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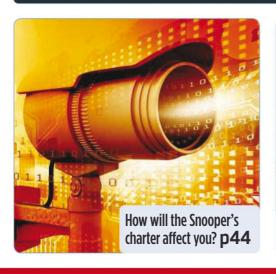

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Challenge Microsoft to recognise your emotions from photos

icrosoft may not yet be able to read our minds, but it can now recognise our emotions. That's the aim at least of its new 'machine-learning' software, which interprets expressions in photos as different emotions, including happiness, surprise and disgust. You can test the accuracy of the 'Emotion Recognition' tool by uploading a photo of yourself at bit.ly/emotion385. The software will display a blue frame around each face – hover your mouse over these to see the emotion 'scores' (it's all explained on Microsoft's blog: bit.ly/msblog385).

To test the software ourselves we needed a photo displaying a wide range of emotions, and found this gem taken at last year's Web User Christmas party. Gurning at the bottom is Andy Shaw, our Technical & Reviews Editor. whose look of

Watch satellites fly above your house

On a clear night, away from lightpolluted cities, it's possible to spot dozens of satellites orbiting Earth. You need to be quick though, because they



move fast – at around 17,000 miles per hour – and are usually visible only for a few minutes. To increase your chances, use the Line Of Sight map, which tracks the path of every satellite – around 2,250, currently.

Start by searching for a large UK city near you, then hover your mouse over one of the moving grids to find out what the object is, such as a weather satellite or a discarded piece of an old rocket. Filter the type of satellite using the topright menu. If you're lucky, you may spot the International Space Station (ISS) – you can find out when it's overhead by using spotthestation.nasa.gov/sightings.

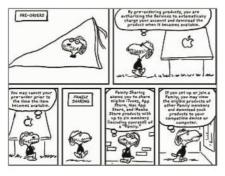

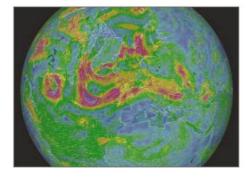

Windows 10 users hit by update problems

What happened?

Microsoft rolled out its first major update for Windows 10, but many users reported problems during and after installation.

As we reported in the last issue of Web User, the Fall Update (which was codenamed Threshold 2), includes performance tweaks, expands the Start menu and adds new features to the Cortana voice assistant, including the

ability to read hand-written notes. It also improves the Edge browser and speeds up boot time by as much as 30% compared to Windows 7.

However, users who

downloaded the update have reported a host of problems on Microsoft's forums. One bug appears to crash the installation process approximately half-way through, although a moderator suggested that the error could be avoided by ensuring you've removed any SD cards or other external media

before you perform the update.

That's problematic for anyone who's installing the Fall Update on a PC or laptop with limited storage, who may have been using an SD card to free up the 20GB that the massive update requires. Microsoft suggested that USB memory sticks or USB external hard drives would provide a more effective workaround for this problem.

Other angry users complained that the update is uninstalling programs, and only telling them after the fact rather than before the action is taken. Affected apps include the system tools CPU-Z, HWMonitor and Speccy, and the anti-malware tool Spybot. The programs can be easily reinstalled, but it's still an arrogant move on Microsoft's part. It's even been reported that the Fall Update reinstalls apps that users deleted when they installed Windows 10, and reverts settings they had customised to Microsoft's defaults.



How will it affect you?

If you've been trying to install the Fall Update only to have it stall, check that the SD card slots on your PC are empty before continuing.

Microsoft said it isn't yet actively pushing the Fall Update to all new users. If it's been fewer than 31 days since you upgraded to Windows 10, you won't get the update immediately, which gives you the flexibility to downgrade to Windows 8.1 or Windows 7 if you decide that Windows 10 isn't for you.

Otherwise, the update will automatically download to your PC. You may have it already (perhaps prompted by last issue's cover feature) but, depending on your settings, you may need to give your computer permission to install it. Microsoft will hopefully have fixed the bugs by the time you read this, but it's still worth making sure that your PC is fully backed up before running the installation - although that's good advice for any upgrade.

The problems highlight the difference between updates - the security patches that Microsoft rolls out once a month - and upgrades, when new versions arrive with fresh features. Microsoft is set to allow anyone using Enterprise, Education or Pro versions of Windows 10 to allow automatic security updates but hold off on feature upgrades.

However, users of the Home version are faced with an 'all or nothing' approach, which means they're more likely to experience bugs.

What do we think?

/indows 10

We're hardly surprised to see glitches and bugs in such a major update - it involves a lot of code that can interact with your current setup in unexpected ways, and that's one reason many users hold off installations for a few days or weeks. However, we do expect better from Microsoft. Any minor problem affects thousands or even millions of people, and it's not asking too much for the company to take a closer look at its code before releasing it to the world. None of these features needed to be rushed out. We'd rather wait a few more weeks for solid code than be forced to accept a buggy mess.

We also wish Microsoft would give Home users more control over updates, but we also understand why it's wary: many people don't bother installing security patches, because they take time and often require a reboot. That leaves users at risk, and makes Windows look like an insecure system. Still, if Microsoft made updates run more smoothly and ensured upgrade code was bug-free, then perhaps we'd be happier to install automatically rather than wait and see.

Chrome ends support for XP and Vista

What happened?

Google announced that it will stop supporting its Chrome browser on older operating systems, most notably Windows XP and Vista. As of April 2016, anyone using Chrome on either OS will no longer receive security patches or other updates, although the browser will still work. Google is also ending support for Mac OS X 10.6, 10.7 and 10.8.

Google continued to support Chrome on XP long after Microsoft stopped patching the OS itself. Indeed, the April 2016 deadline will mark exactly two years since XP last had security support from Microsoft, so Google has actually been more generous to its rival's customers than Microsoft itself!

How will it affect you?

If you're still using one of the older Windows operating systems, you can



keep using Chrome, but Google won't be rolling out security patches to protect you if flaws are found. That leaves you at greater risk of being targeted by criminals online, because you're not only using a vulnerable OS, but an increasingly weak browser, too.

Mozilla still supports a version of Firefox that works with XP, provided you updated to the last Service Pack, so you could switch browser, but that's only a short-term solution and you really should consider upgrading.

What do we think?

Pulling the plug may sound harsh, but don't forget that Microsoft and Apple no longer support their own outdated operating systems.

That said, Windows XP remains the second-most popular version of Microsoft's OS, with just under 12% market share. Many of these XP users are likely to be businesses that are unable to upgrade because of compatibility issues with a critical in-house app, or Chinese residents who are forbidden by the government from upgrading. But there are surely many Brits who are also still using XP and

If you're still running the 14-year-old OS, you might want to put a new PC or laptop on your Christmas list or find one in the sales. It's worth the money to keep yourself safe.

Sky unveils new premium TV service



What happened?

Sky unveiled its new "super-premium" TV service, Sky Q, which combines live broadcasts and on-demand shows in a system the company has called "fluid viewing". You can watch TV shows and films across three TVs and two tablets at the same time, and also record shows to view offline.

Sky Q can be accessed on your TV via an interface on Sky's new set-top box, the Sky Q Silver. This has a 2TB hard drive for storing shows to watch later, which is five times more space than is currently offered by Sky HD boxes. There's also a new Sky Q Mini box, which lets you watch outside your living room on a phone or tablet. If you also opt for the Sky Q hub, it replaces your router and turns the Mini box into a Wi-Fi repeater, boosting wireless coverage around your home.

How will it affect you?

There are two important details that aren't yet known: the price and the

availability date. Sky said Q will arrive in early 2016, but couldn't be more specific. Existing customers may love the added features, but Sky's TV packages are often expensive, and the added functionality may not be enough to draw new customers away from a £6-a-month Netflix package.

What do we think?

We're amazed that Sky or other television channels haven't done this before. Tying live TV together with on-demand makes perfect sense. It's annoying to have to flip between different systems on a TV to watch the show of your choice. Having everything in one place is a great selling point for Sky Q.

The Sky Q Mini box is an intriguing idea, particularly for its ability to act as a Wi-Fi repeater. This should help Sky see fewer customers complaining about poor Wi-Fi coverage. Better TV and better Wi-Fi is the sort of package we can get behind – assuming we can afford it!

UK government to double funding for cybersecurity

What happened?

In the wake of the terror attacks in Paris, Chancellor George Osborne said that the Treasury will double its investment in cybersecurity to £1.9bn over the next five years to fight terrorism online.

"ISIS's murderous brutality has a strong digital element," he said. "At a time when so many others are using the internet to enhance freedom and give expression to liberal values and creativity, they are using it for evil." Although British intelligence does not indicate that Islamic State has the ability to cause harm to the UK through cyber-attacks, Osborne warned they "are doing their best to build it". He added: "From our banks to our cars, our military to our schools, whatever is online is also a target."

The announcement followed the atrocities in Paris, when 129 people were killed in bars and restaurants, as well as a concert venue and a stadium, for which Islamic State claimed responsibility.

How will it affect you?

As Osborne suggests, a cyber-attack on the UK wouldn't simply mean being

knocked offline for a while or unable to take any cash out - it could affect every aspect of our lives. Catalin Cosoi, Chief Security Strategist at Bitdefender, warns that such an attack could have devastating consequences on the UK. "A possible worst-case scenario is the crippling of all communication and critical infrastructures.

ranging from mobile phone to water supply, electricity and gas," Cosoi says. "This could be co-ordinated alongside a physical tactical assault, because disrupting any form of communication or internet-connected technology could be used as a serious tactical advantage on the ground."

What do we think?

Although we're concerned that the government may use the increased terrorist threat to further invade our privacy (see our FAQ on the Snooper's Charter on page 44), we welcome it investing more in cybersecurity. The

> web has undoubtedly played a huge part in aiding Islamic State to spread propaganda and plan attacks, so it would be foolish to ignore the risk of terrorists using the web itself as a weapon. So many services now rely on the internet that its abuse by fanatics could lead to far more serious consequences than those that were envisaged from the Millennium Bug.

Recent hacks on companies such as TalkTalk have highlighted the weaknesses in the security of many systems, so we're happy to see more money being spent on protecting national services.



Beats Pill+ uk.beatsbydre.com

The Beats Pill+ portable wireless speaker is big-sounding, bassy and pretty to look at - living up to its name with a pill-shaped design that houses both front- and rear-facing speakers. Its rubberised case displays four basic buttons - power, volume up, volume down and the Bluetooth button. Apple acquired the company in April 2014, and its most prominent effect on the Pill+ design is its Lightning charging cable, which has replaced the micro-USB found in its predecessor. However, the 3.5mm aux and USB phone-charging ports remain unchanged.

The audio performance is impressive, delivering a full range of tones with excellent clarity, which is

price tag. The original Pill favoured the higher end of the scale but struggled to reproduce lower frequencies, so we kept this in mind during our tests. We played a wide range of music through the device, in an attempt to catch out the Pill+, but everything we threw at it sounded good. However, there is one caveat: the sound is typical of Beats products. Not the muddy, muffled bass of early Beats headphones, but bassy in the same way as the current Beats Solo2. It's not a sound that will match the high expectations of audiophiles

and purists. The goodquality audio hardware and large battery (Beats quotes the Pill+ as having a 12-hour battery) makes the Pill+ quite heavy (745g), so its not going to sit comfortably in a jacket pocket. The accompanying Beats Pill+ app is pretty unremarkable and you'll only really need to download it if you want to stream to more than one Beats Pill+ speaker or grant control of it to a guest. But if you're after a speaker that produces good-quality audio for a wide range of music, and can be used in multiple scenarios, the Pill+ is well worth considering.

Is Apple about to launch its second smartwatch?

After all the hype about 2015 being the 'year of the wearable', smartwatches didn't prove quite as popular as predicted, but the Apple Watch was definitely one of the best options. Now, Apple is rumoured to be launching a second version, with an improved screen and better battery life, which could be here as early as April 2016.

That date comes from a comment made by one of Apple's suppliers, Quanta, that it expects to see a surge in orders in the second quarter of 2016. However, it's more likely we'll see the Apple Watch 2 released in June. That way, the company's wearable product will renew on a yearly cycle, like the iPhone.

Apple previewed the Watch 2's likely operating system, watchOS 2, earlier this year, offering some clues about the device itself. Alongside new features such as more clock faces and a Time Travel function, watchOS 2 also makes the Apple Watch more independent from a paired iPhone. One of the most common complaints about the current model is that it relies on a tethered

Telegram blocks Islamic State accounts

Messaging app Telegram has announced that it has blocked 78 accounts that were being used

to spread propaganda by the so-called Islamic State, according to the BBC. Although the BBC first reported that the service was being exploited by ISIS in early October 2015, Telegram said it was 'shocked' to learn that it was being used in this way. Naturally, the news has resulted in further calls for backdoor encryption. Indeed, Manhattan's district attorney published a report demanding that a method to access passcode-locked devices be built into iOS and Android. However, those responsible for the Paris attacks reportedly used standard SMS text messages to communicate, which means encrypted messaging services

may not have been used at all. bit.ly/is385

Malvertising strikes Fantasy Football site

The Premier League's official fantasy football website (fantasy. premierleague.com) carried malicious

adverts that could have been used to infect users' PCs, the Telegraph reports. The offending flash-based advert appeared to be for a yacht seller but redirected users to a website offering a 'Nuclear exploit kit' that uses Flash's vulnerabilities to compromise the end-user's PC. The malicious ad, which used Google's goo.gl URL shortener to hide its final location, was discovered by security company Malwarebytes. After being notified of the security threat, a spokesperson for the Premier League said, "We are looking into this and have asked the agency which sells our

advertising space to make sure this advert is not appearing on our website anywhere in the world."

Facebook snooping increases 60% in ŬK

Requests for personal data on Facebook have increased by 60% in the UK in one year, according to the social network. In the first six months of



2015, there were 3,384 requests from the Government and law-enforcement authorities in the UK, most of which related to criminal investigations. As described on its page about government requests (bit.ly/about385), data requests are normally for "basic subscriber information, such as name and length of service", but can also relate to IP-address logs and account content.

Following the arrest of the TalkTalk hacker, is it true that most hackers are teenagers? Abbey Lynch, Facebook

Yes. Teenagers, some as young as 14, make up the majority of hackers monitored by the National Crime Agency, which

demonstrates how clued-up young people are at using the internet. This is reflected in recent research conducted by Kaspersky Lab, which found that 43% of young web users believe that they are more 'internet-savvy' than their parents by the age of 13.

Our research also revealed that many teenage hackers did not realise they were breaking the law, which highlights the importance of educating children on what constitutes acceptable behaviour online. Young

people need to understand the wider context (in both legal

and moral terms) of something they might otherwise see only in technical terms and do 'for kicks'. With this in mind, it is imperative that parents discuss their children's activities on the web, yet our research shows that only a fifth of respondents feel they can talk to their parents about such issues.

Our survey also indicated that while many young people believe they are more technically savvy than their parents, 60% of them still

guidance on cybersecurity. This trust is often misplaced because 83% of parents don't feel able to protect their children from online dangers such as cyberbullying and inappropriate content.

That's why it's important for parents to understand the potential threats, so they can open up a dialogue with their children about the risks and use the technology that's available to help them control their web access, especially in an age where young people have so much influence and vulnerability in potentially dangerous online activity.

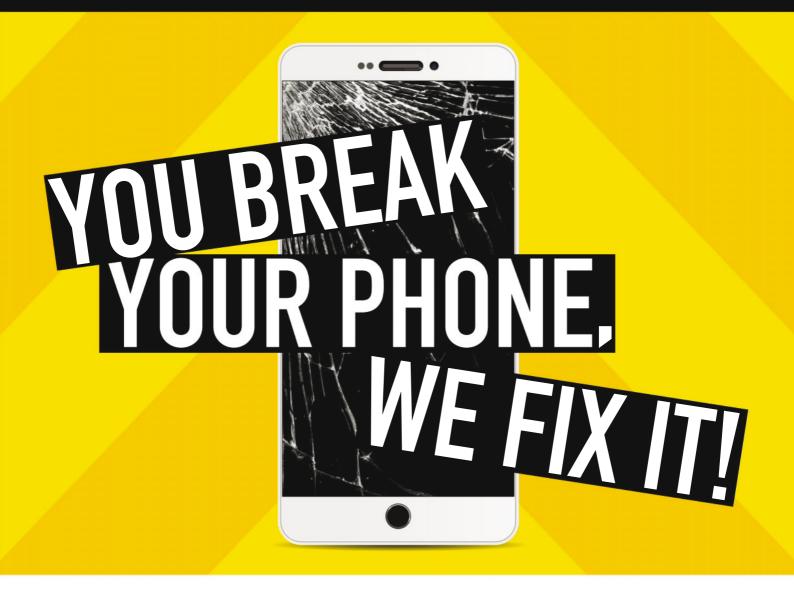

You should stick to a clean typeface with a reasonably large font size and make sure your text has high

contrast to the background. Web-safe fonts such as Verdana and Georgia are a good choice, since they are widely used and were designed specifically to display on computer screens. Besides that, they are pre-installed on almost every device, so you don't have to load additional fonts. The font of your choice shouldn't be too light as it will be difficult to read on low-density screens. Finally, if you're using more than one font, proper fontpairing will help maintain the overall readability of your text.

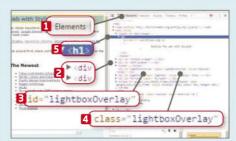

Web-design software

Get yourself online in no time as **Andy Shaw** reviews five programs that can help you create the perfect website

uilding your own website can be an overwhelming project, and there are lots of different ways to do it. You could set yourself the task of learning HTML (HyperText Markup Language), so you can carry out the coding yourself, or use online tools and services offered by WordPress or a web host. But one of the simplest ways to get a good-looking site online with very little fuss is to use web-design software to design your site offline, and upload it to your web host when it's finished.

Here, we've reviewed five of the latest web-design programs to see which is best-suited to creating a great-looking site with the minimum of fuss.

HOW WE TESTED

Each program was installed on a Windows 10 PC and used to create a simple site. We analysed the breadth of tools and features on offer, how good each program was at doing its job, how easy it was to use and whether it offers good value for money compared to the other products we tested. We also looked at whether each program was able to create a responsive website that adapts well to being viewed on a mobile device, because this is becoming increasingly important.

Xara Web Designer 11 Premium | £69.99 | www.xara.com

Xara's web-building software is called Designer for good reason, because it focuses primarily on the layout of your pages. The software interface looks like a desktop-publishing program, in that you create a page, arrange the pictures and text, then move on to the next page. You can also add shapes, shadows and fills, and organise how everything is layered, much as you would if you were designing a static page for print or PDF, such as a newsletter. The icons that are

visible around the edges of the interface change according to the element you've highlighted.

Because it uses a layout system that's similar to page design, it doesn't create truly dynamic websites that change depending on the size of screen they're being viewed on. However, it does have some flexibility built in, which can deduce from a user's browser settings how big their screen is and alter the layout accordingly. To do this, you'll need to design separate versions of the site for each screen size you want to cater for. Fortunately, Xara takes this in its stride and links the content in each version, so if you change something on one design, it will alter it on the others, too.

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Once you've designed your site, there are lots of options for getting it online, including basic free hosting if you want to do everything through Xara. This isn't a bad idea, because it allows you to use Xara's online site-editing tool to make small changes to your website, even if

you're away from the PC that your web-design software is installed on. If you'd prefer to find your own hosting deal, Web Designer lets you connect using its built-in FTP software, so you can transfer everything to your web server, straight from the program itself.

VERDICT

Web Designer 11 makes it easy to create a good-looking website without having to use HTML or CSS code. The interface will be familiar if you've ever carried out page design before, even if your publishing experience has been restricted to printed matter. Despite this static approach, the program provides all the tools you need to WEB DESIGNER 11 create flexible sites that change depending on the size of the screen. You simply rearrange your design to suit smaller screens, and the software will ensure that the content fits.

Serif's software comes with a ton of introductory videos and tutorials to help you get started. You can access these from the splash screen that launches with the software or directly from the website.



Like our Gold Award-winner Xara, WebPlus is essentially a page-design program, so you create a layout in the software and the website will look just like it when you publish it online.

The software lets you create sites that change depending on the resolution of the screen they're viewed on, but it doesn't work as intelligently as Xara's. You still have the tools to design two or more versions of the site to cater for different screen sizes, but WebPlus only links the pages by using redirects. Making changes to the text, for example, on one version of a site doesn't change it in the other.

VERDICT



Serif's web-design tool lacks some of the useful extra features in Xara's, but its wealth of videos and tutorials make it a great option for beginners. It's not as good at creating responsive sites, though.

Website X5 gets its name from its five-step system of creating sites, although each step breaks into further sub-steps. There are plenty of templates to choose from but Website X5 uses a credit system to sell them to you.



You start with enough credits for around six templates, so you can choose ones you want, but we thought they looked a bit old-fashioned compared to Xara and Serif's.

The software can create sites that respond to screen size but it doesn't use a WYSIWYG system to help visualise it. Instead, you split the screen into rows and columns, then drop in the content and edit it separately. The Professional version we've reviewed here can also deliver your content to an Incomedia app, which your readers can download to access your site's content from mobile devices.

VERDICT



Website X5 is supposed to be a simpler web-building tool but its lack of WYSIWYG means you won't know exactly how your site is going to turn out until you've previewed it. The Professional version comes with a handy app for mobile users.

WYSIWYG Web Builder uses a ribbon toolbar like Microsoft's Office apps, so it looks familiar and is easy to explore. There are about 12 templates installed, with many more available to download, but the designs



lack flair, so while they can get you up and running with a basic page, they won't help you to create anything spectacular.

The software allows you to create responsive websites, but it's a bit fiddly. You add 'break points' of different sizes, which are a bit like separate views, and although changes to text and images in one view will follow through to another, you have to make sure you completely divorce your content from your layout, otherwise elements can stop working properly.

Putting together a basic page is very straightforward, though, and as the cheapest of the products we've reviewed, it offers good value for money.

VERDICT



WYSIWYG Web Builder is easy to get to grips with and offers good value for money, but its supplied templates aren't the best starting point unless you're happy with something really basic.

Of all the software we've reviewed, Coffee Cup's Responsive Site Designer is the most focused on creating a site that works well on any size of screen. However, it's had to ditch the simplicity of a



WYSIWYG design to do this and focuses instead on a columnbased layout, similar in style to popular web-building templates used by professional designers.

The downside of this powerful software is that it's complex and relies on the user having a good understanding of how web pages are coded, so it's not a tool for beginners. Much of the layout and design options are configured around HTML and CSS settings, which will make for a cleaner, search-friendly web page, but the onus is on the user to know what they're doing. If you've never dabbled in HTML and CSS, you'll be lost in Responsive Site Designer.

VERDICT



Responsive Site Designer is a powerful tool if you already know how HTML and CSS work, and want to streamline your build of a responsive site. However, its lack of a WYSIWYG interface makes it suitable for advanced users only.

OUR VERDICT

We've awarded our Gold Award to Xara Web Designer 11, which can create a professional-looking site without you needing any knowledge of web technologies such as HTML or CSS. It uses a familiar pagelayout interface but can still create separate versions of a site that work well on mobile devices.

Serif's Silver Award-winning PagePlus X8 is almost as good, particularly for beginners looking to get guidance on their site-building. It's not as good for creating responsive sites, though.

Our Bronze Award goes to Incomedia Website X5, which breaks site building down into simple steps. However, it doesn't have a WYSIWYG interface, which can leave you guessing what your final design will look like.

Chromecast 2

Google's Chromecast was a fabulous gadget that made your TV smarter. Alan Martin finds out what its successor has to offer



oogle's original £30 back-of-the-TV Chromecast dongle did pretty much everything you'd want it to do at a hugely appealing price, streaming content straight from your phone to your TV. It made standard TVs smart, as long as they had an HDMI port. The new version does much the same thing but has some minor improvements, including better Wi-Fi and a new design.

The new Chromecast 2 looks very different, like an ice-hockey puck with a short cable to connect it to the HDMI port. This is better than the stick-like design of the previous model which could get in the way of other devices if the area behind your TV was particularly crowded. However, you still need to provide power to its USB port, either from a powered USB port on your TV or a wall socket.

Setting it up is as quick and easy as ever. Plug everything in and it immediately flashes

up easy-to-follow instructions, starting with information on downloading the Chromecast app to your smartphone. From there, you pair the two, so your handset knows where to send your content.

In any cast-compatible app, you'll see the Chromecast icon in the top-right corner of the screen. Tap it, select your Chromecast and the app appears on the big screen.

It's certainly nippy. Screen mirroring exhibited virtually no lag, allowing you to broadcast whatever's on your phone's screen in both landscape and portrait mode. This speed is in part due to the improved Wi-Fi. The new Chromecast includes an adaptive antenna system supporting 802.11ac Wi-Fi, which means you can hook up to 5GHz networks as well as 2.4GHz ones, making it more reliable if you have a compatible mobile device.

You can also use your phone as a remote, to control volume and fast forward/ rewind. And you can continue to stream content while you use your phone for other things. Best of all, because the video data is pulled from the cloud rather than streamed from your phone, it won't suck the battery dry.

The new model works as well as ever. We connected it to a busy office router and it coped effortlessly, pumping out Netflix and BBC iPlayer programmes to a big screen at Full HD.

Chrome browser tab to show everyone what you're doing, or run embedded videos with no cast support built in. This works in much the same way as before, and the results are perfectly watchable.

OUR VERDICT

Apart from the new Wi-Fi channels, the technology remains broadly the same. If your existing Chromecast works well, there isn't much reason to upgrade, unless vou have a collection of 802.11ac devices and you want to benefit from its improved connection.

For anyone who hasn't already got a Chromecast, now is as good a time as

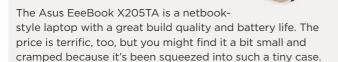

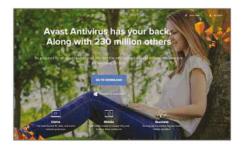

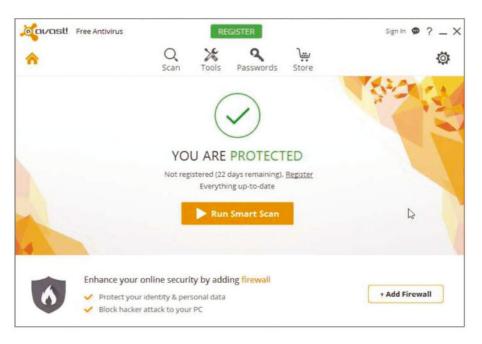

The big new addition to this release is Avast Passwords. This powerful password manager can generate, store

and automatically fill secure passwords for all the sites you have an account with. The software also syncs your logins on mobile devices via Avast's free Android and iOS apps.

The improved network scanner now detects 12 more types of router vulnerability, while HTTPS secure scanning is much smarter. Pay attention during installation and untick the option to install Chrome and set it as your default browser, if you don't want it. Choose the Customise option to pick which components to install.

Read reviews of stores before you buy

As we head into the busiest shopping time of the year, it's useful to know which online stores you can rely on to offer good value and service, and which should be avoided at all

costs. One way to find out is to install the excellent SiteJabber extension (bit.ly/sitejabber385), which provides reviews and ratings of thousands of websites, so you can steer clear of unreliable retailers. When you visit a site, the add-on's toolbar button will turn green, red or yellow to indicate whether that company has received mostly positive, negative or mixed reviews. Click the button to view a breakdown of reviews and ratings, and to read other customers' opinions and share



your own. SiteJabber ratings also appear next to Google and Bing search results, and you don't need to create an account to use the free service.

Play YouTube videos instantly

When you search for a video on YouTube, it's almost always the first result - Google is pretty good at the search thing, after all. But wouldn't it be better if you could skip the search results altogether and jump straight to the video? That's the idea behind the new Chrome extension YouTube I Am Feeling Lucky (bit.ly/lucky385), which adds an 'I'm Feeling Lucky' button to the video site. When you want to watch something straight away, just type the title into the search box and click the button to bypass the results page and play the video instantly. Alternatively, press Shift+Enter after typing your search query to skip to the video.



Save recipes from across the web

Avid cooks who are forever forgetting where they spotted that delicious recipe for shepherd's pie will love a tasty new



Chrome tool called Chef's Hat (bit.ly/chefs385). This lets you save recipes from food sites to cook and enjoy later, simply by clicking its toolbar button to 'clip' the content. Chef's Hat is free to use, although you do need to create an account, and lets you organise your recipes using keyword tags and email them to friends. We tested it on various recipe sites including BBC Food, Food Network UK and All Recipes UK, and it worked a treat, although it did make us very hungry!

Avoid spoilers for films and TV shows

There are few things worse than having unwatched episodes of your favourite TV shows ruined for you by loose-lipped 'friends' and thoughtless TV reviewers. Rather than staying offline until you've caught up, you can use Spoiler Alert (bit.ly/spoiler385) to filter mentions of specific TV



series, films, events, football matches and more from web pages and social media. Just install the add-on, register your details and click Find Alerts to choose which spoilers you want to avoid. The choices are heavily biased towards US culture, but several British programmes and films are covered, too (although not Doctor Who, strangely), and the lists are frequently updated to include new releases such as Star Wars: The Force Awakens. We also like that you can easily switch individual alerts on and off if you decide that you don't care what happened in Downton Abbey, after all!

FIREFOX

Enter passwords by right-clicking

We covered Firefox's new, more powerful Private Browsing mode in last issue's What's New Online, but another welcome improvement is an update to the built-in password manager. This now lets you access multiple logins for the same site by rightclicking a text box and choosing Fill Login, then picking the account you want to use from the options available. These will only include passwords that you've specifically asked the browser to store for you. Mozilla has also made it much easier to view your password for a specific site - rather than going to Tools,



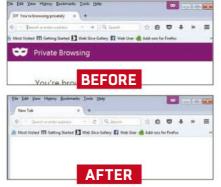
Options, Security, Saved Passwords, simply right-click the password box on the page and select View Saved Logins from the Fill Login menu. You can also click Import to grab your passwords from Chrome and Internet Explorer.

Block adverts in search

Many of us aren't too bothered by non-intrusive online ads. because they help to keep the web free, but we draw the line at those that litter and confuse our search results in Google, Bing and DuckDuckGo. Search Engine Ad Remover (bit.ly/search385) is a new Firefox add-on that strips the ads from above, below and to the right of search results, so you're not 'tricked' into visiting a site that has paid to be featured on the page. It also means you don't need to use a full-on ad blocker, such as Adblock Plus, which may slow down your system by using excess memory and deprive smaller websites of essential ad revenue. We found that certain sponsored links still slipped through, especially on Google, but generally the add-on worked very well. Below, you can see how effectively it cleaned up our Bing search results.



Make Private Browsing more private



One drawback to using the Private Browsing mode in Firefox 42 is that it displays a 'You're browsing privately' confirmation message under a purple banner and eye mask, thus revealing to anyone in the vicinity that you're possibly up to no good. Blank Private Browsing Mode (bit.ly/private385) provides a simple solution by

> replacing that banner with an empty tab, so nosey parkers nearby will be none the wiser. No other elements of private browsing will be affected, so your history, cookies and searches still won't be saved to your computer.

View food-hygiene ratings for takeaways

It's easier than ever to order takeaway food online, but how can you be sure the restaurant you're buying from isn't a filthy, mouse-infested hellhole? By installing MunchDB (bit.ly/ munchdb385), that's how, so you can view official foodhygiene ratings for thousands of UK takeaways. The add-on, which is also available for

Chrome. claims to cover more than 85% of companies listed on Just Eat and



Deliveroo, and to "uncover the truth" when restaurants hide online under incorrect trading names. It's a handy way to avoid falling victim to food poisoning.

Browse popular YouTube videos

YouTube videos with millions of views are usually popular for good reason, but you probably don't have time to

keep visitina the site to discover why. The Opera and Firefox add-on YouTube Popular Videos



(bit.ly/youtube385) saves you the trouble by displaying a one-click grid of the 10 most viewed clips in four categories: General, Music, Sports and Gaming. The grid opens in a new tab, so it won't obstruct the current page, and also lets you browse popular playlists and search for specific titles within each category.

ACCESS ALL BLOCKED CONTENT

COVER FEATURE Don't be told what films, TV shows and music you can and can't enjoy online. **Robert Irvine** reveals the best new ways to get around streaming restrictions

t Web User, we've long believed that your access to the web should be unrestricted and that nobody - not the government, not big business, not former newsreader Angela Rippon - should be able to control what you see and do online. Sadly, this hasn't stopped many websites and online services applying restrictions to their content and, after users discovered ways to circumvent those blocks, introducing further restrictions to block the unblockers. But you can't

keep a determined web user down and, recently, several new tools have emerged that allow you to resume your unrestricted viewing, listening and downloading.

In this feature, we reveal our favourite free ways to bypass unfair and unnecessary geographical restrictions to access any TV, films, music, software and products you want on your PC, phone and tablet. We also take a closer look at the practice of 'geo-blocking' and the legal issues surrounding it.

YOUR GEO-BLOCKING QUESTIONS ANSWERED

What is geo-blocking and why should I care about it?

Geo-blocking is a system that's used Ato restrict your access to specific websites, online services and their content, based on your location. Blocks are usually implemented for legal reasons, most commonly because the copyright holders of films and TV shows only license their work to be available in a particular country. Geo-blocking is also used by retailers who want to charge different prices in different territories, and as a means of stopping malicious traffic from specific domains.

As to why you should care, geoblocking undermines the idea of the web as being open and fair, as originally visualised by Sir Tim Berners-Lee. It makes the internet regional rather than a level playing field for all business and consumers, with the price and choice of content varying considerably between territories.

How does geo-blocking work?

Every computer, phone, tablet and other device that accesses the internet has a unique numerical identifier called an IP (internet protocol) address. Each time a device makes a request to a server to provide content, its IP address is included, so the server knows where to send the requested content.

IP addresses also reveal your geographical location with reasonable accuracy, so if a server detects that

How do I get around geo-blocks?

That's what we're going to explain in this feature, so just be patient! Essentially, the main methods are to use a virtual private network (VPN), a proxy tool or a DNS-based solution to change or disguise the server you use to access the internet. All three have their advantages and disadvantages, which we'll outline in the next section.

Is it legal to bypass geo-blocking restrictions?

We had a feeling you might ask that! The truth is that it's still a giant 'grey area'. Although it's perfectly legal to use a VPN or proxy, if you stream or download content that hasn't been authorised for release in your country you're likely to breach copyright restrictions. This means you could technically face legal action from the rights holder, such as a production company. However, that hasn't stopped millions of web users worldwide using VPNs and proxies to watch popular TV shows including Game of Thrones, The Walking Dead and our own Doctor Who.

What do governments think about geo-blocking?

Interestingly, commissioners at the European Union are currently proposing to scrap "unjustified" geoblocking in EU countries to create a single digital market. In April, they argued that "too many Europeans cannot use online services that are

available in other EU countries, often without any justification; or they are re-routed to a local store with different prices. Such discrimination cannot exist in a single market". This hasn't gone down well with US companies such as Amazon and Google, whose monopolies of the global retail and entertainment industries benefit greatly from regional variations in the pricing and availability of content, and who don't like the idea of increased competition from a single European digital market.

Does this mean I'll be able to watch iPlayer on holiday?

Theoretically, yes. As we reported in Alssue 371 (bit.ly/webuser371), the European Commission's plans for "harmonised" copyright across all 28 countries in the European Union would mean you'd be able to watch BBC iPlayer and the UK version of Netflix while

you're on holiday. Indeed. anyone living in the EU will be able to do so, without needing to resort to VPNs and proxies. However, this

does raise questions about

BEST NEW TOOLS FOR UNBLOCKING WEB CONTENT

Since we tested VPNs in Issue 378, several tools have been launched and updated that offer more flexibility for less hassle. Here, we choose six of our favourites

Hotspot Shield Free VPN Proxy

We've long had a love-hate relationship with Hotspot Shield. Indeed, in Issue 371 (bit.ly/webuser371), we included it in our 'Software & Apps You Should Never Download' feature because "the free version bombards you with adverts and is unnecessarily obtrusive".

So we were pleasantly surprised - nay, gobsmacked - by the quality of its new Chrome extension, which has replaced the controversial Hola (hola.org) as our favourite browser-based VPN. Why? Well, firstly, because it couldn't be easier to use; you just click the toolbar button and choose one of five countries - including the US, France and the Netherlands - as your fake browsing location. Secondly, unlike its Desktop counterpart, it gives you unlimited bandwidth for free (at least for the moment) and without any adverts

boxes - it secures your connection, conceals your IP address, encrypts your data and unblocks all websites - yet it requires no payment, doesn't ask you to register and it imposes no limits on time, speed or bandwidth.

What's more, Betternet is available for Windows, Android and iOS (a Mac version is 'coming soon'), with extensions for Chrome and Firefox, and is also incredibly simple to use - just install the program, app or add-on, then click or tap Connect to start browsing anonymously.

If you think that all sounds too good to be true, you're right. You do have to view 'recommendations' for other apps within Betternet, but the company has to make money somehow and these are non-intrusive and don't track you or collect your data. Betternet even provides a full breakdown of its costs and income at www.betternet.co/ transparency.html, which must be a first for a new web company.

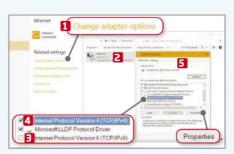

VPNs almost always require you to download and install software, which consumes space and memory on your PC or mobile device. Proxy servers, by contrast, don't require any downloads, but they can be very slow and they're usually supported by a surfeit of ads. The amazing new service Tunlr suffers from neither of these drawbacks, while still allowing you to unblock TV, music and films from overseas, without anyone knowing

It works by asking you to change the DNS settings on your PC, Mac, router, phone, tablet or games console to access Tunlr's own DNS servers. This sounds slightly risky but, as long as you note down your original DNS settings, you'll be able to reverse any changes. See our Workshop below to find out how to set up Tunlr

Once you're up and running, you'll be

granted instant access to lots of popular US streaming services, including Netflix, Pandora and Comedy Central. TunIr says that Hulu will be added soon and that if you live outside the UK, you can use the service to watch BBC iPlayer. Streaming happens directly between your device and the content you're streaming, so it won't slow down your internet connection.

F-Secure Freedome VPN

Considering that VPNs offer one of the most secure ways to browse the web, it's surprising that only a handful of security software companies offer their own. One of the most powerful and reliable is F-Secure's Freedome, which is available on Android (including Kindle Fire), iOS, Windows and – since May this year – Mac OS X. Freedome was recently updated to reduce its battery consumption on mobile and to add an

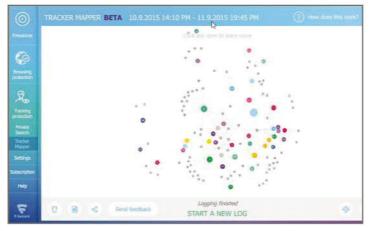
innovative feature called Tracker Mapper. This creates a 24-hour visual record of all the tracking attempts it has

blocked while you've been browsing the web, so you can see who's been watching you online. Freedome deletes this data automatically after three days, or you can purge it yourself. You can also export the info as a text file.

Freedome VPN is free to try for 14 days, after which you'll need to purchase a subscription. Prices start at £39.99 for secure browsing across three devices for one year.

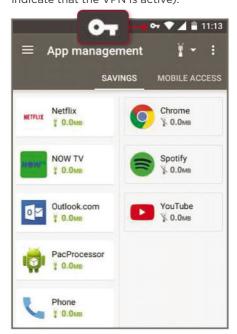

We recommended the Opera Max app for Android in Issue 383 as a means of compressing web pages and videos to make them faster to load, but it also has a handy VPN function. This is because Opera routes your internet traffic through its own servers, effectively disguising your real location and allowing you to access content that's otherwise blocked on your phone or tablet, such as geo-restricted videos. Opera Max works with lots of popular apps, including YouTube, Chrome, Amazon and Netflix, and the VPN feature works automatically without needing to be configured (a key symbol appears at the top of your screen to indicate that the VPN is active).

IS THE BBC NOW BLOCKING VPNs?

NG VPNs?

For those of us in the UK, the Holy Grail of streaming services is US entertainment hub Hulu (www.hulu.com),

which is notoriously strict at blocking VPNs and proxies. Viewers outside the UK, however, including British expats and holidaymakers, are most keen to access BBC iPlayer so they can enjoy such top-quality programming as *Doctor Who, Sherlock* and *Homes Under the Hammer* (well, maybe not the last one).



BBC iPlayer TV programmes are available to play in the UK only. Find out why. If you are in the UK and see this message please read this advice.

Overseas viewers will miss out on the thrilling Series 19 of Homes Under the Hammer Until recently, it was fairly easy to watch iPlayer overseas using a VPN, but the Beeb has got wise to such tricks and is now blocking these tools from accessing iPlayer, even if you're based in the UK. If you try, you'll simply see an error message reading: "BBC iPlayer TV programmes are available to play in the UK only".

The BBC's reasons for this blockade are understandable: why should the rest of the world get to watch *Bargain Hunt* for free when us Brits have to pay £145.50 for the licence fee? There are also rights issues to consider, and the fact that – as we reported

in Issue 381 (bit.ly/webuser381) – the BBC plans to launch a paid-for streaming service in the US next year. "We regularly make updates to our technology to help prevent access to BBC iPlayer from outside the UK, which breaks our terms of use," a BBC spokesperson told The Register (bit.ly/register385).

"BBC iPlayer is freely available to users across the UK without a VPN".

The new BBC Store (store.bbc.com/terms) is also covered by the VPN ban and makes clear in its terms and conditions that "to stream content, or to download content to your device, you have to be located in the UK".

Music, Lifestyle, Sports and Movies. The latest update to the service adds the useful ability to find channels by keyword, which saves you scrolling through long lists.

TV Chrome's channels are streamed in the add-on's own drop-down panel, so you're not redirected from your current page. You can also open the player in a separate window. The catch to getting all this international TV for free is that you need to sit through an advert for 20 seconds before you start streaming a channel. But once this is out of the way, your viewing will be uninterrupted (aside from commercials screened by

the channels themselves).

There's also a Firefox version of the add-on called, unsurprisingly, TV-Fox (toolbar.tv-fox.com).



You can browse channels by country and category, or search by keyword

WATCH US NETFLIX ON YOUR TV

The US version of Netflix offers a greater choice of films and TV shows than its UK counterpart. Using the right unblocking tool, you can enjoy US Netflix not just on your PC and mobile device, but also on your TV by streaming the service to your Chromecast.

Sadly, this isn't as simple as installing a VPN app on your phone or tablet and then 'casting' US Netflix to your TV, because both your Chromecast and your mobile device need to be configured to access the service. If your iPad, for example, is set up for US Netflix but your Chromecast isn't, the Chromecast won't be able to connect to the proper stream.

Change your DNS address settings

To get US Netflix working, you need to prevent your Chromecast from accessing its usual Google DNS server

Create a static route on your router to force your Chromecast to use a VPN server

Using a Chromecast or other streaming stick, you can watch US Netflix on your TV

addresses and force it use the DNS addresses of your preferred unblocking tool. The easiest way to do this is to create a staticroute rule in your router. Static routes are a way of telling your router how to

access specific IP address. Not all routers support this option (the BT Home Hub, for example, is very locked down); if yours doesn't, then you won't be able to get US Netflix on your Chromecast.

Go to your router's web-based management page by typing its IP address into your web browser – this is usually 192.168.0.1 or 192.168.1.1. Enter your username and password (your router's manual will tell you the default ones) and look for the static-route option, which is usually in the advanced settings. Create a new static route and enter the destination IP address as

8.8.8.8, the subnet mask as 255.255.255.255 and the gateway address as your router's IP address, such as 192.168.0.1. If required, enter the Metric as 2. Repeat, but this time enter the destination IP address as 8.8.4.4.

Next, you'll need to change your network's DHCP server settings so that all your devices receive the DNS addresses used by your chosen unblocking tool. These will vary according to the service you're using, and should be

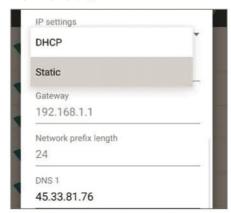

provided on the website – with TunIr, as mentioned in the Workshop on page 41, the server addresses are 45.33.81.76 and 45.33.12.13. Make sure you note down any settings you change so you can restore them when you want to stream UK services such as iPlayer.

Configure your mobile device

You should now be able to cast US Netflix to your Chromecast, provided both the Chromecast and the device you're casting from are configured to use the same DNS addresses. To check this on Android (and to change the settings manually if the addresses don't match), open the Wi-Fi networks list and long-press the one you're connected to. Tap 'Modify network' and choose to show advanced options. Ensure that 'IP settings' is set to Static and that the correct DNS server addresses are entered below.

On iOS, go to the Wi-Fi Settings screen, tap the arrow next to the network you're connected to, and tap the DNS field.

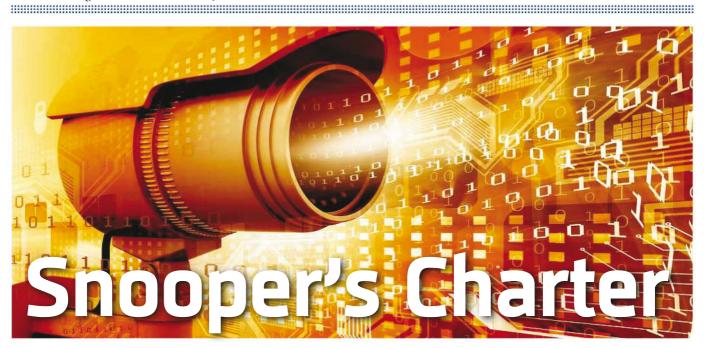

Are you happy to expose your browsing history to prying eyes? **David Crookes** looks at government proposals to let spies do just that

What is the Snooper's Charter?

The Snooper's Charter - or Snoopers' Charter - is the nickname given to a draft bill that would allow law enforcement and government intelligence agencies to access details pertaining to the personal internet usage of millions of UK citizens. The proper title of the latest version is the Investigatory Powers Bill (previously it was the Communications Data Bill), and many claim that it tips the balance between freedom and security to the serious detriment of our privacy.

In the light of the recent terror attacks in Paris, some political commentators and MPs are calling for the Bill to be rushed through as soon as possible.

What is being proposed?

The Home Secretary, Theresa May, wants internet service providers to store their customers' browsing history for a period of one year. These records would be made available to intelligence agencies, the police and other public bodies if an individual is under suspicion. The draft bill also lets the security services legally bug and hack phones and computers to amass their own communication data.

Wow! Will they need permission to do this?

Yes, they'll need a surveillance warrant. Issued by Cabinet ministers, these warrants will be carefully considered by senior judges before they can be enacted. The promise is that they will only get the go-ahead if there are concerns about national security, economic well-being or serious crime.

What details will be stored?

ISPs and mobile-phone providers will be forced to note the metadata of communications - the who, what, when and where - but they won't be asked to keep logs of any content. This means that only the domains of the websites you visit will be stored rather than individual pages. For example, if you browsed www.webuser.co.uk, a log of the site would be made against your IP address but no record would be kept of your conversations with Madeline and Bedstor on the forum, or what you voted in the latest poll. The authorities certainly wouldn't have access to the intricate logs that appear in the History section of your browser.

What use is such vague information?

Well, even a list of sites that you visit can reveal crucial information about you. For example, spooks could see who you bank with, the political party you associate with, your hobbies and even your health problems. The news websites you visit could say much about your interests and, if a dating website appears, it could be

assumed that you are single - or having an affair! And you may not be too keen on the authorities knowing that you've visited pirate or pornography sites. Even if the logs don't indicate what you actually do when you visit a site, the information could still be used against you. And that is what concerns civil liberty groups.

Why is the government doing this?

The idea is to combine the current laws that grant the authorities access to our data. May claims that this is essential to tackle child sexual exploitation, serious crime cartels, drugs, guns and terrorism. It is the second time the Conservatives have tried to push this kind of legislation through Parliament (the Draft Communications Data Bill was blocked by the Lib Dems last time).

What's the general consensus?

Opinion is split. Although the Bill's critics acknowledge the need to combat evils such as terrorism and child sex abuse, they warn that collecting everyone's data by default to catch the small percentage of bad guys is like using a sledgehammer to crack a nut. But there is a general agreement that the nature of communications has changed greatly over the past 15 years and that the law needs to be upgraded to reflect this.

Can ISPs cope with so much data?

That's a good question: the government thinks they can but the ISPs beg to differ! Matthew Hare, the CEO of broadband network Gigaclear, says customers download 15TB of data each year. He also said that the Bill didn't take into account that terrorists and cybercriminals were encrypting their communications. There is no mention in the Bill about Virtual Private Networks, either, and given that they are used to blur the origins of net traffic, this strikes us as a major oversight.

So will encrypted services be affected?

This is a grey area. There have been a few headlines claiming that services such as WhatsApp, Snapchat and Facebook Messenger would be banned if the Bill successfully goes through both Houses of Parliament and becomes enshrined in law, but that's a myth - encryption services won't be banned. Instead, the draft Bill says companies must work with MI5, MI6 and GCHQ to help them bypass any protection on your computer or phone if they need to gain access to your data. In serious crime cases, encryption would become useless.

Will it make our computers less secure?

Some security analysts are concerned that the draft Bill effectively means they would be unable to flag up 'backdoor' vulnerabilities if they were being exploited by spies or the police. They argue that it could leave those backdoors open to cybercriminals.

There is also the danger that the masses of data being stored for long periods of time by ISPs will attract hackers, who will inevitably seek to gain access to the databases and the personal info they contain. Certainly, given the recent breaches, it would appear that no company can ever truly claim to be guarding your data 100% securely.

Who will bear the costs if the Bill becomes law?

We will, it seems. The government says



surveillance of UK citizens

that it will be setting aside £175 million to pay for the storage of the data (which means it will be funded by taxpayers' money). Yet the ISPs told a Commons select committee that the costs are likely to be higher. They argue that the ongoing costs would be passed onto providers and that they would be forced to increase broadband bills to cover them.

Will we need to rethink how we use the internet?

Perhaps. Even if you do nothing wrong online - and that goes for the vast majority of us - there's still a serious threat to our privacy. United Nations privacy chief Joseph Cannataci said: "The Snooper's Charter in the UK is just a bit

worse than scary, isn't it?". Already some activists are looking at ways to scupper the plans. The Guardian newspaper has even suggested overwhelming the databases by browsing nine random websites for every one you want to visit, but that seems like a bit of an overreaction, not to mention tediously time-consuming.

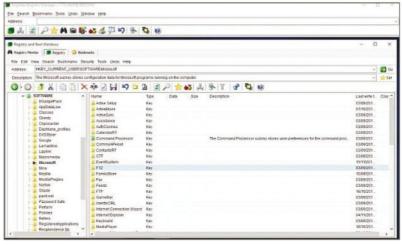
What we liked:

Registrar Registry Manager is a much more sophisticated tool than

Regedit. For starters, navigation is much easier. If you know the path of the key you want to get to, you can simply type it (or paste it) into the Address bar, as you would a web address on a browser. Alternatively, if you only know part of

the key you want to go to, you can click the search button and just type what you know. All the keys that include your search term will be displayed, which is a huge improvement over Regedit's Find tool.

The software uses a system of tabs, located just below the toolbar (so it's a bit different to browser tabs), which let you keep different views open at the same time. It also remembers which tabs you had open the last time you closed the software, so you can get back to the same place you left off. Elements such as searches and bookmarks have their own tabs, as well



as the basic Registry-exploring tab.

Once you've found the key and value you want to edit, double-click it to make changes. You can carry out all sorts of tweaks above and beyond the basic Windows tool. This means Registrar Registry Manager can look a bit complicated, but the ability to add your own notes makes it easy to keep track of any changes you've made, and you can still export and import backups.

If you decide to install Registrar, you should take advantage of its offer to import its pre-configured Registry bookmarks and tweaks. These add descriptions to many of the Registry

keys, which will help you find what you're looking for when searching.

How it can be improved:

The free Home Edition displays a splash screen for the Pro Edition every time you launch the software, which is understandable but becomes annoying. Also, the layout of the tabbed interface is a

bit confusing - having the tabs below the toolbar is an unwelcome reminder of what Windows software was like 20 years ago.

OUR VERDICT

The best thing about Registrar Registry Manager is that it provides stacks of extra features that make the software easier to use. The search and navigation tools in particular are a huge improvement over Regedit's, making this a much more attractive alternative.

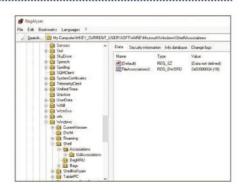

RegAlyzer looks basic and has a very similar appearance to the built-in Windows Regedit tool, but don't let its ultrasimple interface fool you.

Despite having very few options openly visible, there's a surprising amount of power available if you take the time to explore.

It doesn't add many extra tools beyond what Regedit already has, but it refines them significantly. There's a better bookmarks manager, which lets you create folders and arrange your files as you like. The search tool is a lot more sophisticated, too, and provides many more search options than Regedit, including searching by date and providing a handy list of all the

RegAlyzer saves a log of any changes you make, so you have a handy record of what you've done in case things go wrong. This can be used to roll back any individual changes you've made without having to restore an entire back-up.



How it can be improved:

Because it hides its tools away and doesn't provide the quick access of a toolbar, RegAlyzer isn't as easy to learn as our other award-winning programs.

RegAlyzer's basic interface hides a lot of sophistication in its menus and windows, and it can take time to get used to the interface and work out where everything is. Once you're familiar with it, though, you'll find it a perfectly straightforward tool with lots of added extras.

Regmagik's interface provides lots of toolbar buttons, giving you quick access to options that you can also get to from the menus. While some of the tools are more sophisticated than those in Regedit, we found it lagged a bit behind the awardwinners. However, if you're after a shorter step up from Regedit, and find our top three too complicated, then this might be worth a try.

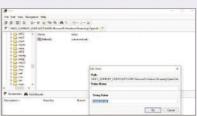
If you're happy using Regedit but just want something that's better at finding the keys you're looking for, then RegScanner is ideal. It's a fantastic search tool that makes it easy to find the Registry settings you want to tweak, but doubleclicking on the result simply opens the Regedit tool rather than providing editing tools of its own.

Reg looks like a promising opensource tool but it's been around for a while and is still on version 1.0. As a result, it didn't work well on our Windows 10 test machine, and threw up an error as soon as we launched it. With better-supported alternatives available, Reg was a bit of a disappointment.

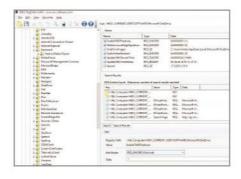

entire process. The search tool is much improved, listing search results in a panel at the bottom of the screen; just click a result and it will open in the side bar to the left and display the key information above. There's also a Path bar, so you can type or paste a path to go straight to it, or easily copy the path of the location you're currently at.

The process of editing keys is very similar to the Windows version, with drop-down options keeping the look of the interface simple. This makes it easier to get used to than the more complex options available in the Gold Awardwinning Registrar.

O&O's software can be used without installing, so you can save it to a USB stick and carry it around, which is handy if you often find yourself fixing other people's computers.



How it can be improved:

The bookmarking system is presented as a simple list of favourites. If you have a lot, the list can become long and unwieldy, and they can't be arranged into folders in the way Registrar's can.

OUR VERDICT

Because it's very similar to the basic Windows version, it's easy to think RedEditor doesn't offer much, but it's worth exploring because most of the tools have been enhanced significantly.

There's more to your favourite software than meets the eye. **Wayne Williams** reveals secret options in programs and apps that unlock new features and fix problems

Access the hidden Windows Start menu



There's a second Start menu in Windows 8.1 and Windows 10, which offers instant access to several useful features. To open it, you just right-click rather than left-click the Start button. From here, you can

quickly access system tools such as Power Options, Device Manager, Disk Management and Command Prompt (regular and admin mode versions), and also launch the Task Manager, Control Panel, File Explorer, Search and Run functions. You can shut down Windows from here, too, or go straight to the Windows Desktop, minimising all open windows in the process.

Use Shift to unlock more Windows options



The right-click context menu in Windows brings up a lot of different options, depending on where you are in the operating system and what you're doing (hence the 'context'

part of its name). However, the menu you see may not show all the available options. To display bonus commands, hold down the Shift key when right-clicking the Desktop or in File Explorer (or other places). These extra commands let you carry out a variety of actions such as copy a file path or expand the Send To options to include more destinations.

Open the Battery Settings menu in iOS 9

Apple introduced a new Low Power Mode in iOS 9, which automatically springs into life when your iPhone or iPad battery life drops to 20% (and again at 10%). There is a new, built-in Battery Settings menu, which lets you turn this

any of the apps in the list, or the small clock icon in the top-right corner, and the menu will reveal how much time each app has been running both onscreen and in the background.

Access Android's hidden Developer Options

There is a secret menu tucked away in Android that lets you access special options that change the way your phone or tablet works. For example, you can force applications to use 2D hardware acceleration; increase the speed of animations to make everything feel snappier; and stop apps running in the background when they're no longer

required. Unlike most mobile menus, this one really is hidden. To access it, go to Settings, choose 'About phone' or 'About tablet' in the System section and scroll down to 'Build number'. Tap this seven times, then



go back to Settings. You'll see a new Developer Options menu toward the bottom that effectively turns you into an Android power user!

Use Android's secret codes

All Android phones have secret codes built into them that let you perform useful tasks. To use these codes, simply enter the relevant characters on your keypad. Not all codes work with all devices, and there are special codes for Samsung and HTC phones that you can find by searching the web. Try the following to get started:

*#06#

Displays your phone's IMEI number (International Mobile Station Equipment Identity), which identifies your phone to help you recover it if it's lost or stolen

##273283*255*663282*#*#*
Backs up all the photos and videos on your device

##7594#*#*

Turns off your device without displaying the Power menu

##4636#*#*

Displays information about your phone, including battery usage and Wi-Fi

##7780#*#*

Performs a factory reset (so be careful!)

*2767*3855#

Wipes the phone completely (so again, be careful!).

##1472365#*#*

Tests your GPS

Reload sites in Safari for iOS 9

Here's a simple trick you can use for those times when a site doesn't display as it should on your iPhone or iPad.



Press down on the Refresh button in the address bar for a couple of seconds, and a small menu will pop up at the bottom of the screen. From here, vou can request the Desktop version of a site (if you're

viewing the mobile one) and reload the page to view all available content.

Access iOS's hidden Field Test settings

There's a hidden Field Test screen in iOS, which mostly includes baffling advanced settings, but it also offers the useful option to display the signal strength on your iPhone in numbers rather than bars. To access this screen, turn off Wi-Fi, dial *3001#12345#* and press Call. From the Field Test menu,

hold down the Power button until vou see 'Slide to Power Off', then release it. Hold the Home



button until you're returned to the main screen, and you'll now see numbers showing your signal strength. Tap the numbers to switch back to bars.

ACCESS NETFLIX'S SECRET MENU

Netflix automatically manages streaming based on your connection, but you can manually manage buffering via a hidden settings menu, which may fix streaming problems. If you're watching on a computer, press Shift+Alt on a PC, or Shift+Option on a Mac, and left-click the video. If this doesn't work in Chrome,



press Ctrl+Alt+Shift+S to bring up the Stream Manager. On a Smart TV, Blu-ray Player or game console, you'll need to enter a special code. On your remote control or games controller, and press: Up, Up, Down, Down, Left, Right, Left, Right, Up, Up, Up, Up. This brings up a secret menu you can use to tweak the settings.

Boost Firefox using secret tweaks

There are lots of advanced settings tucked away in Firefox, which change the way the browser behaves and can fix many annoyances. To access these hidden options, type about:config into the address bar, and hit Enter. A warning screen will be displayed, alerting you that "Here be dragons!". Read the details, then click: 'I'll be careful I promise!'. You'll be presented with a long list of preferences that you can configure to perform tasks such as speeding up the browser, customising how it looks and disabling unwanted features. However, it's far from obvious what each option does, so you should do some research before you make any changes. You can discover the meaning of each entry at bit.ly/aboutconfig385.



Be first in line to try Chrome's future features

Chrome has a selection of experimental features hidden away, which often include useful new tools that Google plans to introduce in future versions of the browser. If you want to try these before everyone else, type chrome:// flags into the address bar and press Enter. Google warns that these experiments "may bite", and also change, break or disappear at any time.

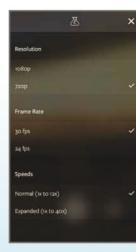
Unlike Firefox's about:config menu, it's more obvious what each setting on this secret page does because entries are accompanied by short descriptions and the experiments are easily enabled or disabled. That said, it's important to understand what impact the changes will have on your browser, so don't alter anything if you aren't certain of the repercussions.



Get advanced video options in Hyperlapse

Hyperlapse from Instagram (bit.ly/ hyperlapse385) lets you shoot impressive timelapse videos on your iPhone or iPad. The app offers digital stabilisation and all you need do is tap a single button to start recording. Although Hyperlapse doesn't have any settings to tinker with, there is a hidden

menu you can summon by tapping the screen four times with four fingers. This lets you switch the recording resolution from 720p (the default) to 1080p, and lower the frame rate from 30fps to 24fps. You



can also switch between normal (1x to 12x) and expanded (1x to 40x) speeds.

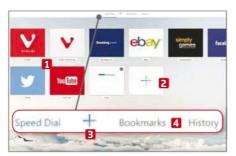


Browse the web using Vivaldivivaldi.com

Vivaldi is a new web browser from the former CEO of Opera. It's recently been updated with extra features, including support for Chrome extensions. Here's what you need to know

ost people tend to stick with the big-name web browsers
- Chrome, Firefox, Internet
Explorer and Opera - but there are many smaller, more interesting alternatives available. Vivaldi has received a lot of attention thanks to its pedigree - coming as it does from Jon S von Tetzchner, the

co-founder of Opera – and has notched up over 2 million downloads since its launch in January. We looked at Vivaldi's 'technical preview' in Web User 366, when it was far from complete and missing many big features. It's now a polished beta release that could well serve to replace your existing browser.



Open a new tab and you'll be greeted with the Speed Dial page. As with most of the big browsers, this displays thumbnails of your favourite sites. 1 You can add locations 2 and create new folders by clicking the plus symbol at the top of the page. 3 You can also browse bookmarks and history. 4



The narrow sidebar on the left provides access to bookmarks, Vivaldi Mail (not currently available), downloads, notes and a new Web Panels tool (the plus icon), for easy access to your favourite sites. Click a button to open the tool in a resizable side panel.





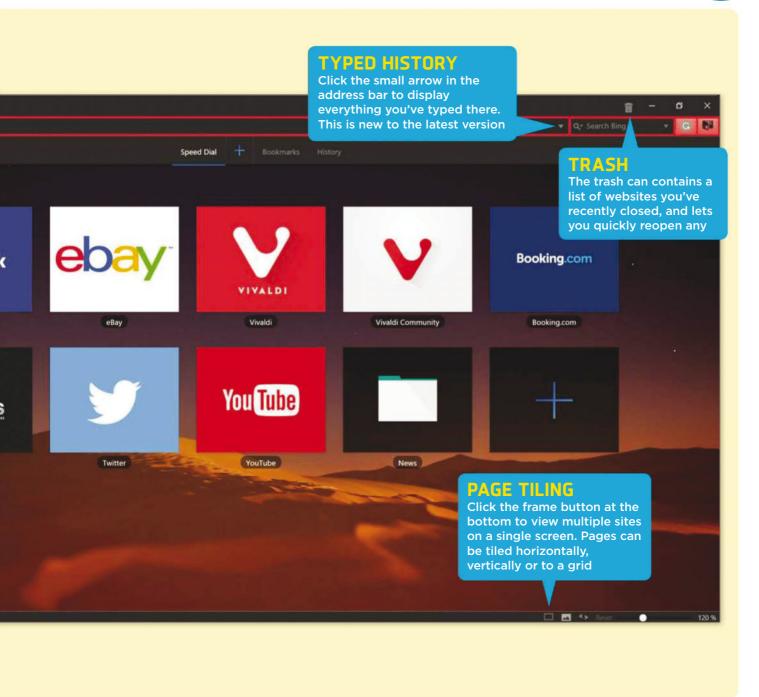
From the Web Panels tool, enter the address of a favourite site, such as Facebook. The site will open in a panel. 1 You can then log into it, 2 if you need to. Resize the panel to your preference. You can add as many sites as you like, and each one can be accessed via its tab in the sidebar.



Vivaldi now supports Chrome add-ons and says its browser can handle "most extensions made for Chrome". Type vivaldi://extensions into the address bar to manage your installed add-ons. 1 Click 'Get more extensions' 2 to open the Chrome Web Store to find and add new ones.



5 Vivaldi lets you group tabs together, which is handy if you have several open. Just drag and drop one tab on to another to create a group. The thin line at the top of the tab 1 shows how many sites are included, and lets you switch to a particular one. Hover over a group to see previews of the sites it contains.

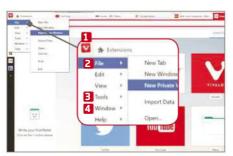




Click the Page Actions arrows at the bottom of the browser 1 to see a menu of options that let you change the look of websites. 'Content blocker' 2 removes ads, and the filters change the colours. 3 'Skewed images' skews all pictures, while Transform 3D lets you rock the page from side to side. 4



Vivaldi is highly customisable. Click the cog icon at the bottom of the sidebar 11 to open the settings window. Startup 2 lets you change the default homepage and choose which pages open with the browser. You can change the look of the Start Page 🖪 and manage the tab layout and behaviour under Tabs.



Click the Vivaldi logo in the top-left corner 1 to access the browser menu. The File menu 2 lets you create new tabs and new windows, and access private-browsing mode. Tools 3 lets you view extensions, clear private-browsing data, and more. The Window menu 4 lets you jump to any currently open page.



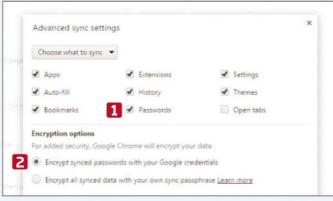
Sync your passwords securely with Google

hrome's built-in password manager makes it easy to sync your login details across all your devices, and its experimental features can be set up to make it as powerful as many purpose-built password managers. Once the browser is set to save your passwords, a pop-up offering to save your credentials will appear each time you log into a new site. And with password syncing activated, your details will be filled automatically when you next visit the site, regardless of which device you use. You just log into passwords.google.com from any browser to manage your passwords. It even works with Android Lollipop's Smart Lock feature to automatically log you into your favourite Android apps.

In this Workshop, we show you how to set up Chrome as a password manager and configure its chrome://flags settings to use experimental tools, including a secure password generator and a 'force saving' option that offers to save passwords even for websites that normally stop the browser from doing so.





Open Chrome, click the menu button and select Settings. Check that you're signed in to your Google account, then click 'Advanced sync settings' and make sure that Passwords 1 is ticked. The encryption mode should be set to 'Encrypt synced passwords with your Google credentials'. 2



Return to the Settings page and search the menu for 'passwords'. 💶 Tick 'Offer to save your web passwords' 🔼 and 'Enable Auto-fill to complete web forms in a single click' 3 if you want Chrome to save and auto-fill personal information including addresses and credit card details.



Later, you can manage your saved passwords and auto-fill information from this menu by clicking the appropriate links. 1 To access your passwords from another device, visit passwords.google.com and sign into your account.



To start using Google's password manager, visit a website and sign in. A pop-up appears in the address bar asking if you want Chrome to save your login details for the site. 1 Select 'Save password', 2 Never 3 or click the 'X' 4 to make the decision another time.

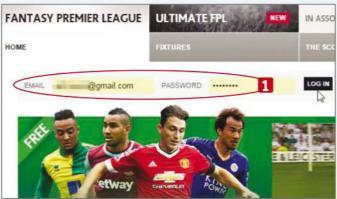

Android Lollipop's Smart Lock feature uses your saved passwords to automatically log you into Android apps, as described in Step 10. If you also want the reverse to work - for Chrome to be able to use login credentials you've stored from Android apps - visit chrome: //flags and enable 'Affiliation-based matching in password manager'.



Log out, visit the website again and your username (or email address) and password will be filled automatically by Chrome. 11 If you've saved more than one account, click the username field to select the account you want from the drop-down menu.



Type chrome: //flags 1 into the address bar, then press Ctrl+F and search for 'password'. 2 'Enable password generation' is an experimental feature that lets you set Chrome to generate random, secure passwords when you create new accounts online. 3



Select Enable from the drop-down menu, relaunch Chrome, then visit a website you want to set up an account with. When you click the Password box, a pop-up appears displaying a suggested password. 1 Click it and Chrome will save the password once you've finished creating your account.



Chrome might not ask to save your login details for some sites, but you can force it to do so by activating 'Enable force-saving of passwords'. 1 If you want to save passwords automatically, without a prompt, for every site you log into, click Enable below 'Save passwords automatically'. 2



To reveal a password from Chrome's settings page's 'Manage passwords' pop-up, you're asked to enter your Windows password. If you're the only person who uses your PC, you can stop this by clicking the Enable link below 'Disable Password Manager Reauthentication'. 1



Your saved passwords will be synced to your mobile browser if password syncing is turned on in the Chrome app. Android devices running Lollipop or later also have a feature called Smart Lock, **1** which signs you into apps as well as websites.

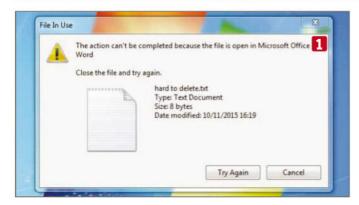


Delete undeletable files

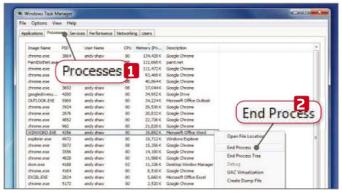
very now and again, you'll encounter a stubborn file that refuses to let you delete it, for no apparent reason. Usually, it's because the file is tied up by another program

that won't release it, but it isn't always obvious which program this might be. Here, we look at some tricks you can use to release and delete your undeletable files.

Malwarebytes FileAssassin: bit.ly/file385 | 🕒 10 mins | 🎥 XP, Vista, 7, 8, 10



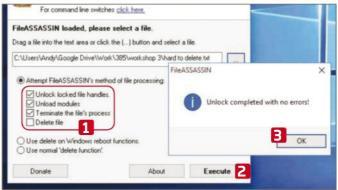
Before you download any software, check that the file you're trying to delete isn't just locked by some other software. Windows offers clues to this, letting you know if it's being used by another process. 11 If you can't close the program as normal, it might have crashed.



Right-click the taskbar and choose Task Manager or Start Task Manager. Check whether the program is on the Applications tab and, if it isn't, look for it on the Processes tab. 1 Either way, right-click on the culprit and choose End Task or End Process. 2



If that doesn't work, use a file-deleting tool such as Malwarebytes FileAssassin (bit.ly/file385). Download, install and run it - it will ask for Administrator rights. Click the three-dot button 1 to select a file to delete. Some versions of Windows let you drag and drop the file to the text box. 2



The default settings 1 attempt to remove and shut down all running references to the file, including the process (program) that's running it. Note that the 'Delete file' option isn't ticked. Click Execute 2 to try these default settings. Click OK on the pop-up, 1 then try deleting the file.



If that doesn't work, try repeating the process with the 'Delete file' option ticked. 1 You could also try rebooting the PC and trying again, which might help Windows or the culpable program release its grasp on the file.



If a startup program is claiming the file, select the 'Use delete on Windows reboot functions' option 11 and click Execute. 2 This won't remove the file immediately, but it will have a good stab at it the next time you reboot your PC, before the usual startup programs can get hold of it.

Control which Android apps can access the web

ecause mobile networks limit the amount of data we use, it's important to stop apps from eating into your precious allowance without you realising. NetGuard makes this possible, connecting to the internet via a VPN to give you a fine level of control over how and when your apps can access the web. By granting access only via Wi-Fi (or when your screen is on), the app also helps to preserve your battery life.

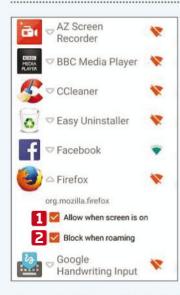

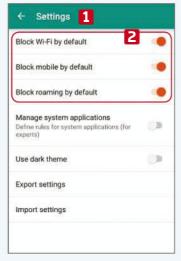
A key icon appears in the status bar. representing the active VPN connection. 11 By default, all manually installed apps are blocked from using the internet via both Wi-Fi and your mobile data connection. To allow access, tap the appropriate buttons, which will turn from orange to green. 2



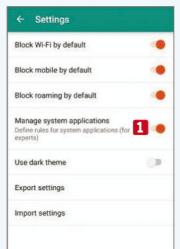
Selecting an app's name opens a sub-menu that gives you further control over how and when it accesses the internet. To give an app internet access when your device is in use, tap 'Allow when screen is on'. 11 By default, roaming is blocked for all apps. 2



In the right-hand column, icons indicate the advanced settings you've chosen for each app. After giving an app internet access (via mobile data or when the screen is on), NetGuard lets you enable roaming by unticking the 'Block when roaming' option. 2



If you have a long list of apps, you can use NetGuard's search tool to find the one you want. Tap the three-dot menu button and select Settings to open the app's settings menu. 11 Here, you can choose whether you want to block access to Wi-Fi, mobile data and roaming by default. 2



Even when NetGuard is set to block internet access for all apps, Google apps including Gmail and Drive will continue to sync. You can prevent this by using NetGuard's 'Manage system applications' option, 11 but only do this if you're confident fiddling with advanced settings. Otherwise, open Android's Settings menu and tap Accounts to manage your Google account.

Get more from your phone's GPS tools

There's more to GPS tools than getting directions. Wayne Williams tries out some new and fun ways to use this handy technology



Go Geocaching

Geocaching is a giant worldwide scavenger hunt, in which you seek out 'caches' hidden by other players. The size and type of the items can vary, but they are most often trinkets with sentimental rather than financial value. To get started, you need the GPS co-ordinates of the first cache, which you might find on a geocaching forum or a site such as Geocaching.com (www.geocaching.com).

Once you've got the co-ordinates, you use your phone to visit the location and find the cache. The rules of the game may differ slightly from one service to another but, typically, once you find a cache, you take the item inside, replace it with something of your choosing (for the next player to find), sign the log book, share your find online and move on to the next cache.

Geocaching.com is a great place to

start because it has more than 2.5 million geocaches in over 185 countries and more than 10 million registered users so, unless you live somewhere particularly remote, you should be able to find a cache within walking distance of your location. You can play anywhere, so if you're going on holiday, you might be able to find geocaches near to where you're staying.

Geocaching.com is free to use but, if

you're enjoying the experience, there's a paid-for Premium version available, which gives you access to more features and geocaches. This costs £24.99 a year (you can choose between auto-renewal and non-renewing memberships), or £7.99 for a three-month auto-renewing membership. This last option is useful if you just want to try out the premium features or go geocaching in the summer, when the weather's better. Remember to cancel your membership before the renewal kicks in, though.

There are also free and paid-for apps for Android, iOS and Windows Phone, and the iOS version offers an Apple Watch app, so you can check your position from your wrist without needing to hold your phone.

Play GPS-based games

There are lots of other GPS-based games you can take part in using your mobile, such as Geo Crash: Stolen Rolls Royce



Once you've found a cache, you sign the logbook and log your find online. Kids will enjoy swapping a prize from the cache

from Locomatrix (geos.locomatrix.com). This is a fairly simple game, suitable for all ages, the aim of which is to solve the mystery of why the Geo family stole the mayor's Rolls Royce and ended up in jail. You need to go to a large open area, such as a field or park, and walk around 'recovering' dropped personal items. It's available for iOS and Android devices.

Niantic Inc (a sister company to Google) produces the excellent Ingress (www.ingress.com), an augmented reality game set in the real world. The idea is to find portals, tap energy and acquire objects. GPS For Ingress (gpsforingress



GPS games are becoming increasingly popular - Pokemon Go is coming soon!

.com) is an unofficial app that provides directions to Ingress Portals.

Nintendo and the Pokemon Company have teamed up with Niantic to make a Pokemon geolocation game called Pokemon Go (bit.lv/

pokemon385). This will be released for iPhone and Android devices next year, and looks like

it could be very good.

Find your lost car

We've all done it from time to time: parked the car in a busy car park or a side street in an unfamiliar town, then forgotten exactly where we left it. Using GPS to locate your vehicle is much more reliable than wandering around until you find it again. All you need to do is mark the location of your parking spot in a GPS app before leaving the vehicle, then navigate back to it later.

Go on a tour

GPS driving, walking and cycling tours are available for lots of countries. You'll find some good ones to follow at www .gps-tour.info. When you find a tour you like the sound of, scan the QR code and add the tour to your phone. However, a lot of the tours on the site are in German.

You can bring Ordnance Survey maps to your iPhone or iPad by using the meanderingly titled OutDoors GPS-Navigation, OS Maps and 200,000 Routes (outdoorsgps.com/products). It lets you

create your own routes or download one to follow. While the app itself is free, you'll need to subscribe to individual regions, and these are rather pricey. Most regions are £9.99, but the Lake District will set you back £25. If you want smaller maps of specific areas, the OS MapFinder app (bit.ly/osmap385) sells sections of the OS's Explorer and Landranger maps for between £2.29 and 69p.

Cities Talking (citiestalking.com) is available for iOS and Android, and offers audio tours of cities around the world. The app uses GPS to track your location and provides audio voiced by local celebrities. For example, Christopher Biggins is the narrator for London. Each tour costs £4.99.

Android provides downloadable maps of all countries and most cities, so it doesn't require an internet connection when you use it. One of its cleverest features is the walking directions, which provides turn-by-turn spoken instructions to get you from one place to another. You can use it to guide you around rural or urban locations, and the instructions are very easy to follow.

Create your own GPS art

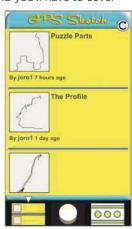
People have been plotting their movements to make drawings for as long as there have been GPS devices, so this isn't a completely new idea, but GPS-A-Sketch for iPhone (www.gps-a-sketch. com) makes it easy for anyone to turn their travels into Etch-A-Sketch-style art. Make sure 'location services' is active on your phone and then start moving.

You need to walk, run, bike or travel at least 30m (around 100 feet) to draw a line in the app, and you'll have to cover

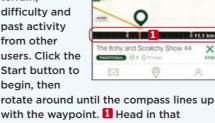

Drag the geocache title up the screen to view additional details, such as a description (and who set it), size, terrain, difficulty and past activity from other users. Click the Start button to

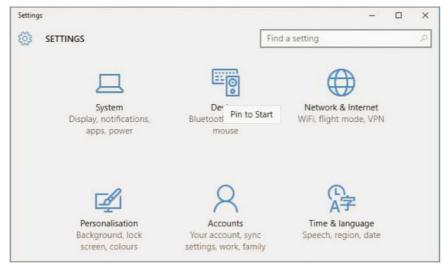

TOP TIPS FOR WINDOWS 10 SETTINGS AND CONTROL PANEL

Pin important settings to the Start menu

ou know that apps and programs can be pinned to the Start menu, but did you know that settings can, too? Click Start, Settings and right-click any section. 'Pin to Start' will add the setting as a tile on the Start menu. Open a section in the Settings app, such as Personalisation, and any of the items on the left can also be pinned by right-clicking them.

In fact, anything in the Settings app can be pinned. You can create a collection of tiles on the Start menu to access your favourite or most used settings, which saves time and effort when hunting for them in the Settings app. The fastest way to open Settings is to press Windows+I. Touchscreen users can tap instead of clicking items.

Control Panel shortcuts

Microsoft introduced PC Settings with Windows 8, bringing some of the tools from the Control Panel into a new interface. When Windows 8.1 arrived, Microsoft moved over a few more settings. Windows 10's Settings (the 'PC' has been dropped), has more settings than ever, but the Control Panel is still there – for now.

It's clear where Microsoft is going with this, but the current transitional state inconveniently splits settings between the new Settings app and the old Control Panel: some Windows settings are exclusive to the Settings app, some are only in the Control Panel and some are in both. To see an example, click

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

Start, Settings, Personalisation, Themes. Click 'Theme settings' on the right and the Control Panel opens. You'll then have to make your adjustments from there. At other times, clicking an item in the Control Panel takes you to Settings.

This means that you still need the Control Panel to access certain settings. You can get to it from 'All apps' in the Start menu, by scrolling all the way to the bottom and opening Windows System. You can then right-click the Control Panel icon and select 'Pin to Start', so you can access it using a Start menu tile. You can also pin it to the taskbar, which is actually quite useful in Windows 10, because right-clicking the tile displays a jump list menu of shortcuts to some of the Panel's most recently used tools.

Search for settings

Sometimes, the easiest way to find a Windows setting is to search for it, and you can do this from within the Settings app. Click Start, Settings, click inside the search box in the top-right corner and enter a word that you think might appear in the setting you're looking for. For example, if it's something to do with Wi-fi, then type wi-fi or wifi (either will work). This shows settings

such as 'Change WiFi settings', 'Flight mode', 'Turn wireless devices on or off', 'Radio privacy settings' and more.

Another way is to click the search box in the taskbar and type a word or phrase. The search results often contain settings, which have a gear icon next to them. If you don't see the setting you're looking for, click My Stuff at the bottom of the search panel and scroll down to the Settings section. All the settings results will be listed.

Like the Settings app, the Control Panel also has a search box in the top-right corner. Open Control Panel and type a word into its search box to see every setting containing that word.

Click everything to find new

Some actions and tools in Settings are not obvious. For example, you might not have expected to be able to right-click items and pin them to the Start menu. Other items in Settings hide unexpected features, so our advice is to left- and right-click everything to see what happens. For example, if you click Start, Settings, System, Storage, you'll see a graphic display on the right showing the amount of drive space used and the total space available. You can then click this to display a further breakdown of the usage, which shows the space used by apps and games, documents, pictures, photos and so on.

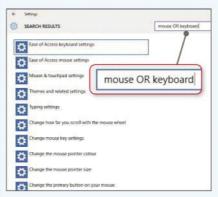

Fix the Settings tool

A small number of people have had problems opening the Settings app after upgrading to Windows 10. If this applies to you, try running the Microsoft troubleshooter tool linked to by a user called 'faniko' on the Windows 10 Forums at bit.ly/sett385 - you have to download the file and run it. There is also a similar Windows apps troubleshooter tool in a link posted by Kapil Arya on the Microsoft Community forum at bit.ly/apps385, which might also help.

Advanced searching

When you search for settings in the Settings app or in the Control Panel, logical operators such as AND, OR and NOT can be used, but you have to enter them in capitals. If you type mouse or keyboard into the Settings or Control Panel's search boxes, then the exact phrase is searched for. But if you want to find settings for either the mouse or the keyboard, type mouse OR keyboard and a long list of results are found that contain one keyword or the other. To find only mouse settings that do not mention the keyboard, search for mouse NOT keyboard.

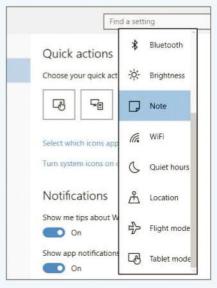


Use logical operators to help refine your searches

Activate God Mode

Another way to find settings is to use God Mode. This doesn't give you supernatural powers, as the name might lead you to believe, it's just a list of Control Panel settings organised into categories and sorted alphabetically. Right-click an empty part of the Desktop and select New, Folder. Click the folder's name and rename it:

GodMode. {ED7BA470-8E54-465E-825C-99712043E01C}

Customise quick actions

Some settings are available in the Action Centre, which can to some extent be customised. Click the Action Centre's icon in the Taskbar's notification area. There are three rows of four tiles with settings; if you only see one row, click the Expand link.

The top row of tiles can be changed, so you can bring your favourite settings to the top. Go to Start, Settings, System, 'Notifications & actions'. There are four tiles at the top under 'Quick actions'. Click each one to see a menu of alternative actions. Click the one you want to use.

View internet usage

Whether you're trying to stay within vour ISP's limits or you're just curious to see how much downloading and uploading goes on behind the scenes, it can be useful to keep track of how much internet data you use. There is a useful tool in Settings that lets you do this. Click Start, Settings, Network & Internet, 'Data usage'. On the right, you'll see your Wi-Fi and Ethernet usage displayed.

Right-click 'Data usage' on the left and select 'Pin to Start' to add it as a tile on the Start menu. This is a live tile that will update with a display of data usage, your external IP address (how the world identifies you), and internal IP address (how other devices on your network identify you). If you ever need to know your IP address, this is the easiest place to look for it.

Keeping tabs on bandwidth hogs

Is it possible for programs to start automatically in the background and be using my broadband bandwidth while I am doing other things? If so, how do I find this out and what do I do to stop them?

Is there a free real-time usage monitor that would let me set a daily usage limit in megabytes? Ideally, one that would put a live tile on my Start screen so I could take a quick look before and after I've done something to check on my usage each time I use the computer. I'd like something that's simple, light and won't spy on me.

To see which programs are running in the background, right-click the taskbar and select Task Manager, then select the Startup tab. Non-essential programs can be selected and disabled. However, this doesn't record internet usage.

Programs that use the internet include Windows Update and OneDrive syncing, plus a wide range of other software such as Chrome and Firefox updates, security software downloading virus definitions, apps such as News, Mail, Twitter and

anything else that downloads updates.

Windows has tools to monitor internet usage. In Windows 10, go to Start, Settings, Network & Internet, 'Data usage' to show the amount of data used in the last 30 days. Click the 'Usage details' link to see which programs have accessed the internet and how much data they have used. Your web browser will probably be the heaviest user, but you could look for apps you don't use and uninstall them. Right-click 'Data usage' on the menu and select 'Pin to Start' to add a live tile to the Start menu that displays the last 30 days of internet usage.

An even better alternative is a free app in the Windows Store called Data Usage, which lets you set a monthly data allowance and a billing date. It shows your monthly usage, the allowance remaining, daily average, weekly total, uploads/downloads total and more. It also has a live tile for the Start menu that shows the data you have remaining.

Download Now. Run the program to install the latest version of the ATI graphics driver software. There is also an option to manually select and download the driver software. Use this if you already have the latest driver.

It's easy to clone your account and the process is the same as if you had bought a new computer. Go to Start, 'All programs', Accessories, 'System tools', Windows Easy Transfer. When it asks how you want to transfer items, select 'An external hard disk or USB flash drive'. Select 'This is my old computer' and save your account. The option to save shared items is not necessary because you are not moving to a new computer. Save the file to drive C:\.

Afterwards, go to User Accounts in the Control Panel, click 'Manage another account' and create a new administrator account. Restart Windows and log into the new account. Run Windows Easy Transfer again and select the option to use an external hard disk, but this time select 'This is my new computer' and select the file you saved earlier. It imports all your files and settings.

Problems with a Windows account

I have three user accounts on my PC. One has become corrupted and shows a blacked-out background with white icons and a Windows message saying the CCC has stopped. This all happened after a Microsoft Essentials scan and clean-up. The other two accounts are fine.

System Restore worked but, as soon as I did a new scan (this time with AVG), it rebooted and was blacked out again. It hasn't affected the other two accounts.

I would like to know how I can copy over all my files, folders and settings to a new user account.

CCC is ATI Catalyst Control Centre, which is part of the video driver software. If it is corrupt or has become outdated, it could result in the blackedout screen and other effects you describe. You should replace it with a fresh copy, even if it is up to date.

Find Vista drivers for a motherboard

I have an MSI B85 motherboard. It has XP video drivers, but no Vista drivers. I can't find any on MSI's website, so how do I install Vista video drivers?

Vista drivers could not be located for this motherboard, but a search on eBay turned up a couple of original driver CDs for just a few pounds. The auctions will have ended by the time you read this, but try searching again because there may be more. Have you tried the XP drivers on your computer? Vista drivers would be better, but you may find the XP drivers are compatible.

Bluetooth handset for overheating phone

Using my mobile phone for long conversations makes it heat up around the earpiece. I am looking for a separate handset that can sit in its own charger and connect via Bluetooth to my Windows mobile phone. This apparently isn't available in the UK. I have found a Panasonic handset, but it only mentions Android devices on the box. PC World, Maplin and many other places do not stock such a thing.

Bluetooth is a widely supported method for wirelessly connecting two devices. It's hard to think of a current mobile phone that doesn't have Bluetooth, and most phones are designed to be used in hands-free mode with a Bluetooth headset - a handset is no different. It may not state on the box that a device is compatible with your

Windows phone, but it would

be surprising if it wasn't. The Sony Smart Bluetooth Handset SBH52 (bit.ly/sony385) works with most phones and, if your phone has NFC, there is an option to simply touch the two devices to pair them. Sony lists the price as £79.99, but stores such as Amazon discount it significantly.

Headsets are more common (and cheaper) than handsets,

and there is a wide range available.

Stop Windows 10 phoning home

I really enjoyed your article in Issue 380 about Windows 10's privacy settings. I was wondering if it's possible to block the parts of Windows 10 that report your user data to Microsoft, and stop them from accessing the net in the first place? I use ESET Smart Security in interactive mode so I can choose which

programs are given access to the net. It seems there are lots of Windows programs that want to access the net, but without knowing exactly what they all are, it is hard to know which ones to block and which ones to let through.

The 13 sub-sections in the Privacy section of Windows 10 Settings contain switches you can turn off to prevent components in Windows from sending data to Microsoft. However, this isn't a complete list of the ways in which Windows 10 'phones home' with data. It may be better to use a good privacy tool such as O&O ShutUp10 (bit.ly/ shut385) or Spybot Anti-Beacon (bit.ly/ anti385). These programs present privacy settings as simple switches that you can easily turn off.

If you stop Windows 10 from sending data to Microsoft, some features may not work as well. The data is not always

personal and sometimes it is key to making certain services work. For example, you might not want to stop using location services, or stop Cortana from learning about you, and you may want to sync your account information across computers.

Remember that other devices such as your mobile phone also track your location, activities, apps, contacts, photos and more - not just Windows 10!

Facebook app crashes

I was using Facebook on my iPad when it suddenly quit and the home screen appeared. I presumed it had crashed. It's happened twice again over the past week. What can I do to fix it?

There isn't a lot that can be done about apps that crash. It's not common, but it does happen occasionally. Double-tap the home screen to show all the apps suspended in the background and swipe them away. Hold down the sleep/power button until the option to power off appears and select it. Hold down the sleep/power button to restart the iPad.

Go to Settings, General, Software Update to make sure iOS is up to date. Open the App Store, tap Updates at the bottom and update any apps that need it. The next Facebook update might fix it.

Repair damaged CDs

I have an extensive CD collection that I want to transfer to my computer, but a few of the discs are very old and scratched through wear and tear, and will not play. Is there any way they can be repaired so I can copy them to my computer?

There are two methods for repairing scratched CDs: one is to use an abrasive to rub away the scratch and the other is to fill it in. Some people have found that gently rubbing toothpaste (a mild abrasive) into the scratch with a soft cloth helps. Others have used wax polish, petroleum jelly or floor polish to fill in the scratch.

There are CD/DVD cleaning kits

available for around £5 to £20, which are more likely to be effective. For example, Maplin sells a Manual CD/ DVD Cleaner and Repairer (bit.ly/ disc385) that costs £4.99. You put the disc in the device, turn the handle for 60 rotations to grind it down, then 60 more rotations to polish it up. It is worth trying, but sometimes the scratch is simply too deep to repair.

This cleaner from Maplin will repair damaged music and software discs

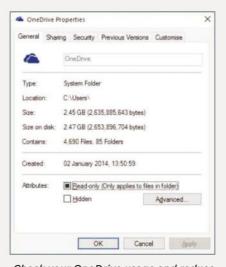

Check your OneDrive capacity

You reported in Issue 381 of Web User that Microsoft is reducing the amount of free OneDrive storage from 15GB to 5GB. If you're wondering how much you are using and whether you are over the new lower limit, there are a couple of ways to find out. One is to right-click OneDrive in the left-hand panel of an Explorer window and select Properties from the menu. The other way is to log into onedrive.live .com and click 'Get more storage' in the bottom-left corner of the homepage. It shows the amount of space used, the total amount you have available and any bonuses you have earned, such as by syncing your mobile-phone photos.

To do this, run Command Prompt as an administrator, type netsh wlan show profiles and press Enter. 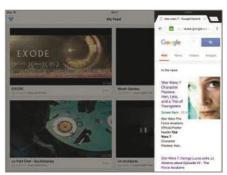

Fix laptop battery-drain problem

I recently bought an HP Envy laptop that had Windows 8 installed on it. I upgraded it to Windows 10 and everything was running fine, with the exception of one thing: when I turned on the laptop, I noticed the battery percentage was significantly lower than when I'd previously turned it off. I experimented by fully charging it, shutting it down for a few hours, then checking it again and, sure enough, it was always much lower. Searching Google showed lots of other people reporting the same problem after upgrading to Windows 10.

I eventually got to the bottom of this. There's a BIOS setting (which is enabled by default) that states that USB charging can take place if the laptop is sleeping, hibernating and even switched off. This only affects 'charging' ports, which are normally indicated by a lightning symbol next to the port. I had a small Sandisk USB drive permanently plugged into my



laptop and, although it obviously can't be charged, it was still drawing power from the laptop.

One solution would have been to move the USB drive to a non-charging port, but I instead chose to disable the BIOS setting so that I don't have to worry about unplugging things every time I shut down my laptop.

Capture a screen grab

If there's something on the screen that you want to save, such as in a web page, you can grab the screen by pressing the Prt Scn (or Print Screen) key. It can then be pasted into Paint and saved. However, there is an alternative: a Windows 7 tool that I use all the time, but rarely see mentioned anywhere. It is called Snipping Tool and you can find it in Start, All programs, Accessories.

Other screen-capture tools I have tried will grab the whole screen, a window or any rectangular section, but Snipping Tool also offers a freehand option. You can draw any shape you like on the screen and it is copied into the program.

Click the New button in the toolbar, then click the arrow to the right of the New button and select Free-form Snip. Draw around the part of the screen you want to capture and it will be copied into the program. From there, you can save it as a JPEG, PNG or GIF file.

Speed up Firefox

After reading Anthony McNee's tip in Issue 381 (bit.ly/webuser381), I decided to try resetting Firefox to see if it would speed up the browser. Unfortunately, it didn't do the trick for me, but I have since discovered a website that helps. Your Online Choices (bit.ly/choices385) stops targeted ads (based on your previous browsing activity) from loading in your browser, and I find that it makes pages load much faster.

I enter a lot of competitions on various different websites and one site suggested that using an ad blocker such as AdBlock Plus could harm my chances of winning. I'm not sure how this works but, because Your Online Choices only stops the ad companies from gathering information about my browsing activity, I can enjoy faster page load times while hopefully not harming my chances on the competition sites. The service lets you individually block any of the 50 or so companies listed, or you can simply click 'Turn off all companies' to stop all targeted ads.

It works using cookies, so if you clear your browsing data, make sure you go back to Your Online Choices to get it working again.

Prevent accidental purchases on iPad

Last week, my grandson bought something on my iPad shortly after I'd paid for a new app and, rather worryingly, he wasn't asked for the password. The in-app purchase he made was inexpensive, so I wasn't worried about having it refunded, but I decided to investigate the matter so that it couldn't happen again. It turns out that the iPad is set by default not to ask for your password on purchases made less than fifteen minutes after your last passwordverified purchase, which can be seen as helpful or potentially disastrous, depending on your perspective.

To change this, go to Settings, App and iTunes Stores, then Password Settings. Under Purchases and In-app Purchases, you can change the setting from Require After 15 Minutes to Always Require. This is well worth knowing if, like me, you've got grandchildren or children who could make dozens of purchases in the space of 15 minutes!

Extra Firefox searching tools

As a long-time Firefox user, I'm always finding clever tricks it can do. For example, it has some useful features that let you choose what to search.

If you have a lot of tabs open, they will shrink and the titles will disappear. So, if you want to find a particular tab, click in the Firefox address box (not the search box) and type % and a space, then a word or even just a few letters to identify the tab. Search results are listed below. along with a 'Switch to tab' link.

Another useful search option is #, which searches the titles of web pages that you've visited. It ignores URLs. In the address box, type # and a space, then a word that appears in the title of a page. Search with and without the hash if you want to see the difference.

Remove Windows 10 apps

Until recently, if you didn't like one of Windows 10's built-in apps, the best you could do was remove it from the Start menu; you couldn't remove it completely because the Uninstall button was greyed out in the 'Apps & features' menu. Following the release of CCleaner version 5.1.1, (www.piriform.com/ ccleaner), it's now possible to remove any of the built-in Windows 10 apps including Calendar, Mail, Groove Music and Photos. In CCleaner, simply navigate to Tools, then Uninstall and you'll be able see all your installed programs including the built-in apps. Select one, click Uninstall and you can remove it permanently.

Make sure you are certain that you want to get rid of the app for good, because I'm not sure how straightforward it is to reinstall one once it's gone!

How difficult is it to fit a solid-state drive (SSD)?

I wonder if anyone can offer me some advice before I buy a new 250GB SSD. Will installing it on my desktop PC be as simple as fitting a SATA hard drive? Also, how straightforward is it to clone the old drive to the SSD if I use Macrium (www.macrium.com)? Lastly, do you recommend buying it from Amazon?

Installing an SSD is relatively easy but there are important issues to consider after you've done so. I've uploaded three useful articles to my website at www.arwcsw.com. so I recommend that you read these before making a start.

If you haven't previously used an SSD on your PC, you should first check that your BIOS supports SSDs. You might also need to change the partition size on your original hard drive if it is larger than the capacity of the SSD that you want to replace it with. You can use EaseUS Partition Manager (bit.ly/easeus385) or Macrium Reflect (www.macrium.com) to do this

I bought my SSD from Amazon because they were selling it at the best available price. I fitted it to an Icybox IB-2535StS 2.5in to 3.5in hard-drive converter so that it would fit in the SATA drive bay. I then cloned my hard drive to the new SSD using Paragon Hard Disk Manager Suite 12 (www.paragonsoftware.com), selecting the option to clone from hard drive to SSD. After I'd done all that. I removed the old hard drive and replaced it with the new SSD. The PC booted with no problems whatsoever.

There are plenty of guides you can search for online that offer advice on every aspect of migrating from a hard drive to an SDD, such as Lifehacker's bit.ly/migrate385.

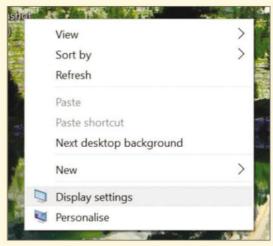
Why won't the picture fill the screen when I connect my laptop to the TV?

I often stream BBC and ITV shows on my TV by connecting it to my Acer laptop via an HDMI cable. However, for some reason. the picture only fills about 90% of the screen. When I try streaming with my old Lenovo laptop, it fills the screen nicely.

Both PCs are running the latest version of Chrome and the only other significant difference I can think of is that the Lenovo runs Windows 7, while the Acer has Windows 8 installed. Any ideas why they might be displaying differently on my TV?



If your TV is a recent model, it will probably have a 1080p resolution, so you have to adjust your graphics driver to output at the correct resolution. To do this, right-click the Desktop and select 'Display settings',



To change the settings for an external display, right-click the Desktop and select 'Display settings'

check that the resolution is correct for the external display and also look to see if any kind of scaling has been enabled. A bit of tinkering in this menu should fix the problem but, if it doesn't, you can try opening the TV's own display settings to see if the problem can be fixed from there.

Go to Control Panel, then click Keyboard, select the Hardware tab and click the Properties button. From here, select 'Change settings' and the Power Management tab, then tick 'Allow this device to wake the computer' before clicking OK. You should be able to follow the same process for the Mouse, clicking

Mouse instead of Keyboard in Control Panel. If you want to change what the power button does, open Power Options from Control Panel.

How Microsoft solved my Office problem

write in reference to your Star Email from David Guest in Issue 384, about Windows 10 sabotaging his copy of Microsoft Office. As I had a similar problem, I wondered whether the following advice might be useful to pass on.

I had Office 2013 installed on my PC when I upgraded to Windows 10. I was happy with the upgrade so I then installed Office 2016. However, when I tried to install Office 2013 on another computer, I was told that I couldn't, due to licensing restrictions. It appears that

installing Office 2016 on top of 2013 does not 'uninstall' the old copy, so it looks like you're trying to abuse the licence

David's letter implies that

he used to have Office 2010 on his PC and that after upgrading to Windows 10, he tried to reinstall it. If he did not uninstall Office 2010 but, for example, reformatted his PC to do a Windows 10 install, it might be that Microsoft thinks he's trying to install two copies of the software, but only has a licence for one.

The error message he received certainly seems to indicate a software restriction rather than a 'fault'.

When I had my problem, I contacted Microsoft's helpdesk at 9pm on a Friday night. They were very helpful, and ended up taking control of both machines to fix the licensing issue. I was reluctant to give control to Microsoft, but my fears were unfounded. It took the helpdesk chap less than 10 minutes to resolve the problem, which was caused by

> Microsoft's licensing server not recognising the uninstall. I'm no Microsoft fanboy, but

the helpdesk person actually solved my problem, which I was not expecting. Perhaps David should give them a try.

I've just read Issue 384's Group Test of 'Windows 10 laptops under £250' (bit.ly/webuser384) and have reached the conclusion that none of them including your Gold, Silver and Bronze Award winners - are worth buying.

For me, there are two killer reasons for this: screen resolution and battery life. A screen resolution of 1.366 x 768 pixels is simply dreadful, and 1,280 x 800 is only a little better. It amazes me that back in 2007 you could buy a laptop with a 1,920 x 1,200 non-glare screen but we appear to have been going backwards ever since. Last year, I reluctantly stopped using my Dell 1720 and moved to a new

machine with a 1,920 x 1,080 screen. My spreadsheets and word processing and browsing programs miss those extra pixels, and using Facebook isn't nearly as easy - especially when playing games.

Only one of your choices has a decent screen resolution but it also has a dreadful screen size and battery life.

I might as well just use my Nexus 7 with a Bluetooth keyboard.

It's high time that laptop manufacturers ditched 1,366 x 768 screens. I will never buy one and I doubt if those informed enough to read Web User will either.

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OS is still working flawlessly?

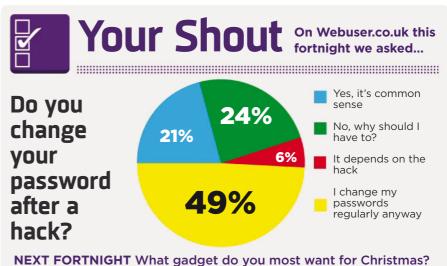

Nature created man, and if man wipes something out then this is nature. The world will end and start all over again, because that is what nature does.

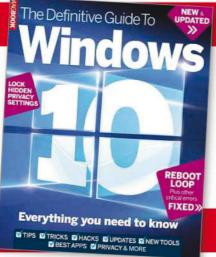
Nothing man does will change that fact. So please understand: humans are part of nature and everything we do is therefore natural.

Barry Collins accuses the Beeb of making a boob of flogging its TV archive

The BBC store is no match for Netflix

Imost precisely a year ago, in this very column, I suggested that all TV licence fee payers "should have access to the entire BBC archive on demand". We've already paid for the programmes once, so the BBC should hand them over to anyone who can enter their licence-fee number into a web browser. It seems someone at Auntie got the memo, but didn't read it properly.

Instead, we've got the newly launched BBC Store (store.bbc.com) – another attempt to fleece us for the television programmes we paid for the first time around. Worse still, the Beeb appears to have been asleep for the past five years and failed to spot the enormous popularity of all-you-can-eat subscription services such as Netflix and Amazon Instant Video, and is instead trying to flog us the streaming equivalent of DVD boxsets, much like Apple was about a decade ago.

Yes, you can now whip out your credit card and spend £24.99 on a 16-episode set of *Only Fools and Horses* specials or stump up £8.99 for the second series of

Gavin & Stacey – a total spend of £33.98 to rewatch just two shows that are repeated on a virtually constant loop anyway on channels such as Dave and BBC Three.

What's more, that £34 combined outlay would buy you around five months' worth of Netflix, where you can already stream both of those BBC

comedies and about a gazillion more shows, including much of what the BBC is offering for one-off purchase in its Store:

Sherlock, Peaky Blinders, Luther... the crossover is considerable.

"Aha!" I hear the BBC Store press officers yelp. But there's a big difference between the BBC Store and Netflix. On Netflix, you can only stream what's available on the service at any given time, whereas in the BBC Store you "own" your purchases and can stream or even download them to your PC

whenever you like.

Except you don't. Not really. Although the 'My Programmes' section of the BBC Store says I "own the series" of *The Smell of Reeves & Mortimer*, which I bought to test the service, the Terms & Conditions say otherwise. They state that the BBC "cannot guarantee that you will be able to stream or re-

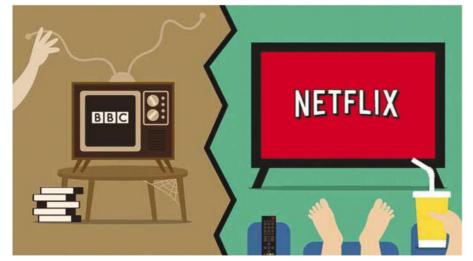
download content that's in your BBC Store account forever" and that in cases where the BBC's "right to make content available has expired, you will no longer be able to

stream or download that content from your BBC Store account".

So I don't "own" a copy of Reeves & Mortimer in the same way I would if I popped down to HMV and bought the DVD. I've merely bought the right to view it until the BBC removes it – an almost identical arrangement to that of Netflix and Amazon. Should the BBC Store close next year – a distinct possibility given how unattractive the prices are – all my purchases would go with it because even downloads are locked to the service using copy protection. You don't get a file you can keep.

A BBC Worldwide spokesperson told me, when I enquired about this point, that the Corporation "will only remove content for editorial reasons" and that there's "no danger" of the service being pulled within a year. To my mind, however, the BBC has found a blisteringly expensive way to rent us the shows we've already paid for, for a worryingly vague amount of time. Lovely jubbly, as a certain Peckham resident might say.





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
