Broadcasting During the Fourteen Days.

WITH the sudden and almost complete cessation of printed news during the first few days of the emergency, broadcasting immediately came to occupy a position of unprecedented importance in the life of the nation as the sole general channel of communication for news, official and otherwise. It is not easy to estimate what would have been the effect of the strike if there had been no such thing as wireless communication. For one thing, the whole country might have been a prey to panic. Even as it was, a large part of our service was devoted to tracking down and slaying false and dangerous rumours.

It was stated in some quarters that the B.B.C. had been commandeered by the Government. This was not the case actually or literally, though under the Emergency Regulations the Government would have been well within their powers if they had taken over Savoy Hill and the whole organization beyond, and had made broadcasting an official medium altogether, comparable with *The British Gazette*. We were bound, as we always have been bound, by the terms of the Licence under which we work, to act as a channel for official announcements, and during the strike these were received from various sources in the Government and when broadcast were duly announced as such. Even here, in some cases, our advice as to their form and delivery was invited and accepted.

That the Government abstained from taking the drastic step of definitely commandeering the B.B.C. was probably due to their realization that the B.B.C. could

be trusted, and that the confidence and goodwill which it had built up during three and a half years, through its record of sincerity and impartiality, was an asset to the cause of good citizenship not lightly to be discarded. Complete impartiality during the emergency was, in the circumstances, not to be expected. But we endeavoured throughout the emergency to preserve our tradition of accuracy and fair-play.

Information from Trade Union sources was not excluded. On the contrary, the speeches of Trade Union leaders both in Parliament and outside were given proportionate notice, and references were made to *The British Worker*, the official organ of the Council of the Trade Union Congress.

In our news service our aim was to present a true and dispassionate account of the state of the country. Our special service of emergency news bulletins

HERE WE ARE AGAIN!!

WE regret that, owing to the strike, *The Radio Times*, in common with nearly every other weekly journal throughout the country, could not be printed last week. Peace has now been restored to the printing industry, and we are glad to be able to present ourselves to our readers again, though in a somewhat attenuated form. Next week we hope to do better. Owing, however, to its very large and widely distributed circulation, *The Radio Times* is obliged to go to press some considerable time ahead of publication; it will, therefore, take two or three weeks to get back to normal conditions. But like the rest of the country, we are doing our best!

given five times daily, with the co-operation of those responsible for official reports, and of the News Agencies, consistently gave the country a connected view of the progress of events. About thirty of the staff were absorbed in this task in relays from eight a.m. till midnight daily.

Certain of our correspondents have expressed some doubt as to the veracity of our news because they have happened to witness some act of rioting or violence which was not mentioned in any of our bulletins, but we would remind these critics that important as such incidents may appear in the locality in which they happen, they are not of sufficient general interest or importance to warrant inclusion in a brief survey of the national situation.

The special speakers who addressed the nation through the microphone during the week exercised, we believe, a moderating influence which was calculated to counteract any extremists on either side. Such was the tenor of the Prime Minister's speech, of the Archbishop's sermon, and of Lord Grey's talk. We have been criticised in some quarters for not having invited a representative Labour leader to speak, but in this connection it should be remembered in fairness to ourselves that our liberty of action was not complete.

For the rest of our programmes we conceived it as our duty to carry on "business as usual" as far as circumstances allowed. The service we thus performed in providing

a steady stream of music and entertainment during the period of crisis was, we venture to claim, in itself a contribution to the cause of peace and goodwill.

This is, of course, only a partial account of our stewardship during the emergency, and we are more than grateful for the stream of encouraging messages received from our vast audience of listeners everywhere.

We cannot refrain from mentioning in these notes the name of the Deputy Chief Civil Commissioner, Mr. J. C. Davidson, C.H., C.B., M.P., who was responsible to the Government for all official news, and without whose sympathetic and understanding co-operation, the situation would have been much more difficult.

We may conclude by quoting the words of our message broadcast on the night of May 12th: "Our first feeling on hearing of the termination of the General Strike must be of profound thankfulness to Almighty God, Who has led us through this supreme trial with national health unimpaired. You have heard the messages from the King and the Prime Minister. It remains only to add the conviction that the Nation's happy escape has been in large measure due to a personal trust in the Prime Minister.

"As for the B.B.C., we hope your confidence in and goodwill to us have not suffered. We have laboured under certain difficulties, the full story of which may be told some day. We have tried to help.

"In going to work to-morrow or the next day, could we not all go as fellow-craftsmen, united in the determination to pick up the broken pieces, to repair the gaps and build up the walls of a more enduring city—the city revealed to the mystic eyes of William Blake when he wrote:—

"And did those feet in ancient time
Walk upon England's mountains green?
And was the Holy Lamb of God
On England's pleasant pastures seen?"

"And did the Countenance Divine
Shine forth upon our clouded hills?
And was Jerusalem builded here
Among those dark Satanic mills?"

"Bring me my bow of burning gold!
Bring me my arrows of desire!
Bring me my spear! O clouds unfold!
Bring me my chariot of Fire!"

"I will not cease from mental fight;
Nor shall my sword sleep in my hand
Till we have built Jerusalem
In England's green and pleasant land."
