
The key to this issue's cover feature is a tiny USB stick called a YubiKey, which combines powerful data security with the convenience and reassurance of having

We explain exactly how a YubiKey works, why you should invest in one and all the services you can use it with. We also look at other types of USB security key and reveal how to make your own - for free.



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
# What's New Online

Master machine learning without

using code

ou don't need to be a programming genius to get to grips with the basics of machine learning. Indeed, a couple of years ago, Google launched its Teachable Machine, which allowed anyone to use a webcam or files on their hard drive to teach the computer how to recognise patterns in data.

Now, Google has unveiled Teachable Machine 2.0, which again doesn't require any coding and lets you interact via your microphone. Choose between an Image, Audio and Pose project and, by selecting photos, sounds or people moving around, the computer can be trained to pick up on the differences to classify new examples - such as telling the difference between a human and a dog. Trained models can then be exported to websites,



devices and apps.

Along with easy-to-follow video tutorials, there are links to three

example projects that teach the computer to determine if a banana is ripe, detect simple sounds and recognise which way your head is tilting. Real-life projects are also explored and, for anyone worried about privacy, Google promises that any media you upload or capture remains on your device unless you save a project to Google Drive.

# Queue videos on YouTube

YouTube has made a few tweaks to its website, the most useful of which is a new "add to queue" button. This appears when you hover over a video thumbnail or click the threedot menu underneath. As with the YouTube mobile app, the queue option lets you choose the next set of videos to



watch without interrupting the one that's currently playing and, unlike Watch Later (which remains an option), it doesn't add them to your permanent playlist.


Other changes

include longer video titles, larger thumbnails and video previews that play in a higher resolution. YouTube has also added channel icons below thumbnails to make it easier to recognise content creators. Recommendations remain, but it's now possible to tell YouTube not to promote a particular channel on the YouTube homepage. Just click the three-dot menu and select Don't Recommend Channel.

Share large Dropbox files with anyone

#### www.dropbox.com/transfer

Dropbox lets you share files that others can access and edit, but the downside is that collaborators can alter the original documents and view any updates you subsequently make. With a new feature called Dropbox Transfer, you can select files from your hard drive or Dropbox account and generate a link, so recipients are restricted to downloading the content without altering the original.



It's similar to WeTransfer and allows users to get around email file-size restrictions, although free Dropbox users are limited to 100MB. Paid-for accounts offer limits between 2GB and 100GB, depending on the plan, and let you set expiration dates and protect the files with passwords. It's also possible to check how many times someone has accessed the files and make transfers from Dropbox's desktop and iOS apps.

# Have a bot complete your text

Backed by Elon Musk, OpenAl can study a small amount of text and create a large document based on what it reads. You can test the neural network by typing in the text box or choosing an example, before watching as it creates coherent sentences a word at a time using a language model called GPT-2.



#### View a WW2 Read books cited air-raid map on Wikipedia

Although the web is a fount of knowledge, much of the world's wisdom is contained in books. Just visit Wikipedia and you'll see that



looking up many of its sources involves a trip to the library. With this in mind, the Internet Archive

has teamed up with Wikipedia, letting visitors click a cited source to view an online copy of a referenced book. So far, 130,000 Wikipedia references link to 50,000 digitised books, each shown as previews. You can 'borrow' the full versions for a limited time, and the Internet Archive plans to digitise another four million physical books over the next few years.

#### bit.ly/bombing489

When The National **Archives** announced the launch of a Second World War air-raid map using



data from its collection, there was so much demand that it was forced offline. Created by Dr Laura Blomvall, a historian from the University of York, the Bombing Britain map pinpoints the location of more than 32,000 German air raids on the UK between 1939 and 1945, drawing on 6,500 pages of daily reports compiled by wartime intelligence officers. Clicking the pins shows more information, such as the bombing location, time of attack and the number of casualties. You can also learn more about the map, data and methodology.

#### Apply for a McJob

Applying for a job via Google Assistant (and Alexa) is something of a world-first. Say: "Hey Google, Talk to McDonald's Apply Thru" and answer some basic questions.

#### Play songs from YouTube Music

Using Siri in iOS 13, you can say "Play [song] on YouTube Music" to stream that song on the service. It'll ask for permission to access the app's data the first time.

#### Interact with BBC News

A new interactive news service launched by the BBC lets you listen to the latest headlines ("Alexa, give me BBC News"). You can then "skip" or get background info by saying "more from the BBC".

#### **Follow topics on Twitter**

Rather than trying to keep up with the latest news by following individuals on Twitter, you can now follow topics instead. Search for a subject (there are more than 300) and choose Follow in the results.

Facebook now lets you manage its navigation options in the Android and iOS apps. Tap and hold an icon (such as Marketplace or Watch) to remove it from the shortcuts bar or turn off the notification dots.

# Google sparks privacy fears over health data plans


#### What happened?

Google has again caused alarm by hoovering up medical data, this time via a partnership with a US hospital chain that involves the health records of 50 million people being shared with the search giant.

Known as Project Nightingale, the plans entail data held by the American medical company Ascension being passed to Google to help build an artificial-intelligence tool for clinicians. Unlike previous medical data-sharing projects, there's been no effort to anonymise patient data and, worryingly, patients weren't even told that their data was being shared. Google is able to see full health records including medical diagnoses, along with patients' names and addresses.

The project's details were revealed by journalists at the Wall Street Journal, and it is now under investigation by the US Department of Health following criticism from politicians. Google said it was "happy to cooperate" with the federal inquiry into its medical work. The partnership has been running for at least a year, and Google did mention its partnership with Ascension in an earnings call last summer, noting that it had dozens of other similar projects.

One of those is in the UK - a contract was signed in October with the Taunton and Somerset NHS Trust - and involves Google analysing patient data to feed into its AI systems to help spot disease and illness more quickly. Under the partnership, the trust is handing over five years' of patient data, including

diagnosis and treatment history, as well as demographic details. The trust previously had a contract with the UK startup DeepMind, which was subsequently acquired by Google. Initially, Google said that data from the medical research firm would be stored separately, but last year changed its mind and health data is now held not by DeepMind but by Google itself.

Similarly, in 2015, DeepMind started work with the NHS Royal Free hospital trust in London, on a project for an app that algorithmically analyses patient data to spot the signs of kidney failure. The two organisations used real patient data but patients were neither notified not asked for consent. Two years later, the Information Commissioner's Office deemed the data sharing illegal. Google and the hospital are still working together on the project, but now have a clearer data-sharing agreement.

The news comes as an investigation by the *Financial Times* revealed that health websites are sharing information gathered using cookies with Google, including data about drugs and fertility, though Google said it did not use such sensitive data for targeted advertising.

#### How will it affect you?

Project Nightingale is currently US-only but Google has plenty of other medical projects around the world, and has run Al trials in the UK via its DeepMind machine-learning division.

Google said in a blog post (bit.ly/ ascension489) that the data it sources from Ascension can't and won't be tied to Google's own customer data, so a patient's identifying details won't be linked to their Gmail account or their behavioural-advertising profile.

Google also stressed that the data is held securely in an encrypted environment controlled with access logs that is regularly audited. A limited number of Google employees have access to private health information under the partnership.

#### What do we think?

We're being asked to trust Google with our medical records, which perhaps isn't the wisest move. Google says it has no plans to link its profiles on us to any medical data it gathers, but it also said it wouldn't directly hold health records used in research by DeepMind, then changed its policy and swallowed up that data regardless.

It's possible to develop AI tools, store records in the cloud and analyse data for research without handing over any of it to Google, but if we're going to trust any tech company with our medical records, we need robust laws that protect our sensitive data. This should be a priority for politicians and data watchdogs alike, as well as the NHS. Hospital trusts are the ones signing over our data, and it's essential that they treat our private data seriously.

# Labour promises free broadband if elected

#### What happened?

The Labour Party hit the headlines with a pledge to give every home and business in the UK full-fibre broadband for free if the party wins the looming general election. The plans would see BT partially nationalised at a cost of £15 to £20bn, with some of the costs funded by a tax on technology companies.

There are two aspects to the plan: the first is to roll out full fibre to all premises in the UK, rather than the slower fibre-to-the-cabinet that makes up most of our network; the second involves nationalising Openreach, the infrastructure and networking company that



BT owns but was forced to separate from in 2017. Most ISPs in the country actually resell Openreach services, though some – such as Virgin Media – have built their own networks. BT was previously a publicly owned company.

#### How will it affect you?

If Labour wins a majority, and manages to pull off this plan amid other distractions, the aim is to have full fibre coverage by 2030. The Conservatives have already pledged £5bn in public funds to help spur a fibre rollout by 2025. BT argues that Labour's goal will cost as much as £30bn, and that the party has underestimated the difficulty of achieving perfect high-speed coverage in rural areas.

Then there's the free

service. The details of how this would work isn't clear, but it's worth noting that plenty of Brits buy broadband as part of a TV and mobile package, and that contracts in the UK are already some of the cheapest in Europe.

#### What do we think?

Regardless of who wins the election, something needs to be done to push Openreach into accelerating its full-fibre rollout - and, one way or another, it's going to cost us. But it's good news to see broadband back as a major policy for the political parties, getting the necessary attention it deserves.

# Microsoft kills off Windows 10 features

#### What happened?

Microsoft has revealed details of a handful of built-in tools that will be dropped from future versions of Windows 10.

These include the People app, which pulls together contacts from phone lists, Skype and your email account into a single location – although why you'd need someone's phone number to email them has never been particularly clear.

Other features set to disappear include Snipping Tool, which was used to capture screenshots and has been replaced by Snip & Sketch; Windows To Go, which allowed Enterprise users to boot from a USB drive; and the 3D printing app Print 3D, which has been replaced by 3D Builder.

#### How will it affect you?

These tools don't yet have a 'death date', so don't plan the funeral just yet. Instead, they're the latest to be added to the deprecated features page (bit.ly/deprecated489), which signals that Microsoft isn't going to spend any more time or money developing them. They could still be revived in the future, as happened with the Paint app after an online backlash, but they're more likely to simply be removed via an upcoming update. That means anyone using these tools needs to find suitable alternatives before the built-in versions disappear, although there should be



some warning from Microsoft for example. So we hope before they vanish for good. Microsoft gives plenty of

#### What do we think?

Microsoft's telemetry data lets it know in detail how well used such Windows 10 apps and tools really are, but that doesn't always paint a true picture – someone may only use the People app now and then, but rely on it as their main contacts-list backup,

for example. So we hope Microsoft gives plenty of warning before the tools are permanently removed.

But it's understandable that Microsoft isn't willing to pay developers to keep working on tools that aren't well used. It makes sense to focus efforts on more popular features that provide a benefit to a greater number of users.



# Facebook 'bug' secretly opens iPhone cameras

#### What happened?

Anyone worried about the privacy implications of using social-media apps such as Facebook now has even greater cause for concern because the app has been discovered activating users' cameras without their knowledge. A handful of iPhone users have taken to Twitter to share evidence that their phone's camera started running in the background, and was automatically activated while they were scrolling through their Facebook news feed.

First reported on 2 November by Twitter user Joshua Maddux (@JoshuaMaddux), several people have now discovered the same bug affecting their device. It appears as though the camera can be inadvertently activated when you're looking at photos or watching videos in your feed. Because of a glitch that meant the Facebook screen was shunted slightly to the right after viewing an image or clip in full screen, several people were able to see that the camera had been opened and was running behind their Facebook app.

#### How will it affect you?

Facebook's Vice President of Integrity, Guy Rosen, has acknowledged the problem and stated that this is definitely a bug - not something that the company is doing deliberately. He has also responded to concerns on Twitter,

stating that the camera would neither capture nor upload any photos or videos. Rosen said: "We've confirmed that we didn't upload anything to FB due to this bug and that the camera didn't capture anything, since it was in preview mode. We've submitted a fixed version to the App Store which is already rolling out."

Since Facebook says it has fixed the bug, there's not much you can do to find out whether your phone was affected by this problem. We'll just have to take the social network's word that no data was actually recorded.

#### What do we think?

It's important to approach apps such as Facebook with a healthy dose of cynicism: none of us can know precisely what they're doing with our data, and allowing unfettered access to our

devices means it's easy for something to go wrong. In this case, it really does seem to be a bug: there's no evidence that Facebook was acting maliciously or that users' security was compromised.

All that being said, Facebook users are putting a huge amount of trust in the company, and we don't think that it's unreasonable to expect better of them. Bug or otherwise, this kind of mistake shouldn't be happening, and we hope that Facebook has learned a lesson and will tighten up its quality control processes as a result.

#### **Snapchat Spectacles 3** bit.ly/specs489

Remember when high-tech glasses were set to change the way we saw the world? The idea was that you'd slip on a pair, record your every waking moment with the built-in camera and share it with your adoring followers on social media. Google had a go with its Glass specs, and failed, but Snapchat hasn't given up and its Spectacles 3 glasses are its latest attempt to turn the dream into reality.

Built into either side of the lenses are two cameras ready to record HD images and video at 60fps (frames per second). This gives Spectacles 3 its unique selling point: the ability to capture the world in 3D. You can then

play them back using the included 3D viewer essentially, a cardboard box with a slot for your phone - which gives your footage a sense of realistic

depth. Sync up media with your phone and you're then free, in true Snapchat fashion, to add all manner of creative filters and 3D effects to your photos.

Digging into the specs' specs reveals a basic phone-inspired set-up, presumably to maintain the lightweight 56.5g frame: two f/2.2 aperture cameras, a four-microphone array, Bluetooth and Wi-Fi, and 4GB storage capable of saving 100 3D movies.

The main drawback, however, isn't the low specification or even the invasiveness of having a pair of cameras strapped to your face - it's that the glasses' design is awful. The cameras

look like a second pair of eyes, squinting above your own, and the ultra-thick arms, bridge and top bar will get you noticed for all the wrong reasons. Still, at least it's easy to share the baffled looks you'll get - on social media and in 3D.

Snapchat Spectacles 3 are available now for an unjustifiable £330, and come in two shades: mineral and

# Are British TV shows leaving Netflix?

Netflix has, for a long time, been the home for some of the best British TV ever made, including classics such as *Blackadder*, *The* Office and Fawlty Towers, allowing viewers to ditch their old DVDs and stream their favourite shows instead.

Now, it seems, all this could change. Rumour has it that the 'vast majority' of British shows will leave Netflix and Amazon Prime Video next year, and it's all down to the launch of BritBox (see page 19).

The subscription service, a partnership between all the main UK TV broadcasters, is focused on becoming the online home of British TV shows - and that means reclaiming fan favourites from the American streaming sites.

Paul Moore, ITV's communications and affairs director, explained that each show is licensed to those platforms on a 12-month rolling contract. As each contract runs out, it's thought the shows will revert to the original licence holders: BBC, ITV, Channel 4 and Channel 5.

However, while Netflix has already been stripped of certain programmes, including Love Island and Gavin & Stacev, it's believed that not all will be removed.

It's likely that, by the end of next year, BritBox will be the only place to legally stream archive UK TV programmes. The BBC, ITV, Channel 4 and Channel 5 are going to need all the help they can get to coax a £6 monthly fee out of new subscribers, so don't bet against them trading on their heritage titles to get customers through the door. It's the best chance they have right now, given the lukewarm reception to the current BritBox catalogue, and more popular British shows will give it a better shot at competing with Netflix and Amazon Prime.

Now adopting a dark-modish look, it explores apps such as Safari, Maps, Photos, Messages, Siri and Apple Pay, and covers devices, too. There's plenty of detail, especially in the many white papers covering Location Services, Face ID and more, which are randomly scattered around the Features and Control sections. Finding government request reports is easier: intriguingly, the UK asked for customer data on 1,109 occasions between July and December 2018.

As the choice of TV viewing expands, a decent online TV guide is sure to get a great reception. As such, Freeview's revamped site is worth tuning into, with its choice of three layouts - horizontal, vertical and channel specific - and a new Watch Now feature for programmes aired by the BBC, ITV, Channel 4 and Channel 5. Available shows are highlighted at the top of the screen but you have to clumsily click the left and right arrows to see them all. They also play on the relevant TV player rather than via the Freeview site. Even so, it's an improvement. The site also lets you check Freeview's current status and see planned outages, works and available channels.

#### **Switch image formats** to WebP

If your website includes a lot of images, you may want to consider



switching from JPEG to WebP. WebP images take the best compression elements from JPEG, PNG and GIF to create images with file sizes around 30% smaller.

Creating WebP files is simple and most image editors can handle them. For example, in Paint.net (www.getpaint.net), choose Save As, select WebP from the 'Save as type' box and set the level of compression. It provides a guide to how large the file will be at the top. Your images will be smaller but can hold more detail.

#### Write code online

If you're ready to take your programming skills to the next level, Microsoft is launching an online version of its popular Visual Studio tool. You can try Visual Studio Online for free while it's in its beta test period. Go to bit.ly/ vso489 to set up an account and give it a go.







#### **Trend Micro insider sells** customer data to scammers

A rogue agent at Trend Micro has been selling its customers' data to unknown criminal third parties, the cybersecurity company has disclosed.



A blog post on the company's website (bit.ly/trendblog489) revealed that a Trend Micro employee was discovered to have harvested the personal details of around 70,000 customers, which they then sold to an "unknown third-party malicious actor".

The insider infiltrated a Trend Micro customer-support database containing names, email addresses, support-ticket numbers and some customers' telephone numbers. The company stated that it has found "no indication" that the culprit accessed any financial or payment

information, but said that the attack exclusively affected home users of its security products, rather than its business or government clients.

Trend Micro was first alerted to the issue in August, when customers complained about fraudulent calls from scammers claiming to represent Trend Micro support agents. The subsequent investigation identified a specific employee, who was immediately locked out of the system and dismissed.

#### Hackers use fake summons to spread malware

A new phishing campaign is targeting web users with emails that claim to be from the Ministry of Justice, but infect the victim with data-stealing



malware. Uncovered by researchers at cybersecurity company Cofense,

the scam states that the recipient has been issued a court summons and asks them to click a link to see more details about the case, giving them 14 days to comply.

The enclosed link uses trusted sources - namely Google Docs and Microsoft OneDrive - to redirect the victim to a malicious macro-laden Microsoft Word file, which downloads a form of malware called Predator the Thief. This is able to steal usernames, passwords, browser data and the contents of cryptocurrency wallets, as well as take photos using a webcam, before self-destructing and removing any evidence that it was there in the first place.

The phishing email refers to a 'subpoena', a common American term no longer used by the UK court system. So far, the scam has mostly targeted employees in the insurance and retail industries.

The news that the UK government will no longer need permission from local councils before installing 5G phone masts is a major

cause for concern.

5G technology uses sub-millimetre waves that can track consumers to within a metre of their physical location and, because of the rapid speeds delivered, devices and apps will be able to relay huge amounts of consumer data.

Compared to existing technology, the submillimetre waves employed by 5G technology dissipate very quickly, so many more masts are needed to get a 5G network up and running.

What's more, these waves can't penetrate buildings, and even encounter signal problems when an object such as a bus - gets in the

way. It's therefore necessary to have relay antennas located up every street and even throughout buildings to bounce the 5G signal along to its desired endpoint.

This vast number of masts



will make it much easier to track individuals, which will create serious privacy implications. Concerns exist not only over the potential for 5G to be used by companies to persistently monitor consumers, to serve them personalised ads based on where they are and what they are doing, but also for the technology to be harnessed by government agencies to accurately track people as they move around locations where 5G has been rolled out.





# **VPNs**

Beat web restrictions and stay anonymous online with our roundup of the best virtual private networks

VPN (virtual private network) is the best way to keep your internet connection completely private. VPN services run servers across the globe, which you can pass through before accessing the web. Because the data between this server and your PC is securely encrypted, it blocks your ISP from seeing what you're doing and stops the sites you visit from knowing who - and where - you are.

Here, we've put 16 VPNs through their paces and picked out our top four. You can see why the remaining 12 VPNs didn't make the grade in our summary, opposite.

#### **HOW WE TESTED**

To test each VPN's performance, we installed it on a Windows 10 PC using a domestic fibre-broadband line rated at 110Mbps. We connected to a selection of each VPN's servers around the world and tested their speed with the free Ookla Speed Test (www.speedtest.net). We also scrutinised the features available from each VPN, how easy it was to use and the value for money offered.

#### NordVPN | nordvpn.com | £2.29 per month for three years

NordVPN has been in the news recently, after it revealed that some of its user data was hacked from a server it was leasing from another company back in 2018. It doesn't look like NordVPN was specifically targeted and the leaked data didn't contain passwords. Rather, some accounts were broken into because users had set up the same combination of username and password on multiple sites, including one or more that have compromised passwords in the past (check yours at haveibeenpwned.com). NordVPN has declared that, following an internal audit, it's perfectly safe and secure to use. We're inclined to trust it, but if you're not, skip to the next review.

NordVPN has 5,500 servers across 60 countries. Clicking on a country automatically connects you to the fastest server available. In our tests, we saw speeds of 100Mbps from Switzerland and the Netherlands, and 80Mbps from New York. It gets slower around the Pacific Rim, with 60Mbps in California, Japan and Australia, but that's still fast enough to stream 4K video. We accessed Netflix US with ease.

NordVPN has special servers for peer-to-peer services, double connections that further disguise your location by routing through two distant servers, and a range of servers that let

> you surf from a static IP address, though the latter option costs an extra £54 per year.

Despite its nordic-sounding name, the VPN is based in Panama, which should be safe from government interference, and has commissioned a Price Waterhouse Coopers audit as proof that it doesn't record user activity.

It's not the cheapest VPN, at £5.36 per month for six devices if you pay annually, but the price drops to £2.29 per month if you're prepared to commit to three years.

NordVPN strikes the perfect balance between usability, features and price. It's easy to initiate a private connection and then seamlessly continue with whatever you're doing, and there's a good selection of servers across the globe for you to choose to appear from. Although NordVPN revealed that it suffered a recent security scare, we think this was managed sensibly and the service's security remains convincing, not least because it regularly undertakes reviews of its security and practices, and publishes the results to its users.

Surfshark lets you connect with an unlimited number of devices, so if your household is packed with computers, phones and smart appliances, you don't have to worry about disconnecting one device to connect another.

Rates are very competitive: an annual subscription costs £4.79 a month, which plummets to £1.59 if you commit to two years - the cheapest of all the VPNs

reviewed here. The trade-off is that Surfshark only has 800 servers across 59 countries, some of which are virtual servers that aren't located in the country they claim to be in. Servers are heavily concentrated in the US, with 26 cities represented. Australia gets five, but no other country gets more than three.

Speeds range from very fast, topping 100Mbps in Switzerland and the Netherlands, and 98Mbps via Silicon Valley, but slowed to 26Mbps when streaming via Japan. We had no problem accessing US Netflix via the New York server.

#### **VERDICT**

It may not top the table for speed or number of servers, but Surfshark does everything most users want from a VPN. It's superb value for money, with

unlimited connections for £1.59 per month if you sign up for two years.

#### **CyberGhost** | cyberghostvpn.com £2.10 per month for three years

CyberGhost appears as a black pop-up in your notification area - ready to connect to the fastest nearby server with a single click of a button. It's easy to jump on specific servers



in popular countries and unblock the localised locks on streaming services, including Netflix US and BBC iPlayer. Click again to open up even more servers spread over 61 countries.

CyberGhost provided a solid 104Mbps via the Netherlands, and 50Mbps from New York and Japan. Australia fell to 14.6Mbps, though, which isn't enough to stream 4K video.

The service is very versatile - you can connect up to seven devices at once, including Amazon Fire TV, or set up your router to provide access to all your devices. There's a handy kill switch that cuts all internet activity if the VPN connection drops, and you can set up rules, such as connecting to a specific location when you're using a particular program.

#### **VERDICT**

CyberGhost offers a lot of options but the interface remains clean and intuitive – nothing is more than a few clicks away from the main screen. We love how the interface unfolds as you learn its potential and find more things it can do.

#### **ExpressVPN** | expressvpn.com £7 per month for one year

Like CyberGhost, ExpressVPN starts small and only ventures further if you have a specific need. By default, it picks a fast connection for you and remembers the last two connections you made, in

case you want to return to something you were doing before. Going further afield is more fiddly. Clicking a connection

offers a search box for seeking out servers in other locations but you can't see at-a-glance how fast they are. Instead, you need to click on them to run a speed test.

On the most part, performance is good, with speeds topping 100Mbps in Switzerland and the Netherlands, 88Mbps from New York, 71Mbps in California and 50Mbps in Australia. Japan was disappointing, however, at 16.3Mbps.

The only thing stopping ExpressVPN getting one of our award is its price. The best deal is £7 per month, regardless of how many years you sign up for.

#### **VERDICT**

ExpressVPN has strong security and privacy credentials, and its solid performance and liberal approach to streaming make it a persuasive choice. However, there are no deals on offer so it looks expensive compared to its rivals.

#### **BEST OF THE REST**

- HMA Pro (hidemyass.com | £3.59 per month for three years | \*\*\*\*\*) performed well but isn't such good value for money, so it missed out on our awards.
- Hotspot Shield (hotspotshield.com | £9 per month for three years | \*\*\*\*\*) is hampered by its price, which is extraordinarily high. It's also based in the US, which might be an issue if you want total privacy.
- Private Internet Access (privateinternetaccess.com | pricing, even if you only commit to one year, but its interface is a bit technical and not particularly easy to use.
- Windscribe (windscribe.com | price varies | \*\*\*\*\*) lets you set up your own service, so you can choose which countries to use. This is flexible but it barely works out any cheaper than its rivals.
- Getflix (getflix.com.au | £1.85 per month for two years | \*\*\*\*\*) is brilliant if you want to stream video from foreign services but won't do anything for your privacy.



#### **OUR VERDICT**

We've given our Gold Award to NordVPN because it's affordable, performed well in our tests and is straightforward to use. It's worth noting that you only unlock its best prices if you commit to staying with the VPN for three years, which is a long time in computing terms, but having survived a recent security scare with its integrity intact, we think NordVPN is here to stay.

For even better value for money, particularly if you want to connect a lot of devices to your VPN, consider our Silver Award winner, Surfshark. While it isn't the household name our other VPNs have become, its best price only ties you in for two years.

Our Bronze Award goes to CyberGhost, which does a great job of offering lots of features without over-complicating its interface. It dynamically reveals its tools as you need them, making it as simple for beginners as it is for experienced VPN users.

# Get your weekly bookmarks emailed to you


How often do you bookmark a page with the intention of returning to it later, only to completely forget about it - or unearth it months later, by which time the page is irrelevant?

Mailist (bit.ly/mailist489) lets you bookmark pages by clicking its toolbar button and choosing 'Add page to Mailist' so you can receive them in an email newsletter every week. Another option is to select 'Manage all links' to manually add bookmarks at my.mailist.com. The Settings here let you set the number of links sent to you each week - anywhere from one to 10 - and choose a particular day.

However, the best part is that you can add all your other bookmarks from both Chrome and Firefox. This is a fairly straightforward procedure

that sees you export them from your browser, then upload them

to Mailist. At least this way, you'll never forget about another saved page again.



#### Hear web pages read aloud to you


Elocance (www.elocance.com) is a browser tool and app combo that makes the web more accessible. Many users struggle to read text on the screen,

My recent additions Suggestions What's recyclable,

which means missing out on swathes of content. Install Elocance in Chrome and on your phone, sign in on both devices with the same account and you'll be able to get emails, web pages and text documents read aloud on the app.

Once you find an article that takes your fancy,

click the extension's toolbar button and choose 'Add this page to my library'. For documents, either upload them via File Explorer or drag and drop them to the box. If you're browsing on your phone, tap the Share button to see an option to send to Elocance. You can then open your library to play back your text. Here, you can also change the Elocance voice and discover new articles.



#### Make the web even more accessible

In keeping with the accessibility theme, try Helperbird (www.helperbird.com). This handy browser tool is designed for people who suffer from dyslexia and struggle to read onscreen text. It lets you tweak the appearance of just about any website - one click lets you change a page's Font, use Zoom and enable Colour Blind mode.


Each of the three options has numerous selections within. Click into Fonts and choose from 15 different typefaces, then toggle the Enable Font switch to On. Zoom lets you get up close and personal with websites, from 10% to 100%. Finally, Colour Blindness includes Emphasize Links, which adds a block around any clickable text, and Stroke, which turns it into red bubble

writing.

Helperbird also offers a monthly subscription, so if you plan on sticking to the free version, choose Get Started, not Upgrade when you click the extension's button.

#### Add estimated reading time to emails

Email Reading Time for Gmail (bit.ly/ reading489) tells you how long it will take you to read a message you've received in Google's webmail service. Open an email in your Inbox and, directly below the subject line, you'll see the estimated time to read, as well as the word count. This gives you a fair idea of how long it'll take you, on average, to get through the whole message - or whether you should save it for when you have more free time.

# Download any image from the web

It's always been a convoluted process to get images from the web. Typically, you need to choose Save Image, enter a filename to save it as and then download and that's if the option is even available in the first place, which it often isn't.



The Firefox add-on

Download Image from Context Menu (bit.ly/image489) streamlines the process by adding a new, useful option - 'Download image' - when you right-click any image on the web, whether in Google Images or on a website. Simply select this option and your image is downloaded instantly - no checking if you're sure, or deciding to change the name or save location - it's sent straight to your Downloads folder.

#### **Download videos and audio** files online

As if downloading images wasn't time-wasting enough, getting hold of other media files is usually even trickier.



Media Download Helper (bit.ly/ media489) speeds things up by scraping all your open tabs for videos, images and audio files.

Click the toolbar button and the extension presents you


with a list of all the media it's found, alongside three options: 'Copy to smartphone', 'Copy link' and Download. When you select the first option, it creates a QR code that can be scanned by your phone to open the link.

Below the preview image are buttons that filter different media types. You can also choose to download everything on the page (including as a zip file, to save space). The add-on is a bit cluttered, particularly with its sidebar of hot-links and a footer full of settings, so it's worth spending some time with the tool to get the most out of it.

#### Convert files on your new tabs

File Converter Live (bit.ly/convert489) adds a useful tool to your New Tab page. On the downside, you get the usual search bar - which uses nobody's favourite search engine, Yahoo - as well as the date, time and weather. But it's the bar at the top that's impressive.


Alongside the redundant Quick Search bar, there is an option to convert any files. Just drag and drop - or browse via File Explorer - then choose the output format. The tool's smart enough to know if you're converting an image or text document, and serves up related, relevant file types. Once you're set, click Convert to begin the process. After conversion, choose Download File to retrieve your file.

Tweak your privacy

settings Privacy fears are never far from our minds when we're online, especially when it comes to preventing websites from tracking you. We all need to keep ourselves fit but not all of us can afford the extra expense of a fitness band to help monitor our exercise. While both Apple and Google provide their own fitness apps, Pedometer is an excellent option for Android users.

The app's stylish, minimalist design looks great and is very straightforward to use. Its chief aim is to count your steps and present you with daily, weekly or monthly reports that

let you track your fitness goals and share your progress with friends and family. In our tests, we found that it was reasonably accurate, though not as good at tracking steps as the best, dedicated wearables. Plus, you have to remember to keep your phone with you at all times.

Unlike some similar apps, Pedometer has a very low impact on your device's performance. Although it runs in

the background (even when your phone is on standby), it uses your device's built-in sensors to count your steps - because there's no GPS tracking involved, it barely consumes any battery power.

Pedometer doesn't ask for any unnecessary permissions when you install it and you don't even need to sign into an account. The app's developer claims that it never collects your personal data or shares information about you with third parties.

It's also 100% free, so you won't find any features annoyingly locked behind a paywall. Our only complaint concerns the large full-screen


ads that pop up intermittently. These aside, Pedometer is a refreshingly simple way to keep on top of your daily step count.







# Stalkerware

Ever get the feeling you're being watched - maybe by someone you know? David Crookes looks at the scary rise in stalking software

#### What is stalkerware?

Stalkerware is a type of surveillance software that's installed on mobile phones, tablets and computers with the purpose of allowing someone to spy on the device's user without their consent. It can monitor call logs and the content of text messages, among other things, to generate daily activity reports for the person who installed it. As you can imagine, it is often used as a tool of abuse and victims are often entirely unaware that they're being watched.

#### Who is using these tools?

Most of the time, it is someone close to the victim, which is why the various apps that allow this kind of invasive activity are also sometimes referred to as "spousewear". They appear to be popular among ex-partners, jealous lovers, possessive friends or rivals at work.

#### How is stalkerware installed?


Unlike spyware, which is usually spread via other software, stalkerware is actively downloaded before being manually and deliberately installed. This generally requires physical access to the victim's device and the ability to unlock it.

Once stalkerware is installed, all the perpetrator has to do is launch it and enter their email address and a password. Reports about how the device is being used are then either sent to them or made available via an online dashboard.



#### What exactly is being tracked?

Aside from monitoring call information and text messages, stalkerware can keep an eye on someone's browsing history, access a device's GPS and even record the screen. It can also launch a device's camera so that the person who installed the software can directly spy on the individual and see what they're doing at that time. In fact, anything seems to be fair game: from social media and passwords to photos and emails. Some stalkerware can even track encrypted communications made through apps such as WhatsApp and access the microphone.

being spied on when the perpetrator starts to discuss matters they weren't directly told about.

#### Who is creating this stalkerware?

A depressing number of developers appear to believe it is perfectly acceptable for people to spy on someone else's digital activity. Many will claim that their apps have a legitimate use and are designed for parents looking to monitor their children or for employers anxious to discover if workers are misusing

#### Surely a victim knows they're being spied on?

Unfortunately, it's really hard to determine if a device has been compromised because stalkerware can immediately hide its tracks. Some tools even continue running in the background after being uninstalled, which makes it easy to believe that nothing untoward is happening. Indeed, a victim may only get a hunch that they're


workplace equipment. Some, however, go further and suggest using their apps to catch a cheating partner. It goes without saying that all such uses are on shaky moral ground.

#### How are people downloading these apps?

Believe it or not, Google and Apple were both found to have inadvertently distributed stalkerware in the past, via the Play Store and the App Store. Stalkerware is also purchasable on the web and includes the likes of Xnore, mSpy, TheTruthSpy and FlexiSpy, which has been widely criticised for allowing the monitoring of "everything that happens on a PC or Mac".

#### What action is being taken?

In October, the creator of a stalkerware app called PhoneSheriff was ordered to destroy user data by the US Federal Trade Commission and told to ensure its apps could only be used in legitimate situations. Also, back in July, the security company Avast brought eight Android stalkerware apps to Google's attention and the internet giant promptly removed them from the Play store. Seven were from a developer based in Russia: Spy Kids Tracker, Phone Cell Tracker, Mobile Tracking, Spy Tracker, SMS Tracker,

Employee Work Spy and the catchily named Track Employees Check Work Phone Online Spy Free. All managed to get past Google's review team, which is supposed to ensure that apps meet its privacy standards. It's likely that there are more such apps out there.

#### How big an issue is this?

According to Avast, the eight apps pulled from Android were downloaded 140,000 times. Spy Tracker and SMS Tracker were the most popular, with more than 50,000 installs. Kaspersky claims to have detected the presence of stalkerware, or attempts to install it, on 518,223 occasions over the first eight months of this year, affecting 37,532 users - a rise of 35% on the previous year when 27,798 users were targeted.


However, the mere fact that stalkerware exists makes it a big issue regardless of numbers. Not only does it make the victim vulnerable to control, manipulation and 'gaslighting', but it breaks trust, breaches privacy and is often carried out within an environment of domestic violence.

#### Is Android at greater risk than **iOS?**

It would appear that Android devices are

currently seeing a growing number of stalkerware detections, at least according to Kaspersky, which added a Privacy Alert to its security app for Android (bit.ly/ kaspersky489) back in April. At that time, there were 7,075 detections on Android,

rising to 9,251 in August. **Because** Apple is more stringent in its

review process, stalkerware isn't as easily found on the iOS App Store, which means the operating system will generally need to be 'jailbroken' to install stalkerware.

#### How can I protect myself?

The easiest way is to prevent anyone from installing stalkerware in the first place, by keeping your phone, tablet or computer with you at all times. Since stalkerware must be manually installed, this would certainly stop anyone from gaining physical access to your device. However, in reality, this may not be practical, particularly if you're living with the person who is hell bent on putting you under surveillance. In such circumstances, ensure your device is locked using a passcode that only you know. Experts warn against using fingerprint or facial recognition to gain access to a device in case someone points it at your face or grabs your thumb while you're asleep.

It's wise to perform regular security scans and remove any signs of stalkerware. Your device could also be factory reset to remove all traces of the problem.


#### Would the law be able to help

If you find someone has put you under surveillance using stalkerware, then a prosecution can be brought under the Protection from Harassment Act 1997. You can also seek advice from Paladin: National Stalking Advocacy Service (paladinservice.co.uk), which has a phone line open from 9am to 3pm weekdays (10am to 5pm on Wednesdays).

#### **CAN I BE MONITORED WITHOUT STALKERWARE?**

Stalkers don't necessarily have to turn to stalkerware in order to place you under surveillance. They could secretly activate Share My Location within the Find My app on your iPhone, iPad or Mac (turn it off by opening the app, tapping Me and toggling Share My Location), or the similar Find My Device tracker for Android. They could also use your fitness apps or check for your whereabouts in social-media status updates, so do be wary and delve into the settings if you're worried.

Even Google Maps can become an enemy by divulging your position to others. If this option has been set up, you can stop it by launching the app, selecting the menu icon, tapping Location Sharing, choosing a contact and deactivating Share Your



# Secure Anything Witha USB Stick



Protecting your online accounts doesn't have to be fiddly and confusing. Wayne Williams explains how you can ensure all your data remains safe by investing in a YubiKey

s we explained in last issue's cover feature, 'Stop leaking your identity', protecting your online accounts against every security breach is nigh on impossible, and your passwords may already have been stolen without you realising. With phishing and keylogging scams to worry about, too, it's worth adding a second line of protection to ensure that your data can't be accessed even if your passwords are leaked.

Two-factor authentication (2FA) provides a reliable defence, but its system of sending a verification code to your phone or email address can

prove tiresome, which is why YubiKeys are becoming increasingly popular. In this feature, we reveal the benefits of buying one of these tiny USB sticks, examine the options available and explain how to use one to protect all your files, accounts and devices.

If you don't fancy putting a YubiKey on your Christmas list this year, we also show you how to create your very own USB security key - for free.

#### Secure anything with a USB stick



#### YOUR YUBIKEY QUESTIONS ANSWERED

#### WHAT IS A YUBIKEY?

YubiKey is a physical security key that looks similar to a flat USB flash drive. It enables strong two-factor and password-free authentication, preventing attackers from gaining access to your online accounts.

Made by Swedish-American company Yubico (www.yubico.com), the product was invented by husband-and-wife team Stina and Jakob Ehrensvärd (now Yubico's CEO and CTO respectively) in 2008. The origin of its unusual name is the Japanese word for finger (yubi) but it's also short for "your ubiquitous key".

Working closely with Google and Microsoft, Yubico helped create the FIDO (Fast Identity Online) Universal 2nd Factor (U2F) and FIDO 2 open authentication standards (fidoalliance .org). These allow you to securely access multiple internet services with a single security key, and without the need for special drivers or software.

There are a number of different YubiKeys available, offering a variety of features, although they all essentially work in the same way. Once set up, you use them as a second line of security alongside your existing password.

#### WHY DO I NEED A YUBIKEY?

Hardly a day goes by when we don't hear of another data breach in which user login details have been stolen or leaked. According to the FIDO Alliance, web users have on average more than 90 online accounts (although many probably aren't in active use) and reuse up to 51% of their passwords. That last statistic is a concern because passwords are the root cause of over 80% of data breaches.

If you use a YubiKey to protect your logins, no one can access your account – even if they have your username and password. While there are other two-factor authentication methods out there – using your phone as a second login method being the most popular

- the beauty of a YubiKey is that you don't have to worry about typing in any codes to confirm your identity, and there's no personal information associated with the key itself.

Additionally, a YubiKey can protect you from all manner of threats including phishing scams, session hijacking and man-in-the-middle and malware attacks. Phishing scams – where users are unwittingly tricked into logging into a fake version of a website, usually by clicking a link in a convincing looking email – are very common these days, but are easily defeated with a YubiKey. No matter how convincing the fake site looks, only the real site can be authenticated using your key.

There's no limit on the number of accounts you can use your YubiKey with – for instance, if you have more than one Gmail account, you can use the same key on all of them.

#### **HOW DO I USE A YUBIKEY?**

Different types of YubiKey work in different ways. If you have a USB-A model, you plug it into a spare USB port in your PC or laptop. If you have a USB-C key, then you plug this into the USB-C port on a computer or a mobile phone (if it supports the new USB standard). The YubiKey 5Ci, which has both USB-C and Lightning connectors, can be plugged into a computer, mobile phone with a USB-C port, or iPhone or iPad. If you have a key that supports NFC, you just tap this on a compatible Android phone. Some keys are designed to be carried with you (they all have a hole at one end for attaching them to a keyring) and used as needed, while others are intended to stay plugged in at all times.

Once you have your key, you simply need to enable it on all of the sites you want to use it with. We'll explain the process for this a little later but, essentially, you just find the option for adding a key under the two-step verification on a site (usually under Settings, but you may need to hunt around). If you can't find this option, check on the YubiKey site to make sure the service you want to add a key to is supported.

You don't need to have your YubiKey with you at all times to access a site.

During setup, you'll be given the option to have the site remember the computer

you are logging in from, and you won't be asked for your key again in the future. You should only tick this box when on your home computer or private laptop, so your account remains protected when signing in from elsewhere.

YubiKey doesn't need charging (it pulls its power from the USB slot when plugged in), so there's no danger of you failing to log in due to a dead key, and there's nothing to install, either.

Although you don't need any extra software to use your key, there are a number of tools that offer enhancements, including a YubiKey Manager for Windows, macOS and Linux (bit.ly/tubman489), which shows the name of the key and its current firmware version, and lets you configure FIDO 2, OTP and PIV functionality and adjust settings (on supported keys). There's also a Personalisation Tool (bit .ly/yubper489), and an Authenticator (bit.ly/yubauth489) that generate OATH credentials via Windows, Mac and Linux computers. Both work with all Yubico devices bar the blue Security Key.

#### WHICH SERVICES DOES YUBIKEY **WORK WITH?**

YubiKey works with all the major services you are likely to want to use it with - the ones that you'd be most devastated about if your account was hacked - such as Google/Gmail, Facebook and Microsoft. We explain how to set up YubiKey with Gmail in the workshop below, and the process is the same for other supported web services.

In the case of Facebook, log into the social network as you would normally, using a supported browser (Chrome and other Chromium-based browsers such as Vivaldi, Brave and Opera or Firefox), then go to the Security and Login Settings page (bit.ly/fb489) and scroll down to 'Use two-factor authentication'. Click the Edit button, then find the Security Key entry and click Set Up. You can add your security key there.

For Microsoft, go to your account page (bit.ly/msaccount489) and sign in as normal. On the page that opens, click


the safe picture under Security and sign in a second time. Click 'More security options' and, under 'Windows Hello and security keys', click 'Set up a security key' and follow the instructions.

You can browse the full catalogue of services that work with YubiKey at bit.ly/yubcat489. The page lets you sort the list by security protocol, category (browser, computer login, cloud storage and so on), YubiKey type and company.


Some services only support One-Time Password (OTP) authentication, whereby the key generates an encrypted password for one-time use. There are two variations of this - HOTP (HMAC-based One-Time Password) and TOTP (Time-based One-Time Password). The former uses a counter, while the latter uses the time. The full list of these One-Time Password-only services can be viewed at bit.ly/ hotp489 (HOTP) and bit.ly/yubtotp489 (TOTP), but include 1password, LastPass, Electronic Arts, Epic Games, Instagram, Kickstarter, WordPress and the Windows Hello app. OTP isn't as secure as FIDO U2F, but it's secure enough (see bit.ly/otp489).

If you log into Windows using a local account (as opposed to a Microsoft account), you can use the new Yubico Login for Windows tool (bit.ly/ yublog489). Download the software (there are 32- and 64-bit versions available) and follow the instructions. It works with Windows 7, 8.1 and 10. If you log into Windows using a Microsoft account, you can't use a standard YubiKey to speed up the process, only



Apple Mac owners can use a YubiKey to log in using the Smart Card functionality. There's a configuration guide which explains how to do this at bit.ly/yubmac489. A word of warning, however: the guide doesn't cover the latest version of macOS - Catalina.

Linux users use the Yubico Pluggable Authentication Module (PAM), and there are instructions for this at bit.ly/yubpam489.

The British government is actually the first government in the world to support FIDO U2F, and Gov.uk Verify (bit.ly/ gov489) lets you use a number of government services without needing to verify your identity online or wait for a letter to arrive in the post. You can use it to apply for Universal Credit, file your tax return, check your state pension and much more, and further services will be added in due course. To use your YubiKey, you'll need to register it with Digidentity (www.digidentity.eu), one of the government's certified identity service providers. See bit.ly/digid489 for more details.

ubico offers a selection of keys aimed at different audiences (home users, businesses, government agencies) and devices (computers, smartphones). Which one you choose will depend on your personal needs and the devices you use.

The easiest way to narrow down your options is to take the YubiKey quiz at www.yubico.com/quiz. This will ask you what type of user you are (individual, IT/ security professional, government worker) and the type of ports you'll be using the key with - USB-A (the common one), USB-C or Lightning. The quiz offers drawings of the ports if you're not sure which ones you have. You'll be asked if you want to use the YubiKey with an Android NFC-enabled phone or tablet (unless you choose the Apple Lightning option) and what you plan to do with the key. Once you've finished the short quiz, you'll be shown

the product that most closely matches your needs.

The most popular option is the YubiKey 5 Series which is available for USB-A, USB-C, NFC and Lightning. The USB-A version costs £42 in stores such as Amazon (bit.ly/yubi5489), while the Nano version (a very tiny key) is £46 (bit.ly/yubinano489). If you don't need all the features offered by the YubiKey 5, then you should choose the Security Key instead. This is available for USB-A with NFC for £25 (bit.ly/yubisecurity489).

If you want to use a YubiKey to log into a Windows 10 PC instantly, keep an eye out for the YubiKey Bio – see below.

#### **SECURE ACCOUNTS WITH YOUR FINGERPRINT**

YubiKey devices come with a button or gold disk that you press when authenticating with a website.
However, they don't include a fingerprint reader (even if it looks as if they do). Yubico has long been rumoured to be working on a biometric key with a built-in fingerprint reader and, at this



year's Microsoft Ignite conference at the start of November, the company finally previewed its first such product - the YubiKey Bio (bit.ly/yubibio489).

The Bio key will support both fingerprint and PIN-based logins, and work with the biometric enrolment and management features that are built into Windows 10. Like Yubico's other security keys, YubiKey Bio doesn't require a battery, drivers or additional software. There's no word on pricing or availability at the moment but Yubico does say it's "coming soon", so we're hoping it might arrive in time for Christmas.

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
#### **CREATE YOUR OWN 'YUBIKEY' USB SECURITY KEY**

If you'd rather not spend the money on a YubiKey, you can turn a USB memory stick into a security key to lock and unlock a PC. This will stop anyone accessing your computer, and you'll no longer need to enter a password to unlock it, but it does

require you to have the key plugged into a USB port at all times when using your PC. Our preferred tool for the job is the free program USB Raptor – it works with any USB drive, which doesn't have to be blank. The lock file itself is only 1KB in size.





That's all you need to do to set it up. When you're ready to start using your new USB security key, tick the box next to Enable USB Raptor. 1 The square to the right will turn from red to green to show that it's active. 2 A message informs you that you can no longer change your password.

To check the key is working, pull out the drive. The screen should lock, displaying a single-colour background with USB Raptor text and copyright information scrolling across it. Plug your key back in and the PC will unlock. If you lose your key, double-click the screen to display a password box.



Tick 'Advanced configuration' 1 to open additional settings that make the software more useful and more secure. Under 'General settings', 2 you can set USB Raptor to run at Windows startup. 1 Lock behaviour' 1 lets you add a delay or timer, and optionally have a program of your choosing run on lock/unlock.



The 'Lock features' tab lets you change the screen colour and enable backdoor access in case you lose your key. Under 'High security options', you can insist that the program use the same key when locking, and also require a password or PIN to complete the unlock.

#### **BEST YUBIKEY ALTERNATIVES**

ubiKey is the most popular brand of security key but it's far from the only one. The next best known, thanks to the company behind it, is Google's Titan Security Key (bit.ly/ titan489). This costs £50 and contains both USB-A and Bluetooth security keys. The bundle includes adapters that let you use the USB key with either USB-C or Micro USB.

The Feitian ePass FIDO-NFC Security Key (www.ftsafe.com), which costs £22 on Amazon, works with Windows, macOS and Linux via USB, and Android through the NFC chip. It's the closest to YubiKey in terms of security and features, and supports FIDO U2F multi-factor authentication on all the major services, including Google, Dropbox, Facebook and Twitter, as well as FIDO 2 passwordless authentication on Microsoft Accounts and OneDrive.

Kensington's VeriMark Fingerprint Key (bit.ly/kens489) is another option - as well as supporting FIDO U2F, it comes with a fingerprint reader and can log you into your computer using Windows Hello. It's very tiny, so it won't get in the way when connected to a USB port. You can pick one up

for £45 from Amazon.

Nitrokey (www.nitrokey.com) is a German company that makes a number of security-based keys including the Nitrokey FIDO U2F for secure web logins, which costs €28 (£23.70), and the Nitrokey Pro 2, which also offers email, file and hard-drive encryption, for €55 (£46.60). Smart Login for Windows, which lets you log into a Windows computer using a Nitrokey, costs €46 (£39).

Finally, Thetis (thetis.io) offers two FIDO U2F security keys - one regular (£17) and one with BLE (Bluetooth Low Energy, £23), which can be used on mobile devices. Both products can be ordered from the American site (add £10 for shipping).

#### IS A YUBIKEY COMPLETELY SAFE?

The purpose of YubiKey and Google's Titan Security Key is to keep your logins secure. You would imagine - since there's no software involved - that there's little that could wrong, but both developers have had to recall keys due to hardware flaws. That sounds worrying, but you shouldn't be too concerned. In the case of Yubico's recall, the problem only affected its FIPS-certified

security keys, which are aimed at government and regulated industries, not individuals, and the company quickly made replacements available free of charge.

Google's Titan Security Key was recalled due to a misconfiguration with the Bluetooth Low Energy (BLE) version in the US (non-Bluetooth keys weren't affected), which meant it was possible for an attacker within approximately 30 feet of you to communicate with the key or the device to which it was paired. Google pointed out that it was still safer to use the affected key than no key at all, but offered free replacements anyway. Google's Titan keys are manufactured by Feitian and unsurprisingly - that company's own security keys were also hit by the issue.



Despite these flaws - which didn't affect the standard USB and NFC products - security keys remain very safe, and the fact that Yubico, Google and Feitian were all quick to acknowledge the problems when they came to light (and issue free replacements) should help put your mind at rest.

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**Best free** email software

Why stick with a webmail service or the basic Windows Mail app when you could upgrade your inbox to use quick, free email software? Steve Clark downloads and tests six of the best free email clients


What we liked:

Mailspring is everything that email software should be: clean, clutterfree and super fast. Think of this as an evolution of traditional email software,

rather than a revolution. The software's Windows Mail- and Thunderbird-inspired heritage is nakedly apparent - along the left is a sidebar that lets you jump to folders and options, while the centre pane displays your emails and the right-hand side features a reading pane. However, in comparison to its older rivals, the look and feel of Mailspring is impressively modern. There's even a handful of different themes to choose from, including (but not limited to) Dark Mode.

With the free version, you're able to add up to four email accounts. Unlike other email software, this isn't Gmail-orbust territory because there's support for a wide range of platforms including iCloud, GMX, Outlook and Yandex.

Mailspring also lets you search your inboxes using Google-style search terms, including 'in: [folder name]', 'from: [email address]' and 'before: [date]'. Don't worry about remembering all the combinations because the options appear in a drop-down menu



every time you click the search bar.

One of the best features is the Activity section, found at the foot of the sidebar. Here, you can monitor busy periods, which is particularly useful if you're trying to limit email usage. You may also get a kick out of monitoring the performance of your emails, based on the most-opened subject lines, read receipts and tracking links.

#### How it can be improved:

For software that's so well designed, Mailspring has one glaring design flaw: some of the icons feel a tad small, especially in-email actions such as 'Move to Trash' and 'Mark as Spam', which hover above the reading pane,

near-invisible to the naked eye. It also lacks optional extras found in other email clients, such as note-taking and a dedicated calendar. We hope to see these added in the future, along with

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#### **OUR VERDICT**

Mailspring is a modern take on an old classic. Standard features, such as Snooze and Search, sit alongside some quirky extras, but the focus remains firmly on sending and receiving emails. You don't get calendars and note-taking, but it is an excellently designed inbox.

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#### **Thunderbird** | www.thunderbird.net | \*\*\*\*

#### What we liked:

Thunderbird has, for a long time, been considered the premiere email client - and with good reason. Mozilla's open-source software

powers up your inbox in a way Windows Mail never could, although it takes a lot of design cues from the original Outlook, which makes it immediately familiar to navigate.

Double-click an email and, rather than opening in a new window, it pops out in a tab, which works in the same way as a browser. This keeps your desktop free when you want to focus on email management. You can expand the Thunderbird experience by installing new themes and add-ons, which bring additional functionality to the software, such as Tabbed Folders, Send Later and Grammar Checker.

Beyond the basic inbox, Thunderbird also features a calendar and a chat app for more immediate communication. With one click, you can download your email for offline viewing, so you're not chained to an internet connection.



#### How it can be improved:

It's understandably contentious, placing Thunderbird in second place. After all, it's been a fan-favourite for years. However, for as long as we can remember, the layout has felt cluttered and, at a time when we're receiving more emails than ever and other apps are shifting to a more user-friendly design, this has become less forgivable.

#### **OUR VERDICT**

Thunderbird remains a top email program that's totally free and easy to use. Despite that, the design is beginning to show its age and could do with a moderate revamp to drag it into the 21st Century.

#### What we liked:

In time, it's possible that eM Client could topple Thunderbird in the email software stakes. One glance at the program and you'll note the similarities in

design and features, including calendar and chat support.

It's well laid out, too. The clean three-panel window offers plenty of space between messages, so you never feel overwhelmed, even if your inbox is brimming. Below the folder list, there are buttons for Calendar, Tasks and Contacts. This is a great way to utilise unused space without cluttering up the ribbon or tucking options out of sight behind drop-down menus. To the far-right of the screen are tabs showing Contact Details for your current email, Agenda and Chat.

The ability to connect Gmail, Outlook, Microsoft Exchange and iCloud accounts isn't as extensive as our Gold and Silver award winners, but it's better than many other offerings. There's also extensive server support.



#### How it can be improved:

To say eM Client's features are basic is an understatement. Outside of chat and calendar, there's not much else to do here, so if it's a toss-up between this and Thunderbird, opt for the latter. We also noticed several images refusing to load and, given the software's emphasis on wide support, we're left wondering where the phone apps are.

#### **OUR VERDICT**

eM Client is a solid option if you're looking for email software that apes its more famous competitors and looks good doing it. Support for email servers is excellent.


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#### **BEST OF THE REST**

#### Spike

Spike is an email client fit for the Facebook age. The inbox itself is spacious and inviting, while navigation is performed via helpfully large icons at the bottom of the screen, including a collaborative Groups setting. All other actions are performed by clicking the three-dot button in individual emails, which keeps the design uncluttered. Overall, the app reminds us more of an instant-messaging app than an email client, but that's no bad thing.



#### **Windows Mail**

Windows 10's default client, Mail, remains a fine choice for basic email services - there's nothing special about it, nor is there anything that should put you off. Connecting multiple email accounts to the app is easy but it's a bit old-fashioned, particularly when writing your own emails. You can't even add a proper HTML signature, which is bizarre.




#### **Twobird**

# Make light of the

There's a lot more to the so-called dark web than dubious and criminal activity. Robert Irvine rounds up eight of the best hidden sites that are completely safe and legal to use



Considering that the BBC is The websites we've covered in this feature can't be accessed via your usual "committed to impartiality", it's strange web browser. Instead, you'll need to download and install the Tor Browser to think of its content being censored, (www.torproject.org), which is based on Firefox and has just reached its ninth stable version (see Best Free Software on page 28). Type the 16-character but such is the case in certain countries including China, Iran and Vietnam,

'.onion' URL into the Tor Browser's address bar and press Enter to visit the hidden site - you may find it slower to load than a standard website. Contrary to popular belief, you won't be exposed to disturbing and illegal sites by browsing with Tor unless you specifically go to those addresses.





Note that you won't be able to watch anything on BBC iPlayer through the mirror site because Tor makes it look like you're outside the UK, so it's no use for catching up on Strictly while you're out of the country.



American intelligence agencies have been lurking on the dark web for years, so it makes sense for the CIA to have its

own hidden site, which it launched back in May. Indeed, the whole concept of 'onion routing', which underlies Tor, was originally developed for the purpose of protecting US intelligence communications online.

Whereas most onion addresses have 16 characters, the CIA has opted for a finger-unfriendly 56 - as you can see from the ridiculously long link under the heading for this section - to reduce the risk of impersonation by hackers (try bit.ly/ciator489 to save time and typing). The site itself is a straight mirror of the standard version, but allows Tor users to contact and report information to the CIA in a "secure, anonymous and untraceable" manner.

You can also apply for jobs with the agency, browse its news archives and search its open-source library, while

young dark-web users (with parents' supervision) can crack codes, solve puzzles and discover clues in the Spy Kids games area.

#### Facebook

#### facebookcorewwwi.onion

Facebook may be notorious for invading its users' privacy but - unlike the similarly nosy Google - it offers a dark web version that lets you access the social network through Tor, while maintaining the latter's 'cryptographic protections'. Facebook insists that you sign up under your real name, and you wouldn't be able to find people (and they wouldn't be able to find you) if everyone used pseudonyms, so its onion site is not a workaround for staying anonymous online. Instead, it s primarily aimed at residents of





countries where Facebook is blocked or censored, but is equally useful for anyone concerned about online surveillance because it claims not to keep logs of user activities. The site attracts more than a million dark web users a month and can also be accessed on mobile devices via the Tor app for Android (bit.ly/tordroid489). Tor's built-in script blocker means you shouldn't see any ads, either!

#### DuckDuckGo

The default search engine in Tor is the privacy-focused DuckDuckGo, which unlike Google and Bing - doesn't store your search history or personal information, or track you around the web. However, if you want to guarantee that nobody else can see what you're looking for online, it's worth switching to the 'dark web' version of DuckDuckGo. This encrypts all your Tor search queries end-to-end and stops anyone knowing that you're even using the search engine.

You can either access the hidden DuckDuckGo via the onion link above, or select DuckDuckGoOnion from the options below the Tor Browser's address bar or search box when you type a search query. To always use this version, right-click its icon and choose Set As Default Search Engine. Because of the 'onion routing', you'll find it's a little slower than standard DuckDuckGo.



#### ExpressVPN

VPNs and the Tor network both keep you anonymous online by concealing your real identity and location, and



encrypting your browsing data. For maximum privacy and security, you can combine the two - although this will noticeably slow your internet connection - by signing up for ExpressVPN via its dedicated dark website. Not only does this site allow people living and working in countries that block VPNs to enjoy the benefits of the service, but it lets anyone register for ExpressVPN anonymously and pay for their subscription using Bitcoin.

ExpressVPN says that connecting to its service, then launching Tor is the most secure browsing method, and that its encryption will prevent your private data from being leaked through exit nodes (the last point Tor traffic passes through before it reaches its destination).


#### **ProtonMail**

ProtonMail (protonmail.com) is already the most secure webmail service available: it encrypts incoming and outgoing messages, doesn't log IP addresses and stores your data in an underground bunker in Switzerland, which has some of the strongest privacy laws in the world. But if you're still worried about email snoopers or you're in a country that blocks access to ProtonMail, you can log into its hidden service through Tor.

ProtonMail's dark web version provides true end-to-end encryption, which makes it impossible for anyone spying on your web activities to know that you're using the service. Tor's encryption also prevents man-in-themiddle attacks, because your connection is completely anonymous and your IP address undetectable even to ProtonMail itself.

The free version of ProtonMail limits you to 500MB of storage and 150 messages a day but you can increase this to 5GB and 1,000 messages for €5 (£4.25) a month.



#### **Hidden Answers**

Like a dark web version of Reddit, Hidden Answers is a great source of information and opinion, with a



community that is happy to provide helpful - or, at least, honest - answers to any question. Some of the discussions are slightly shady, but the Technology board is by far the most popular, addressing such innocuous topics as 'How can I recover deleted files?' and 'Does the onion version of Facebook actually work?'. You'll also find useful advice about online security and privacy, and tips on avoiding the latest scams.

Hidden Answers forbids its members from trading illegal wares and blocks users who flout its rules about spam, pornography and attacking others.

#### SecureDrop

#### secrdrop5wyphb5x.onion

The dark web is widely used by activists, campaigners, whistleblowers, journalists and other people wary of government censorship and surveillance, to share and source information anonymously. SecureDrop provides a safe system for submitting and accepting confidential documents, encrypting data in transit, protecting against hackers and masking IP addresses, identities and other metadata.

The SecureDrop website provides a directory of all the media organisations that use its service, complete with their 'onion' addresses for file drops, which you can search by country, topic and language. In the UK, SecureDrop 'instances' include the Guardian and HuffPost, while other big names include Al Jazeera, BuzzFeed, the New York Times and the Washington Post. Submission categories span everything from criminal justice and human rights to cybersecurity and celebrities, and you can add your own company to the directory.



# SECRET TIPS for Facebook Messenger

Are you getting the most from Facebook's messaging app? Jane Hoskyn reveals how to unlock Messenger's best tricks and tools



#### **Use Messenger without** a Facebook account

Messenger began as just another Facebook feature, but you can now use it entirely separately from your Facebook account. All you need is a phone number.

To start from scratch, install the app (Android: bit.ly/messdroid489, iPhone: bit.ly/messios489) then select 'Not on Facebook' after opening it. You'll need to enter an SMS code to confirm your phone number.

If you already use Facebook and want to leave it without losing Messenger, head to bit.ly/delete489 and choose Deactivate to carry on using Messenger with your old Facebook credentials. Alternatively, choose Delete (ideally after downloading your data via bit.ly/ fbinfo489), then install Messenger afresh and sign up using your phone number, as above.


Certain devices, such as Samsung phones, offer a 'Dual Messenger' option that lets you install two instances of the app, so you can have one that's linked to Facebook and one that isn't. To set this up, reinstall Messenger, then tap the Dual Messenger notification.

#### Play hidden games in Messenger

Messenger is packed with third-party games such as Words With Friends, Tetris and Daily Sudoku, and they tend to be faster and less resourcehungry than their equivalent standalone apps. To find them, tap More (four dots or the

plus symbol) in a chat, or Discover (compass icon) on the Chats screen, then Games. You're forced to "play" a default game before unlocking the list, but all you really have to do is load then close the default game.


You can kick off a couple of turnbased games simply by sharing an emoji in a chat - for example, send the football emoji, then tap it to kick off; or send the basketball emoji, then tap it to shoot hoops.

#### Complain to a company's Al bot

Open the Discover screen's Businesses tab to search and browse thousands of artificially-intelligent bots, each programmed by a specific organisation to reply to your enquiry, complaint, booking or even compliment. These chats include all the usual attachment

options, so you can upload a photo of a receipt or even record a voice message.

Unlike WhatsApp, Messenger's voice-message tool doesn't let you cancel while recording. It's automatically sent the moment you lift your finger. If you want to delete it (by long-pressing it, then tapping the bin), it only disappears from your screen, not from your



#### Mark a chat as unread

To restore the bold text to a conversation on the Chats screen, perhaps to remind yourself to read it and reply, swipe it left and choose 'Mark as unread' (see screenshot, right). The same menu lets you archive, block, mute

or delete the conversation.

There are more customisation options behind the 'i' icon in the chat itself. Here, you can change that chat's highlight colour from the default blue and switch its response emoji from the default thumbs-up; give the chat a nickname; search its messages; and start an encrypted 'secret conversation'.

#### Switch to dark mode



Turn off the lights with Messenger's 'Dark mode' toggle

Dark mode is the new black in the world of apps. Even Facebook's desktop version is testing a native dark mode (bit.ly/fbdark489), but Messenger got in early with a 'Dark mode' toggle on the Me screen (tap your profile photo).

Dark mode has several advantages - white text on a black background means less eye strain when reading after dark, and it also uses less battery power,

especially if you have an OLED screen.

#### Go 'Lite' to save phone resources

Even in dark mode, Messenger devours battery, storage and memory, but you can dramatically cut the bloat by switching to its nimble sister app, Messenger Lite (bit.ly/lite489). It's currently Android-only (unless you're in Turkey), though you can try spoofing your location with a VPN to get the

iOS version (bit.ly/liteios489).


Messenger Lite doesn't have all the bells and whistles of the main Messenger app (no dark mode, business bots, secret conversations, filters or games) but it's not completely stripped-back. As well as the messaging basics, it includes free video and audio calls, multimedia attachments, voice clips, 'Mark as unread' and custom colours.

#### Create an interactive date reminder

Quickly agree the whens, wheres, whos and whats of a future event - without having to muck around with links to external calendars - by tapping More, then Reminders. When sent, the reminder automatically turns into a calendar-style invitation card with an interactive response button for your recipient - or for everyone, if it's a group chat. If you've added an alarm (under 'More options'), it'll appear as a 'sticky'

message at the top of the chat, unless you dismiss it.

Like WhatsApp, Messenger now has a Live Location tool that you can use to let someone track you when you're trying to meet up. Oddly, this isn't integrated into Reminders.



Create an interactive invitation and reminder without having to bother with calendars

Instead, you'll need to enable Live Location when it's time for your rendezvous, by tapping Location under More.

#### Poll your friends and family

Group chats have an extra option under More: Polls (on iPhone, you'll find the Polls icon in the 'Type a message' field).

As well as being a fun way to validate your opinions (or not, as the case may be), polls are an efficient way to let multiple people respond to a suggestion. For example, you could use a poll to agree on a meet-up location or to decide what to have for dinner tonight.

To start a group chat, tap the pencil icon on the Chats/

Conversations screen, then 'Create a new group'. Tap Polls and pen your poser, along with a choice of answers. Messenger now lets you set photos as optional replies, as well as text.

Messenger is so stuffed with clever features that it hardly needs extensions, but it can't do everything on its own. Here are some of the best extra tools.

- Dual Space (Android: dualspace .com): Create two instances of Messenger on one phone, and log in using separate accounts.
- Messenger Kids (Android, iOS: bit.ly/kids489): Official app for youngsters with tools such as sleep mode. No phone number is needed, so it works on tablets.
- Unseenly (Chrome: bit.ly/ unseen489, Android APK: bit.ly/ undroid489): Prevent people from seeing when you've read their messages.
- Multimessenger (Chrome: multimessenger.cc): Manage Messenger, WhatsApp, Instagram and other messaging tools in one floating browser window.
- Messenger online (any browser, messenger.com): Access Messenger



on your PC without having to sign in using Facebook.

- Pinned Messenger (Firefox: bit.ly/ pinned489): Get an always-on Messenger tab.
- Messages Saver for Facebook (Windows, Chrome: chatsaver.org): Download entire conversations in text format. At £2.49, it's the only tool in our list that isn't free.

dge comes as part of Windows 10, but the redesigned browser, which Microsoft expects to launch on 15 January, is built around Chromium, the open-source version of Google Chrome. Though it isn't finished yet, you can now download the Release Candidate from bit.ly/edge489.

If you're feeling adventurous, you can


also preview test versions that contain extra features, such as Collections, which lets you collate information from web pages as you browse. To try these extra features, you'll need to download the Dev or Canary versions of the browser, which are cutting-edge test releases that are updated with new features as they're developed.




The first time you run the new Edge browser, you're greeted with a personal message and given the chance to either add all your browsing data (favourites, history and more) 11 or start from scratch. 2 Click Confirm 3 and, on the next screen, you can choose a look for the new tab page.



This is the Inspirational layout. Its background is a Bing image and it has a Bing search box 🗓 with your favourite or most recent sites in a bar along the bottom. 2 This gets populated as you browse. Click the plus button **B** to manually add new sites. You can add personalised news and other items. 4





Click the three-dot menu button in the top-right corner. 1 From here, you can open a new tab, new window or new InPrivate window. 2 You can also zoom in or out, **B** and access favourites, history, downloads, apps and extensions. There are options to have the page read aloud 4 and open Settings. 5




The Settings screen displays all the categories on the left, 1 with the settings for each section on the right. 2 You can switch profiles, **3** choose what information to sync between devices, view and manage saved passwords 4 and import data from another browser. 5




The Appearance section 🗓 lets you customise the look of the browser, changing the theme 2 and toggling the favourites tools on or off. 

You can manage what the browser displays on startup, customise the new tab page 4 and manage privacy settings and services. 5






The original Edge didn't have many add-ons but that changes with the Chromium version. You can view and download a host of extensions directly from the Microsoft Edge Insider Addons page (bit.ly/edgeaddons489). Browse the full selection 1 or view them by category. 2



Click an extension, then click the Get button on its page to install it. In the box that appears, click 'Add extension'. To view and manage add-ons, open Edge's menu and click Extensions. You can enable or disable something, 11 or remove it. 2 Click 'Keyboard shortcuts' 3 to set a hotkey to activate an extension.



Edge lets you turn web pages into Edge lets you turn web pages into standalone apps. Navigate to a page, open the browser menu, go to Apps and select 'Install this site as an app'. 11 Name it **2** and it will open in a new window and be added to the Start menu. You can also access your apps in the browser menu, and manage or remove them from there.



# Edit your videos for free using VLC



LC is usually thought of as a media player, and a very good one at that. However, there's more to the software than meets the eye. Did you know you can use it to make simple edits to your videos as well as just watch them? This saves you needing to download a separate video-editing tool if you're short on space or don't use one often enough to justify the installation.

VLC's editing tools are a bit rough and ready, but because its options are limited, it can be used to create clean, unfussy videos, free of elaborate transitions that can be too tempting to ignore in regular video editors. That said, the software can also perform a handful of magic tricks to transform your footage, which we look at in the last two steps of this workshop.

#### **EXPERT TIP**

#### **Andy Shaw says**

The trimming process outlined below can be tricky for edits because you have to manually click the Record button at the precise moment. For a more accurate cut, open the video in the Windows 10 Photos app, click Edit & Create and choose Trim. Use the sliders to find the start and end point of the clip you want to create and click 'Save a copy'. A version of the file named 'filename\_trim' will appear in the same folder as the original video.




First, we'll look at how to trim video, so you can remove unwanted sections to create a clip. To do this, you need some extra tools. Open the View menu 💶 and choose Advanced Controls. 2 This adds a Record button 3 and a useful 'Frame by frame' button. 4




Load the video and watch it through to make sure you're familiar with where you want the start and end points to 💶 be. Use the slider 💶 to get the video near to your preferred starting point. Click the Play button 2 and immediately press the Record button 🛭 when you get to the correct place.




You have to mark the end of your clip manually. When the video gets to the stop point, click the Record button again. 11 The trimmed video file is saved to your Videos folder with 'vlc\_record' at the front of its name. 2 Do this as many times as required to collect the clips that you need.




While VLC is perfectly capable of sticking video clips together, the option was removed from the latest version of the graphical interface. However, the action can still be performed from the Command Prompt. Start by renaming the files you want to stitch together - use a simple, consecutive system, such as numbering them. 💵




Close any instances of VLC that you have open. Enter cmd in the search box 11 to launch the Command Prompt, and navigate to the folder that contains your renamed video files. In our case, we used cd c:\Users\Andy\Videos.




Next, type a command with the path to the vlc.exe file, 1the names of all the files you want to join 2 and a couple of additional commands including the name of the final file. 3 Ours was "C:\Program Files\VideoLAN\VLC\vlc. exe" 1.mp4 2.mp4 3.mp4 --sout "#gather:std{acce ss=file,dst=join.mp4}" --sout-keep




VLC opens and joins the files together. The process is carried out discreetly, so you won't see anything appear on the screen. 11 You now have to shut VLC down again before the new file (in our case, called 'join') is properly finished. If you look at it before closing VLC, it will appear to be an empty file. 2



The file's thumbnail appears. 🗓 You can reopen VLC and play the video as normal. 2 If you want to make any changes to the file, such as adding more clips, make sure you rename the output file in Step 6, so it doesn't overwrite your existing file.



You may feel your video is a bit boring and decide to spice it up with a few video effects. If you do this as you record your clips in Steps 2 and 3, you can insert them into your finished production. Click the 'Show extended settings' button 1 and click the Video Effects tab. 2



There are plenty of effects to experiment with, such as changing the colour of your video from the Colors tab. 1 Here, we've chosen a Sepia tint. 2 The Essential tab 🖪 has subtler colour changes, Geometry 🛂 lets you rotate the video and Overlay 5 can insert a logo or text.



#### Get phone notifications on your computer

f you regularly spend your day switching between your phone and your computer, Crono is the tool you need to bridge any gaps. This combination of app and browser tool lets you create a link between the two devices, pushing phone notifications, messages and more to your PC browser. Once you've set it up, the experience is streamlined, effortless and, most importantly, instant.










Download and log into the Crono app with your Google account, then download the extension at bit.ly/cronoext489. Click the browser tool and, in the app, tap 'Connect to Crono Web'. Scan the QR code to connect the two. Name the browser 🗓 and tap Save. 2 Press the plus sign 3 to add more browsers.




In the app, select Enable Notifications Access. Toggle on Crono, then tap Allow so it can read your notifications. With this set up, notifications on your phone are mirrored in the Crono browser window. • Options to Share, Edit or Delete appear below 2 and there's a reply box 3 for messages.






It's also possible to determine which apps are displayed from the browser extension. Click Push Alerts 🚺 to show the app list. 2 Clicking each box 3 activates or deactivates the app, while selecting Enable All or Disable All is another way to set them all on or off by default.



To make sure you never miss a phone notification, click Crono's menu button. 1 At the bottom of the sidebar are a handful of options, including Crono on New Tab. 2 Switch this on. While you're there, set dark mode 🖪 and two-factor authentication notifications 4 to deliver to the browser, too.



— Under Actions, 💶 'Paste Clipboard to Device' and 'Ring my device' 2 both require a single-click. When selecting 'Send file to device', **3** however, use the box **4** to drag and drop files or click to upload via File Explorer. 5 Pick these up in the app by going to View Files.




leachBit is the ultimate PC-cleaning tool, since CCleaner's fall from grace. Free and open source, it's been designed to remove clutter and personal data from your PC, so no one can snoop on your actions or look at

any files you created and deleted. The latest version introduces lots of new tools which we'll explore below, after a quick recap of the basics.




In the left-hand column, choose the type of clean-up you want to perform. 11 You can select a heading or choose individual elements. Click the Preview button 🛂 to see which files will be cleaned **3** and how much space you'll gain. 4 When you're happy to proceed, click the Clean button. 5



You get a final chance to cancel the cleaning process just before it starts. However, eagle-eyed veterans will notice a new button on the toolbar. This Abort button 11 lets you cancel a clean-up operation, even if it's already started.




You can also use BleachBit to shred files. Click the Menu button 11 and choose one of the Shred options. 2 You can also Wipe Free Space, **B** which lets you completely remove any files that you may not have deleted as thoroughly in the past.



BleachBit has a new tool for creating 'chaff' - hundreds of nonsense files for hiding important documents. Click the Menu button, choose Make Chaff 🚺 and select the Inspiration (a tech magazine or, bizarrely, Hillary Clinton's leaked email archives) and the number of files to create.



Select a folder for the chaff 10 or create a new one. You can choose to immediately delete the files (to hide any sensitive deleted files among the chaff) or keep them. 2 Click 'Make files'. 3 The first time you do this, it downloads some small files it uses to create the chaff from.



The new version of BleachBit has a dark mode which, if you're installing it from scratch, it launches in automatically. If you'd rather have a traditional white background, open the menu and choose Preferences. Select the General tab 11 and untick 'Dark mode'. 2



# Make your phone and tablet more accessible

Wayne Williams reveals the tweaks and apps that can make your mobile devices much easier to see, hear and use



#### Simplify Android use

The accessibility options available to Android users depend on which version of Google's operating system you have installed on your phone. To complicate matters further, many developers customise Android, adding and removing features. For this project, we'll be focusing on what's on offer in the standard version of Android 9 (Pie).

To get started, open Settings and go

to System, then Accessibility. Here, you'll find an Accessibility Menu which, when enabled, provides a large on-screen menu to control your phone. Tap the Accessibility button that appears on the bottom of the screen to access this menu.

From the Settings screen, you can enable 'Select to Speak', which reads selected text aloud; or TalkBack, which provides spoken feedback on everything on the phone. We show you how to use

TalkBack in our Mini Workshop, opposite. The 'Text-to-speech output' setting lets you adjust the speech rate and pitch using sliders. Tap the Play button to hear some example text read aloud.


People with motor impairments can control their device using one or more switches, and that option can be enabled here also.

Back in the main Settings menu, select Display and you can change the font size




The Senior Homescreen launcher only shows apps most likely to be used


and display size. The latter option lets you increase the size of items on the screen, such as buttons, menus and text. Use the slider to adjust the settings and preview the effect of the changes. You can also turn on magnification, which lets

you zoom in on items. As well as colour correction, for people who suffer from colourblindness, there's also a Colour Inversion option that inverts the colours. It's not the same as dark mode, though the results are similar.

If you use a mouse with your Android device, it's possible to increase the size of the cursor. You can also remove animations, set dwell timing (which, when using a mouse, performs a click if the cursor has been stationary for a period of time), switch to mono for audio and enable captions. Android 9 also has an experimental High Contrast Text setting which can be enabled at the bottom of the Accessibility screen.

In addition, Android users can make use of Google Assistant to perform tasks


using spoken requests, and there are special Android launchers available that redesign the look of the interface, making it easier to use. Two we'd recommend are Simple Launcher (bit.ly/simple489), which displays big fonts and icons; and Senior Homescreen (bit.ly/senior489), which is aimed at older users and displays the apps they are most likely to need, such as phone, camera, photos and WhatsApp. Access any installed launchers through Settings, 'Apps & notifications', 'Default apps', 'Home app'.

#### Make iOS easier to use

iOS and iPadOS (Apple's new tablet operating system) come with a number of options to make Apple's devices more accessible. Open Settings and tap


#### MINI WORKSHOP | Use the TalkBack screen reader in Android



With TalkBack switched on, you can use your phone without looking at the screen - handy for blind or partially sighted users. To enable it, open Settings, go to System and tap Accessibility (the exact process may vary depending on your version of Android). Tap TalkBack and switch the toggle to On.



Grant TalkBack its required permissions and the tutorial screen loads. This explains how it works and offers a few lessons to help master it. You can learn about a lesson or practise it. Single-tap on anything (such as buttons and text) and TalkBack reads what it says aloud. Double-tap to action the command.



With the tutorial done, return to the screen where you enabled TalkBack and tap Settings. Text-to-Speech output 1 lets you change the speech rate and pitch. Set what's spoken under Verbosity. 2 You can set TalkBack to only speak passwords when headphones are being worn. 5 Scroll down to access the navigation options.

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

Accessibility. The tweaks are sorted into four categories - Vision, 'Physical and Motor', Hearing and General. Most of these settings are set to Off but you can enable any that are likely to be helpful.

- The Vision tweaks fall broadly into two types: you can make items easier to see or you can get audio descriptions. The Zoom tool magnifies the entire screen and you can adjust the maximum magnification amount, and enable or disable other settings. Display & Text Size lets you make things easier to see in a number of ways, from increasing the size of text to making it bolder, reducing transparency and more. You can also use your device to make it easier to see things in the real world by activating the Magnifier. This works with your camera and lets you zoom in on hard-to-see text. We show you how to use it in our Mini Workshop, below.
- The VoiceOver setting provides a spoken description of almost everything, including buttons, menus, notifications and even details such as your screen dimming. Once enabled, tapping an item tells you what it is, and double-tapping actions it like a normal tap. You can adjust the speaking speed. If you don't need that level of description, the Spoken Content feature can read out selected text or the screen's content, and provide typing feedback. Enable Audio Descriptions and these play automatically when available.


Motor iOS has settings to help users with physical or motor problems

- Options in the 'Physical and Motor' section make Touch easier to use and let you manage features such as 'Tap to Wake', 'Shake to Undo' and Vibration. There are options for Face ID and Attention (on devices that support it). Switch Control lets you set up your phone to work with adaptive accessories.
- Anyone who has difficulty interacting with the device through touch can enable Voice Control and use spoken commands. For devices with a side button, such as the iPhone X and newer, you can use it to manage the click
- speed and other settings, and enable keyboard features such as Sticky Keys and Slow Keys.
- Under Hearing, you can connect a compatible hearing aid, switch to mono audio, enable phone noise cancellation and set LED flashes for alerts, as well as enable closed captions and subtitles.
- Finally, iOS has options for Guided Access (which keeps the device in a single app and controls what features are available), Siri and Accessibility Shortcuts.


#### MINI WORKSHOP | Use the Magnifier feature in iOS



Smartphones can come in handy for making small text in the real world in the camera to view text or take a picture and then zoom into the image. iOS also has a useful Magnifier option. Enable it in Settings, Accessibility, Magnifier. Toggle Magnifier on 11 and the optional auto-adjust exposure setting, 2 if required.



Open your device's camera and point it at the item that you're having difficulty seeing. Summon the Magnifier by pressing the button three times. The view switches to a much closer one. If things still aren't clear enough, use the slider 11 to zoom in or out as required.



Tapping the flash button 11 puts the phone light on to make things easier to see. You can lock the focus  $oldsymbol{ ilde{2}}$ and freeze the display. El Tapping the overlapping circles 4 lets you adjust the brightness and contrast, and quickly invert the colours. You can also choose from a number of visionfriendly presets, such as white/blue, yellow/blue and greyscale.

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
# Web User Masterclass

Customise the taskbar with new tools for accessing programs and files

#### Launch Windows programs directly from the taskbar

few icons appear at the left side of the taskbar by default, such as Explorer, Microsoft Store and Mail, but you can add more if you want. Run a program by launching it from the Start menu, then right-click the taskbar icon and select 'Pin to taskbar'. Launching an app from the taskbar is much quicker than having to find it in the Start menu.

You can use keyboard shortcuts to launch your apps from the taskbar: Win+1 for the first app on the left; Win+2 for the second and so on. If you have a lot of program icons in the taskbar, it can be easy to get the number wrong, so click and drag your most used tools to the left of the taskbar and leave the lesser used ones further along on the right.



Add programs to the taskbar and start them with Win+1, +2, +3 and so on

#### **Access Start menu shortcuts**

Left-clicking the Start button displays the Start menu but, if you right-click it, you get a different menu containing shortcuts to tools that let you configure Windows and repair faults, such as Device Manager, System, 'Apps and Features', Disk Management and more. Some options are for advanced users only, such as Event Viewer and Windows PowerShell. Microsoft can't decide what should be on this menu and sometimes changes it with Windows updates.

#### Choose taskbar icons

Some icons appear at the far right of the taskbar in the notification area but there are often more hidden in a pop-up panel



If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

- click the arrow to see them. If a frequently used icon is hidden in this panel, you can move it to the taskbar where it's easier to access.

Press Win+i and select
Personalisation, then Taskbar. Scroll
down and click 'Select which icons
appear on the taskbar'. Use the switches



Choose whether icons appear in the notification area or are hidden from view

to choose whether an icon appears on the taskbar or can be stowed in the pop-up panel. You can also click and drag icons between the taskbar and panel to move them.

#### Hide system icons

System icons – such as the clock, power and volume – are displayed to the right of the notification area. Open Settings, Personalisation, Taskbar and click 'Turn system icons on or off'. You can use the switches to show or hide items – for example, if your computer has keyboard buttons for adjusting the audio volume, you can choose not to display the Volume system icon.

#### Show or hide taskbar badges

Some icons on the taskbar can display badges, which means they can be overlaid with a number. This is useful with the Mail app, for example, so you can see the number of unread emails waiting in your inbox.

If you're not seeing any badges, open the Settings app and click Personalisation, then Taskbar. Turn on




the switch under 'Show badges on taskbar buttons'.

#### Shrink taskbar items

The taskbar can become crowded on a small laptop screen and you might want to get rid of the search box to free up space. Right-click the taskbar, go to Search and cick 'Show search icon'. It's replaced by a magnifying-glass icon, which you can click when you want to search for something.

If you don't want even the magnifying-glass icon cluttering your taskbar, right-click the taskbar and select Search, then Hidden to remove it. When you want to search for something, click Start and begin typing.

Another way to make room for more icons on the taskbar is to use smaller icons. Open Settings, Personalisation, Taskbar and enable 'Use small taskbar icons'. Remove the Explorer icon - you can just press Windows+E to open it.



Shrink the search box to an icon to make more room on your taskbar

#### Annotate screenshots

Right-click the taskbar and select the Windows Ink Workspace button. A new button appears on the taskbar and clicking it shows two options: Whiteboard or Full Screen Snip. Whiteboard is an app with various drawing tools that can be used to create and export illustrations, so you can share them with others.

Full Screen Snip takes a screenshot and opens the image in the Snip & Sketch app, which can be used to draw, annotate and edit it, before you save it.

#### Add people to the taskbar

Right-click the taskbar and select 'Show People on the taskbar'. Click the new People icon to see suggested contacts from Outlook email, Skype and Calendar. It aims to make it easier to access your contacts - you simply click People, click a contact and see their details or send them an email. However, this feature only shows contacts stored in your Microsoft apps and services, not elsewhere, such as in Gmail and Google Contacts.

#### TAKE IT TO THE NEXT LEVEL

More advanced tips for when you're feeling brave

#### Improve Windows Search

The taskbar search box can find files, documents, emails and even search the web. You can extend the search parameters to make it find more things. Open the Settings app and click Search. In the Permissions & History section, choose Strict, Moderate or Off for the adult-content filters, as you prefer. This mainly affects the Web tab in the search results panel.

Select Searching Windows in the Settings sidebar, then select Enhanced under Find My Files. This indexes all files on the hard drive and it means that taskbar searches will find files outside of the normal Documents, Pictures, Music and Videos folders. If there are folders you don't want included in searches, click 'Add an excluded folder'.




Choose between Classic and Enhanced searches in the taskbar

#### Use taskbar tasks and jump

Pinning programs to the taskbar makes it easy to launch them, but you also get a right-click menu of actions. For example, find the Calculator app on the Start menu, right-click it, select More and click 'Pin to taskbar'. Now, right-click the taskbar Calculator icon to open a menu that lets you choose standard, scientific, programmer or date-calculation mode. Right-clicking a browser's taskbar icon may offer normal and incognito windows.

Right-clicking some taskbar icons displays a jump list of recently opened

files, folders, websites and more. These make it easy to revisit a website or reopen a file. If you don't see a jump list, the program might not provide them - to be sure, open Settings, Personalisation, Start and turn on the switch under 'Show recently opened items in Jump Lists on Start or the taskbar'.

#### Add taskbar toolbars

Right-click an empty part of the taskbar and select Toolbars followed by Address or Links. Address adds a browser address box to the taskbar and you can enter website URLs to launch a browser and visit the site.

Links shows browser bookmarks stored at C:\Users\YourName\ Favorites\Links or C:\Users\ YourName\Favorites\Favorites Bar. Unfortunately, these seem to mirror Internet Explorer's Favourites Bar, rather than any of the usual popular browsers. However, you can drag a website URL from Chrome's address box and drop it in this folder to add it.

#### Create your own toolbar

Any folder can be turned into a taskbar toolbar that lets you access its contents from a menu. For example, right-click the taskbar, go to Toolbars and select 'New toolbar'. Browse the hard drive and select a folder, (the Documents folder is selected by default but you can choose another).

The folder's name appears on the taskbar and clicking the doubleheaded arrow next to it shows a menu. Folders become sub-menus and clicking a file opens it in the associated program. To remove it, rightclick the taskbar, go to Toolbars and deselect the one to hide.

#### Switch taskbars

Switch (bit.ly/switch489) adds extra taskbars, which is useful if the main taskbar is full. Run it and it appears on the right of the screen. Click an empty spot and select a program to add to it. The taskbar auto hides and pressing Alt brings it back. We found some task switching bugs but it's fine for starting programs.

#### Save iPhone photos to your PC

Can you explain how to save photos taken on an iPhone to a Dell computer, please? Is it possible to just treat it as an external storage device, or is a specialist program or app needed to do this?

On a slightly different but related matter, I believe I read that iPhones capture photos in a unique format and that it's necessary to alter some setting to save them as JPEGs. As I am well over 70, I would appreciate some simple instructions, if possible.

There are several ways to transfer photos from an iPhone to your computer. If you store photos in iCloud, you can log into the www.icloud.com website on your computer and open the Photos app. Browse your photos and select the ones you want to download, then click the cloud icon to download them as a zip file.

Another way to transfer photos is to install the OneDrive app on your iPhone. Open the app, tap the plus button at the top and select the photos you want to upload to

OneDrive. Windows 10 has OneDrive built in, so uploaded photos will automatically appear on your PC's hard drive in the OneDrive folder.

You can use other online drives, such as Google Drive and Dropbox, if you prefer. All these online storage services have options you can set for automatic photo upload that sync your mobile device, online drive and PC as you take your snaps.

The iPhone saves photos as HEIF files (High Efficiency Image Format), though the file extension is actually 'heic'. You can also take Live Photos on the iPhone – they look like a very short video with about a second of movement before the still shot. Photos downloaded from the iCloud website on a PC are automatically converted to JPEG images (static photos) and MOV movie files (Live Photos), so there are no file format problems.

Photos that aren't transferred using an online drive remain in their original file format. If you can't open a photo, search the Microsoft Store app in Windows 10 for **HEIF** and install the free extension. Because Live Photos taken




You can choose the file format used for iPhone photos in the camera settings

on the iPhone are like a video, they require Windows HEVC extensions, which cost 79p.

GIMP (www.gimp.org) is a free photo editor you can use to edit HEIC photos, and an image-conversion tool such as IrfanView (www.irfanview .com) converts HEIC to other file formats, such as JPEG.

If you'd rather your photos were saved as JPEG files as soon as they're taken, open Settings in your iPhone and go to Camera, Formats, then select Most Compatible. In the camera app, there's a button you can use to switch off Live Photo if you don't want it to save the video part of the photo.

#### **BROWSERS**

#### Safely clear browser data

In the Web User Masterclass in Issue 486 (bit.ly/webuser486), I followed the instructions in advanced tips and got the following: "Your stored cookies, site data, and cache are currently using 2.8MB of disk space". I decided to free up the 2.8MB but a box appeared stating that I would lose various caches and so on, and the consequences looked rather dire if I carried this out, so I did not proceed. Can you explain what, if anything, is likely to happen?

Cookies and other browser settings are stored for your convenience – nothing more – and most people can



live without them. However, clearing them can cause a major problem in certain circumstances, which is why you are given a warning before they are removed.

If we type **mail** into the address box of our browser and press Enter, Google Mail appears a second later and displays our email inbox. If cookies and other data are cleared, we have to type the full mail.google.com address into the browser, which takes longer. Google then requires us to log into our account and asks us to type in our email address. In the next step, we have to enter our password and, after that - because two-factor authentication (2FA) is enabled - Google sends us a text message, so we have to find our phone, unlock it, read the message and copy the code into the computer. Finally, the email inbox is displayed.

These extra steps mean it can be very inconvenient when cookies and other browser data are cleared. Multiply this by the number of websites you log into and you can see how it can really mess up your day. And if you don't use a password manager and can't remember your password, or you don't have your phone on you to read the 2FA security text that is sent, you wouldn't be able to get into your account. This is why a warning appears when clearing cookies.

Cookies are useful but clearing them is no worse than buying a new computer, which won't have any cookies on because it's never been used. If you have a password manager to store your website logins and your phone is within reach for sites that use 2FA, nothing bad will happen.

#### Create an essential PC toolkit

After buying your magazine for the last few years, I decided to start taking note of the programs I want to install on my PC. I'm not technically minded, so I was wondering if you could please look at this list and tell me if I should install the following and confirm that they are easy to use: Pegasun System Utilities (pegasun.com/systemutilities), SUMo (bit.ly/sumo489), AdwCleaner (www.malwarebytes.com/ adwcleaner), Driver Booster Free (bit.ly/ driboo489), uBlock Origin (bit.ly/ ublo489), Restore Point Creator (bit.ly/ repc489), Patch My PC (patchmypc .com/home-updater-download), CCleaner (www.ccleaner.com) and Spybot (www.safer-networking.org).

Are any of these programs duplicates? Are there any simple programs you could recommend that aren't on my list? Bear in mind that they have to be easy to use.

I currently have Kaspersky (www .kaspersky.co.uk) on my PC and run a NordVPN (www.nordvpn.com). I want to uninstall Kaspersky when my subscription runs out because it intermittently seems

to stop my internet working -I sometimes have to turn it off to get online - so I was looking to install Comodo (bit.ly/como489) instead.

#### Get the clipboard back

I have not been able to try the interesting features in your thorough and informative Clipboard Masterclass in Issue 484 (bit.ly/ webuser484), on either Windows or Android. This is because Windows Clipboard History hasn't worked for several weeks and I don't know how to get it back.

Clipboard History and syncing is always switched on in Settings. When I copy something, I get the audible click to notifying that a clip has been made and, until today, there was also a visual notification, though this has now stopped. However, when I press Win+V, I don't get a list of what's been copied.

I know my copies are successful because I use a useful third-party app, ClipClip (clipclip.com), which displays them. ClipClip is very good and I recommend it to others, after having found it in Web User. I now depend on it for all my cut-and-paste activity and will certainly keep it, at least as a backup. It's very versatile.

Even so, I want Clipboard History back for several reasons, not least because of its ability to sync with other devices, including my Android phone and tablet. ClipClip is great but it isn't able to sync to Android.


Let's start with the basics. Open 🦰 Settings, System, Clipboard and enable all the options to use clipboard history and syncing between your computers and devices. These features may be blocked by privacy settings, so open Settings, Privacy, Activity History and turn on all the switches, so the clipboard can be synced via your Microsoft account.

Some people find that restarting Explorer works. Right-click the taskbar and select Task Manager. select the Processes tab and find Windows Explorer, then right-click it and select Restart.

Press Win+R and type regedit to open the Registry Editor. Go to: HKEY\_LOCAL\_MACHINE\ SOFTWARE\Policies\Microsoft\ Windows\System

On the right, we have nothing and clipboard history works fine. However, some people find adding the following values solves the problem: EnableActivityFeed, PublishUserActivities, UploadUserActivities, AllowClipboardHistory and AllowCrossDeviceClipboard

Go to Edit, New, DWORD (32-bit) value to create them. Double-click them and set the values to 1.

You've come up with an excellent list of programs, all of which we would fully recommend. However, they are mostly designed to fix various sorts of specific problems and there is a saying that's worth bearing in mind: "If it 'aint broke, don't fix it".

Driver Booster, for example, finds and updates hardware drivers more easily than if you had to hunt down and apply them yourself, but it should only be used if you are experiencing a hardware problem. The same is true of some of the other tools. AdwCleaner and Spybot prevent or clean spyware and adware, but are only useful if your PC is infected with spyware or adware.

Pegasun System Utilities and CCleaner clean caches, cookies, temporary files and so on. They can be useful on an old PC that's accumulated a lot of junk files, but there's little benefit on a new PC. And, as explained in our reply to fossewayfella on page 66, cookies and caches can be useful and fix problems in some circumstances.

Our advice is to keep the software as a list. If you have a problem you need to fix, download and use the appropriate tool, but don't install and run them all on a PC that is working properly.

Kaspersky shouldn't stop the internet working, but sometimes odd things can happen with software, so it may be worth trying an alternative program. Tests of the latest security software can be found at AV-Comparatives (www .av-comparatives.org/consumer) and AV-Test (www.av-test.org/en).

The usual suspects are all good

performers, such as Avast (www.avast .com), AVG (www.avg.com), Bitdefender (www.bitdefender.co.uk), Avira (www .avira.com), Norton (www.norton.com), Trend Micro (www.trendmicro.com) and others. Windows Defender now offers good malware protection, but the others we've listed offer extras that aren't available in Microsoft's tool.


#### **EMAIL**

#### Don't overfill your inbox

I have read on several occasions perhaps you've mentioned it in Web User, too - that you should regularly clear out the trash in your email account and delete old emails. Why is this? They are not doing any harm as far as I can see. Why not just leave them? I use Outlook and Gmail.

One reason for clearing out old emails is because many people use free online storage and the space provided is capped. Both Google and Microsoft limit you to 15GB of free storage, and you can end up using it all for emails, particularly if you receive a lot of attachments. When this happens, you'll no longer receive any messages because they'll be deleted on arrival. What's more, you might not realise this is happening until you wonder why an important email that you know has been sent fails to arrive.



Check that the amount of storage used for email isn't reaching full capacity or you might lose your messages

Go to drive.google.com and click the Upgrade Storage link on the left. Ignore the sales pitch at the top and scroll down to the bottom to see your Google Drive usage. The overall space used and the amount used individually by Gmail, Drive and Photos is listed. Make sure you have plenty of space.

Go to outlook.com and click the cog icon at the top. Click 'View all Outlook settings', then select General and Storage to see the amount of space used. Unlike Google's services, where Drive, Gmail and Photos share the same pool, email storage is kept separate in OneDrive.

then About. Find your phone's build number and tap it seven times. Now, go back to Settings - near the bottom, you'll find 'Developer options' within which there is an option called 'Transition animation scale'. Select 'Animation off' and see if your phone is any speedier.

If it's the latter, just check that Windows Defender is enabled in your group policies. Tamper Protection is part of the Windows Defender settings, and different antivirus tools don't always play well together.

When using anything except Defender, uninstall or temporarily disable it, then switch on the setting.

If you're still seeing the message, try again using the hidden admin account. Open Command Prompt in Admin Mode. Enter net user administrator /active:yes to make the second account active. Sign out of your usual account and into this one, then try to change your Tamper Protection settings.







#### Defrag with every shutdown

I definitely want my next computer to have an SSD (solid-state drive) because they are so much faster than the mechanical dinosaur that's buzzing inside my current PC. However, my next PC is at least a year off, so I'll have to keep this one running as best I can.

If you still have a hard drive in your PC, it needs defragging. Windows does this automatically in the background, but I find it still leaves lots of fragmented files, so I use Defraggler (www.ccleaner.com/ defraggler) to do the job. Instead of shutting down my computer from the Start menu in the evening, I use Defraggler to shut it down instead. Right-click the desktop and select New, then Shortcut. Click Browse, find the Defraggler installation folder and select 'df.exe'. Add c:\ /QD /shutdown to the end of the command line (note the spaces between each element) and click Next. Name it Shut Down and click Finish.

To shut down the computer, just click the desktop Shut Down icon you created. It does a quick defrag (the '/QD' parameter) and then shuts down the PC (the '/shutdown' parameter).







When you sign up for a new antivirus subscription from Kaspersky, you are asked if you would like auto-renewal, so you're not left vulnerable by your antivirus protection going out of date. This is fine and works well, but what they don't tell you is that they will always charge you the full price, which at the time of writing is £39.99 for Kaspersky Total Security.

Many people will just let the auto-renewal process run year after



year, without thinking to check how much the program would cost if they renewed it themselves as required. Without searching too hard, you can renew the licence manually through Kaspersky's own website for £27.99. That's an effortless saving of £12.

This caught me out once, so I complained to Kaspersky and they refunded me the difference, but how many people are getting bamboozled by this? I now wait for the reminder emails, then renew the licence myself. You get countdown emails so it's not difficult to remember.

#### EaseUS has dropped free backup options



In reference to the program EaseUS Todo Backup Free (bit.ly/ ease481), as recommended in your Best Buys section. As part of an apparently new sales strategy, this company has removed the

incremental, differential and, more importantly, the 'Smart backup' options from the free version of this software.

Smart backup is now only available in the paid-for version, and the incremental and differential backups can only be set within a scheduled backup, and not as before. In view of this, you may wish to reconsider it as one of your Gold Award winners.

# X marks the Windows laptop to avoid

f the definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again while expecting a different result, someone needs to send two pencils and a pair of underpants to Redmond to go full-on Blackadder Goes Forth.

Cast your mind back to 2012, when Microsoft launched Windows RT (the RT stands for Really Terrible). RT, which launched alongside Windows 8, was the version of Windows designed for devices with the kind of ARMcompatible processors you find in phones and tablets. The theory was that these devices would offer much longer battery life, the trade-off being you couldn't run most of the traditional Windows apps that are coded to work with Intel/AMD's x86 processors.

Windows RT turned out to be as successful as Bill Oddie's swimsuit calendar (don't Google it). The poor chumps who bought an RT device quickly discovered they had a Windows PC that couldn't run Windows apps and promptly took it back in their droves. Return rates went through the roof and

RT was quietly taken out the back and shot, never to be seen again.

Never one to be disheartened by an outright disaster, Microsoft is now having another stab in the form of the Surface Pro X. Once again, it's a foldy

tablet-cum-laptop thing that looks absolutely lovely although I've always had my doubts about that clip-on keyboard. which never sits comfortably when

you're typing on your lap.

This is a Windows 10 Home device, not Windows RT, but it's saddled with the same dirty secret - it's using an ARM-compatible processor, which means it can't run many everyday Windows apps. If you look at Microsoft's website for the Surface Pro X (bit.ly/ surface489), you'll do well to notice it's anything but a regular Windows laptop. But there - midway down the page in a discreet grey box - is the small warning that "App compatibility may vary on a

Windows 10 ARM-based PC".

What does that mean in practice? Any app you wish to run on the Surface Pro X has to have been rewritten to run on 64-bit ARM processors. That essentially leaves you with a handful of apps,


> mainly ones that Microsoft makes itself, because few other developers can be bothered to go to the cost and complexity

of recompiling apps that are going to be used by 0.1% of their customer base.

So, Microsoft is working around this with an "emulation layer" - a piece of software that takes traditional Windows apps and translates them on the fly to run on the ARM processors. That may sound clever, but like someone translating a speech from French to English, it slows things down. That's just about acceptable when it's something simple like a web browser or word processor, but it falls apart at the seams when it comes to heavyweight apps such as Photoshop or 3D games, which - according to early reviews - are completely unusable on the Surface Pro X. Worse, if a Windows app is already 64-bit, as many are, Microsoft's emulator won't work at all.

So, once again, you've got a Windows device that won't run many Windows apps. That might just about be forgivable if this thing cost around £400, the price of a similarly hobbled Chromebook. But it starts at £999, going all the way up beyond £1,800 for the top-of-the-range spec.

I'll bet my right ARM they'll be filling skips with all the returned Surface Pro X devices once buyers work out they've been hoodwinked again.
