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

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


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Inside Vermont Bride: Staff Notes

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Entertainment BasicsThe DJ, the Band and Your Wedding Sound

Choosing music for your wedding often means choosing between getting a band or a DJ. Each has advantages and it is not unusual for those with a large budget to hire both, but most couples have to go with one or the other in order to keep their costs under control. In your planning consider these points:

DJ

- Will typically cost significantly less than a full band.
- · Can put any song you want into the set list.
- Can work in small spaces.
- Able to keep the music going without breaks.
- Can work with your reception schedule to keep announcements, introductions, speeches and the dancing moving efficiently.

BAND

- Has a dramatic physical presentation.
- A band's energy and personality can get people onto the dance floor that might otherwise remain seated.
- Live music played by musicians has an effect that recorded music does not.
- Even those who won't dance will usually enjoy watching a band.
- A band contains a number of entertainment personalities, not just one.



The music you choose for your **ceremony** often has to cover several movements: the arrival of guests, the processional of the bride's party, the processional of the bride herself, and the recessional. The **reception** may need choices for: introduction of the bridal party, the entrance of the bride and groom, the wedding couple's first dance, a Father/bride dance, a Mother/groom dance, cake cutting, a final dance before the bride and groom exit the reception.

The DJ/Band gratuity: Be sure to designate a responsible member of your wedding planning group to give the customary 15% cash gratuity to the musicians or DJ at the end of the evening.


An "extra" thirty-minutes: Usually there will be a set time for the reception to end, at which point the DJ or band will pack up and leave. But what if the dancing has finally taken off and now you have to pull the plug? You can negotiate an extra block of time ahead of time that you leave

open to implement depending upon how the evening is going.

ALTERNATIVE IDEAS

- If you're putting together a low-budget (or even no-budget) wedding event, you can use a MP3 player hooked up to the appropriate amplification pre-programmed with a list of the music you want to hear. Better: pay a fee for a DJ to set everything up for you to transport to the event and then you just plug-and-play. Give it at least one test run-thru!
- Synchronize the music to play with a visual presentation of your favorite photos or home movies celebrating the bride and groom.
- Place inexpensive disposable cameras or video recorders at each table and have guests record each others comments, wishes for the bride and groom, or general reactions to the event as it unfolds.

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

- B. Love Mother Earth. Nature-inspired pieces, lots of greens and tans, natural fibers and a bunch of wildflowers plunked in a canning jar displayed on your windowsill.
- C. Cozy Comfort. Big, plush couches and pillows, lots of books and music, an eclectic collection that provides safety and sanity.

Total your score: Give yourself 1 point for every A, 2 points for every B, and 3 points for every C.

5-8 Points: Simple & Classic

Classic and traditional, your style will stand the test of time. You will find floral bliss with a bouquet of strong accent flowers whether an arm bouquet of striking white calla lilies or roses in one dramatic hue. Foliage can be added or kept to a nominal amount. Minimal and clean, your bouquet will sparkle because of its simplistic natural beauty. Consider centerpieces in basic geometric containers of square glass cubes, cylinder glass vases, and rose bowls. Grouping flowers of the same variety and color creates a dramatic and ascetically pleasing presentation.

Classic and traditional, your style will stand the test of time.

9-11 Points: Natural & Earthy

If you and your best girls could stop at the local farmers' market on the way to the church and gather handfuls of wildflowers, this would be your ideal nature-inspired bouquet. You love the natural look of herbs, grasses, and the bounty that sprouts effortlessly from Mother Earth. Depending upon the season of your wedding, your florist may be able to source these awe-inspiring blooms from local growers. Your centerpieces, filled with a variety of color and garden flowers, take shape in canning jars, baskets, galvanized pails, and terracotta pots. Containers do not have to match. Variety creates interest and as long as the choices are compatible, the overall look will be realized in a most creative array. Consider growing mint, lemon balm, lavender, and sage and use for added texture and scent.

12-15 Points: Romantic & Dreamy



At times, as mentioned above the wedding party was never aware of the situation. Having smart vendors, on site staff or family who can quickly help is imperative.







Quick Quips and Helpful Tips

Wedding Invitations:

The most important thing you must do before putting your invitations into the mail is *check them* carefully. A fatal mistake is to approve invitations that contain incorrect information, and are now traveling through the mail system on their way to confuse and mislead your guests!

But besides this obvious item, remember that your invitations are the tone and the style of your wedding all wrapped up into a few sheets of paper. The colors you want, the textures you want (paper comes in many, many formats and produce different feelings when you touch them) all these aspects convey your identity as a couple, and the theme and unique quality of your wedding

Most wedding planners have contacts with custom wedding invitation designers, if that is your desire, or with traditional printing establishments that have hundreds of existing styles to use.

But either way, what you want is for your future guests to receive the envelope, and when they open it and look at it they will be able to say, "That's them!"


Tip: WEDDING ADVISORS

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




Our Engagement


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


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Most Memorable Details



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
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MATT'S P.O.V.


minutes that at once flew by and stood till. Wrapped and comfortable as always in arms, a synchronized heart bout to be split; one entity to be pulled in two.


And it was beautiful. Such a sweet and beautiful, sad goodbye. Right to the edge of the line - the line only ticketed passengers can cross and there we stood as one for

day is the pivchapter in a beautiful love story-one that began months, often years, before you ever tried on that perfect bridal gown. Have you ever thought about how you'll preserve the story behind your special day? After all, it's your unique romantic journey that sets your wedding ceremony apart from any other.

I know that amidst the busyness that surrounded my own wedding over a decade ago, I didn't have a spare second to sit down and record my thoughts and feelings about this once-ina-lifetime experience. And my husband-to-be certainly wasn't keeping a journal! Thirteen years, a house, and two children later, I would love to hear what we might



have had to say as we approached this major milestone in our relationship – and lives.

Yes, I have a wedding album and a video of the entire event. I even had my gown preserved in white acid-free tissue paper. But I don't have any record of what was going through our hearts and minds during the months and days leading up to the moment when we said, "I do."

As a personal historian who helps individuals and families share and preserve their memories, I often interview couples celebrating a golden anniversary or milestone birthday. With the passage of time and the surreal nature of the event itself, it's understandable that decades from now you might not remember all of the details surrounding your engagement and wedding planning, let alone your innermost thoughts, feelings, hopes, and dreams.


But there are steps that you can take today that will boost memory recall later on. Here are a few fun and simple ways to keep those special memories fresh through the years:

- Select photo albums with memo space for writing detailed descriptions alongside your pictures-remember, who, what, when, where! At the very least, consider pasting (on the inside-front cover of the album) a list of key memories, moments, and funny stories from your wedding week.
- Keep a journal chronicling the events leading up to your wedding day, as well as your thoughts and emotions prior to, during, and after the celebration. Some couples even create wedding blogs to share with friends and family. Save hard copies of your posts and place them in a beautifully designed binder.
- Print out and save weddingrelated emails. Store them in a folder or binder along with any other special letters and cards. Together, they will tell the story of your engagement in a unique and intimate way.
- Hire a personal historian to help you tell your love story in

your own words. Captured through interviews with the bride and groom (and even friends and family) days before the big event, "your wedding story" can take the form of a digital recording complete with music and photos or a keepsake book to be shared with loved ones or tucked away for your own enjoyment through the years.


Whatever approach works best for you, I encourage you to take the time and make the effort to preserve your love story so that it's as clear in your mind fifty years from now as it is today.



Your Wedding Your Way

Money, Sex and Power

ulia and Ken came to their first session with the wedding coach with some questions about the logistics of their new life together. They started living together when they got engaged. Julia's place was larger than Ken's, so he moved in with her. Pooling their incomes for joint expenses like the electric bill was simple enough. But they had different ideas about long term planning, like how to save for a down-payment on a home, vacations and retirement. Ken's career had been compromised by the economic downturn, so his approach to finances was more frugal. They didn't doubt their decision to get married, but they were somewhat stalemated in their planning for the wedding and the honeymoon.

When the wedding coach suggested that Richard Foster's classic book *Money, Sex, and Power* summarized three basic areas which challenge all couples, they were intrigued. Ken immediately ordered the book, read it, and encouraged Julia to read it. Reading and discussing it together, they began to see how their families of origin shaped different approaches to handling money and decision-making. They began to use Foster's ideas on creating a new "covenant" beyond their old ideas as a basis for a common approach to saving, spending, and decision-making.

What challenged them the most, as it turned out, however, was the shift in their sex life after moving in together. It was Julia's place. She was an introvert. And she had daily and weekly routines that she found difficult to continue around Ken's more extroverted routines with the TV and the radio, for example. They found it difficult to create a life together that accommodated their individual preferences for spending time at home. A joint rythym for meals, cleanup, and bedtime didn't come easy. Julia became less interested in sex. Ken was frustrated. And they weren't even married yet.

They were feeling a need for a breakthrough before invitations were sent out. Wedding planning came to a complete halt. Ken called the wedding coach.

"Sounds like you need more than Foster's book," the coach said to him. "Tell Julia this is not uncommon. All couples have to negotiate this sort of territory at some point or another in their life together. I encourage you to do that with a marital therapist. Invite Julia to go." And the coach recommended a therapist he knew did good work in the area where they lived.


Julia was not immediately amenable, but agreed to go when he shared how important it was to him. She was not disappointed.

The therapist was not only good; she worked what Ken thought was a minor miracle in one session. A breakthrough came with the therapist's simple disentangling of bedtime and sex. While a lot of couples attach lovemaking with going to bed, it can be a routine of which they quickly tire, especially because even young couples are tired at the end of the day.

The key for Julia and Ken was seeing their lovemaking as something so precious and sacred that they didn't leave it to chance at bedtime. 

Getting Ready: the Legal Details for a Vermont Wedding

Vermont Marriage Law is a remarkably relaxed affair. There is no waiting period or blood test required to receive a marriage license. If you're a Vermont resident, simply visit your town clerk and for a minimal fee of \$45.00, you can legally be married that same day! You can also purchase a license 60 days prior to the ceremony; however, the license becomes void after 60 days and will need to be reissued.

Other legal requirements include providing your:

- Legal town of residence
- Place and date of birth
- Parents' names, (including mother's maiden name), and the states where they were born

· Information regarding your race, highest degree of education completed, number of times previously married, and how previous marriages ended.

Proof for information related to the above: birth certificates and/or divorce decrees.

A judge, Supreme Court justice, assistant judge, justice of the peace, or any licensed or ordained minister residing in Vermont and recognized by the state can perform the marriage ceremony.


To obtain a copy of your Vermont Marriage Certificate:

- Upon purchase of the license, arrange with the town clerk to send you a certified copy of the marriage certificate as soon as the marriage is recorded. The cost is \$10.00 (in addition to the \$45.00 cost of the license).
- Two weeks or more after the ceremony, a request, in person or in writing, may be made to the office of the town clerk from which the license was purchased.
- Six weeks or more after the ceremony, a request, in person or in writing, may be made to The Vermont Department of Health Vital Records Unit. You will receive a copy of the original marriage certificate embossed with the town or state seal and signed and dated by the appropriate official. This certified copy is considered acceptable for all legal








Spotlight on Wedding Flowers

Stephanotis

Botanical Name: Stephanotis floribunda (stef-ah-NO-tis-flor-ih-BUN-duh)

Common Names: Madagascar Jasmine, Bridal Veil, Hawaiian Wild Flower, Floradora.

Colors: Stephanotises are available in white only with vines of leathery, dark green leaves.

Availability

Stephanotises are available year round with peaks being in summer and autumn. Florists purchase in boxes of 25, usually without the vines. Most purchased travel from Madagascar and subtropical regions of Africa and Asia with some being grown domestically. Several weeks' notice is usually needed for growers to ensure availability, especially during winter and spring.

Description

Approximately 1" – 1 1/2" in diameter, these plump, waxy, star-shaped flowers are highly scented and widely sought focal flowers for bridal bouquets. The fragrance is similar to true jasmine, Jasminum officinate. Stephanotis is a member of the Asclepiadaceae family.

Meaning

'Marital Harmony,' 'Desire to Travel,' and 'Good Luck.'

Design Ideas

Adorn Stephanotis by adding pearl pins (white or colored), crystals, or rhinestones in the center of the star cluster. This is especially effective if the bridal gown has details of pearls or beading. The groom may choose to wear an elegant boutonniere of Stephanotis. It can also be used as an accent with another flower such as a rose, orchid, or gardenia.

Long Life

After harvesting the grower will remove stems and pack these fragile flowers in airtight containers with moistened tissue to keep humidity high. As they are shipped without stems or a water source, upon arrival the florist will soak the flowers in room temperature water allowing hydration and then store in a cooler with high humidity at a temperature of no lower than 42° F.

Name Game

The genus name Stephanotis has Greek origin, made up of two words: "stephanos" meaning crown and "otis" meaning ear or crown of ears referring to the five ear-like attachments to the staminal crown at the flower's center.

Everything was packable for the flight home including the syrup which was less than 3 oz. for those flying with only carry on bags!

8.Stick to your budget.

How Not to Offend Friends & Relatives When They Aren't Invited to Your Wedding

ometimes bigger is not always better and a couple may opt for a small ceremony, or what I like to refer to as a "microwedding" when they decide to get married. This is what my husband and I did. When we were deciding on what kind of wedding we wanted, the thought of a wedding with fifty or more people seemed daunting. Neither one of us likes crowds of people. As we would be paying for the wedding ourselves we weighed what it was we really wanted. My

husband doesn't dance and I didn't want to participate in traditional wedding events like tossing the bouquet. Also, we weren't the typical couple getting married for the first time. By the time the ceremony would occur, we would be in our mid-thirties.

We had been together for over six years and had our own home together for a few years as

well. Our families had known each other for over twenty years, so we didn't feel we needed a big ceremony for everyone to get acquainted. We finally decided on a small ceremony with immediate family only, which amounted to thirteen guests, and then a dinner afterwards. When we finally made that decision, we were concerned with how family and friends not included in the big day would feel.

We wanted to help them understand our decision and let them know that we wanted something intimate and it had nothing to do with wanting to leave them out.

Once we decided on a wedding date, we sent engagement announcements to those invited to the wedding and to friends and family we thought would have expected to be invited. We told everyone that an intimate ceremony was planned on our wedding date and that although we would not be having a traditional wedding event we wanted to share the good news. Our hope was to give friends and family, in a courteous way, plenty of time to adjust to the plans of a tiny ceremony instead of a large event. We had over a year to let people know at other family gatherings that we simply wanted an intimate wedding and were not leaving anyone out because we did not want them there, but because we wanted something untraditional with immediate family only.

I had decided on having a matron of honor and told her not to have a bridal shower for me because of the possibility that some potential guests would not be invited to the wedding.


Nevertheless, my future mother-in-law and sister-in-law decided to throw me a shower to welcome me to the family. Many people who weren't coming to the wedding came to the shower, happy that my future husband and I were doing what we wanted. The shower was a great opportunity for all of us to celebrate the marriage. Etiquette advisors say that it is common for those attending the bridal shower to be invited to the wedding. In my case, everyone was just happy

> to be at the shower and celebrating the formal merging of two families that had been merged emotionally for years.

Eco-Friendly Weddings: Going Green in 2010

e've all changed our lifestyle due to the way we care about the environment. We turn off water when brushing our teeth, lights (powered by energy efficient bulbs) are clicked off when we leave a room, we return empty cans and don't think twice about separating plastic from cardboard. We're doing our part to preserve Mother Earth. For couples choosing to further this cause as part of their wedding, they get two big green thumbs up. Our favorite frog Kermit said: "It's not that easy bein' green." If Kermit ever got his willpower energized and popped the question to Ms. Piggy, he would have realized that going green doesn't mean sacrificing style or panache. It's easier than he imagined. These thoughts empower all of us to make decisions that will have positive,

rather than destructive, impacts on our planet. The following are some ideas to consider when wedding planning meets environmentally conscious thinking.

The Gown

If wearing your mother's gown isn't an option, consider shopping secondhand and vintage clothing stores. With some alteration and modification, a diamond in the rough dress from bygone days could become elegant and distinctive. We know a bride that purchased her gown for \$99.00 at a vintage clothing store and

looked like a million dollars on her wedding day. If you are purchasing new, look for designers that use sustainable fabrics. Hemp, hemp blends, organic silks, and cottons are nature-friendly rather than factory-friendly options. Pay it forward and consider donating your gown to a charity or secondhand shop.

Jewelry

Consider purchasing jewelry made from recycled metals and stones. Visit estate sales and vintage shops to find pieces that can be resized or reset. If a diamond is in your future, ask the right questions to be sure the stone was acquired in a 'conflict free' manner.

Ceremony and Reception

State parks, beaches, outdoor gardens, and backyards are not only earth friendly, but natural, picturesque venues for ceremonies and receptions. Save on electricity consumption and let the solar power provide the ambiance. If opting for an indoor site, ask about energy efficient appliances and biodegradable products. Restrooms should have hands free dryers, natural soaps, and lotions. Silverware and china should be used over throw away plastic and paper ware. Holding the ceremony and reception in the same location eliminates the need for additional travel and carbon emis-

Menu and Dessert

Partnering with your caterer you will be able to offer your quests the best local, organic and seasonal products; produce and meats from local suppliers are far healthier and tastier than those trucked from the west coast - not to mention the carbon footprint savings. Visit farmers' markets to get an idea of local offerings and share these ideas with your caterer. Maple syrup presented in a variety of glassware make fantastic, local favors. Carman Brook Maple Farm and VT Mountain Syrup (located in the Resource Guide section of Vermont Bride Magazine) are experts at these sweet treats. Consider free-range poultry, eggs and beef – the taste difference is remarkable. If fish is on the dinner menu, avoid commercially raised and those high in mercury. Wild salmon and tilapia are excellent choices; stay away from dolphin harming tuna.

Local wineries, including Boyden Valley Winery, offer a wide variety of white and red wines along with exquisite dessert wines. Look into donating any leftover food to local food shelves or soup kitchens. This is a good job for the best man and maid of honor.

Décor

Candles add sparkle and elegance for a reasonable price. Produced from petroleum, paraffin candles have taken a second seat to more earth friendly choices like soy and beeswax. Excellent choices for their longer, soot free burn time and renewability, soy and beeswax candles are sure winners - they also make great favors.

Leave the streamers, confetti. balloons, disposable cameras, and polyester at the discount store. Being dumped in a landfill to putrefy for years is far too hefty a price to pay for all of us – especially when there are friendly alternatives. Put on your green thinking cap and come up with your own socially conscious touches.

Consider the most natural choice of decoration for your reception: plants. From the showy banana tree to the bushy Boston fern, these natural

eing asked to serve as a bridesmaid is a great honor, but it is also a responsibly that shouldn't be taken lightly, especially by younger teens.

The financial responsibility can be particularly difficult for a young teen. Unless the teen has an income, a parent will have to pay for items associated with being a bridesmaid including the bridesmaid dress, new

underclothes, shoes, gifts for the shower and wedding, transportation to the wedding... and, if the wedding's out of town, perhaps even a hotel room. If the teen doesn't have a driver's license and a car, then a parent may have to drive the teen to attend pre-wedding planning sessions, dress fittings, showers and rehearsals. For these reasons and others it is important that a young teen consult their parents before accepting the honor of being a bridesmaid. Even if parents agree, a teen should be one hundred percent sure they want to be a bridesmaid or should graciously decline the invitation. It's better to say no when first asked than back out after the dress is ordered.

Once a young teen has agreed to serve as a bridesmaid, a great next step is to search on the internet for a list of bridesmaid duties, choose a couple that are appealing and suitable, then volunteer to do them.

Often times a bride gets caught up in the hustle and bustle of wedding planning and may forget to directly ask the bridesmaids to help—or may feel uncomfortable telling people what she needs help with. So, if a young teen is specific about what they would like to do and are capable of doing it will be a great relief to the bride.

There are many prewedding duties that are suitable for young teens, such as volunteering to address wedding invitations and stuff them into envelopes, helping make favors and baskets for out of town guests. Asking the maid of honor if she needs help with the shower or anything else is not only polite, it is expected.

A young teen should go with the rest of the bridesmaids when the dresses are chosen—this is one of the high points of being a bridesmaid, as is choosing hairstyles and shoes. Some brides allow the bridesmaids to help choose dress colors and style, some do not. The important thing for a young teen to remember is to tactfully speak up if the dress style makes you uncomfortable or does not fit well, but remember color and style are ultimately up to the bride. Resist any urge to argue. This is the bride's day not yours.

As the wedding day approaches, a young teen needs to pick her dress up from the bridal shop in time to have it altered if necessary. She should try the dress on with the underwear she intends to wear on the wedding day and make sure it doesn't show.

Pick up several pairs of pantyhose that work with the dress and tuck an emergency pair in a formal bag that matches the bridesmaid dress. Shoes should be tried on and stretched. Practice walking in them. These all seem like common sense, but everything a young bridesmaid can do to prepare herself ahead of time will eliminate stress on the wedding day, so all the attention can focus on the bride instead of a bridesmaid's last minute dilemma.

Generally, young bridesmaids are invited to the bridal shower, but a young teen should not feel slighted if she isn't invited to the bachelorette party. Often bachelorette parties involve drinking and older guys. The last thing the bride needs is to have a bridesmaid get in trouble for underage drinking or caught in a comprising position with a guy. If a teen is invited to a bachelorette party, resist temptation and stick to the no drinking alcohol and no flirting with older guys rule. These

rules also apply at the rehearsal dinner, during the ceremony and the reception, all of which a teen bridesmaid will be attending.

During the rehearsal, listen to all the instructions—this will make

the wedding day much less stressful. On the wedding day, a teen bridesmaid should focus on making the day as Independence and cooperation are easy and wonderful for the bride as pos-

sible. Independence and cooperation are the keys to doing this. Get out of bed At the reception, a teen bridesmaid most the keys to doing this. Get out of bed and and be ready to go early. ready to go early. Be sure to get to the hairdressers on time. If you don't regularly wear makeup or go to a hairdresser, don't complain or refuse to be made up. The truth is that makeup will make you look better in photos as will a hairstyle that coordinates with the other bridesmaids'.

Do everything you can to help the bride and maid of honor. Ask if they need anything, like water, a snack or Kleenex. The wedding day is a time of high emotions and often small details go astray, like the ring bearer's pillow being left in the limo. If a teen notices something is being forgotten, speak up. Do anything you can to led moral support and make the day stress free for the bride.

When it comes to the ceremony, follow all the instructions that were given at the rehearsal and resist the urge to fool around or giggle. Take a deep breath, and when it's your turn to walk down the aisle do it slowly.

Once the wedding is over, help gather up things like the unity candle and any stray possessions that the bride might forget. A teen bridesmaid can quickly scan the pews or chairs and gather any items that guest have left behind, such as cell phones or cameras. But don't forget that you are expected to stand in the receiv-

ing line with the rest of the bridal party.

often will sit with the other bridesmaids, though the bride may make other seating arrangements. The teen should take part in the formal parts of the reception, such as the toast, the bouquet toss and first-dance sequence, but after that she is free to socialize with other guests.

Above all a young bridesmaid should remember that whether the bride is a family member or a friend, don't let wedding stress lead to petty arguments. Be understanding and forgiving. Weddings last one day, but the friendship between a bride and bridesmaid can last a lifetime.

Nowadays it is not unusual to include all guests attending the wedding particularly at a destination location.

Subsequently the function of this pre wedding party has changed somewhat and now serves as an effective tool to 'Break the ice' providing a great opportunity for the two families and the wedding couples various friends to meet and interact in a friendly and relaxing environment.

Introductions are made with ease and informality.

Destination weddings offer so many exciting opportunities to plan a unique, memorable and a very special weekend celebration that is officially launched with the 'rehearsal'.

This event should not conflict with the arrangements of wedding day itself so avoid hosting the two events in the same setting or property.

Make sure the menu suits your style but does not share any similarities with the wedding meal. In your planning remember to make sure the chef is aware of any special dietary needs or allergies your guests may have.

Keep it casual and be imaginative avoid the 'cookie cutter' type of arrangement. Any Inn or restaurant that wants your business and claims to host such evenings should be enthusiastic and provide ideas and guidance to make this important dinner special

Country Inns are often very well equipped to provide a venue that is truly special and some of them actually specialize in such events.

pril Desabrais, Cosmetologist and Owner of Manestream Salon in Middlebury, Vermont offers these bridal hair tips after years of experience with wedding hair for brides, grooms, and attendants.

Deciding Your Style

There are many considerations when choosing a hairstyle that will work for you. The first and most important is to be realistic with what your hair can do. If you have fine hair, a thick full updo may be more difficult. The setting and formality of your wedding should be taken into consideration. Is the wedding inside or outside? What does your dress look like? Is it strapless, or what type of straps does it have? Are you wearing a veil? Are you wearing a tiara? Where is the veil going to sit? Do you plan to take the veil off after the ceremony? Check to see if the style you have chosen is age appropriate. Does the hairstyle compliment your attitude? Looking through wedding magazines and cutting out photos of what you like are extremely helpful to stylists.

Hair Preparation

It is not necessary to grow your hair out for a year prior to your wedding! Trim your hair a half inch every three months for healthy hair that is easier to work with. If you are interested in a different cut, please cut your hair a month before the wedding. You may decide that hair extensions would help you

create the perfect look. Talk with your stylist about extensions 6-8 weeks prior to your wedding date so that she can color match your hair and get you started on the process. Extensions are a fantastic way to create volume and length in a fun non-permanent fashion. If you color your hair, schedule all color services 2 weeks prior to the wedding day.

Consultation

The consultation is everything: it is a chance to decide how to style your hair on the date! Most salons require a bride to have one or more consultations before the wedding as a practice run. Tips for your consultation include:

- 1. Come in with shampooed, dry, clean hair.
- 2. No waxes, hairspray, or gel in your hair.
- 3. Wear a button up shirt.
- 4. Bring a camera to take photos from every angle.
- 5. Bring veils and headpieces.
- 6. Bring photos of styles you prefer.
- 7. Bring a friend.
- 8. Have fun!

The first consultation is a test run to see which styles you prefer and what you feel comfortable in. The second consultation will show you a finished product including placement of your veil.

Current Hair Trends

The loose, romantic look is popular now according to Ms. Desabrais. She has seen many brides asking for the half up/half down, slightly wavy style. There has also been a resurgence of brides incorporating braids into their styles. The sleek sophisticated updo with a side bang has never gone out of fashion.

Grooms

Although not as apparent, the groom's hair cut is essential. Men should have their hair cut 1-2 weeks before the wed-

ding, not the day before. Men should not try a new style a day before the wedding. Products are a must for men on the wedding day. If men have been using a camouflaging color, this should be done 2 weeks prior to the event.

Bridesmaids

The bride is the captain of the hair team. Although many brides give their attendants the ability to choose a style, a bride should be given the choice to recommend a style that better suits the setting and feel of a wedding. Most bridesmaids do not have a consultation, but are encouraged to have one if they are having a more difficult style, or if added decorations such as fresh flowers are being used.

Children

The bride should be the one deciding what hairstyle her flower girl is wearing. Many flower girls mirror the bride's style, for example they each

have a tiara. Children do not typically have consultations. They should arrive at the salon with shampooed, dry hair. Children are restless, so letting them go first can get them done and happy.

Moms

Many mothers of the bride and groom state they do not need to have their hair done, and then regret that decision when they get to the salon with their daughters. The suggestion we give is to book your mom and plan it for her. She will be so pleased and will feel wonderful for the photos. Ms Desabrais recommends a simple shampoo and blow dry, or perhaps a quick set to make her hair shine. Don't forget Grandmas too! Some of the most fun we have had with makeup and hair has been for the grandmothers of the bride.

Where to Have your Hair Done

It is recommended that you choose your stylist based on many factors, but your first choice should be the stylist you have

> seen regularly. Many brides are coming to Vermont and do not have a relationship with a salon and need guidance. We recommend you search a wedding directory such as the one in Vermont Bride to see which salons can cater to wedding hair. They will be able to see you and your attendants in less time if they have more stylists. Ask for referrals from wedding consultants, or at a spa, florist, or photographer. It is recommended that you have your hair done in a salon or spa as the stylists work best in their environment with their tools. Lighting, mirrors, electrical outlets, and access to materials are important during a high-energy affair such as a wedding. And as a plus, is usually less expensive to have your hair done at the salon then to have them travel to you.

Price

Prices for hair vary by salon. The average price for bridal

hair is \$100 and up for the bride and \$50 and up for attendants. Consultations may or may not be added into the price. Ask the salon what their policies are so that you understand their pay structure. Deposits are generally required, and often you pay prior to the wedding day to ensure a smooth day without stress. The bride's mother often pays for the group as a wedding gift. Otherwise, it is common for individuals to pay for their hairstyle. Expect to pay \$500-\$1000 for 6+ attendants and the bride.

Lisa, Colchester


A. Never should the request be printed on invitations. Guests will ask your family and bridal party where you are registered and that is a good time for them to relay your wishes. You should register for gifts even if you prefer cash over a can opener as many people will want to purchase something anyway; sometimes in addition to money. Guests will understand and honor the gift of money over the gift of product if they know in advance. Use your inner circle as a billboard and ask them to spread the word.

Q. I can't decide between my sister and best friend, can I have two maids of honor?

A. Why not? This is your wedding! To set them apart from the bridesmaids, choose different dresses (color, length, or style). Having co-maids of honor means double the assistance in sharing tasks (choosing flowers, gown shopping, writing invitations, etc.). Compose a few special words to be printed in the program as to why you chose these two particular women. When it comes time to walk the aisle, each takes an arm of the best man. When it's time for dancing, each has their time in the spotlight, hand in hand with the best man.





We've picked out our Invitations. What are Save-The -Date-Cards and do we need them?

A. Although not mandatory, Save-The-Date-Cards are recommended. Different from Invitations, Save-The-Date-Cards are sent to guests 5 – 6 months prior to the wedding and act as a reminder to record this important date in their daily planner before other appointments take over. Be casual and just state the facts (who, when) with 'Formal Invitation to follow,' – keep it simple. Postcards, photos, stickers, magnets, and note card paper all work well.

We don't want everyone lined up at a head table. What are other seating alternatives?

Lynn, Burlington

A. You and your new husband can share the reception sitting with parents or enjoying each other at your own sweetheart table. The sweetheart table could be placed in the center of the room, being surrounded by family and friends – a charming sentiment. The wedding party (with their dates) can be seated among the group of friends they would be sitting with had they not been in the wedding.

I'm planning our wedding and it's a second marriage for both of us. I don't see myself in a trailing white gown or veil. What's appropriate?

A. If a full-length white gown isn't your forte, wearing a simple, yet elegant cocktail-length dress may be more to your liking. Keep the veil in the display window and opt for a simple comb or pin with flowers. Anything goes and if you have your eye on a special dress that you ordinarily wouldn't purchase, consider splurging for this occasion.

INTERFAITH WEDDING

It is often said, "Love is blind." This could not be truer then when it comes to religious differences. Unfortunately for many couples, this love that "blinds" religious differences can be a problem when looking for a clergy person to

Unfortunately for many couples, this love that "blinds" religious differences can be a problem when looking for a clergy person to officiate at a wedding. In this article I will explore some of the issues an interfaith

marrying couple may encounter if hoping to have a rabbi perform the wedding.

Interfaith marriages represent a special challenge to the Jewish people.

Orthodox and Conservative Judaism respond to intermarriage by prohibiting their rabbis to officiate at interfaith weddings, period. This is non-negotiable for them. Though some Orthodox and Conservative rabbis will meet with the couple and share their concerns and/or make a connection so as to be able to work them in the future, they still will not officiate at the wedding. Other rabbis, or their secretaries, will simply turn the couple down. To be sure, there are more or less compassionate ways for the rabbi to say no. In any case, do not be offended when an Orthodox or Conservative rabbi says no to your request: it is not personal. Renewal, Reconstructionist and Reform rabbis are empowered, however, to decide for themselves whether they will officiate at an interfaith wedding.

In short, knowing the rabbi's affiliation before you ask if she or he is available can prevent a lot of unnecessary hurt feelings.

Assuming the rabbi contacted is not Orthodox or Conservative, there are still reasons why she or he may not agree to officiate at an interfaith wedding. A common reason is that the ceremony is and Ohalah: The Association of Rabbis for Jewish Renewal.

scheduled for a time when weddings are traditionally prohibited, for example the Sabbath and holidays. Another reason is that the couple intends to incorporate religious symbols and language from the non-Jewish partner's religious tradition. A third reason may be that the couple is seeking a rabbi only to make Aunt Sadie or Mom happy and they themselves do not care if they have a Jewish wed-

And then there is co-officiating, this is when clergy members from different faiths officiate together. There are Reform and Renewal

> rabbis who co-officiate but Reconstructionist rabbis are prohibited from doing so. There are many reasons that are considerably less support for co-officiating, which are complex and beyond the scope of this article. Suffice it to say, the reasons are never personal. Rabbis put a lot of thought into whether or not to officiate or co-officiate at interfaith weddings long before you call. Whether seeking a rabbi to officiate or co-officiate it is definitely possible to find someone who will do it. The key is to do a little homework and determine the rabbi's affiliation before calling.

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
















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
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




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
