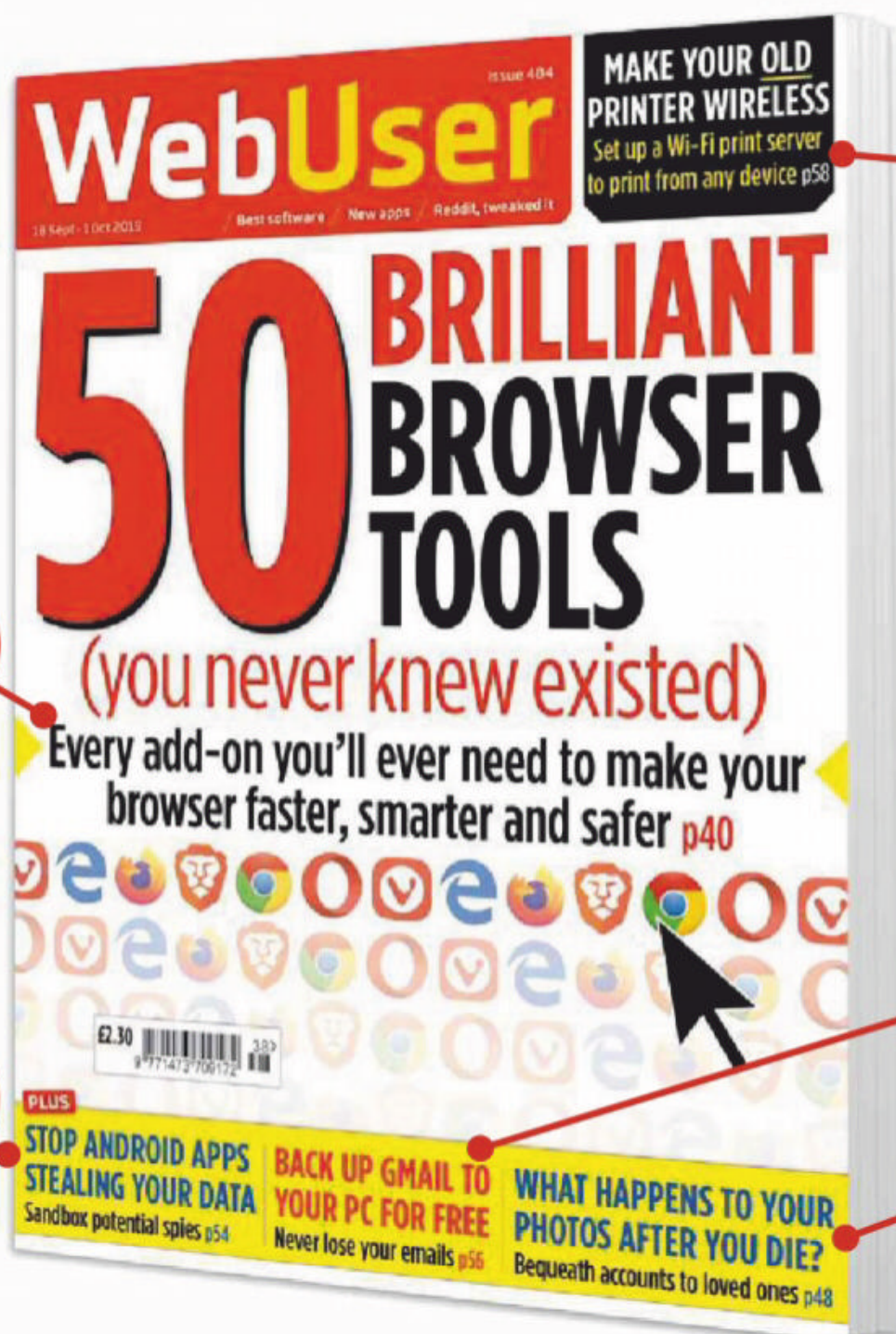
## Unsung heroes of Browsertown

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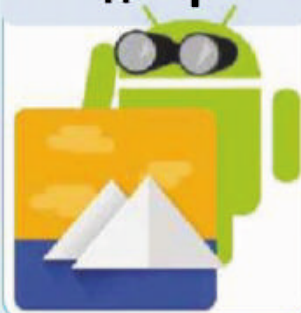
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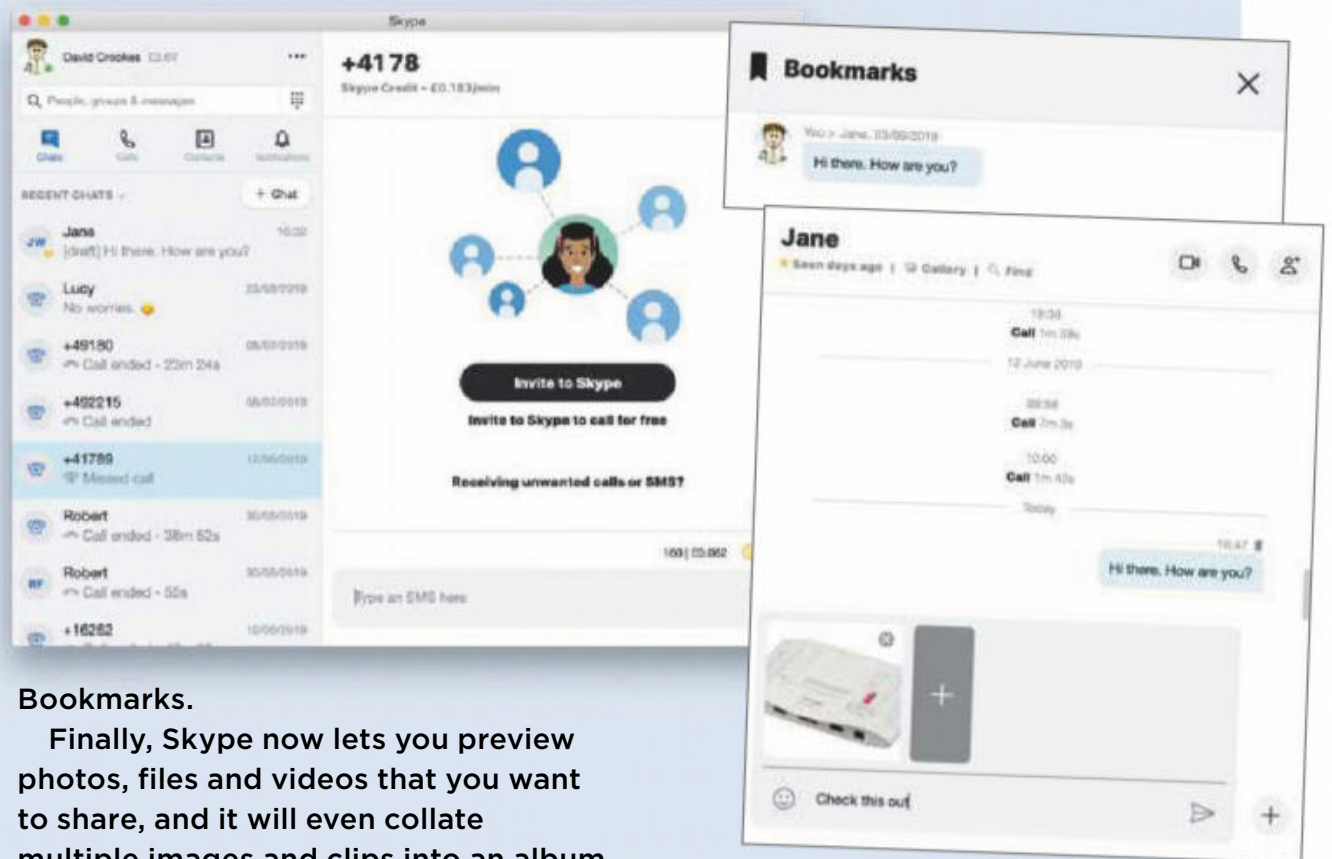
# What's New Online

## Master Skype's new messaging tools

Skype may have been overtaken as a messaging tool by WhatsApp, Messenger and Apple Messages, but its owner, Microsoft, is keen to boost its credentials by adding a host of handy new features.

For starters, you now don't need to worry about finishing a message you've started. Provided you don't delete your text, you can go off and do something else before returning to complete it. Unfinished, unsent messages are marked "[draft]" so you can easily spot them when you look down your list. It doesn't even matter if you close Skype: those drafts will remain.

Messages can also be bookmarked, which is very handy. You do this in the desktop app by right-clicking and selecting Add Bookmark or by long-pressing if you're on a mobile device. Tap your profile picture and you'll see all your saved entries under



Bookmarks.

Finally, Skype now lets you preview photos, files and videos that you want to share, and it will even collate multiple images and clips into an album within the chat history.

All desktop versions also benefit from a new split window that puts the

contact list in one frame and conversations in the other.

## Search for text in images in Google Photos

Some of your photos and screenshots are likely to contain text – many of us snap Wi-Fi passwords or recipes from books, for example – but such images are easily lost among your other pictures. With the latest update to Google Photos, help is at hand. You can search for text within your images to find the picture you're after and, even better, copy and paste those words elsewhere.

To start, just tap the search bar in the Google Photos app and type the words featured in the image you're looking for. When the image appears, open it, press the Google Lens button at the bottom of the screen and select the image to highlight some text. You'll be able to indicate exactly how much text

you want to copy using the sliders, then transfer them to another app for pasting. It's a brilliant use of optical character recognition (OCR) technology.



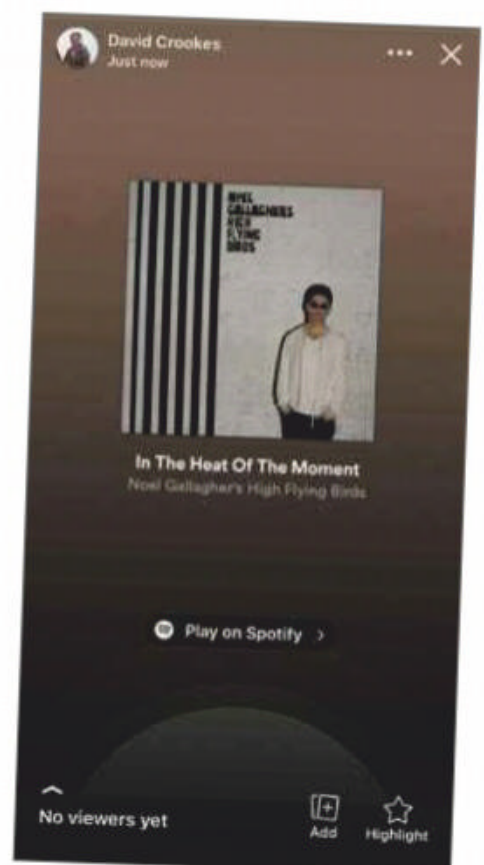
## Share Spotify songs to Facebook Stories

Spotify now lets you share music and podcasts on Facebook Stories. The new feature allows for an instant 15-second preview of a single track on the social network. The listener can then tap if they want to hear the track in its entirety within Spotify.

The function is primarily geared towards artists who want to promote their own content but it can be used with any song and by anyone. You simply need to view the track in Spotify and tap Share then select Facebook and customise the Story before posting it.

When someone views the Facebook story, they'll get an audio preview and be able to click the relevant button for the whole track. The feature doesn't work with more than one song so it's not suitable for albums, playlists or artist profile pages.

SnapChat is making it easier to produce your own augmented-reality lenses. The messaging service's desktop app Lens Studio allows for step-by-step creation by selecting

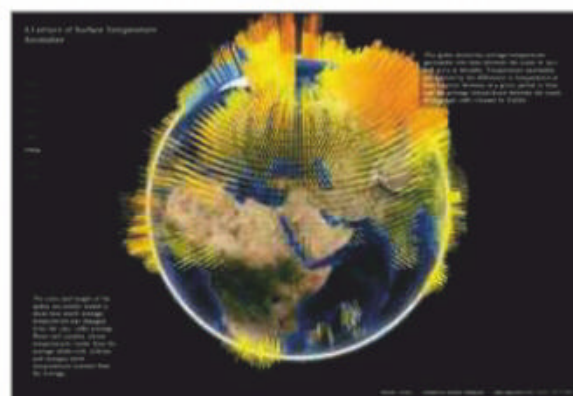
Help, Start Tutorial and also offers a range of new templates including one that applies 2D content to a video

and others that allow for makeup and different hair colour. You'll need to download Lens Studio to get started, but you can see what other users are creating by tapping the smiley icon in the mobile app when the Lens Carousel is active. An extra 14 world landmarks have been added, too.

## See temperature changes globally

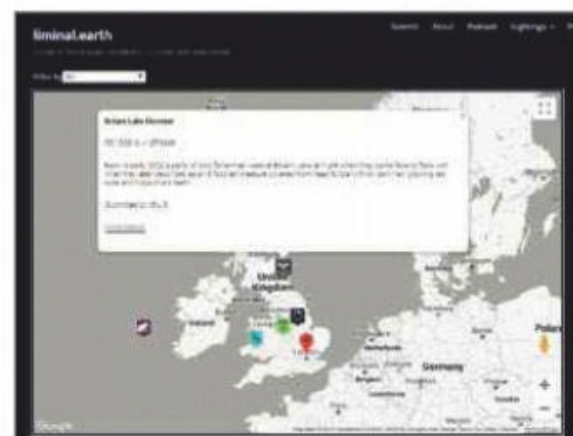
Using data from NASA, this interactive globe lets you see how temperatures have changed on Earth over the past century. Select a decade and the tool will compare the temperature for that 10-year period with the average for 1951 to 1980, before spinning the globe to see the anomalies in different parts of the world. Red, yellow and orange spikes show warmer than average temperatures, while blues and purples indicate cooler averages. Take a deep breath before you select the 2010s – it's rather worrying.



## Explore global paranormal sightings

Described as a "map of the strange, wonderful, unusual, and unexpected", Liminal.Earth lets you explore spooky sightings around the world, as reported by users, from fairies and ghosts to aliens and time travellers. The UK is currently underrepresented, although a "classic flying saucer" has been spotted in Birmingham and a scary, 8ft lake monster was seen in Northumberland.



## NEW VOICE COMMANDS



### Keep Assistant quiet

Google now lets you turn off speech output, so responses appear on an Android phone but aren't spoken aloud. Say "Ok, Google" and tap the Explorer icon, then your profile picture and select Settings, Assistant before tapping Speech Output under 'Voice and Speech' and choosing Hands-Free Only.



### Find a new book

Audible's new Alexa skill gives recommendations for your next book or audiobook. Say "ask Book Finder for inspiration" to hear from editors, authors and celebrities, or ask for bestsellers, new releases and books similar to those you like. Audio samples are also available.



### Combine transport methods

Google Maps now recognises that you may need a bike or taxi ride before you can hop on public transport, so it includes cycling and ride-share options with directions when you search for a destination. Routes include travel time and costs.

### Distort text with your hand

Touch Type uses body tracking from Posenet as well as a clever algorithm to allow you to wave your hand in front of your webcam and make typography on the screen distort and disappear. It works best if you stand back, so that both hand cursors appear on the screen.

### Learn Latin with Duolingo

Latin may be considered a dead language, but Duolingo has added it to its list of courses. Available via its website and iOS and Android apps, it uses Duolingo's process of reinforcement and repetition.



## Facebook leaks phone numbers of 210 million users

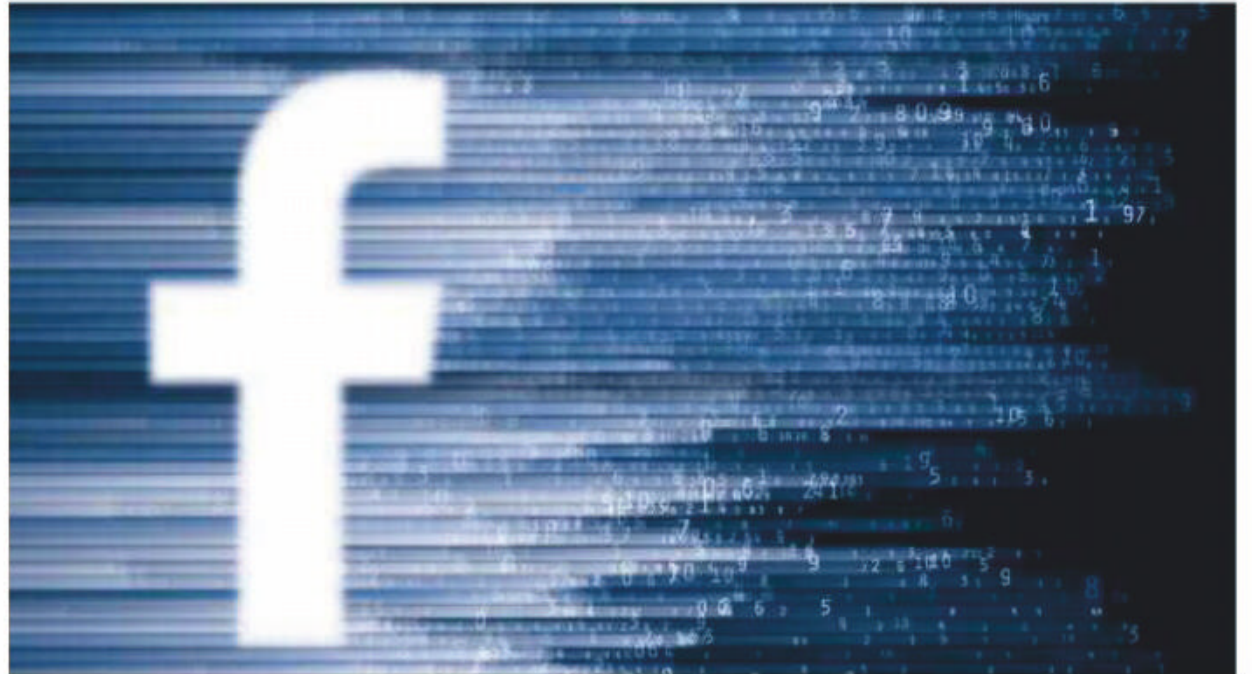
### What happened?

Facebook has admitted to yet another privacy breach, this time leaking 419 million phone numbers shared with the social network by its users. According to reports, the information was stored on a server connected to the web and not password-protected, which meant anyone who spotted the data could view it without any effort.

The leaked dataset included Facebook IDs (made up of your username and a unique number), as well as associated phone numbers. Full name, gender and country were listed for some of the records. It's not yet clear who scraped the data, but it has been removed by the web-hosting company. The dataset was spotted by security researchers at the GDI Foundation.

Facebook previously collected phone numbers so users could search for each other, but the practice was stopped last year after it became clear that scammers and political campaigns were using Facebook's automated tool to scrape names and profiles by entering a phone number.

This latest incident follows last year's data breach when hackers accessed the data of more than 50 million users, as well as the Cambridge Analytica scandal. And it comes as US regulators pile on another antitrust investigation into the company, with New York state authorities looking into whether Facebook has "endangered consumer data, reduced the quality of consumers' choices or increased the price of advertising". Facebook says it isn't a



monopoly because there are plenty of social-media alternatives online, though it now owns WhatsApp and Instagram.

### How will it affect you?

Some of the records were duplicates, so the actual number of users affected is around 210 million. Of those, about 18 million were UK Facebook users, while 133 million were in the US. The tool that is suspected to have collected the data was disabled last year, which Facebook said suggests the affected phone numbers are old. However, tests by tech news site TechCrunch shows plenty of the numbers are still in use.

"This dataset is old and appears to have information obtained before we made changes last year to remove people's ability to find others using their phone numbers," a Facebook spokeswoman said in a statement sent to journalists. "The dataset has been taken down and we have seen no evidence that Facebook accounts were compromised."

While it's possible for your phone number to be harvested by data brokers or abused by scammers, this particular data breach isn't likely to lead to other serious repercussions. Still, it makes us think twice about entering phone numbers on Facebook, or letting the site peek at our contacts list.

To leave Facebook, you can either

deactivate or delete your account: the former removes it from active use, letting you re-enable it later, while the latter completely removes your profile.

### What do we think?

Oh, Facebook! The company can't seem to catch a break. But we have no pity for Mark Zuckerberg or his social network. The reason this data was collected and left unprotected is the company's profound disrespect for data privacy. Facebook never needed our phone numbers – the tool to search for friends using their number was clearly nothing other than a data grab to help further identify users. Even after disabling the phone-number search tool, Facebook kept asking users for phone numbers, saying it was for security authentication. Yet last year, researchers revealed that such numbers were used to target ads.

We think it's right that regulators consider whether Facebook has too much power, and ensure that it doesn't further link accounts across Instagram and WhatsApp. It's disappointing that so many popular web properties have been snapped by Zuckerberg's company, given its many data issues.

Of course, none of these data problems should come as a surprise. Facebook has failed time and again to protect user privacy. The time may have come to abandon it altogether.

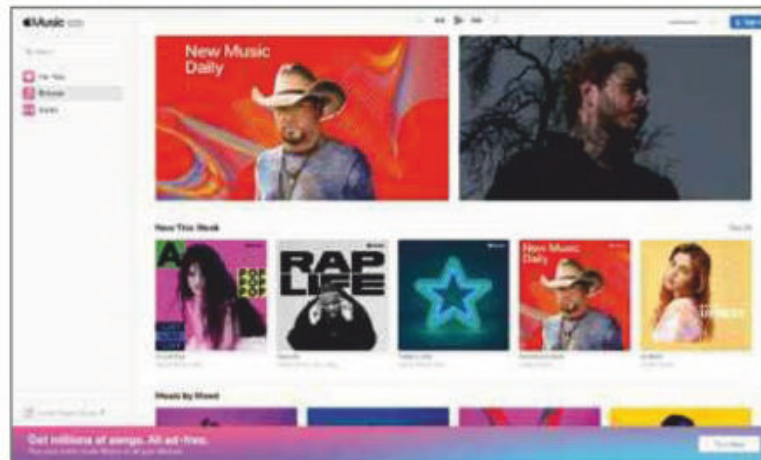

## Apple Music launches on the web

### What happened?

Forget installing bloated iTunes software or the Apple Music app – a new web interface for the streaming service means you can play your favourite tracks directly in your web browser.

If you already use Apple Music, the website will look familiar because it's structured in a similar way to the app. The web version of Apple Music is available at [beta.music.apple.com](https://beta.music.apple.com) and as its URL suggests, it remains in beta, so some features are currently missing. While you can access the full streaming music catalogue, some Apple-only content such as certain music



videos and the Beats 1 radio station aren't yet available. Such features are expected to arrive eventually, though it's not clear when the web version of Apple Music will come out of beta.

### How will it affect you?

Apple Music isn't limited to iPhone and iPad users – it's already available as an

Android app, too. Now, you can listen to the service even if you're not using a

mobile device, although for the time being you'll still need to register via an app, so ask a friend for help if you don't have a smartphone.

If you're already a subscriber, you'll now be able to play your tunes on your PC or laptop of choice, rather than be limited to your smartphone. Apple Music costs £9.99 a month for a

single subscription, or £14.99 for a family deal with support for six people.

### What do we think?

One of the great things about the web and browsers is that they're interoperable: websites can be read on a Mac or a Windows laptop, on an Android phone or an iPhone, and everything in between. Rather than locking down the streaming service, Apple is opening it up for anyone to use, which isn't the way the company normally operates but is a welcome development. Handily, it also brings Apple Music in line with its biggest rival, Spotify, which also has a web version.

## Android hit by text-message security flaw

### What happened?

The Android mobile platform has been hit by another security flaw that could affect up to a billion phones. Researchers at cybersecurity firm Check Point ([www.checkpoint.com](http://www.checkpoint.com)) spotted a vulnerability that allows smartphones to be hacked with a single text message. It takes advantage of network settings to pretend to be an operator, and sends a dodgy text to a target. If the victim accepts the new settings, their internet activity could be viewed by the attacker.

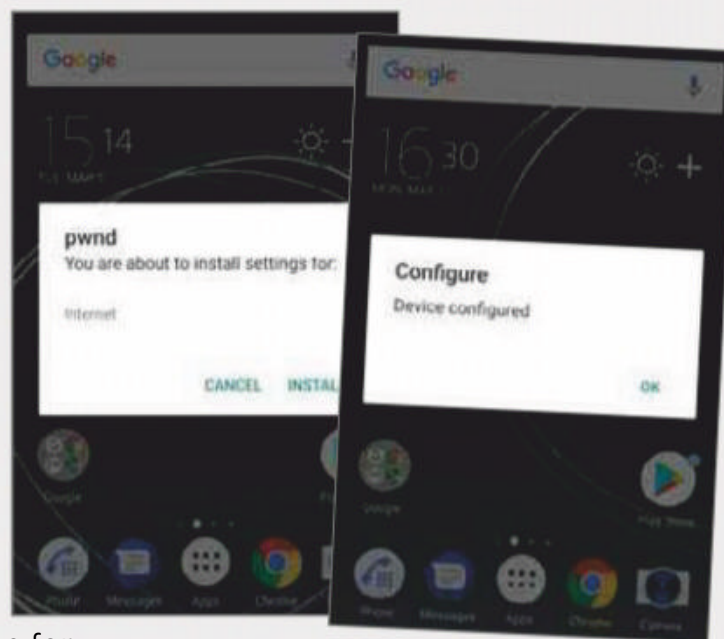
### How will it affect you?

The researchers said that Samsung phones were particularly at risk from this

attack because they don't require operator messages to undergo checks for authenticity. While other phones do authenticate, there are still ways around the checks, the researchers said.

This vulnerability is serious, but it's one for Android and phone manufacturers to solve – indeed, Samsung and LG have already rolled out patches, while Huawei says one is in the works.

If you receive a text purporting to be from your operator that you find



confusing, don't click Accept until you've contacted customer services. It's worth remembering that such research finds flaws in order to fix them, and doesn't necessarily mean any hackers are using this particular technique.

### What do we think?

This may sound like a niche flaw, but it serves to highlight the many different ways hackers can target us. While most attacks will still come via the usual routes, such as dodgy emails, there are myriad ways we're at risk online and on mobile devices. There's no cause for panic because most attacks can be avoided with a bit of common sense – if something doesn't feel right, it probably isn't.

Don't be afraid to ask a friend or family member for help or to call customer support at your network provider – that's what they're there for, after all.

# Fraud fears over Chinese ‘deepfake’ app

## What happened?

Chinese-developed video app Zao has come under fire for stripping users of the rights to the images they upload. The ‘deepfake’ app lets people cast themselves in the role of popular film and TV characters. One video, which recently went viral, replaced actor Leonardo DiCaprio with a Chinese user in scenes from the 1997 blockbuster movie *Titanic*.

Despite the fun and games, the app’s end-user agreement has come under intense fire. According to the South China Morning Post, it “gave the developers the global right to permanently use any image created on the app for free”. And Chinese messaging app WeChat has now banned the use of the Zao app due to associated “security risks”. Developer Momo has since apologised and removed this clause from its terms and conditions.

However, the issue doesn’t end there. Some experts have suggested that the deepfake technology could be used to defraud facial-recognition systems at financial institutions. Chinese internet giant Alibaba, which owns the PayPal-style AliPay, went as far as releasing a statement explaining that even the impressively accurate deepfake videos could not be used by others to pay for goods. It said: “There is a lot of online



face-changing software – but no matter how realistic, it is impossible to break through the facial payment system”.

## How will it affect you?

If you haven’t used Zao, your data is safe because for now, the issue only relates to users of the AI app. So far, it’s impacted Chinese audiences, but it’s entirely possible that western developers will release a similar app with an equally obtuse end-user agreement. As always, check the terms and conditions before signing up for apps.

These types of apps are becoming more popular – a new one hits the app store each weekend and it’s all too easy

to get swept up in their viral nature. But it isn’t always “just a bit of a laugh”. No technology company should own the rights to your image – and any that try should be shown the door.

## What do we think?

Fears over advanced artificial intelligence, data misuse and cybersecurity are all part of a modern disaster story that’s becoming all too prevalent. Following the recent Russian-made FaceApp – which aged users’ selfies to make them look like pensioners – it highlights yet another example of the way apps use, or own, the data you provide.



## FIRST LOOK

### Amazon Fire TV Cube [bit.ly/fire484](https://bit.ly/fire484)

The Amazon Fire TV Stick has proved remarkably popular. The branded USB stick makes TVs ‘smart’, so you can watch Prime, Netflix, iPlayer and YouTube without needing to buy the latest models. The Amazon Fire Cube, however, failed to set the world alight, and didn’t even go on sale in the UK.

The all-new Fire Cube is set to change that. This second-generation box promises to offer “the fastest, most powerful Fire TV ever, delivering a fast, fluid experience for your favourite films and TV programmes”.

Think of this 4K-capable streaming media player as a combination of a Fire TV Stick and an Alexa smart speaker. That means no more hunting for the remote control to change the

channel – just use your voice. Film fans and TV binge-watchers should also approve of the support for HDR, HDR 10, HDR10+, HLG and Dolby Vision.

Setting up the hands-free TV streamer proves just as easy as any Fire TV device – simply connect it to your TV through the HDMI port, switch it on, and sign in. You’re also able to hook up multiple supported devices such as sound bars, using the cloud, infrared or HDMI-CEC. These, too, can be controlled by your voice.

But the Fire Cube is not without shortcomings. For one thing, you won’t be able to connect your phone via Bluetooth (so no Spotify blaring from



your TV’s sound bar), and there’s a lack of consistency across apps – some can be fully controlled via Alexa, while others can’t. This makes it an occasionally frustrating experience, should you step outside the

usual Prime-Netflix comfort zone.

However, it’s not enough to make the Cube a total write-off. Especially given Amazon’s tendency to update its software and associated apps over time.

The Fire TV Cube goes on sale on 10 October for £109.99 – which, for a TV-focused Alexa device, will make it a Christmas must-have for many of us.





## WHAT'S THE RUMOUR

## Is it time to prepare for Wi-Fi 7?

Wi-Fi 6 may have only just launched, but already there's talk about the coming of Wi-Fi 7. The current Wi-Fi standard has brought increased speed and flexibility – it uses both 2.4GHz and 5GHz channels, which makes it ideal for high data streams over longer ranges.

But apparently that's not enough for technology company Qualcomm. The chip manufacturer, which has helped place Wi-Fi 6-enabled chips in modern devices, held a so-called Wi-Fi day this summer, where the company's VP of Tech claimed: "I'm excited about delivering a gigabit everywhere in your house, every nook and cranny. You'll be at the point where wireless is faster than wired."

It's thought that Wi-Fi 7 will roll out in three stages. The first sees users jumping on the 6GHz channel – this will only be available to devices running Wi-Fi 6 or above, preventing older devices from clogging up the channel. The second stage, expected in 2022, sees an uplink upgrade. Entitled uplink multiuser multiple-input multiple-output – or UL MU-MIMO for short – the technology allows Wi-Fi signals to send data across multiple paths, and upload



data faster.

The third and final stage sees network manufacturers creating 16-antenna devices – for comparison, Wi-Fi 6 allows up to eight. That should mean, for everyday users, ever quicker internet speeds and improved range.

## LIKELIHOOD RATING



**It's inevitable that Wi-Fi will receive another upgrade. While the technology is impressive, it's not fit for an always-on world that demands instant connections – especially as internet usage grows in Africa and Asia. There are also technical complications that will need to be ironed out before Wi-Fi 7 is fit for human consumption. As such, the rumoured 2024 final release date may be optimistic.**

Using 60-degree reception, this aural device acts as a kind of satellite dish, amplifying sound from all directions, rather than just in front of you. The precision-milled earbuds were tested by the University of Southampton to see if they help you hear conversations better (they do). But this isn't strictly a medical device for the hard-of-hearing – EarHD is also suitable for listening to music, going to gigs and generally enhancing your audio environment. Pledges start at £199 for a pair of aluminium EarHDs, or £299 for the titanium version.

### Hackers steal e-tickets from transport apps

Mobile phone apps for public transport can be manipulated to create free tickets, it has emerged, after an activist group hacked two Manchester-based services. The hackers were able to generate digital tickets by exploiting a security flaw in the transport apps, which create QR codes that function as e-tickets, but store the keys used to generate these codes in the apps themselves.

The group, who call themselves The Public Transport Pirate Association of the United Kingdom, released its findings on Reddit and



called the apps' security "laughable at best". The hackers believe that public transport should be free to all, which is why they've gone public with their findings. The initial hack focused on the Greater Manchester area, but the group said it can be easily adapted to other transport networks that use the same software for their electronic tickets.

A spokesperson for Transport for Greater Manchester said: "We want to assure customers that the security of customer data is paramount and we've been informed by our suppliers that no personal data has been compromised". [bit.ly/etickets484](https://bit.ly/etickets484)

### Fraudsters use AI voice tech to steal money

Cybercriminals have used artificial intelligence (AI) and voice technology to impersonate a UK business owner, resulting in the fraudulent transfer of \$243,000 (£201,000).

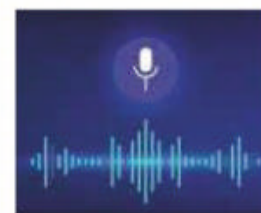
In March this year, an unknown hacker

group is said to have exploited AI-powered software to mimic the prominent business leader's voice to fool the CEO of a subsidiary into transferring funds to a Hungarian supplier. The money was then moved to other locations.

This social-engineering attack could be a sign of things to come, according to ESET cybersecurity specialist Jake Moore, who expects to see a huge rise in machine-learned cybercrimes.

"We have already seen deepfakes imitate celebrities and public figures in video format, but these have taken around 17 hours of footage to create convincingly," he said. "Being able to fake voices takes fewer recordings to produce. As computing power increases, we are starting to see these become even easier to create, which paints a scary picture ahead."

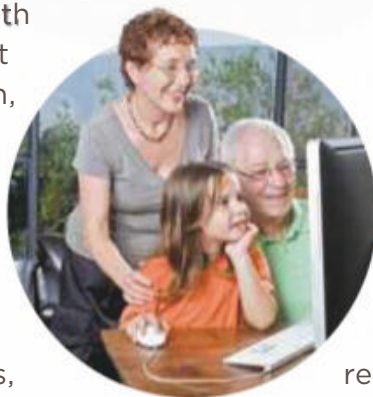
**Q Are schools doing enough to educate children about cybersecurity?**

**A** While younger children are becoming more tech-savvy, they are by nature less risk-averse and lack the understanding to

fully appreciate the dangers of being online. With reports of toys that can spy on children, and kids as young as three owning social-media accounts, it's clear the dangers are real – for homes and schools, as well as children.

Although the government and schools are increasingly teaching children how to spot potential dangers online, there's still a lack of awareness around basic device protection. This means parents need to take more responsibility to ensure their children are cyber-

secure. Recent research by Kaspersky revealed that while younger generations

are often asked to provide tech assistance to older relatives, people over 50 are likely to be more worldly, and adopt a greater sense of caution. This means they are generally more selective about their reasons for going online, whereas younger people have grown up

immersed in tech and are happy to use the internet in nearly every aspect of their lives.

For this reason, a young person's potential 'attack surface' is a lot wider than it is for someone older. That said, it's important to note that people of all ages are vulnerable to scams and other threats. It is crucial to adopt the same sense of caution when we are online as we do in the real world.

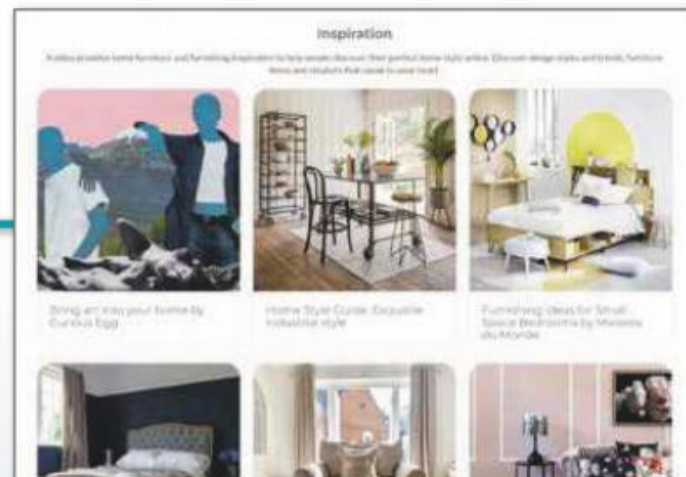
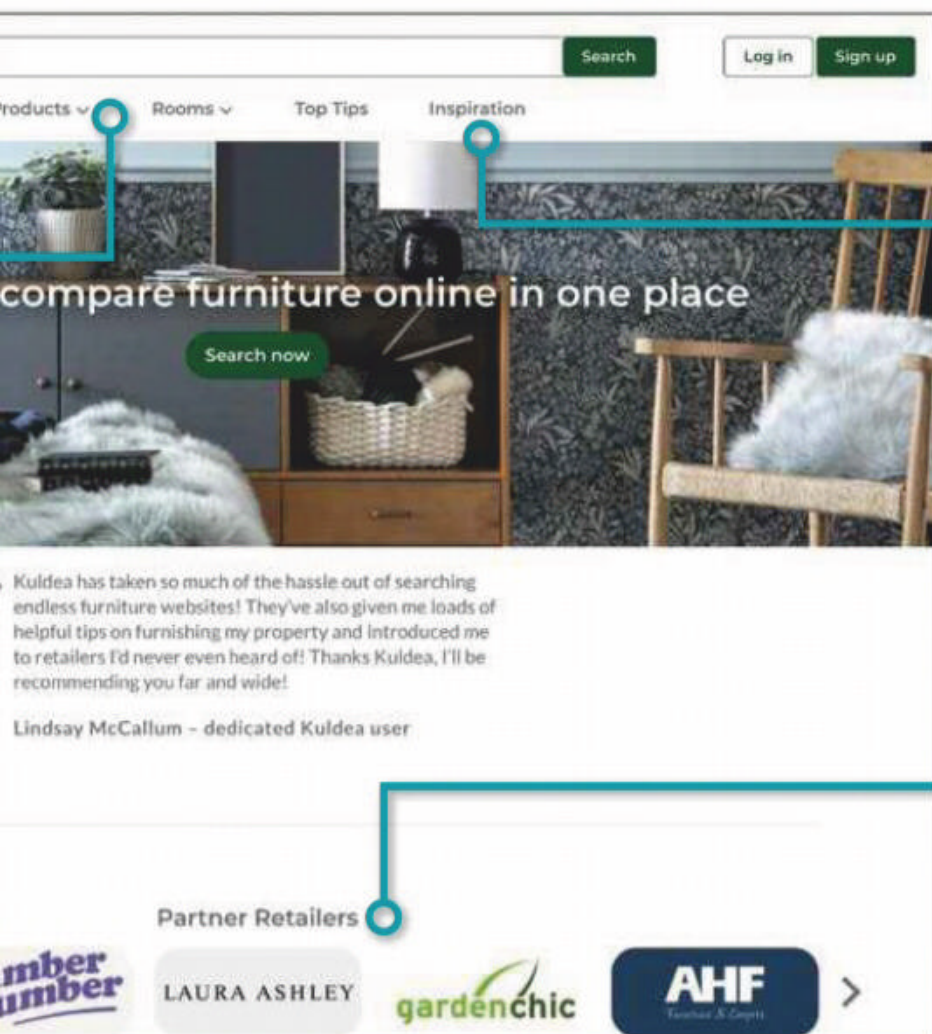
Non-profit organisation Science News is nearly a century old and its pledge to be honest, transparent and accurate in its reporting has seldom been more needed. The revamp has dropped some sections, such as blogs, but the site is no poorer for it. Instead, images and videos are at the fore and lot of work has gone into creating a less-cluttered design with clearer navigation categories and more space to breathe. Built using WordPress, the site also has mobile devices in mind. Comments on stories, however, need to be emailed so there's less chance of building a bustling community.

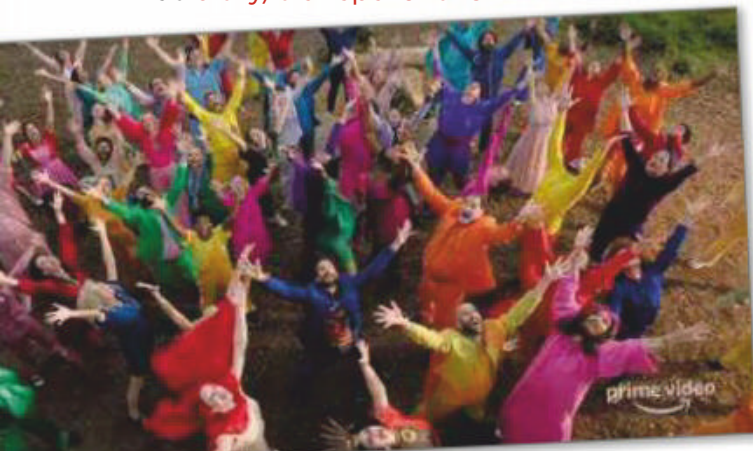


### Sing farewell to *Transparent*

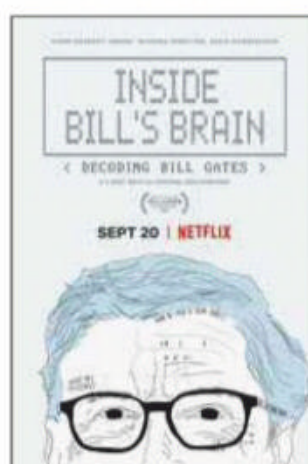

# Product Test

We test and compare the latest products

## Acer Aspire C 24

Instead of a chunky desktop computer, why not make your next PC a sleek all-in-one, where the PC is built into the screen?

**M**any people choose a laptop as a compact alternative to a desktop PC, and then plug it into a big screen when they want to get a better view. But if you're not bothered about portability, you could opt for an all-in-one PC, where the components are built into a large screen you can use all the time.

We've had a few all-in-ones pass through our labs in recent months, so we can compare this latest Acer model against the slightly older Acer Aspire S 24 and the similarly priced rival Medion Akoya E23401. All three of these models are built around a 24in screen with a resolution of 1,920 x 1,080 pixels, an Intel Core i5-8250U processor and 8GB of memory.

### Build and design

The C 24 has an attractive slimline design. Its minimal screen bezels (the plastic area around the edge of the screen) have a faux brushed-aluminium finish, and its angular stand complements its clean, modern aesthetic, even if it's largely made out of plastic. It's not as eye-catching as the S 24's gold trim, but it's a good-looking PC for the price.

Both 802.11ac Wi-Fi and Bluetooth 4.1 are integrated, while all the physical connectors are positioned on the rear. These amount to one HDMI output, one Ethernet

socket, a 3.5mm audio jack and two USB 2 ports, with an SD card reader and two USB 3 ports sitting higher up, one of which is intended for the included USB webcam.

This camera perches on top of the screen, held on by a magnet so it's easy to remove

when you don't want to use it. This is an almost identical system to the Akoya E23401, and it's a nice touch. Video quality is good, with smooth movement, and removing it is more reassuring than a sliding privacy cover, because physically disconnecting the

camera means you can be sure it's not working. If anything, it's probably best to leave the camera unplugged until you need it, because four USB ports isn't very many – fewer than the port count on both the aforementioned S 24 and the E23401.

The bundled mouse and keyboard can be connected to the same USB port via a single wireless receiver but this still limits you to three ports with the camera unplugged, or just two ports if you'd prefer to keep the camera accessible.

USB ports aren’t the only way the C 24 has scrimped to keep its price low. The speakers are awful – completely devoid of bass and incapable of making music sound like anything other than a scratchy mess. They’re not particularly loud, either, although considering their lack of fidelity, that may be a good thing.

## Screen quality and performance

The C 24 managed to display a satisfactory 82.4% of colours in the sRGB colour standard and has a decent contrast ratio of 1,008:1. Peak brightness is 272.2cd/m<sup>2</sup> (candles per square metre). These aren’t the kinds of figures you’d expect from a top-class monitor but they’re not bad considering more corners could have been cut. Furthermore, it’s a much better screen than you get on both the E23401 and the more expensive S 24.

With regard to performance, the C 24’s small

compact build means it relies on the graphics hardware integrated with the processor, so it’s not a great option if you’re looking for smooth gaming. The best we could get out of Dirt Showdown – a game we regularly use to test PCs – was 32fps (frames per second). To get this, we had to lower it from the preferred Ultra detail settings to High, and reduce the resolution to 1,280 x 720 pixels.

All that said, the C 24 is a good general-use family PC, acceptably priced and perfectly adequate for

browsing and simple office tasks. As you’d expect with similar core setups, the performance on the other all-in-ones was similar.

The C 24’s lone 1TB hard drive, however, can cause some frustrating slowdowns. With no SSD or solid-state cache, Windows is entirely reliant on creaky old mechanical tech, which is bad news for booting and transfer times. At one stage, the C 24 took more than six minutes to perform a simple restart.

The E23401 escaped this problem by pairing its mechanical hard drive with a master SSD drive, which gave it a significant boost when booting Windows and launching key software. The compromise comes with the screen, which pales in comparison to the C 24.

This affordable all-in-one PC will solve all your desktop space problems, particularly if you don’t want to compromise on screen quality. The PC’s components are built into a 24in screen, which is large enough to satisfy most needs and provides the best

quality viewing we’ve seen in recent all-in-one PCs.

However, this has led to compromises elsewhere. With no SSD to keep Windows zipping along, the C 24 was sometimes frustratingly slow, particularly when booting up. The integrated graphics

means it’s not much use for games, either, though it handles other Windows tasks well.



# Ikea Symfonisk

These new wireless speakers from Ikea offer the most affordable way to get Sonos-compatible speakers in your home

A trip to Ikea can fill even avowed shopaholics with dread, but the Swedish retailer's latest wireless speakers may have you beating a path through its showroom. Outwardly, they've been designed to blend in with your home's Ikea furniture, but the music-playing element comes from Sonos, which promises multi-room Wi-Fi connectivity and a quality of sound you wouldn't expect from something this affordable.

It's worth noting that there's no microphone, so you can't use them in conjunction with Google Assistant or Amazon Alexa. That said, you don't get Amazon and Google smartspeaker compatibility with standard Sonos devices until you reach the £195 Sonos 1.

## Build and design

There are two models, both available in black or white. The 'bookshelf' speaker is designed to sit comfortably and discreetly on a shelf (though there's also a wall-mounting kit available), and costs a mere £99, which makes it the cheapest Sonos speaker to date (the nearest Sonos-branded alternative is the £149 Sonos Play:1). The 'table lamp' has the speaker hidden in the base and is more expensive at £150.

The bookshelf speaker is built from minimalist, solid-feeling plastic with a textile grille covering the drivers and all cables hidden at the back. The lamp is bigger and more suited to a living room than a bedside table. Similarly sturdy, its base is covered in what looks like a knitted tea cosy and topped with a shade of frosted glass. Speaker aside, it's pretty basic – there's a circular switch for turning the light on or off, but no dimmer option. There are Play, Pause and Pairing buttons on the front of both designs.

## Sound quality and control

The Sonos system lets you set each speaker as a standalone device or as part of a multi-room system (playing the same music around your home), and they're compatible with Apple AirPlay 2.

Besides AirPlay 2, the best way to control the Symfonisk speakers is to use the brilliant Sonos app, which gives you access to numerous streaming services, from TuneIn Radio through various high-resolution audio options, and all the big-name music

services including Spotify, Google Play Music, Apple Music and YouTube Music.

The app lets you integrate services if you use more than one, so you can search and build playlists across multiple music services. It also has a fantastic automatic tuning tool that optimises the speaker to perform as well as acoustically possible in the

space you've placed it.

Both speakers provide impressive performance, particularly after the automated tuning process. They can't compete with expensive audiophile brands but you get a significantly better sound from these models than you do from similarly-priced Amazon and Google smart speakers.

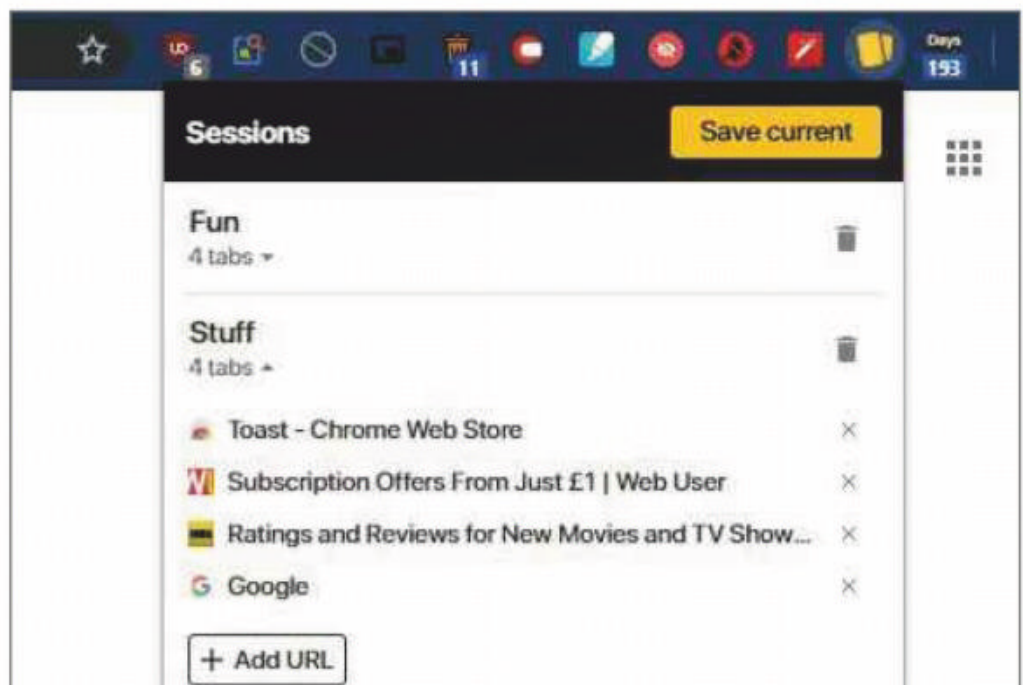
## CHROME

### Try the best Chrome tab manager yet

Tab management is always a hassle. You open multiple tabs for work, then you need a separate browser window to have multiple tabs open for fun sites. And then another for that holiday you're planning. It can quickly become overwhelming.

There are lots of tab managers out there – and we've covered several on these very pages – but most such extensions tend to group tabs into sections along the browser ribbon. This means that while they're useful, it can still be tricky to find precisely what you want among the clutter.

Toast ([bit.ly/toast484](http://bit.ly/toast484)) is easily the best tab manager we've come across. With the extension installed, open your many tabs, then click the Toast toolbar button to name and save them as a group. You can then open more tabs or restore older saves with one click.

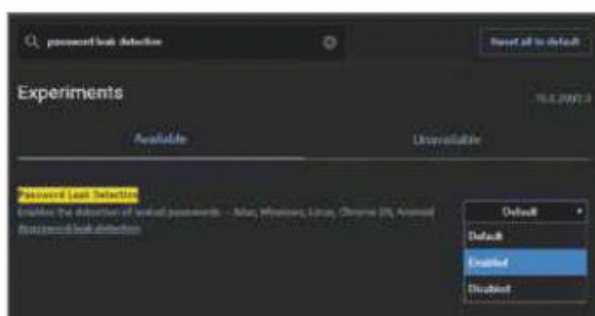


### Check your password security in Chrome

A new flag (experimental feature) has been added to the Canary developer version of Chrome ([bit.ly/canary484](http://bit.ly/canary484)) that automatically checks to see whether any passwords you enter have been involved in a data leak.

We've covered extensions that do this job before, but this new flag offers the function directly in the browser. Any time you use a password, Chrome's super-experimental browser will double-check it against a list of compromised passwords held by Google. You'll then either be given the all clear or Chrome will suggest that you try a safer password. It's not imperative that you do this, but it's recommended. This handy new monitoring system is only available in Canary, but we expect to see this reach the stable version of Chrome at some point.

In Canary, head to `chrome://flags` and search for 'password leak'. Using the drop-down menu, switch the flag to

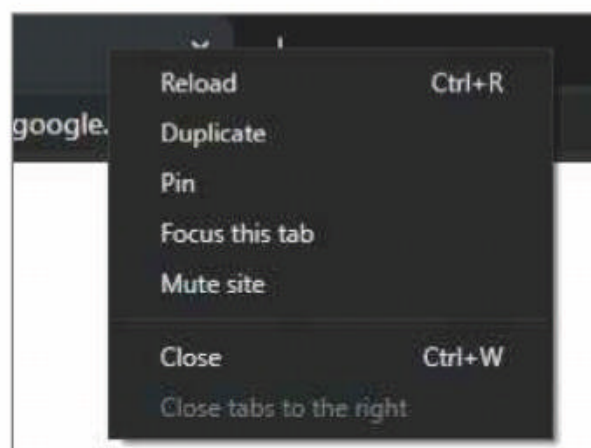


Enabled. Restart the browser when prompted, then you're set.

### Chrome improves the tab right-click menu

In another Canary exclusive, Google has introduced significant changes to the tab context menu – the menu you see when right-clicking tabs. The multiple 'close tab' options are gone, replaced with a single Close, and you no longer send specific tabs to your device and open bookmarks via a right-click. In the new version, these have either vanished altogether, or can be accessed by right-clicking the browser bar. By trimming the fat, Canary leaves only the option to Reload, Duplicate, Pin, Focus and Mute Site.

As ever with an experimental browser, this change may never be implemented beyond Canary but it's very useful, so we fancy its chances.

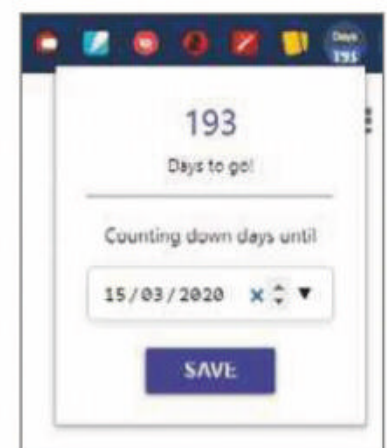


### Keep track of important dates

Got a special event coming up – a holiday, birthday or that anniversary you swore you wouldn't forget (not after last time!)? Instead of setting a phone reminder that you'll probably forget to check, install Days Until (Days Countdown) ([bit.ly/days484](http://bit.ly/days484)).

This extension counts down to a specified date right inside your browser, so you've got no excuse to forget the event and have plenty of warning to build up to it.

Install the browser tool, then click its toolbar button. You're prompted to add a date, either by typing it or via the drop-down calendar menu. Handily, you can move between day, month and year using both the Tab key and the arrow keys – something most online calendars let you do. When you've set the date, click Save. The extension now displays the number of days until the big day.





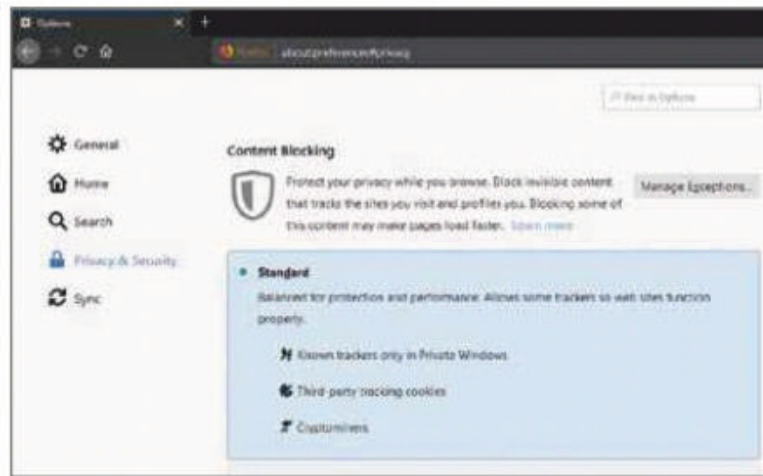

## FIREFOX

### Try new tools in Firefox 69

The latest version of Firefox adds a host of useful features. Most notable is the introduction of what Firefox is calling the Enhanced Tracking Protection. This feature automatically blocks known tracking cookies. You can check how well the browser is blocking content by going to

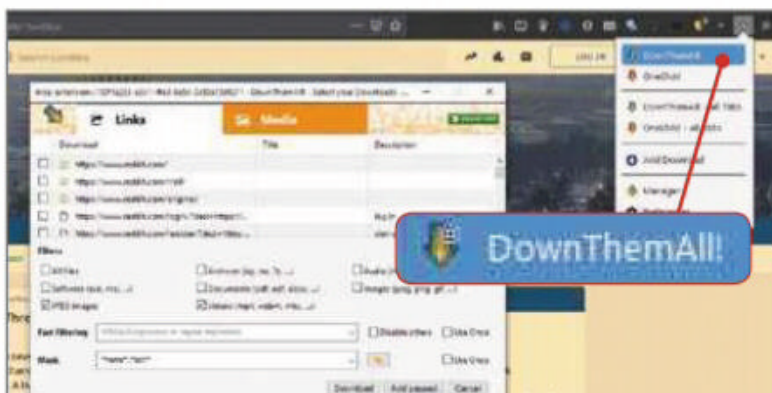


`about:preferences#privacy`. By default, it's set to Standard, but you can lock down your browser further using the Strict and Custom settings.

Autoplay blocking options also received an update. You can now stop websites automatically playing videos and sound – prior to version 69, autoplay would only block videos with audio. To set this up, go to `about:preferences#privacy` and, under Permissions, click the Autoplay button. Here, you can set your default setting and whitelist websites.

### Download files faster with DownThemAll

The much-loved Firefox add-on DownThemAll ([bit.ly/down484](http://bit.ly/down484)) has returned. The tool, which lets you download multiple files at once, famously dropped off the radar after Mozilla introduced its new WebExtensions system. After two years, the developers have brought it back – and it's just as good as you remember it. Visit any web page, then click the extension's toolbar button. You can download everything on the page – from uploaded images to the text itself – and everything on every tab you have open. If that's too much, there's also a filtering system that lets you decide what type of files you want to download. Visit the Preferences for the option to turn the browser button into a OneClick downloader.



### Stop Google breaking the web

If you've ever wondered why, when clicking a link on your computer, you're suddenly confronted with a mobile version of the site, check the address bar – chances are that hidden within that URL are three letters with the power to ruin your entire browsing experience: AMP.



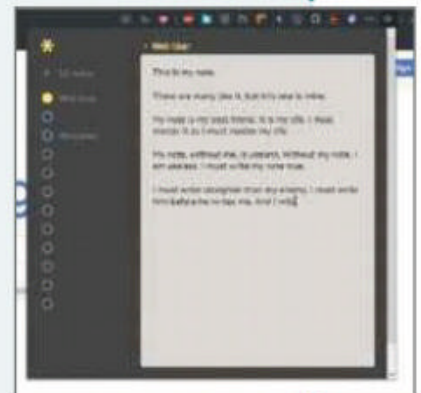
AMP was created and is controlled by Google, and designed to hasten website loading times on phones, using a cached lazy loading technique – good for your mobile data, bad if you're not using a phone. Not only does it alter the website's look and remove certain functions, it can also send data about your browsing straight to Google.

Redirect AMP to HTML ([bit.ly/noamp484](http://bit.ly/noamp484)) solves this problem. Whenever you click an AMP link, the browser tool steps in and forces the desktop version of the website to load.

## OTHER BROWSERS

### Make notes while you browse

It's always useful to make notes while you browse – whether it's a passing thought or details of a website you want to check back on. Rather than scrabbling around for a notepad and pen, install Plain Text ([bit.ly/text484](http://bit.ly/text484)).



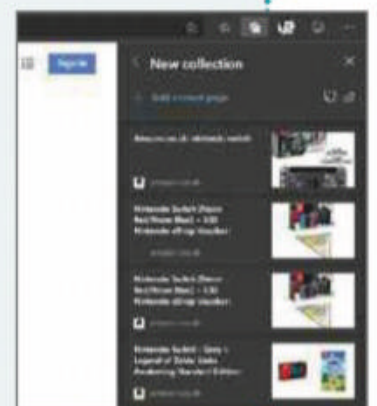
This tool places up to 15 notebooks right in your browser, so you can make on-the-fly notes with one click. You're also able to change the background colour for each notebook to make management a lot simpler. Click the Plus sign to begin, give your note a name and choose a colour, then click the enthusiastic 'Create!' button.

### Collect and compare as you browse

Collections is a new "general-purpose tool" in Edge that pulls together everything from products you intend to buy to trip itineraries, depending on how you use it.

It's still in beta phase, so only available in the Edge Canary build. To set up Collections now, go to `edge://flags#edge-collections`. In the drop-down menu, switch from Disabled to Enabled, and restart the browser when prompted.

You'll now see a pane icon beside the address bar. Click 'Start new collection' and you can add your current page to the collection. It's then easy to flick between your collections, to collate or compare.

WhatsApp is so ubiquitous these days, it's easy to forget there are other excellent messaging tools out there – such as Telegram.

Launched in 2013, Telegram already offers several features that give it an advantage over its rivals, including groups that can host up to 200,000 members, an open sticker platform and cloud-based messages, which sync seamlessly between devices while ensuring attached

GIFs and videos don't eat up your phone's limited storage.

Over the past few weeks, however, the app's developers have launched a steady stream of updates and new features, with the clear intention of persuading staunch WhatsApp users to switch their allegiance.

Telegram's most useful new feature is its hidden Send menu, which offers two brilliant options. The first is the ability to send messages to your contacts that don't make an alert sound on arrival – useful if you know that your

recipient is currently in a situation where that notification 'ping' would be inappropriate, such as asleep or driving, or at the cinema.

The other new option, also in the Send menu, is Schedule Message, which lets you set a specific date and time for your message to be sent – handy for pre-planning birthday greetings or sending messages across time zones.

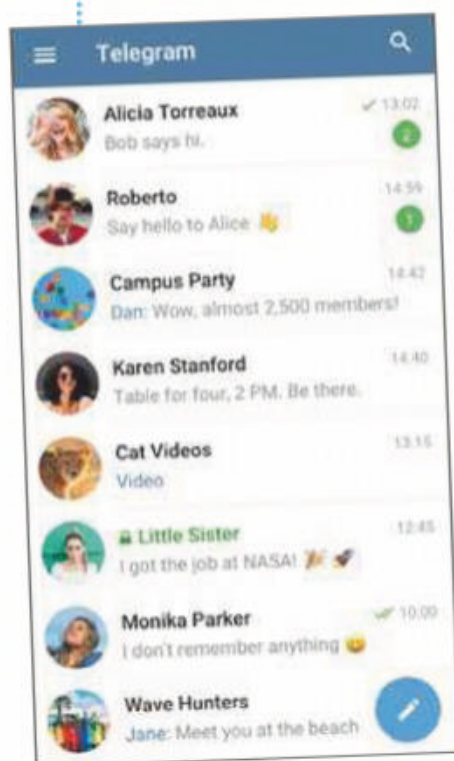
The latest update also includes new customisation options that let you choose themes for Telegram across all your devices, as well as an expanded selection of animated emoji.

Telegram has also boosted its privacy settings. You can now ensure that

strangers who

randomly add your phone number cannot access your profile, while still allowing anyone in your contacts to find you by your number.

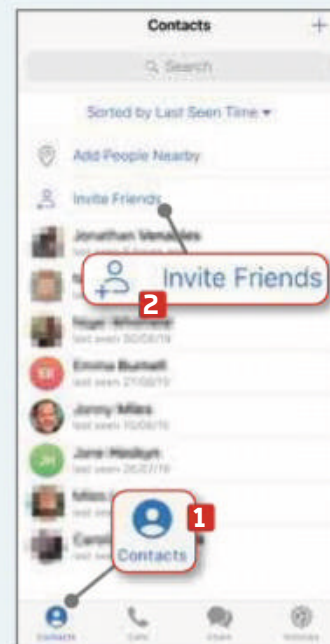

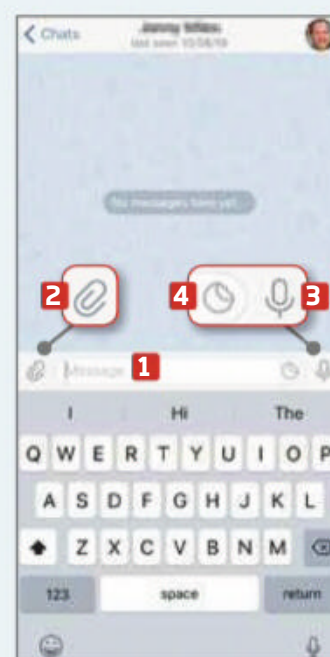

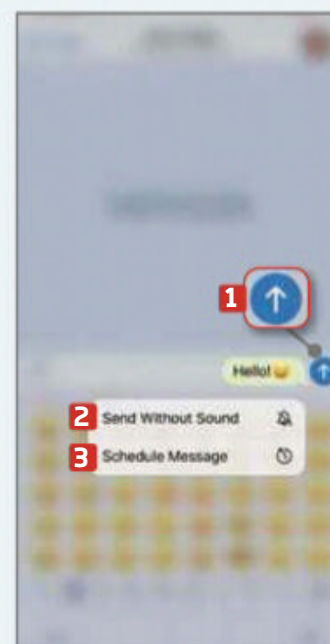
**1** If this is the first time you've used Telegram, swipe through the initial welcome screens and tap Start Messaging. Enter your phone number, name and a profile picture when prompted, and allow the app permission to access your contacts and send you notifications when requested. To get other people you know to join you on Telegram, tap Contacts, **1** Invite Friends, **2** then select the recipients and press Share Telegram.



**2** To send a message, press Chats at the bottom of the screen, then tap the pencil icon and select the contact or group you want. Telegram works in a similar way to many other messaging tools – tap in the Message box **1** to type a text message, tap the paperclip **2** to attach or take a photo, or press the microphone icon **3** to dictate a voice message. Press the sticker icon **4** to send stickers, GIFs and emoji.



**3** If you want to use Telegram's new enhanced Send menu options, long-press the Send button **1** to bring up the hidden menu. To send a silent message, tap Send Without Sound **2** – this will deliver your message to its recipient(s) without making an audio notification alert. To send a message later, select Schedule Message, **3** select your date and time and press Send.

## Our guide to Fiit

Want to get in shape without the expense and hassle of the gym? **David Crookes** looks at a fitness app that helps you work out at home

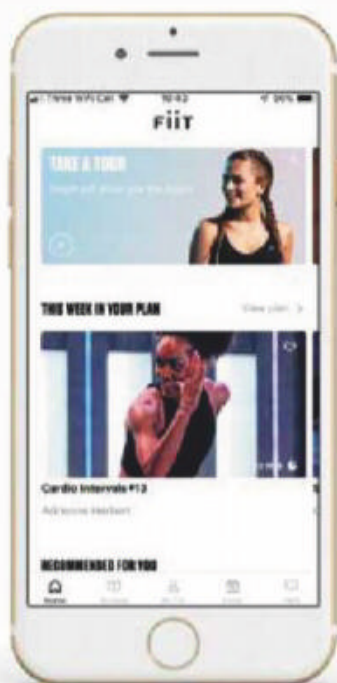
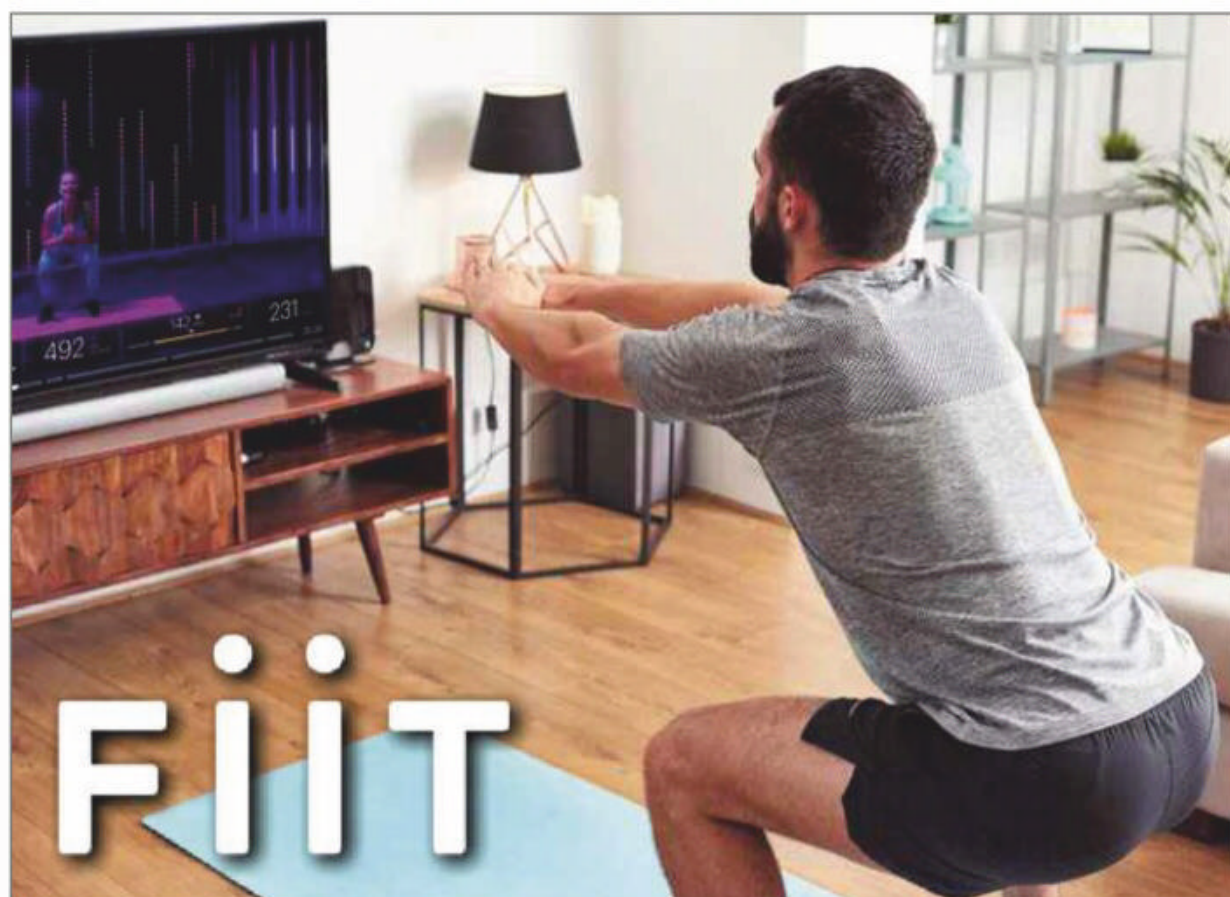
### What is it?

Fiit ([fiit.tv](https://fiit.tv)) is a smartphone app that has been described as “Netflix for workouts”. It aims to replace your gym membership with video-based classes and courses fronted by expert trainers, so you can engage in a vigorous workout from the comfort of your home.

### Just like a fitness DVD?

Not quite. Although you can draw parallels with the many fitness videos and

DVDs that have emerged over the past three decades or so, Fiit has successfully upped the stakes. It's not simply a matter of following the exercise regime set by someone like Jane Fonda, Davina McCall, Joe Wicks or the scores of other celebrities who have lost a few stone and want to share their secrets. Fiit aims to be social and it also keeps a close eye on your progress.



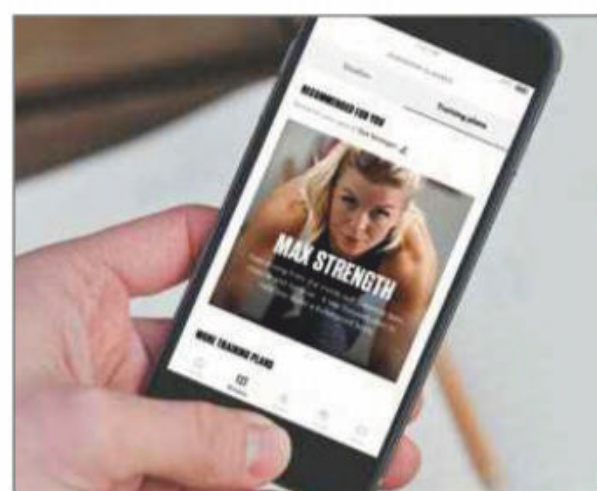
**Replace your pricey gym membership with Fiit's app**

### So how do I get started?

When you open the Fiit app for the first time, you tell it your fitness level – from entry to advanced – then indicate your goal, whether it's to lose weight, get stronger, gain better flexibility and balance or improve your overall fitness. You can then start a 14-day personalised plan made up of thrice-weekly 25- and 40-minute workouts. Alternatively, you can pick one of the 75 classes that best suit your goal and level.

### How much do they cost?

The 14-day plans are free and there are four in total, covering cardio workouts, strength and muscle, rebalance and one that involves classes from the previous

three. Each of these can be repeated, but if you want to take things to the next level, you'll have to buy a premium subscription. Depending on whether you're paying for a month, a quarter or a year, it'll cost between £10 and £20 per month – but this is where things become interesting.

### What's the benefit of paying?

Aside from getting a personalised training plan with recipes and nutritional

advice as well as access to more than 350 on-demand workouts, the premium tier tracks your health. It does this by giving you a device – worth £65, according to Fiit – that you wear around your chest, which tracks your heart rate, calories and reps, displaying these stats live on the screen so that you can easily monitor your progress.

The device is actually a rebranded Wahoo Tickr X and it's easy enough to connect – open the app, strap the device on your chest and watch out for the blue light to indicate a connection and red for heart rate detection. It is equipped

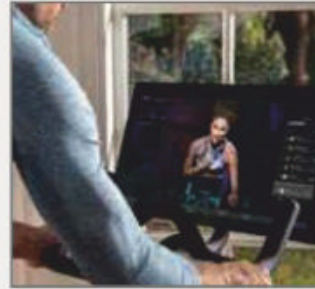

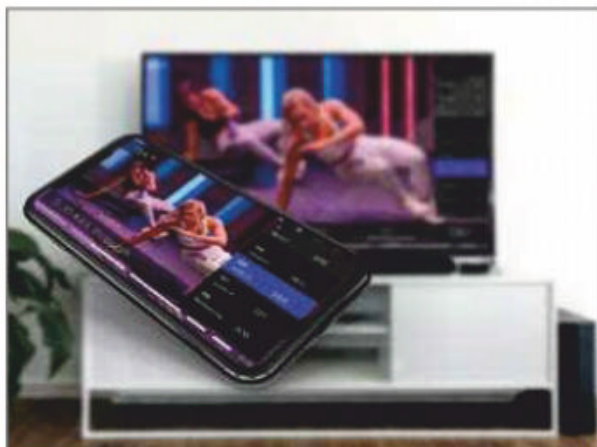
with Bluetooth and it generates workout data in real time.

### What are the classes like?

Each of the videos is filmed in a studio in east London using a five-camera setup, so they look slick and professional, and offer plenty of visual stimulus and close-up detail. They also feature several high-profile tutors including the advanced yoga teacher Cat Meffan, Instagram fitness blogger Chessie King and celebrity trainers such as Richie Norton and Tyrone Brennand who ordinarily charge up to £120 per hour for one-on-one personal training. Many of the tutors have specialisations, such as quiet workouts, Hatha yoga and those who target posture. All the trainers are hugely positive and they're constantly focused on keeping up your energy levels.

### Isn't staring at a phone screen distracting, though?

Fiit works from a smartphone – iOS for now with Android due later this year – but squinting at a tiny screen while throwing yourself into a workout routine isn't ideal. To use the app properly, you connect your handset to your television, mirroring your phone screen using an HDMI-Lightning cable (sold by Fiit for a tenner) or using Apple TV. Fiit is also working on Chromecast compatibility.



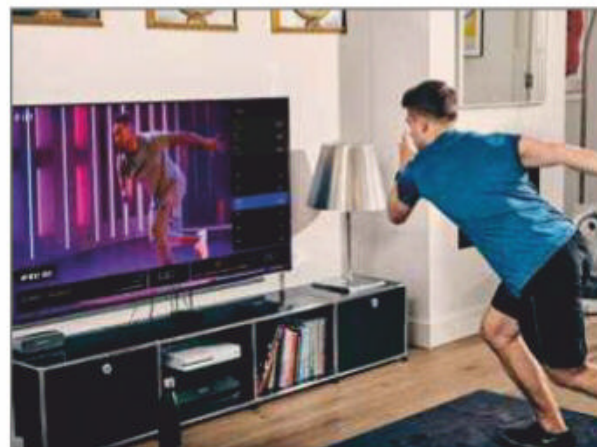

### How does Fiit keep users motivated to keep coming back?

Premium subscribers get progress data which helps to turn fitness into a game. With the Fiit device strapped to your body, you'll earn points during the main workout when you stay in the target heart-rate zone, and the app will keep challenging you to beat your personal best. This works to optimise your safe fitness level too, since anyone over- or underworking will see fewer points being scored.

### Does it lose the camaraderie of a group workout, though?

If you find exercising with others motivates you, then you can get involved with Fiit Club. It offers high-intensity interval training to get your heart pumping while allowing you to train with others across the UK. These classes are made available at specific times on certain days and you simply log on and connect up with the device up to 10 minutes before the start before virtually mingling with other users in the lobby. When the class gets underway, a live leaderboard will appear. The person with the most Fiit Points wins. However, rather than dish out rewards based on your level of fitness, Fiit awards you points for effort, and for keeping in a safe target heart-rate zone personal to you.

### Are there enough people to compete against?

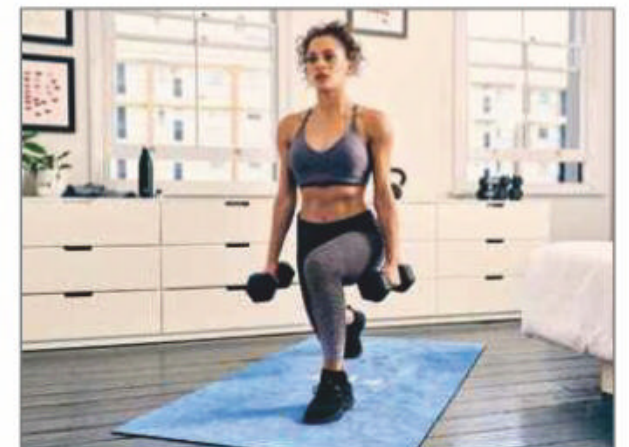
Yes. Not only can you invite your friends to join you in a workout (assuming they're also premium members), Fiit is able to draw on thousands of users – some 150,000 have downloaded the app so far and 500,000 classes have been taken. A Fiit Challengers Facebook group has more than 3,870 members ([bit.ly/fiit484](https://bit.ly/fiit484)).

### What if I'm into weights?

Fiit offers equipment classes that involve using dumbbells and kettlebells in the Cardio and Strength studios. It links to a company called Origin in its in-app shop, offering four different weight packages. Fiit also sells mats, resistance bands and bottles.

### Surely there are some potential dangers?

As with any physical fitness regime, there's a risk of injury, so there are certain best practices you should follow. Fiit advises users to warm up and cool down, and it's also important not to overdo things or go without water during a workout. Extreme exercise can lead to rhabdomyolysis which, while uncommon, is serious and involves muscle tissue breaking down. Listening to your body is always the best way forward.

Sticking to the same old extensions may be familiar and safe, but you're missing out on all kinds of terrific tools. **Nik Rawlinson** rounds up the best add-ons to make your browser faster, smarter and safer

**A**ccording to a recent report by Extension Monitor ([bit.ly/extension484](https://bit.ly/extension484)), of the 188,000 add-ons available in the Chrome Web Store, only 13 have more than 10 million users, despite the browser itself being used by more than two billion people worldwide. Even more surprising is that 87% of extensions have fewer than 1,000 installs, which means a huge number are being overlooked and ignored.

In this feature, we shine a light on

the 50 best add-ons for Chrome and Firefox that you may have missed, but which can boost your online security and privacy, add useful and fun tools to your browser and make the web quicker and easier to use. Wherever possible, we've chosen tools that cater for both Chromium-based browsers and Firefox: if you're running Chrome, Brave, Opera, Vivaldi or even the beta of Microsoft's forthcoming version of Edge, you're using a Chromium-based browser; if

you're using Firefox, you have a Gecko-based browser.

All the add-ons we've recommended are available from the official Chrome Web Store ([chrome.google.com/webstore](https://chrome.google.com/webstore)) and the Firefox Add-ons site ([addons.mozilla.org](https://addons.mozilla.org)). However, it's always worth being careful and checking the permissions required by an extension before you install it, to make sure it doesn't access more of your data than you're happy with.

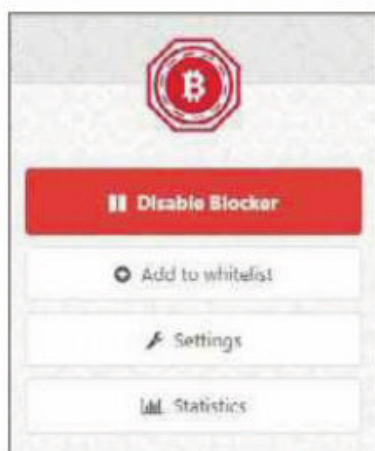

Although you may never have knowingly handled cryptocurrency, you may unwittingly have helped bolster the global supply. That's because digital currencies, of which Bitcoin is the best-known, are generated by solving very complex mathematical equations,

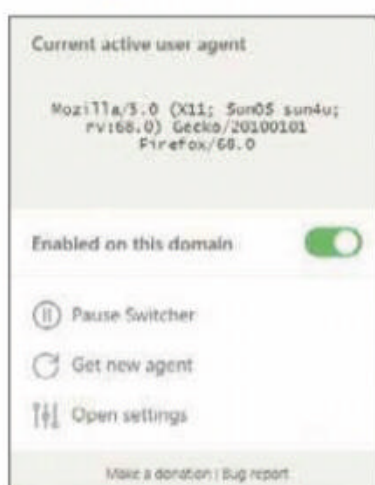


which are getting harder all the time. We've now got to the point where the amount of energy required to generate every unit of cryptocurrency costs more than the currency is worth, which has

prompted some digital-currency advocates to hijack other people's computers to 'mine' for coins. This can result in a laggy PC for you and slow down your browsing. Anti Miner helps block these mining scripts from working on your computer so that the resources you've paid for are yours alone to use. Although this add-on is for Chromium browsers, the Firefox extension minerBlock ([bit.ly/miner484](https://bit.ly/miner484)) performs a similar function for Mozilla's browser.

## Random User-Agent

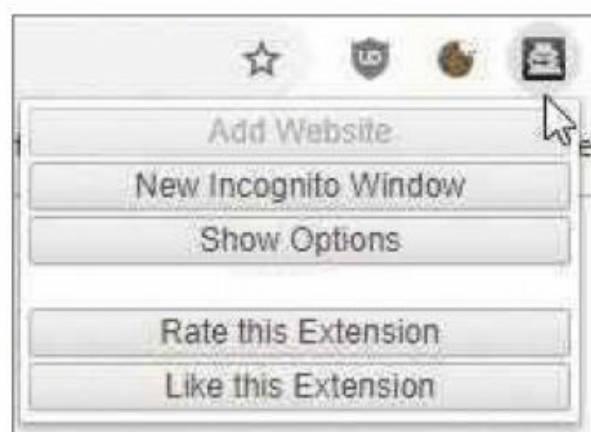
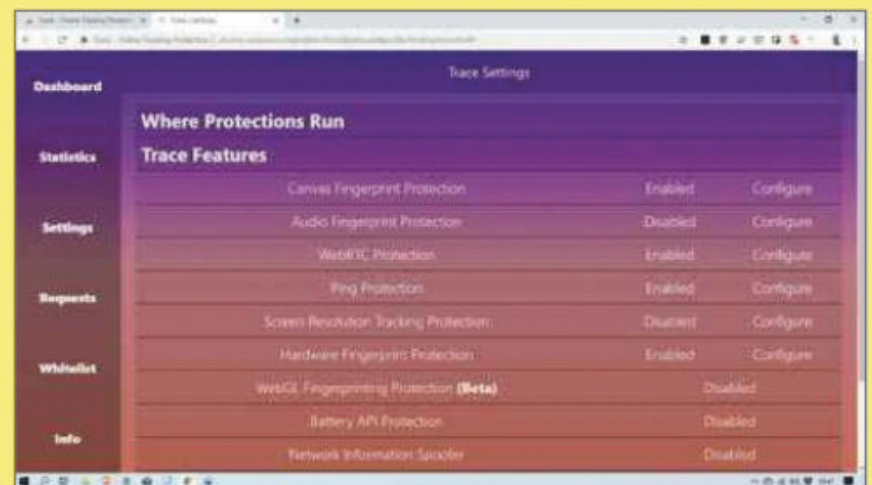

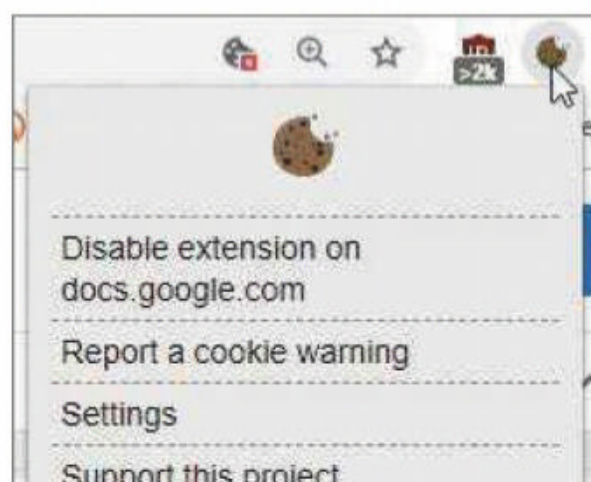


a few even force you to accept all their cookies before they'll allow you to peek at their content. Opening this kind of website in a private or incognito window, which will wipe all the cookies you were forced to accept when you close it, gets around this problem – but remembering to right-click and select incognito every time is a faff. Incognito-Filter gets around this by opening specified websites in incognito windows every time they're clicked, without the need for any manual intervention.

Fight back with Location Guard, which adds a degree of 'noise' to your detected location to make it less accurate. How much noise – and how inaccurate – is up to you.



Browse up to four times faster, promises Malwarebytes. How? By filtering out ads and other 'annoying content'. It also squashes pop-ups and unclosable dialogues that hijack your browser, so you can enjoy an altogether more pleasant and secure online experience.

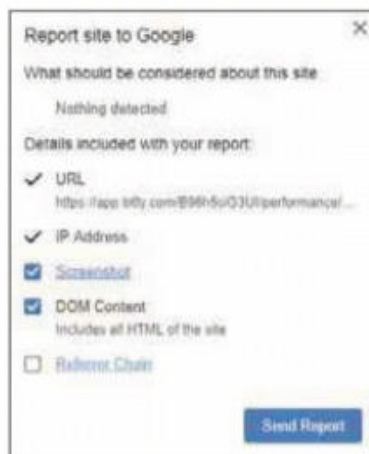

IBA Opt-out (Chrome) and Interest-based Advertising Opt-out (Firefox) block IBA ads to show you generic promos, not only on Google's own web pages, but on sites that have signed up to use the DoubleClick advertising network. Both tools linked here were created by Google itself.

Often, from other Chrome users. Suspicious Site Reporter lets you give back to the online community by quickly and easily reporting any site you think deserves further investigation.

When you're elbows-deep in research, you may need a hand sorting the wheat from the chaff. That's what Google Similar Pages does, by recommending other sites you should look at based on what your browser's displaying when you click its icon. The results are drawn from Google, and accompanied by thumbnails and snippets. Better yet, because the extension was developed

by Google itself, it should always be updated to work with any tweaks it makes to the way it ranks and indexes pages.

Similar Sites, linked on the left, performs a 'similar' function on Firefox, in this case, taking results from [similarsites.com](https://bit.ly/similarsites484)

This makes it easy to attach it to a map or automatically post it to location-aware sharing services such as Instagram and Facebook. With Exif Viewer installed, you can expose all this information in a browser window to give you a fuller 'picture' of any picture you spot online. Although they have the

same names, the Chrome and Firefox add-ons come from different developers.

If you find Exif Viewer provides too much information, EXIF QuickView for Chrome ([bit.ly/quickview484](http://bit.ly/quickview484)) gives you a truncated excerpt

from the Exif data when you hover over an image.

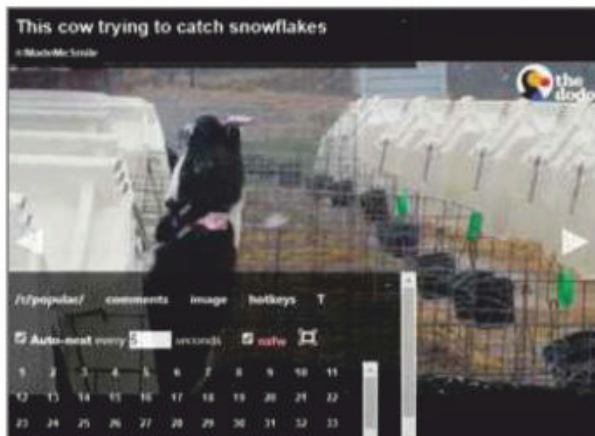
# Secret hacks for Reddit



Reddit is a brilliant but basic source of news and discussion. **Robert Irvine** explains how to customise and improve its looks

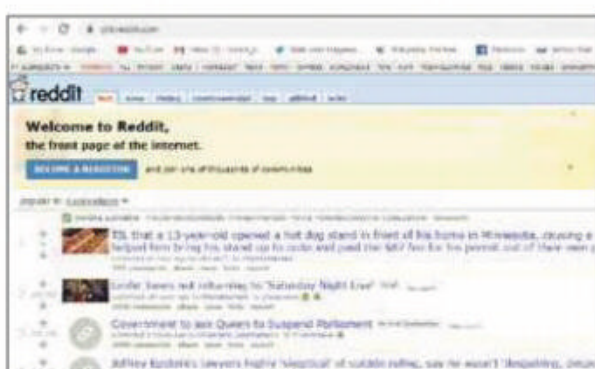
## View Reddit images as a slideshow

Browsing picture-based subreddits such as the popular landscape-photography community EarthPorn ([reddit.com/r/EarthPorn](https://www.reddit.com/r/EarthPorn)) involves clicking lots of individual threads to view the full-size images. If you're not interested in reading comments, add the letter 'p' after 'reddit' in the URL – for example [redditp.com/r/EarthPorn](https://redditp.com/r/EarthPorn) – to display all the pictures (and videos) in the subreddit as a slideshow, which you can click back and forth through or let play automatically. There's also an option to filter NSFW (not safe for work) content.



## Restore Reddit's classic design

Last year's redesign annoyed lots of loyal Reddit users, but you can still revert to its 'classic' look: either type old before the URL of a subreddit – for example, [old.reddit.com/r/movies](https://old.reddit.com/r/movies) – or select Visit Old Reddit from the menu in the top-right corner. Alternatively, install the extension Old Reddit Redirect in Chrome ([bit.ly/oldc484](https://bit.ly/oldc484)) or Firefox ([bit.ly/oldf484](https://bit.ly/oldf484)) to automatically load subreddits in the classic design. Unlike



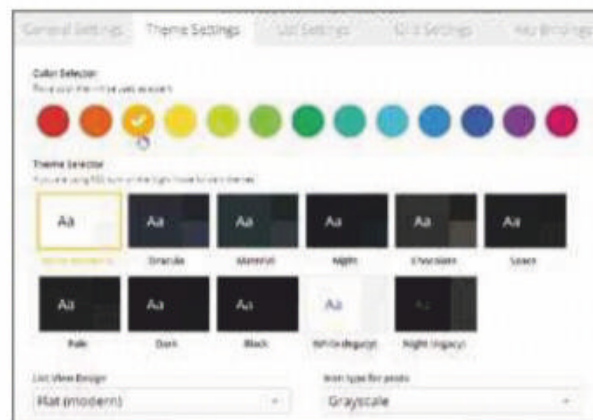
Reddit's own option, this also works in Incognito mode.

## Install the Reddit Enhancement Suite

Reddit's lack of features has led millions of users to install Reddit Enhancement Suite ([redditenhancementsuite.com](https://redditenhancementsuite.com)). Available for all major browsers, this extension adds Never Ending Reddit, which removes the need to click 'next page'; keyboard shortcuts for upvoting, downvoting and hiding posts; an inline image viewer; the ability to switch between multiple accounts; clearer presentation of comments; and more.

## Apply different themes to Reddit

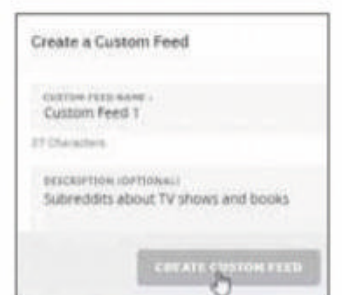
Reddit now has a dark theme, which you can switch to by clicking the menu in the top-right corner and choosing Night Mode, but for proper customisation, you



need the Shine extension for Chrome ([bit.ly/shine484](https://bit.ly/shine484)) and Firefox ([bit.ly/shinefire484](https://bit.ly/shinefire484)). This places a menu in the bottom-right corner that you can use to switch between list and grid view, change Reddit's default colour and layout, and apply themes such as Chocolate, Material and Dracula. It also lets you use keyboard shortcuts to navigate the site.

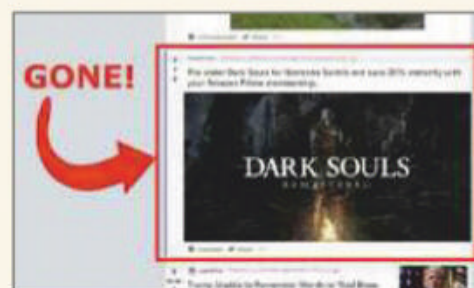
## Create a custom Reddit feed

If you subscribe to lots of subreddits, keeping track of all their content via the front page can be overwhelming, while switching between separate communities is time-consuming. Save yourself hassle by creating a Custom Feed (formerly called a 'multireddit') of your favourite subreddits or some with a similar topic. To do this, click the menu in the top-left corner and click the plus sign next to Custom Feeds. Enter a name and (optionally) a description for your feed, then select Create Custom Feed. Now, type the names of the desired subreddits into the Manage Communities box and click Add for each one. Your Custom Feed(s) can then be accessed via the top-left menu. ■



## BLOCK PROMOTED POSTS ON REDDIT

Like all social networks, Reddit supports itself through advertising, some in the form of 'promoted' posts that are easy to mistake for genuine ones. Upgrading to Reddit Premium for \$5.99 (£4.89) a month removes these ads, but you can also filter them from your feed using Reddit



Promoted AdBlock ([bit.ly/promoted484](https://bit.ly/promoted484)). Simply install this Chrome extension and you can avoid ever seeing promoted posts on Reddit, without needing to

use an ad blocker to block all adverts on the site. For Firefox, there's the similar Hide Promoted Reddit Posts ([bit.ly/hide484](https://bit.ly/hide484)).



# Best free automated file organisers

Are you tired of doing the same file admin jobs over and over again? **Andy Shaw** looks at six free tools that can streamline your Windows work, saving you time and effort

## What we liked:

Dropt's great innovation is a floating icon with an arrow on it, which lurks on your desktop, ready to spring into action whenever it's needed.

When you've got a file that needs sorting, just pick it up with your mouse, drag it over to the icon and drop it. Presuming that you've taken the time to set up the appropriate rules, your file will be squirreled away and automatically stored in the exact location you want.

Setting up basic rules is relatively straightforward, but there are layers of hidden depths if you're adventurous enough to explore them. You could just have all the photos that arrive in a particular folder, for example, extracted and dumped into your Photos folder. This is a relatively simple rule to set up – you just need to select the start and destination folders in the appropriate boxes, choose the file type, then specify a move action.

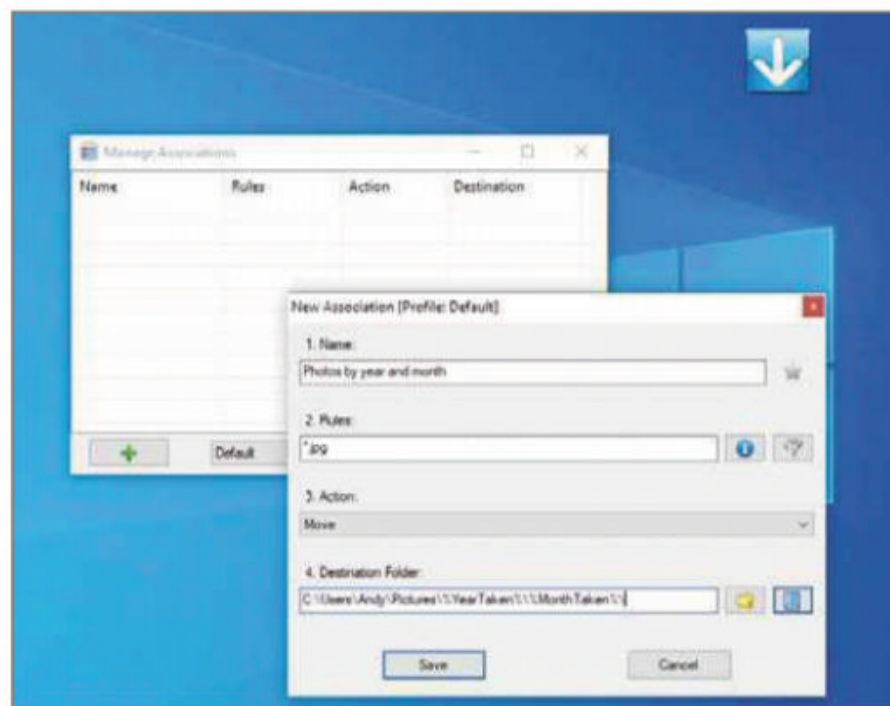
However, with a bit of help from the online documentation (of which there is a lot), you can go much further, creating even more folders as you go. For example, you could take the photos from the previous example and file

them away in folders based on the month and year the photos were taken. If the folders don't already exist, Dropt will make them for you.

The possibilities seem endless. You can move and copy files, like you can with the other programs we've reviewed, but you can also rename, delete, zip, unzip, encrypt, decrypt, split, join and more. Essentially, if you've ever dreamed of doing something to a file, you'll probably be able to automate the process in Dropt.

## How it can be improved:

The interface isn't complicated but its bleak, grey appearance does little to promote its extraordinary usefulness and could benefit from some love and attention. The advanced features aren't well integrated into the software, either, requiring that you use text commands in the boxes to fine-tune the actions you want to create.



## OUR VERDICT

Dropt is extremely powerful but using its most advanced features isn't straightforward. It doesn't really matter because the basic interface is simple enough to get you started and there's plenty of help available on the website. But it would be great to see more of the specialist tools integrated into the software, rather than left as text commands that need researching and constructing manually.

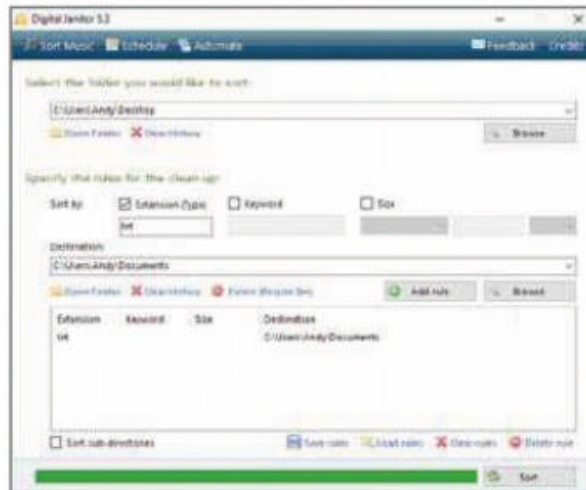
Digital Janitor hasn't been updated for a while, but it installs and works well on Windows 10, performing its job admirably. If you don't like the permanent, looming presence of Dropt's hovering desktop icon, this is a subtler alternative.

To create a rule, fill out a simple form: select the folder you want to sort, the rules you want to apply to the files it contains and the folder to send them to. The rule then appears in the list below. You can use any or all the rules at any time, by selecting them and clicking the Sort button.

Tools to schedule and automate tasks are included, so once you've set it up you can get your files tidied without even thinking about it. If you're having trouble with music files, there's also a special option for sorting them using the metadata hidden within.

### How it can be improved:

The interface is starting to look a little dated (the software hasn't been



updated for a decade) but it barely matters with something as simple as this. The only thing it's really missing is a drag-and-drop option like Dropt's, to get a particular file moved to a specific place without having to click anything.

### OUR VERDICT

This software is ancient but still does an admirable job of automatically sorting your files for you. It's a bit more user-friendly than Dropt but lacks the advanced tools that won it the Gold Award.

### What we liked:

Drop Zone is incredibly simple to use but remarkably complicated to configure. All it does is provide a box on your desktop, into which you can drop one or more files. Doing this opens a menu of options featuring different folders, and you simply click the one you want your files to end up in.

However, when you right-click the box and select 'Edit settings' to make changes to the rules, it opens a text file you have to edit manually. This isn't as difficult as it sounds because the text file is crammed with comments to help you make the changes you want, and you can essentially just copy, paste and tinker with what's there and slightly adapt it to your needs. You can also create more DropZones, to perform different tasks, by copying and renaming the DropZone.exe file.

### How it can be improved:

The biggest problem is the text-based configuration file, which is a frustratingly



archaic way of changing the settings of a program, though its open-ended flexibility makes Drop Zone extremely configurable. An options window would be preferable, though.

### OUR VERDICT

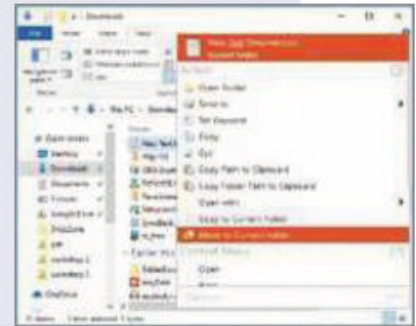
If you regularly find yourself manually dropping files into specific folders and don't mind tinkering with text files, Drop Zone is a valid alternative to Dropt. However, manually editing configuration files won't be to everyone's liking, so it's some way off being a serious contender for our Gold Award.

## BEST OF THE REST

### Listary

Listary has some file-management automation among its plethora of additional tools. For example, you could open an Explorer window, type the name of a file you want to move to that folder, then choose the option from the menu when Listary has located the file.



However, with search and all sorts of other tools also bundled, it's very over-specified for this particular group. It's worth checking out, though, if you want a tool that does a lot more than simply sort files.

### PhotoMove

One of the biggest challenges for automated file-manoeuvring comes with storing photos in a sensible, meaningful way that lets you easily browse them.

If this is the quandary you're facing, PhotoMove could fit the bill. It doesn't do



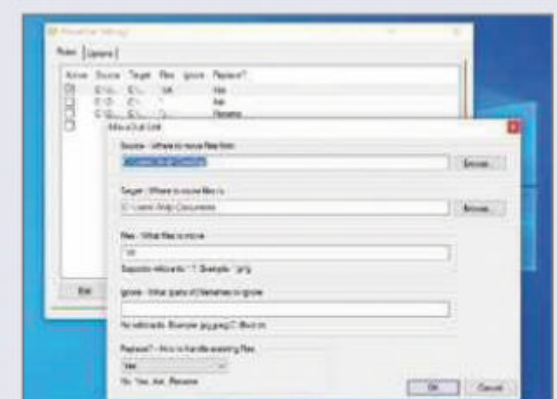

It's all stored securely for as long as you live, until access is given to your named trustees when you die.

UK-based Lexikin ([www.lexikin.com](https://www.lexikin.com)) is a more legally-minded affair, run in partnership with a London law firm. You can create a family tree, list digital assets, record your life story and access a collection of free end-of-life resources. Paid-for services you can hire through the site include wills and executors. ■

## HOW LOVED ONES CAN\* CLOSE YOUR OTHER ACCOUNTS

(\*OR CAN'T!)

Most sites expect your family to do the legwork when you're gone. They usually demand a copy of your death certificate, which loved ones can order online from the General Register Office at [bit.ly/register484](https://bit.ly/register484).

- **Amazon** will give limited account access and some data transfer to a verified family member of a deceased account holder. The family member will need to email their ID and account holder's death certificate to [bereavement-support@amazon.co.uk](mailto:bereavement-support@amazon.co.uk).

- **Apple** will delete iTunes and iCloud accounts if next of kin provide a death certificate. However it totally bans family from accessing photos and other data.

- **Microsoft** automatically deletes your account after a year of inactivity. Within that deadline, a 'verified Next



of Kin' can apply for a DVD of your Hotmail, MSN and Outlook emails and address books – but not your Windows 10, Office 365 or Xbox Live activity. They need to apply by post, with documentation, to Microsoft in the US ([bit.ly/mskin484](https://bit.ly/mskin484)).

- **PayPal** is in line with most banks and financial services. If you haven't securely bequeathed your passwords to named

beneficiaries, your family can apply to close your account and transfer funds. They'll need a copy of your will, a grant of probate and/or a letter of administration ([bit.ly/paypal484](https://bit.ly/paypal484)).

- **Twitter** will delete an account if requested by next of kin ([bit.ly/twitter484](https://bit.ly/twitter484)). Your family can maintain your account in your name if you want, as with WW2 veteran Harry Leslie Smith, who died in 2018 ([twitter.com/Harryslaststand](https://twitter.com/Harryslaststand)). Twitter won't hand out login details to anyone, so if you want your account to outlive you, you'll need to securely bequeath your password.

- **Yahoo** will close an account if a family sends a formal letter and a copy of the deceased user's death certificate to Yahoo in the US ([bit.ly/yahoo484](https://bit.ly/yahoo484)).

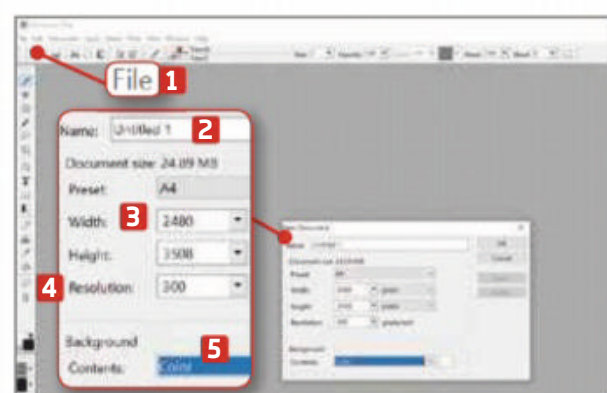

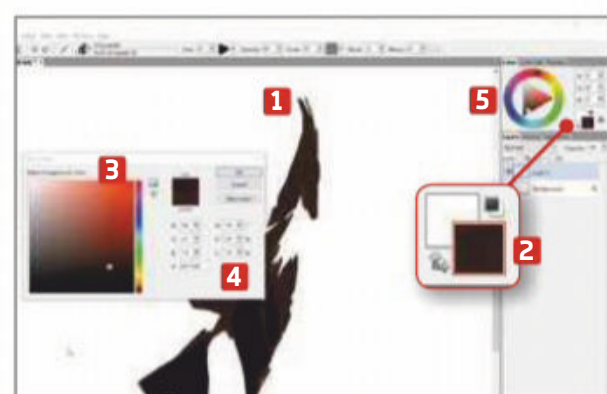

**1** To start a new drawing or painting from scratch, click File, **1** New and give your creation a name. **2** Choose a preset size or enter the dimensions manually. **3** Set a resolution **4** and choose whether you want a coloured or transparent background. **5**



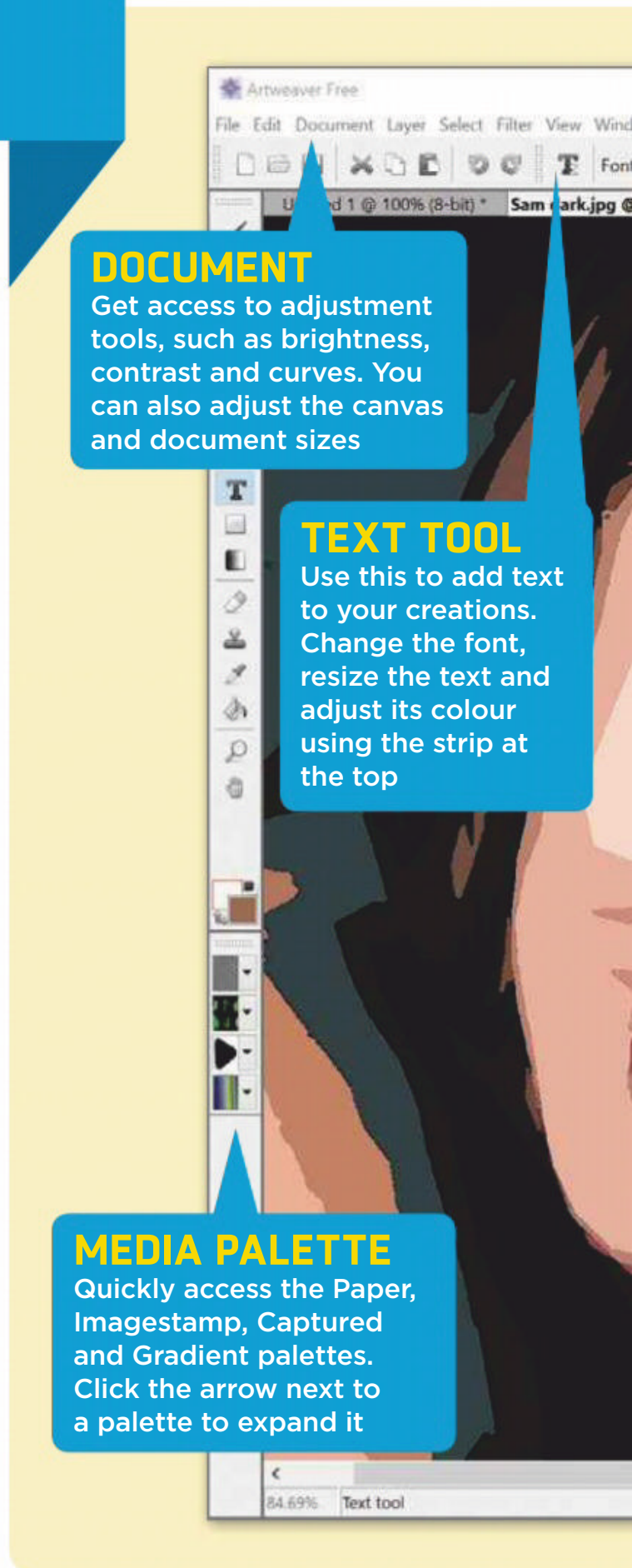
**2** The Brush tool **1** is selected by default. Click the drop-down menu at the top **2** and choose the type of brush you want, **3** then pick a variation on the right. **4** You can see a preview of a stroke underneath. **5** Adjust the size and opacity in the toolbar. **6**



**3** Start drawing on your canvas. **1** Double-click the foreground or background colour box **2** to open the picker and choose a new colour, **3** or enter the RGB or HSL values **4** if you know them. There's also a colour wheel **5** you can use to quickly select a colour.

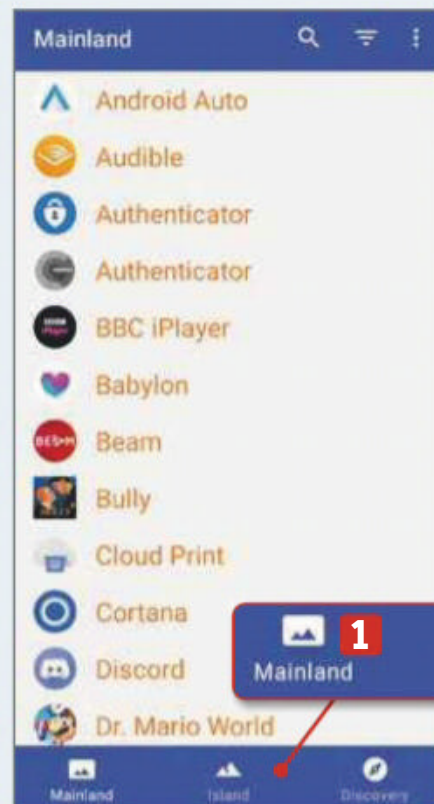
### Steve Clark says

Island blocks access to your personal data, but apps can still access some device-based data, such as your IMEI (International Mobile Equipment Identity number). They may also still try to share certain data, such as your location (though they won't be able to access it), so it's worth checking all permissions granted. Go to Android's Settings and choose Apps, Permissions, to find out what information an app can see.

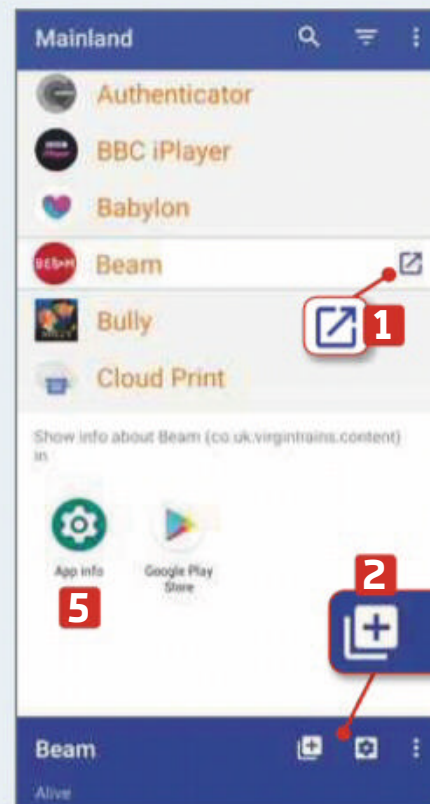


**D**ownload any Android app and it's likely to ask for access to a whole bunch of personal information, such as call logs, photos, location and more. While it makes sense for an email app to need access to your contacts, it's odd that games want to see that data, too.

In such cases, it's a good idea to sandbox apps that ask for too much, cutting them off from the rest of your data and apps. Island does exactly this, segregating your apps into 'Mainland' and 'Island'. The Mainland is where you'll find all your apps, accessing all the permissions you granted when you first downloaded them. What Island lets you do is clone a Mainland app and place it on its own private, data-free island, where it can be run in isolation from everything else.



**1** When you first set up Island, you're prompted to create a 'work profile' - which is the trick that makes Island work. Accept the app's requirements, creating a profile separate to your personal Android profile, and you're taken to the home screen. There are three sections: Mainland, **1** Island **2** and Discovery. **3** Mainland is where your standard apps reside, while the Island is home to sandboxed apps.

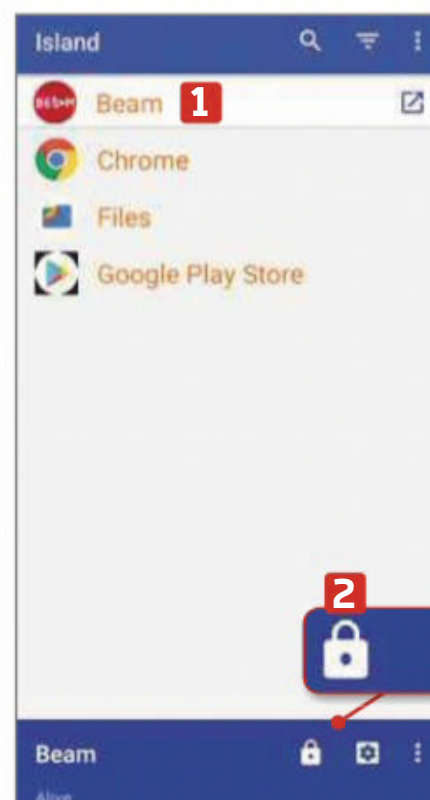


**2** Go to Mainland and tap any app you want to sandbox - selected apps show an Open icon. **1** There are three options at the bottom of the screen: Clone, **2** Settings **3** and a menu **4** with the option to Uninstall App. Tap Settings, 'App info' **5** and, on the next screen, head to Permissions. This is a handy way to check an app's permissions and decide whether it needs sandboxing.



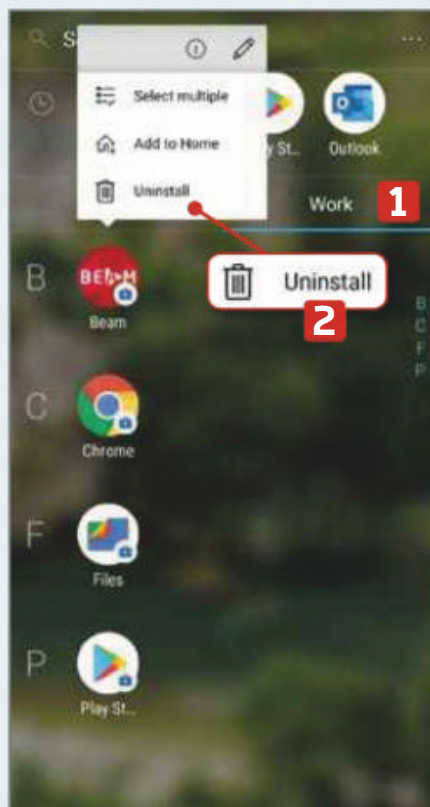
**3** To sandbox an app, tap the Plus icon. You're informed that the app will now 'install' again, though it won't take up any further storage space. Tap Continue. On the following screen, tap Install **1** to continue the installation. Wait while Island clones your app. Upon completion, a notification lets you re-check the cloned app's settings for your sandboxed profile.

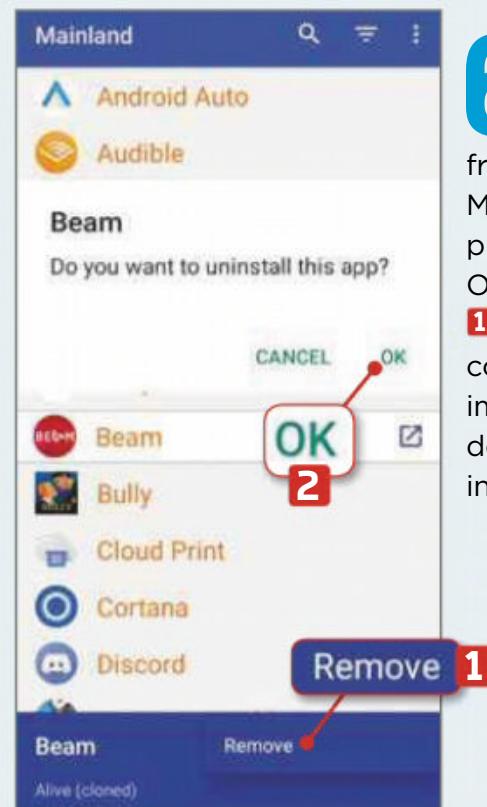


**4** Now, when you flick from Mainland to Island, you can see a clone of the app in the list. **1** Any app located here is unable to access personal data, such as your contacts and location. Tap the app, as before, and you're offered three options below it: Freeze, **2** Settings **3** and the menu. **4**

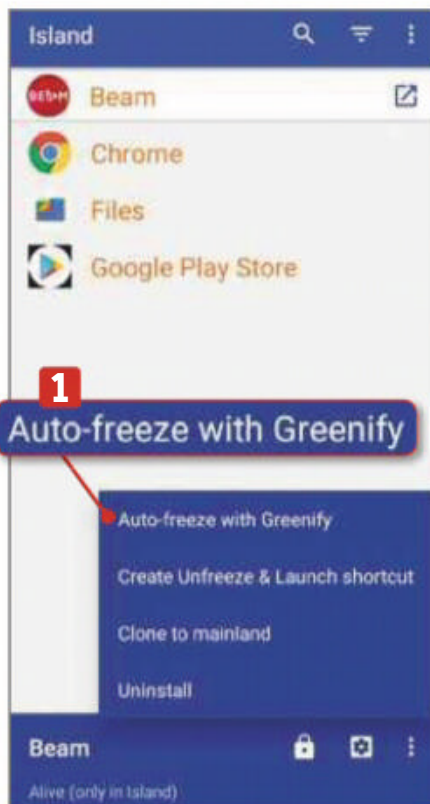




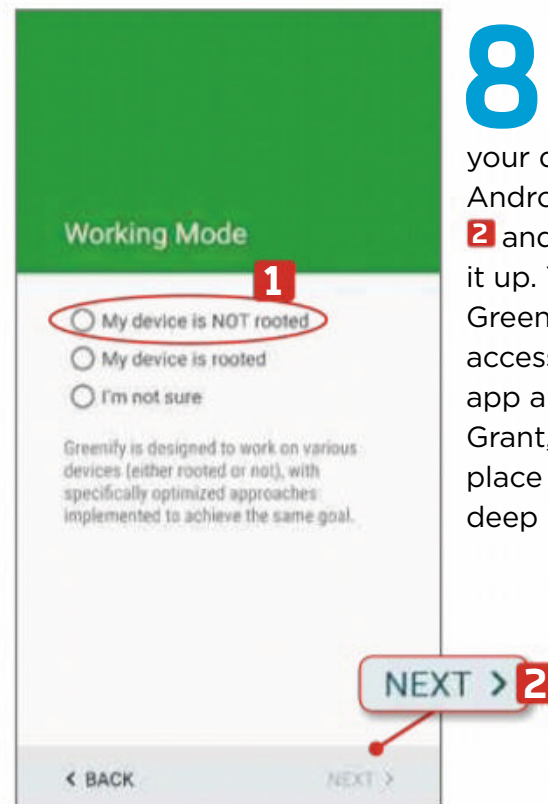
**5** Your next step is to uninstall the non-sandboxed app. There are two main ways to do this. The first sees you open the app drawer from your Android home screen. Where previously your apps were located in a single list, you'll now see two: Personal and Work. **1** Locate the app in Personal, press and hold it, and choose Uninstall. **2**



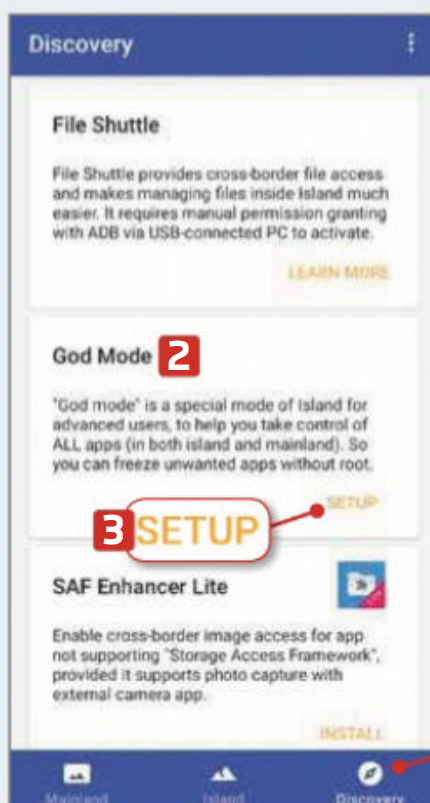
**6** The second method (and we reckon the easier way) is to manage your apps from within Island. Go back to Mainland, tap the app, then press the three-dot button. One option appears: Remove. **1** Tap this, then tap OK **2** to confirm the uninstall. The app is immediately removed from the device, leaving only the clone in the Island list.



**7** You can manually freeze Island apps, but it's easier to do this by pairing Island with Greenify ([bit.ly/greenify484](http://bit.ly/greenify484)). This app, from the same developer, lets you auto-hibernate apps to save battery life, memory and data. Install Greenify, then head back to the Island list, tap an app, then the three-dot button. Choose 'Auto-freeze with Greenify'. **1** In the 'Greenify integration' pop-up, press Continue.

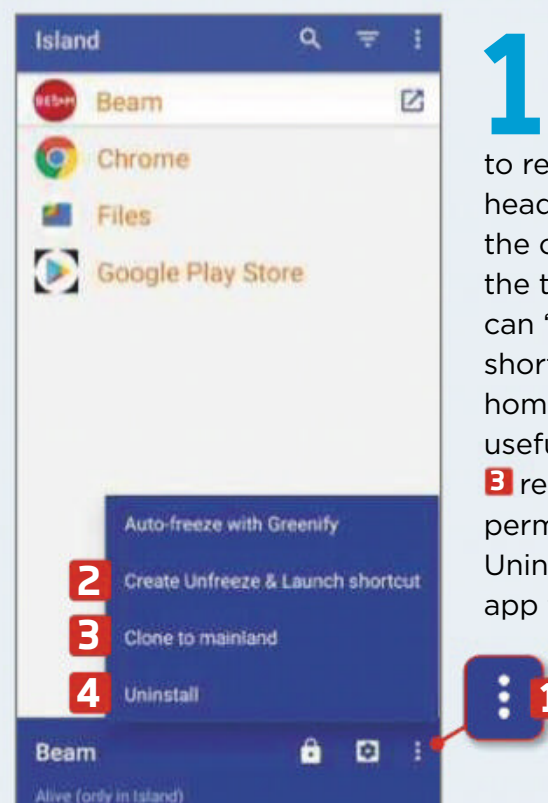
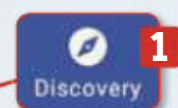


**8** The first time you do this, Greenify will request some information about your device, such as whether Android is rooted. **1** Tap Next **2** and Grant Permission to set it up. You must then toggle Greenify's Android 'Usage access' to On. Go back to the app and tap Finish. Finally, tap Grant, Allow so the app can place Island-managed apps into deep hibernation.



**9** If you'd like Island to control all your apps, tap Discovery **1** to see its additional features. Locate God Mode **2** and press Setup. **3** This opens 'Setup & Shutdown', which shows the status of 'unmanaged' Mainland and 'managed' Island apps. Tap Mainland to read the developer's in-depth guide ([bit.ly/godmode484](http://bit.ly/godmode484)).

Note that this is for advanced users and you should back up everything before continuing with God Mode.



**10** If you find you've sandboxed the wrong app or need to remove an app completely, head over to the Island list, tap the offending app and open the three-dot menu. **1** You can 'Create Unfreeze & Launch shortcut' **2** on your Android home screen or – more usefully – 'Clone to mainland', **3** restoring its former privacy permissions, and then Uninstall **4** the sandboxed app from your device.

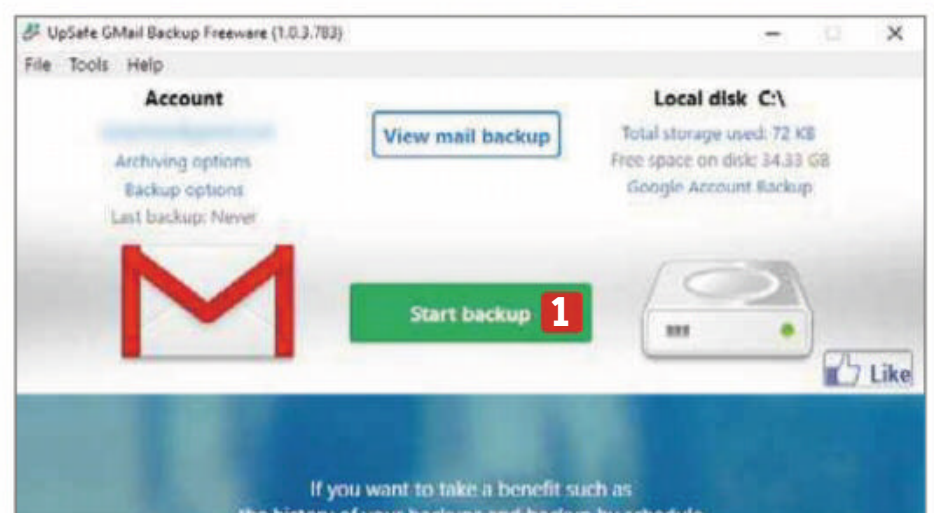
**1** Launch the software and click the 'Sign in with Google' button. You log in directly with Google, so your password isn't seen by UpSafe. Enter your credentials and agree to the permissions. The main screen shows your Gmail account **1** and the proposed location of your backup. **2**



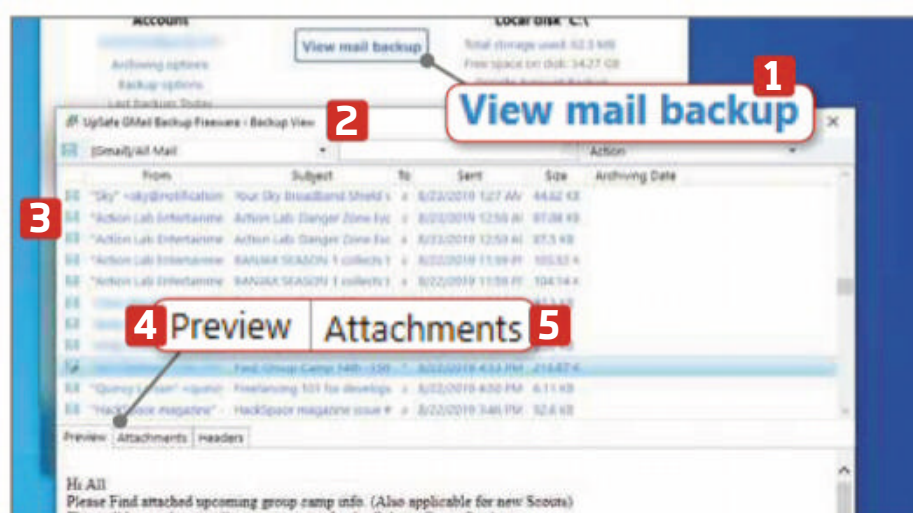
**2** To see exactly where your backup will be stored, click the 'Total storage used' link. **1** This opens the Options on the Storage tab. **2** If you want to store your backup somewhere else, click the '...' button. **3** You can also see a breakdown of how much space the backup is using. **4**



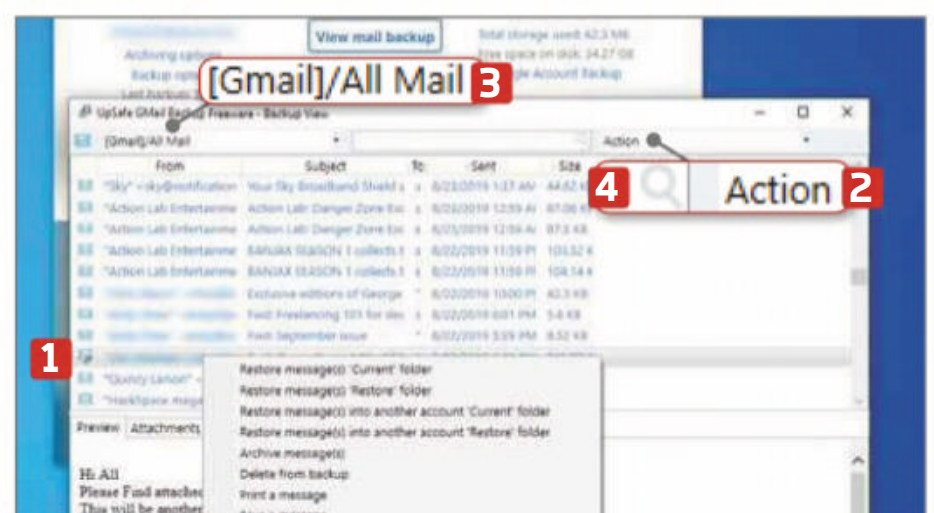
**3** You can fine-tune your backup by choosing a subset of folders. Click 'Backup options' **1** to open the Backup tab **2** in Options, then tick the Folders box **3** and make your selection by ticking the boxes in the drop-down list. **4** You can also filter by date, and by the From, To and Subject fields. **5**



**4** Once you've configured your backup, click 'Start backup'. **1** The button is replaced with a progress bar. Depending on the volume of emails you're backing up, this may take a few minutes, but it'll be faster next time, as it incrementally adds new mail rather than backing up the whole lot again.



**5** Once the backup is completed, click 'View mail backup'. **1** This opens the Backup View window **2** where you can see all the emails you've downloaded. **3** Click one to read it in the Preview window, below. **4** Any attached files can be downloaded from the Attachments tab. **5**



**6** If disaster strikes and you lose your emails, restore them from your backup. Select an email or use Shift+Click to select several. Right-click the selection **1** or click the Action menu **2** to choose how the emails are restored. You can refine the selection by folder **3** or by searching. **4**

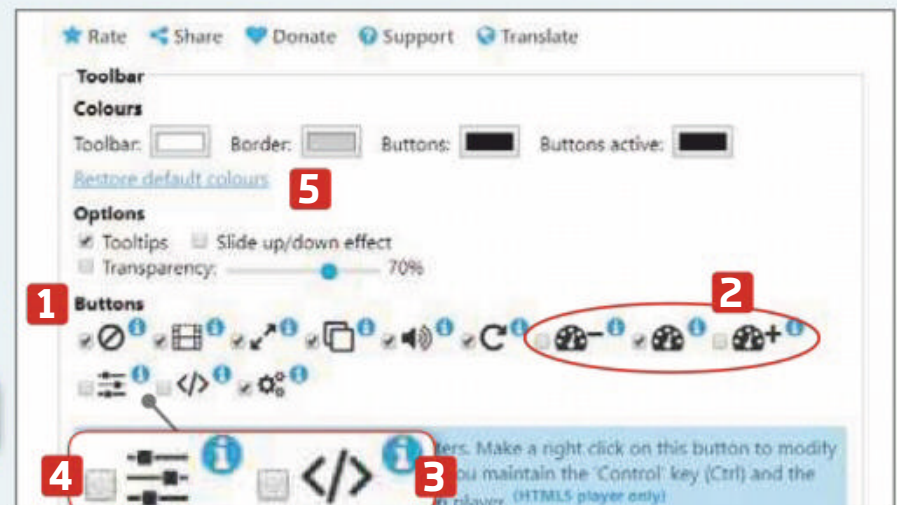

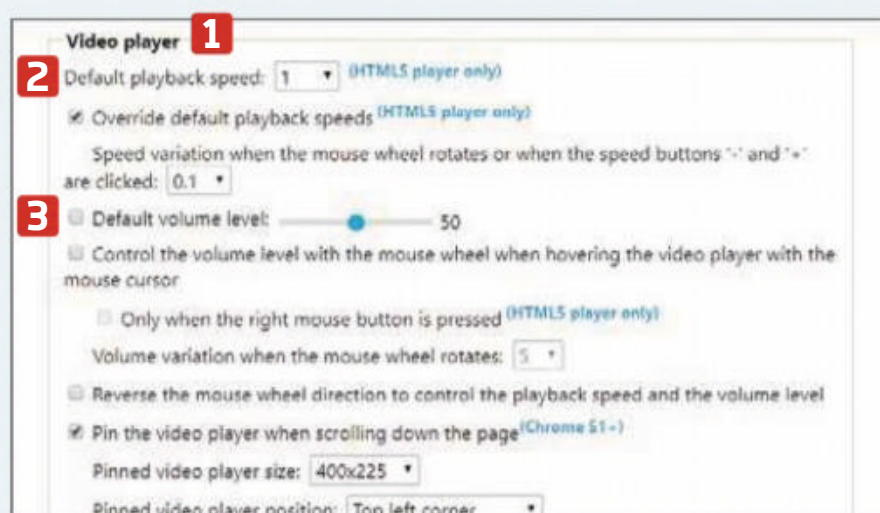

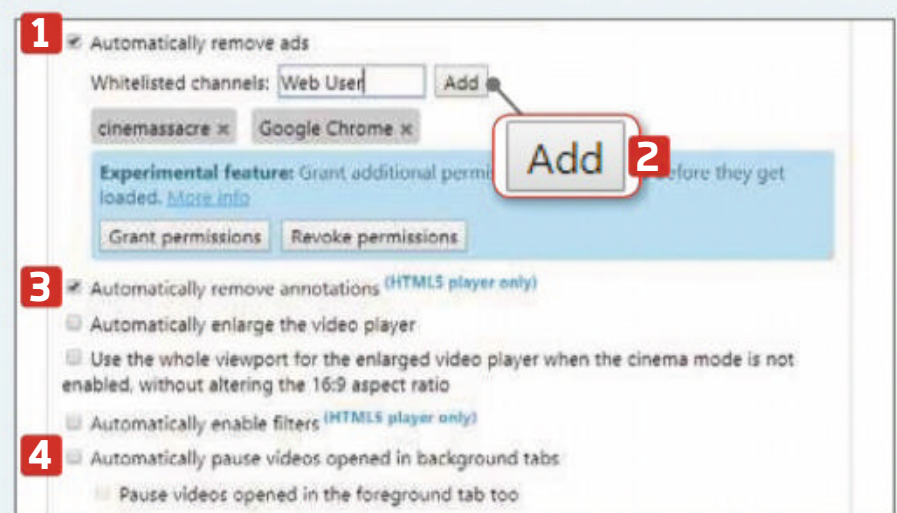
**1** Enhancer places a toolbar at the bottom of YouTube pages containing eight options: **1** 'Remove ads', 'Cinema mode', 'Resize player', 'Detach player' (an unpinnable picture-in-picture mode), 'Boost volume', 'Loop video', Speed (controlled via your mouse wheel) and Options.



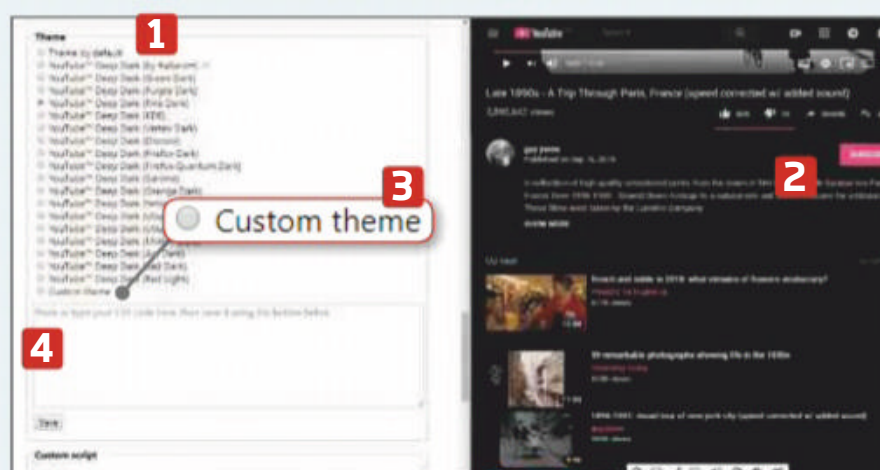
**2** To add more tools, go to Options, Toolbar. The Buttons section **1** has extra speed controls, **2** custom scripts **3** and filters. **4** Tick a box to add it, or untick to remove any you don't need. New features are added instantly. You can also customise the toolbar's colour and transparency. **5**



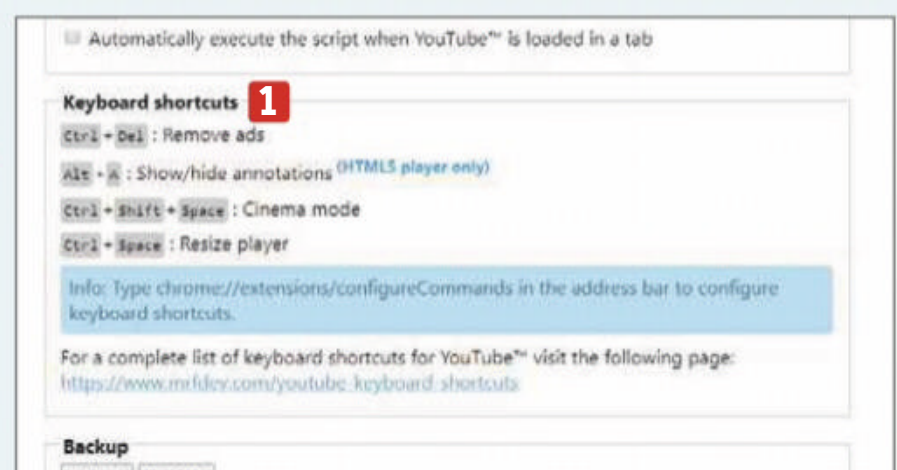
**3** Scroll down the Options screen to 'Video player'. **1** Here, you can set your default playback speed, **2** volume level **3** and screen size for every video. At the bottom of this section, you can choose the default video quality, with backup options.



**4** You can 'Automatically remove ads' **1** and click Add **2** to whitelist your favourite channels so they still get ad revenue. Tick 'Automatically remove annotations' **3** to stop them blocking the screen. 'Automatically pause videos opened in background tabs' **4** helps to save your data.



**5** There are 18 additional themes, beyond the default setting, **1** each of which adds a black background with coloured accents. **2** Tick the box to see the effect instantly. If you know CSS, you can select 'Custom theme' **3** and paste the CSS code in the text box. **4**



**6** Enhancer for YouTube's keyboard shortcuts **1** go far beyond pressing the spacebar to play and pause. Useful shortcuts include 'C' to switch on subtitles, 'M' to mute videos, and arrow keys to control volume and playback speed. How to...

## Make any printer wireless

**Wayne Williams** explains how you can convert an old wired printer into a wireless model, so you can print from any device

**B**efore Wi-Fi became a common fixture in our homes, your printer would be connected to your PC via a cable. If you wanted to print something from another device, you'd have to first transfer the file to the PC connected to the printer (via email, SD card or USB stick, for example), then print it from there.

Nowadays, you can connect to a wireless printer from anywhere, using almost any device. If your printer doesn't have wireless capabilities, there are several ways you can add this functionality.

In this issue's Weekend Project, we look at the various options available to you, from adding a wireless print server to harnessing the power of the cloud. If you have a Raspberry Pi, you can even use this to build your own print server.



### Add a wireless print server

Most modern printers now come with built-in Wi-Fi, but if your old-school printer doesn't offer this, there are various ways in which you can add it yourself. The first and easiest option – but also the most expensive – is to buy a wireless print server, such as TP-Link's TL-WPS510U (£50, [bit.ly/tpl484](https://bit.ly/tpl484)). You plug this into your printer's USB port and can then connect to it from any device

on your network.

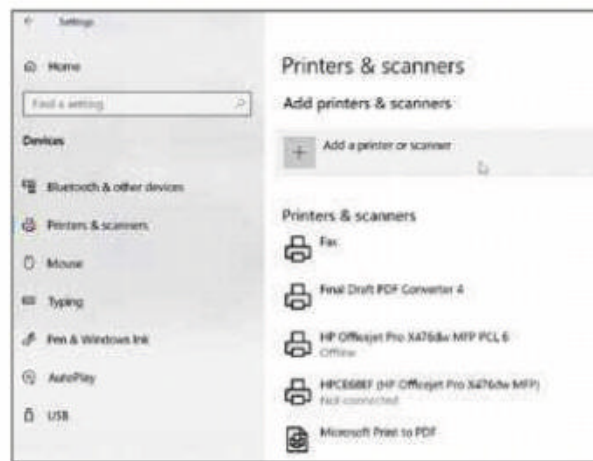
However, there are a couple of downsides to be aware of. Most wireless print servers are a few years old, and therefore may not be fully compatible with Windows 10 – or even your printer – so it pays to do some research before you buy. Also, given the cost, it may actually be cheaper to replace your outdated printer with a newer wireless model. Shop around to see what's available.

If you own a Raspberry Pi, you could consider turning this into a wireless print server. You don't need the latest version – an older model will do, and these are very cheap to buy. We show you how to set this up in our Mini Workshop, right. It essentially involves installing and configuring the CUPS (Common UNIX Printing System) print server software from Apple that's typically used on Linux and Unix systems.





TP-Link's TL-WPS510U connects to your printer's USB port and makes it wireless

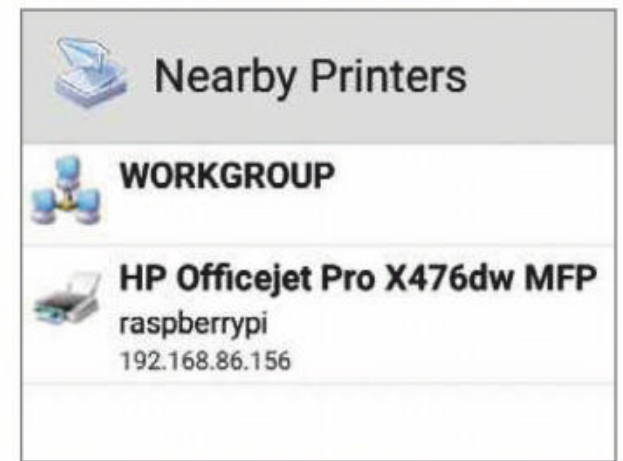

## Share a wired printer over your home network

Another way to access your printer from different devices is to share it over your home network. Be aware, though, that the computer your printer is connected to needs to be switched on at all times for this to work.

To set this up in Windows 10, click Start, Settings and select Network & Internet, then Sharing Options. This opens the Advanced Sharing Settings in the Control Panel. To get to this stage in Windows 7, go to Start, Control Panel,

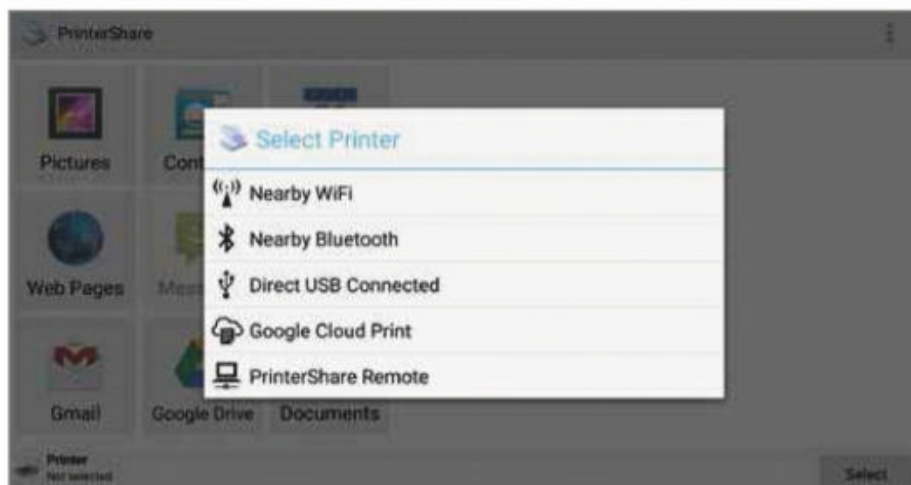


PrinterShare lets you connect an Android device to your Raspberry Pi-shared printer

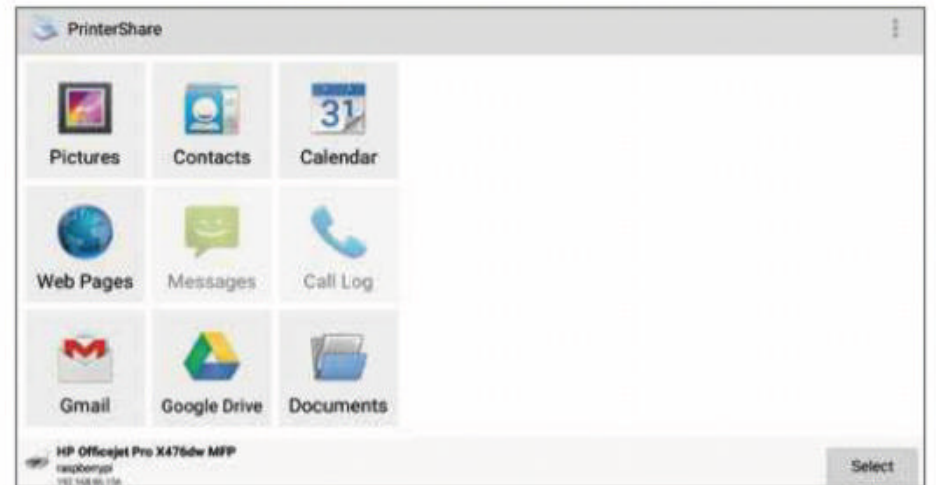
'Network and Internet', 'Network and Sharing Center' and click the 'Change advanced sharing settings' link.

Make sure the 'Network discovery', and 'File and printer sharing' settings are enabled. Turn off 'Password protected sharing' under All Networks, then click the 'Save changes' button. Restart your PC (or log off and back on again) to action the changes.

When done, click Start, Settings, Devices. Select 'Printers & scanners' on the left, and select your printer on the right. Click Manage, then click 'Printer



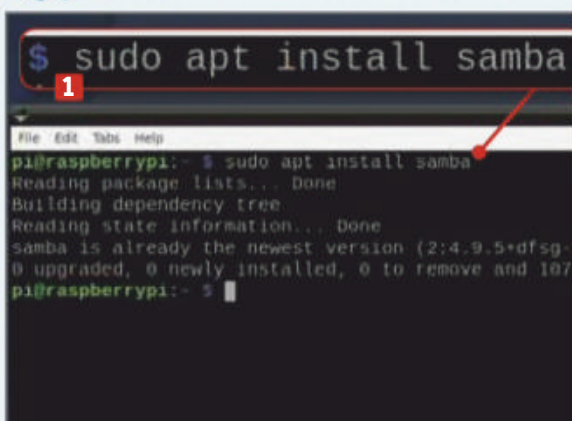

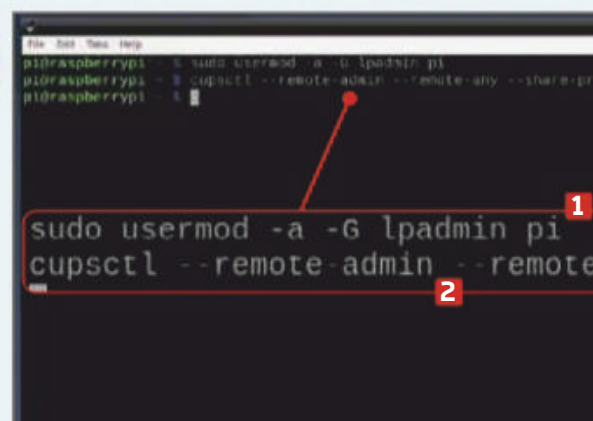

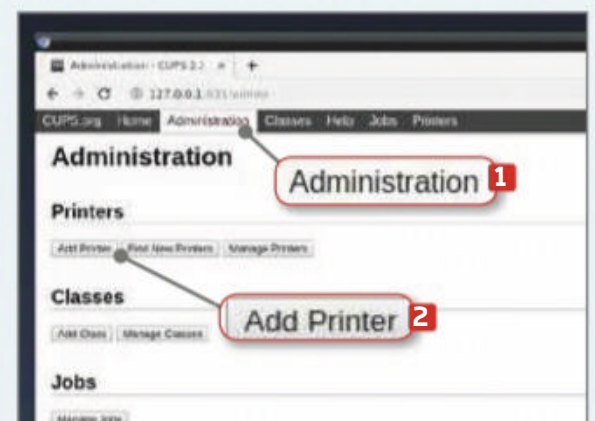
## MINI WORKSHOP | Make a wireless print server from a Raspberry Pi



**1** If you haven't used your Pi in a while, you'll need to make sure its software is fully up to date. Open Terminal and enter `sudo apt update` then `sudo apt upgrade` to download and install all updates. Next, install SAMBA, which lets you print from Windows devices, by entering `sudo apt install samba`. **1**



**2** The next step is to install CUPS (Common UNIX Printing System). In Terminal, enter `sudo apt install cups` then `sudo usermod -a -G lpadmin pi` (replace 'pi' with your actual username if you changed it from the default). **1** To allow remote access, type `cupsctl --remote-admin --remote-any --share-printers`. **2**







**3** You may need to reboot your Pi. Now, open your web browser and go to `127.0.0.1:631` to access the CUPS admin page. Click the Administration tab **1** and log in with your Pi username and password. Connect the Pi to your printer (if you haven't already) via USB, then click Add Printer. **2**

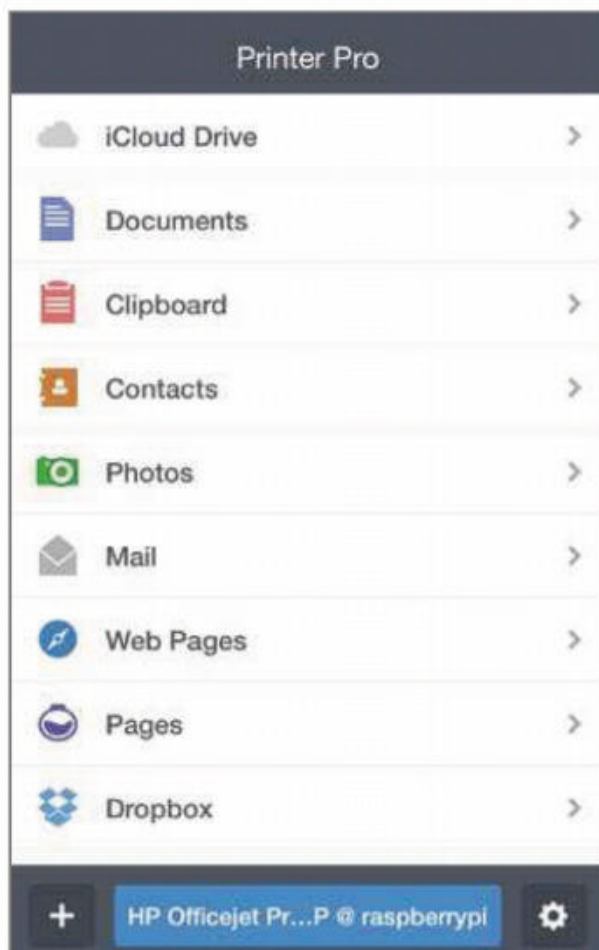
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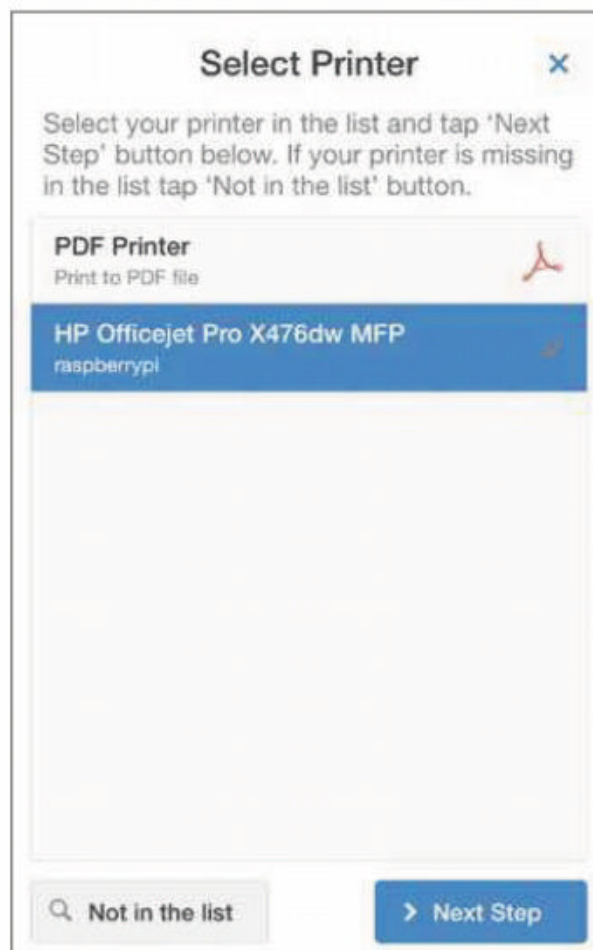

properties'. In the box that opens, click the Sharing tab. Next, click the Change Sharing Options button, then tick 'Share this printer' and give the device a recognisable name (or accept the default choice). This window also gives you the option to render print jobs on the remote device if you wish.

Finally, if you plan to connect to your printer using a PC running a different version of Windows, you may need to

install some drivers. Click the Additional Drivers button to do this. Restart your PC (or log off and back on again) and you should be ready to print.

To access your printer from another computer on the same network, type **printer** in the search box and click 'Printers & scanners'. In the Settings window, click 'Add a printer or scanner'. Windows 10 automatically searches for compatible devices, but with older

versions of Windows there are some additional steps to follow. Select your printer in this list, click Next and complete the steps to set it up.

To use your printer from an Android device or iPhone, you can use an app such as Mobile Print - PrinterShare ([bit.ly/pshare484](http://bit.ly/pshare484)). The app itself is free, but you need to buy a Premium Key via an in-app purchase to unlock all its features. This costs £4.99 (iOS) or £3.45 (Android) and lets you print photos, contact or calendar information, web pages, messages, Gmail messages, documents, Google Drive content and more.

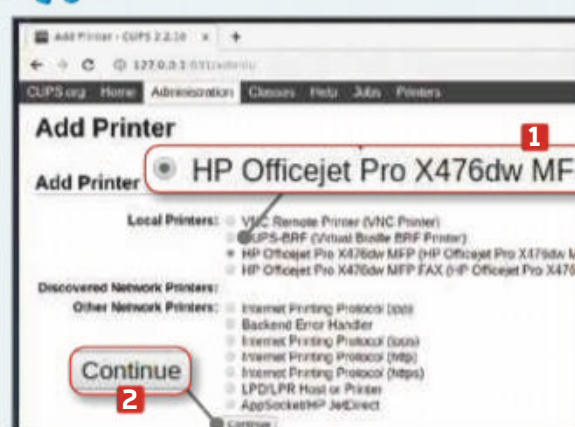
## Print from an iPhone or iPad

There are various ways to print from an Apple mobile device but our favourite app is Printer Pro by Readdle ([bit.ly/printpro484](http://bit.ly/printpro484)). It costs £6.99, which might seem a little steep, but you can use it to print anything from your iPhone or iPad, including documents, photos, emails, web pages, clipboard contents and Dropbox items. It also comes with an incredibly useful Print Options screen that lets you change the orientation, paper size, scaling, number of copies and even specify the number of pages per sheet.

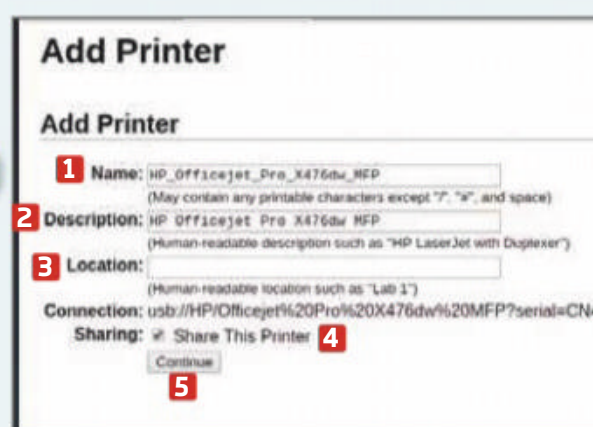
If your printer is connected to a PC or Mac, you need to install the free Printer Pro for Desktop program ([bit.ly/ppdesk484](http://bit.ly/ppdesk484)) before you can access it through the mobile app. Once connected, you'll be invited to print a test page to make sure that everything is working correctly. ■



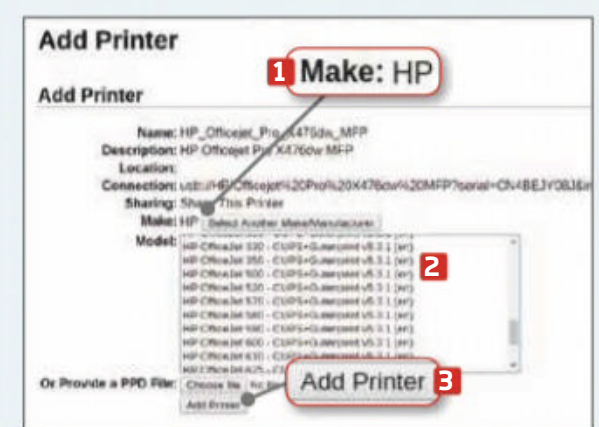

**4** The Add Printer page opens and you're presented with a list of devices you can add, including local and networked printers. Yours should appear under Local Printers. 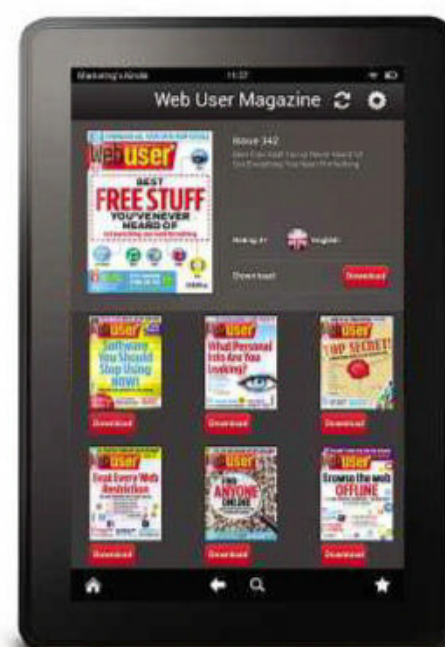

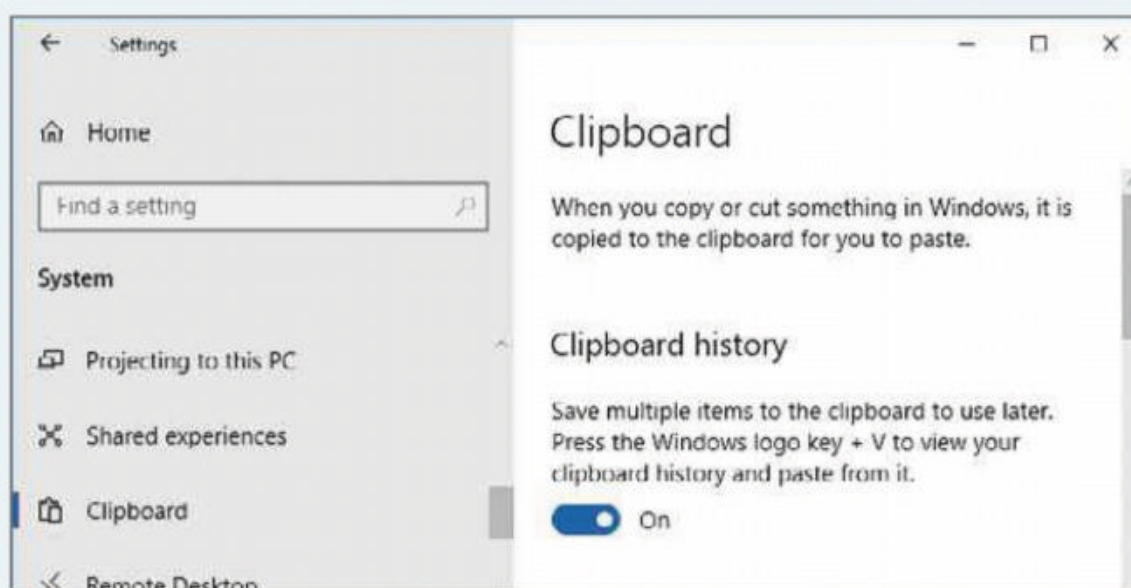
## Master the clipboard in Windows and Android

### Switch between multiple clipboards in Windows 10

**B**efore the arrival of Windows 10, the Windows clipboard only let you cut, copy and paste one item at a time.

Now you can copy lots of things from various programs, then switch to another and choose the item you want to paste.

Open Windows 10's Settings, select System, Clipboard, then turn on 'Clipboard history'. Now, open a program that lets you copy and paste, such as WordPad, and press Ctrl+C to copy several bits of text. Press Windows+V to list everything that was copied and select the one you want to paste. Use the mouse wheel to scroll through the list of clipboard items if there are lots of them.



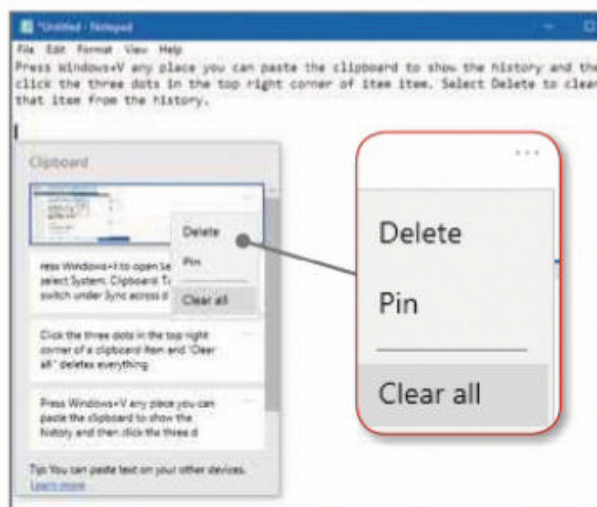
*Enable clipboard history and store multiple items for pasting*

### Clear clipboard history

There may be times when you copy something to the clipboard that you don't want anyone else to see – for example, if you share your computer with colleagues or family members, and have copied and pasted a password into a program or web page.

While you're in a program you can paste to, press Windows+V to show the clipboard history. Click the three-dot menu in the top-right corner of an item and select Delete to clear it from the history. Select the 'Clear all' menu item if you want to delete everything.

Another method is to press Windows+i and go to System, Clipboard, then click the Clear button near the bottom.

### Pin and save items

As mentioned in the previous tip, selecting 'Clear all' from the three-dot menu deletes everything stored in your clipboard. However, if you want to retain any of the items, select Pin to preserve specific clipboard entries and exempt them from the 'Clear all' action.

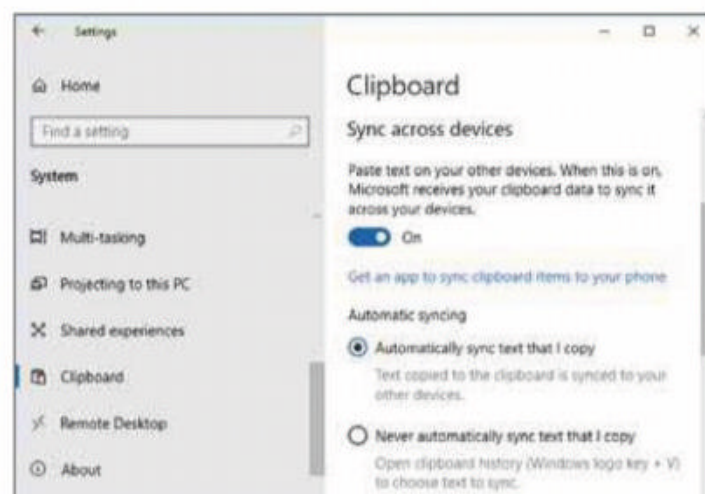
It's not obvious which items are pinned because there is no visual clue, but if you click the three-dot button for a clipboard item, the menu will offer to Unpin it if it is pinned.

### Use the keyboard to control clipboard

When you're using a word processor or typing text into a web page, you may prefer to use keyboard commands for the clipboard, rather than interrupt your flow to reach for the mouse. Press Windows+V to show the clipboard history, use the up and down arrow keys to select an item, then press Enter to paste it or the Delete key to clear it.

### Sync clipboard between PCs

Any text saved to the clipboard can be synced between Windows 10 PCs, which could come in handy if you're using more than one Windows 10 device.



*Sync the clipboard across Windows computers and devices*

When switching from one device to another, clipboard items follow you and can be used in your apps and web pages.

To enable this feature, which is disabled by default, open the Settings app and select System, Clipboard. Turn on the switch under 'Sync across

devices'. Below this, select 'Automatically select text that I copy'.

From now on, any cut or copied text will appear on the other computers and devices you use.

## Manually sync clipboard items

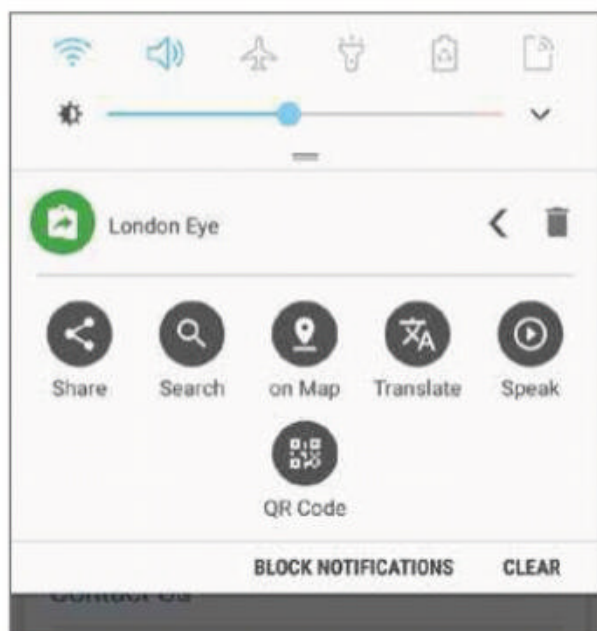
If you have set your clipboard history to sync between devices, you may want to change this to sync manually rather than automatically, for privacy and security reasons. Synced items are sent to Microsoft and stored in your account online, so it's worth being cautious with certain items, such as copied passwords.

In Settings, System Clipboard, select 'Never automatically sync text that I copy'. Go to a program you can paste into and press Windows+V to show the clipboard history. Click the three-dot icon in the top-right corner and you get a new item on the menu – Sync. This option syncs just that one specific item. Use this method to sync only the items you want to appear on other computers and devices.

## Android clipboard actions

Clipboard Actions & Manager ([bit.ly/clam484](https://bit.ly/clam484)) is a handy tool for Android phones that lets you choose various actions for text copied to the clipboard. Copy some text in any app – such as a note-taking app or a browser – and pull down from the top of the screen to show notifications. Pull down again to expand the notification and you'll see a collection of icons.

The icons displayed depend on what's been copied to the clipboard. With most text, one tap lets you share the copied text, search Google (or another search engine), show it on Google Maps, translate it, speak it or turn it into a QR code. If the copied text features currency, such as '£125', you'll see a button to convert it to another currency, such as Euros.

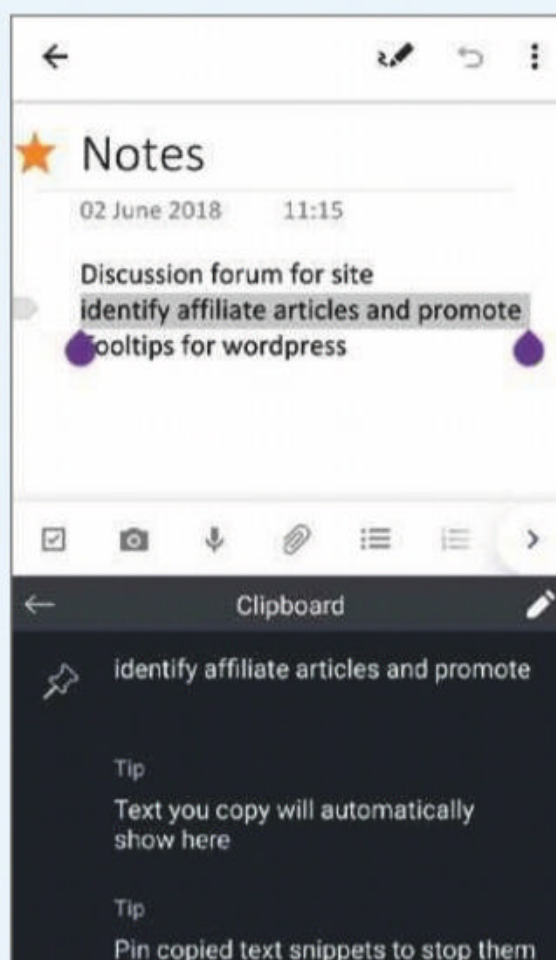
### Add clipboard history to Android

As with Windows, there are lots of apps that boost the power of the clipboard on your phone. One way to create multiple clipboards is to install the SwiftKey keyboard ([bit.ly/swift484](https://bit.ly/swift484)). Add it, run it and go through the three-step setup to enable it. The new clipboard works everywhere, but a notes app is a good place to experiment with it.

If you don't see the SwiftKey toolbar, press the plus button on the left just above the keyboard. Tap the clipboard icon and the keyboard will be replaced with a view of the clipboard history.

Long-press some text to select it, then tap Copy to add it to the SwiftKey clipboard, which stores multiple items. Swipe up and down to browse the clipboard items, swipe left and right to remove unwanted items, and tap an item to paste it.

Run the SwiftKey app and press Typing, Clipboard to open the clipboard manager. You can now add, edit or delete clipboard items.

### Share the Windows clipboard with Android

If you have enabled clipboard history and syncing in Windows Settings,

install SwiftKey Beta ([bit.ly/swiftbeta484](https://bit.ly/swiftbeta484)) on your Android phone. This lets you share the clipboard between your PC and your phone.

Bear in mind that as this feature is still in beta it could be a bit buggy or it may not work at all. It'll be great when it is finally finished, though!

### Using the clipboard from the command line

Why on earth would you want to use the clipboard from the command line? It turns out that there are some interesting actions you can perform with it, such as copying file and directory listings.

Press Windows+R, type `cmd` and press Enter to open a command prompt. Type `cd` and drag a folder from Explorer, then drop it on the command prompt and press Enter to go to that folder. Use the `dir` command to list the directory contents, which can then be copied to the clipboard with:

```
dir | clip
```

Alternatively, if you want a list of files in this folder along with all subfolders, use:

```
dir /s | clip
```

Back in Windows, press Ctrl+V to paste the file and folder listing into Notepad, Word or any application that accepts text. You might want a list of all your photo or music files, for example, and this is a good way to create it.

A text file can be copied to the clipboard with:

```
clip < file.txt
```

and the clipboard can be cleared with:

```
echo off | clip
```

### Reset clipboard in the Registry

You shouldn't need to access clipboard settings in the Registry, but if your clipboard ever stops working, press Windows+R, type `regedit` and press Enter. Go to:

HKEY\_CURRENT\_USER\Software\Microsoft\Clipboard

There are several values.

CloudClipboardAutomaticUpload and EnableClipboardHistory are the clipboard settings in the Windows 10 Settings app we covered earlier.

Values are 1 (enabled) or 0 (disabled).

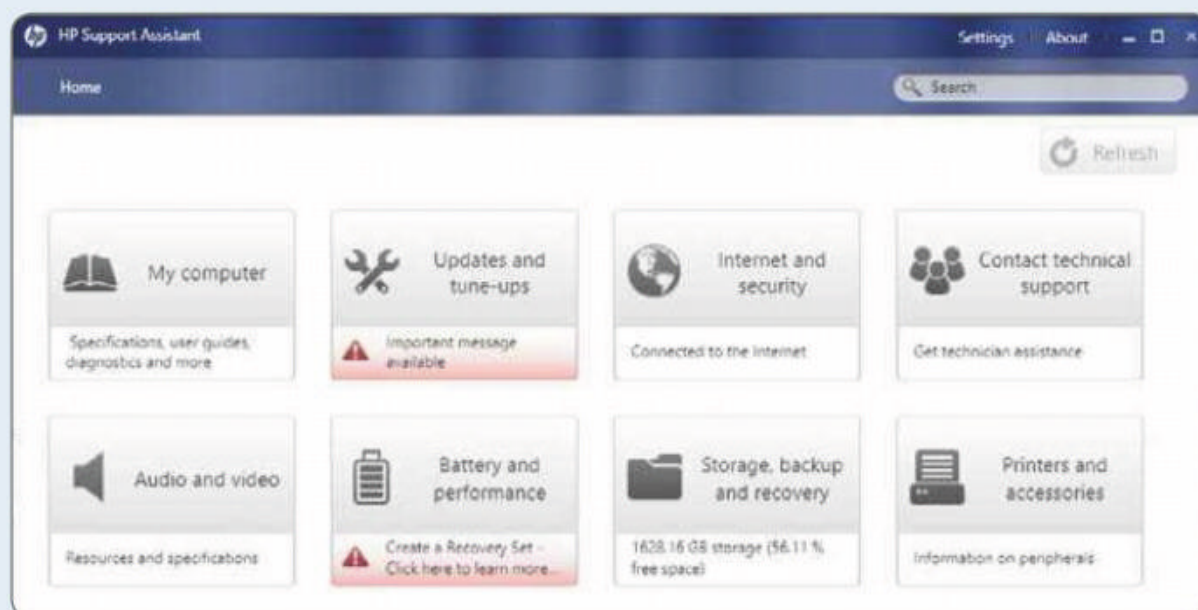
### Fix the HP Support Assistant tool

**Q** How do I make HP Support Assistant work on my new laptop running Windows 10? I've tried uninstalling and reinstalling it several times, but all I get when I try to open it is a white screen. Any help or advice would be greatly appreciated.

**A** We tried HP Support Assistant on a Windows 10 PC and it worked fine, so it's not a Windows 10 issue. Your problem could be caused by an old or outdated version of the Support Assistant, so try downloading the latest version from [bit.ly/hpsa484](http://bit.ly/hpsa484).

Uninstall the old version of HP Assistant from Settings or Control

Panel, then restart Windows before installing the new version. Make sure there are no other programs running in the background when you start it.

HP Support Assistant may be useful, but it's not essential and your laptop will

run perfectly well without it. You don't need it to download drivers, tune up the PC, check storage, run troubleshooters or any of the other basic tasks it performs. It just makes it a bit easier.

### Reconfigure System Restore

**Q** The option to configure a System Restore point is greyed out and it says protection is switched off, but I can't turn it on. My Windows 10 laptop is less than a month old and this is my first attempt to create a restore point.

**A** To configure System Restore, open the Settings app (Windows+i), type **system restore** in the search box and click 'Create a restore point' in the search suggestions. This opens the System Properties window on the System Protection tab.

Select the Windows C: drive and click the Configure button. Select 'Turn on system protection' and drag the Max Usage slider to give it some disk space to work in – as little as 3GB should be fine, but if

the drive is quite large, increase it to 20GB. Click Apply.

If this doesn't fix the problem, go to the Start menu and type

**powershell**. When Windows PowerShell appears, right-click it and select 'Run as Administrator'. In the PowerShell window, if you only have one drive partition to protect, type:

**Enable-ComputerRestore -Drive "C:\"**

Press Enter. If you have more than one drive partition, add them to the command like this:

**Enable-ComputerRestore -Drive "C:\", "D:\"**

If you have more than one drive or partition, type **systempropertiesprotection**, press Enter, and see if System Restore can be configured and a restore point created.

### MSN homepage on startup

**Q** Over the last couple of weeks, whenever I start my computer with the modem switched on, I get the MSN homepage popping up with Chrome with no prompting from me. I have tried altering the Chrome settings but nothing seems to get rid of it. Is there any way I can stop this MSN homepage





automatically appearing and could this be related to a virus or malware?

My PC is running Windows 8.1.

**A** Your problem could be caused by Chrome – open the Settings and find the ‘On start-up’ section to see if MSN is listed. If it is, change it to another web page you’d prefer to see. However, it’s most likely to be a startup program that’s requesting the web page. Chrome is probably opening because it’s set as the default browser.

Press Windows+R, type `msconfig` and press Enter. Click the Startup tab and see what’s auto-starting with Windows. If that doesn’t produce any clues, try Autoruns ([bit.ly/arun484](http://bit.ly/arun484)), which is a more powerful tool for listing startup items.

### Secure compromised passwords

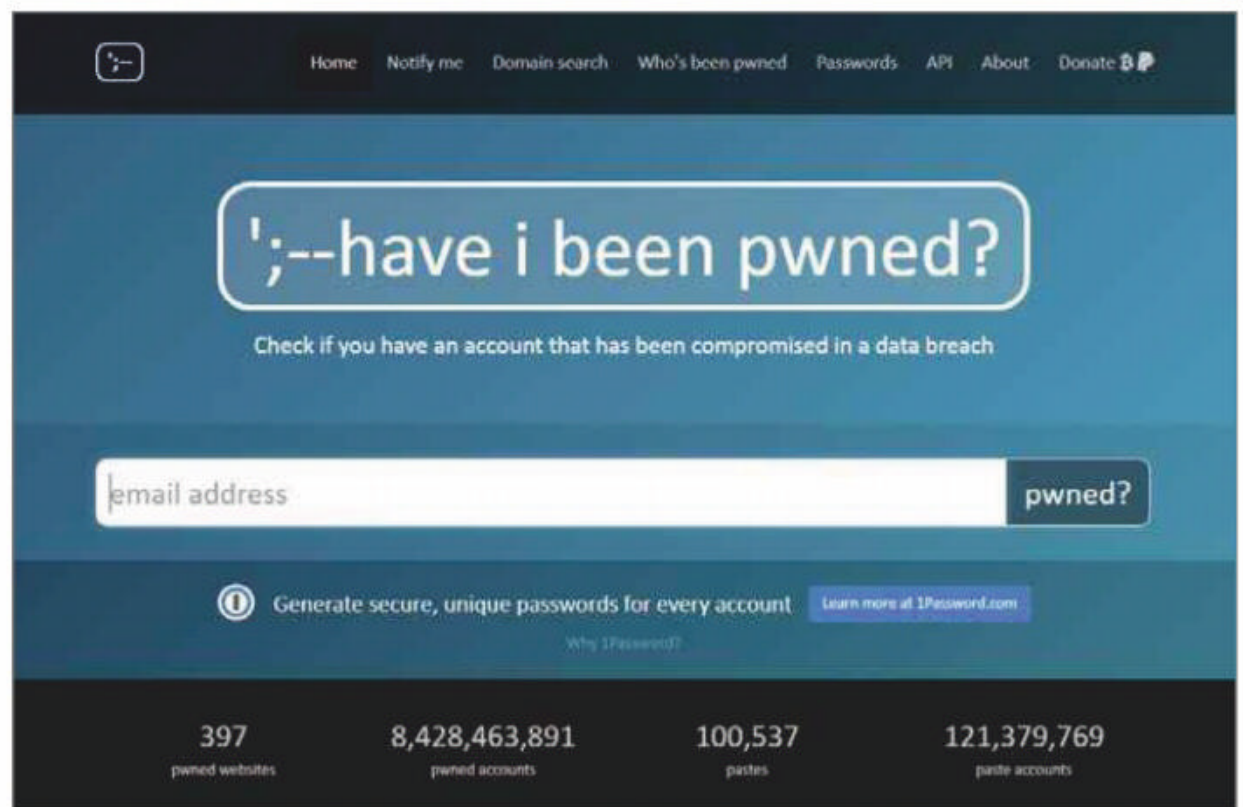
**Q** I received an email from Firefox Monitor (which I don’t remember signing up to – I haven’t used Firefox in years) saying my data has been compromised by a particular website. I visited the Have I Been Pwnd website ([haveibeenpwned.com](http://haveibeenpwned.com)) which confirmed that my personal information had been compromised on that website, and also three other services. One was an Android app I’ve never used and doesn’t show in either the installed or library list or under my name in the Google Play Store. Another was a genealogy website I have not accessed for years. There was also a social site I vaguely remember but which I stopped using years ago, along with a design website I had checked out to compare with other similar sites, where I must have had to enter my details.

I tried to log into these sites so I could delete my profiles, but since I had no recollection of the registered email or password, I wasted a lot of time trying to use the “I’ve Forgotten my password” options, which ended up leading me around in circles.

If it’s so difficult for me to get on these sites, what can I do? I have thought of emailing each one, but without logging in, I can’t find any contact options on their front pages.

My only comfort is that even if I had given my credit card details to these sites, my card supplier recently made me change to one with a different number and security code. Do I need to waste any more of my life on this? Not dealing with it is making me feel nervous and vulnerable.

**A** It’s easy to sign up for stuff without realising or forget that you’ve created an account if you haven’t used a service for years. Because you received an email message, Firefox Monitor must be using your current address, so you’re correct to try entering it into the ‘password reset’ or ‘forgot password’ feature of those websites.

If this method isn’t working, your account was probably deactivated or deleted due to being inactive. In that case, even someone in possession of your details won’t be able to log in. And even if they could, you’ve said that you changed your credit card, so any payment details stored on the breached sites will be useless.

The biggest risk is if you’ve used the

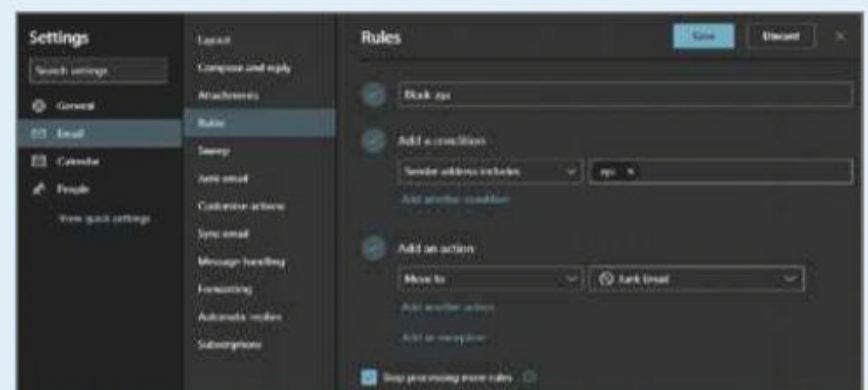
you replied to an email from Davis

Andrews who asked if you knew how to block emails from the ‘.can’ Top Level Domain (TLD). Your reply explained how to block domains (since he actually referred to it as the ‘.can’ domain), but I believe he was asking how to block a TLD, which you didn’t specifically answer as you appeared to assume he was asking how to block a domain and not a TLD.

Like Davis, I am plagued by spam that comes from non-UK and non-US TLDs and would really appreciate your advice on how to block a TLD completely using email rules. I mainly use Outlook 365 (part of Office 365) and am fully conversant with how to block a domain, but not a TLD.

I would be very grateful for your help as I really want to block a load of TLDs that I never ever correspond with.

**A** Blocking a whole top level domain is very broad and could result in useful or important emails being deleted. Still, it’s possible to do this using rules. For example, at the Outlook website, click the cog icon followed by ‘View all Outlook settings’, then select Email in the first column, Rules in the second and create a new rule.

Under ‘Add a condition’, select ‘Sender address includes’ and enter the top level domain on the right, such as ‘.can’. Select ‘Move to’ under ‘Add an action’, then select a folder, such as Junk Email or Deleted Items.

Unfortunately, this would not only block ‘everyone@somewhere.can’ but also, for example ‘bob.cantrell@gmail.com’ and ‘sue.canfield@outlook.com’.

same email address and password for other accounts. You should always pick a unique password for each of your accounts so that if one site is compromised, the same email/password combo can't be used on another. As long as your passwords are different, you probably have nothing to worry about.

#### Make office software check spelling

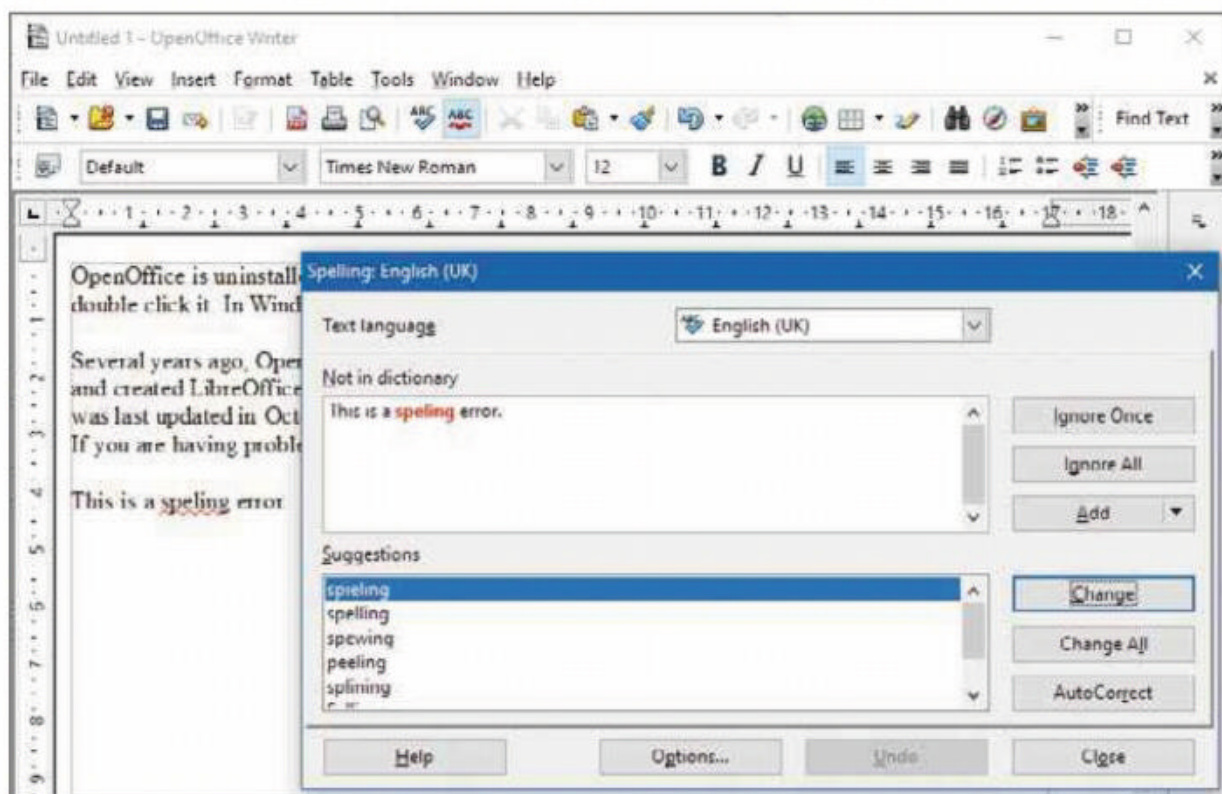
**Q** I don't have any use for a sophisticated word processor and my needs are met by the basic pre-installed WordPad in Windows 10. The only thing I miss is an auto spellchecker.

Following your recommendation in Issue 468 ([bit.ly/webuser468](http://bit.ly/webuser468)), I installed the free Apache OpenOffice suite ([www.openoffice.org](http://www.openoffice.org)). This was a considerable improvement but I have never managed to get the auto spellchecker to work. For this reason, I decided to get rid of OpenOffice but now I can't uninstall it.

How do I get the auto spellchecker to work? If I can't do this, I'd rather delete the Apache suite. What is the best way to uninstall it?

**A** We haven't had any problems with spell-checking in OpenOffice. Straight after installation and without any configuration, it underlined **misspelt**

words as soon as they were typed.

Make sure spellchecking is turned on in your version of OpenOffice by going to Tools, 'Spelling and Grammar'. A window opens highlighting spelling errors and offering replacements. Click Options to see a list of spelling and grammar items, such as 'Check spelling as you type'. Make sure this is turned on.

OpenOffice is uninstalled in the usual way – open the Control Panel and double-click 'Programs and Features'. In Windows 10, open the Settings app, choose Apps, find the OpenOffice

option and click Delete.

Several years ago, a group of developers left OpenOffice and used the source code to create LibreOffice ([www.libreoffice.org](http://www.libreoffice.org)). The latter program was updated just a few weeks ago, so if you are having problems with OpenOffice, try switching to LibreOffice.

To prevent uninstaller problems, you could use the Portable Apps versions of OpenOffice ([bit.ly/opoff484](http://bit.ly/opoff484)) or LibreOffice ([bit.ly/liboff484](http://bit.ly/liboff484)). When run, they unzip to the Downloads folder and can be launched from there.

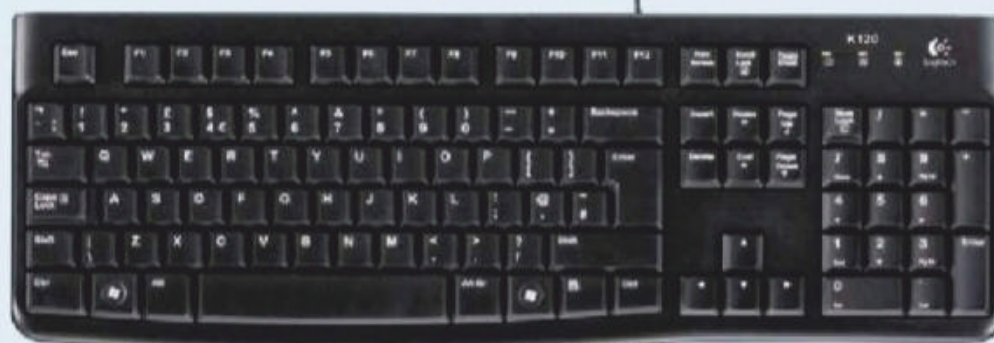

#### Repair a malfunctioning laptop keyboard

**Q** I have been experiencing problems typing on my laptop. When I press certain keys (such as B and N), nothing happens and the keypresses are not registered. If I repeatedly press them hard, I can eventually get the letters to appear. Some of the surrounding keys occasionally produce more than one letter when pressed. Can you suggest a solution?

**A** Repairing or replacing the keyboard on a laptop can be tricky, and the ease or difficulty will depend on the design. Most modern laptops can't be opened or repaired

by users. Apple MacBooks are an obvious example, along with some Windows laptops.

Take a look at your laptop's construction and see whether it's easy to take apart. Search YouTube for the make and model and see if anyone has created a video of it being opened for repairs or replacement of components.

If you don't feel confident taking apart your laptop – after all, you might make the problem worse or even damage its components – there are a couple of easy alternatives you can try, which may work if you're lucky.

Dust, food crumbs and other debris

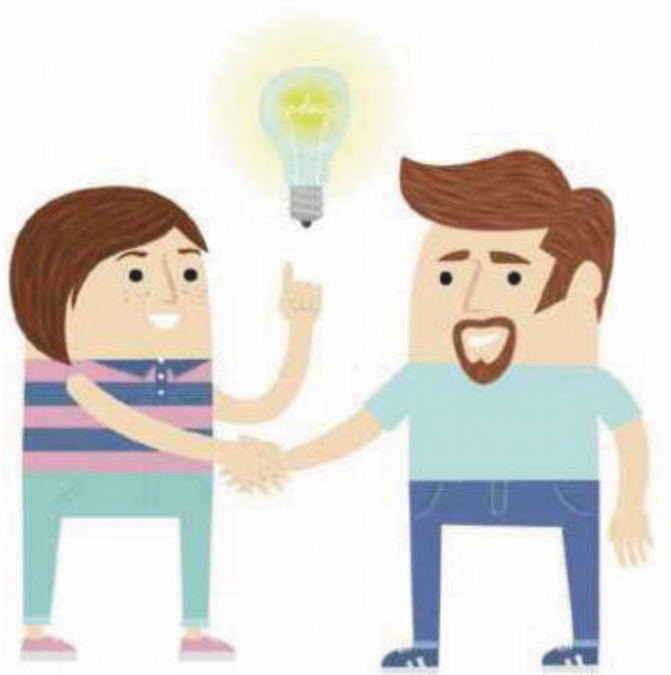
can get stuck in keyboards and removing them may solve the problem. Turn the laptop off, hold it upside down and gently shake it to dislodge anything under the keys. Use the pipe accessory on a vacuum cleaner with a stocking over the end to suck out anything that maybe trapped under the keys.

If the keys still don't work, try using an external keyboard instead. It's not an ideal solution with a laptop, but a USB or wireless keyboard will work as soon as it's plugged in, with no need to configure it or install extra software.

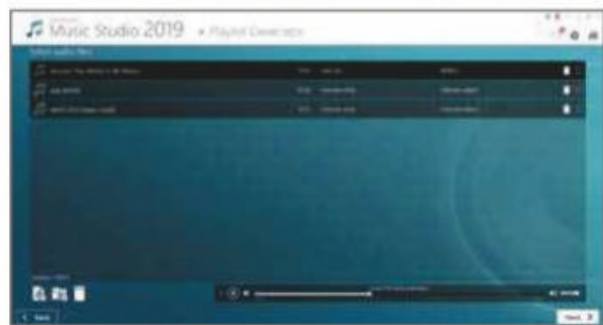

If this is all too convoluted and you'd rather use a standard music player, MusicBee ([getmusicbee.com](http://getmusicbee.com)) is one of our favourites.

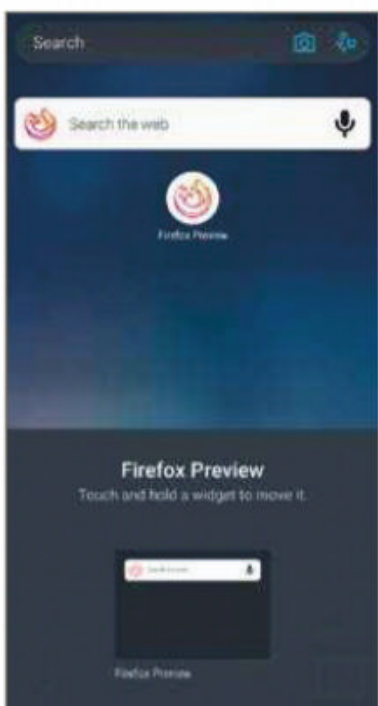

There are three ways to use the Enter key – by pressing Enter on its own, Shift+Enter or Ctrl+Enter – each of which performs a different action depending on the software that text is being typed into, such as online forms, website comments, social media sites and so on. In most word processors, such as Microsoft Word or the Word web app ([bit.ly/word484](https://bit.ly/word484)), pressing Enter on its own begins a new paragraph, while Shift+Enter starts a new line – you can see the difference in the line spacing. Ctrl+Enter is used to start a new page: in Word, --- Page Break --- is inserted, which is useful for new sections or chapters in a document. When

printed, Page Break starts a new page.

On Facebook (and some other sites), Enter posts your comment, while Shift+Enter just starts a new line.

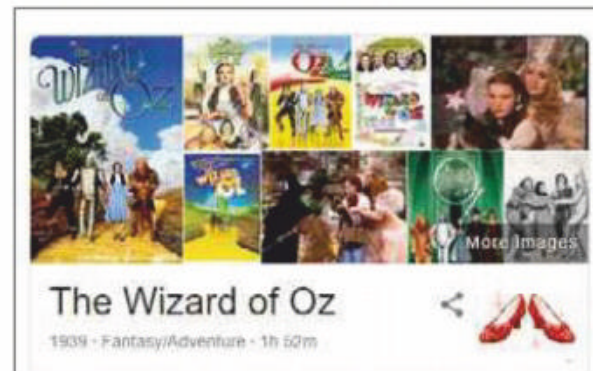

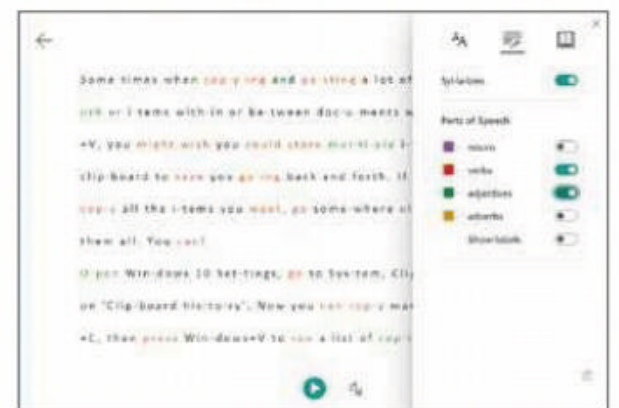

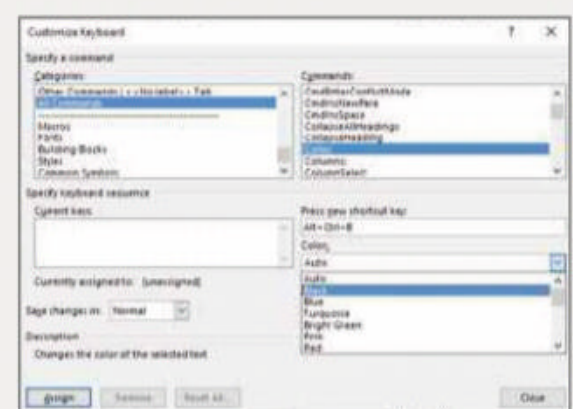

### Create shortcuts to change font colours

While recording my family tree in Microsoft Word, I assigned a different colour to each generation. This entailed constant use of the font colour icon, which was a bit of a pain, especially as I had to keep dipping into 'more colours'. Setting up a shortcut for each colour made life much easier.

To do this in Word, click File, Options, Customize Ribbon. In the pop-up, select 'All commands' in the left column and Colour in the right. Choose a colour and click Apply. This method can also be used with fonts.

I use Ctrl+Alt+any letter for each colour (such as 'b' for black, 'g' for green and so on). This setup works well if you have to regularly switch to

different fonts and colours.

To reset the colour of the font to the Windows default, simply repeat the shortcut to toggle it off.

### Cryptomining and the decentralised internet

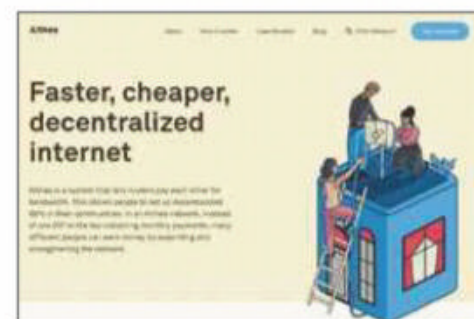
Roland's reply to Ian Smith in 'Ask The Expert', Issue 482 ('Make money by cryptomining on an old PC') was very interesting. Since Arweave and Maidsafe presumably require cryptominers to be online 24/7, would it not be better to use

something like a Linux Mint Mintbox Mini 2 to provide the 'vaults' for storing data? The Mintbox doesn't have moving parts such as fans, the absence of which would reduce the risk of fires - a very important consideration for equipment that's permanently left on in people's homes.

As for the decentralised internet, Arweave and Maidsafe are not the only kids on the block. Others that look interesting are the InterPlanetary File System ([ipfs.io](http://ipfs.io)), Substratum ([substratum.net](http://substratum.net)) and Althea ([althea.net](http://althea.net)). Althea appears to be going further than the rest by developing small roof-based relay stations so that independent,

decentralised data transmission networks can be built (one is already up and running in Columbia).

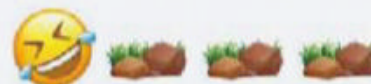

Barry Collins finds the best way to make calls is to avoid the phone altogether

## Why you don't need 5G – or a phone

Is that the Eiffel Tower I can see from my bedroom window in Sussex? My mistake, it's a 5G phone mast. Or at least it will be, if this week's Digital Secretary, Nicky Morgan, gets her way.

Morgan has launched a "consultation" – government jargon for something they're going to do anyway, but want to make it look like they're listening – that will eventually allow mobile operators to build masts taller than 25m. Bigger masts mean signals that stretch further, meaning us out here in the boondocks might stand a fighting chance of getting a decent mobile signal without having to lean out of the loft skylight.

That's the theory, anyway. The truth is that 5G signals stand as much chance of passing through trees, walls and other obstacles as I do of passing through a Pirelli calendar audition. With 4G nothing but a rumour in these parts, I'm not holding my breath for 5G. In fact, I'm beginning to give up on the 'phone' altogether.

I've tried several means of boosting my pathetic signal. I've switched mobile networks, switched handsets, switched on BT Mobile's risible Wi-Fi Calling service. The latter made yoghurt pots and string sound like Dolby Cinema.

The best solution I've found is to avoid the phone – full stop. They don't shout about it a great deal, but both Amazon Echo and Google Home speakers allow you to make free mobile and landline calls over the Wi-Fi network. You say "Alexa, ring Dad's mobile" and after a couple of seconds of thinking, you get



put through to the old boy's phone.

Google Home is even more impressive in this regard, because it can call numbers you don't know. If you tell Google to call the Ask restaurant in Lewes, for example, it will look up the number and put you through. It's like Directory Enquiries, except you don't need to remortgage your house to pay for it first.

Call quality via both Alexa and Google Assistant is decent and reliable (Alexa slightly more so, in my experience), and you can tell both services your mobile phone number so that when you call friends and family, your name – rather than "Unknown caller" – pops up on their mobile screen.

The only downsides are that you're completely snookered if the company you're calling has one of those "press 1

for sales" switchboards, and you feel a bit of a plum saying "Alexa, end call" when you've finished your conversation – it's normally best to let the other person hang up first.

The Amazon and Google options will deal with most outgoing call scenarios, but what about incoming calls? Here, I'm working on a Heath Robinson solution. Skype lets you buy UK numbers at a relatively modest cost of a fiver a month, so I can divert all my mobile calls to that number and pick up my incoming mobile calls on Skype, without worrying too much that the call will drop after five seconds.

The problem with this approach? Skype itself, which has an uncanny knack of ringing every device except the one you actually want to pick up the call from. This leads to hilarious scenarios where I find myself pressing an iPad to my ear. Yes – it looks ridiculous, but it's still nowhere near as ridiculous as the Crystal Palace-sized mast Nicky Morgan wants to erect in my back garden.
