The maintenance of professional standards

In the United Kingdom the General Medical Council (GMC) is responsible to Government for the regulation of the profession, in terms of determining the main characteristics of undergraduate education and the pattern and style of postgraduate training, with the Universities and the Royal Colleges running syllabuses and training programmes under a system of inspections. The Council. on which I serve as an appointed member, has recently endorsed key recommendations for the implementation of revalidation for all registered doctors, to ensure the maintenance of appropriate standards. Patients want to be sure that their doctors are up-to-date, properly skilled and really capable of doing the job – a growing tendency and one enhanced by some recent failures to ensure that this is so.

The GMC has decided that there must be a regular demonstration by all registered doctors that they remain fit to practise in their chosen field and that this is best assured by a link with continued registration. This implies sanctions for the non-performing practitioner who might lose specialist registration if found to be failing in some regard. For most doctors, continued employment depends on a combination of contract and registration because their contracts require them to be registered, loss of registration would undoubtedly imply dismissal. This could only occur after a well considered process and would, in the UK, follow the GMC's current "fitness to practise" procedures, which by local, and when necessary, national procedures, provide a sufficient mechanism for the review of a doctor's registration on the grounds of serious dysfunction. They also permit the organisation of remedial actions, or any necessary action consequent to an adverse review in relation to a doctor's registration. The Council intends to extend the link between regular demonstration of fitness to practise and continued registration to include all UK registered doctors whether in practise in

the National Health Service or not (this will affect the pharmaceutical industry, for example, as well as private practise).

Of course it is evident that the introduction of any system of revalidation will require adequate resources, both human and financial. Without such resources, the data, time and analysis required cannot be delivered, and the purpose of the scheme - the promotion and assurance of good standards of care for all patients - would be lost. Discussions with Government and others will be required to ensure that the introduction of revalidation is linked with the provision of these resources. It seems likely that similar systems will be demanded in a number of countries in the EC. It would be useful to know how we all view these difficult issues; discussions here in the UK have generated considerable heat. We are confident that the profession should be self-regulating but welcome lay involvement (the GMC has a large lay membership). What do vou think?

Molecular and Diagnostic Surgical Pathology Update, Liverpool, UK, 16–18 June 1999

Organised jointly by pathologists from Liverpool and Manchester under the joint aegis of the European Society of Pathology and The Royal College of Pathologists, this annual symposium is designed to provide new technical information, as well as to enhance practical skills for diagnostic surgical pathologists and for basic scientists interested in human tissue structure and disease. This is a three-day residential symposium in which all accommodation, meals and lectures take place at the Derby & Rathbone Hall of Residence, University of Liverpool, located in the pleasant and leafy surroundings of Mossley Hill, South Liverpool.

The symposium is suitable for candidates preparing to sit for postgraduate qualifications in diagnostic pathology, including surgical M.R.C.Path. and the U.S. or Australian Board Certification examinations. Current issues in diagnostic surgical pathology will be addressed - either in lecture format or as case presentations. This year, the lectures concentrate on the three contentious areas of molecular pathology, cytopathology and aspects of autopsy and human tissue utilisation. During these sessions, specific topics which are either of general interest, or in which there are contentious issues causing problems in current surgical pathology practice will be presented. These topics will include the potential role of automated cytoscreening in modern cytopathology and will be followed by an analysis of difficulties to be resolved in providing quality assurance by cytopathology laboratories. The ethically difficult subject of ownership of human tissues whether residual surgical specimens, autopsy-derived material or donated tissues will be discussed from the legal viewpoint.

The core of the seminar will comprise 16 cases of diagnostic surgical pathology spanning the full range of tissue types from the esoteria of the CNS and paediatric pathology to the more mundane subjects of the breast and bladder. In accordance with current trends and the demands of information technology, the cases for presentation and discussion will be issued in CD format rather than as the previously conventional glass slides. However, with respect to pathologists who remain more comfortable in front of a microscope - rather than a video monitor – sets of glass slides will be available for review during the course of the symposium.

Although an intensive programme has been arranged with daily activities commencing at 08.30 and extending to 23.00 h, the social highlight will be the symposium Dinner held on the evening of day 2 following an address which, this year, will be made by Dr. William Marshall, Treasurer of The Royal College of Pathologists, who will speak on

"Training, Examinations and Accreditation". The Royal College of Pathologists' perception of accreditation across national boundaries within Europe will be particularly illuminating.

It is anticipated that participants at this symposium will find a wealth of new information as well as revised approaches to familiar topics to assist them in their daily practice in providing a high-quality diagnostic surgical pathology service. There is a fixed fee of £175.00 for tuition, accommodation and meals. Payment may be made by cheque, international money order or major credit card.

Ioannina University Courses in Pathology (IUCP), Lung Pathology, 13–17 October 1998

The Ioannina University Courses in Pathology are already well known to combine both the outstanding warm Greek hospitality and the high substantial quality of the given lectures and information. This unique combination which offers training, education and insight into new ideas and developments in diagnostic pathology is guarantied by Prof. Niki Agnantis and her staff members.

The actual course on lung pathology comprised theoretical lectures, workshops and slide seminars. Within the lecturers well acknowledged pathologists presented a teaching program and detailed insights into diagnostic lung pathology. The course was opened by lectures given by Dr. C. Artinopoulos, Prof. S. Constantopoulos and Assoc. Prof. H. Tsimara-Papastamatiou (Chairperson of this course) who discussed imaging techniques, the latest developments in lung biopsies and pathways to obtain correctly classified lung tumors. The obligate lecture on neuroendocrine lung tumors was given by Dr. R. Tringidou. Assoc. Prof. H. Tsimara-Papastamatiou discussed benign lung tumors and the theory of lung cancer, whereas the objective of preneoplastic lesions and prognostic factors of lung tumors was my duty. The broad field of cytology was covered by Dr. S. Angeli, Dr. D. Daskalopoulou, Dr. P. Karakitsos, Ass. Prof. S. Markidou, and Dr. E. Tamvakopoulou. Diagnostic problems of fine needle aspirates were solved by Assoc. Prof. V. Malamou-Mitsi, those of lymphoproliferative disorders by Dr. M. Fotinou. Immu-



nohistochemistry and molecular biology in lung cancer were presented by Assoc. Prof. H. Tsimara-Papastamatiou and Dr. A. Papadopoulou. Dr. A.R. Gibbs allowed us to participate in his unique experiences on nonmalignant epithelial tumors of the lung and pleural tumors.

About 50 participants who arrived from more than seven different European countries took not only the chance "to heavily screen the slides" but contributed to an open and sparkling discussion which widened the doors to a very successful course. Needless to say that all presentations were well prepared and supported by well-compiled handouts. Needless to say that the venue seems just to be built for such an event. Needless to say that the organization including the "maintenance" of the participants was perfect, and that the beauty of Greece could be noted not only in the charming city of Ioannina but, in addition, in the country side of the University environment.

The evening before I had to leave, the city of Ioannina was protected by a large double-ringed intensive rainbow which seemed to originate from the sky and range across the entire lake and Ioannina town. There are strong suggestions that the country of Greece has close connections to heaven, and these connections might explain the warm-hearted hospitality which experienced all the participants. We, the "Northern foreigners", can only admire, try to come again, strongly suggest our colleagues to participate in the future courses, and explain our deep gratitude to Prof. Niki Agnantis and her entire team.


