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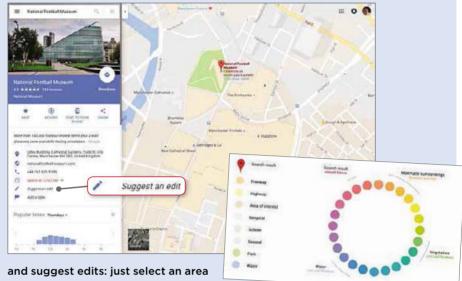


Find areas of interest in Google Maps

oogle has made some subtle but welcome changes to its mapping service, so its maps are now cleaner and easier to browse. Superfluous elements such as road outlines have been removed, and the typography of street names and points of interest has been sharpened for greater emphasis. You'll also notice that extra detail appears in a smoother way as you zoom in.

The most significant additions, however, are the 'areas of interest'. Google has used a mix of algorithms and human intervention to show where in a particular zone you'll find the most to do and see. So in large cities, you'll see lots of orange shading to mark where the shops, restaurants, bars, museums, hotels and other amenities are concentrated. Each of these has an icon you can click to view more information.

And that's not all. It's now easier than ever to add places to the map



and choose to either 'Add a missing place' or 'Suggest an edit'. If a suggestion for a location is already pending, you can verify that the information is accurate. When enough people have voted, the suggestion will

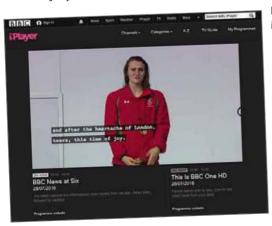
be published, which means amendments will appear more quickly, making for more accurate and useful maps.

View subtitles for live channels on BBC iPlayer

If you are deaf or have impaired hearing, you can now benefit from live subtitling on BBC iPlayer. The live trial is currently available only for PC and Mac users, but it should hopefully expand to include other devices such as smart TVs, tablets and mobiles in the near future. The subtitles work on all the major live channels: BBC One, BBC Two, BBC Four, CBBC, CBeebies and BBC News. Activating them is easy – just click the S icon to the left of the full-screen



button in the iPlayer's control panel and the subtitles will appear. If you can't see them, try changing your location to England, Scotland, Wales or Northern Ireland rather than a region.

Share entertainment you buy from Google Play

Google is following Apple's lead by allowing six people to share apps, games, films, TV shows and books across devices, without needing to pay again. The new Family Library feature lets you enter the details of up to five family members and allow them to access



as much or as little of your purchased media as you choose. Although you retain your own Google account and personal library of content, you set up a single payment method that all family members can share.

This allows the whole family to read books and watch films and TV on Android, iOS and in their browsers, and could save you a lot of money and hassle. That said, it's not a complete free-for-all. You can't share any apps and games you bought before 7 February unless the developer approves, and you can't share rentals either.

It ties in with the museums' biomedical collections, so diagnoses and treatments use real-life objects that are on display, from early X-ray machines to a bronchitis kettle. It's creative and strangely addictive.

And while it takes away the element of surprise, it's fascinating to see how many Pokémon there are around you. BT hangs on to its Openreach network despite poor service

What happened?

BT has been allowed to keep its broadband-engineering division Openreach, following calls to break it off to a separate company, but regulator Ofcom has demanded that the telecoms giant invests to fix its myriad problems.

Rivals including Sky and TalkTalk have loudly called for Ofcom to spin off Openreach, which owns and manages the fibre and copper infrastructure that supplies broadband to most UK homes, and which many ISPs – from the biggest companies down to small local firms – pay to access its services.

Critics have said that BT has invested too little in Openreach, leading to poor service, and that Openreach's business decisions too often favour BT's own broadband business. Ofcom has agreed that the relationship between BT and Openreach is flawed and needs to be improved, but said spinning off or selling Openreach is not the best solution. Ofcom CEO Sharon White claimed selling Openreach could take years, while her proposed plan would only take months to see improvements.

White has called for Openreach to be run as a legally separate company within BT. This means that Openreach will have its own board of directors and a chairperson separate from BT. Despite White's reticence to completely separate the two companies, she stressed: "If Openreach fails to up its game, we will return to a plan to break up BT and Openreach, however difficult".

As well as the wider division between the two organisations, Ofcom is forcing

Openreach to provide easier access to its telegraph poles and tunnels, which would allow rivals to roll out their own fibre networks at less cost – and, as White noted, help "reduce the country's reliance on Openreach".

The plans were welcomed by BT, which probably would have welcomed anything that didn't involve a complete divorce; meanwhile, rival ISPs and industry critics said the plans don't go far enough.

How will it affect you?

The separate boards and distinct company arrangements should mean Openreach is less likely to favour BT with its investment decisions and is more accountable to its direct customers - the ISPs that connect us to the web. However, any benefit from that structural change will take time to trickle down to customers.

One area that may lead to a more immediate change is the call for greater consultation with ISPs, with those discussions held confidential from BT for a time. This allows ISPs to develop infrastructure plans with Openreach without tipping off BT's own broadband division. Hopefully that, alongside the greater access to infrastructure such as poles and ducts, will spur other ISPs to roll out their own networks and truly boost competition.

None of this is likely to immediately improve customer service on engineering callouts – a longstanding problem with Openreach – or to suddenly expand fibre coverage or cut costs. However, a bit of patience from customers in the short term will hopefully pay off in a few years.

What do we think?

It's fair to say that Ofcom's decision to put checks on BT and Openreach is a half step, and rival ISPs would clearly prefer a full split because it would benefit their bottom lines. But a complete separation of the two services would be an unwelcome distraction for Brits at a key time in fibre rollouts, and it's impossible to say if it would provide customers with better service, lower prices and higher-quality broadband.

With that in mind, Ofcom is right to continue to hold the threat of a full separation over BT and Openreach. If customer service and infrastructure investment don't improve quickly, it'll simply prove that rival ISPs were right in their complaints. And while Sharon White is correct that a sale of Openreach would delay progress by years, it may still be an inevitable move. Here's hoping that's not the case and that broadband customers across the UK feel some benefit from these protracted negotiations.

Amazon Dash comes to the UK

What happened?

Online retail giant Amazon is finally bringing its Dash ordering tool to the UK, two years after it launched in the US. Dash is a barcode scanner and microphone that lets you reorder household goods with a scan or verbal search. If you run out of your preferred washing powder, for example, you can simply scan the barcode to add it to your Amazon basket.

The gadget is similar to Amazon's Dash buttons – small internet-connected devices branded with a product's logo that let you reorder that product with one touch. Stick the button for your favourite toilet paper in the bathroom and, when you run out, you just push the button to get a delivery the next day. This isn't yet available in the UK, and nor is Amazon's smart voice assistant, Echo.

How will it affect you?

Dash is only available to customers who have signed up to Amazon Fresh, the store's grocerydelivery service, which is currently limited to selected areas of London but is expected to expand its coverage to the rest of the UK in due course. Enter your postcode at www.amazon.co.uk/amazonfresh to see if your neighbourhood is included. If you make two orders before the end of August, Amazon will offer you the Dash gadget for free otherwise it costs £35.

What do we think?

Using the Dash gadget could make it quicker and easier to do your online grocery shop, because you won't need to make a list or visit the supermarket. However, it does mean that you have you do all your grocery shopping with Amazon Fresh.

That said, the idea itself is sound. We'd love an app on our phone that lets us make a grocery list by simply scanning an item's barcode. If you'd prefer to stick with your current grocer, you'll have to wait for Sainsbury's, Tesco, Ocado and the other major players to come up with a similar time-saving tool.



Google fights spam calls on Android



What happened?

Google declared war on spam phone calls, updating its Phone app for Android with a spam-blocking tool. The separate Phone app is so far only available on Google's Nexus handsets, and uses the existing caller-identification system. The spam-blocker feature compares the number of an incoming call to a database of unwanted callers. If the call is on that list, Google notifies you with a red screen that says it may be spam. You can still answer the call, or you can choose to block the number permanently or whitelist it, if the call has been mistakenly designated as spam.

How will it affect you?

If your phone is a Nexus device running Android Marshmallow, you can update the Phone app now at bit.ly/phone403 to get this new feature. If you're on a different version of Android, you can use alternatives such as TrueCaller (bit.ly/true403) and Call Blocker (bit.ly/call403) until the updated Phone app is made

available on older versions of Android.

If you have an iPhone, you're currently out of luck because Apple has locked down the iOS operating system so that such tools can't work. That's set to change this autumn with iOS 10, which is expected to allow spam-blocking apps to access the new caller ID system.

What do we think?

It's easy to forget the original purpose of phones, given the number of functions they now perform. While developers happily add slick animations, sophisticated games and other flashy entertainments, they often forget the basics – such as battery life, ease of use and phone calls.

With that in mind, we're happy that Google is trying to solve the problem of unwanted calls. Such a simple tool as a call blocker may not sound impressive, but it will genuinely save time and cut frustration for the hundreds of millions of people using Android. That's an innovation we truly appreciate.

Yahoo to be sold to Verizon for \$5bn

What happened?

Telecommunications company Verizon has confirmed that it has agreed to buy Yahoo's core internet business for \$4.83bn (£3.62bn). This comes just a vear after Verizon bought another ailing web pioneer, AOL, to boost the internet side of its business. One great advantage of the deal for Verizon is that it gains access to masses of user data, as well as Yahoo's incredibly lucrative advertising technology.

Forrester analyst Shar VanBoskirk explained how acquiring a huge amount of customer data from Yahoo might boost Verizon's advertising operations: "The more access to customer data it has (online through Yahoo and AOL, in home via cable boxes and on mobile via smart devices) the more targeted it can be with advertising and sponsored content or product placements across those same devices".

VanBoskirk added that this would allow Verizon's "ad products" to compete more effectively with those of online companies such as Google, as well as other cable and telecom companies.

While this deal signals the end of Yahoo as a trading company in the West, it still exists in the form of Yahoo Japan, of which Yahoo retains 35.5%. along with a 15% stake in China's Alibaba e-commerce company.



How will it affect you?

In an interview with the Associated Press. Yahoo CEO Marissa Maver said: "We haven't even scratched the surface [of] how things will be run after the takeover", so it's not clear what the future holds for Yahoo and its 225 million users. Verizon bought the Yahoo brand name as part of the deal, so it's likely that it will continue to operate Yahoo as a separate brand, at least to begin with. Yahoo's email and search tools may also be rolled out to Verizon's US customers by default. It's no secret that Yahoo has been struggling of late, so the future of the company's other services, such as Flickr and Tumblr, is no

more or less certain than it's been at any other time recently.

What do we think?

Yahoo may not be the internet search juggernaut it once was, but its global brand is still strong enough for this to be a lucrative deal for Verizon. Because Yahoo has suffered such financial trouble recently, however, we wouldn't be surprised to see its strategy change dramatically over the coming months and years. In the past, both Google and Yahoo have shut down services used by millions of people, and Verizon could easily do the same to make a success of its acquisition.



SoundMagic E10 C www.soundmagic.com

SoundMagic's E10 C headphones don't look particularly special, but stick them in your ears and they'll blow you away. This level of clarity from a pair of headphones costing just £40 is simply astonishing, and the sense of space and separation they produce is of such high quality that we wouldn't have batted an eyelid if we'd been told they cost £150. They don't provide the attack, detail and dead-flat frequency response you get with our favourite in-ear monitors, the Etymotic ER-4P, but the bass quality and sense of scale are beyond anything else we've heard at this price.

As well as sounding great, the SoundMagic E10 C set is well made, with metal earphone housings

rather than the plastic used for most headphones at this price. The smooth finish on the cables means that when they rub against your clothing, they don't transmit every scrape and tap straight down your ear canal.

SoundMagic has produced several different versions of

the E10 headphones, but the E10 C is the first pair to include a three-button inline remote control with integrated microphone for use with a smartphone. It's no ordinary inline remote, either, because it works seamlessly with both iOS and Android devices, which is unusual. Play, pause, skip, voice-control



activation and volume all functioned perfectly on both types of device when we tried them.

The SoundMagic E10 C also comes with a robust storage case, seven pairs of silicon earbuds of various sizes and an adapter that splits the microphone and headphone connection into two, so you can

use them with older laptops and PCs.

All told, you get a lot for your money with the SoundMagic E10 C. They sound wonderful, come with a good selection of accessories and the price is very reasonable. Quite simply, they're the best headphones you can buy at this price.

Is the smartwatch already dead?

Smartwatch sales slid by a third from April to June 2016, their first decline since the wearable technology took off with the Apple Watch in April 2015. That's according to International Data Corporation (IDC) (bit.lv/ idcwatch403), which reported smartwatch shipments of 3.5 million globally in the second quarter of the year, down from 5.1 million in the same period last year. Although Apple's sales were the only ones in the top five to slide - diving a whopping 55% - they make up half of all smartwatch sales, at 1.6 million, which means Apple remains "far and away the market leader".

"Consumers have held off on smartwatch purchases since early 2016 in anticipation of new hardware. and improvements in WatchOS aren't expected until later this year, in effect stalling existing Apple Watch sales,' said Jitesh Ubrani, senior research analyst for IDC Mobile Device Trackers. Apple currently has a 47% share of the market, followed by Samsung with 16% and Lenovo with 9%. "Apple still maintains a significant lead in the market and unfortunately a decline for Apple leads to a decline in the entire market." Ubrani said.



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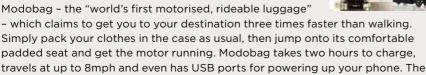
Although a 55% drop in Apple's sales is alarming, we don't see it spelling the end of the smartwatch just yet. Apple was the only major manufacturer to see a slump, and there is a perfectly good reason for this. Unlike some Apple products, the Watch doesn't have an annual release cycle, so consumers would have been particularly wary of parting with their hard-earned cash for a device that is already quite old, in technological terms. We expect to see sales pick up again when the next versions of the Watch are launched.

SECURITY ALERT! | What's been bothering us this fortnight

WhatsApp doesn't delete your 'deleted' messages

WhatsApp continues to store your conversations even after you delete them. a security researcher has



discovered. The latest iOS version of the app leaves a forensic trace of chats whether or not you delete or archive your messages, iOS security expert Jonathan Zdziarski said in a blog post. The problem, Zdziarski explained, is that once WhatsApp messages are deleted, they enter a 'free list' that's stored locally in WhatsApp's database and are not deleted from the device until the database needs to free up storage space. The researcher explained that "there is no guarantee the data will

be overwritten by the next set of messages. In other apps, I've often seen artefacts remain in the database for months". This might not be a problem if it were not for the fact that this database of stored messages is sent to your iCloud account in routine backups, if you have those enabled.

Chthonic banking Trojan spread by PayPal accounts

PayPal emails have been spreading the Chthonic banking Trojan, research by Proofpoint has discovered. Proofpoint found that PayPal emails with the subject line



"You've got a money request" were being used by criminals to distribute the malware. However, rather than using fake emails that appear to be genuine, it

seems the emails were sent using PayPal-registered accounts.

The criminals were able to send emails to other PayPal users via the money-sending service, adding the malicious link in the personalised message. The content of the message explains that the victim's PayPal account has been used to defraud another PavPal user: however, the other user is actually the criminal. asking for a refund of the monies. The attack is twofold: the victim is asked to send a payment to this user, and they might also click a malicious link in the email, which claims to link through to evidence of the fraudulent transaction but actually directs them to a malicious site that downloads a hidden JavaScript file. This file, if opened, downloads Chthonic - a variant of the Zeus banking Trojan.

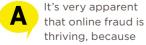

more data available on the black market and more financial institutions and merchants that are vulnerable to attacks.

You can help secure yourself against fraud in the following ways: Only shop with well-known companies online, or use safer payment systems such as PayPal, Apple Pay and Android Pay to avoid directly providing your payment details to an unknown merchant.

Use strong, unique passwords on each and every site you register with, and

don't use public computers or free, unencrypted Wi-Fi to conduct banking or shopping transactions or interactions.

Make sure you don't fall victim to email and phone scams that pretend to be from your bank and ask for personal account information. If you are contacted in this way and you aren't sure if the email or call is genuine, call the bank directly, using the number displayed on the back of your card or on a recent statement.

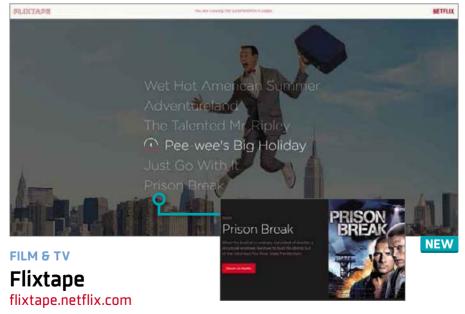

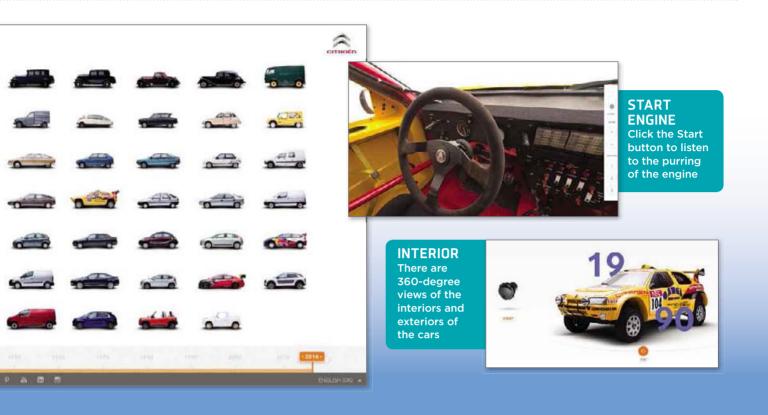

You can then easily order samples and work out how many rolls you'll need before you buy. We particularly like that you can add wallpaper to a Mood Board and adjust it for specific rooms and whims. However, the blog could do with more splashes of personality.

Code with Brackets

Many websites are built using WordPress, but occasionally you need to edit code such as HTML, CSS or PHP. Brackets (brackets.io) is a free editor from Adobe that is now up to version 1.7 and offers some great features, such as the clever ability to open a small window within your code to edit the CSS that applies to it. Another new feature is Ctrl+Tab, which lists recently opened files, so you can reopen them. Although you edit the code directly, Brackets displays a live preview of the page in Chrome as you type.

Customise the WordPress dashboard

The WordPress dashboard is flexible and customisable. Click the Screen Options button at the top and tick the items you want to see. You can click and drag the dashboard panels into your preferred order, placing your most used items first. Click the up arrow in the top-right corner of a panel to shrink it.

Spam comments are a frequent problem, but if you go to Settings, Discussion Settings, Content Moderation and enter 1 then any comments with links will not be posted until you approve them.

You shouldn't have to create different websites for different devices. There are lots of website builders, including WordPress, that can be used to design a website that looks great on phones and tablets, as well as on a Desktop. These allow your website to respond to the screen it's being viewed on, to optimise legibility, image size and layout. A website with responsive images also lets users with limited bandwidth download less data. This makes pages load more quickly. which means people will have a more enjoyable experience when visiting your site.

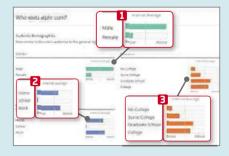

Media streamers

You don't have to spend hundreds of pounds on a new TV to access the best entertainment on the web. We test eight devices that let you stream the latest films, sport and catch-up channels

treaming devices have revolutionised the way we access content on our televisions, and the latest models are cheap, easy to use and offer more to watch than ever. With a media-streaming device plugged into your TV, you can rent movies, subscribe to all-you-can-watch movie and TV services or, if you prefer, just catch up with your current terrestrial favourites at a time that's most convenient to you.

Services such as Sky offer better deals and increased flexibility because you no longer have to have an unsightly dish mounted on an outside wall of your house, and even Freeview can't compete with the free services available online.

We've tested eight media-streaming devices to see which one you should use to bring the best of internet TV to your living room.

ROKH 3

The Roku 3 is a compact box that supports a broad range of content. Catch-up TV is very well supported, with all the UK terrestrial services represented, including BBC iPlayer, All 4, ITV Hub and Demand 5. The device also supports Netflix, Amazon Video and Sky's Now TV, and you can rent or buy movies on a pay-as-you-go basis from Google Play, Sky Store and Sainsbury's.

The Roku 3 has a Fast Ethernet port and 802.11n Wi-Fi, or you can stream video, pictures and music from a microSD card or a USB port. It only has an HDMI output, though, supporting resolutions of 720p or 1080p.

Setting up the device is easy. You need to create a Roku account on your computer or mobile device in order to link the account to the media streamer. Once that's done, you simply connect the box to your TV and start installing channels.

The Roku 3 has a wonderful user interface, with a scrollable menu of categories and options on the left-hand side and

a matrix of channel tiles to browse on the right. It's slick to operate and looks great.

The Roku store includes Plex, which makes it easy to access your own content through networked devices, though it isn't quite as slick on the Roku as it is on other devices.

The hardware is brilliant, particularly the remote control. It has a headphone socket that automatically mutes the TV, so you can watch whatever you like without disturbing others. It connects to the device via Bluetooth so you

don't even need to point it at the box, which sounds gimmicky but is a joy to use - pointing your other controllers at the screen will become a chore after using this.



The third-generation Roku brings together the best elements of its previous models. Unless you absolutely must have 4K capability – in which case, you should opt for the Amazon Fire TV box - this is as close to a perfect TV-streaming device as you're likely to find, providing all the terrestrial catch-up services and a choice of Netflix, Amazon Video, Google Play and Sky services.

The Fire TV Stick plugs into an HDMI port on your TV and is about the size of a USB memory stick. It's powered by a USB power adapter. or will run from a TV's USB port, as long as this supplies enough power.

Like the Roku, the Fire TV Stick supports all the main UK catch-up channels. As you might expect, it prioritises Amazon Video (which comes bundled with the £79 per year Amazon Prime delivery service) but can also stream from Netflix, Spotify Connect, YouTube, Sky News and BBC Sport.

You can control it using the supplied remote or, if you prefer, your mobile device. This gives you the added benefit of voice search, but for £10 more you can get it built into the remote. There's also a game controller available for another £40, but if you want to play games rather than watch TV, you'd be better off with the additional power supplied by Amazon's Fire TV with 4K Ultra HD.

VERDICT

At £35, the basic Amazon Fire TV is great value for money. If you're an Amazon Prime member, it's a particularly good way of getting extra value out of your delivery subscription by taking advantage of Amazon's video-streaming service.

It's a bigger box than our other award winners but its contents are more powerful, so navigating around its menus feels incredibly slick. It also comes with the voice remote we mentioned in the Fire TV Stick review, so you can speak your searches into the device.

It streams programmes from all the UK catch-up services, and you can download an app to connect it to a Plex server for streaming content over your own network. With the option of Fast Ethernet or 802.11ac Wi-Fi, you should enjoy a smooth and unbroken connection.

VERDICT

★★★☆

If you've already splashed out on a 4K TV, this device lets you get the most out of the technology. Viewers with lower resolutions are better off with the Fire TV Stick, unless you want an excuse to upgrade your TV at a later date.

Apple got a bit more serious about its TV device with this 2015 refresh of its set-top box. But while the hardware and the interface are



suitably powerful and slick, the content lets it down. Netflix and Now TV are available but there's no built-in catch-up TV from UK channels and, unlike Roku, it hasn't cut a deal with Amazon, so you can't access its video-streaming service.

This is a shame because everything the Apple TV does, it does wonderfully. The remote is the most sophisticated in this group, despite its minimal buttons - it has a trackpad that can move the cursor around; it's a motion controller (like the Nintendo Wii's) for playing games; and it's rechargeable. It also provides sophisticated Siri-based voice control for searching apps and controlling playback.

All is not lost, however, because you can use an iOS device to fill some of the missing elements by casting with AirPlay, but it's a hamstrung streamer if you don't already have an iOS device.

VERDICT

 $\star\star\star\star$

If you only want to beam content from your mobile device, the Chromecast is more affordable than Apple TV. It's great for Netflix and playing games, but there aren't enough catch-up services and it doesn't support Amazon Video.

BEST OF THE REST

The cheapest way to get a decent streaming service on your TV is to use

Sky Now TV (£15 | www.nowtv.com/box |

★★★★☆). This gives you simple no-contract access to Sky's movie, entertainment and sports channels, and the pay-as-you-go Sky Store, on a device that's basically a re-badged Roku. You can also use it to view all the catch-up channels, but rival

services such as Netflix and Amazon aren't included. The Google Chromecast (£30 | store.google.com

| ★★★★☆) remains a great device when used in conjunction with a smartphone but casting content through your mobile device is less convenient than having everything already built in, as is the case with the other streamers we've reviewed.

If you're into gaming and want to play PC and Android games on a big screen (even a 4K model), you'll love the

Nvidia Shield Android TV (£150 | www.ebuyer.com |

 $\star\star\star\star\star$). It's not so good at streaming TV, though, and there aren't enough Android apps configured to support it.

The NZXT Doko (£117 | www.amazon .co.uk | ******) is a disappointment. It's another gaming accessory, which can connect to your PC (though only using an Ethernet cable) and display content on your TV, but there's plenty of room for improvement.

OUR VERDICT Our favourite device for getting the best internet entertainment to a TV is the Roku 3. With a full complement of catch-up channels; services from the likes of Sky, Amazon and Netflix; and an innovative interface and remote, it's a brilliant device. It deserves our Gold award. The Silver and Bronze awards both go to Amazon. Silver is taken by the £35 Amazon Fire TV Stick, which has great support for catch-up TV and is doubly useful if you subscribe to Amazon Prime. But if you've already got a 4K TV, or are planning to get one soon, consider upgrading to the £80 Fire TV with 4K Ultra HD, which won our Bronze award. Both are superb value for money and cover a Roku 3 good range of services, including Netflix, should you prefer it to Amazon's own streaming service.

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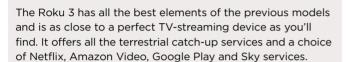

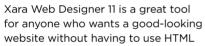

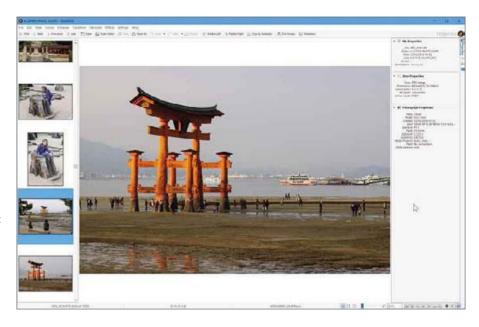

The excellent free DigiKam is a very powerful photo organiser and editor. There are actually two separate programs included in the download -DigiKam and Showfoto. The former lets you manage your photo collections; sort images into albums; browse for pictures by keyword tag, label, date, location, subject and more: and share items across numerous services, including Facebook, Imgur, Dropbox, Flickr and Google Photos.

You can give each of your pictures a star rating, view them in several ways such as in a slideshow or on a light table - easily add tags and find duplicate or





similar images. You can also apply multiple changes in batches, which saves time and effort.

The other program, Showfoto, is a good photo editor that lets you view images in a window, full screen or as a slideshow; adjust a picture's colour; and enhance, transform or decorate it. It's no rival to Paint.net, but the software offers a good range of effects, including charcoal drawing, oil paint and blurs.

The interface takes a little getting used to because it was written for Linux

and ported to Windows and Mac, but it's worth persevering. There's much more to both programs than you might expect, and you'll discover new, useful features hidden throughout as you play around with them

This new version of DigiKam has been rewritten to make it much faster and more stable in Windows. It also gains new tools and editing functions, such as the ability to import images from a digital scanner and options for editing metadata and geo-location information.

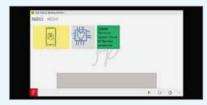

Problems with your PC's RAM can lead to freezes and crashes, which is no fun at all. MemTest86's memory-diagnostic tool boots from a CD or USB flash drive and runs a series of tests looking for faults with your computer memory. Although the program looks very technical (and, actually, it is), all you really need to know is that if it reports any errors, that means there is a problem with your PC's RAM and you should probably replace it.

There's an additional test in this new version (Row Hammer Test) and the software can now run tests in Parallel CPU mode - if your PC supports this - meaning the process will complete significantly quicker.

Modern versions of Windows (from Vista onwards) have a feature called Volume Shadow Copy Service, which takes regular, automatic snapshots of your hard drive.

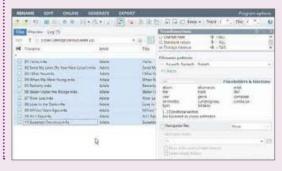

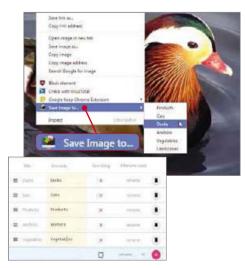

Remove all mention of Pokémon from the web

Unless you've been living in a cave for the last few weeks, you'll know that Pokémon Go is the sensation that's sweeping the nation. Indeed, the mobile game has become so ubiquitous that you're probably sick of hearing about it, which is where PokeGone (bit.ly/pokegone403) comes in. Like similar tools for the Karsdashians (bit.ly/kard403) and Donald Trump (bit.ly/trump403), this extension removes all mention of Pokémon from web pages, so you can browse without being bothered by it. PokeGone offers three levels of sensitivity – mild, aggressive and vindictive –



and keeps track of the number of Pokémon it has 'caught'. We found it worked well on social media, but on other sites it merely warned us that Pokémon were present, rather than actually blocking them. If you'd like to read more about Pokémon Go, rather than less, turn to our FAQ on page 36.



Download web images to different folders

Although it's easy to change your default Downloads folder in Chrome – just go to Settings and click the Change button next to 'Download location' – there are times when you'll want to save files elsewhere. Help is at hand from a new extension called Save Image Router (bit.ly/saveimage403), which lets you expand Chrome's right-click menu with multiple download locations. True, there are some restrictions – the locations must be subfolders within the main Downloads folder and you can only save images – but it's still a very useful tool.

To set the available subfolders to save to, click the toolbar button, select

Options and add them to the list. They'll now appear when you right-click a picture and choose 'Save Image to...'. You can delete, rename and rearrange the new locations on the Options page.

Disable Chrome extensions more easily

If you have too many extensions running, Chrome can become slow and prone to crash. Right-clicking them on the toolbar only lets you hide them or remove them altogether, but if you would rather just disable add-ons temporarily, you should get Extensity (bit.ly/extensity403), which makes the process much quicker and easier. At the click of a button, it displays a drop-down list of all the Chrome extensions and apps you have installed. You can then turn them on and off



individually, simply by clicking them, or flick a switch to disable or enable them all in one go. It's an essential tool for extension addicts.

Mute background tabs automatically

If you've got BBC News 24 going in one tab and decide to play a YouTube video as a bit of light relief in another, you'll end up suffering an aural assault from the clash of audio sources. Thank goodness for Smart Mute Tab (bit.ly/mute403), a new Chrome add-on that ensures only one tab - the current one - is able to play audio at any time, by automatically disabling sound from other background tabs. When you close the current tab, it will instantly 'unmute' the one you switch back to. You can set the extension to ignore specific websites, so you don't miss new-message alerts and other important audio notifications.

Install Chrome extensions in Firefox

There are thousands of great add-ons for Firefox, but many new ones are only released for Chrome, which can be frustrating for Mozilla devotees. Until now, that is, because an incredible new tool called Chrome Store Foxified (bit.ly/foxified403) has arrived. This lets you install your favourite Chrome extensions in Firefox. to get the best of both worlds. Simply visit the Chrome Web

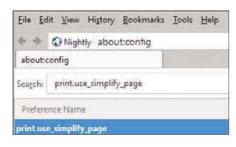


Store in Firefox (chrome.google.com/webstore), click the add-on you want and you'll notice that an 'Add to Firefox' button appears in the top-right corner. Click this and the extension will convert to Firefox format, and you'll be able to 'sign' and install it. You'll first need to create an account at addons.mozilla.org, if you don't have one already, but this doesn't take long and it opens your browser to a world of new possibilities.

Print cleaner versions of web pages

Firefox 49, which is currently in beta but will be officially released on 13 September, introduces a welcome new feature called Simplify Page. This lets you print online articles without the irrelevant clutter that surrounds them - such as adverts, links and design elements - saving you ink, paper and time. Oddly, Mozilla has decided to disable the feature by default (at least for the time being), but it's easy enough to turn on. Type about:config into your address bar, press Enter and click 'I'll be careful, I promise'. Find the entry 'print.use simplify page' and doubleclick it to set its value to 'true'.



When you want to print a cleaned-up page, press Alt on your keyboard and choose File, Print Preview. When the page opens, select 'Simplify page' and Firefox will remove the clutter so you

can proceed with printing cleanly.

If you can't wait a few weeks to try this fantastic new printing feature, you can download the Firefox 49 beta now from bit.ly/beta403

Close tabs by pressing Delete

Question: which keyboard shortcuts can you use to close the current tab in Firefox? If you said Ctrl+W and

Ctrl+F4, aive vourself a pat on the back, but don't stop reading yet because there is



now a third way. Delete Tab No Restart (bit.ly/delete403) closes the active tab instantly when you press - you guessed it - the Delete key on your keyboard, thus saving you a whole key press. That's very handy, you might say, but what happens when I need to use the Delete key to actually delete something? Well, if you think about it - when did you last press Delete rather than Backspace when using your browser? Ages ago, right? So everybody wins.

OTHER BROWSERS

Delete cookies for specific sites There are good cookies

and bad cookies on the web, but removing the latter from Opera involves a lot of fiddling around in the browser's settings. Wouldn't it be easier if you could clear all the cookies implanted by the current site in one go? The good news is that you can, by using the Opera extension 'Remove cookies for the current

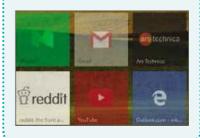
domain' (bit.lv/ cookies403). When you

inadvertently visit a website you don't trust, just click the add-on's toolbar button to wipe all that site's cookies instantly. It's also a speedy way to log out

of online accounts.

Try the new and improved Edge

Microsoft is continuing to tweak its Edge browser to make to it a stronger competitor to Chrome and Firefox. The recent Windows 10 Anniversary Update improved the tiles that appear when you pin websites to the Start screen. Previously, these merely featured the Edge logo and the name of the site, but they now display the proper 'favicon'. Microsoft also claims that Edge is the only browser, apart from Apple's Safari, to support the full-HD playback resolution of 1080p for Netflix streaming; and the latest version uses less memory and battery power. It's certainly worth another look.

The BBC has made almost as many apps as TV shows over the last few years. Does the world - let alone your space-squeezed phone or tablet really need another one? Yes, because despite its limited size, BBC+ does the job of several apps. Tell it what you're interested in, and it



delivers relevant content from across the BBC's network.

The first thing we saw upon launching the app was a photo of David Attenborough, which was a great start. Sign in using a BBC ID, or create one, then choose 'interests' such as technology, entertainment and recipes, along with curated video and radio content such as 'BBC iPlayer TV picks', 'Latest sport videos' and the more topical 'Pick of the Proms 2016'. We'd welcome more such time-relevant feeds - how about an Olympics video feed, for example? Breaking news appears at the top of the screen, whatever feed you're looking at.

Although relying too heavily on BBC+ means you're unlikely to venture out of your 'comfort zone', the app serves its purpose well by supplying you with content you're

bound to enjoy. It's very easy to use and feeds are updated regularly. As well as saving you the space that would be consumed by installing individual BBC apps, it's also a great time-saver and a fantastic source of programmes and articles you'd never otherwise see. However, in itself, it's fairly limited. It doesn't have a built-in media player, so you need the BBC Media Player app for Android (bit.ly/media403)

or the iPlayer app for iOS (bit.ly/ iplayer403) to open video and audio.



MINI WORKSHOP Set up BBC+ on your mobile device

Launch BBC+ and sign into your BBC iD account or create one for free. Tap 'Get started'. On the 'Add interests' screen, tap the '+' 1 next to three or more subjects to add them as feeds. Your selected subjects are ticked. 2 You can swipe down the screen to see dozens more. When you've finished, tap Next. 3

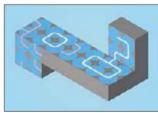

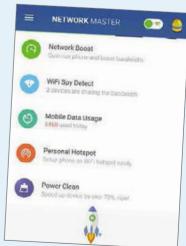

Pokémon? That's a blast from the past isn't it?

Indeed. Pokémon made its video-game debut 20 years ago with the release of two versions: Red and Blue. Launching with the catchphrase "Gotta catch 'em all!", the role-playing title became the biggest hit for the Nintendo Game Boy since Tetris. It has now made an incredibly successful leap to Android and iOS, making Pokémon Go (www .pokemongo.com) possibly the biggest mobile-game craze ever seen.

What exactly is Pokémon Go?

Best described as a location-based augmented-reality game, Pokémon Go involves capturing and training virtual

cartoon creatures that can then be put into battle against other players. It's a similar concept to the previous Pokémon titles, but this time the action takes place in the real world.

The game displays a map of your current area and uses your phone's GPS location data to direct you to the Pokémon, which are superimposed on the

real world using augmented reality. The creatures can appear on your street, in your garden or in front of a monument, and the more vou catch. the quicker you progress through the levels and open new possibilities.

Just how big a deal is Pokémon Go?

Within three days of being released in the US, Pokémon Go became the biggest mobile game in US history, attracting 21 million daily active users. Many more millions have since flocked to play the game - not just in America but in Japan, New Zealand, Australia, Germany, Canada and, of course, the UK, where it was released on 14 July. Thousands of Android and iOS users can currently be seen scouring their neighbourhoods in search of Pokémon. The fact that it's free (albeit with optional in-app purchases) has attracted the casually curious and

it has the perfect ingredients to become a smash-hit with obsessive fans.

What ingredients, exactly?

The first is perhaps the familiarity of the franchise which, by February this year, had achieved sales of more than 279 million units. The second is its widespread availability on phones and tablets. But it also seems people have taken well to the fun of exploring the world around them, with the incentive of collecting items and competing against others. Indeed, demand has been so high that the servers have frequently been overloaded.

How do I start playing?

Download the game from the App Store or Google Play, then create an account and customise your trainer character. Choose either Charmander, Squirtle or Bulbasaur as your starter Pokémon, catch it by flicking a Poké Ball in its direction and you're ready to venture outdoors. You'll see

the trainer moving around the in-game map, matching where you are in the real world, and your phone will vibrate whenever you encounter a Pokémon.

But why are people hanging around the streets?



You can battle other players at a Pokémon gym

Certain areas called PokéStops, based at places of interest such as museums, shops and pubs. contain random collectible items. You may even get Pokémon Eggs that hatch into creatures you've never seen before - as long as you've incubated them by walking enough steps first. There are also gyms where your Pokémon are trained and you

can battle other players.

Bet there's a bit of cheating, eh?

Oh yes, there's plenty of that. Some players have tried to hack the game and others have used drones to make speedier progress. We've seen a level 23



You can buy Pokémon cheats on eBay

account containing 119 creatures being sold for £500 and you can also buy rare Pokémon that only reside in specific locations, such as by rivers or in densely populated cities. But, as the saying goes, you're only cheating yourself.

Still, at least it gets people out and about, right?

Yes, just as Nintendo Wii saw players leaping around their living rooms, so Pokémon Go is encouraging gamers to get out of the house. It's having some health benefits - people are spending an average of 43 minutes walking around and it's been said that it will burn 1,500 calories in women and 1,800 in men each week if played daily. But it's also making for the ultimate in social gaming.

Has the game had any problems?

It has, yes. Quite apart from hackers carrying out a Distributed Denial of Service attack on the Pokémon servers. there have been reports of someone dialling 999 to report a "stolen" Pokémon, teens in Florida being shot at after being mistaken for thieves, people

being robbed at knifepoint for their phones, children becoming stuck in caves and people walking off cliffs and wandering into roads. There have also been warnings from child-protection agencies and the police.

Should I steer clear of it. then?

Oh no, not at all. On the plus side, the game has even led to some crime-fighting -

Pokémon Go players stopped a burglary in its tracks near Doncaster and there have been some startling discoveries, not

least a body found in a Wyoming river. But ultimately, Pokémon Go is great fun and. far from being just a summer craze, it has the potential to change the way we use the mobile web. It has already beaten Twitter's number of daily users, has more downloads than the dating app Tinder and users are spending more time



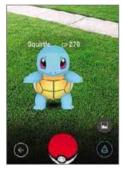

on it than on Facebook. So it's being watched very carefully by many people.

So what's the future for Pokémon Go?

It's too early to predict the long-term impact of Pokémon Go but there is certainly potential for developers to make their fortunes. Players are allowing

> the game to learn their locations and movement, which means it could become a valuable database for advertisers and marketers. and it marks a triumphant comeback for Nintendo. which was suffering poor sales of the Wii U console. CopyQ is a relatively new clipboard manager that's free to use and comes with a ton of advanced features. One of its most useful assets is that it lets

you edit items while they're sitting in the clipboard. Just copy some text and you can view it in the main CopyQ window by left-clicking the icon in the taskbar's notification area. Highlight the clipboard item you want to edit, then press E2 or click the Edit icon in the toolbar on the right. You can make any changes you like to your highlighted text, then click the Save icon to return it to the same location in the clipboard. If you want to do a bit more with it, the 'Edit with editor' button brings up Notepad, so you can make changes in a more familiar setting.



CopyQ's interface is refreshingly modern and includes some impressive tricks that are missing from the somewhat oldfashioned presentation of our other two award winners. For example, CopyQ applies the relatively modern concept of browser tabs to its software. so you can take saved clipboard items from the main tab and store

them in another, to efficiently organise your saved items and make them easier to find.

Once you start fully exploring the software, you'll find all manner of advanced options, such as scripting, to bring a whole new level of sophistication to your cutting and pasting.

How it can be improved:

Although its modern look is leagues ahead of the other award-winning clipboard managers in this group, CopyQ's interface is actually quite clunky and looks a bit cobbled together. The internet-editing option is brilliant



but it only works with text, so you can't yet carry copied images through to your preferred image editor, which would be a nice touch.

OUR VERDICT

CopyQ has come out of nowhere to snatch our Gold Award from previous winner, Ditto. Its modern interface and wealth of options offer an impressive array of tools if you want a bit more from copy and paste than what you get from the standard Windows Clipboard.

What we liked:

Ditto is a wellestablished program that won our Gold Award in our last testing of clipboard managers in

Issue 363 (bit.ly/webuser363). Nothing has changed with the software in that time and we still love this small and compact program, with its tiny interface that loads

instantly and needs very little space to work. It might look a bit too small on modern high-resolution screens, but it's a trade-off we were happy to accept for a clipboard manager that doesn't infringe on the rest of the Desktop.

Despite its small size, Ditto manages to include some handy, well thought-out tools. Best of these is the humble search box that sits at the bottom of its Quick Paste interface. This is brilliant for tracking down a specific section of text when you've got a whole collection of copied snippets sitting in its various clipboard slots.



How it can be improved:

Things have moved on since we last looked at Ditto and its Windows XP-stvle interface looks more dated than ever. If you suffer from eye strain, you may struggle

with the interface, which uses tiny fonts and thumbnail icons that are more little-finger than thumb-sized.

OUR VERDICT

This previous Gold Award winner is still among the best but some stiff competition has pushed it into second place. Newer clipboard managers have more sophisticated tools but Ditto's lightweight speedy interface and simplicity mean it's still a great choice.

BEST OF THE REST

Clipdiary Free

clipdiary.com

Clipdiary is the newest of all the products we tested and its features look comprehensive and promising. However, it's so new that, during our

testing, Norton Internet Security didn't want us to install it. Scanning it on VirusTotal, only one of the 52 scanners flagged it up as dangerous, which looks like a false positive, but we can't guarantee this. Keep your eye on this one though, as it



could be big news in the future.

ArsClip

ArsClip made a promising start during our testing but we ran into a few difficulties when trying to copy images to its clipboard. It claimed one of our images was too big the first time we tried, but accepted

it on a subsequent attempt. With other clipboard managers working without a single

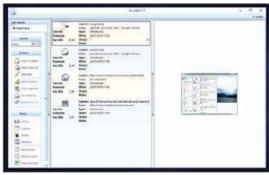
What we liked:

Like Ditto, Save.Me has been pushed down a ranking since our last look at clipboard managers. This portable, single-file

program saves everything you copy to the clipboard, as long as you have the software running. Like our other award-winners, it places an icon in the notification area of the taskbar so you can launch it easily and see that it's running.

The main interface is split into three columns: menu options on the left; the list of copied items in the middle; and a preview pane on the right. This latter is particularly useful for images, which display better than in the smaller viewers of the other programs.

If you prefer a more compact view. Save. Me also provides a small window with icons, rather than a list of contents, which looks a bit like an Explorer window. Double-click an icon and it opens in a separate window.



How it can be improved:

Save.Me works well but, like Ditto, its interface hasn't had a refresh since Windows XP, which makes it look spectacularly dated. It also isn't particularly intuitive to use.

OUR VERDICT

Save.Me's previews and thumbnails make it particularly good for copying and pasting images. However, its interface looks very old-fashioned and isn't straightforward enough to use.

Facebook Facebook's privacy settings make it easy to control who can look you up and add you on the social network. Just click the drop-down menu in the top-right corner of the site and select Settings, Privacy. You can stop anyone who's not on your Friends list looking you up using your phone number or email address by clicking Edit next to the appropriate options and choosing 'Friends' from their respective menus. You can also prevent your profile from appearing in Google and other search engines by selecting Edit for the last option under 'Who can look me up?' and unticking the box to 'Allow search engines outside of Facebook to link to your Profile'.



People can still look for you by name using Facebook's search tool and, by default, anyone can send you a friend request. To stop strangers trying to befriend you, click Edit alongside 'Who can contact me?' and select 'Friend of friends' from the drop-down menu. Unfortunately, you can't block people from trying to contact you, but



Facebook only lets you see messages from people it thinks you might know. These are filtered to the Message Requests section of your inbox, so that you're not disturbed unnecessarily. To check if you have messages in this folder, simply click the Messages button in Facebook's toolbar and a number in brackets alongside 'Message Requests' will indicate if you have any unread messages. Select the message to open it and either click Accept to accept future communication or Ignore to move the message to 'Filtered requests'.

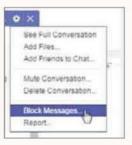
Twitter Being able to interact with people you don't know is one of the best things about Twitter, but if you'd prefer to control who follows you and responds to your tweets, there's a simple fix. Click your profile-picture thumbnail, select Settings and 'Security and privacy', then, under Privacy, tick



REPORT ABUSIVE USERS ON FACEBOOK

If you receive messages on Facebook that make you feel uncomfortable, you can block the user from contacting you again by opening the conversation, clicking the settings cog and selecting Block Messages, then Block Messages again.

You can then delete the conversation by selecting Delete Conversation in the same menu. Bear in mind that if



you want to report abuse, it's best to keep a copy of the conversation, which you can do by taking a screenshot. To block someone completely on Facebook, so you don't even see their profile, click the padlock symbol in the toolbar, select 'How do I

stop someone bothering me?' and then enter the name or email address of the individual you want to block.

Stop strangers contacting you

the box to 'Protect my Tweets'. This stops your future tweets being publicly visible and any new followers will have to send you a request that you can either accept or reject. Remember to click 'Save changes' before leaving the page, or your new tweets will remain public.



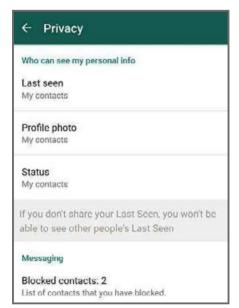
If you want to stop an existing follower from seeing and replying to tweets you post, you'll have to block them. To do this, visit their profile, click the Settings cog and select Block. Bear in mind that blocking someone means you'll no longer be able to see anything they post. A sneaky trick to get around this is to block the person and then unblock them immediately. They will have to request to follow you again to see your tweets, but you are still free to view theirs. However, you probably won't be very popular if someone notices that you've done this and they may well decide to block you anyway!

Only users who you follow can send you direct messages on Twitter, so if you want to stop someone from messaging you privately, all you need to do is unfollow them - you don't have to block them.



WhatsApp owes much of its success to the ease with which

it lets you contact your friends and family. Unlike other messaging apps,



there's no need to send a friend request because simply having someone's number in your phone's Contacts app is all you need to start a chat with them. But what if vou've had the same phone number for years and

don't want old friends (or old flames!) to see what you're doing these days? Thankfully, there's an easy method to stop just anyone from viewing this information. Open the app's Settings menu, then tap Account, Privacy and you can choose who can view your 'Last seen', 'Profile photo' and 'Status'. By default, they're all set to Everyone, but you can change this to only your contacts or to nobody at all. If they can't see this information, people who you've not spoken to for years will have no way of knowing if the phone number still belongs to you.

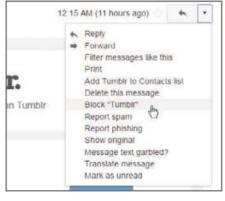
Alternatively, if you need to block a specific individual from getting in touch with you, simply find them on the app's Contacts screen, select the three-dot button and choose More, Block. You can use the same method to block unknown senders when you receive a message from someone who isn't in your Contacts list.

Gmail is normally pretty

Gmail

reliable at spotting spam messages, but if the same persistent and unwelcome senders keep getting past its filters, there are some simple ways to stop them in their tracks. If the messages are from a newsletter or mailing list that you signed up to, try opening one of the messages, then scroll to the bottom to use the 'unsubscribe' or 'change email preferences' links within the email. If these don't exist. Gmail often includes its own 'Unsubscribe' button next to the sender's email address at the top of the message. On the other hand, if the message is clearly spam, you can report

it as such without even opening the





email. To do this, select it from your Inbox and click the 'Report spam' button. If these methods fail, you can block a sender manually by opening an email, clicking its drop-down menu and selecting Block "sender" (where "sender" is the name of the person or business emailing you). Should you change your mind, you can unblock the sender in the same way.

Google also lets strangers email you via Google+ if they add you to one of their circles - they don't even need to know your email address. To prevent this from happening, log into Gmail, click the cog icon and select Settings. Scroll down to the 'Email via Google+' section and select 'No-one' from the drop-down 'Who can email you via your Google+ profile' menu.

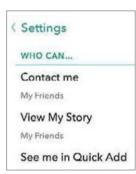
Snapchat

Preventing unwanted attention on Snapchat is quite

straightforward. First, tap the ghost icon at the top of the screen, then select the gear icon to open the app's Settings.

From this menu, make sure that 'Who can contact me' is set to 'My Friends' and not 'Everyone'. The same setting should also be

applied for



'Who can view my story', if you want to stop strangers seeing your past content. Now, when a user tries to send you a snap, you'll receive a notification, but you won't see the snap unless you add them to your Friends list first.

If you receive too many friend requests, you can disable 'See me in Quick Add' from the same menu, which stops you being suggested as a Quick Add to users with whom you share several mutual friends. You can also select Mobile Number from Settings and untick the option to 'Let others find me using my mobile number'.

To block a user who has tried to add you, tap 'Added Me' from the main menu, swipe left on their name and select Block.

VIDEO DOWNLOADER

Get iPlaver

What's so great about it?

Get iPlayer was created to let telly addicts download and keep BBC iPlayer shows for longer than 30 days, but support was abandoned in March 2010 when the Beeb blocked open-source tools from accessing its catch-up service. Fortunately for viewers, the project was continued by other developers, so this unofficial PVR (personal video recorder) still works perfectly for recording iPlayer content to watch for as long as you want. The latest maintenance update was in March this year, but there have been no significant changes to the software for six years.

What to watch out for:

Get iPlayer has a confusing commandline interface that was designed to work across Windows, Linux and OS X. For a friendlier view, launch the Web PRV Manager from the Start menu, then

either search for a programme to download or paste its web address from the iPlayer website. Click Record and the show will be saved in DRM-free MP4 format that you can watch in any media player.

PERSONAL FINANCE

Money Plus Sunset Deluxe bit.ly/money403

What's so great about it?

Microsoft officially discontinued Money, its popular personal-finance software, in June 2009, but there hadn't been a UK version since 2005. Even so, for people who used Money to view their account balances, create budgets and manage their spending, Microsoft's loss of interest in the program was both inconvenient and irritating.

However, fans of Money received some good news in 2010 when the company released Money Plus Sunset Deluxe (MPSD) - a free, cut-down version of the program with the same simple interface. This doesn't offer any online tools or support, but it lets you import and manually enter financial data; use scheduled transactions to ensure you pay your bills on time; create and track a budget; forecast your personal cash flow; and view and print reports of your income, expenses, savings and investments.

What to watch out for:

Money Plus Sunset Deluxe isn't compatible with data files created using old, non-US editions of Microsoft Money. You'll need to export these to Quicken (QIF) format to open them in MPSD. Also, be aware that MPSD will

overwrite any existing versions of Microsoft Money installed on your PC.

What's so great about it?

Now approaching its 23rd birthday, software veteran Total Commander (which was called Windows Commander until 2002) is widely acclaimed as one of the best file managers that ever existed. Its interface is showing its age, but it's packed with useful features including side-by-side windows for copying files and comparing folders; a speedy and sophisticated search function; a built-in compression tool that supports ZIP, RAR, TAR and many other formats (although some require plugins); an FTP client for uploading files to the internet; and much more.

Total Commander is the tool that Windows Explorer should have been, and it's compatible with all versions of the operating system, even providing a 16-bit download for ancient machines running Windows 3.1. There are also apps for Android and Windows Phone.

What to watch out for:

Total Commander is classified as shareware, which means you get a nag screen each time you open the program until you register it. Unlike other shareware, however, this is free to do, and even if you don't register, you can still use the software for free forever (albeit with a nag).

DISC BURNER

CDBurnerXP

What's so great about it?

Although CDBurnerXP's name suggests that it only works with Windows XP (it works with all other versions of Windows but was originally designed for XP when it was released 12 years ago), it's still one the best disc-burning tools around, and is much faster and easier to use than similar commercial software. As well as writing data discs (CD, DVD or Blu-ray), audio discs and ISO image files, it lets you create bootable discs, design and print covers, and split content across multiple CDs or DVDs.

CDBurnerXP is completely free to use, with no bundled junk, and is updated several times a year to add new features and fix bugs, although there hasn't been a 'full' release since version 4 in 2007.

What to watch out for:

Some users have reported problems when running CDBurnerXP in Windows 10, particularly the 64-bit version of the operating system. However, the developers seem happy to help, if you

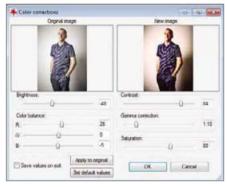

What's so great about it?

IrfanView celebrated its 20th anniversary in June and we still use it to take most of the screen grabs you see in each issue of Web User. Although it hasn't changed a great deal in recent years, it's updated at least once annually to introduce new options, fix bugs and add support for further image formats.

IrfanView's popularity and longevity can be attributed to its speed and simplicity, giving you a quick and easy way to view, edit, capture and convert images, without unnecessary frills. Although the program's range of effects and enhancement tools hale in comparison to 'proper' image editors, IrfanView is the perfect lightweight tool if you just want to lighten a photo, blur a confidential name or address, or crop surplus elements from a picture. There are plugins available if you need extra features.

What to watch out for:

The 'recommended' download link for the software on the IrfanView website takes you to CNET Download.com, which - as we highlighted in last issue's feature on safe download sites - is plagued by deceptive ads and bundled junk. Much as we love the software in this feature. some old programs should be avoided because of the security risks

involved. For example. it's essential for your browser to be completely up to date to stop hackers using vulnerabilities in its code to spread malware and steal your personal data. Likewise, old messaging tools such as MSN Messenger could leave you open to infection, while once-popular file-sharing clients such as LimeWire and Bearshare are a definite no-no. Relving on out-ofdate antivirus software is the worst thing you can do because the latest threats will go undetected and your PC will be rendered unsafe and potentially unusable.

.winamp.com) and its current owner, Radionomy, promises that Winamp will be "re-energised" very soon. True, the most recent version - v5.666 (bit.ly/ winamp403) feels very old-fashioned, with its widget-based interface, graphic equalizer and blocky controls, but as a lightweight way to enjoy your music collection, Winamp beats iTunes hands-down. For a bit of fun, try clicking the llama's bottom on the homepage for an audio surprise.

What to watch out for:

Winamp no longer tags audio files with track data from the Gracenote online database and it can't generate playlists automatically. Although the download is free of junk and malware, it's always risky to use a program that connects to the web if it hasn't been updated in some time - see the 'Use old software safely' box - so you may prefer to wait for the forthcoming relaunch. Or just use it to listen to music stored offline.

AOMEI Backupper Standard backs up your PC automatically and now offers additional scheduling options. Here's how to use it

e all know it's important to back up our PCs on a regular basis to protect important personal data in case of a malware attack or hard-drive failure. The trouble is, few of us actually bother to put a backup plan in place. Recent figures from a survey by Backblaze (bit.ly/backupsurvey403) show 25% of people back up their systems just once a year,

17% back them up even less frequently, and 24% never back them up at all.

AOMEI Backupper Standard is a free tool that's very easy to use. You can set it to back up your PC at a time and frequency that suits you, and this latest version gains some new scheduling options – so it can automatically run backups when you start up or shut down your PC.



Getting started with the program is very straightforward. Just click Create New Backup 1 in the main window. This opens the Backup tab 2 where you can choose the type of backup you want to run. You can open the Backup tab, or any of the other options on the left, at any time.

Backup hard disks to an image file

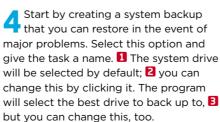


A System Backup backs up
Windows and creates an image of
the system partition. A Disk Backup backs up any drive to an image file.
You can also run a Partition Backup or a File Backup, which makes copies of your chosen files or folders - such as Photos, for example.



Scroll down to access the File Sync option. 1 This backs up folders using file synchronisation, rather than creating a disk image. You just select the source files and folders to back up, and a destination to store the copy. Any changes you make in the source folder are mirrored automatically in the destination.

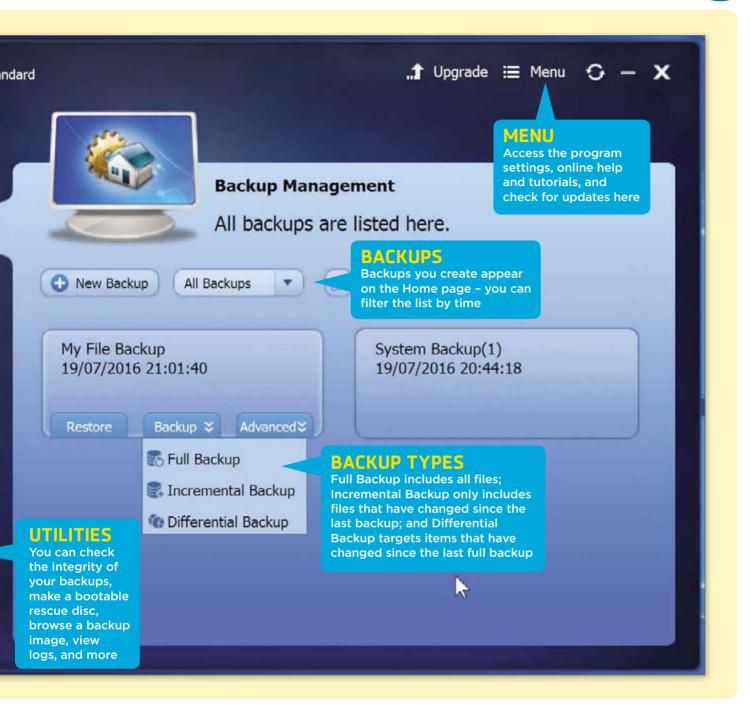

Click the Backup Options cog 1 to access the settings. You can add a comment to the backup, and enable encryption and email notifications. You can also manage the level of data compression and split backups into several smaller image files. Tick Schedule 2 to choose when backups should run.







The Schedule Settings screen lets you set the frequency, 11 date and time. You can also set Event Triggers, which run backups when you log on or off, or start or shut down your PC. Backups can be restricted to once a day. 2 The Advanced tab 3 lets you choose the type of backup to run.



As well as creating a drive backup, you can choose to clone 11 your hard drive, **2** system **3** or partition. **4** This will be an exact copy that you can write to a new or formatted drive. You need to share a message about the software via social media in order to unlock System Clone.



) If you experience problems with your PC, you can load a backup. Click Restore 11 and choose the backup you want to use. Click Path 2 and navigate to the saved image file, then click Next to start the process. If it's a system image, you'll be asked if you want to carry out a full system restore.

BullGuard also offers cloud backups for your contacts, calendar and messages, but you need to pay an annual subscription to back up photos and videos.



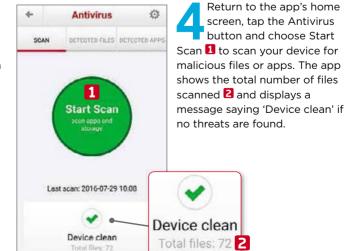




To use any of these features (or the app's 'scream' function) visit msm.bullguard.com in your browser and log in using your BullGuard credentials. 🚺 Note that once Antitheft has been activated, you'll need to disable the app's Device Administrator permissions (via Settings, Security, Device Administrators) if you want to uninstall BullGuard.



From the Antitheft screen, you can turn on the option to send commands from other phones to your missing phone via SMS. 11 Tap the switch to activate this feature 2 and you'll be asked to create a PIN. Next, a page loads showing you how to create these commands using your PIN.

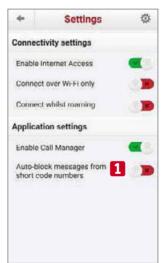

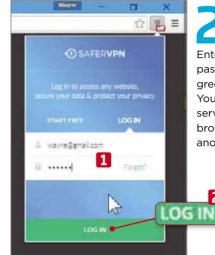

When you install the add-on in Chrome, a button 1 is added to the top-right corner of the browser. Click this to open the SaferVPN homepage, then click the Start Free link. 2 In the website that opens, sign up for a free



Verify your email address, then click the browser button again. Enter your username and password, 1 then click the green Log In button. 2 You'll be signed into the service and can begin browsing the web anonymously.



The VPN is initially disconnected. To start using it, switch the button to On. 1 Your traffic will be routed through SaferVPN's servers, so you appear to be browsing from a different location. In this case, we are based in France. A map and flag 2 show the current location.



If you want to change to another location – to access websites restricted to a particular country, such as the US – click the arrow next to the country name, 1 and choose a different option. As well as France, SaferVPN offers Germany, Russia and USA East Coast.



Once you've switched locations, the flag and map marker will change accordingly. You can see how much of your free traffic data is remaining, 1 and how long until the data renews. 2 Click Get Unlimited Data if you want to upgrade to the paid-for service.

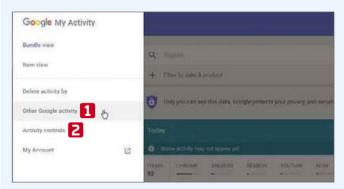
The default 'Bundle view' shows items associated with the same product condensed into a single window. 1 Click the number of additional items 2 to show them all or click the three-dot button, 3 then Delete 4 to delete the group. Once expanded, you can delete items individually.



To delete all your recorded activity for the entire day, select its three-dot button 1 and click Delete. You can use the search box 2 to find older, specific entries or click the plus button 3 to filter the results by product or date.

Location History activity is not shown on the My Activity page, but you can view and manage this data by selecting 'Other Google activity' 11 from the menu, then selecting Visit Timeline. To choose what activity is stored by Google, click 'Activity controls' 2 in the main menu.



From this page, you can stop Google saving Web & App Activity, 1 Location History, Device Information, Voice & Audio Activity, YouTube Search History and YouTube Watch History. Any activity tracking you disable 2 produces a notification saying how this might affect specific services.

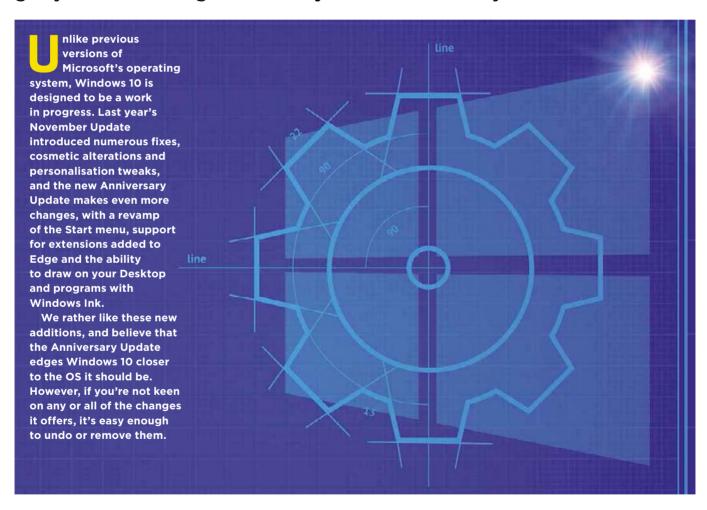

Take control of Windows 10 Anniversary Update

If you don't like the changes in the latest Windows update, you can get your old settings back. **Wayne Williams** tells you how



Customise the improved Start menu

The Anniversary Update makes a fundamental change to the Start menu. The All Apps list is now permanently on display and a small sidebar provides direct links to Power, File Explorer and Settings. You can customise this sidebar through the Settings screen: go to Start, Settings, Personalisation, then Start. Scroll down to the bottom and click

'Choose which folders appear on Start'.
You can add Documents, Downloads,
Music, Pictures, Videos, HomeGroup,
Network and Personal folders.

You can make other changes in the Settings menu, too, such as showing more or fewer tiles, and your most used and recently added apps. You can even replace the Start menu with Windows 8's Start screen, if you're one of those rare people who miss it.



The Settings app can make all sorts of changes to the Start menu, including adjusting most of the changes made during the update

The Anniversary Update also displays more adverts - or 'app suggestions', as Microsoft prefers to call them - in the Start menu, but you can change this by flicking the 'Occasionally show suggestions in Start' option to Off.

Swap the Start menu for a different one

If you don't like having tiles on your Start menu at all. vou can get a different one by using Classic Shell (www.classicshell .net). This entirely replaces the default Start menu and offers a choice of three different menu styles - Classic, Two Columns and Windows 7 - all of which can be customised to suit your preferences. It offers lots of extra options, too, such as transparency settings for skins, the ability to uninstall Windows Store apps directly from the menu, a dedicated shutdown button and an enhanced Windows Search function. It can also replace the default File Explorer with a different version.



Classic Shell is a great tool for getting the Start menu exactly how you want it

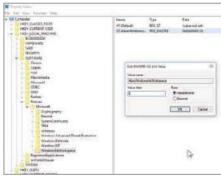


The Windows Ink menu shows all the drawing options available in the update

Enable or disable Windows Ink

Windows Ink lets you scribble on your Desktop and browser, and is particularly useful if you have a Windows tablet or a touchscreen PC. If you have a connected pen (stylus), then Windows Ink will appear automatically. If you don't, you can open it by right-clicking the taskbar and selecting 'Show Windows Ink Workspace button'. This adds a Windows Ink button to the notification area of the taskbar, and clicking this displays the available options, such as Sticky Notes, Sketchpad, and 'Screen sketch'. You can hide the button by right-clicking it and unticking its option in the taskbar menu.

If you don't want Windows Ink, you can disable it via the Group Policy Editor (see our Mini Workshop, below) or by using a registry tweak.



Turn Windows Ink off completely from the Registry Editor

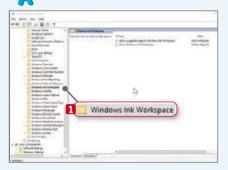
For the latter, click Start, type regedit and press enter. Navigate to: HKEY LOCAL MACHINE\SOFTWARE\ Policies\Microsoft\

Right-click 'Microsoft' and select New, Key. Call this WindowsInkWorkspace. Select it and, in the right-hand pane, right-click and select New, then DWORD (32-bit) Value. Give this the name AllowWindowsInkWorkspace. Exit Regedit and log off. When you log back in, the icon will be gone and right-clicking the taskbar will show the menu entry greyed out.

Cortana on the lock screen

Cortana has been made more useful in the Anniversary Update and, provided the digital assistant is active and you have the lock-screen image set to picture or slideshow, she'll be ready to use even before you log in. If you don't want this, you can remove Cortana from the lock screen. Open Cortana and click the menu button in the top-left corner. Select Settings and flick the switch that says 'Use Cortana even when my device is locked' to Off.

MINI WORKSHOP | Disable Windows Ink Workspace using the Group Policy Editor



The Group Policy Editor is available in most versions of Windows 10, including Pro, but not in Home. Click Start and type gpe. Press Enter to open the 'Edit group policy' app. In the left-hand pane, navigate to Computer Configuration, Administrative Templates, Windows Components, Windows Ink Workspace. 11

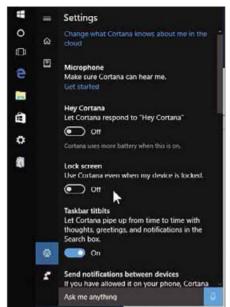

Action Centre changes

The action centre has been updated to offer notifications for more apps. Alerts are now grouped by source, rather than chronologically. This makes it easier to dismiss all notifications from a particular app, such as Skype. We think the changes to the Action centre are for the better, but they can also be customised.

Go to Settings, System, 'Notifications & actions'. Here, you can choose which apps you want to see notifications from. Clicking an app opens its settings screen and lets you set a priority for it. Set an app to 'Top' and notifications from it will

appear at the top of the Action screen. You can also set the number of notifications you want displayed in the Action Centre

The 'Notifications & actions' settings screen also lets you choose which Quick Actions appear in the Action Centre, and whether or not alerts are displayed on the lock screen. If you have no use for the Action Centre, you can disable it. To do this, click Start, type regedit and press Enter to launch the Registry Editor. Navigate to:

Right-click in the right-hand pane and select New > DWORD (32-bit) Value, Call it DisableNotificationCenter Double-click it and change the Value data to 1. Click OK and exit the Registry Editor. Restart your PC and you'll see that the Action Center has been removed from the taskbar.

Remove unwanted apps

Windows 10 Anniversary Update comes with lots of apps you may have no use for, such as Candy Crush Soda Saga, Get Office, Groove Music, 3D Builder and Messaging. To remove the ones you don't want, go to Start, Settings, System and select 'Apps & features'. Select an app you want to get rid of and click the Uninstall button for it.



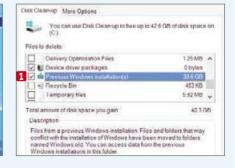
MINI WORKSHOP | Reclaim space wasted by the Anniversary Update



The Anniversary Update is a sizeable download and it takes up a lot of space on the hard drive. Once it's installed, you can clean up after it and regain a lot of space. Click Start and type Disk Cleanup. Launch the Disk Clean-up app, then make sure your main hard drive is selected 11 and click OK.



The app will calculate how much space can be regained by removing junk files, emptying the Recycle Bin and so on. [1] Ignore this for now and click 'Clean up system files'. 2 Select your system drive again and click the OK button. Disk Cleanup will recalculate your space savings but include 'Previous Windows installation(s)'.



Tick that entry 🚺 and the one for **Temporary Windows installation** files, then click OK. The app will go to work and remove these backed-up files to free up hard-drive space. Be aware, though, that doing this will remove the option to roll back your PC to a previous installation.

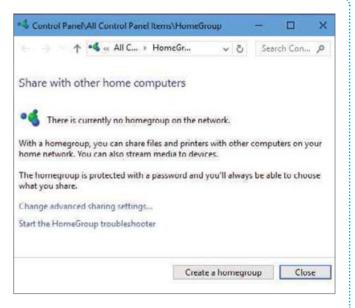
TOP TIPS FOR NETWORKED PCs

Create a HomeGroup

omputers on the same network can share files, folders, printers, music, photos and videos.

Networking PCs can be quite complicated, so HomeGroup was introduced with Windows 7 to make it easier to set up the sharing options. Open the Control Panel and click HomeGroup. Click the 'Create a HomeGroup' button and you are asked what you want to share, such as documents or media files. It's up to you what you share and HomeGroups are password protected, so you can choose who has access. Afterwards, you'll see the password displayed on your screen. When someone on another PC opens HomeGroup in the Control Panel, they will be able to join the HomeGroup if you give them the password. This makes it easy to share files between your PCs.

Open HomeGroup in the Control Panel and create a group for your networked PCs



Access shared resources

Once you have created or joined a HomeGroup, you can explore and use the shared content of the other computers. Open Explorer and, in the left-hand panel, expand HomeGroup and select the HomeGroup below. On the right, in the main part of the Explorer window, you'll find the shared items, such as Music, Pictures, Videos, Camera Roll and whatever else has been shared. Each computer has its own section because different PCs may share different things.

The shared items are just like the folders on your PC, so you can open the Pictures folder and double-click photos to view or edit them; open the Music folder and double-click a music file to play it; and so on. The computer that

holds the files has to be turned on for you to access its contents.

Modify your shares

When setting up a HomeGroup, you choose what you want to share. If you decide you no longer want to share the files on your computer, return to HomeGroup in the Control Panel, which

displays the libraries and devices you are sharing. There is a link near the bottom which lets you leave the HomeGroup and stop sharing. However, this also prevents you from accessing the shared items on the network's other computers.

If you still want to access the other devices in the HomeGroup, just

change the shared items instead. Click 'Change what you're sharing with the HomeGroup' to see the Pictures, Videos, Music, Documents, and Printers. You can now set the items you want to share.

Share with everyone

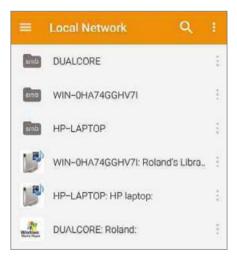
It is possible for TVs, games consoles, tablets and phones to access shared items such as music, photos and movies. Whether this works or not depends

on the device, but it's worth trying.

Open HomeGroup in the Control Panel and click the link 'Allow all devices on this network such as TVs and game consoles to play my shared content'. You'll be asked to name your media library to enable it.

If you have an Android phone or tablet, download the VLC app from the Google Play Store. Open it, tap the menu button in the top-left corner and select Network. The computers on your network are listed along with the PC's shared media library. Press it, then press an item - Music, for example - and browse the contents. Press a music file to play it on your Android phone or tablet. This is a useful way to turn a PC into a media server that everyone can access.

Allowing all devices on your network means sharing without passwords or logging in, so don't put anything in the shared folders that you don't want other people to access.

Wired vs wireless

A computer can connect to your router using wireless networking or via an Ethernet cable. Most routers have two Ethernet sockets on them and some have four. The same features will be available whether you use an Ethernet cable or a wireless connection, but the latter will be slower and less reliable. Connecting both computers to the router using Ethernet usually results in the fastest connection. If the router supports Gigabit Ethernet, then the connection is super fast. This is the best option if you are transferring or working with large files such as videos, or if you are transferring a lot of files from one computer to another.

If you plug an Ethernet cable into your PC, it will automatically use it in preference to Wi-Fi and you don't have to configure it in any way. It just works.

TAKE IT TO THE NEXT LEVEL

More advanced tips for when you're feeling brave

Traditional networking

HomeGroup is a convenient way to share files with other computers, but you can connect to other computers without it. Networked computers appear in the Network section of the left-hand panel in Explorer. When you select and access a computer, you are asked for a username and password. Enter the credentials you would use to log in to that computer. This is useful when sharing documents and media files with old computers running Windows XP, for example, which doesn't have HomeGroup networking.

Discover network devices

Every device on a network has a unique IP address. It can sometimes be helpful to know a device's IP so you can check it is working and can be seen on the network. Wireless Network Watcher (search for it at www.nirsoft.net) scans your network for devices and lists their names and IP addresses.

If you can't connect to a computer or printer, use Wireless Network Watcher to check that it can be seen on your network. It can also be used to check whether someone else is using your network. Network information is sometimes complicated but you can usually work out what something is between the Device name and Network Adapter Company columns.

For another way to view the computers on a network, press Windows+R, type cmd and press Enter to open a command prompt window. Type net view and press Enter to see all the computers listed.

Ping devices

Is a computer or device on the network working? Is it powered up?

Has it crashed and become unresponsive? Ping can answer all these questions. It sends messages to the computer or device and listens for a response. If nothing comes back, then the computer or device is faulty or powered off. Turn it on or restart it.

Press Windows+R, type cmd and press Enter to open a command prompt window. Type ping, then the IP address of the computer or device, then press Enter. If you don't know what the IP address is, use Wireless Network Watcher to find out.

Remote shutdown

Depending on how your PC is configured, it may be possible to shut down or restart other computers on your network. So, for example, you could shut down your child's computer if they have left it on at night.

To set up the other computer, press Windows+R, type services.msc and press Enter. Double-click Remote Registry and set the Startup type to Automatic, then click Apply and Start. Close the window, then close the services window. Open Windows Firewall in the Control Panel and click 'Allow an app or feature through Windows Firewall'. Click 'Change settings', then tick 'Remote shutdown' and 'Windows Management Instrumentation'.

You can now turn off the remote PC by pressing Windows+R and typing cmd. Type shutdown -i and press Enter, Click the Add button and type in the remote computer's name as it appears in Explorer. Select either Shutdown or Restart, then click OK.

Remote Shutdown (lizardsystems .com) is a free tool that makes this task easier. Run the software and add the computers on your network.

> Select a computer, then select Shutdown or Restart and click Execute. This saves you having to fiddle with the command line.

Remote Shutdown doesn't always work - it depends on your PC and network configuration.

Extend the reach of a HomePlug network

Our HomePlug system works well in some rooms but not in the new extension, which is powered by a secondary fuse box fed from the main one. As far as I'm aware, each fuse box is the simple type, with breakers fed from a common busbar. Why is it not working and can you suggest a fix?

Your home's electrical wiring forms a loop that passes from socket to socket, which HomePlugs use to create a network. Any sockets not in the loop, such as those in your

extension, can't be included. If they could, you would risk sharing your network with other homes, particularly if you live in a flat. Try using a HomePlug Wi-Fi extender in the room nearest the extension to provide internet access to that area

Remove discussion forum

I regularly contributed to the ABC news discussion (abcnews.go.com) until I was suddenly informed that I was blocked, but I haven't been able to find out why. I tried using CyberGhost (www .cyberghostvpn.com) and changing my email address, but I'm blocked from my PC every time. Changing my email and IP addresses doesn't work, either, My IP is in Ireland, and CyberGhost used a new IP in Ireland, which may be relevant.

There are several ways to block someone from discussion forums and website comments. If you have to log in to comment, your account may be blocked, in which case you need to create a new account with a new username, password and email address.

If your IP address is blocked, use a different one. CyberGhost provides this service and it doesn't matter that the location is still in Ireland because the whole country won't be blocked just one IP address.

It may be a cookie setting that's blocking you. Websites store cookies when you visit and, when you return, they read the cookie to see when you last visited, get account information, apply settings and so on. Enable CyberGhost, open a Private Browsing or Incognito window, log in with a new account and see if you can comment.

This procedure varies according to the web browser you use. To access cookies in Chrome, go to the menu, Settings, then 'Show advanced settings'. Click 'Content settings' in the Privacy section, then click 'All cookies and site data' in the Cookies section. Use the search box to search for a website and delete its cookies by moving the mouse over them and clicking the cross icon that appears.

Improve your backups

In a previous issue of Web User, you provided excellent instructions for backing up everything in Windows 10 to a hard drive. I bought a WD My Passport portable hard drive and was surprised at how easy the process was. I used the default setting of hourly checks.

However, Windows 10 backup seems to leave out many files, apparently at random, and never backs them up, even after several weeks. Last Friday,

for example. I saved two PDF files to the same location in my regular documents folder, but the backup only found one of them. Most files are backed up, but the ones it misses are of all different types (Word, PowerPoint, PDF). A backup is of limited use if it's only 90% reliable. What might be causing this?

Corruption or other file problems can interfere with File History backup in Windows 10. Go to Start, 'All apps', Windows System, then right-click Command Prompt and select More, 'Run as administrator'. Type sfc /scannow to check that your Windows files are okay. When it has finished, type chkdsk c: /f and press Y in reply to the question. Type exit and restart Windows to check that the drive is okay.

Deleting your old backups and resetting File History may solve the problem. Right-click Start and select Control Panel. In 'Small icons' view, click File History, then 'Turn off' and Apply. Right-click Start and select System, then click 'System protection'. Select the C: drive, click the Configure button, then 'Disable system protection'. Delete the backups on the external hard drive.

Go to Start, All apps, Windows Administrative Tools, Disk Clean-up. Scan the hard drive, select all the items and click OK to clear out the junk. Restart Windows and turn File History and System Protection back on. A fresh backup will be created.

If you're still having problems with File History backups, turn it off and use a free backup tool such as AOMEI Backupper Standard (www.backup-

utility.com - you'll find a Workshop on using its newest tools on page 52 or EaseUS Todo Backup (www.easeus .com). Both tools, like File History, can create file backups. They also let you make full backups with a bootable CD, in case your hard drive fails completely.

Convert images in Windows 10

My Canon printer's useless over-thetop software only saves in PDF, so I use Paint with my printer because it lets me save scans as JPEGs and other files. However, since upgrading to Windows 10, I can no longer use Paint, which apparently won't work on the new operating system.

The scanner tool in Windows 10 doesn't work so I tried to download Fresh Paint (bit.ly/paint403), but there was an error. To make matters worse. to get Fresh Paint from the Microsoft Store, I set up a new Microsoft account with a password, and this has reset how I sign into Windows, which I didn't want.

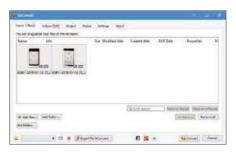
Meanwhile, I have downloaded a file converter, which appears to work. I've seen free online image converters but I'm not keen on sending my files to anyone online who I don't know. I want a program that can save to JPEG at source or convert from PDF. I don't even mind paying a small amount.

Paint works fine in Windows 10, and there shouldn't be any problem with Fresh Paint, so it sounds as if you may have some bigger issues with Windows. Right-click the Windows menu and choose 'Command Prompt (Admin)'. Type sfc /scannow to check that your Windows files are OK

Most PDF-to-JPG converters are online tools but it's understandable that you don't want to upload your PDFs. There are a few tools you can download, though, including PDF Conversion Suite, which is available in the Windows 10 Store. This free app converts PDFs to TIF files, but TIFs are widely supported by image editors and converters, so you can easily open your files in one of those and save them as JPG images.

Pixillion Image Converter Software (bit.ly/nch403) is even better, because it lets you load several PDF files, select any image format and convert the lot with one click. The Premium Edition costs £19.22, but the Standard Edition converts one file at a time for £13.05.



XnConvert is a handy free tool that converts one file format to another

The best option, however, is XnConvert (www.xnview.com). This free tool converts between different file formats, including PDF and JPEG. You can load several PDFs on the Input tab and choose which file format to convert them to on the Output tab. The Actions tab lets you apply filters, resize, crop and apply other effects. It's a useful image-conversion tool.

Uninstall unsafe software

Having read Issue 400's warnings about insecure software, I duly removed Adobe Flash and Java. I now find that although Chrome and Internet Explorer are fine, Opera no longer plays the live stream from a website I visit. All I get is a black rectangle with the message: "Problem loading video. (URL_OF_UNKNOWN_OR_ UNSUPPORTED-MIME-TYPE)."

I have emailed the website but haven't heard back yet. Is the problem that I no

longer have Flash installed? Does Opera have a plugin that gets round this?

I also deleted some Nero software. because it seems to have Java associations. I see that Apache OpenOffice seems to rely on Java, too, although I'm not sure how. Opera on my Android Samsung J5 mobile still plays this particular stream without difficulty. Are there security problems with using Flash and Java on mobile devices?

Some websites and software use Adobe Flash and Java, so if you don't have them installed, those websites won't work - either partially or completely. You have to choose between security and functionality. If you want to use websites and software that require Flash and Java. you'll need to have them installed

Some browsers, such as Chrome and Internet Explorer, have Flash built in. so they won't have any trouble playing Flash videos, but other browsers rely on external services. Opera doesn't have Flash and relies on you installing the plugin. If you remove it, Opera can't play the streaming video.

There are no mobile versions of Java, and Flash for Android was discontinued several years ago. If these sites work in Opera on your mobile device, it's probably because the site is sending a different, mobile-friendly page when it detects it's being viewed on a phone.

Cancel pending print jobs

I was trying to print a large file from my HP Pavilion laptop to an HP Envy Printer, but I decided to cancel it by pressing

Cancel Printing on the printer. Now, every time I switch it on, it starts printing again. I'm sure I can cancel it using my laptop but I don't know how.

Printers take several minutes to print a long document or photo. For this reason, print jobs are stored in a queue. There is one on the printer and one on the computer. You can stop the current print job by taking the printer offline or pressing the Cancel button, but it might start

printing again if there is another job in the queue. To stop the printer, switch it off and unplug it from the mains.

There may also be a queue of print jobs on the PC, so look for the printer queue icon in the notification area of the taskbar. Right-click it and select the printer to open a window listing anything that's waiting to be printed. Right-click each document and select Cancel to delete it. Deleting a print iob takes several seconds, so wait until it has finished. Switch the printer back on when the queue is clear.

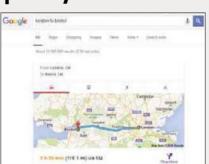

Get directions more quickly

In the past, when I needed directions in Google Maps, I would visit maps .google.com, enter the destination. press Enter, click the directions button and then type in my starting point. I've since discovered a much quicker way of doing the same thing, which can be done from any web page in Chrome. Simply type START to END into the search bar, where START is your starting location and END is the end location. Press Enter, and Google shows a journey summary and lets you choose from four different methods of travel including car, bicycle, walking and public transport. For full step-bystep instructions, rather than a simple

Share direct links from **Google Drive**

When you share a link in Google Drive, your recipient needs to visit the URL and click a Download button to save a copy of the file. There's no option to share direct download links, but you can fix this by visiting Direct Link Creator (directlink.booogle.net) and granting the website access to your Google Drive. When you pick a file from the top dialogue box, simply click 'Share All and Get Direct Links' and it will generate direct URLs for all the files vou selected.

Direct download links have all kinds of advantages, particularly if you want to

Double-up Chrome's search engines

You can set up the Chrome browser to have two search engines available at the same time, so you can easily switch between them.

To do this, go to the menu in Chrome and click Settings. In the 'On start-up' section, select 'Open a specific page or set of pages' and click the 'Set pages' link. Type https://www.google .co.uk/ to make Google your homepage. Back in the Settings menu, Go to the Search section and use the drop-down menu to select Bing as the search engine for the omnibox.

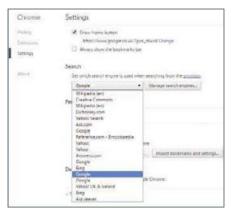
Now, when you launch the Chrome browser, it displays the Google homepage with a box you can use to search Google. But if you type your search query into the URL box at the top,



it will use Bing to search instead. Two search engines on one page!

Keep OneNote organised

A good tip for keeping it organised is to sort your notes into a logical order, rather than the order in which you saved them. Contactless payments with Barclays app

I was excited about trying Android Pay after it recently launched in the UK. Unfortunately, Barclays was not one of the participating banks, so I was unable to use it. However, when I recently opened the Barclays Mobile Banking app, I discovered I could still use my Samsung Galaxy S6 to make contactless payments and it was incredibly quick and simple to set up.

After launching the Barclays app and logging in, select Contactless Payments from the side menu, then choose the card you want to use for contactless payments. You'll be prompted to set Barclays as your default 'Tap and Pay' app. Once you've completed this process, a notification is constantly displayed on your lock screen so you can make contactless payments whenever

you like by simply holding your device over a compatible reader, both in shops and on London transport. If you don't like having the notification displayed on your lock screen, you can hide it by opening your application manager and checking the option to 'Hide on lock screen' for Barclays Mobile Banking.

To use the feature, you'll need a smartphone with NFC (near-field communication) and a new enough version of Android. I've already found it really useful and bought a coffee the day after setting it up when I briefly left the house without my wallet.

If you're worried about security, you can set the app to always ask for a PIN, even on payments under £30. Any payments of more than £30 require you to enter your PIN.

There's no need to set up an account but doing so lets you use Challenge Mode to take on your friends and family. Just be careful when visiting the site that you spell it correctly, because other variations take you to sites that you might not want to visit.

Block programs from using your webcam

FratPark recently wrote a helpful tip about disabling your laptop's built-in webcam via Device Manager. However, if you still need to use your webcam sometimes, you can disable it for specific applications by using Kaspersky Antivirus (www.kaspersky.co.uk). Once you've

Use advanced clipboard tools

I've been using Google Docs (docs .google.com) for a long time, but I've only just discovered that it has multiple clipboards, so you can copy as many things as you want. It's really useful when writing and editing.

Instead of using the mouse or keyboard to copy text, you use the Edit menu by clicking Edit, 'Web clipboard' and 'Copy selection to web clipboard'. You can copy several items without having to save them and, when you want to paste one of them, you just select it in the 'Web clipboard' menu. It's not quite as convenient as using Ctrl+C and Ctrl+V to copy and paste, but you can use both the normal clipboard and web clipboard at the same time, whichever is best.

Can I use one extra-secure password for all websites?

For the past 20 years, my passwords have been based on family birthdays, car registrations and holiday destinations, among other things. The problem with this is that I've now got a very long list and I have to keep it updated. It was only when I was required to create a password for an insurance site that needed to include at least two capitals, a number and three special characters, that I wondered if I could create a single extra-secure password of 20 or 30 characters, keep it on a USB stick and use it for every site I visit in future?

Using one very secure password for all sites is one of the worst things you could do, because anyone who discovered it would have access to all your accounts. If you only want to remember one, strong master password, the best idea is to use a password manager such as Dashlane (www .dashlane.com), which stores all your separate passwords in an encrypted vault. The program automatically generates secure passwords for any new accounts and it auto-fills them for you when you next need to log in.

If you prefer to store your passwords on a USB, be sure to use a program that encrypts them, such as KeePass (keepass .info). Because USB sticks can fail at any time, make sure you have more than one copy of your password database.

CCleaner (www.piriform.com/ ccleaner) is very popular with Web User readers, so if you already have it installed and would prefer not to download another program, why not try its built-in duplicate finder?

To do this, run the program and select Tools, then Duplicate Finder. Leave its default settings as they are, select the drive or drives you want to scan and click Search. This shows all manner of duplicate files (not just images) but be careful not to delete anything that you don't recognise, because some duplicates are necessary. CCleaner only really gives you

a quick summary of your duplicates and doesn't have the broad range of tools available in dedicated duplicate finders. If you want something more sophisticated, try Duplicate Cleaner (bit.ly/duplicateclean403), Auslogics Duplicate File Finder (bit.ly/ duplicatefind403) or Free Duplicate File Finder (www.ashisoft.com).

Also, if you still use Picasa, you could try its built-in duplicate finder by clicking Tools, Experimental and Show Duplicate Files.

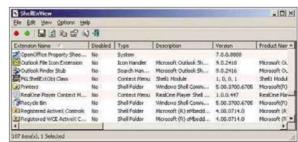

The suggestions on a thread at TenForums (bit.ly/wten403) should help you solve this problem. It's often

caused by a problematic context menu, so try downloading ShellExView (search for it at www .nirsoft.net) and disable all your context menus, then re-enable them, one-by-one. Before that, try opening Reliability History (type View reliability history into the Start

menu and click the top result), and look for specific clues. If you recently upgraded to Windows 10, it's worth reinstalling applications, even if they have apparently transferred over properly from the previous Windows version. Prioritise any that have right-click menu additions. Finally, you could try installing a different file manager such as XYplorerFree (bit.ly/ xy403). It's a vast improvement on Windows 10 Explorer and you can use them both together on the same PC.

Contactless payment is actually more hassle than cash or cards, says Barry Collins

The pointlessness of paying by phone

The Catch 22 is that if

your phone battery is dead,

so is your wallet

elcome to the cashless society, good old e-Britain. where you can wander down to the corner shop to get yourself a pint of milk and a loaf of bread armed with nothing more than your mobile phone. No need for those awkward bits of paper with portraits of Her Majesty on the back or your Flexible Friend - we're all contactless now. At least, that's what the idiots behind these dreadful e-payments systems would have vou believe.

I've tried several of these electronic payment systems over the past year and they all have one thing in common: they're a damned sight less convenient than the cash and credit cards they purport to replace.

My experiments started with Barclays' bPay, the b standing for "bleeding useless". This bPay comes in various guises: there's a sticker you can attach to the back of your smartphone, a keyring fob and even a wristband, for those who prefer the 'just got back from Glastonbury' look. Each of these has a little chip inside that allows you to make contactless payments, in the same way

you do when you slap your bank card on the payment terminal.

However, you can't just register your bank details

with bPay and trundle down to Tesco. Oh, no. First you have to register all these devices with the bPay app and then top up each of them individually with credit from your bank account, a bit like a pre-payment gas meter. If you run out of credit, your sticker/key fob/ wristband won't work, meaning you constantly have to check how much money you've got left on each of your

devices before you use them, or face the ignominy of explaining to Gladys behind the till why your wrist has been declined

Android Pay, Google's equivalent to Apple Pay, which lets you pay for goods by touching your smartphone on the payment pad, is marginally better.

> Once again, you register your bank details with the system, but instead of having to top up your phone with credit, it simply

deducts the precise amount from your bank account, which is much cleaner. The bad news is that Android Pay only works with certain banks - customers of Santander, Barclays and other big name banks are currently excluded.

It's not only certain banks it takes exception to, either, but certain smartphones. Your phone needs a Near Field Communications (NFC) chip to

make the contactless bit work. But leaving NFC switched on to make contactless payments drains the battery on your phone even more quickly than normal, the Catch 22 being that if your phone battery is dead, so is your wallet. So you've either got to fiddle around with NFC settings every time you make a payment, prompting plenty of tutting from the queue of impatient punters behind you, or take your bank cards and cash as backup.

But you're going to have to take cards or cash anyway, because the contactless payment limit is fixed at £30 and many shops - including my local Tesco - still don't accept contactless payments of any kind at all.

Alternatively, you could ignore all of these ridiculous payment systems and pay for everything, in any shop, using that slim piece of plastic you've been carrying in your wallet or purse for the past 30 years. But that will never catch on.



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
