



overviews and introductions to the buildings before using the Google Poly 3D viewer to look around.

Scroll to the bottom of the homepage to learn more about how lasers can preserve human history and the technology involved in doing so. There



are also videos documenting CyArk's work as well as a virtual-reality experiment involving Bagan's earthquake-damaged temples. You can also request a download of the data collected on the cultural heritage sites, and explore them and their surroundings in Street View.

Play a jellified version of Mario

This surreal version of Super Mario Bros may look familiar at first, but it soon throws a plumber's spanner in the works. Programmer Stefan Hedman has experimented with the game's physics, turning everything to jelly - including Mario himself - so the protagonist ends up floating around,

bending the environment, producing craters in the brickwork and exploding in a blast of colourful pixels whenever he hits a Goomba.

Although the jelly effect makes this two-level blast of the Nintendo classic very tricky, it remains great fun since you end up looking for ways to cause the most destruction. You can play the

> game for free in your browser, using the cursor keys to control Mario. It's still in pre-alpha, so you can expect it to evolve over time, but for now your main challenge will be to get to Stage 1-2, where things become really odd.

Search the BBC's SFX library

Want to hear a South American parrot talking and screeching? Or the footsteps of an approaching stranger? Well, now you can, because the BBC has delved into its audio archive and made an astonishing



16,016 sound effects available online to stream and download for free. You can use every one of them in your own projects as long as it's for personal, education or research purposes.

Although searching the archive is cumbersome (made worse by some of the obscure descriptions and a slow search facility), each entry tells you the length of the clip and, in most cases, the category. You can then click the Play symbol to listen to an effect before deciding whether you want to download it as a WAV file. Some fun effects include a nostalgic dial-up modem and, rather obscurely, wild boars having tea from 1972.

Delve into Scotland's history

Find emoji in the real world

Forget looking for Pokémon and instead try to find real-life equivalents of emoji by firing up this great game





matches. But you have to be quick because there's a time limit to race against. The more emoji you spot, the more time you get for the next ones.

Be guided when drawing

Pick something to draw from the drop-down menu in this Artificial Intelligence experiment and start sketching. As you do, a green 'pen' will mark where the computer thinks you should be drawing next as it seeks to guess and influence the process. If this sounds like déjà vu, that's because it uses data from Google's Pictionarystyle Quick, Draw experiment of 2016 (quickdraw.withgoogle.com) which evolved into the 'sketch-rnn' neural network. Although it's not always perfect, it's fascinating to watch the Al's thought process. You must be using Chrome to run the tool.



Create your own Snapchat lenses

If you're an artistic type who enjoys using Snapchat's face filters, then why not create your own? Snapchat's downloadable Lens Studio has just released seven new templates and added Giphy integration, and although it's perhaps overwhelming for newbies, you can have fun using face paint, distorting images, adding 2D or 3D objects and triggering animation.

Need to Know

BT to kill off landlines by 2025

What happened?

It's the end of an era: BT has revealed it will disconnect all landline telephones. But don't worry - you'll still be able to make and receive calls. Instead of running calls over the public switched telephone network, you'll be chatting over IP (internet protocol) telephony on the company's fibre network.

BT said the changes will start soon, with everyone hopefully switched over to the fibre network by 2025. Before the work starts, BT is running a consultation with the rest of industry, including the companies that buy access to BT's network to sell their own services.

At a technical level, BT is hoping to shut down its public switched telephone network (PTSN) and instead run calls via Voice-over-IP (VoIP) on the fibre network. It's like using Skype for calls, but you won't have to log into an app; you'll simply pick up the phone and dial a number, as you do now - but the call will run over a different network. It's effectively a switch from analogue to digital, but most BT customers won't notice much difference.

How will it affect you?

For the most part, this shouldn't change the way you make calls. You aren't being forced to give up a traditional phone that plugs into the wall in favour of a mobile device - it's just that your calls will instead be carried over fibre-broadband lines.

That's good news for BT, because it means the ISP need only maintain the one network. However, the rollout could

prove a challenge because not everyone in the country has robust enough broadband to support Voice-over-IP. If your connection struggles with Skype calls, BT will need to boost your broadband before the switchover. Hopefully, that's good news for those stuck without solid broadband, because it suggests BT is willing to shore up faster



In Issue 444, we explained how you can get broadband without paying for a landline



services in areas with slower connections, but we'll have to wait until the consultation with industry regulator Ofcom is finished before we know exactly how BT plans to go about implementing this change.

To clarify, this doesn't mean we'll all get fibre broadband from BT. The ISP is able to run digital phone services over copper, thanks to new technologies that boost those speeds.

There are already concerns in the industry about how this will affect competition. The move means BT will withdraw its Wholesale Line Rental, which lets other providers offer services such as broadband and landlines over

> the BT network. Regulator Ofcom will be watching carefully to ensure this doesn't lead to problems in the communications market, with BT grabbing

too much control.

What do we think?

In some ways, this move has been a long time coming. Back in 2014, a report from industry watcher Rootmetrics found that 95% of people surveyed didn't think they needed a landline at all because they preferred to use a mobile phone. Of course, there are good reasons for keeping a landline, and these changes won't force you to ditch yours. Instead, BT will simply take advantage of the savings it can make by running a single network.

Many of us are already doing the same. Plenty of broadband providers, BT included, charge for a line rental when you get broadband, and they now include that cost in the overall advertised price. But why pay for a landline if you don't use it? As we explained in our 'Ditch Your Landline' cover feature in Issue 444 (bit.ly/ webuser444), if you make local calls on your mobile phone and long-distance calls over Skype, there's really no reason to pay for a landline any more. Hopefully, the switchover leads BT and other broadband providers to ditch such pointless charges, as some have already done. However, because you'll still be renting a line for communications, don't expect much change on that front.

Either way, the switchover shouldn't impact your calls or your bills, other than to cut their cost. This is a sensible rationalisation by BT, and should help simplify its network infrastructure and how we conduct our communications.

What we think of this fortnight's top tech news stories and rumours, and how they affect you

Google unveils Chat messaging service

What happened?

Google is once again having a go at launching a messaging app, unveiling Chat to replace SMS texting on Android phones. Rather than a standalone app, Chat is an entirely new messaging standard known in the industry as Rich Communication Services, which means Android's default texting app Messages gets features such as images, video, read receipts and more.

Chat is essentially
Android's version of the
iMessage service on Apple
iPhones, and lets users
send text messages as well
as set up groups, share
photos and swap emoji.
Chat will be built into new
Android phones, but it'll
be up to manufacturers
whether they decide to
offer the service or not.

How will it affect you?

Chat may seem unnecessary given the many messaging options already available - including Facebook Messenger and WhatsApp - but like iMessage, it lets you send texts to people who aren't using Chat. You can only send a message via WhatsApp to someone else who has that app installed, but with Chat, if the recipient doesn't use the service, they'll receive the message

App makers will also be able to use the Chat

standard to develop their own messaging tools. Chat support has already started rolling out, but Google said it'll take up to two years to become mainstream.

What do we think?

This is a better route for Google to take than launching yet another messaging app. We've already seen Hangouts, Huddle, Allo and Duo, alongside Google Talk for Android - keeping track of them all is a pain, as is getting all your friends and family to sign up for an app that's probably going to disappear in a few years.

This new standard should improve texting on Android handsets, but Google hasn't sought to encrypt or otherwise secure Chat in the manner of Apple iMessage. For this reason, messaging apps such as WhatsApp are still worth considering if you use an Android device.



iPhones vulnerable to trustjacking flaw

What happened?

Security firm Symantec has warned about iPhone 'trustjacking', which is when attackers exploit settings on the Apple phone to access private data. When you charge an iPhone by plugging it into another device, such as a laptop, you'll see a message asking "Trust this computer?". There's no reason to choose yes' it will charge regardless - but if you do, the computer will be able to access your phone's data, which is handy for transferring files or backing up settings because the two devices can sync over the same Wi-Fi network.

If you do give your 'trust', you could be at risk of trustjacking because enabling the setting opens a way for attackers to target your iPhone. The Symantec researchers noticed this by accident after one of them realised he could connect to a co-worker's phone simply because they were on the same Wi-Fi network, which was marked as trusted.

How will it affect you?

The flaw could allow someone to grab your data, such as photos or messages, or install malware. However, you'd have to both be on the same trusted network. For this reason, researchers have not seen trustjacking attacks in the wild.

To revoke trust on your iPhone, go to Settings, General, Reset and tap



'Reset Location & Privacy'. The trust feature is handy when you're at home on your own network, but be wary that others who connect to your Wi-Fi could abuse it to access your phone's contents.

What do we think?

We're all used to simply choosing 'OK' when we see a pop-up dialogue box on our computers and smartphones, and we often don't understand what the settings actually allow. Thank goodness Symantec noticed this flaw, though it's a shame Apple didn't spot it first. Hopefully, it will do a better job of testing features for weak points in the future, but at least this one hasn't yet led to any hacks beyond the security researchers' lab.



Minecraft malware infects 50,000 players

What happened?

Minecraft, the immensely popular world-building game with more than 74 million players, has a malware problem. Users who download skins for their avatars from the official Minecraft website are unwittingly allowing malicious code onto their computers.

Currently, nearly 50,000 Minecraft accounts are known to be infected with the malware, which is designed to reformat a hard drive and delete backup data and system programs.

The problem was first spotted by security software developer Avast's Threat Labs. The team discovered that user-created and uploaded Minecraft character skins created as PNG files were being used as a distribution method for homemade malware before being uploaded to Mojang's Minecraft website. Mojang is aware of the problem and is currently working on fixing the vulnerability.

Avast doesn't believe that the malicious code has been created by hardened cybercriminals, instead citing inexperienced players looking to exploit others for their own amusement. The code itself is, in Avast's words, "largely unimpressive" and can actually be found on websites that provide step-by-step guides to creating DIY viruses using Microsoft's built-in Notepad word-processing tool.



How will it affect you?

So far, the number of infections is comparatively small compared to the number of active Minecraft players. But it's worth noting that user numbers grow by nearly 20 million each year, so there's real potential for an epidemic. Also, 43% of Minecraft users are under 21, and young people are particularly vulnerable to this type of homemade malware infection.

Obviously, not all skins for Minecraft are infected with a virus – that would be severely detrimental to Minecraft's user-created appeal – but there are at least three skins out there known to be carrying malware. If you've downloaded any of these or similar ones, you should run a scan on your system right away.

What do we think?

Most parents and players trust thirdparty skins hosted on the official Minecraft website, but it appears Mojang isn't screening every upload for potential viruses. So even if you regularly scan your machine, your trust in the Minecraft website could lead you to think that any flagged problem is merely a false positive.

Protecting yourself against Minecraft malware is simply a matter of running regular antivirus scans on your system. Most decent security software will remove the threat once it's been detected, but if it's a particularly bad infection, you may have to reinstall Minecraft and take extra care with any skins you install in future.



FIRST LOOK

Honor 7A www.hihonor.com

Available in black or blue, the Honor 7A looks and feels like it costs several hundred pounds more than its £140 price tag. At a slender 7.8mm, its aluminium body and curved edges make it comfortable to hold, and although the phone has a large 5.7in display, its 18:9 aspect ratio means the screen is narrow enough to use with one hand and has a little extra height.

Around the back of the phone, there's a single 13-megapixel camera with a dual-LED flash and an ultraresponsive fingerprint sensor. There's also a 3-in-1 card slot, which lets you use a microSD card and two SIM cards simultaneously. Impressively, it also includes Face Unlock, and is the cheapest phone yet to do so.



Honor has opted for a micro-USB port at the bottom instead of USB Type-C, but has also, thankfully, included a 3.5mm headphone jack at the top of the device. According to Honor, the speaker is able to go "200% louder than a conventional smartphone".

The 7A's rear camera includes standard Honor features, such as panorama, night and Bokeh mode, but it's limited to core features, with no image stabilisation or autofocus. Its front-facing 8-megapixel camera is arguably more impressive, with a flash the company calls 'Soft Light', which allows for better selfies in low light.

Honor has included a 2015 octa-core Snapdragon 430 processor, 2GB of RAM and 16GB of internal storage, which can be expanded to 256GB via the phone's microSD card slot. Battery life provides an impressive 16 hours of talk time.

With its impressive features, attractive design and great-looking screen, the Honor 7A may well be the best budget smartphone of 2018.

Is Apple going to kill off iTunes?

Rumours suggest that Apple is planning to scrap paid-for iTunes music downloads next year. According to sources inside the company, as reported by Digital Music News (bit.ly/digital448), Apple has set a firm date for the iTunes store's shutdown. It's likely that the service won't close overnight, but will be phased out gradually starting from 31 March 2019. After that point, buying new music won't be possible;

instead, Apple reportedly intends to shift its focus to its Spotify rival, the Apple Music streaming service. However, it's believed that Apple has no plans to revoke user rights on purchased songs, which means any music you've bought will always play on all Apple devices and you'll still be able to manage your downloaded music collection.

Apple had previously denied any plans around possibly killing its service but in an interview with the BBC, Apple Music executive Jimmy Iovine explained that the store would shut down "when people stop buying". Iovine avoided providing a date for the shutdown, but his admission suggests that Apple is certainly thinking about the prospect.

Apple Music may not yet be as big as Spotify, which has 71 million paid subscribers, but the number of people using Apple's service is growing. As of



Apple's last report, Apple Music has more than 40 million paying users with around another seven million on its free trial. By closing the iTunes Store, it's likely that more people will finally bite the bullet and sign up for Apple Music.

It's very rare that Apple submits to pressure to confirm rumours, so we expect the company to remain tight-lipped on this matter until March 2019. However, with music streaming now significantly more popular than downloading, the closure of the iTunes Store certainly won't come as a surprise.

Russian hackers target millions of devices

UK and US security agencies have alerted governments and private companies to



a global, state-sponsored hacking campaign emanating from Russia.

The FBI, Department for Homeland Security (DHS) and the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) issued a joint Technical Alert describing a Russian-backed assault on routers, firewalls and business networks in an attempt to launch man-in-themiddle attacks. Even routers in small offices and homes are at risk, the agencies said.

Ciaran Martin, chief executive of the NCSC - an arm of British intelligence agency GCHQ - told The Independent that Russia was the West's "most capable hostile

adversary in cyberspace", and that "the purpose of these attacks could be espionage, the theft of intellectual property." He added: "There are millions of machines being globally targeted".

The guidance issued by the security agencies includes advice about password and device security. Specific advice has also been given to manufacturers, security vendors and ISPs, to encourage them to move away from using older equipment and standards for security

The NCSC warned that the scale and severity of the threats facing the UK were "bigger than ever", and that it was highly likely 2018 would bring further attacks. bit.ly/russian448

Android phone makers lie about security patches

Some of the biggest Android smartphone manufacturers are thought to be misleading users about important security updates. The claim comes from technology analyst firm Security Research Labs, which has reason to believe that Android manufacturers are telling users that their devices have been updated, when in fact they are missing important patches issued by Google.

Over the past few years, Android manufacturers have earned a reputation for being slow to issue important software updates. Statistics released by Google show that just 1.1% of Android devices run the latest Android version.

The researchers spent two years analysing the firmware of 1,200 phones from companies including Google, HTC and Motorola, and found that even the biggest Android manufacturers have been making misleading promises about security updates.

Any online platform you use collects

information about your behaviour, location and interests. Browsing history may be combined with

physical location, shopping purchases with watched TV shows commute to work and so on. Basically, you're tracked from the moment you wake up until you go to sleep.

It's difficult to completely avoid being tracked - and the data that has already been shared cannot be taken back. However, there are a few proven privacy protection methods that can easily be implemented by anyone using the internet:

 Download all your Facebook data if you are deleting your account. If you have decided to delete your Facebook account, first download all your data that

is held by Facebook - just to see the extent of what they have been collecting Go to Settings, General Account Settings and click 'Download a copy of your Facebook data'.

• Delete all suspicious apps. It's important to revoke access to Facebook applications that are no longer in use, as well as suspicious apps that offer users ways to get 'likes', followers or view private accounts on Instagram and other types of social media.

• Delete cookies, which are one of the most common ways to track your online behaviour. These are small pieces of code that are

downloaded to your browser when you visit a website. When you visit that site again, this will be recorded through the cookie, so you can be targeted with ads. You should regularly clear your browsing data to get rid of cookies.

• Use a VPN to encrypt data between your device and the internet, and make sure your browsing history remains confidential. 





It does so by scanning your Gmail inbox for travel confirmations from past bookings to check if the price of travel has fallen. The site promises to keep your data safe, but asks for your phone number, date of birth and card details. If that doesn't put you off, the service sends you texts asking what you want to do next and keeps your interactions simple.



Top Tips of the Fortnight

Bust WordPress jargon

Technology is riddled with unfathomable jargon and even supposedly friendly tools like WordPress are plagued by it. Thankfully, WordPress's developers have recognised the problem and launched a useful jargon buster (bit.ly/wpjg448). If you think it might be a useful reference, you can download a PDF version from the site.

Allow Google to retain **Analytics data**

If you use Google Analytics (analytics.google.com), you should have received an email about data retention outlining how long Google is allowed to hold your information for. This is associated with the legislation around GDPR but we'd advise against requesting that Google deletes this particular set of data, because it's so useful to be able



to compare your website to its historical performance. To help make your choice, sign into your account, then choose the site you want to adjust. In the Property column, click Tracking Info, then Data Retention and select the period you want to leave data for. You can also choose to have the clock reset itself every time you access the service, so it'll only disappear if you stop using it.

The last time I designed a web page was at the dawn of the millennium. Back then, you had to worry about which browser your visitors used. Is this still a problem?

Many people now develop websites using tools that have already been thoroughly tested for browser

compatibility. Even if you are building a website from scratch, the browser situation is much better now, so unless you're experimenting with obscure web standards, this isn't something you need to worry about. What you do need to ensure is that your site works on mobile browsers, which 18 years ago weren't a concern. It's definitely worth checking that your site displays properly on a smaller screen.

If you have space on your Google Drive or OneDrive account, you can use it to host a simple website for free. Upload the files to your storage space and use DriveToWeb to turn it into a website that people can visit

Choose whether you want to keep your files in Google Drive or OneDrive, then create a folder and upload your website's files to it. 1




Right-click the folder that's holding the files and click Share. In Google Drive, click Advanced, then click Change next to 'Private - Only you can access'. Select 'On - Public on the web' 11 and click the Save button. 2 In OneDrive, click 'Get a link', which activates sharing (though you don't actually need the link).



Go to drv.tw and click the button of the service you've chosen. You'll need to sign in with your account credentials. Follow the instructions and the Admin Panel will appear displaying the address of your web page as a link at the top. 11 Click it to see the page online.





We test and compare the latest products

Apple iPad (2018)

Apple's new entry-level iPad is its cheapest full-size tablet ever. We find out what's new

ou'd be forgiven for barely noticing Apple's recent revamp of its standard iPad, which offers little fanfare for the home consumer but sees Apple pushing the tablet into schools and colleges. However, with the lowest price that a full-sized iPad has ever sold for and a number of small but significant upgrades, this new model is well worth considering if you're looking for a new tablet.

The new price is only a slight drop from the previous model but any decrease is unusual from Apple, particularly with a device that's been updated with new components and features. The £20 drop takes the basic 32GB Wi-Fi-only model to £319, but every little helps.

If you want more storage, the 128GB Wi-Fi-only model costs £409. You can add another £130 to either device - taking them to £449 (32GB) and £539 (128GB) - if you want to add a SIM card for mobile data, though you could just tether the device to your phone's mobile data connection instead.



Apple Pencil

The biggest hardware news is that this is the first of the non-iPad Pro models to work with the Apple Pencil, with all the same tilt- and pressure-sensitive features. It comes into its own when used in apps specifically designed for it, though it can also be used for taking handwritten notes or sketching quick diagrams and pictures, and it's great for annotating documents in Apple's word processor,

Pages. You don't get quite the same feedback and satisfaction of using a pen on paper, but it's incredibly close. The stylus has also seen a price drop and now costs £89, which is £10 cheaper than its launch price.

Even more enticingly, you'll be able to buy alternative stylus devices for this model, though so far only Logitech has announced one – the Crayon is a chunkier, more rugged-looking stylus, clearly


aimed at children. It's due this summer at a cost of just \$49 (around £34) and plugs into the iPad's lightning port rather than operating wirelessly, as Apple's Pencil does.

What's new?

Other than compatibility with the Apple Pencil, not much has changed. The new iPad's looks and physical attributes are identical to last year's £339 model and it's more or less indistinguishable from the outside, with the same excellent display and highly responsive feel, whether you're using the Apple Pencil or your fingers.

As before, the new tablet has a 9.7in display with





a resolution of 2,048 x 1,536 pixels. It fills most of the front of the device, though having any kind of bezel around the edge is beginning to look a little old-fashioned in the face of the chassis-filling displays we're seeing on other tablets, laptops and phones.

There's a rear-facing 8-megapixel camera and a 1.2-megapixel camera on the front. Unlike the iPhone X, the iPad keeps its Touch ID button, which you'll find in the usual position below the screen when holding it in portrait mode.

Internally, the hardware upgrades are relatively minor. There's a new generation processor, the Apple A10 Fusion, which is a significant upgrade on the 2017 model's A9, but its power falls well short of the A10X installed in the more expensive iPad Pro.

The screen is excellent - as technically competent as you could expect for the price. It's vibrant and colour accuracy is high, with a contrast ratio that's slightly better than the previous model at 1,023:1, while brightness reaches 507cd/m² (candles per square metre).

Surprisingly, its battery life isn't as impressive as previous iPads. In our standard battery-life tests, the 2018 iPad lasted 8 hours and 43 minutes, whereas the previous version lasted over 14 hours, and even the iPad Mini 4 managed more than 10 hours. That's still better than most Windows 10 laptops, though, so you shouldn't need to worry about it running out of power before the end of the day, as long as you aren't working it too hard.

Perhaps the biggest omission is that there's no Smart Connector contact for the addition of a keyboard,

as seen on the iPad Pro models. That doesn't mean you can't use a keyboard at all - the device has Bluetooth so it can connect to any compatible wireless keyboard, including Apple's own.

Apple's mobile office software, which includes Pages, Numbers and Keynote, all have extensive support for the Apple Pencil and have been upgraded for the new iPad. There are also updates to some of Apple's other apps, and we particularly liked the new version of Garage Band, which is now much easier to use for creating simple tunes.

OUR VERDICT

There's a lot to like about Apple's new tablet. It's more affordable than ever and it works with the Apple Pencil. However, while the overall performance is a step up from the iPad's previous incarnation largely thanks to its faster processor - its battery doesn't last as long. The 8-9 hours should still get

you through a day of use, but it's a significant drop compared to the previous version and falls well behind the battery life of the iPad Pro models.

Amazfit Bip

We test a budget smartwatch that covers all the bases and is comfortable to wear

espite having a name that looks like a typo, the Amazfit Bip is an intriguing addition to the world of smartwatches. It's aimed squarely at the cheaper end of the scale, costing less than £70, yet it tracks your daily steps, heart rate, sleeping schedule and - incredibly, for such a cheap device - even traces your location with GPS.

Admittedly, it does none of those things as well as its £300-plus rivals, but the watch is surprisingly well made. The 1.28in, 176 x 176-pixels resolution screen is protected by Corning Gorilla Glass, and is dust-

and splash-resistant. It's not the most beautiful of smartwatches but its appearance doesn't give away its budget price. More importantly, it's very comfortable to wear, with a rubber strap that moulds itself to your wrist. Within five minutes, you won't even notice that it's there.

App and accuracy

The Amazfit Bip is the latest in a line of budget wearables produced by Chinese company Xiaomi. The watch syncs with Xiaomi's own smartphone app, Mi Fit, which is designed exclusively for use with Xiaomi's range of devices. We found the app's design and layout overly simplistic, and the English translations sometimes questionable, but it's able to pull up handy stats on a range of different activities, including average heart rate, stride, step frequency, uphill distance and sleep patterns. The Mi Fit app is available on both Android and iOS, but support for feeding data into other apps is limited: it connects to Google Fit, for example, but not Strava.

We tested the watch's distance-measuring accuracy against a Polar M430 watch worn on the opposite wrist during a 5K run, and found a difference of about 100m which isn't bad considering how much cheaper it is. However, it did record 300 steps while we were sleeping!

Heart-rate measurement wasn't spot on either, but few smartwatches manage this as accurately as a finger on the pulse and a stopwatch. Our tester's resting heart rate was

measured at 59bpm by the Bip, while the human reading put it at 66bpm, though this isn't actually too far off.

What the watch lacks, which you'll often find in more expensive devices, is NFC for contactless payments, a microphone for responding to messages and the ability to control music.

But in other areas, the Amazfit Bip is more than

serviceable and one of its standout features is its incredible battery life. We enabled every function we could find, turned up the screen brightness, and used the Bip to track GPS location during a walk and a bike ride. Over two days of light use it lost just 3% of its total charge. We reckon an average user will get around two to three weeks between charges.

OUR VERDICT

Given its low price, the quality and range of features built into the Amazfit Bip defies belief. It monitors workouts, sleep and heart-rate, and includes GPS tracking and more, all managed by a cheerful, if simplistic, app. It's also one of the most

Thanks to bombshell revelations such as the recent Facebook/Cambridge Analytica scandal (see our cover feature on page 40), we web users are more aware than ever about privacy on the web, but that doesn't mean we know how best to protect it. Privacy Pal, from security firm Avira, helps you shield your data by identifying privacy problems in Windows, preventing tracking and removing traces of your activity.

Privacy Pal's opening screen displays your system's protection status in a colour-coded wave. This shows the percentage of your data that's currently protected, the privacy settings you should adjust and the digital traces you need to fix. As you use the software, these percentages will change and hopefully improve.





There are three privacy protection levels: Basic, Enhanced and - the default setting - Personalized. The latter offers full control over your privacy protection, but you can switch to either of the other two for a simpler approach.

Basic offers rudimentary privacy protection and removes tailored ads, while Enhanced also prevents programs from collecting your private data. The Personalized option lets you choose exactly which areas Privacy Pal should target, and you can switch between Simplified and Expert views, depending

on how in-depth you want to get.

Privacy Pal lets you perform a privacy sweep of your system whenever you like, and choose which areas to target. Options include browser cache, browsing and download history, cookies, chat logs and application usage.

Note that during installation, Avira advertises its other security software, giving you the chance to install any programs that take your fancy, but it doesn't trick you into installing anything, and these options are easily bypassed.

Best New Browser Tools



CHROME

Lock down your online privacy settings

Back in Issue 432, we recommended a tool called PlusPrivacy (plusprivacy.com), which lets you manage your privacy settings for social networks, apps and extensions via a unified online dashboard. Now, in the wake of the Facebook-Cambridge Analytica scandal, the service has dropped the requirement for users to open an account and sign in, which means you can use it anonymously, with all data stored locally rather than shared with PlusPrivacy. The simplest way to use the extension is to select 'Single click privacy' to lock down your settings on all the social sites and apps that you're currently logged into. However, we'd advise taking a more methodical approach and going through each of the the options in the sidebar – these

include Facebook, Twitter and LinkedIn, and Chrome add-ons, as well settings for blocking ads, trackers, malware domains and social-media buttons. PlusPrivacy also lets you create fake email identities to use when signing up for websites, but this feature does require you to provide your real email address.



Protect yourself against phishing scams

Phishing sites, which try to steal your password or other confidential information by tricking you into believing you're on a legitimate website, can be very convincing and sometimes have almost identical web addresses to the sites they're spoofing. The scammers use Unicode or other non-standard characters to recreate alphabetical URLs, then wait for unsuspecting web users to click through to them. A new Chrome extension called PhishProtect (bit.ly/phish448) safeguards you against this devious practice by warning you when the site you're trying to visit contains unusual characters in its domain. The add-on quickly redirects you to a safe page, although you can choose to 'Continue anyway' if you're willing to take the risk. PhishProtect is currently in beta, so you may encounter the occasional bug.



Remove junk using Chrome Cleanup

Google has long offered a Software Removal Tool - later renamed Chrome Cleanup - that finds and removes suspicious programs that interfere with its browser's settings and performance. As of Chrome 65, this has been integrated with the browser's settings, so you can scan your system for junk without first having to download a separate tool. Instead, you can run it manually by going to Settings, Advanced and scrolling down to the new 'Reset and clean up' section. Select 'Clean up your computer' and click Find next to 'Find and remove harmful software' to perform a scan - you may want to disable the option to report details to Google.

Last month, Chrome Cleanup was the subject of some controversy when it was reported that the tool runs automatically in the background once a week, with no option to turn it off. Google dismissed concerns by saying



that the scan only covers items that could hijack the browser and that the tool is "heavily sandboxed" to prevent abuse.

Display GIFs on your New Tab page

If you're tired of seeing the same old search box and websites every time you open a new tab, AnimatedTabs (bit.ly/animated448) can bring the

page to life. It displays a different animated GIF each time you click the 'New tab' button, so you can watch low-



quality clips of amusing cats, crazy stunts and movie scenes, complete with a caption, before you decide which web page to open. The random nature of the GIFs keeps things interesting, and there's a Work button that pauses playback and switches to calendar view when you're too busy for amusement.

Stop Facebook tracking you around the web


Facebook has rightly come in for a lot of criticism following the Cambridge Analytica scandal, and although Mark Zuckerberg has promised to improve privacy, little has been said about the social network's creepy tendency to follow you around the web.



Fortunately, help is at hand from an official Mozilla add-on called Facebook Container (bit.ly/container448). This isolates your Facebook activity from everything else you do online, making it harder for Facebook to track your visits to other websites. When you install the extension in Firefox, it deletes your Facebook cookies and logs you out of the site. The next time you visit Facebook, it will load in a blue browser tab (the 'container') that lets you use the site as normal without compromising your privacy. If you click a non-Facebook link while in the container, the page will load outside the blue tab.

One of the best things about YouTube is that it allows videos to be embedded on other websites, so that people can play them instantly. However, not all sites support embedding, which means viewers have to click a nondescript YouTube link that could potentially lead them to dubious or disturbing content.



A new Firefox add-on called YouTube Tooltip & Notification (bit.ly/tooltip448) addresses this problem by letting you hover your mouse over a link to view information about the video. This includes its title, duration, upload date and channel, and can be displayed as either a tooltip or a browser notification. The extension is particularly useful on online discussion boards such as Reddit, where it's not clear where a link might take you.

Restart Firefox at the click of a button

Although Firefox offers an option in its Help menu to restart the browser with add-ons disabled, there's no easy way to restart it with all your extensions intact. Unless, that is, you install Restart Browser (bit.ly/ restart448), which provides you with four different ways to relaunch.

By clicking the Restart Browser button on the toolbar, you can either refresh all open tabs and windows, relaunch only the current window, set a preferred page to open on restart or designate a specific length of time after which to close and reopen the browser. The latter method requires a separate add-on called Time Restart Reloaded (bit.ly/ time448), which was created by the same developer.

Brave (www.brave.com) in our Switch Your Browser Now cover feature in Issue 440, our main criticism concerned its lack of customisability compared to Chrome, Vivaldi and Firefox. So we're delighted to hear the team behind Brave is working on a new version of the browser that's based on Chromium, and "will have support for nearly

all Chrome features and extensions". Additionally. because Brave's main focus



is on privacy, these new tools won't include any code that shares your data with Google. The release of the revamped browser, which is officially Brave 1.0, is still some months away, but you can read more info in a blog post at bit.ly/brave448.

Capture and edit screenshots

Edge extensions are now being released at a much faster rate and the latest useful tool for Microsoft's browser is Nimbus Screen Capture (bit.ly/ capture 448). This lets you capture screenshots of your entire screen or just a selected area; annotate your grabs with text, arrows and shapes; easily resize and crop images; and blur sensitive information such as email addresses. You can either save your screenshots to your hard drive or instantly share them online.

The first is that you can now shop from Amazon stores in other countries without having to convince Amazon.com (US), Amazon.ca (Canada), Amazon. au (Australia) or any other foreign Amazon site that you really do want to shop there

and not at Amazon.co.uk. Instead, all you need to do is open the latest version of Amazon Shopping and twiddle a few settings (see Mini Workshop, right), and you can shop from abroad to your heart's content. You can limit the products listed in searches to those that offer UK delivery and even change the currency to Pounds Sterling, so you don't need to use a separate currency converter to work

> out how much your purchases are going to cost.

The other big change is the addition of Amazon Launchpad a new area of the UK store that sells extra 4.3in e-ink display to your mobile's rear, for reading ebooks and receiving live notifications. If you have a product of your own that you want to market, you can register with Launchpad as a seller

innovative products from startup companies. Currently, there are six different Launchpad categories: Body, Food & Drink, Electronics, Home, Toys and 'Made on Kickstarter'. Launchpad items currently being promoted include a smartphone case that adds an





If you want to buy and import goods from international Amazon stores, you'll need to make a few changes to the settings on your Amazon app. Open the app and sign in with your Amazon account, then tap the three-line menu button in the top-left corner. Tap the Settings option at the bottom of the menu and select 'Country & Language'. 1



Tap Country. At the top of the list of countries, select the option for International Shopping, 11 then tap Done. Now, when you search for products, you'll see matching items eligible for UK shipping from other territories, including Amazon US. To change the currency to Pounds Sterling, tap the menu, Settings, 'Country & Language', then tap the Currency button. Select '£ - GBP - Pounds', then tap Done.

To shop through Amazon Launchpad, you need to change your country back to UK, so reverse the process you carried out in the previous two steps. 





Killer robots? Are they like 'killer apps'?

If only, but no: "killer" here is being used in the more traditional sense of robots that seek to slay us, rather than machines that are so desirable you'll want to rush out and buy one. The term actually describes fully autonomous weapons that will make decisions on who they should lethally target without any human intervention. They represent the dark side of artificial intelligence (AI).

Scary stuff. So how do they work?

Typically, killer robots take the guise of armed drones, tanks and automated machine guns fitted with sensors. They are able to scan video footage using advanced image-recognition algorithms to identify and select their targets, employing AI to make life-or-death



Is it a bird? Is it a plane? No, it's an armed drone and it's a bit alarming

decisions. Acting without the need to defer to a human controller, they're empowered to fire on targets. Since this hands the power and responsibility to machines, it is understandably causing widespread concern.

Why take away human control?

There is a huge push toward giving technology greater autonomy, as we've seen with the ongoing work with selfdriving cars. These vehicles use algorithms to identify, track and avoid obstacles, with the hope that this leads to safer roads, more convenient travel and cheaper transportation of heavy goods (much to the alarm of lorry drivers).

In the same vein, killer robots will be cheap and effective, removing the need to train very large armies, and making combat safer (at least for the side that owns them). It's certainly no surprise to hear that autonomous weapons are being viewed as the "third revolution in warfare" after gunpowder and nuclear weapons, allowing wars to be fought on grand scales and at great speed.

Isn't it all a bit Terminator-

Yes, to some degree, but it's no movie fantasy. Strides are already being taken to make killer robots a reality. Google is understood to be working with the US Department of Defence on Project Maven (bit.ly/defence448), helping to develop Al algorithms that will autonomously extract information about objects spotted in videos taken by drones, although it insists "the technology flags images for human review, and is for nonoffensive uses only". That hasn't prevented 3,100 Google employees from signing a letter asking Google to stop its involvement, however. "We believe that Google should not be in the business of war," the letter says (bit.ly/letter448).

So is America at the forefront?

Not necessarily. Other countries, from China and Israel to Russia and the UK. are also taking an interest in killer robots, although none are actively manufacturing and selling autonomous weapons right now. Indeed, the British Military of Defence has been test-flying the Taranis

unmanned drone made by BAE Systems (bit.ly/baesystems448). Designed to carry a payload of guided missiles and bombs, it has an autonomous flight mode, allowing it to self-navigate within set constraints.

More controversial, however, is the news that a South Korean university has partnered with weapons manufacturer Hanwha Systems, which makes cluster munitions that are banned in 120 countries. There are concerns that the deal to "provide a strong foundation for developing national defence technology" could lead to killer robots, and AI researchers from nearly 30 countries have pledge to boycott the university in response. Samsung's SGR-A1 gun already assists South Korean troops in the Korean Demilitarised Zone: it includes surveillance, tracking, firing and voicerecognition, and can be fired autonomously.

What are the campaigners saying?

According to the letter addressed to both the Korea Advanced Institute of Science and Technology (KAIST) and Hanwha Systems (bit.ly/kaist448): "It is regrettable that a prestigious institution like KAIST looks to accelerate the arms race to develop such weapons." But KAIST president Sung-Chul Shin says the university "does not have any intention to engage in development of lethal autonomous weapons systems and killer robots." It adds that it is "significantly aware of ethical concerns".

Surely the United Nations is worried?

It is. More than 20 countries have called for killer robots to be banned and the UN recently met in Geneva to discuss

autonomous weapons. That's good news for the Campaign to Stop Killer Robots (www.stopkillerrobots.org), which has been pushing for a total ban since 2014, although the Convention on Conventional Weapons did not take any formal decisions. For the record, the countries looking to ban killer robots include Argentina, Brazil, Cuba, Egypt, Iraq, Mexico, Pakistan, Uganda and Zimbabwe.

So can we stop robots ruling the world?

That's the plan, but some high-profile names reckon we've got a job on our hands. Elon Musk, the multi-billionaire CEO of SpaceX, worries that authoritarian governments may produce "an immortal dictator from which we would never escape".

Musk believes that governments do not have a proper handle on AI technology and its growing influence and evolution. He is concerned that we will develop regulations when it's too late for them

to be effective and that we could conceivably become mere pets to superintelligent machines. "Until people see robots going down the street killing people," he said last July, "they don't know how to react because it seems too ethereal". He has repeatedly said that AI is more dangerous than nuclear weapons.

The late, great Stephen Hawking agreed that AI could be the "worst event in the history of our civilisation". Both men called for urgent regulation in a bid to control Al's development.

But why are robots hell-bent on 'going rogue'?

Ah, good question. And the answer is: they probably aren't. Robert A Johnson, author of the recently published Thinkonomics: Illustrated Critical Thinking Articles, agrees that our brains will become inferior to artificial intelligence at its highest level and that robots will be able to learn and process data more quickly than us. But he argues against Musk's assumption that just because humans have farmed other species, gone

> to war and become obsessed with power means that robots

will follow suit. Rather, he says robots will only become killers if we want them to.

"Robots are no more likely to want to rise up and dominate the Earth than they are to want to drink sugary drinks, inject heroin or watch reality TV," he wrote in The Independent. "That we see


dominating Earth as the end goal of a perfectly rational individual says much about our own evolution, and very little about robots."

HOW BAD COULD KILLER ROBOTS REALLY BECOME?

Sometimes mere words are ineffective, which is why campaigners against killer robots have sought to show as well as tell of the potential dangers posed by autonomous machines.



With this aim, two key films have emerged in recent months: Slaughterbots, which runs for seven minutes and 47 seconds, can be viewed for free on YouTube (bit.ly/ slaughter448). It was shown at last year's Convention on Conventional Weapons, and starts with the announcement of a fictional drone packed with a widefield camera, tactical sensors, face recognition and a shaped explosive, then depicts it killing politicians and activists without human intervention.

The documentary Do You Trust This Computer (bit.ly/trust448) goes even further and looks at the pros and cons of Al. "We're rapidly headed towards



digital super intelligence that far exceeds any human, that's very obvious," says Elon Musk, who reckons there only is a "five to 10 per cent chance of success" if we decide to wage war against them.

Facebook Google Amazon

COVER FEATURE Could you, and should you, stop using the trio of web giants accused of money grabbing, data stealing and tax avoidance? **Robert Irvine** explains how you can ditch the dictators that rule our online lives

n 12 March this year, to mark the web's 29th birthday, Sir Tim Berners-Lee published an open letter on his website in which he bemoaned the online supremacy of a handful of tech giants. "What was once a rich selection of blogs and websites has been compressed under the powerful weight of a few dominant platforms," he wrote, ascribing the success of these platforms to "the competitive advantage that their user data gives them" (bit.ly/berners448).

It's not difficult to guess which companies Sir Tim was referring to: Facebook and Google have built their multibillion-dollar empires through the collection of their users' data, while Amazon knows more about your tastes and interests than you do.

None of this is a secret, of course, but the recent backlash against Facebook over the Cambridge Analytica scandal suggests that many of us have reached data-collection breaking point and find these companies ruthless, devious and avaricious. But what are the alternatives?

In this feature, we reveal how you can stop using Facebook, Google and Amazon - temporarily or permanently - and explain the benefits of switching to services that treat you and your privacy with greater respect.

BOYCOTT FACEBOOK



e don't need to tell you that the past few months haven't been great for Facebook. The Cambridge Analytica scandal revealed what most of us had long suspected but chose to ignore – that Facebook shares our personal data with third parties, who then use that data to target us with advertising, marketing and propaganda. This was followed by disclosure of further privacy breaches and calls for regulation of the social network.

When Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg appeared before US Congress, he admitted that the company had "made a lot of mistakes" and promised to try harder in future. But considering that he's made a \$70bn fortune from peddling

user data, while repeatedly claiming that same data is owned and controlled by individual users, it's unlikely the social network will completely rethink its business model. And besides, why should we trust Mr Zuckerberg's word when he clearly knew exactly how our personal information was being shared and processed? And what else is he hiding?

If you haven't already joined the #DeleteFacebook campaign that began in the wake of the Cambridge Analytica revelations (apparently 9% of Americans now have), we explain here how you can stop using Facebook without sacrificing your favourite online activities and recommend the best alternatives.

LOG INTO SITES WITHOUT FACEBOOK

One reason many Facebook users are reluctant to delete their accounts is that they used their Facebook logins to sign up with other services. Fortunately, there are workarounds that let you disconnect from Facebook without losing access to your content elsewhere. Here's what to do for three commonly linked services.

SPOTIFY www.spotify.com

There was a time when Spotify forced you to use Facebook to sign up, and even when this ridiculous restriction was dropped, many of us still used the same login option for speed and convenience. Annoyingly, this means you can't disconnect your current Spotify account from Facebook. However, you can cancel it and switch to a new one, to regain access to your music-streaming library and playlists – provided you're a Premium subscriber. Spotify provides instructions for this on its Help page 'I want to use Spotify without Facebook' (bit.ly/spotifyfb448).

If you signed up for Spotify using your email address and connected it to Facebook later to enjoy the 'social features', then disconnecting is much easier. Open the Spotify desktop app (you can't do this on mobile), click the

down arrow in the top-right corner and choose Settings. In the Social section, select 'Disconnect from Facebook'. That's it!

INSTAGRAM www.instagram.com

Yes, we realise that Facebook

owns Instagram, but the photo-andvideo-sharing service also functions independently within its parent company and - as far as we know hasn't compromised 87 million users' data or let Russians try to influence elections. If you want to stick with Instagram while ditching Facebook, you can disconnect them by opening the Instagram app and going to Settings, Linked Accounts. Select Facebook, then press Unlink Account and tap Unlink or Yes I'm Sure to confirm. This will stop your Instagram content appearing on Facebook, although of course you'll effectively still be a Facebook user.



You can unlink Facebook from your Instagram account or delete the latter, too

To delete your Instagram account as well, log into the Delete Your Account page in your desktop browser (bit.ly/insta448), choose a reason, such as 'privacy concerns', from the drop-down menu and select 'Permanently delete my account'. If you signed up with Instagram through Facebook, you'll (rather ironically) need to enter your Facebook password to leave.

both to sign up with the home-rental service and to verify who you are, so potential hosts and guests know they can trust you. If you no longer trust Facebook and want to unlink it from your Airbnb account, you can sign in

using email instead and avoid using it for verification. Go to Profile, 'Trust and Verification' and disconnect Facebook there. If you've turned on Airbnb's Social Connections feature, which lets Facebook friends see your activity on the site, you can disable that by going to Profile, Privacy and deselecting 'Share my activity with my Facebook friends that are also on Airbnb'.


BEST ALTERNATIVES TO FACEBOOK

With more than 2.2 billion users worldwide, Facebook is so ingrained in our lives that you may find it hard to imagine giving it up completely. Even if you don't post very often, it's still a useful way to chat, share photos and find out what your friends are up to, but there are other similar sites and apps. Here are six less nosy options to try.

RAFTR www.raftr.com

Whereas your Facebook news

feed is (or was) a jumble of posts of varying degrees of interest, Raftr lets you browse communities – called 'rafts' – about news, topics and activities you actually want to read about and discuss. In this sense, it's similar to Facebook's Groups feature, but with a cleaner, better organised interface. Sharing thoughts, photos and videos is very

straightforward, as is exploring and joining rafts that interest you.

Raftr is available on the web and as an iOS app, and you need to provide your phone number to sign up, so it can "verify your identity with a unique, texted code each time you log in", and prevent abuse and spam. It's certainly worth a look, although currently there's a bias towards US college students just like early Facebook!

Diaspora promises to be very different from Facebook. This non-profit social network lets you choose where in the world your data is stored, by selecting a 'pod' server when you sign up. Twitter-like features such as 'mentions', 'reshares' and 'loves' make Diaspora feel familiar, and you can explore the content


Since 2010, Diaspora has attracted around a million users, but only has two UK-based pods, so you may find it pretty quiet. Perhaps the Facebook backlash will encourage more sign-ups.

Available for Android and iOS, Vero was hyped earlier this year as the "new Facebook", offering many of the same features but with better privacy. Unlike Facebook, Vero doesn't use

vour news feed is organised chronologically. isn't curated or manipulated in any way, and lets vou choose exactly who can see the content you share. Best of all, Vero has no sponsored ads and promises not to sell your information to third parties. Because Vero doesn't use paid-for

advertising, it plans

to make money by charging an annual subscription fee, though the cost has yet to be confirmed. Currently, it's free for anyone to sign up, but this is partly to compensate for the number of bugs and outages the service has suffered.

Twitter is far superior to Facebook for breaking news (just don't believe everything you read), less cluttered with ads and annoyances, and allows you to interact with celebrities and companies on the same level. Conversation is fast, unfiltered and concise, and it's easy to share photos, videos and GIFs, as well as opinions, jokes and pithy replies. Unlike Facebook, you don't have to hand over lots of private data to use Twitter - not even your real name - and can opt out of personalised ads by going to Settings, 'Privacy and safety', Personalisation and choosing 'Disable all'.

Sadly, Twitter is no stranger to data breaches - in 2016, 32 million users'

passwords were stolen - and its privacy policy is far from perfect, allowing for the "collection, transfer, storage, disclosure and use of your information". Remember too that, unlike Facebook, Twitter is a public arena where anyone can read what you say, so it's not ideal for sharing personal pictures, while the flurry of content can make it difficult to follow conversations. There's also the ongoing problem of 'trolls' posting abusive and pointless content, although Twitter recently improved its tools for blocking and reporting offensive users.

NEXTDOOR nextdoor.co.uk

Nextdoor turns Facebook's local-groups feature into "the private social network for your neighbourhood", connecting you online with people who live nearby. Users can discuss issues

affecting their community; advertise items for sale or free collection; request and offer services such as decorating, dog walking and house sitting; recommend plumbers, cleaners and other tradespeople; share details of lost and found items; or just have a moan.

Nextdoor's Facebook-style interface makes it easy to use, but you need to provide your phone number or address to sign up. This helps to deter troublemakers, but you may see it as an invasion of privacy, particularly as your home is then marked on the neighbourhood map (unless you hide it).

SIGNAL signal.org

Facebook-owned WhatsApp uses end-to-end encryption, but the data-sharing scandal may make you less confident about the messaging app's privacy. In March, the Information Commissioner's Office ruled it illegal for WhatsApp to share data with Facebook, but this may change once the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) comes into force later this month.

If you love to chat, but you no longer feel comfortable using WhatsApp – let alone Facebook Messenger – you're better off using Signal. Available for Android, iOS, Windows, MacOS and Linux, this ultra-secure messaging service also uses end-to-end encryption, but dispenses with privacy-invading notions such as accounts, tracking and cloud backups. It lets you set messages to self-destruct after a specific length of time and offers encrypted voice and video calls

You need to provide your phone number to register with Signal and

Signal encrypts all your messages and calls

verify your account, but once you've received the confirmation code (or automated voice call), everything thereafter is done online. The only drawback is that your friends need to be on Signal for you to chat to them, but as it's quick, easy and free to sign up, this shouldn't be a problem.

DELETE, DEACTIVATE OR DOWNLOAD?

Facebook has responded to the Cambridge
Analytica fiasco with new privacy controls that it hopes will restore users' confidence. Here's a summary of what you can now do to review and protect your data.

 To check if your data was affected by the Cambridge Analytica breach, go to bit.ly/ca448.
 Here, Facebook tells you

whether you or any of your friends logged into the controversial app This Is Your Digital Life, and inadvertently shared your data.

A new feature called Access Your information displays all your Facebook

data on a single page, organised into categories such as Friends, Posts, Likes Photos and Videos, so you can delete specific types of information. You can also delete things you've searched for, and even move your data to another service – though this feature wasn't unavailable at the time of writing.

- The Facebook mobile app has been redesigned to make it easier to find specific privacy settings. Previously, these settings were spread over nearly 20 different screens, but they're all now accessible in a single location.
- There's also a new Privacy Shortcuts menu that gives you control over your data in a few taps and provides clearer explanations of how privacy controls work, including two-factor authentication and opting out of targeted advertising.
- You can download all the data
 Facebook has gathered about you over the years - including posts, photos,

videos, messages and profile information – as a single package. Just click the arrow in the top-right corner and choose Settings, then 'Download a copy of your Facebook data'. Select Download Archive and after 20 minutes or so, you'll receive a link to download the ZIP file.

• You can leave Facebook temporarily - rather than forever - by deactivating your account. On the General Account Settings page, click Edit next to

'Manage account' and choose 'Deactivate your account'. Alternatively, to delete your account permanently, go to bit.lv/fbdelete448.

We would recommend downloading your data first because you won't be able to retrieve it afterwards.



BOYCOTT GOOGLE

oogle must be delighted that Facebook has been hogging the headlines for the past two months, because the Cambridge Analytica bombshell has drawn attention away from Google's own greedy attitude towards our data. Here at *Web User*, however, we don't forget or forgive so easily, and figure that if you're going to boycott Facebook for its privacy-invading practices, you should give Google the heave-ho, too. After all, Google is even worse for collecting and sharing our data, and treating its users as 'the product'.

Indeed, many news sources believe that Google executives will be next to face a government grilling. "It's unclear how

long Google will be able to stay out of Facebook's data-privacy shadow", said the Washington Post. Only last month, a coalition of more than 20 privacy groups filed a complaint alleging that Google-owned YouTube had violated laws that protect children's online privacy by harvesting young users' data to target them with adverts (bit.ly/youtube448). Google's defence was that kids shouldn't be using YouTube in the first place! This, from a company whose official motto is - or at least, was - "You can make money without doing evil". Here, we recommend the best new alternatives to Google's most popular online tools and explain how and why you should abandon your Google accounts.

YOUTUBE

www.youtube.com

We're sure you're familiar with 'posh YouTube' Vimeo (vimeo .com), but when was the last time you visited Dailymotion (www.dailymotion .com)? A recent, radical revamp has made this service a stronger YouTube rival by trading its scrappy old design for a smarter, speedier viewing experience on both desktop and mobile. The video player is larger and better quality than YouTube's, and usefully plays content in a pop-out window so you can continue watching while searching. The downside is that many videos now come from Dailymotion 'partners' rather than users.

The dark, mysterious BitChute (www .bitchute.com) is closer to YouTube in design and content, but without its adverts, data harvesting, censorship

and obsession with 'monetisation'. It's powered by BitTorrent, so users can share content directly through the site rather than having it processed by Google servers, although this also means another 'peer' must be 'seeding' a video for you to stream it.

Launched last year, BitChute is rapidly growing in popularity, and has yet to be contaminated by idiots.


Google search's ubiquity and quality might make boycotting it seem both impossible and pointless, but there are good alternatives available - and we don't just mean Bing and DuckDuckGo. Qwant (www.qwant.com), for example, describes itself as the "only European search engine" that doesn't use cookies or trackers, or collect data about your searches. Whereas most privacyfocused search engines are pretty basic, Quant has an attractive homepage that features photos, videos, personalities and hashtags from 'trending' news stories, and offers a choice of searches including Web, Social, Images, Videos and Music. Its search results include ads, but these are unobtrusive, and its Boards feature lets you share your own content. Qwant mobile apps and

GMAIL mail.google.com

Though Google no longer scans our Gmail messages to target us with ads, it now uses information from our other online activities and our physical locations, and still scans our emails for other reasons – such as to generate 'smart' replies. Outlook.com also scans messages "to help protect you and display, categorise and sort your mail appropriately", so it's not necessarily a more secure alternative – especially as Microsoft is obliged to hand your emails to the authorities when requested.

For truly secure free webmail, you need to look outside the Five Eyes countries to a service such as ProtonMail (protonmail.com), which was developed by the CERN research facility and is based in Switzerland, outside EU and US jurisdiction. Available in your browser and as Android and iOS apps, its end-to-end encryption stops your messages being intercepted, and it doesn't store IP-address logs that identify your computer. It even has a hidden Tor service (protonirockerxow.onion) to combat the censorship and surveillance of its users. The free version of ProtonMail limits you to 500MB of storage and 150 emails a day. If you want more, you can pay €5 (£4.32) a month for 5GB and 1,000 messages.

Alternatively, try German-based Tutanota (tutanota.com), which is completely free for personal use and automatically encrypts all your emails, subject lines, attachments and contacts. It gives you 1GB of storage, offers Android and iOS apps, and ultimately hopes to be a complete replacement for Gmail, with a calendar, notes and cloud storage encrypted by default.

browser extensions are also available.

Also worth a look is Million Short (millionshort.com), which lets you dig deeper than Google by removing between 100 and one million sites that appear at the top of results in other search engines. But if you want Google-quality results without handing over your data, then Startpage (www .startpage.com) remains hard to beat.

everywhere you go - see your Timeline at www .google.com/ maps/timeline and although vou can turn locationtracking off, you may prefer a mapping service that isn't so nosy in the first place. For your phone, we recommend Maps.me (bit.ly/ mapsme448), which provides up-to-date offline maps

for every country in the world without sacrificing detail. It features millions of points of interest, including restaurants, petrol stations and cash machines; provides walking, driving and cycling directions; and offers traffic information for 38 countries including the UK, US and much of Europe.

On your desktop, the best option is OpenStreetMap (www.openstreetmap. org), which provides open-source data

🕻 DELETE YOUR GOOGLE ACCOUNT

If you're fed up with Google guzzling your data and want to wipe the slate clean, you can delete your entire Google account. Do consider everything you'll lose before taking this drastic step, such as apps, bookmarks, photos, emails, contacts, calendars and more. You can review the surprising amount of data on your Google Dashboard (myaccount.google.com/dashboard) and

click the link to download a copy as a ZIP or TGZ file. To proceed with the deletion, go to myaccount. google.com/deleteaccount and follow the instructions.

Alternatively, you can keep your main Google account, but prune specific services. To delete your Gmail account, go to the 'Delete a Google service' page (myaccount.google. com/deleteservices) and



click the dustbin icon next to Gmail. Bear in mind that you need a Gmail account to use other Google services, but deleting it won't remove Google Play purchases. To delete your YouTube channel (where all the videos you've uploaded appear), click your YouTube profile picture, select Settings, then Advanced and 'Delete channel'.

If you regret deleting your Google account, there's a chance you can get it back via the 'Account recovery' page (myaccount.google.com/recovery).

to many other mapping services, and emphasises that it "values the privacy of our users, members and others that visit". It's incredibly detailed, offers useful layers for cycling and public transport, and lets you add notes to maps if you spot any mistakes. For satellite imagery, Wikimapia (wikimapia .org) offers stunning views from above.


DOCS & DRIVE mail.google.com

As with Gmail, Google scans content you create and share in Docs/Drive "to provide you personally

relevant product features". There's also an alarming section in its privacy policy which says that by using the service, you give Google a worldwide licence to do what it wants with your content (bit.ly/privacy448). If you like the convenience of a combined online office and storage service, but without the privacy concerns, and you don't want to use Microsoft Office/OneDrive, the best free alternative is Zoho Docs (www.zoho.eu/

docs). This offers word processing, spreadsheet and presentation tools, gives you 5GB of free online storage, has Android and iOS apps, and supports most file types, including – unlike Google – zipped files, so you can instantly extract their contents. Also, Zoho's privacy policy is a lot clearer and less worrying than Google's (bit.ly/zoho448).

Another good option is Disroot (disroot.org), which combines an online word processor and spreadsheet with 4GB of free cloud storage, an encrypted email service and other useful tools.

BOYCOTT AMAZON

mazon doesn't suffer the same privacy issues as Facebook and Google – after all, it makes its money from your purchases rather than your data – and its Privacy Notice (bit .ly/amazon448) is mostly transparent about the types of information it collects about you and why. This includes detecting your location so it can provide relevant search results (and ads), and using pixel tags to determine whether you open its marketing emails.

Less commendably, Amazon says it will pass your personal information to the authorities when doing so is "appropriate" to comply with the law - an admission that has led privacy-campaigning group the Electronic




Amazon refuses to reveal what data Alexa collects through Echo speakers

Frontier Foundation to scold the company for "disappointing" privacy practices. Amazon has also failed to address concerns that its Echo smart speakers 'spy' on users, other than mentioning that unspecified data is collected "by our subsidiary, Alexa Internet".

However, the strongest reasons to boycott Amazon derive from its dubious business practices, which have made its founder and CEO, Jeff Bezos, the richest man in the world, with a net worth of \$112bn (£79bn). Once Amazon started branching out into every retail area, many smaller businesses went bust because they couldn't compete with its low prices and huge range of stock - unless, of course, they were willing to play the game and sell their products through Amazon. As many ebook authors have discovered, Amazon's view of what constitutes a 'fair cut' of profits can cancel out the benefits of its enormous customer

Then, of course, there's the matter of tax. The most recent figures show that in 2016 Amazon paid just £15m of tax on sales of nearly £20bn across Europe, of which £7.3bn was in the UK. The company attributed the low figure to modest profits and investment in

infrastructure, but many were shocked that it was still paying so little.


Last October, Amazon was ordered to repay €250m (£216m) by EU commissioners for exploiting "illegal tax advantages" in Luxembourg between 2006 and 2014. This scheme meant almost three-quarters of Amazon's profits went untaxed, allowing it to pay four times less tax than its rivals, until it changed its tax operations in June 2014. Its suspect practices aren't confined to Europe, either: in the US, President Trump has repeatedly attacked the company, tweeting that: "they pay little or no taxes to state & local government".

If you've had enough of Amazon's sneaky money-grabbing, tax-dodging tactics and monopolising business practices, here are the best alternatives to try.

ALIEXPRESS www.aliexpress.com

If you've no objection to buying from China (which is, after all, where most of our products are made these days), AliExpress has bargains galore, spanning almost as many categories as Amazon. From clothing and computers to tools and toys, this online marketplace offers discounts on an incredible range of items, although it's not so good for books, DVDs and other entertainment.

There are a few things to watch out for, however, including dodgy goods,

electronics that don't meet UK safety standards and extra charges such as VAT and customs duty on products costing more than £15. Also, although delivery is often free, it can take up to 40 days (!) – so check to see if your order can be dispatched from a European country to speed things up, and make sure the seller has a high feedback score. Still, for low-cost household items, phone accessories, cheap clothes and other bits and pieces, AliExpress is hard to beat.

ebay www.ebay.co.uk

Just as Amazon has become more of a 'marketplace', with around half of its stock now sold through third-party merchants, eBay has moved away from its origins as an auction site to become more like Amazon, selling more new items than used. With its huge variety of listings, easy ordering process and high-street-beating prices, eBay is the obvious alternative to Amazon, although it's not without its

own controversies. In 2016, the UK arm of eBay paid only £1.6m in corporation tax, against a pre-tax profit of £7.7m, even though its US parent company had total revenues of \$1.32bn (£920m) from its UK operations. Also, eBay has been accused of failing to protect its sellers against fraudulent buyers and of charging unreasonable fees, though at least it promises that it doesn't "sell or rent your personal information to third parties... without your explicit consent".





Find lots of brilliant bargains in your area using free car-boot sale app Shpock

SHPOCK shpock.com

If you're tired of buying and selling through corporate giants who are only interested in your money and personal data, then Shpock is an excellent, independent alternative. This car-boot sale app lets you sell items directly from your phone or tablet (you can also make offers through the website), with no listing or transaction fees - unlike Amazon - so you can make as much money as possible, and arrange collection instantly. Shpock is equally good for browsing and buying, and especially useful for household items, with listings arranged by proximity to your location, and photos and prices placed upfront. On the downside, Shpock's ads can prove distracting and its push notifications are annoying. Also, you don't get the buyer protection offered by Amazon.

retail behemoth. Amazon was a humble online bookstore, but searching for a book today involves avoiding a barrage of 'recommendations' for other items.

DELETE YOUR AMAZON ACCOUNT

Whereas Facebook and Google both make it verv straightforward to leave, Amazon is determined not to lose your custom, so it deliberately tucks the option away and - rather than just click a button and be done with it - you have to personally contact the company to close your account. On the Amazon

website (you can't cancel through the mobile app), click the Help link below the search box, then 'Need More Help?' from the list of topics and choose Contact Us. On the next page, click 'Prime and more', then choose 'Update account information' from the 'Select an issue' menu and 'Close my account' from the subsequent menu. Finally, select how you want to close your account - by phone, chat or email (the last option was greyed out for us) - and wait for a customer-service assistant to contact you and try to change your mind. What a hassle! We also noticed that Amazon's terms and conditions for closing your account (bit.ly/terms448) are out of date, still referring to LoveFilm, which shut down last October.



It may not have Amazon's ability to undercut high-street bookstores by massive amounts, but there are plenty of discounts of 50% or more, while the site's clear privacy policy shows a reassuring respect for your personal data.



Keep your programs safely up

to date

Following the disappointing news that the brilliant free software updater Secunia PSI has been discontinued by its developers, **Jonathan Parkyn** compares the alternatives

What we liked:

Short for Software Update Monitor, SUMo has

two key advantages over its rivals, the first of which is its simplicity.

Run SUMo and it scans your PC for installed programs and tools, then displays a list of what it's found, highlighting any programs that are in need of updating with an amber or red warning. It doesn't automatically

download the update itself - you have to click a program, then Get Update to open the program's download page in your browser. From here, you can download and install the latest version yourself.

SUMo's other benefit is the huge number of programs it supports. Its developers don't explicitly state how many applications and programs the tool supports, but in our tests, SUMo was able to spot and provide updates for several programs that other tools of

this type failed to pick up on.

By default, SUMo is set to check for updates every time you start your PC, but you can customise this and other functions by clicking Options, then Settings. A handful of extra features, including the option to manually include or exclude specific folders in your scans (in case you've installed programs in non-standard locations, for example) and the ability to export your list of applications as a text file or spreadsheet (CSV) file, round out this excellent tool.

How it can be improved:

SUMo doesn't currently update device drivers. There's a Drivers Update button among its tools, but clicking it simply prompts you to install the separate DUMo tool by taking you to its web page (bit.ly/dumo448).

It would be great to see a single free program that integrates the functions of both.

Another welcome function would be for SUMo to automate the update process

in the free version. This is currently reserved for users of SUMo Pro, which costs around £26.

SUMo doesn't fully automate the update process, but it's lightweight, easy to use and – most important of all – it supports the widest selection of applications and programs of all the updaters we tested.


The main bonus of this excellent free tool is that it's portable, so it doesn't need to be installed - you just download and run it.

Another major benefit is that it automates much of the update process, downloading and silently installing items with one click of the Perform Updates button.

The program offers a generous selection of useful extras, too, including the ability to batch-install the latest versions of many popular programs by ticking the relevant boxes in the left-hand pane. A built-in uninstaller, a scheduler and the option to create automatic restore points prior to updating are also handy.

How it can be improved:

Presentation isn't Patch My PC Updater's strong suit. The program's inelegant layout can be confusing because it's easy to assume that the programs listed in the left-hand pane



of the main area are tools the updater has found on your PC.

Also, Patch My PC Updater isn't quite as thorough as SUMo. According to its developers, it supports more than 300 programs, but it missed a couple of the applications that our Gold Award winner was able to catch.

OUR VERDICT

It's better at automating the update process than SUMo and is bursting with genuinely useful extras, but Patch My PC Updater doesn't support as many programs as our top choice.

What we liked:

A free tool from a dependable brand, Kaspersky Software Updater doesn't offer a great deal in the way of features - the ability

to customise the update schedule is pretty much the only significant option available - but it's by far the easiest to use of all the programs in our test.

The software scans your PC for programs, then only lists the ones that need updating. You can 'Update all' in one batch or install the latest versions of individual applications by clicking the Update button next to each one.

The update process is, for the most part, automatic and silent. Once you've set the tool updating, you don't need to work though individual installation screens. However, in a couple of cases, we found the automatic update process failed with no obvious explanation.

How it can be improved:

While Kaspersky Software Updater



is completely free, you'll be frequently prodded to buy the company's other products, such as its antivirus software. It also lags behind SUMo in the number of programs it detects and updates.

Brilliantly simple, but lacking in features, Kaspersky Software Updater is great if you want to keep your programs up to date without having to think about it too much.

Malwarebytes and more. Just tick the boxes and download your custom installer. Not only does Ninite block toolbars and other unwanted



foistware from being installed, but it can also keep your selected programs up to date. Just run the custom installer again - it'll automatically check for and install the latest versions.

FileHippo App Manager

Technically still in beta, FileHippo App Manager is a program updater tool from the people behind the popular software download website (filehippo.com). You can choose

to check for updates on a daily schedule or at startup. Click the 'Download & Run' button next to any tools that need updating. FileHippo App



Manager is easy to use but it failed to find updates for several of our installed programs. It's also marred by prominent advertising.

Heimdal Free

Heimdal Free positions itself as a security tool, updating your software in order to eliminate vulnerabilities and prevent cyber-

attacks. You can set it to silently monitor and auto-update supported programs, or opt to be notified



when updates are available and manually apply them yourself. The traffic-filtering and malwarescanning components are only available if you pay for Heimdal Pro. Lock down your router

Don't let your router be the weak link in your wireless network's security. **Robert Irvine** reveals how to tweak its settings for maximum protection





Change the default username and password

It's natural to read advice about changing passwords and think "blah blah – we all know that", but it's essential not to ignore this with regard to your router – it's even a matter of urgency. Every router comes with a generic username and account password – if it comes with a password at all – which can be as basic as 'admin' and 'password' (see, we've compromised yours right there!). This means that anyone in the vicinity of your router can log in and change the settings, potentially putting your entire network at risk.



Stop anyone messing with your router settings by changing the default password

To change your default password, open your web browser and log into your router settings. The IP address is usually something like 192.168.0.1 – check the label on your router for details or search for your device on the Router IP Address database (www.routeripaddress.com). Look for the Wireless Settings section or similar, and change your Admin password (not your Wi-Fi password) there, as well as

your username, if possible. Remember to note down your new login details for future reference. If you forget them, you can restore your router to factory settings to regain access, using the Reset button or hole on the device.

Hide or rename your

A Service Set Identifier (SSID) is the technical term for the broadcast name of your wireless network. When a Wi-Fi-enabled device searches for a network to connect to, it's this information it's looking for, which means that if you leave the SSID set to the default - often something like BTHomeHub-1234 - other people can identify your router type. This potentially gives hackers the information they need to target your network, particularly if that make of router has a known flaw.

Preventing your SSID from being broadcast increases your network's security by making it invisible. You can still connect to it, but you'll need to manually enter the correct SSID. In theory, by not broadcasting your details, neighbours, passers-by and

cybercriminals won't be able to deduce your network and access it, or tell the make of your router. The drawback is that some of your own devices may not be able to connect to your network if its SSID isn't visible, so you may prefer to rename your SSID instead.


To hide your SSID, go to your router's settings in your browser and untick the option 'Enable SSID Broadcast' or similar. To rename your SSID, find the entry Wireless Network Name (SSID) or similar and type your chosen name. For obvious reasons, it's best not to use your own name, address or other identifying details, and although you can have fun by calling the SSID something like 'Tell My Wi-Fi Love Her' or 'Please stop your dog barking', it's best to avoid drawing attention to your network and use random characters instead.

Turn off WPS on your router

Like hydrogen airships and asbestos insulation, Wi-Fi Protected Setup (WPS) once seemed like a good idea, but is ultimately more dangerous than it is convenient. It's a wirelessnetwork security standard that tries to make connections between your router and Wi-Fi devices quicker and easier, by letting you pair them at the touch of a button. WPS only works when certain types of encryption are turned on, which sounds secure enough, but considering that it allows anyone with physical access to your router to connect to your network without a password, it really isn't very secure at all.

Fortunately, it's easy to plug this security hole and render the WPS button on your router useless – and thus

safe. Go into your router's settings, find the WPS option - this is sometimes in the Advanced section - and turn it off. Some routers, such as Virgin Media's Super Hub, also have a WPS PIN option that's a little more secure because it requires a code for connection, but you may want to disable this, too, especially because it doesn't require physical access. Naturally, you can re-enable WPS to let trusted friends and family members access your network.

Update your firmware manually

As with your operating system, browser and other software, hackers are constantly looking for security holes in routers that they can exploit to steal your data and infect you with malware. When router manufacturers learn about these exploits, such as the KRACK vulnerability that was discovered last year, they plug these holes by issuing updates to the router's firmware (routing software), but these aren't always installed automatically at least, not straight away.

If the recent news stories about Russia targeting UK routers (see page 12) has made you worry about Wi-Fi security, you can ensure that your network is protected by updating your firmware manually. New firmware may also come with updated features for the router, so it's worth doing even if you're not paranoid about Putin.



If your router isn't updated automatically, upload and install the firmware yourself

Go into your router settings and find the page labelled Firmware, Router Upgrade or Update. The location varies by manufacturer, but you can usually find it in the Administration, Utilities or Maintenance section. Click the Check button to see if an update is available and, if it is, download and install the new firmware.

If no Check or Download buttons are provided, you can usually get the update yourself from the support section of the manufacturer's website, for example www.netgear.com/support for Netgear routers. Search for your device to see available updates, then download and extract the files, and return to the firmware page in your router settings. Here, you should be able to upload and install the firmware software - this may be in an unusual format such as STK.

Activate your router's built-in firewall

We're sure security-savvy Web User readers already have softwarebased firewalls running on their PCs, whether as standalone tools, part of a security suite or Windows' own tool. But did you know that your router has its own hardware-based firewall?

A hardware firewall sits between your



Ensure your router's firewall is switched on and control the flow of internet traffic

PC and the internet, whereas a software firewall sits between your computer and your network. If your PC is infected with malware, that malware could potentially disable your software firewall, but not vour hardware firewall.

To check whether your router's firewall is activated, go into your router settings, look for a configuration page labelled Security or Firewall, and ensure that the firewall option is switched on and is using the default setting to block all unsolicited web traffic. You can also set up 'rules' and 'port forwarding' to control incoming and outgoing traffic through specific ports, but you don't need to worry about these unless you're using a special service such as a P2P network, gaming server or VPN.

CHOOSE THE STRONGEST ENCRYPTION

Your router will offer a choice of encryption standards, such as WPA Auto, WEP, WPA2-PSK [AES] and WPA-PSK [TKIP]. You've probably stuck with whatever the default setting was, but if there are stronger options available, you could end up with a less secure network that leaves you vulnerable to attack TKIP is considered insecure and should definitely be avoided. Similarly. WEP is now easily bypassed by even novice hackers thanks to cracking

tools available on the web, so don't use that either. If your router offers WPA2-PSK (AES), select this because it's the most secure option; if WPA2 is unavailable, try WPA. Support for AES encryption has been mandatory in all devices manufactured after 2006, so everything you own (unless it's very old) should work fine. You'll need to enter a password, also known as a network key, for the encrypted Wi-Fi, and may need to reboot your router.


When you install the software, click the Options button to change the language from the default English (United States) to English (United Kingdom). From here, you can also make the browser the default; choose where the browser's shortcuts will go; and import bookmarks and cookies. When you first run the browser, you'll get a chance to change some of these options again, along with a further option to stop the browser from automatically launching on startup.




When you first open Avast Secure Browser, it looks just like Chrome and may even have imported your existing bookmarks. 1 There are three add-ons preinstalled: Adblock, 2 a video downloader 3 and Avast's Security & Privacy Center. 4



Open the Security & Privacy Center by clicking its icon. If you haven't yet set the browser as your default, a bar lacksquare across the top of the page provides a button to do this. lacksquareSome of the settings require you to download further software, 2 while others need switching on 5 or configuring.



The only preinstalled tool that's switched off is Anti-Fingerprinting, 1 which stops websites from recognising your browser based on its 'fingerprint' of add-ons and installed tools. It's switched off by default because it can stop some websites from working but if you're willing to take that risk, toggle the switch to enable it. 2




Adblock, 1 Anti-Phishing 2 and Anti-Tracking 3 work in the background to stop sites from bombarding you with adverts: Adblock stops visible ads; Anti-Phishing blocks websites known to be harmful; and Anti-Tracking uses the browser's Do Not Track tools to stop adverts following you around the web.






Chrome's incognito mode keeps you anonymous by wiping your history and cookies at the end of your browsing session. Stealth Mode is Avast's version of incognito, and it goes a step further by also switching on anti-tracking, 1 HTTPS encryption 2 and anti-phishing tools, 2 even if you don't have them on in the regular browsing mode.




HTTPS Encryption 1 forces websites you visit to open HTTPS versions, if they have them; and Flash Blocker prevents websites that still use Flash technology from displaying animations and video. Extension Guard 1 is a useful addition that stops you inadvertently installing add-ons that aren't safe.




Password Managers is set to 'Browser (Default)', which means Chrome will be looking after any passwords you've saved. If you use Avast Antivirus, you can use its password-management tool instead. Click the drop-down menu to select it.



Privacy Cleaner opens Chrome's settings and takes you straight to its standard browser clean-up tool, which is set by default to wipe evidence of your last hour of browsing data. 1 Use the Advanced tab 2 if you want more control.



Avast switches the address-bar search engine from Google to Yahoo, but you can choose a different one from Settings. Click the menu button, choose Settings, then scroll down to the 'Search engine' section. I Choose an alternative from the drop-down menu 2 next to 'Search engine used in the address bar'.



The browser also includes a video-downloading tool that works across a range of sites, including YouTube. If you find a video you'd like to keep a permanent copy of, click the toolbar icon, 1 then the Download button. 2 More information about the file is available from the drop-down arrow.




hanging your PC's display settings in Windows involves a lot of trial and error. ControlMyMonitor provides a much simpler way to tweak brightness, sharpness and colour tone with a scroll of your mouse, then save groups of settings as

presets to use in different lighting conditions. Like most NirSoft programs, ControlMyMonitor is portable, so you can run it from a USB stick to manage the settings on any PC's screen.




Download, unzip and run the portable program. Your default display appears in the 'Monitor:' box. If you have a second monitor, it'll appear in a drop-down menu. Select the display you want to configure, then click Refresh to see its current settings in the main window.



You'll recognise many of the options in the VCP ('virtual control panel') Code Name column 1 - such as Sharpness, Clock and Brightness. Only entries with a green dot, which are labelled 'Read+Write', 2 can be customised. The Maximum Value of most customisable settings is 100.




Choose a green-dot setting that you'd like to adjust; we'll use Brightness as an example. Right-click it, then click 'Increase Value +1' (or press F8) to make your screen fractionally brighter, or 'Increase Value +5' (press F3) for a bigger jump. Click the Decrease options to turn it down.



To skip increments, double-click a setting and enter a number in the Set New Value box. 1 Or to use your mouse wheel to increase and decrease the value, select the setting, press Ctrl and scroll. To omit the need to press Ctrl, click Options, Change Value With Mouse Wheel, then Always.



You can download your settings as a CFG (configuration) file, which is handy for saving a backup of your default configuration. Click File, Save Monitor Config, 1 choose a file name 2 and click Save. To roll back to these settings later, click File, Load Monitor Config and double-click the CFG file.



You can also use CFG files as display presets. You could save a configuration with a lower Color Temperature Request value (warm tone) and Brightness, then load it when working late at night to reduce eyestrain. A CFG file can also ensure consistent settings across two monitors.

Stop your Android apps installing junk


ost app developers use a range of plugins and add-ons for various purposes, from tracking how the app is used to serving adverts to its users. When you install an app on your Android device, you'll also be getting

these extras. Addon Detector keeps an eye on these add-ons so you can see exactly what's being used and what permissions are requested, both in new and updated apps.



Install the app from the Play Store and launch it. Start by scanning all your existing apps by tapping the Scan button. 💶 The software will scan everything on your device, looking for add-ons. The bar at the bottom of the screen charts the scan's progress. 2

You'll be asked whether you want to automatically upload scan data. This shares anonymous information about your apps with Addons Detector but enables the Livescan Monitor for free. Click OK 1 if you agree. You'll still need to switch on the Livescan Monitor (see Step 6).





Scanning opens up all the other options on the main interface. Tap Addons to see a full list of all the apps on your device, 11 with all the add-ons associated with each one. 2 Tap an app for more detail, including app permissions.

Permission Explorer 1 is a handy list that shows you how often each permission type is used by your apps, 2 so you can see which ones are common and which are more unusual. Tap a permission to see a full list of the apps that use it. Install Date shows when apps were installed.





To set the software to detect the creation of shortcuts and notifications, tap Shortcut Monitor and Notification Monitor respectively, and switch them on. 11 The latter needs an accessibility tool in the settings toggled on, but you're taken to the correct page to perform this action.

To switch on Livescan Monitor (it's disabled by default), tap it, then tap Settings, Enable Live Scanner. 11 It will automatically scan for all the items listed below 2 and notify you. You can untick any you're not worried about if they appear in updates or new apps.



Leave no trace on any PC using Tails

Wayne Williams demonstrates a privacy-focused operating system you can run on any PC, without making any changes to it



What you'll need

If you're running Windows, you need two USB memory sticks of at least 8GB each. The first is for installing an intermediary copy of Tails (which lacks certain security and usability features). You use this to install the secure OS on the second stick. If you don't have two memory sticks, you can use a blank DVD disc with a DVD writer for the intermediary copy.

You also need to download the latest

version of Tails from bit.ly/tadl448. You can download it directly from the website in ISO format or use a BitTorrent client, if you have one. It's a 1.2GB file, so the download option you choose will depend on the speed of your internet. If you have a fast, reliable connection, the direct download is probably the best choice.


There's also a browser extension which you can use to verify the ISO. This will prevent problems with incomplete or

broken downloads, and protects you if the files on the Tails site have been compromised by hackers. While verification is recommended, you can skip this stage if you wish.

You'll also need the Universal USB Installer from tails.boum.org/uui/ Universal-USB-Installer.exe, which is used to write the Tails ISO file to your first USB stick. We guide you through the steps in our Mini Workshop, right.

Create the secure OS

Once you've installed Tails on the first memory stick (or DVD), you're ready to install a secure version on the second one. Plug the blank drive into a spare USB port, open Applications and select Tails, then Tails Installer. Make sure 'Clone the current Tails' is selected, then click the drop-down menu under 'Target USB stick' and select the new drive.

Click the Install button. If this button isn't available, it may mean you forgot to format the original drive in Fat32 using the Universal USB Installer. A warning message will flash up. Click Yes to confirm that you want to proceed, then wait while the secure version of Tails gets installed. This might take a while and may even appear to freeze occasionally, so try to be patient.

Once Tails has been installed, shut down your PC and disconnect the first USB stick. With the new drive still in place, restart your PC and boot into Tails from it. You can now start using it as you would like. At this stage, you can create an 'encrypted persistent storage' space on the drive to store personal files, settings and encryption keys. This storage is protected using a passphrase and remains available to you every time you start Tails.

Create an encrypted persistent storage space


Creating your secure space is very straightforward. Go to Applications, Tails and select 'Configure persistent volume'. Enter a passphrase twice. The storage space isn't hidden, so anyone accessing your drive will see it. For this reason, it's important to choose a strong passphrase.

Once you've entered and verified this, click Create and wait while the space is created. You'll be shown a list of available options, such as Personal Data, GnuPG, SSH Client, Thunderbird, Browser Bookmarks and Printers. Select Personal Data (and any other features you might





require) and click Save. Shut down your PC, then boot back into Tails.

When the Tails Greeter appears, select your language and keyboard layout. In the Encrypted Persistent Storage section, enter your passphrase and click Unlock. This will activate the storage ready for use. Click Start Tails and you'll now be able to save personal files to this space, which you'll find under Places, Persistent.

What's in Tails?

Tails offers a good selection of tools, so you can do pretty much anything you need without ever leaving the privacy of the OS. Applications are sorted into categories including Favourites, Accessories, Graphics, Internet, Office, Programming, Science, Sound & Video,

System Tools and Utilities. Among the tools on offer are Tor Browser (a secure browser that routes what you do through the Tor network), Thunderbird email client, Pidgin Internet Messenger, KeePassX password manager, GIMP image editor, LibreOffice office suite and Audacity audio editor.

We'll show you how to get started with the OS in our Mini Workshop, below.

Use the Tor Browser

One of the main things you're likely to do with Tails is use the Tor Browser to browse the web securely. The browser comes with some useful built-in features, including a content blocker (uBlock Origin), HTTPS Everywhere (which routes you to the secure version of a website)

and NoScript (which prevents Java and JavaScript scripts from running). You can customise the behaviour of the different add-ons by clicking their buttons in the browser.

Your traffic is routed through the Tor network automatically but the green onion icon in the top-left corner lets you manage your anonymous browsing settings. The browser makes it appear as if you're located elsewhere and you can change this location at any time by launching a new identity. It will show you the circuit that you're taking to disguise your location.

You can also adjust the browser's security level. By default, this is Standard, but you can switch to Safer or Safest using a slider.

Improve Windows sound quality

Expert tips to enhance audio and solve sound issues

Restore old audio software

ome of the big Windows 10 updates, such as the various Creators Updates, can cause problems with your PC's sound quality, making the volume so low that it's almost inaudible. This is because Windows updates sometimes replace the sound drivers and other software that came with your computer with Microsoft's own versions, which may not be as good. Go to your PC manufacturer's website and search for drivers for your computer, then find the audio software and save it to your hard drive. If a Windows update adversely affects your computer's sound, reinstall your PC manufacturer's most recent audio software and drivers. It's worth keeping this software somewhere handy because you'll need it twice a year if Microsoft sticks with its current update schedule.



Download and install the most recent audio drivers for your computer


Check the volume

You'll want different devices and apps set at different audio volumes, because earphones can sound perfect with the volume set to 10, but speakers may require a setting of 70 or 80. Making sure the volume is set appropriately for the device or app being used may sound obvious, but it's more complicated than you think.

Open a few apps, right-click the speaker icon in the taskbar and select Open Volume Mixer. Your mixer controls may look different to our screenshot (right), which shows separate volume controls for YouTube in Chrome and Vimeo in Edge – it depends on which apps you are running.

These controls are not entirely independent and sliding up the main volume can affect the others. However,

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.



Each app has its own volume control

it's possible for the main speaker volume to be turned up while an app's volume is turned down. Many apps with audio output have their own volume controls, so if things sound a bit quiet, make sure the volume is turned up for the app you're using.

Boost headphones

If you use headphones with your PC, there's a tool in Windows 10 that can improve the quality of the audio. Right-click the speaker icon in the notification area on the right side of the taskbar and select 'Spatial sound', then 'Windows Sonic for Headphones'. This switch can be set on or off, so start playing some music, plug in your headphones and see which setting works best for you.

Select the output

Your computer may be set up with several different output options and you should check that you have the correct one selected. For example, you may have built-in speakers on a laptop, external speakers on a desktop PC, and use earphones or Bluetooth speakers. Click the speaker icon in the notification area, then click the up arrow in the corner, if there is one. This displays a list of audio output devices and you can select the one you want.

Customise the audio output

The audio output from your computer can be customised using the Sound control panel, where you can tweak elements such as speaker and

earphone properties. Open the Control Panel (start typing it in the search box and click it when it appears) and, in 'Small icons' view, click Sound. Doubleclick Speakers to open a new window.

The options available depend on your PC's hardware, but you may see tabs for General, Levels, Advanced and Spatial Sound. Select the Levels tab and click Balance. There may be sliders for left. right, centre and subwoofer volumes, or you may just see left and right speaker balance. It depends on the hardware installed on your computer.

Select the Advanced tab and choose a quality setting from the drop-down list. There are around 19 settings from 16-bit 32KHz (FM Radio Quality) to 32-bit 192KHz (Studio Quality). For reference, a CD contains audio at 16-bit 44.1KHz, which is good enough for most people. Too high a setting on a lowpowered PC can cause problems, so reduce the quality if necessary.

The 'Spatial sound' tab has three settings: Off, 'Windows Sonic for Headphones' and 'Dolby Atmos for Headphones'. Try them all with your favourite music to see which one you like best. There's also an option to enable 7.1 virtual surround sound, if you have hardware that supports it.

Troubleshoot your sound

Windows 7, 8 and 10's troubleshooting tools are a quick and easy fix for many audio problems. Open the Control Panel, click Troubleshooting, then click the 'View all' link on the left. Run 'Hardware and Devices', Playing Audio, and Recording Audio. In each case, click the Advanced link and tick the box 'Apply repairs automatically'.

More advanced tips for when you're feeling brave

Customise system sounds

Windows plays sounds for certain events, such as calendar reminders, connecting or disconnecting devices, a low-battery warning and so on. These can be silenced, or you can customise them to play a different sound. In Windows 10, press Windows+i to open the Settings app. Click Personalisation and select Themes on the left, then Sounds on the right. In Windows 7, right-click the desktop and select Personalize followed by Sounds.

A theme can contain a set of sounds - to see them listed, click the dropdown menu under Sound Scheme. Windows 7 has several themes and a long list of sound schemes to choose from. Windows 10 has only one by default, but more may be added when new themes are installed.

Change the sound associated with each of the system events

Whether you have one sound scheme or a dozen, select an event in the list, such as Calendar Reminder. and click the Test button below to hear it. Turn up the speaker volume if it isn't loud enough.

Click the button to the left of Test to assign a different sound to the event. There are dozens to choose from, Click Browse and select a WAV file as the sound for that event.

Playing a sound takes time and processing power, so if you're creating your own event sound, make sure it's short. Load vour music or sounds into an editor such as Audacity (www .audacityteam.org), cut a second or two from it and save it as a WAV file.

Go to bit.ly/theme448 in your browser to see a collection of Windows themes with custom sounds. Some are based on sounds in popular games such as Angry Birds and Age of Empires. Click the Download link, then click the file in the Downloads folder to install it. They all work on Windows 7, 8.1 and 10.

Update audio drivers

Your PC manufacturer's audio software may be the best choice for your PC (see first tip, opposite), but sometimes Microsoft's audio drivers work better. If your sound is poor quality or not working at all, then a driver update may be the solution.


Right-click Start and select Device

Manager in Windows 10 or open it in Control Panel in Windows 7. Expand 'Audio inputs and outputs', then right-click each item in turn and select 'Update driver'. Select the option to automatically search for drivers. Repeat the process with the 'Sound, video and game controllers' section.

Delete audio drivers

Sometimes the best way to sort out audio problems is to remove the drivers completely. For instance, if the latest drivers are already installed, but are corrupted. an update will not replace

them. Right-click each audio item in Device Manager and select 'Uninstall device'. Repeat this with the 'Sound, video and game controllers' section. When you restart Windows, the drivers will be installed automatically.

Back up OneDrive

A friend of a friend managed to lose all their files in OneDrive when a sync problem forced them to reset everything. Can I back up my OneDrive storage to make sure the same thing doesn't happen to me?

OneDrive's default setting is to store a copy of every file it finds in your PC's OneDrive folder, which is on your hard drive - usually at C:\Users\YourName\OneDrive. A regular backup of your PC's hard drive will include this folder, and there are plenty of free tools you can use to manage backups, such as EaseUS Todo Backup Free (bit.ly/

etbf448) and AOMEI Backupper (www.backup-utility.com).

If you've set OneDrive to store files online only, they won't be backed up, but deleted files remain in OneDrive's recycle bin for 30 days. If you ever lose a file, go to onedrive.live.com in a browser and see if it's in the bin.

Security checks won't find anything because it's not a malware problem - it's just a bug in a program that's trying to access an area of memory it shouldn't. It doesn't sound like a Windows error and, because it appears when you start your PC, it's probably a program that's set to start when Windows launches.

Right-click an empty part of the taskbar and select Task Manager. Select the Startup tab and see if any programs have 'software update' in their name. If they do, select them and click Disable.

Some people have found that the cause is a program called Easybits Magic Desktop, and the website (www .magicdesktop.com) says it's preinstalled on more than 90 million PCs. If you don't use this software, open Windows Settings (Windows+i) and click Apps. Find Easybits Magic Desktop and click it, then click the Uninstall button.

Stop Defender nagging

I have security software installed on my Windows 10 PC but I still get annoying Windows messages about security and enabling Windows Defender. How do I stop the nagging?

Installing other security software should disable Windows Defender and stop this type of message appearing, but it doesn't always work. A few tweaks to Windows should make

the messages go away. Open the Settings app (Windows+i) and click 'Update & Security', then select Windows Security on the left and click Open Windows Defender Security Centre

on the right. Click

the gear icon at the bottom of the Defender window to see options for disabling various notifications. If you have security software installed, you can disable them all. Click the 'Virus & threat protection settings' link and disable Defender's protection settings.

Next, press Windows+R to open the Run box, type regedit and press Enter to open the Registry Editor. In the left panel, go to:

HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\ SOFTWARE\Policies\Microsoft\ Windows Defender

Select Edit, New, 'DWORD (32-bit) Value'. Name it DisableAntiSpyware. Double-click it and set its value to 1. Close the Registry Editor and restart Windows.

If you ever want to undo this, delete the Registry key you've just created, return to Windows Defender Security Centre and switch everything back on.

Clear an access violation error

Soon after I start my PC, I see an error message that reads "Software update notification. Access violation at address F556E930. Read of address F556E930." I ran some security checks but none of them fixed the problem.

Import problematic photos

I usually import photos to my laptop using the memory-card slot, which takes SD cards from my digital camera. However, I've recently been getting a long, complicated error message that says "Unauthorised changes blocked", among other things, and I can't import images, even though I'm an admin user. Is there a fix for this?

In recent versions of Windows, Microsoft introduced a tool called Controlled Folder Access. When enabled, this prevents unauthorised software from accessing certain folders, such as Documents, Pictures and so on.

It's a useful security feature that protects your files from modification by malware, but it can also prevent access by legitimate software. When you want to import photos, temporarily switch off Controlled Folder Access.

To do this, click the search box in the taskbar and start typing windows defender. When it appears, click Windows Defender Security Centre in the search results. Click 'Virus & threat

protection', then click 'Ransomware protection' or use the 'Controlled folder access' on/off switch. You'll see one or the other depending on which version of Windows 10 you have.

Reinstall broken Media Player


I'm having trouble playing files with Media Player on my Windows 7 PC. I'll eventually replace it with a Windows 10 PC, but how can I fix this for now?

Windows Media Player can handle a range of audio and video file types but it can't play them all. Are the files you want to play supported? VLC (www .videolan.org) is a free media player that can handle a much wider range of files and it's worth trying to see whether it's a file problem or a Media Player fault.

There are a couple of ways to repair Media Player if it's causing problems. Open the Control Panel (by typing it into the search bar, then clicking it when it appears) and click Troubleshooting. Click 'View all' and run the following troubleshooters: Playing Audio, Windows Media Player DVD, Windows Media Player Library, and Windows Media Player Settings.

If you still have problems, go back to the main Control Panel screen and open 'Programs and Features'. Click 'Turn Windows features on or off', clear the tick against Media Features and click OK. Restart Windows. Go back to the

Windows Features settings and tick the box next to Media Features to reinstall Media Player. Restart Windows again.

Remove Edge's bias for sports news

When I open my Edge browser, it shows a collection of news stories, including sports reports. I don't follow sports so can I customise the feed to remove them?

Edge displays news stories it deems the most popular. You can tell it the types of story you prefer, which may reduce the number of sports stories, but you can't block them completely.

Open Edge and click the cog icon in the top-right corner. In the news topics near the bottom of the Customise page, select ones you want to see more of and deselect those you want to see less of. This still won't completely remove unwanted topics, though.

Another option is to set the startup page to a different news site. At bbc.co .uk/news for example, you have a choice of 10 sections and many subsections. Pick your favourite, such as business, tech or science, and copy the URL.

Go to Edge's menu, choose Settings, then under 'Open Microsoft Edge with', select 'A specific page or pages'. Paste the URL here and Edge will always start at that page.

Fix Windows 10's Photos app


When browsing photos in Windows 10's Photos app, I use the Next and Previous arrows on either side of the window to move forwards and back. However, sometimes the arrows disappear and I'm stuck. Is there a fix?

Some people have experienced this when viewing photos in a folder that contains a large number of images. One solution is to move your photos

into several folders instead.

Another potential solution is to open an Explorer window that contains the photos, press Ctrl+A to select them all, then press Enter to open them in the Photos app.



Set Explorer to open files in your chosen program

This assumes that Photos is the default app associated with JPEG images. If it isn't, right-click a photo and select 'Open with', 'Choose another app'. Select Photos and tick the box 'Always use this app to open .jpg files'.

Reset Windows Spotlight images

I love the images that appear on my Windows 10 laptop's lock screen, but it has been showing the same one for the past two months. It used to change at least every couple of days. How do I get it going again?

For those who haven't seen this, press Windows+i to open Settings and click Personalization, then 'Lock screen'. 'Windows spotlight' is an option in the drop-down menu under Background, and it displays a new lock-screen photo every day or two.

Clearing out the old files usually fixes the problem. Set the Background setting to Picture and select an image. Open Explorer, choose the View tab

and tick 'Hidden items'. Go to: C:\Users\YourName\AppData\ Local\Packages\Microsoft.Windows. ContentDeliveryManager...\Settings

Delete all the files in the folder. Return to the Settings app and select Windows Spotlight in the Background menu. Restart Windows to finish.



HARDWARE

Keep an eye on your GPU

If your PC's fan is making a lot of noise, it's probably because the CPU is working hard and generating a lot of heat. To see what's causing it, press Ctrl+Shift+Esc to open Task Manager, click the Processes tab, then click the CPU column heading (you may have to click it twice) to sort the processes and show the hardestworking programs at the top.

If you can't see anything in the list using excessive CPU, it may be the GPU -Graphics Processing Unit - that's causing the additional heat. This may already be showing in the last column but if not, right-click the last heading and select GPU from the list.



Check your PC's GPU activity and switch views in Task Manager

You can also see GPU activity on the Performance tab - click the GPU tile on the left, if you have one. Right-click a graph and select 'Change graph to', then choose either 'Single engine' or 'Multiple engines'. If I select 'Multiple engines' and click the title of the top two charts, I'm shown a choice of nine different displays - what you see on your PC may depend on your video card and whether it's being used.

Try calling up Task Manager when you're playing a game to see how vour GPU copes under heavy stress.

Switch off Firefox data harvesting

Even Firefox now gathers your data and makes it difficult to opt out. To stop this, open Firefox and click the menu button, then choose Options. Click Privacy & Security on the left and scroll down to 'Firefox Data Collection and Use'. Untick anything you're not happy with.

If you want to take this a step further, type about: config in the address bar, press Enter and click the 'I accept the risk' button if it appears. Type telemetry into the search box to see a long list of settings. You don't want to

disable everything here but The Windows Club recommends a list of things you should do with these settings at bit.ly/twc448.



Stop Kaspersky blocking Google Backup Sync

I started using Google Drive's new Backup and Sync tool, and all was fine for a week or so. Then it started displaying error messages and eventually stopped working completely.


It turned out that the problem was Kaspersky Antivirus. You have to add the Google Drive shell extension (.dll) to Kaspersky's trusted apps. You also have to uninstall and reinstall the Google tool, but Kaspersky stopped this from happening until I added Google Installer as a trusted app, too.

Hide Edge searches

If you open Edge in Windows 10, you'll see a search box on the startup page. Under it is a list of your recent searches. If other people use your computer, you may not want this information on display. Click Manage History under the Web

Clear temporary files

The Windows Temp folder doesn't get mentioned very often but, over time, it still accumulates junk in the form of temporary files. These files take up storage space and can have a detrimental impact on your PC's performance if your hard drive is small or nearly full. Clearing out old temporary files recovers the space.

Press Windows+R, type %temp% and press Enter. Explorer opens and shows the contents of the Temp folder in an Explorer window. Select the View tab and click Details. Click the 'Date modified' column to sort by date.

Assuming you switch your PC off at night, only files and use and anything older can be deleted. To be extra safe, delete everything that's more than two days old and don't forget to empty the Recycle Bin to recover even more hard-drive space.

Spot a failing drive before

I tried to create a backup image of my main hard drive and got error 0x8078007D. The image creation went well until it neared the end of the process and switched to creating a shadow copy, which is when I got the error message. I ran a standard Windows check on the hard drive, which seemed to be fine, and have tried to create the image on two separate external hard drives.


Following advice, I've used the time-limited trial version of Hard Disk Sentinel (bit.ly/hds448). This reported back that the hard drive has 109 weak sectors with an overall health status of 52%, though its performance status is still reported as 100%. Its life expectancy is 347 days, while the two drives I'm using to make the copy have more than 1,000 days and are problem-free.

How should I proceed? Should I move Windows to another drive?

Uninstall HDSentinel but keep the installation file in your Downloads folder. It stops the trial-clock ticking and you can reinstall it and use it again in the future.

Because Windows is rejecting your hard drive and HDSentinel isn't happy with it either, it's time to get another hard drive to use as your main system drive.

Remove a performance blockage from a PC

In the last week or so, my twoyear-old HP notebook (which runs Windows 10 version 1709) has become extremely sluggish at startup, shutdown and everywhere in between. Having a look at IObit Advanced SystemCare performance monitor (bit.ly/iob448), it would appear that everything is clogged up. Even typing this is a laborious stop-start exercise.

Remove unwanted antivirus software

My wife accidentally installed Avast Free Antivirus on her laptop. Because she didn't want it, she used Revo Uninstaller's (bit.ly/revo448) 'advanced' scan facility to remove it. However, Avast

> is still showing up as a Startup program, even though it doesn't appear in the main program list in Control Panel. It's also set in Services as 'automatic' and 'running'.

I can't disable or remove it from the services list. even though I've unticked it in the Startup tab of the Task Manager.

Download Avast's own uninstallation tool, which is called Avastclear (bit.ly/avac448). You need to use it in Safe Mode. Your previous attempts to uninstall will probably have removed the software's main EXE file and successfully triggered the option to render it invisible, but the overall Avast remove tool should still be able to remove what's left

If it still doesn't get rid of the software, try starting over by downloading and reinstalling the latest version of Avast Free Antivirus, then using the Avast uninstall tool (in Safe Mode) to completely uninstall it again. This should get rid of any old files while it removes the new ones.

Streaming with confusion over geoblocking

s a regular reader, I have seen very little in Web User about the attempts within the EU to ban geoblocking. About a year ago, we were told this was likely, then this was watered down and we were told that we could access our home Netflix (and similar) accounts and their contents throughout the EU, provided that this was limited to holiday or business trips (VPN not needed). This regulation was said to have been accepted and due to come into effect in April 2018. At some point, the big guns of sport successfully got that exempted, as was other copyrighted material.

Where are we now? Googling brings up many hits dated last year and it is difficult to know which ones include valid information. When I last took an Amazon Fire TV Stick abroad to



Cyprus, it allowed me to access my UK account and view the Amazon-sourced programs. However, most feature films would not play.

to a video-on-demand service not offered in your home country in the first place", which means we can't stream content in the UK from other countries without using a VPN, and vice versa. There remains a battle to be fought before digital borders are properly removed.

5G billions? They're literally buying thin air

spoke to my dad in hospital this morning. Well, I say spoke. I heard about every third word he uttered – neither of us sure whether it was the iffy mobile reception inside the hospital or the iffy indoor reception on my mobile network that was to blame.

At least there's more chance of dad getting better than our mobile networks. The UK's four big mobile operators have just handed £1.4bn to the Treasury for the rights to operate 5G networks, so there's little or no chance of them spending heavily to fill the massive gaps in their 3G and 4G coverage. There's a new technology to sell on expensive new tariffs: who cares if the old stuff still doesn't work?

You might think telecoms regulator Ofcom should. Indeed, when the 4G auction took place in 2013 - sticking another £2.3bn in the chancellor's top pocket - Ofcom assured us that the spectrum was sold with coverage

guarantees, ensuring few people would miss out. The reality turned out to be very different.

Only one network - O2 - was forced to deliver a high level of indoor coverage. The batch of spectrum O2 bought came with a caveat that the network must "provide a minimum level

of indoor data coverage to 98% of all UK premises by 31 December 2017". In March, Ofcom confirmed that O2 had ticked that box but when you look at the detail, it's enough to make you weep.

The conditions of O2's licence were that it was to deliver a network "capable of providing, with 90% confidence, a mobile telecommunications service with a sustained downlink speed of not less than 2Mbps when that network is lightly loaded". Note the two get-out clauses: "90% confidence" and "lightly loaded".

What does lightly loaded mean? Ofcom defines this as "a single user demanding service within the serving cell," where "the surrounding cells of the network are loaded to a light level". So

> as long as you're the only idiot in the village trying to get a mobile signal, you've got a 90% chance of getting a pathetic 2Mbps. Ofcon [sic] strikes again.


> > Since 2000, the

government has collected the thick end of £30bn from selling mobile spectrum. And while I'm well aware that this money may have helped my dad get the treatment he needs on the NHS and could be funding many other worthy causes, it still seems a staggering waste. It's not as if the government goes to any expense to secure spectrum, after all.

It's literally selling thin air.

So, instead of forcing these companies to hand over a few billion quid every few years, why doesn't the government do something bold and forward-thinking? Like forcing them to achieve 100% coverage on their 4G networks, both indoors and out, at a decent peak-time speed, before they get the right to sell 5G? You wanna bet Vodafone, O2, EE and Three wouldn't find the money to fill in their networks if they knew they were at genuine risk of being held back?

Still, I'm not holding my breath. I'll just keep my fingers crossed that the next time I ring dad, the line's clear enough for him to hear we all love him and want him out of there as quickly as possible.


