don't always work out. Guess I was lucky."

To our way of thinking, Dennis' modest "lucky" should have been, instead, "talented." As they say in modern jargon, Eugene McNulty. "Dennis Day" is "loaded with it." And we also feel that having heard

smatterings of the Day versatility via guest spots, we're more than ready to digest a weekly showful.

Dennis' naive humor, so aptly summed up by his wistful "Yes, please," is well known to listeners. As for his singing, the consensus rightly claims it "tops." But Day as a comedian, mimic and actor can be equally billed.

We don't like to be the kind who says, "I told you so," but we must boastfully admit we've had garlands ready to toss since our first encounter with Day.

Excellent Cast

Just what contributes to making a sure-fire comedy show? Perusing the credits on the Day script, we viewed nothing but the finest of talent, a number one essential. Such thespians as Sharon Douglas, Bea Benadaret, John Brown, Dink Trout, and Bob Bailey; writers Frank Galen, Russell Beggs, Arthur Alsbury, Frank Fox and Bill Davenport comprised the list. Direction of the musical numbers is under the baton of Charles "Bud" Dant, and Frank O'Connor is in charge of over-all production.

But we feel one of the wisest moves executed by Day when he branched out from under the violin of Jack Benny was in maintaining the same character he had previously established.

Dennis Day starred in "A Day in the Life of Dennis Day" was no different from the Dennis Day featured on the Benny show. From Sunday's adventures to Thursday's, the singer-comedian only seems to find more time in which to leap in and out of hot water.

As a soda-JERK, poor Day is in love with Mildred Anderson, whose parents prefer heel-suitor Victor Miller. That's the premise of each week's script into which the writers throw a new obstacle course to be hurdled by our unsuspecting hero. The plot is always refreshingly funny, per-

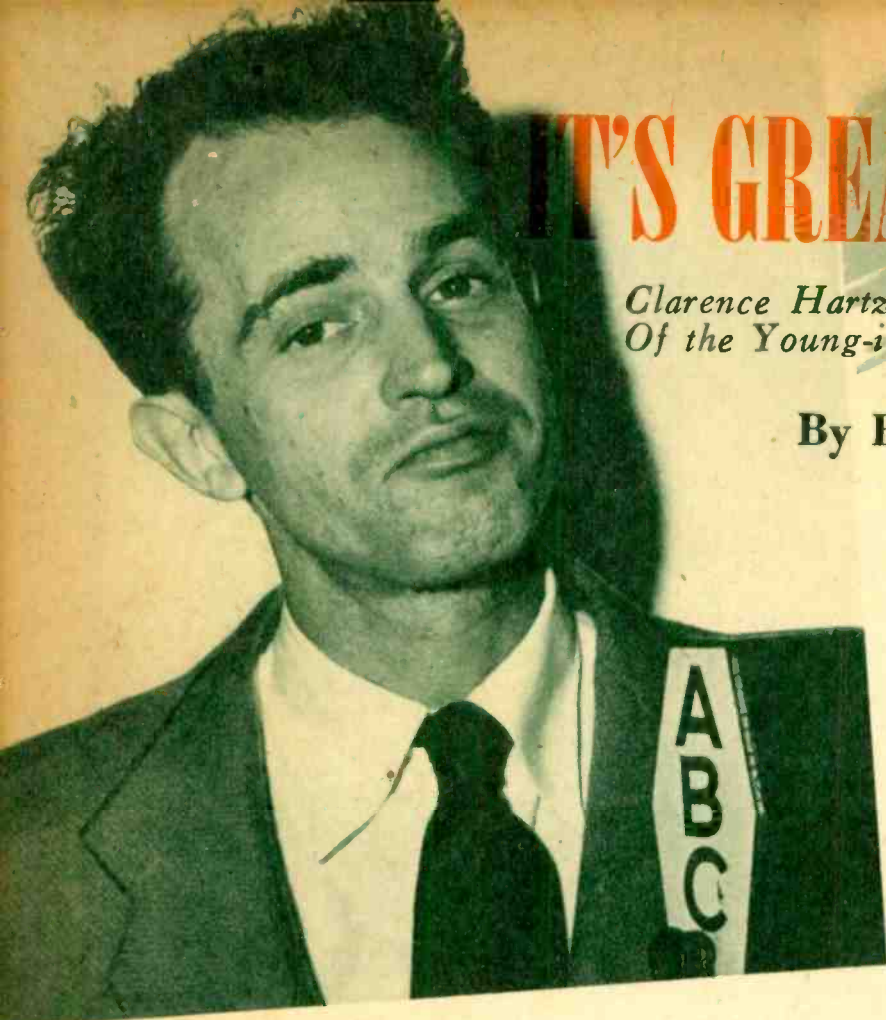
haps due to the simplicity with which it is handled. We've even heard hardened radio veterans chuckling over Dennis' predicaments.

Observing Day during an afternoon rehearsal session, we noted he still displayed the same verve and enthusiasm which are a great part of his charm. Yet much of his shyness seems to have developed into self-confidence, which aids in presenting a more mature appearance.

"Yep, guess I was lucky," Dennis repeated gratefully, whereupon, we'd like to repeat (and we're not press agents for Dennis!) that such talent is deserving of luck.

IT'S GREAT TO BE OLD

Clarence Hartzell Enjoys His Portrayals
Of the Young-in-Heart Oldsters He Plays

Clarence broke into radio on his home town station doing a harmony act with his brother. Discovering that he couldn't make a living as a musician he became an announcer on a Cincinnati station. From there he went to Chicago as an announcer and writer. "I never did study acting," he smiled, "I guess I just kinda fell into it." A job with a local stock company playing the part of an old man was the deciding factor in Clarence's career. "It was so much fun playing old men!" he exclaimed. Soon he was playing "Uncle Bud" on the popular "Uncle Ezra" show, "Pappy Yocum" on "Li'l Abner" and characters on shows that he himself had written—that is, if the characters were over-age!

When Paul Rymer, writer of "Vic and Sade," decided to write in the part of "Uncle Fletcher," who heretofore had been heard only through the cryptic letters the old man had been penning to "Sade," his niece, Clarence was the logical choice for the zany "Uncle." Clarence's interpretation was wildly successful with "Vic and Sade" fans who had been fearful that the portrayal of "Uncle Fletcher" would fall short of his fanciful letters.

Living Here

For six years, Clarence supplied his brand of aged whimsy on this show, whose fans included practically everyone in radio. Chet Lauck and Norris Goff were particular admirers of the program and of Clarence's portrayal. "The minute we heard him, we wanted him," Chet "Lum" Lauck told us. So when the "Vic and Sade" program was terminated, Clarence came west to portray "Mr. Watt" on "Those Websters" and was promptly grabbed by "Lum and Abner" to create "Doctor Benjamin Franklin Withers," "Lum's" boarder. "Doc" fits in perfectly with the rest of the characters in Pine Ridge and his vagaries are even more fanciful than before. Clarence, who had been in Hollywood only three weeks when we talked to him, is also being heard

Intending to be a musician, Clarence studied violin and piano and made one of his first public appearances as the drum major with his high school band. He recalled fondly that he was a pretty stylish sight in a tall fur hat and he got such a big laugh once when, at the end of his routine, he bowed and his hat plopped off into the mud that he always finished that way.

For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

Picks 'Em

Collaring sportscaster Rube Samuelson during the height of pre-Christmas scurrying was an accomplishment chalked up the other day by Radio Life.

"So you want me to go out on a limb!", grinned Rube. "Okay, I pick UCLA's undefeated, un-tied Bruins for the up-coming Rose Bowl game. I think they'll lick the Big Nine champ, Illinois."

Rube seemed to know what he was talking about, because he saw two of the strongest Big Nine teams, Northwestern and Michigan, tangle early in the season back at Ann Arbor and he thinks the Bruins have a little too much power and finesse for Illinois come New Year's Day. In the nation's No. 2 Bowl (Sugar), he selects Georgia over North Carolina.

Last year, Rube became the first sports writer and commentator in the nation ever to pick every Bowl winner correctly for the St. Louis Sporting News. In past years, he's served as sports editor of both NBC's Western Division and CBS' West Coast operations, carrying also his own radio programs. This past year he has devoted much of his time to his own history of the Rose Bowl game, which will be published by A. G. Barnes & Son of New York next year.

He's sort of a modest guy, but we didn't promise not to tell on him,—how he's scooped the whole country on an impressive list of stories: Bing Crosby's selling his racetrack interests in order to buy into Pittsburgh Pirates National League baseball team; Buck Shaw's succeeding Stub Allison as head football coach at UC; the Army's being receptive to a January 1, 1946, Rose Bowl bid; and the Los Angeles Dons story (revealing the reorganization of the Don Ameche-headed professional football team.)

As to the importance of sports, Rube claims: "I hold to the opinion that sports and music provide just about the only media upon which the nations of this world can meet on common ground—yes, with all due respect to diplomacy. Or should we say power politics?"

Red on Commercials

Following the December 10th broadcast of NBC's Red Skelton show, the network was deluged with calls requesting copies of his talk about Radio commercials. For those Radio Lifers who are interested, here is what Red said (incidentally, he wrote this himself):

At this point, ladies and gentlemen, you usually get Rod O'Connor and a commercial . . . but tonight, at my own request you get ME . . . I've had something on my mind for a long time . . . and because it's on the level, I hope you'll listen.

While I was in the army I had a chance to talk to a lot of fellows about their likes and dislikes on various shows and products . . . and I might add they didn't pull any punches.

Then when I got out of service, I took my list of bees and paid a visit to our sponsors and advertising agency.

First on my list CAME THE COMMERCIALS! At one time or another we've all complained about radio commercials.

THEY WERE TOO LONG. . . THEY SHOULD BE ELIMINATED ENTIRELY . . . SOMETHING HAD TO BE DONE ABOUT THEM!!!

We've even been guilty of turning off our sets till the show started again . . . and since the commercial spot on our show has never been a part of my job, I'VE BEEN ONE OF THE BIGGEST SQUAWKERS.

But I'VE CHANGED MY MIND . . . IN EVERYTHING, TURN ABOUT IS FAR PLAY.

I'm convinced that our sponsors, in fact ALL radio sponsors . . . HAVE A CASE.

It stands to reason that without you folks who do the buying, there wouldn't be ANY products . . . but have you ever thought of the time effort and money spent yearly to hold your approval?

Believe me, with general costs and competition so high it amounts to plenty . . . for example, hundreds of thousands are spent yearly on radio entertainment . . . and in return for their efforts to please you, they are permitted to use THREE MINUTES of every half-hour radio network time to tell you of their product.

The LONG commercial we hear on EVERY nighttime show never exceeds ONE MINUTE.

The balance of their time is used for QUICKIES.

And the other TWENTY-SEVEN MINUTES IS turned over to you in the form of FREE ENTERTAINMENT.

When you stop to think of it THREE MINUTES isn't very long . . . yet we kid about it . . . we get annoyed.

Meantime, when you hear a commercial, pay that sponsor the courtesy of listening . . . they're only permitted a few seconds, and what they have to say is truly worth hearing.

LET'S GIVE ALL SPONSORS A BREAK; IT'S THE CHEAPEST BOX OFFICE ADMISSION in the world, for good entertainment.

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

"Melodies America Loves"

"Melodies America Loves" (KNX, Tuesday, 7:30 p.m.) is just what the name implies, which should make listeners who like "good music" happy. This is a "live" show—that is, the music is not recorded or transcribed by a variety of groups, but rendered by one orchestra under the direction of Earl Townner, with the talents of various guest musical artists featured each week. Production of the program is handled by Cliff Howell.

All of the above combine harmoniously to bring music-hungry radio audiences an enjoyable half-hour of familiar and beautiful melodies.

Starmakers

Except for the "kinks" apt to be found in the initial offerings of any show and except for the general criticism that full-length motion pictures are difficult and often impossible to adapt into half-hour radio broadcasts, KFVB's recently-inaugurated "Starmakers Radio Theater" (Tuesdays, 9:00 p.m.) is interesting and pleasant radio entertainment.

Of course, if your listening tastes demand impeccable perfection, perhaps this program is not for you, for its participants are not perfectionists—yet. They're still learning, but, as director Raoul Walsh pointed out on a recent "Starmakers" airing, these young performers are studious, realistic, and seriously intent on doing a good job.

The series brings to radio audiences adaptations of past Warner Brothers screen hits, with the Burbank movie studio's young contract players portraying all the parts. The three-fold purpose of the program is 1) to promote Warners' film products; 2) to acquaint the public with these young performers; and 3) to give these players the opportunity to gain microphone experience.

Don Maguire, Martha Vickers, Russell Arms, Ray Montgomery, Joan Winfield, Ross Ford—to name a handful—are among the Warners acting "cubs" being used on the series, and Warners screen hits such as "Casablanca", "Gentleman Jim", "Make Your Own Bed", "The Mask of Dimitrios", "The Maltese Falcon", "Thank

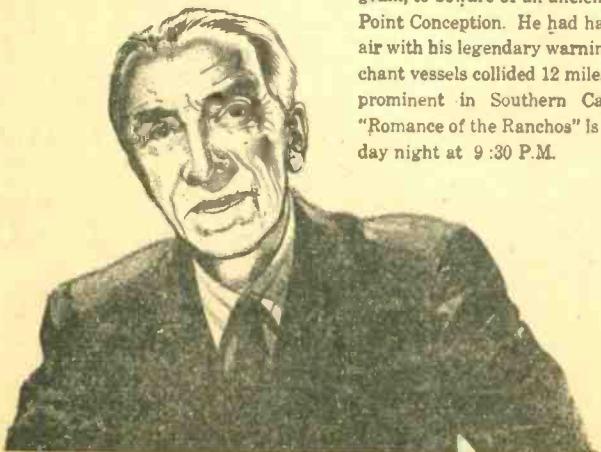





It's fun working for Radio Life. We have the most glamorous boss in town, for one thing. (Editor's Note: Wants a raise, no doubt.) But not only glamorous, Evelyn Bigsby is smart, too. (Editor's Note: It's the week before Christmas. Hm-m-m!) She gets good ideas. (Editor's Note: Like having Jack write a column?) Like for example, she asked us to get up a first of the year column on the most popular discs of 1946. Well, that's a good one. Most folks like to look back and kind of hum over old favorites.

In our opinion, the biggest record of 1946 was Freddy Martin's "Bumble Boogie", with Jack Fina at the piano, which hit early in the year and extended into the summer.

"To Each His Own" came next, with Eddy Howard and Mercury stealing the march on other recording artists and companies by two months. But Freddy Martin's RCA Victor waxing came along in time to cash in on this big hit.

"Rumors Are Flying" is the latest big hit of the year, with the recordings of Frankie Carle for Columbia, Betty Rhodes for RCA Victor and Tony Martin for Mercury all going strong.

The tune to watch at present is "Gal in Calico". Johnny Mercer and the Pied Pipers cut it for Capitol and Tex Beneke for RCA Victor. It looks like the next big un.

Frank Sinatra's "They Say It's Wonderful" and Sammy Kaye's "I'm a Big Girl Now" both were right up there with the toppers, the latter being what the trade refers to as a "sleeper".

Even tho' it wasn't big, we think that Perry Como's "Prisoner of Love" was one of the best—almost a great record.

Among popular albums, RCA Victor's release of tunes by Glenn Miller's orchestra has been the best seller the past sixty weeks, and the Victor people are amazed at its consistent sale. Vaughn Monroe's "Dreamland Special" of "dream" songs is another biggie coming up.

Spike Jones' "Hawaiian War Chant" was, without question, the biggest novelty of the year.

Outstanding recording discoveries of 1946 included Betty Rhodes, long a radio and screen favorite, whose second disc for Victor, "Rumors Are Flying", was a Number One; Skitch Henderson, handsome and suave young pianist, who carved himself a name in Capitol wax, and the Page Cavanaugh Trio, a group of ex-G.I.'s who provide out-of-this-world music.

Q.—No, try again.

WHAT DO YOU, the listening audience, say to a program that gives you the opportunity to talk back? And not just a chance to talk back to the radio artist, but also to let fellow listeners know how you feel on a subject.

You who have heard Joan Shafer's "What Do You Say?" know of the fairness and impartiality with which each controversial subject is treated. Once Joan received a letter from a listener who said that Joan was no good and called her everything from a Nazi on. This, too, she read on the air. That did it. The next day the mail started pouring in from Joan's fans, giving her critic a very bad time. Letters she receives run from such things as cruelty to animals through labor problems, politics, and education.

As you no doubt know, these sub-

jects are gathered by way of letters. For example, Joan will receive a letter from a fan stating his or her point of view on a debatable subject. This letter Joan will read, inviting opinions, the opinions to be read on a later program.

Sample Mail

Two samples of typical letters, these on the race-prejudice problem, are as follows:

Dear Miss Schafer:

Goodness knows I don't think I'm any better than anybody else, nor do I think anybody else is any better than I am. But I sure get scared when the government starts trying to sell us on the idea of bringing a hundred-thousand aliens into this country. We're already so over-

crowded that good American citizens are living in unspeakable living quarters, and can't even get enough of the right kind of food to keep our children strong and healthy. They not only want us to send all our food over there, but they want to crowd in here and take our homes away from us too. I say let those people stay in the countries where they belong. If they come over here all they'll do anyhow is stand around and criticize our government and way of life, and try to take over all our business. Let's keep America for Americans!

to strike him before he can compose.

Jack even has what he terms a "hep side." He's the only composer we've ever heard about who's also a darn good jitterbug. Jack's wife, who was a well-known singer under the name of Patricia Norman, also has a "hep side," according to Jack, and together he claims they "get raised eyebrows with their jitterbug routine."

Jack's favorite composers are those who write music with an imaginative quality. He enjoys the dramatic classics of Ravel, Prokofieff, Stravinsky, Dellus, Debussy. "I guess I'm a modernist," he smiled as he summed up his list.

Production History

Meakin's musical background started in San Francisco, where he was staff pianist for NBC and arranger for Meredith Willson. You

probably also remember him as "Dr. John Brunner Meakin," the conductor of "Bug House Rhythm," early forerunner of "Basin Street." A trip to New York to handle the music on a show titled "Quite by Accident," which lived up to its name, says Jack, by folding abruptly, led him indirectly to radio producing. "It was purely a matter of economics," said Jack. In addition to the shows already mentioned, Jack was identified with the Bob Hawk program, "Thanks to the Yanks," and as head of the radio department of Foote, Cone and Belding, with the Lucky Strike radio programs. In that capacity he came to Hollywood to work on the agency's West Coast shows.

That old devil, music, raised its head once again, and Jack decided he'd gotten too far away from radio. "I've been back in music for over a

Wife Patty gave up her singing career when she married Jack. "I think she misses it, too," he confided. "She's always singing around the house." Pat was well known as singing star of the "Hit Parade" and as vocalist with the Eddy Duchin band. Her record of "Old Man Mose" is a collector's item. Pat hopes that their two children, Jackie, seven, and Jill, four, inherit Jack's musical talent. Jack hopes they inherit Pat's good looks! Little Jackie plays piano and drums, Jill loves to sing.
