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## It's wiser to wait for Windows 10

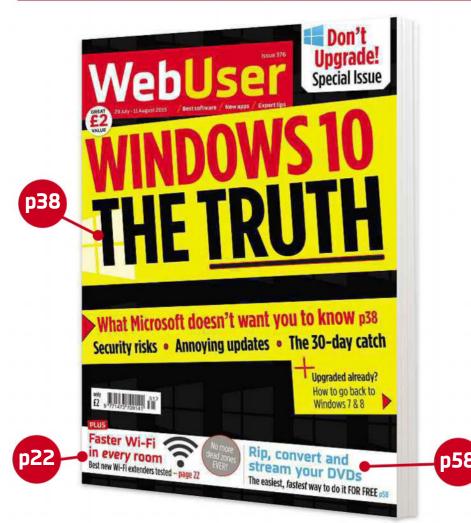

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# What's New Online

**Download BBC radio shows to listen** 

to offline

e've been able to download TV programmes from BBC iPlayer to play offline for a while now, but not our favourite radio shows. Happily, the Beeb has now seen sense and added this much-requested feature to its updated iPlayer Radio apps for Android, iOS and Kindle Fire (sorry, Windows Phone users).

This means you can download full BBC radio programmes and listen to them at your leisure, even if you're out of range of a Wi-Fi or 3G/4G signal. So you can enjoy Desert Island Discs while sunning yourself on the beach and take The Archers on the plane with you.

As with TV downloads, BBC radio shows are available to download for 30 days after broadcast, and you then have a further 30 days to listen to them before they disappear from your mobile device.

However, there are exceptions. In its blog post to announce the new feature, the BBC warns that "some programmes are available for a



shorter period or not at all because we have different rights agreements with different programmes".

If you have the BBC iPlayer Radio app installed on your phone, it should update to the new version automatically; otherwise, you can download it from your app store. The existing iPlayer Radio app for iPads and other tablets is being discontinued, so you'll need to install the new one.

## **Send Google Maps** directions to your phone

In April, Google introduced a clever feature that lets you send directions from search results to your phone. Now you can do the same in Google Maps. Once your directions are on screen, click the 'Send to device' link, check that your device (Android or iOS) is supported, then



select it. A notification will then appear on your phone showing your destination address. From there you can open Google Maps, or just bring up the directions.

You need to be signed into your Google account, and your phone needs to be linked to it. You'll also need the latest version of Google Maps (Android bit.ly/maps376; iOS bit.ly/ mapsios376). If you're having trouble, read Google Maps' Help page: bit.ly/help376.

# Firefox blocks Flash after hackers exploit countless flaws

#### What happened?

Mozilla has blocked the Flash plug-in by default on its Firefox browser, after a host of bugs were found that were being used by criminals to attack users.

Mozilla said the block may only be temporary, suggesting it may reverse its decision if Flash's developer Adobe fixes the security flaws. Other tech companies including Apple have long blocked the plug-in, which is used to show videos, adverts and other multimedia content online.

The move follows leaks from Italian IT security company Hacking Team, which was - rather ironically - hacked in early July. Documents released by the hackers show the group had on file several Adobe flaws, which could be used to target users when a browser uses the plua-in.

Adobe has rushed to fix some of the flaws, but Flash is always a major target for hackers, which is why Apple won't let it run on iPhones and iPads. Google's Chrome is set to start blocking Flash adverts from playing by default, but Google says this isn't for security-related reasons, but rather to make sure it doesn't weaken battery life on phones and tablets.

#### How will it affect you?

The change doesn't mean you can't use the Flash plug-in; it simply means Flash multimedia content will no longer play by default. If you load a web page in Firefox that has Flash content, the browser will show a pop-up bar with the message: "Firefox has prevented the unsafe plug-in 'Adobe Flash' from

running" (see screengrab below). In the banner, there is a button to "allow" it to play, though before clicking you'll want to think twice to make sure you trust the source. You'll be able to let Flash run just

that time, or turn it back on permanently.

The tide does seem to be turning against Flash, though. Chrome's advert ban could be the final nail in the coffin for the beleaguered plug-in because it may force advertisers to switch to HTML5, a different - and potentially safer - way of displaying multimedia content. Netflix and YouTube already use HTML5, for example.

As a web user, you probably won't notice the difference between Flash and HTML5. Your videos will play the same

> and adverts will still litter web pages. The difference is that websites using HTML5 should load faster and contain fewer security holes that leave you at risk of being hacked or otherwise targeted by



into the address bar, and then clicking the Enable/Disable link under Adobe Flash.

#### What do we think?

Mozilla's decision was overdue. Five years ago, Apple's then-CEO Steve Jobs wrote an open letter with his "thoughts on Flash", explaining the many reasons why his company was dropping the software. Its poor security was just one point of several.

At the time, many criticised Jobs for trying to control the web, but he appears to have been correct in picking HTML5 over Flash. Five years on, others have followed suit. Mozilla and Google have taken steps away from Flash, and major online video sites already favour HTML5.

The whole debate highlights how slowly the web evolves. It's been well known for years that Flash has severe flaws, but it's taken too long for web companies to move to a better, safer alternative. In the meantime, users have been left using software at regular risk of being hacked. It's time for all websites and browsers to drop Flash, especially since moving to HTML5 is so smooth most users wouldn't even notice it happening.

# £50 'unlock' scam targets iPhone users

#### What happened?

British iPhone users are reporting that they are being targeted by a scam that is already well known in the US. A message from "iPhone Support" pops up (see screengrab), saying that a third-party app has caused your phone to crash and is trying to steal your data. It tells you to ring a support number to get "an immediate fix".

However, calling that number isn't a good idea: the people on the other end of the line are scammers and will try to charge you £50 – and also steal your credit card details.

#### How will it affect you?

If the message does pop up on your phone, don't panic and definitely don't call the number. There's an easy fix that anyone can perform. Simply go to settings and put the phone in Airplane Mode. This turns off all connectivity. Then go to settings for the Safari browser, clear the website history and saved browsing data, then re-open the

browser. If that doesn't work, visit an Apple Store (see locations at bit.ly/stores376) and ask an expert to help you.

Such scams tend to hang around for years. If you have less tech-savvy friends or family, warn them about the scam.

#### What do we think?

Such scams aren't common, which is a surprise given the phenomenal popularity of the iPhone. But as is so often the case with text and email scams, a little common sense goes a long way if you want to avoid becoming a victim. The message that's catching people out has typing errors and spelling mistakes. For example, it spells 'iOS' with a capital 'i', a mistake Apple wouldn't make.

Even if criminals learn to use spellcheck, always remember that companies such as Apple or Microsoft – another company scammers often pretend to be calling from – simply won't ask for your creditcard details over the phone.



# Email spam hits 12-year low

#### What happened?

Time to break out the champagne: spam has slid to its lowest level in more than a decade. That's according to security firm Symantec, which said that 49.7 per cent of the emails it scanned in June were

spam messages - the lowest proportion in 12 years. In the month since, that rate has continued to fall, dropping to 46.4 per cent.

Symantec said this was mostly down to successful legal action taken by law-enforcement agencies worldwide against criminal networks. However, there's a downside. Online gangs are shifting away from spam but looking to malware to make money instead, so the number of hacking attacks has risen.

#### How will it affect you?

At one point in the history of email, more than 90 per cent of messages were believed to be spam – though most of us wouldn't see the difference between then and now. That's because most modern email providers, such as Outlook.com and Gmail, do a good job of filtering spam before it hits our inboxes, either blocking it entirely or diverting it straight to our junk folders



where it sits unread until it's deleted.

#### What do we think?

We congratulate email providers and security firms for holding back the tide of spam. A few years ago, this kind of good news seemed a long way off. Without such efforts, email would have quickly become useless rather than remaining a tool many of us depend on in our work and personal life.

Web users also deserve praise, because very few now fall for the kind of transparent frauds that comprise most spam.
Criminals know this, and now increasingly use malware, not spam, in their attempts to steal the personal information they need to gain access to your bank account.

However, email and security companies should realise that the demise of spam doesn't mean we're winning the war on cybercrime, and must reinforce their efforts to keep us safe.

### Windows 10 to be sold on USB stick

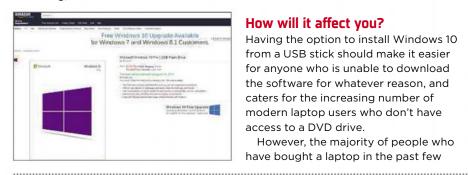
#### What happened?

Microsoft announced that Windows 10 would be the first version of the operating system you can buy on USB stick as an alternative to downloading it or buying it on DVD.

However, if you are already running a legitimate copy of Windows 7 or 8.1, you won't need to "buy" anything, as you will be able to download Windows 10 free of charge for 12 months from its launch on 29 July - provided your hardware is compatible.

Microsoft is rolling out Windows 10 in waves. Windows Insiders will be the first users allowed to download the OS, followed by Windows 7 and 8.1 users who reserved their copy by clicking the Windows icon that appeared in their Taskbar after a recent update.

Windows 10 has been officially released to manufacturers at the time of writing, which means it has been





finalised ahead of its launch on 29 July. However, it seems the USB version of Windows 10 won't be available to buy straight away. The Amazon US product page for the USB drive says it will only be released on 16 August (see screengrab). There's no news on when it will be available in the UK, but we'd be surprised if it doesn't arrive before the end of the summer.

#### How will it affect you?

Having the option to install Windows 10 from a USB stick should make it easier for anyone who is unable to download the software for whatever reason, and caters for the increasing number of modern laptop users who don't have access to a DVD drive.

However, the majority of people who have bought a laptop in the past few

years will already be on Windows 7 or 8.1 anyway, so will be eligible for the free download offer and won't want to have to pay for either of the physical formats Microsoft is offering.

Even if you don't qualify for the free upgrade because you're still using Windows XP or Vista, you will still have the option to download the software you'll just have to pay for it first. Prices have yet to be confirmed, but the Home version is expected to cost £99.99.

#### What do we think?

This is a good move on Microsoft's part, as it makes it easier to upgrade to the most eagerly anticipated (and most hyped) new operating system in years.

In the future, things will be easier indeed, this might be the first and last instance of Windows being offered on USB. From now on, Microsoft intends to update Windows on an ongoing basis, rather than release completely new versions - as happened between Windows 7 and 8. Users will therefore receive regular updates rather than having to completely reinstall the operating system. This should mean new features arrive quicker than before, though some users may get fed up with constant updates.

#### **Humax Freesat HDR-1100S**

The Freesat HDR-1100S is the successor to Humax's much-loved Freesat+ PVR box, the HDR-1010S. The new model differs from its predecessor primarily in that it's significantly smaller and adds Wi-Fi connectivity.

The size reduction is mainly due to Humax dropping the front LCD screen, which was largely redundant

because you can easily tell what channel you're watching using vour remote control and TV screen. Also gone is the SCART slot - again, we doubt many Freesat boxes, the HDR-1100S provides 200 free TV and radio channels (including 11 HD channels) once you've connected it to a satellite dish (bought separately).

Using Freesat's award-winning TV guide, Freetime, you can also catch up on any programmes from the past seven days across 26 channels, and you can pause, rewind and record live TV using the box's built-in hard drive.

Navigating the Freetime menus was smooth and straightforward and we also liked the Freesat app for Android and iOS, which lets you set programme reminders and recordings on the go.

The HDR-1100S has two USB ports that you can use to access photos, videos and music. The device also has built-in Ethernet, providing a faster and more stable network connection than the integrated Wi-Fi, which is handy if you want to stream content from a NAS drive. Lastly, there's HDMI or composite for connecting to your TV and an optical connection for audio.

> Overall, we really liked the HDR-1100S, and it does well to build on many of the things we already loved in its predecessor. The new box is available in

black and white in three sizes: 500GB (£189), 1TB (£219) and 2TB (£299).

## Will Microsoft stop making Windows Phones?

Microsoft boss Satya Nadella has dismissed rumours that the company is considering pulling out of the mobile phone business and killing off the Windows Phone mobile OS. Nadella told website ZDNet: "We will do everything we have to do to make sure we're making progress on phones". He said that even if no company wanted to build phones running Windows, Microsoft would continue to do so itself. "There will be Lumia devices," he promised.

The Microsoft boss suggested that the company's Lumia handsets could turn out to be Microsoft's equivalent of the iMac, which helped swing Apple out of long-term decline on its way to becoming the world's biggest technology company.

"You've got to remember even the Apple regeneration started with colourful iMacs," Nadella argued. "So let us first get the colourful iMacs. I think with what we're doing with Lumia, we're at that stage. I want to do good devices that people like, and then we will go on to do the next thing and the next thing."

He was forced into defending Microsoft's mobile ambitions following the company's announcement a week earlier that it was cutting 7,800 jobs, most of them in the phones division, and writing off \$7.6bn related to the \$9.5bn it spent buying Nokia in 2013.

Nadella said fewer Lumia devices would be built in the future, leading to



speculation that Microsoft was considering scrapping Windows Phone and choosing instead to focus solely on Windows for computers.

### LIKELIHOOD RATING

Nadella may have stretched the point by comparing Lumia phones to Apple's iMac, but his bullishness is persuasive. And while Microsoft lost the first battles of the phone wars to Apple and Google, the market is too lucrative for the company to ignore. Plus, Nadella wants developers to write 'universal' apps for Windows 10 on PCs, phones and tablets. It's a crucial part of the company's 'free upgrade' strategy.

#### **PATCH TUESDAY: July**

July's Patch Tuesday could be the last of its kind, since Microsoft has pledged to push security patches to Windows 10 as they are developed rather than in a single monthly update. The second Tuesday of July saw Microsoft release 14 bulletins, fixing dozens of vulnerabilities. Twenty-nine of these flaws were patched by bulletin MS15-065, a major update for Internet Explorer that affects all versions of the browser since IE6. The most serious of these vulnerabilities lets a hacker remotely access a victim's PC by tricking them into visiting an infected

web page. This and three other bulletins were given Microsoft's highest severity rating of Critical. These included bulletin MS15-066, which fixed a vulnerability in the operating system's VBScript scripting engine; bulletin MS15-067, which patched a flaw in Window 7's and Windows 8's Remote Desktop Protocol; and bulletin MS15-068, which affected Windows Hyper V. All three fixed flaws that could have been exploited by hackers to give them remote access to other people's computers. bit.ly/july376

Security breaches are always bad news. But it's

worth noting that the LastPass breach didn't result in the theft of

customers' master passwords - just the hashes and salts used to verify their access to the service. This was only a problem for anyone who had chosen a weak master password - hence LastPass's advice to change this password. Nor did they get access to the vault holding individual customer passwords. So while no solution can be deemed 100-per-cent secure, using a password manager is safer than using one password for every online account you hold, and much easier than trying to remember numerous complicated passwords. For anyone who's reluctant to use an online

service, there are password managers that store the data on your own computer.

Have there been any instances yet of malware targeted at wearables?

Although there have as yet been no

malware threats aimed specifically at wearables, they are still as susceptible to attack as other connected devices. Like computers, wearable devices are built on familiar operating systems and have vulnerabilities that can be exploited. The problem is,

since security and privacy are not a priority for developers, these devices are not built with security front of mind.

One of our researchers recently managed to hack into his own smart bracelet (see bit.ly/bracelet376), and found that in some cases you can connect to a wearable device without the owner even knowing.

And remember, the risk doesn't just come from malware being installed on a wearable. If the device used to access it, such as a smartphone, is compromised, the data stored on the wearable may be compromised too.

## Top Tips of the Fortnight

#### Stop using Flash

It looks like Flash is on its last legs after another spate of security problems hit the software recently. These resulted in Firefox changing its default settings to block the software completely (see page 8 for more), and Chrome also blocking it for non-core elements of web pages, such as adverts. If your site uses Flash for animations, widgets or other special features, we'd recommend you consider switching to something else, before the browsers decide to block it completely.

#### Hack your WordPress website

One of the great things about WordPress (www.wordpress.org) is that it's open, so you're free to tweak it in any way you like. If you've ever delved into the WordPress code on your website

(using the Editor that's on the Appearance menu of your Dashboard) to work out how to change its look and feel, you'll have seen lots of Template Tags. These are the bits of text among the PHP coding language tags that WordPress templates use to grab information from its database. There are nearly 200 Template Tags in WordPress and, if you rearrange them or add new ones, you can change how your site is displayed.

If you want to find out more, the Tuts+ website has a brilliant new guide at bit.ly/tuts376, which is a great way to start exploring what Template Tags can do.

I think bad sites are linking to my website and are having a negative impact on my SEO. Can I stop them?

Poor-quality inbound links can hurt your rankings, so this a serious problem. The bad news is that you can't stop websites from linking to you. The good news is you can request that Google ignore these links using Google's Disavow Tool. You'll need to register your site with Google's Search Console (www.google.com/ webmasters/tools) to get access to it but, once registered, you can put together and submit a text file containing the offending links (or sites). Use the Disavow Tool with caution and be aware there's no guarantee that Google will remove the bad links.

Boosting your site's Google ranking is hard if you don't know where to start. BeamUsUp's WebCrawler scans your site and highlights areas that are holding it back. It doesn't need to be installed but it does require Java



Load the software and type the URL of the site you want to test into the URL bar. 11 Click the Start/Stop button. The software scans your site to see whether it has any problems you can fix - you can see how it's doing in the progress bar. 2 Problems will be listed below, as they are discovered. 4



When the progress bar shows Finished, 🚺 click one of the warnings listed. 2 This will show you the URLs of the offending pages, 3 and list the problems WebCrawler found. 4 Click the Show All Filtered URLs 5 button to see all the problems at once, or the Show All URLs button 6 for a global list of all pages that have been checked.



Because you don't have to install the WebCrawler, you lose all data when you close it. You can always repeat the scan, of course, but a better option is to export your data. The first three Export buttons I create CSV files that will open in any spreadsheet. You can also export straight into Excel 2 and Google Drive **1** if you prefer.

# Wi-Fi extenders

Does your Wi-Fi network fade to nothing when you move away from your router? Andy Shaw tests 11 extenders that can stretch your signal to reach every corner of your home

i-Fi makes home networking incredibly convenient, but the signal can fail if your router is positioned too far away from the rooms where you need it. A Wi-Fi extender can be positioned between your router and any problem areas to give your wireless signal greater reach. We tested 11 Wi-Fi extenders to find out which is the best.

#### **HOW WE TESTED**

We tested the extenders in a domestic environment by connecting two PCs to a Linksys EA6900 AC1900 router: one using a Gigabit Ethernet cable and the other via an AC1900 PCI Express extender. To measure the network speed of each type of network, on each adapter, we transferred a 500MB video file from the router-connected PC to the distant one. In the first test, the distant PC was placed 12m away, on a separate floor; in the second, it was in an out-building 20m away. In each test, the Wi-Fi extender was placed optimally between the two PCs.

#### Netgear Nighthawk AC1900 Extender | £130 | www.netgear.co.uk

The Nighthawk looks more like a router than a traditional Wi-Fi extender. It has three large antennas sticking out the back, alongside five Gigabit Ethernet ports and a single USB 3 port (which can share printers and storage).

It supports the high-end AC1900 variant of 802.11ac Wi-Fi, providing up to 1,300Mbps (megabits per second) on the 5GHz bandwidth and 600Mbps on 2.4GHz, as long as you have compatible triple-antenna adapters that also support the standard. You'll be hard pushed to find many AC1900 adapters or devices, other than PCI cards of the kind we used in our tests, but more are likely to appear in the future. When they do, this extender will be ready.

The well-designed wizard makes it easy to find your existing networks and create extended ones. You have to sign up with an email address and password, which is an unnecessary extra step, but that's our only complaint.

Positioning the extender is also very simple. Both network bands have their own signalstrength meter, so you can easily tell when it's placed in the optimum spot. And because it's so powerful, it can hold a stable link even if it's further away from your router, so you have greater flexibility over where it sits.

Performance is exceptionally good. Even on the 2.4GHz band, we recorded speeds of 12.8MB/s (megabytes per second) in our mid-range tests. This increased to 17.9MB/s

and a storming 20.1MB/s with 5GHz 802.11n and 802.11ac connections. The Nighthawk's speeds dropped in our long-range tests, but they were still acceptable and ahead of any rival extenders. In fact, this was the only non-HomePlug extender to keep a stable signal to our out-building, maintaining a speed of 5.2MB/s.



The Netgear Nighthawk is expensive, but it's fast, powerful and built to last. Its Wi-Fi networks have more speed and power than most of your hardware will need, but

VERDICT

this quarantees longevity, because it will be able to cope with the next generation of devices, which are likely to come with Wi-Fi standards that make full use of the Nighthawk's advanced tools. It came top in all our speed tests, which makes it the best Wi-Fi extender you can buy.

in speakers and stream music to it. Setup could be better there's no mention of WPS in the instructions and no help with positioning - but with some experimentation, we managed to find effective spots for both our tests.

The RE6500 was a consistently good performer in our mid-range tests, scoring just behind the Netgear, Asus and ZyXEL extenders in the 5GHz band and just ahead of Asus and ZyXEL on the 2.4GHz network. What's more, it held up better in our long-range tests, where it jostled for supremacy with the Gold Award-winning Nighthawk.

#### **VERDICT**



The RE6500 wasn't the top performer across the board but it's up there with the best at long range, particularly on the 5GHz network. It also has music streaming and four Gigabit Ethernet ports, and is much cheaper than the Nighthawk.

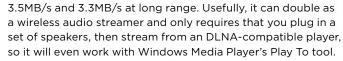
#### TP-Link TL-WPA4230P | £78 uk.tp-link.com

The TL-WPA4230P is a HomePlug kit, so you plug the basic unit in near your router and connect it via the supplied

Ethernet cable, then position the Wi-Fi extender where you want your Wi-Fi hotspot to be. Like all HomePlug devices, it takes barely any setup. The device managed 11MB/s at mid-range and 4.9MB/s at long-range, coming close to the 2.4GHz Wi-Fi speed of the fastest devices here, but it doesn't use the 5GHz network. However, we found these HomePlugs to be the best device for getting an extremely stable Wi-Fi signal to our out-building in the garden.

#### Linksys RE1400W | £45 www.linksys.com/gb

The Linksys RE1400W can extend a 5GHz network, but it only works with 802.11n networks, not 802.11ac. Its performance was middling in our tests, reaching 11.2MB/s and 13MB/s across the 2.4GHz and 5GHz networks at short range, but dropping to

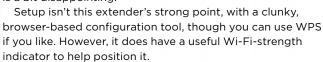

For a smaller device, the Asus RP-AC52 has some impressive features, including a handy nightlight, which can help you find your way around your hall or landing in the dark. It can also be used to stream music to a set of speakers, as long as you use Asus's own AiPlayer Android app. Its single Ethernet port is of the Fast Ethernet standard rather than Gigabit, though, which is a bit disappointing.



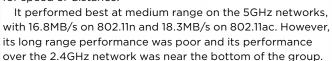
It performed well in our tests, hitting a respectable 14.5MB/s on the 802.11ac network in our mid-range test, and still delivered good results across the 2.4GHz and 5GHz bands in the long-range tests.

#### **VERDICT**

The Asus comes in a small HomePlug-style case that attaches directly to a power socket. It's not as powerful as the Netgear and Linksys models, and it lacks any extra Ethernet ports, but it can still stream audio via an Android device.

ZyXEL's AC750 extender is one of the smallest devices we tested. It has a Fast Ethernet port and some lights to indicate signal strength, which help to position it in the best location. It can also be configured to optimise your network for speed or distance.



#### TP-Link RE210 | £44 | uk.tp-link.com

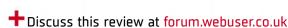
TP-Link's RE210 is the only 802.11ac wall-plug extender in our test with a Gigabit Ethernet port. It's easy to set up using WPS, but there isn't much guidance on position, other than the manual suggesting you place it equidistant between your router and adapter. At medium range, the 802.11n 2.4GHz speeds reached 10.4MB/s but its 5GHz was 7.9MB/s. 802.11ac was faster, at 9MB/s, but that's far

behind the fastest devices we tested. Long-range tests held up better, recording 4.5MB/s on the 2.4GHz network, but it dropped down the rankings on the 5GHz networks.

#### **OUR VERDICT**

If you want to extend your Wi-Fi network, you probably want to extend it as far and as fast as you can. Our Gold Award-winner, the Netgear Nighthawk, is an expensive option but it's also the best at its job. It uses all the latest standards, which means it's more future-proof, because it shouldn't get overtaken by new standards on Wi-Fi devices any time soon.

The Linksys RE6500 receives our Silver Award for offering the best alternative to Netgear's speed, especially over long range, and for

a very attractive price. If you're on a tighter budget but still want a top-class Wi-Fi extender, it's well worth considering.

Our third-place Bronze Award goes to the Asus RP-AC52. It's the only HomePlug-style extender in our top three, which makes it smaller and more compact than the other award-winners. Although it doesn't have as many extras such as Ethernet ports, it can still be used to connect to a pair of speakers for streaming music over Wi-Fi.

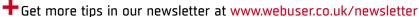

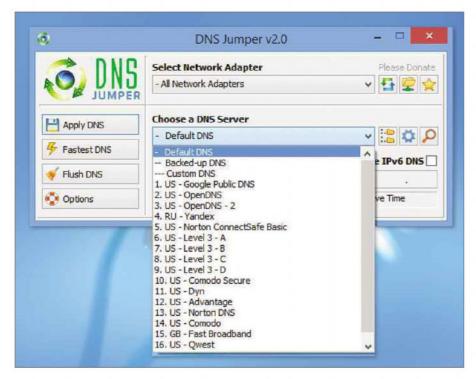

DNS (Domain Name System) is used to translate site names into IP addresses so that they can be understood by web servers and internet routers. When you type a website name into the address bar, your browser has to ask the DNS server for the IP address of the required site before it's able to load it. As a result. there is a small, but noticeable, delay before the page appears on screen. You probably use the default DNS server provided by your ISP, but there might be faster options available, and DNS Jumper lets you quickly switch to an alternative DNS server that could shave milliseconds off your lookup time, and speed up your browsing.

The program is tiny and fully portable, so you can store it on a USB memory stick. Just run the tool, choose the DNS server to switch to and click 'Fastest DNS' to find the best choice for your setup. The latest version of DNS Jumper introduces some useful new startup options that allow you to set the program to start alongside Windows,



check for the fastest DNS server and switch to it automatically, so you'll always be using the fastest available option. There's also a feature called Turbo Resolve, which can reduce the time it takes to complete the DNS speed test itself. It's disabled by default, but is easily enabled, and makes a noticeable difference to how quickly

results appear.

You no longer need to open the program menu to make changes to DNS Jumper, because all its important features can now be accessed via its icon in your System Tray. If you don't see any improvement in your internet speed, you can easily switch back to your previous DNS server.

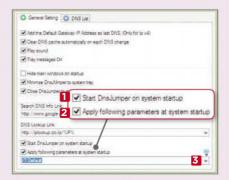

## Count down the days until your holiday

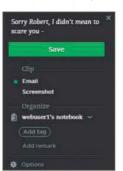
You probably know the date you're heading off on holiday, but it's helpful to be reminded of how much time you have left to get ready for your trip. HolidayFeeling Countdown (bit.ly/ holiday376) is a new Chrome add-on from the Post Office that displays the numbers of days remaining on your New Tab page. Just click the cog icon to select the date on the

calendar and begin the holiday countdown. Not only that, but the extension also lets you specify the language of your destination, so you can learn useful holiday phrases such as 'What time is it?', 'Do you speak English?' and, of course, 'Where is the Post Office?'. The add-on displays clouds and planes floating across an attractive sky-blue background, and the accompanying website (holidayfeeling. postofficeholiday.co.uk) gives you lots of other helpful advice for your holiday.



#### Save even more web content using Evernote

Evernote Web Clipper (evernote.com/ webclipper) has long been one of our favourite tools for saving content from the web for later, and the updated



Chrome extension makes it even more useful. You can now save Gmail messages, including attachments, to your Evernote account and choose whether to 'clip' the

whole conversation thread or just the emails from the other person. Other handy new features include saving clutter-free videos from YouTube, product details from Amazon and profile information from LinkedIn,



complete with annotations and highlights. As always with Evernote, it's easy to share the content you clip without leaving the page you're currently browsing.

#### Replace bad words with 'awesome'

There are several Chrome extensions that make browsing the web more pleasant by substituting words and names you don't like - such as 'millenial', 'UKIP' or 'Kardashian' - for others you prefer. The latest example is an add-on inspired by and named after the song 'Everything is Awesome' from The Lego Movie, which finds and replaces negative words and swearwords on web pages with the word 'awesome'. Once installed from bit.ly/awesome376, it starts working automatically and you'll soon find rainbow-coloured instances of





awesomeness brightening your browser. When we tested it, Everything is Awesome made 67 substitutions on the Mail Online homepage alone. Awesome!

#### Move multiple tabs in one go

You probably know that you can 'tear off' a Chrome tab into a new window by dragging and dropping it with your mouse, but what if you want to move more than one tab at once? The answer is very simple, although it's kept curiously quiet by Google: just hold down the Shift key, click adjacent tabs to select them (they'll 'glow' to show they're selected), then drag the lot to tear them off into a new window. Alternatively, you can move nonadjacent tabs to another window by pressing Ctrl before you click and drag them. If you're using a Mac, hold down Cmd rather than Ctrl to select multiple tabs.

## **Adjust your privacy** preferences more easily

Firefox stores many of your privacy settings in its rather baffling 'about:config' section, so you don't tweak them unnecessarily but, if you've got a hankering for tampering, you can install Privacy Settings (bit.ly/privacy376). This useful add-on lets you access and alter all your privacy preferences in one place. These include Safe Browsing (which scans downloads for malware), Tracking Protection (which stops advertisers following you around the web) and Geo-location (which lets websites see where you're browsing from).



You can either turn settings on and off individually, or use the Full Privacy or Protect Privacy & Security buttons to apply default preferences. Hover your mouse over a setting to see a tooltip explanation of how it protects your privacy.

#### Hide annoying adverts by right-clicking them

Rather than blocking all online ads and depriving websites of revenue, you can use the punningly named Firefox add-on Hide Adverse-tisements (bit.ly/ adverse376) to only block the most annoying and offensive adverts, such as those featuring women in suggestive poses. Just right-click the ad and choose 'Hide this' to browse the rest of the page without distraction (reloading

the page restores the ads). It's a simple but useful tool, although it doesn't work on Flash adverts, and



the next version will (anonymously) notify advertisers when you block their ads, so they realise their techniques are causing irritation.

#### Move useful Firefox features to one panel

LastPage (bit.ly/lastpage376) lets you access many of the most useful Firefox features in a resizable panel at the bottom of the window, rather than spread across several menus. These include your Bookmarks folder. History and Add-ons Manager; Firefox's 'about:config' settings; and the Session Restore page that lets you recover closed tabs and windows. To move between these different features, click



the View menu and select the relevant option from the new LastPage sub-menu.

#### Opt out of McAfee when installing Flash

It's essential to use the latest version of Flash Player to combat security flaws but, annoyingly, the download (from get.adobe.com/flashplayer) comes with an 'optional' pre-ticked offer for McAfee Security Scan Plus.



It's easy to untick this. but even easier to forget to do so, which is where

McAfee Auto Opt Out (bit.ly/ mcafee376) comes in handy. As its name suggests, this add-on automatically opts you out of the bundled McAfee extra when you install a Flash Player update from the Adobe site, to save you the hassle of removing it afterwards.

#### OTHER BROWSERS

**Block social widgets** on web pages Social-media widgets such as Facebook's ubiquitous Like button are among the nosiest parkers on the web, tracking the sites you visit and

you click, so they can target you with adverts. The new Opera

the links



add-on Social Disconnect Plus (bit.ly/social376) lets you shake them off your trail by blocking social content from more than 20 companies, including Facebook, Google, Microsoft, Amazon and eBay. You can turn the extension on and off with a single click, and usefully see how many social trackers it has blocked since you activated it. The developer also promises that by using the add-on, pages will load 25 per cent faster.

We cover the Desktop version of Apple Music in this issue's Workshop 1 (see page 52), but Apple's new streaming service can also be accessed via the Music app on your iPhone or iPad, once you've installed iOS 8.4. Unlike Spotify, there is no free streaming option (except for listening to its Beats 1 radio station), but you'll be automatically enrolled in

a three-month free trial after choosing either the individual or family membership (which cost £9.99 and £14.99 a month respectively thereafter).

Perhaps our favourite thing about Apple Music is its For You discovery feature. The first time you launch the app, you'll be asked to indicate your music tastes by tapping a selection of genres and artists you like. Based on this, Apple Music then suggests albums and playlists (which are compiled by music

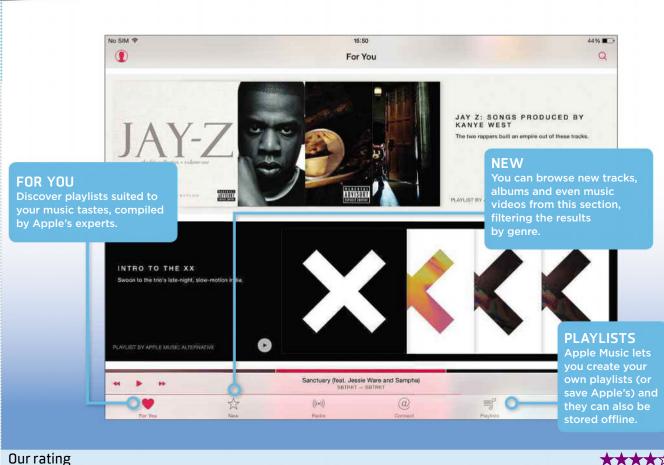
experts rather than computers) for you to listen to. By tapping the 'love' icon on the albums and tracks you like most, you can help improve the quality of Apple Music's recommendations even further.

We were really impressed by Apple's live radio station, Beats 1, which is advert-free and hosted by three regular DJs including Zane Lowe, as well as special guests such as Elton

John and Dr Dre. The variety of music is better than anything you'll find on your local radio stations and you can launch the station by simply telling Siri to "play Beats 1".

Elsewhere, however, Music doesn't yet feel like the finished article. Its basic Share option pales in comparison to Spotify's more advanced social features and, unusually for Apple, the interface often feels slightly over-complicated. If you don't already pay to stream music, it's well worth using Apple Music's three-month free trial, but otherwise you might be best off waiting to see how the service develops before jumping ship.

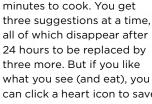

# WINDOWS 10 THE TRUTH

COVER FEATURE Don't believe the hype! **Wayne Williams** reveals why Windows 10 might not be the all-conquering operating system that we've been waiting for – at least not just yet

icrosoft has released its fair share of bad operating systems over the years: Windows Me, for example, infuriated users with its frequent crashes, while Windows Vista introduced the universally loathed User Account Control. But even by those standards, Windows 8 was a mess, and it'll come as no surprise to anyone who used it in its first year that it's the software giant's least successful operating system ever.

Thanks to two major updates, Windows 8.1 (as it became) is a much better OS, but even so, many of us can't wait to ditch it for the new Windows 10, which promises to bring together the best bits of Windows 7 and 8.1, with some welcome new features thrown in for good measure.

But are we being over-optimistic to hope that Windows 10 will set the PC world to rights? Has Microsoft been too hasty in choosing a summer release when many testers have deemed the OS "buggy" and "unstable"?

In this Windows 10 special, we cut through the hype to reveal the truth about what Microsoft isn't telling you about its latest OS, and explain why it might be more sensible to hold back on upgrading until all the early problems have been ironed out. We also look at some of the worst mistakes made by Microsoft when launching previous versions of Windows, and why experience suggests that it may be foolish to rush in where wiser PC users hesitate to tread.

### WHAT MICROSOFT ISN'T TELLING YOU



years until 13 October 2020. Beyond this date, Microsoft won't add features to Windows 10. The OS then enters the five-year Extended Support phase, which ends on 14 October 2025. This is the more important date because that's when Microsoft will stop updating Windows 10

with security fixes. However, the newly updated

Windows lifecycle fact sheet (bit.ly/ lifecycle376) has some accompanying small print that says ongoing support is all dependent on devices remaining compatible.

"A device may not be able to receive updates if the device hardware is incompatible, lacking current drivers, or otherwise outside of the Original Equipment Manufacturer's ("OEM") support period," the text reads.

So the question remains: will you have to replace ageing hardware in order to guarantee receiving future updates? That small print suggests you might. And now that Windows is a regularly updated service, will Microsoft release new "baseline" versions of Windows 10 (such as Windows 10.1) every few years

and, if so, will the 10-year life cycle be updated accordingly?

In essence, then, at the time of writing, we still don't know how long Microsoft will continue to support Windows 10, as it is launching, with feature upgrades and security patches.

More troubling is Microsoft's announcement that updates will be mandatory. Windows 10

Home users will have no say at all in which updates are installed and when, and while Windows 10 Pro users will be able to defer updates for up to eight months, they won't be able to veto them entirely.

Microsoft says this is in the interests of improved security, but if you've ever had to disable Windows Update to stop it messing up your PC, you'll know that updates sometimes impede, rather than improve, the performance and security of your system. It's rumoured that Microsoft will cut off security patches to users who block updates using third-party software, potentially making them vulnerable to malware



Only Windows 10 Pro business users will be able to stop updates completely, and thus sidestep problematic ones, but us hapless Home users won't have that privilege. This means that if Microsoft decides to make major changes to elements of the operating system, including bundling additional unwanted content (games like Candy Crush Saga, for example), you'll have no choice but to accept these changes. Maybe you'll be able to uninstall such additions, maybe you won't.

But the biggest question that remains unanswered about Windows 10 is how much it will cost to buy after the first year. Microsoft has yet to announce UK pricing for Windows 10 at the time of writing, but the Get Windows 10 app

When Microsoft announced Windows 10 last September, it said the OS would be free to Windows 7 and Windows 8 users during its first year of availability, leaving people to wonder what that actually meant. There was talk of "Windows as a service" - so did that mean Microsoft would be charging a yearly subscription for it, like it does for Office 365? Eventually it was clarified that this would be "more than a one-time upgrade: once a Windows device is upgraded to Windows 10, we will continue to keep it current for the supported lifetime of the device - at no additional charge".

However, that then begs the question – what exactly does "supported lifetime of the device" mean? It was initially believed to be a period from two to

four years but, just before we went to press, Microsoft revealed that it would be supporting the new OS for 10 years - the same length of time as previous versions of Windows. Mainstream Windows 10 support starts on 29 July 2015 (launch day) and runs for five



shows the price for Windows 10 Home as £99.99 (crossed out, with "free" next to it). Underneath, it says this is just the "estimated retail price of Windows 10 Home full license, actual prices may vary", which leaves the door open for the price to go up before July 2016

We're also concerned that Microsoft has barely mentioned the fact that once you've upgraded to Windows 10, you have only 30 days to roll back - or 'downgrade' - to your current Windows OS if you decide you don't like the new one. See our



'Downgrade from Windows 10' section on page 42 for more about this catch.

Finally, although it's less likely to be a potential deal-breaker than some of the other unanswered questions we've

covered, it remains unclear how much input Windows Insiders have had on the shape and direction of Windows 10. Microsoft says there are more than five million Windows Insiders, but while we know bugs and other problems have been remedied thanks to feedback from Insiders, we wonder how much (if any) user contribution has been involved in Windows 10's design and functionality. After all, it's hard

to imagine that the majority of users were keen to retain the tiled Start menu in favour of one that's more akin to the standard Windows 7 design.

### THE PROS AND CONS OF NOT UPGRADING

Microsoft obviously wants Windows users to upgrade to Windows 10 as soon as it's released and is offering you hard-to-resist incentives, such as making it free for a whole year after its release. But that doesn't mean you should grab the new OS straight away. With a full 365 days to upgrade, you can wait until

the very last day (presumably, 28 July 2016) if you so wish. Or you can stick with your current operating system and not upgrade at all - you're under no obligation to switch to the new offering.

The biggest disadvantage in choosing to wait is the risk of missing out on the free upgrade offer altogether and

> having to pay for your Windows 10 licence, which will cost at least £99.99. If you try to side-step this by getting the OS for free from sources other than Microsoft, there's the danger of getting a dodgy copy and not being able to download upgrades.

Another downside to not upgrading is



that you won't be able to install Windows 10 apps. Although Windows 8.1 is short of amazing apps, that could change with Windows 10 because Microsoft has made it much easier for developers to 'port' Android and iOS apps over to the new operating system.

That said, it's inevitable that the OS will remain a work in progress for a long time after its release. Microsoft has rushed Windows 10 out of the gate, and even if it's relatively stable and free of



### MINI WORKSHOP | Get Windows 10's best features in Windows 7 or 8.1



You can get many of Windows 10's new features - such as virtual Desktops - in older versions of the OS by installing third-party programs. The easiest way is to install the Windows 10 Transformation Pack (www .windowsxlive.net). Run it, and make sure 'Enable with repair checking (Recommended)' is selected. 1

### WINDOWS 10 USER OR WINDOWS INSIDER?

Microsoft is offering Windows 10 users a choice. From 29 July, you can either upgrade to the RTM (Release to Manufacturing) build of the operating system, which is essentially the "finished" stable version, or you can join upwards of five million or so Windows Insiders testing

preview builds of the OS. Standard Windows 10 users will require a valid Windows 7/8+ or 10 licence, through which the operating system will be 'activated', as with all previous iterations of Windows. However, Windows Insiders won't require a valid licence, making it a good option for Windows XP or Vista users who aren't eligible to upgrade for free. Insiders are offered new

builds to test as they

become available, with each build only lasting for a set time before expiring. Provided you keep updating to the latest builds, you'll be able to keep using the OS for free. Insiders can choose to be on the Fast or Slow ring - those on the Fast ring will receive new cutting-edge (and therefore likely buggy) builds, while Slow ring Insiders will

> be able to upgrade to more stable releases but on a less frequent release schedule. The chief benefit of being a Windows Insider, aside from not requiring a Windows 10 licence, is that you'll be the first to try out new features and changes. The downside is you'll be running a far less stable operating system that will likely crash more regularly, and cause you lots more problems.



bugs, it will still require a lot of updates to fix all the problems that didn't come to light during the Insider Preview testing stage.

Microsoft plans to push Windows 10 to an estimated one billion devices, but so far it has only been tested by around five million Windows Insiders, many of whom won't have reported the problems they've encountered. You can expect Microsoft to be rolling out a ton of updates for at least the first three months or so following Windows 10's official launch, and your best bet is to stick with a stable operating system until these glitches are ironed out and Windows 10 is truly ready for use.



If you're currently running an older version of Windows, such as XP or Vista, you don't have the option to upgrade directly, and you'll need to carry out a fresh Windows 10 install from scratch. This means backing up everything beforehand and either purchasing a valid licence or joining the Windows Insider program and risking buggy versions of the OS instead. All the more reason to not commit yourself until the OS is stable, or you could end up paying even more in the long run.

Although Windows 10 looks



promising, you can get many of its features on Windows 7 and 8.1 right now without the risk of losing your personal files during an upgrade, and without losing the functionality you currently enjoy with your existing operating system. See our Mini Workshop on the previous page to find out how.

We also wouldn't be surprised if the new Edge browser, which currently only works with Windows 10, eventually makes it onto Windows 8.1 - in the same way that Internet Explorer 10 was released for Windows 7 six months after it launched with Windows 8.

Furthermore, while Windows 10 is a huge improvement over Windows 8.1. it looks guite similar, and much of what was unpopular about the tiled OS has been retained. Many users detested the Modern (Metro) interface, but Windows 10 still uses the same tiles, albeit in a Start menu rather than a Start screen.

Windows apps, too, remain a major feature of the OS, even though the apps are generally nowhere near as powerful as standard Windows programs - or "legacy apps", as Microsoft annoyingly insists on referring to them.



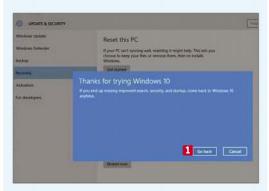
### MINI WORKSHOP How to downgrade from Windows 10 to Windows 7



Provided you've upgraded to Windows 10 as an in-place update (and not a custom install), rolling things back is quite simple and is carried out directly inside Windows. Click the Start button and go to Settings. 11 Click the Update & Security section 2 in the window that opens.



Click Recovery 🚺 in the left-hand pane. You'll see several options, including the ability to 'Reset this PC'. 2 More importantly, underneath this should be the option to go back to Windows 7 (or Windows 8.1, if that's where you upgraded from). Click the 'Get Started' button. 3 You'll be asked why you want to take this action.



Answer the question, or skip it, and click Next. You'll be warned that any changes made to Windows 10 since upgrading will be lost, but your personal files should be safe. Click your way through the following screens, until you get to the 'Thanks for trying Windows 10' screen. Click 'Go back' 11 and the uninstall process will begin.

### **FEATURES YOU'LL LOSE IN WINDOWS 10**

Although Windows 10 offers numerous new features, such as the integration of Microsoft's personal assistant Cortana, multiple Desktops and a modern command prompt, it also. removes several popular tools found in previous versions of Windows. It's a classic case of giving with one hand, and taking with the other.



Without doubt, the biggest feature to be lost in Windows 10 is Windows Media Center. Microsoft has canned the program "due to decreased usage", according to Windows Insider chief Gabriel Aul, and won't even offer it as an optional free download. If you regularly use Media Center, you'll either have to find a free alternative, such as Kodi (kodi.tv), which won our Gold Award in Issue 372, or stick with your existing Windows OS. The moment you install Windows 10, Media Center will be gone. As compensation, Windows

10 offers a free DVD-playback app, but that's hardly the same thing and it lacks most of the useful features offered by Media Center.

If you currently use Desktop gadgets in Windows 7, prepare to say goodbye to them in Windows 10, and to familiar Windows games such as Solitaire, Minesweeper and Hearts. You'll be able to find and download new editions of the first two games in the app store, but they won't come pre-installed.



If you like to manage your own Windows updates, you'd better hope you're eligible for Windows 10 Pro (the free upgrade entitles you to the closest version of Windows 10 that your current OS corresponds to), because the Home version doesn't let you defer updates. The update process in Windows 10 Home is entirely automatic, with updates installed as soon as they become available, whether you like it or not.

Worst of all, some of your existing programs and apps might not work in Windows 10, and you won't know which ones until you try running them in the new OS. Microsoft says that Windows 10 "should work with the same devices and programs that work with Windows 8.1, but you might need to update or reinstall some of them", which doesn't exactly fill us with confidence!



### WHAT TO DO BEFORE YOU UPGRADE

If you decide to upgrade to Windows 10, there are a few things you need to do before clicking the Install button. First, make sure your PC is up to the task of running the new OS. Windows 7 or 8.1 users shouldn't have any problems, but there's no guarantee everything will work as it should. The official minimum system requirements are:

- Processor: 1GHz or faster processor.
- RAM: 1GB for 32-bit Windows 10 or 2GB for 64-bit.
- Hard disk space: 16GB for 32-bit OS or 20GB for 64-bit OS.
- **Graphics card:** DirectX 9 or later with WDDM 1.0 driver.
- Display: 1,024 x 600 pixels.

Assuming your PC is compatible, check that your current version of Windows is up to date, because you can only upgrade if you're running Windows 7 with Service Pack 1 (SP1) or Windows 8.1 with Update 1. If you use an older Windows OS, like XP, you'll need to do a fresh install, and your existing OS will be completely wiped from your hard drive.

The Get Windows 10 app, which

Microsoft has pushed out to Windows 7 and 8.1 users, includes a compatibility checker (this isn't active at the time of writing, but should be from July 29 onwards). Launch the app, click the menu in the upper-left corner and select 'Check your PC'.



Finally, you should back up all your personal data and settings and create a system image in case of problems. You can use the excellent program Macrium Reflect Free (bit.ly/macrium376), which appeared in last issue's Best Free Software, to create the image and restore your system from it.

### **DOWNGRADE FROM WINDOWS 10**

If you decide you don't like Windows 10 after you upgrade to the new operating system, or buy a new PC with the OS pre-installed, it is possible to return to using Windows 7 or 8, provided you make the move within 30 days.

If you upgraded directly to Windows 10 from your old operating system, you can roll things back using the built-in Update & Security

settings. Just follow the steps in our Workshop on the opposite page.

If you bought a new PC with Windows 10 pre-installed, this might still work, but it will depend on whether the seller upgraded the device's operating system before you bought it (in which case it will work) or if Windows 10 was the first operating system installed on it (which means it won't).

The simple uninstall method will only work on PCs that have upgraded via the Get Windows 10 app. If you performed a custom install over the top of Windows 7



or later, you will need to install the older OS from scratch, which will wipe your personal data. The same applies if you upgraded Windows XP or Vista to Windows 10, so again, you'll lose any personal content and programs.

Either way, before attempting to revert from Windows 10 to an older OS, you should back up all your personal files and settings, just in case something goes wrong. See the Mini Workshop on the opposite page for instructions on how to downgrade from Windows 10 quickly and safely.



We asked Web User readers what worries them most about upgrading to Windows 10. Here's what you told us:

What is the situation regarding older Flash-based apps and browser games. Will they still work in Windows 10?

I am using Windows 8.1 with a recovery partition on the main drive. Will upgrading remove this or will it be retained so I can roll back to Windows 8.1, if so desired?

rogerman40

I don't need Edge, I'm quite happy with Chrome. I've no microphone and have no wish to talk to my laptop, so I don't need Cortana. I like the look of Windows 7, which I also understand, and I'm concerned that software such as Encyclopedia Britannica will not work if I upgrade. So why do I need Windows 10?

FratPark

Microsoft has done it again – added unnecessary features just because it can. I understand someone with limited dexterity using voice operation, but nobody else. It's just wasted technology. I used enough of my bandwidth downloading Windows 8.1 and 8.1.1, so I won't be using three weeks' allowance to download Windows 10.

Mikec1

My concerns are that old versions of Office, such as 2000, may not work on Window 10, and my old printers won't have W10 drivers available.

Peru

I've got used to Windows 8/8.1, but now I'll no longer be able to type a request anywhere on the Start page, as I currently can, for example typing N to bring up a link to Notepad. But my biggest concern is recovering the system should it fail to boot. What happens to the PC manufacturer's recovery partitions and drivers? It seems to me that they are useless once Windows 10 is installed.

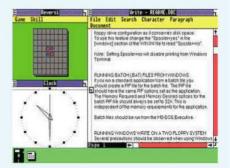

Since 1985, there have been more than 40 iterations of Windows. Here are our highlights.

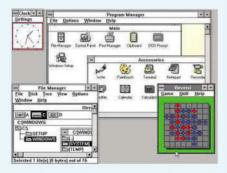
### Windows 1.0

A basic, black and white interface, which arrived on a single 5.25in floppy disk and included a strategy game called Reversi.



### Windows 3.0

Microsoft's first big win, thanks to a better interface, memory management and support for text-mode DOS programs.



### **Windows NT**

More stable and more secure, with an emphasis on networking.

### Windows 95

The first consumerfriendly version of Windows, it introduced the Start



button, taskbar, Windows Explorer and a startup sound.

### Windows 98

A more modern interface, featuring improved hardware support and built-in Internet Explorer and Outlook Express.

### Windows Me

Specifically designed for home use with a few internal tweaks to improve speed - but it's really just a stopgap.

# **MICROSOFT'S BIGGEST** WINDOWS BLUNDERS

Windows 10 will be the widest-ever release of an OS, but Microsoft has 30 years of experience at botching launches, as Rob Beattie recalls

### Precarious presentations

It's a technological truth that if something can go wrong during a new product demonstration, it probably will - often because of highly complex software that's ready to be promoted but isn't quite ready for use.

Even so, a YouTube search for "Windows product demonstration fail" uncovers some pure comedy gold. This includes Vista producing a Blue Screen of Death during a public demonstration (bit.ly/vistalaunch376), after Windows 98 had done exactly the same thing during a live demo by Bill Gates himself (bit.ly/98launch376).

But nothing can prepare you for the humiliation of seeing Mr Microsoft sink deeper and deeper into one of Conan O'Brien's comfy chairs as he tries in vain to get a peep out of Windows XP Media Center Edition (bit.ly/medialaunch376).

So what awaits us with Windows 10? On this evidence, quite possibly a repeat of that classic Microsoft catchphrase: "The great thing about.... whoa!".



### Design disasters

Windows Vista cluttered our screens with unnecessary bits of electronic furniture, such as the pointless Sidebar and its range of largely redundant gadgets. It also introduced the processor-sapping Aero interface with its glass effects and pointless Flip 3D task-switching.

However, nothing can compare with the way Windows 8 stank up the place. By hiding the Start menu and Desktop, and unleashing the bizarre tile-based Modern (Metro) interface and disappearing/reappearing Charms bar, both of which are fine on a touchscreen

but hopeless with a keyboard and mouse, Microsoft lost in a stroke any kudos it had accumulated for the widely admired Windows 7.



Fortunately, one of the highlights of Windows 10 is that it partly brings back the Windows 7 interface, while retaining the better aspects of Windows 8.1.

However, the company's worst blunder of all is still Microsoft Bob. the preposterous interface for home PCs that reimagined (we use the word loosely) the Desktop as a series of cartoon rooms where real objects, such as notebooks and calendars, represented programs. Sadly, there was no way to throw the entire interface onto the roaring fire in the study. Bob is also responsible for introducing the world's most loathed typeface, Comic Sans. It says a lot that many tech journalists described Windows 8 as "the worst thing since Microsoft Bob".



### Terrible technology

Imagine having to ask permission every time you wanted to put something away in a kitchen cupboard, change channels on the TV or go to the toilet. That was the kind of user "experience" delivered by Windows Vista and its irritatingly

nannyish User Account Control (UAC), which made computing doubts and anxieties part of daily life. Hilariously in retrospect, at least - a product manager at Microsoft once claimed that the aggressive UAC built into Vista was deliberately designed to "annoy users" in a wrong-headed attempt to improve how both they and software companies behaved. "We needed to change the ecosystem and we needed a heavy hammer to do it," he said, echoing what many of us felt like doing to Vista.

Meanwhile, Windows Me was such a confusing and pointless release that no-one even knew how to pronounce its name (Me? Em Ee?) or whether it stood for Millennium Edition or Multimedia Edition; PC World magazine probably came closest to clearing things up by calling it the "Mistake Edition".



Even Windows XP, loved and lamented long after Microsoft turned off its life support, arrived dragging a dog called Internet Explorer 6 with it. This appalling, bug-ridden browser singlehandedly held back web development for the five miserable years of its active product life; and even longer for the many poor people who were forced to keep using it at work. Here's hoping the

new Edge browser proves safer, faster and more reliable.



### Awful adverts

Microsoft has managed to produce some cringingly bad adverts. Steve Ballmer set the bar low right from the start with his used-car salesperson-style tirade in praise of Windows 1.0's "advanced operating environment" (bit .ly/ballmer376. This dreadful promo has since been explained as a prank for internal consumption only, but it's knuckle-gnawingly bad, either way. As is the extraordinary piece of nonsense (bit.ly/windows386376) used to promote Windows 386, which starts as

a Mission Impossible spoof before descending into a Cyndi Lauper-style pop video



singalong - "W-W-Windows 386!".

More recently, there was the bizarre ad campaign that tried to encourage people to host their own Windows 7 launch parties (bit.ly/

windows7launch376). It featured a group of unconvincing actors standing around in an equally wooden kitchen, imparting advice such as "part of the fun of a launch party is seeing what you already know". Yeah, thanks for that.

However, our favourite (because we're of a certain age) is a promotional video in which Chandler and Rachel from Friends teach you how to use Windows 95 (bit.ly/friends376), which - in the words of one viewer - "gets worse the farther you watch".



### Windows XP

The first 100-per-cent Windows success. Intuitive and attractive, with excellent hardware support, it sold more than one billion copies.



### **Windows Vista**

Overblown and interface-heavy, with a widely hated tool called **User Account Control and** ineffective family 'safety' features.

### Windows 7

Still the one to beat, it muffled User Account Control, boosted performance and is still the most agile of all Windows releases.

### Windows 8/8.1

A muddled combination of Desktop and tablet interfaces that many users find baffling; 8.1 reinstated the Start button sharpish.



### Windows 10

We like the virtual Desktops, Cortana and Edge but can Microsoft produce a single, unified Windows that works well across devices?

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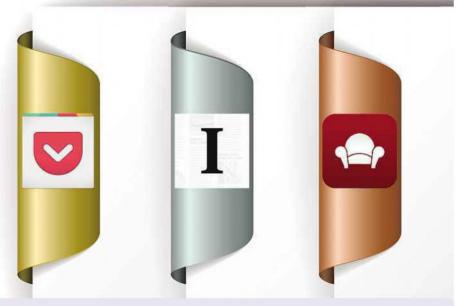
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# Best read-it-later services

You don't always have time to read a long article as soon as you find it on the web. Andy Shaw tests six read-it-later tools to see which is best for keeping your saved articles accessible and organised



Pocket | getpocket.com | ★★★★

### What we liked:

Pocket was the original read-it-later service (it was even called Read It Later when it was first launched) and, in our opinion, it's still the best.

Every aspect of it is just that little bit better than the competition and, although there's a paid-for version, the free service is all that most people will need

It's very easy to add articles, videos and web pages to Pocket: there are browser add-ons for all the main browsers (it's preinstalled on Firefox now, whether you like it or not); you can send articles to it by email; and it's well integrated into hundreds of other apps and services including Twitter and Feedly. To save a page in your browser, you simply click the add-on's icon. This saves the page and, unlike the other services we've reviewed here, lets you add tags straight away, so you can file and organise your reading as you go.

Once you've saved an item to Pocket, you can use its own apps to view your saved stuff anywhere, either via the website or through the apps. These are available for phones and tablets running Android or iOS, and Kobo ebook devices.

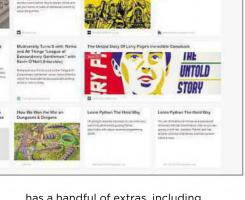
All the apps let you choose between articles. videos and images, but you can also view by tag, which is handy when you want to catch up on a particular topic. Your saved articles are represented by thumbnail images, which makes the interface look more inviting and

interesting than our other awardwinning services.

When you view an article, you're presented with a stripped-back version of the web page, so your reading isn't distracted by clutter. Images are included but all the surrounding web furniture is removed, which makes pages very clear to read, though it isn't conducive to exploring more of the site the article is from.

### How it can be improved:

You don't get everything in the free version. Premium Pocket costs £3.99 per month (or £34.99 for a year) and



has a handful of extras, including a better search tool, automatic tag suggestions and a cloud-based archive that lets you read your articles even after they've disappeared from the web.

### **OUR VERDICT**

Pocket is one of the oldest read-itlater services and its maturity stands it in good stead. It provides plenty of different ways to save your articles, and lets you organise them with tags as you go. It also works well with lots of other tools.

### Read-it-later services

### Instapaper | www.instapaper.com | ★★★★☆

### What we liked:

As with Pocket, saving articles in Instapaper creates an easy-to-read version of a web page, stripping away unnecessary extras such as ads and navigation. This

pared-back design follows through into the main Instapaper interface, which eschews Pocket's fancy thumbnails and instead displays each of your saved articles with a simple headline and opening sentence or two. It's certainly clean, but it's a bit bland.

There are sparks of brilliance here, though, such as the Speed Read tool, which flashes up articles word by word, saving you the bother of scanning your eyes across the page and forcing you to read without pausing. You can adjust the speed but we found the default 350 words per minute worked well.

### How it can be improved:

Instapaper doesn't have a Firefox extension. You can use the bookmarklet in any browser and, in many ways, this is



probably a better, sleeker option (see our Top Tips for bookmarklets on page 64). You can file articles in folders, but it would be preferable if you could do this as you save them.

### **OUR VERDICT**

Instapaper is all about the words, stripping back everything else from a website to make it exceptionally clear and easy to read. However, this is also carried through to the website and its apps, which leaves everything looking a bit sparse.

### What we liked:

Readability pitches itself primarily as a tool for making websites more readable, though you can still save articles for reading later. This gives it

a slightly different angle to Pocket and Instapaper, although all three essentially perform the same tasks - it's just a question of how the services are marketed.

The main difference with Readability is that you can also follow other users. It flags up people who have saved similar articles to you, so you can use them as a source for further reading. However, this Recommended option is higher up the pecking order of the main menu than your own Reading List, which we aren't particularly keen on.

Readability has apps for Android and iOS, and add-ons for all the main browsers. You can also use it to send articles to your Kindle.

### How it can be improved:

Readability's browser add-on installs three buttons: Read Now, Read Later



and send to Kindle. This is too many, especially if you don't own a Kindle, and the other two look too similar and can be easily muddled up. You also can't tag articles to organise them from these buttons; instead, you have to go into the apps or the website and do it retrospectively.

### **OUR VERDICT**

Readability is trying too hard to be different, by pushing its social recommendations and clear-reading options above its basic articlesaving tool. This makes it a little more cumbersome to use than the other award-winners.

### Framabag

### framabag.org

Framabag is a French website but it's bilingual, so everything's written in English alongside or just below

the French version. It uses another service called Wallabag to save



articles, which it does well enough, but this can get confusing, particularly since you can't use Wallabag without having a Framabag account. It's also a long way from being as slick as our award-winners.

### ReadingPack

### readingpack.com

ReadingPack is an interesting service but it loses a lot of credibility by only letting you sign

in with a Facebook account. rather than giving you the option to register with your



email and a password. Its main emphasis is on sharing articles with other people, so while you can use it to save things for reading later, you can also use it to find new, interesting things to read, too.

### **Evernote Clearly**

### evernote.com/clearly

This browser add-on for Evernote cleans up web pages for easier reading and, because Evernote is designed to save things you want to look at later, it can also be used to save articles. However, since it converts pages to Clearly first, before you can save them, it turns what should be a single-click

process into two clicks. Evernote is great for storina notes and clippings but it's



complicated if all you want to do is save things to read later.



# Transfer any file to any device

Want to copy a file to or from your PC without having to faff about with USB drives? Jonathan Parkyn explains the easiest, fastest ways to transfer files between your devices

### Windows to Windows

Emailing yourself files or using a USB memory stick is fine for the occasional transfer, but if you often need to move files between Windows PCs, then setting up a shared folder is the smartest option. First, make sure all the PCs are connected to the same network and belong to the same HomeGroup. To do this, click Start, type homegroup and click the HomeGroup option on each PC to either create or join a HomeGroup as required. Certain libraries are shared among HomeGroup PCs by default, including Music, Pictures and Videos, and you can also add specific folders.

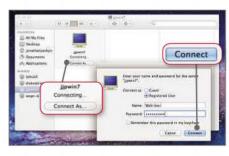
Navigate to the folder you want to share, then right-click it and select 'Share with', then choose 'HomeGroup' (Read/Write)' - or, if you're using Windows 8, 'HomeGroup (view and edit)'. To access the folder from another PC, open an Explorer window, click your HomeGroup on the left and browse for the folder on the remote PC.

If you're transferring files between PCs that aren't on the same network, see the 'Transfer any file to any platform' box, opposite.



### Windows to Mac OS X

You can use shared folders to transfer files between Macs and Windows PCs over a network, too. On the Windows PC, right-click the network icon in the Notification Area and select 'Network and Sharing Center', then click 'Change advanced settings' and make sure Network Discovery and File Sharing are both turned on. Tick the 'Use user



accounts and passwords' option under 'HomeGroup connections', then navigate to the folder you want to share on your PC. Right-click it and select Properties, then click the Sharing tab and click Advanced Sharing. Tick the 'Share this folder' box and click Permissions, then tick Allow for all options and click OK three times.

On your Mac, open Finder. You should see your Windows PC's name under Shared on the left. Click it, then click Connect As and type your Windows username and password before clicking Connect. You'll see your shared folder, and be able to drag and drop files to transfer them to and from your PC.

### Linux to Windows

A quick way to transfer files between a Windows PC and a Linux (Ubuntu. for example) computer is to use FTP. On the Ubuntu computer, open the Terminal and type sudo apt-get install openssh-server then press Enter. On your Windows PC, install FileZilla (bit.ly/ filezilla376) and run it. In the Host box, type your Linux computer's IP address. Enter your Linux login details in the Username and Password boxes and



enter 22 under Port, then click Quickconnect. You should now be able to browse your Linux PC from your Windows computer and transfer files back and forth between them

### Android to Windows

You could just plug your Android device into your PC using USB but these days, let's face it, cables are a hassle. For full wireless transfers between your devices, grab yourself a copy of the free ES File Explorer File Manager app from Google Play (bit.ly/esfile376). Once it's installed, tap the three-line Menu button, then tap Network followed by LAN. Tap New and enter your PC's IP address under Server, along with your Windows login under Username and Password. If you don't know your PC's IP address, you can find this out by clicking Start, typing cmd and pressing Enter on your keyboard, then typing ipconfig and pressing Enter again - the IP address will be listed under IPv4 Address.

Once you've entered these details in ES File Explorer, an icon for your PC will

appear under LAN. From here, you can browse and transfer files from any of your PC's shared folders (see the first two tips for instructions on sharing folders).



To wirelessly access your Android device's files from your PC, tap the menu button in ES File Explorer, then tap Network, Remote Manager and 'Turn on'. You'll see an ftp address. Type this into the address bar of an Explorer window on your PC to access folders on your Android device and transfer files to and from them.

See our Workshop on page 57 for more about ES File Explorer.



notoriously difficult to transfer files, even when plugged in via USB. But, thankfully, there's a free way to easily make wireless file transfers without

jailbreaking your device.

Install and run FileApp on your iOS device (bit.ly/fileapp376). Tap File Sharing and switch on Sharing. You'll see a username and password, which you can change to anything you want. Underneath, you'll see an IP address. On your PC, open a browser and type the IP address into the address bar, then press Enter. When prompted, enter the username and password shown in FileApp. Now you can drag and drop files into the browser window or click 'Upload files' and browse your PC. The files you transfer can be found in the Downloads folder under FileApp's 'Files and Folders'.



### Android to Android or iOS to iOS

You can transfer files between two Android devices via Bluetooth, but it's slow and unreliable. Instead, you could use Wi-Fi Direct, which is much faster and more stable. Most recent Android devices have Wi-Fi Direct built in. On your first device, tap Settings, Wi-Fi, Menu (the three-dots icon), Advanced, then Wi-Fi Direct. Tap the device listed under 'Peer devices' to send an invitation, then tap Accept on your other device. Use ES File **Explorer File** Manager (see opposite) to locate the file you want, then long tap it and tap

Send. Now select the other Android device and tap Send. For devices without Wi-Fi Direct built-in, try using a third-party app, such as SuperBeam (free, bit.ly/superbeam376)

WI-FI Direct

WPS Push Button

WPS PIN entry

Similarly, you can use AirDrop to transfer between newer iOS devices such as the iPhone 5 and 4th generation iPad. Swipe the Control Center up from the bottom of the screen on both devices and tap AirDrop to turn it on. then locate your file and tap the Share

Accept on the other device when the notification appears.

### Android to iOS

To transfer files between any mobile devices - however old and whatever OS they are running - try the free app Feem Lite (bit.ly/feemdroid376 for Android, bit.ly/feemios376 for iOS). The two devices have to be connected to the same Wi-Fi network or hotspot. Install and open the app on both devices, then browse one device for a file you want to send, select it and tap Share. The other

device will appear as a destination - tap it to send the file which, once transferred, will appear in Feem's Camera, Music or Files folder (depending on the type of file) on the destination device.



### TRANSFER ANY FILE TO ANY PLATFORM

If you want the freedom to transfer files between any devices, regardless of the operating system they run, a number of options are available. The obvious route is to use a cloudstorage service, such as Dropbox, Google Drive or OneDrive. Any files saved here can be accessed from any device once you've logged in with your account. Large files (up to 2GB) can be transferred over the web for free using the excellent WeTransfer

### (www.wetransfer.com).

Another great way to move files around is by using Pushbullet. Install the app for your Android (bit.ly/pushdroid376) or iOS (bit.ly/pushios376) device, then get the Chrome (bit.ly/ pushchrome376) or Firefox (bit.ly/ pushfox376) extension for your PC. You can now 'push' content including text messages, links, files, maps and more - to specific devices.

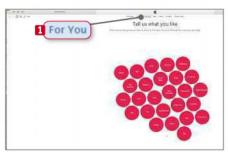

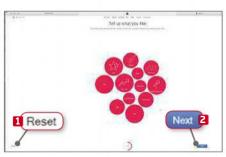
pple Music is a new streaming service that's available on iPhone, iPad and iPod touch, as well as PC and Mac (via iTunes). Unlike other streaming services, there's no free tier - it costs £9.99 a month for a single membership, or £14.99 a month for families. There is, however, a free three-month trial available. You will be automatically signed up for the autorenewal payment option, and charged

once the trial is over. To opt out of this, open iTunes and click the Account icon at the top. Select 'Account info', then log in and click Manage, which is next to Subscriptions under Settings. Click Off, next to Automatic Renewal. You can also opt out through an iOS device via Settings, iTunes & App Store.

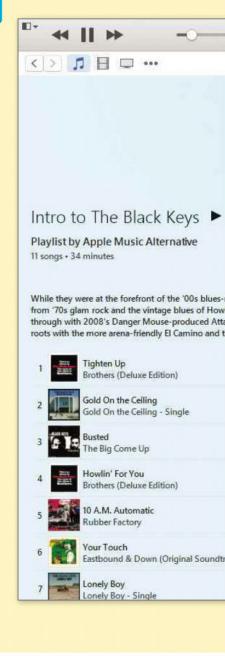
Here, we look at the PC (iTunes) version of Apple Music, but it's essentially the same on iOS devices.

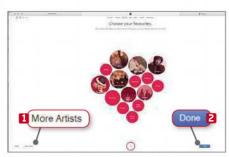


Make sure you have the latest version of iTunes installed. A splash screen will invite you to join Apple Music. Do this, then choose a membership plan. You can upload music stored on your computer to the iCloud Music Library, so it can be accessed on an iOS device. Click the For You option.



Select your preferred genres of music. Click once on any you like, and twice on the ones you love. You can remove anything you don't like by hovering your mouse over a bubble and clicking the small X. You can also start from scratch by clicking Reset. 1 When done, click Next. 2

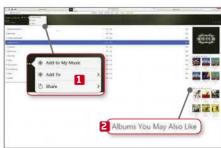




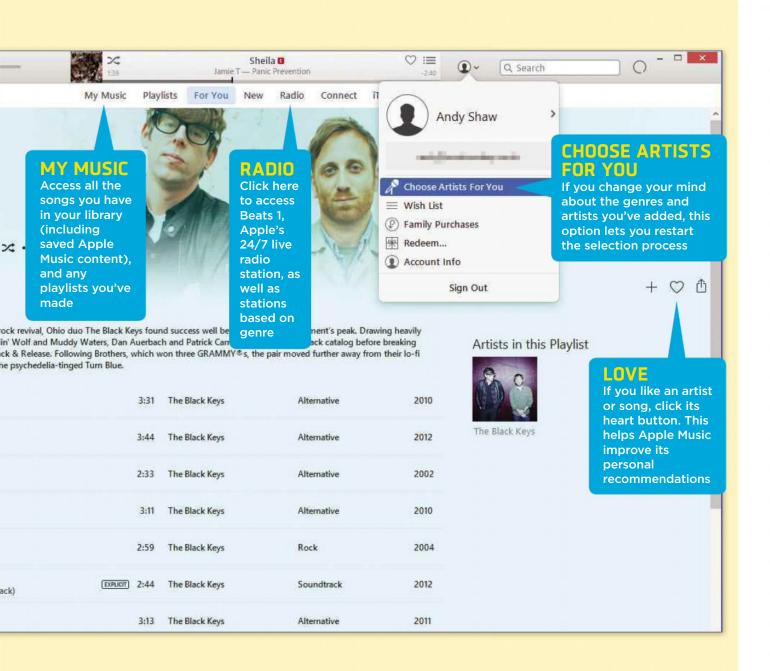
You'll now see a selection of artists Apple Music thinks you might like. As before, single-click any that you like and double-click the ones you love. You can reset the selection at any time. Click the More Artists button 11 to add further choices to the mix. When you're happy with your selection, click Done. 2



You'll see some playlists 11 and albums 🛂 you might like. Hover your mouse over one of them and click the Play button 1 to start listening. You can control playback using the slider 4 or the controls, 5 just as you would with locally stored music.



Click an item to open its page, which displays all the tracks. Double-click a song to start it playing. You can play the entire album or playlist, randomise the selection, share it or add to My Music or a playlist. 11 You can also browse other related music. 2





Hover your mouse over a music track and click the three dots that appear. You can set that song to play next or add it to the Up Next queue. 11 You can add the song to My Music, 2 or create a new radio station from that Artist or Song. 1 You can also go to that artist or album's page. 🛂



When you go to an artist's page, you'll be able to follow or unfollow them. You'll already be following any artists you selected during the setup process. Click Connect 11 to see news, photos and videos that those singers or bands have shared with their followers. You can like, comment or share a post.



Click New 11 to browse the latest music; currently popular content; themed playlists; and top songs, albums and videos. Hover over something to start it playing 2 or access the menu. 3 You can select a genre using the dropdown menu, 4 although this doesn't currently do anything in iTunes.



# Boost your PC's anti-malware protection

msisoft recently released Emergency Kit 10: a fast, portable malware scanner that protects and speeds up your PC by removing malware and PUPs (potentially unwanted programs). Because the application is portable, it doesn't need to be installed and you can run it alongside other security programs. So even if you already have Malwarebytes Anti-Malware installed on your PC, Emergency Kit can use its own anti-virus scan engines from Emsisoft and Bitdefender as a 'second-opinion' malware scanner.

In this Workshop, we show you how to run a full scan and demonstrate how to use Emergency Kit to quarantine or delete suspicious files. If you'd rather be safe than sorry, Emergency Kit can be set to automatically quarantine threats on completion of the scan, which is quickly reversible if any items turn out to be false positives. The program also has a handy tool that lets you white-list any files that you want to omit from future scans.





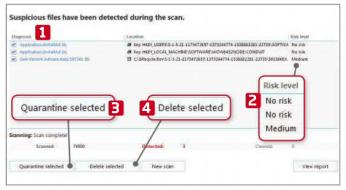
Download Emsisoft Emergency Kit and run the executable file. Before using the program, you'll need to choose the destination for its contents, 1 then click Extract. 2 Open the folder using Windows Explorer and click Start Emergency Kit Scanner.



When you run Emergency Kit, a notification appears asking you to run an online update to check that you have the latest malware signatures. Click Yes. 1 When the update is complete, the first box 2 turns green to show that its 'Software is up-to-date'.



In the second box, click Malware Scan, 1 then Yes to start a thorough scan of your system for malware and PUPs. You can Pause or Stop the scan at any time. The number of detected items appears in red.



Emergency Kit reports its findings on completion of the scan, showing the diagnosis 1 and risk level 2 for each item. You must choose whether to quarantine, 3 delete 4 or do nothing with the identified threats. Click 'View report' to see a TXT file containing a text-based summary.

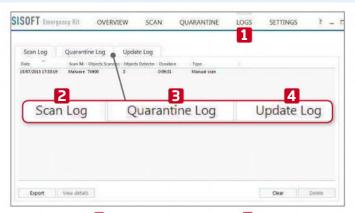
If you discover a suspicious file on your PC that Emsisoft Emergency Kit fails to identify, you can help to improve its malware definitions by visiting bit.ly/submit376 and uploading the file with an accompanying description. You won't receive a response if the file is infected, but the software will be updated to protect against it.



Click New Scan to be taken to the Scan menu, where you can configure your own scan settings by selecting Custom Scan. Click 'Manage whitelist' to specify any files you want the program to ignore, and select 'On scan completion' to change its default behaviour once a scan has finished.



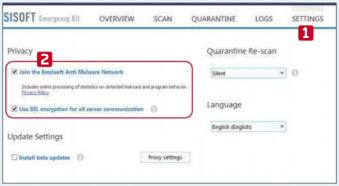
Files that have been quarantined can be found by clicking the Quarantine menu. 1 To restore a file, select it and click Restore. 2 Alternatively, click Delete 3 if you're sure you don't need it anymore. You can also manually quarantine files by clicking 'Add file'. 4



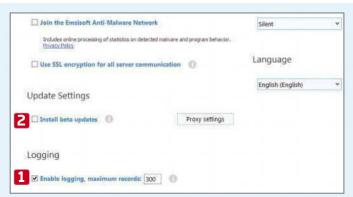
Click Logs 1 to see logs of your scans, 2 quarantined items 3 and malware signature updates. 4 If your scans don't appear here immediately, try closing Emergency Kit and reopening it.



To see more information about a scan, select it and click 'View details'. 1 You can delete individual logs by selecting them and clicking Delete. 2 To clear all scan logs, click Clear 3 and then Yes. 4



Click Settings 1 to configure the software. By default, the program is set to join the Emsisoft Anti-Malware Network and uses SSL encryption for all server communication. 2 You can change these settings by unticking the appropriate boxes.



To turn off logging, untick the 'Enable logging' box.

Tick 'Install beta updates' if you want to download the latest beta update files, but be aware that this could cause the program to behave erratically.



### Browse web pages side by side

abs are a common way of keeping lots of sites open in your browser, but most browsers don't let you see them side by side. With PolyBrowser, you can scroll between your tabs instead of clicking them, and easily

keep several tabs visible on screen at the same time. It also has handy tools for saving groups of tabs so you can open them in one click.

Instead of switching between tabs that fill the browser window, PolyBrowser opens tabs side by side, 🗓 so you can scroll between them using your mouse. To do so, right-click and hold, then move the mouse left or right to scroll through the tabs you have open.



To increase the number of visible tabs, right-click and move the mouse up to zoom out of the page. You can right-click and drag down to zoom back in again - it will zoom in on the tab you clicked. Alternatively, use the zoom menu, **1** which appears as soon as you start zooming.



You can resize individual tabs to fit the screen rather than zooming out. Click the dotted separators 🗓 and drag them left or right to increase or decrease the amount of screen space devoted to that specific tab.



Use the PolyMarks tool to save groups of tabs and launch them in a couple of clicks. Click the PolyMarks icon 11 and sign up for the service. Click 'Save Tabs as PolyMark' 2 to save the group and give it a name. You can then click the name **B** to relaunch the tabs together.



PolyBrowser has the Super Start add-on built-in. Recent sites will appear as icons under the PolyBrowser logo. 1 You can also set up Speed Launcher to save sites to groups. Click the folder 2 to choose individual sites or the Open All icon 15 to open every site in the folder in its own tab.



Most of the browser settings will be familiar to Firefox users. To get to them, click the Menu button 🗓 and choose Options. The Tabs tab 2 is slightly different to Firefox, though - click the Super Start Options button 11 to change the way the New Tab screen looks.

### Make more space on your Android device

ndroid devices are like pocket computers; you can store all manner of files on them, including documents, photos and videos. While this makes them hugely versatile, it also means that you quickly run out of storage

space. In this Workshop, we show you how to compress your files using ES File Explorer, so you have more room for apps, games and other files.

Download and install ES File Explorer, then navigate to the folder containing the files you want to compress. Longpress a file to highlight it. 11 You can then tap other files to select them, too.



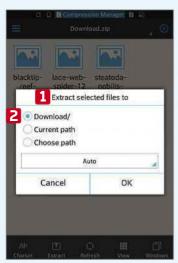
Tap the More button and choose Compress. A window titled ES Zip Viewer appears. From here, you must choose the name of the compressed Zip file, 11 the format 22 and the level of compression. **3** You can also protect the compressed file by entering a password 4 before tapping OK. 5



The Zip file appears in the same folder as the files you compressed. 1 To make more space, delete the original files by tapping them (in the same way described in Step 1) and selecting Delete. 2 A box appears showing the total size of the files being deleted.



To check the size of your compressed files, long-press the Zip file and tap More, then Properties. 11 To extract the files, tap the Back button twice, then tap the Zip file once. In the dialogue box that appears, tick the 'Set as default app' box and select ES Zip Viewer to proceed.



Highlight any files you want to extract and tap Extract. A pop-up asks where you want to extract the files to. 11 Leave the top option selected 2 to extract them to the same folder as the zipped file



Alternatively, tap 'Choose path' to select a location of your choice, then tap OK. A message appears to show that the files were successfully extracted. 1 Tap the Back button to see the folder containing the Zip file (and the extracted files, if you chose the first option).

## Rip, convert and stream your DVDs

Wayne Williams shows you how to clear your living room of DVD clutter and bring your movie collection into the 21st Century

t's a familiar sight in living rooms everywhere: towering stacks of DVDs littered around the TV, from muchloved movies and current favourites to birthday box sets and friends' recommendations that are yet to be watched. While DVDs take up less space than chunky old video cassettes, they still clutter up shelves and cupboards, and the chances are that you only watch them infrequently. In this issue's Weekend Project, we'll show you how to kill two birds with one stone by freeing up space and making your movie collection more accessible.



### Rip your DVDs

If you want to move your DVD collection out of the living room and into the loft or garage, or simply sell or bin the discs, it makes sense to rip the DVDs so you have a digital copy that you can watch whenever the mood strikes. There are lots of free programs you can use for the task, including popular conversion tools such as Freemake Video Converter (www.freemake.com, but take care to

decline any unwanted extras during installation). There's a guide to using it in our Mini Workshop on page 61.

You can rip your discs to a range of formats, although we'd recommend Matroska Video - or MKV, as it's more commonly known. This is a container format that can store numerous video, audio and subtitle tracks, as well as any metadata. Of course, it's only worth ripping to this format if the device you're going to play it on can handle it. PCs will have no problem and most modern standalone media players support the format. It's only older devices that may not recognise it.

Assuming MKV is a format that works for you, the best free ripping tool is probably MakeMKV (www.makemkv. com). As well as converting DVDs into MKV video files, it can also rip Blu-rays, if you have a Blu-ray drive in (or attached

recorded ty Windows Media Centre comes with many versions of

Windows, but it's being phased out with Windows 10

to) your PC. The program is available for both Windows and Mac OS X. See our Mini Workshop, below, to find out how to use it to rip your discs.

Other tools worth considering include WinX DVD Ripper Free Edition (bit.ly/ winx376), Format Factory (www .pcfreetime.com) and the open-source StaxRip (bit.ly/stax376). There are also plenty of commercial disc rippers available to buy, including AnyDVD (around £35 from www.slysoft.com) and Any DVD Converter Pro (£21.48 from bit.ly/anydvd376). While these offer some additional features, most people will be better off sticking with free software.

### Where to store your movie collection

The obvious place to store your ripped DVDs is on your PC's hard drive. Y ou will need a sizable drive to hold them all and you might want to back up your favourites in case of drive failure (although if you keep the original DVDs,

you can simply rip them again). You could also buy or make your own HTPC (Home Theatre PC) just for storing and playing movies - OSMC for the Raspberry Pi (osmc.tv) is a cheap option, though you'll need to store your ripped DVDs on an external USB drive.

Other storage options include a NAS (Network

Attached Storage) drive, so your movies can be streamed to any device from anywhere, including over the internet. You can buy ready-made NAS devices that attach to your router, or make your own using FreeNAS (web .freenas.org).



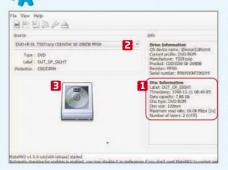
There are also portable media drives, such as the Seagate Wireless (£95 from www.ebuyer.com). This is a batterypowered 500GB drive with a built-in wireless network that can stream movies to up to three smartphones, tablets and laptops simultaneously.

If you have a Blu-ray writer in your PC,

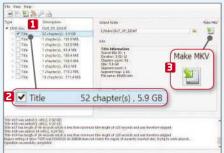
you can burn multiple ripped DVDs to a single Blu-ray disc, or save your favourite movies on a USB memory drive. Most modern standalone Blu-ray and DVD players have a USB port and can play movies from a memory stick. Check your player's manual to find out if your make and model can do this.

Keeping movies on a wireless hard drive makes them accessible from any device

### MINI WORKSHOP | Rip DVDs using MakeMKV



Insert the DVD you want to rip into your disc drive, then launch MakeMKV. The program will scan the disc and present you with information about it. 11 If you have more than one optical drive, you can select the correct one in the drop-down box. 2 Click the DVD image [3] to open the disc.



The software will scan the disc to locate the video and audio you require, and decrypt the data. After a short while, it will present you with a list of content that can be ripped. Assuming you just want the film itself, select the main (largest) one. 2 Click the Make MKV button [3] and the software will get to work.



You'll be prompted to create a save directory for the ripped video. The process will take quite a while to complete. You can view the progress 1 and stop it at any point, should you need to. 2 When it's finished, navigate to the Save directory, rename the file and your movie will be ready to watch.

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### Useful software

Media Player software provides a useful front end for a movie collection stored on a PC. If you're running Windows 7, you can use the built-in Windows Media Center (though this isn't available in Windows 10). There are several other decent free alternatives including Kodi (kodi.tv, which was formerly known as XBMC) and MediaPortal (www team-mediaportal.com). Web User had a round-up of these programs in Issue 372 (bit.ly/issue372).

Plex (plex.tv) is a powerful media server that lets you stream movies stored on a central location (a PC or NAS) to any device on your network. You can buy an app if you'd like to use it on your smartphone or tablet.



Data Crow is an excellent tool for cataloguing a large DVD collection



FileBot automatically finds information about your movie files

A program for cataloguing your movie collection will also come in very handy. One of the best tools for the job is Data Crow (www.datacrow.net) which can manage and organise any kind of media, including books, software, images, music tracks and movies. Select the Movie

> module, then add your collection to it. The program offers loads of advanced features.

Finally, if you don't want to manually rename individually ripped files (as well as movies you've sourced from other locations), you can use FileBot (www.filebot.net) to organise and

rename them for you. It automatically matches your files with data pulled from the web and lets you choose how your files should be named.

### Is it legal to rip DVDs?

In October 2014, it was finally made legal for UK residents to rip CDs and DVDs for personal use. Prior to that, creating a copy of your own discs - ripping audio CDs to add your music to iTunes, for example - was against copyright law. However, you still can't rip discs that you don't own - such as those belonging to friends - and you can't rip and convert DVDs wrapped in DRM, for watching on an iPad or Android devices.

While it was great to see some common sense prevail with the updated law, there have been some new complications. At one point, it seemed possible that the UK courts might relax the restriction over making personal copies of DRM-protected media, but in a judicial review sparked by an appeal from the music industry, the High Court struck down the government's new law because there was no compulsory system for compensating copyright holders who might have been "harmed" by the copying. Quite how a copyright holder would be harmed by someone making a personal copy of something they've already paid for is anyone's guess but, as it stands at the time of writing, it's still illegal to rip DVDs, although you're unlikely to get into trouble for doing so.

### **WORKSHOP** | Convert DVDs to any format with Freemake Video Converter



While DVDs are best ripped to MKV format, you may prefer to save videos for viewing on a particular device, such as an iPad, Freemake Video Converter has several options for saving video files. Insert the disc, click the DVD button 11 and, in the window that opens, navigate to the VIDEO\_TS folder 2 on the disc.



Click OK and the software will open the DVD. Like MakeMKV, you'll be presented with a list of titles that can be ripped. The main movie file will be selected for you. Click OK and the item will be added to the queue. 11 You can change the audio, 2 add subtitles 3 and make some edits. 4



Choose the type of format or device you want to save the video to. If you want to watch it on an iPad, select 'to Apple'. In the 'output parameters' window, you can pick a preset, change the folder you are saving to and its name, Band adjust the size of the file. 4 Click Convert 5 to begin.

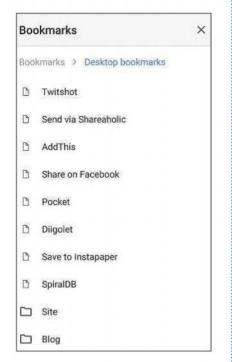
Our experts show how replacing add-ons with bookmarklets can make your browser faster and lighter

### **TOP TIPS FOR BOOKMARKLETS**

### Get browser tools for mobile

he extensions you add to Chrome on your PC won't appear in the portable version of the browser installed on your Android and iOS devices, so you might miss the shortcuts and tools they offer when you're on your phone or tablet. Bookmarklets are a special type of bookmark that provide some (but not all) of the tools that add-ons offer. To add them to your bookmarks bar, press Ctrl+Shift+B (to show the bookmarks bar) then drag and drop your bookmarklets to it. They can then be accessed on your phone or tablet like regular bookmarks, but instead of taking you to a website, they perform useful functions. In Chrome, tap the three-dots menu button, select Bookmarks and go to 'Desktop bookmarks'.

Use bookmarklets on your phone and tablet instead of add-ons



### Bookmark the website lighter, faster and less bloated.

Some browser add-ons work by simply taking you to a website. For example, the Twitter dashboard app TweetDeck, available from the Chrome Web Store, simply takes you to tweetdeck.twitter .com. Instead of bloating your browser by adding it as an extension, you could simply add it as a bookmark or Favorite. Just drag the URL to the Bookmarks bar (in Chrome or Firefox) or the Favorites bar (in Internet Explorer). No add-on or extension is needed, so your browser is

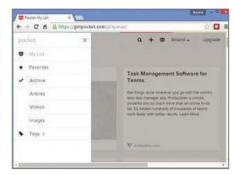
If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

There are lots of other apps and extensions in the Chrome Web Store that act in a similar way. When you install an add-on or extension to your browser, make sure you're getting more than just a bookmark - otherwise, remove it.

Outlook, for example, just takes you to the Outlook website, as do lots of other add-ons such as Word, OneDrive, Google News, Google Play, Pixlr Editor, WeVideo, various games and much more. Instead of installing them as add-ons, try adding them to the bookmarks bar.

### Post to Pocket

Pocket saves web pages you don't have time to read so you can enjoy them later (see our round-up of read-it-later services on page 46). The Pocket extension for Chrome adds a button to

the toolbar that you can click when you want to add a web page to Pocket. You can view all the pages you've saved at getpocket.com.

The Pocket bookmarklet is a fraction of the add-on's size and does the same job. Go to getpocket.com/ add and click the link 'Or install the bookmarklet', then drag the Pocket button to your browser's Bookmarks bar. Click the bookmark to add the web page you are viewing to Pocket. Firefox users have the Pocket add-on preinstalled.

### Instapaper in an instant

Instapaper is similar to Pocket and can be used for saving web pages to read later. Go to www.instapaper.com and sign in, then go to www .instapaper.com/save. Drag the 'Save to Instapaper' button to your browser's bookmarks bar to install it.

### Add a Diigolet

Diigo is a popular web service that lets you bookmark web pages, read them later, add sticky notes, save highlighted sections and more. It has extensions for IE, Firefox and Chrome, but the bookmarklet does the job well by itself. Go to bit.ly/diigo376, click the Diigolet button, then drag and drop it to any browser's Bookmarks or Favorites bar. Click the bookmarklet to pop up a mini toolbar at the top of the browser window, then choose an option such as Highlight, Bookmark, Read Later, or Share.

### Social sharing

When you read a news story, or find a funny photo or a great website, you don't have to use a browser add-on to share it with your friends. Sometimes it is possible to perform the same task using a bookmarklet. You might not get every feature offered by the add-on or extension, but the basic tool can still do the job.

If you want to share websites on your Facebook timeline, go to bit.ly/ fbshare376 and drag the 'Share on Facebook' button to the bookmarks or Favorites bar.



The Facebook bookmarklet lets you post to your timeline

Instead of using Twitter extensions, get the bookmarklet from bit.ly/twit376 and click it to post a tweet. The Twitshot bookmarklet, which is at the bottom of the page at www.twitshot.com, lets you tweet about a site and also include a photo. LinkedIn updates can be posted by adding the bookmarklet at www .linkedin.com/bookmarklet.

### Advanced link sharing

There are add-ons you can use to share web content across all your social networks and other services simultaneously, and some of them have bookmarklets that can do the task simply and efficiently. If you use AddThis to share stuff you find on the web, uninstall it and use the bookmarklet instead. Go to bit.ly/ addthis376 and drag the bookmarklet button to the toolbar.

Shareaholic is a similar sharing service. Instead of using its browser add-on, go to bit.ly/holic376 and drag the 'Send via Shareaholic' button to the toolbar to add it.

### Organise your bookmarklets

The bookmarks bar is the most convenient place to keep your bookmarklets, but it can quickly fill up. One solution is to shorten the names so more of them fit. Right-click Chrome's bookmarks bar and select Edit. Change the 'Share on Facebook' bookmarklet to 'F' or 'Fbk'; change Pocket to 'P' or 'Pkt'; change 'Save to Instapaper' to 'Insta'; and so on.

Another option is to create a bookmarklets folder to store them in. Right-click the bookmarks bar and select Create folder. Name it Bookmarklets, then drag and drop your bookmarklets to the folder in the bar. Click the folder to access all your bookmarklets in one dropdown menu.

### LastPass without LastPass

The LastPass password manager remembers all your login details for websites, but it's a big extension. The bookmarklet, on the other hand, is tiny and is almost as good. Go to lastpass.com and log into your account. Expand the Tools section on the left and click Bookmarklets. There are three to choose from: LastPass Login; LastPass Fill; and LastPass Forms. Drag them all to the bookmarks bar. You can now disable the LastPass add-on.

The first time you use a LastPass bookmarklet in a session, you're asked to sign in, but from then on you can just click it to log in, fill forms and so on, as you can with the browser extension. This is a stripped-down version that doesn't support every feature of the add-on, so you might want to keep the extension installed but disabled, just in case you need it.

### Shorten long URLs

If you share a lot of web links via email and social media, you probably use

a URL shortener. Bitly (bit.ly) is one of the most popular and it has a bookmarklet that saves you having to go to the website to shorten a URL. Go to bit.ly/bitly376 and drag the Bitmark button to the bookmarks bar. The first time you use it, you're asked to sign in (get a free account). After that, you can just click the Bitmark link to create a short URL.

### Post to Tumblr

The Tumblr bookmarklet is the most powerful of all the bookmarklets we've covered in these Top Tips, and it has an excellent range of features. Go to tumblr.com/apps and drag the 'Post to Tumblr' button to the bookmarks bar in any browser. Click it to open a small window. The content it displays will depend on the web page being viewed. For example, it might show the page heading in a text post or offer a choice of photos from the web page in a photo post. You can switch between the two using the button in the top-right corner. Click the button next to Post to bring up a menu with options including 'Post now', 'Add to queue' and Schedule. It's a brilliant tool for Tumblr bloggers.



Get the Tumbir bookmarklet and post to your blog more easily

### Get website info

If you have a blog or website, you may want to analyse your competitors' data. Get a free account at SpiralDB (spiraldb.com), log in and add the bookmarklet. You can now go to a website, click the bookmarklet and get interesting information, such as the domain authority, which is a measure of a site's popularity.

### Windows updates are crashing my PC

I carried out a clean installation of Windows 7 using the disc that came with my PC (which has the SP1 update on it), and it runs perfectly until it installs Windows updates. There are about 187 in all and, after they've been installed, the PC no longer boots up. It goes through the start process but when it gets to the start up sound, the screen goes black.

I've managed to get the PC working by reinstalling Windows and disabling Windows updates before they have a chance to install. However, I'll need the updates to get the free upgrade to Windows 10. How do I get around this?

### Terry Wareing, via email

There are two ways to install Windows 10 and one is through Windows Update. If you have an up-to-date copy of Windows 7 or 8.1 with all the latest service packs, bug fixes and patches, then Windows Update can be used to download them and upgrade the PC. If you don't have all the updates, you can still install Windows 10 when it's released, but you will have to download the ISO image and burn it to a DVD. You can then install it from the disc. So the problem you have will not prevent you from upgrading.

However, it would be best to sort this out now. Instead of using



If you have problems with Windows Update, try installing them manually

Windows Update to get the latest updates, you could download them to your PC and run them from the hard drive. This might solve the problem and is worth trying. Go to Microsoft's 'Service Pack and Update Center' (bit.ly/update376) and follow the link to the Windows 7 service pack download page.

When you click the Download button, you'll see a list of files. The best option is the 1.9GB DVD ISO file, which contains every update for every version of Windows, but it is very large and you'll have to burn it to a DVD to install it.

Down at the bottom of the list are the much smaller files: windows6.1-KB976932-X86.exe for 32-bit Windows and windows 6.1-KB976932-X64.exe for 64-bit (the numbering is confusing, but Windows 7 is actually version 6.1). These files are 537MB and 903MB respectively and can be installed from your hard drive. Just double-click them in the Downloads folder to install them.



You can manually check for updates on Android by tapping Update now

can check for them by going into Settings and selecting About. Tap Software Updates or System Updates to see when it last checked for an update. There is a link to check again.

The battery problem is being caused by apps. When the battery was draining fast, you factory reset the Hudl and cleared the apps, which then made it work fine. Now that you've downloaded apps, it is draining fast again. If you download a lot of apps and a problem arises, it's hard to tell which one is the cause. If you download one and use it for a few days before downloading another, it's easier to tell which one is causing increased battery drain.

There are many ways to make your battery last longer: reducing the screen brightness, switching off the Wi-Fi when the tablet's not being used, uninstalling apps you don't need and setting a longer update time for apps (such as the time between checks for new email, new Twitter messages and so on).

### **Hudl battery drains too fast**

I have a couple of problems with my Tesco Hudl. The first is that I have Android version 4.2.2 and cannot seem to upgrade. The second is my battery, which drains very, very quickly. In the end, I decided to factory reset the Hudl. It was fine - I wasn't downloading many apps or games or anything - and then it happened again. It was charged at 100

per cent and after looking at the home screen for about a minute the battery was on 93 per cent.

### Fix Windows 8 to upgrade

I have a reasonably new HP Pavilion desktop PC that runs Windows 8.1 with few problems. After a failed driver update using Driver Booster (bit.ly/ boost376), I had to resort to using the hard-drive recovery image of the original Windows 8 that came with the computer, because it didn't have a recovery disc on CD or DVD. This worked fine.

After much downloading and restoring, I got my system back from the original

Windows 8 to 8.1, and it was in a usable condition. My concern is this: I would like to download Windows 10 but will I have a drive image, disc or similar to be able to restore a corrupted or damaged Windows 10 back to at least a basic usable system?

I run several online businesses, so I am very concerned about the possibility that things might not go well and I'd like to make sure I've got an escape plan so I can get back up and running if things go wrong or I don't like the new OS.

I already have a factory image of Windows 8, so could I use this to get back to a workable Windows 10?

Your original recovery image will be of limited use once you have upgraded because using it will take the computer right back to the day you bought it with a clean install of Windows 8. You could still use it to get back to Windows 10, with all your current software, but it would take a lot of work.

Since Windows 8, a tool has been provided to reset your PC using two options. One keeps your files and the other clears everything out, like a clean install, but they both keep your current version of Windows. In Windows 10, go to the Start menu, Settings, Update & Security, Recovery.

If you are running a business on your computer, you should ensure that you have adequate backup. The best solution is to buy a USB hard drive and to use it to store an exact image of the system. There are lots of backup tools that can make an exact copy of your hard drive and store it on a USB drive. They can then be used to create a boot CD or a boot USB flash memory drive, which can be used to start your computer. If disaster strikes and the computer will not start after installing Windows 10, you can use the boot media and restore the hard drive image. The only loss will be any files you created since the last backup.

### Responsive website not working

I have started to make my website responsive and it seems to be working. The HTML calls a style sheet and sets different screen sizes. However, I've noticed some strange characters after the '.htm' such as '#.vym' and 'dvd', for example 'htm#.VYMUQVJ5bZw'. Is this to do with CSS or UTF-8, or something else?

To explain this, we need to get a bit technical. A normal link to a page on a website looks like this:

### <a href="http://mysite.com/ page.html">

That's an external link that goes to a new page. If a web page is long, you might want to link to a point further down, such as a different section. This is an internal link from one part of the page to another. To do that you insert:

### <a href="#gohere">

This takes the cursor to a place labelled 'gohere' from within the HTML code. Find the point in the code that you want people to skip to and insert:

### <a name="gohere">

To link to that point in the page from elsewhere, you would use a URL such as mysite.com/page.html#gohere. When a hash (#) follows the name of a web page, it instructs the browser to jump to that point in the page. For some reason, the web-design software you are using is saving pages with this internal link. Check the settings, try using Save As rather than Save, try removing the internal links manually and then see what happens.

If all this fails, try a different designer. Brackets (brackets.io, which is free and great for hand coding) will run on your PC but Xara Web Designer (www.xara. com) is better if you want to avoid HTML. A lot of websites use WordPress (www.wordpress.com if you want a ready-hosted version or www. wordpress.org to host it yourself), which simplifies website design by letting you pick a responsive template from a gallery. You then then enter your site's content using a relatively simple form called a content-management system.

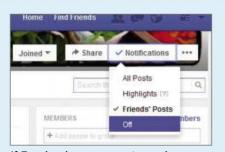

### Silence a noisy Facebook group

I recently joined a group on Facebook. I like it but it has more than 1,000 members and there is a lot of chat. Posts from this group, sometimes trivial or unimportant, are filling my Facebook homepage while posts from my friends, which I want to see, are buried and easy to miss. I don't want to leave the group but would like to cut down on the posts I see from it. How can I do this?

One method is to click the little downward-pointing arrow in the top-right corner of a post. There are

options to hide it or see fewer posts like it. However, we've had mixed results with this. Another option, which we've found works better, is to go to the group's page. At the top of the page on the right side of the image is Notifications. There is a choice of All Posts, Highlights, Friends' Posts and Off. Select Off and it hides nearly everything.

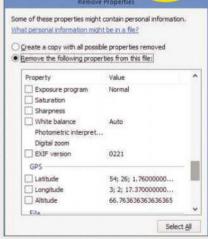

### Hide file properties

Some files contain hidden properties that aren't immediately obvious. For example, every photograph you take on a digital camera or phone contains a lot of information, including the camera model, shutter speed and aperture. It may also contain geographic location information that can be used to identify you and where you live. Before sharing photos online, I remove this information.

In Windows 8.1, choose a photo in Explorer, then select the Home tab form the ribbon at the top. Click the drop-down arrow under Properties and select 'Remove properties'.

In Windows 7, you can do the same thing by selecting the photo, clicking the Organize button and selecting 'Remove properties'. In the window that appears, there is an option to

create a copy of the file with all its properties removed, or you can remove individual properties from the list below.

### Play YouTube music in the background

Unless you subscribe to Google Play Music All Access, it's impossible to keep videos playing in the Android YouTube app when it's minimised. If, like me, you've created music playlists on YouTube over the years, you'll find it very frustrating that songs are interrupted the second you lock your device or try to use another app, especially because leaving

it on the screen makes the battery drain more quickly.

Fortunately, there's an app called FireTube that makes it possible to keep YouTube music playing in the background without adverts.

The app costs £1.92, if downloaded from the Play Store, but you can get it for free if you download it from the Amazon App Store. To do this, visit www.amazon .co.uk/androidapp and download Amazon for Android. Before you can use the Amazon app, you'll need to visit the Security section of Settings to make sure your device lets you install apps from unknown sources, but otherwise installing it should simply mean opening the APK file you've downloaded.

Once it's up and running, search Amazon for FireTube and install the app. The main shortcoming of FireTube is that it only lets you listen to music and won't let you watch the videos, but since the YouTube app lets you do that, it's really not a problem.

### Send files to Kindle wirelessly

Did you know that you can send many types of document to your Amazon



Kindle without needing to convert them first? Kindle supports DOC, DOCX, HTML, RTF, PDF and several other file types, and you can send these documents directly to your device by simply attaching them to an email and sending it to your Kindle email address.

If you're not sure what your Kindle address is, visit www.amazon.co.uk/myk, select Settings and scroll down the page until you find Send-to-Kindle E-Mail Settings. If you have more than one Kindle, or you use the Kindle app on your smartphone or tablet, you'll have a different address for each device. From the same page, make sure that the email address you're sending the document from is listed in your Approved Personal Document E-mail List or you won't

To convert your files to the Kindle format, simply add convert to the title of your email and it'll be converted before it appears on your Kindle, letting you take advantage of tools such as variable font size and annotations. I have sent numerous PDFs to my Kindle in this way and find the service very useful.

### **Customise your jump lists**

Jump lists are the menus that appear when you click icons pinned to the taskbar. If you don't like how they are configured, you can make them more useful with a quick tweak.

Right-click an empty part of the taskbar and select Properties on the

menu. Select the Jump Lists tab. There are two tick boxes which let you show recently opened programs and/or recently opened items (files) on the jump-list menu. Ticking the box and setting the number to 10 has made my jump lists more useful. I can now right-click an icon and open a file in a program with just one more click.

### Make browser notes

When you are browsing the web and want to take notes, there is a strange URL that you can enter to turn a Chrome or Firefox tab into a notepad. Type data:text/html, <html</pre> contenteditable> into the address bar and press Enter, then click inside the empty window and start typing. You can also copy and paste the text - left-click and highlight the text on the page, rightclick and select Copy. To paste text copied from elsewhere, press Ctrl+V.

You can even right-click images on web pages, then copy and paste them into the notepad. To save your notes, press Ctrl+A (to select everything), then Ctrl+C to copy them, then switch to another program, such as WordPad, and press Ctrl+V to paste them.

### Stop VLC from auto-resizing its window

I've always loved VLC Media Player (www.videolan.org) but it has a feature enabled by default that makes the playback window resize according to the size of the video you're playing. While this doesn't necessarily sound like a bad thing, it can be very irritating if you haven't got a large monitor, because the window is sometimes enlarged to the point that you can't see the player's controls.

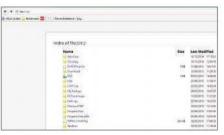

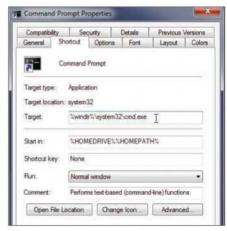

### Will Windows Live Mail work in Windows 10?

I use Windows Live Mail 2012. When I try to open my emails, I get the error message: "POP3 server has not responded in 300 seconds. Would you like to wait?".

I tried contacting Microsoft, but was told that they no longer support the software. Also, I've heard that Windows Live Essentials will no longer exist when Windows 10 is released, so does this mean I shouldn't proceed with the upgrade?

The error you're receiving is probably a result of a temporary problem with the email server. I have six accounts on Windows Live Mail and I have had this happen occasionally. Fixing it is usually just a matter of waiting until the server problems are resolved. In the meantime, you can always try signing into the webmail service for your account, if you have one, to see if that works.

I'm not sure where you've got the information regarding Windows Live Mail not being supported in Windows 10. I currently have Windows Live Mail, Movie Maker and Windows Media Player working in the Insider Preview. I haven't read anywhere that the programs (available via a Windows Essentials download) won't work or will be removed during an upgrade. I know that Windows Media Centre will be removed, if you currently have it installed, but this is not the same thing.

### How do I delete a partition from my hard drive?

I have a hard drive that's split into two partitions. The partition allocated to my C: drive is only 300GB and is nearly full, so I was hoping to expand it by deleting my D: partition. I have tried to look for information on how I might do this, but found a variety of different opinions. Can anyone help, please?

I'd recommend using a third-party partition manager because it will be easier to use and more flexible than Windows' built-in Disk Management tool. My preferred choise is EaseUS



EaseUS Partition Master lets you manage and resize partitions on your hard drive

Partition Master (free from www .partition-tool.com) but there are several others available.

It's worth noting that if D: is a recovery partition, you won't be able to expand C: without first deleting D:, in which case, you should establish an alternative method (either cloning or imaging the hard drive) for restoring your OS in case of a major malfunction.

You have a year to consider whether you want to upgrade to Windows 10, so it's probably worth waiting to see what teething problems other users face before taking the plunge. Based on a thread on the Microsoft forums (bit.ly/ windows376), it looks as if Windows Live Mail should work with Windows 10. If it doesn't, Microsoft may provide another Desktop mail application or improve the app supplied with Windows 8.1. It's just a case of waiting and seeing.

Is it possible to use software such as Photoshop on my PC without connecting to the internet?

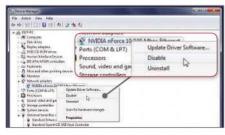

Yes, you can run most software on your PC without giving it access to the internet. To stop your PC from connecting, open Device Manager, find the entry for 'Network adapters' and

right-click the adapter to disable it. When you want to go back online, simply repeat the process, but click Enable instead of Disable. You can also disable and enable the network adapter from the Control Panel by clicking 'Network and Internet', View Network Status, then Change Adapter Settings.

Take a look at the articles at Digital Inspiration (bit.ly/internet376) and Ghacks (bit.ly/internetoff376) about free software that does the same thing with fewer clicks. If you want passwordprotection, parental control software is probably the best option.

Social media ought to be a pleasant 'chill out' place and for the majority of us. it is.

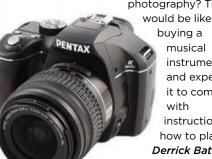

Barry Collins in on the warpath as EE makes billions from angry customers

# The huge rewards of shoddy service

ou have to work staggeringly hard to generate 3,000 complaints. When Jeremy Clarkson said he would have striking public sector workers "executed in front of their families" on prime-time television, only 736 people were sufficiently enraged to complain to regulator Ofcom. Yet, in the first three months of this year, EE has managed to rack up 2,800 complaints about its service to that very same regulator.

And that's not the half of it. EE only managed to upset 0.1 in every thousand of its 28 million mobile customers, but it's even better at brassing off broadband customers, racking up 0.5 complaints per thousand – at least twice as many as every other major provider.

Now, I know what you're thinking. Give it a rest, Collins. Half a person per thousand folk is nowt to get wound up about. Except that's only the people who complained. Thirty-one thousand went direct to the BBC about that Clarkson outburst. If that's roughly proportional, there are well over 100,000 customers complaining

directly to EE. In terms of approval ratings, EE's running a close third to Adolf Hitler and diabetes (I may have made that last statistic up).

EE is so bad at handling customer complaints that, earlier this month, Ofcom fined it £1m for failing to deal with them "appropriately and fairly". EE is supposed to inform customers that there's an independent adjudicator on hand if they aren't satisfied with the company's response to complaints, but



it seems it couldn't be bothered. Maybe it was too busy profiting from angry customers instead.

Indeed, when last summer EE noticed that all those awkward customers ringing up with problems were clogging its telephone lines, it had the barefaced cheek to impose a system called Priority Answer. This charges anyone ringing its support lines 50p to jump the telephone queue to speak to the next available operator. "Your call is important to us.

Just not as important as the call from the person who couldn't bear to listen to Beethoven's Fifth for the next 45 minutes. Please hold."

When *The Telegraph* confronted

EE about the matter, the company told the newspaper (with a straight face, apparently) that its "goal was to set the highest standard for customer service" and that, because it had "already committed to returning over 1,000 roles to the UK from overseas call centres", it had to "introduce some small charges

for certain customer services". EE's annual profits climbed 10 per cent in 2014 to £1.6bn. That £1m Ofcom fine won't even make a dent.

It angers me that appalling customer service has become a lucrative business. EE is in the middle of a £12.5bn takeover by BT, which will merge one company with a terrible customer-service record with another. BT has held on to the title of most complained-about pay TV provider for a record eight successive quarters, and has above-industry average complaint volumes for fixed-line telephone and broadband, according to Ofcom.

The potential for disaster even moved consumer watchdog *Which?* to write to Ofcom and the Competition and Markets Authority (which has to approve the merger), warning that the BT/EE deal could "adversely affect competition and the level of service that consumers receive in the UK".

Will EE's record of profiting handsomely from poor customer service be enough for the regulators to put the kibosh on the proposed takeover? 50p says it won't.

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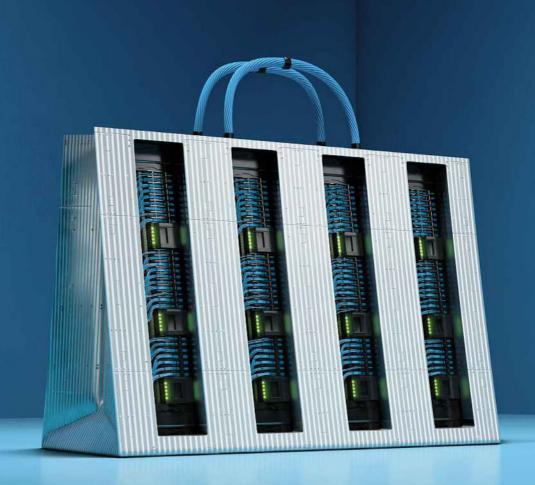
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
