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## IMPCRTANT TO READERS

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## Broadcasting from Geneva.

By P. P. ECKERSLEY.

0N the morning of March 17 th, at approximately half past nine, anyone with a wireless receiving set capable of picking up the London and Daventry Stations had the unique opportunity of hearing speeches delivered by ceitain European statesmen in the Assembiy of the League of Nations in Geneva.
Some of the implications of this notable achievement were given the next day in the Manchestor Guardian thus :

It is to be hoped that all those who are interested in the broadcasting of great political occasions had the experience yesterday of hearing the Daventry wireless station relay the speakers at the League of Nations Assembly. There has been no single stimulant of interest in the League stronger, for those who enjoyed it, than this extraordinaril $/$ clear transmission of the explanations of the estatesmen concerned in its faiure on an historic occasion. The League ceased for the moment to have the qualities of abstraction and remoteness, and the printed word became thereafter more graphic to the reader. In the hum of under-talk at Geneva, the rustling of papers, the announcements of the speech master, and the emotional cadences of the speakers the League became, as nothing but personal contact could make it, a real body of men wrestling gravely and vainly with a cri-is. It is safe to say that to none who heard M. Briand's French roling across Europe, or the sad precision of Si ir Austen Chamberlain's Engish, or Senhor Mello Franco declaring his inabiity to exceed his instructions, can the League again seem a matter with which he has no personal concern."
I am more concerned now, however, with
the story of how the link between Genevs and London was achieved. Credit is largely due to Mr. Arthur Burrows, our late colleagus here in the B.B.C., and now the Manager of what I may call the Wircless League of Nations, the Office Internationat do Kadio. phonie. It was he who saw all the authoritics over there, obtained the many per: missions that were necessary, and generatly fixed up all the irritating detai,s that aro always among the most difficuit points in a Ersadcast of this sort.

Mr. Burrows' greatest efforts, however, would have brought nothing of interest to us had it not been for the French engineers of the P.T.T., who obtained so clean a landline between Geneva and Paris. Actually, of course, Geneva is not further from Paris than is Aberdeen from London, but it must be remembered that the engineers' difficulties were the greater in not having previously used this line to any extent for the particular requirements of broadcasting.

In Paris the speeches were amplified and passed to the Eiffel Tower, and here they were radiated for French listeners and for .our reception in Britain. At Keston, equipped with a special receiver and land-line amplifier, Captain West and Mr. Partridge of the B.B.C. picked up the transmission from the Eiffel Tower and, by means of a land line, selayed their fecpition to Lerien Here, the movement of one jack transferred the input of the Daventry and London. Stations from the studio of evervday use or Savoy Hil to that fateful meeting by the Lake of Geneva scemingly so far away from our everyday experience.

## Secrets of the Radio Drama.

## By Frank H. Shaw.

Captain Skew is a pioneer amorg writers of plays for troadcasting. Two of t'e recent successes which bave attracted wide attention have been "The Mavfair Mystery" and "Which ?"

Tplay appeats to penses- pisthe to liearing; the radio play ear appead only to onk senso : consequeutly, it may be convidered play that has not onty to be spoken, buit also acted in words. In words and in atmo. aphere, that is: for, lacking thie stagesot of the cuntomary drama, ita movements and its costumes, it in my opinion that the radio drama must depend for its succesa on its audible atmosphere, at least as much as on its story and dislogue,
I find, in writing my wireless plays, that I am oturnally handicapped by this lack of visible atagesetting. Every gesture, every turn of the head, evary definite movement must, to is great extent, be singeated by the dialogue. Irimetad of wrifing stage instcuctions: " $A$ moves from Centro to O.P. B,' A munt be heard to move, cither thuourin dialogue or through a sound effect. The tendenry is, fo conseque noe, to make the characters indulge in is fow movements as possible; and yet, fince the entire effect is to creato the illusion that the drama is actually transpiring many movements abo necosairy.

## A New Type of Play.

Fortunately for the suthor, the resounces of the wireless "effects" are to-dey practioally limitJess : and I find these resourees peculliariy buitablo to the produotion of plays containing a ship as a atagu. Every time I hear is sea-piece produced, I am pat in mind of the Tentonio producar who, during a stago represontation of tlounder leeard actinal thmoder outsides, and exelaimed:, "My thunder in better than that ${ }^{\prime \prime}$ "d heavens-hardgals, oveuted by -means of wirelens "effect9," alunsts outhons the real thing ! Yet every detail of its veriamilitude is exact-from the dull thud of a striking sen, ancompanied by the erisp splush of the crevt, to the creak of a balliard block. I um still axed and a mazed by the possibilities of the accessory departimeit at Savoy Fill.

Deating with a new meiliom, I am safo in stating, that a new type of play is demanded. Prefenably it should not be a declamatory play: it should carry throughout an excellent stimp of restraint. long orations are out of place; dialogue shonli Ee eminently or sp and telling, with-as in the care of the logitimate stage-play - no single unneeessary word. The brain of the Histener mast not be confuect and beclouded by verbal tormants laading nowher. Dialogues must be "smappy, "conveying definite meaning, Furthermore, the situations woust arine mo-mutarally that the credulity of the listemer is not strained. There is no time, when listening to a wireleas play, to refer baok mentally to discover the aubtleties permissible on tho proper stage. A radio play inust be abvinus in its action, however conceraled its ultimate clinum might be.

A Sinall Cast the Eest.
Aa few characters as posciblo thould be employed, rince humnt voices tre not as prone to convey definita impresaicns as human personiatitios: gad the listmer, dopendent only on his semse of lecating and tio imagtaction, is apt to trow corfined by many voiocs, inless they affict very considerably ono from aniothé. And ceih ehathoter, I find. shothld diffor greafly from evety other: the contrasting personalitiof ahould, in decd, bo exagererated to some extents if a clear eut impression is to be conveged.

It matters not at all to the listener whether a character is tall, bandrome as a Greek god, reckless in appearance, or whether he is undersized send possosses id cast in his ege, wo löng as lis voice conveys nsuggeation of his persornality. As no filmfan concerns himelf with the vocal qualities of his film-favourites ; so no wipeless fan concerns limecti, to any othor than an academio extent, with the faciat and phybicat qualities of his radio fivourites ; at all events, during the progreas of the ploy.

The radio dramatist is, to an aven greatef exlent, than his brother, the straight playwright, depenident on thie proctueer for his succocss. The tintile of a glass at precisely the right moment adds wa enormonsividue to the spolisen word-ll is almost an impossibitity for radio players to "gag", through a crisis. And as the larger "t effects " are not always produced in the same stadio where the voeal pre. sentation is taking place, an enormous responsibility rests op the produeer's shonlders if all synchroniza. tions of twords and sounds are to be correct. If cannut remember to have been let down orico,

## Cheosing a Flot.

To give essential details for the proper writing of nadio dramie is difficult. It is A neveart, as yet fn its infancy, but, I venture to think, a lusty chili.
A stroig and convincing plot is essential; the introduction should be crisp and convincing; the charaters should be delineated clearly, without any shadow, of doubt as to their personality. Aotion throughont should bo brisk: situations cleanly sutlived; and the whole play should move pemorse. leedly forward to its middle-olimax. A slight suggestion of anti-climax may be permitted when once the listener's intereat has been secured; but it should only be employed ass taking-off phree for the finat and ultamate climux. Onoe that climax Iis reaehed, the play should end, as if clean-cut with fil knife. If possible, the ending should be un-expected-but, to my mind; the satirical twist -hould be avoided.

## Brevity is the Soul of Wit.

A definite stary, a good plot, characters that introduce themselves smartly, an overwhelming climax and no suggegtion of anti-climax-these, to me, are the most desirable qualities in a radio play. But, as there still remains a suggestion of tho eerie und uncanny in wireless, it play that possesess some hint of tho ocoult and the supernatimal, carries more couviction through the ether than from the vidble stage and, I think, enbranes a radio-drama's possibilitios. Only, us on the legitimate stage, there is an torgent noed for clean, convincing comedy over the wircleas.

A radio-play should be short-that is a sine cwa $10 \%$. It is not on much that a listener eatinot Le carried away by the ntrength of a play to listen for is two-hoir stretch; but it has alwayo to bo Sorne in mind that all listeners cannot devote a two-hour unliroker spell to ariy one play ; and if a cortain portion has been miased, it if not poasible to cut in and collect an interest in what remains.

None the less, I firmly believe that the time is not - far ristant when a sohool of radio-dramatista will erise capable of creating such a new form of radio play as will carry the prolonged interest of a : twothour play, what fime it occupics onily-say-an Liour: And there ia oue (bing to be naid for the rahio-play. If a theatre-goer is ominterested in a Ftage-play he-unally sita it out, unwilling to diafurb his follow ecat-holders. A listener cen always forn ofl the loud sperkerior remose the ear-phones, and wait for something more to his likinge. Theroin tio-scorea over the stall-holder is' a- West-end' theatre-the management in the theatre doce note offer a substitate performanoe.

## Broadcasting from Gencya.

(Continued from the previous page.) It is now the aim and ambition of the broadcast organizmitions of Europe to expand the "S.B." system, and if faciities can be given us, there is no reason whatsoever why events of real international importance should nöt be radiated from every important European station simultaneously.

The first essays at radiating from Gemeva were-abortive; this latest event shows that experience teaches, and that ouly detailed improvements are required to bring about i universal network. When Parliaments admit microphones, when Geneva again has to discuss affairs of real moment to us and to generations to come, when great musical events take place in whatsoever city, there is no technical reason why we should not all share in occasions to which so many of us now manifest indifference through lack of reat-contact.

There may be mountains of prejudice to level, there may be detailed difficulties to ovarom? but we tectricians can see our way elear to making the Geneva broadcast historical to future generations, to whom such events wi.l undoubtediy be a commoliplace.

If only the spanning of the Atlantic by wireless telephony can become an established fact, we shatl be able to open up still greatet possibinities. Broadcasting potentially has the power to link us all together so that we may in time appreciate the real meaning of world citiznship. It is significant that the first successfut finger-post to point the way to our goal has been erected by the League of Nations.

## A New Service for Listeners.

By the Earl of Drogheda.

[A new organization, the aim of which is to assist listeners in various ways, has lately been formed under the title of the Wireless Association of Great Britain. We give facilities to this new body as wo have done to certain ethers designed to serve the great listening public. In the following article Lord Droghede, who is a member of the Council of the new Arsociation, briefly outlines its aims and objects. He will broadcast a talk on the subject from all stations at $10.10 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$, on Wedresday, April 7th. 1

THERES is ono aspect of broaileasting which has only recently begun to receive slight attention, but which is, in niy opinion, so important that it is surprising to find it has been neglected zo long.

It is no more than ten years ago that the greatest astonibbment and excitement was created when a wireless operator at sea, or perchaps ons of the very fow amateurs porsessing wireless receivers, heard is his tolephones the mound of the spoken voise, or, pertape, of music. At that time wircless was looked upon by the general publie, or that small portion which had ever heard of it, as being one of the abstruse sciences incomprehensible to the erdinary individual. From that time an extraordinary frognoss has been made. There is now an almost univeraal employment of wireless, and many thousands of people possess their conmertiati-ed wircless rectivers.
One of the most essential innovations necessary to bring ubout this revolution was the supply of something to listen to, and it was this need for vontinnons programmes which the B.B.C. Las so ahly filled during the last few years. The important point I wish to draw attention to is that although the prognammes of the B.B.C. have reached a very high state of efficieney, and ithough commercial peeivens, as prodaced by the variour manufacturing concernk, are yearly increased in efticiency, yet no jrovision has been mule for any exgani.ation, either to inprove the hnowfedgo of the public in wireless technical matters or to render them the vary necessary ussistance in undertanding and using their apparatus. Let us sec what is the ressolt of flit extraordinary neglect of this branch of the development of broadcasting.

Finstly, ow.ng to faulty or out-a'-dato af paratus, reeption is often poor. Then there is the oscillation tromblo, which is almost completely spoiling the hroadoant programmes in some places, such oscillation leing almost entirely due to ignorance of how to use a receiving set.

Another important point is that for a long time past the public has been spending far more than is necessary in the frequent purchase of components and accessoties which do not work harmonioualy together.
All these factors tend to bring broadcasting into lisrepute and retard the progress of what should become a national utility service.

Are not these the natural results of a certain lack of edacation and instruction in some of the technioal aspects of wireless? Svant, attention is puid even in the schools to the subject of wireless and technical lectures are few and far between, so that with the exception of a certain amount of advice offered by the Press, the public has nowhere to reek' information that will enatle them to get full value out of their vets.

It is the careful consideration of these facts by a number of eminent wireless enthusiasts which has cauned them to decide on the formation of an organi ation designed to be of real service to listeners throughout the country. The Wireless Association of Great Britain is the result.
I woull like to say at once that the Automobile Association, the suceess of which is so well known to everybody, is the model upon which the constitution of the Wireless Association is based. As the one ward Service has boen the kesnote of the
sunceas of the A.A., so will the wond Service be the basis upon which the sinceess of the Wireless Association of Oreat Britain must depend.
Take, for example, the nsceillation muisance. It is geverally admitted that this cannot be subdued by force and, further, that in nime cases out of ten that force is not necessary. As I have already mentioned, ignoranco is usmally the sole cause, and offendens wil be only too pleased to cease orcilluting If they can onily be told how nit, to do it,

The personal service, which is the prineipat feature of the new deoociation, is the ideal and only antidate for this partionlar nuisonee. That, I think, is one of the main reasons why I hope the great public of radio listeners will leittily support the Hew Association.

## Listening to the League

## By Professor Gilbert Murray.

I HAVE been asked to - send a mesrage to 7 he Ratio Times on the broadcasting of the speeches made in the Leame of Nations As. sembly at Genevacon the morning of March 17th.
I was not able myself listen, since 1 whe travelling in a train alt that day, but I am as sured by a frient who heard the transmission that the espeches, both French as well as Enyish, were very diatinet This is a great improsement on any previous result, and a great triumph for the engineers eoncerned in the experiment.
But the achiesement has more to its credit than simply the technique of engineering. The initiative and the breadth of sision which impelled the B.B.C. to undertake the transmission of these speeches in this commery are of the greatest importpance to the whole movement for international cooperation. I undersfand that the enterprise of the B,B.C. on this occasion roflects its genurat policy of beeking to dedieate the medium of, wirdess broadeasting to purposes which will servo the general interests of civilization.

## An Aid to Feaca.

I have been glad to hear of the initiative taken by the B.B.C: in establishing an international union of broardcasters with headquarters at Geneva. It il atl to the good that this mion is working in close unofficial co-operation with the Secretariat of the Eeague of Nations, and appears to be animated with the same epirit. I am sure that, rightly conducfed, wireless liroidcasting is destincd to beeome an important nuxilinry to those forees which make for permanent peace.

It was a remarkable achievement to chable the millions of tistencs to the London and Daventry Stations to hear the rpecches at Genera on Wednes. diny morning just as clcarly and realisticalty as if they had been present in the Assembly Hall itself. But this is only a beginning, and 1 took forward confidently to the time when proceedings of this kind will have a radio andience not contined to a few oountrices or linited by any distances or plysicat obstacles.
I am sne that many of the half miltion members of our Leaque of Nations Union were partioularly thrilled to liear in their own homes the speeches of one of the most momentons days in the history of the feague. It has been a period of acute disappointrient, but, neverthelesse there is no reason for supporters of the Ieague to feel disappointed. The internationnl goodwill which was showa at Locarno between the chief belligerents in the Great War has been sharply tested, but it is in-no way diminished.

The League of Nations works through publis opinion and publicity, and the help given to it in this difficult lime by the B.B.C. will not readily be Forgotten.

A skrirs of programmes called "Beacons of Cenins," comprising performances of works of modern mnsimians, coupled with those of the famous clasaical compoeers (ehosen by the modern muaicians) was recently started at the Cardiff Station. The first of these programmes dealt with the works of Gustav Holst, who chose as his favourite composer Thomas Weelkes, of the Tudor period. Another programme of this series will be given on Tuesday. Aprit 20th, dealing with the works of Paul Corder, who has chosen as his favourite oomposer Drapak.

$\mathrm{S}^{\circ}$O the Government has given its decision against the broadcasting of the Chancellor of the Exchequer's Budget Speech this yean. This wil come as a sharp disap: pointment to listeners everywhere, and especially to those of our readers who had been impressed by the cogent arguments in favour of the innovation which such competent authorities as Mr. Philip Snowden (himself an ex-Chancellor of the Exchequer), Mr. J. M. Keynes, the famous economist, and Mr. T. P. O'Connor, the Father of the House, have brought forward so ably in recent issues of The Radio Times. Time, however, is on our side. Whatever the present House of Commons may say, it cannot be long before the microphone takes its place on the Speaker's table beside the Minister's dispatch box and the historic Mace. In the very near fature no one will be found to dispute its right to be there on all red letter days in Parliamentary history.
In this connection, we may quote from the able letter from Sir Arthur Stanley, the Chairman of the Wireless League, which appeared in The Times on March z2nd.

There are occasions when the broadcasting of speeches made in the House would not only be of the greatest interest to the listener, but would also be of immense service in his political education. . . . Take, for instance, the speeches of Sir Edward Grey and Mr. Asquith in the early days of 1914, when they respectively, as Foreign Secretary and Prime Minister, were stating the case for or against our entering into the Great War; take Sir Austen Chamberlain's speech on his return from Locarno, and take again the speech he will make on his return from Geneva. All these speeches are not poitical in the ordinary meaning of party poilics. Theyarestatements of fact and policy, and, as such, are of vital interest to the millions of listeners who tune in to the B.B.C.

Many of our readers have written to us lately asking whether it is practicable to broadcast the proceedings in the House, having regard to the character of the Chamber and the corditions under which the debates are carried on. Let us briefly outline the problem from the point of view of the radio engineer.
What are the facts to be considered in facing such a problem? For good intelligibiity, taking the average microphone transmitter and receiving set as they stand to-day, a microphone las a maximum range of, say, from ten to fifteen feet. In other words a speaker could still be followed if he were at this distance from the microphone, but a much more practical distance is from three to four feet. It would thus be easy to arrange a small number of hidden microphones around the Speaker's table, and to switch on to the one that is nearest the member whose remarks are to be broadcast.

Interruptions thirty to forty feet away would come to the listener as a faint back ground of noise hardly distinguishable above
the intrinsic noises of the microphone itself. They would certainly not be as istelligible as the speech itself. The relative "loudness," indeed, of a speaker at four feet, even when compared with somebody shouting at forty feet would be so greatly in favour of the speaker nearest the microphone, that apart from intelligibility, strength alone would preclude the average receiving set from picking up any but the "Front Benchers."

It must therefore be understood that any arrangement of microphones on the Speaker's table would not in itself enable the proceedings throughout the House to be broadcast, it would serve only those members in the immediate vicinity of the Speaker.
No one need fear that the microphones would be an unsightly addition to the Speaker's table. They need not even be visible, for they could be suspended below the edge of the table. They are only three inches cube, Neat wiring would run under the floor down to an "amplifier room," somewhere near the Chamber itself. Here each pair of wires would be labelled to indicate the actual position of the microphones, and to make things clear doubtloss certain Ministers nearest each particular microphone would be distinguished on the labelling. A gallery observer with a telephone to the amplifier room could signal down as soon as a "Front Bencher" rose to speak and the appropriate microphone would immediately be thrown into circuit.

There is nothing complicated in all this, our radio engineers assure us; in fact they have often'succeeded in cartying out far more difficult broadcasts, such as. for instance, a public dinner, where speaker after speaker rises, each in a different place, and each necessitating the use of a different microphone, which has to be switched in by an engineer sitting in an adjoining room. The progress of the proceedings has to be teleptioned in each case by an observer lidden somewhere in the room where the dinner is taking place.

Of course, if it ever became necessary to broadcast the whole proceedings of the House of Commons, it would need a very lively procedure to switch in the appropriate microphone as each member caught the Speaker's cye, and one of those "scenes" which occasionally lend a "certain liveliness" to the proceedings of the Mother of Parliaments, might well prove too much for the observer whose task it would be to attend to the business of switching. Who knows but that some day it will be made a rule of the House that a member is "out of order" if he rises to speak without first switching on bis microphone
The question of broadcasting the proceedings of Parliament day by day, however, is quite outside the realm of practical poiitics. All that we have discussed in these columns has been the broadcasting of the annual Budget Speech, the case for which, wa submit, has been convincingly set forth in these columns, and has not been answered:

## Speaking to the Microphone.

## By Herman Klein.* <br> THE fact that you only heur the broadeasi apealkor and cannot oberrve the expression of his fuob

 or bee his lips moving makes it alf the more necessary that the voice and the organs of speech should be perfornting their functions currectly. Mere louidness will not tuelp to muke the words moio distinot: sonority is not everything. You will hear move sound. but it miny be only noise, as your loud spenker will quickly prove. A megaphone will-magnify the humin voice, but it will not meke word's clearor; on the contrary, it muifles thems.So, when the person in the griblery whe eannut hear well eries out "Speak upt" ho means that the epective neod not shout or imitate the effest of a megaphone, but that ho should raiso the pitch of his voice, and deliver the words in a bigher key, so thit both will iravel better und farther, ani bring to the distant ear theme missing syllables wibich are preventing the listener from hearing an that is being said or sung.

## The Art of Breathing.

In front of the mierophone the groat thing of course, is to bo nitaral, casy, careful, and clear in articulation. There is les need in the brcade saing studio than in a theatre or a hall to adapt une's voice to the size of the auditarium or to study its wuonstive.
But there is somet ting else, too, that is equaily important to the diction of both speaker and singer-that is, the art of breathing. The breath is the controlling agent in the employment of our woenl forees and, uniless wo can exercise the control effeotually, whether by instinct (which is rare) or by a vorrect scientitio method, umpleasant thinga may happen. The dellivery is liable to lrecome hurriod and jerky; you hear the hissing intake of tho breath, a sort of gasp followed by a rapid outpouring of breathy tone and words; you note the drop in the pitch or in the resonance of the voioe as the supply of breath quickly dimimiatios: the tian and fall of the inflections become irregular, and the cuitenoes lose thicir charm.
For the breath ereates the tone and the degroe of breath pressuresustains and regulators ita pewer. Bireetly there ccascs to be sh exact proportion between the varions forves, the balance is upset, and either voive or lanizaago, or both, muet suffer
Fet, in apite of this recognised law, it is beyond question that there are large numbers of publia kingers and speakers, of actors und actressent, who have never mastered, and perhapps hatve nover even studied, the rules of ecientific broathing. It is almoet unbelieynable, but it is truc.

## The Viee of Vibrato,

There is yet another bad result which may be Chielly attributed to wrong methods of breathingnumely, the slakly, unateady tone ktwwn as the Irenain or cilruio, which so often disfigures a beautiful singing volice.
In my opision, one of the first cspentiali in the broudcasting voice is perfeot eteadinese. Perhapa the very first is the capacity for singing in tume; but. apart from thist unpurdonable defect, what ean be more irritating than to lioten to a singer with a good ergan whoge voice ossillates between two fotes instead of remaining on one, and that the right one?

I know that the word "oscillation" has noother dreadful aignification nowadays, but I employ it here in its ordiniary sense, and, to my thinking, one ain is hardly less heinous than the chlier. The voice of a woll-trained singer should never tremblenever oncillate. If it does, you may be pretty nawo that it is a Liubit cumsed in the first instance ty faulty breathing. Once contractod, it is a habit difficult to cure.

## A Mozart Symphony,

$\mathrm{O}^{\mathrm{N}}$Thursday night, at 8 p.m., the Station Orchestra will play Symphony No. 30 in E Flat, by Mozart, This symphony is the first of a group of three symphonies which are the yenerally eonsidered his finest. This one was composed in 1788. The Orcheatra is not a large one, employing only one flute, two clarinets, two harsoons, two horns, two trumpets, two kettledrums, and the usual strings. The symphony consists of four distinct movements.
The first movement opens with an introduction elaborated from the first two bars. At the end, there is a soft
phrase for tlute, bastoon, liorna, first viotins and string bass, thien two quiet Volins and string bass, then two quiet
detached ehords, and thien the Allegro begins. The first main tune, simple, expressive and melotions, is given Alicify to the stringes, first in the treble, fhen in the bess. This ends in a loud and prolonged flourish for full orchestra. At length, there comes a sudden tall, with which starts the second main tane, sagain quiet and expressive, bat in several phases, violins and woodwind answering one mother. This, in turn, ends in a big elimax. The rest of the movement is very clear, these tuncs being developed and recapitulated in the usual way.
The reeond moverment is siumiar in form to the first. A long lirst main tune is given out by stringe alone. Woodwind and hork then have two bars, after Which, strings enter again, and for a time the finst tune continues to appear. Eventually, the first, vioins are prac-
tically left alone, then the second tically left alone, then the second
main time is introduced by the besmain time is introduced by the bessoons and the clarinet.
The third movement is one of the best-known of all Mozart's tumes. It a written in accordance with the usual Minuet plan.
The fourth is a very merry move-ment-almost akittish. Nothing pleasater for the final mood of the Symphony conld poratbly he imagined. The main tune is heard at the very opening in first violins, with accom. paniment for second violins. Soon,
howecor, the whole. orehestra burats in. Almost the whole of the movement grows out of this jolly rume, Nete ane plane whery flute anit hassoon atke the little runnirg mot if of the tone n tum, with a sort of ragid leapisod effect.

In 1914, he was engaget to sing the principal hass parts ate the Norwieh Trienwial Musioal Festival. In 1916, Sir Thomas Beecham heard frim sing, and immediately engaged him to play principal buss whes in his Grand Opera Company.

They were engigeri sepanately, just aiter the cloae of the war, to sing the contralto and soprano parts respecively in a quartet at 8t, Panl's Cathedral, and although they were then strangers, eacls recognized the complementary qualities of the other and their succensful ansociation as duettista began.
