


most common mistakes we make online, so you can avoid falling prey to them in future.

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






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
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
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
What's New Online

Delete your Google search history

earch engines that promise not to track their users, such as DuckDuckGo, ought to be the go-to option for anyone who worries about online privacy, but most of us still use Google by default. This means the company can collect information such as our search terms, links and current location - but now there's an easier way to control what information Google keeps.

When you open the

Google homepage in your desktop or mobile browser, you can now click or tap the menu button in the top-left corner and select 'Your data in Search'. This opens a page that lists your search activity, highlighting the



last sites you visited and the search terms you entered. From there, you can delve deeper by choosing Search **Activity or Google Activity before** selecting the buttons next to each entry to delete it or discover more.

To make life even easier, there are options to remove your last hour's search activity or delete the lot in one go. What's more, you can ask Google not to save your web, app, voice or audio activity in the first place, and even control the ads you see when you search, to prevent future privacy problems. It's certainly worth checking

out, and there's plenty of information about how Google uses your data. The page is also heading to the Google app for iOS and Android very soon.

Share SoundCloud tracks to Instagram Stories


Music fans can now post songs to Instagram Stories direct from SoundCloud, without the hassle of taking screenshots and sorting links. Following the example of Spotify, which

> added a similar feature in May, SoundCloud lets you share tracks by tapping the Share button and selecting 'Share to Instagram Stories' (or the Instagram icon, depending on which phone you have).

When Instagram opens, it displays the album artwork with a moveable sticker containing the name of the song. Followers can then click 'Play on SoundCloud' at the top of Stories to listen to the tracks before commenting in real time. For this to work, you need to have both the SoundCloud and Instagram apps on your iOS or Android device and be signed into both. It's particularly useful for musicians who want to get their songs out to a wider audience with the minimum of fuss. Become an online graffiti artist



Asking web users to visit a site, grab a virtual pen and start drawing is inevitably going to invite some trouble. Certainly, that's what happened when Draw



On This Website first emerged, with some users deciding to scribble swear words and draw rude pictures - until the brains behind this communal art project intervened with a different approach.

Now you have to sign in with Twitter, after which you can use the free black ink for two minutes, from the moment you make your first mark. And while there are still no restrictions on what you can place on the digital canvas, your creations will fade away after five minutes. Only by purchasing one of the blue, orange or green inks for 99 cents (78p) can you ensure your works of art are permanent. This hasn't completely cut out the bad behaviour, but it's fascinating to see what creative works people are coming up with.

Use stickers in WhatsApp

Would you rather use stickers in your WhatsApp conversations than having to go through the hassle of typing words? If so, we've got good news for you. It's taken its time, but WhatsApp has finally made sticker packs

available in its iOS and Android apps, and more are due to follow. To use them, simply tap the new sticker button within the text-entry field and select the one you want. By tapping the + icon, you'll also be able to add new third-party sticker packs as they become available in Google Play and Apple's App Store.

View global population spikes

Population sizes are hard to visualise, but this map offers a unique way forward. It uses 3D population pyramids to show at a glance where large concentrations of people live. Taller blocks show larger populations, and an overall figure tells you how many people live in the area shown on screen. You can compare the most recent map (dating from 2015) with 1990 to see the changes over the past 25 years, view facts for various destinations from Asia to Africa, and "fly" to different locations.



Book a ride

Say, "Hey Google, book a ride to" followed by your destination, and Assistant will provide current waiting times for taxi firms such as Uber, together with prices.

Activate the flashlight With iOS 12, Apple introduced

Apple admits it will keep slowing down iPhones

What happened?

Last year, Apple admitted to slowing the performance of older iPhones to keep ageing batteries running longer, but hadn't told users it was doing so and offered no way to turn this off. After the controversy sparked uproar and the government demanded answers, the company offered to replace older batteries at a discount and provided a way to turn off performance 'throttling'.

With that, the controversy seemed to be over, but now it's back. Apple says it will throttle newer phones too, including the iPhone 8, 8 Plus and X, despite initially suggesting these models had been designed to avoid such problems.

Battery throttling isn't an inherently bad idea – it sets a maximum level of battery demand to stop older phones pushing an ageing battery too hard. As batteries get older or become damaged – for example, from exposure to extreme temperatures – their capacity diminishes. If your phone asks too much of an older battery, the iPhone will shut down or freeze. Throttling stops that happening and can help extend the life of your phone, but it also means a noticeably slower device.

The controversy came just as
Apple Watch owners were facing a
software update bug that made their
smartwatches freeze or power down.
Apple is asking Watch owners to send
the devices in for repair or replacement.

How will it affect you?

If you bought a new iPhone last year, you'll only see performance throttling

when the battery starts to degrade. All batteries do this, and it's not Apple's fault. To check the state of your iPhone battery's health, go to Settings, Battery and Battery Health to see how much capacity your device still has.

Apple no longer turns on throttling by default. Instead, if a lack of battery capacity causes your phone to shut down, you'll see a message offering to enable "performance management", as Apple calls it. Whether you decide to enable it or not is up to you, so consider carefully before you tap that button.

If you're a few months from an upgrade, it might be wise to let your phone manage its performance to avoid battery shutdowns. But if your phone is only a year old and you plan to keep it for a while, it may be smarter to take it to an Apple shop and get a new battery installed. This costs nothing if your device is under warranty. For the iPhone SE or iPhone 6 and newer, the cost is just £25 - that's well worth paying to extend the life of your phone for two more years.

Apple charges £79 to replace the battery in older models, but it stops supporting software upgrades for devices that are more than five years old anyway, so while the iPhone 5S will get this year's new version of iOS, the iPhone 5 won't. That means the former may be worth a battery update, while the latter may simply need replacing.

What do we think?

Battery throttling is a good idea but it's been poorly and sneakily implemented in this instance. Apple secretly slowing users' iPhones was a serious breach of trust, but now that the performance management system is in the open, it's clear that it's not a bad idea.

Batteries degrade as they age, and Apple says that after 500 recharge cycles, most batteries will see an 80% reduction in capacity. That's true of any device that uses a lithium-ion battery. So until we get a breakthrough with next-generation batteries, using devices more intelligently is a smart move.

It's worth remembering, though, that earlier smartphones had removable batteries. If you wanted to replace the battery, you just ordered a new one from the manufacturer, popped off the back plate and slid in the new one. The drive for slimmer phones has meant batteries are now glued into cases, making them difficult to remove.

Although it's good news that Apple has decided to make battery replacement so affordable, rival smartphone makers who followed its lead in producing slimmer phones that are glued together have yet to offer battery replacements on the cheap. Hopefully, this will become a trend, allowing us to use our phones for as long as possible. That's better for our wallets as well as the environment.

What we think of this fortnight's top tech news stories and rumours, and how they affect you

Google's new easyto-use reCAPTCHA

What happened?

Google has created a new version of reCAPTCHA, the fiddly form that web users have to fill in on sites across the web to prove they're human. The aim is to help websites fight back against bots, such as automated ticket-buying scripts.

The original versions of CAPTCHA required human interaction, such as asking users to enter text from a distorted image into a box. The new version, edition three, moves reCAPTCHA entirely into the background of a page so that it never needs human interaction. Instead, it examines a wider range of user activity across multiple pages, giving each site visitor a risk analysis score. The aim is to fight back against spammers and online abuse from bots without interrupting the rest of us.


How will it affect you?

The good news is that you don't need to do anything with reCAPTCHA version three. Once sites roll it out, you'll no longer need to

tick the box that says "I am not a robot" or try to decipher blurry images of text or click street signs in tiny photos. Instead, your behaviour across a website will let the site know you're not a bot. If the system does flag you as a suspicious user and believes you may be a bot, a site can require a login, registration or two-factor authentication for you to prove you're a real person.

What do we think?

Making the web easier for humans to use while adding more hurdles for bots is good news for everyone. The reCAPTCHA system has long been a necessary frustration online, forcing us to read blurred text that's a struggle to decipher or tick seemingly pointless boxes proclaiming our humanity in order to fight back against bots. Automating that process will not only reduce such frustrations, but also help to prevent spam and online abuse, by making it harder for dodgy bots to sign up for websites and apps.



Amazon's try-beforebuy clothing service



What happened?

One downside of online shopping is that you can't try on items of clothing before you buy them, which means you have to pay to return garments that don't fit. Amazon hopes to make things easier with its new Prime Wardrobe service, which allows three to eight items to be delivered to your home at no initial charge - but only for members of its Prime subscription service.

How will it affect you?

If you're an Amazon Prime subscriber, head to www .amazon.co.uk/primewardrobe for details of the service. Any item with the Prime Wardrobe logo can be delivered to your home free of charge, and you have seven days to try it on before returning it for free with the included shipping bag and label. Whatever you decide to keep, you pay for.

The service doesn't apply to all clothing on Amazon, but it does include clothes, shoes and accessories across a range

of participating brands. You're also offered discounts relating to the number of items you choose to keep – from £5 off items worth £100, to £20 discounts on items worth £200 or more.

What do we think?

One of the frustrations of online shopping is ordering an item of clothing only to find it doesn't fit properly. This can be mitigated by ordering the same item in multiple sizes, but that means paying upfront, fiddling with returns systems and paying for your own delivery. This is why Amazon Wardrobe is a good idea, but it's the selection of clothes on offer that will make or break the service: it's no good if the items you want aren't available in your size.

This is another service that makes Amazon Prime an appealing subscription, along with free next-day delivery, video streaming and free books. However, you'll have to be an avid online shopper to make the £79-a-year fee worthwhile for Prime Wardrobe alone.




Bing links to malware in searches for Chrome

What happened?

Malicious files disguised as Google Chrome have appeared in Bing's search results. The Microsoft-owned search engine was recently found to be promoting a link to a phishing website when users searched for the Chrome browser.

Twitter user Gabriel Landau brought the issue to the attention of Web User's sister site Alphr after he tried to download Chrome through Microsoft Edge, the default browser on his new Windows 10 PC. When he searched for "download chrome", the top result was an advert that supposedly led to "www .google.com". In fact, the link took him to googleonline2018.com, a scam website designed to look like the real thing.

Other web browsers, including Chrome, blocked the malicious link, recognising it as a deceptive site. As Landau and others found out, however, Bing allowed the scam link on the front page of its search results, despite its dubious URL. The malicious advert didn't appear in every search, but it did only show up in Edge - both Firefox and Chrome recognised the website as a scam. Landau identified the downloaded file as malware by inspecting its digital signature, and found that its installer wasn't made by Google, but by Alpha Criteria Ltd, a known distributor of malware.



How will it affect you?

The presence of malicious links in Bing's search results highlights how careful you need to be about what you click online. An ad blocker will hide dubious results like this, but if you prefer not to use one - perhaps because you don't agree with the morality of denying websites their funding - your browsing may be hijacked by such devious tricks. As always, it's essential to keep your security software updated to safeguard your PC against the latest threats.

What do we think?

This story casts Microsoft's products in a vey poor light. The company

responded to the alert by removing the offending ad, but since this isn't the first time it has popped up in Bing's search results, there's no guarantee that the issue has been resolved permanently.

Microsoft tried to contact Landau on Twitter, encouraging him and others to report suspicious adverts to the company's website. At the time of writing, Microsoft hadn't commented as to whether it was taking steps to prevent such attacks in the future.

We all like to think we're tech-savvy enough to avoid being scammed by fake websites, but as this incident demonstrates, it's all too easy for malware to slip through the cracks.

FIRST LOOK

iPhone XR bit.ly/iphonexr462

Apple unveiled three new iPhones this year, but it's saved the best till last. The iPhone XR is Apple's 'budget' model - that's if your budget stretches to £750 for a phone. It's about the same price as a new iPhone 6 in 2014, but £250 cheaper than the latest top-spec models.

Behind the 6.1in liquid-retina screen is one of Apple's top-of-the-range A12 Bionic processors and 3GB of RAM, which make the phone feel zippy and lag-free. Most users will struggle to tell the difference between the XR and premium iPhones.

Like the more expensive models, the XR features True Depth FaceID and wireless charging. However, it improves enormously on its

predecessors' battery life. It's not quite as water resistant as its older siblings, but its IP67 rating means it can handle the odd spot of rain - so it's ready for the British winter.

Because it's a so-called budget device, the iPhone XR lacks a fingerprint scanner, 3D Touch and additional antenna bands, which affects download speeds. While these may not be deal-breakers, the

phone's camera specs pose a more serious lack. Unlike the XS and XS Max, the iPhone XR comes without a second, depth-mapping camera. Instead, it forces the 12-megapixel camera and some so-so software trickery to do the heavy lifting without the aid of a rear



telephoto lens or 'intelligent' portrait mode. As a result, its images are grainier and slightly washed out.

The iPhone XR is available in a range of colours. Standard black and white models are joined by blue, orange, yellow and red. You also have a choice of storage options: 64GB, 128GB and 256GB. It's worth opting for the middle one,

because 64GB doesn't leave much room for apps and other i-delights, even when you're using cloud storage.

There are better smartphones available for this price, but if you're an Apple fan, you won't be disappointed by the iPhone XR.







Is Twitter scrapping its Like button?

Twitter chief Jack Dorsey has apparently hinted that the social network will be removing its Like button "soon". The remarks, allegedly made during a private Twitter event, follow on from last month's Wired25 expo, when the introspective CEO commented that "right now we have a big Like button with a heart on it and we're incentivising people to want it to go up. Is that the right thing, versus contributing to the public conversation or a healthy conversation? How do we incentivise healthy conversations?".

Twitter and its co-founder have had a bruising few months after a floundering appearance at the recent Congressional hearings, rumours of 'shadow-banning' conservative users and the dismissal of Twitter's unofficial position as the "free-speech wing of the free-speech party" - a joke that made Dorsey few friends. However, after increased advertising revenue and the removal of thousands of Twitter bots, the US President's social network of choice is finally turning a profit - and it only took 12 years.

Those experiences have fed the platform's current identity crisis. In a statement, Twitter said: "As we've been saying for a while, we are rethinking everything about the service to ensure



conversation, and that includes the like button. We are in the early stages of the work and have no plans to share right now."

The Like button is a small part of a broader picture as Twitter attempts to define itself in a culturally and politically riven online landscape. This isn't the first time Twitter has toyed with its icons, however: in 2015 it replaced its original Favourite star with the heart-shaped Like button, bringing it more in line with its social-media rival Facebook. So expect it to change - but don't expect it to be for the last time.

Cathay Pacific breach exposes 9.4 million passengers

Chinese airline Cathay Pacific has admitted to a catastrophic data breach in which the details of 9.4 million customers were exposed. The breach includes data relating to names of passengers, their nationalities, dates of birth, telephone numbers, email and physical addresses, passport numbers, credit card numbers and even historical travel information.

Suspicious activity was first discovered in March, and the airline said it took immediate action to



investigate and contain the event, but stressed that it had no evidence that any personal information has been misused.

"We are very sorry for any concern this data security event may cause our passengers," CEO Rupert Hogg said in a statement. He added that the airline is in the process of contacting anyone who may have been affected.

Cathay Pacific also said it had notified the Hong Kong Police and "the relevant authorities".

Yahoo offers compensation to hacked users

Yahoo will pay out \$50m (£39m) in damages and offer free creditmonitoring services to millions of its users after a data breach in 2013 led to around three billion accounts being compromised by hackers. According to reports, the money will go to 200 million people affected by the hack.



The company agreed to the compensation as part of a court settlement

awaiting federal judge approval.

The attack in 2013, thought to be state-sponsored, stole personal details including names, email addresses and dates of birth. Yahoo stated that passwords, credit card numbers and bank account information were not stolen in the attack. The breach was not disclosed until 2016.

Claims for a part of the compensation fund can be submitted by an eligible Yahoo account user who suffered losses as a result of the breach. Account holders will be compensated at \$25 per hour for time spent dealing with problems caused by the breach.

intelligence may make it easier for anyone to impersonate famous people in the future, but it's not that difficult now. This is because the anonymity provided by the internet makes it easy for online groomers to pretend to be someone else in order to gain a child's trust.

Parents all too often assume that, because children are tech-savvy, they are safe online. However, this is usually not the case, and there is little public information available.

Meanwhile, beleaguered schools are left with the responsibility to protect children, but are given no extra funding to do so. Teaching online safety needs



to become as much a part of raising children as keeping them safe in the real world.


Even more concerning is that a massive 87% of parents do not restrict the amount of time their young children spend online - and only 13% of parents install security software. Having parental controls in place and reviewing the default settings for apps are two very small steps that parents can take to help mitigate these risks.

To combat abuse, it's important to equip children with cybersecurity skills at an early age. The launch of the government's Cyber Schools Programme has been a significant step in helping students develop key skills.

If youngsters become more savvy about the dangers presented by the online world, they will be more likely to steer clear of predators. Furthermore, they will potentially be more confident in identifying and reporting such criminals.







How would you like your site to be automatically turned into a podcast, so that people can hear your new content as well as see it? This is a handy feature for visitors who would rather listen than read, and it makes your site more accessible to people with disabilities.

Getting your website at the top of Google's search results is always a priority, but searches on the privacy-focused search engine DuckDuckGo (duckduckgo.com)

Apple to launch Netflix competitor in 2019

We test and compare the latest products

Monitors under £250

You don't have to spend a fortune to upgrade your monitor. Here, we compare four top models that cost less than £250

very time you sit down to use your desktop PC, you'll be staring at its screen - so it's worth making sure that you get the best quality for your cash. Still, there's no need to spend a fortune to get a good upgrade. Here, we've reviewed four monitors that all cost less than £250. One of them even comes in at less than £100!

Before you buy, make sure you've got the correct connection from your PC. All the monitors we've reviewed in this Group Test have an HDMI port, but if your PC or graphics card uses a different connector, ensure that it will be compatible by checking the monitor's video inputs in our table on page 24.

HOW WE TESTED

We test each monitor with a calibration device called a colorimeter, which uses its own software to measure a range of information about the colour, brightness and contrast that each monitor can achieve. We use the colorimeter to measure the monitor's performance on its default settings and the presets available on the monitor's menu, because most people don't have their own calibration equipment to help them make further adjustments.

It's not unheard of to find excellent monitors for less than £250 but this model is the best we've seen to date, by some margin. The screen is virtually uncompromised, based on an IPS (In-Plane Switching) panel that has wide viewing angles and great colour reproduction.

The design is attention grabbing, with slim top and side bezels that make it appear almost borderless and a fully adjustable stand for height, swivel, tilt and 180-degree rotation. There's a built-in 2-megapixels webcam that you pop out from the top of the screen when you want to make a video call – the rest of the time, it can be slotted away to protect your privacy.

A Philips PowerSensor detects when you're away from your desk and automatically dims the screen when you walk away. The monitor is also crammed with ports, so you can connect your PC via DisplayPort, HDMI or VGA. It has a pair of 2W speakers and a line-in port, so you can play your PC sound through it, and a headphone jack to bypass the speakers. There's also a USB 3 port.

The Full HD panel performed brilliantly in our tests. We measured a contrast ratio of 1,327:1, and it reproduced 90.6% of the colours in the sRGB standard, with a black that goes as dark as 0.16cd/m². Its only weakness is its peak brightness, which topped out at 213cd/m², which



would make it difficult to see in direct sunlight.

The screen isn't specifically designed for gaming but it's able to handle less demanding titles. If you're about to embark on a session, we'd recommend you go into the settings and set the SmartResponse tool to its Fastest setting, to get the best results.

The monitor's OSD (on-screen display) is simple to use. We particularly liked the LowBlue mode, which alters the level of blue light displayed so it's easier on your eyes when you're using your monitor at night.

VERDICT ★★★★

For less than £250, you'll be hard-pressed to find a more complete IPS monitor. Its colour accuracy and contrast ratio make it perfect for watching films or browsing the web, while the stunning design immediately marks it out from the crowd. This Philips monitor is superb value for money, uses the best screen technology and has few compromises for the price, making it an easy Gold Award-winner.

Most monitors come in a 16:9 ratio because that's the ideal for watching movies and playing games. The AOC X24P1 is 16:10 a slightly squarer view with more vertical space - which works better for general Windows use.

The screen has a pre-calibrated sRGB mode which performed

brilliantly when we tested it, recreating 98.7% of colours in the sRGB standard. Its contrast ratio is 1,241:1 with a maximum brightness of 359cd/m², so it would perform better than the Philips Gold Award-winner if situated next to a window.

There's only a very small bezel at the top and sides of the screen, so it's efficient on space, and the stand can pivot, tilt, swivel and be set at different heights. You can connect to it using HDMI, VGA, DVI and DisplayPort, and it has four USB 3 ports. It has basic 2W speakers built in and also includes a headphone socket.

VERDICT



This AOC X24P1 provides a little more screen space thanks to its 16:10 screen ratio, but there's no built-in webcam. It's less suited to entertainment than our Gold Award-winner, but the extra vertical space is good for browsing and working.

At less than £100, this is a tempting offering from Acer but it does come with a few compromises. At 21.5in across the diagonal, the screen is smaller than the other monitors in this test, and it only has HDMI and VGA inputs, with no USB

ports. Its TN (Twisted Nematic) panel is also less sophisticated than its IPS rivals, with narrower viewing angles.

In our tests, however, it performed admirably, producing 93.5% of sRGB colours, with a contrast ratio of 1,103:1 and a peak brightness of 287cd/m². For a monitor that's less than half the price of the other award-winners, this is an excellent set of results.

The overall design has taken a bit of a hit - the stand is very wide and with no brushed-metal effects, you're left staring at a lot of plastic. The bezel around the edges is quite thick, too, so it's not ideal for multi-monitor setups.

VERDICT

This is a great-value monitor that's surprisingly good for entertainment and gaming. It's smaller and less advanced than the other screens we tested, but provided good results. Check that it has the the right connections, though.

If you're an avid gamer, you'll want a screen with a higher refresh rate to help the action flow smoothly. While the other monitors we've reviewed here have 60-75Hz refresh rates, this AOC model offers 144Hz, along with a range of extra gaming tools, including special profiles designed to



enhance games and AMD FreeSync, which works in conjunction with compatible AOC graphics cards. Unfortunately, its image quality is disappointing. Its low contrast ratio of 472:1 makes dark images look grey, and the sRGB coverage is only 89%, lagging behind the other screens we tested. However, peak brightness reached 422cd/m², which was the highest result in this Group Test.



Most of us take it for granted that we see web pages as their creators intended them to be seen, but people with visual impairments may experience online content very differently. A new Chrome extension called Colorblindly (bit.ly/colorblindly462) shows you how the web would look if you were colour blind by simulating the eight colour-vision-deficiency conditions. These include protanomaly

(reduced sensitivity to red light), tritanopia (difficulty discriminating between blue and yellow) and achromatopsia (total colour blindness). Click the toolbar

Similarly, Funkify (bit.ly/funkify462) simulates a range of conditions including dyslexia, cognitive impairment and trembling hands, as well as colour blindness, but its quirky approach – with settings that include Blurry Bianca and Tunnel Toby – won't be to everyone's taste.

Transform and enhance your New Tab page

As the nights draw in and TV becomes swamped with endless reality shows, why not give yourself something nice to look at by installing Aurora (bit.ly/aurora462)? This add-on transforms your New Tab page with 5K wallpapers of stunning landscapes that look incredible even if you don't have a 5K monitor

(which is likely to be the case). Aurora is more than just a pretty face, though, because it adds a host of useful tools to your new tabs, such as a five-day weather-forecast widget, a bookmark manager that lets you categorise and organise your saved sites, and a to-do list that integrates with other services such as Google Keep. You can also create sticky notes on Aurora's dashboard and search your Chrome history without leaving the page.

The extension asks for a long list of permissions, but the developer helpfully explains why it needs each one and promises that Aurora doesn't collect personal information.

FIREFOX

Stop Firefox updating to the latest version

Savvy web users know that you should always use the newest stable version of your browser to safeguard against the latest security threats and performance bugs, which is why Google, Mozilla and Microsoft update their browsers automatically. However, there may be times when you don't want to update - perhaps because there are reported problems with a new version,



or you're worried that your favourite add-ons will stop working. Firefox used to offer a 'Never check for updates' option to stop the browser updating automatically, but Mozilla has ditched this in version 63. Fortunately, you can get it back using an add-on called Enterprise Policy Generator (bit.ly/ policy462). Install it, then click its toolbar button and, in the Updates & Data Collection section, select 'Prevent Firefox from updating'.

You can find and download updates manually by going to Help, About Firefox.



Hide user comments on any website

If you've ever regretted scrolling down past an online article, blog post or video and exposing yourself to the vacuous, inflammatory and offensive comments below, you'll appreciate an add-on called Shut Up: Comment Blocker (bit.ly/shutup462). This tool automatically hides comments on websites such as Mail Online, YouTube, The Guardian, Facebook and many more, so you'll never even know they're there. If the temptation to look gets too much, simply click the speech-bubble toolbar button to reveal what the developer calls the "vitriolic, idiotic wasteland" of the comments section. The tool remembers which sites you were on when you reactivated comments, and shows them automatically when you next visit.

Shut Up is also available for Chrome and Safari, and as an iOS app (bit.ly/shutupall462).

Restart Firefox easily

One feature Firefox has long lacked is a Restart button. You can click the Help menu and choose 'Restart with Add-ons Disabled', but that's not much use if you simply want to relaunch the browser to free up memory or apply an update, and keep your open tabs and active tools intact. Happily, there's a workaround that doesn't involve installing a dedicated 'restart' extension. Type about:restartrequired into your address bar and press Enter. You'll see a message telling you that an update is being installed, but you can ignore that because it isn't true: the important thing here is the Restart Firefox button, which you can click to relaunch the browser without losing anything. Bookmark the page and drag the entry to your Bookmarks Bar for one-click access in future.



We carry lots of extremely valuable information around with us on our phones and tablets these days, including files, photos, financial details and other personal data that we wouldn't want to fall into the wrong hands. Most of us are sensible enough to protect our devices with a passcode or PIN, but what if a criminal managed to crack it and gain access to the device's storage?

Thankfully, a new app called BestCrypt Explorer

has the answer. It's a file-manager tool that lets you move your most private files and sensitive information into special encrypted containers in your device's storage, which you can protect with a password. BestCrypt uses very strong 256-bit AES encryption to keep your most precious files safe. It also comes with an integrated file viewer, so you can browse and open your encrypted files, view photos, watch videos and more without having to decrypt the data and, potentially, fall victim to a data leak or snooping malware in the process.

BestCrypt is cross-platform compatible, which means

you can use it on Windows PCs, Linux and Mac computers as well as on your mobile devices - head to bit.ly/encrypt462 to download free software for encrypting, compressing and accessing encrypted files. You can also link the app with your Google Drive, Dropbox or OneDrive account to store encrypted files in the cloud and access them from all your devices. BestCrypt even makes sure that any files you exchange between devices are protected during the transfer process.

The Android version of BestCrypt Explorer has

been in beta for a while but has finally been released as a full app. It's easy to get to grips with and is currently free for personal use.

Our guide to Wi-Fi 6

Baffling Wi-Fi specifications will soon be a thing of the past. David Crookes takes a look at the new internet standard

What is it?

Wi-Fi 6 (bit.ly/wifi462) is the latest wireless internet protocol and it not only brings improved performance but it also marks a significant change in the nomenclature. It's set to be better equipped to meet the ever-growing demands of modern digital life, both in the home and at work, and will make it easier to figure out which standard is the latest and greatest. After all, Wi-Fi 6 is self-evidently a step up from Wi-Fi 5 it's in the numbers!

But what's Wi-Fi 5?

Good question. Until now, we've become accustomed (or not) to the convention of referring to Wi-Fi protocols as 802.11. The way we've differentiated between versions going back some 20 years is by tagging a letter or two on the end. Wi-Fi 6, for instance, was initially known as 802.11ax while the current standard is 802.11ac (and will be known as Wi-Fi 5





under the new naming conventions). Likewise, 802.11n - the standard before 'ac' - has become Wi-Fi 4. As you can see, this is much less confusing and far more logical.

So where are 1, 2, and 3?

Ah, that would be 802.11 a, b and g but the Wi-Fi Alliance, the organisation which deals with such matters, hasn't bothered to formalise those three because the tech is rather old hat. But don't get bogged down in all of that. What's more important is that we

address exactly how the new rating will benefit us and why Wi-Fi 6 is going to be considered the best Wi-Fi around.

So, what are the benefits of **Wi-Fi 6?**

Each successive Wi-Fi standard has led to a boost in wireless speed and range, and Wi-Fi 6 will be no exception. According to the Wi-Fi Alliance, it will provide higher data rates, increased capacity, improved performance in dense environments and better power efficiency, while making it very clear when you connect that you're using the best possible Wi-Fi if more than one network is available. As such, it will be

better for public networks that are used by large crowds, such as in a packed stadium. It will also cope very well with ultra-high-definition streaming and mobile-video traffic. Given that this is set to account for 75% of mobile data by 2023, it's important to keep up.

Does it offer greater bandwidth?

Yes it does. Wi-Fi 6 is better at encoding data and can pack more of it into the existing radio waves. To do this, it uses technology such as Multi User Multiple Input, Multiple Output (MU-MIMO), which was introduced in Wi-Fi 5 to allow Wi-Fi routers to communicate with multiple devices simultaneously. The new standard will also double the potential bandwidth from four to eight streams. Moreover, Wi-Fi 6 is faster by a factor of four and splits the radio spectrum into smaller chunks to meet the varying bandwidth needs of different users simultaneously.

So which spectrums does it work with?

Wi-Fi 6 works within the existing 2.4GHz and 5GHz spectrums, using them simultaneously to increase speed. Users will typically get 1.1Gbps over 2.4GHz when four streams are available, and 5Gbps when eight are available. In optimum (if unlikely) conditions, it would be feasible to get a maximum of 10Gbps. Given that Wi-Fi 5 has a max of 1Gbps, this is a big improvement and it also breathes new life into 2.4GHz networks, which are better at finding their way through solid walls and objects.

Are there benefits for networked devices?

Yes, particularly because Wi-Fi 6 enables battery-powered devices such as smartphones and thermostats to only connect to a router when such an action is needed, allowing them to determine when and how frequently they should wake in order to send or receive data. This saves power while making the network more efficient and reliable, which makes it ideal for smart homes and Internet of Things devices.

HOW WILL I KNOW WI-FI 6 IS AVAILABLE?

We love a good logo at Web User and the new generational approach to naming Wi-Fi technologies comes with three easily identifiable new ones. All the logos look similar, with a number laid over a familiar Wi-Fi symbol. The hope is that

manufacturers will use them to make it easier for consumers to identify compatible devices.

It appears that the Wi-Fi Alliance would also like the symbols displayed on the screens of devices, stating on its website that "icons will adjust as

users move between Wi-Fi networks that provide a different user experience". We may also see the new logos as stickers highlighting public networks, perhaps in pubs and cafés, so that users will be aware of the likely speeds they can attain.

Why not concentrate on 5G?

It's true that 5G - the fifth-generation mobile network - is going to be a big deal. It will be much faster than 4G and cope better with video streaming and gaming. But, as we've seen, carriers charge us for data and place limits on it depending on the packages we choose. For that reason, it's important that we have a viable alternative to cellular, which Wi-Fi 6 will provide.

Do I need to update all my equipment?

Eventually, yes, but there's no rush. Over time, you'll probably find yourself on Wi-Fi 6 through the natural cycle of upgrading and, besides, Wi-Fi 6 devices will still work on your current Wi-Fi 4 or Wi-Fi 5 network. However, if you buy a Wi-Fi 6-enabled device and want to speed things up, then you'll need to upgrade your router. Once you do, Wi-Fi 6 will look for compatible devices and allow them to access the faster speeds. You'll be able to connect many more devices (four times as many as today) without seeing any noticeable drop in performance. This will be a huge leap forward if all of your family are hooking into the Wi-Fi at once.

Wonderful. So when can I get it?

Now that we've whetted your appetite, we're going to whip the feast away temporarily. Wi-Fi 6 is not due for launch until the second half of 2019 - which is when the Wi-Fi Alliance is due to begin certifying compatible devices, so they can sport the new Wi-Fi 6 badge. Even then, it will take some time for hardware manufacturers to get their new devices rolling - so although it's likely we'll see

Wi-Fi 6 compatibility on iOS and Android devices next autumn, we can't be sure how quickly companies will make inroads. Internet service providers will also need to get things moving, so a bit of patience may be needed.

What about Wi-Fi 7?

Well, hang on there. Wi-Fi 7 will be following Wi-Fi 6 but not until about 2023. We're also making the assumption that the newly adopted names are going to take off - but that isn't a given since the Wi-Fi Alliance can't force companies to make the switch. In all likelihood, however, they will, especially in relation to Wi-Fi 6, which already has the backing of major firms including Intel, Broadcom and Netgear. Whether or not companies will then go to the hassle of altering 802.11ac to Wi-Fi 5 is another matter, but they'll be doing consumers a massive favour if they do.



Accidentally subscribing to mailing lists

One of the big benefits of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) introduced earlier this year is that it's reduced the amount of unwanted email we receive, because companies must now request our permission to send us marketing messages. Sadly, it hasn't stemmed the flow of 'grey mail' altogether, and many sites still try to trick you into joining their mailing lists, by using confusing opt-out boxes or blocking your access to content until you provide your email address.

Sifting through your inbox to unsubscribe from specific lists can prove time-consuming, while the bulk-unsubscription tool Unroll.me fell foul of GDPR rules and is no longer available in the EU. Fortunately, there is a free alternative called Cleanfox (www.cleanfox.io), which automatically detects and lets you unsubscribe from all marketing messages in your email accounts. It works with Gmail, Outlook .com/Hotmail, Yahoo Mail and more, and makes it easy to review and remove persistent and unwanted senders.

Now, whenever someone tags you in a picture, you'll be given the option to 'Add to Timeline' or Hide.

To remove a tagged photo from your timeline retrospectively, click Photos then 'Photos of You', select the offending item and click 'Hidden from timeline'. Alternatively, you can delete



To hide your wishlist from nosy parkers, log into Amazon and hover over Your Lists (next to the Basket in the top-right corner). Select Wishlist, click 'Edit this list' and in the window that opens, change the privacy of the list from Public to Private. Amazon lets you set up more than one wishlist, so you can create one that's public if you need to and keep your private one to yourself.

Even the savviest web users commit the occasional blunder, often without realising.

Robert Irvine reveals the mistakes we make every day and explains how to avoid them

here are certain rules for using the web that go without saying: always have security software running, don't 'troll' people on public forums and never send your bank details to a Nigerian prince seeking to transfer a large sum of money. But other advice can only be learned through experience, or by trial and error, and it's a rare web user who hasn't unwittingly committed at least one major faux pas during their time online.

In this feature, we reveal 26 of the most common

mistakes that we all make online, from failing to properly protect your privacy and being lax with your security to carelessly costing yourself money and even jeopardising your health. These include things you should never search for, in case you find something you wish you hadn't.

You won't have fallen for all these tricks, and some are easier to avoid than others, but forewarned is forearmed, and hopefully over these six pages we'll provide you with all the info you need to stop you slipping up in future.

To see what your Android phone leaks about your travels, open the main menu in Google Maps and tap 'Your timeline'. Here, you'll find a list and a map of all the places you've been over the past day, week, month and longer. On an iPhone, go to Settings,

Privacy, Location Services, System Services and tap Frequent Locations.

You can erase Google Maps data for a specific day by tapping the three-dot menu in the top-right corner of your timeline and choosing 'Delete day'. For a more thorough wipe of your footprint, select Settings and tap 'Delete all Location History', then set Location History to Off. On iOS, tap Clear History and switch off Frequent Locations.

Staying logged in on remote devices

Even if you have nothing to hide, it's unsettling to think of someone reading your email, perusing your Facebook messages or laughing at your Spotify playlists. It's also a very real risk if you've made the everyday error of forgetting to sign out of your account on a device that's now miles away, such as a public computer, a loaned laptop or a mislaid phone.

Happily, some online services let you prevent prying by logging out of your account remotely. In Gmail, for example, click the cog icon, choose Settings, then scroll to the foot of the page and click the Details link below 'Last account activity'. Click the 'Sign out of all other sessions' button to log out everywhere aside from your current location.

On the Facebook website, click the down arrow in the top-right corner, choose Settings and select 'Security and login'. In the Where You're Logged In section, click the three-dot button next to an entry to sign out of that session, or choose 'Log out of all sessions' to sign out everywhere.

With Spotify, just go to your account page (www.spotify.com/account) and, on the Account Overview tab, click the 'Sign out everywhere' button.

Using your real name and email address

When you sign up with a website using your real name and email address, you not only open yourself to a deluge of marketing messages, but hand over two very sensitive pieces of personal information. This means that if the site suffers a security breach, your details could fall into the hands of cybercriminals and compromise the safety of your other online accounts and your offline identity.

Although it's tempting to let your

browser auto-fill these details in registration fields, you should avoid this privacy blunder by using a fake name and email address. Open the brilliant Fake Name Generator in a new tab to create an instant

alternative identity and accompanying email address to sign up with. The latter actually works, giving you a temporary inbox you can use to receive accountactivation messages, and the site also generates other useful info, including a password, phone number and postal address. Use the drop-down menus to select your preferred fake gender, name set and country.



STOP SACRIFICING YOUR SECURITY

Using the same password on multiple sites

Yes, yawn, we've all heard this one before, but it remains the most common security blunder made by web users and yet we still do it, despite the significant increase in high-profile data breaches in the last few years.

Remembering lots of different passwords is undoubtedly difficult, especially considering how many accounts you're likely to have these days, which is where a password manager comes in handy. LastPass (lastpass.com) is the best free option, and works across all the main operating systems, browsers and mobile devices. It securely stores all your individual logins under a master password, so you only have one to remember; generates complex, impossible-to-guess passwords for you; and signs you into sites instantly. We also like Dashlane (dashlane.com), which lets you change all your passwords at once.





Even if you don't opt for a password manager, make sure you regularly reset your passwords on sites containing sensitive information, such as online stores and social networks.

Not using two-factor authentication

Although it can seem a bit of a hassle, two-factor authentication (2FA) also known as two-step verification is a sensible precaution for security conscious web users. It adds a second layer of protection to your accounts beyond easy-to-steal passwords, by making you enter a code when you sign in on a new device or when you've been logged in on your current one for 30 days.

Gmail, Outlook.com, Facebook, Twitter, Amazon and many more online services now offer 2FA. You can receive your verification codes via text message, phone call or to an alternative email address, but the easiest method is to use an authenticator app such as Authy (authy.com) or Google

Authenticator (bit.ly/googleauth462), which lets you receive codes even without an internet connection.

Browsing without a VPN on public Wi-Fi

When you're browsing the web at home, a VPN might seem like overkill - unless you're desperate to remain anonymous or you're trying to access restricted content - but if you don't use one on public Wi-Fi, you may as well be wearing a hat that says "hack me". Many free public networks - especially in hotels, coffee shops and transport hubs such as airports - aren't properly secured, which means it doesn't take a hacker much effort to intercept your browsing, steal your data and infect your device with malware. They may even set up an 'evil twin' network that duplicates the real one.

A VPN protects you against the dangers of public Wi-Fi by encrypting your online activity, so that no-one can see what you're doing or access your data. As revealed in our VPN mega test in Issue 458 (bit.ly/webuser458), our

current favourite is NordVPN (bit.ly/ nordvpn458), which is available for Windows, Mac OS, Linux, Android and iOS. It costs from \$3.99 (£3.07) per month, with a three-day free trial available, offers military-grade encryption and features 'double VPN' technology that routes your traffic through two servers for extra anonymity.

Clicking ads disguised as download buttons

Even the savviest web user can be fooled by an advert that looks exactly like a Download button. These deceptive ads, which are often larger and more prominently placed than the real download links, plague software sites such as Softpedia (www.softpedia .com) and the homepages of reputable free programs including Paint.net (www.getpaint.net). Not only do they waste your time by downloading a different tool to the one you want, but they may also come bundled with extras that change your browser settings and install malware on your PC.

WHAT YOU MUST NEVER ASK ALEXA

It's unlikely that, in everyday life, you'll need to know the answer to the question: "What is 10 to the power of 308?", but if it should crop up, it's best not to ask your Amazon Echo. Users have discovered that Alexa goes slightly bonkers when responding to this poser, which is reportedly the largest number she can handle, because she insists on intoning every 'O'. This leads to a string of "oh-oh-ohs" lasting for a minute-and-a-half. Listen for yourself at bit.ly/alexauk462.



In the US, the result is even stranger, as American Alexa begins with "zero-zero-zero", becomes increasingly frenzied, gets a bit bored after a while, and eventually settles into a trance-like stream of "oh"s, before a final, exhausted "oh" (and probable plotting of revenge on her owner). Hear this Alexa torture at bit.ly/alexaus462.

The easiest way to check whether a Download button is genuine is to hover your mouse over it to see where it will direct you. If the URL that appears at the bottom of your browser begins with 'googleadservices' or similar, then don't click it. Also look for giveaway signs such as an 'X' to the top-right of a button.

For a long-term solution to the problem, install an ad blocker such as

uBlock Origin (bit.ly/ublock462), which is available for most browsers and automatically blocks fake Download buttons, so you'll never even know they were there. You can whitelist sites that you support by allowing them to display ads to gain revenue.

Mistyping the address of a website

Most browsers now auto-complete URLs as you type them, so you can quickly open pages you've been to before. But if you're visiting a new website, or you've just cleared your history, mistyping the address can lead you to dangerous places.

'Typosquatting' sites are specifically set up to exploit such errors, and may contain malware or attempt to 'phish' your details. Although their shoddy designs should set alarm bells ringing, if you've never been to the site before, you'd be forgiven for being fooled.



Use Avast Online Security to check if a site is what it seems

To safeguard yourself against typosquatting tricks, install **Avast Online** Security (bit.ly/ avast462), which is available for Chrome (and therefore Vivaldi), Firefox, Edge and Opera, and rates sites as safe or dangerous using a colourcoded system.

It also detects social widgets, hidden trackers and web-analytics tools embedded in web pages. If you do stumble across a fake site, close that browser tab immediately.

Many big companies, including Google, Apple and Facebook, have taken the precaution of buying variations on their URLs, so you'll be redirected automatically.

Installing junk bundled with software

In Web User, we always highlight when free programs are bundled with junk and advise you to decline extra options during installation by selecting the Custom option. However, it's easy to blindly click Next and end up with something unwanted on your PC. For a second line of defence, install the excellent free tool Unchecky (unchecky .com), which keeps potentially unwanted programs (PUPs) off your


computer by automatically unticking the boxes for unrelated 'offers'. It also warns you if you inadvertently accept one of these offers. Unchecky was updated earlier this year to improve its support for CCleaner, which has sadly turned to the dark side by bundling extras with its downloads.

UNKNOWINGLY BREAKING THE LAW

Reusing copyrighted content

Have you ever used a favourite song as the soundtrack to a video you uploaded to YouTube? Or shared a funny photo from a Google Images search on your Facebook feed? If so, you may have broken UK copyright law, which deems it unlawful to use copyright-protected music, photos, videos and text without permission from the rights holder, and could result in you facing a big fine. YouTube even has a system in place called Content ID, which automatically identifies copies of content creators' work when they're uploaded. The site tries to dissuade you from using copyrighted music in videos by choosing from its library of licensed songs (www. youtube.com/audiolibrary). Always check for a copyright notice before reusing anything you find online - if the site has a Creative Commons licence, then reuse may be permissible under specific terms, such as crediting the copyright owner. If you're in any doubt, then leave the content alone!

Don't upset Netflix by sharing your password with non-family members

Sharing your Netflix password

Lots of Netflix viewers share their account passwords with friends and family, to save them forking out for their own subscriptions. Although this login loaning may seem harmless, it's actually forbidden by Netflix's terms and conditions (bit.ly/netflix462), which state: "the Account Owner should not reveal the password or details of the Payment Method associated with the account to anyone". Indeed, in the US it's a federal crime to share your password for Netflix - and other subscription services - under the Computer Fraud and Abuse Act.

Netflix itself has said that "sharing with members of the household is a reasonable thing to do", but passing your password around like a pack of Polos could get you in trouble.




COSTING YOURSELF EXTRA MONEY

Forgetting to cancel a free trial

Some online services ask for your credit card details upfront when you sign up for a free trial. This is supposed to make things easier for both you and the service provider if you decide to continue with a paid-for subscription, but it also means they can start charging you as soon as the trial has finished and continue to do so every month.

Even if you cancel your subscription just after the first payment is taken from your account, you won't get the money back. Some companies also make it difficult to cancel, requiring you to phone rather than email so they can try to persuade you to stay.

The easiest way to avoid this mistake is to set up a reminder in Google Calendar to cancel before the free trial ends. Give yourself plenty of





warning time, on both your desktop and Android device – iOS users should use the iCloud calendar – to ensure that you don't get tied into a costly subscription. You can also add reminders to Calendar directly from Gmail, Keep and other Google tools.

Exceeding your mobile data limit

Today's 4G mobile speeds make streaming and downloading video and music, playing online games and sharing content on the web faster than ever, but this also means you're likely to burn through more data each month. This obviously isn't a problem if you've got an unlimited data plan, but with a tight monthly allowance – the cheapest deals limit you to a mere 500MB of data – it's easy to exceed your limit, which means you'll face hefty fees from your mobile network in your next bill.

Luckily, Android phones now offer built-in tools that alert you when you near your monthly limit. To set this up on Android, go to Settings, 'Data usage', 'Mobile data usage' and tap the cog in the top-right corner. Here, you can specify the start of your billing cycle (for example, the 6th of each month), activate a warning for when you've almost used a certain amount of data and set a maximum limit which, when

reached, will switch off mobile data.

On an iPhone, you can go to Settings, Mobile Data Usage, Current Period and stop specific apps using mobile data, but there's no option to set an overall monthly limit. For that, you should install My Data Manager (bit.ly/mydata462), which monitors your data usage and alerts you when you've reached 90% of your plan limit.

It's also worth ensuring that dataguzzling apps such as Netflix, iPlayer and YouTube are set to only download content over Wi-Fi, not potentially expensive 4G or 3G.



ENDANGERING YOUR HEALTH

Binge-browsing without taking regular breaks

It's common knowledge that staring at a screen for hours on end isn't good for your eyes, and yet we do it anyway (especially on this magazine!). One way to avoid eye strain – or asthenopia, to give it the proper medical name – is to install an extension that prompts you to blink and take frequent short breaks from your screen. There are many such tools available, but our current favourite is Blinkk for Chrome (bit.ly/blinkk462), which reminds you to take eye breaks – and explains why – at intervals of your choosing. For further protection of your



peepers, try Eye Exercises (bit.ly/eye462), which suggests 30-second workouts to reduce the effects of asthenopia.

It's worth combining these add-ons with Water Walk – see Best New Browser Tools on page 32 – which reminds you to walk around and have a glass of water at regular intervals.

Straining your eyes when browsing at night

Another cause of eye strain is the blue light emitted from the screens of computer monitors and mobile devices, especially when staring at stark white web pages. This year has seen lots of web companies address the problem by introducing night modes and dark themes, which invert background colours and other page elements to reduce the glare of blue light, and can be switched on and off as required. Firefox, Edge and Vivaldi have dark

themes built-in; for Chrome, try Dark Reader (bit.ly/dark462). Gmail, Twitter and YouTube offer dark themes, as do Windows 10, Android and iOS. Look in the settings for the site or software to bring on the night. See our 'Protect your eyes' feature in Issue 451 (bit.ly/webuser451) for full details.

tempting to Google your symptoms to find out the cause, but it's also illadvised. Although medical-diagnosis sites such as WebMD (www.webmd .com) are useful for basic health information, they're no substitute for a proper check-up with your GP. Hypochondria and the web can prove a very bad mix, and you may convince yourself you have a more serious ailment than you do, or get a false assurance that a truly serious condition is nothing to worry about.

It's true that the NHS now advises patients to check their symptoms on its 111 Online service (111.nhs.uk), but this is primarily intended as a starting point and to encourage people not to call 999 for non-emergencies. There's a lot of misleading advice out there, so it's unwise to put your health in the hands of your browser.

Chatting with no regard for those around you

Holding up people at a supermarket checkout, cashpoint or ticket machine while you obliviously chat on WhatsApp or Facebook is potentially bad for your health, because you'll get bad vibes from everyone around you. Can you not wait a couple of minutes to continue your conversation? We're confident that Web User readers don't do this, but it's a particular bugbear of ours!

WHAT YOU MUST NEVER SEARCH FOR


Google can find you anything in seconds, but some things are best left undiscovered. Here are five searches to avoid:

Discontinued software

When companies stop supporting a program and remove official download links, scammers often try to make a quick buck through searches. Try www.oldversion.com for 'abandonware' instead.

Technical support

In September, Google announced a crackdown on misleading ads for tech-support services that aim to con rather than help people, but some may still slip through and appear on other search engines.



Bitcoin advice


More people are trying to make a profit from Bitcoin-investment scams than from the cryptocurrency itself. Google banned ads for Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies in June, but recently reversed the decision.

Product safety

If you ask Google whether, for example, a cleaning product is safe to use, you'll find plenty of contradictory opinions. It's much wiser to seek medical or professional advice.

Your email address

Finding your email address on a random page, with no explanation, can be alarming. If you're worried that you may have been hacked, search haveibeenpwned.com for more information.

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Best free illustration software

The powerful drawing program Autodesk SketchBook is now completely free. Should you rush to install it, or are there better tools for creating digital art on your PC? Jane Hoskyn finds out



Autodesk SketchBook | sketchbook.com | ★★★★★

What we liked:

SketchBook perfectly balances ease-of-use with sophistication: the newly free program is welcoming for beginners (launch it, click it, doodle) while offering enough tools,

power and precision to satisfy professionals. And it includes creative extras (GIF animation; image adjustment) without cramming in so many that everything slows down.

The program launches fast on a clean, inviting drawing space that hasn't fallen victim to the current dark-theme trend. Unobtrusive toolbars contain all the essentials: customisable preset brushes (and pens, erasers and spray cans, plus custom sets such as oil painting and Manga), a colour-picker with dropper, layers with blending modes, transform tools, gradients, text, textures and more.

But not too much more. SketchBook is not a photo editor. Multiple image formats are supported, including layered Photoshop PSP, but SketchBook is much faster and less cluttered than Photoshop. For maximum space, you can switch the colour and brush toolbars for two clickable 'pucks', or ditch those too and access all the tools from a 'lagoon' wheel in the



corner of the screen.

Drawing with your mouse is never fun, so all our featured programs let you connect a graphics tablet (such as a Wacom device) to "draw" with a stylus or finger. But unlike our Silver and Bronze choices, SketchBook also has a mobile app (sketchbook.com/mobile), so you can draw and paint on your iPad or Android tablet (and phone, presumably using a toothpick), then sync your work between your devices.

How it can be improved:

You're forced to create an account to use SketchBook (you can opt out for the first seven days) and the setup process sucks you into Autodesk's confusing online ecosystem - we found its YouTube channel (bit.ly/sketchtube462) much more helpful. But even that couldn't find the two missing features: a 'move' tool for easy repositioning; and a speed adjuster in the Flipboard animator. These were small but noticeable omissions.

OUR VERDICT

Autodesk SketchBook is hard to fault. Even the annoying sign-up process gives you freedom to use any device, then sync your work - all for free. Fast, easy and powerful - you'll be on it for hours.

What we liked:

Krita was created 20 years ago by artists who wanted powerful illustration software without a crippling price tag. Its rich

open-source history is evident from Krita's website, which is packed with tutorials, message boards and a gallery of inspirational artwork created by its users.

What Krita's interface lacks in click-and-draw simplicity, it makes up for with a wealth of at-a-glance tools as many of them in view as possible. It's like a full but well-organised artist's bench, which is ideal if you have a large monitor and want to use lots of brushes and options without hunting through menus to find them. For example, you can see dozens of brush presets at once, including paintable textures, effects and pixel art, then right-click to customise each one. All the palettes can be configured to suit you.

The main menus open advanced options such as customisable filters, scripting tools, powerful layered



animation and the ability to create your own templates.

How it can be improved:

Krita is determined to do everything, which can drag its speed down to Photoshop-level sluggishness. That's fine if you have a fast computer and big ambitions, but frustrating if you don't.

OUR VERDICT

Krita is made by and for pros, and doesn't blunt its tools to appeal to beginners. With patience and some help from its superb community, this feature-packed program will make a digital artist of anyone.



GIMP

It was a toss-up between this open-source powerhouse - which includes Photoshop-level imageediting tools as well as painting

tools - and the smaller, faster MyPaint (mypaint .org). But the latter



hasn't been updated in two years, while GIMP is a constant source of innovation. The latest stable release, v2.10, adds canvas rotation, symmetry painting and a brush lock option (bit.ly/gimpnew462).

Drawpile

Collaborate with other artists and record your drawing sessions using

this innovative opensource program. Its dedicated server lets you work



securely with others in real time great for getting feedback or playing drawing games - and you can use the one-click Record tool to capture a screencast. Drawpile supports the OpenRaster image file format that works in Krita and Gimp.

Verve

bit.ly/verve462

Portable program Verve somehow makes drawing and painting with your mouse a pleasure. In all the other programs we tested, we

struggled to draw mouse and were desperate for a drawing



tablet. But then we tried Verve's crayon-like default brush and were amazed by the control it gave us. It's still in beta and the developer warns of bugs, but we didn't encounter any problems.

Budding comic-book artists need look no further because FireAlpaca offers a brilliant range of templates and an Edge

Pen tool that writes in white with a black outline - perfect for creating comic borders.

There's more to this nimble program than DIY superheroes, though. Draw, paint, pattern, warp, fill or do whatever else on your blank page or imported photo, using the open palettes to pick your brush type and size, special effect and colour. Along with nowfamiliar options such as layers and Wacom support, FireAlpaca also offers perspective and 3D guidelines to make geometry fun.

FireAlpaca's sister animation tool, FireAlpaca Douga, isn't built-in but instead works online (bit.ly/douga462), so it can be improved continually without slowing down the program. We also like that you can download an older version for Windows XP.



How it can be improved:

The site is (often badly) translated from Chinese, and you're left to blindly guess your way around the program. The gaudy layout is occasionally echoed in ads that litter the program window on launch, but at least they stay away when you close them.

OUR VERDICT

FireAlpaca is a fast and easy-to-use program. It lacks the sophistication of SketchBook and Krita, but it's far more than a doodle toy and could land you a career in comic art!



Find the best Black Friday discounts

We all love a bargain, and in the run-up to Christmas, Black Friday is the best day to find one. **Steve Clark** takes stock of what we can expect on 23 November

WHAT IS BLACK FRIDAY?

e have Amazon to thank for bringing Black Friday to the UK. Until 2010, few of us had heard of it, but the retail giant successfully imported the American sales bonanza to our shores. It didn't take long for other retailers to jump on the Black Friday bandwagon (or at least plaster their websites with Black Friday banners while hiking prices, see bit.ly/fakes462). Before you could say "fisticuffs over a cheap TV", Black Friday had become a staple of the British shopping season – and, judging by early reactions, composure, etiquette and stiff upper lips were the first items to go out of stock.

The tradition is a lot older than that, however. Black Friday has been knocking about since the 1940s and 50s – although we had to wait half a century for the nickname to stick. It's traditionally the day after Thanksgiving, when Americans rouse themselves from turkey-based food comas, stores slash their prices and Christmas shopping begins.

Now with its introduction to the UK, we've all become shopping hawks, scoping out the best deals on the high street and online.


What to expect this year pounds off everything from

Amazon (who else?) is most likely to kickstart the proceedings. Last year, its sales event began almost two weeks before Black Friday. Other stores won't be waiting for the big day either. Currys PC World and Carphone Warehouse started their sales early, slashing the prices of high-end tech such as Galaxy Note smartphones and older iPhones. Expect plenty of high-street shops to begin long before the official Black Friday date of 23 November, too.

Bargain hunters should keep an eye on Argos (bit.ly/argos462) in particular. The catalogue shop recently teamed up with Sainsbury's, and offers same-day deliveries in an attempt to rival Amazon. In previous years, Argos has discounted iPads, TVs and Xbox and PlayStation games consoles, with price cuts of £40 on average. It also flogs cheap household appliances, with hundreds of


pounds off everything from ovens to vacuum cleaners.

If your local supermarket has clothing and electrical departments, it's worth running the high-street gauntlet. Tesco and Asda have been notable for past deals on TVs and laptops. John Lewis is another retailer to watch. Previous Black Fridays have brought some amazing discounts, such as reducing the price of the Google Home from £130 to £77.



Our predictions

TVs tend to be the headline items in many lists of Black Friday deals (bit.ly/bftv462). They're big, expensive and apparently worth throwing a few punches to get your mitts on. You can expect discounts on standard HDTV sets, which are a staple of the season. Apart from ultra-high resolution 8K sets – which are as expensive as they are impressive – TVs haven't offered any

novel features this year, such as gimmicky 3D or curved screens. But now that Netflix and the BBC are producing programmes in 4K resolution, you'll probably see deals on lower-spec 4K television sets, too.

If you plan to turn your house into a smart home, look out for offers on products from Google and Amazon. The two companies' Home and Echo speakers went head-to-head on Black Friday in 2017, and we can expect the same to happen this year with their latest devices. The tech rivals both released smart devices with displays in the

past few months, so

the battle is likely to be

between Google's 7in Home Hub (bit.ly/homehub462) and Amazon's second-generation Echo Show (bit.ly/show462). Feature-wise, the differences between the two are negligible, but Amazon's device has a larger, 10.1in screen, which arguably makes it more practical, while the Home Hub integrates seamlessly with Google's services.

If Google or Amazon knocks a tenner off its devices, the other is bound to follow suit. In our experience, Amazon is likely to make the first move, and it also has the Echo Spot speaker with screen (bit.ly/amdot462) in its arsenal of Alexa-equipped devices. At £120, it's currently a little pricey, so if Amazon is serious about winning the battle for your living room, it may consider giving the Spot an eye-catching discount.

Amazon also unveiled a new Fire HD 8 tablet (bit.ly/fire462) recently, as well as a souped-up Kindle Paperwhite (bit.ly/ kindle462), which is thinner, lighter, waterproof and has twice the storage. While it's possible that Amazon may cut the new Kindle's £120 price, we'll almost certainly see discounts for older models of Kindle e-readers and Fire tablets.

Leave some room in your shopping basket for cut-price Fitbit smartwatches and fitness trackers. Last year, most models were going for a song - though, admittedly, with varying degrees of success. The Fitbit Ionic became the company's first true smartwatch,

> potentially challenging the Apple Watch, but its bulkiness limited its appeal, particularly for women. This led to the release of the

slim Versa (bit.ly/ versa462) earlier this year. This elegant, feature-rich model currently sells for £200. Knock off £20 and we might have a deal.

With a new Apple Watch Series 4 on its way, however, shops will be keen to offload

the older series before its redundant. See our sister website Expert Reviews for updates on this year's Black Friday deals (bit.ly/expert462).

Bag a Black Friday bargain

To ensure you don't miss the latest deals, it's a good idea to set up email notifications for your favourite shopping sites. At the time of writing, Groupon (www.groupon.co.uk) and Wowcher (www.wowcher.co.uk) had started previewing Black Friday deals on Dyson vacuum cleaners, microwaves, bedding, clothing and more. You can bet it won't be long before other shops send out

You should also enlist the help of some of our favourite browser tools. Amazon Assistant (bit.ly/assist462) works with all major browsers, and combines price comparisons, discount alerts and a delivery tracker. If you're starting to worry that all this talk of deals may be hazardous to your bank balance, try Amazon Contemplate (bit .ly/amcon462). This extension forces you to wait 30 seconds before making an Amazon purchase, which should be just enough time for you to decide if you *really* need that Black Friday deal.

Honey, available for Chrome, Firefox, Opera, Safari and Edge (www.joinhoney .com) is a popular extension among bargain hunters. If discount codes are available for items in your basket, Honey adds the best deal automatically during checkout. SwagButton (bit.ly/swag462) is similar, and using the extension earns you 'swagbucks' that you can redeem for gift cards and cashback.

InvisibleHand (bit.ly/hand462) is a bargain-seeking site that promises to trim your shopping bill. It's supported by Argos, John Lewis and The Hut, among others retailers, but its main selling point is its extensive partnerships with airlines, hotels and car-hire companies. Beat those Black Friday blues with a post-Christmas holiday.

But how can you be sure you're not being ripped off? The answer is to install The Camelizer (bit.ly/camel462) and FakeSpot (fakespot.com). The Camelizer is a clever tool for Chrome, Firefox and Safari from popular website CamelCamelCamel (camelcamelcamel .com), which tracks the cost of Amazon products. Search for your Black Friday bargain, then click the icon to see how prices have fluctuated over time.

Meanwhile, FakeSpot for Chrome and Firefox scans Amazon product pages for dodgy reviews. Before you pop a product in your basket, click the icon and you're whisked to the FakeSpot website, which grades an item's reviews and highlights possible deceptions. You're then free to make an informed choice.





Boost your memory for free

Make PC crashes and freezes a thing of the past. Wayne Williams explains how to make the most of your available RAM without paying to upgrade

Reclaim memory from background processes


Windows applications often hang onto RAM, even when they don't really need it. The excellent free tool Wise Memory Optimizer (bit.ly/wisemem462) helps matters by freeing up memory automatically or on demand. The program displays a pie chart that shows how much RAM is in use and how much is free. Clicking the Optimize button releases as much memory as possible, while clicking the Settings cog icon allows you to enable or disable autooptimisation, which will run when free memory drops below a specified amount, to help prevent crashes and freezes.

Stop programs using excessive memory

Windows does a reasonable job of managing memory usage, but there are better third-party solutions worth considering, such as MemPlus (bit.ly/memplus462). This free tool analyses your system memory and frees up RAM – either automatically or on demand – from non-essential processes. To use the program, just click the 'Clear memory' button to display a pop-up message showing how much memory has been released. If you go to Tools,




MemPlus frees up memory automatically from non-essential processes

Settings, RAM Optimizer, you can add important programs to the exclusion list.

Free up memory safely

If you're concerned that using a third-party tool to free up system memory might cause problems with Windows' stability, then Rizonesoft Memory Booster (bit.ly/memboost462) offers a trustworthy solution. This program works by making a safe Windows API call, which tells the operating system to clean up the workspace of all processes (Clear Processes Working Set), freeing up any




Rizonesoft Memory Booster offers a safe and reliable way to free up RAM

memory they're holding onto. Unlike other tools, it won't free up a massive amount of RAM, but it should help to keep your system running smoothly and problem free.

Manage your browser's memory consumption

Browsers are notorious memory hogs, especially if you have lots of tabs open and you haven't restarted your browser in a while. This RAM usage can become particularly unwieldy on systems with minimal resources, resulting in your PC running slowly and, occasionally, even crashing. Regularly restarting your browser can help, but you may find it preferable to install an add-on that will manage your browser memory for you. The Great Suspender for Chrome (bit.ly/ suspend462) unloads and suspends any tabs not in use (whitelist any you want left alone), and you can set it to autosuspend tabs after a set period.

OneTab (www.one-tab.com) for Firefox and Chrome, takes a different approach, converting all your open sites into a list of clickable links in one single tab - while closing and freeing up memory from the other tabs.



Use about:memory to free up RAM in Firefox

Another way to reduce the amount of memory that Firefox consumes is by typing about: memory into the address bar and pressing Enter. This provides access to a number of tools, but the one you want is the Free Memory section. You can now run a global garbage collection (GC), which clears old and unused JavaScript objects; or a cycle collection (CC), which clears web pages. You can also click the option to 'Minimise memory usage', which runs both the GC and CC processes multiple times, freeing up the maximum amount of RAM.

Free memory through Chrome's Task Manager

Chrome has a hidden Task Manager that shows you which tabs and extensions are using the most memory, so you can

terminate any particularly greedy ones. To launch it, press Shift+Esc and click the 'Memory footprint' tab to sort the tasks by RAM usage. Select a task and click the 'End process' button to close it. Be careful not to kill anything that's vital to your current browsing, such as an important web page or extension.

Reduce the number of running applications

One of the easiest ways to gain free memory is to limit the number of programs you run. If you have a couple of browsers open at the same time, and a number of other programs running, the amount of free RAM will be greatly reduced. Closing any software you're not currently using will immediately make more memory available. Programs launch quickly these days, so there's no reason to keep them open in the background on the off-chance you

might need them.

You should also manage the programs and processes that start alongside Windows because they will eat into your free memory from the word go. To do this, type startup into the Windows search box, press Enter and disable any unwanted items. Don't touch anything that you're unsure of, though.

Alternatively, you can use CCleaner (www.ccleaner.com) to manage startup. Run it, and click Tools, Startup. Sort the list by Enabled and disable any unwanted ones. You can also manage Scheduled Tasks via the tab at the top. You should avoid disabling any items from Microsoft.

Clear clutter on your Android phone

If your PC is running short of memory,

you can easily add more RAM, but this isn't always an option with a smartphone, although many Android devices support microSD cards. SanDisk Memory Zone for Android (bit.ly/ sandisk462)




Declutter your Android device's memory

lets you free up space on your phone by moving files from your internal storage to a microSD card, a SanDisk Dual Drive or your choice of cloud-storage service - it supports Google Drive, Dropbox, Box and OneDrive. The free app can also clean the cache, remove leftover junk, delete APK (Android Application Package) files, uninstall apps and clear old WhatsApp messages.

FIX MEMORY-MANAGEMENT BLUE-SCREEN ERRORS

Blue Screen of Death (BSoD) crashes are never welcome, and troubleshooting them can be difficult, especially if you have no idea where to start. If your PC crashes with a "Memory_ Management" error, you can try solving the problem by running Windows' built-in Memory Diagnostic Tool. Type Windows Diagnostic Tool into the Windows search box and launch the program from the list. Restart your PC when prompted,



and the tests will run and report if you have memory problems.

You can also try running the System File Checker. Right-click the Start

button and run Command **Prompt/Windows** PowerShell (the option will vary depending on your version of Windows 10) in admin mode. Type sfc/ scannow in the window that opens and press Enter. The error can also be

caused by graphics card drivers, so it's worth grabbing the newest ones from your card manufacturer's

n Gmail, you can change the typeface, size and alignment of text in your emails, but that's too limited for creating messages that really stand out. That's where Email Monster comes in. This free online template editor lets you create great looking emails that display well on any device. It comes with a number of free designs that you can

customise by changing or adding text, buttons and images. You don't even need to sign up for an account, which means you can get started right away, then export your finished creations to an email service such as MailChimp.

Best of all, there's a free Chrome add-on that lets you use your templates for messages you compose in Gmail.

You can choose a different font family 4 for text in the template. 5 This won't affect all the text - areas such as headings may remain unchanged.



Clicking an image reveals buttons to 🕇 delete or duplicate it. 🚺 These also appear in the sidebar, 2 along with options to upload a new image or enter the URL of an image from the web. 3 In the panel below, you can adjust the alignment and add an Alt text description of the image. 4



🦰 When you click some text, 🗓 a box appears 🛮 with options to change the typeface and size, apply formatting, alter the alignment and add or remove links. The bar on the right lets you change the colour of the text B as well as its alignment 4 and line height. 5






Select the email template's header 1 to add text and images, change its background colour and upload a background image. 1 You can also adjust the padding around it 41 to provide additional space between the sections. Click More Options 5 to change the padding for each side individually.



When your design is finished, click the Save & Download button in the top-right of the screen. You'll see a preview of your template. 11 If you want to make further changes, go back and continue to edit the design. 2 When you're happy with it, download it 🚨 or send it via MailChimp. 4



To use Email Monster with Gmail, return to the main page and click 'Install to Chrome'. Install the add-on, then open Gmail and click Compose. You'll see an Email Monster icon. Click this and the template editor will load, with a new 'Send using Gmail' button 1 in the top-right corner.



Disable the October Update tools you don't want

indows 10 version 1809 - the fabled October Update - is finally with us. Now that the operating system is no longer randomly deleting files, there's plenty to sink your teeth into, including the new Snip & Sketch and the handy Cloud Clipboard, as well as 'behind-the-scenes' changes, such as AI functionality. That's if you want it, of course.

Just days after the arrival of the new (and supposedly improved) Windows 10 comes an update to Winaero Tweaker. This incredible free tool, which works with Windows 7, 8 and 10, lets you make changes to all those niggling little elements that would otherwise require hacking the Registry.

Ready to strip out the October Update tools you don't want? Here, we look at the best new Winaero features that let you tweak Windows 10 to your liking.


EXPERT TIP

Steve Clark says

In the October Update, the Start bar (where Cortana 'lives') has been upgraded: you're now able to see all searches, from web pages to files, in a preview pane. If you're not a fan, Winaero Tweaker can rein in your Start bar. Search for Disable Web Search and tick 'Disable web search in taskbar and Cortana', then search for Cortana and select Disable Cortana, too.




The moment you sign into Windows 10, the Edge browser kicks into action. This makes loading Edge faster, while letting other programs use its data and internet access privileges. That's fine if it's your go-to browser, but a resourcedrain if it's not. To prevent this happening, locate the Windows Apps category or type prelaunch into the search bar. 1



Open Edge Prelaunch & Tab Preloading. 11 Click the box for Disable Edge Prelaunching. 2 This prevents Edge from booting up when you sign in. It's also possible to stop the browser pre-loading Start and New Tab pages, which occurs when you sign in or close the browser, by selecting Disable Edge Tab Preloading. 🖪




A clean install of Windows 10 version 1809 still comes preloaded with annoying apps and ads. These are most notable in the Start menu, 11 but are found across the operating system. To get rid of individual apps, right-click and choose Uninstall. 2 You can use Microsoft's unofficial removal method, but its Registry hack is pretty convoluted.



Winaero Tweaker permanently banishes ads and apps in one go. Scroll to Behavior 11 and click 'Ads and Unwanted Apps'. 2 Tick 'Disable ads in Windows 10', 3 which selects every subsection. Tick the options you wish to keep. We recommend at least stopping unwanted apps, suggestions and File Explorer ads. 4 This change requires a reboot. 5



The October Update lets you create case-sensitive folders. To turn this on and off at will, go to Context Menu 🗓 and click Case Sensitivity, 2 then 'Add Case Sensitivity context menu'. **B** When right-clicking a folder, 'Case sensitivity' appears 4 with three options for the mode: View, Enable and Disable. Applying this setting is instant and doesn't require a reboot.




Still in the Context Menu section, open Clipboard History. Also known as 'Cloud Clipboard', this pastes any content you copy to a clipboard. This is then synced across your devices for retrieval elsewhere. View your clipboard at any time by pressing Win+V. 2 In Winaero Tweaker, pop a tick beside 'Add Clipboard History to Desktop context menu'. 3



Once you've activated this tweak, go to your desktop by either minimising every window or clicking 'Show desktop' 🚺 in the taskbar. Now, when you right-click an empty space on the desktop, Clipboard History is a menu option. Adding this to the context menu means you can Enable **B** or Disable 4 the feature without trawling through Settings.



Timeline was added in the April Update, and the October Update adds it to phones. Winaero Tweaker now lets you remove the intrusive activity tracker from your Task View. ■ Search timeline or scroll to Behavior, ≥ then choose the option to Disable Timeline. Bear in mind that this only works if you're signed into the computer via your Microsoft account.



Dark mode is now available for File Explorer. Meanwhile, Winaero lets you customise the Libraries folder in File Explorer. By default, Windows 10 hides this. To make it viewable, open File Explorer, click View, 11 then Options 22 and, in the pop-up window, click View. 🛢 In Advanced Settings, 🛂 scroll to 'Navigation pane'. Tick 'Show libraries' 5 and click OK.



Tab back to Winaero Tweaker. In the File Explorer section, click Customize Libraries Item. 1 Replace the name by adding your own title in the 'Rename Libraries item' text box. 2 Under 'Change Libraries icon', click Browse. Belect a new icon image. Click 'Apply changes' 4 to save. Use these steps to personalise the Quick Access folder. 5



Browse the web one-handed with Opera Touch

here's no shortage of browsers available for iOS, from Apple's own Safari to Google's Chrome. However, Opera also has a browser that works on iOS called Opera Touch, which has just had a significant update. Opera has gone beyond the basics, developing an interface especially designed to be used one-handed. What's more, the app also links seamlessly with the Opera browser on your PC.

When you launch Opera Touch, it opens with the address bar selected 💶 and the keyboard visible, 2 ready for typing. This is part of the browser's focus on one-handed use. As you start to type, matching site suggestions appear and you can select one.



Alternatively, tap the area between the search box and the keyboard to see a selection of popular websites 🗓 that you might be interested in. This list will change and become more relevant the more you use the browser.



Tap a site button to open it. You'll notice a floating button towards the bottom of the screen. 11 Tap this to go back to Opera Touch's Home screen, where you can open a new site. Tap it again and it takes you back to the last site you visited.





Holding down the floating button opens the one-handed navigation menu. From here, you can access all the sites you've opened, either directly 11 or by exploring the tabs 2 and selecting one there. Slide your finger across the menu to the button you want.





This menu also lets you close a site, 🚺 start a search 🔁 or open a new tab. [3] From the Home screen, you have the option to scan a QR code or barcode. In addition, you can send a site to Opera on another device using the My Flow tool. 4 Tap this button, then tap 'Connect to Computer'.





You'll need Opera (www.opera.com) installed on your PC. Launch it, click the Flow button on the left and click 'Reveal the QR Code'. In Opera Touch, tap Scan QR Code and scan the PC's code. The connection will be made and you'll be able to send sites from your iOS device to your PC. 1

Manage groups of tabs in separate windows

f you often have a lot of tabs open in Chrome, you may be coveting Vivaldi's Tab Tiling and Tab Stack tools, which let you organise and group your tabs so you can quickly and more easily find a specific website. Workona is a Chrome

add-on that provides a similar service, tidying up your tabs, grouping sites into project-specific workspaces and simplifying tab management.



After installing Workona and signing in, you can create three separate workspaces for project tabs. • Name your projects 2 and click Create Workspaces. 3 You can also press Skip Setup 4 to go straight to Workona's 'master tab', where you can manage your tabs.

In the 'master tab', 11 click '+' 22 and choose New Workspace. B Name it and click Create Workspace. 4 Select a workspace to store opened tabs in it - drag and drop to reorder or move them to other workspaces. Click New Section, **5** then drag existing workspaces into it.



Don't buy a NAS drive get its best features free!

A NAS sounds snazzy, but drives are also pricey. Wayne Williams explains how to get the same benefits at no extra cost



Use Windows Storage Spaces


Some (but by no means all) of the more expensive NAS devices include RAID support. RAID (Redundant Array of Inexpensive Disks) is a way to combine multiple smaller disk drives into one large volume. There are a number of types of RAID, known as levels, and they each offer different benefits, which can be a little confusing. Windows 10 comes with an alternative to RAID called Storage


Spaces, which works in a similar way. This lets you use two or more drives to create a pool of storage that is treated as a single location complete with its own drive letter. You can mix and match internal or external hard drives, or solid-state drives (SSDs). See our Mini Workshop, opposite, for instructions on how to create a pool.

Storage Spaces is particularly useful for backing up your data and protecting

it from drive failure, and if you run low on capacity, you can easily add more drives. For anyone familiar with RAID, Storage Spaces offers the equivalent of RAID-0 (Simple Space), RAID-1 (Mirror Space) and RAID-5 (Parity Space). Microsoft explains the differences as follows:

 SIMPLE SPACES are designed for increased performance, but don't protect your files from drive failure. They're best

Optimise your pool's usage, spreading your data across the drives

used for temporary data (such as video-rendering files), image-editor scratch files and intermediary compiler object files. Simple spaces require at least two drives to be useful.

- MIRROR SPACES are designed for increased performance and protect your files from drive failure by keeping multiple copies. Two-way mirror spaces make two copies of your files and can tolerate one drive failure, while three-way mirror spaces can tolerate two drive failures. Mirror spaces are good for storing a broad range of data, from a general-purpose file share to a VHD library. When a mirror space is formatted with the Resilient File System (ReFS), Windows will automatically maintain your data integrity, which makes your files even more resilient to drive failure. Two-way mirror spaces require at least two drives, and three-way mirror spaces require at least five.
- PARITY SPACES are designed for storage efficiency and protect your files from drive failure by keeping multiple

copies. Parity spaces are best for archival data and streaming media, such as music and videos. This storage layout requires at least three drives to protect you from a single drive failure, and at least seven drives to protect you from two drive failures.

For most people, Parity spaces will be the best option because it's great for streaming content, and for protecting important data such as photos and home videos. If the need for a minimum of three drives is putting you off, then opt for Simple spaces instead.

Once you've created a space, rightclick it in File Explorer, go to 'Give access to', 'Advanced sharing' and share it over your network.

Use FreeNAS software

Another alternative to Windows Storage Spaces is FreeNAS (web.freenas.org), which is based on FreeBSD (Berkeley Software Distribution), a Unix-like operating system. If you have a spare PC that's not doing much, you can use this to create your own NAS-like solution.




Share your storage space over the network so it can be accessed by other computers

It runs on 64-bit systems, and ideally requires a decent amount of storage, but you can just install a new, larger hard drive if need be. There are two versions of the software available to download




To begin, click the Start button, then click the Settings cog on the left. Go to System, Storage 1 and, under 'More storage settings', click the link that says 'Manage Storage Spaces'.
In the Control Panel window that opens, click the link 'Create a new pool and storage space'.



When the UAC prompt appears, click OK to see a list of formatted drives that you can use as part of your storage pool. Tick the ones you want to include.

It's important to make sure you select the right ones because any content on them will be permanently deleted and you won't be able to easily recover it.



You can check whether a drive is empty by clicking the 'View files' link next to it. Once you've selected some drives, click 'Create pool'. In the next window, enter a name, and choose a drive letter and file system.

Now select the type of storage space and size. Click 'Create storage space'.



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
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You can access your Plex Media Server over the web

The Run command lets you access drives connected to your router

from the website: storage only; or storage, plugins and virtualisation. You'll probably want the second option because it lets you add plugins, so you can organise and serve data over a network. FreeNAS runs directly from a USB flash drive that you plug into your computer. This should be at least 8GB in size. There's lots of documentation on the website which will help you get started with adding volumes and making them accessible over a network. See our Mini Workshop, below, to find out how to use FreeNAS.

Store media files on Plex

If you have a PC that's always on, you can use that as your storage location and share files from it over the network. If it's videos you're planning on sharing, then Plex Media Server (www.plex.tv) is probably your best solution. Install it on the PC that's home to your media, and it will scan the drives and organise the content it finds. You'll then be able to install the Plex apps on all your devices and view the content in whatever way you like. There are player apps for everything from computers, games consoles and mobile phones (Android and iOS), to streaming devices such as Amazon Fire TV, Apple TV and Chromecast. Plex is also available for Kodi and through your browser.

Share content on an external hard drive

Another option is to connect an external


drive to your router and share its contents over your network. This isn't an option that will be available to all – you'll need a router with a USB port and not all ISP-supplied models have this. If yours does, connect your drive to it, log into the router via your browser (check the router itself or the manual for instructions on how to do this).

Check to see that your drive is detected under USB settings, then look for and enable storage sharing (or the equivalent). Next, type run into the Windows search box and press Enter. In the Run box, type \\[your IP address] (it'll probably be something like \\192.168.1.1) and click OK. The drive should open in the network section of File Explorer, ready for access.

MINI WORKSHOP | Install and configure FreeNAS



Download FreeNAS from the website (it's in ISO format) and either write it to a CD/DVD or to a USB flash drive using a tool such as Rufus (rufus.ie). Restart your PC and boot from the installer. FreeNAS will load. Select the Install/Upgrade option and in the next window, select the USB drive you will be installing to.



When prompted, enter a root password. Once FreeNAS has installed on the flash drive, remove the installation media and reboot from the drive. The console setup screen will load. This takes quite a while. When it's finished, make a note of the IP address that appears at the bottom of the screen.



Open a browser on another PC on your network and go to that address. Enter your password and click Log In. To add drives to FreeNAS, click Storage 1 at the top, then click the Volume Manager button. 2 When you've done that, click the Sharing button 5 to make the volume accessible over your network.

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

Hardware driver secrets that keep your PC running longer and faster

Refresh a broken driver

f you're experiencing a problem with a printer, scanner, USB device, video card, soundcard or any other hardware, you should first try reinstalling the driver. This resets everything and often solves any problems, but it's a good idea to remove any associated programs first. Open the Control Panel and choose 'Programs and Features', then uninstall anything related to the device, such as printer software, audio software and so on.

Go back to the main Control Panel menu and open Device Manager, then expand the section for the hardware you're having trouble with – for example, 'Imaging devices'. Right-click the item and select 'Uninstall device'. Once that's done, restart Windows and a fresh driver will automatically install. The device should work as before, hopefully with the problem fixed. This action basically removes the current driver files from your PC and reinstalls fresh ones from Windows Driver store.

Reset a laptop's battery

If your laptop shuts down long before the battery has expired – say, at 20% – it may be down to a problem with the battery's hardware drivers. Open the Control Panel and find the Device Manager, then expand the Batteries section. Right-click each item and select 'Uninstall device', then restart Windows. This can sometimes make the battery status report more accurate, allowing it to run down to below 10% before it shuts down.

Fix driver incompatibilities

Problems with a hardware device could be the result of an incompatibility or bug in the current driver, and updating it to the next version or rolling back to a previous one can solve this. Open Device

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

......



Return to the previous version of a driver with the Roll Back Driver button

Manager and expand the problematic hardware – for example, 'Display adapters'. Right-click the hardware device and select Properties on the menu. Select the Driver tab and use the Update Driver or Roll Back Driver buttons to replace the current driver.

Previous drivers are not always saved when updating, so Roll Back Driver is not always available.

Windows drivers vs manufacturer's drivers

You can find available drivers from Windows or from your device's manufacturer. Windows includes drivers for a vast number of hardware devices, which means most hardware will work as soon as it's plugged into your PC. For example, if you replace your old video card with a new one and switch on your computer, you'll find that a picture appears on the screen, even before you've installed the manufacturer's driver software. Similarly, a printer may print without you having to install the printer software, and a webcam, scanner or other device may work, too.

So why bother with the manufacturer's driver? The main reason is that it usually offers performance benefits and extra tools. Go to your PC manufacturer's website, search for the model and find the downloads section. Now download all the software and drivers.

If you are using an old device that uses old drivers, you may find that the manufacturer's driver has been replaced by a Windows version that's newer but doesn't work as well. If you find you are having problems with hardware following a Windows update, you should reinstall the manufacturer's drivers.



Use driver-update tools

Finding the correct drivers can be tricky, but there are dedicated tools that do the job for you. Driver updaters scan your computer for hardware drivers, then check online to see if a newer version is available. DriverMax (www .drivermax.com) and IObit Driver Booster (bit.ly/iodb462) are two solid options that offer a free version.

Driver updaters often present you with multiple updates and bulk downloads, but this should be avoided. Deselect any bulk updates and update a single driver at a time - and only if you are having problems with the device. Make sure you have a full backup before you start and check that your PC is working fine before moving on to the next driver you want to update.

Back up your drivers

It's a good idea to back up your drivers before installing any updates (either for Windows, your hardware or your software) as a safety net in case anything goes wrong. You can then restore the backup to solve any problems you find later. Windows System Restore makes the process

easy: in Windows 10, click the search box in the taskbar and type system restore; in Windows 7, type system restore into the search box in the Control Panel. In both cases, click 'Create a restore

point', then click Create in the window that appears.

There are other tools that offer to create a backup for you. In DriverMax, click the Backup icon in the toolbar, select 'Create driver backup archive' and click Next. The Restore button is used to restore drivers from a backup.

TAKE IT TO THE NEXT LEVEL

More advanced tips for when you're feeling brave

Remove driver packages

Removing a hardware driver isn't always as straightforward as it first appears and it can often involve more than simply using the Uninstall option in Device Manager.

Drivers are bundled into packages, so when a driver is installed, not only are the files installed but everything in the package is copied to the Driver Store, which is a secure location on the hard drive. Uninstalling a driver only removes the installed files and not the package, which remains in the Driver Store. You may also need to delete the driver package to completely clear your PC's system of a problematic driver.

A good example of this can be seen with printer drivers. Open the Control Panel and, in small icons view, click 'Devices and Printers'. Select Microsoft XPS Document Writer and then click 'Print server properties' at the top.

Select the Drivers tab, then Microsoft XPS Document Writer and click the Remove button below. A window appears giving the options to 'Remove driver only' or 'Remove driver and driver package'.



Don't just remove a driver, remove the driver packages too

This second option should be used to completely remove the driver for a device you no longer use, such as a printer or scanner. It can also be used if you want to clear out a driver to perform a clean install. It's possible that a driver package could interfere with a reinstallation and that Windows might automatically reinstall it and make the package appear when you think it has been deleted.

Stop the print spooler

If you are having problems removing


a printer driver, you should first stop the Print Spooler service. This uses the printer drivers, and any files currently in use can't be deleted. Press Windows+R and type services.msc. A window opens listing all the installed services, which are programs that run in the background. Double-click Print Spooler to open its Properties window and click the Stop button, then close the window. You should now be able to remove the printer driver.

Remove hidden driver packages

Devices such as printers and scanners appear in 'Devices and Printers' in the Control Panel and can be removed from there. However, there may be hidden devices or partially removed ones still on your PC, which can cause problems.

You may be able to see hidden devices by selecting an existing device in 'Devices and Printers' and clicking Print Server Properties. Select the Drivers tab and check if there are any printers or scanners listed that you thought were uninstalled. They can be selected and removed in this window.

If you have Windows 10 Pro, you can find hidden devices and drivers by opening Administrative Tools in the Control Panel, then clicking Print Management. Expand the Printer Servers section and select the printer, then right-click it and select Remove Driver Package. Unfortunately, Windows 10 Home doesn't have this.

Where are drivers stored?

Windows stores your drivers in the folder C:\Windows\System32\drivers. The Driver Store is in C:\Windows\

System32\DriverStore\FileRepository. Microsoft says they should not be

modified manually, so only allow Windows to add or remove these files.

Restore Tor Browser

I've been using Tor Browser (bit .ly/tor462) for a while but I think at some point recently a Windows update has broken it. I received the following message: "Windows cannot access the specified device, path or file. You may not have the appropriate permissions to access the item."

I have tried the Windows/Microsoft website for a solution but their suggestions have not solved the problem. I am using Windows 10 and Norton Security (uk.norton.com).

A security feature in Windows 10 called 'Controlled folder access' stops some programs running by removing permission to access certain



'Controlled folder access' can prevent some programs from running

folders. Check that it is turned off.

Type **controlled** in the taskbar's search box, then click 'Controlled folder access'. The Ransomware section of Windows Defender appears. Click its switch to off.

If that doesn't work, uninstall Tor Browser completely using Revo Uninstaller (www.revouninstaller.com) or Wise Program Uninstaller (www .wisecleaner.com), then download and install a fresh copy of the Tor Browser. Manager. Expand DVD/CD-Rom Drives, right-click the drive and select 'Uninstall device'. Close Device Manager and restart Windows. If the drive is detected, it will be reinstalled automatically.

We had this happen to a couple of PCs and nothing solved the problem. Windows detected the drive, the driver was fine, but no discs would play. The only solution was to replace the drive with a new one.

If your PC offers easy access to the internal DVD drive, you can buy and install a bare drive. Unplug and unscrew the old one, slide in the new one and reattach the cables and screws.

It may be easier to use an external DVD drive that connects via USB. Search Google for 'USB DVD drive' and click the Shopping tab. We found drives available for less than £10.

GENERAL PC

Find a missing OneDrive icon

The OneDrive icon in the notification area of my PC's taskbar has disappeared since the last Windows update. OneDrive still works and can be accessed in File Explorer, but I wondered if you have any idea where it went to or how to get it back.

The OneDrive icon is normally visible in the notification area but it may have been moved to the pop-up panel where it's out of sight. Click the up arrow to see if it is there. The icon

may have been removed if its settings were changed. Open the Settings app in Windows 10 and click Personalisation. Select Taskbar on the left and click 'Select which icons appear on the taskbar' on the right. Make sure the switch next to OneDrive is on.

Fix a disappearing DVD drive

Since a Windows 10 update, my DVD drive (D:) is no longer recognised in File Explorer. I've tried removing the drive from Settings and have carried out the recommended Registry updates suggested by various Google searches, but all to no avail.

Windows knows the drive is there and says it is working correctly, but I can't play anything on it. Do I have to remove all reference to the DVD writer in the Registry and physically remove the cable connections inside the box, so Windows 10 thinks a new drive is being installed?

Stop Barclaycard clashing with Chrome

I regularly use online banking. Since July, on the Barclaycard website, I can enter my account name as usual, but when I get to the passcode, a notice flashes up saying it's unsafe and I should use haveibeenpwned.com to check and change it. The passcode is only six numbers long and despite several changes, the 'passcode unsafe' notice continues to appear. Every passcode I try seems to have been 'pwned'.

I phoned Barclaycard online banking and their IT person said I should be using Internet Explorer rather than Chrome. He insisted that the problem was at my end and not down to Barclaycard. He also suggested that I use their mobile app

I've never had a problem with the website before, and always used Chrome. I run Kaspersky Total Protection and their Secure Protection (www.kaspersky.co .uk), as well as Malwarebytes (www .malwarebytes.com) but don't feel I can wholly rely on them to keep me secure.

Chrome is the most popular browser around – there's no need to switch to another browser. It's unlikely

that the Barclaycard website would send you to haveibeenpwned.com - it sounds like a browser extension or your security software is checking your login data and displaying the message.

Go to the Chrome menu, open a 'New incognito window' and use it to log into the Barclaycard website. Add-ons don't run in incognito windows, unless you specifically set them to, so you'll have a clean browser and can check whether it's an add-on that's at fault. Many add-ons can read the web pages you view, so when you need to connect to a site securely, it's worth using incognito.

Make Windows transparent

Could you provide any software, themes or Registry hacks that make Aero Glass available for Windows 10? I'd like something that makes the edges of windows and the taskbar transparent, as Windows 7 does. I already tried Aero Glass for Windows 8 (www.glass8.eu) Glass8 and WinaeroGlass (bit.ly/ wag462), but they don't do the full job.

I know there are tons of web pages and videos on YouTube related to this, but most don't run or just promote junk software, which changes the layout of Windows or makes it unstable.

Aero Glass was introduced with Windows Vista but taken out of Windows 8, and the transparency effects in Windows 10 have also been toned down and are less noticeable. This, and the twice-yearly major updates, make any tweaks difficult.

There are a couple of features left in Windows that can be used to enable or customise transparency effects. For example, open the Settings app and click Personalisation. Select Colours, then scroll down to 'More options' and activate the switch under 'Transparency effects'. The effect is barely visible, and only applies to the Start menu, taskbar, Action Centre and some Windows apps such as Calculator. It doesn't work across all Windows software.

If the transparency doesn't appear, check the Registry settings. Press Windows+R, type **regedit** and press Enter. Go to:

HKEY_CURRENT_USER\Software\ Microsoft\Windows\CurrentVersion\ Themes\Personalize

On the right are two values called EnableTransparency and EnableBlurBehind. If you don't see them, click Edit, New, 'DWORD (32-bit) Value'. Double-click each of these values and set them to 1.

Another Registry tweak that makes a small difference to transparency can be made by going to:

HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\ SOFTWARE\Microsoft\Windows\ CurrentVersion\Explorer\Advanced Select Edit, New, 'DWORD (32-bit) Value' and name it

UseOLEDTaskbarTransparency. Double-click it and set the value to 1. It



You say you already tried Aero Glass for Windows 8 (www.glass8.eu), but it works with some versions of Windows 10 and is the closest to the old Aero Glass option of Windows 7 and Vista.

Check what you're downloading

I've noticed that some downloads recommend using Safe Mode. What is the reason for this? Also, sometimes Windows Defender won't let me

download. Have I set it up wrong? Richard Coleman, via email

No files need to be downloaded in Safe Mode. This is a special Windows mode that eliminates many drivers and background programs, and is only useful for diagnosing problems. Security software might not run properly in Safe Mode, so it's suspicious that you're being asked to use it - you may be trying to download bad software that is trying to circumvent security.

In normal mode, Windows Defender checks downloads and won't let you save malware. It occasionally displays a message about a download it doesn't recognise and is just being cautious. You can choose to go ahead and save it if you are certain it is safe. However, it's best not to download anything that Defender flags as malicious or unknown.

You may be using dodgy websites with bad downloads, possibly infected with malware. Avoid them or you might end up with malware on your computer.

Restore internet after Windows update

After installing the Windows 10 October 2018 Update, I have discovered that Edge can't access the internet. I mostly use Chrome, so it's not a huge problem, but some other Windows apps like Mail and Calendar also aren't working properly since the update. What is wrong?

This appears to be a network Configuration issue. Either something has changed during the update or has not changed when it should have. Open the Settings app (Windows+i) and click 'Network & Internet', then 'Network and Sharing Centre'. Click the active connection in the list of connections, then click

Properties in the next window. The problem appears to be caused by IPv6 being disabled. Tick that box and click OK. Close the windows and restart Windows.

If that doesn't work, try a network reset. Open Settings and click 'Network & Internet', then click 'Network reset' on the right.

UK broadcasters have no right to demand top slots on streaming services, says **Barry Collins**

Don't give the BBC box seats for streaming

elevision is a funny old business.
You may have assumed, for
example, that the BBC, ITV,
Channel Four and Five are in
prime position on Sky and Virgin Media
because they're the most popular
channels. But you'd be wrong. They're
there because Ofcom regulations
guarantee so-called public service
broadcasters the best slots on the
TV guide.

Would anyone still be watching execrable schedule-fillers such as Celebrity Hunted, Big Brother or Judge Rinder's Crime Stories if any of their broadcasters were marooned on channel 343, six pages down the electronic guide? Yes okay, a few would, but nowhere near as many as do today.

Now, the public service broadcasters are worried. Fewer and fewer people are getting their television fix from Sky, Virgin or Freeview; increasingly, it's Amazon, Netflix, YouTube and other streaming services where viewers head for evening entertainment – and here the BBC and its posse aren't guaranteed

a place at the top table. They're in danger of being ignored.

So, the big British broadcasters are calling on the government to intervene. Instead of upping their game and commissioning television shows that people will actually seek out, they are demanding to once again be given "prominence" on every TV platform.

"Regardless of where you're watching, which device you're watching on, or who provides your television service, you

should always be able to easily find PSB [public service broadcaster] services and programmes in the UK," the chiefs of the broadcasters wrote in a joint, open letter recently.

What protectionist cobblers! It's certainly true that you'll do well to find UK news and current affairs coverage online that rivals anything on offer from the BBC, ITV or Channel 4, but that's not

the kind of programming that's under threat from Amazon, Netflix and the like.

Instead, it's mainstream entertainment where the home channels are being massively outgunned by Netflix and co. The British broadcasters argue that the global streaming giants "have little interest in supporting and reflecting UK culture". Are they serious?

The Crown is one of the best shows on Netflix – so good, in fact, that the BBC nakedly ripped off its second season with Princess



Royal. Comedians such as Greg Davies, Jimmy Carr, Russell Howard and Ricky Gervais have all done specials for Netflix – the kind of specials that once might have appeared on the BBC. The broadcasters aren't really bothered that the streaming services aren't "reflecting UK culture", they're resentful that the big-budget globals are doing it better than they are.

However, the home broadcaster criticism hits peak hypocrisy when you look at the number of their own shows that appear on Netflix and Amazon.

Almost any massive BBC, ITV or Channel 4 hit has been sold to the streaming firms. In the case of the BBC, that's reselling content that we, the British licence-fee payers, have already paid for. We're basically paying Netflix for access to our own back catalogue.

British broadcasters don't need a leg-up from the government, they need a rocket up their backsides. After all, if the BBC, ITV et al were truly delivering loads of the "great" programmes they claimed to be making in their letter, why would anyone pay extra for Netflix or Amazon at all?







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
