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
## What's New Online

### Browse and keep historical images

hen a major public library releases huge numbers of maps, posters, ancient texts, drawings and manuscripts online, it's always a cause for celebration, and the New York Public Library (NYPL) has done just that, gifting the internet more than 180,000 high-resolution images and allowing them to be used without restriction.

You can search through these and 500,000 more digitised items in the collection using keywords, or scroll down and view the recently added images and collections. But you may find it easier to go to the lovely range of public domain picks where you can see images of a changing New York or view the Renaissance and Medieval Manuscripts collection.

Each image comes with details of the artist and the date created, and can be downloaded in various sizes. Check out the interesting ways the NYPL Labs team has experimented with the content, too. One amazing



visualisation lets you browse by century, genre, collection or colour and is well worth

playing around with.

If you keep an eye on the blog at bit .ly/nypl389, you can discover more about the fascinating stories behind certain collections. This is also the place where new projects will be announced: the library is looking for

people to think up new ways of presenting the public-domain materials as games and interactive content, so there should be exciting things ahead. Just don't lose track of the time when you visit the site: with this little lot you could be sitting in hushed silence for hours.

Behind The Lyrics is limited to Hip Hop and Hits playlists at the moment but should expand its repertoire soon.

#### Test your text for errors using Al

Numerous reports over the past few years have indicated that people are reading more than ever, but that doesn't necessarily mean our grammar is benefiting, which is why Microsoft Word, Google Docs and Grammarly (grammarly .com) regularly pick up our mistakes. They're not perfect

themselves, though, and often fail to understand context.

That's where Deep Grammar comes in. Using deep learning. and allowing you



to adjust the sensitivity, the site examines

text to decide how likely it is that it was written as intended, and then tries to generate a more likely text for the user. It's not always accurate, it can be slow and it only examines the first sentence or two but then it is still a prototype. ## Don't panic: your boss can't read your email

#### What happened?

A Romanian man took legal action against his former employer for reading his private instant messages, but lost his case. This caused widespread confusion and media hysteria regarding what the ruling means for the rest of us and our privacy at work.

Bogdan Barbulescu brought the case to the European Court of Human Rights, complaining that his privacy had been breached when his employer read his personal messages on a Yahoo Messenger account. His employer had looked at the messenger logs to determine whether Barbulescu had been communicating with his family while at work and, finding that he had, fired him. The court found in the company's favour, saving that it hadn't looked at other data on his work computer, and that the Yahoo account had been specifically set up for work.

Following the ruling, headlines in the UK, from BBC News to the Daily Mail, claimed that private messages could now legally be read by your employer. Union bosses insisted that this shouldn't be seen as a "green light" to snoop on staff, and the head of the Institute of Directors, Simon Walker, said staff shouldn't be subject to "Stasi-style surveillance" at work.

However, it appears that the news was misreported and the European Court of Human Rights has subsequently accused the media of "misinformation".



Even the BBC misreported the effects of the EU ruling on private messages at work



While it didn't clarify its complaint exactly, the court stressed that bosses don't have the right to snoop on their employees' private messages - merely that the ruling applied to a specific case and that Barbulescu's rights hadn't been infringed in this instance.

#### How will it affect you?

In short, you have the right to talk to your family from work unless you've agreed to a policy that says otherwise, which Barbulescu had done. If you use your employer-supplied email address on your work laptop, you can't assume it's private, but if you send messages from your own phone or via a webmail service, you have a right to privacy.

Of course, the lines between these two situations can be vague, especially as many of us take our own laptops to work and use downtime in the office to chat to our family and friends or browse the latest posts on Facebook. That said, the court's outrage over the British headlines certainly suggests it doesn't see the law or the ruling as a green light for surveillance at work. Unless your company has a specific policy against it, logging into your Gmail account on your work computer to send a quick message is unlikely to get you into trouble. If you're concerned, check your company's HR policies and ask your boss for clarification.

#### What do we think?

Simply put, most employers don't mind their workers checking their emails during office hours, and it's unreasonable to ban us from doing a spot of online banking, placing a quick grocery order or sending a personal message while we're sitting at our desks. However, there's good reason why some companies need to impose more of a lockdown, especially when sensitive data is involved - you can't have WhatsApp installed on a work device if an information leak would be damaging to the company. But for the rest of us working in less sensitive roles, there's no reason not to let staff take a few moments to deal with personal matters.

It's not as if this use of office technology is something new: desk phones have always been used for personal calls, and that didn't cause the economy to collapse from lower productivity. We can't be expected to turn off our personal selves for eight hours a day and, indeed, few businesses expect that.

With that in mind, we'd like to see HR policies that not only specify what behaviour will get staff in trouble, but outline permissions for dealing with minor personal matters during office hours. If the law is this confusing, we need a clearer idea of our rights.

## Netflix cracks down on proxy streaming

#### What happened?

Netflix has pledged to stop viewers using proxy tools and virtual private networks (VPNs) to bypass regional restrictions. The video-streaming service operates in 130 countries but, because of licensing agreements, it doesn't offer the same range of movies and TV series in every nation - Australians have access to only 10% of the selection available to Americans, for example. If content you want to see isn't available on your local Netflix, it's easy to use a proxy or VPN to fool the system into believing you are accessing it from the host region.

Netflix says its ultimate aim is to offer the same content everywhere, but claims that this will take time. Meanwhile, it will block proxies and VPNs. It hasn't made clear how it intends to implement this plan, though, and previous attempts to block such technologies haven't been successful. Indeed, the announcement came just days after the company suggested that it's almost

impossible to ban proxies and VPNs because users simply ditch blacklisted exit points and find new ones.

#### How will it affect you?

It's likely to become more difficult to use a VPN or proxy tool to watch films and shows that aren't available over here. Even if Netflix isn't serious about this change, it will have to show that it's making an effort. Hopefully, we'll soon see the results of Netflix's attempt to globalise its licensing, which means we'll get more of the content that's currently only available in the US.

#### What do we think?

It's unfair that Brits pay roughly the same but get less content than Americans, although this is the fault of the copyright system rather than Netflix. It's time for a change and efforts by the EU to make Europe a single digital market should help.

## BT approved to buy EE



#### What happened?

BT's £12.5bn bid for mobile operator EE has been approved by competition authorities, which means it will soon go ahead. The tie-up will make BT the largest service provider in the UK, combining its control of almost a third of the fixed-line broadband market and 38% of the landline phone market with EE's 33% share of the mobile sector.

#### How will it affect you?

If you're an EE customer, your contract will be shifted to BT's control once the finer details of the acquisition have been ironed out. BT customers are also likely to be offered mobile services as part of their existing package. For many people, that may be more convenient because if you already use BT and EE, you'll eventually have only one bill to pay.

It's worth noting that BT has been repeatedly criticised for poor customer service, while EE was fined £1m last year for failing to ensure that customer complaints were dealt with fairly. Moreover, mergers often have a detrimental

impact on customer service because integrating systems and staff can cause disruption.

Others are concerned that BT shelling out £7bn of the buying price in cash, rather than shares, could lead to price increases for customers. The telecoms giant expects to make some savings, but whether that's enough to cover the cost of the deal remains to be seen.

This is all speculation, though, so we'll have to wait and see if BT's acquisition of EE really is as problematic as many are concerned it will be.

#### What do we think?

The Competition and Markets Authority approved the deal saying it doesn't believe it will "damage competition or the interests of consumers". We're less certain that's true. Rival mobile and broadband

providers still remain, but this deal gives BT a huge amount of power in the market, and BT and EE's previous performance in customer service have left much to be desired.

#### RIP David Bowie: technology pioneer

On 10 January, the UK and the rest of the world mourned the tragic loss of David Bowie at the age of 69. Aside from his groundbreaking music, idiosyncratic fashion and unwillingness to bend to cultural mores, Bowie was also a technology visionary. Back in 1998, he launched his own dial-up internet service provider, dubbed BowieNet. For a fee of £10 per month, the ISP offered fans their own '@ davidbowie.co.uk' or '@davidbowie. com' email address, and digital versions of new and rare songs, music videos and 20MB of online storage to build their own custom homepage. There was also a chat room, in which Bowie himself spent time under the tag name "Sailor". That chat room eventually evolved into BowieWorld, a 3D chat room that arrived before Second Life. BowieNet was as ahead of the times as his fashion and music, but sadly it didn't last. The ISP shut down in 2006 and he launched a more standard website in 2013 www.davidbowie.com - which is still active today.

Of course, the ISP wasn't Bowie's only foray into technology. He crowdsourced songs by asking fans to contribute lyrics and ideas, and even wrote one using software called Verbalizer. He was also the first major artist to release a song online, 'Telling Lies' in 1996, which later appeared on his album Earthling. In



concert over the web. although bandwidthcapacity issues at the time meant that few people could actually watch it.

A few years later, Bowie moved on to video games, starring in 2000 in Omikron: The Nomad Soul, in which he played a character called Boz, a revolutionary who exists entirely on a computer network.

None of these innovations occurred by pure chance, or can be dismissed as the try-anything-once behaviour of many rock stars. In interviews, Bowie

understanding of the incredible effect the internet would have on all of us, particularly for musicians, foreseeing the problems inherent in digital distribution,

"I don't think we've even seen the tip of the iceberg," Bowie told Jeremy Paxman in a BBC interview in 1999, saying the internet was "going to crash our ideas about what mediums are all about". Just as the man himself did.

#### **Microsoft Display Dock** bit.ly/displaydock389

Microsoft's Display Dock is an £80 adapter that effectively turns your smartphone into a portable PC using Windows 10's new Continuum feature. At the moment, it's only compatible with the Lumia 950 and Lumia 950 XL, because you need to connect your phone to the Display Dock with a USB Type-C cable. Once connected, you can plug the device into an external monitor via an HDMI or DisplayPort output and run a desktop PC-type experience using the hardware inside your smartphone.

Along with its two display outputs, the Display Dock has three USB 2 ports for a wired mouse and keyboard. Bluetooth is also available if vou want to cut down on wires. It's a



the ports are USB 3, but you at least get one that doubles up as a charging port, so you can power another device, such as a tablet or battery pack, while you work. The USB-C connection also charges your phone, so you don't need to worry about running out of juice when you're in the middle of writing an important document. The Display Dock itself is powered via a USB-C port, with a supplied charger to match.

Unfortunately, even the Lumia 950

XL's octa-core 2.0GHz Qualcomm Snapdragon 810 chip and 3GB of RAM weren't quite fast enough to run Windows 10 completely lag-free on the big screen but, aside from this, performance was not a problem and we found working on Word documents and Excel spreadsheets was just like using a laptop.

Microsoft's Display Dock could revolutionise mobile office working if all your basic office apps can be run off your phone, there will be no need to lug a laptop around. Of course, a fair amount of infrastructure is required before we get to the stage of simply plugging in our phones and getting down to business, but provided your workplace has the correct monitor, cables and accessories, then Continuum has huge

#### Will Windows 10 be the only option for PC users?

Microsoft has made an amendment to its Windows support policy, which removes support for older versions of Windows on the latest PC hardware.

This will prevent users

from downgrading from Windows 10 to Windows 7 or 8.1 on computers running the latest Intel Core processors, such as Skylake. It will also cause trouble for businesses that rely on hardware, old or

new, to run previous versions of

Windows. In an announcement about its new support policy, entitled Windows 10 Embracing Silicon Innovation (bit.ly/ silicon389), Microsoft argued that redesigning Windows 7 subsystems for

new generations of silicon processors would "introduce churn into the Windows 7 code base". New silicon chips are on the way and

only supported Windows platform" on the forthcoming Intel Kaby Lake, Qualcomm 8996 and AMD Bristol Ridge silicon processors.

Microsoft said Windows 10 will be "the

Microsoft has promised to continue to support Windows 7 for security, reliability and compatibility through to 14 January 2020 on systems running on older silicon chips. Windows 8.1 will



receive the same support until 10 January 2023.

Users upgrading to selected Skylake devices this year will be able to downgrade from Windows 10 to Windows 7 or 8.1 during a limited 18-month support period, but Microsoft's decision to remove the compatibility of its older operating systems will cause concern for many of its customers.





#### 96,000 phishing scams target Brits

The number of people targeted by phishing scams rose 21% in 2015, with reported scams growing to nearly

96.000 between November 2014 and October 2015, according to the City of London Police. The research, carried out by the force's National Fraud Intelligence Bureau as part of Get Safe Online's Think Twice Before You Act campaign, found that almost 80% of all phishing attacks were delivered by email. Phone calls, at 12%, came second, while text messages, mobile phone calls and scams by post occupied the remaining 10%. According to the research, the most common kind of phishing campaign was a BT account update, followed by a fake iTunes invoice and fraudulent HMRC tax refunds.

Suspended or blocked bank accounts and credit cards were also popular themes, and many of the emails included false attachments.

#### LastPass flaw 'puts passwords at risk'

LastPass users could be tricked into giving away their login details because of a design flaw that has been described as "hard to



fix and easy to exploit". The flaw, dubbed 'LostPass', puts users at risk of phishing attacks and is said to be capable of bypassing two-factor authentication, making it a serious security risk. Sean Cassidy, security researcher and CTO of Praesidio, a cloud-based cyber-security firm, discovered the flaw, which he has shared in a blog post and discussed at ShmooCon 2016.

Is current encryption strong enough to stop hackers reading our emails? Evan Cross, via email

No. standard PGP encryption doesn't solve the

core problem. From a technical perspective, the

basic architectural design of email allows metadata to be read as plain text, both for sent and received messages. This metadata includes details of the sender and the recipient as well as the date a message was sent and received, subject, message size, whether there are attachments and the email client used to send the message, among other things. This is enough information to enable a targeted attacker to reconstruct the timeline of conversations and learn when people communicate with one another, what they talk about and how often they communicate. By gathering

this information, cybercriminals are able to learn a lot about their targets.

What's more, technologies are constantly evolving, so something that is encrypted today may be easy to decrypt a few years or even months later, depending on how strong the encryption key is and how quickly technologies develop. This scenario has caused many people to avoid email for confidential conversations. Instead, they now use

secure mobile-messaging applications with end-toend encryption. These applications provide strong data and connection encryptions for improved security, automatically delete messages from mobile phones and communication servers after a given time, and don't store metadata. By using these methods, conversations are kept confidential, practical and safe.

What should I be adding to the HTML links of my images to help my site's SEO?

Fill the 'title' and 'alt' attributes of your <img> tags with text that accurately and concisely describes

the content of your image. The 'title' attribute is displayed in the browser when a user hovers over an image, so you can use it as a simple title or to clarify what's in the picture. The 'alt' text appears if the image can't be displayed for some reason, and is also useful for visually impaired visitors. It helps Google determine the subject of your picture and the surrounding text. You can also include the keywords you want search engines to use to find your site, but only do this if they are relevant to the image.



## **Antivirus software**

Dennis Technology Labs monitored the performance of antivirus software throughout 2015. Andy Shaw collates its findings to find out which program you should use this year

our PC is connected to the internet all the time. If you don't protect it with internet security software, hackers and viruses have free reign to access your data and use your PC to attack other vulnerable computers on the internet. The question isn't whether you should protect your PC, but how best to do it.

Choosing internet security software isn't easy. However, to make your life simpler, we've enlisted the help of Dennis Technology Labs, which spent all last year monitoring antivirus software, publishing its results in quarterly reports. Each report shows how well the software performed over the previous three months, but because most paid-for security software comes with a minimum subscription of a year, you'll want to know how well it performed over a 12-month period. This gives us a better indication of how consistent the results are and how well the software should continue to perform in the coming year.



#### **HOW WE TESTED**

Dennis Technology Labs tests two key areas of each security program: the level of protection it provides when everyday malware strikes, and whether or not the software gives 'false positive' warnings when you try to install harmless software.

Each product on test was installed on an identical PC running Windows 7.

We then directed each PC to 100 real websites, all of which were found to contain live malware on the day of testing. We recorded how each product reacted to the malware, noting any changes made to the PC's Registry or file system.

We also downloaded and installed a suite of 100 legitimate programs,

ranging from very popular software to obscure new programs. We used these to test how good the security programs are at allowing legitimate software to install without hindrance.



#### **Anti-malware** protection

This chart shows which products were the best at protecting against the malware threats they were exposed to. The software can do this in two ways: by blocking the threat before it takes hold; or by detecting the malware once it's installed itself and removing it before it does any harm.

Only Kaspersky Internet Security and Norton Security were able to defend their respective PCs completely over the course of the year. Both products stopped every single piece of malware we threw at them. However, the scores are weighted according to how far the threat was able to get before it was dealt with, which pushes the score in Kaspersky's favour. Of the 400 infections we exposed the PCs to over the year, Kaspersky allowed four malware samples to install on its PC before discovering and



removing them. Norton let two more through. Both products have improved since last year. In 2014, Kaspersky missed one piece of malware entirely, while Norton missed two.

It's also worth looking at the products at the bottom of the chart. All three of the free programs tested appear in the bottom


three places, with Avast performing the best and Microsoft Security Essentials the worst. Avast might have fared better, but it had a bad period between July and September, during which it allowed nine of the 100 sites visited in the test to install malware. Microsoft Security Essentials improved its performance over the course

of the year. After letting 32 of the 100 sites install malware between January and March, the number fell in each subsequent test and, in the last test of the year, it let in just six threats. It's an improvement, but we'd need it to rival Kaspersky and Norton before we could consider it as a serious contender.

#### False positives

Any security software could achieve a 100 per cent success rate by blocking absolutely everything from running on your PC. However, you wouldn't be able to do anything on it, so we place significant weight on how well the software avoids 'false positives'. A false positive is when the security software stops you installing a safe, legitimate program on your PC.

Over the course of the four tests, we attempted to install 400 safe programs in total (100 in each test). In an ideal situation, the antivirus software would recognise each as safe and let it install unhindered. If a legitimate program was blocked, we deducted points from the software's overall score. Two weightings apply here: the first distinguishes between software that blocks a program completely or just



flags it up and waits for the user to respond; the other takes into account a program's popularity, so more points are docked for blocking a popular program than a rare one.

Relatively few points were lost by any of the programs in this test, but Kaspersky

Internet Security and ESET Smart Security did the best, allowing us to install every program we tested. Microsoft Security Essentials flagged up a single program in one of the tests but didn't block it. AVG and Norton only scored a single false-positive through the whole year.

The worst performer of the free programs was Avast, which consistently blocked one legitimate program in every test. The worst offender overall was McAfee Internet Security, which blocked nine legitimate programs in total, spread across all four tests.




#### **Overall ratings**

Our final chart brings together each product's performance in the antimalware and false-positive tests, and combines them into a final score.

Top of the chart is Kaspersky Internet Security, which topped our results tables last year, too. This is a phenomenal achievement, and shows that it's the safest, most reliable way to protect your PC. With no false positives and an unblemished record of protection from malware this year, we heartily recommended it.

Norton comes a very close second but it lost out to Kaspersky on two fronts. First, it isn't quite so proactive at blocking malware before it installs, though it still managed to stop absolutely everything once it was allowed to perform a clean-up. On this basis, we'd have no qualms about leaving it to protect our PCs. It also flagged up a single false-positive, which



may not be much but it's one more than Kaspersky.

**ESET Smart Security and** Trend Micro Internet Security battled it out for third place but both fall some way short of the two leaders. Trend Micro was the best at stopping malware over the four tests, though it was a close-run thing. Both fall behind McAfee Internet Security in this area, though,

showing that the Intel-owned McAfee is managing to find its feet again after a difficult period of poor results in these tests. McAfee and Trend Micro's poorer performance in our falsepositive tests, however, gave ESET the lift it needed to achieve third place overall.

The free programs haven't fared quite so well over the course of the year. Avast

Free Antivirus pipped McAfee to fifth place in our overall ratings but, with its anti-malware rating failing to beat any of the paid-for programs, we'd be wary of trusting a PC to its protection unless you really can't afford anything better. With AVG Antivirus Free and Microsoft Security Essentials trailing behind Avast, however, we'd still take it over these two.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Because of its overall performance, we've awarded our Gold Award to Kaspersky Internet Security. Kaspersky has proved rock solid when it comes to protecting your PC from the worst of the web, and performed an amazing job in our tests this year, with no viruses or other malware able to get past its robust defences.

In all fairness, the Silver Award-winning Norton is no more than a whisker away from Kaspersky's perfect record. It also stopped all the malware we tested it against, though it was slightly less ruthless than Kaspersky, letting a couple more viruses through its first line of defence. It also blocked a legitimate program, but it's still an extremely effective tool.

Although it doesn't offer as much protection as the paid-for software, we've given our Bronze Award to Avast Antivirus Free because it offers the best protection of the three free programs we tested. If you can afford it, we'd still recommend you opt for Kaspersky or Norton instead, but those on a tight budget are safer running this software than nothing at all.







Sophos is a well-known security firm that offers a range of powerful paid-for tools to protect your PC from various threats. If you prefer to use a free antivirus solution, the good news is that the company now offers one in the shape of the new Sophos Home. This promises to deliver "commercial-grade Sophos security" to home users, and is available for PC and Mac. It's free for both private and non-commercial use, and can protect up to 10 computers per user.

Sophos Home is a fairly basic tool and it lacks the advanced options found in many other free antivirus products. What you do get is automatic antivirus protection that springs into life any time a file is accessed; as well as on-demand scanning, web protection and detection of potentially unwanted apps. You can toggle any of the features on or off, and view exceptions such as whitelisted (permitted) files, applications and websites. The software is also very easy to update via its system-tray icon.



The program doesn't offer any settings beyond that, but you'll find a few configuration options on the web-based Sophos Home Dashboard. Log into your account online and, as well as getting an overview of the security status for all linked devices, you

can enable and disable features, and block (or warn against) sites that offer potentially unwanted content, such as imagery of an adult/sexual nature, violence or hacking. The Dashboard is also where you can set up any exceptions to whitelist (allow) content.







#### View productivity tips on your New Tab page

Are you having trouble getting into gear this year? Are your New Year's resolutions already in tatters? If so, you need Tabtics (bit.ly/ tabtics389), which helps you improve your health and productivity by displaying motivational tips on your New Tab page. These aren't vague inspirational quotes like "believe in yourself and your dreams will come true", but useful, practical pointers such as "switch off pop-up notifications while you're working" and "even when it's cold, blowing a small fan on your face can help to keep you focused". The extension also displays the current time, weather and temperature for your location against a background of attractive photos. It can even sync with your Fitbit wearable device to show the number of steps you walked today and the number of hours you slept last night.



#### Sound more confident when writing emails

If your emails are peppered with phrases such as "sorry to bother you" and "just wanted to ask" then you risk coming across as a bit of a weed. You can inject some assertiveness into your Gmail messages by installing the new extension Just Not Sorry (bit.ly/ just389), which highlights 'qualifying' words in emails by underlining them in red. Hover your mouse over the dotted line to see an explanation of why you should avoid that term, for example: "Using "sorry" frequently undermines your gravitas and makes you appear unfit for leadership". It's an interesting idea, based on the writings of a US life coach called Tara Mohr, and certainly keeps you from needlessly apologising (a notorious British trait). However, we'd like to see it expanded to include further timid phrases.



#### Hide what your friends 'like' on Faceboók



Do you really care if someone you barely know is partial to Marmite, or which bands are favoured by former work

colleagues? Probably not, but we bet your Facebook news feed is full of such info, which makes wading through it like searching for a needle of interesting content in a haystack of trivia. Help is at hand in the form of a new Chrome (and Safari) extension called Friends Feed (bit.ly/friends389), which hides all the posts about other people's 'likes' from your feed so you can focus on the important stuff such as funny videos, inspirational quotes and self-obsessed

> status updates. The add-on works automatically and certainly makes for a less annoying and ad-driven Facebook experience. If you find that you miss knowing who rates Doritos or Emmerdale, you can choose to fade

'[so-and-so] likes' posts rather than hiding them altogether.

#### **Remove Donald Trump** from the web

There really isn't any escape at the moment from the Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump, whose controversial views on immigration and bizarre, bouffant hair are slathered across every news website. If you've had enough of reading about the barmy billionaire. you can use the new Chrome extension Trump Filter (bit.ly/ trump389) to banish him from your browser. Once installed, it detects mentions, photos and videos of Mr Trump on web pages and filters them so they don't bother you. There are three sensitivity settings: Mild, Aggressive and Vindictive, and the add-on keeps track of how many Trumps it's removed.







#### **FIREFOX**

#### Turn off push notifications from websites

Last issue, we explained how to stop Chrome sending push notifications, which many sites including Facebook, eBay and Yahoo Mail now use to display messages on your Desktop. The latest version of Firefox (44) also supports push notifications, so it's worth knowing how to disable them if you find that they become a nuisance. Go to Tools, Options, Content and click Choose next to Notifications. To turn off notifications from a specific website, select its URL in the Site



field, click Remove Site and click Save Changes. Alternatively, you can disable notifications from all websites by clicking Remove All Sites. Firefox 44 also lets you prevent websites from asking you to allow notifications. To do this temporarily (until you restart your browser), select the 'Do not disturb' option under Notifications. To turn off such requests permanently, type about:config into the address bar, press Enter and agree to be nice to dragons. Find the preference 'dom.webnotifications.enabled' and double-click it to change the value to 'false'. You'll never be bothered by a push notification again.

#### Remove redirects from Google search results When you search for something in

Google and hover your mouse over one of the results, you'll see the URL of the relevant page. However, if you rightclick the link to copy it without visiting the page, the URL will be prefaced with a lengthy Google redirect along the lines of 'http://www.google.co.uk' and a load of gobbledygook when you paste it. To prevent this from happening so you can copy and paste clean links, install Remove Google Redirect in Google Search Results (bit.ly/redirect389). As its name suggests, this strips the extra rubbish from search results by disabling the JavaScript function that Google uses to create the redirect, leaving you with "crisp, fresh links" that you can copy

and paste anywhere.

Despite having a browser in front of them, many people insist on asking questions online that could be answered instantly by the not-exactly-obscure




search engine called Google. One way to help these clueless or lazy individuals is to use Let Me Google That For You Add-on (bit.ly/ letme389) to show them how it's done. When you're confronted with a vacuous query on social media, in an email or on a forum, highlight and right-click the text, select 'Create a Imgtfy link' and then paste the result into a reply. When the other person clicks the link, they'll see a short animation of their query being entered into Google (accompanied by a 'Was that so hard?' button) to produce the answer they're looking for. Yes, the add-on is a bit cheeky, but it means the person will think twice about asking next time!

Close tabs by right-clicking them It's not exactly difficult to a close a browser tab, but it can still prove fiddly to click the tiny 'x' to do so. The new Opera add-on Close Tab (bit.ly/

View trustworthy ratings for websites You know where you stand with big names such as Amazon and eBay but, for sites you've never bought from before, you can use TrustaFact (bit.ly/trusta389) to get the lowdown. This free tool provides

scores and facts for criteria including popularity, data protection and spam, as well as an overall user grade for the site you're currently



viewing. You need to register with TrustaFact to view full info, but you can see basic ratings by choosing 'Skip signing up for now'. It claims to cover more than 750 million sites including new and less popular ones.

MX saves a few seconds of footage from just before the image was captured, so you can rewind and save individual frames; you can also share the entire clip as a fun, animated photo. Unlike the iPhone's Live Photos tool, Live Shot doesn't record audio, but you can trim the clip and it differs from basic animated GIFs by repeatedly rewinding to the start instead of simply looping.

Once you've created a Live Shot, Camera MX lets you share it via a multitude of channels or you can enhance the still image using an impressive selection of editing tools. Even if you have no interest in using Camera

MX as your primary camera app, it's a powerful photo and video editor and can also be used to manage your photos and videos.







## Free hospital Wi-Fi



Having to pay for web access in hospital literally adds insult to injury. David Crookes looks at government plans for free Wi-Fi in all hospitals

#### Free Wi-Fi? What sort of sweet pill is that?

A very good one, we'd say. Health Secretary Jeremy Hunt has made plenty of enemies within the NHS but his proposal to provide free Wi-Fi in all health-service buildings has been widely welcomed. It was one of a number of ideas put forward to the National Information Board in a governmentcommissioned report by Martha Lane Fox, the co-founder of Lastminute.com and now Baroness Lane-Fox of Soho. Mr Hunt said that: "Everyone using the NHS expects it to be a world leader in digital healthcare and free Wi-Fi is an essential part of making that a reality".

#### Don't some hospitals already have free Wi-Fi?

Two-thirds of NHS hospitals offer the internet to patients as a paid-for option through third-parties. WiFi Spark (bit.ly/ wifispark389), for example, provides Wi-Fi to hospitals in Leicester, Liverpool and Chesterfield among others and charges £3 for four hours, £5 for a day, £10 for a week and £15 for a month. Hospedia (www.hospedia.co.uk) gives at



WiFi Spark offers internet access in some hospitals, but you have to pay for it

least 15 minutes of free Wi-Fi but charges for more time in some locations. Even when hospitals offer unlimited Wi-Fi minutes, they often limit the access to specific wards, units or areas.

#### But why have free Wi-Fi in all hospitals?

There are two main reasons, other than it's often difficult to get a mobile signal in hospitals. The first is to allow patients to use their phones, tablets and even laptops, both to keep in touch with friends and family and to alleviate their boredom. This is seen as important to the wellbeing of patients: last year the Royal College of Psychiatrists reported a high

prevalence of boredom among hospital patients and said engaging with "psychosocial needs" helps to manage the gruelling experience of sickness.

The second reason is to make it easier for staff to access clinical services and use cutting-edge technology to help care for patients. Baroness Lane-Fox quoted Professor Sir Bruce Keogh, NHS England's national medical director, as saying junior doctors identified Wi-Fi as the one change that would make their jobs easier.

#### How does Wi-Fi help doctors?

Around 70% of a junior doctor's time is said to be spent on bureaucracy and it is

believed that Wi-Fi would make administrative tasks more efficient. The idea is that by freeing up time otherwise spent on laborious paperwork, they will have more hours in the day to dedicate to patients. The Department of Health also says errors in medication can be cut by 50% with more use of e-prescriptions.

# So patients will benefit medically from free Wi-Fi?

Theoretically. yes. Baroness Lane-Fox says patients will be able to monitor their conditions using apps, and this element of self-care and

self-management will take some of the pressure off medics. By using Wi-Fienabled wearables such as skin sensors and asthma and diabetes monitors. patients can be constantly and remotely monitored, easing NHS staffing problems. As well as being able to book appointments and repeat prescriptions, patients will also be encouraged to fill out online surveys for instant feedback.

# Won't patients Google illnesses to second-guess doctors?

Granted, it will be easier to use the net to self-diagnose if Wi-Fi becomes widely available in hospitals, but it's not advisable. A growing number of 'cyberchrondriacs' - people who search online for diseases that match their symptoms - are increasing the workload on doctors. A survey by private medical helpline Dr Morton published in January 2016 said that 16 million people a month are diagnosing themselves online and demanding that doctors treat them. Doctors say using the web to selfdiagnose only leads patients to worry.

# Who is paying for the scheme?

Money is being made available from a £1bn technology fund - a pot created by the last government in September 2013 with the aim of improving patient care and easing pressure on A&E departments. Although it supports local IT solutions to local problems (the fund was created in the same month as the abandoned NHS IT system that was said to have cost £9.8bn), the Wi-Fi initiative is a national plan.

# Is everyone happy with the proposal?

While some say it will allow patients to

continue with their day-today lives, others have expressed concerns that the money set to be spent on free Wi-Fi could be better used on frontline clinical services. Grant Ingrams, deputy chairman of the IT subcommittee of the BMA General Practitioners

Committee, expressed grave concerns and said that it

was an "unaffordable luxury". Writing in the British Medical Journal, he believed it would "adversely affect" the relationship between the NHS and its staff, patients and the public, and he also feared that people would visit hospitals purely to use the free Wi-Fi. Indeed, there are concerns that doctors and medical staff will have their important work persistently

interrupted by patients asking for help to log into services and deal with IT problems.

# Has this happened in other places where Wi-Fi is free?

There do not appear to be any obvious cases. Many NHS hospitals began offering free Wi-Fi in 2015 and they have appeared happy with the outcome.

# Why has free Wi-Fi suddenly become an issue, though?

It hasn't. Free Wi-Fi in hospitals has been on the agenda for years with NHS England's former director of patients and information Tim Kelsey a staunch supporter of it up until he left in



The Personalised Health and Care 2020 report looked at the benefits of digital technology

December. Indeed, in 2011, designers were called in by the Department of Health to come up with ideas to help make A&E visits

at Southampton Hospital, Chesterfield Hospital and Guy's and St Thomas' in London more pleasant. They said free Wi-Fi would keep potentially disruptive patients occupied. Furthermore, the Personalised Health and Care 2020 report drawn up under the Conservative/ Lib Dem coalition government looked at the use of digital technology to improve patients' experience and outcomes.

# When will all NHS hospitals switch to free Wi-Fi?

No firm deadline has been set but it's understood that the Health Secretary expects all NHS buildings in the UK to have free public Wi-Fi by 2020, and that the NHS will be "digital and paperless" by this time. Then again, in September 2013, Mr Hunt went on record to say: "I've set the NHS the challenge of going paperless by 2018". There will inevitably be some slippage in any timetables that are set although some hospitals are already making great strides towards digitising their records. For example, Gloucestershire Royal and Cheltenham General Hospitals have a fully digital patient-information system called SmartCare.

# ERROR MESSAGES



Is your PC pestering you with perplexing problems? Wayne Williams reveals the causes and solutions of the 34 most frequent and frustrating error messages in Microsoft's operating system





hen it's working as intended, Windows is a fantastic piece of software. It's easy to use and customise, and generally responds to commands appropriately. But when things go wrong, the operating system - whichever version you're using - can cause major headaches. It's not just fixing the problem that can be tricky, but understanding exactly what the error means and what's causing it.

Windows seems to delight in reporting its faults in the most unintelligible way imaginable: 'Code 80248014', 'Stop:

0x0000050', 'DLL file is missing' and our favourite - 'Something happened'. What do these baffling error messages even mean?

In this feature, we set out to demystify the most common Windows errors, explaining the most likely reasons for why you're seeing them, and - most importantly - showing you how to overcome them and prevent them from reoccurring.

We also include some quick explanations of error codes that you can refer to the next time Windows pops up one of its headscratching error messages on your screen.

# Fix Windows error messages



# **SOFTWARE ERRORS**

# This program is not responding

### What it means:

As you can probably gather, this common error message indicates that a program or app has decided to be anti-social and



stop communicating with Windows.

# How to fix it:

It's likely that the program in question has crashed, although it might also have temporarily stalled or simply be too busy to respond. This error will give you two choices of action – end the program or cancel the error. Clicking Cancel will buy the software some more time to wake up and this is usually often the best option if you have the patience to wait. If not, and if clicking End Now doesn't solve the problem, right-click the taskbar and choose Start Task Manager. Select the program in the list and click End Task. It may take several attempts to close it if it's being particularly stubborn.

# The application was unable to start correctly (0xc0000018)

### What it means:

The program you want to run won't launch in Windows, even though you know it's installed and has worked previously without problems.

# How to fix it:

Firstly, try rebooting your PC, to see if that fixes the problem. If it



doesn't, try uninstalling and reinstalling the troublesome application, and/or updating to the latest version. If you still get no joy, click Start and type regedit to launch the Registry Editor. Navigate to the entry:


HKEY\_LOCAL\_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\Wow6432Node\Microsoft\WindowsNT\CurrentVersion\Windows

Find APPINIT\_DLLS and delete everything in it or, failing that, delete the entire key. If it's already empty, open Task Manager and click Processes to see what else is currently running on your PC and end any processes that could be causing conflicts.

# There was a problem sending the command to the program

# What it means:

This error occurs occasionally when using Microsoft Office – Excel in particular. You'll usually see it when opening or saving a file, and it can prove extremely irritating.



# How to fix it:

If you're using a template, try changing it to something else. In Excel, go to File, Options, Advanced and scroll down to the General section. Tick 'Ignore other applications that use Dynamic Data Exchange (DDE)'. Depending on which version of Excel you're using, this setting may be located somewhere else in Options, so hunt around for it.

# NVIDIA Install %1 is not a valid Win32 application. OK

# Not a valid Win32 application

# What it means:

Windows doesn't recognise the program you're trying to launch as one that it can run. If you got the application from the web, it could be that the download terminated prematurely and didn't complete, or it's become corrupted. It's also possible that the file has been renamed to look like a program (given an '.exe' file extension, for example), but isn't.

# How to fix it:

Try downloading the program again. If that doesn't work, look for a different source or try a different browser. Make sure you're downloading a program designed for Windows – and not Mac or Linux – and that it's the correct version for your operating system (some Windows 8.1 and 10 tools won't work in Windows 7).

# Fatal error during installation

### What it means:

While installing a new program, a major error occurred that prevented the installation from completing. Although the word 'fatal' sounds rather scary, don't worry: you haven't killed your PC!

# How to fix it:

Check to make sure that you have enough space on your hard drive to install the program. Next, try emptying your Temp folder. Find its location by pressing Win+R and



typing cmd in the box. Click OK, then type set and hit Enter. Make a note of where the Temp directory is located, go to it and delete the contents (but don't delete the folder). Finally, close any open applications, reboot your PC and try to install the software again.

# This app can't run on your PC

### What it means:

This is the modern equivalent of the 'Not a valid Win32 application' error (see page 39). It means that Windows 10 doesn't recognise the program or app,

so it doesn't know how to run it.




### How to fix it:

If you downloaded the app or program yourself, try downloading it again. Use a different source or browser if the error persists. If you got the app from the Microsoft Store, try downloading it again later, at another time of day.

### Runtime error

### What it means:

A program has encountered a problem in its code, such as bug or a corruption, which has caused it to crash. This error is particularly common



in browsers, especially older ones such as Internet Explorer.

### How to fix it:

Try running the software again. If it continues to crash, check to see if there's an updated version available. You could also try running the software in Compatibility Mode. Right-click the program shortcut, select Properties, click the Compatibility tab, and click 'Run compatibility troubleshooter'. Finally, although the crash is unlikely to be caused by malware, it's worth performing a quick scan for malicious code, just in case.

# Another copy of the application is already running

### What it means:

Most PC users will have seen this head-scratching error at least once. It occurs when you're trying to run a program that is already running in Windows, even though it's not visible.

# How to fix it:

Sometimes when a program crashes, it disappears from the taskbar, but continues to run in the background. We see this error cropping up most regularly in Firefox. To close the program properly, right-click the

taskbar, select Task Manager and find the program you're trying to run - if you can't see it on the Applications tab, try looking in the Processes tab. Select the culprit and click End Task or End Process. When it closes, run the software again.

# **INSTALLATION AND UPDATE ERRORS**

# There isn't enough memory available to create a ramdisk - 0xc0000017

### What it means:

This might seem like a rather obscure error that you're never likely to see - after all, when would you need to create a ramdisk? What the hell is a ramdisk, anyway? But it's actually something that can occur when upgrading your PC from one version of Windows to another. It means Windows is unable to use the RAM (memory) as a temporary data store.


# How to fix it:

There might be a problem with the RAM inside your PC - such as there not being enough memory available or a hardware error - but this is unlikely. To overcome the problem, you need to use the built-in Windows Boot Configuration Data (BCD) command. Right-click Start and launch Command Prompt (Admin). Type bcdedit /enum all and hit Enter. Among other things, you'll see


a list of 'bad' memory locations which you can clear, thereby (hopefully) solving the problem. Type bcdedit /deletevalue {badmemory} badmemorylist and hit Enter. Close the Command Prompt, restart your PC

and run the Windows

installer once more.



# Windows could not search for new updates - 80248014



# What it means:

8024 errors are usually caused by corruption in the Windows Update agent that prevents you from installing any new updates. This occurs in all versions of Windows, including Windows 10.

# How to fix it:

Press Win+R, type cmd into the box and press Enter. In the Command window, type net stop WuAuServ. Press Win+R and type %windir%, then press Enter. In the opened folder, locate 'SoftwareDistribution', select it, press F2 and name it 'SDold'. Press Win+R, and type cmd into the box, then hit Enter. In the Command window, type net start WuAuServ. Try getting an update and, hopefully, it will now work.

# **PERMISSION ERRORS**

# Access Denied. You need permission to perform this action

# What it means:

When you try to perform a seemingly straightforward task such as deleting a file, Windows prevents you from doing so because you don't have permission. But if you're an administrator and it's your computer, who exactly are you supposed to ask permission from? The Queen?


This error message (usually) refers to system files that are protected to prevent accidental deletion or modification by users who may not

fully understand the potential repercussions of their actions. But sometimes it can affect regular files, too.

# How to fix it:

The file has probably been protected for a good reason, but that's not always the case. If you're sure it's safe to delete the item, you need to get permission or take ownership. See what permissions you have by right-clicking the folder or file, selecting Properties and clicking the Security tab. To change permissions, select your admin account in the list and click Edit.

If you can't make the required changes using this method, consider using the powerful free program Malwarebytes FileAssassin (bit.ly/fileassassin389), which can usually remove locked files from your PC and save you a lot of frustration.





# You don't have permission to save in this location

# What it means:

This is a straightforward enough error - you want to save a file, such as a Word document or Excel spreadsheet, but Windows won't let you. This is because - as the error rather snottily tells you - it appears that you don't have the required permissions to save in that location.

# How to fix it:

First, make sure that you're not trying to save to a read-only location, such as a DVD or a system folder. Next, check the permissions of the folder you're trying to save to. Right-click the folder in question and

select Properties. Switch to the Security tab and click Advanced. Tick the oddly-phrased option 'Replace all child object permission entries with inheritable permission entries from this object', then click Apply followed by OK.



If that doesn't work, try setting

yourself as an administrator on your PC (if you aren't one already). Open the Run box and type netplwiz. Press Enter, select your user account and click Properties. Open the Group Membership tab and make yourself an administrator. Reboot your PC and you should now be able to save files to the previously forbidden location.

# ESSENTIAL ERROR CODES X

The error codes that appear when Windows runs into a problem may seem to make no sense, but they do actually mean something and can help you troubleshoot whatever issue you're facing. There are hundreds of different codes, and their meaning is often very broad. Here are some of the most common examples:

Error code 0 (0x0) - success The operation completed successfully.

# Error code 2 (0x2) - file not found

Your computer could not find a specific file (you may need to reinstall the program).

# Error code 5 (0x5) - access denied

Access is denied (obviously). Check that any required username and password were entered correctly and accept any requested authentication.

# Error code 20 (0x14) - bad unit

Your system can't find the device you are trying to use. You may need to reinstall the hardware.

# Error code 14 (0xE) or 8 (0x8)

Not enough storage is available to complete the operation you're trying to perform.

# Error 28 (0x1C)

Your printer is out of paper. No prizes for guessing how you solve this one!

# Error 303 (0x12F)

The file you're trying to open is in the process of being deleted, which is why you can't open it.

# Error 1021 (0x3FD)

You're unlikely to see this error unless you're fiddling with the Registry, but its official title is ERROR\_CHILD\_MUST\_BE\_ VOLATILE, which we find quite amusing.

You can view a (very) long list of errors at bit.ly/errorcodes389. You can also use the free Error Lookup tool (bit.ly/errorlookup389) to translate error codes into a more meaningful text description.



# **GENERAL WINDOWS ERRORS**

This copy of Windows is not genuine. You may be a victim of software counterfeiting

### What it means:

Quite self-explanatory this one: it means vou're running a version of Microsoft's operating system that has been detected as counterfeit or is not recognised as being genuine.



## How to fix it:

The obvious solution is to buy and install a proper version of Windows - that is, not a dodgy one from eBay! If you believe that you are running a genuine copy already and have been falsely accused of unsavoury practice, you could try 'rearming' Windows. Click Start, and search for cmd. Right-click Command Prompt and select 'Run as administrator' - in Windows 10, simply right-click the Start button and select 'Command Prompt (Admin)'. Type slmgr -rearm and press Enter. Restart your PC to complete the rearming. If that command isn't recognised, try slmgr /rearm instead.

# WerMgr.exe or WerFault.exe - Application Error

# What it means:

These system files (found in the System32 folder) collect and send error logs to Microsoft to help identify and fix problems. This error occurs when the file in question has become corrupted in some way.



# How to fix it:

Open a Command Prompt as an administrator, type sfc /scannow and press Enter. This will repair important Windows files including

Explorer EXE

(hopefully) WerMgr.exe or WerFault.exe, if they are corrupted. If that doesn't fix the problem, you could disable the Windows



Error Reporting Service. Hit Win+R and type services.msc. Scroll down to Windows Error Reporting Service, right-click it and select Properties. Change its startup type from Manual to Disabled. Click OK and restart your computer.

OK



# Inaccessible boot device

# What it means:

This is a Blue Screen (or Stop) error that occurs when Windows 10 is no longer able to access the system partition or drive on your PC. This could be caused by corruption of the hard drive.

### How to fix it:

Shut down your PC, wait a few seconds, then turn it on again. You can also try removing any hardware that you've recently connected. It may be worth disconnecting and reconnecting all your hard drives when your PC is powered off in case of a loose connection

Finally, if you can get into Windows 10, right-click the Start button and select 'Command Prompt (Admin)' and type chkdsk /f /r on the system partition. If you can't boot into Windows 10, use the Recovery Console (press F8 when the manufacturer logo appears) and run 'Chkdsk /r'.

# **VAGUE ERROR MESSAGES**

# Unspecified error

# What it means:

As you can probably guess from the message, an error has

occurred, but it's not one for which Windows has a specific description. Yeah, thanks for that!

# How to fix it:

This really is one of the least helpful error messages and deserves a good kicking. The problem could be caused by all manner of things. Try closing all your applications and rebooting your PC. Beyond that, the only other thing to try is to check if there are any updates available for the program that triggered the error message.

# Something happened - 0x80070005-0x90002

# What it means:

Another amusingly vague Windows error message that's been around for quite some time. If you see this while installing Windows 10, it essentially means that the installer can't work with a required file for one reason for another.

# How to fix it:

Disable any running security software (in case this is interfering with the installer), go to bit.ly/fixit389 and run the Fix It tool there to reset Windows Update components. Then run the installer again.

# Fix Windows error messages



# DLL file is missing/could not be found

### What it means:

DLL (Dynamic-Link Library) files contain the code and data needed to perform specific actions in Windows, and can be accessed by any program. Unfortunately, they can go missing, get corrupted or be replaced by incorrect versions, which is why errors relating to them are so common.

### How to fix it:

Don't try to solve the problem by downloading the missing DLL file from the web and copying it to the specified location, because this can make things worse. Instead, restart your computer



and, if the error message appears again, run your antivirus software to check for malware, because this can often be the cause. Look in the Recycle Bin to see if the missing file is there and, if not, try rolling things back using System Restore. You can also try reinstalling the problematic program.

Another option is to open a Command Prompt window as an administrator, type sfc /scannow and hit Enter. This will repair important Windows files including DLLs. If none of this works, you can try registering the DLL file. Open a Command Prompt and type regsvr32 [name of DLL file] then reboot the computer.

# System thread exception not handled

# What it means:

This is another common Blue Screen (or Stop)

error that can be caused by problematic programs and drivers. A message tells you that 'Your PC ran into a problem and needs to restart'. Windows will collect some data and then reboot.

# How to fix it:

If the error occurs more than once, check the text next to the error message (before Windows reboots) to see if it provides the name of the file that caused the problem. If it's listed, search Google to find out what it is, then look to see if there's a newer version available. If it's a driver,



check the manufacturer's site or use a tool such as IObit Driver Booster 3 Free (bit.ly/driverbooster389) to install the latest version.

# WINDOWS 10 UPGRADE ERRORS

### 0x80073712

A file needed by Windows Update could be missing or damaged.

### 0x800F0923

A program or driver is not compatible with Windows 10.

### 0x80200056

The upgrade process was interrupted. Try again.

### 0x800F0922

Your PC was unable to connect to the Windows Update servers. Check your internet connection and try again.

# 0xC1900208 - 0x4000C

An incompatible app on your PC is preventing the upgrade process from completing.

# 0xC1900200 -0x20008/0xC1900202 -0x20008

Your PC doesn't meet the minimum requirements for downloading or installing the Windows 10 upgrade.

# 0x80070070 -0x50011/0x80070070 -0x50012/0x80070070 -0×600

Your PC doesn't have enough free hard-drive space to install the upgrade.




What we liked:

Google Drive has dominated cloud storage since it launched back in 2012. As it stands today, its free option has the second largest space

allocation of the free services we've reviewed here, though its 16GB is some way behind Mega's whopping 50GB. It carries this excellent value for money into its paid versions, with £1.36 per month buying you 100GB of space.

Google is the only service that allows for a significant increase in available storage space, with sensible steps in between. You're unlikely to want to pay £204.41 per month for 30TB of storage but, if you did need that much, it's a simple matter of increasing your plan rather than having to switch to a completely separate service. Before you get to this extreme, there are smaller and cheaper increments available, including 1TB, 10TB and 20TB.

Syncing files from your computer is very straightforward. The best way is to download the software, which adds a sync folder to your user account and pins it to Explorer's Favourites section. Anything that changes or is copied into the folder is replicated online. You can set the software to sync all or just some



of the folders in your storage area, which is handy if you use more than one PC and don't, for example, want your work files replicated at home.

Google Drive's mobile services are up to the expected standard, and work well on both Android and iOS devices. You can access all your files with ease and there are apps for editing both documents and photos.

The website is equally accessible and lets you arrange and view files in a variety of ways; look up plenty of information about individual files; and view and restore old versions.

### How it can be improved:

Google's broad range of services can

sometimes suffer from being too interconnected. For example, you may have no intention of using Google Photos, but you'll still find it lurking in your Drive interface. It's mobile service is somewhat inconveniently spread across a lot of apps, with different software needed to edit different types of files.

# **OUR VERDICT**

Google Drive is a great way to store files online and access them from any device, whether it's a PC, an Android phone, a Chromebook or an iPad. It also provides a vast range of viewing and editing tools.

# What we liked:

Microsoft's new storage limits sound like bad news but it's still offering the same amount of free space as Apple and Amazon, and 3GB more

than Dropbox. If you're already a OneDrive user, you can even maintain your existing free allowance of 15GB by visiting bit.ly/oned389.

If you use a Windows PC, you'll find OneDrive's integration into Explorer is seamless. Sign into Windows using a Microsoft account and your files will be synced for you. You don't even need to install software because it works like another drive, which is about as simple as you can get. The web version is also well presented, easy to use and ties in well with Microsoft's online office tools.

If you need a lot of space and use Microsoft's Office software, it's worth exploring the Office 365 combination. The annual fee of £79.99 sounds steep but it's reasonable value for money if you consider the more than ample 1TB of OneDrive storage that comes with it.



# How it can be improved:

Microsoft has become less generous with OneDrive, switching off its Unlimited option and reducing the free storage available to new users to 5GB. Also, its 50GB tier costs more than twice the price of Apple's.

### **OUR VERDICT**

While the cut in free storage space is disappointing, OneDrive remains a serious contender, especially if you mostly use Windows. It integrates well with PCs and, if you also use Office, it can be combined in a great-value bundle.

It's not often you can use the word 'inexpensive' in an Apple review but hold on to your hats iCloud is good value for money. It has a standard 5GB cap on the free option but

is an affordable 79p per month for 50GB, offers 200GB for £2.49 per month, and peaks at £6.99 for 1TB, matching Google Drive throughout.

As you might expect, users of Apple devices benefit the most from the service, which is well integrated into iOS devices and Mac computers. But it mirrors Google's sync integration with Explorer, so Windows users can still work well with the storage space. It also adds an iCloud Photos folder, which is handy for syncing photos from an iPhone or iPad. This isn't much use for Android users but, thankfully, you can just unpin it and forget about it.

### How it can be improved:

Apple's storage quota includes access



to its other iCloud services, including its online office suite and other apps that sync with Apple products such as Calendar, Mail and Reminders. However, there are no official Android apps, so it isn't ideal if you use a mix of devices.

### **OUR VERDICT**

If you use iOS rather than Android. iCloud is an obvious choice because it's built with your devices in mind. PC users might also find its affordable storage options too good to pass up, though Apple doesn't produce apps for Android devices.



service hasn't changed much since his departure, though, maintaining its outstanding 50GB of storage space for free. However, if you need a lot of storage space, Google Drive, iCloud, OneDrive and even Dropbox offer cheaper alternatives by the time you get to 1TB.

# Recover lost and stolen devices

If your beloved phone, camera or bike has gone missing, don't despair - there's still a chance you could get it back. Robert Irvine reveals the methods most likely to succeed



# Track down your stolen

Losing an expensive camera can be devastating, especially the thought that someone else could be using your snapper to capture their happy memories. Fortunately, the thief's arrogance could also be their downfall, because your camera contains a unique serial number that appears in the EXIF metadata of every photo it takes. Once the person now in possession of your camera (who may, to be fair, not realise that it's been stolen) shares an image online, that serial number will be posted with it, which is where Stolen Camera Finder (www.stolencamerafinder.com) comes in. This ingenious free service trawls the internet searching for photos and collecting the serial numbers of the cameras that took them. When you upload an image to the site that was captured with your lost camera, Stolen Camera Finder detects the serial number and displays matches from its database, complete with details of where the photos are being hosted - for example, on Flickr. You can then contact the photographer and ask them politely but firmly to return your camera.

Stolen Camera Finder isn't perfect -

some sites, including Facebook, strip EXIF data from uploaded photos, and not all camera models (and no phones) are covered. It also charges £4.99 for Pro features such as unlimited searching and email alerts for when a picture taken with your camera is shared online. However, it's worth a try if you're desperate to recover your camera or if you've bought a second-hand one and want to make sure it's not 'hot'. We particularly like the option to post details of your lost camera on a global map, in case another user comes across it.

# Locate, lock and wipe your device remotely

Both Apple and Google now offer built-in tools that let you find your

Android or iOS device if it goes missing and prevent anyone else from using it. To activate this feature on an iPhone or iPad, go to Settings, iCloud, tap Find My iPhone and ensure the slider is set to 'on'. If your device is lost or stolen, sign into www.icloud.com/find on any other device to view its current (or last online) location on a map. You can then remotely turn on Lost Mode to lock your device with a 4-digit passcode, or wipe its data by choosing Erase iPhone or

For Android phones and tablets, there's the similar Android Device Manager, which lets you trace your device through android.com/ devicemanager. As well as using the Lock and Erase options as required, you can ring your lost phone in case it's still in the immediate vicinity - such as down the back of the sofa!

# Stop thieves using or selling your phone

As with cameras, all mobile phones have a unique identifier called an IMEI (International Mobile Station Equipment Identity) number. This 14- to 16-digit serial code provides information about your handset's manufacturer, model and specifications, and also allows you to disable or potentially recover a stolen or lost phone. For this reason, you should find out what your IMEI is before disaster strikes. It's usually printed on a label under the battery or on the SIM tray, and you can also view it on screen by pressing \*#06#.

If your phone is stolen, report the theft to your mobile operator or the police who will add the IMEI to a blacklist. This renders it useless because it will be unable to make and receive

calls, or send messages, and the thief won't be able to flog it to phonerecycling services and through online marketplaces including eBay, which require the seller to provide the IMEI. You can check if a phone you've bought or are thinking of buying is blacklisted using CheckMend (www.checkmend .com/uk). For a one-off fee of £1.99, this will tell you if the handset is currently or has ever been blocked; if it's been reported as lost or stolen; if it's had multiple users; and if it's been recycled or refurbished.

# Look on online marketplaces

Most stolen goods are quickly resold and there's a chance that the thief may be brazen enough to use a well-known online marketplace such as eBay, Gumtree or Craigslist to do so. It's definitely worth searching for your lost device on these sites, and using filters to show the most recent listings, used items only and nearby sellers (if you believe it was pinched locally). Also look carefully at sellers' other current and previous listings to see if they ring any alarm bells - for example, why would someone be flogging so many secondhand phones? If you think you've nailed

the culprit, contact them first - it's possible they may have obtained your device without realising it was stolen - and keep a record of all your correspondence. If they prove unhelpful or unresponsive, then report the incident to your local police (if you haven't already), including details of the date time and location of the theft, and ensure vou obtain a crime-reference number. Both eBay (bit.lv/ ebaystolen389) and Gumtree (bit.ly/ gumtreestolen389) promise that they will "always assist in a criminal investigation received from Law Enforcement" and "give evidence in court if necessary". Unfortunately, the poorly moderated Craigslist is a law unto itself, especially because it doesn't have a UK office, but you can still notify the police if you spot your stolen device. There's also an Android and iOS app called Mokriya Craigslist (craigslist .mokriya.com), which watches the site for specific items and notifies you when it finds them.

# Report and find a stolen bike

A recent survey by CCTV.co.uk found that bikes were the most stolen items in the UK in 2015, overtaking mobile phones, with one nicked every 67 seconds. They're also among the most difficult to recover, although you might

get lucky using Stolen Bikes (stolenbikes.co.uk). This excellent free service takes a three-pronged approach to uniting cyclists with their wheels. Firstly, it lets you report your bike as stolen, including details of manufacturer, model, colour and frame number, a full description and as many photos as you like. The site will then share the info and offer advice to maximise your chances of getting back your bike. Secondly, you can use the Find That Bike section to view the latest bike listings on eBay and Gumtree, in case that's where yours has ended up. Finally, you can ensure you don't inadvertently purchase a stolen

bike, by looking up its frame number and comparing it against stolen-bike registers across the country. Stolen Bikes

won't

recover your bike for you - that's still a matter for the police - but it helped more than 1,000 cyclists get back in the saddle last year.

# REGISTER YOUR DEVICE ONLINE

UK property register Immobilise (www.immobilise.com) goes straight to the top when your devices go missing - it's used by the police to identify thousands of items of lost and stolen property every day. Registered items are also checked against the stolen goods database CheckMEND (see left), reported to the second-hand trade and issued with police reports, which makes it much easier to claim insurance.



To register your phone or tablet for free, create a secure Immobilise account and enter your device's IMEI number. To register a laptop, PC, camera or other gadget, enter its serial number along with details such as its make, model and specifications, and upload photos of it.

If your item has already been lost or stolen, you can still register it on Immobilise. Tell the service it's lost, provide as many details as possible and the site will make the information available to all UK police.

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
# **MOVE ALL YOUR DATA T**

It's easier than you think to transfer contacts, messages and media files from an Android phone to an iPhone, and vice versa. Robert Irvine explains how to migrate your data for free

# COPY YOUR CONTACTS

Google and Apple both store your contacts in the cloud, which makes it easy to transfer names and numbers from Android to Android, or from iOS to iOS - just log into your account on the new device to load the data.

You can move contacts that aren't stored on your SIM card from an Android phone to an iPhone via your Google account. Go to Settings on your Android device, tap Accounts (or 'Accounts and sync') and select your Google account. Ensure the Contacts option is selected in the list, then tap the three-dot icon in the top-right corner and select 'Sync now'. On your iPhone, go to Settings, select Mail, Contacts, Calendars and tap Add Account. Choose Google or Gmail in the list, sign into your Google account and ensure Contacts is selected to sync with your new phone.



You can also use Mail, Contacts, Calendars to transfer contacts from an iPhone to an Android phone - just add and sign into your Google account to sync the data. If this doesn't work, choose iCloud in the Accounts list and select Contacts to merge your iPhone's contacts with iCloud. Log into www. icloud.com in your browser on your computer, click Contacts, click the cog icon and choose Select All. Click the cog again and choose Export vCard to

download your contacts as a VCF file. Once this is done, go to Google Contacts (contacts.google.com), click More and then 'I eave the contacts preview' - the new version doesn't vet support importing files so vou'll need to revert to the old one. Click Import Contacts, 'Choose file', select the VCF file you exported from iCloud and click Import. Your iOS contacts will now be available on your new Android phone.



If neither method proves successful, try My Contacts Backup, a free app for iOS (bit.ly/mcbios389) and Android (bit .ly/mcbandroid389) that makes it easy to transfer your address book in either direction. Sadly, it isn't available for Windows Phone, but if you're moving to or from a Microsoft device, you can use PhoneSwappr (www.phoneswappr.com) to transfer your contacts. It works with Android, iOS and Windows Phone, but you need to pay 79p to download your contacts to the new phone.

stored on the old one. Carbonite's excellent free app SMS Backup & Restore (bit.ly/smsbackup389) solves this problem by letting you copy texts from one Android phone to another via an online storage or webmail service. Install the app on your old phone, tap Backup and decide whether to only save standard texts or to also include multimedia messages, conversations and call logs. At the bottom of the Create New Backup screen, select 'Local Backup and Upload' and choose where to upload your data from options including Google Drive, Dropbox, Gmail,

# **COPY DATA USING MOTO MIGRATE**


Moving data to a new Motorola phone couldn't be easier, thanks to a useful tool called Migrate, which comes pre-installed on Moto devices. To transfer contacts, messages, call logs, photos, videos and music from

your old Android phone, download the Migrate app (bit.ly/migrate386) and scan the QR code with your new phone's camera. Use Migrate to import contacts from an old iPhone by logging into your iCloud account.



Outlook.com and Yahoo Mail. Log into your account with your chosen service and tap OK to back up all your messages and other selected data.

Next, install SMS Backup & Restore on your new Android phone along with the app for the relevant storage or webmail service. Open the latter, find and tap the backup file, and choose to restore it using SMS Backup & Restore. Tap Restore and all your saved texts will be saved to your default messaging app. Note that on versions of Android later than 4.4 (KitKat), you'll need to set SMS Backup & Restore as the default app to perform the transfer, but you can switch back to using Android's standard Messaging app once this is complete.



You can also use SMS Backup & Restore to transfer messages from iOS to Android, but be warned that it's not as straightforward. First, you'll need to connect your iPhone to iTunes on your computer, right-click it in the Devices list and choose Back Up. Locate and open the backup folder - on a PC, this will be the newest one stored in:

C://Users/[username]/AppData/ Roaming/Apple Computer/Mobile Sync On a Mac, you'll find it in:

~/Library/Application Support/ MobileSync/Backup

Search for a file named: 3d0d7e5fb2c e288813306e4d4636395e047a3d28 (or 'sms.db', if you're lucky). To make things easier, you can copy and paste this from our Page-by-page links for Issue 389 at bit.ly/page389. Drag the backup file to your Desktop, then connect your Android phone to your computer and copy the file to its internal memory or SD card. Next, install the app iSMS2droid (bit.ly/ ism389), tap Select iPhone SMS Database and select the iOS backup file to convert your text messages to an

Androidcompatible format. Finally. open SMS Backup & Restore, tap Restore and locate



the converted file to import your iPhone texts. Well, we warned you it wasn't going to be easy!

To copy messages from Android to iOS for free, along with other useful data, you can use Apple's 'Move to iOS' app (see boxout, below).

### TRANSFER MEDIA FILES

Because photos and videos aren't tied to your mobile operating system, they're



much easier to move between mobile platforms than contacts and messages. and there are several methods to choose from. For example, you can connect your old phone to your computer, copy the files over, then connect the new phone and copy them to it. You'll need to use iTunes (or a third-party program) to sync photos with your iPhone, but with an Android device, you can usually drag and drop the files to and from your PC or Mac.

Another method is to use a dedicated app such as the brilliant free Copy My Data (copymydata.com), which lets you easily transfer photos and videos from Android (bit.ly/copyandroid389) to iOS devices (bit.ly/copyios389), and vice versa, over your Wi-Fi connection,

without needing to use a computer.

Last but not least. you could use a mediastorage service such as Google **Photos** 



(photos.google.com) or Flickr (www.flickr.com) to sync your files across your devices. Both services offer free apps for Android and iOS that you can use to detect, organise and upload all the photos and videos stored on your phone so they can be accessed from anywhere.



# **MOVE TO BUT NOT FROM IOS**

Late last year, Apple released the controversial app 'Move to iOS', which lets you wirelessly transfer contacts, messages, photos, videos, mail accounts and more from your Android phone or tablet to an iPhone or iPad. This hasn't proved popular with reviewers on Google Play, not only because of Apple's perceived gall in trying to lure Android users to

its devices, but because many users claim it simply doesn't work. Its 2.3 out of 5 rating on the store includes more than 36,000 one-star reviews, although many of these are from Android loyalists! It was rumoured at the beginning of January that Apple was planning an equivalent 'Move to Android' app for iOS users - a claim that it subsequently denied.

# Access your Android devices remotely | www.teamviewer.com

Remote-access tool TeamViewer has been updated to let you control your Android phone and tablet from anywhere. Here's how to use it

eamViewer lets you access and take control of any computer, anywhere on the planet – with the owner's permission, of course. It's great for helping to fix other people's PC problems (instead of guessing what's wrong, you can see it for yourself), and you can use it to copy files between computers and other devices. The latest version of TeamViewer can provide

unattended Android access, so if you've accidentally left your phone or tablet at home, you can use the software to access it remotely and perform tasks such as killing misbehaving processes, switching wireless connections and uninstalling apps. The most useful new feature is that you can now use TeamViewer to copy files to and from the mobile device, too.



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
There are several TeamViewer apps for Android. You need to install the TeamViewer Host (bit.ly/host389) on your phone or tablet, and the TeamViewer program on your PC. Launch the app and sign up for a free TeamViewer account. Tap Sign Up 1 and enter an email address, username and password. 2



Sign in on your Android device, then open a web browser on a computer and go to <a href="https://login.teamviewer.com">https://login.teamviewer.com</a>. Log in with your account details and you should see your Android device listed. If you have more than one device with TeamViewer installed, you'll see those as well. Click Connect.



The Launch Application box opens.
Select the TeamViewer 11 program
and click OK. TeamViewer opens and
displays a Dashboard for your phone or
tablet. Click Apps 1 and TeamViewer will
list the apps on your device, and provide
details on each one's version number,
size and the date installed. 2



4 You can sort the apps list by name, version, size and date, 1 which is handy if the list is long. You can remotely remove unwanted apps on the device from this screen, too. Hover your mouse over an item and click the Uninstall button. 2 You still need someone to OK the action on your device, though.



5 Click Processes 1 to see a list of system processes running on your device. Click 'Memory usage' 2 or Runtime 3 to sort the list by size or age. Hover your mouse over the list of items and you'll be able to remotely terminate 4 any you don't want running. Make sure it's safe to do so.





The Dashboard also displays useful information such as the manufacturer and model, the version of Android the device is running and its network connections





If you're accessing a tablet, you'll see a 'Remote control' 1 option for remotely viewing and controlling your device. Click the tablet image. A message appears on your device asking permission to display the screen. Grant this and the tablet's display will be mirrored in the program. Not all tablets allow this.



One of the most useful tools is the remote File Transfer. Select this option 11 to open a file manager. You can browse your computer on the left 2 and explore your device's storage on the right. El Click and drag to move content between the two locations.



On the remote device, you'll see who the app is assigned to 1 and who it's connected to. 2 Tap the three-dot icon 3 to open the Options menu. You can remove the assignment (prevent future remote access). 4 Advanced 5 lets you enable UDP (User Datagram Protocol) for better network performance.



# Create a portable version of Windows 10 for free

AOMEI Partition Assistant: bit.ly/partition389 | 🕒 60 mins | 🦉 XP, 7, 8, 10

bootable version of Windows 10 on a portable USB drive is a very handy tool to have around. It allows you to try the operating system on your own PC, before committing to installing and running it full-time, or you can simply use it as a personal version of Windows, containing your own software and settings, that you plug in and run from any other PC (such as at work or when visiting friends and family).

One of the quickest and easiest ways of doing this is to use AOMEI Partition Assistant's Windows To Go tool. It's compatible with both Windows 8 and Windows 10 - you just need a disc or ISO image of the version you want to use.

We'll also take a quick look at Partition Assistant's other bootable tool, called Make Bootable Media, which offers a stripped-back Windows PE-based console that lets you make a copy of your hard drive's contents.





You need a Windows ISO file to create a bootable version. Visit bit.ly/windows389 and click 'Download tool now'. 1 Run the Windows 10 Media Creation Tool, accept its license terms and choose 'Create installation media for another PC'. Click Next and make sure the correct options are selected.



Click Next, then OK. The program asks how you want to save the operating system. Select 'ISO file' 1 and click Next, 🔁 choose where you want to save it and select Save. You can carry on using your PC while the Media Creation Tool downloads Windows 10.



The final screen warns that you need a product key to install Windows 10. 11 This is true if you want to use the OS without a watermark and access its Personalise settings, but you can skip the licence-key entry during installation and activate Windows later (if you decide you want to).



Click Finish, then download and install AOMEI Partition Assistant (bit.ly/partition389). Run the application and select Windows To Go Creator 1 in the Wizards sidebar. Insert a USB drive (see Expert Tip for size requirements), click Refresh 2 and select the drive from the drop-down menu. 3






# **EXPERT TIP**

# **Edward Munn says**

To create a Windows To Go bootable drive with AOMEI Partition Assistant, you need a USB drive with a capacity of at least 13GB. However, we found the tool extremely slow when we used a 16GB flash drive (indicating it would take more than 24 hours to complete!), so we recommend using a larger drive. With a 1TB WD My Passport Slim, the same process only took about 10 minutes.




Click Browse, then Browse again, to navigate to the Windows 10 ISO file. Select it and click Open, then OK. Click Proceed and AOMEI warns that it will format your USB drive. Click Yes if you're happy that any important data you had on the drive is backed up elsewhere.




Once AOMEI has finished copying Windows to your USB drive, a window appears saying 'The operation completed successfully'. 1 Click OK. 2 The bootable USB drive is now ready to use. Restart your PC and enter its BIOS (you can normally do this by pressing F2 or F12).



Navigate to the boot priority order page. If the USB isn't set as the primary option, change the settings accordingly, then save and exit the BIOS. 1 Your PC will boot from the USB drive and a Windows 10 setup screen appears. Follow the steps to finish preparing the OS on the drive.



If you're mostly going to use the drive on a single PC, we recommend downloading and installing any necessary drivers for it by visiting the manufacturer's website and searching for the appropriate model. All drivers will be installed as normal and saved to the USB drive.



AOMEI Partition Wizard also lets you create a bootable Windows PE drive, which is invaluable if you need to rescue files from your hard drive when Windows won't start. To do this, insert an empty USB drive and click Make Bootable Media 1 in the Wizards sidebar.



From the pop-up screen, click Next, select USB Boot Device and choose the drive on which you want to install Windows PE. Click Proceed and, once the wizard has finished, you can boot from the USB drive to run a light version of the AOMEI Partition Assistant.

dobe's Lightroom app has been available for free on iOS for a few months and it recently became available for Android, too. This image-editing software is a step up from most photo-editing apps and provides advanced

tools to make the most of your pictures without having to move them from your tablet or phone.



You need to send photos from your device to Lightroom's separate photo collection. Tap the three-dot menu button and select the Add Photos option. Tap the photos you want to import to select them, 11 then tap the tick in the top-right corner. 2



Tap the folder and the thumbnail of the image you want to edit. You can flag 11 an image to remind you to work on it later, and choose a star rating 2 to help you keep track of your favourite images. Tap one of the four editing icons **I** to access the editing tool.



The first icon of the four selects the image. Use this if you want to switch to another picture to work on. The second is the crop tool. Drag the corners of the image box 11 to crop unwanted areas. The strip of tiles 2 in this section lets you change the aspect ratio, **3** rotate **4** or straighten **5** an image.



Tap the Colour icon, 🚺 then tap one of the tiles, such as Color 2 or B&W. The number on the tile 3 refers to the number of options available. A list of thumbnail previews appears 4 so you can get an idea of what the end result will look like. These are all automatic preset options.



For more control over the results, click the Sliders icon.  $oldsymbol{1}$ Here, you can tap one of the tiles to bring up a slider across the bottom of the image. 2 Drag your finger along it to control the extent to which the effect is applied. This allows for more subtle control over your edits.



To get your finished photo back out of Lightroom, tap the Share button, 11 then select Share 22 from the drop-down menu. You can choose an app you'd like to send the photo to, such as online storage or email.



# **Beat Netflix's regional restrictions**

t can be very frustrating to find that the films or shows you want to watch on Netflix aren't available for your region. Smartflix is a new service that unlocks Netflix's impressive catalogue of on-demand movies and television from around

the world. You need a Netflix subscription to use the program, but otherwise there's no need to set up an account, and Smartflix is free to use while it's still in beta.

Download and install Smartflix, run the program and you can browse the full global catalogue of Netflix's films and TV programmes. The Popular 11 movies section loads by default, but you can use the menu to explore a range of other film categories including 'New on Netflix'. 2

Hover the cursor over a title to see its release date. running time and description, 1 along with the region of Netflix it's hosted on. 2 Click to watch it or rightclick to watch the trailer (or to add the movie to your watch





Select TV Shows 11 to explore TV categories including Documentary, Drama and Reality. Moving your cursor over a programme shows you which seasons are available, and right-clicking lets you choose the season and episode you want to watch. 2

To find a specific film or programme, or one featuring a particular actor, use Smartflix's search bar. 11 Click Account 2 to sign into your Netflix account and leave the 'Remember me on this device' box ticked if you want to skip the login process next time.





If you don't have an account, click Sign Up Now and follow the onscreen instructions to get a month's free subscription. Close the Account pop-up and select the film or programme you want to watch. You can pause, 1 skip forward, 2 adjust the volume 3 and view subtitles. 4

Click 'Back to Browse' and select My Lists 11 to see a summary of your recently watched 2 content. Selecting Watch Later **B** lets you browse a list of any programmes or films you've added to your watch list.




# Make Windows 10 as fast as possible using an SSD

Upgrading your Windows 10 PC with an SSD can dramatically boost its speed. Wayne Williams shows you how to install it and set it up

here are a lot of simple upgrades you can perform to boost the speed of your PC. In the past, the most popular (and cheapest) option was to pack your computer with more memory, although this was restricted by the number of available slots on your PC's motherboard and the operating system you were running. These days, transferring Windows onto an SSD (solid-state drive) will yield far greater speed improvements, and dramatically reduce the length of time it takes your PC to start up. In this issue's Weekend Project, we show you how to install an SSD and get Windows 10 to run as speedily as possible.

Most of the advice we've provided also applies to previous versions of Windows, which similarly benefit from being run from an SSD.



# Why choose an SSD?

Like USB sticks and camera memory cards, SSDs use flash memory. This means they are significantly faster than traditional hard drives because they store their data on memory chips, which provide almost instant access to any section of the drive. Traditional hard drives use a movable mechanical arm with a read/write head to access information from a spinning platter,

which is a much slower process.

If you move Windows and your installed programs from a hard drive to an SSD, your computer will feel like it's been turbo-charged. Instead of waiting minutes for your PC to boot up, you'll be able to use Windows in seconds. Your applications will load significantly quicker, and the drive's read and write speeds will also improve.

Windows 10 is a speedy operating

system as it is, but if you install it on an SSD, you'll really notice the difference.

# What to buy

SSDs have some drawbacks. In theory, they have a shorter lifespan than hard drives because the MLC (Multi-Level Cells) memory chips that make up an SSD can only be written to a set number of times. They're also more expensive: while a 2TB hard drive might set you

back £60, the SSD equivalent is likely to cost upwards of £500.

Unless you've got enough money to splash out on a huge capacity SSD and not worry about its shorter lifespan, it's worth considering a combination of the two: an SSD for Windows and your installed programs; and a hard drive for storing your personal data, such as documents, photos, videos,

music and downloads. A 120GB SSD might just suffice but a 240GB or 480GB model, which will set you back around £60 or £115 respectively, is a safer bet. As with buying memory or USB sticks, it's worth spending a little extra to buy an SSD from a brand you trust, such as Crucial (bit.ly/crucial389) or Kingston (bit.ly/king389), so you can be sure you're getting a reliable component.

# Back up your data

Before you do anything, back up all your personal data with a purpose-built program such as EaseUS Todo Backup Free (www.todo-backup.com). The beauty of this software is it can also be used to migrate Windows 10 from your existing hard drive to a new SSD.

After you've created your backup,



You can use Todo Backup Free to make a backup of your old drive and install it on the new one

you'll need to install the SSD in your PC. We show you how to do this in our Mini Workshop, below.

# Copy or install Windows 10 onto the drive

Once you've fitted the new SSD into your computer, the next step is to install Windows 10 on it. If you already had the

> operating system installed on your PC, you can transfer this and any software to the SSD using a clone tool. Your drive may have come with software that does this but, if not, EaseUS Todo Backup Free is ideal for the job. This is the quickest approach and will have you up and running in no time at all, with all your existing software ready to use.

However, if you want to get Windows 10 running as fast as possible on your PC, the best


# **WORKSHOP** | Install an SSD in your PC



Laptop hard drives are the same size as SSDs, so you simply swap one for the other. Remove the battery from the laptop, ground yourself on a radiator or similar, and remove the back of the case. Take out the old hard drive and replace it with the new SSD, then attach the power and SATA connectors and reassemble everything.



To install an SSD in a desktop PC, you'll need a 2.5in to 3.5in adapter. Your new drive may come with one but, if it doesn't, you can pick one up for around £7 from the likes of Amazon. Ground yourself to disperse any static electricity, as in Step 1, then insert the SSD into the adapter and screw it in. 11



Turn off and unplug your PC, then remove the case. If necessary, unscrew and remove the existing drive. Insert the adapter (with the drive in) into a spare drive bay and secure it in place. 1 Once done, attach the power and SATA cables and you're ready to install an operating system or clone a drive.


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option is to perform a fresh install. This ensures that no errors or junk files make their way on to your new drive, taking up unnecessary space (which is an important factor considering the reduced size of the SSD) or causing problems down the line Bear in mind, though, that carrying out a fresh install is also more time-consuming, because you'll need to install all your programs and configure them from scratch. That said, it's

important to remember that installing anything on an SSD, including a new operating system, will take much less time than installing it on a slower mechanical hard drive

To perform a clean install of Windows 10 on an SSD, you will either need a Windows 10 licence (which you have to pay for) or you'll need to have previously upgraded Windows on your old hard drive. For ease, it's probably simplest to install a copy of Windows 7 or 8.1 on your SSD and then upgrade it to Windows 10 through the Get Windows 10 Now app, which should appear in your taskbar's notification area. We show you how to clean up your SSD after the upgrade in our Mini Workshop, below. Alternatively, use the Media Creation Tool program from Microsoft at bit.ly/mct389 to achieve a clean install.




You shouldn't defrag an SSD but you can optimise it to make sure it's using Windows' special SSD tools

# Look after your SSD

Unlike mechanical hard drives, SSDs don't need to be defragmented. In fact, defragging an SSD regularly can significantly shorten its lifespan.

Windows 10 automatically recognises when it's installed on an SSD and can perform an optimisation known as TRIM. This tells the SSD which blocks of data are no longer considered to be in use so they can be wiped. Click Start and type defrag, then launch the Defrag function. Your system drive should be listed as a Solid State Drive under Media Type. Select it and click the Optimise button.

Personally, we don't think Windows needs to index your SSD's contents, as it does little more than contribute to wear and tear. To turn off this feature, press Win+R and type services.msc into the Run box. Press the Enter key. In the

Services window, scroll down to Windows Search, then right-click it and select Properties. Change the Startup type to Disabled and click OK. Close the window. and open File Explorer, then right-click your SSD and select Properties, making sure 'Allow files on this drive to have contents indexed in addition to file properties' is unticked. Click OK.

Windows 10 is automatically optimised for SSDs but if you want to check this on your PC, right-click the Start button and click Command Prompt (Admin). In the window that opens, type Winsat formal -V (note that's 'formal', not 'format'). This will test your PC and make any changes required to ensure Windows works as intended with your SSD.




# MINI WORKSHOP | Clean up your SSD after a Windows 10 upgrade



When you upgrade to Windows 10, a lot of temp files get left behind. This is to allow you to roll everything back to the previous OS if it turns out that you don't like it. However, this just wastes space on an SSD. To remove these leftovers, click Start and type Disk Clean-up. 1 Launch the application. 2



Select the drive you want to clean up this will be the SSD with Windows on, probably C:) and click OK. The tool will calculate how much space can be saved and then present you with a list of items that can be cleaned. 11 Ignore this and instead click the 'Clean up system files' button. 2



Select your SSD again, and the tool will repeat the process, but this time a new option is displayed -'Previous Windows installation(s)'. Tick this box 11 and the box for 'Temporary Windows installation files', 2 then click OK to remove those files and regain your missing hard-drive space.

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

# TOP TIPS FOR HOMEPLUGS

# Don't mix different types of HomePlug

omePlug is a general term used to describe powerline adapters that plug into a mains power socket to provide networking facilities around your home. Plug one into one room and another elsewhere in your home, and they'll use your property's electrical wiring to create a network between the two. There are several manufacturers of HomePlug powerline adapters that offer different networking standards and ways of operating. To avoid compatibility problems with the devices (and there are some potential traps to watch out for), it's best to stick to one manufacturer and, even, one particular model. You may find that different models work together, particularly those that claim to operate at the same speed, but there are no guarantees and manufacturers are unlikely to offer support for mixed products from different manufacturers. Starter kits contain a pair of devices and you should add more of the same if you need them.



Not all HomePlugs are compatible with one other; it's easiest to stick to one model

# HomePlug vs Wi-Fi

Even if you have a good Wi-Fi signal around your home, your Wi-Fi may not be making the most of your broadband bandwidth, particularly if you have fibre broadband. The internet speed you get on your devices is only as fast as the slowest link in the chain, which may be the wireless connection between your computer and your router.

One way to improve the speed is to connect your computer to your router with a network cable. All routers and

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

most computers have one or more Ethernet sockets and, if you connect the two, you don't need to use Wi-Fi. An Ethernet connection is always faster and

doesn't suffer from poor signals and interference.

If your computer and router are in different rooms, you will have to trail a long Ethernet cable around your house to link the two. However, you can avoid this by extending your wired network using HomePlug powerline adapters. Setting up a HomePlug network is very straightforward: you just plug an adapter into the mains socket next to the router, then use a cable to connect the Ethernet sockets on the HomePlug

and the router. You then plug a second HomePlug adapter into any power socket in the room where you use your computer, and connect that

HomePlug to your computer using an Ethernet cable. You'll now have a wired network connection to the internet that's much faster and more reliable than Wi-Fi.

# Pick a standard

There are different HomePlug powerline standards available - for example, HomePlug 1.0, HomePlug AV and HomePlug AV2 - but as long as you choose adapters that use the same standard, you shouldn't have any problems. You can use different types of adapters in your home, but they may not communicate with each other. However, all devices with the HomePlug Certification Logo should work with each other.

# Plugs and sockets

You probably have a multiblock power strip extension lead to plug in all your devices, such as the computer, TV. phone charger, printer, router and so on. Don't plug the HomePlug adapter into the extension: plug it into the wall socket and then plug the power strip into the socket on the adapter, if it has one. Although a powerline adapter may work when plugged into a power strip, it will work better if it is plugged into the wall.

# Extend your home Wi-Fi

If there are rooms in your home that have a poor or nonexistent Wi-Fi signal. HomePlug Wi-Fi adapters can be used to extend the network. Plug the HomePlug adapter into a mains power socket next to the router and connect the two devices with a network cable. You can now add a HomePlug adapter that includes Wi-Fi into a wall socket in any room, anywhere in the house, to get Wi-Fi in that room.

Starter kits usually come with two devices and you can add more Wi-Fi extenders in other rooms as necessary. To add a HomePlug adapter to your Wi-Fi network, just press its Wi-Fi clone button (different manufacturers may give this another name on their devices), and the WPS button on the wireless router. HomePlugs are paired in the usual way by pressing the button on both devices. Your home Wi-Fi network will be made available wherever you placed your HomePlug adapter.

# Improve the speed

Powerline adapters are generally fast, and some are very fast. If the speed seems too slow, try a different power socket in the room. Low speeds are often caused by electrical interference and a different socket might work better.

# **Customise the QoS Setting**

QoS (quality of service) is a feature that's designed to prevent problems if you have a lot of activity on your network. When several applications on a computer - or several devices on a network - all use the internet at the same time, they compete for the bandwidth. QoS maintains a minimum level of network bandwidth and stops one application or computer taking precedence and leaving the others struggling.

Your HomePlug adapter may have a tool that lets your computer choose which type of network activity to prioritise. For example, if you use TP-Link HomePlugs, go to bit.ly/ tool389, click the relevant model of HomePlug adapter, then click Support, Utility, and download the software. Use a network cable to connect your computer to your HomePlug and launch the software. Select the Advanced tab and select Simple Application Mapping.

You can choose to prioritise general internet usage, online gaming, audio, video or VoIP (such as Skype). If, for example, you select the gaming option, your playing won't slow down if someone else on your network starts watching a video or browsing the web.



You can prioritise specific types of network traffic

# Update the firmware

Firmware is software that's built into the HomePlug and makes it work. If your powerline network is operating well, then it's best to leave this alone. But if you're having problems, then updating the firmware might help.

Software that comes with the HomePlug adapters can be used to update the firmware. You can also download the new firmware from the manufacturer's website. This will usually consist of one or sometimes two files. Run the HomePlug utility



HomePlug firmware can be upgraded with the manufacturer's utility

and find the firmware-update tool. With TP-Link, for example, you select the System tab, click Upgrade Firmware and select the two files downloaded from the TP-Link website.

To update a HomePlug's firmware, you have to use a computer that's directly plugged into it using an Ethernet cable. You should update all your HomePlug adapters so they are all running the same version of the firmware.

# Reset to factory defaults

If you're having problems with your HomePlug network that you can't fix, or if you want to give or sell the adapters to someone else, they can be reset to the factory default settings. It depends on the adapter. but with TP-Link, for example, you press and hold the button for 15 seconds to reset it. An adapter can also be reset by connecting it to a PC via a network cable and running the TP-Link utility. Select the System tab and click Reset Local Device or Reset All Devices, as required.

Many Netgear adapters have a Factory Reset button. There may be a little hole that you poke the tip of a pen into, which presses down on the Reset button. Press and hold it for one second.

# Link your HomePlugs

HomePlug powerline adapters may work straight out of the box but you can link them to create a network that is password protected. To get them working together, press the button on one; you then have about a minute to press the button on the other.

This can often be set up using a computer, too. Use the manufacturer's utility to configure each adapter with the same network name and password. Connect them one by one to the computer with an Ethernet cable and use the Status tab.

# Stop your laptop's backlight turning off

The screen's backlight on my Toshiba laptop keeps switching off. I've had both the screen and the backlight replaced, the connectors resoldered and the display wires replaced, but it still keeps happening. I know it's not the graphics hardware because when I hook the laptop up to an external screen, the image works fine, so what's wrong?

You seem to have tackled all the likely hardware, but it may be worth checking the 'automatic brightess'. Some laptops have a sensor that measures the light in the room to brighten the screen when it's in sunlight and dim it when light is low, and this sensor could be faulty.

Some laptops also adjust the screen's brightness depending on



If you find automatic brightness settings irritating, turn them off

whether they are running on mains power or battery. Open the Control Panel and click Power Options. Select the Maximum Performance power plan (click 'Show additional plans' if it is not visible), and click 'Change plan settings'. Click 'Change advanced power settings', expand Display, expand 'Enable adaptive brightness' and set both the battery and plugged-in settings to Off.

# Restore a lost WordPress site

I had a good WordPress website on Fasthosts (www.fasthosts.co.uk), that was getting over 1 million hits a year. I had paid for lots of plugins and had Twitter apps to re-post my posts as tweets. WordPress would not update on my Dashboard so, like an idiot, I went to the control panel and pressed the WordPress icon, which carried out a new install and created a new database. Now I have lost over two years work and many of the plugins I paid for.

Fasthosts say that they can't restore the site because they only have the new database and not the old one. Surely, this can't be difficult for them to do. I don't know how SQL stores posts within WordPress because I can't see individual files in the file manager, but I can see the backed-up plugins and themes. Am I fighting a lost cause?

Whether you can recover anything from your website depends on whether you have backups. Without them, there isn't much hope. There are two components to a WordPress website: the WordPress files themselves, such as the templates, plugins, php files, images, buttons and so on; and the database, which contains all the content for the site.

You can restore your old website if you have a backup of both the files and the database, but not if one or both are missing. Backup services are usually provided by web hosts but they can sometimes be classed as optional extras requiring payment, and may only work with the site itself, not with the associated database. There are plugins for WordPress that will back up the database for you on a schedule.

According to Fasthosts, cloud servers are backed up every day and a site can be restored for £60. However, it

depends on whether you have a hosting deal that includes this option. Log into your web-hosting account's control panel and see if you are subscribed to any backup services. If you are, then you can use them; if not, the site is probably lost.

Websites crash and are occasionally hacked so it's always worth making sure you have a backup and that you know how to restore it.



# **Decompress 7z files**

I downloaded the Windows Update Mini Tool, as referred to in an article on page 54 of Issue 387 (bit.ly/ webuser387), but hit a problem. How do you open and install a 7z file? I'm asked by Windows which app I want to use and it suggests Edge, but this just brings up a blank white page and nothing happens. Any info on this would be helpful as there are those of us who have never heard of 7z files.

7z is an alternative to Zip, but the compression is slightly better, which results in smaller files. Install 7-Zip (7-zip.org) to open 7z archives.



7-Zip supports a wide range of compressed file types, including 7z

# FrontPage and Windows 10

For the last 12 years, I've used Microsoft FrontPage to build my own not-for-profit website on my Windows Vista PC. I need to upgrade my computer, but FrontPage may or may not run on Windows 8.1 or 10, according to user groups I've looked at on the web.

I am often away from an internet connection when working on my website. FrontPage has been invaluable in this respect, because I can spend as long as I want changing the pages offline and then upload when I am connected again. Most new template-based software needs you to be online all the time.

How do I get a definitive answer about continuing with FrontPage when I change to Windows 10? There is so much content on my site that it's going to be a major job to change to a different program. What modern, idiot-proof webdesign programs are there that will let me work on my website offline? I believe Serif may be one. Are there any others that run on Windows 10?

According to users, FrontPage will run on Windows 10 but some of its functions cause it to crash. If you want to continue to use this program, stick with Vista and don't upgrade your PC.

FrontPage was discontinued years ago and sooner or later you'll have to switch to an alternative site editor. It will be less work if you do it now, because your site will only get bigger and more complicated in the future.

Two good programs worth considering are Xara Web Designer (from £34.99, www.xara.com) and Serif WebPlus (£84.99, www.serif.com), They came first and second respectively in our Group Test of web-design software in Issue 385 (bit.ly/webuser385).

For a free alternative, try Mobirise (mobirise.com) or TOWeb (www.lauyan .com). These are modern programs that use the latest web-design techniques, so there may be some work involved in getting your site working in them. Try them all to see which one copes best with your site's files.

# Back up recovery partitions

I have just bought an HP laptop. I downloaded AOMEI Backupper Standard (bit.ly/back389), as recommended in Issue 386 (bit.ly/ webuser386). How do I go about backing up the hard drive while keeping the recovery partition, in case I should ever get a system failure?

Backupper can perform several types of backup and what you want is the Disk Backup. This copies all the partitions on a hard drive, whereas the System Backup, which is one of the

other options, only backs up the C: drive that contains Windows. The backup must be saved to an external USB drive.

After creating a Disk Backup, go to the Utilities section and select Create Bootable Disc. There are options to burn a CD or use a USB flash memory drive. Whichever one you choose, it can be used to start your PC if Windows fails completely, and allows you to restore the disk image saved to the USB drive.

That's a worst-case scenario. If you only lose a file or folder and want to recover it, you can run Backupper in Windows, explore the backup and restore individual files and folders.

# Fix failing Windows 10 installation

I am running Windows 8 and I keep getting a message to upgrade to

Windows 10, but when I try to do this I get the message "Error code 0x800704DD-0x900016". Is it because my son installed VMware? How can I get Windows 10 to install?

It is unlikely to be VMware that's causing the problem and there are several tasks you need to perform in order to prepare Windows 8 for the upgrade. Just work through them and you should be fine. Open Explorer, go to This PC or Computer, right-click the hard drive and select Properties. Select the Tools tab and click the Check button in the 'Error checking' section. Scan the drive for errors.

Get the Windows Update Troubleshooter (bit.ly/reset389) and run it from the Downloads folder. Press Windows+S to open the search panel and type command prompt. Right-click it in the search results and select 'Run as administrator'. Type sfc /scannow and press Enter to check Windows files.

Type dism.exe /Online /Cleanup-image /Restorehealth and press Enter to check Windows files on the hard drive against the versions that Microsoft has online. Uninstall any security software (this isn't strictly necessary but is a good idea). You can now try upgrading to Windows 10 again. Hopefully, it will work this time.


# **Restore missing** Bluetooth

I have an HP G6-2244SA laptop running Windows 10. Since upgrading, I no longer have Bluetooth installed. It is not even in the settings. What do I have to do to install it?

Software for your laptop can be downloaded from bit.ly/hp389. Click 'Software and Drivers', then Go. However, HP does not provide anything for Windows 10 and recommends Windows Update instead. To find a Bluetooth driver, you have to select Windows 8 in the Driver-Network download section, but you should only download and install the Windows 8 driver as a last resort.

The best way to get Bluetooth working is to uninstall it, then reinstall it. Click inside the taskbar search box



Hardware problems may be solved by uninstalling in Device Manager

and type device manager, then click the result to open the tool in the Control Panel. Expand the Bluetooth section, then right-click the Bluetooth device. There are two options to try: Update Driver Software and Uninstall. Uninstall removes the device and software and, when Windows is restarted, the hardware is detected as if it were a new device, automatically installing the software.

# Save CD software as a virtual drive

I have some old clipart CDs that I bought more than 10 years ago, which I still use. To save having to constantly swap discs - and because I was worried they might stop working because of all the scratches on them -I transferred the files to my computer and saved them to the PC's hard drive as ISO images. Now I can access my clipart CDs just by double-clicking these files. This mounts them as a virtual drive and saves me the bother of having to find where I've put the CDs and load them in the drive.



# Use Windows on a Mac

> app in the Mac's Utilities folder. This is used to copy Windows to a USB memory stick, which is then used to boot the Mac and install Windows in a separate partition on the drive.

Once installed, you can choose to start the computer with either Windows 10 or OS X. I may now have a Mac, but I'm still a Windows user.

# **Connect to difficult hotspots**

If you are out and about with a laptop, phone or tablet, and need internet access, you can often find a Wi-Fi hotspot. Sometimes, however, you need to open a web browser to launch the Wi-Fi hotspot's login page. You may not be able to do this if your browser's homepage is set to a website that uses HTTPS. This is because HTTPS sites are designed to be harder to hijack, so your browser may not let you switch to a less secure web page. For example, Google uses HTTPS, so if Google is your homepage, you may not be able to access the hotspot's login page.

I've often had this problem when Google is set as my homepage. To get



to the hotspot's login page, you might need to set an http site, such as www .bing.com, as your homepage.

You can see if your browser is using an HTTPS site by clicking or tapping in the address box. Using an unsecured site as your homepage should let the hotspot's login page take over your browser.

### Download YouTube videos

Most of us want to download videos from time to time, often from YouTube. The best software I've found for this purpose is 4K Video Downloader (bit .lv/4kvideo389), which is free from bundled junkware.

To download a video from a site that isn't supported by 4K Video Downloader. I often use KeepVid (www.keepvid.com): just paste the video's URL into the homepage. It supports 30 sites and has a good rating from WOT (www.mywot .com). However, I'd always recommend scanning any downloads with anti-virus software, just to be safe.

If you use Firefox or Pale Moon, there's a useful add-on called NetVideoHunter (bit.ly/netvideohunter389), which worked very well when I tried it with Vimeo. Unfortunately, there doesn't seem to be a Chrome equivalent.

# Avoid fake items on Amazon

I recently bought a second charger for my Samsung S6 smartphone (to use at

work) from Amazon.co.uk and, although it claimed to be genuine, upon close inspection it wasn't the same as the original, so I returned it for a refund. The product was sold by a third-party seller but fulfilled by Amazon, so I took this as an endorsement of sorts, but I certainly won't be making the same mistake again.

When buying electronic items, there are often scores of similar listings, which makes it very difficult to know what is genuine and what is not. Following my bad experience, I now only look at and buy items that are sold directly by Amazon.co.uk, even if they cost more.

There's an easy way to filter your search results so that only these products appear. After entering your search term, scroll down the page until you see the Seller heading in the lefthand sidebar (you might need to select a product sub-category before this option appears). If Amazon.co.uk isn't shown, select 'See more' and choose it from the complete list. Higher up the page, you'll also see an option that lets you filter the results by brand. In my case, this would mean selecting 'Samsung' to filter all third-party accessories.

# Stop WhatsApp auto-saving images to gallery

I love WhatsApp, but I don't like the way it saves every image I receive to my phone's Gallery. Telegram (bit.ly/ telegram389) does not do this but instead gives you the option to choose which images are saved to your Gallery. Thankfully, there's an easy way to fix this. Using a file manager, move a text file to the WhatsApp Images folder (found at /WhatsApp/Media/WhatsApp Images) and simply name it as .nomedia. Next, restart your phone and the WhatsApp Images folder will be hidden from Gallery. Bear in mind that doing this means you'll need to use a file manager to see and manage any of your received images outside of WhatsApp. If you change your

mind and want the files to be shown again, simply delete the .nomedia file.

As well as activating it manually, you can set it to come on at scheduled times, so that your phone doesn't disturb you when you're sleeping, for example. To do this, open Settings, select Do Not Disturb and tap the switch next to Scheduled. The time period from 22:00 to 7:00 is selected by default, but you can change these hours to anything of your choice. Below this, there's an option that stops repeated calls from the same person from being silenced, and you can also allow calls from Favourites or other groups.


# Why have emails disappeared from the Mail app?



# Can I install Windows 7 using another PC's disc?

I want to reinstall Windows 7 on my Dell Inspiron N5050 laptop. I have the Windows licence for it, but the only Windows 7 disc I have is for another PC. WINDOWS 10

# Why has the 'Open with' option disappeared?

The option to 'Open with' has disappeared from some of my context menus in Windows 10 since the latest round of updates. Before the changes, I was able to choose the browser that I wanted to open a web page file with, but this option has disappeard. Can anyone tell me how to restore it?



It's still there but, unfortunately, it only appears when Windows thinks you might need it. For instance, when you right-click a JPEG file, it'll still let you choose which application you want to open it with. For web pages you've saved, you can now only open the file with your default browser. To change this, try installing the appropriate Registry file listed in

'post 1' of the Ten Forums website thread at bit.ly/openwith389. Make sure you've backed up your Registry (just in case), then download and double-click the REG file. Restart your PC for the change to take effect. This restored the 'Open with' option for me.

I don't think the key on the PC sticker will work with another PC's disc, so a phone call to Microsoft will probably be necessary to activate your Windows copy. In my experience, the installation won't be a problem, but you may not be able to activate it.

Before you reinstall Windows 7, use

ProduKey from Nirsoft (www .nirsoft.net) to retrieve the stored product key. because it could be different to the one on the sticker. Use this stored product key when you install.

As for drivers, you might be lucky and have the correct ones on the disc, but I would go to the Dell website and download them from there first. You can get the correct ones by entering your Dell service tag number.

Alternatively, go to:

C:\Windows\System32

Back up the three driver folders onto a removable drive, then copy them back in after the clean installation.


# BT's website is using up my bandwidth

If readers on BT Broadband who have a capped monthly allowance of 10GB are wondering how a large chunk of this allowance is being swallowed up each month, the answer is: surprise, surprise... RTI

Since the beginning of December 2015, I noticed that my monthly allowance was disappearing at an alarming rate. Between January and November 2015 I used, on average, 5GB a month of my 10GB allowance. In December 2015, I was shocked to find that almost all my monthly 10GB was used up by the middle of the month, despite the fact that I had not used any more data than in earlier months

I downloaded and installed an excellent, small program called Networx (bit.ly/networx389) to find out where my bandwidth was going and to independently check my download and upload speeds. The answer was shocking. Before logging onto the BT website to check my speeds using its own online tool, I took a reading from Networx of the bandwidth I'd used so far that day, which was 88.6MB. After logging into BT, I signed off and opened Networx once again, only to find that my bandwidth usage had increased to 154MB. This means that logging onto the BT website and checking my broadband speed had used up no less than 65.4 MB!

If readers were to visit the site several times each day, a huge chunk of their monthly bandwidth allowance would simply disappear without trace. Perhaps





I should add that I've been keeping a close eye on my download and upload speeds because of previous 'speed issues' with BT.

It is clear that BT has now decided that using its website should be at a cost to your monthly bandwidth allowance. This change in policy was not announced anywhere as far as I am aware. BT is one sneaky company! Caveat emptor!

# There's no rest when you're roaming

've just returned from my regular annual pilgrimage to Las Vegas, covering the gobsmackingly enormous Consumer Electronics Show, where for the first time the constant "ding, ding, ding" of the slot machines was accompanied by the "ping, ping, ping" from my smartphone.

Normally, the first thing I do when touching down in Las Vegas is switch off my mobile data, lest I run up the kind of roaming bill that would force Bill Gates to sell a kidney. This year, however, I'm taking advantage of the free roaming offered by my mobile network, Three. The Feel At Home deal lets you use your smartphone in 18 different countries - including the US, Spain, France and Australia - as if you were still back in Blighty. Calls, texts and data are simply deducted from your regular monthly allowance, and it doesn't cost a dime extra.

This is an absolute game changer. I can ring my kids at home and not have to hurry them along when they're nattering about what they did at school today because it's costing a couple of limbs. I can fire up Google Maps satnav

when I'm driving a hire car, instead of fussing with a paper roadmap. I can check my online calendar and call people when I'm inevitably running late, because the traffic

in Vegas moves about as fast as St Paul's Cathedral.

And it's a game changer because Britain's other mobile networks will eventually be forced to follow Three's lead, bringing to an end 20 years of shameful consumer exploitation, with



roaming charges that bear absolutely no relation to the miniscule cost of letting you use your phone properly abroad. Vodafone still charges £3 per MB for roaming data in the US. The 200MB of data I've used in the few days

Facebook and Twitter. Family, friends and colleagues were warned in advance that I'd be going off the grid, and largely left me to get on with my trip. Instead, I found myself stood in front of the amazing vistas of Red Rock Canyon, tapping out replies to work emails and checking the football scores.

There's not even any escape in the air. The Virgin flight out here offered Wi-Fi, which sadly wasn't fast enough to stream Netflix as an alternative to the Jennifer Aniston movies on the in-flight entertainment, but perfectly sufficient for the bloke across the row from me to keep rattling out work emails for the entire duration of the 10-hour flight. They don't even demand you put your phones and iPads away for take-off and landing anymore.

Roaming might be free if you're with the right network, but you're no longer free to roam.



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
