


Boost your broadband with Ofcom

verage broadband upload and download speeds have increased significantly over the years, but Ofcom says only half of the 94% of the UK homes and offices that could be receiving superfast broadband are taking advantage of it. In a bid to change this, it has launched a new consumer campaign and accompanying website that lets you enter your postcode to discover the type of broadband available to you.

The site highlights how fast your broadband should be, based on what you use it for. Basic broadband users require a speed of just 10Mbps, for example, while for heavy household use it apparently should be 30 times faster. A link points you to a speed checker to measure your current speed, and from there the site reveals the questions you need to ask of your broadband provider.

Ofcom has created the service as part of new measures that require



Conduct your own orchestra

semiconductor.withgoogle.com

Forget strumming an air guitar or tapping your toe in time to the music. With Google's fun new artificial intelligence experiment in your browser, you can wave your arms around in front of your webcam to control a virtual orchestra.

Semi-Conductor uses hundreds of audio files from recorded instruments and a machine-learning library called PoseNet to map your movements. It asks you to position your head and arms within a frame before playing Mozart's 'Eine Kleine Nachtmusik' and vibrating to your tune.

Moving from side to side controls which section of the orchestra plays, affecting the instrumentation in real time. The faster you move your arms, the quicker the orchestra plays, while raising or lowering your limbs makes the music louder or quieter. Just be careful you don't accidentally hit

anyone around you!



Facebook ends 2018 with yet more data scandals

What happened?

Facebook has once again been accused of being reckless with our data, with a report in the New York Times claiming the social network offered its business partners access to its users' private data. A separate report revealed that a bug meant photos uploaded to but not shared on the site were publicly leaked.

Records obtained by the NYT (bit.ly/nytimes466) from 2017 showed Facebook shared data with its partners, including Microsoft, Netflix and Spotify, potentially breaking its own privacy rules. Amazon was allowed to see names and contact information, while Yahoo could access posts that were otherwise not shared. Netflix and Spotify were allowed to view private messages, while Microsoft's search engine Bing was given access to friend lists, without users being asked first.

Facebook said in a blog post (bit.ly/fbpartners466) that such partnerships are necessary for apps and systems to interact, such as sharing your Spotify playlist with friends on the social network or accessing your Facebook account through "social hubs" on your phone. Allowing users to send a message from Spotify, for example, requires 'read' and 'write' access. Facebook said most of those features are actually now gone, and those that

remain are bound by its own privacy policies, with most asking for permission from users first. Whether that convinces users or regulators remains to be seen.

This wasn't Facebook's only data scandal to round off 2018. The company admitted that it had a bug in its photo API - the system that lets other apps connect to the social network and share data. The tool was only supposed to allow apps to access photos specifically posted on a user's timeline, but a flaw let 1,500 apps see every uploaded photo, including images used for Marketplace or Stories, as well as pictures uploaded before the user then decided not to publish them - perhaps they lacked mobile signal or had second thoughts. Facebook holds those images for three days in case users change their mind and decide to post them.

The latest data debacle comes as US regulators filed a lawsuit against Facebook for the Cambridge Analytica incident, in which the private information of millions was abused in political ads.

How will it affect you?

If you want to see which third-party apps have permission to use your

Facebook data, head to the Settings section of your account. Beneath 'Data access', in the 'Apps and websites' section, remove any apps you no longer use or don't want to have access.

On the photos front, Facebook has said the bug was only live between September 13 and 15, 2018. During that time period, 6.8 million users were affected. If you were one of them, you should receive a notification from Facebook that will direct you to a help page. If you're not sure whether you've seen the notification or not, you can find out if you were affected at bit.ly/fbcheck466. Beyond that, there's not much you can do.

If you're tired of Facebook's cavalier attitude toward your data and want to take a break from the site, go into General Account Settings to temporarily deactivate your account. Alternatively, download your data to grab your photos for yourself, and delete your account permanently. However, don't forget that Facebook owns Instagram and WhatsApp, too!

What do we think?

It's hard to keep track of all the datasharing scandals, and Facebook's executives are running out of ways to apologise. It's remarkable that Mark Zuckerberg hasn't stepped down as CEO of the company he founded, or been shoved out by angry shareholders.

Perhaps it's even more remarkable that anyone still uses the site, but after putting in so many hours building our profiles and networks, it's not easy to say goodbye and risk losing touch with people. We'd rather see regulators force Facebook to sort out its behaviour, so we can keep on using the social network, rather than have to find a new way to organise our online lives, but it wouldn't be the first social site to lose favour. We lived without Facebook before, perhaps it's time to do so again.

Women abused every 30 seconds online

What happened?

Research released by Amnesty International (bit.ly/amnesty466) found that 1.1 million abusive tweets were sent to women last year, which works out to twice every minute. The human-rights organisation worked with an Al software company to sift through tweets sent to high-profile women across the US and UK, including journalists from a variety of publications and politicians from across the ideological divide. The study found that women were sent the same number of horrible messages regardless of whether they were aligned to the left or right.

Black and minority ethnic women were 34% more likely to be targeted with abuse than white women, with one in 10 tweets mentioning black women found to be problematic.

How will it affect you?

We know that online abuse happens, but it's interesting - and alarming - to have evidence to prove how serious it is for other people. The study doesn't necessarily reveal the level

of abuse faced by all women online, because female politicians and journalists attract more vitriol thanks to their higher profiles, but it's a reminder of what they have to put up with just to get on with their jobs. The researchers are calling on Twitter to do more to prevent abuse, while still allowing freedom of speech, and are again asking Twitter to publish any data it has about the scale of abuse on the site.

What do we think?

It's easy to forget that a real human being is on the other end of a Twitter profile, whether it's a politician, journalist or even a company you're angry with for providing poor service. Shouting at someone on social media may feel like screaming into the wind, but a human is probably tasked with reading your comments. It's fair to use such sites to complain and criticise, but remember that the recipient is likely to be dealing with a host of angry, abusive messages. A bit of kindness can go a long way.



Windows 10 adds a sandbox — for some

What happened?

Microsoft is introducing a useful new security feature for Windows: a sandbox. Windows 10 will be

updated with Windows Sandbox, a miniature, protected version of the operating system that's isolated from your own files.

A sandbox provides a self-contained environment where you can open a file that may be suspicious without worrying about it infecting the rest of your PC. For example, if you've been sent a EXE file as an email attachment, opening it isn't safe; but if you run it inside the sandbox, any damage will be limited. Once you've run the program to check it out, the sandbox will delete everything associated with the EXE file, so there's no fear of malware infecting your system.

How will it affect you?

Sadly, this welcome new tool will only be available to business and professional users. Sandbox will arrive next year in Windows 10 Pro and Windows 10 Enterprise, and there's currently no indication as to whether it will filter down to Windows Home users. Hopefully, a future version of the operating system will include the

sandbox for the rest of us - once it's proved useful for everyone else.

When it does finally arrive, Windows Sandbox will come preinstalled in updates to either of those versions of the software, and will be free to use. Anyone wanting an early look should keep their eye out for build 18305 in the Windows Insider programme, which is for early adopters and beta testers.



It's easy to get annoyed with Microsoft's constant bug-ridden updates, but it's worth remembering that the software giant does actually listen to users, and often rolls out useful tools and improvements for free.

The company spotted that business users were creating virtualised environments to sandbox files and sought to make their jobs easier. Because of that, and despite the other challenges Microsoft faces and the many missteps it makes, Windows 10 generally does keep getting better - even if it doesn't always feel that way.

Met Police tests facial-recognition technology

What happened?

London's Metropolitan Police has begun testing facial-recognition technology in the capital. The trials conducted just before Christmas mark the seventh attempt by the Met to get its controversial technology off the ground.

Rather than scanning people without their consent, the Met wants people to volunteer to take part in the testing. Critics of the scheme have been vocal, suggesting that people who turn down the invites will look "suspicious".

Bigger grievances, meanwhile, pertain to issues of privacy. Big Brother Watch (bigbrotherwatch.org.uk), a prominent civil-liberties advocacy group, has denounced the technology as "authoritarian, dangerous and lawless," stating that it constitutes a "breach of fundamental rights to privacy and freedom of speech and assembly".

On its website, the Met explains that images captured by its cameras are streamed directly to the Live Facial Recognition database, which contains a 'watch list' of offenders wanted by the police and courts for various offences. When the cameras detect a match, an alert is sent to an officer near the scene, who can then decide whether to stop and speak to that person.

How will it affect you?

If you don't fancy being roped into the



recognition technology have a mixed record, to say the least. A trial last July led to a grand total of zero arrests, while a May study found the software flagged false positives in up to 98% of cases.

In the meantime, we're pleased that Big Brother Watch is ploughing on in its role as a watchdog; it recently took to Twitter to name, shame and snap one of the facial-recognition vans conducting the trials. "This looks an awful lot like covert surveillance," the group commented on a picture of the seemingly innocuous plain green van.

face-recognition trial, you should avoid central London. The test areas are said to fall within the capital's tourist hubs, with Soho, Picadilly Circus and Leicester Square touted as prime locations.

Be wary of pranksters, too. The Met has established that only "clear uniformed" officers will be carrying out trials. The Live Facial Recognition system stores faces matching the watch list for 30 days, while all other images are reportedly deleted immediately. The Met says that anyone can refuse to be scanned, and it's not an offence to actively avoid being scanned.

Palm bit.ly/palm466

With smartphone screens steadily expanding and pockets bulging, there's plenty of space in the mobile market for a phone that fits comfortably in the palm of your hand. Palm, best known for its PalmPilot PDA from the mid-1990s, is hoping that smaller is the way forward with the laiunch of the tiniest and lightest handset that we've ever seen.

Intended as a secondary device – or something for the holidays – the credit card-sized Palm phone has a minuscule 3.3in screen and weighs a mere 60g. Despite its diminutive size, it comes reasonably well equipped, with an octa-core 1.4GHz processor, 3GB of RAM and 32GB of onboard storage, which can be expanded by



a further 256GB via microSD. There's a 12-megapixel camera on the rear of the phone and an 8-megapixel selfie snapper, giving it the capabilities of some handsets twice its size.

Sadly, the compact size of the Palm phone makes for some serious flaws. First, there's no 3.5mm headphone jack, which is fine if you always use Bluetooth but frustrating if your favourite

headphones are wired. Second, the battery is only 800mAh in capacity, which in our tests only lasted for 3 hours and 37 minutes before needing to recharge.

Also, as you'd expect, the on-screen keyboard is very small, which leads to you frequently hitting the wrong keys. The tiny display also makes playing games very difficult.

Worst of all, the Palm phone's modest build isn't matched by its price. In the UK, it's exclusive to Vodafone and either costs £350 with a £10 pay-as-you-go SIM or a whopping £31 a month on a 24-month contract, which means you'll end up paying £744 in total. It may be cute and easily pocketable compared to Samsung's phablet monsters, but it's certainly not worth spending that kind of money for the novelty of its teensiness.


Did Google sabotage Microsoft Edge?

Google deliberately sabotaged Microsoft's Edge browser, according to a former Microsoft intern. Software engineer Joshua Bakita claims that the search giant's tinkering made his work on Edge difficult by perpetually switching things around on its websites and services.



One example Bakita cites relates to YouTube, where, he explains, the platform's engineers "added a hidden empty div" [a web-design element] over YouTube videos, which "causes our hardware acceleration fast-path to bail. Prior to that, our fairly state-of-the-art video acceleration put us well ahead of Chrome on video playback time on battery".

Google subsequently boasted about its own browser's speed and superiority. Bakita contends that: "almost the instant they broke things on YouTube, they started advertising Chrome's dominance over Edge on videowatching battery life".



For all his suggestions of duplicitousness, Bakita doesn't outright accuse Google of being Machiavellian. "Now I'm not sure I'm convinced that YouTube was changed intentionally to slow Edge," he writes, before saying that "many" of his co-workers do believe this to be the case, so much so that they "looked into it personally".

It's easy for Google to maintain its innocence against this accusation. Tweaks made to its sites may well have been organic and entirely unrelated to Edge's performance. There's no bad blood at Microsoft's end, either, as Edge is now set to use the same browser engine as Chrome. Only time will tell if this is a win-win situation for users.



Web users still choosing weak passwords

The weakest link in cybersecurity is still humans, it would seem: the annual list of



100 worst passwords has highlighted just how complacent some web users are about their logins. Compiled by software company SplashData, the list is based on five million leaked passwords from various data sources around the internet.

Predictably, the worst offender for the fifth year running, appearing the most on leaked datasets, was '123456'. 'Password' came in second, with variations of it such as 'paswOrd' and 'password1' also making the top 30, and 'football' coming in at 16.

A new entry for the year was

'donald', which has become so popular that it's the 23rd most frequently used password on the list. This was one of ;11 new entries to make the top 25, suggesting that web users are ignoring security experts' advice to make passwords unique, about eight to 10 characters long and a mix of numbers and lower- and upper-case letters. bit.ly/passwords466

Brexit could lead to rise in phishing attacks

Companies in both the UK and wider Europe have been warned to expect a sharp spike in phishing attacks once the political uncertainty around Brexit is resolved, with analysts already spotting a rise in malicious activity.

The outcome of negotiations should be known by March 2019, by which point organisations will face an increase in Brexit-themed 'spear phishing' campaigns and political disinformation, according to threat intelligence firm

EclecticIQ.

"Cybercriminals could easily exploit Brexit in large-scale phishing campaigns," the researchers said.



"A campaign targeting businesses could see cybercriminals sending out documents that are made to look like government advice on dealing with Brexit [but] which, in fact, download malware. Cybercriminals regularly use similar tactics by spoofing government organisations such as HMRC in order to spread malware or steal personal information."

Researchers also found evidence of recent Russian-linked ATP28 (Fancy Bear) activity, suggesting the hacker group will launch malware attacks against political targets across Europe once the confusion has settled.

Wi-Fi, 31% have never updated the security options on their routers and nearly a third (30%) do not protect their devices with security software. It seems that consumers have turned a blind eye to how far sensitive details can travel and the extent of the information that companies and websites hold about them. In other words, consumers have lost control of their personal data, leaving them vulnerable to cyberattacks - and mostly unaware of the risks they face.

Even data that many people would consider innocuous is routinely stolen and sold on the dark web. For example, stolen medical

records, which sold for between £70 and £100 each in 2016, have now dropped in price simply because there are so many in circulation.


These days, someone's complete digital life can be sold - and bought - for less even be accused of a crime.

Following on from last issue's Workshop, we show you how to configure WordPress 5.0's trickier content blocks





When you finish a block by pressing Enter at the end of a paragraph, a new block is created that's ready to have text written into it. Alternatively, create a block by clicking the + button 💶 and choosing its type 🛂 - there are several to choose from. You can change the type of an existing block by clicking its 'Change block type' button. 🚨



Most of the blocks are straightforward to use but a few are unnecessarily complicated. If you want to split a block horizontally into equal sized columns, choose the Columns block. By default, it splits into two and you can click between them to add content. To add more columns to the same block, increase the number in the sidebar. 2



Although conceptually similar, adding tables requires a different process. Choose the block from the list and you can set the number of columns and rows you want to add. 

We test and compare the latest products

Android phones under £250

You don't have to spend a fortune to get a great smartphone. We test seven impressive and affordable devices

f you refuse to take out a second mortgage to blow on one of the latest flagship smartphones, don't despair: you can still get an excellent device for a modest outlay of less than £250.

The phones we've tested here have great screens, powerful batteries and brilliant cameras – just not necessarily all three. If, instead of expecting the best of everything in one device, you prioritise the features that matter most, you can pick up a real bargain.

HOW WE TESTED

We put all seven smartphones through a series of demanding tests. The screens were analysed with a colorimeter to measure colour, contrast and brightness; while performance was tested with gaming benchmark GFXBench and core performance benchmark Geekbench. Finally, we tested how long the battery lasted on each fully charged device by playing a standard looping video until the power ran out.

Motorola Moto G6 | £199.99 | Buy from Amazon: bit.ly/motog466

Motorola has an excellent record of striking the right balance between performance, looks and affordability. The Moto G6 maintains this commendable trend, and its sophisticated curves and polished glass make it barely distinguishable

from vastly more expensive models. Reduced from its original price, it now costs around £199 – not ultra-cheap but in a world where the most expensive models exceed £1,000, not to be sniffed at. And since the phone runs Android 8.0 (Oreo), it can do pretty much everything that its pricier counterparts can.

The large 5.7in display has a tall, narrow, 18:9 ratio with a resolution of 1,080 x 2,160 pixels. The screen is rich and vibrant, but it's not the brightest (peaking at 408cd/m²), nor the most colour accurate (reproducing a relatively low 86.3% of the sRGB colour palette). While the phone's 1.8GHz octa-core Snapdragon 450 processor may not be the fastest smartphone chip around, it's enough to make the Moto G6

feel responsive for everyday tasks, with benchmark scores that match other phones in this price bracket. Also, Motorola's version of Android is cleaner than most and

> doesn't come overburdened with unnecessary extra apps and user interface elements, which gives it some extra zip.

The most impressive thing about the G6 is its camera. The rear snapper is made up of two cameras working in unison, the second used for depth perception to create top-quality portrait images. It takes brilliant outdoor photos, too, and although it doesn't perform as well in low light, its results are still impressive.

The main disappointment, however, is its battery life. The 3,000mAh battery lasted only 10 hours and 45 minutes in our test, which should still get you through a full day, but was bettered by the other award winners in this group.

WebUser GOLD AWARD

If you're on a strict budget and you're after a phone that looks good, feels natural to use and takes great photographs, there's none better than the Motorola Moto G6. Although it's the second-most expensive phone in this test, it offers superb value for money. Sure, it can't match every aspect of vastly more expensive flagship phones that are way beyond the budget of this review, but the compromises made are in all the right places, with fussy extras trimmed while core features remain intact.

Our next-favourite sub-£250 smartphone is another Motorola, though this one is a bit cheaper and, therefore, less of an all-rounder than the G6. However, if battery life is your priority, look no further than the E5 Plus. With its huge 5,000mAh battery, this phone lasted 24 hours and 2 minutes in our tests, which is longer than any other currently available phone - at any price - that we've tested.

The camera is also superb. There are no fancy options involving dual lenses, but it takes wonderful photos that are vastly superior to any other model that's this affordable.

The E5 Plus's plastic case shows where some cost has been cut, but it still feels surprisingly classy and houses an impressive 720 x 1,440 pixel screen, along with a microSD card slot that lets you expand the phone's storage up to 256GB.



Although this is more than £100 under our budget, the Motorola E5 Plus has everything in all the right places. Best of all is its epic battery life, which is better than any other phone you can buy. It also takes cracking photos.

Samsung Galaxy J5 (2017) | £129.50 | Buy from Amazon: bit.ly/samj466

It was a tough call not to give Motorola a clean sweep of all three top awards in this Group Test, but Samsung's J5 has dropped in price significantly since its £250 launch

It's the J5's display that elevates it from the rest of the pack. It has an AMOLED screen, with an sRGB coverage of 98.5%. Although it doesn't get as bright as some of its rivals, maxing out at 297cd/m², its contrast is wonderful and displays velvety deep inky blacks.

last year, so it's an absolute bargain.

Our battery tests ran for 18 hours and 26 minutes on the J5, which is impressive, even if it's hours less than the Moto E5 Plus. Its 1.6GHz octa-core processor is better than the ones in the Motorola models, though, which gave the J5 better scores in our performance benchmark tests and gives Android a smoother, slicker feel.

VERDICT

It may not have the battery life of the E5 Plus or the general well-roundedness of the G6, but if your main requirements from a phone are a slick interface and a luxurious screen, then the Samsung Galaxy J5 is an excellent choice.

Motorola Moto E5 | £119.99 | Buy from Amazon: bit.ly/motoe466

The Moto E5 doesn't have the mighty battery life of the E5 Plus (though it still lasted a solid 19 hours and 39 minutes in our tests) but it's otherwise just as good. Its solid plastic case feels

comfortable to hold, the generous 5.7in 18:9 ratio display has no major flaws and its rear 13-megapixels camera is brilliant. Storage and RAM are a bit mean at 16GB and 2GB, but there's a microSD slot to expand this. However, performance from the 1.4GHz quad-core processor is a touch sluggish, which is why the Samsung J5 beat it to third place.

Honor 8X | £209 | Buy from Amazon: bit.ly/hono466

The Honor 8X is the biggest, fastest phone you'll get for less than £250, with a huge 6.5in screen that's surprisingly easy to hold thanks to its thin 19.5:9 aspect ratio and narrow bezels. It has a sharp resolution of 1,080 x 2,340 pixels and

reasonably accurate colours (91.6% of sRGB), though it's not particularly bright. In our benchmark tests, it outperformed every other phone in this Group Test, both in games and processor performance, helped by its 4GB of RAM and 64GB of storage. The camera and battery aren't great, though.

Vodafone Smart N9 | £95 | Buy from Vodafone: bit.ly/vsn466

The N9's main attraction is its modern 18:9 ratio screen, which has a decent resolution of 720 x 1,440 pixels and is surprisingly good quality, with sRGB coverage of 90.9%. It feels well made, and has a fingerprint reader and NFC for your convenience. However, the camera is poor and battery life is

disappointing (9 hours and 11 minutes in our tests). That's an acceptable compromise for the price but you get so much more if you stretch your budget to the Moto E5 or beyond.

Vodafone Smart N9 Lite | £59 Buy from Vodafone: bit.ly/vsnl466

This is the only phone we've tested that runs Google's Android Go operating system, which is a lightweight version of Android 8.1 designed to help ultra-cheap phones run faster. However, the N9 Lite still feels sluggish, particularly when using apps that aren't optimised for Go. Its 480 x 960 pixels screen

is a generous 5.34in but it's not colour accurate, displaying only 64.1% of sRGB colours. Battery life was also weakest in our tests, lasting just 8 hours and 50 minutes.

OUR VERDICT

The Motorola Moto G6 scooped our Gold Award from tough competition. It's a fantastic all-round smartphone, available for a very reasonable £200. You can't expect it to compete in every aspect with rival models that cost five times as much, but the G6's compromises are in all the right places, making it extraordinary value for money.

If that's still too expensive, the E5 Plus is a more affordable alternative that actually trumps the G6 for battery life. It also takes great photos, offers superb value for money and wins our Silver Award.

Anyone looking for top performance without sacrificing too much in other areas should look beyond Motorola to the Samsung Galaxy J5, which nabbed our Bronze Award. 

The start of a new year is the perfect time to refresh your New Tab page, and if you're not fussed about seeing pretty pictures then Minimo (bit.ly/minimo466) is the ideal extension. This "elegant,

It displays the current time and date in the centre of the page, usefully accompanied by your estimated download speed and battery level. Chrome tabs from other devices at the bottom of the page. Minimo also offers a 'writing mode' for jotting down your thoughts, and speedy access to your bookmarks, history and downloads, but its elegant minimalism is what makes it so appealing.



Boycott Amazon and other sites that it owns

Amazon may be the biggest store the world has ever known, but it didn't get where it is today without causing controversy, from tax avoidance and anticompetitive business practices to its alleged poor treatment of

warehouse workers. Yet we still head to Amazon, almost automatically, whenever we need to buy anything online. A group of activists is expressing its disgust with the retail behemoth with a Chrome extension called Block Amazon For Me (blockamazonfor.me), which prevents you from making multi-billionaire CEO





Jeff Bezos even richer. When you try to visit Amazon, or other sites it owns such as IMDb, Twitch and Audible, the add-on denies you access, forcing you to use a more ethical alternative. You can easily switch it off when you want to suspend your boycott to do some shopping!

Identify outdated news on Facebook


Lots of Facebook users fail to check the date of the stories they share, 'like' and comment on, which makes the site a prime source of misinformation - or fake news, if you prefer - and leads to people grieving over celebrities who died years ago or raging about rumours long dispelled. A new Chrome extension



called Sure Or Not (bit.ly/sure466) addresses this problem by flagging outdated news on your Facebook feed as 'Old' so you don't end up resharing or reacting to it. We're not sure how old stories need to be for the add-on to classify them as such, but it could certainly prevent embarrassment.

Control Spotify from any web page

If you like to listen to music using Spotify's Web Player (open.spotify .com) as you browse the internet, you'll know how frustrating it is to have to keep switching tabs when you want to play, pause and skip tracks. Spotify Controller (bit.ly/ spotify466) makes life much easier by letting you control the player from any web page. Just click its toolbar button to access Play, Pause, Back and Forward controls, as well as an option to open the player directly.

FIREFOX

Stop dodgy websites hacking your tabs

Did you know that when you click a link that opens a page in a new tab, the new page can control the content in the previous tab and even load a new page? It's a trick often exploited by advertisers and is a clear security risk if the site you've opened contains malware. Web designers can stop this happening by adding the attribute 'rel="noopener"' to links that open pages in new tabs, but many don't bother, which is where Don't Touch My Tabs (bit.ly/touch466) comes in. This



Firefox add-on searches web pages for links to other pages that are not hosted on the same domain, and adds the rel="noopener" attribute to them. This ensures that malicious sites aren't able to infect your browser, but doesn't 'break the internet' and prevent links from working properly.

Mozilla is currently testing a feature that will automatically add rel="noopener" to links, to be included in the next version of Firefox.

Beat online surveillance automatically


We all know that Facebook and Google spy on us and guzzle our data, yet we use them anyway - often out of habit rather than necessity. A new Firefox add-on called Resist the Internet (bit.ly/ resist466) is leading the charge against online surveillance by redirecting you away from invasive tech giants and toward "privacy-preserving alternatives".



For example, if you try to search the web using Google, you'll be automatically redirected to DuckDuckGo, which doesn't track you or store your searches. Attempt to access Google Maps and you'll be taken instead to the privacy-respecting OpenStreetMap, while Facebook and Twitter are blocked in favour of the community-run social network Mastodon. The developer describes Resist the Internet as "primarily a joke" and "not really recommended for any serious use", but it's actually an effective privacy tool.

Force YouTube to stream at maximum quality

YouTube automatically adjusts the streaming quality of videos based on the speed of your internet connection, the size of the video player and the quality of the uploaded content, but you may sometimes feel it's shortchanging you on picture quality. You can increase this by clicking the Settings cog below a video and choosing a higher resolution from the Quality menu, but an easier option is to install YouTube in HD (bit.ly/ youtube 466). This forces YouTube's HTML5 and Flash players to stream videos at the highest quality possible, be it 1080p HD, 1440p or even 2160p - you can choose your preferred resolution in the add-on's options, and even go lower if you like. It also monitors changes in the streaming quality of the video and adjusts itself accordingly.

Show access keys for websites

Some websites support 'access keys' - keyboard shortcuts that let you jump to

specific sections and tools without using your mouse - but few of them tell you what those keys actually are. So kudos to


Vivaldi for adding a new feature to version 2.2 of the browser that shows you all available access keys for the current site. The option is available through



Vivaldi's Quick Commands menu, which you can open by pressing F2 on your keyboard. Start typing access until you see the command Show Webpage Access Key Shortcuts, then select it and press Enter.

Activate the window warning

Version 58 of Opera - currently in beta and due for release later this month - adds a Firefox-style feature that warns you when you try to close a browser window containing lots of open tabs. This guards against accidentally losing data you've typed when filling in forms or writing comments, but if you find it annoying, just select 'Do not warn me when closing a window'. To turn the warning back on again, go to Settings, Advanced, Browser and, in the 'User interface' section, switch on the option 'Warn on closing windows with multiple tabs'.

Al predictive policing

Could the police target you for crimes you're yet to commit? David Crookes looks at how a science-fiction concept has become reality

'Ello, 'ello, 'ello — what's all this then?

Al-powered predictive policing is an attempt to identify the individuals who are most likely to commit a crime or become a victim in the future. It uses vast data sets and machine-learning algorithms to assess potential risks. The idea is that by alerting police forces, officers can consider the most appropriate action - tackling crime before it even takes place.

How does it work?

UK police forces, led by West Midlands Police, are working on a system called the

National Data Analytics Solution (NDAS). Based on the records of five million people who have committed crimes or been stopped and searched, it uses artificial intelligence to decipher criminal patterns. So far, it has uncovered 1,400 'predictive indicators' - 30 of which are deemed to be particularly strong. There's a possibility individuals will be given a risk score that can determine how likely a person is to offend. Those at the higher end will be flagged.

Who will be flagged by the

lain Donnelly, the project's lead, says the system will pick up on a person's history and social interactions, and this could

manifest itself in many ways. Someone with a background of mental-health problems, for instance, may be deemed more likely to be a future violent offender. Likewise, someone who hangs around with other violent offenders, or a person whose behaviour is thought to match that of others who have gone on to commit greater crimes, could be flagged as being of greater risk.

So far, so Minority Report?

The parallels between Al-powered predictive policing and the 2002 Hollywood movie starring Tom Cruise have not gone unnoticed. In the sci-fi film, set in 2054 and based on a short story by Philip K Dick, a police

department called PreCrime uses three psychics to foresee murders taking place. But although they enable the murder rate to be cut to zero. there are inevitable flaws. The same is true of the NDAS.

But what sort of crimes are being targeted?

At the moment, the NDAS is looking to predict serious violent crime, which means incidents involving a knife or a gun. It will also seek to identify potential victims of crime or modern slavery, but there's nothing to say that the system will stop there. If the system shows itself to be effective, then there's no


telling what other crimes will eventually fall under its radar. The jury is also out on how ethical all of this could prove to be.

Could it lead to false arrests?

Not at this stage. West Midlands Police says it will not be arresting anyone based on the information thrown up by the NDAS, and that is also set to be the case with the other eight forces involved in the project (among them, the Metropolitan Police and Greater Manchester Police, which means the country's three largest forces have taken an interest). Instead, local health and social workers will be dispatched to visit flagged people in the hope of nipping possible issues in the bud. Potential offenders will be offered counselling while those at risk of becoming victims will be contacted either to warn them or make them aware of how to deal with problems they may end up facing.

So what's the problem?

The Data Ethics Group at the Alan Turing Institute in London (www.turing.ac.uk) has been working with the Independent Digital Ethics Panel for Policing (IDEPP) and has praised attempts to develop an

ethically compliant proposal. But it also says the NDAS is "moving law enforcement away from its traditional crime-related role and into wider and deeper aspects of social and public policy". The institute is worried about inaccurate prediction - false positives or negatives - and it has raised ethical issues around surveillance and autonomy. as well as the "potential reversal of the presumption of innocence".

Have the concerns been dismissed?

No. West Midlands Police says it will draw on the advice offered by Turing and IDEPP "to help develop their approach to the ethical governance of the project". A prototype is set to be produced by March 2019, so it's likely to fall under greater scrutiny at that point to see if the ethical concerns have been ironed out.

There are worries that certain people are likely to be targeted even if they have never committed an offence, and there is no way that anyone can truly foresee whether or not a person may tread down a slippery path. Young black men, for instance, may be disproportionately stopped and searched by the police, and the datasets would reflect that. Machine

SPOTTING FACES IN A CROWD

As well as investigating technology designed to predict the risk of offending, UK police forces have used facial-recognition tools at high profile public events, including the Notting Hill Carnival, a Six Nations rugby match and the UEFA Champions League final in Cardiff in 2017.

The UK's data commissioner Elizabeth Denham is currently looking into the technology, in particular at the lack of a national governance framework. There is concern that it is intrusive and that the artificial intelligence had a 98% false-positive rate when tested by The Met. Yet despite worries about a lack of



transparency and even that the system struggles in low-light conditions and with large crowds, automated facial recognition continues to be used.

learning could pick up on such records and reinforce the bias.

Surely the data just needs 'cleaning'?

Yes, it does, and there are companies that do this: Chorus Intelligence (chorusintel.com) works with 85% of police departments as well as counterterrorism and Home Office immigration enforcement units to clean data to evidential standard. But bias tends to find a way through and similar systems in other countries have shown this to be an issue. It points towards the need for ultra-clean data as well as clear training for the police officers recording the information.

So the UK isn't the only country pursuing this?

Not at all. Predictive policing systems are gathering pace and many companies have sprung up to provide software. Dating-mining company Palantir (www .palantir.com), for example, worked with the New Orleans Police Department and developed a system that analysed social media, traced people's ties to gang members and charted criminal histories in order to identify those affiliated with notorious gangs such as the 3NG and the 39ers. Chicago's police, meanwhile, developed an algorithm-based "heat list" that identified people most likely to be involved in a shooting.

But what about people with no history?

Focusing on people who have already had a brush with the law, or those who are affiliated with someone else who has, is always going to throw up dangers. There's a chance police will come to rely too heavily on Al-powered predictive

policing and that people unknown to them will slip through the net. Cashstrapped forces may also reduce their presence or concentrate too heavily on particular locations to the detriment of others. In the case of Chicago, it was found that police used the system to target people for arrest rather than to provide social assistance. What's more, the city's murder rate pretty much remained the same.

Could AI-powered policing also affect sentencing?

Maybe, although not in the UK for the foreseeable future. In Pennsylvania, there's a proposal for a criminal-justice algorithm that predicts the risk someone poses to public safety. Again, there are worries that it will lead to racial bias since nine times more black people are imprisoned in that particular American state but it could potentially lead to someone receiving a higher sentence based on attributes as wide-ranging as age and employment, as well as criminal record. That said, the idea is to keep lower-risk criminals out of jail to reduce costs

Don't let unfair geographic restrictions block your access to great stuff on the web. **Robert Irvine** explains how a VPN lets you download, stream and enjoy whatever you want

ou probably already know about the privacy and security benefits of using a VPN, but here's a quick recap, anyway: they keep you anonymous online, they encrypt your data and they protect you against hackers and other security threats. But VPNs aren't just for serious, sensible purposes; there are lots of fun things you can do with them, too.

Because a VPN lets you pretend that you're in another country, it's the ideal tool for accessing content that's blocked in the UK for geographic, political or licensing reasons. Although browsing with a VPN is noticeably

slower than over a standard connection, being able to circumvent unreasonable restrictions far outweighs that minor inconvenience.

In this feature, we reveal the best things you can only download, stream and access using a VPN, from forbidden videos and unavailable apps to websites that can only be viewed in a specific country. We also show you how to use our favourite free VPN.

Don't forget that VPNs themselves are completely legal to use - in this country, at least - but they should never be used as a shield for conducting illegal activities.

DOWNLOAD AND STREAM TV SHOWS AND FILMS


Full-length movies on YouTube

Full-length films on YouTube tend to fall into one of three categories: official releases you have to pay for, unofficial uploads in terrible quality and unknown titles that used to sit on the shelf of your local video shop and no one ever rented. So we were pleasantly surprised last November when YouTube added more than 100 'proper' movies for users to stream for free (bit.ly/ytfree466), including Four Weddings and a Funeral, The Terminator, Legally Blonde, Dirty Rotten Scoundrels and several classic Pink Panther flicks. Sadly, clicking these films only displays the message: 'Video unavailable. The uploader has not made this video available in your country'; nor any country, it seems, aside from the US.

Happily, with a VPN installed, you can bypass this unfair geo-restriction and not only stream *Throw Momma From* the Train, All Dogs Go to Heaven and more, but download them, too, using a free tool such as 4K Video Downloader (bit.ly/4kdownload466). Just set your VPN to a US server, copy the video link from your browser and choose a file format and quality. Your encrypted connection will then let you download the film to watch offline. On the downside, all the free movies are supported by adverts and some have as many as nine ad breaks interrupting your viewing.

Free entertainment on Sony Crackle

So many streaming services now compete for our custom that you'd assume one that offers free content must be full of rubbish. That certainly isn't the case with Sony Crackle (www.crackle.com), which is available in America, Australia and (via subscription) in many Latin American countries

(it closed in the UK in 2014), and offers hundreds of high quality Sony films. These include Fight Club, Groundhog Day, The Da Vinci Code and Saturday Night Fever, as well as TV shows such as Married With Children and Seinfeld.


Crackle can be streamed to Android and iOS devices, games consoles and smart TVs, as well as your desktop browser – and it's completely free.

Go to the website in your browser and you'll be told that "unfortunately, we're not available in this region", but with your VPN set to an American server, you can watch whatever you want on Sony Crackle. Just be prepared for ad breaks every 10-15 minutes, which support the free service.

Streaming video from Facebook Watch

Facebook's YouTube rival, Watch (www facebook.com/watch) launched in the UK last August, a year after its US debut and with little of the latter's quality content. Whereas American Facebook users can now enjoy every episode of Buffy the Vampire Slayer (see last issue's What to Watch Online), video highlights when we visited the British site included 'How to Make Homemade Butter' and a dog singing a Whitney Houston song on Belgium's Got Talent.


You can see what's streaming across the pond by accessing Watch via a US server in your VPN, although you may need to create a new account with the social network (Facebook knows exactly who you are and where you live!). It's also possible to download videos from Watch by copying their links to Savefrom.net (en.savefrom.net), although this only works with content uploaded by users, not (presumably DRM-protected) official series.

Live TV shows on Australian channels

Most people use a VPN to access American TV shows, but if yours offers servers in Australia (most paid-for VPNs do, but free ones don't), you can discover what's on Down Under. Most Australian TV channels are streamed online for free, but only to Aussies; a



VPN lets us Poms tune in, too. Visit the ABC TV website (www.abc.net.au/tv) for news and entertainment channels from the Australian equivalent of the BBC; 7plus (www.7plus.com.au) for films, documentaries, reality shows and more; and 9Now (www.9now.com.au) for content from Australia's most popular TV network. There's also an Australian version of Freeview (www .freeview.com.au) that brings together all the free channels in one place. You'll be surprised how many UK shows, US imports and Aussie versions of British formats appear across the channels, as well as plenty of original Australian programmes. Neighbours is now on 10 Peach (tenplay.com.au), in case you're wondering.

Torrent files anonymously

BitTorrent is best-known as a way to download music, TV shows and films,

but torrents also have plenty of legal uses, including peer-to-peer sharing of massive files, downloading Linux distros, getting huge updates for games and grabbing non-copyrighted content from the Internet Archive (archive.org). The downside is that torrents don't shield your IP address or details of the content you share, and downloads are monitored by torrent trackers that over time can amass plenty of information about you.

You can protect your anonymity while torrenting by using a VPN - however, there are some caveats. Some services, especially free ones, leak your data and expose your IP address, while others - such as those based in Five Eyes countries - willingly pass info about your activities to the authorities. Certain VPNs forbid torrenting outright, because of the strain the heavy traffic places on their servers, and bear in mind, too, that torrent files can be very

large, so a free VPN with a tight monthly limit (TunnelBear gives you only 500MB) won't be much use.

For this reason, if you hope to do lots of anonymous torrenting, you should ensure that the VPN allows it before you sign up. Web User favourites NordVPN (nordvpn.com), ExpressVPN (www.expressvpn.com) and Windscribe (windscribe.com) all give torrents the thumbs-up. NordVPN proudly proclaims itself the 'Best VPN for P2P', and even provides step-by-step instructions for configuring BitTorrent clients, while Windscribe usefully highlights servers that shouldn't be used for peer-to-peer file sharing – all others are fine.

Another advantage to using a VPN is that you can access torrent sites that ISPs block in the UK, such as The Pirate Bay. Indeed, a VPN will even prevent your ISP from detecting that you're torrenting at all.

DOWNLOAD BLOCKED AND UNAVAILABLE CONTENT

Mobile apps unavailable in the UK

Some new apps, and new features in existing apps, aren't made available in the UK at the same time as other countries – the US usually gets them first but India's often ahead of us in the

queue, too. Recent examples include the new Live Albums feature in Google Photos, which automatically creates albums featuring specific people or pets; Facebook's Messenger Kids app, which lets parents control their children's text

> and video chats; YouTube Go, the 'lite' version of the videostreaming service; and the similarly cut-down Twitter Lite, which is "available in 46 countries", but not this one.

These apps won't show up when you search for them in the UK Google Play or Apple App Stores, and if you follow a direct link to one you'll be told, rather snottily, that it's "incompatible with all your devices" – as if you're to blame! You can download these forbidden apps, and access withheld features, by using a desktop or mobile VPN to fool the app store into

thinking you're in a compatible country – just choose a VPN server in the US, India or wherever. If you already have the app installed, and want to try the geo-restricted new option, uninstall it and re-download it through your VPN.

Windows apps that you can't get in the UK

Microsoft hasn't persuaded us to completely abandon traditional software in favour of desktop apps, but there are plenty of good ones available for Windows 10, spanning everything from entertainment and shopping to security and system tools. Occasionally, however, you'll read about an app that isn't available from the UK Microsoft Store, and while switching to the US one may appear to solve the problem, when you click Get you'll be stopped in your tracks. So much for 'universal' apps!

Setting your VPN to a US server allows you to install Windows apps from

the US store, which aren't supposed to be available to UK users. Bear in mind that if you download an app for a US subscription service such as Pandora, Hulu or HBO Now, you'll also need to create a fake US account and provide payment details. See our boxout on page 45 for more information.

The latest updates for your Android device

When Google releases a new version of Android, its own devices – such as its Pixel phones – are invariably first in line, while everyone else has to wait for their handset's manufacturer to issue the update. The new Android version is then gradually rolled out across the globe, with some countries receiving it well before others. Recent figures reveal that most Android devices are still running Marshmallow (version 6) or Nougat (7), but if you're tired of waiting for the update to 8 (Oreo) or want to try for Pie, there's a chance that a VPN can help.

Install a VPN app on your phone and choose a server in a country that's likely to be ahead of the UK for Android updates, such as the US, Canada, India, Japan or Taiwan. Go to Settings, 'About phone' and tap 'System updates' to check if a change in location triggers the download you desire.

HOW WE DOWNLOADED

To test our tips for downloading forbidden videos, streaming georestricted content and accessing blocked websites, we used the free VPN Windscribe (windscribe.com). Not only did this save us a few bob after an expensive Christmas, but it's arguably the only free VPN worth bothering with.

Whereas similar free tools limit the amount of data you can use and only provide a few servers, Windscribe gives you a generous 10GB of bandwidth each month and access to fast servers in 11 countries. Unusually

for a free VPN, that includes the US (East, West and Central) and Windscribe's new Build A Plan option lets you add another location for just \$1 (80p) per month, including Windflix US for streaming US Netflix.

We used the lightweight
Windscribe app for Windows (see
our Mini Workshop, below), but it's
also available for Mac OS, Linux,
Android and iOS, and as a Chrome
and Firefox extension. If you need
more data and servers, you can
upgrade to the Pro version for as
little as \$4.08 (£3.22) per month.

You can also try this trick on phones that run custom versions of Android, such as OxygenOS on OnePlus phones.

Games that haven't yet been released in the UK

Games that are expected to prove popular often receive a staggered release across the world to prevent servers from being knocked offline by demand. For example, last November, Fallout 76 was launched at one minute past midnight in most countries, which meant that gamers in Sydney could play it 16 hours before their counterparts in New York. Similarly, Pokémon Go – the most-downloaded mobile game of 2016 – was released in the US, Australia and Germany well before being 'rolled out' to the rest of Europe.


If you're unwilling to wait hours, days or even weeks to get stuck into an exciting new game, use your desktop or mobile VPN to jump the queue by pretending to be in an early-bird country. Check the game developer's website and social feeds to see if they've posted a 'rollout schedule', as Bethesda did with Fallout 76.



Content on websites blocked by GDPR

First, virtually every website you visit now nags you to review its privacy policy and allow certain cookies (or at least it should do, under GDPR); and second, some US sites either can't (for business reasons) or won't (for stroppy

ones) comply with GDPR, so they've blocked access from the EU altogether. The Los Angeles Times, New York Daily News and Chicago Tribune are three notable examples, while other sites now offer

stripped-down versions to EU visitors.


You can beat both these annoyances by using your VPN to pretend you're not in the EU, at least until Brexit makes that fiction a reality. Choose a US server and not only will you not be pestered about privacy policies, but you'll also be able to access all content on American sites unhindered. Although this could leave you open to unregulated data gathering, the anonymity granted by your VPN will protect you against that, too.

Content on UK sites while abroad

The most popular reason for using a VPN in the UK is to access content that's restricted to the US, but it's just as useful to have one when you travel abroad. You'll be surprised how many British sites aren't available from overseas, while global online stores will

redirect you to local versions and streaming services will limit you to the library for that region. In countries where the internet is censored, such as China, Vietnam and Russia, you may not even be able to access Facebook, Twitter and certain Google tools.

Fortunately, if you're feeling homesick, you can use your VPN to access your favourite British sites and services as if you were back in Blighty. Just choose a UK server from the options available. Note that BBC iPlayer now makes you sign in to stream and download shows, but your account doesn't disclose your real location – when we logged in with our VPN set to a US server, it assumed we were outside the UK.

DOWNLOAD AND COMMUNICATE SECURELY

Download securely on public Wi-Fi

Common sense dictates that you should always be careful when browsing and downloading over a public Wi-Fi hotspot. If a hacker gets between you and the connection point, they can not only access your sensitive information, including emails, passwords and card details, but easily install infected software on your laptop or mobile device. Some hackers even attack the hotspot itself, so that a pop-up window appears offering you a free upgrade to a popular program, but which actually installs malware when clicked.

Using a VPN to read the news, watch TV or check Twitter seems like overkill,



but if you're planning to download software, install updates or receive sensitive files while out and about, then a VPN is essential. It lets you download securely and anonymously, and even if a hacker manages to intercept your connection, all your data will be encrypted.

Access files on your home network

You undoubtedly have lots of important files stored on your home PC, which you may sometimes need to open, view, edit, print or delete when you're away. You can achieve this by setting up your home router to allow remote access to your local network, but for security reasons it's wise to combine the remote connection with a VPN, so that no-one can intercept and steal your files.



Check to see if your router offers a built-in VPN for accessing your files remotely

Some high-end routers feature built-in VPN servers, which you can usually activate via the Advanced settings in their web interfaces: to access this, type 192.168.0.1 or 192.168.1.1 into your browser's address bar, press Enter and sign in with your username and password. If yours doesn't, you can set up port forwarding on the router to send incoming network traffic to a computer running VPN software. The downside is that this device will need to be constantly on, but all your data will be encrypted so that files you access remotely are unhackable. Check the help pages for both your router and your VPN to find out how to set up port forwarding for that particular device and service.

Chat more privately and cheaply on Skype

There are lots of good reasons to use a VPN when you're chatting over the internet using Skype. Not only does it encrypt your voice and video calls - and any files you share - against eavesdroppers, but it also lets you use the VoIP service in countries where it's blocked (such as the United Arab Emirates), and even improves the clarity

FAKE YOUR ACCOUNT INFO

Some services accessed via a VPN require you to register to use them, and you may need more than an email address and password. If signing up requires details such as a postal address and phone number, you can copy convincinglooking data for the country you're pretending to be in from the fantastic Fake Name Generator (www.fakenamegenerator.com).

For US sites, choose American from the 'Name set' menu and United States as the country, to get a full fake profile including address, zip code, phone number and disposable email address.

One problem you might encounter when signing up overseas is entering acceptable payment information. Sharing your real debit or credit-card details might give the game away, while PayPal officially forbids the use

of VPNs to access its services. You can get around this problem by using Blur (dnt.abine.com), which lets you create secure virtual cards while masking your real details, so you can pay for subscriptions without arousing suspicion.



and quality of your communication. Skype itself says that "we recommend the use of VPNs to separate voice from data traffic, and as part of an overall Quality of Service optimisation" (bit.ly/ skype466), while ExpressVPN has an article on its website entitled 'Use a VPN to Unblock Skype' (bit.ly/express466).



Combine a VPN with Skype for clearer, cheaper and unrestricted internet calls

Best of all, combining a VPN with Skype can save you money when you call someone in another country. Rather than paying steep international rates, you can choose a VPN server in the same region as the person you want to chat to and reduce the cost of your Skype credit to a local rate.

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Best apps to clean up your photos

Photos are one of the biggest space-stealers on any smartphone, with duplicate images and blurry snapshots taking up vital storage. **Steve Clark** cleans up his act with the best free photo cleaners for Android

When you first run the app, it quickly analyses your gallery and searches for 'unwanted photos'.
Once that's done, press the pulsing Show Results button to delete unnecessary images, boost memory-sapping apps and remove all those games you never bother to play. The quick-access boxes on the home screen trigger specific cleaning actions, including photo clean-up – so you can just jump in and take a look at where you can save even more space.

Navigation is child's play, marred only by large banner ads between each section that are too easily tapped by mistake: scroll down to see screenshots, duplicates and bad, old or optimisable images, all of which can be reviewed and cleaned with a tap. One of AVG Cleaner's quirkier features is 'Photos for

Review', which pulls together pictures that it deems below par. You can decide whether you want to keep them or not by swiping left or right. The built-in Smart Photo Cleaner then learns from your choices, promising better recommendations in future.

Unless you're tapping the screen with your eyes closed, it's nigh-on impossible to accidentally delete a precious photo. The app repeatedly prompts you to connect your Dropbox, Google Drive and OneDrive accounts, and stores

original photos there before commencing space-saving compressions or deletions.

How it can be improved:

We'd like to see more cloudstorage services added, outside the 'big three'. To the careless eye, ad buttons appear to be part of the app, which seems a tad sneaky, but at least we were only subjected to a few upgrade nag-screens. Be aware that you need to grant additional usage permissions for tools such as the ultra-deep clean. This isn't necessarily a problem, but we'd rather AVG explained more clearly what it needs and why.

OUR VERDICT

No app is faultless but AVG Cleaner comes close. It's a delight to use and comes packed full of features that go beyond merely tidying up your photos folder. The ads are a bit annoying but a fair price to pay for free apps. We'd love a dedicated photo-management spin-off.

Android photo cleaners

Nox Cleaner | bit.ly/nox466 | ★★★☆

What we liked:

Three taps is all it takes for Nox Cleaner to detox your smartphone: select, execute,

confirm. Repeat this until you've whittled down all those unnecessary images and videos cluttering up your device.

Like AVG Cleaner, this is a full optimisation app but the Image Manager, concealed in the Common Features section, is particularly effective. After running a scan, it lets you explore five types of images: similar, screenshots, videos and blurred images can all be deleted; while large images can be compressed to save space.

However, the app's not quite as clever when it comes to spotting similarities. We found that some images declared 'similar' were entirely different to supposed matches, and sometimes had no counterpart at all.

We particularly liked the 'Specified clean' tool. Select a messenger app (WhatsApp, Line and WeChat are



supported) to manage and clean the app's data. This includes photos and videos, helpfully separated into sent and received files.

How it can be improved:

This excellent Image Manager should be front and centre on the home screen, not tucked out of sight. Don't be fooled by Nox Cleaner's 'advert-less' claims: ads appear on the 'Clean successful' screen, although they are non-invasive. It's a shame you can't 'fix' blurry photos instead of just deleting them.

OUR VERDICT

Hiding its star attraction away is the only real design flaw in an otherwise attractive and encouragingly speedy app. The 'Specified clean' will come in handy if you're forever sharing throwaway or backed-up media with friends and family.

Remo Duplicate Photos Remover | bit.ly/remo466 | ★★★★☆





What we liked:

This clever app scans all your photos and spots duplicate and related images.

Depending on the number of saved photos, the initial scan may take a few minutes, but once complete, you can swipe between two lists: Exact and Similar.

Results are grouped into manageable Sets. Using the tick boxes, it's easy to

earmark photos for deletion and control what remains. Alternatively, tap a photo to enlarge it, view metadata or trash it.

Remo also offers a safety net, so you don't accidentally remove the wrong photo. Select your favourite snaps and press the Eye icon to exclude them from any future scans.

In Settings, you can tweak the Matching Level - 100% being an exact match. We found the default setting of 50% was impressively accurate at



catching most similar-looking snapshots.

How it can be improved:

Beyond searching for similar and duplicate images, there's not much going on - you can't even back up images in the cloud before tinkering with them. And don't tap the Home button: it takes you to a

splash screen with no way of returning to your photos list unless you scan your phone all over again.

OUR VERDICT

Remo does one thing incredibly well, and its results are bang-on and easy to use. However, additional, photo-focused features would make it a more attractive tool.

BEST OF THE REST

Duplicate Photos Fixer

bit.ly/duplicate466

Duplicate Photo Fixer is ideal for

quick clean-ups but it's limited when compared to rival apps. Start by selecting a specific folder, tick only camera images or our preferred method - perform a full scan. This won't take too long and it comprehensively found images that



even our top-performing apps missed. In the Settings menu, you can determine whether to search for exact or similar pictures but, frustratingly, not both.

iSweep

Simplicity, so they say, is the ultimate sophistication. Which

would make iSweep the most elegant app on our list. It doesn't even scan your images for duplicates; all it does is let you clean out your entire camera roll by swiping right (to keep) or left (to trash). Elsewhere, you can view images ordered by month,



which offers a level of control over the images you see and swipe.

Files by Google

bit.ly/files466

We're usually fans of Google products, but this photo clean-up

experience feels half-hearted. Mind you, its simplicity makes it a pleasure to use. Choose to free up space and the app scans your phone for duplicated images already backed up in the cloud, or those in messenger apps. It's also handy for moving images from



phone storage to SD card, but otherwise it's in no way a comprehensive clean-up tool.

Make room for massive data in 2019

With downloads getting bigger, Wayne Williams explains how to ensure you have enough space on your devices and don't exceed your monthly data limit

Free up drive space on your PC

If you fail to keep on top of your PC maintenance, your hard drive(s) can easily run out of space. There are lots of ways to free up room, starting with the built-in Disk Cleanup and Storage Sense features. To use Disk Cleanup, type cleanup into the Windows search box, launch the tool and select the drive to clean and the areas to target.

To use Storage Sense in Windows 10, type storage in the Windows search box and press Enter. You can enable Storage Sense here, and have Windows automatically free up space by periodically removing temporary files and emptying the Recycle Bin. Click the 'Change how we free up space automatically' link to manage the settings and choose how often the tool should run. You can also click 'Free up space now' to start a manual clean. You'll be presented with a list of items to be removed and can select the ones you wish to include.

Uninstall large programs you no longer use to make space for new ones

You can free up a lot of space by uninstalling old and unused software. It's worth using the free IObit Uninstaller (bit.ly/uninstall466) for this because it can remove programs, Windows apps and browser toolbars, and clear up junk that the Windows uninstaller leaves behind. You can order the list of installed programs by largest or most recent, so you can quickly see the biggest space hogs and oldest software, and get rid of them.

Compress files before downloading

Many files you download from the web come packaged in Zip or RAR format to reduce their size, but others are only available in their bloated full versions. Thankfully, you can use CloudConvert



CloudConvert lets you compress online files to reduce their download size

(cloudconvert.com) to compress files online before downloading them. On the website, or in the CloudConvert iOS app (bit.ly/ccios466), click the arrow next to Select Files and choose 'Add from URL'. Paste the download link address, then click the Select Format box and choose the compression type you require options include 7z (7-Zip's proprietary format), RAR, TAR and ZIP. Click the Start Conversion button and wait. You can save the file to your device or to cloud-storage services including Dropbox, OneDrive or Google Drive. The free version of CloudConvert limits you to 25 conversion minutes a day, and a maximum file size of 1GB.

Free up space on your phone

If you're running out of space on your Android device, you can use Files from Google (files.google.com) to clear away the clutter. This recently updated app can remove unused apps, large or

duplicate files and lowresolution videos. As a bonus, the app also lets you securely transfer files to nearby friends without using your data allowance, and back up files to the cloud. On an iPhone or iPad, go into Settings, General, iPhone


Storage and free up content there. Alternatively, there's iMyFone Umate (bit.ly/ imyfone466). Install the software on your PC or Mac, connect your iPhone and 'trust' the connection. It will scan your device and tell you how much space can be reclaimed. There's a free trial available, or you can pay \$19.95 (around £15) for a lifetime licence.

Make room for data

Music Quality. For streaming, Automatic (Recommended) is the default, but you can opt for Low or Normal quality. The Download setting lets you switch between Normal (Recommended) and High or Very High. Make sure the Download Using Cellular setting is switched off unless you have an unlimited mobile plan.

Set alerts for data usage

Your mobile network provider should let you check to see how much of your data plan you've used and have remaining at any time, and may alert you if you get too close to using it all. If it doesn't, or you need greater control over the notifications you receive, install My Data Manager (www.mydatamanagerapp .com) on your Android or iOS device. This free app lets you set custom usage alarms, as well as showing you which

apps consume the most data. It monitors how many call minutes and text messages you have left, and the iPhone version comes with a free VPN.

Limit data used by smart-home devićes

Security cameras protect your property and belongings, but they really chew through your data if the footage gets uploaded to the cloud. You can reduce this by only recording when necessary - when you're not at home or when motion is detected. Dropping the resolution is also worth considering, provided the video is still clear enough to make out faces and other distinguishing features.

Other smart devices may use more data than you might expect so it's

important to keep an eye on these. A lot of modern routers provide tools that allow you to see how much data your various connected devices are using, giving you the chance to take action to reduce this in the device's app (if possible). If your router doesn't offer this feature, consider buying a newer one that does.

Reduce the streaming quality of apps

When you're streaming or downloading videos or music on the go, opting for the highest quality available seriously eats into your mobile allowance and available storage. Dropping the quality can make a huge difference to the size, and you probably won't even notice the difference when viewing videos on a smaller screen.

Netflix users can tap the More button in the app, go to App Settings and adjust the video quality there (you can also delete previous downloads). In iPlayer, open the Menu and tap the cog icon. Make sure Higher Quality Downloads is off.

Spotify users can adjust the audio bitrate by tapping the cog and choosing


Music-streaming services usually offer a choice of bitrates to help you keep your data usage to the optimum level, but it's useful to know exactly how much data that means. Spotify's Low, 24 kilobits-per-second (kbit/s) streaming rate works out to around 10.8 megabytes per hour (MB/h), while the Normal rate of 96 kbit/s is 43.2 MB/h. The Very High 320 kbit/s rate will eat up 144 MB/h.

Photos on your smartphone are likely to clock in at around 4MB each, although some can be up to 10MB or more. Videos take up the most space. 720p quality at 30fps will consume 60 megabytes a minute (MB/min), 1080p at 30fps will take up 130 MB/

t......

min and 4K at 30fps a whopping 350 MB/min.

Downloads from video-on-demand services vary in size, but on Netflix, for example, shows are 0.7GB per hour for standard definition, around 3GB per hour for 1080p streaming and 7GB per hour for 4K quality.



Spot and avoid dark patterns

Ever get the feeling you're being prodded, tricked and aggressively persuaded into performing certain actions online? **Steve Clark** investigates how dark patterns manipulate our web experience



WHAT ARE DARK PATTERNS?

Dark patterns are design or interface tricks used by apps and websites to push you towards making certain choices. The term was coined by British designer Harry Brignull (www.brignull.com), who describes them as "a user interface that has been carefully crafted to trick users into doing things, such as buying insurance with their purchase or signing up for recurring bills".

These tricks are how companies force you to do something you may

not really want to do - hand over your email address, for example, or make in-app purchases in a free mobile game.

You don't have to go far to see dark patterns in action. For example, open

your Gmail account. Are those a couple of unread messages in your inbox? Or are they just ads designed to trick the unguarded web user into opening them? Double points if the 'sender' uses the traditional 'Re:'


subject line to fool you into thinking this is in response to an email you've sent.

And that's just the low end of this duplicitous practice.

How do dark patterns work?

Dark patterns are deployed in a variety of ways - from toying with our expectations when we use a website or app to baffling us into submission.

Probably the most famous dark pattern you'll run into is the 'disguised ad'. We've all been tricked by clickbait articles masquerading as news stories

on legitimate sites, but even big names aren't above engaging in this deception. For example, make a purchase on Argos and your confirmation page offers you money off your next order. It looks real, like it's an offer from Argos, but if you look closer you'll see that it's actually a message from a partner website that charges you a monthly subscription for the privilege of receiving this offer.

Then there's the phantom 'X'. When you want to close an unwanted window in your browser, you'll naturally look for the 'X' in the top-right corner. Malicious designers know this, so they foil your expectations by hiding the 'X' elsewhere. The truly devious dark wizards add a second 'X' that, once clicked, opens a new window or takes you to a new site. This means more ad revenue for them and more ads seen by you.

Alternatively, think of a time when you've declined an offer on a website:

typically, signing up means clicking a big, colourful button, while the 'skip this step' or 'not now' option is in faint, plain text. Some sites even include a line such as 'No, I do not want to know the secrets of earning more and living longer' – a tactic known as 'confirmshaming' (bit.ly/confirm466) – guilt-tripping you into reluctantly accepting an offer that draws the eye. You click it reflexively, without thinking. That's what businesses are banking on and their tricks only get more complex and psychologically devilish.

Facebook knows that receiving notifications creates a near-Pavlovian response (bit.ly/notification466). It's part of what keeps us on the social network when we should be doing other things. That's why the site frequently flashes up notifications even when there's nothing to see: it produces an adrenaline buzz. And ask yourself why


those notifications are coloured red (hint: it's not just so they get noticed).

Fear of missing out is another sneaky way sites can trick you into making purchases. Sites including eBay, Etsy and Booking.com aren't shy about telling you how many people are looking at the same product or hotel, and how many have been sold in the last hour. Even when you can see, in black and white, just how many items remain in stock or 'rooms at this price' are available, these 'warnings' still create a sense of urgency and panic. Before you know it, you're waiting on a delivery of 50 VCRs, just because you feared someone else might bag a bargain first.

Not all dark patterns are so nakedly nasty - some are presented as beneficial. That's why subscription services such as Netflix or EA Access set up recurring billing under the guise of making it easier for you to keep watching and playing what you love. Until you finally remember you're paying for the subscription, that is. And while it's easy to sign up (for your benefit, of course), you'll be jumping through hoops for hours just to cancel.

Watch out for 'Friend-spamming', too. Sign up to a social service such as Twitter or Facebook and it'll helpfully let you add people you know based on the contacts stored on your phone or in your email account. Congratulations: you've just furnished an anonymous web giant with your friends' and colleagues' personal data.

If it's any consolation, LinkedIn was fined \$13m for pulling this stunt back in 2015, after using contact details to send phoney invites to the site, apparently from unsuspecting users.

How to spot dark patterns

The first step is knowing the types of dark patterns (bit.ly/dptypes466) that are used by web designers and app developers. This should help keep your digital antenna alert.

Some dark patterns quickly reveal their trickery, but by the time you realise something is off, it's too late. One sneaky example is the 'speck of dirt' or

'hair' displayed in ads on touchscreen devices: wipe it away and you suddenly find you've triggered the ad.

Another successful dark pattern can be found in the PayPal app. Notice that the 'Continue' button loads first and in the time it takes



Flick that hair away. The ad designer knows you want to

for you to press it with your thumb, it's been nudged down the screen by an ad, which is what your screen-tap registers. That isn't your internet being slow - it's nefarious design. Always ask yourself: What's in it for them?

How to avoid dark patterns

With so many different kinds of dark patterns designed to lure you down murky paths, there's no silver bullet. The obvious place to start is by installing an ad blocker to kill off disguised ads. uBlock Origin (bit.ly/ublock466) is a reliable filtering extension that works

with most browsers.

Next, take your time and stay vigilant. Most dark patterns rely on you rushing and not paying attention. Companies take advantage by using misleading language and confounding expectations, so read what you're signing up for and double-check that you're clicking or ticking the right boxes. Beware of businesses that aren't above using 'opt-in' boxes on one page, only to switch to 'opt-out' on the next.

Set your own reminders to cancel free subscriptions before that automatic charge kicks in. And don't be fooled by online stores prompting you to spend extra to get free delivery, when delivery wouldn't cost as much in the first place.

Additionally, you should turn down your computer's volume. We all know that TV ads used to be louder that the programmes (until Ofcom made the practice illegal in 2012). However, YouTube, having normalised the sound for all its videos, has long engaged in boosting the volume of its ads to get your attention.

MASTER OF THE DARK ARTS

Amazon is undoubtedly the master of the dark pattern. It starts with those pre-ticked boxes that trick you into subscribing to its Prime delivery service. The same service that offers a recurring subscription, and the words 'No thanks' in minuscule letters elsewhere on the page.

For one of the worst examples, try to close down your Amazon account for good and you'll find yourself in an intricate labyrinth of madness. You'd think it would be in account settings. It's not. Instead, you'll tour multiple help pages without guidance, leading to an Amazon chat box where someone else will - eventually - close it for

you. And don't even think about searching the pages for it because the option isn't there.

You can buy a Kindle in one click, but closing your account takes around 50. It's all part of Amazon's masterplan and a sign of its expertise in the art of dark patterns.

Build a more powerful desktop

SideSlide is a highly configurable workspace tray and program launcher that helps keep your desktop better organised. Here's how to use it

e last took a look at SideSlide two years ago: since then the software has been refined and updated, and the interface has been improved. The program features a floating workspace, which can be placed anywhere on your desktop and used to store shortcuts, files, folders, bookmarks, notes, reminders, news feeds and more. Everything is neatly sorted into resizable windows and the workspace can be hidden away at any edge of your screen, sliding back into view when you hover your mouse over it. The program also comes with a Keyboard Launcher that lets you quickly open items or websites, and you can access favourites via the Speed Launch menu.




Launch SideSlide to make the workspace appear. You can move it anywhere on screen by clicking and dragging its title bar. 1 To resize the workspace, move your cursor to the corner or edge of the window, then click and drag the handles. 2 Double-clicking the title bar maximises the workspace.



The workspace provides direct access to your Windows user account folder, as well as the Documents, Pictures and Programs folders, and the desktop. 1

Double-click a location to open it in File Explorer. You can also interact with the ready-made containers – two news feeds and a welcome note. 2






Hover over the coloured square at the top of a container (or click the container itself) 1 to expand it. When you move your mouse away, it will shrink back down again. You can click and drag a minimised container around the workspace 2 and drag an expanded one to the desktop.



Control where on the screen the workspace sits by right-clicking the top-right button 1 to open a menu of potential positions. It can go on any screen edge, 2 and you can collapse it 3 or send it to the centre of the desktop. 4 You can also lock its size and position. 5



5 When not in use, the dock will 'collapse' (hide out of sight). To summon it, move your mouse up to the workspace's location. Right-click an expanded container's title bar to open a menu that lets you attach it to the workspace, 1 dock it somewhere on screen 2 or customise it. 3





Right-click the workspace to add new content, 1 such as a container or folder container, a news feed, a note, a reminder or a shortcut. 2 You can create additional notes (and some other containers) by clicking the plus sign in the item's title bar. 🛂 To add text to your note, click inside it and start typing.



SideSlide has a keyboard launcher you can use to open shortcuts, folders and websites. Right-click inside the workspace and select Keyboard Launcher. Type what you're looking for in the search box, 1 then click the down arrow 2 to narrow searches to a particular folder (Desktop or Documents, for example).



To customise the software, right-click inside the workspace and select Settings (or press F3). There are general settings, **I**dock and containers settings, 2 and shortcut settings. 3 Hovering your mouse over a setting will tell you what it does. The Appearance tab 4 lets you change the look of the program.



Securely sync passwords across all your devices for free



Bitwarden: bitwarden.com | @ 20 mins | Works with most devices, systems and browsers

t's unforgivable when online companies play fast and loose with our security - however, it's our responsibility to make sure that our account passwords are complex and unique. But managing this data - given that you're not supposed to write it down - is nigh on impossible without a password manager. LastPass (www.lastpass.com) is an excellent option, but you have to pay to sync across your devices, while KeePass (keepass.info) is free but doesn't sync.

Now there's a third way. Bitwarden is a brilliant open-source password-management tool that stores your passwords securely in a web-based vault. It can be accessed from all your devices, including computers, mobile devices and browsers.




Andy Shaw says

If your partner or family members are hopeless with passwords, you can ease them into using Bitwarden with shared passwords for family accounts. Passwords are shared via the Organizations tool, which is accessed through the web vault (vault.bitwarden.com).

Setting this up for two people (including you) is free, but expanding it across a larger group via a Family Account costs \$1 (around 80p) per month.




The best place to start is on the web. Go to the Bitwarden website, create an account and log in. You'll need to verfiy your email account. If you have existing passwords stored elsewhere, click the Tools option 1 and select Import Data. 2 Choose the type of file from the drop-down list 3 - it recognises password files from most common tools, including browsers.




Click 'Choose file' (or paste its contents into the box below) and click Import Data. A list of the imported information appears. 1 You can just use the online vault (vault.bitwarden.com) to store your passwords, if you wish. To copy a password, hover over the account to get a cog icon with a drop-down menu 2 and choose Copy Password.



You can now download Bitwarden's apps to any of your devices. See bit.ly/bwdl466 for a full list and to access all the links. You can install it on a computer, 1 get an add-on for your browser 2 or add it to a mobile device (Android or iOS). Start by adding your preferred browser add-on.




Here, we've installed the Chrome add-on from bit.ly/bwch466. It installs an icon next to the address bar and overlays a red padlock icon 1 to show that you need to sign in. Click the icon and enter your master password in hte pop-up. 2 Any accounts relevant to the current tab are displayed.




Go to one of your account's sign-in pages. If there are details held for it in the Vault, you'll see a number superimposed, 11 indicating the number of stored accounts. Click the icon and the account name 2 to automatically enter your login details.




Alternatively, you can right-click in the username or password box, and choose Bitwarden from the context menu. 🗓 This provides further options that let you 'Auto-fill' (as in Step 5); copy the username or password to the clipboard for pasting manually; or generate a new password.




To view everything in your vault, click My Vault. 11 Note that you can also add credit card details and identity information, 2 to help you fill out forms while you're shopping, entering addresses and more. You can also make a secure note [3] if there's something private you want to save for later. Tidy things up by organising them into folders.



The tool also has a password generator, so you can make a new, secure password for each new service you sign up to. Click Generator 🗓 and a new password is created at the top. 2 There are settings you can change below. 3 If you don't like a password, click Regenerate Password. Otherwise Copy Password 4 sends it to the clipboard for pasting.



The mobile apps work in a similar way to the browser add-ons, but you have to set them up if you want to access the passwords in your mobile browser. Install the app for your device from either the Apple Store or Play Store. On an Apple device, open the Settings app, tap 'Passwords & Accounts', tap AutoFill Passwords, turn on AutoFill 11 and select Bitwarden. 2



On Android, open the Bitwarden app, tap the Tools page and choose Bitwarden Auto-fill Accessibility Service or Bitwarden Auto-fill Service, depending on your version of Android. Select Auto-fill Accessibility Service at the bottom. Status Disabled will appear in red. Tap the Open Accessibility Settings button. 🛂 Find Bitwarden and enable it.




Sync Android with Windows 10

ince killing off Windows Mobile, Microsoft has thrown itself into support for Android, adding the entire Office 365 suite and a smartphone-specific Edge browser to the Play Store. It also introduced the Arrow Launcher, which has

since been rebranded as Microsoft Launcher. If you use Microsoft's apps on Windows 10, this Android tool will seamlessly sync almost everything between your phone and PC.

To start syncing across devices, sign into your Microsoft account on your Android device or sign up at account.microsoft.com. Swipe right and tap the circle in the top-left corner, then tap Sign In With Microsoft. 1 Once you're in, tap each 'card' in the Glance feed, to grant the launcher specific permissions.




Tap 'Customise feed' at the bottom of the launcher. Use the switches 11 to add specific 'cards' to your feed: Documents 2 syncs with Word on your PC; Calendar 윌 with Outlook; and Cortana 4 with Microsoft's AI assistant. Tap the arrow for 'Recent activities' 5 to switch on Photo, Video, Documents and Mail.



Tap 'Add widget'. There are default widgets to choose from, but if you use cross-platform apps such as Google Calendar (bit.ly/ gcal466) and many from Microsoft's suite (bit.ly/ msapps466), these will also appear in your list. 11 Once selected, click Create 2 in the on-screen prompt to give the launcher permission to access the data displayed by the widget.



Sign up as a Microsoft Launcher beta tester at bit.ly/msbeta466. This adds Sticky Notes and To Do (bit.ly/todo466) to crossplatform syncing. Switch on each app in 'Customise feed' and tap '+' 💶 to add a note. Tap the circular Sync arrow 🔼 to force synchronisation. Tapping the card expands it to display all your synced notes.



The latest version of Launcher introduces Timeline, which lets you open files, web pages and apps on one device, then continue to use them on another. On your PC, click Start, Settings, then Privacy. In the sidebar, select 'Activity history'. 1 Tick both permission boxes 2 and toggle your Microsoft account to 'On'. B



Back on your phone, swipe across to Microsoft Launcher. Head into the settings by clicking the cards-and-cog icon in the top-right corner, then switch on the Timeline option. [1] You'll now see that the Timeline tab has been added to the main Microsoft Launcher feed.


Explore Vivaldi's new browser tools

pdates to the brilliant Vivaldi browser are coming thick and fast, as the constantly improving software continues to gather momentum. Here, we guide you through the latest tools since last year's launch of version 2.0,

which let you customise the address bar, access your tabs more quickly (even if you've already closed them) and save bespoke collections of tabs for reopening at a later date.





You can select the Vivaldi tabs you'd like to save as a 'session' while keeping everything else open. Ctrl+click the tabs, 💶 then right-click one and choose 'Save x Selected Tabs as Session'. 2 Give the saved session a name. To reopen a saved session, press the Alt key, choose the File menu and select Open Saved Session.



Switch between tabs more quickly by using number shortcuts. Press Alt+W to open the Window menu. 🗓 Open tabs are listed vertically, 🔼 with a number to the left. 2 You can either press the number key of the tab you want or just click it with your mouse.




Sometimes you may want to go back to a previous page but still keep the current tab open. Click and hold Vivaldi's Back or Forward button, 11 then choose the page you want to open using your mouse's middle button. 2 This opens the older page in a new tab so you don't lose vour current place.



One of Vivaldi's best tools is its Quick Commands toolbar, summoned by pressing F2. 11 You can open a recently closed tab by typing its title and pressing Enter. If you can't remember what it's called, type show closed tabs 2 and press Enter. This opens the list of recently closed tabs - just click the one you want to reopen.



You can choose which tools appear in the Address bar (top) and Status bar (bottom). To remove something from either area, right-click it, choose Customize, 11 then Remove From Toolbar. 2 To bring items back again, choose 'Reset Toolbar to Default'.



Any HTML5 video can be popped into a picture-inpicture window, 1 so you can keep watching while doing other things, as long as you don't close the original tab. Right-click a video and look for the 'Picture-inpicture' option. 2 On YouTube, you have to double right-click.

Make your own online photo-storage service

Wayne Williams shows you how to create a personal version of Flickr or Google Photos using an old PC



What you'll need

For this project, we'll be using Lychee (lychee.electerious.com), a free, opensource photo-management tool that can run on either a server (a PC that you set up yourself and add to your network) or a hosted web-space. Depending on your preference, you'll either need a spare PC that can act as your server or a web domain with hosting.


In this project, we'll focus on building

your own photo server. Provided you have a spare PC with a large enough hard drive, it won't cost you anything to get started. You will need to install a copy of Ubuntu Server on the PC (bit.ly/ ubun466) - download either the 18.04.1 LTS (Long Term Support) or 18.10 builds, it doesn't really matter which one you go for. Write the downloaded ISO file to DVD or USB flash drive (use Rufus from rufus.ie for the latter) and boot into it.



There's a live demo of Lychee you can try out at Id.electerious.com

You need to create an account when installing Ubuntu



Install Ubuntu

Boot into Ubuntu Server and, when the installer loads, select your preferred language and keyboard configuration. Select Install Ubuntu and click through the next few screens, then select the option to install the OS on the entire hard drive. This will wipe the drive, so make sure you've backed it up before you start.

Select the drive, click Done on the next screen, then select Continue. Enter your name and a name for your server -Ubuntu-Lychee, for example - as well as a username and password. Click Done and the software will get to work.

Click Reboot Now and press the Enter key when asked. Once it loads, enter your username and password. The server has a text-based interface, but you can install Ubuntu's graphical front end, which also adds a browser that you will need later.

Type sudo apt install ubuntudesktop and press Enter. Type your password, press Enter and type Y when asked if you want to update the package. The installation takes a long time, so be patient. When it's done, reboot and log into the interface, then open Terminal.

Configure Ubuntu and install Lychee

Make sure you follow these next instructions carefully. Misspelling anything, or missing out an element (such as a semi-colon), will mean Lychee won't run. Type cd /var/www/html/ into the Terminal window to get to the directory we'll be working in. Next, install LAMP, which is a software bundle consisting of Linux, Apache, MySQL and PHP. Type sudo apt install lampserver and press Enter. The (found above the number 6 key) is essential here. Press the Y button when asked if you want to install LAMP.

We'll be installing Lychee from GitHub because it's the easiest method. To do this, we first need the Git package. Type sudo apt install git and press Enter. Now we need to gain root (which is like Windows' admin mode). Type sudo — s and press Enter.

To download Lychee from GitHub, type git clone https://github.com/ electerious/Lychee.git and press Enter. It's installed in a 'Lychee' folder and shouldn't take long.

Installing everything requires you to type commands into the text-based Terminal

The next step is to update the permissions of the data and uploads folders. Type cd Lychee, press Enter, then type sudo chmod -R 777 uploads/data/and press Enter again.

The next step is to set up MySQL, which provides the database for Lychee. Type mysql secure installation and press Enter, then create a password. You'll be asked a series of questions relating to security. After you've entered your responses, you need to log into MySQL. Type mysql —u root —p, press Enter, then type in the password you created earlier. You won't be shown the password as you type, but the keypresses are being registered.

The prompt changes to mysql>. Type create database lychee; to create the Lychee database. Next, set up a user (called lycheeadmin) by typing: GRANT ALL PRIVILEGES ON lychee . * TO lycheeadmin@'localhost' IDENTIFIED BY 'password' WITH GRANT OPTION; replacing 'password' with your actual password. Press Enter, type flush privileges; and press Enter again.

To quit SQL, type; and press Enter, then type exit and press Enter again.

Install PHP by typing sudo apt install php7.2-* and, after pressing Enter, type:

sudo apt install git php-cli php-gd php-mysqlnd php-curl php-json php-zip php-exif php-session php-mbstring


Press Enter, then create a configuration file by typing: touch /etc/apache2/ sites-available/lychee.conf

Now open it in the Nano text editor by typing: nano /etc/apache2/sitesavailable/lychee.conf

WHAT YOU CAN DO WITH LYCHEE

Lychee provides an attractive interface that lets you upload, move, rename, describe, delete or search through and share your photos. You can view thumbnails of your images or enjoy them full screen, and either keep them private for your own personal use or share them with the world. Because it's a self-hosted solution, you don't need to worry about data breaches or your photos getting accidentally wiped.

There's no storage limit, no

compression, and it fully supports EXIF and IPTC metadata, such as the format and resolution of your photos, so you (and anyone else you share it with) can see it at a glance.



Press Ctrl+O to save it and press Enter. Now that everything is installed, we just need to set up Lychee.

Find out your server IP address by typing ifconfig into Terminal, pressing



Find out details about an image, such as its size, format and resolution

Enter, and making a note of the number returned towards the top. Open your web browser and go to http://ip-address /Lychee, replacing 'ip-address' with your actual IP address.

In the login box that opens, type lycheeadmin as the username, and the SQL password you set up earlier as the password. If everything has worked properly, you'll be presented with a box that lets you enter a new username and password for the installation. Lychee will load, ready for you to add some content - see our Mini Workshop below.

PHP and other problems

We've found Lychee and the associated packages can be a little problematic at times. You might find, for example, that the php.ini file takes exception to you loading images if they're particularly large, in which case you'll need to tweak the settings. It may also be that the software requires additional or updated PHP extensions. Click the Settings cog in the top-left corner of Lychee and open Diagnostics. That will show you which areas, if any, require attention.




MINI WORKSHOP | Add your photos to Lychee



The first time you run Lychee, you're presented with four albums -Unsorted, Public, Starred and Recent. They're all empty at this point, so the next step is to add some images. Click the plus sign in the top-right corner 2 to open the upload menu.



The menu lets you upload images from your computer or from a connected USB drive. Browse to the location you want in the File Upload tool, 🚺 select it and click Open. 🔼 You can also pull images from a web link or import them from Dropbox (you'll need to set this up) or a server.



Create a New Album from the Add menu. Right-clicking a photo's thumbnail [1] lets you star, tag, rename, duplicate, move or delete it. 2 Select Move to display the available destinations. Click one to send your chosen image to it. Clicking a photo opens it.

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

Give your eyes a rest by mastering dark mode on your PC, phone and tablet

Enable the dark mode in Windows

he standard display mode for
Windows uses a light background
with black text. Dark mode swaps
this for a dark background with white text,
which is designed to be easier on the eye,
particularly at night time, although some
people like to use it all day long. Before
last October's update, dark mode was
limited to Settings and a few other apps.
Now, it's been extended to more apps and
Explorer supports it, too.

Open the Settings app (Windows+i) and click Personalisation, then Colours on the left. In the 'Choose your default app mode', choose Dark. It doesn't work everywhere, but support is growing with each update and an increasing number of apps now switch to dark mode, including News, Calendar, Mail, Store, Weather and People.



Windows 10 dark mode is expanding to other apps, such as Explorer

Dark wallpaper, colours and themes

As well as selecting the dark theme for Windows, you might also want to set a dark desktop, colour scheme or theme that's easy on the eyes. Search sites such as Pixabay (pixabay.com) for 'night sky', 'night forest' or 'dark background'. Save the image to your hard drive, then find the file in File Explorer and right-click it, selecting 'Set as desktop background'.

Open Settings and click
Personalisation, then Colours. On the
right, under 'Choose your colour', select
'Automatically pick an accent colour
from my background' and choose one of
the darker colours from the palette. For
more options, scroll down and click
'Custom colour'.

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

Click Themes on the left, then 'Get more themes in Microsoft Store'. 'Call of the Raven', Meteor Showers, Dark Skies and Warm Winter Nights all use dark colours. Click a theme thumbnail, then click the Get button to install it.

Make YouTube dark

YouTube's dark theme, which displays a dark background with white text, enhances the look of videos, making them look more cinematic when watching in normal browser mode. It doesn't affect full-screen mode, which always uses a dark background anyway.

To enable the dark theme, click your account picture in the top-right corner of a YouTube page, then click 'Dark theme' to switch it

from Off to On. You can switch back using the same menu.

YouTube dark mode works on iOS and now Android devices, too. Tap your account picture in the corner of the YouTube app, tap Settings and enable 'Dark theme'. It looks great and, on some devices, uses less battery power, too.

Even darker YouTube

If the white text in YouTube's dark theme means it's still not dark enough for you, try the Windows 10 app Turn Off The Lights, which is available from the Microsoft Store. It makes YouTube even darker by dimming the white text. The app lets you open YouTube (and Facebook) to watch videos. Click the three-dot icon at the top for a menu from which you can turn on the dark theme. When you're watching a video, you can click the lightbulb icon at the top to dim everything but the video window, toning down the white text to make it less distracting.



Darken everything except the video you're watching with Turn Off The Lights

Darken Facebook and Google

Facebook doesn't have a dark theme. but the Chrome add-on Dark & Night Theme for Facebook (bit.ly/dntf466) will do the job. Install it and go to the Facebook website, then click the moon icon in the toolbar and hover your mouse over the five dark themes. Click the one you like most.

There's a similar Chrome add-on called Dark Theme for Google, which you can download from bit.ly/dtgo466. This applies dark themes to various forms of Google search.




This add-on gives Facebook a dark mode - there are five to choose from

Dark mode on the go

Phones and tablets don't usually have their own global dark mode settings. Instead, they rely on them being built into individual apps by their developers. To see if an app has a dark mode, check

its settings.

Google News shows other apps how it should be done. Open the app, tap your account picture in the top-right corner and press Settings. Tap 'Dark theme' and choose from four options that enable the dark theme all the time, never, automatically or when your device is in battery-saver mode. The automatic



The Google News mobile app has a range of dark mode settings

option switches on the dark theme both at night and whenever the battery is low.

Amazon Kindle has light and dark themes in the app, but books are set separately. Open a book, tap a page, press Aa, tap Color and choose black. In Google Play Books, tap a page, then Aa, press the cog icon and select black.

Microsoft News has a dark theme switch in the app settings. For Twitter, tap your profile picture and enable 'Night mode'. In Android Messages, tap the three-dot menu and press 'Enable dark mode'. It's worth checking your other favourite apps to see if they have their own dark mode.

Schedule Windows dark mode

The Windows Auto-Night Mode app (available from GitHub at bit.ly/

wanm466)

lets you set light or dark mode at specific times of the day. Run it and select the 'Change automatic' option, then



Set a time of day to switch from Light to Dark mode

choose the times you want to trigger the switch, such as 7am and 5pm. Click Apply.

Dark mode Registry hacks

Windows is put in dark or light mode by a Registry setting. Open the Registry Editor by pressing Windows+R, then type regedit and press Enter. Go to:

HKEY_CURRENT_USER\Software\ Microsoft\Windows\CurrentVersion\ Themes\Personalize

On the right is AppsUseLightTheme, which is set to 1 when light mode is selected and 0 when dark mode is active. Double-click

AppsUseLightTheme and set it to 1 or O to see Windows instantly change from light to dark.

Changing this Registry value in a program produces some interesting results. Open Notepad and type the following, all on one line:

New-ItemProperty -Path HKCU:\SOFTWARE\Microsoft\ Windows\CurrentVersion\ Themes\Personalize -Name AppsUseLightTheme -Value 0 -Type Dword -Force

This PowerShell command sets AppsUseLightTheme to 0. Save it to the desktop as DarkTheme.ps1 then

change -Value to 1 and save it as LightTheme.ps1. We will schedule PowerShell to run automatically and change themes based on the time.

Click Start, type task scheduler, then click it in the results. Select Task Scheduler Local and, under Actions, click Create Basic Task. Name it Dark Theme and click Next. Select Daily for the trigger and click Next, then set the time you want dark mode activated, such as 5pm. For the Action, select 'Start a program' and type powershell.exe into the Program box. Enter the following into the 'Add arguments' box:

-ExecutionPolicy Bypass -File C:\Users\YourName\ Desktop\DarkTheme.ps1

This runs the file created in Notepad. Put double quotes around the path if it contains any spaces. Click Next and Finish. Repeat the process and this time create a basic task for the light theme. Set it to run daily at 8 AM and change the path to the LightTheme.ps1 file.

You now have two scripts set to automatically run in the morning and evening that change the Windows mode to dark or light as appropriate.

Use your device's night light


Computer, phone and tablet screens emit blue light which, if you use them at night, can trick your brain into thinking it's daytime, making it harder to get to sleep. Open Windows Settings, System, Display and turn on 'Night light'. Click 'Night light settings' to set an automatic schedule.

On Android, open Settings, Display and look for 'Night light', 'Night mode', 'Reading mode' or 'Blue light filter'. Tapping this may bring up an option that lets you activate it on a schedule, such as from sunset to sunrise.

On iOS devices, go to Settings, Display & Brightness, Night Shift.

> You'll see options for Manually **Enable Until Tomorrow** and Scheduled, which lets you set the hours it will

come on.



Recover a lost hard drive

Yesterday I discovered that I had accidentally wiped 1.5TB of files off my backup drive when I used it for a Linux install to test Manjaro (manjaro.org). I had meant to make a bootable USB but selected the wrong drive. I've lost everything music, Sketchup files, the lot - going back to 2009. Should I try to recover the data myself or pay a professional data-recovery service?

Many recovery tools that find lost files on drives work well but they




Recuva finds and rescues deleted files on a drive

are designed for small numbers of files, not 1.5TB. Recuva (bit.ly/ recu466) and Data Recovery Wizard Free (bit.ly/easu466) are good tools, but this is a huge job and you'll need a second 1.5TB drive to save the recovered files to. It can be done, but it would be easier to use a professional service, if you can afford it.

from the web to try to predict what you want to type as you type it, whether that's a search term, email address, data entered into a form and so on. Windows doesn't store this information.

The email addresses you're seeing when you start typing aren't stored anywhere that you can access, copy and save elsewhere. It's a live search of the emails in your inbox. Each letter typed triggers a search and the results are displayed for you to choose from.

Some email services automatically add people that you email to your contacts but we can't tell whether One .com does this or not. In Gmail, for example, go to Settings and in the General section under 'Create contacts' for auto-complete', select 'When I send a message to a new person, add them to Other Contacts'.

Convert photos to PDF

How do I turn photos into PDFs in Windows 10? I don't want to download any junk software.

You don't need to download anything because support for creating PDFs is built into Windows 10. When printing any file from any application - text or image - the print window lets you select from the available printers. Select the option 'Microsoft Print to PDF' and print as you would normally to a physical printer.

You're prompted to enter a filename and a place to save it to.

An even simpler way is to right-click a file in Explorer, such as a photo, and select Print from the menu. Select 'Microsoft Print to PDF' and you can then choose paper size and image quality. If you select multiple files, you get the option to print one, two, nine or even 35 pictures to a page as a contact sheet of thumbnails. The images are automatically resized to fit.

Where does Windows store the information it holds on email addresses? When I'm in webmail and I start to type an address that I've sent an email to before, a list of addresses appears for me to choose from. Some of the addresses are in my contact list, but is it possible to add the ones that aren't? I use One.com (www.one.com) for webmail but they have been completely useless in answering this query.

Force your display to sleep

I set my laptop to switch off after a certain number of minutes, but it doesn't work and the screen continues to display. I am worried about screen burn (where an image is permanently etched on the screen) and unnecessary battery drain. How do I get the screen to switch off automatically?

Screen burn was a problem with boxy old cathode-ray-tube monitors and early flat screens, but modern screens use a different technology that's more resistant to the problem, so you don't need to worry about that. However, the screen is the main consumer of a laptop's power, so setting

a short timeout and blanking it whenever possible will certainly help prolong your computer's battery life.

Open the Settings app in Windows 10 (Windows+i) and type screen saver in the search box. Click 'Turn screen saver on or off' and, in the window that opens, set the screensaver to '(None)', then click OK. Back in the Settings app, click System and select 'Power & sleep'. Under Screen, set the length of time you want to pass before the screen turns itself off.

The screen display will only turn off after the set time if no activity is detected. Some devices plugged into the computer - such as a printer, scanner, mouse, keyboard, joystick or game controller - can keep the display awake by generating signals or activity, and this may be your problem. Try unplugging all devices to see if the display turns off after the timeout. Plug each device back in one by one, testing as you go, to isolate the culprit.

Run two external monitors from one laptop

I run an extra screen with my HP Pavilion laptop, so I can have my email open on the laptop screen and a spreadsheet on the other monitor. It's great for applying information from one screen to another, without having to open and close windows.

However, I started to notice that switching my focus from the small laptop to the larger monitor was causing eye strain, so I decided to switch to two 27in monitors, using the laptop to operate as the PC but leaving its screen idle. Unfortunately, the laptop has only one HDMI output and I can't figure out how to set up two separate external monitors.

I sought advice from a local PC superstore, where I was told that I would need an external graphics card to support two HDMI outputs. Bizarrely, the superstore doesn't sell this. I've looked

online but all I can find is an HDMI 'splitter', which is no good to me.

The PC superstore is right: you need an external graphics card to drive an extra monitor. This is basically just a dongle that's plugged into a USB port on the computer. A USB 2 device will work, but screen resolutions are limited; a USB 3 device is better because the extra speed and power enables higher resolutions. Try a Cable Matters USB to HDMI Adapter, USB 3.0 to HDMI (£44.99 from Amazon at bit.ly/ cmusb466) or Plugable USB 2.0 to VGA/DVI/HDMI Video Graphics Adapter (£37.95 at bit.ly/plug466). You should be able to run one external monitor from the laptop's HDMI port and the other from the USB dongle.

Downgrade Windows 10 to Windows 7

I had a Windows 7 PC for many years and was happy with it, but it recently developed a serious fault and wasn't worth repairing. I bought a new laptop and, of course, it came with Windows 10. I have tried but I can't get used to it, and would prefer to downgrade to Windows 7, which I am familiar with. Can I do this?

Any operating system can be installed if you have a bootable disc or USB flash drive, and a valid licence. However, there are potential pitfalls with Windows 7. For example, a new computer might use components that

weren't around when Windows 7 was popular, and the PC's manufacturer might only offer drivers for the version of Windows that was supplied with the computer.

Another factor to consider is that Windows 7 support will only be around for another year, after which you might not receive any security or bug fixes. Windows 10, on the other hand, is constantly updated and is more secure than Windows 7 anyway.

We recommend persevering with Windows 10. If you don't like the tiles on the Start menu, right-click them and select 'Unpin from Start'. When they are all hidden, you will be left with just the Start menu itself. Go to Settings, Personalisation, Start to customise the menu and remove or add tools to make it easier to use and more familiar.

Alternatively, you could try Open Shell Menu (bit.ly/opsh466), which makes Windows 10 look and work more like Windows 7. This is a spin-off of the old Web User favourite Classic Shell, which stopped development just over a year ago.

Why can't you contact Amazon UK by email? I have a seller account, which I use to sell secondhand books and CDs, and all I want to know is the URL I need to link to it.

To contact Amazon by email, you have to fill in a form on the website. Go to bit.ly/amaem466 and select the nature of your enquiry from the available options: An Order I Placed; Devices; 'Digital Content and Services'; and 'Prime and more'.

Work through the steps, selecting options that are designed to narrow down the subject of the contact request. At the end is an option to send an email. Type your message in the box and click 'Send e-mail'. Replies will be sent to the email that's registered with your Amazon account.







Word then 'blanks' out what it thinks is the background in a vivid shade of purple. If it's not quite accurate, adjust it using the 'Mark Areas to Keep' and 'Mark Areas to Remove' buttons. This brings up a pencil, so you can shade what you want to keep or crop. Once you're happy, click Keep Changes and your background magically disappears.





Alternatively, in the Search bar, search type:=picture or kind:=picture - it doesn't matter which - to hunt down every image stored on your computer. Now, either select all and drag and drop them into your dedicated Pictures folder - this may take some time - or right-click and select 'Open file location' to see which folder a picture is hiding in.

We can also recommend RegExp Download Organiser (bit.ly/regexp466), a Chrome browser add-on that automatically directs every image you download into a specific Pictures folder within the Downloads folder.



Will 2019 be the year of the cloud PC?

bought a powerful new PC at the end of last year and it only cost me £27! Well, £27 per month, if you're going to be stickler for accuracy. It's powerful enough to run all the latest games, it doesn't take up an inch of space in my office and it's doing no damage whatsoever to my electricity bills (at least, not directly).

In fact, it's not in my house at all. It sits in a data centre just outside Paris. I can access my new PC from any old PC because, just like Netflix, my new PC is streamed over the internet. Once it's running full-screen on my old laptop, it is to all intents and purposes as good as having a new £2,000 PC gracing my office space. It is the future of computing, I'm sure of it.

My new PC came from a company called Shadow (shadow.tech), and that £27 per month buys me a pretty high-end PC with a powerful processor, 12GB of RAM, 256GB of storage and an Nvidia GeForce GTX 1080 graphics card. That spec is regularly upgraded, so you always have the latest hardware, not a computer that's decaying the moment you get it home.

The graphics card is crucial, because

my main computer is a laptop with no dedicated graphics. It's plenty powerful enough for everything, except 3D games.

Instead of going out to buy a desktop PC or an awkward external graphics card to run PC games, I can simply fire up Shadow. If you've got kids or grandchildren begging you to upgrade their PC to play Fortnite, for example, this is a much cheaper way of doing it.

But this Shadow PC offers more than just games. It's a full-blown Windows 10 installation, so it can run everything from Word to professional apps such as Adobe Photoshop. If I need to edit a huge photo, I can take advantage of the Shadow's graphics power and do it in a

> fraction of the time it would take on my laptop.


Shadow simply runs as an app on any of my current computers. It doesn't matter how slow or decrepit

the old computer is, because all the performance is done at the other end in Paris. I can play the latest cutting-edge games on a long discarded, dustencrusted six-year-old laptop, and plug in keyboards, printers, disk drives and other devices to use with my Shadow PC - and there's no noticeable lag.

Of course, you need a fast and stable broadband connection to pull this off any fibre-grade connection should be fine, but you won't get a smooth ride on ADSL. The biggest potential downside is that if your broadband connection goes down, you lose your computer too - but how useful is a regular computer without a broadband connection these

I'm convinced this is the future of computing, not least because Microsoft has fallen head over heels for cloud computing and the subscription models. You may already pay a monthly fee for Microsoft Office and other software, so why not wrap it all up in one price and throw in the PC too?

I'm so sure I know what I'm talking about that if Microsoft doesn't launch its own Cloud PC in 2019, I'll eat my keyboard.







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
