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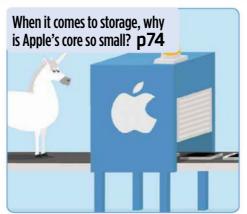
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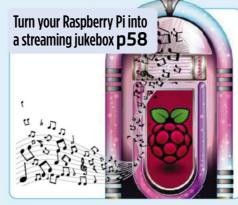
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What's New Online

Start live video chats using Firefox

Hello

ozilla has launched a simplified version of Firefox Hello, its free, live video-chat service that lets you talk to anyone via the browser. In the previous version released as a beta in October - you couldn't browse the web while waiting for your contact to join the chat. Now, however, a small window pops up, letting you visit websites as you wait.

Whoever starts the chat has to do so in Firefox, but the person responding can use Chrome, Opera or Firefox. All three browsers use the WebRTC technology (www.webrtc .org) that allows live video chats without the need to install plug-ins. In October last year, Microsoft said it was backing WebRTC, but the company hasn't yet added support to Internet Explorer, which is why it's still incompatible with Firefox Hello.



To start a chat, click the smiley-face icon in the menu bar. If you can't see it, click the menu button, then click Customise at the bottom of the window and drag the Hello icon up to the top bar. Firefox Hello is very easy to use, though it lacks some of Skype's more

advanced features. Click the link below for full instructions.

Discover the most popular dog breeds near you

Do you live in an area of Border Collies, Shih Tzus or Cocker Spaniels? This interactive BBC map uses 10 years of micro-chipping data to work out the most popular breeds in specific areas of the UK. It shows that Staffordshire bull terriers dominate Sunderland, jack russell terriers rule Bristol, and Halifax is home to greyhounds. But the UK's most popular dog overall is the

labrador retriever - more than 509,000 were tagged in the past 10 years, followed by 376,000 jack russells and 356,000 staffies.

The data comes from pet-registration companies Petlog and Animalcare, covering around 60 per cent of the country's canine population, but excluding crossbreeds.

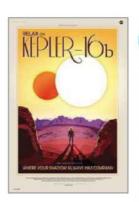

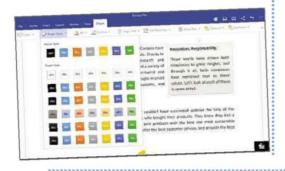

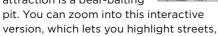

Need to Know

Google refuses Android patch for bug hitting a billion devices

What happened?

Google has said it won't fix a bug in Android, despite the fact that it will leave a billion phones and tablets vulnerable worldwide.

The bug, discovered by researchers at security firm Rapid7, is in a component called WebView, which Android uses to show web pages in apps that aren't browsers, such as when you click a link in Twitter. It affects versions of Android older than KitKat (4.4) which, Google claims, is now too old for the company to invest time and resources to fix.

"If the affected version is before 4.4, we generally do not develop the patches ourselves, but welcome patches with the report for consideration," Google told Rapid7.

This means that unless a security firm releases a fix approved by Google, any device running Android Jelly Bean (4.1 to 4.3) or a previous version will be at risk of being hacked. According to Google's statistics, around two-thirds of Android phones and tablets run Jelly Bean or earlier. Jelly Bean was released in mid-2012 and is used on more devices than its successor KitKat.

Google isn't just being difficult or trying to force users to buy newer devices. The affected part of WebView, the WebKit rendering engine, was replaced by a new system called Blink in Android 4.4 and 5. This makes it difficult for Google to update, because the company would have to issue an update via manufacturers and mobile operators. It has done this in the past, such as for last year's Heartbleed flaw, but it is a rare occurrence.

How will it affect you?

If you use a device that runs Jelly Bean or earlier, don't panic. Hackers haven't yet exploited the flaw, and it's unclear whether it is serious enough to let them infiltrate a device. However, with so many phones and tablets vulnerable, you can bet they will be trying to. If you were considering buying an Android 4.3 device, no matter how cheap it may now be, you should certainly think twice.

Because WebKit isn't being updated in older phones, it's a good move to download and use an alternative browser that will receive updates, rather than sticking with the standard Android one. However, this flaw is in WebView, which is also used by apps that aren't browsers. This means that you should follow safe web-surfing advice by being extra cautious when clicking a link you're unsure about.

It's also worth keeping an eye out for a security fix. Perhaps a company out there will see it is a smart way of winning the hearts and minds of a billion Android users.

What do we think?

What a disappointing response from Google. The tech giant seems to be

telling us that devices a mere two years old are too ancient to be fixed, yet its own numbers show that despite new smartphones selling in their millions every year, most of us are on older handsets. Maybe we just want to stick with what's familiar, or have inherited a handset when a friend or family member upgraded, or are waiting for an upgrade of our own. Either way, the onus is on Google to issue key updates. How did it manage to design a system that was so difficult to maintain?

Imagine the backlash if a major flaw were to hit Windows and Microsoft refused to update it. Indeed, last year Microsoft said it would stop issuing security updates for Windows XP which came out in 2001 - but when a major flaw was found soon afterwards, the company relented and released a patch to help protect users.

It's fair to point out that the problem isn't only with Google: manufacturers and mobile operators aren't very good at pushing out updates that are issued. But rather than give up, Google could use its considerable power to implement a better system. We think the company should be working harder to keep its many users safe.

David Cameron calls for ban on online encryption

What happened?

Prime Minister David Cameron called for a ban on encrypted online communication services. He said the UK can't "allow a means of communications which it simply isn't possible to read". His call followed the British government's initial response to the murders at the French satirical magazine Charlie Hebdo, which was to renew calls for the so-called Snooper's Charter, giving security forces greater access to our digital communications.

In response to Cameron's statement, many experts said that such a move would be impossible, and would affect more websites than just communications services. Banks, online shops and even Cameron's own government websites all use encryption.

While we're likely to get a clearer view of the Prime Minister's plans ahead of the upcoming election, many assume his target is messaging services such as Apple's iMessage, Snapchat and WhatsApp. Security forces find it hard to crack messages sent on these services because they are protected by end-to-end encryption. This protects the message from when it's sent to when it's received.

How will it affect you?

As Cameron and his party have given so little detail on these plans, it's



impossible to know what it means for users. It's hard to believe the UK would really ban a particular messaging app because security services couldn't access the data it's the sort of thing that happens in China or Iran. It's also hard to imagine Cameron going up against the biggest US tech firms. Time will tell if this pledge dies following the negative reaction, or survives to find a place in the Tory election campaign.

What do we think?

Banning encryption is simply daft. It's on a par with saying we can't have sturdy locks on our doors because it makes it harder for police to kick them in. The murders in Paris were horrific, but could a ban on encrypted messaging services have prevented them? We realise that security services should have a reasonable amount of freedom to monitor suspected terrorists online. but banning WhatsApp and other sites is as technologically difficult as it is morally wrong.

Google updates Translate app with real-time tools

What happened?

Google updated its translation tools, adding voice-to-text and sign reading to its app. This means you can now speak into the app and it will turn what you say into written text in a different language. You can also now point your phone's camera at a foreign-language sign and use the Word Lens tool to see the translation on screen. The tools come as part of an update to the Google Translate app, which is free for Android (bit.ly/transand363) and iOS (bit.ly/transios363).

The new features arrive a month or so after Microsoft released the beta version of its Skype Translator (bit.ly/skype363), which translates speech as you talk to someone, with only a few seconds delay. Currently it only translates between English and Spanish, but Microsoft intends it to work with 40 languages in all, including Klingon from Star Trek.

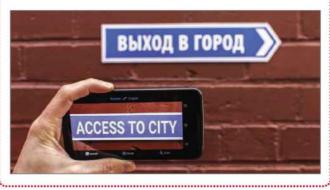
How will it affect you?

If you already have Google Translate on your

smartphone, it should automatically update to the latest version featuring the new tools. To use the voice tool, tap the mic icon and start speaking. Google Translate will automatically recognise what language you're speaking. To access the Word Lens tool in the app, tap the camera icon and point your phone's lens at the text you want to translate. Google will translate the text directly on the image, so you'll see how the words fit into the context on a sign or menu, making it easier to read. Best of all, you don't need a data connection for the tool to work.

What do we think?

The computing power in our phones continues to astound. Making on-the-go translations from a handheld device is a ridiculously powerful tool – one that makes wandering a foreign city and ordering from a local menu so much easier. With such tools, it's easy to imagine a world where differences in language no longer matter. Not bad for a free app!





BT faces pricing test from Ofcom

What happened?

BT's broadband prices could be forced up after the telecommunications watchdog Ofcom revealed a new test designed to ensure fair competition among ISPs. BT sells access to its network infrastructure to rival broadband providers, some of which have complained that it is charging too much, making it impossible for them to make enough profit. In response, Ofcom has come up with a new margin-pricing formula: if the difference between what BT charges its competitors for access to its network and what it charges its own customers is too small, the regulator will force it to change its pricing.

The test still has to be approved by the EU, but BT's pricing models would currently pass the existing criteria. That could change in the future, not least because broadband pricing isn't as simple as merely paying for a connection. Many customers bundle television services and mobile contracts, both of which raise issues for BT, which offers BT Sport television for free to its broadband customers and is in talks to buy mobile operator EE.

How will it affect you?

If BT fails the margin-pricing test, it will be forced to raise its own prices, cut what it charges rivals or perform a combination of both. Given the



competitive pricing in the UK broadband market, it seems unlikely that BT would want to raise its own prices in the short term, and it wouldn't be able to make changes to existing contracts without risking losing customers. Indeed, if any communications provider raises prices mid-contract, you are allowed to cancel your contract without paying a penalty.

However, if BT cuts prices for rival ISPs, that doesn't mean you will pay less for broadband. This test is about protecting margins for ISPs using BT's network, so retail prices will probably stay the same in the short term.

What seems more likely to change is BT's ability to bundle freebies such as BT Sport and offer discounts on mobile contracts, so we may see fewer compelling offers from the company.

What do we think?

Ofcom is right to keep watch over the broadband market, because BT holds significant power thanks to its infrastructure. However, this test seems designed to ensure ISPs make enough money, rather than keep prices low for customers. Surely Ofcom's job is to protect consumers, not increase the profits of massive corporations.



Asus EeeBook X205TA bit.ly/asus363

We published a Group Test of Windows 8.1 laptops in Issue 362 of Web User (bit.ly/webuser362) and while the Asus EeeBook X205TA doesn't rival any of our award winners, it's a good Windows laptop for such a low price (£179).

The first thing that impressed us was the laptop's build quality. It doesn't feel cheap and nasty, like some budget models, and we liked its rounded corners and squared edges. Weighing in at 908g, it's also one of the lightest laptops we've ever tested. The screen isn't particularly brilliant, but its 1,366 x 768-pixel display is no worse than those found on other cheap laptops.

The keyboard is surprisingly



capable and the keys feel light, responsive and not at all spongy. The touchpad is good, too, and makes navigating Windows and using multitouch gestures easy.

The laptop has an impressive range of connections, with two USB ports, a microSD slot, a headphone jack and micro HDMI port, as well as Bluetooth and 802.11n Wi-Fi.

Inside, the laptop has a 1.3GHz Intel Atom Z3735F processor, which is more common in cheap Windows tablets. This caused us some initial concern, but the EeeBook X205TA performed fairly well in our multimedia tests, considering its low price. Despite having just 2GB of memory, it'll run a browser with plenty of tabs open and handle all the Microsoft Office programs without any fuss. However, it doesn't cope well with more challenging tasks such as video and photo editing.

The biggest problem for us was that installing Chrome and Microsoft Office on its 32GB eMMC drive left only about 10GB free. Thankfully, you get a year's free subscription to Office 365 and 1TB of OneDrive storage (worth £60), so there's plenty of space in the cloud to store your files.

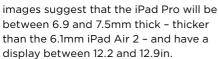

Is Apple set to release a larger iPad?

There's always an iPad rumour kicking around, and the latest one claims that Apple may be working on a larger, 12in model to release in the spring of this year.

Reports of the Apple iPad Pro or iPad Air Plus have popped up on lots of websites, with leaked photos of the exterior posted on nowhereelse.fr. The



Other reports suggest Apple may be trying to compete with Microsoft's Surface tablets by having the iPad Pro run OS X Yosemite, the operating system that runs on Apple's Mac computers, rather than iOS, which normally runs on its tablets and smartphones. While that seems unlikely, the Macotakara website (www

.macotakara.jp) put forward another rumour - that the 12in tablet will have a detachable keyboard, like the Surface

Industry analyst Ming-Chi Kuo of KGI Securities suggested that a larger iPad might come with a stylus, despite Steve

Jobs' previous assertion that a tablet which requires a pen is a sign that the manufacturer "blew it". That said, an iPad with a stylus would be handy for designers and business users. Last year, Apple signed a deal with IBM to help push its tablet to the corporate market.

We'll have to wait until at least April to find out if any of these rumours are correct, because that's the earliest release date mentioned in the reports.

A larger iPad with a stylus would be a major departure for Apple, but the number of rumours and leaks suggest it could be a real possibility. And it's worth remembering that the rumours of Apple messing with the size of its best-selling smartphone seemed very unlikely, until the company unveiled the larger iPhone 6.

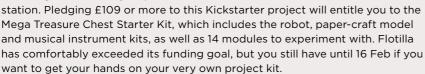

Apple laptops vulnerable to 'undetectable' virus

A researcher in the US has discovered a way to install a virus on Apple laptops that cannot be detected or removed. For the Thunderstrike virus to install, an attacker needs access to the MacBook's Thunderbolt port, which at least means you can't catch it from the internet. The virus is then transferred onto the boot ROM (the chip that contains the information the computer needs to start up), where it can't be detected by regular security software. Even removing the hard drive won't clean it up.

PATCH TUESDAY: January

Microsoft's Patch Tuesday update for January included eight updates: one Critical and seven Important. The Critical update secures a problem with Microsoft's Telnet software, which is a command-line tool for controlling PCs remotely. A hacker could have used this exploit to gain access to any PC with Telnet installed.

Four of the seven Important patches are related to a problem with the elevation of privileges, whereby a

rogue program could put itself into Administrator mode without notifying the user. If this happened, the program could make potentially harmful changes to the PC without issuing the usual warnings.

The other three updates fix security flaws that could have been used to bypass some of Windows' built-in security tools or used in denial-ofservice attacks. bit.ly/patch363

Manchester. Thieves were using the camera on a discontinued version of Apple's portable music player to film people entering their PIN codes. A fake front attached to the card slot trapped victims' cards so that only the thieves could retrieve them. It is very difficult to identify those responsible for targeted attacks because the

hackers can cover their tracks and deliberately mislead investigators.

To avoid becoming victims of these attacks, we should all be careful about what we do online and take steps to stay secure. This may mean using technology, such as internet security software and file encryption; changing how we operate online, by using unique, complex passwords for all our online accounts; and limiting what we post on social networks.

Does the end of Windows 7 support mean I have to upgrade my PC? Jacob Jones, via email

No. Microsoft has moved Windows 7 from 'mainstream

support' to 'extended support'. This means that there will be no new features added to Windows 7, and you can no longer get free support. However, Microsoft will continue to provide critical security patches for the operating system until January 2020.

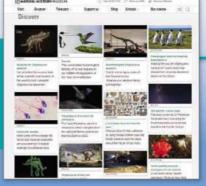

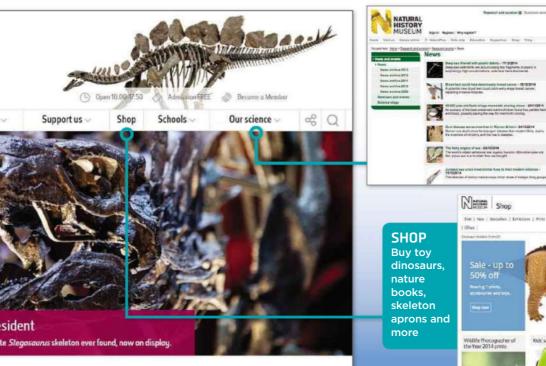

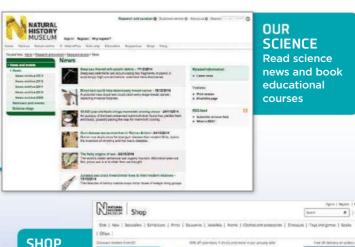

Skiplagged lets you book the latter and simply abandon the trip in Chicago. The site is currently being sued by airlines, so book now while you have the chance. 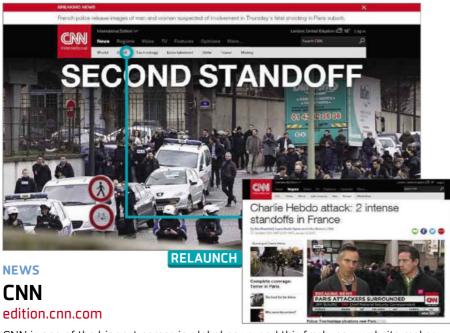

Back up your website

What's the easiest way to transfer a domain from one host to another?

Most hosting companies let you transfer domains using their control panel, without having to contact the support team. Transfer rules vary depending on the extension. With .com, for example, you usually just need to unlock the domain in the control panel to get an authorisation code. It can take up to 10 days to transfer. For .uk domains, however, you just need to update your Internet Provider Security (IPS) tag and your domain will be transferred immediately. Don't forget to make sure that your hosting provider supports the domain extension you want to transfer. At OVH, for instance, we support more than 500.

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We test and compare the latest products

Anti-virus software

Andy Shaw analyses all the anti-virus tests conducted by Dennis Technology Labs in 2014 to find out which security software gave the best year-round protection

ost anti-virus tests aren't accurate enough because they only show how good a program is at stopping viruses from getting through to a PC on the specific occasion when the test takes place. Our own anti-virus testing facility (Dennis Technology Labs, www.dennistechnologylabs .com) carries out tests throughout the year, exposing anti-virus programs to new threats found on dodgy websites as they appear.

The results of these tests are published quarterly. But a product that does well in one set of tests may not necessarily excel in another, so we've taken all four test results from 2014 and brought them together, to give you an idea of which products offered the best year-round protection. The award winners of this Group Test aren't one-off wonders, specially built to blitz a particular test, but solid, reliable security programs that provide a consistent level of PC protection.



HOW WE TESTED

Dennis Technology Labs carries out a cycle of three-month tests, every quarter. These tests are split into two areas: the first examines the quality of protection provided by each security product when faced with the kind of malware you might normally encounter while browsing the web; the second tests the security software for false positives, which is when a security

program mistakenly prevents your PC from installing safe software.

We installed each security product on an identical PC running Windows 7. We then used each PC to visit 100 websites, all of which have been found to contain live malware. These are real sites with real malware, not sites we've mocked up ourselves. We recorded how each product reacted to the

malware it found, logging any changes made to the PC's Registry and file system. We also downloaded a suite of 100 legitimate programs to test how good the security programs were at allowing safe software to install unhindered.

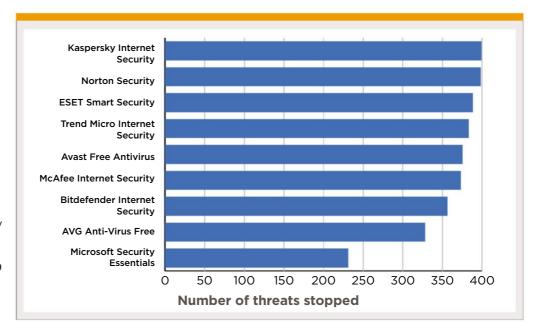


Anti-malware protection scores

The chart on the right shows the overall level of malware protection provided by each anti-virus product when exposed to the 400 compromised websites (100 sites in each of the quarterly tests). This result combines defended and neutralised results (which we look at more closely in the section below), showing the general level of protection recorded for each product.

Kaspersky Internet Security came top with a phenomenal performance. In the four tests, it defended against 399 of the 400 threats discovered, letting through just one malicious program during our July-September 2014 test.

Norton Security came a remarkably close second, letting through just two malicious files - one between January and March, and the



other in the same July-September test as Kaspersky's.

Third place went to ESET Smart Security, which only missed 12 of the malicious

programs it was exposed to. The best performing free program was Avast, which came fifth behind Trend Micro Internet Security, letting through 25 threats

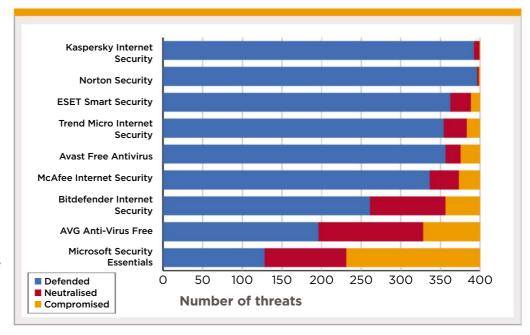
over the course of the year. The worst performer in our group was Microsoft Security Essentials, which only protected against 231 of the 400 threats.

Anti-malware protection details

Even if a security program let through a malicious program onto the test computer, its protection scores weren't affected as long as the threat was then neutralised by a scan. It's worth making a detailed analysis of these results, particularly at the top of the group.

Although Kaspersky managed to protect the test PC from more threats than Norton overall, the latter offers a better front-line defence, because only four malicious programs got past its barriers. Two of these were neutralised afterwards by a scan. Kaspersky, on the other hand, let eight malicious programs through its first line of defence, but then redeemed itself by removing seven of them through scanning.

Trend Micro and Avast have a similar tale to tell in the fight for fourth and fifth place. Avast reached its total score by initially blocking 356 malicious programs, but



neutralised another 19 on scanning. Trend Micro's blocks weren't as strong, stopping 354 malicious programs, but it then removed 29 with its scanner.

At the bottom of the group, the number of threats defended against drops

significantly, with the software relying on scanners to sweep up more of the problems. Microsoft Security Essentials only blocked 128 of the 400 malicious programs, going on to remove another 103 when scanning, but still remained compromised by

169 programs.

AVG Anti-Virus Free performed better but remained second from bottom. It blocked 196 threats outright and removed another 132 on scanning. However, this still left 72 threats on the test PC.

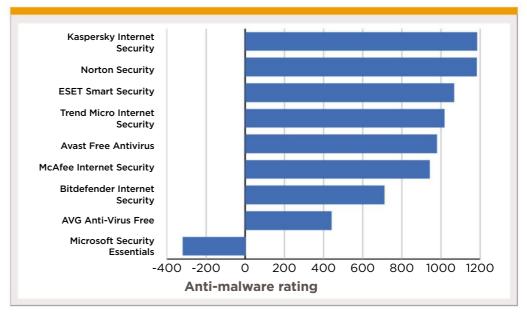


Overall anti-malware ratings

The speed with which an anti-virus program detects and removes a threat affects its overall ratings in our tests. If the software completely defended against a threat, we award it three points; if the threat was neutralised and the PC was returned to the exact state it was in before the infection occurred, we award two points; and for stopping a threat from running but not returning the PC back to its previous state, we give 1 point. We take five points away from any product for each threat it fails to detect.

This means that a security program can score a maximum of 1.200 to a minimum of -2,000 points across the four tests.

The faster a product is at stopping threats, the higher it scores, and our test results are presented in the protection-ratings chart,



above.

Kaspersky and Norton came top with 1,183 and 1,182 points respectively. The former edged ahead because it only let through one malicious program, rather than two, but the latter fought back because its first line of defence put in the best performance.

ESET and Trend Micro remain in third (1,066) and fourth (1,018) place, with Avast putting in the best results for free software in

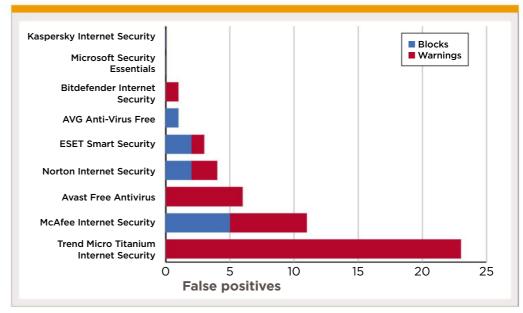
fifth place with 978 points. AVG Free came second from last with 441 points. At the bottom again was Microsoft Security Essentials, which ended up with -318 points because of the number of threats it failed to spot.

False positives

The aim of anti-virus is to stop malware getting onto your PC, but that's no good if it also blocks everything else. Your PC still has to download and run safe software, so we submit each security program to a false-positive test to check that safe software is allowed to install and run, and the program doesn't blanketblock everything it comes across.

Security software either blocks software outright or warns you of potential risks: the former makes the program unobtrusive, but doesn't give you a chance to override its decisions; while the latter gives you more control but may become annoying if there are constant requests to grant permission. Over the four tests, we attempted to install 400 safe programs (100 in each test) and our chart, above right, makes a distinction between the two levels of blocking.

Kaspersky and Microsoft



got the best results by letting all our legitimate software through without a single block, all year. For Kaspersky, with its top results in blocking malicious software, this gave proof of an efficient and accurate security program. Microsoft's result is less impressive because its lax performance in our antimalware tests show it will let almost anything through.

AVG is the best free program for avoiding unnecessary alarms. It blocked just one legitimate program over the course of the year, though it did this without warning. Bitdefender also blocked just one program, but it warned us

that it was doing so. ESET and Norton blocked fewer than five programs, while Avast slipped to six, though all were warnings rather than unannounced blocks. The worst performers were McAfee with 11 false positives and Trend Micro with 23, though these were all warnings rather than blocks.

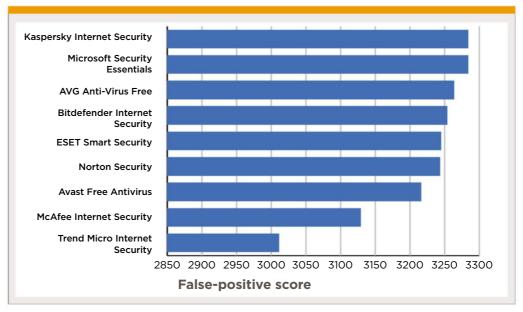


False-positive results

When testing security programs for false positives, it's important to note that not all software is equal, so we further analyse our scores to take into account the type of software that's blocked.

We add modifiers to the score based on how wellknown the blocked program is, by checking the number of weekly downloads it has on Download.com. Most of the legitimate programs we used for our false-positives test had been downloaded more than 20,000 times that week, so the software should have had no problems recognising them. For this reason, these popular programs are given a high weighting in our scores, so any security program that blocks one will be docked maximum points.

At the other end of the scale, we also use a handful of programs that have rarely been downloaded - less than



25 times that week. The punishment for blocking one of these lesser-known programs isn't so harsh. We also use a spread of programs between these two extremes, and weight the results depending on the method by

which the legitimate program was blocked.

Our rating system didn't change the order of the results, with Kaspersky and Microsoft again topping the chart. Because they let all our software through, they

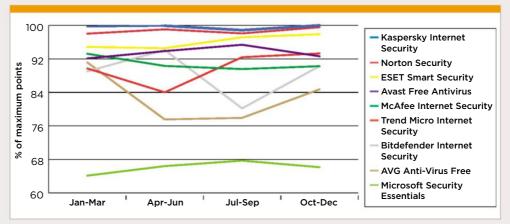
received maximum points (3284). AVG remains the best free program in third place, with Trend Micro's software at the bottom of the chart. because it put up the most warnings about legitimate software.

PROTECTION OVER THE YEAR

This test set out to show which products produced the best, most consistent protection over 2014. The chart on the right shows the overall ratings for each quarter, taking into account both malware protection and false-positive scores, so you can see how they fluctuated over time. The chart's vertical axis represents a percentage score, showing how close each product came to a perfect performance in each of the four tests.

Kaspersky and Norton both sit at the top of the chart, barely dropping below the maximum ratings, though Kaspersky always performed a little better. ESET is also impressive, climbing above 95 per cent after the first half of the

For a free program, Avast does very well. It peaked in our Jul-Sept test and was beaten by McAfee,



Bitdefender and Trend Micro in individual tests, but it didn't experience the significant slumps that these three paid-for programs suffered.

AVG Anti-Virus Free started the year better than it ended it, but a poor mid-year slump affected its overall score, while Microsoft Security Essentials languished at the bottom of the chart throughout.



Overall anti-malware ratings

Our rating for an anti-virus program's overall accuracy is based on the software's performance in all the other tests, brought together in the chart on the right. The maximum score possible is 4,484, spread across the four tests, and the points here represent the total results for the year in one convenient rating. This takes into account how good each program is at blocking malware and recognising legitimate software.

Top of the chart is Kaspersky, with 4,467 points. This product did so well in all our tests that it's no surprise to see it come first in our overall results. It achieved a superb record of protection, letting through just one piece of malware during all four tests. Its ability to recognise legitimate software and allow it to run was perfect.

Norton comes a very close second, proving almost as reliable as Kaspersky. It let through two malicious programs, and stumbled over four that were legitimate, but



this is still an excellent score, and demonstrates how high expectations are at the top. Our third-place slot is taken by ESET Smart Security, which also put in a great performance with a score of 4.311 points.

The best free product is Avast, which beat several

paid-for security programs to come fifth, accruing 4,194 points in our tests. Although it only managed to rank in the bottom half of the group for false-positive tests, it's a testament to its excellent performance in the antimalware tests that it came so high in the overall results.

The other free products in our tests - AVG Anti-Virus Free and Microsoft Security Essentials - didn't fare so well, taking the bottom two places in this group. AVG only managed 3,705 points over all the tests, while Microsoft performed terribly overall, with 2,966 points.

Conclusion

It's no surprise that, for its 2014 performance in our tests, our Gold Award goes to Kaspersky Internet Security. Kaspersky came top of all four of the quarterly tests, providing a level of security that's simply unprecedented. With that kind of performance in 2014, there's nothing to stand in the way of us recommending it for 2015.

Norton Security comes a very close second to Kaspersky, and fully deserves our Silver Award. If Kaspersky wasn't in the running, we'd have no hesitation in recommending Norton, because it still did a brilliant job of protecting our PC during our tests.

We're awarding our Bronze Award to Avast Free Antivirus. Although ESET Smart Security performed better over the year, it's another paid-for product, while Avast costs nothing. If you're happy to part with your money, one



of the paid-for options should offer you the best protection over the coming year, but if you're after a free product, opt for Avast, which performed significantly better than AVG and Microsoft's free software.

As well as protecting your files, GuardAxon can encrypt text, letting you pass on secret coded messages to friends - provided they have a copy of the software and know the cipher version and mode you're using.

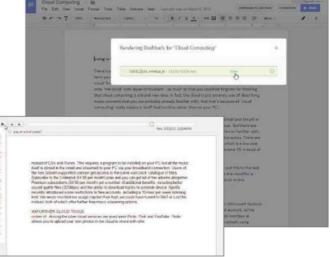


CHROME

View Google Docs revision history with Draftback

Whether you're typing a letter, writing your life story or trying to produce your first novel, it can be useful - and fascinating - to find out more about how you write. Draftback (bit.ly/ draft363) uses Google Docs' revision history data to build a video showing all the changes you made as you produced the document. It can be a bit eerie - it's almost as if somebody was filming over your shoulder as you worked. But it can help you gain valuable insight into the decisions and problems you face when you write.

Once the add-on has installed, open a document in Google Drive and you'll see a Draftback button on the top toolbar. Click this and Draftback will begin rendering the revisions. Once it has finished, click View and watch as the writing process is magically recreated on-screen. The only hitch is that it doesn't work as well with documents that haven't been composed in Google Docs, such as those written in Word.



Fix Chrome with Google's Software Removal Tool

If Chrome has started behaving oddly or you suspect that spyware may have wormed its way into your browser, then try running Google's new Software Removal Tool (www.google.com/ chrome/srt). It searches your browser for suspicious software and removes any it finds. When you run the tool, you're also offered the option to reset Chrome's settings. This will return everything, including your homepage and search engine, to their defaults and disable all your extensions, but it's a good way to troubleshoot any problems you've been experiencing.



Search your open tabs

If you often have a lot of tabs open at the same time, it can be difficult to find a specific page among all the others. Chrome Tab Search (bit.ly/tab363) provides a quick and easy way to search your browser tabs and locate the one you want. Press Ctrl+O on your keyboard to bring up a search box, then type the name of the page you're looking for. Any relevant results will



appear, and you simply click the one you want to switch to it.

Hide tabs until you need

Another way to deal with an overload of tabs is to install Tab Snooze (bit.lv/ snooze363). This extension lets you put tabs you're not using to 'sleep' until they're needed again - at which point they'll magically reappear. Installing Tab Snooze puts a crescent-moon icon on your toolbar. Click this (or use the keyboard shortcut Alt+S) while you're on a tab to send it to sleep until a time

of your choosing. You can change the snooze times by rightclicking the moon icon, selecting Options and picking one of the choices. You can also review any snoozed tabs.

Automatically convert units and currencies There's no shortage of online unit-

and currency-conversion sites, but

this tool goes one step further by automatically converting units on web pages to your preferred values. Install AutoConvert (bit.ly/ convert363) and select your preferred units and currencies (you can change these at any time by right-clicking the AutoConvert toolbar icon and selecting Options). When you visit a page displaying foreign currencies or units, roll your mouse over the prices to see them

instantly converted to your chosen currency. AutoConvert doesn't work with every website but, when it does, it's a great time-saver.

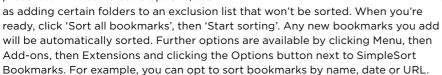

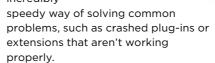

It provides a fast, simple way to scramble text with military-grade AES encryption. Install the add-on and, next time you're typing something, right-click it and select Encrypt from the context menu. Text can be decrypted from the same menu with a quick right-click. Alternatively, you can set the tool to decrypt automatically by right-clicking its toolbar icon and selecting Settings, then clicking the Decrypt tab. CryptoData also works with Thunderbird.



Instantly restart Firefox

Sometimes the simplest tools are the most useful. Fox Restart (bit.ly/fox363) adds a toolbar (and menu) button that restarts the browser whenever you click it. This might not sound like the most earthshattering innovation, but it's an incredibly



Convert links into text with Link Stun

Another simple tool that's highly effective is Link Stun (bit.ly/stun363), which lets you temporarily disable links on web pages with a quick right-click. This stops you accidentally activating a link or copying a whole URL when you're selecting a section of text on a web page. Link Stun converts links to plain text, letting you

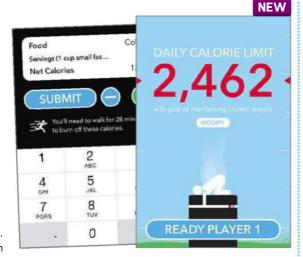

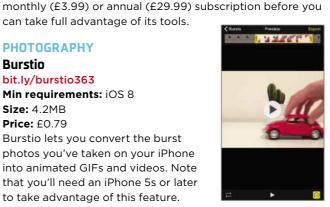

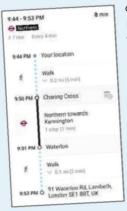


X Don't install...

Google Maps

of travel from driving, public transport, cycling or walking. If you happen to own a car, a bus pass, a bike and pair of shoes, you'll have to click through each tab to compare the results. We can't fault Google Maps' extensive coverage, but its tools could do with a refresh.

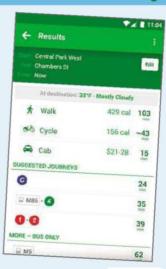
Citymapper

First off, we have to warn you that in the UK, Citymapper only works in London. However, when you are visiting the capital, this free app is a much better option than Google Maps. It estimates how long each form of transport will take, along with how much money each public transport option costs (very important, given how expensive London transport is). Drivers should tap the traffic-light icon on the map to see which roads are busiest. Plus, you can save default routes for home and work, which lets you find your way to and from those locations with a single click. It also works in other major capitals,

including Paris, Barcelona, New York and Rome.





Best of the Consumer Electronics Show 2015

Want a glimpse of technology's immediate and long-term future? David Crookes rounds up some of the most interesting devices showcased at the annual gathering in Las Vegas



SONY WALKMAN NW-ZX2

Why is it interesting?

The instantly recognisable name suggests that Sony hopes the NW-ZX2 will be as revolutionary as its portable cassette-player was in the Eighties. Aimed at serious audiophiles, it offers hi-res sound that retains more detail during the analogue-to-digital conversion process and supports digital music files up to 192Khz/24 bits. It provides high-quality wireless audio via Bluetooth, along with at least 128GB of storage space and a

battery that lasts for 60 hours.

When's it out?

The new Walkman is out now.

How much will it cost?

A staggering £949.

Do I really need one?

If you really love your music, then yes. Bear in mind that it doesn't come with head- or earphones, though.

STOREDOT BATTERY

www.store-dot.com

Why is it interesting?

It's a fast battery charger that can power up a mobile phone from empty to full in 30 seconds and charge an electric car in a blistering three minutes. The technology uses naturally occurring organic compounds called peptides.

When's it out?

StoreDot expects the chargers to be on sale in 2017

How much will it cost?

Indications are that it will cost as little as £20.

Do I really need it?

Yes. One of the main problems with smartphones is their tendency to lose power quickly and then take too long to charge.

SONY BRAVIA 4K ULTRA HD TV bit.ly/brav363

Why is it interesting?

Since 3D televisions failed to catch on, manufacturers are once again focused on picture quality, which means affordable, cutting-edge 4K displays with a resolution four times higher than Full HD. Sony unveiled 12 Ultra HD TVs at CES and claims that the 55in and 65in X90C series are the world's thinnest, measuring just 4.9mm in depth.

The TVs are powered by a new chip called the 4K Processor X1, which Sony says offers the "best-ever" clarity, colour and contrast. They also come with Android TV built-in, so they are ready to beam films, shows and photos from your smartphone or laptop via Google Cast. It also means you can use content from

Google Play, which gives access to films, music and apps. In future, the televisions will be able to stream PlayStation 3 games from the cloud in the UK, thanks to a new service called PlayStation Now.

When's it out?

Sony launched its new range in February 2015

How much will it cost?

Sony didn't announce the pricing at CES, but expect to pay a few thousand for the top-end model.

Do I really need one?

The image quality of 4K TVs is amazingly sharp, so if you are ready to upgrade



your television, then 4K will future-proof your set. While no TV channels currently broadcast in 4K, these televisions make 1080p content shine. Netflix offers 4K content for an extra £2 per month for new customers (and inclusive for existing ones). You will need a good broadband connection, though. Blu-rays are coming soon (see Panasonic's announcement, opposite page, top-left).

PANASONIC 4K BLU-RAY PLAYER

Why is it interesting?

Panasonic has made the world's first 4K Blu-ray player. It can reproduce moving images at a resolution of 3,840 x 2,160 pixels and supports High Dynamic Range, which improves an image's brightness peak.

When's it out?

Panasonic didn't specify a date but, given that Ultra HD Blu-ray discs are promised by Christmas, we would expect to see the player later this year.

How much will it cost?

Again, no details were forthcoming on price.

Do I really need it?

Yes - if you have a 4K TV, love movies and want to see them in the very best quality. Dual- or triple-layer Ultra HD discs play at 60fps (frames per second), as opposed to 40fps on standard Blu-rays, and will look astounding.

AUDI/LG SMARTWATCH

Why is it interesting?

Think back to the the most compelling reason for watching the Eighties' TV show Knight Rider, which was Michael Knight (David Hasselhoff) controlling his car, KITT, using nothing more than a smartwatch. Taking inspiration from that, LG has worked with Audi to produce an NFCcompatible watch that can unlock a vehicle's doors. start its engine and drive it - as was shown in a startling demonstration of an Audi Prologue. The project is still very much at the prototype stage with both LG and Audi being vague about the specifics, but two things are certain: it looks beautiful and it runs webOS, which gives it a very clear, user-friendly interface.

How much will it cost?

There has been no indication of price, but



perhaps it will be bundled with a car.

When's it out?

Again, details are very sketchy, with no official release information from either LG or Audi.

Do I really need one?

Yes, if only for the novelty factor. Then again, as smartwatches become more popular, car-control apps could become available for all kinds of different devices.

AUGUST CONNECT

Why is it interesting?

Last October, August released Smart Lock - a device that allows you to use a Bluetooth-enabled smartphone to unlock the door of your home. At CES,

it announced that the device will connect to the internet using an add-on called Connect This lets users unlock

doors

remotely,

perhaps to let someone in while you are at work or away on holiday. More interestingly, Smart Lock now works with Nest. It can pair up with a Nest Learning Thermometer so that, when you lock or unlock the doors of your home, the house can automatically cool down or warm up.

When's it out?

August Connect will be

available from February.

How much will it cost?

Smart Lock costs \$249.99 with Connect costing \$49.99.



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Do I really need one?

If you have the right kind of door, then this system has the potential to make life much easier when you're away from home. Note that Smart Lock only works on doors with single-cylinder deadbolts (common in North America): it doesn't work with mortise or Eurostyle cylinders. A list of compatible deadbolts can be found at bit.ly/bolt363.

SEER HEADSET

www.caputer.com

Why is it interesting?

Billed as the "world's first truly immersive augmented-reality helmet", Seer may exist only as a 3D-printed prototype right now but it promises much - not least the ability to make the wearer look like Marvel's Iron Man.

By inserting a 6in smartphone into a slot (which, incidentally, just edges out the iPhone 6 Plus), the headset uses mirrors and a heads-up display to overlay images onto a visor. You control it by clenching your jaw and it also responds to head movements. Caputer, the company that makes it, says Seer can mimic a 200in screen and give a 100-degree field of vision.



When's it out?

Seer will be launched as a Kickstarter project.

How much will it cost?

It is not known at this stage but "early bird" special offers are promised.

Do I really need one?

Maybe not, but it does offer many exciting possibilities, with Caputer claiming it will benefit navigation and have applications within medicine and engineering.





You use a browser every time you go online, but are you getting the most out of it? Wayne Williams presents 27 top tips, tricks and add-ons to improve Chrome, Firefox, IE, Opera, and more.

ost people browse the web without giving too much thought to the software that makes it possible. Web browsers are designed to display content and let you navigate a site as quickly and seamlessly as possible. You can customise your browser by installing add-ons to provide extra tools and features, and improve performance, but there are also lots of hidden and little-known tweaks you can use to tailor the software

further.

Over the following five pages, we'll show you the best ways to get the most from your browser, including adding a superior bookmarks manager to Chrome, checking for malicious web links in Firefox, accessing experimental features in the next version of Internet Explorer and blocking adverts in Opera. We'll also throw in a few tricks for the Pale Moon and Maxthon browsers.

HACK CHROME

Access experimental features

Google groups all its experimental features in a single page. To view them, type chrome: flags into the address bar and hit Enter. Google warns that these experiments "may bite" and also change, break, or disappear at any time. Current experiments include enabling fast closing of tabs and windows, forcing hardware acceleration, displaying a frame-rate counter and turning on automatic spelling correction.



Get a better bookmarks manager

Chrome's bookmarks manager is a little on the basic side, so if you want a better way to manage your favourite sites, try Google's Bookmark Manager (bit.ly/ googlebm363). The add-on displays your bookmarks as colourful tiles, and you can add an image and a note when vou bookmark future sites. You can also organise bookmarks by topic, and share collections with friends.



Launch Chrome in Incognito mode

Chrome's Incognito mode can come in handy if you don't want your browsing history recorded for certain sites. You can create a shortcut for Incognito mode on your Desktop. Navigate to Chrome's installation directory

C:\Program Files (x86)\Google\ Chrome\Application

then right-click Chrome.exe and select



Send To, Desktop. Right-click the new shortcut on the Desktop and select Properties. At the end of the Target field, add a space after the quote and type -incognito. Apply and OK it.

Re-enable plug-ins blocked by Google

Last year, Google began blocking most NPAPI (Netscape Plugin Application Programming Interface) plug-ins in Chrome. It's doing this for stability and security reasons, but it's frustrating if you want to run a plug-in such as Silverlight, Java, or Unity, and are happy to take responsibility for your actions. Until September 2015, you can still activate these plug-ins via the address bar, and Google plans to add an override that will let you re-enable NPAPI support. You'll be able to access it by typing chrome:flags/#enablenpapi into the address bar, and hitting Enter (it's not currently there, but is coming soon). After September, NPAPI plug-ins will be permanently blocked.

Use Chrome for notes

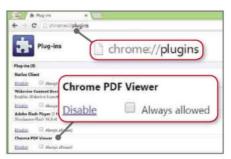
If you want to copy content from one or more websites to use later, you don't need to open another application such as Notepad or Word - you can just use Chrome. Type data:text/html, <html contenteditable> into the address bar and hit Enter. You can now type and paste whatever you like in that tab. To save the contents, press Ctrl+S. In the Save dialogue box, replace the



file's '.html' extension with '.txt'. This trick also works in Firefox.

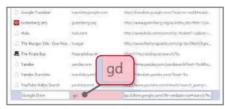
Download PDF files directly

When you click a PDF link in Chrome, the file will display in your browser. If you'd rather download the PDF - so you can view it in a different program or share it - just disable the built-in viewer. Type chrome:plugins into the address bar and hit Enter. Find the entry for the Chrome PDF Viewer and disable it.



Search Google Drive in Chrome

You can use Chrome to search for files stored in Google Drive by adding a dedicated search engine to the browser. Click the menu button and go to Settings. Under Search, click 'Manage search engines', scroll down and type Google Drive in the 'Add a new search engine' box. Enter a keyword, such as 'gd' and in the URL box, type http://drive.google. com/?hl=en&tab=bo#search/%s. Click Done. When you want to look for files in Google Drive, type qd into the search bar and hit the Tab key. Then type some or all of the filename to find an item.



Print wirelessly

You can use Chrome to send content to any printer wirelessly, including nonwireless models. Click the Menu button in the browser and select Settings. Click





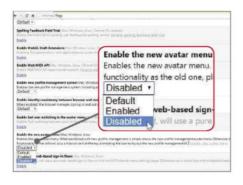
the 'Show advanced settings' link at the bottom, then scroll down to Google Cloud Print. Click the Manage button, then click 'Add printers' on the Devices screen to display a list of all the available printers on your network. Select the one you want and click 'Add printer(s)'. Now, open a web page or Google Doc in any Chrome browser on any device on your network (you'll need to be signed into your Google account). When you hit Print, your printer should be listed.

Disable Chrome's New User menu

Chrome lets you create profiles for multiple users, which is handy if you share



computers and browsers. However, Chrome lets you manage these profiles



by adding a menu in the top-right corner, which may not be to everyone's taste. Fortunately, it's easily disabled. Type chrome: flags into the address bar, hit Enter and locate 'Enable new profile management system'. Change this to Disabled, then restart Chrome.

If you still want to be able to switch

between users, you may prefer the old version of the New User menu. Search for 'Enable the new avatar menu' on the



chrome:flags page and disable that instead, then restart Chrome.

Add a Home button to Chrome

Clicking the Home button in your browser takes you straight to the default homepage. It's a useful feature, but Chrome has it disabled by default. To reinstate the Home button (it appears



bar), click the Menu button, open Settings and, under Appearance, tick



'Show Home button'. This brings up an option to change your homepage; just click the Change link and choose either 'Use the New Tab page' or enter the URL of the homepage you want in the 'Open this page:' box.

Speed up browsing with Data Compression Proxy

Chrome on Android lets you use a data-compression proxy to save bandwidth and speed up browsing. The recently updated Data Compression Proxy (bit.ly/chromedcp363) add-on for Chrome also offers ad-blocking; statistics that show what difference the add-on is making (if any); and the ability to add sites to a bypass list, so they load as normal without using the proxy.



Use Chrome to remotely access your home PC

Chrome Remote Desktop (bit.ly/ chromerd363) offers a simple way of accessing another computer over the internet - useful if you need to securely copy files between home and work machines, for example. There are apps available for Android (bit.ly/chromerd android363) and iOS (bit.ly/chromerdios 363), which launched in January. Install the add-on in Chrome on your devices and follow our Mini Workshop, below.



MINI WORKSHOP | Remotely access your PC from an iPad



Install the Chrome Remote Desktop add-on (bit.ly/chromerd363) on your desktop PC and launch it. You'll be prompted to grant extended access permissions to your computer. Once that's done, you'll be given the option of connecting to someone else's computer (to provide remote support) 🚺 or your own, from anywhere. 🔼



Select the option to access your computers and click 'Enable remote connections'. The Host installer will download. Run this and click OK. You will now need to enter a PIN 11 of at least six digits. Once you've confirmed your account and PIN, you're all set. Install the Chrome Remote Desktop app on your iPad (bit.ly/chromerdios363).



Launch the app and sign in with the same Google account you used on your PC. Tap your computer name and enter the PIN you set up earlier. Click Connect, and you'll be able to see and control your PC. Click the mouse button 11 to toggle the cursor on or off. Tap the button for the virtual keyboard 2 to open it.



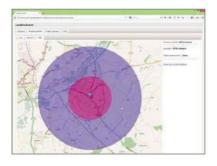
HACK FIREFOX

Hide your location

Websites sometimes want to know where vou're browsing from, which is fine for certain sites - Google



Maps, for example - but you probably don't want to share your exact location with every site you visit. The Location Guard add-on for Firefox (bit.ly/locguard363) disguises your location by adding confusing information (called "noise"). When you visit a site that wants to know where you are, the Location Guard button appears. Just click it to set one of three privacy levels, or to turn it off.



Get alerted when web pages update

Not all websites offer an RSS feed and it can be tiresome to have to keep refreshing a page if you're waiting for new content to appear. Install the Update Scanner (bit.ly/ updatescan363) add-on, tell it which websites to monitor and it will run in the background, checking for updates. When it detects a change, it will notify you in a pop-up. Our Mini Workshop on the right shows you how to use it.



Move the toolbar to the bottom

Browsers place the menu bar at the

top of the screen, but you can move it to the bottom if you want to. Install the Bottom UI extension in Firefox (bit.ly/bottomui363) and the top section of the browser, complete with address bar and open tabs, will appear at the bottom. It takes a while to get used to, but it works well. You don't have to restart Firefox for it to take effect.



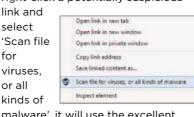
Protect your settings

Firefox is highly configurable but once you've got it set up exactly how you want it, the last thing you need is an extension or toolbar making unexpected changes. Preferences Monitor (bit.ly/ prefmon363) keeps an eye on any changes that occur to browser settings, and can undo them. If you're happy with the changes being made, you can tell the add-on to allow them.



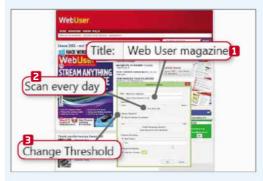
Check links for malware

If you're worried that a link on a web page might lead to a malicious site, install the Security Plus (bit.ly/ secplus363) add-on. When you right-click a potentially suspicious



malware', it will use the excellent VirusTotal service to check the link using 64 different anti-virus products. It then displays the results of the scan at the bottom of the page.

MINI WORKSHOP Get website update alerts from Firefox



Install the Update Scanner (bit.ly/ updatescan363) and go to one of your favourite sites. Right-click it and select 'Scan Page for Updates'. In the window that opens, enter a name for the site, 11 then set how often to check for changes 2 and how major you want the changes to be. El Click OK.



Click the Update Scanner button in the 🗲 browser 💶 to open the sidebar. This shows the sites you're watching. 2 The buttons along the top 🔁 let you create a new entry, show all changed pages in new tabs, delete entries and update preferences. Click Scan 4 to check for updates now. Changes on a page are highlighted. 5



When a page is updated, a notification will pop up near the System Tray. Rightclick the browser button and select Preferences to configure the settings. HACK INTERNET EXPLORER

Hide the address bar

The Modern UI version of Internet Explorer in Windows 8 displays the address bar at the bottom of the screen. You can hide this if you wish, so it only pops into view when required. Go to Settings, Options and set the address bar visibility to Off. You can view the bar by moving your mouse to the bottom of the browser or swiping upwards on a touchscreen.



Enable experimental features

Chrome, Firefox and Opera all offer the ability to turn on experimental features. However, with Internet Explorer, you need to be running the future version found in the most recent preview build of Windows 10. If you are, just type about:flags into the address bar, hit enter and an Experimental Features page will open in a new tab.

There are currently three features being offered - Custom User Agent, which lets IE pretend to websites it's a



different browser; Enable Experimental Web Platforms Features, which activates the new browser engine; and Standard Document Scroll Properties, which changes the behaviour of scroll functions. You'll need to restart Internet Explorer before the changes will be applied.

Get back the Modern UI version of **Internet Explorer**

Windows 8 offers two versions of Internet Explorer - full-screen Modern UI and Desktop. If the Modern UI version vanishes, it's because another browser has been set as the default. To undo this change, go to the Start screen and type PC Settings. Launch PC Settings from the results on the right, and click 'Search and apps'. Click Defaults and change the browser to Internet Explorer. IE will now open in full-screen mode again.





HACK OPERA

Install Chrome extensions in Opera

There are thousands of add-ons for Google's Chrome browser, and any of the ones available from the Chrome Web Store can be directly installed in Opera using the Download Chrome Extension (bit.ly/downchromeex363). However, this only works with Chrome extensions, not web apps.



Block adverts

If you find your browsing experience is being ruined by adverts, you could use Adguard (bit.ly/adguard363) to remove them. It's an excellent ad blocker for Opera that can remove all types of advertising from the web. It can sometimes be a little too aggressive with what it removes, but you can easily tweak the settings to stop it blocking specific items.



Stop web pages automatically playing content

Websites that automatically start playing audio or video when you visit them can be really annoying, especially if you have a lot of tabs open and can't tell which one is the source of the racket. Most browsers now add a

speaker symbol to indicate a tab that's making noise (see our feature on page 48 about turning off annoying sounds on your computer), so you can at least quickly locate and close the offending page. To stop the content from even starting to play automatically in Opera, press Ctrl+F12 to open the Settings and click the Websites link. Under Plug-ins, tick the 'Click to play' option. This means that content will only start playing when you click it. You can set exceptions for any sites you want to exempt from this rule.





HACK OTHER BROWSERS



Speed up browsing in Pale Moon

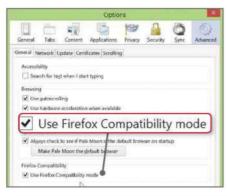
The Pale Moon browser, which is based on Firefox, offers prefetching. This means that the browser predicts web pages that you may want to click, and prepares



cached pages in readiness. The result is that pages load more quickly, although you should be aware that it will also increase bandwidth usage. Prefetching is not enabled by default, so if you want to enable it, type about: config into the address bar and hit Enter. Search for 'network.prefetch-next' and set the parameter to 'true'. To disable prefetching, repeat the process but set the parameter to False.

Use Firefox Compatibility Mode in Pale Moon

Pale Moon used to identify itself to websites as Firefox, which meant that any pages you visited would appear as they do in Mozilla's browser. That's no longer the case in the latest version, and this can cause problems on some



websites that don't recognise Pale Moon, but the browser's Firefox Compatibility Mode solves the problem. You can access it by going to Options, and clicking the Advanced button. Firefox Compatibility will be listed at the bottom of the General tab. It should be enabled by default.

Install user scripts in Maxthon

Greasemonkey (bit.ly/

greasemonkey363) is a powerful add-on for Firefox that lets you customise web pages as you browse by installing scripts that change how your favourite sites look and behave. You can get the same functionality and benefits in Maxthon by installing Violentmonkey (bit.ly/violentmonkey363). Once it's installed you'll need to add some scripts.



What you say...

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Supercharged alternatives to the Windows Clipboard

The Windows Clipboard is OK for basic tasks but there are much better alternatives available. Rob Beattie rounds up the best free contenders



What we liked:

When downloading Ditto, you can choose between the standard 64-bit version or a portable one. The latter runs from a USB stick and means you can carry around your clipboard

manager and plug it into whatever computer you happen to be using.

Like our other award-winners, Save.Me and Shapeshifter, Ditto runs alongside the Windows Clipboard and uses the same Ctrl+C (cut) and Ctrl +V (paste) key combinations. This means you can start using it right away and only dabble with Ditto's extra tools when you want to.

The program captures and stores text, images and web addresses, and you can set the number of items it stores (the default is 500), after which the oldest item will be deleted as you add new ones. Alternatively, you can mark individual clips as 'Never Delete' and they'll always stay in the Ditto database. The amount of storage space for your clippings is similar to Save.Me, and it works better with large clip collections than Shapeshifter. Clipped items are searchable and easily inserted into the document of your choice.

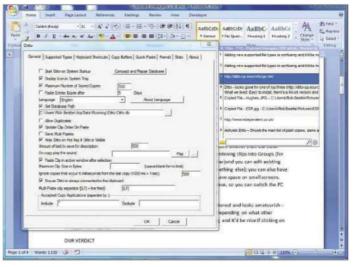
The Ditto window is much smaller

than that of our other awardwinning clipboards, but it has options galore for combining clips into Groups (such as salutations, signoffs and signatures for writing letters and emails), and lets you edit existing text clips or create new ones from scratch. You can

also have Ditto sit on top of other programs and keep it rolled up next to the menu bar to save space on small screens. Like Save.Me, everything is stored in a database, so you can switch off the PC knowing that your clips will be saved.

How it can be improved:

Ditto's interface looks amateurish and unloved, and could do with some care and attention. Its always-on-top mode doesn't always work, depending on what other programs you are running.



Adding new supported file types is confusing and it would be helpful if clicking a clipped URL opened it in a web browser.

OUR VERDICT

Despite its dated look, Ditto does the business. It works alongside the existing Windows Clipboard and hides away when you don't need it, but it still packs plenty of power when you do.

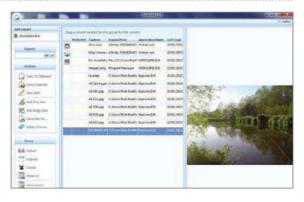
What we liked:

Save.Me comes as a single executable file, so you don't need to install it on your

PC. Its interface is better looking than Ditto's and it has a good Default View, which lists commands on the left, clips in the middle and a preview of the

currently selected clip on the right.

Save.Me's window takes up more space than Ditto's, but is better suited to storing photos and website URLs. because it previews them live and in full. Like the other clipboard managers here, it can clip text, graphics and web addresses, and you can also create new text snippets and save them for later. Save. Me also has a unique Logbook View, which organises clips by date, as well as a useful Research View with customisable columns displaying headings such as Topic, Date, Content and more. Like Ditto, it stores clips even after you turn off your PC.



How it can be improved:

It's easy to miss some of Save.Me's best features, such as the ability to customise the columns in Research View. The Search facility sometimes produces inconsistent results, finding words in some text clips but not others.

OUR VERDICT

Save.Me is better than Ditto at storing visual information, but there's no documentation to guide you around its features and its web previews can slow things down.

What we liked:

At last, a clipboard manager that doesn't look like it was designed in 1995. Shapeshifter's clean

interface is more edgy than the others and although that's due in part to having

fewer features, it's noticeably more refreshing than its staid rivals.

Like the other clipboard managers in this round-up, it uses the same Copy and Paste commands as Windows, but holding down Ctrl+V displays its main window in Integrated Mode, so you can select the item you want to paste into whatever it is you're working on. Shapeshifter is the easiest of our award-winners to master because there are so few options and its use of large thumbnails makes it well suited to working with graphics.

How it can be improved:

We would have liked a better



explanation about how the three different modes work and the advantages of each. In Integrated Mode, you can't open the viewer and close it again if you don't paste anything. It doesn't store clips when you exit or shut down your PC.

OUR VERDICT

Shapeshifter is a good choice if you want more power than the standard Windows Clipboard, but don't need to store items permanently or use Ditto and Save.Me's more complex

Something of an unusual entry, this free program combines attractive sticky notes with a simple clipboard

manager for text snippets. It has an appealing interface; plenty of hotkeys for fast access; and taggable



and searchable notes. Although there's no support for any other data types, the program is neat, effective and fun to use.

This unobtrusive, low-powered clipboard manager hasn't been updated for a while and lacks any database-style features. However, if all you want is access to a simple

pop-up list of recently clipped items (text, URLs and images) that you can access via a hotkey and paste into an



open application, it's definitely worth a look. You can also choose the number of items stored in the clipboard at any one time.

Clipboard History

Clipboard History is another text-only clipboard manager that uses the same simple approach as xNeat but adds some extra features.

These include inserting the date and time at the current cursor position; the ability to delete all clipboard



entries from a pop-up menu; and a clever tool to set exclusions, so that text containing specific keywords will never be copied to the clipboard. It also lets you edit items and set them as 'sticky', so they won't be deleted.

Turn off annoying sounds and vibrations

PCs, tablets and smartphones make sounds to get your attention, but while some are helpful, others are just annoying. Edward Munn shows you how to switch off these irritating noises and unnecessary distractions



Windows

PCs make a lot of irritating noises, most of which you can switch off. Open Control Panel, click 'Hardware and Sound' in Category, then 'Change system sounds'. From here, you can configure all the noises that Windows makes. At the top of the menu, there's an option to change the Sound Scheme from Windows Default to a number of alternatives, including No Sounds. Below this, you can alter the sounds for different Program Events or turn them off altogether. Click Windows Logon, for example, and you'll see that this event is accompanied by the Windows Logon Sound. To turn this off, click the drop-down menu, scroll to the top and select (None).

From this menu you can also silence a number of other irritating noises, including Windows' Default Beep, which



sounds when you press the wrong key or change the volume on your PC; and the New Mail Notification, which gets tiresome if you receive a lot of emails.

Make sure to click Apply after you've made any changes to the Windows Default theme. You can then select Save As to give your configuration a memorable name. Note that there's also an option to untick 'Play Windows Start-up sound' on this page.





One of the most infuriating sounds on an iPad or iPhone is the clicking noise the keyboard makes as you type. To turn this off, tap Settings and Sounds, scroll down to Keyboard Clicks and switch it off. Directly above this, you'll see Lock Sounds, which controls the



sound your device makes when it's locked. Also on this page, you can switch off any of the system sounds that irritate you, from the sent mail Swoosh to Apple's familiar Tri-tone, which sounds when you receive a text message. You can use the options listed under the Vibrate sub-heading on this screen to stop your phone from vibrating on Silent or when it rings. If you want the ringer and all alerts to be silenced when you mute your device using the volume keys, you must switch on the 'Change with Buttons' option.

One complaint that many iPhone

Turn off annoying sounds and vibrations

users have is that the message alert sounds twice if you don't respond to it within two minutes. You can turn this feature off by opening Settings, then Notifications, selecting Messages and setting Repeat Alerts to Never. If you want to stop an app you've installed from making sounds when you get a notification, select it from the Notifications menu and switch Sounds to Off. You can also turn Notifications for the app off altogether from this screen.

If you set your device's volume to loud, so you don't miss important calls and alerts, but want to avoid being disturbed at particular times of the day, you should use Apple's Do Not Disturb feature. To turn it on, open Control Centre by swiping up from the bottom of the screen and tapping the moon icon. By default, the feature will only silence calls and alerts when your device is locked. You can change this by opening Settings, then Do Not Disturb, and selecting Always under Silence.

You can also set a scheduled time period when your iPhone or iPad will enter Do Not Disturb automatically, and you can choose whether to allow single or repeated calls from specific contacts.



🖷 Android

Like iOS, Android 5.0 Lollipop has a new feature that lets you silence reminders, calls and messages. To choose whether to allow interruptions, use the volume keys to select None, Priority or All. If you select None, it mutes even your alarms, so be careful when deciding for how long to activate this mode. If you choose Priority, on the other hand, you can tap the Settings cog to pick which interruptions have priority. For example, you can choose to be notified of incoming calls, but not messages,

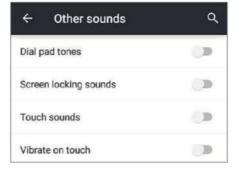


events or other reminders.

As with iOS, you can also decide to be disturbed only when calls are from your favourite contacts, which is very handy if you're frequently targeted by cold callers. This menu also lets you set your Downtime, during which you'll be disturbed only by priority interruptions.

To stop other sounds in Android Lollipop, open Settings and then 'Sound & notification'. You can choose your 'Ring volume', 'Default notification ringtone' and 'Phone ringtone' here, and you can also decide whether your device should vibrate. Tapping 'Other sounds' lets you switch off common bugbears such as 'Dial pad tones', 'Screen locking sounds', 'Touch Sounds' and 'Vibrate on touch'.

By selecting 'App notifications' from the previous screen, you can also choose to block notifications from specific apps that you find irritating. Alternatively, setting them as Priority means that they'll jump to the top of your notifications list when you're not blocking interruptions (ie, when you've selected 'All'), and they'll still appear even in Priority mode. If you're distracted by your device's 'Pulse

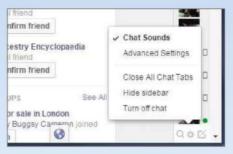


notification light', you can also switch that off here, and there's an option to choose whether or not app notifications are shown on your lock screen.

On the web

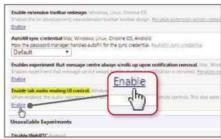
Built-in messaging tools on sites such as Facebook can produce annoying sounds. If you want to silence Facebook Chat, click the Settings icon on the chat sidebar and untick Chat Sounds. You can also turn off Facebook Chat altogether, or click Advanced Settings and choose to turn it on only for the friends that you specify.

If a particular group conversation irritates you, click the Settings icon on that conversation's window and select Mute Conversation. You'll be asked whether you want to silence it for one hour, until 8am or until you turn it back on again. Choose an option, click Mute and the window will remain closed. Also, you won't receive any push notifications on your phone or tablet.



There's nothing more frustrating than video adverts on a website blasting unwanted sound out of your speakers. If you've got multiple tabs open, it can take a while before you even identify the offending website. Thankfully, Google Chrome makes it much easier to locate the source of sound by showing a speaker icon on those tabs that have sound playing.

A new developer feature takes this one step further, letting you mute all sound from the tab by selecting the speaker icon. To activate it, type chrome://flags/#enable-tabaudio-muting into the browser's address bar and enable the highlighted setting. You might need to restart your browser or your PC for the feature to work, but it makes controlling sounds on the web much easier.

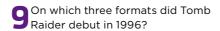

Avoid traffic fines with TomTom Speed Cameras | bit.ly/tomtom363

TomTom Speed Cameras for Android flags up fixed and mobile speed cameras to prevent you from speeding. Here's what you need to know

hen a motorist spots a speed camera, they're likely to slow down, so there's an argument that cameras obscured by foliage or hidden behind signs don't actually make our roads safer by making us drive more carefully, but are there purely to score fines and generate revenue.

TomTom's Android app alerts you to the position of fixed and mobile cameras

on the roads ahead to help you avoid speeding fines. It also provides you with other helpful information, such as the local speed limit, and can monitor how fast vou're travelling.

The app is available to download for free, with a three-month trial. To continue using the app after the trial period is up, you'll need to purchase a subscription at £1.99 per month or £15.49 per year.

TomTom Speed Cameras is very easy to use. You'll need to make sure both the mobile data (cellular) connection and GPS are on, otherwise it can't function properly. To do this, pull down



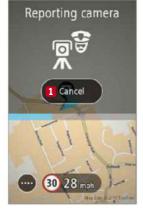
the top bar or access Phone Settings. Start the app to get your current position and plot it on a map. 11

As you drive around, the map updates and displays the name of the road you're on. 11 It also shows the speed limit for that area and how fast you're travelling. 2 This isn't a completely

accurate speed reading and we've found it can be out by quite a few MPH, but it's a useful quide.



The app warns you when you approach a camera, but if you find one (fixed or mobile) that doesn't appear on the map. vou can alert TomTom to its existence by tapping the Report Camera



button at the top of the app. The report will take a few seconds to be sent, and you can cancel it 11 if you need to.

Speed cameras appear on the map as icons. If you enter an average speed zone (an area where multiple cameras measure the average speed at which you're travelling) a banner telling

you the speed and distance will appear at the bottom of the app. 2



The road name and speed limit indicators that appear on screen can get in the way, especially if you have a smartphone with a small display and are zoomed in on

the map. Tapping the

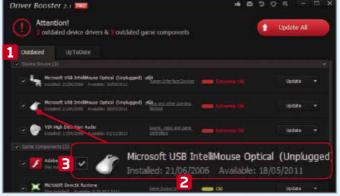
ut-of-date drivers can slow your PC's performance and even stop your hardware from working properly. The free version of IObit Driver Booster 2 identifies old drivers and lets you update them with a single click so that your PC keeps running smoothly. The program can be set to perform scans on a daily, weekly, fortnightly or monthly basis. It detects newly installed devices, scanning them to make sure that you're using the most up-to-date drivers. It's also handy for browsing or exporting a comprehensive list of your installed drivers.

The program automatically creates a system-restore point when you update your drivers, which means you can return to the previous configuration if anything goes wrong. There's also a handy option that lets you set the program to ignore any out-of-date drivers that you don't want to update.





Download and install IObit Driver Booster, taking care to untick the box that installs Advanced SystemCare Free, unless you want it. When you run the program, it performs a scan before showing the number of outdated drivers and game components on your PC.



Check the names of the outdated drivers 1 and the dates that they were installed. 2 If a driver is required for a device you no longer use, you can untick the box next to it 3 to exclude it from the update.



For more information about a driver, click the drop-down menu alongside it and select Details. Here you can see its Type, 1 Vendor 2 and Provider, 3 as well as the latest version available. 4 To hide it from future scans, click Ignore 5 and then Yes.

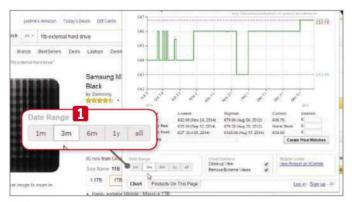

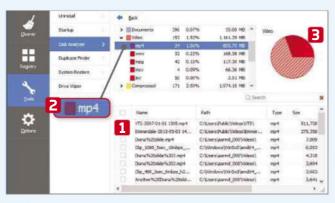

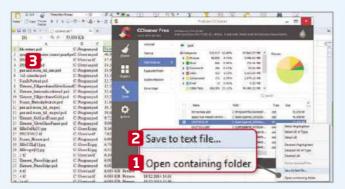

Tick the boxes to select individual files 🚺 or highlight one (use Shift+Ctrl to choose more than one) and right-click for more options. 2 Select the files you don't want, then right-click to 'Delete Selected Files'. 3 This is a permanent delete so no copy is saved to the Recycle Bin.



If you'd rather deal with the files in Explorer, right-click and choose 'Open containing folder'.

You can also choose to save the list as a text file, 2 though it's easier to view as a spreadsheet. To separate the elements into the spreadsheet's columns, **B** import it as 'tab delimited'.



Use the search box 11 to filter your results further. You can use wild cards, as you would in Windows searches, to refine your results, but you can only search for the names of files. To make it easier to find files from their path or size, click the relevant heading 2 to reorder them.

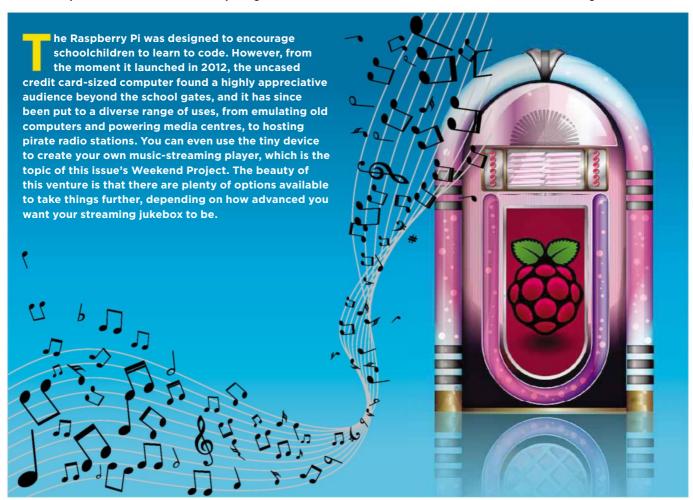

Turn your Raspberry Pi into a music-streaming jukebox

Wayne Williams demonstrates how to turn a humble Raspberry Pi into a powerful music player that can stream music from anywhere



What you'll need

This project will work with any of the four models of Raspberry Pi: A, A+, B and B+. If you don't currently own a Pi, you can find out more at the Raspberry Pi Foundation (www.raspberrypi.org). The Model A has 256MB of memory, one USB port and no Ethernet (network connection), and will set you back around £20. The A+ also has 256MB of memory, but is smaller, supports micro

SD cards and is cheaper (around £15.50).

The Model B costs around £28 and has 512MB of memory, two USB ports and an Ethernet connection. The B+ costs approximately £24, supports micro SD, and has four USB ports.

We'd recommend you go for the Model B+ because it's the best version and is still very affordable. It also has a new low-noise power supply, which means it delivers better audio quality than the

older Pi models.

You can buy a Pi from RS Components (bit.ly/rspi363), Farnell element14 (bit.ly/ farnell363) and Amazon (www.amazon. co.uk). You get only the uncased, bare-bones Pi for your money, so you'll have to budget for the other components unless you have them lying around at home. To use the Pi, you'll need:

• An Ethernet cable to connect the Pi to your network and the internet

The new Raspberry Pi Model B+ has more USB ports and better sound than its predecessors

- A USB Wi-Fi dongle (optional)
- An SD card for the operating system. The A+ and B+ models use micro SD cards (the same as those used in mobile phones). This project will work on a 1GB card, but we'd recommend at least a 4GB card - more, if you want to store music on it
- A micro USB cable or power supply to power the device

Some of these items can bought directly from RS Components, Farnell element14 and most other computer accessories retailers.

You'll also need speakers, an amplifier or headphones (either analogue or USB) so you can hear the music being played, and access to either a computer, a tablet or a phone with a modern browser - Chrome, Firefox, Safari on iOS and IE10

will all work just fine, although older

versions of Internet Explorer aren't compatible with the Pi operating system we'll be using.

You would normally need a screen either a TV or a computer monitor - and an HDMI/DVI cable to connect the Pi to the display, but it isn't necessary for this project. You don't need a USB keyboard or mouse either, which is fortunate because it frees up the USB sockets for speakers.

Pi MusicBox

There are several operating systems available for the Raspberry Pi, but for this project we'll be using Pi MusicBox (bit.ly/ musicbox363), which is designed to make it easy to stream music on the Raspberry Pi and even has support for Apple AirPlay and DLNA (Digital Living Network Alliance) streaming. Its features

You can configure music-streaming services such as Spotify and Google Music from the MusicBox settings

include the ability to stream music from services such as Spotify Premium. SoundCloud, Google Music, TuneIn and Last. FM, and it offers support for playing local and networked audio tracks

Find out how to install Pi Music Box in our Mini Workshop, below. Once you've got

it going, we'll show you how to configure it in the Mini Workshop on page 61.

Go wireless

If you're using a Pi that doesn't have an Ethernet connection, you'll need to configure the Pi Music Box to run with Wi-Fi before you start. Once you've written it to the memory card in Step 2 of our installation Mini Workshop, don't remove the card from your computer. Browse to the 'config' folder, open 'settings.ini' and add the details there - you'll find instructions on what to add and where to add it in the file itself. Once this is done, finish Step 2 by removing the card and inserting it in the Pi.

If you've set up the device using

Connect your Pi to both an Ethernet network 1 and some speakers. 2 You don't need to connect a monitor, keyboard or mouse, because MusicBox is controlled through a web interface, but a monitor will help you find the Pi's IP address in Step 3. Before plugging the Pi into a power socket, you'll need to install the Pi MusicBox OS on the SD card.



Download Pi MusicBox on a PC and unzip it. Connect an SD card to your PC (using an adapter, if necessary). Install and run Win32 Disk Imager (bit.ly/ win32disk363). Browse to the Pi MusicBox image file, 11 select the SD card 2 and click Write. 3 When it's done, insert the SD card into your Pi and power it up.



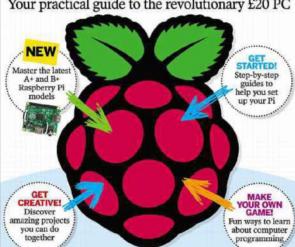
🔁 If you have a monitor attached to your Pi, wait for it to boot, then make a note of the IP address. Open a browser on your PC or mobile device and enter the IP address in the address box. If you don't know it, http:// musicbox.local should also work. This opens the MusicBox web interface where you can access the settings and set up the OS as required. 11

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Ethernet, you can still switch to Wi-Fi later by returning the SD card to your computer and changing the files as above, or editing the settings using the web interface while still connected to Ethernet, then switching to a Wi-Fi network afterwards. Go to Settings, Network and fill in the Wireless Network name (SSID) and password. Scroll down and click 'Update settings (reboot)'. The Pi will restart.

Music sources

Pi MusicBox can play tracks from several sources including a shared folder on the local network; a USB drive connected directly to the Raspberry Pi; and the SD card. You can copy songs onto the card when it's attached to your PC, before you insert it into the Pi.

The OS can also stream songs that are stored on a mobile phone or tablet. Anyone with access to your wireless network will be able to connect to the jukebox and start streaming their music.

Use AirPlay streaming

If you have an Apple device, turn on AirPlay streaming in MusicBox and reboot the Pi. Start a song playing on

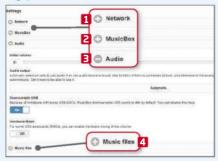
your iPhone, iPad or iPod Touch, then swipe up from the bottom of the device. Tap the AirPlay option, then select the MusicBox entry and the song you're playing will start streaming to your jukebox.

Improve the audio

The default audio quality isn't amazing, but it's good enough, especially if you are using the Model B+. However, you can make a big improvement by adding a USB sound card to the Pi. There are lots of very affordable models to be found on

Amazon. However, you get what you pay for, so while options for less than a fiver might sound tempting, a soundcard such as the Creative Sound Blaster Play (£16, bit.ly/soundblaster363) will deliver better results. Audiophiles may want to consider the HiFiBerry (£33, www.hifiberry.com) or Wolfson (£29, bit.ly/wolfson363) audio cards, which are designed specifically for use with the Raspberry Pi. If you buy a HiFiBerry card, you'll be able to select it under Audio Out in MusicBox's Audio settings. Choose from HiFiBerry Dac, HiFiBerry Digi and HiFiBerry Digi+.

XP-style Start menu

sing the oddly named Spencer (bit .ly/spen363) is the easiest way to install an XP-style Start button in later versions of Windows. Simply unzip the file and drag the Spencer.exe icon to the taskbar to pin it. This adds the program icon, which can then be dragged to the left-hand side of the taskbar, where the Start button is usually located.

When you click the Spencer icon in the taskbar, a simple Classic menu appears containing all your programs. If there are too many to fit on the screen, you can use the arrows at the top and the bottom to scroll through the list. And that's it - there are no other features; it's just a straightforward, classic menu button that requires no installation or configuration.

Start Menu Reviver (www.reviversoft .com) adds a much-needed Start menu to Windows 8 and transforms the existing one in Windows 7. It displays a panel of icons down the left-hand side and a collection of tiles on the right. The top four icons on the left open different Explorer windows, with icons for the Control Panel, Task Manager and other useful items further down the list. If you want to know what an icon does, hover your mouse over it to make its functions appear in a pop-up tooltip box.

The tiled area on the right looks like the Windows 8 Start Screen and is designed to provide quick access to

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation. your most used programs. To add a program, right-click an empty tile and select Add Tile from the menu. Enter a name and click the magnifying glass to browse for the program you want to add. Most of your PC's installed software can be found in the C:\Program Files folder. If you want to replace or clear a program, right-click a tile and select Reset Tile or Edit Tile. Add all your favourite programs in this way so you have quick access to them. You can also drag a tile and drop it on

another to shrink it to a group of four smaller tiles; and if you decide you want to make a quarter-sized tile full-size again, just drag and drop it onto a large empty tile.

To access all your programs, type a word into the search box, such as WordPad, Paint or Firefox. To browse the installed programs, click in the search box, press Tab and click the folder icon on the right.

Choose your menu design

Classic Shell (classicshell.net) is a free tool with a wide range of customisation options for the Start menu in Windows 7 and 8. Run Classic Start Menu Settings from the Start menu. On the Start Menu Style tab, you'll find three different menus to choose from. You can pick one of the two types of Start button, or select and use an image of your own.

Each menu style offers a selection of skins, so once you've decided on the type of menu, click the Skin tab to pick a colour scheme and apply

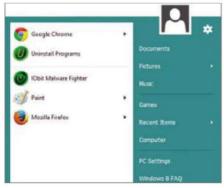
effects such as transparency. The changes are instantaneous so, once you've made your customisations, just click the Start button to see the effect. It makes exploring the different options very quick and easy.

The Basic Settings tab contains some useful shortcuts. For example, clicking the Start button displays your new Start menu, but if you hold down the Shift key at the same time, the standard Windows Start menu will be displayed. This means you have instant access to two types of menu and can easily choose between them.

Bring Windows 7's menu to 8

Start Menu 8 (www.iobit.com) is designed to add the missing Windows 7-style Start menu to Windows 8, but it can also be used to replace the one in Windows 7. Run the program and the settings window appears, which lets you configure your new Start menu. There's a variety of styles to choose from, including both flat and Windows 7-style menu designs, with customisable transparency.

In the General section, you can set Start Menu 8 to auto-load with Windows; enable or disable the highlighting of new programs; set the number of recent programs to display; select the action you want the power button to perform; and more. You can also customise the font size and colour in the User Interface section.

Software-free menu

When you install software on your PC, a shortcut is added to the folder C:\ProgramData\Microsoft\ Windows\Start menu\Programs and also the folder

C:\Users\YourName\AppData\ Roaming\Microsoft\Windows\Start Menu\Programs.

The Start menu is essentially just a list of these shortcuts. The first folder contains public items for all users and the second contains menu items only you can see. If you can't find these folders, go to Folder Options in the Control Panel, select the View tab and select 'Show hidden files, folders or drives'.

Right-click an empty part of the taskbar, select Toolbars, New Toolbar and you'll be prompted to select a folder on the hard drive. Select the first of the two folders listed above to add a Programs item to the taskbar at the right. Click the little double arrow to display a Start-like menu. Add another toolbar in the same way for your private menu items, or move all the private menu shortcuts (C:\Users...) into the public menu shortcuts folder (C:\ProgramData...).

This is a simple and clever way to add a Start menu to Windows 8 that requires no software to be installed. The menu is at the right side of the taskbar rather than the left, but this isn't much of an inconvenience.

Reorganise your menu

Handy Start Menu (www .handystartmenu.com) is a clever tool that works on any version of Windows. If your computer is running Windows 8, the tool adds a Start menu to the taskbar, but if you have an earlier version of Windows, it adds other new tools to the existing menu. Clear the

tickbox for the Registry tool during installation because you don't need it.

If you are running the program in Windows 7, it may look like nothing has changed when you click the Start button. However, if you select All Programs, you'll see a new menu that has all the same items as before, but presented in a different way.

Run Handy Start Menu from the Desktop shortcut and click the option to change the menu settings. The menu has two panes and the left-hand one contains a list of categories. Several are created for you, but more can be added. Click the little arrow next to a category to expand it and see the programs it contains. Click a program, then click a category on the right to move a program to it. By creating and editing categories, you can create a Start menu that organises the items in a way that suits you, rather than having to use the Windows default settings.

The Menu Look tab lets you set the text size. Values greater than 100 per cent make it larger, which is useful if you struggle to read the menu text on a small laptop screen; less than 100 per cent make it smaller, which you could use if you have a large monitor and want to squeeze in more content.

Start menu configurations can be loaded and saved, so you can have several different ones. For example, you could create a menu for work that has all your office tools easily accessible and another one for photo editing or music, that puts all the necessary tools at your fingertips.

Defragmenting an SSD

I was always given to understand that it's best not to defrag an SSD (solid-state drive). However, in Issue 361 (bit.ly/ webuser361) of Web User, your review of Auslogics Disk Defrag Free 5.1 says that it improves the efficiency with which Windows handles SSDs. Does this mean that it is safe to use this particular program to defrag an SSD? And how often would you recommend this should be done?

The traditional advice is that old-style mechanical drives need to be frequently defragmented to maintain performance, while SSDs should not, because it wears them out. However, modern SSDs have proved to be more robust than expected and don't wear out as fast as was originally thought, so defragmenting does not damage them any more than traditional drives, which also wear out

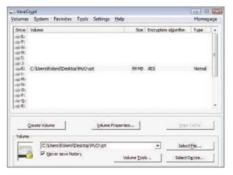
Occasionally defragging an SSD won't damage it, but don't do it as often as you would a regular

over time. The question is, is it necessary?

A file can be broken into fragments and stored on various parts of a hard drive, but eventually no more fragments can be created and an error will occur when writing to it. An SSD needs to be defragmented to stop this happening, but only about once every month or two, whereas you should defrag a traditional drive weekly. With a traditional hard drive, some parts can be read faster than others, so placing frequently accessed files in these locations boosts performance: with an SSD, the location of files makes no difference to the speed with which they are accessed.

The bottom line is that defragmenting an SSD does not offer any speed benefits, but it's a good idea to defrag every couple of months to prevent files from being split into too many parts.

Speed up my PC

My laptop is only two years old, yet it is already running very slowly. What can I do to restore it to its original speed? I do not have a Windows 7 CD to reinstall it.

Windows 7 needs 4GB to run properly and adding more memory can make a significant difference. However, some laptops are easier to upgrade than others. Turn your laptop over and see if it has an easily removable cover over the memory sockets.

If the hard drive is easily accessible, you could replace it with an SSD, which will make the computer more responsive. Use a USB-to-SATA cable to connect an SSD to your laptop and copy across the old drive's contents; then the old and new drives can be swapped.

Cleaning and tuning Windows also boosts performance. Tools such as IObit Uninstaller (www.iobit.com) and Wise Program Uninstaller (wisecleaner.com) can thoroughly remove any software you don't need. Meanwhile, switching to portable software means you can continue to enjoy your favourite programs without filling your hard drive. Go to PortableApps.com (portableapps

Hide my photos

Do you know of any free software that can encrypt images?

There are many ways to hide files such as images to prevent them from being accessed by other people. A tool such as Boxcryptor (www .boxcryptor.com) works with Google Drive, OneDrive, Dropbox and other cloud services, so that when you save a file, it is automatically encrypted. The encrypted file is synced with your online storage, so it can't be accessed by hackers or even the online-storage services themselves. However, the files remain unencrypted on your hard drive, so anyone with access to your computer can still see them.

Drag'n'Crypt Ultra (bitcore.de/dcu) can solve this. The website is in German, so just follow the download link and select English when you run the program. It adds a target icon to the Desktop to which you drag and drop files and folders to encrypt them. They are decrypted in the same way, by dragging and dropping. The original files can be securely and automatically erased by right-clicking the target and selecting Settings from the menu. It is simple, but effective.

VeraCrypt (veracrypt.codeplex.com) lets you create a password-protected and encrypted virtual drive. Use the Volume Creation Wizard on the Tools menu to create a file of 2GB, for example. Exit the wizard and return to

.com), for example, and browse the apps. If you use LibreOffice or OpenOffice, you could uninstall it and use the portable version instead. GIMP, a popular photo editor, is available in a portable version, as is VLC video player, and there are many others.

Cleaning the hard drive and defragmenting it may also boost your PC's performance, and there are some great free tools that can do this, such as IObit SmartDefrag (bit.ly/smart363) and Wise Disk Cleaner (bit.ly/wise363). IObit's tool can clean junk files before defragmenting and optimises the order of programs to make them load faster. Wise's tool has a slimming system that removes unnecessary files such as wallpapers, help files, installation files and other junk, and then defragments the drive.

Windows 10 upgrade is failing

I 've been reading about the Technical Preview version of Windows 10 and was looking forward to trying it, but I'm having problems attempting the upgrade from Windows 7 Home Premium on my Dell Inspiron M5030 laptop. It has a 64-bit AMD V120 2.2GHz processor, 2GB of memory and over 70GB of hard drive space left alongside Windows 7 on the C: drive. The D: partition contains some personal files and photos. Although this is not my main computer, everything is backed up and it has all the latest drivers, including the latest BIOS

I downloaded the latest technical preview 64-bit ISO file, installed CloneDrive and used it to mount the ISO file to a USB drive. I created a bootable USB drive and set the laptop order to boot from the USB drive first, and selected the option to completely replace everything on the C: drive. I have tried two different ways of installing it but both end with a blank screen. The installation may be running in the background, but the screen is blank, so I

can't do anything except a hard reboot, which simply returns me to the original Windows 7 installation. On one occasion I had to reinstall Windows 7.

I haven't tried a virtual machine option because I don't believe I have enough memory.

Your laptop is old and the specifications are poor compared to a modern PC - even a budget model. The processor is only a single-core model and is very underpowered, while 2GB of memory is barely sufficient to run Windows these days. You're correct to assume that software such as VirtualBox won't work because your laptop doesn't have enough free memory. It looks like Windows 10 isn't compatible with your hardware anyway, but even if it could be installed on this computer, it would perform very poorly and probably isn't worth trying.

A modern operating system needs modern hardware. You say this is not your main laptop, so presumably you have a more powerful one. If it has a modern processor, a minimum of 4GB of memory and 40GB of free drive space, you could install VirtualBox and run Windows 10. It will not affect the current installation of Windows in any way.

Changing from POP3 to IMAP

A few months ago I changed my email settings from POP3 to IMAP so I could sync my iPad and iPhone with my PC's email. This has led to a few anomalies that I can't understand. When I open Microsoft Outlook, it defaults to the list of emails that were downloaded using the old POP3 setting. When I then click the IMAP inbox, the PC updates many thousands of cached messages before listing the new headers. This doesn't happen on the iPad. How do I correct the problem?

It sounds like you have two email accounts set up in Outlook; one using POP3 and the other using IMAP, but both accessing the same online account. This is bound to cause confusion and you should delete the POP3 account so that it can no longer be used.

To set up your POP3 and IMAP email accounts, go to File, Info, Account Settings, Account Settings. On older versions of Outlook, you might find Account Settings in the Tools menu. Double-click each account on the 'E-mail' tab and write down all the settings. Afterwards, select the POP3 account and click Remove to delete it. Close the Account Settings window, quit Outlook, then restart it. Hopefully, it will now work properly, but if not, delete the IMAP account, restart Outlook and add the account again.

There is a website at bit.ly/imap363 which contains some useful step-bystep guides for converting from POP3 to IMAP. It covers a range of services and different versions of Outlook.

Easy superimpose

I like to edit my photos by putting people's heads onto other bodies. I used to use PhotoSuite for this, but the software doesn't work with Windows 8.1, and other programs I've tried are too complicated. Can you recommend a simple program for manipulating photos?

To make a composite photo realistic, you need a free selection tool (or 'lasso'), which lets you trace around an irregular object. The edges of the selection need to be merged into the new image to make a seamless blend.

Most basic photo editors provide a selection tool that lets you take an

area of one photo and paste it into another, but free-form selection with blending is often only available in more advanced tools. Our favourites are Paint.net (www.getpaint.net) and GIMP (www.gimp.org). They look difficult to use at first, but it's easy to produce the effect you want with a bit of practise.

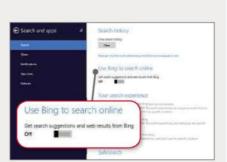

Photos in WordPad

I've tried free office suites but I find them unwieldy and WordPad is a good enough word processor for my needs. It's on the Start menu in Windows 7, but Windows 8 users should start it by typing wordpad in the Start screen and clicking it.

The obvious way to insert a photo or image into a WordPad document is to click the Picture button in the ribbon at the top of the window, then browse the drive and select a JPEG or other image file. This lets you insert an image, but you can't edit it. If you want to do this, click 'Paint drawing' instead. There's no option on the File menu to open an image, but if you click the arrow under the Paste button and select 'Paste from', you can select an image, such as a photo.

Select File, Exit and return to your

WordPad document. The image will be interted, but when you double-click it, it opens in Paint so you can edit it by adding borders, captions and more.

Download iTunes tracks again

While I normally have iCloud Download ticked in my column options of iTunes (as it was in this case), there was no cloud icon giving me the option to download the song again. I fixed this by ticking 'Show iTunes in the Cloud purchases' (from iTunes Preferences, select Store Preferences) and was then able to download the offending track.

Task Manager details

The Task Manager in Windows 8 is much better than older versions and provides a lot more information about running programs, CPU activity, and network and drive activity. It also has some less obvious features that are equally useful.

Right-click the taskbar and select Task Manager. On the Processes tab, you can right-click the Name heading at the top of the processes list to add more columns of information, such as Type, Process Name. Publisher and several more.

Go to the Performance tab and select CPU to view the processor activity. Most processors these days are multi-core models and the Task Manager lets you view each core separately. Right-click the CPU chart and select 'Change graph to', then 'Logical processors'. If it looks like you have too many processors, it's because hyperthreading makes a processor core appear as two virtual processors, so a four-core CPU can have eight scrolling CPU charts.

I've been using YouTube a lot recently and have a few handy tips that I'd like to share with other readers. Firstly, the

speed function is really useful if you want to make a video run faster or slower. There are six options from quarter-speed up to double-speed. It affects the audio track as well, which is handy if you want to make fast commentary clearer by slowing it down. To use the feature, select the Settings cog on the video and click the Speed drop-down menu.

The 'Start at' option is very useful if you want to share a video. By pausing the video and ticking this box, the URL is updated so that the shared clip starts from this point. This is very handy if the relevant part of the clip you want to share is a long way into a lengthy clip.

By dragging the playback marker upwards, you can also see a zoomed view of your position, making it easier to browse from one frame to the next.

Fix Windows Update

I've not had any problems with Windows Update myself, but I know others have. There is a built-in tool for fixing Windows Update and although it probably isn't capable of fixing every problem, it's worth trying. Open the Control Panel and, in the Small Icons view, click Troubleshooting. Under 'System and Security', click 'Fix problems with Windows Update'. This opens a new window that checks for problems and automatically fixes them.

Can I avoid downloading McAfee with Flash Player?

I just received a notification telling me I need to update Flash Player, but there was no option to opt out of installing McAfee, so I decided not to proceed. Can I download the latest version without this irritating add-on?

Are you sure it was a genuine notification? Adobe Flash Player was updated to v16.0.0.235 on 9 December 2014 (it may have had another update since). You should verify which version you are running, then go to its download page (get.adobe.com/flashplayer) if you think you need the update.

You should always be able to untick the option to install McAfee Security Scan Plus, but it's a good idea to install Unchecky (unchecky.com) so that you don't get caught out by PUPs (potentially unwanted programs). If you use Google Chrome as your primary browser, its Flash Player plug-in should be updated automatically. You can check this by visiting chrome://plugins and seeing if the version of Flash Player on your Chrome browser matches the latest one.

I always go to a company's main page, then follow the necessary in-page links to find the product I want. In this case, go to www.adobe.com and follow the links for Flash Player in the bottom-right corner. This leads you to get.adobe.com/flashplayer.

There are sites you can use to find out the owner of a domain, such as TCPIPUTILS (www.tcpiputils.com/ whois-lookup). You can also install a VirusTotal (www.virustotal.com) add-on for your browser to look up addresses with a single-click. Use VTzilla (bit.ly/ vtzilla363) for Firefox and Pale Moon, and VTchromizer (bit.ly/vtchromizer363) for Chrome

You might have volume controls on your keyboard, especially if it's a laptop. On mine, I can use F6 to mute, F7 to turn the volume down and F8 to turn it up. There's also a volume control in the Charms bar's Settings. To access it, swipe in from the edge of your screen; move your mouse into one of the corners and move it up or down the edge; or press Windows+I.

Double-clicking this shortcut will open the same window as the icon in the taskbar. From there, you can open the Volume Mixer and see all the options for your sound card.

How do I back up to an external drive?

I've not had any problems using the built-in System Image tool with Windows 7, 8 or 8.1. I use it regularly to create a back-up image of each of my computers and it has worked perfectly at restoring a PC on the three occasions that I've needed it. I've even used it to

move a disc image to a new hard drive.

If you want a list of good, free alternatives, check the Web User Forum thread at bit.ly/backupsoftware363. Do I need anti-virus for my Android device?

Is anti-virus software required on Android? I've read a range of opinions on the matter and I'd prefer to have some protection than none at all.

I've been told you don't need anti-virus on Android, but I would also rather be safe than sorry. Have a look at these articles from Graham Cluley (bit.ly/cluely363) and How-To Geek (bit .ly/howto363), then see what you think.

The end of How-To Geek's article says that as long as you stick to apps from the Google Play Store, you shouldn't need anti-virus, especially if you're running Android 4.2 or later. Apparently, most Android malware comes from apps downloaded from suspicious app stores, so you should only download apps you trust and make sure you check their permissions before you install them.

It's worth noting that Android's operating system doesn't let apps change your system files, so you can't be infected in the same way as on a PC. However, you still won't be immune to Trojans, phishing and other scams.

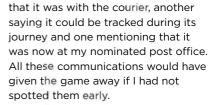

Barry Collins bristles at the meagre storage provision on entry-level iPhones and iPads

Apple is too tight-fisted with storage

he iPhone 6 isn't simply bigger - it's better in every way." So says the blurb on Apple's website, which is a shameless whopper because there's one big way in which it's no better than its predecessor, nor many other vastly cheaper phones on the market: storage.

Apple is phenomenally tight when it comes to the storage it provides on iPhones and iPads. So tight, that it's now on the thick end of a lawsuit in the US (where else?), because the latest version of its iOS operating system gobbles up a full 25 per cent of the entry-level device's 16GB of storage, which is infuriating for customers who now find they've got even less room for their music, photos and apps.

12GB of free storage space simply isn't fit for purpose on a device that Apple sells as an all-in-one MP3 player, camera, video camera and games console. My relatively modest MP3 music collection (around 200 albums) takes up 18GB by itself. A single, chart-topping game such as FIFA 15 consumes more than 1GB of storage. Use the iPhone's video camera to shoot full HD footage, and the free

storage space will disappear faster than an expenses form in the MPs' lobby.

Worse still, when Apple beams down a major upgrade to the operating system, you practically have to wipe the device clean to install it. The upgrade to iOS 8 required 6.9GB of free space on my iPad Air before it would even consider installing. That's more than half of the available space!

The way Apple treats storage, you'd think it was made out of unicorn's ivory rather than

silicon. You're charged a lawyer's overtime bill for the device in the first place, and then stuck with a ridiculous premium on storage upgrades. You can't buy an iPhone 6 Plus from Apple for anything less than £619, and that comes with only 16GB, the same amount of storage Apple offered on one of its original iPhone models, back in the ancient days of 2007.

The next model up, which is identical apart from the amount of storage, is the 64GB version, costing £699. That's £80

extra for 48GB more memory. You can go online and buy a 64GB microSD card for not much more than £20. I know the storage inside Apple's phones is of a higher grade than your cheapo memory cards, but there's no doubt in my mind that Apple is still making a stonking profit on those upgrades. And let's not forget that, unlike many Android phones, Apple doesn't offer a memory

card slot to let customers boost storage themselves. What you buy is what you're stuck with. Apple's storage hobbles way behind

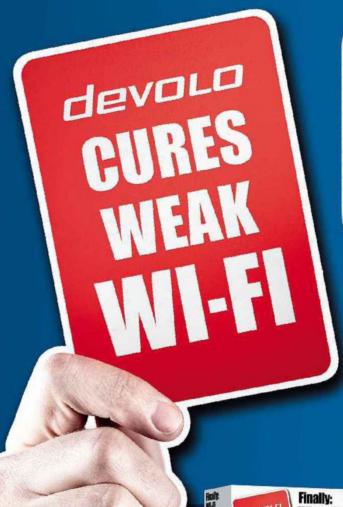
its rivals: both the Samsung Galaxy S5 and HTC One M8 start at 16GB, but they can be boosted with a further 128GB via their microSD slots at a cost of around £80 (the same price Apple charges for 48GB, remember). Indeed, 16GB is now the standard for budget smartphones that cost £100, such as the Lumia 800.

Better in every way? To paraphrase Harrison Ford: you can write that cobblers, Apple, but you sure as hell can't say it. At least, not with a straight
