

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Stop companies tracking you in Firefox's Private Browsing

ozilla has added a feature to Firefox which, it claims, you won't find in Chrome, Edge, Internet Explorer or Safari: the ability to block companies tracking you while you browse the web in private mode.

You'd be forgiven for assuming that a mode described as 'private' already did this, but it actually only stops details being stored 'locally' - that is, your browsing history and cookies. Rather than being truly private, it's really an 'anonymous'




mode (or 'incognito' in Chrome) that prevents anyone who uses your PC knowing where vou've been online.

The new tool, called Tracking Protection, goes further by preventing websites from

leaking your browsing activity to other companies. Mozilla says it will thwart marketing code that follows you from site to site. This is often embedded in adverts or in the social-media buttons that litter the web.

There is a problem, though. With Tracking Protection turned on - and it is, by default - elements on some websites won't load properly. If you trust a website, click the shield icon on



the left-hand side of your browser bar to open the new Control Centre, then click 'Disable protection for this session' (see screenshot, left).


Send one-tap replies in **Gmail**

Over the next few years, you're going to read a lot about Google's 'machine learning' technology - tools that teach

themselves how to respond better to your needs. One of these is the new Smart Reply feature in the Gmail Inbox app (Android and iOS). When it thinks vou've received an email that requires a short, simple response, it suggests up to three pre-written replies that you can just tap to send. In its Gmail blog (bit.ly/gmail384),

Google says Smart Reply will learn which responses you prefer (and which you don't like), and suggest more of the same.



Open Office documents within Chrome

In the long term, Microsoft wants to persuade millions of people to switch from Chrome or Firefox to Edge. We'll see whether that happens but, in the meantime, Microsoft wants to encourage people sticking with those browsers to use its software. With this in mind, Microsoft has released a Chrome extension for Office Online.



letting you create, open and edit Word, Excel, PowerPoint, OneNote and Sway documents from within the browser. Once you've added the extension, click the small Office logo in the top-right corner to see the options.

The extension is part of a major update to Office (explained in Microsoft's blog: bit.ly/officeblog384) that also integrates Skype into Word, Excel, PowerPoint, OneNote and Outlook.com. This lets you chat to your Skype contacts using voice and video within each of the programs, and saves your messaging so you can pick up where you left off.

Make your own **BBC** weather reports

That's the BBC's rather grand way of introducing its Weather Watchers website, which lets you make your own weather reports to share on a UK map. Once you've signed up, click the 'Create a report' button, move the temperature slider and add a photo. It's a great idea: a crowd-sourced hub of information on the one subject that everybody in Britain loves talking about. You can read more about it on the BBC's Internet Blog: bit.ly/ weather384.

Zoom into largest ever photo of space

At 46 billion pixels, this photo of the Milky Way is the largest image of space ever created. Astronomers at the Ruhr University Bochum's spent five years taking photos, then stitched 268 sections together to create a whopping 194GB image. That's too big for an ordinary PC to download, hence this online viewer which lets you zoom deep into our galaxy. You can also search for stars and other heavenly bodies. Type 'Eta Carinae' to see the image below.

Need to Know

BBC launches download store for TV shows

What happened?

The BBC is taking on Netflix and Amazon with its own digital store selling TV shows from its archives.

The BBC Store (store.bbc.com)

lets you browse, buy and download more than 7,000 hours of the Beeb's programming, including popular

series such as Doctor Who, Sherlock and Only Fools and Horses, and rarer shows from the last 60 years. The BBC has said that only a tenth of the shows it has produced are currently available on DVD, so it hopes to offer a wider range of viewing via digital downloads. Indeed, it aims to have 10,000 hours of content available by the end of the year, and plans to add 55 to 70 hours of shows each week.

Prices start from £1.89 for a single episode, with a six-part series costing from £7.99, although the BBC said it will keep its prices in line with rival services.

The older shows on offer include controversial episodes that can't be shown on television uncut, because they feature content that's no longer considered politically correct - for example, Seventies sitcom It Ain't Half Hot Mum. That's handy for viewers who feel nostalgic for popular shows from their youth, but some of the racist, homophobic and sexist language they include might come as a shock to others.

How will it affect you?

Don't worry about the BBC Store replacing the iPlayer - that's still available to watch for free or, if you're watching shows live, after paying the licence fee. You'll also be told if a show on the BBC Store is currently available on iPlayer, so you don't pay for



something you can see for free.

If you already watch BBC shows on Netflix or Amazon, don't fret - they'll still be available on those services for the foreseeable future. That said, some of the series will only be available as exclusives on the BBC Store, particularly older content.

The BBC also emphasises that the service won't be available to viewers living overseas: it's only for UK residents and there are no plans to roll it out around the world. However, there's nothing to stop people downloading the shows to watch offline while in the UK, and mobile apps should be launched before Christmas.

What do we think?

This is a great way to open up the BBC archives, although it will annoy some viewers who feel that they've already paid for the content once via the licence fee. The BBC argues that the site works in a similar way to DVDs - a logic that's hard to disagree with - and points out that the licence fee covers the iPlayer but not the Store. However, it's a shame the BBC isn't promoting the service by offering a few free downloads; instead, there's a 25% discount available on your first purchase.

The store also gives the BBC another way to rake in revenue for its programming as more people shift to watching on-demand rather than live,

for which they don't need to buy a TV licence. Additionally, it should be noted that fewer people are buying DVDs, and many laptops no longer come with optical drives. With so much of the BBC's revenue previously coming from DVD sales, it needs to find a better way to reflect and profit from modern viewing habits, and the BBC Store is the perfect solution.

What we think of this fortnight's top tech news stories and rumours, and how they affect you

Microsoft's unlimited cloud storage ends

What happened?

Microsoft has blamed a "small number of users" for abusing its online storage service OneDrive, and has introduced a 1TB cap.
Previously, anyone with a subscription to Office 365 got unlimited OneDrive storage as part of the deal. That's been scrapped because some users were backing up multiple PCs and storing entire movie collections, with some totalling a whopping 75TB.

Microsoft is also capping free OneDrive storage. You can still get free cloud storage without using Office 365, but it's being cut from 15GB to just 5GB.

How will it affect you?

The cut from 15GB to 5GB will be applied in early 2016, so if you're using the free OneDrive service, you might want to take some time over Christmas to clean out your account. You will still be able to access your files for at least 12 months, so don't panic that Microsoft will delete them. The company is also offering OneDrive users a free Office 365 Personal subscription,

which comes with 1TB of storage. This is an excellent deal, but remember that you'll have to pay the £60 annual subscription once the free period is up.

If you're an Office 365 subscriber using more than 1TB of storage, you'll also have 12 months to sort out your account. If the reduced storage means you no longer want to use the service, you can get a refund.

What do we think?

Microsoft can't be surprised that some users abused this free storage – it was bound to happen. It's a shame that the company is capping all users rather than simply dealing with the worst offenders. Why let a few people ruin it for everyone?

Government updates 'Snoopers' Charter'



What happened?

The Government has unveiled its latest attempt to get online surveillance laws on the books. The latest effort, called the Investigatory Powers Bill, is currently a draft – it will be debated by MPs and is subject to change before the final version is put before Parliament.

The new version of the bill - often referred to as the 'Snoopers' Charter' will see the government require web and communication firms to keep metadata on users including who they send messages to and when - but not the content of those messages. The bill requires ISPs to log every website we visit, but not every page within that site, in case security services need to view that info.

The bill does, for the first time, introduce 'judicial oversight' to surveillance. Security services, police and other public bodies will need to get a judge's permission before intercepting your messages or using hacking techniques to access your PC, although they will still

have the power to view your browsing history.

How will it affect you?

The bill is only a draft, so amendments are expected. This is really the starting point for the debate, and there's agreement and disagreement from all sides of the political spectrum. If you disagree with any aspect of the bill, now would be an excellent time to contact your MP to let them know.

What do we think?

This is a complicated piece of law, and it's impossible to say if it's good or bad news. Aspects of it are an improvement over previous 'Snoopers' Charters', particularly the judicial oversight. But the devil is in the detail: if the judges don't get full information about what they're approving because of time constraints, then it's not much of an improvement.

We'll have to wait and see, but it's hard to feel positive about legislation that enshrines in law the government's right to see nearly everything we do online.



Windows 7 and 8.1 to be discontinued next year

What happened?

Microsoft confirmed that from 1 November 2016, you will no longer be able to buy any PCs or laptops running Windows 7 or 8.1. The company updated its Windows Lifecycle Fact Sheet page (bit.ly/ lifestyle384) with an 'end of sales' date of 31 October 2016 for both operating systems, which means that if you buy a new computer, you won't have any choice other than to use Windows 10.

Microsoft's usual procedure is to discontinue its previous operating system two years after the new one is released. Windows 10 has only been available since 29 July, so Windows 8.1 will have a shorter shelf life than usual. Conversely, Windows 7 should have been completely discontinued last October, but while PCs running the Home Basic, Home Premium and Ultimate versions were taken off sale at that time, Windows 7 Professional was granted a two-year reprieve.

How will it affect you?

If you need a new PC, but you don't want to use Windows 10, you'd better

hurry up and buy one soon, although you'll now only be able to get the Professional version of Windows 7. If you're running Windows 7 or 8.1 on your current machine, there's no need to panic because Microsoft will still deliver security updates to the two operating systems until January 2020 and January 2023 respectively. This is because Windows 7 is still covered by 'extended support', while Windows 8.1 will remain in 'mainstream support' for the next few vears.

You should also bear in mind that with Microsoft aggressively pushing the

Windows 10 upgrade to Windows 7 and 8.1 users, going so far as to download the installation files whether you want

> them or not (see our cover feature on page 36), there may ultimately be no escape from the new operating system.

What do we think?

We suspected from the beginning that although

Windows 10 was originally touted as an optional upgrade, it would eventually become the only choice available. Microsoft is a business, after all, and it's keen for PC users to move on from its old, outdated software and embrace its

We also think that the company is keen to move on from the embarrassment of Windows 8. By preventing the sale of PCs that run the older operating system, it can effectively pretend it never happened. However, with millions of people worldwide still using the outdated and unsupported Windows XP, we reckon this could be more difficult than Microsoft hopes!



FIRST LOOK

OnePlus X oneplus.net/uk/x

The OnePlus X is the second flagship phone this year from Chinese manufacturer OnePlus. Like the OnePlus 2 and the OnePlus One, you can only buy it via invitation, but it's less expensive than the latter, with the cheapest version costing a mere £199 inc VAT.

The OnePlus X is a smaller device than the OnePlus 2, with a 5in, 1,080 x 1,920-resolution AMOLED display. It's available in two exotic finishes - Onyx (£199), and Ceramic (£269) - and runs OnePlus' own version of Android 5.1.1 - OxygenOS. Significant features include its new 13-megapixel camera - complete with isocell sensor tech, phase

detect autofocus and an f/2.2 aperture - and a front-facing camera with an impressively high resolution of 8 megapixels. As with the OnePlus 2, the X has a handy Alert Slider that lets you switch between three different

sound profiles.

The internal components of the OnePlus X make it a bit of an odd beast. Powering the phone is the generation-old quad-core Qualcomm



Snapdragon 801 processor, running at 2.3GHz and accompanied by 3GB of RAM, an Adreno 330 graphics processor and 16GB of storage, expandable to 128GB via a microSD slot. We haven't seen this combination of components in a phone since the days of the OnePlus One and the LG G3. What's slightly more concerning is the size of the battery. It's only 2,525mAh in capacity, which is down by nearly 800mAh on the OnePlus 2 - and we weren't blown away with the stamina of that phone.

It's hard to say at this stage how good the OnePlus X is going to be. On the one hand, the design looks absolutely stunning, especially the ceramic model; on the other, the specifications aren't exactly cuttingedge, and the battery in particular seems on the small side.



WHAT'S THE RUMOUR

Is Google going to merge **Android with Chrome OS?**

For years, Google has been a two-man show when it comes to operating systems. First, there was Android for smartphones and tablets; then came Chrome OS, a browser-based operating system that runs on low-cost laptops called Chromebooks. Unlike the massively successful Android, which is the now most used OS on the planet, Chrome OS accounts for less than 3% of operating systems worldwide.

Despite the wildly different usage statistics, we were still surprised when the Wall Street Journal reported that Google is planning to merge the two operating systems. According to the WSJ: "Google engineers have been working for roughly two years to combine the operating systems and have made progress recently. The company plans to unveil its new, single operating system in 2017, but expects to show off an early version next year." Rumours suggest that the combined OS will be unveiled at Google's I/O developers conference, and make the event "the most exciting in its history".

However, after the WSJ broke the news, Hiroshi Lockheimer, Senior Vice President of Android, Chromecast, and Chrome, tweeted: "There's a ton of momentum for Chromebooks and we are very committed to Chrome OS. I just bought two for my kids for schoolwork!". Google told tech-news site The Verge (bit.ly/theverge384) that



Chrome OS is not being "killed", but also confirmed that it is working on a merged Android/Chrome OS operating system.

LIKELIHOOD RATING **JJJJ**

Confusingly, it seems that Google is going to combine Android and Chrome OS, while also maintaining them separately. This sounds like lot of effort, so we wonder if it has another trick up its sleeve, such as creating an entirely new type of device for the hybrid OS.

Vodafone customers' details stolen

The accounts of 1,827 Vodafone customers have been accessed by hackers, potentially revealing their names, mobile numbers and bank details, the telecoms company has admitted. A spokesperson for Vodafone said the leak was not due to a breach of its systems, but that it "was driven by criminals using email addresses and passwords acquired from an unknown source external to Vodafone". No credit-card details were accessed, but the spokesperson warned that leaked information could leave victims susceptible to fraud and phishing attempts. Affected customers have been contacted and their accounts have been blocked until their details are changed. The revelation came

affected 157.000 of its customers and caused its share value to plummet. bit.ly/vodafone384

Snapchat clarifies changes to its terms of service

Snapchat users were understandably concerned by recent changes to the app's terms and conditions. in which it claimed the right to store. reproduce and publish their content. However, in a blog post published on its website, the popular messaging app has since clarified the changes to its privacy policy. The company states that messages will continue to be automatically deleted from its servers once they've been read by recipients, emphasising that "Snapchat is not - and never has been - stockpiling your private Snaps or Chats". It continues, however, to explain that changes were necessary, in order for collaborative features such as Live Stories (where users contribute

Web-hosting firm leaks millions of passwords

Free web-hosting firm 000webhost leaked the passwords of 13 million users in plain text, according to Bitdefender. The breach was first made public by security expert Troy Hunt (of haveibeenpwned.com) on 29 October 2015, although the user records were stolen more than five months earlier. Following the revelation, 000webhost posted a notice on its website saying that it was fixing the problems with its website. Bitdefender stresses the importance of using different passwords for different websites, so that hackers cannot access multiple accounts with the same

Following the recent hacks of TalkTalk and Vodafone (see story, above), can we really trust any companies to keep our personal details safe any more?

Following any high profile cyberattack, there are questions about who, how and what was to blame, but to an extent these are immaterial. Most firms collect significant personal data on their customers, such as addresses and dates of birth. If left unprotected, this info can give attackers almost all the data they need to undertake fraudulent activity against customers.

These breaches highlight a need for companies to place tight controls on how sensitive info is protected. If data is left unprotected, it's not a matter of if it will be compromised but when. Even

the best security cannot keep attackers away from key data in all circumstances.

A company needs to assume that all other security measures may fail, and the data must be a primary focus for protection via encryption. It is critical this protection includes all potentially sensitive information and not just financially related data.

Many leading companies already employ formatpreserving encryption. Taking a data-centric approach to security means attackers would end up with unusable encrypted data instead of the current outcomes, where customers' personal data can end up in the hands

of cybercriminals.

The theft of financial, credit card or account information has a limited lifespan if the victim changes their account details. But personal information obtained by accessing someone's account profile has a much broader use and can be used to commit a wider range of fraud and identity theft, and this info can't always be changed.

Encryption is essential to protect customer data throughout its entire lifecycle. This, along with a robust security stance, is the way to stop criminals profiting from stolen data.





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We test and compare the latest products

Windows 10 laptops under £250

You can get a brand new Windows 10 computer without spending a fortune. Here, we've tested six affordable options

t's logical to assume that a new Windows 10 laptop is going to cost a lot of money, yet this isn't necessarily the case. Several manufacturers are making cheap laptops, costing less that £250, that are perfectly capable of running Microsoft's latest operating system. That said, a low price will always involve a compromise - none of these machines could be described as powerhouses, and they are limited to browsing the web and running simple applications. However, they are ideal for use as a secondary, portable PC. It takes a while for a new operating system to filter through, so all the models we reviewed come with Windows 8.1 pre-installed. However, we tested all of them having first performed the free Windows 10 upgrade.

HOW WE TESTED

We put all the laptops through their paces using our Windows benchmark suite, which gives an overall score based on a series of tests including office tasks, image editing and video encoding. We also tested each laptop's battery, timing how long it took to drain completely from a full charge.

Asus EeeBook X205TA | £149.99 | www.pcworld.co.uk

The Asus EeeBook X205TA is a netbook-style laptop with a great build quality and battery life, and comes with a free one-year subscription to Office 365. However, the Office offer is only available from certain retailers (including our pick of PC World), so select your supplier carefully if you're shopping online and want to take advantage of the deal.

At 980g, it's the lightest laptop in this Group Test but it still feels reassuringly sturdy and well built. It has two USB 2 ports but no USB 3, which is disappointing, though it has Bluetooth and 802.11n Wi-Fi. There's also a microSD card slot and a Micro HDMI port for hooking up the laptop to an external monitor.

The 11.6in, 1,366 x 768 pixels screen was only able to display 54.7 per cent of the colours using the sRGB colour range, and we measured a contrast ratio of 437:1, which isn't great. However, the keyboard is surprisingly capable. The keys don't have a lot of 'travel' (they are flat, rather than raised, which is less comfortable for touch typing), but they're light and responsive. The touchpad is also good and works well with Windows' multi-fingered gestures.

These small, cheap laptops aren't designed to run the latest games or perform complicated tasks such as video editing, and our test results

bore this out, with the X205TA managing an overall score of 9 points in our benchmark test. But it runs basic apps such as an office suite and web browser without any problems and boots quickly, getting Windows up and running in 15 seconds. The downside of the small SSD (solidstate drive), however, is that you end up having to store files on other devices.



It's impressive that Asus has made such a capable laptop that costs so little. If you're happy to save your work to the cloud and don't mind paving £60 per year for Office 365 after the first free year. the Asus EeeBook is a terrific buy. Some compromises have been

> made to get to this price. however, and you might find it a bit small and cramped, simply because it's been squeezed into such a tiny case.

Windows 10 is a better operating system for tablets than Windows 8.1, and has improved support for gestures. Adding a detachable keyboard, as HP has done with this Pavilion model, gives you the best of both worlds because you can use it as either a tablet or a laptop.

The tablet offers similar performance to the Gold Awardwinning Asus, scoring 9 in our Windows benchmark test, which is no suprise because the underlying specifications are very similar. The Pavilion's screen is touch sensitive but smaller, at 10.9in, and has a lesser resolution of 1,280 x 800 pixels. The device is also surprisingly capable as a laptop, with a good quality keyboard and decent trackpad. The only problem is the relatively low-res screen, which means you can only really run one application at a time before everything gets too cramped.

VERDICT

 $\star\star\star\star$

This is a good Windows 10 machine that operates both as a laptop and a tablet. and is powerful enough to run basic applications. The battery life is a bit disappointing and the screen is on the small side, but otherwise it's a great buy.

If you find the screens on our Gold and Silver Award-winners too small, then you might prefer the Toshiba Satellite C40-C's impressively sized 14in display. The resolution still only matches that of the smaller Asus at 1,366 x 768 pixels, but it's a better quality screen. The Satellite C40-C had the best battery life of all the

laptops we tested, lasting 11 hours and 25

minutes. This is partly down to its more efficient, low-powered processor - a dual-core Intel Celeron - but the downside is it didn't do as well as the Asus and HP in our performance tests, putting in an overall Windows performance score of 7 points.

There are plenty of ports for plugging in peripherals and an SD card slot if you struggle to keep within the 10GB of space you'll have left after Windows 10 has claimed its share. However, there's no Ethernet port, so you'll have to stick with its 802.11n Wi-Fi for networking.

VERDICT

The C40-C didn't perform as well as our top two laptops, but it has a bigger screen which provides the whole device, including the keyboard, with more room. While this means it's heavier and bulkier, it's also more comfortable to work on.

Toshiba Satellite Click Mini £199.95 www.johnlewis.com | ***

The Click Mini's screen is just 8.9in but the bezel around it is wide, so the keyboard isn't as cramped as you might think. The detachable keyboard module has a second battery, but this still left it with the worst battery life of all the laptops we tested, lasting just 6 hours and 38 minutes. It's not a bad performer, though, scoring 9 points in our Windows performance tests, which is as good as our top award-winners.

Acer Aspire Switch 10E | £249 www.staples.co.uk | ***


The connection that fixes the keyboard to the screen in this hybrid tablet and laptop feels less sturdy than other similar units in this Group Test. It scored 9 in our Windows performance tests, though, which ranks with the best here, and was second only to the Toshiba C40-C in our battery tests. However, that's not enough to justify its higher price.

Acer Aspire R11 (R3-131T) | £242.97 www.saveonlaptops.co.uk | ***

This laptop was the only one in our tests to come with a proper 500GB hard drive, but the extra storage capacity makes it comparatively slow to boot. The touchpad suffered from driver problems after upgrading to Windows 10, and it scored a disappointing 7 in our Windows benchmark test. Even worse, it only came fourth in the battery-life test, with 8 hours and 26 minutes on the clock.

OUR VERDICT

If you're looking for a Windows 10 laptop that's a similar price to a Chromebook or netbook, these laptops and convertable tablets fit the bill. We gave our Gold Award to the Asus EeeBook X205TA, which is a bargain for less than £150. It's small but runs surprisingly well for its size and price.

Our Silver Award goes to the HP Pavilion x2, a versatile Windows 10 tablet with a detachable keyboard that turns it into a laptop. It's more than powerful enough to run basic applications.

Both these options are on the small side, so if you want something that's larger and more comfortable to work on, try our Bronze Award-winning Toshiba Satellite C40-C. Its bigger screen is housed in a generous case, with more room for the keyboard, but this makes it heavier than the rest.



Although Windows' built-in uninstaller does a good job of removing unwanted applications, Ashampoo's alternative is a far more versatile solution. It automatically monitors system changes during program installations, so when you come to uninstall software, it does so very cleanly, removing orphaned

files, Registry entries and other leftover items.

Additionally, the program offers a selection of other maintenance tools including a drive cleaner, Registry optimiser, internet cleaner, disk-defrag tool, startup tuner, font manager, System Restore manager, file wiper, undeleter, link checker, duplicate file finder and more.

You need to request a free licence key during the installation process, but this is easy enough to do and only requires an email address.

CHROME

Search all your online accounts at once

Nowadays, there are so many places to store your files online that it's easy to forget exactly what you've uploaded and to which service. You can keep track of all your cloud content using Xendo (bit.ly/xendo384), which lets you search multiple accounts simultaneously to find a file in seconds. To use Xendo, first install the Chrome extension, then sign up for a free account; you don't need to enter your credit card details, but if you want to search more than the last 30 days of uploads, you'll need to pay \$9 (£5.87) per month. Once this is done, choose which services to connect to Xendo from options including Dropbox, Google Drive, OneDrive, Pocket and Evernote; and it will index them straight away. You can then click the toolbar button and start typing a keyword to view matching results below. It's a very useful tool and has no direct access to your actual files.



Learn the meaning of unfamiliar words

We've always liked the word 'nifty' so we were excited to discover that there's a new Chrome extension called Nifty - the tiny language explorer (bit.ly/nifty384). What's more, Nifty is designed to educate and enlighten you about the exact meaning of words you're not sure of. When you encounter a word or phrase on a web page that you don't recognise or understand, you can



right-click it to look it up using one of the options in Nifty's side menu. These include Urban Dictionary for slang terms; Google Translate for foreign words; and Stack Overflow for technical terminology. You can also search for the word on Reddit and Twitter, to see it used in context, and get a detailed definition and explanation from Wikipedia. Alternatively, you can choose Open All for an information overload from all sources in separate tabs. It's Nifty by name, nifty by nature!

View news headlines on your New Tab page

If you like to stay abreast of the news but you don't have time to browse individual sites, check out TLDR: New Tab News Right Now (bit.ly/tldr384). This handy add-on gathers headlines from across the web and presents them on your New Tab page, so you can instantly dip into any stories that pique your interest. The beauty is that articles don't simply appear in a random list, but are accompanied by photos, videos and animated GIFs, and are organised into relevant categories. These include 'Science and Tech', Gadgets and 2016, as well as a few 'esoteric' sections and a Top Stories page of the most popular content. Although TLDR (which stands for 'too long, didn't read') draws heavily on US sources, we saw plenty of articles from UK newspapers, including the



Guardian, Mirror and Daily Mail. It's just a shame you can't choose which sites to include.

Remove the Kardashians from the web

There have been lots of add-ons this year that replace specific, overused words and names on the web with



something less annoying, or else block them altogether, so we're not surprised to see one called The Kardashian Filter (bit.ly/kard384). As you can probably guess, this extension strips all mentions and photos of the ubiquitous Kardashian family from pages - including Kim, Khloe and Kourtney, their mother Kris Jenner and their estranged step-parent Caitlyn (formerly Bruce) Jenner. We tested it on the Mail Online homepage and no less than 101 Kardashian references were removed. Bliss!

FIREFOX

Create fake identities on the fly

Don't you hate it when websites insist on you providing your name and email address, even though you might never visit that site again? One way around this is to use the brilliant website Fake Name Generator (www.fakenamegenerator.com), which is now also available as a Firefox add-on (bit.ly/fakename384). When you register with a site and need some bogus details, click the 'F' toolbar button and choose the desired gender and nationality of your fake identity. Click Generate to create your fictional alter ego, then scroll down to view your new name, email address, phone number, date of birth and other, less essential info including your height, weight, blood type and favourite colour. We are now 29-year old Edward Cameron from Mount Pleasant - pleased to meet you!

Set a custom page as your New Tab page

Firefox 41, the latest version of the browser, removes the option to display a favourite web page when you open a new tab. Fortunately, you can get it back by installing New Tab Override (bit.ly/override384), which lets you view the URL you want on your New Tab page, rather than the standard set of thumbnails. Simply go into the add-on's Options and type the web address of the page you want to use into the URL field. When you now open a new tab, your favourite page will be displayed. To revert to the standard New Tab layout, type about: newtab into the box.



Restore the old Google logo

Never one to obey the maxim 'if it ain't broke, don't fix it', Google recently redesigned its logo, but it's not to everyone's taste. To change it back, install Google Logo Restorer (bit.ly/



.co.uk, search in your browser or access Google from your bookmarks menu or tab bar, you'll see that the familiar old logo has returned. We noticed a split-second delay when the change is applied, but we can confirm that it definitely works.

Customise Firefox's Reader View

One of Firefox's best recent additions is Reader View, which strips ads, images and other surplus content from articles on compatible websites (BBC News is one) to make them easier to read and faster to print. Better Reader (bit.ly/better384) enhances the feature by letting you also change the font of the text on the page, and make the article wider or narrower. Switch to Reader View by clicking the 'open book' icon in the



address bar, then use the controls on the left-hand side to adjust the font style

and size; switch between a light, dark or sepia background; and stretch or condense the text.

OTHER BROWSERS

Download videos from Facebook Much of the time, the videos people share on Facebook aren't half as amusing or interesting as the poster thinks they are, but occasionally you'll see a gem that you might like to keep. Facebook Video Downloader is a new add-on for Opera (bit.ly/operavideo384) and Chrome (bit.ly/ chromevideo384) that does exactly what it says on the tin, letting you grab any clip you want from the social network. Just hover your mouse over the

top-right corner and click either the SD or HD button to download the video in standard or high definition.



Try the latest version of Vivaldi

"Good things come to those who wait" seems to be the motto of the developers behind the Vivaldi browser (vivaldi.com). which launched at the beginning of the year and has only now reached its first official beta version. This fixes several bugs and provides full support for extensions and private browsing, while tweaking the design and adding options that make the browser smoother and faster to use. It's definitely worth a look if you fancy a fast alternative to Chrome and Firefox.

If you're considering buying a homesecurity camera, this app could save you a lot of money. Install Perch on an old Android phone or tablet (connected to both a power source and a Wi-Fi network) and you can turn the device into a fully functional security camera without needing any further accessories. The app is still in beta but it's completely free to use, and setting up a security camera (you can also use a PC



webcam) takes only a few moments.

Once your device is connected, you can see what's going on at home simply by opening Perch on your primary device or by logging in at getperch.com. The website lets you view past events on a timeline and you can also access a range of advanced options, such as setting a recording schedule and adding custom motion-detection zones.

It's a really clever concept, whether you're only interested in seeing what the dog gets up to while you're out or you



want reassurance that your home hasn't been broken into while you're away on holiday.

One caveat, however, is that we found the app's motion-detection notification emails were a little slow to arrive, so if you want to guarantee that

you'll receive prompt alerts of unexpected activity in your home, we'd recommend using a purpose-built security camera such as Y-Cam's HomeMonitor HD (bit.ly/ycam384).

Perch's video playback can sometimes be a little temperamental, too.





The First-**FEATURE**

With the new Fall Update, Microsoft has fixed many problems users had with Windows 10, but has it gone far enough? **Wayne Williams** reveals the best new tools, bug fixes and hidden hacks

indows 10 has generated a lot of excitement and interest, both before and after its release, and it's easy to understand why. Its predecessor, Windows 8, was a major flop and it was vital for Microsoft to recover from that disaster and prove that Windows is still relevant in a world increasingly dominated by Android and iOS. There's no question that the company has managed to turn things around, producing an operating system that blends the best elements of Windows 7 and Windows 8 into a new, modern hybrid, but we at Web User

- along with many PC users - have been cautious about the new operating system. Not least because of concerns about Windows 10's reliability, its attitude to privacy and the sneaky catches that undermined the notion of it being a truly 'free' upgrade.

In this 10-page special, we revisit Windows 10 following the release of the first major update, codenamed Threshold 2 but officially known as Fall, to reveal what's been fixed, what could still be improved and why now is the time to upgrade if you haven't already.

WINDOWS 10 The story so far

It's been a busy three-and-half months for Microsoft's new operating system. Here, we recap the highs and lows since its release

2015, in 190 countries. According to the latest usage statistics from NetMarketShare (netmarketshare.com), it now claims 7.94% of the market for Desktop operating systems, compared to 55.71% for Windows 7 and 13.22% for Windows 8/8.1. That's a pretty good figure, although take-up of the new operating system has slowed over the

indows 10 was launched to great

fanfare on Wednesday 29 July

At the last count, Microsoft said Windows 10 had been installed on more than 120 million computers worldwide, which puts it on track to hit the firm's stated goal of being on one billion devices by 2018. The fact that it's a free upgrade to users of Windows 7 and 8+ - provided they act within the first year - has certainly encouraged people to install the OS, as has Microsoft promoting it at every opportunity, including advertising it within previous versions of Windows.

Dogged by controversy

past couple of months.

Although Windows 10 has been well received for the most part, it has been dogged by a series of problems and controversies. Early adopters suffered from all manner of errors ranging from lost sound and incompatible drivers to a problem that caused some unfortunate systems to become stuck in a reboot loop during the upgrade process. More



worryingly, the 'personalisation' features in Windows 10 allow Microsoft to spy on its users in numerous ways (see Issue 380 of Web User for more details – bit.ly/ webuser380), and the hidden costs of the 'free' OS (which we exposed in

Issue 378, bit.ly/webuser378) have become increasingly apparent.
Other controversies include Microsoft automatically downloading the

Windows 10 installation files onto compatible systems, regardless of whether they were actively requested, and even forcibly starting the upgrade process on some computers, much to the owners' surprise and annoyance.

Microsoft admitted that this devious download was a mistake, yet it will potentially be doing the same thing on a much larger scale next year. According to Terry Myerson, Microsoft's Executive Vice President of the Windows and Devices Group, the software giant will start pushing Windows 10 even more aggressively in 2016. "Early next year, we expect to be re-categorizing Windows 10 as a 'Recommended Update'," Myson said in a blog post published at the end of October (bit.ly/

msblog384). "Depending upon your Windows Update settings, this may cause the upgrade process to automatically initiate on your device. Before the upgrade changes the OS of your device, you will be clearly prompted to choose whether or not to continue. And of course, if you choose to upgrade (our recommendation!), then you will have 31 days to roll back to your previous Windows version if you don't love it."

Microsoft says that this approach will make it easier for people to upgrade to the new OS, although it's hardly difficult to do so at the moment. The automatic update may also result in some users accidentally upgrading without knowing how to roll back to their previous


version of Windows.

As if that wasn't bad enough, the tech giant recently started showing 'ads' for recommended apps in the Windows 10 Start menu which, unsurprisingly, hasn't gone down too well with users. Microsoft claims that this "recommended apps" promotion isn't advertising, because no money has changed hands, but it's still an unwelcome intrusion as far as many of us are concerned. Fortunately it's easy to disable these ads (and yes, Microsoft, they are definitely ads). Go to Settings, Personalisation, Start and toggle off the 'Occasionally show suggestions in Start' setting. This is a new option that's only just been introduced for most users.

Crossing the Threshold

Aside from a four-star review in Issue 377 of Web User, our previous coverage of Windows 10 has adopted a somewhat cautious approach to the OS - and rightly so, given all the reported problems, privacy concerns and forced upgrades. However, the just-released Fall update (previously referred to as Threshold 2) is intended to fix a lot of the issues we've raised. It doesn't, if we're honest, improve Windows 10 to the degree that Windows 8.1 fixed Windows 8, but then the tiled operating system had many more fundamental problems that required addressing than Windows 10 does.

Anyone who's on the Windows Insider Program (see box on facing page) will have seen most of the changes in this update already, because they've been included in previous preview builds. But if you're on the official RTM (Release to Manufacturing) build, as most Windows 10 users are, they'll be new to you.

Expanded Start menu

One of the first things you'll notice in the Fall Update is that Microsoft has tweaked Windows 10's Start menu. This allows you to add a fourth column of medium-sized tiles to the menu, whereas previously you were limited to just three columns. You can also have two large-sized tiles side-by-side if you prefer. To activate this feature, go to Settings, Personalisation, Start and select 'Show more tiles'.

There used to be a limit of 512 tiles on the Start menu, but that has now been raised to 2.048. This is rather a lot and comes at the expense of simplicity and speed, so we wouldn't recommend going overboard!

Improved menus and tiles

There are four different types of right-click context menu in Windows 10, and the ones that appear will depend on where you are in the OS and what you're doing. The context menu in Start has been improved and gains new icons for adjusting the size of the tiles. Start tiles now support jump lists, too, so you can easily access individual items within a particular program or app.

Updated colour options

It's now a lot simpler to change the default colour scheme for the Start menu, Action Centre, taskbar and title bars of windows. Just go to Settings, Personalisation, Colours and turn on the switch next to 'Show colour on Start, taskbar, action centre and title bar'. Title bars now automatically appear darker, which we personally prefer.

Cortana gets smarter

Microsoft's personal assistant works reasonably well in Windows 10, but there's always room for improvement. Changes in the update include giving Cortana the ability to intelligently understand your handwritten notes, and setting reminders based on locations, times and numbers. She can also keep better track of your leisure activities. For example, if you've booked online

to see a film at the cinema, she'll note the details contained in the email confirmation and remind you of them in advance.

We particularly like that when you're reading a PDF document in Microsoft Edge, you can now highlight some text, then right-click and ask Cortana to find more information about a particular name, phrase or other item.

Enhancements to Edge

Edge is still very rough around the edges (pardon the pun!), but Microsoft has made some welcome changes to the browser, including improved HTML5 and CSS3 support to make web pages load more smoothly, and the ability to sync your Favourites and Reading List across computers.

There's also a useful new Tab Preview feature, which lets you view a thumbnail of a website when you hover your mouse over an open tab.



Handy new built-in apps

Skype's messaging, calling and video capabilities are now integrated in Windows 10 through the 'universal' Messaging, Phone and Skype video apps, which work on phones, tablets and PCs. Incoming notifications appear in the Action Centre (as you'd expect), but what's really useful is that you can perform a Quick Reply without opening the Skype app itself.

WHY I'M A WINDOWS 10 INSIDER

Wayne Williams says:

Before the new OS officially launched, the main purpose of the Windows 10 Insider Program was to give people a chance to try it out and help shape its direction. It's debatable how much notice Microsoft actually took of our Insider input, but it would be nice to think that the five million of us who signed up as public beta testers played at least a small part in helping Microsoft identify and fix problems that might otherwise have gone unnoticed.

Windows 10 is now available to all, but the Insider Program is still going strong. As before, you can be on the Fast ring or the Slow ring. The former gives you more frequent - and more buggy - builds to install, while the latter offers fewer builds, but a more stable experience. In my opinion, if you're going to be an Insider, then

you should be on the Fast ring. There's no point in signing up to test early builds if you're not prepared to go all in.

While it's great to be able to try new features in advance and benefit from improvements, there are downsides. Usually, it's that the new features are a little half-baked. although if something is really

buggy, Microsoft will disable it by default and let you decide whether to take the risk or not. Another negative is that when adding new features and improving existing functionality, Microsoft frequently messes up elements of the OS that were working perfectly well before. Some existing features even get temporarily removed. And there can be an agonising wait between builds, even



on the Fast ring - anything from a fortnight to a month.

Microsoft wisely cautions Insiders against using a preview build on a system you rely on (for work, say), but provided you accept and understand the risks (and take precautions, such as backing up your data), you'll be fine. I've been an Insider since the program launched and have yet to experience any major problems.


Improved memory management

While a lot of the new changes in Windows 10 are cosmetic, there are a few under-the-bonnet tweaks that can potentially make a big difference to your PC's performance. This is especially true of the improved memory manager - if your system starts running out of memory, Windows 10 will now compress unused pages, reducing the amount of memory used by each process, and allowing it to keep more applications running smoothly.


Cast music and video

Just as you can cast content from Google Chrome to a Chromecast, so Windows 10 now lets you cast video, picture and audio content from Edge to devices that use Microsoft's Miracast streaming technology on your network. You can cast YouTube videos, Facebook photo albums, music from Pandora and much more, but there are some restrictions with casting content in Edge - protected media (such as that found on Netflix) is not supported.

Display photos on your lock screen

If you like the daily images displayed by Microsoft's search engine Bing, you can now enjoy them on the Windows 10 lock screen. Windows Spotlight was a feature that was originally only

available in the Home edition of Windows 10, but it's now available to Pro users, too. To enable it, go to Settings, Personalisation, 'Lock screen' and select Windows Spotlight in the drop-down Background menu. To see a new image, lock your screen by pressing Win+L.

As well as the image itself, you'll see a message asking if you "Like what you see?". Hover over this and select either "I want more" - to keep that image and see more like it - or "Not a fan" if you'd

> like something different. The more pictures you like, the better idea Windows will have of the sort of thing you want to see, and it will customise the images accordingly.

Updated apps

Windows 10's built-in apps have been updated with some useful new features. For example, the Photos app now has a folder view, which makes it easy to

browse OneDrive and PC content. The Xbox app has received a big update and now shows your friends' activity in real time, as well as game-progress comparison (so you can see how well you're doing, compared to your friends). It's also easier to find and add Facebook friends, and access the Xbox Store to browse and buy Xbox One games.


The Groove, Mail, Calendar, Store and Maps applications have also received significant updates.

Windows 10 activation changes

Activating Windows 10 was previously a rather messy process. When upgrading to the new OS, the installer used your current valid Windows licence and converted it to one that worked with Windows 10, automatically storing the entitlement in the cloud. Once Windows 10 was installed, you could format the drive, perform a clean install and use the newly converted key to install and activate the OS - provided you used it on the same PC. Happily, Microsoft has simplified things and you can now activate Windows 10 with a Windows 7, 8 or 8.1 key, during or after installation. Previously, using a key from an older OS didn't work.

What we still want to see in Windows 10

The Fall Update definitely improves Windows 10, but it hasn't overcome all its problems. Here are some annoyances that continue to frustrate us



Still no Edge add-ons

Microsoft Edge remains very much a work in progress and, while it offers enough functionality for basic use, it lacks one big thing we take for granted in other browsers: extensions. If you were hoping that support for these would be added in the first major update to Windows 10, you're going to be sadly disappointed. Extension support will likely appear in the next major update, codenamed Redstone, but this isn't due until 2016.

Hard-to-change settings in Edge

Changing the default search engine from Bing should be more intuitive. At present, you have to open the search engine you want to use and click the 'View advanced settings' button at the bottom of Edge's Settings pane, then scroll down and click the Change button under 'Search in the address bar with... Bing' and select the search engine you actually want, which – with luck – should be listed there. This seems far too complicated for such a basic customisation.

Being able to change the default download folder directly in Edge would be great, too. Not everyone wants to use 'C:\Users\[username]\Downloads', Microsoft!

Can't fully customise the Start menu

Sure, you can customise the right-hand, tiled side of the Start menu, but the left-hand side remains annoyingly fixed. For example, if you want to reorganise the 'Most Used' list, you can't. This is a pretty basic change that Microsoft really should have implemented by now.

No single uninstaller for programs and apps

Want to uninstall something? Well, if it's an app, you need to go to Settings, Apps & Features. But if it's a program, there's a good chance it won't show up there. Instead, you need to go the old 'Programs and Features' interface. This lists every installed program – but not apps. You can choose to uninstall an item from the Start menu by right-clicking its entry or tile, but all that does is open the relevant uninstaller. How hard is it to create a single uninstaller which handles both apps and programs?

How can Edge be worth using when it still doesn't support extensions?

If IObit can do it with Uninstaller 5 (www.iobit.com), why can't Microsoft?

Release Cortana from Bing

You can change Bing to Google easily enough in Edge, but Cortana only uses Microsoft's search engine. You can force Cortana to use Chrome (or Yahoo or DuckDuckGo) using the Chrometana extension (bit.ly/chrometana384), but we'd like Microsoft to make it easy to switch search engines directly through Cortana's settings.

Some 'legacy' options still don't work

If you launch a program that's not set as a default, you may see a message inviting you to 'select file types that [program] should open'. Choose to do this and you'd expect to be taken to a settings page where you can initiate the changes. However, Windows 10 has other ideas and will instead display a message stating 'To change your default apps, go to Settings > System > Default apps'. Clicking OK doesn't take you there, it just closes the message. We've encountered this laziness on several occasions, and were hoping Microsoft would have sorted this by now.



Fix Windows Update issues

Windows 10 forces updates on you, whether you want them or not, but if Windows Update has a problem, it can prevent the OS from downloading these mandatory updates to your PC. This potentially puts you at risk from bugs and security threats. The Reset Windows Update Agent (bit.ly/ resetwin384), which you need to run as an administrator (right-click the

program to do this), provides you with a list of commands you can run to hopefully solve the problem.

Change the default apps

If Windows 10 has changed your default application choices to something else - for example, making Edge your default browser instead of the superior Chrome - you can change it back and also set your own defaults for other programs. Open the Start menu, type default app settings and hit Enter. If you prefer to use the Control Panel, open the Start menu, type Default programs, hit Enter and click 'Set your default programs' in the window that opens.

Overcome software problems

The majority of third-party software developers have been quick to release updates that ensure their programs are Windows 10-compatible, but if you find an application that has yet to be updated, and is running badly on the new OS, you can try running it in



If old programs won't work properly, try running them in Compatibility mode

Compatibility Mode. Right-click the application's executable file, select Properties and open the Compatibility tab, then choose the version of Windows the software last ran on properly (Windows 7 or 8). Hopefully, that will fix your problems.

SHOULD YOU UPGRADE?

Are you still on the fence as to whether or not to upgrade to Windows 10? You're not alone. The recent numbers from NetMarketShare, as mentioned earlier, show that even with the new OS being available as a 'free' upgrade to Windows 7 and 8+ users, people aren't rushing to install it. If you're happy with your existing version of Windows, then there's no reason not to stay with it, at least for a while longer. The free upgrade period runs until July 29 2016, so provided you act before then, you won't need to pay a penny for switching to Windows 10 (and Microsoft might extend this period if upgrade numbers remain slow).

Despite no longer receiving any form of updates, XP still accounts for 11.68% of Desktop operating systems,

which is surprisingly high when you consider that it's now very outdated and no longer secure. At the same time, it's also understandable - why upgrade if your current OS does everything you want and

you're happy with how it works?

XP users really should switch to a different OS, for security reasons alone, but they may find the transition to Windows 10 rather iarring, Also, there's a cost attached because they'll need to purchase a Windows 10 licence to install it, and there's the danger that the latest version of Windows

won't run on a much older PC.

A better idea might be to buy a copy of Windows 7 from Amazon, and try that. It will be cheaper than a new licence for Windows 10, and

you'll be able to upgrade to the newer OS for free later on, should you choose to. The version of Windows 10 you'll receive will depend on the version of Windows 7 (or 8+) you have installed, so it's worth picking up the Professional edition, rather than



orst problems

from perfect. Here we explain how to overcome the worst annoyances

Windows 10 is stuck in a reboot loop

Some users have reported Windows 10 failing to install correctly. Part-way through the upgrade process, the message: 'We couldn't complete the updates. Undoing changes. Don't turn off your computer' pops up. If you're lucky, you can boot into Windows and try again but, occasionally, a system might get caught in a reboot loop when Windows tries – and fails – to complete the upgrade repeatedly.

To get out of this, press F8 during bootup to get into Safe Mode, then open a Command Prompt with elevated privileges (type CMD from the Start menu, right-click Command Prompt and select 'Run as Administrator'). Type: net stop wuauserv into the prompt window and hit Enter. Next, type: net stop bits and browse to: C:\Windows\SoftwareDistribution

Delete all the contents there, then restart your computer.

Use Microsoft's troubleshooting tools

Microsoft has released a selection of free, downloadable tools designed to overcome common Windows 10 problems. All the tools need to be run in administrator mode. Try the following:




It seems weird - no forget that, it is weird - that Microsoft provides two separate places to configure Windows 10. You'll find most settings in the Settings app (obviously enough), but the Control Panel, which has been a part of Microsoft's operating system since the days of Windows 95, not only remains but offers different, more advanced configuration settings that can't be found in its newer counterpart.

If you prefer to use the Control Panel in Windows 10, we've got some bad news for you - Microsoft is planning to eventually ditch it and move the remaining features to the Settings app. There's no timescale for this, but the software giant has said on numerous occasions that removing the Control Panel makes a lot of sense and will result in a more streamlined and efficient OS. The company also claims that the majority of Windows Insiders favour the Settings app over the Control Panel, adding support to the company's future plans.


Security, Recovery, then click 'Get started' under 'Reset this PC'. You can choose to 'Keep my files' or 'Remove everything'. The latter will give you a completely fresh start but you must make sure you back up all

your personal data before proceeding. Some PCs also give you the ability to 'Restore factory settings'. Whichever option you choose, you will need to reinstall all your programs afterwards.



My first three months with Windows 10

Back in Issue 375, Barry Collins predicted that Windows 10 wouldn't be ready for its 29 July release. Here, he reflects on his experiences with the operating system so far



My biggest beef with Windows 10 is the Action Centre - or, more accurately, the Inaction Centre. It simply stopped working on my main work PC about a month ago. I still get notifications (often hideously delayed) and can click the little speech bubble icon to make Action Centre appear, but no sooner has it hovered into view then it disappears again. I've been forced to become the **British Notification Speed Reading** Champion, scanning my unread messages in less time than it takes to

It's certainly not the only glitch I'm battling with. My day often starts with Windows 10's 'personal' assistant cheerily greeting me with "Hello <name>!", making it about as personal as a cold call from a PPI salesman. Live tiles in the Start Menu frequently fail to update: I woke up every day for a

fortnight to discover that the Shadow Chancellor had changed his mind about benefit cuts (although that could conceivably be true). And only yesterday, while teaching students on my photography course, Windows 10 point-blank refused to open any photos on my Desktop, claiming it "couldn't find the network drive". I haven't got a network drive. I never have. Only a group of alarmed photography students, who are wondering why the angry man keeps pounding his head against the keyboard.

None of these are show-stopping problems. Even the silly 'network drive' bug had righted itself by the time I got back home. But, as I predicted when Windows 10 launched in the summer. even three months down the line it still feels like an undercooked omelette, as if Microsoft rushed to get it finished for an arbitrary deadline instead of waiting until it was actually ready to release.

I suspect that many of my problems stem from the fact that I upgraded from Windows 8.1, instead of starting afresh with a clean installation like I did on my largely bug-free test PC. But then Microsoft practically rammed this free upgrade down our throats, downloading it onto our systems whether we asked for it or not. If it's going to bend our arms backwards to make us take an in-place upgrade, it should damn well make sure it works properly.

There are some things I like about Windows 10. The Start Menu is much improved (despite the sticky tiles), and I really like the little-known feature that lets you uninstall a program by rightclicking it directly from the Start Menu. Alt-Tab is a now massively useful keyboard shortcut with the super-sized thumbnails of your open apps, and I love the option to beam Xbox games to my PC so I can play FIFA 16 even if the family is watching the main TV. Yes, I do need to get out more.


Yet, most of Windows 10's "killer" features are dead to me. I speak to Cortana about as often as I speak to a gynaecologist, I've never needed a virtual desktop and the Edge browser is like an embarrassing acquaintance you try to avoid making eye contact with at


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Best free password managers

In October, LastPass was bought by LogMeIn, which has many LastPass users worried that its new owners might increase subscription prices or withdraw the free version altogether. Andy Shaw weighs up six free alternatives

What we liked:

PasswordBox is another startup that got snapped up by a bigger business but, unlike

LastPass, it had paid-for elements before it was purchased and the new owner Intel made it completely free.

The service is twopronged. The main operation runs from your web browser, using an add-on you can install in

Chrome, Firefox, IE, Opera and Safari (if you're on a Mac). All your passwords are securely stored online and it syncs perfectly with its apps, which are available for Android and iOS. Most of the other services we tested work with a single device for free but charge for syncing, which gave PasswordBox an instant advantage.

Using the service is easy. When you first download the browser add-on and set up your account, you're walked through the process step by step and shown how to set up your first password with one of six popular sites, including



Facebook, Twitter and Dropbox. When you sign up to a site, a PasswordBox icon appears in the text boxes to show that the software is going to store its details. To log back into a website, you simply click the toolbar button and select the thumbnail icon of the site you want to

open. The add-on will auto-fill the form with your username and password, so all you need to do is click the sign-in button.

There are a number of other interesting extra features, including a secure notepad that lets you store encrypted notes, and the option to share your passwords with a family member, so they can access vour accounts in the event of your death.

How it can be improved:

If you only need to have your passwords available on

a single PC using just one browser, you might be better off using our Silver Award winner because it saves your password data offline. Storing data online is reasonably safe but it's not as secure as keeping it on your own PC.

OUR VERDICT

PasswordBox does for free what other services charge for, namely the ability to sync your passwords across all your devices. Primarily running as a browser add-on, but with mobile apps available, too, this is a great choice if you want access to your passwords on more than one device.

What we liked:

KeePass has offered an open-source alternative to LastPass for as long as we can remember. It doesn't have a flashy interface but it's a solid. hard-working tool that's ideal


for storing your passwords.

The software is PC-based and essentially consists of a purpose-built database for storing password and login information. It has a more utilitarian feel than the likes of PasswordBox, but everything is encrypted and stored locally, so you don't need to worry about your passwords sitting on a server, away from your control.

When the software starts, you're faced with a blank screen, which can be a bit disconcerting, but once you start entering passwords, things soon click into place. It's a secure place to keep your usernames and passwords for future reference.

How it can be improved:

KeePass doesn't give your browser access to your passwords, which seems



like a major drawback but, because it's open source, there are add-ons that let KeePass do almost anything you could dream of, including integrating well with your favourite browser. However, it's not as slick a service as PasswordBox.

KeePass is an excellent secure database but it doesn't integrate particularly well with the web on its own. There are add-ons that will do this, but they add an unnecessary layer of complexity to the service.

If you only need to keep your passwords on a single device,

Dashlane is a solid option. It has its own software and integrates seamlessly with your



browser, capturing passwords and other data as you traverse the web, then filling them in for you. The downside is that it costs \$39.99 per year (around £26) if you want to sync with other devices, which PasswordBox does for free.

Sticky Password

Sticky Password has a similar feel to Dashlane but doesn't look quite as sophisticated. It's also free on a

single device but syncing costs \$19.99 per year (around £13) or



(around £65) for a lifetime license. You can try it free for 30 days but we think PasswordBox is better because it's completely free.

What we liked:

Clipperz | clipperz.is | ***

WebUser BRONZE AWARD

Clipperz is a web-based database designed to keep your personal information secure and accessible online. You can use it for your passwords

but, like PasswordBox, it can also store any other information you regularly need to access, such as your bank and credit card details.

Because all the information is stored in a website, you don't need to worry about whether it will sync with one device or another. Instead, you just access it from any device that has a browser connected to the internet. The site is essentially the same wherever you access it from, but it's been designed to work well on all screen sizes, adapting to mobiles so you don't have to concern yourself with separate apps. You can add new data with a single click, and the site recognises what sort of information you're inputting.

How it can be improved:

Strangely, for a service that operates



within a browser, it doesn't do a particularly good job of auto-filling your details into websites. In previous versions, this was done with a bookmarklet, which you clicked while on the page you want to fill. However, it would seem that more and more websites are blocking this, making logging into many sites more fiddly.

OUR VERDICT

This service is as portable as they come - you just need a browser to provide access to all your saved passwords. Surprisingly, though, it doesn't handle the auto-login process very well.

White Sky FastConnect

Like PasswordBox, this integrates with your browser, just not as tightly or as well as our Gold Award-winner. It doesn't install a browser toolbar button so you can't click the software and get an overview of your passwords directly. Instead, you need to open

the separate tool. It's also connected to a web payment system, has its own search bar

and displays ads in a panel on the right, which makes it feel like an adware add-on.

STOP THE WEB **EAVESDROPPING**

Controlling the web with your voice saves you typing, but it can compromise your privacy. Robert Irvine reveals how to make sure speech-recognition tools are only listening when you want them to

Stop Google stealing your voice


Over the last few years, Google has been heavily pushing its voicerecognition tools, especially the 'OK Google' option that lets you search the web hands-free on your phone, tablet and computer (although that's now changed - see box on opposite page). This is undoubtedly useful for tasks such as checking ingredients, looking up addresses and settling pub arguments, but did you realise that your every spoken request is being recorded and stored online by Google? No, we're not just being paranoid - visit your Voice & Audio Activity page at history. google.com/history/audio (use bit.ly/ audio384 for short) and you'll find an archive of all the questions and commands you've addressed to Google since you started using the feature. What's more, when you click the Play button below an entry, you'll hear a recording of your voice (which always sound disconcertingly different to how you imagine!).

Although Google claims it needs to store these recordings so that it can "recognise your voice and improve speech recognition", it's still rather creepy to have everything you say hoarded in this way - even if it's true that only you (and Google) can access the audio. To prevent this unauthorised

eavesdropping, go to the 'Activity controls' page at bit.ly/controls384 and turn off the 'Your voices and search commands' option. Google will continue to store audio data, but anonymously, so it's not identified with you. You should also delete your past recordings from the Voice & Audio Activity page.

Stop Cortana 'getting to know you'

Cortana is one of the cleverest features in Windows 10, but the voice assistant raises privacy concerns. It's great that you can summon her simply by saying "Hey Cortana", but this also means she's effectively listening at all times, awaiting vour next command. Microsoft denies that there is anything invasive about this, saying in its Cortana FAQ that she "uses your voice data to learn how you speak and to correctly recognise and execute your voice commands" (bit.ly/ cortana384). However, it adds that "this information is also used to improve Microsoft products and services that use speech recognition", which suggests that what happens in Cortana doesn't

If you're unnerved by this cavalier attitude to recording your voice, go to Start, Settings, Privacy, click the option 'Speech, inking and typing' and select 'Stop getting to know me' button. This will clear the information gathered by Cortana and Windows 10, and also turn off the personal assistant and dictation functions. Cortana also uploads your voice data to the web, which you can delete by going to Bing's Personalisation page (bit.ly/bing384) and clicking the Clear button under the 'Other Cortana data...' option.

Control when Siri listens to

"Siri will now be listening in at ALL times," screamed a Mail Online headline on 9 September (bit.ly/sirimail384), reporting that in iOS 9, "Siri will be permanently switched on and listening for the voice command, even if you're [sic] phone is on the other side of the room". This isn't quite as sinister as it sounds, because it refers to the fact that you can now use Apple's voice assistant simply by saying "Hey Siri" rather than needing to press a button to activate her. The feature was actually introduced in iOS 8, but it only worked when your iPhone or iPad was plugged in to charge.

Apple has admitted that it stores your voice data for up to two years, and even shares it with third parties to improve the speech recognition but, unlike Google and Microsoft, it does so anonymously without linking the recordings to your Apple ID, email



address or other account. That's all very well, you may think, but it's still passing on my ramblings without my permission. In fact, Apple makes clear in its iOS licence agreement that "by using Siri, you agree and consent to Apple's and its subsidiaries' and agents' transmission, collection, maintenance. processing, and use of this information, including your voice input". Moreover, the feature is disabled by default and very easy to turn off if you do activate it: just go to Settings, General, Siri and move the Allow Hey Siri slider over to the left.

Stop websites accessing your microphone

Certain websites, for example those that let you make video calls over the internet or search using your voice, ask for permission to access your microphone. This is understandable because they wouldn't work without it, but there's a small risk that by granting them access you could allow less trustworthy sites to listen to you through your browser. To stop this happening in Chrome, go to Settings, 'Show advanced settings' and click the 'Content settings' button under Privacy. Scroll down to Microphone and select 'Do not allow sites to access your microphone' then click 'Manage exceptions'. Click the 'x' next to any site you want to forbid access to your

microphone to remove it from the list.

In Firefox, type about:permissions into the address bar, press Enter and

select a site in the list on the left. Click the 'Use the Microphone' drop-down menu on the right and choose Block or 'Always ask'.

You should also prevent Flash content from accessing your microphone. This can't be controlled using your browser's own settings; instead, you need to go to Flash Player's Website Privacy Panel (bit.ly/flash384), select 'Always deny'

and remove any unwanted sites from the permitted list.

Stop your smart TV collecting voice data

Earlier this year, it was reported that Samsung Smart TV viewers who use the Voice Recognition feature are being 'listened to' by their sets, and their voice data shared with Samsung and a third-party service provider (bit.ly/ samsung384). As with similar tools, there is good reason for this: the third party in this case is speech-recognition specialist Nuance Communications, which processes the data.

However, some users made comparisons with Orwell's 1984 because of a section of Samsung's privacy policy that stated: "If your spoken words include personal or other sensitive information, that information will be among the data captured and transmitted to a third party". Happily, Samsung has since amended both the policy and the feature, so that voice commands are only collected when you click the activation button on your remote control and speak into the microphone. If you're still worried, just go to Settings, Smart Features and disable Voice Recognition. Samsung says you may still be able to control your TV using certain predefined voice commands.

GOOGLE DROPS OK GOOGLE FROM CHROME

Since Chrome 35 was released in May 2014, you've been able to search the web without clicking or typing by saying "OK Google" when you open a new tab or the Google homepage. Well, you can't anymore, because Google has decided to drop the feature from Chrome 46 since it found that very few people were using it. You'll still be able to use voice search by clicking the microphone symbol (as was the case



before), but barking "OK Google!" at your PC in an increasingly frustrated tone will only raise your blood pressure. However, the feature will continue to work on phones, tablets and Chromebooks.

Flipper is a Chrome add-on that replaces Google's New Tab page with a more useful and attractive alternative. Here's what you need to know

hrome's New Tab page contains the Google search box, thumbnails of your recently accessed sites and a bookmarks bar. It's functional, but bland. Flipper, on the other hand, is a vastly more stylish alternative that launches vour favourite sites from customisable 'flippers' that revolve when you hover over them. You can add as many sites as you like, and group them together into

themed collections. You can change the background, add your own wallpaper, customise the look of the page and even store notes and reminders.

If you prefer to launch sites from your bookmarks, rather than using the flippers, there's a Minimal Mode you can turn on from the sidebar that just displays the background, current time and your name.

Install the add-on and open a new tab, then Choose your language and click Next. Click 'Start right away' and you'll be prompted to choose a wallpaper for the New Tab page background. 11 Just click one you'd like to apply - you can always change this later in the Personalisations menu. 



Your friends and family can disconnect their PCs from your account at any time by uninstalling the CCleaner Cloud application. If they are revoking access because they want to use the application themselves, they can right-click CCleaner Cloud and select Preferences to unlink the computer and log in with another account.




To exclude files and folders from the cleaning process. untick individual boxes in the Windows and Applications tabs 1 as necessary, then click Run Cleaner. 2 CCleaner shows the amount of drive space saved and a summary of the files deleted.




Click Registry, 11 then 'Scan for Issues' 22 to use CCleaner's Registry cleaner. If you opt to fix the selected problems, the Registry will automatically back up to the remote PC's CCleaner Cloud folder in Program Files.



Select Software 1 and Installed Software 2 to see a list of programs installed on the PC. To uninstall a program, click it and select Run Uninstaller. 3 To install software remotely, click Add Software 4 and choose from the available programs or use your own MSI installer from Dropbox.



Click Processes 1 to see a summary of all the processes currently running on the remote PC. To stop any process, right-click it and select Terminate Process. 2 Click Startup **1** to manage the PC's Startup programs or select Windows Update 4 to install pending Windows updates.



Defraggler 1 helps your PC run faster by organising fragmented files on its hard drive. Select a drive 2 and click Analyze 1 to see how fragmented its files are. If the percentage of fragmented files is high, click Defrag 4 to clean up the hard drive.



Once you've finished cleaning the PC, you can use CCleaner Cloud to shut it down or restart it remotely. Select Tools, 11 then Shutdown. 22 Select the appropriate Command (Restart, Shutdown or Hibernate), then click Proceed **3** and Yes.



Create time-bending special effects in mobile videos

The app can record a new video 11 for use with Screenpie or work with an existing video from your device. 2 You can only use an existing video if it's shorter than 60 seconds. In either case, you'll be asked for your permission to give the app access to your camera or videos.




If you're choosing an existing video, click the Play button to preview it, 11 then click Choose 22 if you're happy with your selection. When recording a new video, click the Record button to start. This will turn into a timer so you can make sure the video doesn't get too long.




Tap the circles to choose whether to 'Speed up' 11 or 'Slow down' 2 your video. A 'Total video length' option appears, so you can choose how long the final video will be. A slowed-down video will be longer while a speeded up video will be shorter.



You can also choose whether to reverse the 🔽 video, 💶 which will play the action backwards. You can do this without selecting a speed-up or slow-down option, or vou can make a reversed video with either of these options also selected. 2



Click 'Add caption' to display a green bar across the middle of the video. 11 Tap it to type your own caption. You can drag the bar to a new location, such as the top or bottom of the video, if you don't want it to obscure any action going on in the centre. Tap OK. 2



If you choose the option to 'Include original video' it will play through the original first, then apply the effect. Tap Preview. The finished video will have a small Screenpie watermark. After previewing, choose whether to save 1 or share 2 your clip.

Click Clear Now and Firefox clears your browsing history based on your selections. Next, click Click&Clean's drop-down button. 🗓 You'll see shortcuts to close all your tabs 2 or all tabs except for the current one. Both these options also have keyboard shortcuts.



The drop-down menu also has shortcuts for opening a new private window 11 and for using Firefox's built-in tools to manage your cache, cookies and site permissions 2. Click Privacy Test 3 to see a summary of the information that you reveal when you visit different websites.



Get more storage on your mobile devices

Don't get stuck with a low-capacity mobile device - Wayne Williams shows you how to get lots of extra storage on your phone and tablet



Add a larger memory card

A lot of smartphones and tablets let you increase their available storage by using a larger SD or microSD card. The location of the slot - and type of card - will vary depending on the device. The maximum microSD capacity supported is typically either 32GB or 64GB (you can view your phone's specifications on the manufacturer's website). Budget phones are likely to have restrictions, while

high-end devices will probably accept cards up to 128GB in size. It's worth checking on mobile-phone forums to find out the experience of other phone owners who have used large memory cards.

Add a storage drive

Smaller-capacity Apple devices can quickly fill up: Live Photos on the iPhone 6s take up more storage than regular photos and certain apps - games in

particular - can be sizable. iKlips, from Adam Elements (www.adamelements .com), is a flash drive designed for iPhones, iPads and iPods. It lets you add between 16 and 256GB of additional mobile storage to your device and, thanks to the Lightning/USB 3.0 dual interface, it also lets you easily share data between other iOS devices, PCs and Macs. The drive plugs straight into your device's Lightning port for when you need to save



or access your photos, videos (including large ones shot in 4K on the iPhone 6s or 6s Plus), audio and other files. Adam Elements says the drive is extremely energy-efficient and has "no noticeable effect" on your device's battery life.

iKlips is available in grey, gold, rose gold, silver and red, so you can pick one that matches your device, or just looks good. The drive has a lightweight aluminium body and the clip on its back makes it easy to attach to your pocket or bag so you don't lose it.

The drive is available from Amazon in five storage capacities: 16GB, 32GB, 64GB, 128GB and 256GB (priced at: £49, £69, £89, £159, and £359 respectively). You can also get it from other retailers, including Expansys (www.expansys.com) and Mobile Fun (www.mobilefun.co.uk). See our Mini Workshop, below, to see

how to use iKlips to get additional storage on your iPhone.

Another drive worth considering is the SanDisk Connect Wireless Stick

(bit.ly/sandisk384), which works with the iPhone, iPad and Android devices, and is available in a choice of four fixed capacities - 16GB, 32GB, 64GB or 128GB. It lets you access and share content with up to three phones and tablets simultaneously, and has its own built-in Wi-Fi connection, Prices start from £19.99 (16GB) and rise to £69.99 (128GB).

There are other similar drives available. including the AirStash Wireless (www .airstash.com). This looks like a chunky flash drive but you connect to it via the device's built-in wireless network and stream content using the free app or the web interface. Storage is provided by an SD card, so you can easily add more space and swap cards as required. It will work with any iPhone, iPad or Android phone or tablet, and is available to buy through Amazon (bit.ly/stash384) for around £100.

If you require a lot more storage and aren't so worried about portability,





Begin by downloading the free iKlips app. Go to bit.ly/iklipsapp384 in your browser or scan the QR code on the packaging. Next, plug the drive into the Lightning port on your iPhone or iPad. [] The installed app should start automatically. Tap the Allow button 2 in the message that appears.



The app has buttons for Photos, Music, Documents, Movies and Finder. There's also a red button 11 that lets you access other options, such as camera and contact backup. To copy images from your phone, select Photos on the main screen, then tap the flower icon and choose what to back up (an album or the camera roll). 2



To transfer backed-up content to your PC (or to copy content from your PC to iKlips), unplug the drive from your phone, remove the cap from the USB end and plug iKlips into your computer. It will appear as a drive in File Explorer 1 and you'll be able to drag content to and from it.

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Use the USB OTG Checker to ensure your Android device is compatible before spending any money

Seagate's Wireless Plus (bit.ly/ seagate384, 89 x 127 x 21mm) is available in 500GB, 1TB and 2TB versions, and has a built-in wireless network and USB 3 port. There are free Seagate Media apps available for iOS and Android devices. The capacity of the drive means it's more expensive than the other products, and you should expect to pay around £170 for

the 2TB model from Ebuyer (bit.ly/ ebuy384).

USB OTG storage

Many Android phones support USB OTG (On The Go), which lets you plug a storage drive directly into the device. To check if your phone supports this, download the free USB OTG Checker from Google Play (bit.ly/otgchk384) to your phone. Assuming it works fine, you'll need to buy an OTG adaptor, such as the Inateck HB3001G OTG Hub with Card Reader (bit.ly/inat384). This three-port hub costs £10.99 from Amazon (bit.ly/ amazon384) and you can use it to add a USB storage drive or a microSD card if

your phone doesn't already have a built-in microSD slot.

Choose cloud storage wisely

There are lots of online storage services

that you can copy your files to, including Google Drive, Microsoft OneDrive, Dropbox and Box. Each offers a reasonable amount of free space; if you're concerned about running out of storage, you can buy more space or divide your files among multiple services. Apple iCloud links to iPhones and iPads, but you only get 5GB of storage for free, which will soon get used up. Additional space isn't all that expensive - from 79p a month for 50GB, rising to £6.99 a month for 1TB - but there are better free options.

If you mostly want extra space to back up photos you take with your Apple or Android phone or tablet, consider signing up to Flickr (www.flickr.com). You get 1TB of storage for free and the app will back up your photos automatically. Google Photos (photos.google.com) lets you store unlimited high-quality photos and videos in the cloud, and is available for PC, iOS and Android. It backs up your photos automatically, and the Assistant feature includes some great tools to make interesting creations from your photos, including animations, collections of images and collages.

We show you how to set it up in our Mini Workshop, below.

The app displays thumbnails of images and videos uploaded to the cloud. 11 Tap the menu icon 2 to open the menu. From here, you can access the Assistant, Photos and Collections.



The plus symbol [3] lets you create a new album, movie, story, animation or collage. Tap the three-dot icon 4 to change the app layout.

Tap an image to open it. From here, you can share the picture 🗓 via all the usual methods including email, Twitter, and Facebook. Tap the Edit button 2 to make changes, apply filters and rotate the

picture. The Info button El contains details about the image, including a map of where it was taken. You can bin 4 unwanted photos.


TOP TIPS FOR RECLAIMING HARD-DRIVE SPACE

Stop OneDrive syncing

neDrive is built into Windows 8 and 10, and any files stored in your online space are mirrored on your PC's hard drive. While this is convenient, it takes up room on your hard drive. If you opt out of syncing certain folders, you could free up gigabytes of space.

Click the up arrow in the notification area of the taskbar, then right-click the OneDrive icon and select Settings. Select the 'Choose folders' tab and click the 'Choose folders' button. Clear the ticks against folders that you want to keep online, but don't need on your hard drive. If your phone automatically uploads photos to the Pictures folder using the OneDrive app, for example, clear the tick to stop them downloading to the PC and using up space. Keep them online only and just download the ones you really need.

> Clear these ticks to stop OneDrive storing files on the hard drive



Remove the Hibernate option

A PC running Windows has four modes: on, off, sleeping or hibernating. Hibernation is found among the power and shutdown options on the Start menu, or it may be activated automatically when a laptop's battery runs out of power. When the computer hibernates, the system state and memory contents are saved to the hard drive in a file called 'hyberfil.sys' and the PC is powered off. When you switch it back on, the PC starts exactly as it was before and you can continue with whatever you were doing.

The hibernate file is as big as the PC's memory, which is 4GB or or more. Turn off hibernation to delete hyberfil.sys

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

and release the space. Find Command Prompt on the Start menu (in Windows 10 you'll find it in 'All apps', then Windows System), right-click it and select 'Run as administrator'. At the command prompt, type powercfg /h off to turn off hibernation. Change off to on if you want to re-enable it. This does not affect Sleep mode.



If you don't use Hibernate, turn off your PC to gain gigabytes of extra space

Compress rarely used files

Any file or folder can be turned into a compressed Zip archive that takes up less space. Just right-click the file or folder and select 'Send to, Compressed (zipped) folder'. Some files compress a lot; others compress very little. Use it on files you rarely access, then delete the originals.

Clean up regularly

Junk files build up rapidly on hard drives and should be cleaned out periodically to free the space they occupy. Find Disk Cleanup on the Start menu (in Windows 10 it's in 'All apps', Windows Administrative Tools) and run it. When it's finished scanning, click 'Clean up system files', which scans again and includes even more junk. Tick everything and click OK.

Uninstall large programs

Some software, especially games, can be huge, so if you no longer use them, you should remove them to reclaim the drive space. Open 'Programs and features' in the Control Panel. Expand

the window to show the Size column (if it is not already visible) and click the heading to sort your applications in order of size. See if you can live without some of the biggest ones and, if you can, uninstall them.

In Windows 10, go to Start, Settings, System, 'Apps & features'. There is an option to sort the apps by size with the biggest at the top of the list. Click any apps you don't need and use the uninstall option.

Move personal folders off your drive

Depending on how you use your personal folders, you may find that the Documents folder doesn't take up much space on your hard drive, but Music, Pictures and Videos can use a lot. If you have a second hard drive, such as an external USB hard drive that is always plugged in and powered up, you could move one or more of your personal folders to it to recover the internal hard-drive space that they occupy.

Open an Explorer window, select the drive you want to move a folder to, and create a new folder. Find the folder that you want to move (Videos, for example) in Explorer's left pane, then right-click it and select Properties. Select the Location tab and click the Move button. Select the external drive and the folder you want to move it to.



Move the Documents and other personal folders to another drive

Use online storage without syncing

Many companies provide free online storage, such as Google Drive (drive .google.com), Dropbox (www.dropbox .com), Box (www.box.com) and others. You could quite easily accumulate 30GB or more of free online storage and this can be used to store files that you rarely access, such as old photos and videos. Do not install the app to sync the online contents with a folder on your PC; just use a web browser to go to the website and upload your files. You can then delete them from your hard drive to free up the space.

TAKE IT TO THE NEXT LEVEL

More advanced tips for when you're feeling brave

Reduce (or stop) System Restore

System Restore is an extremely useful tool for fixing faults with Windows, which can roll your failing PC back to where it was when it was last working well. However, if you rarely have problems (some people have never used System Restore) then it is simply a waste of drive space. To find out how much space it is using, open Control Panel, click System (in 'Small icons' view), click 'System protection' on the left and click the Configure button in the window that opens.

A slider determines the maximum drive space to use for System Restore and this is often set to several gigabytes. Drag the slider all the way to the left to minimise the space used and only one restore point will ever be saved. There is also an option to completely disable system protection to free up even more space. This is risky, though, because you will not be able to use it to help fix any future problems you might encounter.



Delete all restore points and disable system protection to free up space

Clean the WinSxS folder

WinSxS is a folder in C:\Windows that can grow very large, often occupying many gigabytes of space. It contains backups for Windows system files, among other things, but not everything it holds is essential to the running of your PC. You should never try to manually delete files in WinSxS, but there is a Windows tool to clear out unnecessary files and just keep the essentials.

Go to the Control Panel and open Administrative tools (from the 'Small icons' view). Double-click Task Scheduler or Schedule Tasks and, in the left panel, expand the folders to

go to Microsoft, Windows, Servicing. In the middle pane, look for StartComponentCleanup. Right-click it and select Run. It might take a long time to finish, so do it when you have an hour or so to spare.

Move OneDrive

You can keep copies of all your OneDrive files on your PC without using up space on your PC's internal hard drive. The OneDrive folder can be synced to an external drive such as a USB hard drive or USB memory stick instead.

External storage is often formatted using the FAT system, but you have to use NTFS to sync OneDrive. Be careful here, because all the files on your storage device will be erased. Open Explorer, select This PC, right-click the drive you want to use and select Format. Set the file system to NTFS and tick Quick Format. After it's formatted, open the drive in Explorer and create a folder for OneDrive.

In Windows 8.1, right-click OneDrive in Explorer and select Properties. Click the Location tab, click Move and select the folder you created on the external drive. In Windows 10. right-click the OneDrive icon in the notification area of the taskbar and select Settings. On the Settings tab, click the Unlink OneDrive button. Open Explorer and select OneDrive, then click 'Move to' on the Home tab of Explorer's toolbar and select 'Choose location', Move. After moving the folder, return to OneDrive settings and set up OneDrive again. When the option to change the default location appears, choose the OneDrive folder you moved to the new location.

It is essential that you always keep this drive plugged in and powered up. A 16GB flash drive would be almost perfect for OneDrive because you get 15GB of free storage.

Clear out iOS mail

I have an iPhone 4S and an iPad Air 2. Both are on iOS 8.4.1. On each, I had roughly the same number of emails, but whereas my iPad was showing a few megabytes of storage used by the email app, my iPhone showed gigabytes of storage used. Clearing all emails, including sent, received and trash, still left 1.8GB showing as email usage.

I have never sent or received large files that could account for so much usage. It means that my apps sometimes don't have enough space to update and I'm limited to which new apps I can download. I have already taken some data-hungry apps off the phone. Opening Settings, General, About gives my capacity as 12.6GB and available as 2.3GB. What can I do about this?

Restarting your phone can clear some problems. Hold down the power button until the option to slide to power off appears. Wait a few seconds, then hold down the power button to switch it back on.

The problem could be due to caching. Caches are temporary files that are created to help speed up access to data or to reduce internet usage. Clearing out caches can release a lot of storage space and

does no harm to apps, which iust rebuild their cache the next time they are used. Battery

Doctor (bit.ly/batt384) is a free app that can clear these caches and is definitely worth trying.

Different email accounts have different settings, and iCloud, for example, keeps deleted messages for a certain period of time. Go to Settings, Mail, Contacts, Calendars and select your account. Tap 'Mail Days to Sync' and choose 1 Day.

The Mail account on your phone is just a copy of your online email account and is kept up to date by syncing. Deleting the email account on the phone will clear everything related to this account.

If you then add it again, Mail will sync with your email server and all your messages will be restored, but without any extra junk. Go to Settings, Mail, Contacts, Calendars and select the account. Select Delete Account to remove it.

Date settings stop mail syncing

I recently upgraded to Windows 10. When I go to my Mail app, it says: "Your Outlook account settings are out of date". I click 'Fix account' and, after a few minutes, I get the message "Error code 0x80070426".

It quotes the same error message when I go to my Inbox and click 'Sync this view'.

You are not the only person who has had this problem. Some people have fixed it by clicking 'Fix account', but this doesn't always work. Try going to Settings, 'Time & language', 'Date & time' and turn off 'Set time automatically'. Make sure the time zone is set correctly.

Alternatively, go to Control Panel, 'Date and Time', click the Internet Time tab, then the 'Change settings' button, and clear the tick against 'Synchronise with an Internet time server'.

IObit update problem


I installed IObit Driver Booster 3 Free (www.iobit.com) and let it run. It told me I needed 12 updates to drivers and programs, so I asked it to update the faulty software. During the operation, there was a lot of flashing on the screen, then it locked into a multi-coloured screen. The only way I could stop this was to use Task Manager to cancel the program. I am now left with the Start menu showing two icons for every installed program. One icon for each says "(new)". I am unable to delete or remove these. In the case of CCleaner, the program starts up twice. I am running Windows 10 Professional.

Driver Booster makes a backup when it is run and the previous drivers can be reinstalled. It is hard to see how this could affect the Start menu, though. Your best bet is probably System Restore. This puts back many system settings to their previous values. Type system restore into the search box on the taskbar and click 'Create a restore point'. Click System Restore in the window, then click Next in the following window to see a list of restore points. Select one from when the PC was working properly, click Next and follow the prompts.

The Start menu is built from several locations on the drive and it might be useful to check them. Open Explorer

C:\ProgramData\Microsoft\Windows\ Start Menu\Programs

Open another window and go to: C:\Users\YourName\AppData\ Roaming\Microsoft\Windows\Start Menu\Programs

Some folders are hidden, so tick 'Hidden items' on the View tab in Explorer. If there are duplicates, such as a program appearing in both folders, that could be the problem. They should appear in only one location, so delete any that appear in a second location.

Copying DVDs of old TV programmes

I have some old TV programmes I recorded to DVD disc (in the PAL format) about 15 years ago. They are rare and I don't want to lose them. Is it legal to copy them? If so, what is the best format for durability? I have an Acer Aspire E15 laptop.

We're not lawyers, but our understanding is that legally you can only record TV programmes for the purpose of watching them at a more convenient time than when they were originally broadcast, so making a further copy of them 15 years later is probably illegal. However, lots of people have old DVDs and VHS video tapes with TV programmes on them stuck in the back of a cupboard or in a box in the attic. It seems unlikely that anyone is ever going to pursue you through the courts over them, but whether you risk that or not isn't a decision we can make for you. You're more likely to incur the wrath of the law if you share them or try to profit from them.

You can use software such as CDBurnerXP (cdburnerxp.se) to copy the DVDs onto fresh discs. Create an ISO image and store it on your hard drive, so if the DVD is damaged, you can write a new one. DVDs and writers will not be around forever, but they will be available for a few years yet.

Organising iPhone apps

I use an Amazon tablet and an iPhone 6, and the one thing that frustrates me more than anything about my phone is the way iOS organises apps and doesn't let you place them on the screen where you want, like you can with Android.

You can organise them in groups or on different screens, but you still have to follow one app with the other - four across by six down - then move to the

next window. It's annoying. When you do group them together, you only get nine apps showing, taking up only 50 per cent of the screen, then you have to scroll to get to the rest, which is a waste of time.

Android, on the other hand, lets you place apps where you like, which is far easier and quicker. Surely, I can't be the only one who finds this annoying? Do you have any suggestions? I don't want to change to an Android phone because I like everything else on my iPhone.

Apple's icons appear in preset rows and columns and there is nothing you can do to change this without jailbreaking the iPhone. This is an extreme undertaking and could invalidate your warranty, so we wouldn't recommend you do it on an in-warranty iPhone 6. As you say, you can organise apps into screens or folders, but neither solution is perfect. If you want a phone you can configure, then Android is clearly best. However, there are still a few options available to you, though they're still not as good as Android's.

If you want more control over how you launch apps, it's worth having a look at the launchers available for iOS. iPhone launchers are not like Android's powerful ones but you might still find them useful. GO Launcher (bit.ly/ golaunch384) lets you add app icons to the Today screen, which you access by swiping down from the top of the

screen. It's not a good idea to stuff it with 100 apps because it will be hard to find the one you want. However, it can be useful to add vour

favourites. You can then pull down and tap an app to run it from anywhere, which is faster than going to the home screen and searching for it.

Launcher with Notification Center Widget (bit.ly/launch384) also adds app icons to the Today screen, although the free version limits the number to eight (35 if you upgrade to Pro for £2.29). It can still be useful to add links to eight of your favourite apps and it can be used with GO Launcher, so you could have two groups of icons. Music Launcher with Notification Center Widget (bit.ly/music384) adds icons to play your favourite playlists, songs, albums, podcasts and audiobooks. So, you could have three groups of icons on the Today screen.

It still isn't as flexible as Android, but it is worth investigating these and other Today screen widgets.

Go to the Control Panel and open Internet Options. Start with the Advanced tab and click 'Restore advanced settings', followed by Reset. Check that the default level is set on the Security



Get Photo Viewer back in Windows 10

I recently upgraded from Windows 7 and I'm really liking Windows 10. One thing that annoyed me, however, was that double-clicking a photo in Explorer opened it in the Photos app. In the past, it always opened in Windows Photo Viewer. Time your PC's startup

I'm not one for recommending software willy-nilly but I recently came across a program that proved to be very useful. It's called BootRacer (bit.ly/

bootracer384) and what is does (very well) is time the Windows startup, recording details of each instance, so that you can compare the results over time or between different PCs. It's not a magic bullet but it gives you some idea of what's 'normal' for your machine so that you can easily identify whether it

You might find that the program offers to help speed up your boot time by providing links to other programs, but I can't confirm whether these tools are also authentic and safe.

Create text from an image


If you want to create some fancy text for a document, web page or report, GIMP (www.gimp.org) can be used to create text that uses a separate image as the fill for the characters. You could call it 'image text' or 'textured text', and it looks really good, as long as you use it in



moderation.

To give it a go, load into GIMP the image you want to use to fill the text. Click the text tool, then click and drag across the image to create a text box. Type the text you want to appear. The effect works best if you select a large and bold font. After entering the text, click the magic wand selection tool and click the first letter. Hold down Shift and click the other letters. In the layers window, click the bottom layer, which is the image that was loaded, and press Ctrl+C. This copies the image in the shape of the text you entered. Create or load a new image, go to the Edit menu and select 'Paste as', then 'New layer'.

Fix keyboard shortcuts in Windows 10

I recently installed Windows 10 on a tablet, two laptops and my desktop PC. Unfortunately, the desktop installation took a couple of goes, because I found that it wouldn't let me use keyboard shortcuts such as Windows+E to open File Explorer. Of course, I could still open File Explorer using its taskbar shortcut, but I didn't like that the OS wasn't functioning as it should.

Initially, I decided to roll back to Windows 7 Ultimate because I was also experiencing problems with the rightclick menu. The rollback was very fast -I was warned that it could take hours, but it was completed within about 20 minutes. Three weeks later, curiosity overcame my desire for stability and I repeated the Windows 10 installation. Although it was a lot smoother this time around, I found I still had the same problem with the Windows+E shortcut.

I trawled the web and finally found a thread talking about a small standalone shell extensions manager called ShellExView (go to www.nirsoft.net and search for it). I first tried disabling all non-Microsoft shell extensions and immediately the problem was solved. If you experience the same problem, I'd highly recommend using this free tool to see if it fixes it.

Also, for any Sony Vaio users who have been warned against upgrading your laptops, I would recommend going for it. It has completely revitalised my 2011 laptop, not just by speeding it up but also by solving a problem I was having with the USB ports.

Deactivate your Windows licence key

If you're planning to sell your copy of Windows or move it to another PC, you must deactivate your licence key to guarantee that it will work when you try to use it again. If you're not sure that you know your licence key, you must use a program such as ProduKey (search for it at www.nirsoft.net) to find it before you

Before using ProduKey, you need to

disconnect from the internet and deactivate any security software you have running because it can incorrectly flag up the software as a threat. Be sure to restart the security software again when you've finished, before reconnecting to the internet.

The deactivation command should work on versions of Windows from Vista up to 8.1, but be aware that you can't transfer your copy of Windows if it's an OEM version supplied with your PC.

To perform the deactivation, you need to first run Command Prompt as an administrator by typing cmd into the Start menu, right-clicking the program and selecting 'Run as administrator'. Next, type slmgr.vbs /upk into the console and it will report that your licence key has been deactivated. You'll also see a message on the Desktop saving that Windows is not licensed.

Make space for Windows 10 upgrade

I have only recently thought about getting my Windows 7 Professional PC ready for upgrading to Windows 10, so I decided to run Windows' Disk Cleanup tool to try to free up some hard-drive space. It was the first time I'd ever used the tool and I noticed that the Temporary Internet Files option, which accounted for a few gigabytes of storage, was unticked for some reason. After ticking this box to delete the files, I also spotted the 'Clean up system files' button. This feature scans your PC for Windows Update files that can be safely removed and, if successful, a Windows Update Cleanup option appears in the main Disk Cleanup interface. Needless to say, I clicked this box, too, and managed to clear almost 8GB of storage in total.



Why can't I use the app store in Windows 10?

I set up Windows 10 using an Outlook.com account but for some reason I'm unable to download any apps from the app store. In fact, when I open the app store, I see a totally blank page. What do I need to do to download apps on my PC?

Much ado about bandwidth

In Issue 382 (bit.ly/webuser382), Barry

Collins makes some interesting points about Windows updates stealing bandwidth. There is no such problem in our home because we are Mac OS and iOS users, and have several of each device. I am running the Caching

Service on Mac OS Server, which makes life much more straightforward and saves on bandwidth. This could be a useful thing to promote in your magazine. I wonder if Microsoft will ever introduce a useful app that performs a similar function.

Another issue I'd like to bring up is how much BT in particular focuses on download and not upload speeds. I live 1.5km from our fibre cabinet and, on my Infinity package, you can only get around 16Mbps download speed and a measly 0.6Mbps upload at best. Syncing services such as Evernote, Google Drive and iCloud cannot function reliably with such slow uploads and often freeze and fail.

BT will not do a thing about this problem and there are around 20 dwellings at our end of this line. Virgin Media isn't available and, even though I've registered my street in the latest

> campaign, they cannot promise we will ever get it. I get a more reliable 4G signal on EE and regularly have to turn off the Wi-Fi and use 4G in order to upload things! EE offer a 4G service for around £50 per month for a 50GB data

package. I welcome comments from other readers.





Ripping apart BT won't make broadband better. Ripping into BT will, says Barry Collins

ff BT badly needs a kick

up the backside, but the

chin-strokers at Ofcom

Why BT needs a boot up the backside

ere's the thing. BT, ably assisted by that damp paper bag of a regulator, Ofcom, isn't very good. The "fibre" broadband that BT is laying all over the country partly paid for by us taxpayers - isn't fibre at all but leaky old copper with go-faster stripes. It constantly pushes up prices (as I highlighted in my column in Issue 379), and if anything ever goes wrong with your broadband connection or you need a new line fitted, you might as well book the week off work to get it

BT badly needs a kick up the backside, but the chin-strokers at Ofcom might as well be delivering it in fluffy slippers. Egged on by rivals such as Sky and TalkTalk, the regulator is deciding whether to break BT in two: one half devoted to building and maintaining the network, the other half to selling broadband and other services to mugs like you and me.

BT's none too keen on this idea and

neither am I. The company is already split internally along those lines, and I see no evidence that formally tearing BT apart will improve broadband speeds or speed up repairs. In fact, I suspect it

could make matters worse. Here, then, is how to properly fix BT:

Fines for late and missed appointments

In the same way that train companies are now forced to compensate commuters when the wrong kind of sunshine delays the 06:45 from Paddington, so BT should be forced to pay customers when it fails to turn up



on time. According to Sky, BT misses more than 500 appointments to install new lines ordered by Sky customers every month, and 4,000 jobs aren't completed on the first visit.

When a BT contractor came to install

my new fibre line last year, he told me I was lucky I was the first job on his call sheet as appointments at the might as well be delivering it end of the day are always cancelled, because BT doesn't allow enough time

> for engineers to get from one job to another. Charging £130 compensation for missed appointments (the fee BT charges to send out an engineer) and £50 for delays of more than 30 minutes would focus minds back at BT HQ.

BT is still forced, by law, to maintain tens of thousands of public toilets, sorry, telephone boxes. Of course, these

rusting eyesores get used about as often as Patrick Stewart's hairdryer because everyone's got mobiles, making them a huge loss-maker even despite the 60p minimum call charge. Rip them out, give the few people who rely on phone boxes a free mobile, and force BT to spend all the money it saves on improving rural broadband.

Place a cap on charges for slow broadband

Having benefited from practically all of the taxpayers' money put towards improving Britain's broadband, BT's now shrugging its shoulders when it comes to getting that awkward last 10% of homes up to speed. Economically, it makes no sense for BT to invest further, so it needs an incentive. Ofcom should cap broadband fees at £1 per megabitper-second of download speed. If you're only getting a miserly 2Mbps, BT can only charge you £2 per month. Let's see how quickly BT and other ISPs change their minds when they can't profit from your crappy broadband.
