Control Microsoft's privacy settings

n an effort to allay Microsoft users' concerns about privacy, its new web-based dashboard gives you greater control over what the company knows about you. This includes your browsing history, which - if you use Cortana - is sent to Microsoft and used to improve the voice-assistant's performance.

You can view and clear your browsing history through the dashboard, although it will still be stored on your computer. You can also delete your Bing search history and location activity, using a map to see all the GPS data Microsoft has collected about you.

Once you've done that, you can delve into Cortana's notebook to find out what information it has gathered about your interests. Microsoft says it collects this data so that it can better translate what you say or write. By clicking categories ranging from finance to sports, you can see what

data Cortana holds and clear the lot in one go.




Stick to your 2017 fitness goals

Need to Know

ISPs send warning letters to illegal downloaders

What happened?

ISPs in the UK have finally started sending letters to customers who download copyrighted material illegally, in an attempt to dissuade them.

The plans have been years in the making, having first been unveiled as part of the Digital Economy Act, which was rushed through Parliament in 2010. Letters were initially expected to be sent in 2011, but debates and court cases over who should pay for them delayed the project. Now that those issues have apparently been sorted out, ISPs including BT, Virgin Media, TalkTalk and Sky have started warning customers who repeatedly flout the law.

The letters are only educational, with no threat of sanctions or fines, so don't panic if you receive one. The situation is reminiscent of reports from several years ago when lawyers sent letters demanding payment for pirated material. These so-called 'speculative invoices' were sent to people whose broadband accounts appeared to have been used to download a specific film or piece of adult content illegally, and demanded hundreds of pounds in payment. If you didn't pay, the lawyers threatened court action. However, they failed to take anyone to court, and the practice was quietly dropped.

How will it affect you?

Unlike those speculative invoices, these missives from ISPs contain no demands for payment. Instead, a sample letter suggests they'll simply flag up the fact

that someone using the broadband connection has been spotted downloading content illegally.

The messages are designed to inform people that someone they live with is misbehaving online, or to alert less tech-savvy web users that the site they're downloading from isn't above board, in case they were unaware. The letters also aim to highlight legal alternatives in the hope that users will make better decisions next time.

The letters may refer to something called 'Get it Right from a Genuine Site' (www.getitrightfromagenuinesite.org).

This is a government-backed campaign run by lobby group Creative Content UK through which copyright owners are sending the letters.

If you receive a letter, you needn't panic. There's no bill attached, and ISPs aren't threatening to cut off your broadband. It's also worth remembering that it's possible no-one at your home has been downloading illegally sometimes the IP address system can't accurately determine who is attached to which connection. So if your offspring or spouse say it wasn't them, they may be telling the truth.

What do we think?

Not only are the letters too little too late, they were never likely to have much effect without some form of punishment to back them up. What's more, the

campaign only targets people who download from peer-to-peer sites, when much piracy has shifted to direct downloads, streaming services and set-top-boxes equipped with systems such as Kodi (kodi.tv) to search for unofficial copies of films and TV series.

The letters won't be news to many peer-to-peer users - after all, most so-called pirates are aware that what they're doing isn't entirely legal. While pointing out that their ISP knows what they're up to may have a chilling effect on some, without any sanction it seems unlikely that they would stop. Meanwhile, the inaccuracy of identifying people by IP address makes it unfair to fine users or cut off their broadband.

What can be done to cut down on piracy? We'd argue that the best method is to offer alternatives that are easy to use and relatively low-cost. Many people happily pay to stream music from Spotify and watch video through Netflix - it's simply easier for most of us than tracking down an illegal stream.

These letters have been delayed for too long and fail to address modern forms of piracy, and there's no real reason to obey them. It's hard to imagine that people who have been pirating music and video throughout the seven years the Digital Economy Act has been in force will stop now.

WhatsApp flaw raises security concerns

What happened?

A security researcher reported a flaw in the encryption system of messaging app WhatsApp, and suggested that the weakness made it possible for the company to read users' chats. The problem affects the way the system generates security keys, particularly for messages sent to offline users. This means WhatsApp could in theory intercept a message, read it, encrypt and resend it without the receiver knowing - unless security notifications had been switched on first.

Other security researchers have disputed the seriousness of the flaw, however, and WhatsApp denied that it was a "backdoor" created to give governments access to users' messages. The company said it was simply the result of a trade-off between usability and watertight security.



How will it affect you?

WhatsApp users should be aware that the messaging system's encryption isn't perfect and that, in extreme conditions, your messages could be read. It's a problem few of us are likely to face, because our lives are of little interest to security services, but it's worth understanding that there are limits to security.

If you'd rather use a messaging system that doesn't suffer from this issue, consider Signal - it uses the same encryption tools as WhatsApp but without the flaw. Those who want to stick with WhatsApp can opt to be notified about key changes by going to Account, Security and clicking Show Security Notifications. Receiving a notification doesn't mean you've been hacked, only that an encryption key has changed, but it's good to be warned.

What do we think?

Security issues can be baffling to the layman. On one hand, it's important that people understand the limitations of the security systems that protect messaging apps and other services. On the other, it would be better for such information to be reported in a calm, clear manner.

Although most of us don't need to worry about this news, the app is used by government officials, journalists and activists, so it's important they're aware of encryption's limitations.

BT cracks down on nuisance calls

What happened?

Are you sick of receiving unsolicited phone calls about PPI and other insurance claims? BT wants to help. The telecoms giant has unveiled a new system that lets customers divert unwanted calls to a 'junk

voicemail box', which works in a similar way to a spam filter for email.

BT's Call Protect Service will be free for BT phone customers. Once activated, BT's network-analysis tools will divert calls from numbers it suspects are being used by nuisance callers. BT spots these by looking for numbers that make excessive volumes of calls or engage in other suspicious activity.

How will it affect you? Any BT landline customer

can sign up for Call Protect for free by visiting www .bt.com/callprotect or calling BT on 0800 389 1572. Once activated, the system automatically diverts calls from any numbers on BT's blacklist to your 'junk mail' voicemail, which you can check to make sure no legitimate calls have been filtered by mistake. You can also set up diversions for specific categories of calls, such as those from withheld numbers.



If a spam caller manages to slip through BT's net, you can add the number to a personal blacklist by dialling 1572 after receiving the call. If enough customers complain about the same number, BT will add it to its own blacklist.

What do we think?

BT's research suggests that the Call Protect system could divert up to 30 million spam calls every week, and we can only thank the company for taking action. Such calls are a daily annoyance for anyone whose number has ended up on a list and has had to put up with robot callers shilling PPI rebates and scammers trying to convince them that their computer needs expensive technical support.

It's only a pity that the system is limited to BT customers - we'd love to see it shared with other providers, or for those companies to develop similar tools to help keep the pests off our phones.

NHS trust suffers huge cyber-attack

What happened?

Barts Health NHS Trust ruled out a ransomware attack on its systems, but confirmed that a cyber-attack has potentially put its patients' data at risk. The hospital trust sent staff an email warning that engineers were investigating a ransomware attack, according to the Health Service Journal (HSJ, bit.ly/health415).

A spokeswoman told tech-news site IT Pro: "Ransomware was [initially] a possibility, however now at this later stage in our investigation we don't believe ransomware is involved." The trust has not been able to establish what kind of cyber-attack it has suffered, and has had to take some drives and systems offline during an ongoing investigation.

HSJ reported that the cyber-attack affected thousands of files stored on computers running the out-of-date Windows XP operating system. Nine out of 10 NHS trusts still rely on XP, despite Microsoft ending support for it in April 2014, according to a Freedom of Information (FoI) request conducted in October 2016, and published in December.

Another Fol request last year suggested cybercriminals had targeted at least 28 NHS trusts with ransomware in the previous 12 months, seeking to lock access to patient data until the trusts paid a fee. NHS Digital, the body



that oversees cybersecurity for the health service, said no ransom was ever paid and no data was lost.

How will it affect you?

If you're a Barts Health NHS Trust patient, you'll be understandably concerned about this cyber-attack and the risk of your medical data falling into the wrong hands. But this is merely the latest in a series of attempted hacks on NHS trusts, which means we should all be worried, not to mention dismayed that the NHS is still using the unsafe Windows XP. Hopefully this attack will persuade NHS bosses to ramp up the

security of their systems to protect our personal information.

What do we think?

As we discussed in a similar news story in Issue 413 ('NHS Trusts still use Windows XP'), we acknowledge the cost and difficulty of upgrading millions of NHS devices to a more secure operating system, but the latest attack emphasises the need to do so sooner rather than later. We can only breathe a sigh of relief that Barts' computers weren't infected with ransomware the next time, the NHS might not be so lucky. Sort it out, Jeremy Hunt!



FIRST LOOK

HTC U Ultra bit.ly/htcu415

HTC has struggled to keep up with its rivals in the past few years, producing phones that have veered from the gimmick-laden Ultra Pixel camera HTC One M8 to the mediocre M9, and on to the solid but overpriced HTC 10. This year, the firm has gone back to gimmicks again, adding a second screen to its flagship HTC U Ultra. This second display runs across the top of the phone's huge 5.7in screen and shows notifications and shortcuts to apps you commonly use, whether the main screen is on or off.

As well as the extra screen, what lifts the HTC U Ultra above the average high-end smartphone is its ability to understand more about you



and your needs. HTC is calling it artificial intelligence, which is pushing it a bit because what it's building is more akin to the kind of machine learning that Apple uses to recommend apps you might want to use at particular times.

The assistant software behind this, HTC Sense Companion, learns from your

behaviour over time and provides you with smart reminders, such as notifying you to charge the phone if it thinks it's going to run out of battery before you get home. The device also uses four always-on microphones to deliver superior performance for voice-activated services.

We were able to spend a little time with both the HTC U Ultra and the lower-spec HTC U Play at this year's CES (see more CES gadgets in FAQ, page 36), and we feel the company has certainly delivered

a great-looking phone. Its 'liquid surface' coloured glass is reminiscent of the glass and metal design of the iPhone 7, and could prove a credible rival to Apple's device. But we'll only know for sure when we've had a chance to test it in full and know



WHAT'S THE RUMOUR

Is Yahoo changing its name to Altaba?

A filing at the US Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) has revealed that Yahoo plans to change its name to Altaba following the completion of its buy-out by US telecommunications company Verizon. However, sources said many of its products, including Yahoo Mail, its search engine and fantasy sports apps. will keep the Yahoo brand.



Yahoo sold its core internet business. which includes its email, websites and apps - formerly known as RemainCo to Verizon for \$4.83bn (£3.97bn) last vear. It's thought the deal will close in the coming weeks, which is why the changes to its structure have been announced.

There's still some scepticism about whether the acquisition will go ahead following the revelation of two serious data breaches at Yahoo over the last 12 months. However, neither company has revealed whether the hacks will affect the purchase and this latest news would seem to confirm that the deal will go ahead as planned.



LIKELIHOOD RATING

It's important to understand that only the investment part of Yahoo's business is being rebranded as Altaba - a name because of its similarity to the Chinese search engine Alibaba. which Yahoo owns a large chunk of. However, the change does little to conceal the mess that Yahoo is currently in, with dwindling profits and frequent security breaches. That Yahoo's products will be retaining their name and not rebranded as, for example, Altaba Mail is





Hackers can steal fingerprints from photos

Researchers at Japan's National Institute of Informatics (NII) have warned that photos featuring fingertips could pose a security risk with hackers capable of recreating fingerprints from little more than a peace sign. According to NII professor Isao Echizen, camera technology has progressed to the point where photos taken from up to three metres away could be used to glean specific biometric

"Just by casually making a peace sign in front of a camera, fingerprints can become widely available," Echizen told Japanese paper Sankei Shimbun, "Fingerprint data can be recreated if fingerprints are in focus with strong lighting in a picture."

Echizen and other researchers at the NII were able to recreate fingerprints taken by digital cameras, and have said that it can

be done without the need for any advanced technology.

This isn't the first time in recent years that the theft of biometric data from photos has been demonstrated. In 2014, hacker Jan 'Starbug'

Krissler was able to use a high-definition photo to copy German defence minister Ursula von der Leyen's fingerprints. "After this, politicians will presumably wear gloves when talking in public," he joked at the time.

Ransomware disguised as job application

Security company Check Point has uncovered a ransomware attack that poses as a legitimate job application. The email is sent with a harmless PDF covering letter and an Excel spreadsheet that contains the ransomware. When the victim opens the Excel spreadsheet.



they are invited to enable content so that macros can run. Upon receiving the go-ahead, the malicious commands launch a program that encrypts all the files on the user's computer and presents the message: YOUR FILES ARE ENCRYPTED.TXT.

While the files are being encrypted, the user is presented with a fake 'chkdsk' screen urging them not to turn off their PC. Once the process is complete, they will see a skull and crossbones and a message telling them their files have been encrypted using GoldenEye, with instructions on how to pay the ransom and unlock their files. The rates to unlock files start at 1.3 Bitcoins (£800) per infection. bit.ly/goldeneye415

passwords that don't use personal data. Instead of

trying to remember individual passwords, start with a fixed component and apply a simple scrambling formula. For example: start with the name of the online resource - such as 'mybank' - then apply a formula:

- · Capitalise the fourth character
- · Move the second last character to the front
- Add a chosen number after the second character
- · Add a chosen nonalphanumeric character at the end.

This would give you a password of 'nm1ybAk?'. Or, instead of using the

name of the online resource as the fixed component, you could create your own passphrase and use the first letter of each word. So if your passphrase is 'the quick

brown fox jumps over the lazy dog' the fixed component of each password starts out as 'tabfjotld'. Then apply your four-step rule.

By using either of these methods, you can ensure vou have a unique password for each online account, which will be secure against the type of breach that makes use of previously gained personal information.

If all this sounds too complicated, you should consider using a password manager software that automatically creates complex passwords for you,

keeps them secure and automatically enters them when you need to log in.

Simplify posting to multiple social-media services

If you have multiple accounts on social-media services, such as a Twitter account for yourself and another for your website, you'll know that being signed into both accounts at the same time can be a pain, involving multiple browsers and windows, or incognito workarounds. The Chrome add-on SessionBox (sessionbox.io) lets you keep different accounts open in separate tabs in the same browser. The free version also lets you colour-code and group different accounts to keep things organised. Download the add-on from the Chrome Web Store at bit.lv/sbadd415.

Relaxing EU cookie law

The European legislation which dictates that websites have to display cookie warnings is to be toned down. Currently, you have to warn users if you use any cookies, even innocuous ones that don't follow users off-site, such as visitor counters or shopping trolleys. A recent proposal from the European Commission, which you can read online at bit.ly/ ec415, admits that the current law "has resulted in an overload of consent requests for internet users". It states that it will seek to streamline the law, so sites will only have to alert users about cookies if they're going to be used to track their browsing habits. The Commission hopes to get the revised legislation in place by June 2018.



We test and compare the latest products

Netgear Orbi



David Ludlow takes a look at Netgear's latest attempt to bring fast, reliable Wi-Fi to our homes

eak Wi-Fi is a common curse and many of us suffer dead spots, unreliable connections and slow speeds in our homes. You can try to solve the problem by running Ethernet cables around your house or installing Wi-Fi range extenders, but these can be complicated to configure and may only fix half the problem by delivering improved range at the expense of speed.

Netgear's Orbi system offers a different solution by using two routers linked by a dedicated wireless network (called the 'backbone') to ensure a solid, superfast connection. You plug one router into your broadband (via an Ethernet port, so you'll need an existing Ethernet modem or router to connect it to) and place the second 'satellite' router in the middle of your home to extend the network's coverage.

The backbone is a dedicated 1,733Mbps (megabits per second), 802.11ac 5GHz network that's used exclusively to transfer data between the two Orbi routers. Each router then provides an additional 866Mbps 802.11ac 5GHz network and a 400Mbps 2.4GHz network, and your Wi-Fi devices connect to whichever router is nearest. If that's the satellite, the high-speed backbone should ensure you don't experience any slowdown in Wi-Fi speed.



The bandwidth available to the backbone also means that there's room for expansion, so you can buy additional satellite units to expand your network further.

Simple setup

Setting up the starter pack

couldn't be easier. The main router and the satellite come already paired, so all you have to do is connect the main one to your internet connection, then position your satellite and power it on.

Usefully, the satellite unit displays a coloured LED

that glows for 10 seconds to show your network strength: blue indicates that the connection is good, amber means fair, and pulsing magenta means there's no connection.

The web-based wizard then takes you through configuring a new admin password and providing your Orbi system with a new wireless network name and password. Settings are automatically synchronised between the router unit and satellite to create a single network in





your home. This is an improvement on the way many Wi-Fi extenders work, which create a separate network in addition to the one operated by your router.

Once you're set up, the Orbi's settings can be managed through a standard web interface. If you've ever owned a Netgear router, the Orbi's tools will be familiar. although you don't get as many settings to tweak. For example, you can't split the 2.4GHz and 5GHz networks. Instead, the Orbi uses 'band steering', which detects the capabilities of the connecting device, checks the current load and network strength, and automatically connects it to what it considers to be the best network. So vou can't control whether your devices use the 5GHz or 2.4GHz networks, but the overall result should provide better stability and faster speed.

Performance

We placed the main Orbi router where our internet connection enters the house and put the satellite on the first floor. At a range of five metres, we saw a throughput of 384Mbps; on the first floor, we got a throughput of 318Mbps; and on the second floor, 191Mbps. While closerange speeds are excellent, rivals such as the high-end Netgear Nighthawk X8 perform better at a distance.

Unplugging the satellite didn't make much difference to these results because the main router's location already provided good coverage in our test house. We then moved the satellite to the kitchen, to see if it could improve reception at the far end of the property and into

the garden, and the results in this case were more marked.

Without the satellite, we saw throughput of 30Mbps just outside the kitchen window, and no connection at all at the bottom of the garden. With the satellite in its new position, we got 288Mbps just outside the window and 253Mbps at the bottom of the garden. These speeds could be improved by fine-tuning the satellite's positioning and we got the best results by placing it in the middle of the kitchen.

Features

The Orbi devices have all the features you'd expect in a modern router, including port forwarding, dynamic DNS settings and Netgear's excellent web-filtering. However, it failed to stream internet-based YouView channels such as BT Sport, although Netgear has plans to release an update soon that will manage this.

The router also offers three Gigabit Ethernet ports for wired devices, and the satellite adds another four.

This could make the satellite a useful addition to an office or at the back of a TV, where you may have a collection of wired devices.

All that said, the Orbi is very expensive and perhaps some of this is down to the aesthetically pleasing appearance of its units. Most high-end routers are designed to appeal to tech-heads who want a device that looks like it could send a Wi-Fi signal to Mars. That's fine when the router is tucked away in an office or behind a load of other electronics, but displaying it in the middle of your house may elicit a less enthusiastic response from family members who don't want their living space dominated by something so utilitarian. The curved, aerial-free casing of the Orbi is far easier on the eye, and more reminiscent of a vase or the base of a lamp. It still needs a power cable, so pride of place on the coffee table isn't an option, but it looks a lot better among your household furnishings than the usual spiky monstrosity.

OUR VERDICT

Overall, the Orbi is a smart system. We found it delivered rock-solid Wi-Fi to our entire house so if you've struggled with poor Wi-Fi performance in the past, then this router could well be the answer.

But it's far from cheap. If you can physically relocate your existing router closer to the middle of the home, you may be able to improve your Wi-Fi performance without

Honor 6X

lan Betteridge tests Honor's latest Android phone, which offers iPhone 7-style twin cameras at a very reasonable price

onor's previous phones were praised for providing top-end features at affordable prices. The Honor 6X, which the company announced at CES and is already available in the UK, sticks to the winning formula: it's not just a good phone for the money - it's a good phone, full stop.

The design of the 6X isn't going to set the world on fire, but the curved design of its matt-metal body feels comfortable to hold, avoids fingerprint smudges and doesn't look or feel cheap. It comes in a choice of three colours - silver, grey or gold - and houses a 1080p 5.5in LCD screen, along with 32GB of storage and 3GB of RAM.

The phone has a dual SIM slot and uses micro-USB for charging. There's also a fingerprint reader, which typically for an Honor smartphone - is positioned on the back, just below the twin-lens camera. This makes it almost impossible not to plonk your finger on the lens when feeling around for it. On the plus side, it's very fast - in fact, unlocking the Honor 6X is so quick it's virtually instantaneous.

Camera, interface and battery

The Honor 6X's camera is particularly impressive. It's the only phone in this price range to include dual-lenses, in this case a 12-megapixel lens and a 2-megapixel secondary sensor, allowing it to simulate DSLR-like wide-aperture shots. This means you can focus on one element in the picture while blurring everything else. It's not as effective at performing this trick as the iPhone 7 Plus, but it's still good enough to give your portraits a lift. You can even change the focus point after you've taken the shot and save different versions. We tested the camera by taking some challenging indoor shots and the image quality was good, although not spectacular.

Honor has tinkered with the Android interface and includes some unwanted extra software, but you can uninstall everything if you want. Disappointingly, at launch, the Honor 6X doesn't come with Android 7 Nougat,

but that's promised in the next couple of months.

Thanks to a large 3,340mAh battery, low-voltage LCD backlight and Kirin 655 octa-core processor, Honor claims the 6X has twice the battery life of the Honor 5X, which is a significant improvement.

Value for money

There's a lot of competition among phones in this price

range, but the Honor 6X's design and camera give the device an edge over its rivals. It's also fast enough for demanding users and the battery life is good. Its biggest competitor is the Motorola Moto G4 (reviewed in Issue 404. bit.ly/webuser404), which is cheaper and has a better screen. Nevertheless, we prefer the design and the dual-lens camera of the 6X.

OUR VERDICT

The Honor 6X holds its own against phones that cost much more. It doesn't have all the power and performance that you expect from the latest top-of-the-range Apple and Samsung phones, but with the addition of some attractive high-end extras,

The author of this program admits it's just another duplicate-file remover, but DupeKill has an interesting trick up its sleeve - it intelligently guesses which files you want to keep based on their name. It also uses a couple of tricks to speed up searches, such as comparing hashes (small samples taken from files) first. This can be a real timesaver when comparing larger files. CHROME

Remove all the clutter from web pages

Firefox has a useful Reader View that strips adverts. background images and other unwanted clutter from web pages, but in Chrome you're stuck with the full horror of doday design. Unless, that is, you install the marvellous Mercury





Reader (bit.ly/mercury415), which makes even the messiest articles easy to read and speedy to print. Just click the rocket icon on your toolbar to instantly and thoroughly clean up the current page, leaving nothing but the main text and image content.

Alternatively, you can just press Alt and 'on your keyboard to switch to the streamlined view (and back again). Mercury Reader lets you set the default text size, typography (serif or sans) and theme (light or dark) of optimised pages, and share the clutter-free result on social media.

See what Facebook tags in your photos

Facebook's facial-recognition feature is banned in Europe due to privacy concerns, although you can of course still 'tag' people in photos yourself. What's less well known is that the social network also identifies objects in images, partly so it can gauge your interests for advertising purposes and also - more commendably - for the benefit of visually impaired users who rely on screen readers. A clever new Chrome extension called Show Facebook Computer Vision Tags (bit.lv/ tags415) lifts the lid on this covert identification by telling you exactly what Facebook has spotted in photos on your timeline. Common tags include 'food', 'people smiling', 'water', 'plant' and




'table', and the add-on also tells you if a picture was taken indoors, outdoors or at night. It works both with images you've uploaded and with those shared by other people, and is an interesting way to see the kind of information that is routinely extracted from your photos. A version is also available for Firefox (bit.ly/tagsfire415).

Close idle Chrome tabs automatically

Leaving browser tabs open when you've finished with them not only wastes memory but also compromises your privacy and

- if you've been shopping online - could even cost you money. Naturally, you can close idle



manually, but if you're the forgetful type it's worth installing Tab Auto Close (bit.ly/tab415). This new add-on automatically closes your browser tabs after they've been inactive for an hour - you can increase or decrease the number of minutes as required.

Tabs you want to keep open indefinitely can be added to a 'blacklist' to prevent them from being closed, and a two-minute warning gives you time to pause and resume tab termination.

Get warnings for unsecure websites

Any respectable website that asks you to enter a password or payment details will use a secure HTTPS connection to encrypt your data but, sadly, there are still plenty of sites out there that don't. For this reason - as of Chrome 56 - you'll now see a warning when a page you're visiting contains sensitive page elements such as input fields for passwords or credit-card details, but uses an unsafe HTTP server. This warning consists of a red triangle and the words 'Not secure' and will appear even when you're browsing in incognito mode. You can ignore it and proceed anyway, but you do so at your own peril!





Customise and disable keyboard shortcuts

Keyboard shortcuts are undoubtedly useful, saving you a lot of time and mouse clicking, but they can also prove annoying if you trigger them accidentally or have to stretch your aching fingers to perform them. You can solve both these problems using Keybinder (bit.ly/ keybinder415), which lets you disable keyboard shortcuts you don't need and change the ones you don't like. Open the add-on either by clicking the toolbar button or by selecting Tools. Keybinder and you'll see a list of all available Firefox shortcuts, from Ctrl+Q (which closes the browser) to Ctrl+Shift+K (which opens the Web



Console for developers). From here you can either disable unwanted shortcuts or edit them to use your preferred key combinations instead. Any changes you make can be easily undone by clicking Enable or Reset.



Generate a secure passphrase

Word-based passwords are notoriously unsafe because they're so easy to guess, but mixtures of letters and numbers are difficult to remember. A better alternative is to create a passphrase from several words, which is where Passphrase Generator (bit.ly/pass415) comes in. This add-on combines a large word list from the digital-rights group Electronic Frontier Foundation (EFF, www.eff.org/dice) with Firefox's own cryptography to create a random string of six words that you can use to register with websites. This passphrase is generated entirely in your browser - no information is sent to or received from other sources - and refreshes when you click the add-on's toolbar button. We got some interesting combos including 'sacrifice grandson wham viper retrieval gladiator', but do keep yours secret!

Right-click and copy on any website

Some websites - especially news sources - are very protective of their content and stop you selecting, rightclicking and copying their text and

images. This block is usually implemented using JavaScript, but you can get around it using Enable Right Click and Copy (bit.ly/copy415). Once installed, the tool sidesteps any right-click restrictions so you can grab content without having to disable JavaScript. It worked on every site we tested. For Chrome, try the similar RightToCopy (bit.ly/right415).

Test your online reading speed

Are you a speed reader or a slowcoach when perusing articles on the web? Find out by installing Reading Speed Test (bit.ly/test415), which calculates your words-per-minute reading speed. Simply select a block of text, right-click and choose 'Reading speed test' to start the 'stopwatch'. Click Done when you've finished reading (you can restart if necessary) and the



add-on will tell you the number of words vou read, the time it

took and your words-per-minute speed. It's surprisingly addictive and helps you determine how long it will take to read lengthy items.

OTHER BROWSERS



Capture screenshots instantly in Vivaldi

To capture screen grabs in Chrome or Firefox, you need to install an add-on, but the ever-innovative Vivaldi trumps both those browsers by offering a built-in screen-capture tool. Just click the new camera button on the status bar, decide whether to capture the full

web page including non-visible parts - or just a selection, then click 'Start capture'. You can save the resulting



grab as a PNG or JPEG image, and the picture can include the browser itself. The new feature is available in version 1.7 of Vivaldi (www.vivaldi.com).

Open Opera pages in Microsoft browsers

If you like Opera, but find that some web pages don't display properly because they require Internet Explorer or Edge, there's a solution that gives you the best of both worlds. Head to Opera's Extensions store and install 'Open in Internet Explorer' (bit.ly/openinie415) and/or 'Open in Microsoft Edge (bit.ly/ openinedge415). Now, when you come across a page that needs a Microsoft browser, just click the appropriate toolbar button. If IE or Edge is already running, the page will open in a new tab; if not, the button will launch the relevant browser.



Duolingo has ways of making you talk in a variety of foreign languages, and now the app has an even better means of motivating you, by encouraging friendly competition.

Duolingo Clubs is a new section of the app that lets you create a tutorial group for your chosen language and invite up to 14 people to join. As you progress through bite-size interactive lessons, your achievements are updated on the club feed. You can add



comments (in the language you're learning, of course) and emoji to congratulate or taunt other members while vying for the top spot on the weekly leaderboard.

It's amazingly addictive. After spending a few minutes setting up our Spanish-learning club, we'd intended to go and have dinner - but instead we spent more than an hour "playing" Spanish lessons against each other. The learning stuck, too. Tu bebes agua?

The lesson design is brilliant, but sadly this excellence doesn't extend to the setup side of Duolingo Clubs. You can't invite someone directly to join your club. Instead, you have to invite them to install Duolingo, then 'follow'

> each other, then ask them to search for your club and finally get them to enter a special code.

It would be a great shame if this long-winded process puts people off using Duolingo Clubs, because once you're in, it really works. Before you know it, you've learnt several phrases in Spanish, Dutch. Hindi or whatever language you've chosen for the club, and had great fun doing it.

Duolingo also makes an app for Windows Phone (bit

.ly/duowin415), but at the time of writing it doesn't support Duolingo Clubs.

Why is it interesting?

Netatmo's smart smoke detector doesn't pick up on carbon monoxide emissions but its battery lasts for 10 years and it makes sure it's in tip-top shape by checking itself every second. It also works with IFTTT and Apple's HomeKit, which means it can alert other smart devices as soon as it goes off.

When's it out?

It's due in the second half of 2017.

How much will it cost?

No price details have been released.

Do I really need it?

If your existing smoke alarms are due to be changed, then a smart detector is worth considering. With an 85-decibel alarm and the ability to silence it by phone, it can alert you without piercing your eardrums.

RICOH R CAMERA www.ricohr.ricoh/en

Why is it interesting?

This impressive camera can live-stream fully spherical, 360-degree videos for 24 hours at a time, and record them to microSD cards. It's the first camera of its kind that can capture footage for such a lengthy period and it does so in 2K resolution at 30 frames per second, using special technology to stitch the images together in real-time.



How much will it cost?

There has been no indication of price yet.

When's it out?

It is expected to be released in the spring.

Do I really need one?

The Ricoh R is bundled within a Development Kit, and is primarily aimed at professionals. However, it should provide lots of virtual-reality content for the host of VR headsets now available.

FARADAY FUTURE FF91

Why is it interesting?

Faraday Future's FF91 looks to have taken the lead in the race



to deliver self-driving cars. Not only will it have 10 cameras, 13 short- and long-range radars and 12 sensors to help ease it through the streets, it will go from 0-60mph in 2.39 seconds which, the company says, is far zippier than the Tesla Model S.

When's it out?

Faraday hopes the first cars will be hitting the roads in 2018, starting with the US, Canada and China.

How much will it cost?

All we know at this stage is that you need to put down a refundable \$5,000 (£4,034) deposit. Rumours are that the car will cost from \$150,000 (£121,032)!

Do I really need one?

Probably not – at least until the price comes down. But electric cars finally look like they have a significant future ahead of them.

It's not quite up to the capabilities of the magic mirror in Snow White, but this is undoubtedly one smart mirror. Operated via voice control or gestures, it uses a camera to scan your face and assess the health of your skin before alerting you to wrinkles, blemishes, dark circles, spots, fine lines and pores.

By analysing the data HiMirror receives, you can track changes over a period of time, syncing the data to a smartphone app. The idea is that you alter your skincare regime to help improve your complexion while getting an idea of which products work best for you.

A more advanced version - the HiMirror Plus - recreates five lighting situations so you can see how you'd look in, say, a supermarket or a brightly lit office.

When's it out?



You can build robots with Lego Mindstorms, but you have to use

bricks from the Technics range rather than those you're likely to have knocking around the house. Lego Boost is much more versatile, letting you use ordinary Lego bricks to build five hi-tech models, including a

moving robot rover, a playable electric guital an interactive purring cat and even a mini-factory that automatically builds small Lego models for you.

Boost will be based around a Move Hub that has Bluetooth Low

Energy connectivity and an interactive motor, as well as colour and distance sensors. The set will be accompanied by a free Lego Boost app for iOS and Android that lets you bring your robots to life.

When's it out?

Lego will launch Boost in August

How much will it cost?

The starter set will cost \$160 in the US, which is around £130, but don't be surprised if it costs £160 over here.

Do I really need it?

Don't put up with slow, unreliable internet. Wayne Williams explains how you can identify the causes of a weak connection and quickly get back up to speed

ecent research by Ofcom (bit .ly/ofcom415) found that the average download speed for home broadband in the UK is now an impressive 37Mbps (although some rural areas struggle to get 2Mbps). But that doesn't mean everyone enjoys superfast speeds all the time.

Running a test using a tool such as Ookla Speedtest (www.speedtest.net - see page 43) may confirm that your connection isn't as fast as it should be, but it won't tell you how to fix the problem. In this feature, we explain

the most common reasons for slow internet and reveal the secret tweaks that unlock extra speed.

Over the following six pages, we look at which hardware upgrades are worth the money, the router settings you should be using and the main causes of weak Wi-Fi and common network problems. We also explain how you can test your connection speed, so you can find out exactly where the dead spots are in your home and what improvements your changes have made.

HACK YOUR ROUTER SETTINGS

Don't share a channel with neighbours

Wireless routers can transmit on a choice of channels. If you and your neighbours are broadcasting on the same wireless channel, it can result in a weakened Wi-Fi signal. Checking which channels are being used by households in your vicinity and switching to an alternative channel could make a big difference to your internet speed.

Acrylic Wi-Fi Home (www.acrylicwifi .com) is a handy free scanner that lists all the wireless networks within range and shows you their SSID, MAC address, channel, 802.11 standard (see page 42), security type, router manufacturer and other information. Select any network to see a star rating for its channel quality, signal quality, signal-to-noise ratio, network security, transmission speed and 802.11 standards coverage. Acrylic also rates each network for overall

quality, so you can see any available options that provide a better connection.

You can sort the list of networks by their channel to make it easier to pick one that isn't currently being used (or isn't being used in close proximity to vour network, at

least). To change the channel, open the web page for your router's settings this is usually at 192.168.1.1 or similar, and provided in a label on your router - and look for the Channels option there. See our Mini Workshop on page 39 to learn

Wi-Fi network


Choose the correct Wi-Fi band

Many modern 802.11n routers, and all 802 11ac models offer simultaneous dual-band Wi-Fi. This means that two networks run concurrently - one on the 2.4GHz band and one on the 5GHz band. The router creates separate

SSIDs (wireless-network names) for each band, usually with '2' (or '2.4') and '5' in the name, to make it easy to select the one you want to connect your devices to. Putting some thought into which band you use for which equipment can make a big difference to your Wi-Fi speed and coverage.

Ideally, you should use the 2.4GHz band for older equipment, with newer devices - especially anything streaming video - assigned to the less congested 5GHz band. Some routers, such as the standard Virgin Media SuperHub, offer 'selectable' dual-band, rather than 'simultaneous', which means you can only use one of the two bands. If possible, switch to the 5GHz band because this will give you the best results - it's less prone to interference, and there's more room. If you have older devices that can't connect to the 5GHz band, you have three choices: you can

use the 2.4GHz band for everything; upgrade your older devices so they can connect to the 5GHz network; or upgrade your router to a simultaneous dual-band model.

Change your router's security settings

Your router offers a choice of encryption standards, such as WPA Auto. WPA2-PSK [AES] and WPA-PSK [TKIP]. When setting it up, you probably went with whatever the default setting was, but choose incorrectly and you could end up with a less secure and slower network.

TKIP is considered insecure and should be avoided, and WPA or TKIP encryption will slow a faster Wi-Fi router to 54Mbps. If your router offers WPA2-PSK (AES), select this because it's the most secure option. AES support has been mandatory in all devices manufactured after 2006, so everything you own (unless it's very old) should work fine. If you find certain devices can't connect to your Wi-Fi once vou've switched to a faster, more secure option, then you may need to switch back to the original setting. It usually takes around a minute for the change to take effect.

FIND AND FIX NETWORK ERRORS

Change to a different **DNS** server

DNS (Domain Name System) is used to translate site names into IP addresses so that they can be understood by web servers and internet routers. When you enter a web address into your browser, there will be a small delay while the browser asks your DNS server for the IP address of the site before it starts to load it. Most people tend to stick with the DNS server provided by their ISP. but it may not be the fastest and switching to a different

one could speed up the lookup time. Even if you decide to stick with the DNS server provided by your ISP, it's worth running a check to see how it compares with other servers.

DNS Jumper (bit.ly/dnsjump415) is a fantastic free program that lets you quickly switch to an alternative DNS sever without having to enter the details manually in Windows. All you have to do is run it (no installation is required) and click the Fastest DNS button. It will list numerous DNS servers and you can test them all, or narrow the results by ticking the ones you want and unticking those you don't. Click Start DNS Test and the program will benchmark each server. Every server gets tested twice, and the list is reordered according to the results.

To switch to the fastest result, click the Apply DNS Server button. You can also right-click any other result in the list and apply that instead. Before making any changes, it's worth running the test several times during the day, just to make sure the results remain constant.

If you want to make sure you're always using the fastest DNS server, there's an option to have the program

start alongside Windows, check for the fastest DNS server and switch to it automatically.

We'll be providing more advice on taking control of your DNS in next issue's Weekend Project.

Stop your ISP throttling your traffic

ISPs often used to throttle certain types of traffic - BitTorrent downloads in particular - to stop heavy internet users consuming all the available bandwidth. This kind of traffic shaping is much less common these days, although it does still happen with some ISPs and at certain times - usually evenings and weekends when the internet is at its busiest. If you suspect your ISP is throttling your downloads, check the terms and conditions to see what it says about traffic management. Remember. if you're downloading or browsing at peak time, then things will automatically be slower due to congestion. If you use BitTorrent, try scheduling downloads for after 1am. Use Wi-Fi when downloading or streaming on your phone to avoid the risk of throttling.

Speed up your 3G connection

This may come as a surprise, but we've found that using a mobile data connection can occasionally be faster than using public Wi-Fi. For example, O2's free Wi-Fi - which can be found in places such as Costa and McDonalds is often dreadful.

The general rule is that 4G connections are very fast; 3G should be decent; and anything else will be hit and miss. However, 3G speeds can often be improved. Opera Max for Android (bit .lv/opmax415) can speed up browsing on both a wireless and mobile network. It compresses content before it reaches your phone, so you download less data.

For speedier browsing, you could turn off images in your browser (so it just loads text) and also try clearing the cache in any apps that are having problems. In Android, go to Settings, Applications, select the app you want, and tap Clear Cache.

PREVENT PHYSICAL WI-FI PROBLEMS

Avoid interference from objects

Where you place your router can have a big impact on the quality of your wireless signal. If you place it near an exterior wall, some of the signal will extend outside your property; and locating it under a desk or in



a cupboard will reduce the power of the signal. Ideally, you should position your router somewhere central - on top of a desk, rather than under it - and away from any other electrical items or cables. As a rule, the higher up you place the router, the better the signal.

If the router has adjustable aerials, make sure they point into the room. It's worth having them perpendicular in relation to each other – so one is horizontal and the other vertical – because this will spread the signal around and hopefully improve it. You can use reflective surfaces to bounce the wireless signal around any particularly troublesome objects, although your living space may end up looking like a hall of mirrors!

Stop your neighbours piggybacking

If you suspect that someone outside your home might be using your wireless connection, you can check by logging into your router. Open your web browser and go to the router address (this will probably be printed on a label attached to your router), then enter your router's username and password. Look for a Device Connection Status

screen (or similar) and browse the list of wired and wireless devices connected to your network. It will show you a device's name and how long it has been connected for. Look for anything you don't recognise.

Keep away from household appliances

Electrical devices around the home specifically ones with motors, such as blenders can cause interference and degrade the quality of your Wi-Fi. Cordless phones (if you still have a landline), baby monitors and microwaves can also have an impact. If you don't have much of a signal in your kitchen as it is, you'll find it drops even more

when the

microwave is on. The signal will improve the further you move from the source of the interference.

Bearing this in mind, you need to make sure your router is as far away as possible from any potentially problematic electrical devices, and steer clear of them when you use your phone or tablet to go online.

Locate dead spots on a heat map

It's possible that the wireless-

network coverage in your home is a little patchy. If you can identify the weak areas, then you can work on improving the Wi-Fi there – perhaps by moving the router or using range extenders. The free tool NetSpot (www.netspotapp.com) can create a colour-coded 'heat map' of your home that shows where the wireless signal is strongest and weakest. You can create heat maps for both the 2.4GHz and 5GHz bands, which will let you see which network works best in each room.


To record the results so that NetSpot can build a map, you have to move around each location in your property, so installing the program on your laptop is the ideal solution.

Diagnose network-adapter problems

Your wireless network can be slowed down by all kinds of elements, and identifying the root of the problem can

be tricky. KC Softwares offers a Wi-Fi troubleshooting tool called dot11Expert (bit.ly/dot11expert415) that provides detailed technical information about your adapters, network and access points. It displays three panels filled with information, and double-clicking an item displays additional details to help you pinpoint the cause of problems. There aren't many settings to play around with, but dot11Expert could come in handy for identifying hitherto undiagnosed problems.

Make sure you download the free version rather than clicking the link for the paid-for Pro edition.

UPGRADE YOUR OLD HARDWARE

Replace your ageing router

If your router is more than a few years old, it's likely that vou'll be getting slower and weaker Wi-Fi than vou used to, and certainly nowhere near the optimum speed of your current internet package. The first 802.11 WLAN (Wireless Local



Area Network) standard was created in 1997 by the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and, since then, there have been numerous revisions, with each updated standard offering faster speeds and greater coverage. See the table above for a list of the main standards and the theoretical transfer rates they promise.

There are many other standards, too, including 802.11ad, 802.11ax and 802.11ay, but you don't need to worry about those for the moment because they're not yet widely available. The data rates listed in our table don't exist outside of laboratory conditions, so in the real world you'd experience much lower speeds, but they do provide an indication of how much better each of the major standards is in comparison to its predecessors.

If your router is particularly old,

it probably offers 802.11g, in which case you should definitely upgrade it. If it offers 802.11n, you'll get a reasonable speed but, in all honesty, upgrading to a 802.11ac router will pay dividends and is well worth doing - especially if you frequently stream music, TV shows and films over your network.

There is a caveat, which is that to get the most from an 802.11ac router, you need to be using 802.11ac devices; anything that doesn't support the new standard will only receive speeds comparable to 802.11n. The good news is that most newer mobile devices including iPhone 7 and Samsung Galaxy S7. do support this latest standard.

Even if you don't currently have any 802.11ac equipment, a modern router using that standard will result in better and stronger signals over a wider area. For example, we recently swapped an 802.11n Virgin Media SuperHub for the newer 802.11ac model, and the difference in

coverage was immediately noticeable, with dropped connections no longer a problem.

If you don't want to replace your router just yet, it's worth checking the manufacturer's or supplier's website to see if there's a firmware update you can apply. This should give your Wi-Fi a performance boost while improving its security.

Invest in a wireless extender

You can improve the coverage of your wireless connection using an extender, which takes your existing Wi-Fi signal and repeats it via a plug-in unit. You can add multiple units to your home to extend the Wi-Fi to places it doesn't usually reach. However, we've found that the results can be hit and miss depending on which model you buy.

In our Group Test of Wi-Fi extenders in Issue 414 of Web User (bit.ly/



webuser414), we found the TP-Link RE450 delivered the strongest Wi-Fi signal, especially on the 5GHz frequency, covering dead spots that similar devices couldn't reach. TP-Link claims it can achieve speeds of 1,750Mbps, although it's unlikely you'll get near that figure. The extender costs £45 from Amazon (bit.ly/tpl414) and is very easy to set up, with three adjustable antennae for achieving optimal coverage.

Alternatively, you could use HomePlugs to boost your connection. The excellent Devolo dLAN Wi-Fi adapters (bit.ly/dlanwifi415) extend your internet to any room using your home's electrical wiring, without any signal loss, and act as a reliable and unobtrusive Wi-Fi extender. The dLAN 1200+ WiFi ac Starter Kit Powerline (bit.lv/dlanwc415) costs £160 and includes one standard unit and one Wi-Fi AC adapter.

Upgrade to a mesh network

If you want to be certain of having rock-solid wireless coverage throughout

TEST YOUR CONNECTION USING OOKLA

If you suspect that your internet speed is slower than it should be, you can find out for sure using Ookla Speedtest (www.speedtest.net). There are two website versions - the main one, which uses Flash, and the beta version (beta.speedtest.net). which doesn't. There's also a Chrome extension (bit.ly/speed415).

The test measures 'ping time' that is, the length of time it takes for a site to receive an incoming connection and reply - as well as your download and upload speeds. You should run it several times a day to get an average. To see how your wireless network connection affects speeds, run the test on a laptop in different areas of the house.

There's also a mobile version for iOS. Android and Windows 10 (speedtest.net/mobile), which you can use to get a good idea of signal strength and connection speed anywhere around your home. Use this whenever you think there could be a problem with your internet performance.

It's worth running a test before and after rebooting your router, to see what sort of difference that makes. Also, try running a test next

to a working microwave or blender to get an idea of how such appliances can affect your wireless connection. You'll be surprised!

your entire home, then buying a mesh router system is the perfect solution. Rather than a single router, a mesh network is a modular Wi-Fi system with multiple access points that work together to ensure great coverage without lag or buffering. Each node increases wireless coverage by around 2,000 square feet, and you can add as many as you like. A mesh network uses a single name and password.

Linksys recently launched the Velop

Whole-Home Mesh network with Dynamic Tri-Band technology (bit.ly/ velop415), which will eliminate dead spots throughout your home - even in difficult-to-reach places such as your loft or garden. However, it's not cheap: a single unit costs £199.99, a twin pack is £349.99 and a triple pack is £499.99. On the plus side, it works with Amazon's Alexa technology so you can use voice commands such as "turn on guest access to Wi-Fi".

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
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Best free sticky-notes software

Is your workspace drowning in a sea of Post-It notes? Chuck them out and transfer their vital information to the Desktop of your PC. **Andy Shaw** tests six of the best tools to do it



Many of the apps and programs that let you stick Post-it-style notes on your PC's Desktop take the concept literally, by letting you type your reminders onto a series of

yellow squares. While you can certainly do that with Stickies, you can also do lots more. In fact you can do so much more, the options border on becoming overwhelming. Don't worry, though – nothing is overly complicated so you can take on as many or as few of the extra options as you want, and explore further tools at your own pace.

Rather than launching and running as a regular program and taking up space on the taskbar, Stickies operates from a small icon in the notification area, a bit like a security program. To add a new note, just press Ctrl+N and start typing. You can resize and rearrange your notes as you please. Any other applications you open will appear over the top of your Stickies; then, if you want to see them, just left-click the icon in the notification area to bring them back to the top. You can also choose to have your notes always on top if you prefer.

Right-click the taskbar icon and you'll see the extent of Stickies' tools



and options. You can organise your notes into stacks (folders that collect together notes for a particular project) and select options for how they're saved and managed. There's even a separate Manage Stickies window from where you can rearrange and archive your notes.

As well as simple text, you can paste almost anything into a Stickie, including images, web addresses and even file attachments. If you want to get really sophisticated, you can share notes with other people over your network, and there's a solid backup-and-restore option, so you can ensure that your notes are never lost and even transfer them to another PC.

How it can be improved:

There are a lot of sophisticated options available and the software pops up a Help document when you first launch it, which is a bit overwhelming. A link to a video intro with further tutorials for advanced users might be a better way to get all this information across.

OUR VERDICT

Stickies lets you display almost anything in its notes but don't be put off by its range of options. They're there when you want them but you can just as easily start off using it as a simple note tool.



Sticky Notes is Microsoft's take on displaying Post-itstyle notes on your Desktop and it comes preinstalled with

Windows 10. so it's ready to use whenever you want. It's recently undergone a significant update that lifts it above the basics, analysing the content of notes and integrating with other Windows 10 apps to make your sticky notes more functional and to link them to your other programs. For example, typing a web address into a note creates a clickable link; a street address creates a link to Microsoft's Maps app: and a flight number adds known details about the flight to the bottom of the note.

You can choose from six different colours for your notes, which is handy for organising them, and you can resize and rearrange them in whatever way you like. There's not much more to it, but if all you want to do is create and display some simple reminders, this is the easiest way.



How it could be improved:

There are a lot of things that you can't put into a Sticky Note, including images, which is a significant oversight. You also can't perform any text formatting, such as adding bullet-pointed to-do lists, changing fonts or adding bold or italics.

OUR VERDICT

If all you want to do is paste a reminder or two onto your Desktop, Sticky Notes does the job and it's ready to use because it's already installed. Apart from its ability to recognise types of text, though, it offers little else beyond the basics.

This Windows 10 app has a unique trick up its sleeve. Instead of displaying notes on your Desktop, it pins them to the Start menu, which is a handy and easily accessible place to keep them. If you like the idea of sticky notes but don't want to clutter your Desktop, this is a great tool - but it doesn't do anything else.

PNotes.net lets you create sticky notes on your screen but it doesn't do it in a particularly clever way. For example, when you add a new note, it appears in the exact centre of your screen, even if there's another note already there, so you're likely to accumulate a pile of notes hidden behind one another.



StickyPad

StickyPad is a simple and straightforward sticky-note tool but it has a number of drawbacks. For starters, it uses Windows XP-style icons, which look very dated, and you can't use non-text elements such as images in your notes. It also turns every note into a Desktop icon, even if it's closed, which creates a lot of Desktop clutter.

What we liked:

7 Sticky Notes has as many tools and features as Stickes, but is styled in a slightly different way, with many of its tools

focused on the presentation of notes. When you create a new note - by right-clicking its icon in the notification area and selecting the option from a pop-up menu it automatically adds the date and time in the title bar, though you can overwrite this if you want.

It also opens a Note Configuration Window containing lots of icons for formatting your typed text. If you want to spend time making your notes look just right, adding bullet points and highlighting, this is the right tool for the job. However, it defaults to a handwriting font, which we weren't keen on.

The Configuration Window includes tabs containing more tools, such as alarms that can be set to alert you about a note at a particular time.



How it can be improved:

This software hasn't been updated since 2013 and looks suspiciously like it might have been abandoned. As a result, the interface is starting to look a little outdated when run alongside other modern Windows programs.

OUR VERDICT

If you find the Gold Award-winning Stickies a bit overwhelming, you may find 7 Sticky Notes more friendly and easy to use. However, it's looking a bit dated and may never receive another update.

Switch from one provider to another

Companies don't make it easy for you to move to their competitors, but don't let that put you off. Edward Munn explains how to make an easy switch



MOVE BETWEEN IOS AND ANDROID

If you're trading in your Android phone for an iPhone, you can transfer most of your important data by installing Apple's free Android app Move to iOS (bit.ly/move415) and following its simple on-screen instructions. Unfortunately, there's no equivalent app to take care of the switch from iPhone to Android, but the process is straightforward if you know what to do.

Move to iOS

Use this app to copy messages, photos and more from this Android phone to a new iPhone or iPad.

Contacts

If your contacts are saved to your Google account, just set up your Android device with this account and they'll automatically appear in the Contacts app. If, however, your contacts are saved to iCloud, you'll need to go to www.icloud.com in your Desktop browser, log in and click Contacts. From this page, click the settings cog, choose Select All, then click the cog again and



choose 'Export vCard'. Now, in your browser, go to your Gmail account, click the drop-down menu and select Contacts. Select More and Import, then click 'CSV or vCard file' and follow the on-screen instructions to upload your contacts. Once uploaded, your contacts will automatically appear in the Contacts app on your Android device.

Email and SMS

If you use Gmail, you'll be able to access your inbox as soon as you've logged into your Google account on your Android device. If, however, you use a different IMAP email account such as iCloud or Yahoo Mail, you can try using

the 'Add account' option in Gmail's sidebar. Alternatively, you can install an email app that supports IMAP from the Google Play store - our favourite is Type App (bit.ly/typeapp415). You'll receive SMS messages on the Android phone as soon as you install your SIM card, but it's important to disable iMessage before doing this otherwise messages from iPhone users may never arrive. While the SIM card is still in your iPhone, open Settings then Messages and make sure iMessage is set to Off.

Photos

If you haven't backed up your iPhone photos to a PC or Mac, you should install the Google Photos app on your iPhone to upload them to the cloud, where they can be accessed on your new Android device. From Google Photos for iOS, select the menu button, then tap the settings cog and select 'Backup and sync'. Next, switch on 'Backup & sync' and you can sit back as your photos are uploaded to the cloud (be warned that this could take some time!). When you log into your Android device with your Google account, Photos will

automatically contain a timeline of your iPhone photos.

Music

Because iTunes isn't available from the Google Play store, you'll have to transfer your iTunes library if you want to listen to the tracks on an Android phone. This entails uploading the iTunes files to Google Play Music. To do this, make sure that your iPhone is fully synced to your computer using iTunes, then install Google Play Music Manager (bit.ly/playmusic415) and follow its on-screen instructions to upload your music to the cloud. You can sync up to 50,000 songs to the cloud for free and, once you've done so, you can play them from any web browser as well as Android and iOS devices. Note that in order to access your tracks, you might first need to add your credit card details to your Google account.



MOVE FROM YAHOO MAIL TO GMAIL


Following several major data breaches in 2016 and the recent news that Yahoo might cease to exist altogether (after it was acquired by US telecom giant Verizon), there's never been a better time to switch email provider. To import your Yahoo emails into Gmail, open Settings in Gmail and go to the 'Accounts and Import' tab, then click 'Import mail and contacts'. Enter your Yahoo Mail address under 'What account do you want to import from?', click Continue and enter your password, then select Continue again. Make sure 'Import contacts' and 'Import mail' are both selected, along with 'Import new

TRANSFER WHATSAPP CHATS TO A NEW PHONE

If you're moving from one iPhone to another phone, you'll need to back up your WhatsApp chats to iCloud so that they can be restored to your new device. To do this, open WhatsApp Settings, select Chats, Chat Backup and Backup Now. You can also tap Auto Backup from this menu to set the app to back up your chats at regular intervals. After checking when the last backup was performed, you can delete the app. When you install it on your new phone and follow the on-screen instructions, you'll be given the option to restore your chats.

The process for transferring chats between Android devices is very similar. Open WhatsApp's Settings, select Chats, 'Chat backup' and 'Back up to Google Drive'. Choose how often you want backups to take place, then tap Back Up. You'll be asked to select the Google account to which you want to save your backup. Once it's finished, you can delete the app. When installing WhatsApp on your new Android device, you'll be asked if you want to restore your chats when you verify your phone number.

We'd advise against trying to move vour chats from iOS to Android (and



the reverse), because the process is long-winded and involves using third-party apps that might not respect your privacy. You can still keep copies of your important chats and the photos they contain by emailing them to yourself. To do this, open the WhatsApp conversation you want to email, tap the contact's name and scroll down to tap Export Chat. Choose whether you want to include media such as photos and videos from the conversation, then select the Mail app, enter your email address and tap Send.

mail for next 30 days' if you want Yahoo messages to automatically appear in your Gmail inbox for the next month. You can also select 'Add label to all imported mail' if you want your Yahoo emails to be easily identifiable and sortable. Finally, click 'Start import', then OK

COPY PHOTOS FROM FLICKR TO **PHOTOS**

With Yahoo's future so uncertain, it's a good idea to move your photos from Flickr to Google Photos rather than risk

> losing them. To do this, you'll first need to manually download your image files from Flickr. Open the site's Camera Roll view, select the first image, then press and hold Shift while scrolling down to the last entry.

Click this while still holding down the Shift key and Flickr will display the total number of images you've selected. Click Download and the site will ask you to download your images as multiple archive files. Download and extract each one, then install the Google Photos Desktop uploader (photos.google.com/apps) and follow its step-by-step instructions to upload all your photos to the cloud. Note that the free version of Photos is limited to 15GB of storage at full quality, but you can save an unlimited number of files by choosing the 'High quality' option.






Find out whether software is 32-bit or 64-bit

Most 32-bit (x86) software will work on any version of Windows, but you'll need a 64-bit edition of the operating system (and a 64-bit processor) to run 64-bit (x64) software. If you're not sure how many bits you're working with, go to the Start menu and search for system. Select the result to open the System section of the Control Panel and you'll find details of your bits next to 'System type'.

Knowing this information ensures that you click the correct download link, but if you're not given a choice between 32-bit and 64-bit - or you've already downloaded the software - your install




We can happily install this program because it's 32-bit. Hooray!

may hit a brick wall. Help is at hand from a free tool called ExeProperties (bit.ly/ exeprop415), which tells you if a program is incompatible with your PC before you open it. Simply right-click the EXE or DLL file of a download, select Properties and click the Exe/DII Info tab. Here, you'll see which system type the software requires and the minimum Windows version. If it's a 64-bit program and you only have 32-bit, then it's time to give up.

Run old software in compatibility mode

When Windows 10 was released, many users had trouble running their favourite programs in the new operating system, despite its claim to be 'backwards-

compatible'. Microsoft has since fixed most of the problems, but you may still find that some software you used on Windows 7 or earlier no longer works.

RUN CHROME EXTENSIONS IN FIREFOX

By the end of 2017, Mozilla plans to completely replace traditional Firefox add-ons with WebExtensions that work across all browsers. Until then, you can make your favourite Chrome extensions work in Firefox using a fantastic new tool called Chrome Store Foxified (bit.ly/foxified415). Install this add-on, then visit the Chrome Web Store (chrome.google.com/webstore) in Firefox, choose an extension and you'll see an 'Add to Firefox' button in the top-right corner. Click this and the extension will convert to Firefox format, and you'll be able to 'sign' and install

it or download the CRX file to your PC. You'll first need to create an account at addons.mozilla.org, if you don't already have one, but this doesn't take long. Alternatively, you can run the extension temporarily (until you close Firefox) by clicking Temporarily Install Unsigned Addon. Not all Chrome extensions work properly in Firefox, but thousands do!

Will it work or not?

Ideally, Windows 10 should automatically switch to 'compatibility mode' when it detects that you're trying to run an old program, but you can also activate this manually. Right-click the application's EXE file or shortcut, select Properties and click the Compatibility tab, then tick 'Run this program in compatibility mode for:' and choose the version of Windows that the program worked properly on. If you're not sure what the problem is, run the 'compatibility troubleshooter' to select the correct settings

Check the compatibility of Android apps

Google helpfully tells you if an app in the Play store will work on your phone or tablet, but if you have more than one Android device it may say: "This app is compatible with some of your devices". Click the 'i' icon next to this message to find out which one(s) it will work with. Incompatibility may be caused by an older version of Android, because the app requires a mobile network or due to geographical restrictions (although if


the latter is the reason then the app won't work on any of your devices).

Before you upgrade to a new version of Android, such as Marshmallow or Nougat, it's worth checking that your favourite apps are compatible with the new mobile OS. You can do this using a new free tool called AppChecker (bit.ly/ checker415), which reveals the version of Android your apps were designed to work with. If an app was intended to run in Jelly Bean or Ice Cream Sandwich, that doesn't necessarily mean it will stop working after you upgrade, but it might become clunky and not support Android's latest capabilities. These

problems could be fixed by updating the app or finding a more modern replacement. If, on the other hand, your most-used apps support a version of Android higher than the one you're running, it's time to embrace the future!

Report incompatible Firefox add-ons

Any extension you install from the official Chrome Web Store should update automatically alongside the browser, which prevents compatibility problems and removes troublesome tools by disabling them. Firefox is less efficient and many older add-ons don't work in the latest version of the browser. Mozilla usually highlights this on the add-on's download page or warns you when you try to install it, and offers help through its Add-on Compatibility Reporter (bit.ly/reporter415). This lists the add-ons you have enabled and lets you mark them as working okay or as experiencing "issues". You can then submit a report to Mozilla, which will ask developers to fix the problems.

Find the right program to open a file

When you double-click a file with an

unusual extension, Windows asks you to choose a program to open it with. To minimise the guesswork when you try to open an unknown file, the excellent free tool OpenWith Enhanced (bit.ly/open415) checks its online database to suggest applications that have opened that type of file before. Programs that are already installed on your computer are marked accordingly. so vou'll know which ones vou have access to, and if you select an application that's not installed on your computer, you'll be redirected to its official website to download it. Once you've chosen the correct software, select 'Always use the selected program to open this kind of file' to prevent future problems.



OpenWith Enhanced opens the files that Windows can't reach

You can solve the mystery behind an unknown file type by looking it up on FileInfo.com (www.fileinfo.com). This massive database of file extensions provides detailed information about specific file types, including what data they contain and all the programs that can be used to open them. The site covers more than 10,000 extensions. from AAC (Advanced Audio Coding File) to ZZZ (a black-and-white game file, apparently), and includes a weekly chart of the most searched-for file types. FileInfo.com also has a Chrome extension, called File Extension Search (bit.ly/file415), which lets you identify a file's format before you download it, so you know which program you'll need to open it.

Organise your Desktop with SideSlide | bit.ly/side415

SideSlide is a Desktop sidebar and program launcher that was recently updated. Here's how to use it to keep your Desktop neat and tidy

f your Desktop is littered with files, folders, program shortcuts and more, SideSlide can help you whip it into shape. This floating workspace will sit anywhere on your screen or hide at the edge until you need it - just hover your mouse over it, and it appears instantly. Use it to store program shortcuts, folders, files, bookmarks, news feeds, notes and reminders - all of which are

sorted neatly into individual resizable windows. The latest version gains a calendar, which you summon by pressing the '=' key, and the ability to back up your current layout and preferences. There's also a new 'copy path' option.


The default design isn't particularly attractive, but the software offers a range of alternative themes, so you can customise the way it looks and behaves.



When you launch SideSlide, a number of windows appear on your Desktop. These include some Post-It style notes, one of which is a welcome message, 11 and the SideSlide workspace. 2 Drag the Note containing the message to the Desktop, then click the up arrow in its corner **B** to return it to the workspace.



You can move any window in or out of the workspace in this way. You can also move the workspace anywhere on your screen by clicking and dragging its title bar. 11 To resize the workspace, move your cursor to the corner or edge of the window until the handles appear, 2 then click and drag to the desired size.






If you want to use SideSlide as a sidebar, right-click the button in the top-right corner of the workspace 1 and choose your preferred position from the menu that appears. 2 From here, you can also collapse the workspace to keep it out of the way 3 or centre it on your Desktop.



When the workspace is hidden, moving your mouse to its location makes it reappear. Double-click the header to open the workspace full screen. You can move containers into the workspace by clicking and dragging, and shrink or expand them by clicking the small square in the top-left. 1



Right-click the window to open a menu with options to detach a container, 11 add new content 2 and manage shortcuts. 2 You can also arrange, remove and rename containers from this menu. 4 Use these options to reorganise the workspace to your liking.





Notes have their own menu, which you access by right-clicking the menu bar. You can attach a note to the workspace, 11 dock it to the edge of the screen, 2 choose whether or not it's visible at all times, **B** make it transparent and change its colour. 4 You can also close and delete unwanted notes. 5



To add your own containers, click a blank area of the workspace. A floating toolbar appears. 11 Hover your mouse over it to see what each button does, 2 and click one to create that item. Options include, new container, new folder container, notes, reminders and shortcuts.



To customise SideSlide's behaviour, right-click a blank area of the workspace and select Settings, or press F3. Here, you'll find general settings, 1 settings for containers 2 and shortcuts, **3** as well as options for RSS and keyboard navigation. 4 Change how the program looks in the Appearance tab. 5



Back up changed files automatically

he latest version of AOMEI Backupper introduces an excellent new tool that lets you sync a group of files to another location – such as an external hard drive or cloud storage – so you can be sure you always have an up-to-date backup. Because the files are synced rather than stored as part of a backup image, you can view and open them with a minimum of fuss, even on a PC that doesn't have the backup software installed.

You can activate real-time syncing so that any changes you make to your source files are detected immediately and replicated in the destination folder. Alternatively, you can use manual scheduling to ensure your files are synced daily, weekly or monthly.

The option to sync to a cloud app is especially useful because it lets you keep your files where you want them while still backing up to a cloud service. Although we're using AOMEI Backupper Standard, which is the free version of premium software, it provides some great additional tools, including the option to switch off your PC after the initial lengthy sync and to send email reports about all your backups.






Download, install and run AOMEI Backupper. Next, click Backup 1 and scroll down to click File Sync. Choose a name for your backup 2 and, in the area marked 'Step 1', select Add Folder 3 and Browse to choose the folder you want to sync. Click Open to confirm your selection.



Choose whether you want to include subfolders, 1 then select OK. 2 You can repeat the process to add multiple folders. When you're happy with your selection, click 'Step 2' to choose the local directory to which you want to sync your files. Click OK to confirm your selection.



If you want to sync your source folders to a cloud drive, click the drop-down menu, 1 choose the option to 'Select a cloud drive' 2 (the network share option is a premium feature) and select the service you want to sync the files to from the left-hand column, then click OK.



Click Sync Options to add a description 1 that will help you identify your backup. In this menu, you'll also see an option to 'Enable email notification'. 2 Select this if you want to receive email confirmation of your backups (open Settings and Notifications to configure this). Click OK to save.









As with most backup tools, AOMEI Backupper's File Sync feature is one-directional, so every change you make to the source files is reflected in the target folder, but if you make any alterations to files in the target folder, they won't be synced back to the source files. To avoid confusion, therefore, we recommend that you view but don't edit files in the target folder.



Tick the Schedule box and click the button to choose how often your files are synced. You can choose from a range of options including Daily, Weekly and Monthly, 11 as well as Real-time Sync. 2 'Event triggers' is a premium option and not available in the Standard version.



You can use the daily, weekly and monthly options to specify exactly when AOMEI syncs your files. By clicking the Advanced tab, you can also choose to 'Run missed sync at the next system startup' 1 to ensure you always have an up-to-date backup.



If you select Real-time Sync, AOMEI Backupper is set to delete files in the destination folder by default when they're deleted from the source. Untick this option 1 if you would prefer the program to keep copies of your synced files even if you delete the originals.



When you're happy with your configuration, click Start Sync and AOMEI Backupper will back up your files. If you have a lot of files and your sync is likely to take a long time, tick the 'On completion' box 1 and choose what happens when the backup has finished, such as 'Shut down PC'. 2



AOMEI's Home tab shows a summary of all your backups. ■ Click Restore ≥ to restore a backup or Sync Now to perform a manual sync. Click Advanced 4 and select Schedule Sync to change how often a backup is synced, or Edit Sync 5 to change the source and destination directories.



Click Properties to see the description of a backup (which you entered in Step 4), along with information about when it was first created. Select View Logs 11 from this menu to view its sync history. You can also click the Source Data tab to view and open the source files.

eb trackers observe your movements around the web in the hope of showing you tempting (or invasive and annoying) ads based on the sites you've visited. The new version of Privacy Badger blocks these









Privacy Badger starts protecting you automatically. Click its button 1 to display a panel, which lists any tracking tools it detects with a slider: red shows the tool is being blocked, green **B** means the tracker is deemed to be safe, while yellow 4 is partially blocked to ensure the site still works.



You can drag the sliders to any setting you want, but you may find that this occasionally stops a site from working properly. If this happens, click the arrow next to any sliders you've changed 1 to revert to Privacy Badger's defaults.




If Privacy Badger's settings are preventing a site from operating, you can circumvent it completely by clicking the 'Disable Privacy Badger for This Site' button. 1 You can also click 'Did Privacy Badger break this site' to send information back to the developers.



In the latest version, Privacy Badger can be set to operate in incognito mode, but this isn't switched on by default. In Chrome, click the menu button, select 'More tools' 1 then Extensions 2 and put a tick in the box next to 'Allow in incognito'. B



The software learns as you browse and saves the data locally, but you can now transfer your settings to another browser. Click the Options cog, 1 select the Manage Data tab 2 and use the Download button 3 to save the data, then click the Import button 4 to upload it to another browser.



You'll also find a new WebRTC setting 1 under the General Settings tab, 2 which gives you the option to stop information about your IP address leaking when making video and audio calls. Tick it, but be aware that it might slow down certain tools, such as Google Hangouts.

i-Fi Prioritizer lets you automatically connect to your favourite Wi-Fi networks so your device never joins the wrong one. The handy tool then checks for preferred networks at regular intervals and switches to



WiFi Prioritizer will automatically switch to higher priority networks when they're in range and have signal strength of 30% or more if your current network has less than 100% signal strength.






You can stop the app auto-switching to a specific network by unticking the appropriate box. You can also set the minimum signal strength [1] at which Wi-Fi Prioritizer will join available, higher-priority networks. To do this, tap the menu button, open Settings and choose 'Signal Strength to Connect'.



To make sure that WiFi Prioritizer only picks another network when your current one has low signal strength, use the 'Signal Strength to Disconnect' option in the Settings menu. 11 You can also choose how often WiFi Prioritizer scans for Wi-Fi networks by using the Refresh Interval option. 2



To stop your device connecting to Wi-Fi networks that offer no internet connectivity, tick the box next to Check Internet Connectivity. 1 You can choose which URL the app uses to check connectivity 2 and set the duration for which it disables networks with no internet. 3



Wi-Fi Prioritizer refreshes even when Wi-Fi isn't enabled so that you can pick the best Wi-Fi network when it's eventually switched on. To stop the app using too much battery with this constant refreshing, choose longer refresh intervals or disable it using the switch to Enable Scheduled Job. 11



Get Windows 10 Creators Update now

Wayne Williams shows you how to take Windows 10 Creators Update for an early test drive and what to try when you've got it



Before you start

The Creators Update isn't finished yet there's still months of development to go - but Windows Insiders have been trying out its new tools for a while. Build 14986 is one of the most recent releases and has been pushed out to the Insider Preview Slow ring, meaning it's a lot less risky than the usual Fast-ring-only releases. More importantly, it's also been released as an ISO image. This can be used to create

a clean install of Windows 10 Creators Update on a spare PC or installed in a virtualized environment using VirtualBox (www.virtualbox.org). We'll show you how to download it in our Mini Workshop, opposite, and how to run it in VirtualBox in our Mini Workshop on page 61.

You can, if you prefer, install it on your main PC, but this isn't something we would recommend because it's still having bugs and problems ironed out.

Also, if you change your mind about being on the Windows Insider programme and want to return to your previous (stable) version, you'll need to reinstall Windows from your original installation media.


What's new

The Creators Update has a lot of new features and improvements. Here are some of the standouts:



New 3D software

Microsoft is betting large on 3D being the next big thing, and this is the primary focus of the Creators Update. There's a new Paint 3D app that lets you create and work with 3D models (you can scan objects in 3D using your smartphone), and the Edge browser now supports 3D content, too. PowerPoint comes with support for 3D models and the new OS gains a View 3D Preview app for viewing and interacting with 3D models.

Cortana improvements

Microsoft has already made lots of tweaks to its digital assistant in previous

updates and more are on the way. In the Creators Update, you can control your PC using your voice, including shutting down, restarting or locking Windows, and raising or lowering the volume. There's also a new full-screen mode. When your PC is unlocked and idle, say "Hey Cortana" and, after a few seconds (with no further input from you), Cortana will switch to a full-screen view so you can use it from across the room.

Bve-bve Command **Prompt**

The Command Prompt (CMD) still exists but it's in the process of being replaced by PowerShell. You're unlikely to notice the difference but if you do - and you don't like it - you can (for now at least) go back to the original Command Prompt by clicking Start and going to Settings, Personalisation, Taskbar, Look for 'Replace Command Prompt with Windows PowerShell in the menu when I right-click the Start button or press Windows key+X' and change the setting to 'Off'.

Alternatively, take a look at our PowerShell tips in Issue 413 (bit.ly/ webuser413) to get to grips with it.

Unified Update Platform (UUP)

This is an under-the-bonnet change that alters the way Windows downloads updates. The operating system only has to fetch pieces that have changed since the last time, allowing for smaller and more efficient updates.

Windows Ink improvements

If you use Windows Ink to sketch and draw on your PC, you might be interested in the new changes which improve the tool's look and functionality, and let you resume previous sketches.

• EPUB support

You can now read unprotected ebooks in EPUB format in Microsoft Edge. The browser lets you customise the reading







Choose either a 32- or 64-bit download. 🚺 Both are quite sizable - the UK English 32-bit (x86) version is 3.2GB, while the 64-bit (x64) build is 4.4GB. If you want to install the ISO, you will need to burn the file to a DVD or transfer it to a USB memory stick using a tool such as Rufus (rufus.akeo.ie).

Coming up next

New builds are released to the Windows Insider programme on a regular typically weekly - basis. Although the latest ISO is for Build 14986, newer builds have since rolled out, introducing yet more forthcoming features. These include the ability to pause Windows updates, Live Tile grouping and a new pinned tab feature in Microsoft Edge. There's also an improved tab bar and a new Blue Light option to boost colour warmth, which


makes the screen easier on the eyes and will be a welcome option for anyone who uses a computer at night.

Another new addition that only some unfortunate Windows Insiders will see is the GSOD (Green Screen of Death). This replaces the traditional blue-screen error message that most Windows users will be familiar with. Microsoft has changed the colour so it can instantly determine which branch (Stable or Insider) an error has occurred in.

Change your ring

If you ran a clean Windows 10 installation from the ISO, you will have been automatically enrolled in the Slow ring. Updates for this come later than in the Fast ring, but tend to be less buggy. If you want to live life a little more dangerously and switch to the Fast ring, you can do so by going to Settings, 'Update & security' and clicking Windows Insider Programme on the left.

Our experts show how and when to use a VPN to increase security and privacy on the internet

TOP TIPS FOR USING VPNs

Use VPNs in public

onnecting to a public Wi-Fi hotspot on your laptop or phone carries risks, because the security may not be very good and it is possible that someone could snoop on your internet activity. A VPN (virtual private network) creates a secure and encrypted connection between you and the VPN server, bypassing anyone that might try to look at what you are doing, including the owner of the hotspot.

A VPN is especially useful for online shopping, banking and anything that requires you to log in, because it adds a layer of almost uncrackable security. Some VPNs such as Hotspot Shield (www .hotspotshield.com) will detect when you are using an insecure public Wi-Fi hotspot and automatically switch on to secure it. A VPN can be manually enabled, too – just don't forget to switch it on!



You can set some VPNs to switch on automatically when you join a network that might not be safe

Free vs paid-for VPNs

You may be wondering why you would want to pay a monthly subscription for a VPN when you can get one for free. One reason is the number of servers you can connect to. Free VPNs provide a small number of servers, but subscribing increases this to dozens or hundreds (depending on the service), so you have the choice of appearing to be in more locations.

The amount of data you can download is restricted with free VPNs and subscribing greatly increases the allowance. With Avira Phantom VPN (bit.ly/phm415) you get 500MB per

month for free or unlimited data if you subscribe. However, if you register the product, which is also free, your data limit is increased to 1GB per month.

There will be fewer people sharing a paid-for VPN server, so the performance will be better. CyberGhost (www.cyberghostvpn.com), for example, says its paid-for service is five times faster than the free version.


Some free VPNs show adverts, but paid-for services do not. If you install Hotspot Shield and ignore the request for payment, the service won't cost you anything but you'll have to put up with occasional adverts.

Turn off Windows Update

If you are using a free VPN, you will have to use the limited data allowance wisely. Windows Updates can be 1GB or more, which will use all of your data allowance, so you should switch them off while using the VPN to avoid wasting data.

In Windows 7, go to the Control Panel, Windows Update and click 'Change

settings'. Select 'Never check for updates'. In Windows 10, press Windows+i and click 'Network & Internet'. Click the 'WiFi' heading, then 'Manage known networks' to see a list of Wi-Fi networks you connect to. Click ones where you use a VPN, click Properties and turn on the 'Metered connection' switch.



A metered connection prevents your data allowance being wasted on updates

This stops unnecessary internet activity such as large Windows updates from consuming your data allowance.

Increase the response speed


There's more to a fast internet connection than its download speed. Tweaking the latency and ping can speed things up and although the two terms are technically slightly different, vou can treat them the same for the purposes of a VPN. Both latency and ping measure how fast a server on the internet responds when your PC connects to it.

Online gaming, for example, requires a fast internet connection, but your actual download speed might not be that critical whereas a responsive connection is essential for action games where a few milliseconds can make a difference. A player on a slow internet connection is an easy target for players on responsive connections.

Measure the response speed of the internet connection using the ping tool. Press Windows+R, type cmd then press Enter to open the Command Prompt. Type ping followed by the name of a server, such as ping google.com, then press Enter. Look at the last line, which shows the minimum, maximum and average time taken for the server to respond. Low figures indicate a responsive internet connection and are better for games and using other online applications that require a fast response.

Try this before connecting to a VPN, then repeat it again afterwards to see the difference the VPN makes. If it slows down, make a note of the difference.

VPNs provide a list of servers you can connect to and selecting one that is close to the server you want to use could reduce the latency and ping, making it more responsive. For example, if a game server is in the US, then connecting to a US VPN server might be more responsive, although this can also depend on the number of current users. Try various VPN servers close to the website or game server you want to access, ping them from the Command Prompt and use the fastest one.

Encryption pros and cons

A VPN encrypts the internet connection, scrambling all the communications between you and the web servers you're connecting to, so anyone snooping on your data will see only garbled nonsense. The type of encryption affects the speed and security of the internet connection. NordVPN (nordvpn.com) encrypts the data twice, which increases the security but makes it slower than encrypting it once. This doesn't necessarily mean NordVPN is slower than other VPNs, but if a service offers a choice of encryption, simpler tends to be faster, but less secure.

VPNs for routers

Some routers can be configured to use a VPN. To set this up, log into the router's setup program, open a browser and enter the router's IP address, such as 192.168.1.1. If you aren't sure what the IP address is, press Windows+R, type cmd and press Enter. Type ipconfig and look for the Default Gateway. All routers are different, so we can't give exact details of how to set them up. PureVPN has guides for several routers at bit.ly/rou415.

The advantage of a router VPN is that every device in your home that connects to the internet - including computers, phones and tablets - will automatically be secured by the VPN. However, the processing power of a router is significantly less than that of a computer, so its internet performance won't be as good as a PC-based VPN. It's a question of convenience against speed.

Associate sites with VPN servers

ZenMate VPN is a Chrome extension available from the Chrome Web Store at bit.ly/zen415. It's free but you need to create an account to use it. ZenMate adds an icon to the browser's toolbar and clicking it opens a panel that lets you customise its settings. Click the middle icon halfway down and you can select the server location from a list. The options are limited with

a free account but many more are available with the paid-for version.


Associate a website with a specific VPN server using ZenMate VPN

type a URL into Chrome, ZenMate switches to the VPN server associated with it. This is handy if you want to use particular locations with specific websites. To set this up, visit the website and click the icon. Select the server to use with the site.

Free servers for free software

VPNBook (www.vpnbook.com) provides free VPN servers around the world and more experienced users should check it out. Go to the site and click Free OpenVPN Account or Free VPN. Click one of the Free OpenVPN links and a ZIP file downloads. Unzip it, then remember the username (vpnbook) and password at the bottom of the VPN server list.

Download the OpenVPN software from bit.ly/ovpn415 and install it. Run it and close the message that appears. Now right-click the OpenVPN icon in the taskbar and click Import. Select the files in the ZIP you downloaded from VPNBook, then right-click the icon again to connect to one of the VPNs you imported.


Reset Edge

I tried to speed up page-loading in Microsoft's Edge browser by typing about: flags into the address bar and ticking the Enable TCP Fast Open flag. Now, when I restart Edge. a blue screen appears with the error message 'Stopcode -> Driver IRQL not less or equal'. After a few seconds, the blue screen disappears and my PC reboots, but if I launch Edge again, the cycle repeats and I have no chance to open Edge, return to about: flags and click 'Reset all flags to default'.

The blue screen suggests that I visit windows.com/stopcode but when I do this in Internet Explorer, I am faced with over 400.000 possible links to explore! My operating system is up to date so I'd have thought my PC could handle the change to the flag.

There is no simple way to reset Edge and undo the changes. One possible solution is to delete the Edge app by deleting the following folder:

Reset a lost Windows PIN

I recently received a text saying the PIN for my Microsoft Account had changed. A new code was provided but I've accidently lost the text. How do I get my PIN back?

The PIN is a convenient way to sign into Windows 10 and some Microsoft services. You can still sign in using a Microsoft ID, such as an outlook .com email address and password.

Your PIN can be changed or replaced with a new one. Press Windows+i to open the Settings app and select Accounts, then 'Sign-in options'. In the PIN section, you'll see two buttons and a link: Change, Remove and 'I forgot my PIN'. To change a PIN, you need to enter the old PIN and put in a new one; to remove it and create a new one, use the 'I forgot my PIN' link.

Use Command Prompt as an Administrator

My account details show I am listed as an administrator but in Command Prompt I am only a user. I don't understand this apparent discrepancy.

A user who is an administrator can authorise programs to run with administrator privileges. However, this is only an option and, for security reasons, the default setting will still run programs in ordinary 'user mode'.

Go to the Start menu, scroll down to the bottom and expand Windows System. Right-click Command Prompt and select More, then select 'Run as administrator'. The screen clears and a message appears asking if you are sure

Fix Windows 10 update

Since the Anniversary Update in August, my monthly Patch Tuesday updates have been causing problems. It can take up to six hours to update successfully. Even when it finally gets to "Configuring updates don't turn off your computer", the

message can go on indefinitely. This seems to be a common fault but I can't find a fix.

First, check the hard drive. Open Explorer and select This PC in the left panel. Right-click the drive and select Properties. Select the Tools tab, then click the Check button. Scan the drive even if it says you don't need to.

Next, right-click the Start button and select Control Panel. Select 'Small icons' view and click Troubleshooting. Click 'View all' on the left, then click Windows Update and follow the steps.

Afterwards, right click the Start button and select Command Prompt (Admin). Type sfc /scannow, press Enter, and all Windows files will be checked and repaired if any are missing.

When it has finished, type dism.exe /Online /Cleanup-image /Restorehealth (with a space before each '/') and press Enter. This usually restores Windows 10 to full health.

Restore missing DVD drive

I upgraded my son's old desktop PC to Windows 10 but now the DVD drive doesn't work. He downloads most of his software, so it's not a huge bother, but I'd like to get it working again.

This is not uncommon and there are different solutions you can try. For starters, right-click the Start button and select Device Manager. Expand 'DVD/CD-ROM drives', then right-click the drive and select Uninstall. Expand 'IDE ATA/ATAPI controllers', right-click the item below it and select Uninstall. Restart Windows to reinstall the Windows drivers

Another solution is to press Windows+R, type regedit and press Enter to open the Registry Editor. Go to: HKEY LOCAL MACHINE\SYSTEM\ CurrentControlSet\Services\atapi

Right-click 'atapi' and select New, then Key and name it Controller0. Right-click ControllerO and select New, then DWORD(32-bit) Value. Name it EnumDevice1 and double-click it after creating it. Set the value to 1. Quit the Registry Editor and restart Windows.

Use UK English in Windows

I installed Windows 7 Pro 64-bit but when I type colour in the Start menu it displays the US spelling ('color')

despite everything being set to English United Kingdom. How do I change this? Jack Gold, via email

There are many configuration options relating to the language, keyboard measurement units and other tools. You'll have to check them all and adjust them as necessary because if just one is wrong, it can cause problems.

Open the Control Panel and click 'Region and Language'. On the Formats tab, select 'English (United Kingdom)' for the format. Click 'Additional settings' and, in the next window, select the Currency tab. Set the currency to '£' and close the window. Select the Location tab and select United Kingdom. Click the 'Default location' link at the bottom. select United Kingdom and click Apply.

Return to 'Region and Language' and select the 'Keyboards and Languages' tab. Click 'Change keyboards' and select the 'English (United Kingdom)' keyboard. You may need to click the Add button and add the keyboard if it isn't there. Click OK to return to 'Keyboard and Language', and select the Administrative tab. Click 'Change system locale' and set it to 'English (United Kinadom)'.

Check the integrity of downloads

I want to download a version of Linux but it says I need to check it afterwards using a tool called Gpg4win. What is this and why do I need it? I've not used it with other versions of Linux.

The Gpg4win (www.gpg4win.org) function used with the Linux download is probably checksum, which is a unique code representing a file's content. If even a tiny part of the file is changed in any way, the checksum produced will be different. So if a website posts the checksum for a file download, you can recreate the checksum after downloading it and compare it with the post. If they are the same you can be sure that you have an identical copy that has not corrupted or been tampered with by someone else.

Block trackers and other elements

Every time I run my security software, it finds malicious tracking cookies. Why does my security software not block them? And how dangerous are they? Not only is this malware present in my browser (even though it's regularly cleaned), it also appears when I use certain apps from the Windows Store, even Microsoft's own apps.

Cookies are used by advertisers, websites and services to store information. This data can be used to find out which sites you visit and present ads based on your interests.

On a scale of 1 (absolutely fine) to 10 (totally evil), tracking cookies are a 1 or 2. They're not malicious but they

are a privacy concern. Privacy extensions such as Ghostery (www .ghostery.com - or see our Workshop in Issue 409 at bit.ly/webuser409) can block tracking cookies by disabling browser features, but this may stop some websites working properly. Ghostery can also block ads, but you should be aware that many websites rely on ads for income. Apps - especially free apps - may use tracking cookies if they contain ads. But because they don't use a browser, privacy extensions won't block them.



MAPS

Map your favourite locations

If you have a Windows 10 tablet or hybrid device that you use on the go, you should check out the Windows 10 Maps app. It's recently added some great new tools, my favourite of which is Collections. You can store lots of places in a collection and I find it useful when planning trips, but you could use it for anything. Before you set off, use the Maps app to find places to visit and then store them as a collection.

Click the Saved Places icon on the right side of the Maps window, then select Collections in the panel on the left. Click the plus symbol to create a new collection and name it, or select a collection to open it, clicking the plus sign to add places.



Saving destinations to the Maps app before you go on a trip keeps them on hand while you're away

You can search for places, such as the London Eye or Buckingham Palace, or click a place on the map to add it to the collection. It's handy to refer to when you're on your trip.



Translate multiple languages simultaneously

Smart Translate (bit.ly/translate415) is a handy free Chrome add-on that lets you translate from one language to three other languages simultaneously. The add-on can also be installed on Opera and Vivaldi using the above link, but if you want to install it on Opera, you'll first have to install it from bit.ly/opera415. If you need to translate a page to English in Chrome, you can do so without any extensions by right-clicking anywhere and then selecting 'Translate to English'.

the Recycle Bin was my only obstacle, because I could not find a way to save it to the taskbar. I could only create a Start Menu item for it - by right-clicking it and selecting 'Pin to Start'. However, I've now discovered how to pin it to the taskbar.

Right-click the Desktop, choose New, then Shortcut and enter explorer .exe shell:recyclebinfolder Click Next, name it 'Recycle Bin' and click Finish. Right-click the new shortcut and select Properties, then Change Icon. Type imageres.dll in place of 'C:\Windows\ explorer.exe', press Enter and scroll to the Recycle Bin icon. Select it. click OK. Apply and OK. You can now right-click the shortcut and select 'Pin to taskbar'.

Once you've pinned the shortcut, simply delete it from the Desktop.

Ditch defragging completely

One of the oldest and most common tips for speeding up a PC is to defragment the hard drive but I don't think this advice applies anymore, despite still appearing on many tech websites. New computers often come with a solid-state drive (SSD), which don't need to be defragged and are usually ignored by defragging software. Likewise, if you have upgraded an old PC with a new SSD, you shouldn't defrag it.

Only PCs with mechanical hard drives can possibly benefit from defragmenting. However, Windows has been defragging automatically since Windows 7 and there isn't much benefit in further defragmenting your PC.

Get more space from Mega

If you use Mega (mega.nz) for online

storage, it's worth noting that when you delete files they are moved to the rubbish bin, where they continue to count against your

free 50GB of space. There's an easy way to solve this. Log into your account and click the settings cog in the bottom-left corner, Select Advanced, then File Management and turn on Rubbish-Bin Cleaning Scheduler, You are presented with two options: to delete items after a set number of days (which I think works best); or to keep the bin under a certain size at all times.

If you use the Megasync Desktop software, its status bar displays the proportion of your storage allowance taken up by your deleted files (which are represented by a green colour).

Manage multiple Google accounts on one PC


I have two Google accounts - one for work and one for personal matters - and I used to have to switch between them in Chrome using the drop-down menu in the top-right corner of Google sites such as Gmail and YouTube. However, this can become very confusing when you have different accounts open in adjacent tabs, and you can easily end up searching for personal interests on your work account and vice versa. For this reason, I now use Google Chrome's Users tool, which lets vou use different accounts in completely separate windows, so that you can clearly see which one is which and avoid muddling them up.

On my work laptop, I first signed into Chrome (from Settings) using my work Google account. To add my home account, I then clicked my name in the top-right corner (next to the minimise button), selected 'Manage people' and Add Person. You're asked to enter a name and choose a profile picture before clicking Save. A window loads asking you to log in with your Google account. Once you've done that, the browser icons in the taskbar (along with the name at the top of Chrome) clearly indicate which account you're using and your bookmarks, passwords and other synced information are loaded for both accounts in their respective windows.

If you need to let a friend or family member access their Google account and browser information on your PC, this is the way to do it. Once they've finished, you can remove them using the 'Manage people' page.

This setting has totally transformed the way I use Chrome and I can now access work and personal services on the same PC without getting muddled.


Can I restore my PC to Windows 10?

I have backups of everything important but I would like to upgrade again (for free) to Windows 10.

I used the assistive technologies link (bit.ly/assistive415) to upgrade a Windows 7 PC after the deadline, but as your PC has already been upgraded, you could download the Windows 10 media-creation tool (bit.ly/media415) and run it from within Windows 7. Choosing the option to 'Upgrade this PC' should work automatically, even without you entering your license key. It's always handy to have a Windows 10 installation disc available, so you could also select the option to 'Create installation media for another PC' and burn the ISO file to a DVD or USB drive, if you prefer.


How do I change permissions for my Windows account?

Due to a bad fault in Windows 10, I had to reinstall the operating system from scratch. It is now working fine but my wife has somehow been named as

Can I log into Windows without a Microsoft account?

I just replaced my motherboard and hard drive, which meant I had to reactivate Windows 10 by signing in with my Microsoft account. However. I now have to do this every time my PC starts. Can I change the login password back to my original non-account one? Or if I do that will my Microsoft password change, too? Also, am I now more open to snooping from Microsoft?



To sign in with a local account, open Settings, select Accounts and under 'Your info' click the link to 'Sign in with a local account instead'. Type the password for your Microsoft account and click Next. Enter your new local user name and password, along with a password hint, then click 'Sign out and finish'. Some information relating to your Microsoft account may still be present, but apps will simply

ask for your login credentials before you can access them.

Whether you use a Microsoft account or a local one makes little difference to how much data Microsoft collects. To minimise data collection. you simply need to configure Windows 10 appropriately from its Settings.

You might decide that simply changing your password or setting up a PIN for faster login suits you better. To do this, open Settings and Accounts, then click 'Sign-in options' and look for the respective Password and PIN options.

If you and your wife already have accounts, you should be able to switch the Administrator rights over by logging into her account and selecting 'Change account type' under User Accounts in Control Panel. From here, select your account and choose 'Change the account type', select Administrator, then click Change Account Type to confirm.

You can have more than one account set to Administrator, but if you want to remove the privileges from your wife's account, simply follow the same instructions, only choose Standard instead of Administrator. If you don't yet have an account, this would explain why your wife's account has defaulted to the Administrator. You can set up a new account for yourself from User Accounts in Control Panel and then change the account types as described above.

computers will now use Linux. Two have the latest flavour of Mint and my newest is now running Ubuntu. I love it!



I trust you will pass this on to my fellow readers as cause for concern.



Get a government grant for speedy broadband

In my last email, I expressed the sentiment that Web User was about empowering readers with facts. So I bring good news for readers who suffer broadband speeds of less than 2Mbps.

Many government initiatives are loudly trumpeted by politicians but are found to be lacking in any actionable detail. The Better Broadband Subsidy Scheme (which I'd never heard of before) is one of these, having all the attributes of







a deep-state secret and which your readers can now also be a party to simply by typing not spot into Google or going to notspotbroadband.com.

Finding out about the "not spot" was the difficult bit. The rest was a doddle and it takes just over a week or so to go through the Ofcom speed checker, get a government BDUK approval code and choose a supplier who will either install satellite broadband or, as I did, the EE 4G satellite service.

If, like me, you have a sub-2Mbps broadband service and no alternative, The BDUK code entitles you to a government contribution of £350 towards fitting an external aerial and associated equipment internally for in my case and typically - £470. As suggested by EE, I have started with the lowest monthly tariff of £23 per month for a grant-mandatory 12-month contract, which I can extend or upgrade as and when required. For this I get a service that's often much faster than 10Mbps.


