Brett was average height, light brown hair, and hazel eyes. My brother-in-law, Mark, spent 15 minutes trying to locate him because he was so adamant that I meet this guy.

We met, shook hands, exchanged small talk, and I walked away.

Where I met Brett isn't your usual meeting place for a social introduction. I met Brett at Camp Johnson where he was going through pre-mobilization for his deployment with Mark to Iraq.

Like Mark, Brett was leaving early, 3 weeks ahead of the rest of the platoon to get ready for their arrival at Camp Shelby.

It didn't strike me at the time, but he had a quiet confidence about him that spoke volumes. When I saw Brett again at the Military sendoff on January 4, 2005, I approached him, gave him a hug, and thanked him for his service to this country. Since he was surrounded by his family at the time, I knew his attention was in high demand, so I quickly walked away to find Mark.

This brief encounter was the only personal interaction Brett and I had before his deployment.

In the next month that followed, my brother-in-law spoke to me about Brett and had asked me to send him some type of care package. His excuse was that he felt bad for the guy, and that he only got mail from his mother. I explained to Mark that I would do it, but was doing it to be friendly and supportive for one of his friends. Mark said it was just a morale booster and would brighten Brett's day. It just so happened to be February when I put together a care package. I made some brownies, put in some gourmet cookies, found a couple guy magazines and sent them to Brett.

By the time I had gotten all of this ready for Brett, I had received an e-mail from him. My brotherin-law had given him my e-mail address. The link between Brett and I was Mark. He was determined to get us talking. I e-mailed back, small chat, but it was good small chat. It sparked my interest.

Then something happened that changed both of our lives. We lost a good friend to both of us, in combat in Iraq, 1st Lt. Mark Dooley.

He was Brett's platoon leader and best friends with my brother-in-law Mark. I had known Dooley for about 2 years and just like everyone else who knew him was easily caught up with his love of life and adventurous behavior. Brett and I started e-mailing more frequently. The e-mails lead to our first phone call. I remember being so nervous. I don't remember why I was so nervous, but I had those butterflies in my stomach. At the time I was working the night shift at Dartmouth Hitchcock. Brett and I had coordinated with e-mails for this phone call to take place. It was 2:00 A.M. here, *continued on page 28*

but that was my break time. I had a one hour break and we talked for the whole hour. The sound of his voice on the phone was comforting and the moment we started talking, neither one of us wanted to let the other one go. All day I had worried if we would have enough to talk about, but in the end, the conversation came easy. Through all loss and sadness came a smile across my face again.

Only 6 weeks later, as I was preparing for the night shift, a phone call came that changed the way I lived my life.

I was leaving a message on someone's voicemail when the phone rang. I stopped midstream on the message I was leaving; I had lost my breath, and I knew something was wrong. I then hung up my cell phone and listened to the sadness and disbelief of my father's voice talking to my sister. I heard him say "No, No, No." My heart broke in two again. 2nd Lt. Mark Procopio, my brother-in-law, had been killed by an IED. I spoke briefly to my sister on the phone, and then I went to get my mother who was at work.

The next few weeks were some of the hardest weeks of my life. I don't know if I would have made it through them if it hadn't been for Brett. He e-mailed me almost every day; he called me when he could, and he was there for me to lean on. This was when I fell in love with him. Despite the loss he had suffered of two close friends, he put me ahead of his own pain and suffering. He listened to my heartaches in the e-mails and called on the days he knew would be difficult for me to get through.

I was falling in love with someone I had never even eaten a meal with. We had never seen a movie or gone out on a date, but I found myself wishing he were there.

When Brett came home on leave in March we finally made our relationship official. We went out for a St. Patrick's Day celebration and the rest was history. Brett's deployment was done in June of 2006 and finally we were able to have a somewhat normal beginning to a relationship. The only problem was that I lived 2 hours away. Brett was awesome, and on his weekends off made the drive down to the farm to see me. For the next year and a half, we spent a lot of time on the phone.


I think that I knew before Brett did that we would end up together. I remember saying to Mark Dooley's mom when she asked me about my relationship with Brett, "If he survives this deployment, we will probably get married." I don't know where the certainty came from for me to make such a statement, but somehow I knew it



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would work out if God allowed me the chance to be with Brett.

There are always things that change how one looks at life. The past year of Brett's and my life has been no exception. In January 2009, Brett's father Robert Clairmont was diagnosed with terminal cancer. Bob bravely lost his fight to cancer May 2, 2009. The tables turned and it was me who was there for Brett.

I tried to be strong for him so that he had someone to lean on. like he had been there for me.

Only he can tell you the pain of losing a parent, but I felt like Bob was a father to me. In the short time that I knew Bob, he always made me feel welcome with his quiet confidence. Bob was an amazing husband, father and friend. When I look at Brett I see so much of his father in him, especially when I look back to the first time I met him at Camp Johnson.

The Proposal:

In early May of 2009 I graduated from nursing school and got a job right out of school. For my graduation present, Brett got us amazing tickets to go and see George Strait for the last weekend of May. He had originally planned on asking me during the concert but I beat him to the punch. Brett had found a BMW motorcycle for me, and as I had always wanted one and promised myself I would buy one as a graduation present to myself, Brett bought it for me.

In one of our many discussions about getting married or when would be the perfect time, Brett brought up a valid point despite the fact he was being sarcastic. I believe his exact words were, "Well the money that I would have spent on a ring is tied up right now in a motorcycle that a certain someone just had to have. But that has two rings on it that can take you places, what more could a girl want?" At the time

I took the ring out and set it in front of Brett. I asked him, "Can this go along with my BMW?" He pulled the ring out and smiled. He looked at the ring, then got down on one knee and asked me to marry him.




We wanted a perfect experience but our expectations were exceeded. It does not get better than that. We are regular visitors to the Inne now and are members of their exclusive Crown Club.

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
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
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Spotlight on By Karen Sturtevant Wedding Flozeers: Gardenia



Uses: Boutonnieres, (in France, it's customary for the groom to wear a gardenia as his boutonniere), corsages, bouquets, cake decoration, hair accents, sewn/pinned on veil.

Houseplants:

Gardenias are challenging to keep and thrive as houseplants. The environment needs to be as closely replicated as its native land with high humidity, bright, indirect light and temperatures between 55° F - 65° F. Winter months will prove daunting with short days and dry air. With diligence and nurturing, gardenias can bring pleasure and reward of a job well done to a persevering caregiver.

Botanical Name: Gardenia jasminoides (commonly known as Cape jasmine).

The genus Gardenia was named for Dr. Alexander Garden, a Scottish physician and botanist who resided in Charleston, South Carolina.

Availability: Gardenias are available year round. Quantities are limited in winter as the time period for blooming is 30 days or longer December - March. To ensure availability, order well in advance as gardenias are widely sought after wedding flowers.

Description: Native to tropical and subtropical regions of Africa, Asia, and Australia, gardenias are known for their exotic, sweet fragrance. With dark, glossy leaves and multi-petaled waxy flowers, gardenias are as charming as a southern belle.

Meanings: Purity, Sweetness, Secret Love, Joy, You are Lovely.

Long life: When left at room temperature, gardenias will begin to turn creamy yellow. The flowers are extremely sensitive to oils and acids on hands; florists will often wear gloves when working with these delicate beauties. After receiving from the grower, the florist will spray with a flower antitranspirant and keep sealed in the high humidity cooler in shipping boxes or air tight bags at a temperature between 32° F to 35° F.

Name Game: The gardenia is part of a species of flowering plants found in the coffee family Rubiaceae. The plants are evergreen shrubs and trees that grow to 3 - 4 feet tall.

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Your Wedding Your Way

"Parents in the Planning"

Tom and Carolyn's parents fit the bill for "best in the universe" – until the engagement. They'd dated for years. They knew and liked each other's parents. And both sets of parents seemed to genuinely like the fact that they were together. So they felt blind-sided by the difficulties after they announced their engagement.

Carolyn's dad was a great guy in a lot of ways, and extended himself to Tom in a way that made him feel included in the family. But Carolyn was his only daughter. He wanted to walk her down the aisle and "give her away" in the traditional way at the wedding, which is when tensions surfaced.



In college, Carolyn's consciousness was unalterably raised by feminist teachers. She loved her father. But she saw the traditional beginning to a wedding as tied to a time when women were property to be transferred. She knew her father didn't see her as property, but she thought the ritual was archaic. In consultation with Tom and the wedding coach, the decision was made to walk the processional together as a couple, with the wedding party preceding them – mirroring the recessional. It was different, and they liked the difference it made, and the independence it implied.

When Carolyn's dad balked, they talked to the wedding coach. He suggested a new custom, now seen in many contemporary ceremonies, to be intentionally inclusive of all the parents. After the declaration of intent and before the vows would come "Pledges of Support." In this moment, the officiant asks a question.

"Will the parents of the bride and groom please stand... Will you give your love, support, encouragement, and blessing to them as they are married today? If so, please say "We will." "We will!"

Tom was especially interested in this variation because it meant his parents could participate as well in such an affirmation. It also meant, since his parents were both divorced and remarried, that his stepparents could be included as well.

The coach was precise in suggesting how to approach it. He strongly urged them both to sit down with Carolyn's father and mother, saying in advance that they needed to talk about wedding details in general. They could start with some of the other logistics to break the ice, then, together, with Carolyn taking the lead, talk about the new element of the ceremony that they decided to do. She would announce confidently what she and Tom would do...

"I love you Daddy. I know we're doing this differently than you would prefer. One of the reasons we're doing it is to include Mom, and also Tom's folks. We love you no less. We want your blessing."

With Tom included in this exchange, and Carolyn's mother also there, there was a balance and a responsible confronting of a difficult issue. The good thing was, when the meeting took place, they portrayed their maturity in a way that Carolyn's parents could see and appreciate.

What also went on in that moment between the lines is that Carolyn and Tom also established their own family, cutting the cord from family of origin so that their new family could thrive, like a re-potted plant no longer root-bound. They loved their families no less in getting married. But with this fine-tuning, they clearly stated their autonomy and their maturity as a new family unit.

Reviving **Old Traditions** for Festive Modern Day Celebrations

These age-old wedding customs will bring new life to your special occasion.

There are some traditions, like exchanging rings and throwing the bridal bouquet, that remain central to the wedding ceremony.

But there are other customs that have been tossed to the wayside by a generation or two of brides and grooms.

Make your 21st century celebration stand out from the crowd by incorporating these ancient traditions into your wedding plans:

Make it a full moon – in June!

There is an old belief that getting married on the day of a full moon will bring you good luck – and hopefully, aid in conception efforts. And, historically, June was a particularly good month to "tie the knot," as a fall pregnancy and spring birth wouldn't interfere with the bride's ability to assist with the harvest. Also, a bright, sunny wedding day was said to bring good fortune to the couple, while a rainy day guaranteed a short, rather unsatisfactory marriage. Although June continues to be a popular month for weddings, it's probably safe to say that the reasons have changed.

Have fun with superstitions

Perhaps the most widely known wedding day saying is, "Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue, and a silver sixpence inside your shoe."

Although this superstition about what a lucky bride should carry along on her wedding day has been around for a long time (a few hundred years or so), today it's more of an afterthought than a heartfelt belief. But it might be worth planning ahead for this wedding day ritual.

For "something old," loved ones who are attending the ceremony will fit the bill (or a small item with some family history). "Something new" is your union as a married couple – and can be symbolized by practically any recently purchased item that you're wearing. "Something borrowed" should be a belonging on loan from the bride or groom's family, such as the mother's bridal gown or veil, whereas "something blue" could be just about anything, as long as it's blue – even a simple stitch of blue material tucked out of sight. And a "silver sixpence" – thought to bring good fortune in the form of love and financial prosperity – may take the form of a penny hidden in the bottom of the bride's shoe.

Carry a bride's handkerchief

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The traditional wedding day hanky is the perfect family heirloom to pass from mother to daughter through the generations. This age-old custom began as a superstition amongst farmers that a bride's wedding day tears would usher in a bountiful crop,

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a belief that was later replaced by the saying that a woman who cried on her wedding day would enjoy a happy marriage. Nowadays, the bride's handkerchief symbolizes the tears of joy that are shed on her special day.

Wear a veil

Although veils are thought to have come on the scene for somewhat sinister reasons, including the hope of confusing evil spirits who may have been lurking around, they've adopted a more optimistic, decorative role in recent years. From "blushers" to long, trailing veils, today's bride has dozens of choices when it comes to the style of her headpiece. But if you want to take the more traditional (and dramatic) route, find a veil that can be worn over your face and lifted by your groom at the alter.

Tie shoes (and cans) to "the getaway car"

Shoes have been used throughout wedding history for a myriad of purposes, from showing male dominance to spreading good will. Depending upon the century and country in which you were married, your wedding guests may have wished you good luck by throwing shoes at either you or your carriage. Now we simply tie them behind our cars and watch them bounce down the street. By the same token, you may have seen cans rattling behind newlyweds' cars. This custom is thought to originate from olden times when guests would tie noisy items to the back of the newly married couple's carriage to ward off evil spirits. Whatever the historical origins, it's a fun and festive way to hit the road!

Wear two garters - one to keep and one to toss

While the tossing of the garter is believed to have begun in the 1500s, its modern day meaning – whoever catches the garter will be the next to wed – appears to have taken shape in England, where the bridal party would rush the bridal chamber and take turns tossing the ladies' stockings in the air. The person whose stocking landed on the bride or groom's nose would be the next to "tie the knot." Nowadays, the groom gets to do the tossing, and brides often choose to wear a second garter to keep as a memento.

Carry her over the threshold

In days of yore, grooms are said to have carried their brides over the threshold for one of two reasons – to force the poor, recently captured girl into her new abode or to keep feisty family demons from following the young bride into her bridegroom's home. Neither purpose was terribly romantic. Today, this wellknown tradition still carries with it a note of chivalry but is certainly a more amorous gesture than it may have been in ancient times.



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
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HOW WE MET





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

Bridesmaids often scrimp cost wise when buying shoes to match their gowns. A bride can give her attendants a gift certificate to a shoe store, so the shoes can be upgraded to something that will be enjoyed in the future. Or a bride could simply offer to purchase her attendants' shoes.

Another shoe

related gift would be to purchase footwear for the attendants to wear at the reception.

These could be fun glittery flip-flops, pretty ballet flats or even cute sneakers with hearts or jewels on them—anything comfortable and good for dancing in.

Beauty aides are also a gift that can be used on the wedding day and afterwards.

One of the keys

to making beauty items serve double duty is to put them in a keepsake container.


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Quick Quips and Helpful Tips

Wedding Invitations:

The most important thing you must do before putting your invitations into the mail is check them carefully. A fatal mistake is to approve invitations that contain incorrect information, and are now traveling through the mail system on their way to confuse and mislead your guests!

But besides this obvious item, remember that your invitations are the tone and the style of your wedding all wrapped up into a few sheets of paper. The colors you want, the textures you want (paper comes in many, many formats and produce different feelings when you touch them) all these aspects convey your identity as a couple, and the theme and unique quality of your wedding arrangements.

Most wedding planners have contacts with custom wedding invitation designers, if that is your desire, or with traditional printing establishments that have hundreds of existing styles to use.

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But either way, what you want is for your future guests to receive the envelope, and when they open it and look at it they will be able to say. "That's them!"

More invitation tips: If your reception is to happen at a location separate from the ceremony, include an additional card with the address information, along with the dress code.

RSVP? Commonly "RSVP" is used, but a simpler approach is to simply ask "Please respond by ... " Make sure there is space on the return card to allow your guests to write a brief note. Hopefully you've been able to arrange with your caterer what the food choices will be, and can easily add an easy list with boxes for your quest to check off.

RSVP Tip: Number the back of the cards so that if a guest forgets to sign their name, you will know who has answered by matching the number to a master list.

Time frame: Provide at least eight weeks for your invitation cards to be sent and returned. Plan on at least a full month for all returns to come back.

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
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aromatherapy

We hardly notice the smells of an ordinary day as we work at our many roles. It's when an out of the ordinary scent assaults our limbic system do we consciously become aware that something is different.

Walking in the bakery on a Sunday morning, we suddenly have a craving for those sinful scrumptious cinnamon buns. Guests may not remember that your living room was a mess when they arrived unannounced, but they will remember the smell of the chocolate chunk cookings baking.

The science of scent is an idea that is catching on. The Sense of Smell Institute, a division of The Fragrance Foundation, based in New York, is a leading resource dedicated to the sense of smell and its importance in psychology, behavior and quality of life. From furniture polish to air fresheners and bubble bath to shower gel, the study of smell is big business.



Smells are made from molecules that enter through the fine hairs in the nose, travel to the brain's limbic system that control emotion, memory, and learning and stimulate the olfactory nerves.

Have you ever had a long-lost memory recovered because of a scent?

No two people smell the odor the same way and a woman's sense of smell is stronger than a man's.

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> The advantages of aromatherapy date back thousands of years. The Egyptians, Chinese, Greeks, and Persians were forerunners in their use of flowers and herbs for medicinal and aromatic benefits.

Another Japan study monitored mistakes of keyboard operators and diffused three different scents in their area When lavender was used, errors dropped by 20 percent; with jasmine, 33 percent; and lemon oil, an astonishing 54 percent.

Anacreon (c. 570 B.C. - c. 485 B.C.) said: "The best recipe for health is to apply sweet scents to the brain." Anacreon's thinking was centuries ahead of its time. Scents affect our emotions, thoughts, and bodies.

Scents that summon positive emotion are used to relax and rebalance our bodies and spirit. The essential oils are extracted from plants, trees, flowers, bark, and seeds. Specific oils are credited with specific properties: relaxation, stimulation, anti-viral, anti-inflammatory and pain relief. When inhaled, they work on the brain and nervous system. Oils can also be applied topically or diffused into an area.

The advantages of aromatherapy date back thousands of years. The Egyptians, Chinese, Greeks, and Persians were forerunners in their use of flowers and herbs for medicinal and aromatic benefits. The Equptians are credited with the invention of the first rudimentary machine used to extract the oil from cedar. These oils along with cloves, cinnamon, nutmeg and myrrh were used to embalm their dead. When a tomb was open in

the twenty-century, traces of herbs were found intact in portions of the body and the scent, however faint, was discernible.

In the age of alternative medicine and holistic treatments, aromatherapy is used in work places, the home, and in clinics. In one study, when subjects smelled lavender, their brainwave frequencies showed an increase in alpha waves, which is associated with relaxation. In contrast, the scent of jasmine showed an increase in beta waves on the front of the brain putting the person in a more alert state.

In Japan, engineers are constructing aroma systems into new structures. In one practical

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application, the scents of lavender and rosemary are diffused in a customer area to encourage calm while lemon and eucalyptus are used in the bank teller areas to improve alertness.

Another Japan study monitored mistakes of keyboard operators and diffused three different scents in their area. When lavender was used, errors dropped by 20 percent; with jasmine, 33 percent; and lemon oil, an astonishing 54 percent.

Nature has provided us with the essentials oils of aromatherapy that can help with balancing the psyche, energizing bodies, igniting passion, and help in calming for meditation and relaxation.

The Sense of Smell Institute conducted a study with both college and middle-aged men and women and found the same results when it came to fragrance. Women's feeling of tension, depression and

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confusion were significantly improved with the use of fragrance. Uses of colognes improved both mood and feelings of tension, depression, anger and fatigue for the men in the study.

The use of peppermint oil, applied topically, has been shown to reduce pain and have a long-

lasting cooling feeling. A massage of chamomile oil has an analgesic effect reducing tension, anxiety, and pain.



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earing a wedding veil is an ancient tradition that cuts across cultures and religions. The veil you choose can be inspired by these traditions or by personal style and taste, but either way there are three considerations to keep in mind when purchasing your veil: will it work with your gown, the formality of your wedding and the environmental conditions at your ceremony and reception.

Ceremony Location

If you are planning to be married outdoors where wind may be an issue you are best to opt for a shorter veil or for no veil at all. As you walk down the aisle or stand at an outdoor altar the last thing you need is to be untangling yourself from a wind-blown yeil. If your wedding ceremony is inside and your reception is outdoors, then you can avoid wind issues by removing your veil for the reception. Some brides even purchase a longer veil for the ceremony and a second short veil for the reception.

Reflection of the Gown

You want to make sure your gown and veil harmonize. The simplest way to make sure they do this is to buy an ensemble. If you have a custom veil made or buy a veil that wasn't designed to match your gown, then you'll have to be more careful.

Clearly, the color of the veil should match the gown. What at first may appear to be a negligible tone difference between a white veil and a pale ivory will become dreadfully noticeable when they are worn together---and the disparity will be even more obvious in photographs. If your gown is edged in a color, such as black or claret, then choosing a veil and headpiece with a similar accent color is a beautiful choice. Likewise, sparkling rhinestone-studded veils look glorious with bejeweled gowns--especial for candlelight ceremonies.

Guidelines for Veil Length

By following a few easy guidelines deciding what length of veil to purchase will be easy. The less formal a wedding, the simpler and shorter the veil should be—-and in some cases no veil is far wiser than overdoing. Elbow length or finger-tip length are good choices for the informal affair. With a formal wedding your choices expand to include the shorter veils as well as chapel or cathedral lengths.

You will also want to consider the back of your gown. Where will the bottom hem of the veil fall? Will it cover up decorations on your gown? How does the veil look with the gown's neckline and train? An elbowlength veil will show off details at the waist of a gown and the extravagant cathedral length can add a feeling of modern-luxury for a tall bride in a slim aown.

The most important tip about coordinating the veil and gown is to buy the down first and then choose the veil while you have the down on. If you plan on purchasing them in different locations, try on the gown and similar veils and take photos of how those veils looks with the back of your dress. Once you get home, you can study the photos and decide what style of veil you want. Take the photos with you when you go veil shopping. They will also help you judge which veil looks best with your height and figure. Remember when you buy the veil from a different manufacturer than the dress there may be slight variations in color.

Also consider which veil you feel the most comfortable in as far as weight and style go. And ask your hairdresser which would work best with the hairstyle you plan on having on your wedding day.

Headpiece Styles

Some of the above considerations also apply when choosing a headpiece. Make sure its style and proportion match your gown. If you have pearls, rhinestones or crystals on your gown or your jewelry, then having a headpiece decorated to match will create a fantastic statement.

Tiaras are elegant and make wonderful keepsakes. Headband style headpieces are very effective for shorter hairstyles. Jeweled combs or

barrettes give the same feel but will appear slightly less formal than more elegant headpieces.

Single blooms of fresh or artificial flowers can be scattered through your upswept hair for a light airy feel. A monochromatic wreath of flowers bedazzled with jewels will have a formal feel whereas wreaths created from brightly colored flowers and vines will appear very informal. Your hairdresser or florist can guide you with these choices.

By and large, hats are out of fashion. But if you are looking for a retro look, then they may be exactly what you want.

Merging LIVES AND MONEY By Benjamin Nostrand, CFP®

Congratulations on getting married. Getting married is not just about the merging of two lives, it's also about the merging of finances, assets, and debt, and the sharing of goals, plans, and financial success.

o achieve financial success together, there are some key financial planning steps you and your partner can follow:

Goals and Expectations: It is important to sit down and discuss each of your financial goals, ideally before walking down the aisle. This is the time to be forthright about your financial goals, views on debt, and to set expectations. Be realistic about it all. Many couples might jump into a marriage and expect to be able to take four vacations a year, when in reality they might only be able to take two.

Create a budget: Review all of your combined expenses and put them in a spreadsheet, software (such as Quicken), or an online tool (such as Mint.com) to determine how much you will spend in a year. Compare that to your take-home incomes and make sure you are on track to spend less than you make.


Avoid debt: Avoid spending beyond your means or keeping a credit card balance. You will be much better off in the future if you just wait to buy that sectional, rather than paying interest on it for years. Credit card debt is a huge hurdle that slows the chances or the pace of financial success. If one or both of you already has debt, commit to an aggressive plan to reduce any high interest debt. If one or more credit scores are low, plan to rebuild those scores as quickly as possible to help you finance the house you want. *Save:* Find a place in the budget to make room for savings. You might have to make some cutbacks on your expenses to make room for savings but you will reap the benefits of a larger nest egg down the road. If you have a retirement plan at work, try to max it out. At the very least, make sure you save up to the level of your employers match in contributions – otherwise it is like leaving free money on the table. If you don't have a retirement plan, use an IRA, Roth IRA, or even a brokerage account to save for retirement. The sooner you start saving, the better off you will be down the road.

Review your portfolio: Take the time to jointly review all of your assets, including bank statements, active 401k plans, IRAs, brokerage accounts and any other assets that you both have. Now is the time to determine if you want to combine assets. This is a personal choice you need to make. When investing your savings though, it is best to look at all of your accounts as a single portfolio, not several different portfolios. Be sure that your portfolio is properly diversified and is tailored to your risk tolerance and time horizons. As well, avoid overlaps in investment sectors and securities that happen when there are multiple accounts. A financial planner can assist you with choosing the right investments for you while keeping your risk tolerance and goals in mind.

Once you have completed the above, you should have a clear picture of your finances.



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Plan on discussing your finances on a regular basis, such as quarterly. It is important that both of you know where you stand financially and have common financial goals. Now you can realistically plan for that house, college funding and other big ticket items that come with marriage.

You're in it for the long haul, so be creative and willing to compromise. If the topic of debt, bills, investments, and goals makes one or both of you uncomfortable or defensive, hiring a financial planner to help you meet your goals may be best for you.

AFTER THE WEDDING:

Home Buying Takes Planning. Are you ready?

Last issue I wrote about planning to buy your first home. The steps to take, the research to do and how it is similar to planning a wedding in the regards to how much money do we spend, how do we save for it, can we afford it and ultimately how are we going to pay for it.

I suggested that the first thing you should do is consult with a professional mortgage lender who can advise you on all of the possible programs available to you, whether or not you are prepared to make a purchase now or lead you down the path for future home ownership.

We discussed some of the low down payment programs available such as Federal Housing Authority (FHA), USDA/Rural Development and Vermont Housing Finance Agency (VHFA). This issue I would like to talk more about "conforming loans." These are loans that meet Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac guidelines. Typically they require a higher credit score and more down payment, but come with lower interest rates and monthly payments.

The typical "conforming loan" requires 20% down payment. Although you are allowed to put less than 20% down payment, in which you will be required to pay private mortgage insurance or PMI.

PMI is based on a percentage of the amount of the loan that is insured and is paid on a monthly basis or as a onetime premium at the beginning of the loan. PMI is required to be in place until the equity value in the house has succeeded 20%. In other words the loan amount is 80% or less of the value of the property (80% loan to value). For example if the value of your home is appraised at \$180,000 the loan amount has to be less than \$144,000.

PMI is automatically dropped when the loan to value (LTV) reaches 78% or you can request the PMI to be cancelled when it reaches 80%. If property values in the area are going up and your home is now worth more than when you originally purchased, you may request the PMI to be removed. The lender will most likely require an appraisal to be

done on the property and if the value has increased enough to bring the LTV to 80% or better than they will discontinue the PMI policy.

"Conforming loans" also require a higher credit score. Some investors require a minimum 680 credit score while others will accept as low as a 640 credit score. Be aware the lower your credit score the more you will pay in interest rate. It is very important in your planning stages to get a copy of your credit report. You should review it with your mortgage consultant for accuracy. Give yourself time to "fix" any problems that might be on your report. Your mortgage consultant should be able to give you some suggestions on how to improve your credit score if needed or lead you in the right direction to get help from a credit agency that specializes in repairing credit scores.

Be careful to work with a credit repair service and not a debt consolidation agency, as that may actually hurt your credit score.

Gift funds are also allowed to be used as a source of down payment for "conforming loans." However unlike the FHA, RD and VHFA

grams, con-

forming programs

require 5% of the funds



SPA CORNER

Many brides ask these questions: When should I schedule spa and salon services? How much time do I need for it all? Here is a breakdown of how we determine the bridal spa services schedulina at Waterfalls Day Spa.

When have you scheduled your wedding and other events?

Traditionally, weddings are on a Saturday afternoon. We are seeing more people pick nontraditional times, such as Thursday at 4:30 PM. It is important that your spa coordinator know your schedule of events. When is your rehearsal? How far away is it from the spa? Are there any time constraints that we need to work around? A brunch, girl's cocktail hour, meetings with florists, wedding coordinators, and caterers, are important to know if they need to happen the day or two before your wedding.

Nail Services:

We love to see brides and bridal parties the day before the wedding to treat them to a fun girl's spa day including manicures and pedicures. If you want French polish, be sure to tell your spa coordinator, as it usually requires a bit more time. Depending on the number of women involved, nails can take a large portion of your day on the day before the wedding.



We suggest blocking about 4 hours of your day to fit approximately 7-10 girls in for pre-wedding nail treatments.

Massage:


If you are arriving to your wedding destination a few days before your wedding, we suggest having your massage as soon as you arrive. Schedule a Thursday massage for a Saturday wedding. If you live locally, schedule your massage earlier in the week. Before you know it the week will fly by and you will feel like you did not have a chance to feel rested and relaxed. You need to schedule your relaxation moments the same as your high-energy moments.

Bridal Makeup:

Scheduling your bridal makeup should always start with scheduling your consultation. This is an important part of the process and should be scheduled well. Schedule it close enough to your wedding that your skin tone is about the same as it will be on your day. Don't come in the winter for a summer wedding. The day of the wedding scheduling is a bit more complicated. It is recommended that your hair be done prior to makeup, so schedule dirst for all treatments. Bridal makeup is scheduled first for all treatments. Bridal makeup so for bride and groom about 45 minutes of time. You do not want to rush your esthetician; she is your artist and needs time and space to apply the minerals to your skin.

Hair:

Hair is usually the more time consuming service on your wedding day. We block an hour for the bride, and up to an hour for each attendant depending on style of updo. Often, more people are involved in hair services than there are in makeup (flower girls, grandmothers, mothers, etc) so the timing is important. The bride should get a preferred time, which often is not the first appointment of the day. For a wedding at 3:00 in the afternoon, it is common to start hair treatments at 8:30 AM to get 8 people styled and ready for their esthetician.



Sample Spa Schedule:

Here is a sample of a common bridal party spa services schedule for a Saturday wedding ceremony. They are a destination wedding where we were unable to schedule a makeup consult prior to arrival. If she had been able to come to the spa in April, we would have completed her consult at that time.

Questions and Answers about Wedding Etiquette, Solutions and Help from the Etiquette Experts at Vermont Bride

VERMONT BRIDE'S Discusssion Forum

- Q. We're having a flower girl and ring bearer. Should they sit at the head table? Elizabeth, Johnson
- A. Where children and weddings are concerned, use caution and sit them where they will feel most comfortable. Usually sitting with mom and dad is the safest bet. With her pretty dress and his boy-sized tux, the cute factor will follow them whether at the head table or not.
- Q. My aunt won't be able to attend. I would like to give her a gift. Any ideas? Elyse, Burlington
- A. Send her a beautiful keepsake box filled with photos, a CD of ceremony and reception music, a DVD of special moments, invitations (wedding, bridal shower, rehearsal dinner), program, menu, a piece of fabric from

your gown and a heartfelt letter. These special tokens will show how much she means to you and that she was remembered.

- Q. I'd like to have decorations for the entrance of the church. What are some options? Anna, Jericho
- A. First, check with the church as they will have definite rules as to what can and can't be used for decor. Generally, hooks and nails are already in place for draping and beautification. Wreaths placed on doors are a universal sign of welcome and can be designed in every shape and style. Boxwood wreaths for formal times, soft and light flowers with greenery for a more casual theme or a monogramed wreath for the truly unique. Add a big, multi-looped silver bow made with wired ribbon and it's a celebration! Winter weddings are perfect for trails of evergreen garland lazily draped over doors and stairways. Tiny white lights make for an enchanting effect. Kissing balls with trailing ribbons are whimsical and affordable.
- Q. My mother doesn't know if she should wear a floor-length dress, what color it should be or how formal. Cathy, Essex Junction
- A. Moms are special folks and her dress should make her feel comfortable and compliment, not clash with the colors your bridesmaids are wearing. If your attendants are wearing floor-length dresses, to keep with the level of formality, your mom can also sport a floor-length dress. If she chooses a tea or ankle-length and it compliments the style and hues of the other dress, it's a perfect choice. If she chooses a sheer, lightweight fabric, opt for a wrist corsage (instead of a pin-on) or a small hand-held bouquet.
- Q. We can't agree on a date. I would like a summer wedding; he likes fall. What's the most popular month to wed? Rachel, Rutland
- A. Weddings rule summer. June and July take top spots as the most popular months in which to wed. If you plan on a summer date, be sure it doesn't fall on a graduation date or special guests' vacation plans. Also, this is prime time for photographers, florists, caterers, and other vendors. If you've got your heart set on a sunny, summer afternoon, book the vendors in advance.

7 STEPS

to your Perfect Vermont Wedding

IT TAKES PLANNING to carry through to a perfect wedding, and to make sure that you are able to enjoy planning for your special day, follow these basic steps from Vermont Bride Magazine to help you organize all of the details and keep it manageable.

AGREE ON THE DATE AND TIME Will your guests include young children? If so, ask yourself: Do you need to accommodate a kid-friendly time for your guests? Daytime weddings work best for little ones, but if you are going to have an adult group, an evening time (like 6:00 P.M.) can start the night right and allow for dancing and carousing with your family and friends. Will many of your guests be traveling more than 50 miles to the event? Do you need a good weekend or a close holiday to make it easier for your wedding party to take time off from their regular schedules? Here's a tip that can help your schedule and your pocket book: If you look at the calendar and consider the costs of travel at certain vacation-heavy times of the year, you can avoid setting a date that coincides with higher travel costs.

CHOOSE YOUR STYLE Formal, informal, semi-formal ? You and your fiancé should consider your guests, but also know what it is you're going to be comfortable with and become

what it is you're going to be comfortable with and happy about once the event is over. What sort of party do you want to throw? Does a sit-down affair with linen and china settings for the entire group sound exciting, or tiring? Are you more of a buffet or BBQ person? Once you can decide on the level of formality you're hoping for, you can immediately begin ignoring the hundreds, if not thousands of options that are available to you, so that you can narrow the choices to the type of affair that will best fit you and your partner. THE RING For many, this is a question that is already handled well before the planning is begun, but the method for handling the question of "which ring" can also be applied to other items. Drop hints, point out what rings you have seen that you admire, do some window shopping. Inform other people with whom he may be talking about it with. If you are able, come right out and raise the subject. If by some chance he presents a ring that you simply do not like, suggest having the setting for the stone changed to something you will enjoy.

BUDGETS AND MONEY Don't pick a number out of the air. Nothing will make you crazier faster than trying to shoe-horn your plans into a fixed number. Of course you need to know your limits; but you also need to know what is essential for your happy day. Arriving at that number is easier once you know the main essentials of your day, and what those costs are. From there you can establish the minimum expenses. You'll also see what the big ticket items are – and if that's where you want your money to be directed.

PARENTS: Are they going to participate in the costs? Will each family have certain items which they will each pay for, thus distributing the costs fairly according to means? It can be uncomfortable for two separate families to discuss such intimate financial datails, but you paged to remember that the dollar, amounts are not the lead item.

Instead, know how much lead time you have until the special day, and consequently time to save and prepare for the financial costs. Weddings can be very expensive, but everyday a successful wedding at a reasonable cost is accomplished because careful planning was done. Building a list of your necessary expenses is the way to make sure you're going to spend money on the right items that you need, and not something that will prove unnecessary.

THE GUEST LIST Unless your budget is essentially unlimited, it is unlikely you will be able to invite the horde of guests you and your fiancé might compile. Instead, with a budget established, it is time to match your reception space to the guest list. You will likely have to pare your list, with the help of your family. If necessary, assign each family a third of the possible guests, and reserve one-third for the
