

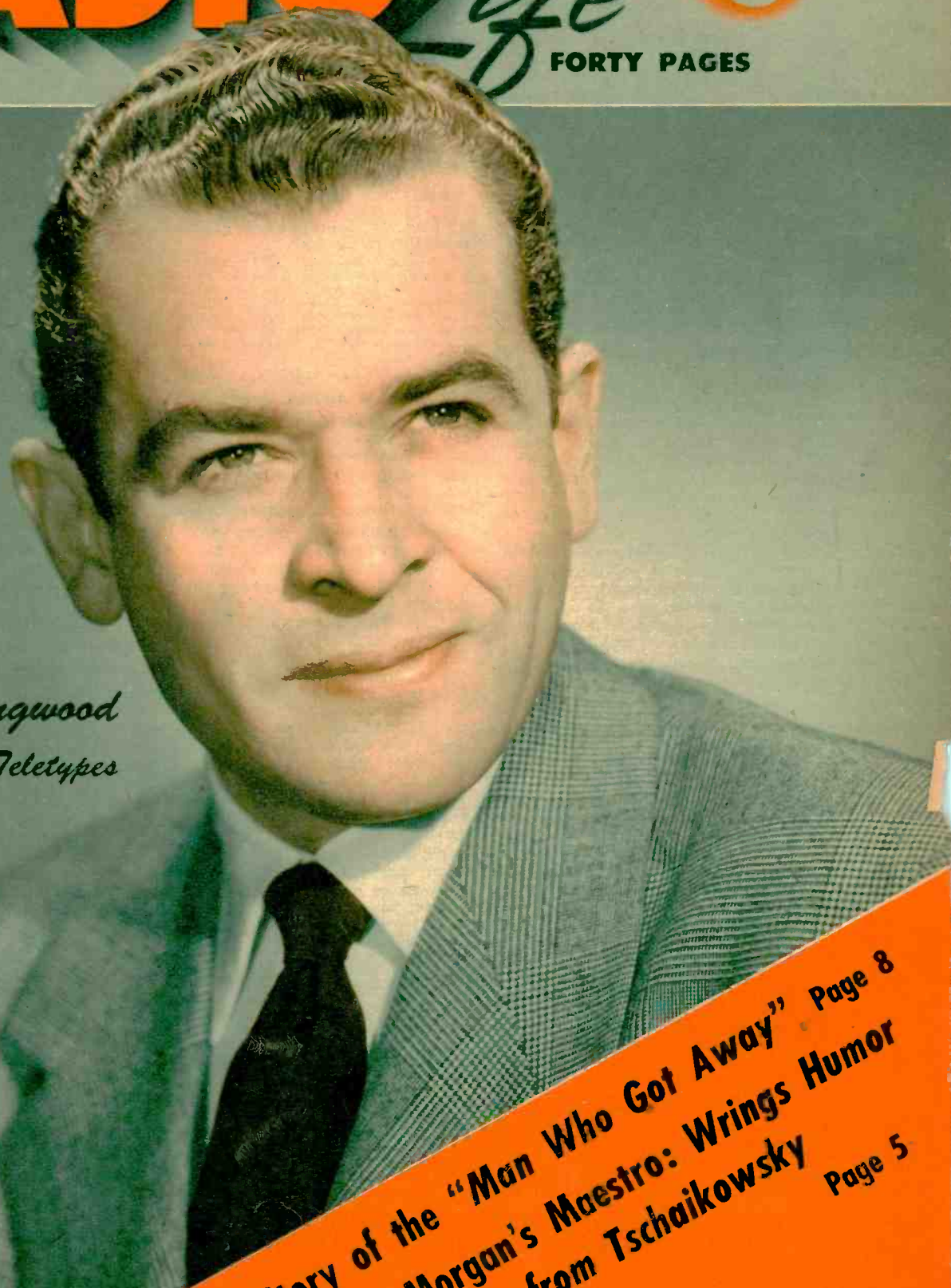

Come on, listeners, let's bombard the sponsors.



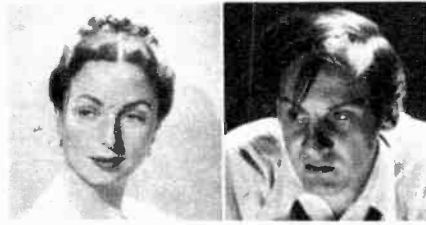

Sirs: I wish to add my sincere protest to the letter of Mrs. Sarah Behrend in a recent Radio Life. Instead of having a gripe, I have gratification for the real privileges granted me by the broadcasting companies.

Last month, knowing my sister from Chicago was to visit us, I made plans to see that she would be able to attend as many radio programs as possible. Having been fortunate in getting tickets myself, I wrote to some ten or twelve favorite programs for tickets for my sister. I sent them three weeks ahead of time, but before two weeks had passed, the courtesy tickets came rushing in upon me. If stations were unable to send any, they did me the courtesy to say so. Some, such as Art Linkletter and Ted Lewis, even answered by air mail at their own expense and enclosed the self-addressed stamped envelopes I had sent them.

I could not possibly have asked for more prompt and kindly response. Thanks so much for this opportunity to give my happy version of the kind way in which my requests were received.

Sirs: In general, the speech, enunciation and clarity of our radio announcers are exemplary. But there is one maddening trait that is evidenced almost without exception by those who announce the major symphonies and those who spin platters on the concert hours for the smaller local stations. When announcing a program of classical or semi-classical music, they bite off their syllables with razor sharpness . . . until they come to the vital part. This is an example:

"And now the vi-o-lin section of the or-ches-tra is fea-tured in the spark-ling mel-o-dy of the beau-tiful waltz 'Spffng by Bsstgg.'"

Couldn't they speak the title of the composition and the name of the composer so distinctly that those of us who listen and say "What is that tune?" would know the answer?

More than that, couldn't they spell the names of such less familiar composers as Glagounow, Dohnanyi, Cui, etc., so that those of us who would like to increase our music libraries can recognize them when we see them in record catalogs? Also, announcing the selections both before and after they are played would greatly help in our identification. So often one tunes in in the middle of a familiar number, one whose name escapes memory, and listens eagerly to the end hoping to have that memory refreshed . . . only to hear a commercial.

While we're on the subject of classical music, is there any hope that some station might again put on a program of this type between 10:00 p.m. and midnight, when now one can find nothing but dance tunes and late news? Those who have to sit up late now and then would welcome a program of good music like the "Classic Hour" that KECA used to present.

May we commend the Gas Company program as a shining example to the defects we have mentioned in other classical music programs? Not only does the announcer speak most clearly, but they furnish a printed program in advance.

How about KGFJ's "Concert Nocturne," Monday through Sunday from 10:00 p.m. to midnight, and KIIJ's fine "Rhapsody in Wax" from midnight to 1:00 a.m. nightly? KNX, of course, has its "Symphonette," from 10:30 to 11:00 p.m. in that late evening period. We agree on your praise of Thomas Cassidy, your "Gas Company Concert" annotator, and if you like printed programs in advance you might also appreciate those sent out by KGFJ's "Musical Digest" (available on written request).

DORIS, WHO HAS been married to Al Jolson show writer Charlie Isaacs for five years, has played in more than 635 network programs since 1943. Previous to radio, she danced for a year with the Ballet Theater, sang with Art Jarrett's orchestra, and was a Powers model.

Still on Her Toes

Only in Front of a Microphone, Instead Of the Corps de Ballet, Is Talented Ex-Dancer, Now Radioite, Doris Singleton.

SOPHISTICATED little Doris Singleton has the grace and carriage of a ballerina. She was one for a year with the original Ballet Theater, when it opened in New York with such notable dancers as Anton Dolin and Agnes DeMille.

Doris, who was an intelligent seventeen at the time, had studied for her position with the troupe under the great Russian master, Fokine. She talks now of the incredible hard work and patience under duress demanded of a dancer at that time. "Often," she remembers, "we would work on our toes in an ice-cold studio for hours at a time. If our toes would bleed it would be nothing to Fokine. 'Karsavina, Pavlova, all of Russia's great ballerinas, were not afraid to suffer,' he would shrug."

She considers her succeeding experience with the Corps de Ballet one of the most exciting in her life, but Doris adds: "I'm afraid I'm very happy to be doing something else now. It was gratifying while you were on stage. The company, of course, had unlimited support, money and prestige. But behind it all intrigue and, unless you were completely insensitive, disappointment in people."

When Doris eventually left the ballet, it was to sing with Art Jarrett's orchestra. (She had had her own vocal show on WNAR some time before, alternating it with rehearsals in a Broadway stage play, "Who's Who," and with cover and ad sittings as a Powers model.) But soon after this new break, Doris' mother sent a letter entreating her to "come out to California."

Odd Meeting

In Hollywood, Doris and her mother



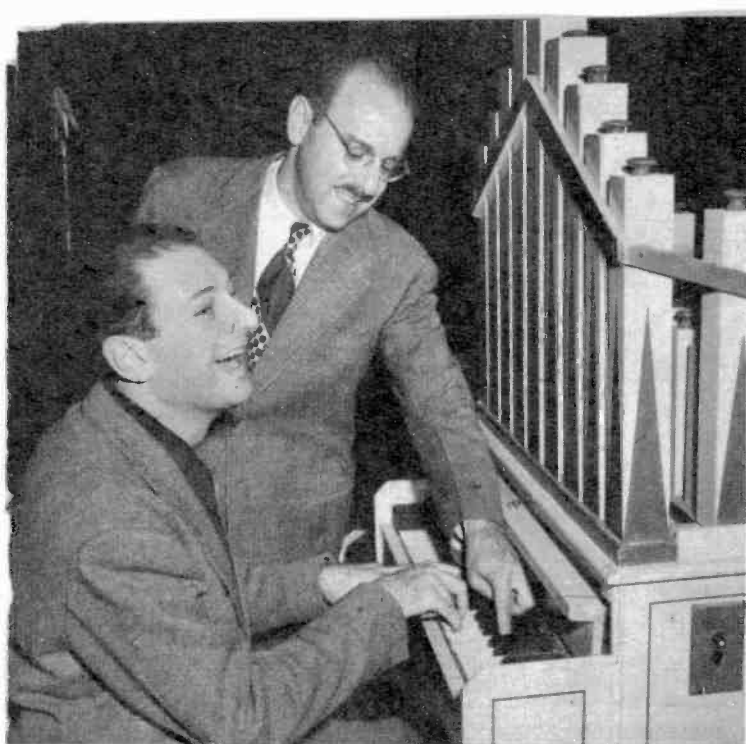
took an apartment together. Traveling companionably up and down the house elevator with them every day was irrepressible radio-writer Charlie Isaacs (now scripting the Al Jolson show). After exchanging several "Nice day, isn't it?" comments with Doris, Charlie eventually added brightly: "I saw you in my garbage pail this morning." "You did?" Doris managed. "Yes," continued Charlie, "you were in a newspaper picture lining the bottom. I saved it. Like to see it?"

With the rescued clipping as his calling card, Charlie made his initial social visit. He asked Doris to marry him when he had rush orders to leave for New York . . . they got a quick license at the City Hall . . . and caught the first plane. Three months later Charlie went into the Coast Guard, and while he was overseas Doris started to work seriously in radio. Her first show was a "Lux Theater" drama starring Irene Dunne. She then became the "Lux" social reporter, "Libby Collins," a spot which she's held until recent program conflicts. And, incidentally, they couldn't have picked a lovelier complexion for the job!

Since January of 1943, Doris has appeared in 635 network programs. She's been Alan Young's girl friend, "Betty"; "Kitty" on "Those Websters"; the coed on "Kay Kyser's College"; and feminine comedy specialist on the Jack Paar show. At present, she's "The Great Gildersleeve's" new flame, "Doris Dalrymple," and the twanging "he isn't in" voice on Hal March and Bob Sweeney's show.

Doris is a direct girl with good ideas about people, subjects for conversation and her own personal ap-

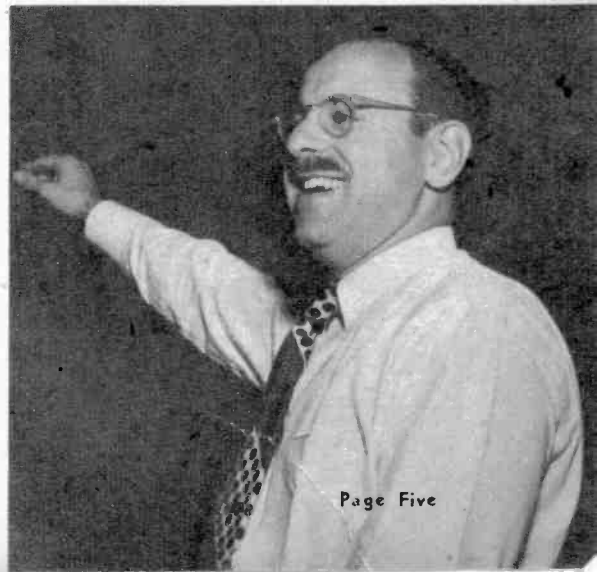

most 200 in the United States, which brings to listeners dramatizations of stories chosen by some of the most famous personalities of our day. To date, stories have been selected by such eminent personalities as Sinclair Lewis, Eleanor Roosevelt, Alfred Hitchcock, Irving Berlin, Deems Taylor, Bing Crosby, Father Flannagan, Van Johnson, Charles Boyer and Fred Allen.

Behind the scenes of the program are two exceptionally young and attractive radio figures, the writing-directing team of Lawrence and Lee. Although they have been working

Could anyone ask for a more illustrious line-up of stars and famous stories? Yet this is but a small portion of the list of programs that have been heard on "Favorite Story" broadcasts.

Southern Californians hear the premiere performance of this show, heard via stations in Manila, Honolulu, 20 outlets in Canada and al-

together since January of 1942, both had long solo experiences before.

Newspaper Background

Jerome Lawrence, "Jerry" to his friends, started fourteen years ago, while still a student at Ohio State University, writing, directing, acting and announcing at local Columbus stations. After graduating with a Phi Beta Kappa Key, he turned to newspaper work, ending up as editor of a small town daily. California beckoned, and his career as one of radio's most prolific writer-directors was launched. Jerry worked at CBS for a number of years, writing many of its top programs. He was co-ordinator of "A Date With Judy" and has contributed to innumerable radio series, including "Silver Theatre," "Screen Guild," "Columbia Workshop" and "The Orson Welles Show." "Off Mike," a book on radio writing, edited by Lawrence, is used as the official text on radio by fifteen major universities. He has written for Saturday Evening Post and his radio plays have been included in any number of anthologies. His war-time program, "They Live Forever," won the Press-Club award for "The best dramatic program of 1942." In 1944, he was sent overseas as a radio correspondent for AFPS and covered

Drama in Action," "Adventures for Readers" and "Television," which was written by Lee while he was in pilot-training with the Army. Bob's early background in radio includes announcing and scripting for various Mid-West stations. An astronomy major at Ohio Wesleyan University, Bob gave up celestial stars for terrestrial ones.

Lawrence and Lee as a team have credits on practically every major

North Africa and Italy, including much time at the Fifth Army Front.

Robert E. Lee, better known as "Bob," spent four years as a producer with Young and Rubicam advertising agency, where he was assigned to "The March of Time," "The Kate Smith Hour," "Screen Guild Theatre," "We the People," the budding "Aldrich Family" and numerous soap operas and quiz shows. He left early in 1942 for the lucrative freelance market. As a free-lance writer, he contributed to "Suspense," "Columbia Workshop," "Orson Welles Show," "Screen Guild" and many others. Published books which have felt the Lee touch include "Radio

dramatic show on the air. They are Frank Sinatra's favorite writers; they wrote his radio program this last season, and have written much of his material on tolerance. For Decca Records, they have dramatized and directed two of their best-selling albums: "Rip Van Winkle" with Walter Huston, and "The Cask of Amontillado" with Sidney Greenstreet. The only outside script Norman Corwin used on his famous series was by Lawrence and Lee.

War Activity

During the war, the boys were not idle. Together they aided in the origination of the vast overseas network, the Armed Forces Radio Service.

While at AFRS they were active in the writing and production of many of their star-studded shows, including "Mail Call" and the official programs for D-Day, VE-Day, and VJ-Day. The British-American Amity series of lavish hour-broadcasts was a joint assignment for them, as well.

Their Broadway show, "Look, Ma, I'm Dancing!" is being produced this season by George Abbott, and is now in rehearsal.

With so much experience and so much talent at their disposal, it is easy to understand why the "Favorite Story" productions are about as close to perfection in radio broadcasting as is possible.

Fish Story Of the "Man Who Got Away"

Actor Ray Lewis Took the Dream Vacation From Radio. If You're a Fisherman, You Will Appreciate His Cross-Country Cruise

EIGHTEEN YEARS behind a microphone and never a real vacation. Of course there have been one- and two-day treks for a bit of fishing, but you always had to get back to town for a show. There have been wonderful vacations planned—two whole weeks of unadulterated fishing—away from the business of radio and all that went with it—nothing to do but camp and fish and then more of the same. But these plans have been tucked in the circular file, one by one, as your work interfered. You never gave up the idea, and always in the back of your mind you knew that some day you would chuck everything and just leave. You would fish until you just couldn't look another fish in the gills.

Well, there is one man in Hollywood who did just that recently. He is Ray Lewis, long-time "Yellow Cab Storyteller," free-lance actor, announcer and writer, whose voice has been heard on top dramatic programs from San Francisco and Hollywood for years.

Deciding that he had procrastinated long enough on the business of "getting away," he started making his plans in the middle of last June. His first idea was to eliminate maps and go where and when he pleased, but heading in the general direction of the Gulf of Mexico. His second plan was to refrain from having his car radio repaired. His third plan was to haunt the Army surplus stores and acquire camp stove, lantern, sleeping bag, hammock, utensils and the many other et ceteras that make up a camping outfit. A week later he had completed a collection of fishing equipment that would satisfy anything wearing scales. The final plan was to get all this parapher-

nalia into "Señor Lincoln," his car and sole companion on the trip. It was accomplished, but don't ask Ray how . . . particularly when he refused to leave without his collapsible rubber boat.

Two days following the last program of "The Casebook of Gregory Hood," (Ray was "Lieutenant Silvers" on the series) he was off on a camping and fishing trip that covered most of the United States. His first port of call was the Colorado River at Blythe, California. On setting up his camp, he discovered he had forgotten the most important thing of his trip—his tackle box including bass plugs and flies. A frantic S.O.S. to Hollywood soon remedied that matter by special delivery and Ray

was following a "hot tip" slipped to him from under the counter of Blythe's only sporting goods store. There was a place called Alligator Lake just about "twenty-four miles up the river." Wondering what the connection was between alligators and bass, Ray made the side trip. To his chagrin the place wasn't swarming with bass as the man had informed him, but rather was swarming with a persistent little fiend called a "no-see-um"—a flying type of thing that had all the ill breeding of a mosquito crossed with the speed and power of a P-80. Ray smeared himself with a repellent which didn't repel at all, but rather gave those flying extroverts a beam to come in on. At Alligator Lake Lewis was too busy to fish.

Fishless Stop

The next stop on the itinerary was Coolidge Lake, Arizona, which turned out to be without water, therefore no fish. Ray had to discard his Army hammock, for there were never trees to hang it on and he figured he was going to get awfully tired packing two pine trees around with him, along with the rest of his equipment. Tiring fast of flipping a dry fly into a dry lake, he turned "Señor Lincoln's" nose toward the open road and Aransas Pass, Texas, on the gulf of Mexico. Through Arizona, New Mexico and Texas Ray flirted with fish in several likely-looking streams, but all his artificial lures accomplished was the stirring-up of some otherwise placid water.

It was at Aransas Pass that a switch on the "man bites dog" story put Lewis on the shelf for a few days, when, believe it or not, a catfish caught him! Another fisherman caught a king-sized catfish and put

to suit us. But then there never is. Fans who remember him from his appearances on the Fanny Brice show will be inclined to agree with us.

Though first shows are poor yardsticks for ensuing enjoyment of comedy programs, this one seemed funny despite its newness. Hans Conried as the leader of the all-girl band, Patsy Moran as an obstreperous girl musician, Billy Gould and Jerry Hausner as the lackadaisical soundmen and Alan Reed as the parking lot attendant and (of all people) CBS vice-president Don Thornburgh, were all given an opportunity for good comedy spots—and they all delivered.

The program ended with us still wanting more of Danny's mournful mirthful humor, his sensational impersonations of Jolson and Winchell. We missed not hearing one of his song specialties too, any one of which is worth waiting for. And for Thomas, we're willing to wait!

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

"Meet the Meeks" and "Archie Andrews"

Two-in-one treatment of these Saturday morning shows (flanking one another on KFI at 10:30 and 11:00, respectively), is in order because of the same deplorable pattern which each follows in its interpretation of "family life."

"Meet the Meeks" has several redeeming features, however. There is whimsicality and sympathy of character in all three depictions of "Mortimer Meek," "Agatha Meek," and "Peggy Meek" by Forrest Lewis, Fran Allison and Beryl Vaughan. Lines by writer Les Weinrott often achieve a gentle sincerity. But imposition of dim-witted "Uncle Louie" (Cliff Souhier) splotches the effect which all these other folks have succeeded in making. Why situation-comedy scripters continually reason that a blundering "duh!" character is necessary to their plotting escapes us. Sticking one into the "average family scene" is, we think, even less intelligent. Left by themselves, to perform genuinely, "The Meeks" hardly need a stooge. Encumbered by one, they appear to us as a very slapstick unit.

"Archie Andrews" reels along with no slight endearments whatsoever. In our opinion the entire offering is a soap opera version of the "Henry Aldrich" adventures, and hardly comes up to its model. Bob Hasting grates through the lines of "Archie," and Harlan Stone Jr. tries to sound a great deal like Jackie "Homer" Kelk in his role of "Jughead." Other principals are "Mrs. Andrews," enacted by Alice Yourman, and "Mr. Andrews," enacted by Arthur Kohl. "Archie" also has a girl friend named "Veronica" (Gloria Mann), and if he emits that half-

brained giggle in another phone conversation with her (which we're unfortunate enough to hear) we're apt to become quite raving.

Swift and Company as sponsors of both packages are responsible.

"Nick Carter"

Occasionally one comes across a pulp magazine whose pages are undertaken by slick-talking, slick-haired crooks or detectives. Probably no one, for numberless reasons, would make a steady diet of this fare, but isn't it exciting reading, just once in a while?

Such an air show is "Nick Carter," KHJ's Sunday at 3:30 p.m. thriller. Avid mystery or adventure fans needn't be told the time—they've been dividing Sunday afternoon from 1:00 p.m. on, between KECA and KHJ, not to miss a word of the stream of spooks or crime specialists who appear weekly.

"Nick" satisfies all the conventions of a strong-armed dandy with the entree to the parlors of the rich or the hangouts of the underworld. Lon Clark plays the part of the young man-about-town who takes his perfect diction, good manners and charm into drawing rooms or dives. But "Nick's" no softie. When the crooks show up (as they do each Sunday, en masse, five minutes before the end of the show) for the gun play, "Nick" throws lead with the best of them, usually triumphantly shooting the last remaining gun out of the last remaining hand. Boy!

So for a look at a master detective who's a real smoothie, and whose exploits are colored to the hilt, get this "Nick Carter," Sunday afternoons. It's satisfyingly exciting air pulp.

On Mike (About Studio Happenings)

No. One "Desire"?

"Heart's Desire" set its statisticians to work analyzing the hundreds of thousands of listeners' requests recently, and they've come through with the report that, in 1947, America's Number One "Heart's Desire" was—a washing machine!

On the basis of 1,000 letters, the leading requests for the whole country stacked up as this: 123 washing

machines, 102 refrigerators, 100 bicycles, sixty-two stoves, sixty watches and forty-four radios. Hundreds of other items ran the gamut from automobiles to false teeth to bubble gum. Usable products were definite winners in the poll, with diamond rings coming in a poor twelfth. One utilitarian item has fallen in favor, however. Eighth on the list last summer, baby diapers had by year's end dropped nearly to the bottom!

Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll, the men behind the celebrated black-face make-up, have actually been in association for twenty-eight years—and without ever having a serious argument. The reason is the simplest one there is—they're both exceptionally polite people.

Pretty Anita Gordon celebrated her eighteenth birthday on the Edgar Bergen-Charlie McCarthy show recently, and following broadcast time was presented a huge birthday cake by the cast. Anita has been Edgar and Charlie's vocalist since she was fourteen.

"Judy's" Back

Rosemary DeCamp, for ten years the "Judy Price" of Columbia's "Dr. Christian" adventures except for three slight interruptions, is back in her familiar role.

Rosemary's absences from the show on the three occasions were attributable to the arrival of her three daughters. The third, Dorothy Valerie, born November 30, 1947, is now happily at home after a protracted stay at Torrance General Hospital with her mother.

No Time for Bird Book

At the height of the holiday rush when most people seemed tied down with last-minute shopping at home, energetic Bill Thompson of the "Fiber McGee and Molly" laughcast set some kind of a record when he Constellationed to Chicago and back between Tuesday night airshows. He made the trip to participate in several fund-raising events for Chicago's five Boys' Clubs. Bill also found time to make guest appearances on six network shows and two television programs and to talk before leading Chicago ad agency representatives at the famous Off-the-Street Club. Bill, who portrays such characters as the Old Timer, Wallace Wimple and Horatio K. F.M. and Television Tips

By JANE PELGRAM

"Visibility zero" is a remark of the past. Visibility doubled, quadrupled and multiplied some more in 1948, is the consensus among television authorities and hopefuls alike.

Radio Life attended a gathering of the video authorities the other day when the Hollywood Advertising Club hosted at Breneman's restaurant for the first of three meetings at which television is the topic of discussion. "Television Station Operation" was the first session, with speakers Harry Lubcke, Don Lee Broadcasting System television director; Ray Monfort, Los Angeles Times television director; Wes Turner, Radio Corporation of America television executive; C. Burt Oliver and Charles Brown of KFI, unleashing some mighty enlightening facts about the shape of things to come to our video screens. One of these "things" is color television, but that's five years away for most of us.

Of more immediate interest is the good news that the number of television sets in use in Southern California will probably swell from a current 11,000 to 200,000 by the end of 1948. In all the United States, 1949 will see 1,000,000 sets in use. A happy side of this news for the laymen is that undoubtedly the production and sales increase will result in a \$100 decrease in the cost of low-priced

television sets, and a \$250 slash in the prices of the zooty big sets. We can all feel free to buy any sort of set now, however, for it will be (and we quote the experts) "ten to fifteen years before present receivers become obsolete." Even when color arrives, it will be a matter of push-pull, click-click to fasten a color screen onto our black and white.

Nineteen hundred and forty-nine will see, too, a legitimate West Coast television network operating just like a radio network. California's pre-eminence as an entertainment center can well turn her into the television center of the United States. As you may know, there are only two major television areas in the U. S.—our West Coast in and around Los Angeles, and the East Coast network that touches Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington. One reason Philadelphia was chosen

as site of the presidential conventions this year was her 21,000 receivers. That's second largest number within any city. New York is first with 90,000.

While everyone else was busy Christmasing, the FCC was issuing permits for the extension of co-axial cables—one from Los Angeles to San Jose; the other from Washington to Richmond, Virginia.

Wendell Noble, who is starred on the "Newscope" show over KHJ-Mutual Don Lee, is preparing for the future by experimenting with television newscasting. Noble has been rehearsing with relief map globes which he uses to point out the scene of the news as it comes over the magic tape reading machine.

Another preparedness-minded individual is Rodney Pantages. This owner of Hollywood's well-known theater of the same name is first to schedule a regular television matinee on Saturdays. Pantages will present the feature race at Santa Anita as transmitted by KTLA. The efforts of the gee-gees in the day's seventh will be shown on a special eight-by-ten-foot screen in order that a full movie house audience may view the exciting goings-on.

We're doubly interested in learning what the panel of experts who visit Hollywood Ad Club for the second discussion of video have to say when they talk about "televising programming." Tell you all about it next week.

Fish Story of the "Man Who Got Away"

it in a sack in front of Ray's tackle box. When he walked over to get something out of his box, he stepped on the aforementioned fish and it ran one of its horns three inches into Ray's foot. Harpooned by a catfish! "Fortunately," says Ray, "I got away."

Fed up with Port Aransas and pugnacious catfish, Ray turned toward Galveston, where he tied into a tarpon—"about six feet long and weighing at least 125 pounds." Says Ray: "The fish played me until he was tired of the fun and then let me get away. It was quite a tussle and about the biggest fishing thrill I've ever had, even though at the time I had visions of being mounted on a plaque in the tarpon's game room."

After fishing the Gulf of Mexico to Mobile, Alabama, he turned toward Florida and Lake Apopka, known as one of the finest fresh water bass fishing lakes in the country. But, being Florida, it rained the entire time he was there. Ray sat around a soggy camp, batting mosquitoes and trying to discourage over-enthusiastic roaches from moving in out of the rain and taking over his food supply. All this while he contemplated with a jaded eye "the finest fishing lake in the country."

Still optimistic, Ray fished his way through Georgia, Tennessee, South and North Carolina, Virginia and Pennsylvania with pretty much the same results—lots of beautiful country and good fishing waters, but canned sardines for lunch. In upper New York state he stopped in the Catskills, where he says he can well believe the story of Rip Van Winkle sleeping for twenty years. The fish up there seemed to be successfully using the same trick—two whole days of fishing and he couldn't even raise a catfish.

On the other side of the Hudson River Ray found the fish a little more amenable and decidedly more cooperative when it came to snapping at a Royal Coachman or a Black Gnat, or making a pass at a Bass Oreno or a Hawaiian Wiggler. It was in the New England states that Ray found the old southern hospitality in fishing circles that was so sadly lacking in the southern states.

Backlashing his way down to New York, the actor dug out his necktie and boiled shirt and played at being a civilian for a week, which was as long as he could stand it. "I missed my sleeping bag and couldn't get used to a soft bed," said Izaak Walton Lewis Jr. "In fact when I passed the Fulton Fish Market and

smelled those wonderful fish I knew it was time to leave."

From New York to Hollywood via the Northern Route is a lot of miles, but Ray measured the distance by streams, lakes and rivers, stopping when the urge was too great to flip a fly, cast a plug or surreptitiously dunk a worm into anything that looked like fishing water.

Statistically Ray fished in thirty-one states, drove ten thousand and fifteen miles and used up three leisurely, wonderful months doing it. But he still claims that the best all-around fishing is in his own state of California. Of course he's only fished in California for about thirty years—he started young. Does he like to fish? Why, that guy would cast a fly at a damp rag. We asked him what became of all the fish he caught on the trip, to which he replied, "Ate 'em." About that we have our doubts—either he has a prodigious appetite for fish or else there were very few caught!

Not many people ever get around to quitting their work, as Ray did, in order to fulfill that dream trip that everyone has in the back of his mind. In radio such an absence can often mean loss of valuable contacts and "ins."

Ray says, "Heck, I've wanted to do it for years, but have always been so intent on earning that extra dollar that I lost sight of the real values. I figured it was high time I quit seeing nothing but dollar signs and started seeing something of the United States and the people who make it."

"I've flown across the country four times and all I ever saw was the back of the head of the guy sitting in front of me, or a hunk of green about ten thousand feet down. Materially it may cost a great deal to give up everything and take a trip, but so far as I'm concerned, I'm a lot wealthier for what I've seen and done these past three months. Next time I plan to see the Northwest and Canada."

During the fall, Ray was heard over KHJ in "Repeat Performance," a record show which featured his own collection of priceless old recordings. Next to fishing, Lewis loves old records. But at present, any question about records is apt to be answered, "Say, I heard the other day that up on the Klamath River, there's a terrific run of steelhead!"

comedy stock still, but keep the laughs coming and bridge the humor with music in the same vein. Green, who had never had a chance to put his theories into practice, had the same idea.

The conductor finds himself in agreement with Morgan musically as well as humorously. "Morgan is musically literate," he told us. "Our backgrounds are culturally similar. He knows what a musician is talking about." Many of the ideas for the comedy musical numbers come from Henry, Green revealed. "We both keep a little list of the ideas that occur to us." We took a quick look at Bernie's list and found row upon row of scribbles like, "Concerto for Everybody," "Clarinet Marmalade," "Newsreel Satire," "Concerto for Doors."

Composition of Group

As unusual as the names of the numbers they play is the orchestration used by maestro Green. Four trumpets, four trombones, a banjo instead of guitar, a tuba, two drummers, four saxes and a calliope combine to make the Green group a cross between the old theater pit orchestra and a circus band. The drummers are the busiest men in the organization, according to their leader, and if he could add another piece it would be a third drummer. At present, one of the men handles five tympani. Often a Green arrangement will call for the melody to be carried by tympani. "We even get fan mail from drummers," smiled Green. The calliope is the instrument that seems dearest to Bernie's heart, though it has given him the most trouble. Except for a few small circuses, this venerable instrument had practically disappeared from the American scene (regrettably) until resurrected for Morgan's music. NBC in New York had the one existing instrument in that area. It had been used to introduce the old "Captain Henry's Showboat" program, and with broken pipes was gathering dust in the basement until the advent of Green. So many of the brass pipes were missing that the conductor found he had to write the calliope parts around the missing notes. Luckily for the program, a small circus went out of business and offered its calliope for sale. ABC grabbed it and Green presented a specially written "Concerto for Two Calliopes," a piece which nicely managed to combine the Rachmaninoff, Grieg and Tchaikowsky Piano Concertos with several rousing circus marches.

Green delights in combining "the literate aspect of music with a circus quality. Legitimate music can be funny," he said. "Wrong notes played intentionally aren't."

Green has done musical condensa-

tions of the opera "Carmen," "Scherazade," the works of Wagner, Gilbert and Sullivan and many others of the masters in order to fit them to Morgan's "lectures." It takes him twice as long to make one of his humorous arrangements as it does a straight one. They are also more difficult for musicians to play, requiring extreme alertness in dealing with the sudden changes of tempo, mood and quality. "Musicians enjoy playing the Morgan show," Bernie says rather proudly.

"I'm lucky to have a crazy sound effects man working with me on the New York show," Bernie told us. "His name is Bob Prescott and he's the only sound man 'ham' I've ever heard of."

Among Prescott's mad contributions to the program and probably the best remembered is his "Solo for Sound Effects" from "William Tell." Another notable Green gem was "The Fabulous Disc Jockey," a little number that combined the more salient features of the boogie-woogie, hill-billy, drippy ballad, Lombardo, Hawaiian and Gene Krupa styles. "The last good number I've done is usually my favorite," the conductor told us when we asked for his preference. He seems particularly fond of his "Carmen" adaptation, and the band's Impression of a Hungarian orchestra trying to play an arrangement of Brahms' "Hungarian Dance" that would please both American and Russian officials.

In addition to his work on the Morgan show, Bernie also does the music for two other ABC programs, "The Clock" and "The Fat Man." As most radio maestros are limited to a comparatively few pieces to use in the background of a dramatic show, they often take one instrument from each section of the orchestra in order

Charles Collingwood And the News

IT'S IMPORTANT that I do not take a stand," said Charles Collingwood, CBS war correspondent turned news analyst. "The purpose of radio news is not to make up people's minds for them, but to give them the material with which to make up their own minds. And radio listeners have a right to honest facts."

The honest facts about the amazing Mr. Collingwood are these: He is from Three Rivers, Michigan. He was graduated cum laude from Cornell. In 1939 he received a Rhodes scholarship to Oxford and a fellowship with the Students International Union, Switzerland.

Winning a Rhodes scholarship is a feat that could be looked back upon as the climax in anyone's life, but for Collingwood the climaxes were just beginning. As a student at Oxford, Charles admits that he was of "the gilded youth contingent." The present head of CBS European news, Howard K. Smith, was also an American Rhodes scholar during Collingwood's year. Smith, according to the newsman, was such a brilliant student that he was elected president of the Oxford Students Labor Club, the first American to hold the office. Emphasizing the accomplishments of his fellow newsman, Collingwood revealed that this particular office is of such import that it practically insures the holder of a position in the government after graduation.

There was to be no graduation for these two American students, however. It was 1940, and in Collingwood's words, "The Athenia was sunk. Chamberlain declared war on Sunday, and on Monday we went down to the United Press office and were hired as reporters."

In the next year, both Smith and

CBS Newsmen Collingwood Relates the Circumstances That Carried Him From Oxford to the CBS Newsroom

Collingwood were hired by headman Edward Murrow as CBS correspondents. Subsequently Collingwood reported the entire African campaign from shortly after Allied landings to victory in North Africa and Sicily. He was the first to tell the news of the assassination of Admiral Darlan and scored a CBS news beat when he entered Tunis with the First Army and then made a dash by car across the desert to Algiers to be the first on the air with the news of the fall of Tunis.

As a result of his work in the African theater, young Collingwood received the Peabody award for "the best news broadcast in 1942." The following year he was cited by the National Headliners Club for "Consistently accurate and interesting accounts" from the same war zone.

Beginning on D-Day, Collingwood kept up with the advanced Allied units in France and his eye-witness accounts were ranked with the war's best reporting. "The greatest story in the world is no good if you can't get it out," the newsman echoed a famous dictum. Getting out his radio reports often entailed covering a hotel room wall with a blanket to make a broadcasting studio, running in lines from a transmitter and battling with the Signal Corps and the local authorities to do it. "You did it yourself, or you didn't get on the air," he recalled. Collingwood credits his success in operations of this sort to the fact that he knew communications from his U.P. days.

Broadcast on D-Day

Collingwood picks as his most memorable war broadcast the one he did on D-Day. He turned down the

post on the command ship where George Hicks did his wonderful series of eyewitness accounts. Collingwood chose to go ashore with a landing barge on Utah beach. "We had decided to cover the war with recordings," smiled the correspondent. "My engineer, Gene Ryder, two weeks before had been doing Guy Lombardo's remotes from the Hotel Roosevelt!" The only barge available for engineer, recording machine and reporter was one loaded with a ton of dynamite, TNT and nitroglycerine! "It was a wonderful morning," Collingwood remembered. "We rode in sitting on the dynamite, and landed with the Fourth Division." Once on the beach, the two found themselves in the thick of the action: ships blowing up behind them, transport planes roaring overhead, blasts of gun-fire in front of them—and the recording equipment was water-soaked, and wouldn't work! Guy Lombardo's ex-engineer worked feverishly over the machine while Collingwood stood over him yelling frustrated curses to "Get that thing working!" By some miracle (the newsman still doesn't understand how) the engineer did get the limping equipment started.

Collingwood grabbed a Navy lieutenant who had been directing the landing of supplies and asked him to say a few words. The lieutenant was only too happy. He grabbed the mike and started, "Hello, folks, it's a beautiful day here at Utah beach. I'm an old radio man myself, you know . . . 'another network' as we used to say back in the States . . . ha . . . ha!"

"What do you think?" exclaimed Collingwood. "Out of that whole landing, I have to pick a professional radio announcer who talks about Times Square!" The rest of Collingwood's broadcast was more to the

THE "BABES" from whose mouths come the gems sparking Mutual's "Juvenile Jury" are five youngsters, ages ranging from five to eleven, who are regular members of the panel, plus two other youngsters who appear "in person" each Sunday to discuss their problem with the jury.

No quiz kids these, they are described by creator-moderator Jack Barry as "average, alert, intelligent youngsters." With Barry, a twenty-nine-year-old bachelor, keeping things moving in a polished manner, the youngsters are called upon to give their spontaneous viewpoints on problems submitted to them by other children and adults.

On one occasion, for example, Barry asked his jurors to solve the problem of a mother whose son persisted in wearing his hat in the house. Advised one member of the jury, "Get a phonograph and keep playing the 'Star Spangled Banner.' Then he'll have to remove his hat."

Another mother was worried over her son's annoying habit of plucking feathers out of his pillow. "Maybe," philosophized one of the youngsters, "he expects to be a contestant on a radio quiz show and thinks that one of the questions will be, 'How many feathers are there in a pillow?'" "Or else," chimed in another juror, "maybe he's been watching you pluck your eyebrows and thinks it's in style to pluck things." "Why worry?" queried another of the youngsters. "With all his wonderful experience you should have no trouble at all renting him out to a chicken market."

Other Solutions

Still another mother was perturbed over her son's poor sense of direction. Whenever she'd send him out shopping, he'd get lost and she'd have to

search for him . . . "Let him get lost," yawned a juror, "Columbus got lost and look what HE found." . . . "Send him out only on Saturdays and Sundays," advised another of the youngsters, "so if he gets lost, he can enjoy a lost week-end."

A boy once told the jurors that his mother refused to let him wear his hair like his father, who, it seems, was completely bald except for little fringes on each side . . . "Don't you know," scolded one of the jurors, "that surreys also have fringes? Surreys are little buggies. Do you want your friends saying you're a little buggy?"

An eleven-year-old boy once wrote to the jurors that his mother would only let him wear short pants, but his girl friend insisted he wear long pants . . . "Compromise," offered one of the youngsters. "Wear short pants and long underwear."

That the jurors' minds sometimes work along curious patterns was best demonstrated on the opening program of this season, when a four-and-a-half-year-old "in person" guest told the jurors his mother wouldn't allow him to start school now, despite the fact that he was anxious to begin learning how to be a doctor. Upon further questioning, he revealed he wanted to be a doctor in order to conquer germs . . . "I think you ought to go to school now," agreed a six-year-old juror. "When I was five and a half I caught the measles and chicken pox germs in school and was very sick. I think you

ought to begin school now so you can catch those germs and get sick now, so when you begin to go to school you'll be over those sicknesses and you won't catch them again."

The interesting thing to remember about such answers is that they have been given by children no older than eleven. The laughter generated by the unrepressed comments of these youngsters in the two years "Juvenile Jury" has been on the air, has been worthy of a Fred Allen or a Jack

Benny. Quite gratifying to Barry and the youngsters has been the fact that a comedian like Red Skelton, on his own program, frequently tells his audience of situations which have occurred on "Juvenile Jury."

The children, of course, are the show. But not to be overlooked is Jack Barry himself, who never adopts a patronizing attitude toward them, keeps them completely at ease, and thereby aids immeasurably toward the success of the stanza.

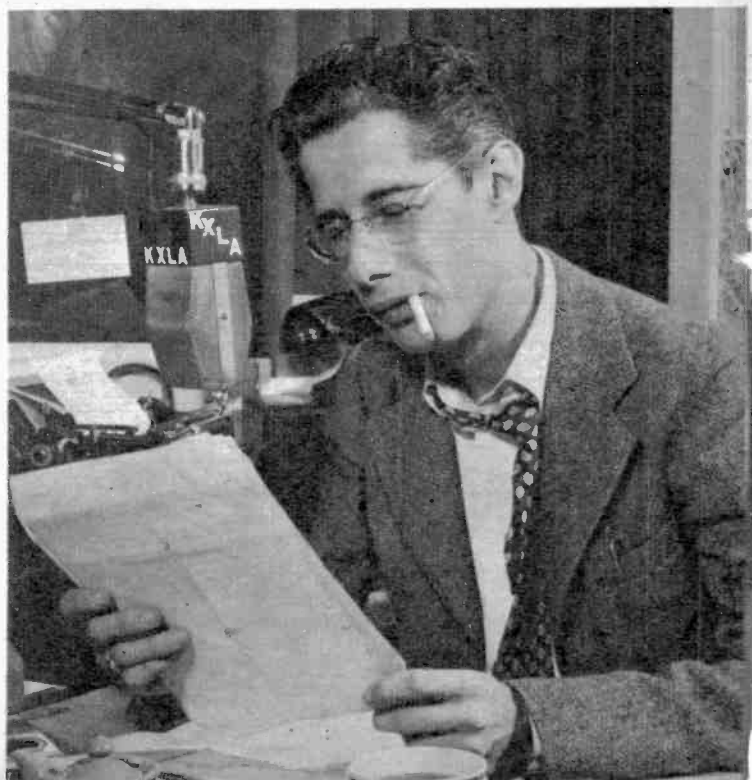

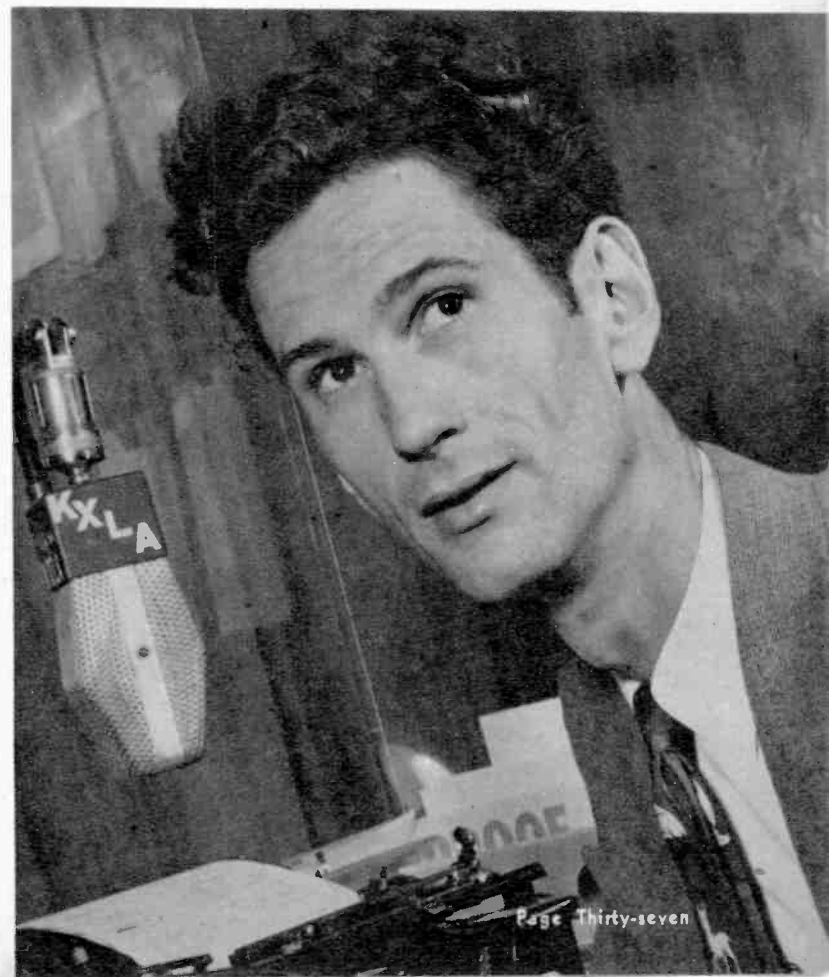

to build a small combination. Green prefers to start with approximately one full section. For example, on "The Fat Man" show, he has practically a whole woodwind section backing up the identifying tuba solo. On "The Clock" he uses a percussion section to put across the "clock" motif of the dramas.

Bernie loves music with a personal association. He's sentimental about Dixieland, old American jazz, ragtime and popular songs. The mere mention of such titles as "Too Much Mustard," "Temptation Rag" or "Ragging the Scale" is enough to make him smile with delight. Also greatly enamored of circus music, Bernie calls "The Entrance of the Gladiators," famous old circus entry march, as great a piece of music in its way as a Brahms concerto is in the classical category. He views with alarm the inroads that popular songs and instrumentations have made into the traditional circus music. A circus without a calliope seems musically catastrophic to Bernie.

Green has a degree in music from N.Y.U. ("longhaired stuff") and has conducted symphony orchestras. He claims not to have been a particularly good instrumentalist, his forte being arranging and composing. He feels he has a great deal to learn about symphony conducting before he'd even let someone compliment him on his appearances with the ABC Symphony last summer.

Married and the father of three young children, Bernie says he's the only musician in the family. Praise of his work by his offspring is given grudgingly, if at all. Morgan, they think, is wonderful.

Buzzing around in Bernie's head are the themes for a symphony.

point. In fact, exhilarated at getting the first eye-witness account of the landing, he wrapped the tape recording in his coat and after getting back to his ship in the Channel, sent it ahead on a PT boat. "About then," Collingwood laughed, "the engineer got very sick and exclaimed, 'Do you know that they were shooting at us!'"

Correspondent Lost?

Four days later, Collingwood returned to London to discover that his tape recording had not come through, and that he'd been given up for dead. Eisenhower had sent out a dispatch to look for Collingwood and authorities had been on the point of notifying his family of his death. "A week later," sighed the newscaster, "the Navy turned up with the recording—but the landing was an old story by that time."

Collingwood's own favorite broadcast came in May, 1945, when he covered the German signing of the Allied surrender terms in "the red schoolhouse" at Rheims, France. He also calls it the most difficult story he ever handled. Ten times he wrote

it and tore it up, finally deciding that plain reporting was the most dramatic when the subject is as thrilling as the climactic event of the whole war.

The newscaster stayed in Paris until late 1945, reporting regularly from the French capital. Upon his return to this country, he was assigned to cover the UN Security Council meetings in New York and was also heard on "Yours Sincerely" and "Report from the U.N."

Movie Star Wife

Collingwood is married to the lovely movie actress, Louise Allbritton, whom he met through a blind date arranged by another CBS newscaster, Chet Huntley. He claims that since meeting Louise he is a firm believer in love at first sight!

The Collingwoods, he asserts, are probably the earliest rising family in Hollywood. They're up and around at 4:30 a.m.—Charles to do an early broadcast to the East and Louise to make the set of "Sitting Pretty" at Twentieth Century-Fox.

Since his coming to Hollywood recently, Collingwood has attracted interested mail and phone calls, much of which applaud his taking issue with Walter Winchell's statement that Communist ground gained in Italy and France would mean war between the U.S. and Russia. Winchell's reply was, "I hope you are right." Most unusual phone call was from a little old lady who said, "Mr. Collingwood, will they really lend me money at Household Finance like the man on your program says?"
