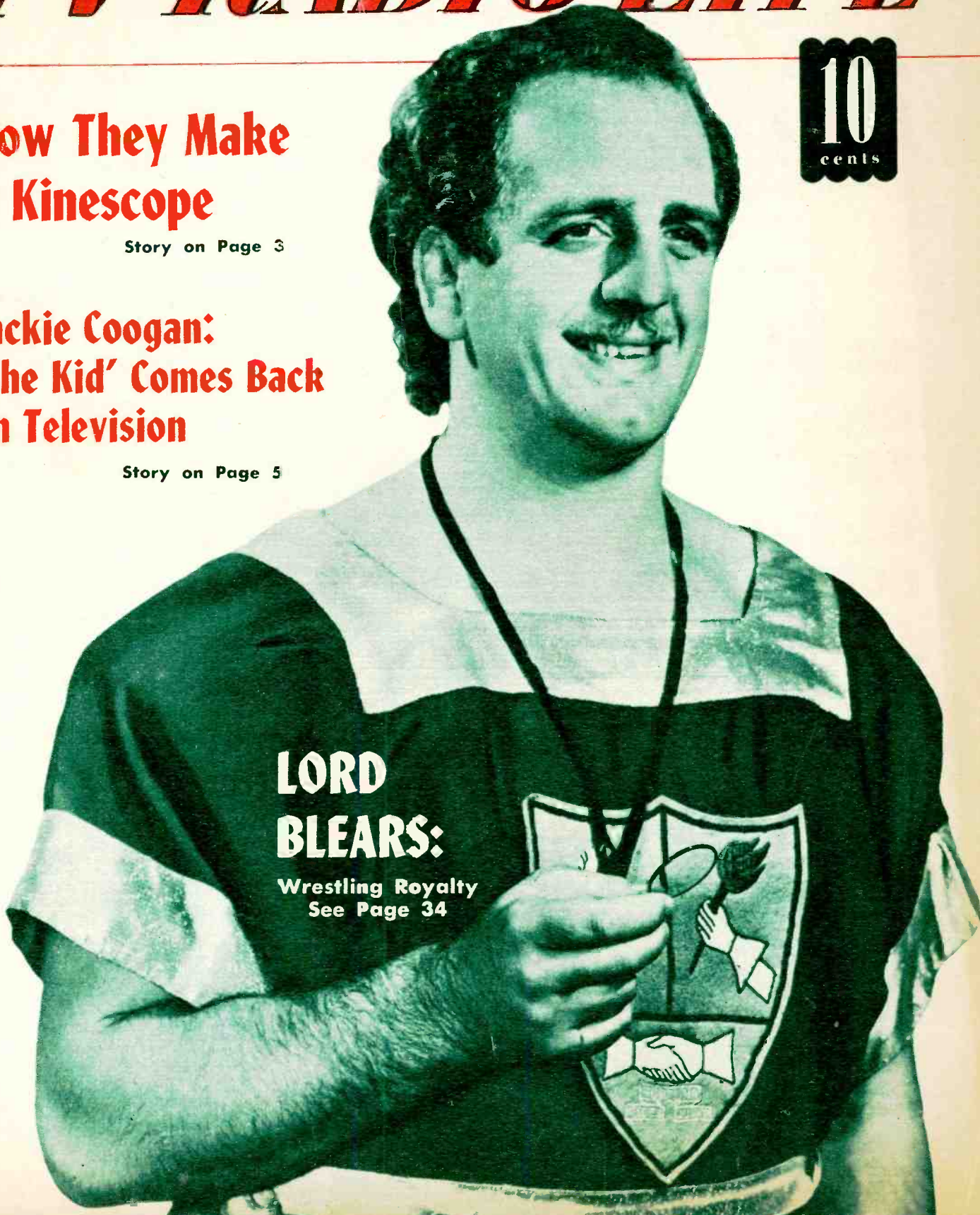

BECAUSE OF television, the word kinescope, or just plain "kinnie," has become a common word in our vocabulary.

Every day millions of people watch TV shows on "kinnie," and talk about "kinnie," and yet very few persons, even within the TV industry itself, know exactly what it is, or how one is cut.

(You may know less and become more confused than ever after reading this article, but let's give it a try anyhow.)

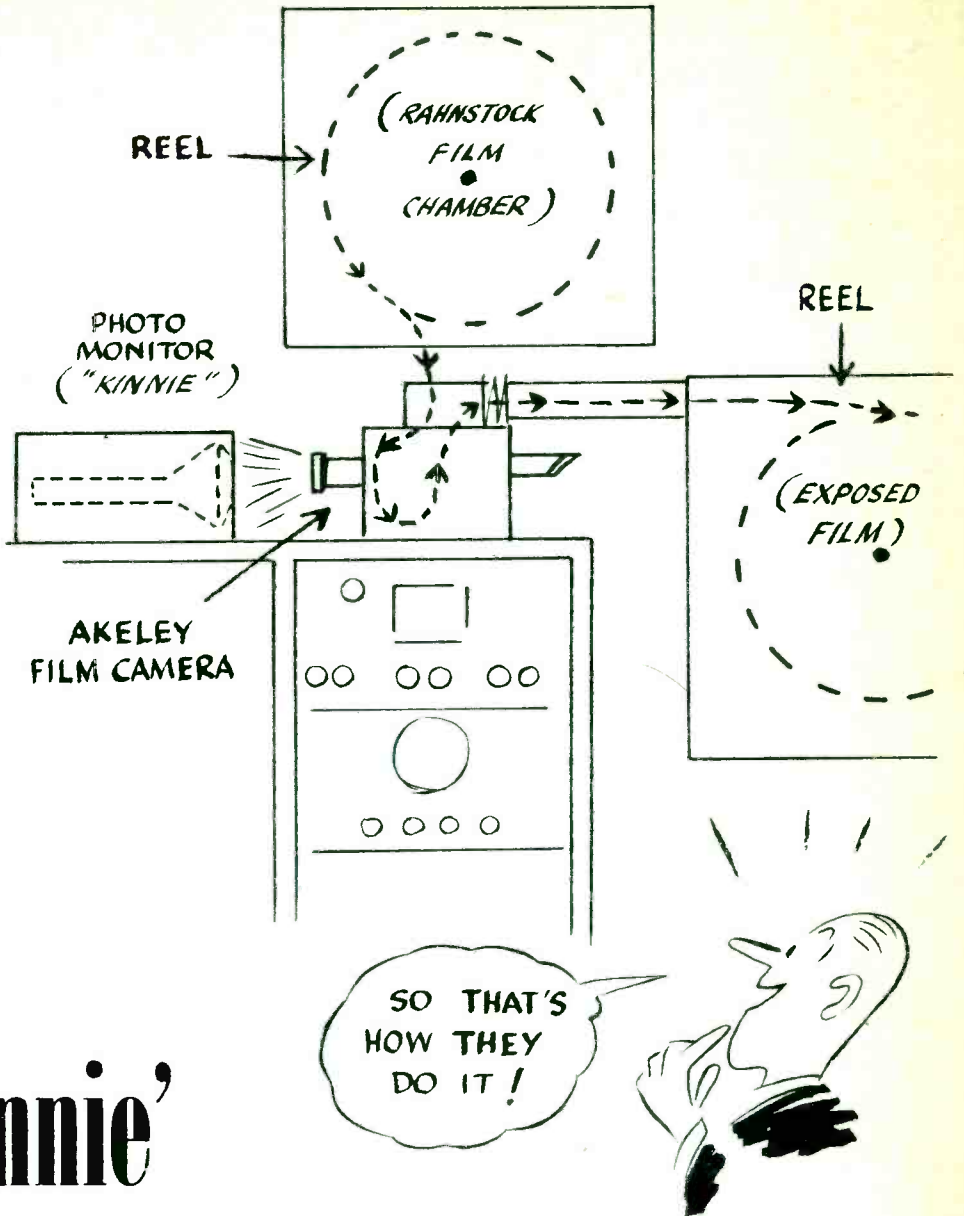
To begin with, there are three means of transmitting a TV show: (1) live; (2) by film; and (3) by kinescope.

Actually, a "kinnie" is a film that is made off of a kinescope machine. In short, it is nothing but a picture of a picture, recorded on film.

Brief Background

"Kinnies" came into being for two main reasons: economy and permanence.

Because talent and production costs for live and film shows were so enormous, TV stations had to rely

more and more on kinnies. Similar to a recording on radio, they could be shown at any time and as many times as a station desired.

Although a kinnie was the least desirable of all three means, and of necessity the poorest in quality, it has been a lifesaver for many TV stations, and has enabled millions of people to see shows they never would have been able to see otherwise.

One morning, Robert Conner, Director of Engineering at KLAC-TV, took time out to explain and demonstrate how Channel 13 cuts one.

The Process

In the process itself, four basic pieces of equipment are used: (1) a video-amplifier and power supply; (2) the kinescope machine itself; (3) an Akley camera; and (4) a reel to load and unload film.

By means of a coaxial cable, a live picture is transmitted from the

studio to the filming room. After passing through (1) the video-amplifier and power supply, it is flashed on the small screen of the (2) kinescope machine. The screen on the kinescope resembles that of an ordinary TV set, except that the image is almost twenty times as bright, and has much greater detail.

The Akley camera (3)—costing a mere \$17,500—then takes a picture of the picture on the kinescope and records the image on (4) blue-sensitive fine-grain film.

Other Facts

KLAC-TV has used thirty-five-millimeter film instead of sixteen-millimeter. "The reason for this," Mr. Conner explained, "is that we found that a far better than average picture could be produced by having our picture on thirty-five-millimeter negative stock."

Ninety feet of thirty-five-millimeter

film can be run off in a minute; thirty-six feet a minute for sixteen-millimeter. A two-hour show consumes approximately 12,000 feet of film. Raw material alone for such an operation costs \$700 an hour.

KLAC-TV has cut kinnies of almost every one of its live shows, and has shipped many back East to independent stations. In 1951, for example, over 500,000 feet of negative release stock were produced.

The sound portion of the program is recorded separately on magnetic tape. Later both film and sound are put on one piece of film. And finally you see and hear the finished product on your own TV screen.

Of course there are a few thousand other engineering details connected with this intricate operation. However, we hope the above information will help you to have a little clearer understanding of how a kinnie is cut for television.

Tito Guizar:

'Viva el Rancho Grande'

The Tune That Became His Magic Formula



DURING TITO GUIZAR'S LONG-HAIRED PERIOD he sang with the Chicago Civic Opera, Mexico City Opera and toured on extensive concert engagements. His KTTV show, however, brings you Tito in a lighter mood as he serenades his audience with folk songs and ballads.

TITO GUIZAR has been a troubador of gay tunes for more than twenty years. His infectious grin and cheery songs are his trademark.

Columbia University served as Tito's passport to the United States and to a musical career. His parents wanted him to become a doctor so they sent him to the University to study medicine. However, musical scales held more appeal for young Tito than scalpels. After convincing his reluctant parents that show business was not sacrilegious, he deserted medicine and sailed to Italy to study music.

Carnegie Hall

During Tito's "long-haired" period he sang with the Chicago Civic Opera and Mexico City Opera and also engaged in extensive concert tours. He sang the conventional arias and classical songs, while appearing at Carnegie Hall one season. But the audiences' perfunctory applause prompted an experiment. Tito sang the unscheduled "Rancho Grande" and their stilted response magically reversed itself.

This little experiment made Tito realize that operatic tenors were a drug on the market. From that day on Tito has identified himself as a singer of folk tunes and ballads. He latched onto a guitar, the standard musical accompaniment of his native Mexico, and has been happily strumming ever since.

Tito showers soft-spoken words of endearment on his guitar, Maria Elena. He treats her as tenderly as if she were his lady love. And she is. Maria Elena has meant fame and fortune to amicable Tito. In 1932, the radio heyday of Rudy Vallee, Morton Downey and Jane Froman, timid Tito persuaded the radio big-wigs to give him and his Maria Elena a chance. The youth from Guadalajara was an immediate success.

Tito sings for the pure enjoyment of singing. Those who have watched him on his KTTV show are aware of the genuine pleasure he derives from ragging the scales.

Sportsman

This singer of soft serenades is very much the outdoor man. He has played with the Mexican Davis Cup

team; he plays golf in the low 80's; he held Mexico's amateur middle-weight boxing title; he's a horse breeder, a polo player and a devout sports spectator.

Tito and his wife Carmen live in a spacious home in Westwood with their three children, Nina, eighteen, Lillya, thirteen, and Tito, Jr., eight. Tito is an extremely friendly person who is guilty of an unchanneled loquaciousness. He tells so many interesting and amusing stories that one has to bird-dog him back to a specific topic of conversation. From all appearances he has a great capacity for enjoying life the easy, gracious way so characteristic south of the border.

"Rancho Grande"

"Rancho Grande" was the turning point in Tito's career. As a result Tito has attached that name to many of his personal effects. The ranch on which he breeds horses in Mexico City is called "Rancho Grande." He won Mexico's equivalent of our Academy Award for his performance in a picture titled "Rancho Grande." "Viva el Rancho Grande," says Tito Guizar.

"The Kid" Comes Back . . . On TV!

THE NAME of Jackie Coogan is a legend in the land of make-believe.

When you think of Coogan, you think of "The Kid." You think of the golden era of Hollywood and the names of Chaplin, Valentino, and Pickford. You think of the "Roaring Twenties," gala opening nights, and all the glory, gaiety, and glamour that surrounded Young America in those days.

Starting in 1919 (when "The Kid" broke all existing records), Young Jackie grew up in an environment of big stars and big money. By 1923 he received a fabulous bonus of \$500,000, a salary of \$20,000 a week, and sixty per cent of the net profits. And there were no heavy income taxes in those days, either.

Throughout the twenties he appeared in countless motion pictures. In 1928 the boy wonder from Los Angeles went on a world-wide tour, and wound up at The Palace in New York two years later. His pay check during this time averaged \$12,500 per week.

In 1930 Jackie made his first talkie, "Tom Sawyer." After completing "Huckleberry Finn" and "Home on the Range," he attended Santa Clara in 1932.

During the thirties, besides his picture making, Jackie appeared on radio as "Billy the Kid," toured the

legit theaters as "Henry Aldrich" in "What a Life," and by 1940 took his own show into the night-club field.

On March 5, 1941, the former husband of Betty Grable and Flower Parry enlisted in the U. S. Army. As a glider pilot, he fought the Japanese in Burma, and was finally discharged in 1945 as a lieutenant.

Ever since then he's been trying to make his "comeback" in show business. Of course the former child star will never be able to recapture his past glory—or money, which he lost through bad investments and legal technicalities. This was responsible for "The Coogan Law" in California, which now protects a minor's money.

TV Activities

TV, however, has given Jackie the opportunity of demonstrating some new talent.

For the past three years he has been a regular panelist on CBS-TV's popular "Pantomime Quiz." His tremendous theatrical experience, plus a natural sense of humor and showmanship, fit perfectly into the "Pantomime" format.

Along with Russell Hayden, he has also just completed a series of thirteen "Cowboy G-Men" films for TV. These Telemont Pictures stress unique plots and comical situations. And in Jackie's own words, "I have attempted to improve the average Western movie by trying to do some real acting in these films."

The CBS-TV star is also one of the telethon champions of TV. As both an active participant and a director-producer, he worked sixteen hours

on KTTV's Milkathon, eight hours on the Cerebral Palsy show, and seven hours with Hope and Crosby for the Olympic fund. Besides these, he collaborates with Sam Mannis on "Take My Advice."

Incidentally, his ultimate ambition in TV is to become a director-producer, a job for which he should be well qualified. He has seven shows registered in his name, which haven't been released as yet. Coogan also has another ace in the hole: none of his old pictures have been shown on TV yet, and when they do he'll get a nice financial cut from them.

A Living Legend

Spending several days with Jackie, watching him go through his TV routines, is a rare privilege (that's the right word).

Doing this, you cannot help but feel a certain sense of tragedy and loss. Not because of Jackie himself—he's a likable, good-natured guy who leads a normal, happy life with his ten-year-old son, and who, despite all his setbacks, holds no grudges.

But whether you talk with him, laugh with him, or see him perform on "Pantomime" or act on the set of Iverson's Ranch for his TV films—you realize constantly that here is a man who represents, probably more than any other living human being, a way of life once vibrant and full of extravagance, which is now decadent and just a memory.

Yes, Jackie Coogan is a legend. Unlike most legends, however, he is still very much alive in the world of show business.

And we can thank TV for it!

With Cummings just as capable as Lucille Ball, it should be a good bet—if they get as good writing for this male star. . . . We hear a top-drawer Western star is being considered for a week-end hour that will put him smack against another less sophisticated but hugely popular Western star! Idea is to crack the

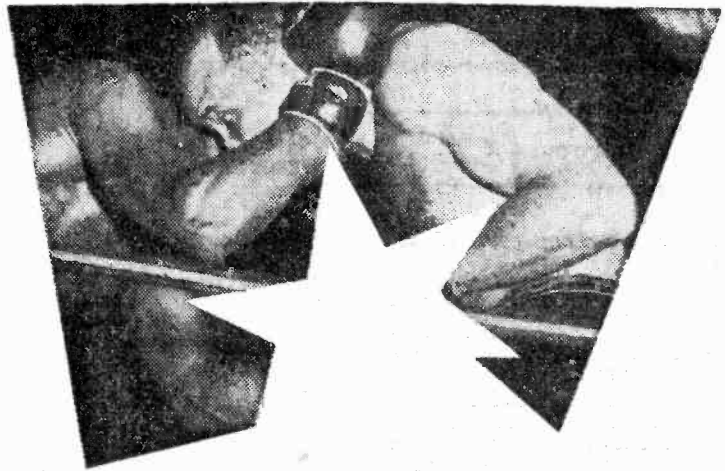

The hint is:

Here's how to make a practical record holder for children's records. It's suspended from the wall and will solve the problem of record storage. Select a four-foot length of six-inch lumber and saw off corners on one end. Lay records on board in the position you wish to hang them, and indicate where the respective spindle holes appear. Make sure that these are centered on the plank. Drill quarter-inch holes to accommodate the three half-inch dowel pegs that will retain the records. The pegs are inserted at an upward angle. And before gluing dowels in place, slightly sharpen their exposed ends in a pencil sharpener.

IMAGINE SEEING THE BOMBING OF PEARL HARBOR as it was filmed by cameras of the Japanese! Imagine seeing the deadly aim of a German torpedo speeding from a sub into a ship of America's merchant marine carrying war supplies to England! The thrill and horror of these sights as viewed one afternoon last week will stick with me a long time, and you'll understand what I mean when you see NBC's new "Victory at Sea" series.

PREVIEW WAS HELD LAST WEDNESDAY afternoon when the Navy Department hosted the TV press aboard the heavy cruiser U.S.S. St. Paul at anchor off Terminal Island. Over 60,000,000 (yes, sixty million!) feet of film were screened for this series, produced by NBC with the Navy's cooperation. Film used was from the U.S., Japan, England, Germany, Italy and several other countries, some of it, naturally, being war-confiscated.

I HAD SEEN QUITE A FEW PICTURES of Pearl Harbor and had read much about the devastation, but the film drove home the reality much stronger. Somehow, when the disaster is pieced together as a half-hour film it is much more impressive and leaves a person frankly breathless. One of the most interesting portions of the Pearl Harbor presentation deals with the elaborate preparations through

which the Japanese went to insure total destruction on December 7. To see the fiendishly grim faces of the Japanese pilots as they strafed and the joyous lantern procession in Tokyo when news of the great victory was celebrated is to remind one none too gently that America should always be on guard. I think you, too, will find "Victory at Sea" a spectacular series of history in the making. KNBH will begin it on Monday night, November 10, 7:00 o'clock.

MR. HAL KANTER OF ENCINO has brought me to task for failing to mention Al Lewis in my recent story on "Our Miss Brooks." Lewis is director-co-writer, assisted by scripters Arthur Alsberg for radio and Joe Quillan for TV. "Why not give them some of the publicity and applause they deserve?" asks Kanter. "While Miss Arden is undeniably a fine performer and is supported by an excellent cast, I doubt that she could ad-lib enough

humor to keep you and me dialing her way every week," he concludes.

RIGHT YOU ARE, MR. KANTER. The omission, however, was not deliberate, and I should explain that what I was trying to do was a preliminary story to acquaint readers with the new TV show as a whole. Later on I hope we will be able to take lookers behind the scenes to see the wheels go round, for, as you probably know, TV-Radio Life has always plugged not only for the top performers, but for everyone connected with a program—supporting players, musicians, writers, producers, technicians.

SPEAKING OF WRITERS, ONE of the best—Jean Holloway—has had several tempting offers dangled under her discriminating nose while she and her husband, Dan Tobin, have been revisiting Hollywood. Jean, who left here two years ago to write "The First Hundred Years" for live TV in New York, is amazed at local progress. But she thinks that one of the biggest problems confronting shows switching from radio to TV is the writing. Too many times the mistake is made of foisting a radio-type script onto TV performers. Even a sequence which may have been a side-splitter on radio can fall flat as a pancake on TV. Jean knows because she tried it just once on her show. Talk now is of preparing "First Hundred Years" for a half-hour weekly telecast. That's the way it started, on radio, that is. Hope it goes.

Initial performance was one-tenth as good as it was on the repeat broadcast, she won it hands down.

The script was based on the American ballad "The Death of Barbara Allen" after researchers authenticated the story behind the music. Morton Fine and David Friedkin, scripters for "Broadway Is My Beat," captured the mood of the ballad in their dialogue.

Briefly, the plot concerns one Barbara Allen, who loves a sailor. A young merchant in town wants Barbara's hand, but she'll have none of him. The spurned suitor discredits the sailor's fidelity and slays him in an argument. After learning that her lover was falsely accused the embittered heroine kills the merchant and joins her lover in death.

A sad tale, made less gruesome by its simple, straightforward dramatization. The supporting cast, Bill Conrad, Joe Kearns and Jeannette Nolan, were convincing. The ballad served as musical bridges, creating an extremely effective mood. Last season "Suspense" introduced as an experiment dramas based on ballads. Their "Frankie and Johnnie" starring Dinah Shore was an instant hit.

Deviation from tales which are purely calculated to keep you in "Suspense" to tragic dramas adapted from ballads has proven a successful experiment. The element of suspense is still evident but the dramatic value of the property is enhanced by the plaintive music and by a simple story. Producer-director Elliott Lewis is to be complimented for his ingenuity and the over-all excellence of his production.—M.R.

Philharmonic Symphony

America's oldest and most distinguished orchestra, The New York Philharmonic-Symphony, begins its twenty-third season of broadcasting with a new sponsor. Willys-Overland Motors has picked up the tab for the 1952-1953 season.

The Symphony was founded in 1842. Its initial broadcasts over the CBS Radio Network took place on October 5, 1930. Only once has a broadcast of the orchestra been interrupted. It occurred on December 7, 1941, by the momentous announcement of the Pearl Harbor attack.

Dimitri Mitropoulos, the orchestra's musical director, will direct eighteen of the season's twenty-eight broadcasts. Guest conductors for the remainder of the season will be Bruno Walter, George Szell and Guido Cantelli.

James Fasset continues in his fourth year as commentator during the intermission feature, which provides provocative interviews and discussions of musical happenings from all America.

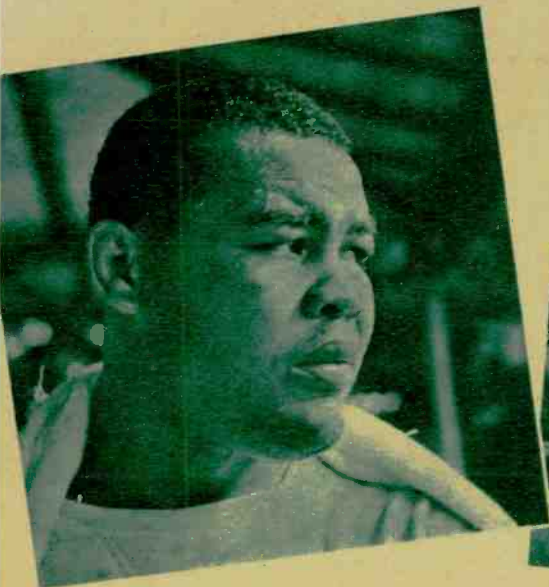

KIEV Has a Birthday

*Manager Cal Cannon Says:
"Being a Square Pays Off"*

LAST SEPTEMBER KIEV celebrated its twentieth birthday. As far as anniversaries go, this could not be considered unusual. But KIEV is unusual because this small 1000-watter has survived network affiliates, larger independent stations and television.

When Cal ("I'm a square") Cannon took over the management of the Glendale station in 1946, he inherited a station which left much to be desired by way of community reputation and good will. Cal and his staff tackled what seemed an insurmountable task, creating good will and regaining the confidence of the community in their local radio station.

Advancement

Within two years KIEV received Billboard's Public Service Award (for independent stations under 5000 watts). The Glendale Junior Chamber of Commerce also cited the station. Cal and his staff not only gained the respect of the community, but within this short period the revenue of the station reached an all-time high.

How does KIEV manage the competition? "Simple," says Cal. "We offer the housewife the sort of popular music that will not become ingratiating . . . no bebop, New Orleans jazz or Western tunes. The type of music we prefer to broadcast can best be exemplified by our blanket instructions—when in doubt play Freddy

Martin. We are on the center of the dial and once Mrs. Homemaker turns on the radio, we want her to leave it at 87C. Our news reports are not slanted and our commercials are spaced," Cal Cannon explained. "We are fully aware of our responsibility to the community and do everything we possibly can to cooperate with their projects."

Mr. Cannon admits liking square music, but he's far from being a square when it comes to promotional ideas. Last summer Glendale (and surrounding areas) was populated by walking billboards. Cal purchased a carload of T-shirts, inscribed with the station's call letters, for sixty cents apiece, and sold them to the young fry for twenty-five cents each. It was a losing proposition in dollars and cents but it paid off in thousands of dollars worth of free advertising. This stunt was so successful that other stations requested Cal's permission to do likewise.

Successful Alumni

A hearty recommendation for KIEV is its successful alumni. John B. Hughes, George Dvorak, Dick Sinclair, Don Rickles, Hal Smith and Jack Narz are but a few of KIEV's graduates. AFRA's prexy, Clyde Wood, sings high praises to KIEV for its clean operation and generous consideration of its staff.

The KIEV story only proves that there's always room for the little guy, and as Cal Cannon puts it, being a square pays off.

Show Business's Oldest Feud

The Battle of Wits That Entertains the Participants, Their Friends and Foes Has Raged for a Quarter of a Century

GHE CURTAIN had hardly hit the floor at the close of a George Burns and Gracie Allen Show when the phone started ringing backstage in Studio A of the CBS headquarters in Hollywood.

An attendant answered, and a familiar voice asked for George. It was Jack Benny, calling from Detroit.

George scurried to the phone while the applause of the studio audience still rang in his ears. "Hi, Jay," he said. "What's Up?"

Benny came back with, "Oh, I was just sitting around with a bunch of newspaper guys here in Detroit, telling a lot of lies. But this is no lie. Your show, which we just saw, was a real smash. Really great."

"Well, Jay, Gracie and I felt it came off pretty well, but we could always do better."

The Gag

After some more persiflage, George asked Jack why he was stopping in Detroit, and the latter, reputedly a pinchpenny and Maxwell driver, replied laconically that he had just bought a new Cadillac. Also that he was driving back to Hollywood with Frankie Remley, the guitarist, as a traveling companion.

"Well, Jay," George said, "I beat you to the punch. I bought one last week here in Hollywood, and I've already got fifty-two miles on it!"

Moaned Benny, "Now I'm glad I got these charges reversed to you at CBS!"

Started Long Ago

Jack Benny and George Burns, two of today's greatest comics, have been friends since their early days in vaudeville. Back in those days they shared bachelors quarters and started pulling jokes on each other. They never stopped.

The night that George married Gracie Allen in Cleveland, Benny called up from Vancouver. He waited until 4:00 in the morning to call. "Hello, this is Jack Benny," he announced. George barked, "Bring up two orders of ham and eggs!" and hung up.

Later, when George and Gracie made their radio debut, Jack addressed a fan letter to his pal: "I listened to your program last night and I think it was swell. I would appreciate it very much if you would send me a picture of Tom Mix's horse."

George immediately found a photo

of a jackass and wrote across it, "To my very dear friend, Jack Benny." Jack acknowledged it with, "Thank you for your picture."

The most expensive and widely heralded exchange of jokes started on the opening night of Benny's engagement at the London Palladium in 1948. George put in a long-distance call for him from his Beverly Hills, California, home. When the connection was made, George said, "Hello, Jack. This is George Burns." Then abruptly hung up.

Paid Back

Jack got even in full a year later when George and Gracie opened at the Palladium. He flew all the way from Hollywood, and made his way to an apartment where a party was in progress in honor of Burns and Allen. Before he arrived, however, he picked up Jane Wyman (then mak-

ing a movie in London) and asked her to stooze for his stunt. She would—and did. Unbeknown to George and Gracie, they hid in a room next to the party apartment.

Then Jane played a veddy, veddy British phone operator and pretended to put through a call to George, from Hollywood. "Mr. Burns, Mr. Burns," she said, "Hollywood calling, Mr. Burns. Righto, it's Mr. Benny. I'll put him on."

George, in the other room, exclaimed happily to the guests, "That's Jack!" Just then Jack said, "Hello, George." And hung up.

"He hung up on me!" George said plaintively. And he had hardly finished the sentence when Jack walked into the room.

George was so overwrought he cried.

She has also demonstrated electric ranges. "We would pack a trailer down to the last paring knife. I would trek off to a potential buyer's home and prepare an elaborate meal while enlightening the womenfolk with the wonders of the electric range. But our sales, unfortunately, did not match the aggregation of women who dropped in to enjoy the delicious repast. Talk about laying a foundation for future sales! That we did.

"I preempted the rights of vacuum-cleaner salesmen. I've sold vacuums to women who didn't even own a rug, and then got busy selling them attachments to clean their mattresses."

Although Mercedes hasn't demonstrated major appliances lately, she is demonstrating her culinary talents on television. Prior to joining KECA-TV she was home economist with the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power for eighteen years. Her idea of an avocation and hobby is to gypsy around the country in a trailer, enjoying scenic wonders and cooking the trout her husband snags.

MAURICE HART is one guy who knows his music. He's been a disc jockey since 1936, and has been in California with KFVB since June, 1949. A capable drummer and saxophonist, he has also written several published songs.

So when the New York-born deejay says, "The music being foisted upon the public these days is terrible," you can rest assured he knows what he's talking about.

Heard on weekdays from 2 to 4 p.m., and on Saturday from 8 to 10 p.m. over KFVB, Maurice, with his smooth, ad-lib style, caters to the "middle-brows" of popular music.

Two things persuaded Maurice to be a disc jockey: the depression and a tragic accident.

A successful businessman on Wall Street for seven years, Hart found himself jobless during the depression. Also, because of a fire accident in his youth, Maurice's hands were badly burned. Consequently, it was difficult for him to get a job where he had to be continuously in the public eye.

Gifted with a natural, pleasing voice, he found radio to be the perfect solution. Two men who aided him immeasurably were engineer Johnny Turrini at WAAT and famous announcer Andre Baruch.

Starting with a small Jersey station in 1936, Maurice hit the big time as Martin Block's substitute at WNEW for over six years.

When Block came West in 1946, Maurice came along with him. Block ran into a snag on the Pacific Coast and returned East, where he is still the number-one deejay. Maurice, however, liked it out here so much that he decided to stay.

Even now, Hart has been offered twice as much money to return to New York, but he's perfectly happy where he is.

Maurice and his wife Luba live on a small ranch in Encino. They have one child, Michael Benita, age ten.
