INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PREPARATION OF COPY

In general, model your copy on recent issues of *TAPA*. The best general treatment of problems of style remains *The MLA Style Sheet*, reprinted from *PMLA* 66.3 (April, 1951) 3–27. Excellent rules for articles on classical subjects will be found in *AJA* 74 (1970) 1–8, which also includes a helpful list of abbreviations of journals and standard reference works.

Attention is called to the following points:

1. TYPE IN DOUBLE OR TRIPLE SPACE AND LEAVE AMPLE MARGINS. No article exceeding *forty* typewritten pages (notes included) will be considered for publication in the *Transactions*. For a speedier decision concerning suitability for publication, send two copies of your typescript.

2. On a separate page type your name, university affiliation and the title of your article. Repeat the title on the first page of the article itself and make every effort to conceal your identity from the Association's referees.

3. Where possible, include in the first or last paragraph a brief statement summarizing the main points of the article.

4. Assemble footnotes on separate sheets at the end of the article, typed in double space with triple space between notes.

5. Avoid large numbers of very short footnotes. In citing passages from ancient authors, put the references in the text, within parentheses.

6. For subsequent references to a work already cited, use the formula, "Jones (above, note 6) 49." If many references to the same work have to be made, list the titles of all such works in an early bibliographical note with their respective abbreviations.

7. Use cross references sparingly. When they occur, use the formula "see above, page 000," or "see below, pages 000–000," and supply the editor with an exact key, giving the page and line numbers of your manuscript to which the cross reference refers.

8. Long quotations in any language should be set off in separate paragraphs, indented and typed in double space like all the rest.

9. Use moderation in quoting Greek. Make the Greek forms look like the type used in recent volumes of *Transactions*. Be careful of spacing within and between Greek words. Allow ample space in your typescript for the Greek to be inserted. Verify accents. Be careful to write accents and breathings directly above the letters to which they belong.

10. Transliterate Greek words as follows, at least in all work dealing with literature:

- (a) Personal names and place names should be Latinized according to the best Roman practice: *Thucydides*, *Museum*, *Samos*, etc.

- (b) Other words, except those whose Latinized forms are familiar in English, should be transliterated directly from the Greek, distinguishing original *omega* and *eta* as *ô* and *ê* respectively: *Nikê*, *koinônia*, *phyteuma*, etc.

11. Use Arabic (not Roman) numerals wherever possible.

12. Italicize (single underline) titles of books and periodicals, names of classical works, and single foreign words, but not quotations in foreign languages.

13. Use quotation marks, not italics, for the titles of articles in periodicals or encyclopedias and of chapters in books.

14. Do not italicize the common abbreviations: cf., e.g., etc., f., i.e., s.v., viz., vol. Do not use l., n., or v. as abbreviations, since confusion may result. Use p. and pp. only when indispensable. Avoid excessive use of ff. and f. for page and line references.

15. Indicate columns or sections of columns in standard texts by letters in small capitals (two underlines) placed immediately after the page number: Arist. *Pol.* 1252a1–22.

16. Give place and date of publication (within parentheses) of all books except very well-known handbooks.

17. Use standard abbreviations for the title of periodicals, collections, and handbooks; but do not abbreviate titles consisting of a single word. Base abbreviated references to ancient works upon their Latin titles, not English or Greek. For standard titles, see *LSJ*, *TLL*, or *OCD*; but abbreviations for both titles and authors' names must often be expanded, in order to insure ease of comprehension. Capitalize the first letter of titles.

18. Verify all quotations and references against the original source. Record the verifications on a carbon copy of the article, and hold this copy until the article appears in print.

19. Clarity and avoidance of ambiguity are the first desideratum, consistency within the article the second, strict conformity to any external standard a poor third.

TYPE IN DOUBLE OR TRIPLE SPACE EVERYWHERE

REPORT OF ACTIONS BY THE DIRECTORS

A. Pursuant to action taken at the 108th Annual Meeting of the Association, the Directors met on October 15, 1977 in Atlanta, Georgia at the Atlanta Hilton Hotel. The Directors voted:

1. To approve the minutes of their meeting of December 30, 1976 as published in *Proceedings* 107 (1977) 44-45.
2. To confirm their disapproval by mail ballot of the request to provide a \$375.00 subsidy for a panel on *Archaeology and the Economic History of the Roman Empire* (see #14 below).
3. To appoint as Tellers for the 1977 election Kathleen McNamee and Jon Solomon who are to obtain whatever assistance is required.
4. To approve the appointment by the President of Janet Martin as Chairperson of the Committee on the Status of Women and of Minority Groups (Dec. 30, 1977-Dec. 30, 1978).
5. To approve the appointment by the President of William C. Scott as the Director of the Campus Advisory Service from June 30, 1978 to December 30, 1980.
6. To accept the following reports: Report of the Secretary, Report of the Treasurer, Report of the Finance Committee, Report of the Program Committee, Report of the Editorial Board, Report of the Delegates to the Fédération Internationale des Associations D'Etudes Classiques, Report of the Representative to the American Classical League, Report of the Committee on Computer Activities, Report of the Advisory Committee to the *Thesaurus Linguae Graecae*, Report of the Editor of *Calculi*, Report of the Supervisor of the American Philological Association's Repository of Greek and Latin Texts in Machine-Readable Form, Report of the Representative to the *Thesaurus Linguae Latinae*, Report of the Committee on the Classical Tradition in North America (also noting the final report of the Committee on Classical Humanities in the American Republic submitted to NEH by G. Kennedy), Report of the Delegate to the American Council of Learned Societies, Report of the Campus Advisory Service, Report of the Committee on Smaller Classics Departments, Report of the Representative to the Governing Board of the *Thesaurus Linguae Graecae*, Report of the Nominating Committee, Report from the Representative to the *Supplementum Epigraphicum Graecum*, and an informational report from the *Catalogus Translationum et Commentariorum*.
7. To refer back to the committee the September Draft of the Report of the Committee on the Status of Women and of Minority Groups.
8. To authorize the President to draft a letter explaining the reasons for the new dues structure which will be mailed with the second request for payment of dues.
9. To instruct the Secretary to prepare the ballot for election to the Board with the notation "vote for three".
10. To include the salary survey requested by Bruce E. Donovan in the survey planned for 1978 by the Committee on the Status of Women and of Minority Groups and to instruct the Treasurer to include this survey in the budget for 1978 to be presented for action by the Board at its December 27 meeting.

11. To limit the announcement of alternate, less expensive accommodations for the annual meeting to student members and to disapprove the request that such accommodations be negotiated and advertised to the general membership.
12. To approve the payment of travel expenses of the Editor of TAPA to attend the annual meeting on the same basis as for members of the Board.
13. To direct the Treasurer to include in the budget for 1978 to be presented for action by the Board at the December 27 meeting the sums of \$1,000 as contribution to *l'Année Philologique* and \$500 as contribution to the *Supplementum Epigraphicum Graecum*.
14. To adopt the following resolution:
In view of the uncertainties of the financial situation of the Association and especially in view of the recent increase in dues, the Board of Directors feels it would be inappropriate to fund travel for speakers invited to the annual meeting for the foreseeable future.
15. To approve the preparation by George Kennedy of a questionnaire to sample opinion of departmental representatives conducting interviews at Atlanta as to the advisability of a separate Eastern Placement meeting early in 1979.
16. To authorize the President to appoint a delegate to represent the Association to the International Association for Neo-Latin Studies.
17. To instruct the Secretary to prepare a document under the terms of which the Association will become a Sponsor of Scholars Press and to present this document for approval by the Board at the December 27 meeting.

4. To authorize the President to appoint, in consultation with the Finance Committee, a Fund Raising Committee to consist of two or three members.
5. To petition to become a Sponsor of Scholars Press with the stipulation of monthly remission of dues.
6. To refer the question of the Association's participation in Classical Micropublishing, Inc. to the Editorial Board.
7. To reaffirm the principle that all individual and institutional members of the AIA-APA should cooperate fully in the Placement Program.
8. To accept the resignation of Bernard Knox and to elect Ronald Stroud to fill the unexpired term (1977-78).

C. Pursuant to the 109th Annual Meeting of the Association the Directors met on December 30, 1977 in Atlanta, Georgia at the Atlanta Hilton Hotel. The Directors voted:

To reaffirm unanimously New Orleans as the site for the 1980 annual meeting of the Association because of the important moral obligation incurred through five years of negotiation with the Fairmont Hotel and to request that the Joint Committee on the Annual Meeting study the question of the Equal Rights Amendment as it pertains to the selection of meeting sites and report its recommendations to the Board at its October meeting.
10. To appoint Douglas E. Gerber to serve, along with the Secretary, as the Association's two representatives on the Board of Scholars Press and to reimburse them for travel expenses consistent with usual procedures.
11. To meet next October 14 in New York City at a location to be announced.

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

The forty-first Annual Business Meeting of the American Philological Association, Incorporated, for the transaction of business, being the one hundred and ninth since the organization of the unincorporated Association, was held in Ballroom A of the Atlanta Hilton, Atlanta, Georgia, on Friday, December 30, 1977, at 9:00 A.M. The list of members present is on file with the Secretary. First Vice President Copley, in the Chair in the absence of President Anderson, announced the receipt of an anonymous gift of \$3,000.00 in memory of Lorna Anderson to assist in underwriting the cost of one of the Association's publications. The Report of the Secretary was read including the names of members whose death had been reported during the past year. A short period of silence was observed in their memory. John Dillon read a memorial in honor of Ivan Linforth. The Report of the Treasurer was read and George Kennedy presented the modifications in the dues structure. A rather spirited discussion ensued. John Williams presented the report from the Committee on Resolutions, which was accepted by acclamation. The Acting President called for new business. Harry Levy, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, asked members to suggest names of qualified candidates to the Committee. There being no further new business, the Secretary reported the election of Officers, Directors, and members of Committees as follows:

Second Vice President, Bernard Knox; Directors (1977-80), Philip A. Stadter, Zeph Stewart and Froma I. Zeitlin; Director (1977-78, to fill the one-year vacancy created by the resignation from the Board of Bernard Knox), Ronald Stroud; Member of the Editorial Board (1977-80), Mary R. Lefkowitz; Chairman of the Committee on the Charles J. Goodwin Award of Merit (1977-78), Michael C. J. Putnam; Member of the Committee on the Charles J. Goodwin Award of Merit (1977-80), Gerald F.
