In this issue's cover feature, we look at the






What's New Online

Explore our Moon and hundreds of others

he 50th anniversary of Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin's walk on the Moon may have grabbed all the attention recently, but they're not the only people to have taken such a giant leap. Ten other astronauts have put a boot on the lunar surface, as NASA is now reminding us with the help of imagery specialist Warren Harold.

Harold has combined images taken by the Apollo astronauts to produce a stunning set of lunar panoramas, which you can see on Flickr (bit.ly/flickr481). He has also converted the Apollo 17 panorama into an immersive view on Facebook (bit.ly/facebook481) that gives us Earth dwellers a fascinating glimpse of our nearest celestial object.

Meanwhile, National Geographic (bit.ly/nategeo481) has been busy



studying 200 known moons elsewhere in our solar system. Scrolling down the page takes you on a fact-packed tour that explains each moon's orbit, the distance from its parent planet, geological make-up and more. It even

includes details of scientific interest and missions, with images that you can drag to rotate for a closer look.

Not to be outdone, Google Earth has teamed up with Science Friday to explore NASA's launchpads and look at how the agency is upgrading them for future rockets (bit.ly/earth481).

Test Steam's latest experiments

Steam is one of the most popular gaming platforms, but there's always room for improvement. As such, its owner, Valve Software, has been developing some potential new features and is inviting us to try them out.

So far, the Steam Labs beta includes three experiments. Micro Trailers lets you hover your mouse over a thumbnail of a game to see a six-second snapshot of the action, with options to run multiple trailers at once. Interactive Recommender uses machine learning to examine the games you play, and lets you filter its results by popularity, release

dates and tags.




The final experiment is an automated half-hour programme generated from snippets of new and popular games as a way of encouraging you to discover something new. This one can be a little tiresome, but the point is that you can leave feedback to help Valve decide which experiments to include in Steam and which to abandon.

Discover how web firms handle your data

bit.ly/fsecure481

Most free online services are not really free. The price we pay for using them is the data we share and the privacy we give away. This means it's important to know exactly what data the web companies are collecting, but since



the details are often buried deep within a website, finding out can be a chore.

F-Secure has set up a Data Discovery Portal to make the process easier, and it's entirely free. Visit the site, then click a link for one of the six firms - Google, Apple, Facebook, Snapchat, Twitter and Amazon. This takes you straight to the relevant data and privacy pages on the service itself after all, there's nothing better than hearing this important information straight from the horse's mouth.

There's not much more to it, other than a few tips for protecting your data, but the site gives you a quick way to tighten your security settings.



What's more, the app automatically detects the language you're

pointing at, and Google has improved the accuracy of its translations. Just open the app, tap the camera icon and aim at the text you want to translate.

After its online exhibition of paintings by Vermeer last year, the Google Arts & Culture app has a new virtual 3D art gallery, this time themed around colour. Millions at risk from malicious browser extensions

What happened?

Security experts have warned that extensions for the Google Chrome and Mozilla Firefox browsers may be snooping on your data. Researcher Sam Jadali uncovered the DataSpii leak (bit .ly/dataspii481), in which eight browser extensions used by millions of people were found hoovering up data, including details of the web pages they visited, and their usernames and passwords.

Web page URLs may not sound like much of a security breach, but their interception can be serious. Plenty of Google Docs and shared folders have no protection, so anyone with a link can access them. As Jadali explained, someone might share a Microsoft OneDrive folder with their accountant using a link, for example. If hackers intercept the link, they can open an account at Office 365 and access the folder and documents – a serious problem if the documents include tax returns, invoices or other sensitive files.

Information gathered in this way was bundled up by the attackers and sold online to whoever wanted it, Jadali said. Mozilla and Google have removed the offending extensions from their stores and disabled the snooping functions. It's unclear how many of the four million people who installed the extensions were actually targeted by the attackers.

How will it affect you?

Sam Jadali spotted eight problematic extensions: Hover Zoom, Speaklt!, SuperZoom, SaveFrom.net Helper, FairShare Unlock, PanelMeasurement,

Branded Surveys, and Panel Community Surveys.

If you're one of at least four million people who installed a rogue add-on, the first step is to uninstall it. However, you could be affected even if you didn't install one but communicated with someone who did. In that case, there's little you can do. If you're worried that a login has been leaked, it's worth changing your passwords, but unless a friend or family member specifically tells you they used a suspect add-on, there's no need to panic, because the researchers contacted those affected.

Both Google and Mozilla have disabled the data-snooping functions in the extensions and banned them from their add-on stores. However, Jadali said that data is still leaking from the extensions, so make sure you take the time to uninstall them completely.

In general, it's best to install only extensions you know from sources you trust – as you would with apps on your phone. If you want to check that an extension won't snoop on you, install a tool called Chrome Extension Source Viewer. (bit.ly/chrome481). Then, when browsing for extensions, click the viewer's toolbar button while on an add-on's Chrome Web Store page. Click to "view source", find the "manifest .json" file and look for an "unsafe-eval" policy. This indicates that the extension

can execute remote code, which is a serious security risk.

If that all sounds too complicated, try running any Chrome extension through Duo Labs' security checker, CRXcavator (crxcavator.io). Submit the extension's ID number – the long string of letters at the end of its URL – and you'll receive a report revealing any security concerns.

What do we think?

Your browser is at the centre of your web use, so it's essential that it's safe, secure and private. Many extensions are handy tools that bring convenience, and some even enhance your security, but never forget that they have a privileged position in your browser. It can be hard to tell whether an extension is behaving as it should, so think twice before you install them, and ensure you get them only from reputable sources, such as the Chrome Web Store. Avoid installing extensions you don't really need, and help friends and family members who use extensions to manage and delete any they don't use.

Google and Mozilla need to do a better job of monitoring these tools and flagging up potential problems without users having to rely on third-party security checkers or independent researchers such as Jadali. If we can't trust browser extensions, what's the point of them?

What we think of this fortnight's top tech news stories and rumours, and how they affect you

Three won't charge customers for 5G

What happened?

The next-generation of mobile networks has arrived, but they may not cost you any more than the 4G you're using now. Three has promised to roll out its 5G services across all existing packages at no extra cost. This means that if you're a Three customer or you switch to that provider, you'll receive 5G for the same price as 4G.

Three's contracts cost as little as £10 a month for 4GB of downloads. In comparison, the cheapest 5G contract on Vodafone costs £30 a month, while EE's most affordable plan is £32 a month - although it comes with a 20GB data allowance. A comparable package on



Three costs £18 a month.

The latest generation of mobile networks brings faster mobile speeds and greater capacity, especially in crowded areas. It should mean you can get online even while you're at a football match or in other crowded places.

How will it affect you?

One important caveat to Three's offer is that its 5G network will be available only in London from August, although the company says it will expand its coverage to 25 other cities by the end of the year. EE started rolling out its 5G services in May,

while Vodafone followed suit in July. O2's network will arrive in October (see page 10 for details).

What do we think?

While 5G is already an option for Londoners and those in larger cities, most Brits won't have coverage yet. What's more, plenty of phones don't even support 5G. That means there's no need for most of us to rush into upgrading - and no reason to pay extra for it. If your phone supports 5G, you live in an area with coverage and you're tired of waiting for downloads, it may be worth paying more for 5G now. Everyone else is better off saving their money until the service becomes standard.

Sky scares users with password reset email

What happened?

Sky raised eyebrows when it sent a password reset email to its customers, prompting fears of a phishing scam. The email began "Dear Customer," rather than using the customer's name, and included a link to click to reset the password making it look like a dodgy email designed to trick people into giving away their credentials instead of a real security message from a major company.

The message didn't reveal why Sky was asking customers to reset their passwords, simply saying that it was to "keep their account safe". While companies often send

emails advising users to reset their passwords after a data breach, Sky said that wasn't the case here, and that no accounts had been hacked. Security researcher Graham Cluley speculated that Sky had detected dodgy behaviour on some accounts and sought to protect everyone with a reset.

How will it affect you?

If you're not sure who an email is from, don't open it or click any links it contains. If you need to reset a password, go directly to the relevant site and log into your account. That way you can change your credentials without the risk that a criminal may be trying to steal your data. If you click a

link in an email, you could be subject to a "man in the middle" attack, where the hackers sit between you and the real site and can see your new password details.

What do we think?

This appears to be a communication failure on Sky's part. We're all taught to look out for phishing emails, but that advice falls apart if legitimate emails start to look as if they could have come

from criminals. Anyone who was confused by the email should be proud of themselves - well done for being alert to such threats. Perhaps those cautious Sky customers could teach Sky a thing or two about digital security.





02's 5G network won't use Huawei hardware

What happened?

O2 has announced plans for its 5G network, which is due to launch in the UK in October. According to the Spanish-owned operator, its 5G service will initially roll out across London, Edinburgh, Cardiff, Belfast, Leeds and Slough. The company hopes to have the rest of the UK covered by summer 2020.

O2's main priorities for its 5G service will be areas where the current 4G networks are already stretched to capacity. Railway stations, shopping centres and entertainment venues such as the O2 Arena are all earmarked to receive the network boost.

There's a twist, however: unlike the other network providers, O2 won't be using hardware from embattled Chinese manufacturer Huawei, which has been caught up in a bitter dispute over security and privacy concerns. O2's chief executive, Mark Evans, explained the decision, saying "we respect all three operators, they were thorough in their submissions, but we were convinced that the best choices for us at this time are our current partners, Ericsson and Nokia." He admitted that the company may still use Huawei products in the future.

The news follows Vodafone's announcement that it will bring its 5G network to even more cities than first suggested, with Bolton and



Lancaster now on course to benefit from the service.

How will it affect you?

O2 will be the last of the four major mobile networks to offer the next-generation phone service to its customers. EE's launch in May was quickly followed by Vodafone's, while Three's service is due to arrive in August (see page 9). This means that once O2 has adopted 5G, you'll be able to take your pick of the networks.

As we've mentioned before, however, moving to 5G won't be cheap. Not only will you pay a lot more for a 5G contract than you currently do for the slower 4G, you'll also need to stump up for a

5G-enabled phone. O2 has confirmed that Samsung and Xiaomi are among the initial line-up of handsets on offer.

What do we think?

We're glad to see that O2 is finally joining the party, no matter how late. Competition among the top four mobile operators can only be a good thing. Switching to 5G is currently expensive, so we're hoping to see prices fall as each company battles to attract new customers. We're also keen to see the technology roll out in less obvious locations. Despite all the fanfare over 5G, very few places in the UK can currently take advantage of its speed – particularly those that need it most.



Kindle Oasis bit.ly/oasis481

If you're thinking of picking up the all-new Kindle Oasis, you'd better be a keen reader. The device will set you back an eye-watering £230, which would buy you an entire shelf of those old-fashioned paper-based books we all used to read – but it's arguably worth every penny.

As with the rest of the Kindle family, Amazon's new e-reader is lightweight, with plenty of storage space for books, and uses the excellent E ink technology that makes reading from the screen easy on the eyes. The waterproof base model packs a 7in glare-free screen into a shell that measures 6.25in x 5.5in and is just a quarter of an inch thick at its widest point. Inside, it has 8GB of internal

storage, which is more than enough for a typical Kindle book collection.

Two other versions are available, which cost slightly more: 32GB and 32GB + 4G. Both are better options if you download audiobooks from Amazon's Audible, as this requires more storage space. To listen, simply hook up your headphones or speakers via Bluetooth. The Oasis comes in two colours: graphite and gold.

The main selling point of the Oasis is its adjustable light. Unlike the cheaper Paperwhite, which has a fixed backlight, the Oasis can display different shades of light, from white to a pleasant warm amber that's easy on the eyes and similar to the 'reading mode' option in web browsers. The device automatically adjusts the brightness to suit your surroundings, too, so you won't be constantly fiddling with the settings.

Amazon has refined the Oasis to the point of perfection. Ebook lovers are sure to snap it up, because it does everything the Kindle already does so well and then does it even better - although you'd certainly hope so for the price.

It's available to buy now from Amazon. Expect to see the new Oasis top many a Christmas wish-list.





WHAT'S THE RUMOUR

Has Microsoft redesigned the Windows Start menu?

A screenshot showing a redesigned Windows Start Menu appeared online, leading many to wonder if Windows 10 is set to receive a new menu.

According to those in the know, the menu was originally built for internal Xbox development but was accidentally distributed to Windows 10 Insiders who use 32-bit PCs. Twitter user NTAuthority (bit.ly/start481) shared the image.

The alleged menu isn't particularly attractive, with a dull grey background and flat, almost colourless icons. It also seems to have a GIF-search tool tucked inside the emoji picker - so if nothing else it's very 21st century. The most striking aspect, however, is that the new-look Start seems to do away with Live Tiles.

Even with the apparent removal of this controversial feature, reactions to the menu on social media have been overwhelmingly negative. Before we jump the gun, however, it's worth noting that, if the image is genuine, the menu could still be in its early stages of development and so lack the polish of a finished update. Also given that the build was sent only to 32-bit PCs, many have suggested that it's destined for the long-awaited Windows Lite, rather than the full Windows 10 operating system.

This isn't the first time Microsoft has made such an error. In 2017, the company accidentally sent out internal builds of Windows 10 for PC and mobile, which left some devices constantly



rebooting. The team in charge were forced to offer users a recovery tool to get their devices up and running again.

Regardless, it's an embarrassing leak for Microsoft. Dona Sakar, who leads the Windows Insider program. stated that Microsoft was "looking into it". A spokesperson later admitted that "This was an error and we've since pulled the build".



The UK was the biggest global target for ransomware



attacks in the first half of 2019, according to a report by security company SonicWall, with the number of incidents rising 195%.

The report states that there were 6.4 million attacks in the first six months of the year, which the company attributes to a growing preference among criminals for 'ransomware as a service', as well as open-source malware kits becoming cheaper and more readily available online.

While ransomware soared in the UK, malware detections have been falling overall in 2019, following a record-breaking 2018 that saw 10.52 billion attacks worldwide. The US and the UK are still the most attacked nations, but both experienced drops in the number of attacks against them, with the exception of encrypted malware attacks. So far in 2019, researchers have detected 2.4 million encrypted attacks, which is almost the same number detected for the entire year of 2018 (2.8 million). bit.ly/ransom481

Google pays \$13 million for illegal data gathering

Google is set to pay millions of dollars to end a protracted legal battle over allegations of privacy violation through its Street View mapping project.

The search giant's fleet of geomapping vehicles unwittingly collected masses of data from unprotected Wi-Fi connections while roaming the streets. Harvested information included email addresses and passwords, even though Google said it only intended to gather data to improve location-based services.



Google is now expected to pay \$13 million (£10.4 million) to end a privacy lawsuit launched by 22 plaintiffs who were affected by the data harvesting. The debacle came to a head in 2010 when Google admitted it had "screwed up" by accidentally taking the data, but Privacy International accused Google of doing so intentionally.

As part of the settlement, Google promised to destroy any data it still holds, and to teach web users how to better protect their privacy online.

One day you receive a phone call from someone who addresses you by name and introduces themselves as a techlarge software company. They tell you your computer has serious problems that need urgent attention, and that to fix them you must install a special program and give the caller remote access. What could go wrong?

In the best-case scenario, such "support" will pretend to repair your PC and then charge you a fortune. In the worst, the criminals will steal your financial data and try to withdraw money from your bank account.

Generally speaking, you should never give anyone

F Never give anyone who calls out of the blue remote access to your PC 🦊

> you don't know remote access to your PC. Most tech-support reps can solve your problems over the phone or by email.

If someone calls you out of the blue and asks for access to your computer, you shouldn't expect any good to come of it.

Never listen to scammers and never give credence to their threats - feel free to say no. If someone claims to have detected suspicious activity

on your computer, scan it using reliable antivirus software to locate and neutralise malware - if there is any.

Also note the caller's phone number and search for it online to see if you find any information about the criminals on the web. If it's not already listed, you can add the phone number to a database of scam and spam numbers, which may alert other users and help them avoid being tricked by the scammers.

Choose colours that engage your visitors' emotions

You don't have to be a talented designer to build a website but complementary colour schemes certainly help to make a drab site more attractive. Before you roll out the colour wheel, take a look at Eva Design System's semantic colour generator (colors.eva .design). Instead of choosing colours based solely on their relationship to others, this gives



you a range of colours designed to invoke emotions in vour visitors.

Enter the hexadecimal code of your site's main colour and it returns suggestions to use to encourage success, information, warning and danger.

Play a game to learn CSS

CSS is used to make HTML documents look attractive but learning it can be tricky, particularly the different ways in which elements on a page can have CSS assigned to them. CSS Diner (flukeout.github.io) is a wonderfully entertaining game that helps reinforce how CSS achieves this. You'll see a table with plates of food displayed at the top of the page and, at the bottom, you have to type in the correct CSS code to isolate the flashing items. Web-building Helpdesk

I love WordPress but I seem to have to carry out plugin and theme updates every time I visit my site. Is there some way to update them automatically?

The reason why this isn't built into WordPress is because updates can break your site and you don't want that happening while you're not looking. Consider minimising the update process by removing all themes and plugins that you aren't currently using.

If you still want to update automatically, there are a few plugins available that can manage the process. Try Companion Auto Updater (bit.ly/caup481),



which can be set to update both themes and plugins. Make sure you check your site regularly to ensure nothing is broken.



Get inside more criminals' heads in *Mindhunter* Series 2

Netflix confirmed Season 2 of its 1970s-set psycho-killer drama nearly two years ago, before the first season had even arrived in the UK. Executive producer Charlize Theron hinted in May that the second season would arrive this month. Finally in July, director David Fincher revealed during a podcast (bit.ly/fincher481) that eight new episodes would land on 16 August. Cancel your plans this is a binge that's worth staying in for.

Mindhunter skips forward a couple of years from 1977 to 1979 for its second outing. The FBI's criminal profilers Holden Tench (Jonathan Groff, Glee), Bill Tench (Holt McCallany, Fight Club) and Wendy Carr (Anna Torv, *Fringe*) are thrust from their dingy basement onto the world stage, where they must tackle notorious cases including the Atlanta Child Murders and Charles Manson.

This gripping, intelligent show might never have existed without Theron, who gave her friend Fincher a copy of the *Mindhunter* book, a 1995 memoir by FBI criminal profiler John E Douglas (bit.ly/mindbook481).



BritBox to launch in the UK by December

BBC and ITV have confirmed that their joint BritBox streaming service will launch in the UK by the end of December. Subscriptions will cost £5.99 per month for HD streaming, and could be available in the UK as soon as October.

At launch, the service will offer box sets of BBC and ITV programmes, including Broadchurch, Gentleman Jack, Happy Valley, Les Miserables and The

Office. Original BritBox content will follow in the new year.

The news came just a couple of weeks after Ofcom provisionally approved the BBC's plans to extend the iPlayer's default expiry date for programmes to one year. BritBox will offer a much wider range of archive shows than the iPlayer, however - especially if other public service broadcasters such as Channel 4 join the service.

In a statement, BritBox confirmed that the £5.99 fee will cover HD streaming on multiple devices. That compares well with Netflix (£8.99 for HD on two screens), Amazon (£5.99 for three screens) and Now TV (£7.99 for six screens, two of which can play simultaneously).

We test and compare the latest products

Home security cameras

We test the latest security cameras that come with a wealth of features to keep an eye on your home while you're away

othing provides more peace of mind when you're away from home than being able to pick up your phone and have a look at what's happening in your front room. Home security cameras are becoming increasingly sophisticated and all eight of the models we've reviewed in this group test are capable of streaming visuals from a camera at home to the web. They can also alert you if they detect anything untoward going on, and some have lots of handy extra features you can read about below. Prices vary dramatically, from £19.99 to nearly £300, so we've compared them all to see whether the top-of-the-range cameras are really worth the extra cost.

HOW WE TESTED

We set up each camera to see how easy it was to install. We then explored the various tools and options available in the cameras, the software and the online services that come with them. The price, value for money and overall ease of use were also taken into account before coming up with our final verdict.

Google Nest Cam IQ Outdoor | £279 | Buy from Google: bit.ly/nest481

This new outdoor model from Nest is powered by a USB cable, which you can run to the device externally or, for extra security, pass straight to the camera from inside your house, if you're prepared to drill a hole through your wall into the back of the mount. Either way, installation isn't simple but it's more secure than battery-powered models.

The camera uses a 4K sensor but only produces video at 1080p. However, the video quality is the best in this group, and it uses its extra pixels for homing in on suspicious activity using an enhanced 4x zoom. Both the original and zoomed picture are saved, should you be unfortunate enough to need them for evidence.

At night, the camera uses infrared LED lights to invisibly illuminate the area around it so the camera can pick up any activity. There's a reduction in visual range and the image isn't as sharp as in daylight, but it's still better quality than on the other cameras we reviewed.

To get the most from the camera, you need a subscription, which lets you control motion zones and uses face recognition to spot friends and regular visitors. There are several tiers of subscription but the basic paid-for level of £4 per month (or £40 per year) provides access to five days of continuous recording, which means if you



go on a longer holiday, for example, you'll need to check in and see whether you have any footage that you need to save elsewhere.

Motion detection was spot on, avoiding false positives and accurately detecting people. It's the best cloud service we tested, making it easy to scroll through footage or jump between alerts if you're looking for specifics. There is a free subscription but it only saves three hours of historical footage to the web.

VERDICT ★★★★

This outdoor camera from Nest is the best-quality external security camera we've tested. Setting it up can be a bit complicated and will require some drilling if you want to maximise its effectiveness. It's also expensive, even before you add on a subscription service for accessing the footage. However, if you're serious about your home security, we think it's well worth the money. The subscription service is the cheapest it's ever been and the camera itself is a cracking device that captures clear, sharp video footage.

At the other end of the price range from our Gold and Silver Awardwinners is this £19.99 model from Neos, which shoots 1080p video (though only at 15 frames per second) and comes with free cloud storage. The hardware is so cheap because it doesn't need its own

hub and is only suitable for indoor use. However, it does have night vision for recording in the dark, and a built-in microphone so you can hear what's going on.

The free cloud storage is limited. When activated, it records a 12-second clip and uploads it. However, it won't then record anything else for five minutes, which is a significant restriction, with no option to invest in a more robust service. Clips are stored online for 14 days.

Alternatively, there is an SD card slot that can store footage so you can record continuously, but you can't access it from the web.

VERDICT

If you can live with its significant limitations, you could put a camera from this range in every room of your house and still not have paid as much as some rivals are charging for a single unit. However, the free online cloud storage is limited and the hardware is basic.

BEST OF THE REST

The D-Link DCS-2802KT (£295.99 for a twin pack | bit.ly/dlink481 | ★★★★☆) has a similar design to the Arlo, with a magnetic mount, rechargeable battery and a requirement to wirelessly connect to a base station. However, this D-Link option is more affordable, providing a twin-camera kit for the

price of a single Arlo starter pack. There are limitations, though, because it doesn't provide continuous footage - cloud recording is only activated when an event is detected. Also, there's no option to power

TP-Link has a simpler indooronly alternative in the Kasa Cam KC120 (£75.99 | bit.ly/tpl481 | $\star\star\star\star\star$). It connects to a standard Wi-Fi connection (including support for 802.11ac) without the need for extra hardware. You get two days of cloud storage and clips are saved when activated by motion or sound. By default, it records in 720p but it can be set to 1080p if you prefer.

it from a wall socket.



The downside of the BT Smart Home Cam (£49.99 | bit.ly/btshc481 | ****) is the cloud storage - it only saves motiondetected screenshots, not video. This has dramatically saved on the price of the unit without it having to compromise on physical features, but the cloud services offered elsewhere are so good, you're sacrificing a lot for that drop in price.

If looks were everything the **Hive** would be on course for a Gold Award. However, it's short on features, didn't perform well in our motion-detection test, and took a long time for the cloud service to notify us when security events were triggered.

Finally, we had high hopes that Ring, the people behind the video doorbells, might make a good security camera, but the Stick Up Cam (£179 | bit.ly/ The hardware is good but the free cloud service is limited to saving still images. Video costs an extra £25 per year.




OUR VERDICT

Google's Nest has secured the Gold Award in this test, with its Cam IQ Outdoor. It's not the cheapest camera, or the easiest to set up, but it's the most secure and has the best features. If you need more than one right device to choose.

We awarded the second-place Silver Award to the Arlo Pro 2. This is more flexible than the Nest, able to be positioned inside or out, and has clear and sharp footage you can access online for seven days.

The Bronze Award-winning Neos SmartCam is from the more affordable end of the price range, so you could easily fill your house with these cameras for the price of a Nest or an Arlo. However, the cameras are indoor only, and don't have such sophisticated hardware or cloud-based tools.






CHROME

Browse the web faster than ever with Chrome


One of the most common complaints about Chrome is that it's too slow. Back in 2008, when the browser was first released, it felt like a breath of fresh air. Now, however, it often feels as sluggish as Internet Explorer. If you've been drumming your fingers on the desk as you wait for another website to load, it's time to install FasterChrome (bit.ly/fast481).

According to the developer, this extension "uses just-in-time preloading". That's a fancy way of saying that it starts to load a page when you hover over its link with your cursor rather than waiting for you to click it. FasterChrome won't do this for every page – if you're logging out of a site, for instance – and it works best on pages within a single website. Preloading increases speeds by around 300 milliseconds, however, which in internet time is about a year.




Control the volume of websites

Audio is a tricky business. All too often, we visit a site and the sound is just too loud or frustratingly quiet. Volume Master (bit.ly/volume481) takes care of this problem. Once you've installed the extension, open a video in your browser, then click the icon. Sound plays at 100% by default, but you have the option of cranking it up to a whopping 600%.



It also has another excellent feature: with one click, you can instantly switch to a tab that's playing audio. This is particularly handy when a website plays a video automatically and you need to track it down to mute it.

Volume Master treats each tab separately, so you can boost the volume for one video and quieten it for another.



Avoid making spelling mistakes online

There are plenty of tools that help you improve your writing, but Language Tool (languagetool.org) is easily one of the best. It scans everything you write on sites such as Gmail and Facebook, and if you make a spelling mistake, it underlines the word in red, just like a word processor. Grammar and style errors are underlined in yellow and blue.

When you click a word or phrase that Language Tool has highlighted, it reveals some suggested corrections. Particularly useful is the option to have the mistake explained to you so you can avoid making it again in future.

You can also type or paste your writing into the text box on the official website. From here, use the drop-down menus to find out how your words read in other languages, including French, Chinese and Japanese.

Focus on your urgent emails

It's all too easy to get distracted when checking your emails. You start responding to one message, but then another one catches your eye and you find yourself mentally preparing how to reply to it before you've finished with the first.

If you find this a problem, it's time to download Gmail Focus (bit.ly/gmail481). Now when you visit Gmail, you'll see only the details of the top message in your inbox. All the others are blurred out, with a scribble effect that masks the sender's name, subject line and first line of the message.

This makes tackling your inbox much less daunting because you can deal with your messages one at a time without getting distracted. You can still click into any email to read it, but thanks to the focus effect, you won't know what's in it until you've opened it.

FIREFOX

Translate any web page into English within Firefox

The web is great for keeping up with world affairs, following international celebrities and buying cheap electronics from China. But if you don't speak the lingo, you're at a real disadvantage. Both Google and Edge offer built-in



translators, but Firefox is lacking in this department, which is why To Google Translate (bit.ly/translate481) is an essential add-on for the browser.

If you want to translate an entire page, right-click and select 'Translate page'. For a specific section, highlight the text and right-click. Selecting the option to auto-detect and translate the text opens a new tab containing Google Translate's familiar setup. You can also choose to Listen, although this can be hit and miss.

Before you start translating, hop into the settings, where you can choose your default language.

Scroll web pages more easily

You probably don't give the process of scrolling through web pages much thought. ScrollAnywhere (bit.ly/ scroll481) will change that.

This add-on brings a new dimension to scrolling, because it lets you click a mouse button and sweep up and down a page as easily as if you were using your phone. Once you've installed it, visit the settings page to tweak the scroll style, alter the speed and change how the cursor acts. It sounds strange, but the add-on actually makes scrolling through web pages fun.



Manage your bookmarks better

If you're anything like us, you probably have a favourites bar and folder filled with websites you swear you'll revisit but never do. You may use a handful of these, but most of them languish, almost forgotten, in your browser.




That's where Keep or Delete Bookmarks (bit.ly/bookmarks481) comes in. This extension transforms bookmark management into a simple matter of swiping left or right, like on Tinder. Click its toolbar button and it shows you every bookmark you've saved, one by one. Under each link, you'll find four options: Keep, Delete, Next and Open. This is probably the quickest way to prune your unwanted bookmarks.

OTHER BROWSERS

Customise YouTube Despite its many redesigns, YouTube still feels like a cluttered mess. Even when there's just a single video in the centre of the screen, it can be difficult to know where to look. YouTube Customizer (bit.ly/youtube481) cuts out the

distractions. Click the toolbar

icon for options that give you full control over the video site's appearance. This includes hiding the 'More videos' panel, video



information, comments and actions such as Watch Later and Share. You can also disable those autoplay options that YouTube loves to foist on us.

Clear your browsing automatically

The latest version of Edge Chromium offers a great new tool: the ability to delete browsing data automatically when you close the browser. Unfortunately, it's not activated by default. To switch it on, first click the three dots and select Settings. Choose 'Privacy and services', and at the top of the page you'll see the option to 'Clear browsing data'. Click 'Choose what to clear' and select anything you want to erase, from cookies to history and passwords. The changes apply only to the account you're using, so if you have more than one profile, you'll need to do the same for each one.

Messaging apps such as WhatsApp offer a number of ways to communicate with others, such as sending text messages, making voice or video calls and more. One easy way to get in contact with someone is to record a brief voice or video message. To do this in WhatsApp, for example, you simply hold down the mic or camera button while speaking, then release the button to send your message.

While dictating a message may be easier for the sender than laboriously typing out a

text, it's not always convenient for the recipient. When you're in a meeting, a library or a doctors' waiting room, for example, you can probably get away with checking your texts but playing an audio message out loud is much less appropriate. That's where Voicepop comes in.

The app is very easy to use. It basically transcribes any

recorded speech from audio or video messages you receive in WhatsApp and other messaging apps (including Line, Signal and Telegram) into a text message that you can read quietly.


Once installed, Voicepop works as an extension to your messaging app, so it's very easy to use. It's also fast, accurate and can process voice messages that are up to two minutes long. The tool encrypts your messages to ensure their contents remain private, and the developers state that no human employees have access to your data.

The app and transcription services are currently free, although that could change in the future. The only real catch is that you need to be online

for Voicepop to transcribe your voice messages, because the speech-recognition technology it uses is based in the cloud.

Minecraft Earth

The best-selling PC game of all time is launching its block-building fun on the real world. David Crookes reveals what to expect

What is it?

Minecraft Earth is the latest iteration of one of the globe's most successful gaming franchises, and this time it is bursting out of its in-game world. By branching into real life using augmented reality (AR), the blockbuilding game is overlaying virtual creations on the streets and spaces around you, paving the way for a whole new mobile experience that could be gaming's next big thing.



How different will it be?

Like the original Minecraft, which was released in 2011, Minecraft Earth allows players to gather resources, engage in crafting and build structures that others can enjoy and explore. The big difference is that it will create a living, breathing parallel land in which the objects you construct are placed in specific realworld locations in life-size AR. When other players wander by, they'll be able to see those structures through their phones or tablets and interact with them. Creation and discovery is key.

So is it a blockbuster in the making?


Time will tell but developer Microsoft is hoping so. Not only is it building on a strong user base of 91 million active

Minecraft players, but the company believes gamers will enjoy the opportunity to express their creative side on a far grander scale than before. Microsoft has also seen the impact of Niantic's AR game, Pokémon Go, which peaked at 147 million monthly users in May 2018 and has been downloaded more than a billion times. The appetite for using real-world settings and mobile devices' GPS appears strong.

How does it work?

The game looks set to appeal on numerous levels but adventuring is at its heart. Players will be thrown into a virtual world based on a precise geographical location such as their real-life neighbourhood, a beach, a park or a city, viewing the action through their phones

> or tablets and doing all they can in that area, whether mining resources, battling against hostile mobs (the game's creatures) or getting creative. What's intriguing is that everyone enjoying the game will see the exact same thing through their phones if they are in the same location. Microsoft believes this will help make the game the killer app for AR.


How does the game know where players are?

First of all, Microsoft is breaking the world down into the smallest of blocks by using open-sourced OpenStreetMap data to create procedurally generated adventures. It'll determine how suited the location is for gameplay, thereby figuring

what would be most appropriate for players to do there. More importantly, however, Microsoft is using its Azure Cloud Spatial Anchor system (bit.ly/ azure481), which fixes a player's location in virtual space using machine-vision algorithms and real-world objects. It's a complicated process but it'll enable the game to figure out what the player should be seeing.

Can I collaborate with other users?

Definitely, collaboration is one of the key aspects of the game. It allows likeminded crafters to work together on mammoth structures, gathering their own resources and bringing them to a shared "build plate". There will be a variety of plates to suit different builds you could, for example, create a ship on a water plate. When one player adds to the structure, the others will see the blocks being assembled and the resulting build can then be placed in the real world. Players can also gather around a flat surface and create their structures in miniature form. When each structure is placed at a location on the map, it becomes life-size and viewable by others.

But can I still burn things down?

Of course. Just because Minecraft is moving into the real world, it doesn't mean that the rules you've become accustomed to within the game are totally different. Indeed, the game is based on the existing Bedrock Engine and it will feel the same. You can loot (although there will be no loot boxes), and use Flint and Steel to set fire to

HOW MINECRAFT EARTH USES HOLOLENS

.....

In 2015, Microsoft demonstrated a version of Minecraft being played through its wireless augmented-reality headset HoloLens. By turning your head, it was possible to view the Minecraft world from multiple angles, with the real-life environment in the background. It fostered a sense of immersion that had critics raving.

The new Minecraft Earth is another step toward realising this idea for the massmarket. It uses the HoloLens algorithms to pinpoint the location of players in the game, and the hope is



that work on Minecraft Earth will help development of HoloLens. Whether or not Minecraft Earth will ever appear on HoloLens is unknown, however.

blocks. If you love producing redstone devices - objects that perform an action when they receive a signal - then you can do this, too.

Is there much fighting involved?

You'll be able to battle hostile in-game mobs either alone or with the help of others. Defeating such an enemy will cause them to drop useful items. You'll also be able to steal from other players but, given that you'll be in the same vicinity, this may not be such a good idea. It will be safer to collect rare and randomly placed 'tappables' that earn you different material blocks, various mobs and objects. A couple of tappables will always be close by when you start an

adventure to get you going, but you'll have to get the rest by exploring, and they will prove vital if you want to build the most impressive structures. It will also be possible to earn in-game currency called Rubies to purchase extra build flexibility.

What platforms will the game

Minecraft Earth will be free to play on iOS 10 and above and Android 7 and above, as long as your device is capable of AR. A Microsoft or Xbox Live account is also needed to play.

The game was rolled out in beta on 25 July, with limited places available for would-be players. Anyone interested is asked to sign up at the official website (bit.ly/mine481).

But is the game the same on both platforms?

Fundamentally yes, but on iOS, Minecraft Earth will use Apple ARKit 3.0's People Occlusion feature. This allows the game to recognise people and their position in the 3D environment, so they are automatically cut out and placed in the virtual world. The function was showcased at Apple's WWDC keynote in June where a Mojang employee's avatar was shown walking around the Minecraft Earth environment, in front of and over blocks. On Android, the game will use Google's ARKit equivalent, ARCore.

It may be a while before the game leaves beta so if you fancy seeing how far Minecraft has come since its launch eight years ago, check out the original at classic.minecraft.net.

REMOVE YOUR FACE FROM THE WEB



Want to keep a low profile online? Wayne Williams explains how to protect your identity by foiling facial recognition and deleting identifiable information about you

acial recognition has made the headlines recently, amid concerns over how lawenforcement agencies in the UK and abroad are using the technology. Civil-rights group Liberty called facial recognition "a dangerously intrusive and discriminatory technology that destroys our privacy rights", while academics have described its

deployment in public spaces as "surveillance creep" (bit.ly/guardian481).

Although concealing your identity is becoming nigh-on impossible in the modern world, you still have some control over how your image, name and other personal details appear online, as long as you know what steps to take. In this feature, we

explain how to remove photos, videos and any mention of your name from the web - and how to stop them appearing there in the first place.

We also look at how tech giants including Facebook, Google and Amazon are using facial recognition for their own ends, and - in the spirit of fairness - highlight some positive uses of the technology.



YOUR FACIAL-RECOGNITION QUESTIONS ANSWERED

What is facial recognition?


There are two basic types of facial recognition. At its simplest, the technology recognises that something is a face. Point your phone's camera at one or more people, for example, and if it detects what look like eyes, a nose and a mouth in close proximity to each other, it will assume it's a face and stick a box around it, track it and make sure it stays in focus. Point your camera at a crowd and it will identify multiple faces.

More advanced facial-recognition systems not only spot faces but try to work out who a particular face belongs to. When you see someone you know, your brain processes a huge amount of information about them – the size, shape and colour of their eyes, the width and length of their nose, the size and shape of their mouth, the colour and style of their hair, and so on. Advanced facial-recognition software does much the same thing.

What is face-recognition training?

While most people can identify faces easily, computers find it much more of a challenge. Your phone, for example, can usually pick out faces in a scene, but it might also tag a tree that has face-like features in the bark. To make the task even trickier, faces can be distorted in numerous ways – such as when we smile, frown, yawn and so on – and they look different depending on the angle. Feeding lots of photos of the same face and others into a computer makes the recognition models much smarter, enabling them to identify faces when only a portion is visible, for example.

The developers use photos from all sorts of sources, including Facebook

and Google Images, to train their facial-recognition systems. How do you know if your face has been harvested in this way? You don't.

How does it identify you?

There are various systems, which use different methods to identify faces. Essentially, however, they build a 2D or 3D image of your face, then compare it with other images. Systems that use 2D images rely on common facial landmarks such as eyes, nose and mouth, including their size, shape and

the distance between them, to produce a unique faceprint – the facial equivalent of a fingerprint. However, different light conditions, angles and areas of shadow can make a face unrecognisable.

This is less of a problem with 3D models, which include additional data on depth, curves and so on.

How is facial recognition being used today?

It's everywhere. Imagine you're taking a photo of a friend using an iPhone XS, for example. Even before you start, you use facial recognition to unlock the phone in the first place. Then, while taking the photo, the camera recognises that you're pointing it at a face. Once you've taken it, facial-recognition technology compares your friend's face with those in previous photos, so now when you tap Search in Apple's Photos app, you can see every photo your friend appears in. That photo, along with all the previous ones, is automatically backed up in cloud storage services, such as iCloud and Google Photos, which use more facial recognition to help you search for people you know there. If you've previously tagged your friend on Facebook, the social network knows who they are when you share this new image there, too.



That's not all, of course. There are CCTV cameras everywhere in the UK including at sports venues, railway stations, airports, major events and concerts - and facial recognition is regularly in use at many of those, too.

How accurate is facial recognition?

If a photo is taken head-on in decent lighting, facial recognition can be very accurate - provided you're a white male. A study in 2018 revealed an error rate of 0.8% for light-skinned men, rising to 34.7% for dark-skinned women (bit.ly/ bias 481). In 2015, Google's imagerecognition app infamously mislabelled African Americans as "gorillas". Google eventually came up with a crude fix that stopped the app labelling any image as a gorilla, chimpanzee or monkey (bit.ly/ gorilla481). Since then, the technology has been improving as companies use

larger and more diverse datasets to train their systems.

However, worrying figures from Freedom of Information requests by Big Brother Watch (bigbrotherwatch.org .uk) showed that between 2016 and 2018 the Metropolitan Police's trial of Live Facial Recognition (LFR)

technology suffered a misidentification rate of 96%. At 2017's Notting Hill Carnival, for example, 95 people were incorrectly identified as criminals.

How worried should we be?

Facial recognition is now so ubiquitous that it can't really be avoided. Like most technology, once the genie is out of the bottle, there's no getting it back in. However, unless you've committed a crime and are on a watch list, you probably don't have much to worry about just yet. Facial recognition can spot particular people it's looking for, but blanket surveillance software that tags everyone is currently unrealistic because the processing power required would be phenomenal.

There's little you can do to stop your face being scanned in public, but you can limit the places online where photos of you are publicly available.

KEEP YOUR FACE OFF FACEBOOK

acebook users like to let others know what they're up to and enjoy the daily memories the site serves up, which is why we upload hundreds of millions of photos to the social network every day. The company scans these uploaded photos for faces it recognises. According to Facebook, its deep-learning system, DeepFace, now has the largest facial dataset to date.

There are benefits to Facebook's ability to recognise you in photos. It allows people to tag you more easily in the photos they upload, for example, and also alerts you whenever you appear in a photo, or if your image has been used in someone else's profile picture - which can help you stop people impersonating you.

If you'd rather keep your face off Facebook, there's good news. The social network lets you completely disable its Face Recognition feature with one click in its Settings. On the website, click the down arrow at the top right, then Settings. In the app on your phone, tap

the three lines button, bottom right, and scroll down to the entry there. Click or tap Face Recognition (which is in the left-hand sidebar on the website) and look for the entry 'Do you want Facebook to be able to recognise you in photos and videos?'. If you select this and change it to No, Facebook will no longer recognise you in any photos and videos added to the site.

Can you trust FaceApp?

There are numerous face-based quizzes and challenges on Facebook, including the recent viral hit FaceApp. This app is currently at the centre of a data privacy row after claims that it may share users' personal information with Russian intelligence agencies.

Launched on iOS and Android in early 2017, the Russian-created app generates highly realistic transformations of faces in photos, changing the subject's hair colour, eye colour or gender, among other features. FaceApp users can also find out how they'll look when they get

older. The app uses neural networks to map people's faces and generate incredibly realistic images of what they might look like in the distant future.

However, the popularity of FaceApp has led to security concerns, with some

claiming the small print offers evidence that the app is being put to nefarious uses, and is secretly sharing users' photos and data with Russian firms. The developers deny this, insisting that FaceApp uploads only the photos that users have selected. The Russian firm also claims that images are deleted from its servers "within 48 hours from the FaceApp reveals upload date", and how you may look insists that no user in the future



data is transferred to Russia or shared with any third parties.

The UK Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) told BBC News that it was "aware of stories raising concerns about FaceApp" and would be "considering them". In the meantime, if you're wary of entrusting something as valuable as your face to a potentially shady company, we say don't take the risk.



REMOVE YOURSELF FROM GOOGLE

Google Photos has a 'Group similar faces' feature that can show you pictures of people and pets it recognises. Due to differences in privacy laws, the feature is unavailable in some countries outside the US, so although we found it on our devices, there's no guarantee that you will. There's confusion as to why some people in the UK have it when they probably shouldn't, although possible explanations include activating it while using the device abroad or over a VPN.

If the feature is active on your device, you can disable it by opening Google Photos on your phone, selecting Settings and then tapping 'Group similar

faces'. You can turn off face grouping completely, or disable the option to 'Help contacts recognise your face', and 'Show pets with people'.

If you find that photos of yourself and other information appear in Google Search, getting them removed can be tricky, because most images in Google's search results come from non-Google websites. If that's the case, your best bet is to speak to the webmaster of the original site. Google can remove images from its search results if they have been deleted from the original location – see bit.ly/search481. Sensitive personal information, such as nude photos or images containing bank details, can be removed from Google by going to bit.ly/photos481.

If your face appears in a YouTube video and you'd rather it didn't, you can contact the video uploader and ask them to blur you out (which they will probably prefer to taking the video

down). YouTube provides tools that make the process easier, although the blur option isn't currently available in YouTube Studio beta (studio.youtube .com). The channel owner will need to select Creator Studio Classic in the left menu to access it.

Google automatically blurs faces and car number plates from Street View images, but if it misses one – or you want it to blur something else, such as your house, for example – you can request this. Go to www.google.com/maps, find the problem on Street View, then click the three dots in the address box and click 'Report a Problem'. The next page asks you why you want to report the image, and allows you to request blurring of a face, a home, a car licence plate or any other object.

HOW AMAZON AND MICROSOFT USE FACIAL RECOGNITION

Most people know Amazon as an online retailer, but the company is also a major provider of web apps and services, and has been working on a facial-recognition project called Rekognition (bit.ly/reko481). This allows developers to add visual analysis features to their applications, so they can identify objects, people,

text, scenes, activities and inappropriate content in photos and videos. The technology proved controversial when Amazon offered it to US police forces and government agencies. The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) Foundation described Rekognition as "perhaps the most dangerous surveillance technology

ever developed".

In June, Microsoft deleted its MS Celeb database, an enormous public dataset containing 10 million images of roughly 100,000 people, which it and other companies had been using to train facial-recognition systems. The company has also called on US politicians to regulate recognition systems due to their "broad societal ramifications and potential"


based facial recognition API called Face, which detects and compares faces in images (bit.ly/face481). Another experiment the company has been running since 2015 is How-Old. net (www.how-old.net), which tries to guess your age – with mixed results.



TRICK FACIAL-RECOGNITION TECHNOLOGY

Tweak images before uploading

Faceshield (faceshield.ai) is a clever photographic filter that adds noise to the facial landmarks in your images, such as your eyes, nose and jawline, which can trick recognition software into thinking there isn't a face there. It offers a choice of three settings: Subtle (which may fool some detectors, but not all), Medium (which fools more, but may have your friends asking questions about your new look) and Intense (even your own mother may not recognise you). To use Faceshield, go to the website, click Upload Photo, select a filter strength, then click Upload Now. Select your image, then download the edited one.

Remove photo tags on Twitter

Go into your account settings in Twitter (bit.ly/twitter481) and select Privacy and Safety. Next to Photo tagging, you can choose 'Only allow people you follow to tag you in photos' or 'Do not allow anyone to tag you in photos'. The latter option is the best choice. If you've been tagged in a photo, open the tweet you feature in, expand the menu in the

upper-right corner and remove your tag from the photo.

Don't use photos of your face

If you have to upload a photo for an online account, it doesn't actually have to be a picture of your face. It could be a pet, or even a cartoon representation of what you look like. The

characters made in the Bitmoji app (www.bitmoji.com) are fun, and you can make them look as like or unlike you as you want.

Detect hidden cameras

Using a camera finder - also referred to as a reflection or lens finder - will help you detect and avoid cameras, with

the added bonus that you'll feel as if you've stepped into a Jason Bourne spy movie. The way they work is simple enough: they project light, which reflects off any camera lenses in the area, allowing you to see them by looking through the device's own lens. Amazon has an entire section devoted to camera finders at bit.ly/camera481 - prices start at less than £10.

Alternatively, you could install a glint finder app on your phone. These use your phone's LED flash to detect cameras, but the results tend to be pretty poor. Detectify (bit.ly/detectify481) is one of the best free examples for Android.

Wear special glasses or a hat

You can buy hats and glasses that have bright 'near infrared' (NIR) LEDs built in, or make your own. These devices foil cameras by dazzling them so that the resulting images are unusable. They work well, too, but they also make it very obvious to a camera operator that you're trying to avoid being recognised, which is likely to arouse suspicion, making you more conspicuous than you might otherwise be.

BAN FACIAL RECOGNITION

Digital-rights group Fight for the Future has launched an interactive map (www .banfacialrecognition.com/map) that shows where in the United States facial-recognition technology is being used and where it's being resisted. The organisation is crowdsourcing the information and updating the map as new details surface. Although the map covers only the US, it's still very interesting, because understanding how facial recognition is currently being implemented over there will give us some idea of how it is - or could be - used in the UK.

As we were going to press, BBC News reported that MPs were calling for the police and other authorities to stop using live facial-recognition technologies (bit.ly/police481), so resistance is certainly mounting.



Face ID and **Trusted Face**

We used to secure our phones with PIN codes until they were replaced by fingerprint readers, and now many phones let you use your face to unlock your device. Apple's Face ID creates a highly accurate 3D map of your face using infrared (IR) light and image capture. It's so advanced that even disguises can't fool it, and it works perfectly in the dark. Android's

Trusted Face feature (previously called Face Unlock) is nowhere near as sophisticated yet and only uses a photo of your face, which Google admits is less secure than a PIN.



Melping the visually impaired

Face recognition can be a real boon to visually impaired people who use screen readers, because it tells them who is in the photos in their Facebook News Feed and other services, even if those people aren't tagged. It can also help people who have

Prosopagnosia (face blindness), which means they can't recognise people they know. Apps such as SocialRecall (bit.ly/recall481) can tell you the name of people you've met before, although the free version is limited to just five faces.


Tinding missing children and pets

Facial-recognition technology is being used to locate missing children, including victims of human trafficking. During trials of a new system last year, police in New Delhi identified

nearly 3,000 missing children in just four days. Incredibly, police in China managed to find four children who had been missing for 10 years.

The technology can recognise pets as well as people. Finding Rover (www.findingrover.com) is a pet facial-recognition service that aims to reunite lost pets with their owners. Upload a photo your missing pet and the service will look for matches in photos uploaded by the Finding Rover

Community. It's based in the US, so American pet owners are likely to see the best results - the official mobile app isn't currently available in the UK.



Making secure transactions Tace Recognition Authentication allows you to access your accounts and make secure transactions using a selfie taken with your phone. The system creates an accurate biometric template from a selfie. Then when you need to authenticate a transaction, you simply take another selfie, which the system compares with the template to give an accuracy score.

T Stopping toilet paper thieves Designer and environmentalist Jenny Lin recently wrote on Medium (bit.ly/tpaper481) about her experiences of using a Chinese public bathroom. Something you probably don't know (we didn't)

is that these public bathrooms

have a theft problem - toilet paper is stolen from them all the time. To combat this menace, a number of bathrooms have installed toilet paper dispensers with built-in facial recognition. This scans your face before dispensing some sheets of toilet paper. If you then return for more within nine minutes, it recognises you and denies the request.

Best free backup software

Backing up your PC is boring, repetitive, easy to forget and yet one of the most important tasks you should perform regularly. Andy Shaw compares the six best free options to help streamline this essential chore


All the award-winning free backup programs we've reviewed here are trimmed-back versions of paid-for tools. However, EaseUS Todo Backup has

kept the essentials: a wholedrive backup, a system backup (so you can reinstate Windows if something goes wrong) and a more selective standard file and folder backup.

One notable omission is a tool for transferring your system from one hard drive to another – if you were planning on upgrading to an SSD, for example – but since this isn't an everyday job, it's absence isn't too serious.

The interface is very slick, starting with a large icon that tells you there are no backups present, then buttons to either start a backup or restore one from somewhere else. If you choose to initiate your first backup this way, it'll take you through the process of making a full backup of your whole hard drive.

If you prefer, you can explore the other options first, accessing all the software's tools from a column of icons down the left-hand-side. This way, you can choose a more selective backup and set the frequency from Daily, Weekly or Monthly.



Todo Backup also comes with a handy tool for creating an emergency bootable disc that can get you going as soon as possible if the worst comes to the worst and your PC stops responding.

How it can be improved:

Our main niggle with EaseUS is that you need to be careful as you download it because it's far too easy to make a mistake and install a trial of the paid-for version instead of the completely free one. Once you're using it, you'll see options displayed with a padlock that can only be accessed if you upgrade,

which also feels like you're being hassled to get the paid-for version.

OUR VERDICT

Todo Backup has to resort to badgering you into getting the paid-for version because this free one is more than sufficient to keep your PC backed-up for years to come. It's missing a few handy tools but nothing that hampers its everyday usefulness.

What we liked:

Backupper has a brilliant interface that divides its tools between two main buttons: one to back up and the other to restore.

Further icons and menu buttons around the edge of the screen let you delve deeper, but all the options are well presented, with a coherent interface that uses both icons and explanatory text to help guide you through.

The program's tools let you choose from a whole-system backup, which secures Windows and creates an image of your PC in its current state; or a number of more focused alternatives, from entire partitions to individual files and folders. There's also a File Sync option, though this only works once per hour in the free version.

There's a useful Clone option for making an exact copy of a drive but as with the Gold Award-winning EaseUS program - you can only keep this as a backup because the tool for transferring



it to another drive is only available in the paid-for version.

How it can be improved:

At least EaseUS displays a padlock on tools it keeps behind its paywall. With Aomei, you have to click a tool before you see a pop-up window saying the action can't be performed.

OUR VERDICT

Aomei is hot on the heels of EaseUS, with a brilliant core backup toolkit that offers most of the options you need for free. The interface isn't quite as slick, though, and it's harder to know which tools are unavailable.


BEST OF THE REST

SyncBackFree

SyncBackFree doesn't have the professionally designed interface of our award-winning backup

programs. Instead of slick and simple buttons, it uses a more utilitarian system, essentially



breaking down into a list of backups with a wizard to help you set them up. While this initially looks sensibly organised, the options and questions quickly become overwhelming. Despite its name, SyncBackFree only offers what it calls 'basic synchronization' in the free version, so you can't sync files between more than two devices.

NCH FileFort

bit.ly/fort481

FileFort starts working instantly, setting up your first backup as soon as you've installed it. However, it shows its age when offering to back up 'My Documents' and 'My

Pictures' (Windows Vista dispensed with the 'My'), and could do



with a refresh of its terminology. You can use it to create a standard set of backups and store them as compressed files in either its own format or others, but the minimum schedule offered is daily.

Iperius Backup Free

bit.ly/iper481

Iperius looks simple enough at first glance, but click the option to

create a backup and you're inundated with tabs, menus and pop-out options. You



can methodically work your way through them, and advanced users might appreciate that it's not hiding anything, but it isn't as simple to use as other backup programs.


What we liked:

Paragon's free software is thorough from the moment it starts, immediately sending you a

suggestion to create recovery media. The welldesigned interface uses large icons to perform tasks: click the

Source button, for example, to select what you want to back up, then click a destination. You can choose to back up everything connected to your PC, just a selection of drives and partitions, or individual files and folders. Files can be selected manually or by type.

As you fill in details, further options open on screen, which feels intuitive. Many of the tools are given sentencelong explanations rather than icons or vague headings, and options are then presented like links on a web page, so if you want to perform an action or a customisation, you just click the link to be taken to the corresponding configuration screen.



How it can be improved:

We used a relatively small backup for our tests, but Paragon took a long time to get going. It also doesn't have the breadth of backup tools that the other award-winners offer.

OUR VERDICT

We like Paragon but it ran slowly on our test PC. This is a shame, because we loved the way the software was presented, responding to the user as options are selected and configured.

Block ads EVERYWHERE

Adverts are invading more areas of your digital life than ever, from podcasts to voice assistants.

Jane Hoskyn reveals how to filter these annoyances on any device




Block all online ads without exception

An ad blocker is one of those tools you only notice when it's gone. Whether you use market leader Adblock Plus (adblockplus.org), its lightweight rival uBlock Origin (bit.ly/ublock481) or some other browser-based ad annihilator, that little extension has probably made you forget how infuriating, slow and invasive the web can be when you're inundated with commercials.

But chances are you still see some ads. Adblock Plus, which is the easiest mainstream ad blocker to use, allows certain 'non-intrusive Acceptable Ads' by default – reportedly because the advertisers pay for the privilege.

Rather than mess around tightening Adblock Plus's settings, go for a zero-tolerance ad blocker instead. AdBlocker Ultimate (adblockultimate .net) blocks all ads and trackers by default, and strictly refuses to accept payment from any advertisers. Like all the extensions we mention here unless stated, AdBlocker Ultimate is free for Chrome and Firefox, and also works with Opera, Edge and Safari.

Switch to an ad-free mobile browser

Chrome is not the ad blocker's best friend, as you'll know from our cover feature in Issue 479 (bit.ly/webuser479). It's much harder for tools to block ads in Chrome for Android – where it's now the default browser – than on desktop, because Google uses encryption and randomly generated Hosts files that stop filters detecting ads.

So instead of wasting your time with an ad-blocking app that claims to work with Chrome, switch to a browser app that does the ad-blocking all by itself. Open-source app Brave Privacy Browser (Android, iOS, www.brave.com) is built on the Chromium engine but is faster and cleaner than Chrome. All ads and pop-ups are blocked automatically by default (tap the lion icon to see what's blocked). With another tap, you can block all cookies, trackers and scripts, and enable encryption enforcer HTTPS Everywhere, for any site.

Firefox Focus (Android, iOS, bit.ly/focus481) automatically blocks ads that use trackers, but there's no option to block all ads. AdBlock Browser (Android bit.ly/adblockdroid481, iOS bit.ly/adblockios481) - based on Firefox code and made by the AdBlock Plus team - is more robust but only if you untick 'Allow some non-intrusive advertising' in the app's settings (go to

Open-source extension

the extension's icon. So ads are hidden, trackers are deflected away from you and the ad-hosting websites still get the money they're promised. Everybody's happy.

Well, everybody except Google, that is, which kicked AdNauseam off the Chrome Web Store and failed to



explain why. You can still install it via GitHub using Chrome's 'Developer mode', if you're patient (bit.ly/adnchrome481), but your best bet is to ditch heavy-handed Chrome and use AdNauseum in Firefox (bit.ly/adnfox481) or Opera (bit.ly/adnopera481) instead.





For Safari devotees, paying £4.99 for iOS app 1Blocker X (bit.ly/1blocker481) is money well spent. It integrates with Safari's code, telling it to block ads, pop-ups and trackers. You'll need to enable it via the Settings app first, under Content Blockers, where you can enable up to seven rules that include Block Adult Sites, Block Comments and Custom Rules, as well as Block Ads.

Abolish ads from apps — without paying

Google doesn't like apps that block ads across your Android device, so you won't find them in the Play Store. For example, the excellent Blokada needs to be downloaded via blokada.org (or third-party app store F-Droid, bit.ly/blokada481). To install the APK (app file)

ALEXA, STOP TRYING TO SELL ME THINGS

One day you'll say to your Amazon Echo: "Alexa, remind me to buy cat food" and it'll shoot back: "OK, may I recommend Whiskas? Special offer at Asda."

It's bound to happen.
Last year, Google was
caught dropping an ad for
the film Beauty and the
Beast into Google Home
and Assistant. Users were
furious and Google

backtracked (bit.ly/beast481), and now Google and Amazon are both denying plans to include advertising on their personal assistant platforms.

Yet it feels inevitable. After all, streaming services such as Roku and even the BBC iPlayer already display house ads that are nigh-on impossible to bypass (we tried), and ads have long been allowed on the Amazon Fire. You can tackle them, but only by enabling developer mode, installing an Android command-line tool and running a frankly terrifying BAT file called Amazon Ad Remover (bit.ly/amazad481).

If personal assistants do end up becoming the next advertising battleground, we'll be looking to system-wide ad blockers such as AdGuard (adguard .com) to keep the commercials out of our homes.

Watch this space.

you will need to enable 'unknown sources' in your Android settings.

It's worth the hassle, though. Blokada uses a VPN to block any ad requests directed at your device's hosts file – from apps, browsers, games, emails, messaging services and more – then bounces them to a blank IP address. You can whitelist domains that you don't mind allowing through the filter.

AdGuard (https://adguard.com) is similar but less Android-centric, and has versions for Windows and iOS, too. You can whitelist apps, customise filters and cut off certain apps' internet access completely.

AdGuard Pro for iOS (£1.99, bit.ly/adguard481) offers more system-wide ad blocking than 1Blocker X, but thanks to Apple's constraints, it won't cut as much clutter as the Android version.

Blitz those 'don't block' pop-ups

"It looks like you're using an ad blocker" simpers the weeping kitten, getting in





the way of the article you want to read. Some of these 'overlay' messages have a 'continue with ad blocker' option while others act like officious border guards, refusing to let you through unless you allow adverts.

The handy extension
BehindTheOverlay (bit.ly/behind481)
lets you fight back with one click. If you see a 'please whitelist us' pop-up, click the BTO toolbar icon and the pop-up will disappear. It hasn't been updated in a couple of years but we found it perfectly efficient, acting as extra muscle for your existing ad blocker.

Skip annoying ads in podcasts

New app Podcast Guru (free for Android, bit.ly/guru481) describes itself as 'A No Ads Player', but don't get too excited – it can't automatically remove ads from podcast episodes. The app itself is, however, ad-free, and it lets you dodge ads by setting a 'Skip Intro' time for each subscribed podcast. Measure

the seconds you need to skip in an average episode of that podcast, then go to Library, tap the podcast's thumbnail, tap the 'adjust' icon and then enter a Skip Intro time in seconds.

Podcast Guru also lets you skip forward 30 seconds with one tap when playing an episode (ideal for zooming past ads), as do Acast (www.acast.com) and Castbox (castbox.fm), both free for Android and iOS.

The iOS-only app Overcast (overcast .fm) adds innovative chapter markers created by the podcast maker using tools such as Chapters (chaptersapp .com). Some generously include markers for the end of the ads, so you can skip with precision. On iOS 12 you can now choose your own custom skipping times for the Podcasts app, going up to 60 seconds.

Block ads in Skype and uTorrent

The Windows edition of AdLock (adlock.com) obliterates ads from all your installed browsers and other

internet-connected software, such as video chat programs and peer-to-peer download tools. It's easy, efficient and customisable, but not free - it costs €16 (£14.40) per year after a 14-day trial. However, if you use Skype regularly, that's not a bad price to pay to get rid of its increasingly irritating ads.

AdLock can't block ads in absolutely every internet-connected program on your PC, though. If you're a confident computertweaker, you can get closer to that goal by editing your

computer's Hosts file so that it redirects specific ad requests into oblivion. It's hardly the easiest approach, but it gives you ultimate control without the need to install yet more browser tools. Follow the steps at bit.ly/hosts481, or make it a little easier with an editing tool such as HostsCK (redisoft.uk).

Remove ads from YouTube videos

AdBlocker Ultimate (adblockultimate .net, see previous page) will efficiently blitz the ads that YouTube plasters on top of videos when playing, and skip the ones it wants you to sit through before a

video starts. If for some reason you want to block ads in YouTube only, then use a YouTube-specific tool such as Video Adblocker (bit.ly/vidblock481).

You may not realise that YouTube earns income from the ads it sticks on your own uploaded videos by default, but you can stop this, too. Click your profile photo then Creator Studio (or 'YouTube Studio beta' then Creator Studio Classic), open the Channel drop-down menu and then click 'Upload defaults'. Untick 'Monetise with ads', 'Overlay in-video ads', 'Skippable video ads' and 'Sponsored cards' – all of which are enabled by default – then click Save.



Repurpose your memory cards

Don't bin your old SD cards. Robert Irvine reveals five clever new uses for the tiny removable media

Run a portable operating system

As we explained in our 'Run anything from a USB stick' cover feature in Issue 477, you can install Linux on a USB stick to boot a portable operating system wherever you go. The same trick applies to SD memory cards, if they offer enough capacity (at least 4GB is recommended) and your PC has a memory-card slot or USB card reader. Download or create an ISO file for the Linux distro you want to install, run the free tool Rufus (rufus.ie) and insert your SD card. Select 'Disk or ISO image' in the 'Boot selection' menu, click Select and choose the ISO file (you may need to search for 'All files' to find it). Ensure that FAT32 is selected in the 'File system' menu and 'Quick format' is ticked under 'Show advanced formatting options'. Click Start, then 'Write in ISO image mode' and Rufus will format your memory card and install the Linux distro.

Boost your PC's memory

If your PC often struggles with resource-heavy activities such as gaming and video editing, you can use an SD memory card for extra RAM, thanks to a built-in Windows feature called ReadyBoost. Insert the card in the relevant slot on your computer, then open Computer or This PC (depending on which version of Windows you're using), right-click the card's drive icon and choose Format. Select NTFS from the drop-down 'File system' menu, then

click Start to format the card. Once formatting is complete, right-click the drive icon again, choose Properties and click the ReadyBoost tab. Select the option 'Dedicate this device to ReadyBoost' to use the maximum available space for speeding up your PC, then click OK.

You may see a message saying 'This device can not be used for ReadyBoost' because your computer is already fast enough. Although you can override this by tweaking the Registry, it may prove more trouble than it's worth!

Download maps to browse offline

Saving photos, videos and music to an SD card (whether micro or standard size) frees up valuable space on your phone, but it's equally useful to download maps to the card, so you can browse them even when you lose your internet connection. To do this in Google Maps, first tap the three-line menu icon in the top-left corner and choose 'Offline maps'. Press the settings cog in the top-right corner, select 'Storage preferences' and choose the 'SD card' option. Search for the location you want to explore offline, then press the white taskbar at the bottom of the screen and choose Download. Swipe and pinch within the blue rectangle to select the desired area, then tap Download. You can search the downloaded map and get directions from one point to another, just as you

Store portable programs and apps

As with a USB stick, you can store portable versions of your favourite programs on a formatted SD card by downloading the PortableApps.com suite (portableapps.com). Install the software on your card and choose from hundreds of popular tools.

You can also save Windows apps from the Microsoft Store directly to your SD card. Open Settings from the Start menu and choose System, Storage, 'Change where new content is saved'. Click the drop-down 'New apps will save to' menu, select your SD card's drive and click Apply. To move apps you already have installed, go to Settings, System, Apps, choose an app and click the Move button.

RASPBERRY PI SETUP

An SD card is an essential requirement for setting up the Raspberry Pi mini computer. You need to format the card on your desktop PC or laptop, then download and install the NOOBS software from the Raspberry Pi website (bit.ly/ noobs481). The latest model, the Pi 4, uses a Micro SD card, so you may need a Micro SD-to-SD card adapter, or a Micro SD-to-USB adapter if your PC doesn't have the right slot. See our Weekend Project on page 58 for full instructions.

Try Outlook.com's best new tools

Microsoft's webmail service, Outlook.com, has just been updated with a wealth of useful new features. Here's what you need to know



utlook.com has never had the range of features you get in Gmail but Microsoft has been busy trying to address this. After eight months of testing, the software giant has at last deemed its new interface ready to be unleashed. If you didn't opt into the beta, you can expect the new update to arrive shortly, if it hasn't already.


The list of new features is comprehensive and includes a dark mode, tabs, the ability to snooze emails, time-management tools, favourites, expressions and categories. Most of the new features are for email users, but there are some additions for those who use Outlook.com's calendar and meeting components, too.



A lot of programs and web services now offer a dark mode, so it's inevitable that it's come to Outlook.com. Microsoft says it's useful for those times when your eyes are tired, but it can be enabled at any time if you just like the look. Click the Quick Settings cog 1 and toggle 'Dark mode' to On. 2




One of the most useful additions is the introduction of tabs, which makes it easy to switch from writing emails to reading them. Each new task appears as a tab at the bottom, 1 and you can click the one you want to quickly switch from one to another.







The Favourites option lets you prioritise anything important, including contacts, groups and categories. This provides easier access, and shows you the message count for each favourite. Select an item and click the star 1 to favourite it. Expand the Favourites section 2 to access them.



Keep your messages tidy by using the new Categories feature, which lets you tag, organise and find emails. Select a message, then click the Categorise button. 1 You can choose one of the preset categories 2 or create a new one. 3 A Category tag appears on the message. 4




You can add multiple categories to a message. Untick a tag to remove it or click Manage Categories to organise them. In the Settings page that opens, you can create a new category, 1 delete an existing one, 2 (it will be removed from all the messages you've added it to previously) or add it to your favourites. 3






Expressions lets you spice up your messages by adding emoji and GIFs directly from within Outlook.com. Compose a message or a reply, then click the smiley face under the compose window **1** to open the Expressions panel. 2 You can search for whatever you're looking to add. 🗾



TIF you don't have time to respond to an email but you don't want to lose track of it in a crowded inbox, use the drop-down box to snooze it. Select a preset time 1 or create your own. 2 When you snooze a message, it vanishes from your inbox and reappears as an unread email at the set date and time.




To switch to the calendar, simply click the icon in the click the icon in the bottom-left corner. It's now easier than ever to create events. Click a date and enter a title, 1 then input the start and ends times, 2 or set it as an all-day event. El Click 'More options' 41 to add people to the event.



Customise the Windows 10 Start menu

t's fair to say that the fortunes of the Windows Start menu have been mixed - from its high point in Windows 7 to its controversial removal in Windows 8. After a hesitant reintroduction in Windows 10, which seemed to err more on the side of bad than good, the Start menu has finally found its stride.

These days we expect to be able to personalise everything, and the Start menu is no different. A recent update has given us a lot more control over how Start looks and performs. These personalisation options range from tweaking the colours to diving into the Registry Editor and making some much needed changes to the menu's layout. As ever when editing the Registry, make sure you back up your PC before you start.

EXPERT TIP


Steve Clark says

It's not only the Start menu that you can customise to your liking. The taskbar is also up for grabs. There are several Registry edits you could try, but the easiest method is to download TranslucentTB (available in the Windows Store at bit.ly/trans481). Once you've installed the app, you can tweak the taskbar with a quick right-click to add a blur or make it completely transparent.




Let's start with the simplest customisation, which is to change the Start menu's size. Depending on how you use it and which tiles you pin to it, you can add extra columns to the Start menu by dragging out the right-hand side.

This gives you more space for pinning tiles. Alternatively, drag it the other way to make it more compact.



To group your tiles, drag and drop them into place. Then click the two lines above your grouped tiles 1 to edit the group name. If you press and hold these lines, you can move the entire group around the Start menu. Windows 10 automatically creates sections for new groups, which you can see as a thick blue line 2 when moving a tile.




Type Start settings into the Start menu to access a few more options, including 'Show more tiles on Start', which expands the columns slightly. The 'Show most used apps' option is also worth activating because it makes your favourite apps easier to access by placing them in a new section on the left-hand side.




Go to the bottom of the list and select 'Choose which folders appear on Start'. This presents you with a list of folders such as File Explorer, Documents and Music.


Toggle each option On or Off 2 to add or remove the folder's icon from the column on the left, under your Profile button.




You may also like to turn on 'Use Start full screen'. This helpfully removes some of the clutter so that rather than scrolling through every option, you click buttons to move between Pinned Tiles and 'All apps'. Finally, in the settings, go to Colours 11 to select the accent colour 22 and choose whether it also applies to other areas, such as the Taskbar. 🖪




You can add a Hibernate option to the list that appears when you press the power button. Search power options, then choose 'Additional power settings'. In the next window, click 'Choose what the power buttons do'. 11 You may need to click 'Change settings that are currently unavailable'. 2 Tick the Hibernate box 3 and 'Save changes'. 4




When you create a Windows 10 profile, every user can see its shortcuts. To avoid this, open Registry Editor and find or create HKEY_CURRENT_USER\SOFTWARE\Microsoft\ Windows\CurrentVersion\Policies\Explorer. 1 Right-click to create a New 32-Bit DWORD. 2 Call it NoCommonGroups, 3 and give it a value of 1. 4 Click OK 5 to save it, then restart.



To switch off a live tile, simply right-click it and select More, 'Turn Live Tiles off'. If you'd rather block them all at once, however, look for HKEY_CURRENT_USER\ SOFTWARE\Microsoft\Windows\CurrentVersion\ PushNotifications. 1 Create a DWORD (32-bit) 2 called NoTileApplicationNotification. 3 Set the value to 1.4



For a sleeker Start menu, remove the 'All apps' list. Go to HKEY_CURRENT_USER\Software\Microsoft\Windows\ CurrentVersion\Policies\Explorer and HKEY_LOCAL_ MACHINE\SOFTWARE\Microsoft\Windows\CurrentVersion\ Policies\Explorer. In both create a DWORD (32-bit) In amed NoStartMenuMorePrograms, B and give it a value of 1. 4



Most people know that right-clicking a Start tile lets you resize it or uninstall the app. However, some apps have extra options. Right-click Microsoft Word, for example, to jump to recent documents. Doing the same on Calculator gives you the choice of calculator styles, including Standard, Scientific, Programmer and Date Calculation. 1



Download smarter on your Android devices

ownload managers give you greater control over your downloads and make the process more efficient. The best tool for Android users is Advanced Download Manager, which offers a wealth of options including batch loading and

the import and export of downloads. Android won't let you set Advanced Download Manager as your default downloading tool, so you have to start downloads by hand, but it's still worth using.






While your phone won't open Advanced Download Manager (ADM) by default, preparing your downloads is very straightforward. Tap the three-line menu 🗓 and go to the browser, where you'll find Bookmarks and History. Using the address bar, 2 navigate to your chosen download and copy the address **3** or tap the tick. **4**




Back in ADM, tap Plus. 1 Paste your URL into Link 2 and give your download a name. **1** Tap the three dots. **4** Here you can choose to save files to internal or external memory, decide how many files can download at once, set the download speed and choose whether to use mobile data or Wi-Fi. Close and, on the download screen, press Start. 5



ADM has an impressive selection of download settings. On the home screen, tap the three lines. One of the first features you should switch on is 'Smart download', 🗓 which ensures that downloads don't just stop when your connection drops. Scroll further down and switch on 'Auto-resume', 2 'Only via Wi-Fi', and Scheduler **3** - or turn them off if you prefer.



Tap the Settings cog. Our favourite option here is Scheduler because it makes ADM feel like a proper download manager. Toggle the option to On, 🚺 if you haven't already, then specify a Start 🔁 and Stop time. 🖪 You can also set ADM to switch on Wi-Fi before downloading scheduled items, 4 which is handy if you ever switch it off and forget.



The Automation section is also worth visiting. Open it to specify whether to download newer files first or last, 1 and what happens to a file once it's downloaded 2 - there are tickboxes to open, send, or delete the file, for instance. For greater autonomy, turn on 'Auto-add downloads' [3] from the built-in browser and 'Auto-start downloads'. 4



Back in Settings, open the Cataloging section - which is useful when downloading multiple media formats. With the option switched on, 🗓 tap into each category to change the folder name, **2** view downloadable file types **3** and specify a memory location for different categories. 4 You can locate your files at any time by dragging from right to left on the home screen to open the Category pull-out.

Get alerts when favourite websites update


f you've ever wasted time repeatedly checking for changes on your favourite website or missed an important update because you failed to check it often enough, Distill Web Monitor is the tool to save your sanity. Simply click the

extension's icon when you're visiting your favourite web pages and you can relax in the knowledge that you'll be notified about any changes within minutes of them happening.






Follow the links on distill.io to install it in your chosen browser - we're using Chrome. Visit a page you want to monitor for changes and click the extension icon. $oldsymbol{1}$ If it's available, 'Monitor feed' alerts you when a new story is posted. Click the button, then click 'Add Feed to Distill'.




You're taken to your Watchlist - the list of sites you've set the software to keep an eye on. When new content appears on the site, the icon gets a red notification box. 1 Click the History section 2 to see a list of all the content on the site. The most recent to appear is at the top.




You can change how often checks for new content are performed, 1 see the time of the last update 2 and choose between running the tool in the cloud or on your PC. 1 The free version lets you run five checks in the cloud and twenty five in the browser (when it's in use).



You can monitor a specific area of a website, which is handy for tracking changes in elements that are always in the same place, such as the price of an item in an online shop. When clicking the icon, choose 'Select parts of page' 🗓 and click the area that you'd like to monitor. 🛂



Click 'Save selections' to go to the configuration screen and set what happens when something changes. Use the drop-down arrow next to 'Add action' 11 to choose the type of notification. 2 You can also tweak the checking interval. El Click the Save button when you've finished.



The last option - 'Monitor full page' 11 - is ideal for letting you know when infrequently updated static web pages change, such as a company's homepage. It can also be used to monitor pages that regularly change but don't have a feed.


Use a Raspberry Pi 4 as a desktop PC

Wayne Williams shows you how to set up the new Raspberry Pi 4 and explains how close it can get to replacing a regular PC

he original Raspberry Pi (www .raspberrypi.org) was designed to provide an ultra-cheap way to encourage children to tinker with computer hardware and learn to code, just as they had with home computers in the 1980s and '90s. The uncased credit card-sized computer has since found an appreciative audience outside of education, too, and is used in all sorts of projects.

The Pi has undergone a number of revisions since it was launched in 2012, each more powerful and feature-rich than the last. The Raspberry Pi 4 B, which went on sale in June, offers three times the processing power and four times the multimedia performance of its predecessor, the Raspberry Pi 3+. As we saw in last issue's review (bit.ly/webuser480), it's not enough to replace a Windows desktop PC in every respect but it's getting closer with every iteration.

However, if all you want to do is browse the web and carry out some light office work, you can certainly use this new Pi for that and more. Here, we explain what you need and what to expect if you're thinking of experimenting for yourself.



What you'll need


First off, you'll obviously need a Raspberry Pi 4. This comes with a choice of three RAM sizes - 1GB (£33), 2GB (£43) and 4GB (£53). 2GB is the minimum size you'll need to use the Pi as a desktop PC, but 4GB is preferable.

In addition to the Pi 4 itself, you will need the following extras to get it set up and working:

• TV or computer monitor: the Pi 4

comes with two HDMI Micro ports, so you can connect two screens

- HDMI Micro-to-HDMI cable (or a standard HDMI-to-HDMI cable and an HDMI Micro-to-HDMI adapter): this connects the Pi to the display. You'll need two if connecting two screens
- Ethernet cable: to connect the Pi to your network and the internet (this is optional, because the new Pi also supports dual-band 802.11ac Wi-Fi)
- USB keyboard
- USB mouse
- Micro SD card: you need a minimum of 8GB to install the operating system, and may also require an adapter to connect to your PC to transfer the operating system to it
- 15W USB-C power supply: the Raspberry Pi Foundation made a mistake with this new Pi's USB-C hardware design, so the port is incompatible with

many USB-C chargers. While "simple" cables and the official charger work, so-called E-marked cables – designed to work with all USB-C devices – identify

the Pi 4 as an audio accessory and don't deliver enough power. You'll see a lightning-bolt symbol on screen if your cable isn't charging the Pi properly.

- Headphones or speakers: if your monitor doesn't play sound carried over HDMI, use the built-in 3.5in audio socket
- Case: This is optional, but protects your Pi from dust and damage and enhances its looks. Official and third-party cases cost around £5-£10

You can buy some of these items directly from The Pi Hut (thepihut.com) and other retailers, although the chances are that you'll already have a few of the required cables and peripherals you need. There's also an optional 'Desktop Kit' available to buy which bundles a 4GB Raspberry Pi 4 board, case, USB mouse, USB keyboard, power supply, two HDMI cables, a 32GB Micro SD card and a

Beginner's Guide to help you get you started. This is priced at £105.

We show you how to set up the Pi 4 in our Mini Workshop, below.


Can you use the Pi 4 as a desktop computer?

A £53 barebones board (for the top-of-the-range 4GB model) isn't going to compete with a £500 laptop or desktop PC – it's not even going to come close. But provided your expectations of what you can and can't do with it are realistic, you shouldn't be too disappointed.


Because the Pi runs a Linux operating system, rather than Windows, a lot of programs that you would usually run on a PC – such as Microsoft Office and many big-name games – aren't available for it. You can run LibreOffice (Raspbian comes with it preinstalled), which runs well, and it also handles web browsing and other

MINI WORKSHOP | Get the Raspberry Pi 4 up and running



Start by connecting all the required hardware to your Pi. This includes plugging the device into one or two monitors 1 and connecting a keyboard and mouse. 2 Add an Ethernet cable for a wired internet connection as soon as you start. If not, you can connect to Wi-Fi later. Before powering it up, you need to add an operating system.



There's a selection of operating systems available for the Pi, but your best bet is to download NOOBS (New Out Of the Box Software) from bit.ly/noobs481. Format the Micro SD card using SD Formatter (bit.ly/sdformat481), then open the NOOBS Zip archive and drag the files to your Micro SD card.



Insert the SD card into your Pi and power it up. The NOOBS Installer will run and, if you're connected to the internet, give you a choice of operating systems. Select Raspbian 1 and click Install. 2 Click Yes and the installation will begin. Click OK when it finishes. Your Pi will restart and Raspbian should load automatically.




The Raspberry Pi can play most videos perfectly through VLC Media Player

web-based tasks. Google's Chrome browser is designed to only run web apps, and it can do this on the Raspberry Pi almost as well as it can on a more expensive Chromebook.

The new Pi can play some games, but anything that's too demanding, with high-quality 3D graphics, will struggle. We found SuperTuxKart (bit.ly/stkart481) played reasonably well. Similarly, video editing is either not going to be a realistic proposition, or it will take forever. If the Pi gets too hot, because it's working too hard, then it reduces performance to protect itself. It doesn't have a fan to cool itself down, though you can buy one for the device if you want.

The fact that the Pi 4 can push 4K graphics to two screens simultaneously sounds promising, but we found it struggled to play 4K movies smoothly. However, when we watched videos in FullHD 1080p, the results were fine, with just a little judder during fast-paced action scenes.




What software does the Pi 4 come with?

The latest version of Raspbian comes with the Scratch programming tool, LibreOffice, Chromium Web Browser (the open source browser that Google Chrome is built on), VNC Viewer remote desktop, VLC Media Player, Image Viewer and Minecraft Pi.

You can add more programs by opening the Add/Remove Software feature and browsing the available categories, or searching for a program by name.

MINI WORKSHOP | Get started with the Raspbian operating system



When Raspbian starts for the first time, you're greeted by the Welcome to Raspberry Pi application, which guides you through the setup process and lets you set your country, language and time zone. 🛂 You can also enter a password and connect to your wireless network. It then updates the operating system and applications.



The Raspbian desktop is similar to Windows, but with a taskbar running along the top of the screen and a Start menu sorted into categories -Programming, Education, Office, Internet, Sound & Video, Graphics, Games and Accessories. 11 There are also Run and Shutdown buttons. 2



Maximise your PC's performance by optimising RAM and virtual memory

Limit browser extensions to save memory

xtensions in web browsers use a lot of memory, sometimes as much as 50MB each. In a worst-case scenario, a dozen extensions for Chrome could require over half a gigabyte of memory, and that doesn't even include the memory used by the browser itself or any tabs containing open web pages. This hogging of resources is a problem with web browsers on PCs that have limited memory, so it's worth checking how much each extension is using.

Open the Chrome menu and select 'More tools', then 'Task manager'.
Look for the names of extensions that are running. Any extensions not being used can be temporarily disabled, then enabled again later if you need them. Go to the Chrome menu and click 'More tools', Extensions, then use the switches to disable extensions.



Extensions consume memory, so don't use too many at once

Check memory usage

To see how much memory is being used and whether more is needed, right-click an empty part of the taskbar and select Task Manager. Click 'More details' if necessary, then select the Performance tab and click Memory on the left. Open a dozen browser tabs and watch the memory usage rise. If this has used up most of the memory, your computer will benefit from a memory upgrade.

Real memory vs virtual memory

Programs use memory when they're running and some require a lot of it.

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

Web browsers with multiple tabs, photo editors with large images and other resource-hungry programs may need gigabytes of memory to function.

If there is insufficient RAM in the computer, Windows temporarily saves chunks of the data being held there to the hard drive. This is called virtual memory. While it keeps things running and prevents your PC from crashing or losing information, the data has to be reloaded from the hard drive when it's needed again. To do this, another chunk of RAM may need to be written to the hard drive to make space for it. Using the hard drive as an extension of RAM is therefore very slow, particularly if you have a mechanical model rather than an SSD (solid-state drive).

For a computer to run at maximum speed, it shouldn't be using the disk as virtual memory. Upgrade the PC's RAM so it doesn't run short of memory. These days, 8GB is considered the minimum amount of RAM required for a computer to run smoothly.

Close browser tabs

It's easy to get carried away with the number of tabs you have open in your web browser and end up with a dozen or more. A PC with 4GB of memory can run out of RAM with just 10 tabs open, at which point it starts moving RAM to the virtual memory on the hard drive, thereby slowing everything down.

To avoid this, keep the tabs you're using to a minimum and close any you aren't using. To see how much memory is being used by open tabs in Chrome, click the three-dot icon to open the menu and select 'More tools', followed by 'Task manager'. Click the 'Memory footprint' column header to sort the list by memory usage and see which tabs are consuming the most.

Chrome's memory usage sometimes just keeps growing and we have seen a single tab end up using over 2GB of memory – it would have used even more if we hadn't closed it. If your PC starts running slowly after you've been using it for a while, it's definitely worth closing a few tabs.

Increase virtual memory


Windows commits a section of your hard drive for use as virtual memory. If Windows runs out of both real memory and virtual memory, the PC almost grinds to a halt. This is a serious situation that should be avoided.

Open File Explorer, right-click This PC and select Properties on the menu that appears. Click 'Advanced system settings' on the left, select the Advanced tab, find the Performance section and click the Settings button. Select the Advanced tab in the next window, find the 'Virtual memory' section and click the Change button.

Eventually, you'll arrive at the Virtual Memory settings. At the top is the setting to 'Automatically manage paging file size for all drives', which is usually the best option for most people. However, it may be worth experimenting with custom settings to see if they improve your PC's performance.

Clear the tick from the box at the top and select 'Custom size'. There are boxes for 'Initial size' and 'maximum size' both can be set to the same value and you can get an idea of the size required by looking at the 'Currently allocated' amount at the bottom of the window.

It doesn't do any harm to have a large paging file, but it could negatively impact performance if it's too small. Make it at least equal to the amount of memory in the computer, and possibly double it if there isn't much available. Set at least a 4,000MB page file on a PC with 4GB of RAM (maybe even double that) and 8,000MB for 8GB of RAM.

More advanced tips for when you're feeling brave

Hard drive vs SSD

Solid-state drives (SSDs) are much faster than mechanical hard-disk drives (HDDs), so if Windows has to resort to using the drive as virtual memory, it won't slow down as much with an SSD as with an HDD. This is one of the reasons why computers are much faster when an HDD is replaced with an SSD.

In terms of speed, RAM is fastest, SSDs are slightly slower and HDDs are slowest. So if you can't upgrade the RAM in a PC, upgrade the HDD to an SSD instead.

Limit startup programs

Your computer could be out of memory before you make your first mouse-click. Obvious symptoms are a long startup after powering on and programs that take a long time to get going when they're clicked.


Even a fairly clean PC can require 2.5GB of memory just to boot to the desktop, while up to 1GB of memory can be reserved by the system, depending on the version of Windows. On a 4GB PC, that leaves just 500MB.

If you can't upgrade the RAM, the only thing to do is to stop startup programs loading in the background so they don't use valuable memory.

In Windows 10, right-click an empty part of the taskbar and select Task Manager. Some - but by no means all - startup programs are shown on the Start-up tab. Select any items you don't need and click the Disable button at the bottom. If you don't know what an item is for, right-click it and select 'Search online'. If there's anything you don't understand, leave it alone because it might be important.

Disable hidden startup items

Task Manager shows a handful of selected items on the Start-up tab, but there are dozens of startup items that aren't shown. Autoruns (bit.ly/ auto 481) is a powerful tool that shows everything that starts with Windows. If you want to dive deep into startup items,




Use Autoruns to see what's loading with Windows. Disable any unnecessary items

use Autoruns, but be aware that it contains a huge amount of complex information. Right-click any items you don't understand and use the Search Online option to find out whether they're needed. Focus on obvious items with recognisable names and don't disable anything you don't understand.

Use a memory optimiser

A memory optimiser is a tool that frees up memory to run programs faster. Wise Memory Optimizer (bit.ly/ wimo481) creates lots of free memory for the next program you run, making it run faster and perform better than before. However, it does this by pushing all other running programs to the hard drive in the virtual-memory page file, and switching programs is extremely slow while memory is reloaded from the hard drive's virtual memory to the real memory.

Memory optimisers therefore speed up the PC in one way, but slow it down in another. They may or may not help, depending on how you use your PC. You can try using one, but the benefits are mixed at best.

Organise files in Save As

Ever since I installed the recent major Windows 10 update, the format of my Downloads folder has changed. When I go to Save As and click a folder, it shows a long and detailed list of files organised into Yesterday, Last Week, Last Month and so on.

I find this layout very annoying and would rather have an alphabetical list of files and folders. This is my preferred layout, and I still see this if I access the folder through File Explorer. It also has an extensive toolbar across the top of the contents in File Explorer, which isn't visible in the Save As window, nor does there appear to be a way to make it visible.


How do I make the Save As list look like the File Explorer one?

Fix a non-booting USB

Following Issue 477's cover feature (bit.ly/webuser477) on using a USB memory stick to host a portable operating system, I decided to give it a go and invested £25 in the Pro version of WinToUSB (bit.ly/wtou481). However, I don't seem able to get it to work.

I have tried three PCs and two laptops, a mixture of Windows 10 Professional and Home, BIOS and UEFI, MBRs and GPTs, with no luck. Not a single device booted from the USB stick. I obviously changed the settings in BIOS/UEFI to allow USB boot and made it the first bootable device. I tried with and without Legacy compatibility, and with and without Safe Boot.

I've also tried all the options available in WinToUSB, such as all three partition schemes and all three options at the final stage, including VHD and VHDX. Can you think of any other reason why it's not working? I'm using a DataTraveler 100 G3 64GB stick, which is more than enough for my 64-bit Windows version. Any


advice would be appreciated.



A solution that worked for some people is to use a different make and model of USB memory stick. For example, one person switched from the Kingston DataTraveler to a Sandisk and it worked first time. Some computers and USB flash drives just seem to be incompatible. It can't even be narrowed down to a single manufacturer, because one model will work but another won't.

USB 2 and USB 3 sockets, and USB memory sticks can also be USB 2 or USB 3. It's possible that using a USB 2 stick in a USB 3 socket – or a USB 3 stick in a USB 2 socket – could be the cause of the problem. It shouldn't, but you never know, so try matching the socket and stick versions. Computers have multiple USB sockets, so try booting from all of them.

Some people have found that formatting the USB stick using the free program Rufus (rufus.ie) solves the problem. There's a portable version so you don't even need to install it.

Download Spotify tracks

Can you tell me if there is any software that can download music from Spotify to an external hard drive?

Music is copyrighted, so any software that allowed you to download and save tracks from Spotify would be illegal. There are programs that claim to do it but we haven't tried them because there is a legal way to save Spotify music for listening offline.

With a Spotify Premium account, you can download up to 10,000 songs on up to five different devices, including computers, phones and tablets. This lets you play music offline without an internet connection whenever you want.

Using the Spotify desktop app, go to the File menu and select Offline Mode. Albums can't be downloaded but playlists can. Go to a playlist, click the three-dot menu and select Download.

Storing 10,000 music tracks on your PC's hard drive could use a lot of space,

possibly more than you have available, so there is a way to store them elsewhere. Click the down arrow in the top-right corner of the desktop app and select Settings. Scroll down, then click Advanced and scroll down again to Offline Songs Storage. Click Change

Location and choose where you want Spotify to store the downloaded music.

Convert old Photo CDs

Many years ago, probably in the early 2000s when I first got a digital camera, I had lots of photographs stored on Photo CDs. I still have these, and they seem to be in good condition, but I can't access the photos they contain. Is there a way to open or convert the photos from a 15-year-old Photo CD?

Photo CDs were invented by Kodak in the 1990s and by 2000, many companies offered to turn printed or digital photos into Photo CDs. You could also get software to do it yourself on a computer. It wasn't particularly popular with the public and never took off to any extent, but keen photographers used it.

The PCD file format can contain multiple copies of a photograph at different resolutions, from 128 x 192 pixels, all the way up to 4,096 x 6,144. It's an old file format that isn't used today, but there are still a few software tools that can read files and extract the images, saving them in a more modern

Defragging memory sticks

Since the advent of SSDs, I've seen repeated advice not to defrag them because it allegedly damages them and reduces their life expectancy.

However, the same advice has never been issued about flash memory drives, such as USB memory sticks.

Since these use the same basic means of data storage, do the same rules apply?

There are several reasons why solid-state drives should not be defragmented, and the main one is that it has no effect on performance. A very fragmented mechanical hard drive is much slower than a defragmented one, but an SSD performs the same no matter how fragmented it is.

Another reason is that solid-state drives can only be written to a certain number of times. That number is very high and it's unlikely you would reach




USB memory sticks use solid-state memory, just like SSDs, and don't need defragging

it in even 10 years of normal use. However, defragging involves a lot of writes and you are using up the quota on something that has no benefit, so it unnecessarily shortens the drive's life.


USB memory sticks are similar to solid-state drives and the defragging advice is the same – don't bother, it has no effect on performance and it uses up the write quota, shortening the device's life.

In theory, memory sticks should last a long time, but we tend to lose them and mistreat them, carrying them in a pocket along with fluff, crumbs, loose change and bunches of keys. This shortens their life, too, so they don't tend to last as long as the SSDs installed in PCs.

format, such as JPEG.

Try IrfanView (www.irfanview.com). If that doesn't work, go to the plugins page (bit.ly/ivplg481) and get the iv_formats.zip plugin, which adds Photo CD support. ImageMagic (imagemagick .org) and pcdtojpeg (pcdtojpeg .sourceforge.net) should also work.

Reclaim unused hard-drive space

I bought a 2TB USB hard drive from a friend who didn't need it anymore - he does a lot of video recording and

editing, and needs even bigger drives! I have used various utilities to look at the drive and there appears to be 200GB of space that is unallocated. Can I use this? Ideally, I would like one big drive that uses all the space.

There's no point having 200GB of A unused space on a hard drive. Since your drive is second-hand, the previous owner may have set up and used the space to store personal information, and then erased the partition before selling the drive.

It's a good idea to wipe everything on a used drive before you put your own files on it. Plug it in and power it up, then open Explorer, right-click This PC and select Manage. Select Disk Management under Storage to see the internal and external drives and partitions.

Right-click each of the partitions on the external drive and select 'Delete volume'. The drive can then be rightclicked and a new volume created using all the space. Right-click it and select New Simple Volume, then follow the steps in the wizard that appears.

Switch email providers

I have broadband internet provided by TalkTalk and a TalkTalk email account. I am thinking of switching to another internet provider and am currently shopping around and waiting for a good deal to come up. When I switch, will I still be able to access my email account?


We advise against using an ISP's own email address because it can be a major hassle switching email accounts from the old company to a new one. Cut the tie now and use an email service that is independent of your ISP. Microsoft Outlook and Google Gmail are obvious ones, but there are many more, such as Yahoo, GMX, ProtonMail, Zoho Mail and iCloud Mail (if you also have an iPhone or iPad). All these email services are free and can be accessed in a web browser on your PC. Apps for the

services are available for phones.

Switch email accounts now - don't wait until you move to a new ISP. Sign up for a new email account at one of these

email providers and start using it. If you you receive new emails, tell the have stored emails containing important sender that you have a new email information, send them to your new

If you go into the settings for an email account, you'll see there is almost always an option to forward new messages to another email account. Set this up on your old account to forward everything to your new account. When




Switch from your ISP email to a popular email service as soon as you can, so you don't lose account access if you change ISP

address. This may involve signing into your online accounts, such as your bank, gas and electricity supplier, and changing your email address.

Eventually, everyone will be using the new address and the old one won't be needed. You can then easily switch your ISP whenever you want.

Once you've bought a book, it's yours, so you can read it on any device registered to your Amazon account. You can do this on your new device by pressing the Home button and switching the view from On Device to Cloud - the option is located under the ribbon in the left-hand corner. This displays all the Kindle books connected to your account, and you can download each title by tapping the cover.

You can also push ebooks to your Kindle via amazon.co.uk. Log into your account, then visit 'Manage Your Content and Devices'. You should see a list of all your purchases. Beside each title, you'll see three dots. Click this for the option to 'Deliver to Default Device & Others'. Here you can send the book to a particular Kindle and create a default device, if you haven't already. Click Deliver and your Kindle will download the ebook.







Use your phone even when the screen breaks

Here's a good tip for clumsy folks. Have you ever wondered how you'd access important files on your Android phone if the touchscreen smashed? It's easy enough to buy a new phone and recover any files and apps that are saved in the cloud, but that won't help you retrieve important information saved on the device itself. In this situation, you need an OTG adapter. This lets you control your phone by connecting a USB mouse, so you can get the data you need without using your broken touchscreen. It's easy to set up. Plug one end of the



cable into your phone and attach a mouse to the other end. Provided your phone supports USB OTG, you can use the mouse to open Settings, 'About phone'. Select Software, find the build number and click this seven times to unlock Android's 'Developer options'. From here, switch on USB Debugging. Now you can connect your phone to a computer via USB to transfer files and media from the phone.

If your screen is not only shattered but completely blank, try a free recovery tool such as MiniTool Mobile Recovery (bit.ly/ recovery481). Be warned, though: it's a bit limited.



Another useful toolbar feature is the 'Read aloud' button. As the name suggests, this converts a PDF's text into speech, which means you can turn an ebook into an audiobook. You can then sit back and listen to it rather than reading it. When Edge starts speaking, a new toolbar appears that lets you choose from one of three voices and set the reading speed using a slider.

Uninstall any program

Drag the crosshairs over any program you want to remove literally setting the program in your sights - and the tool will ask whether you wish to Uninstall or Delete the software (you may see other options, too, depending on the program). 

Don't waste time on Windows Updates

Windows 10 is amazing, but sometimes when you try to update it through the Settings app, it gives no indication that anything is wrong until you realise that it's stuck. When I updated from version 1803 to 1903, for example, the download took six hours to reach 100% and then stayed there, even while my laptop was in Battery Saver mode. When I noticed this, I ran the troubleshooter and discovered a WU Database Corruption problem. If Windows Update had run the troubleshooter at the beginning of the process instead - when it says 'Checking for Updates' - and then applied fixes automatically, maybe I

wouldn't have wasted my day trying to download a corrupted update.

I paused updates to avoid repeating the problem, then downloaded the Cumulative Updates from the Microsoft Update Catalog and installed the Microsoft Update Standalone Package, which contains a version of the file that isn't corrupted. Now I have to download and install feature updates using the WUA, rather than leaving Windows Update to detect it. If Microsoft integrates this into a future feature update, maybe users will be less reluctant to update and waste a chunk of their day, as I did.

Three won't give me my switching code

was interested to read your news story in Issue 479 about the new service that lets you get a PAC code by text message ('You can now switch mobile provider by text message', bit.ly/webuser479).

My existing contract with Three terminates at the end of August, so I found out how much it would cost to terminate early. Then I sent a text, as described in your article.

The text was quickly acknowledged, but rather than receiving a PAC code I was directed to Three's customer service team in India. An agent then spent 30 minutes ignoring my request and trying to sell me new services. In the end I became angry. The agent



told me a PAC code would be sent within an hour, but it never arrived.

The next day I visited a local Three shop, where I was told that they had no authority to issue a code and that I'd have to contact India again. When I did so, I faced the same bullying and terminated the call.

This is precisely the sort of behaviour the new service is supposed to prevent. Should I report this abuse to Ofcom? Tony Steele, via email

Web User says: Three is one of the mobile networks that signed up for Ofcom's Text-to-Switch service, so it should have given you your PAC code via text message without argument. However, the system has only just been introduced, so it's possible that there are still a few teething problems. Ofcom's rules state that Three must issue your PAC within two working days of your request or give a reason for not doing so. If you continue to have trouble obtaining your PAC code, you can complain to Ofcom by phoning 0300 123 3000 or filling in the online monitoring form at bit.ly/ofcom481.

Spotify stopped my PC shutting down

Like the winner of your Star Email in Issue 479, I discovered Spotify through your magazine. However, I accidentally discovered something



surprising about the program, too.

When shutting down my PC, a message flashed up briefly stating that Spotify was preventing the operation. This was strange because I hadn't been using the program. When I next booted up, I checked the Startup section in the Task Manager and there was Spotify. Even more surprising is that it was showing high disk usage even though I hadn't downloaded anything. I decided it was time to disable it!

Don't charge your devices overnight

Noise-cancelling headphones to shout about

echnology can be a proper pain in the backside. Facebook knows your inside-leg measurement, even if you've never set foot on the site; Wi-Fi's less reliable than an MP's expenses claim; and my printer pretends it's run out of ink six months before it actually has. But technology can also be magnificent, and if you're jetting off on a long-haul flight this summer, I urge you to make one never-to-be-regretted investment: noise-cancelling headphones.

The headphones I'm talking about are Sony's WH-1000XM3 – widely regarded to be the best noise-cancelling cans on the market at the moment, and so they flipping well should be at around £270. 
Charley to stop her talking for 15 seconds or so.
