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
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
De-Google your life in 2020





on a cross-country trip, detail a multiple stadium tour or explore a particular style of local architecture. In all cases, you start by clicking the Projects button in the left-hand menu before selecting New Project and searching for places to add. You can then create titles, add media and use the 3D view by tilting the map and selecting Capture.

All the projects can be titled and described. They can also be previewed by clicking Present and shared with others. Projects are viewable via the iOS and Android app, and there are options for co-authoring and collaboration, too.

When you're in a foreign country and you need to get your bearings, asking somebody for directions can be intimidating if you don't speak the

Google's Duplex technology will enter your contact details and payment information, and have you enjoying the latest blockbuster in no time.

Hackers reactivate and steal cancelled Netflix accounts

What happened?

The last thing you want to worry about when you relax in front of your TV is hackers, but Netflix has raised concerns about how it stores details of closed accounts, while a new phishing scam has cropped up that uses the streaming service as bait.

On the first front, BBC Radio 4 discovered that even if you cancel your Netflix subscription, your account lives on – and hackers have figured out a way to reactivate those accounts, so they can steal former users' login details and other private data.

This is made possible because Netflix holds on to your user profile data, including billing details, for as long as 10 months. The idea is that if you decide you miss the streaming service, it's easy to rejoin because your details remain on the system. However, that means it's possible for hackers to crack open those dormant accounts to steal the data.

Clearly, if hackers can steal data from a closed account, they can also access an active one but, in this case, the criminals appear to be specifically targeting cancelled accounts, reactivating them and selling the details on the black market for much less than the cost of a real Netflix subscription.

Meanwhile, another phishing scam has been spotted misusing the Netflix brand to trick streaming viewers (bit.ly/netflixscam490). In this latest example, scam emails try to panic recipients by claiming their payments are overdue and their accounts suspended. While

the phishing emails are littered with spelling mistakes, it's easy to be fooled by the logo.

Victims who click the dodgy email's link to "restart" their Netflix service are taken to a page that looks like a Netflix login but is, in fact, run by criminals. Enter your username and password, and they now have all they need to steal your Netflix account. Continue by filling in your billing info and they'll have your card details, too. The best advice to avoid such scams is to always to head directly to Netflix, rather than clicking the link in the email: follow that rule and you won't be caught out by this trick.

How will it affect you?

If you've spotted odd activity on your Netflix account, always report it to the streaming service. And if you're deactivating your subscription, first delete any billing information from your account; Netflix says it will delete your whole account fully if requested to do so via email.

This incident highlights why it's wise to look over your bank or credit card statements regularly, so you can spot suspicious charges, such as a new Netflix subscription when you've quit the service. It also highlights why it's best not to use the same or similar login details across different sites. If one is breached, those details could be

floating around the web for sale to hackers – and while you may be vigilant enough to regularly change login details for active accounts, you might easily overlook that Netflix account you deactivated months ago.

With regards to phishing, if a deal seems too good to be true, it is. And if you aren't sure, don't click a link in an email – instead, go directly to the source. That's good advice regardless of the brand – Netflix or otherwise – being misused by phishing criminals.

What do we think?

If a customer asks for an account to be deactivated, then it should be. There's no reason for a company of any kind to continue to hold our data after we've quit its services. If someone decides they miss the service enough, they'll happily retype their billing details to regain access. Netflix should have warned anyone leaving the service that it would be holding on to their data for 10 months unless specifically instructed otherwise.

Of course, Netflix is far from the only company to do this – just because you delete your profile or end a subscription, it doesn't mean the data collection stops. But it should, and we'd like to see companies being more honest about what happens to our personal information once we depart a service.

Tim Berners-Lee unveils plan to save the web

What happened?

The British creator of the web, Sir Tim Berners-Lee, has unveiled a global plan to target online problems including fake news, privacy invasion, political propaganda and more.

Dubbed the 'Contract for the Web', the plan was developed over the course of a year by more than 80 related organisations, and is backed by 150 in total so far. The aim is for the contract to be endorsed by companies, governments and web users, with each group given three principles to adhere to. Those who endorse the contract but fall short of following its guidelines will be publicly removed from the list. Amazon hasn't

signed it at the time of writing.

How will it affect you?

You can endorse the Contract for the Web at bit.ly/contract490. For individuals, that means abiding by three principles: use the web to create and collaborate; build strong communities that respect civil discourse and human dignity; and fight for the web, by creating awareness among your friends and family of the threats it faces and by supporting companies and politicians who are good web citizens.

The contract also calls for companies to respect and protect users' privacy and data, and to develop technologies that support the best in humanity while challenging the worst. Governments are asked to ensure that everyone can connect to the internet, and that it's

kept available at all times.

What do we think?

Sir Tim is an important voice on these issues, but he alone can't bring to heel tech giants such as Google or Facebook, let alone surveillance-obsessed governments like China – or, even, our own. His ideas are welcome and the principles in the contract are sound, but

these are companies that have already felt the weight of years of negative headlines and complaints from users – a slap on the wrist, such as being removed from Sir Tim's list of good web citizens, is hardly going to deter them. We need tougher regulation, not empty promises, no matter how well intentioned they are.



Twitter halts plans to delete inactive accounts

What happened?

Twitter announced plans to start deleting inactive accounts, so new users could take over profile names that are no longer - or have never been used. The news sparked a backlash after it was realised that the proposed deletions included accounts set up by people who are now deceased, so loved ones would no longer be able to read their messages. Twitter said the move was to comply with GDPR, the EU's regulation for data privacy.

Now, Twitter has said it will come up with a way to memorialise accounts – something Facebook already does – before it

How will it affect you?

If you haven't checked into your Twitter account for more than six months, you could risk losing it. Originally, the deadline to log back in and recover your account was 11 December, but that has been extended following the backlash.

If you want to memorialise an account, Twitter said it's working on a system to save messages posted by people who have passed away. The company hasn't said when this will be available, but it won't delete those accounts until that system is up and running.

The account removals will start in the EU, which Twitter pins on GDPR, though it isn't clear under which aspect of the legislation.

What do we think?

Twitter apologised for not thinking this through but it's surprising no one at the company realised the impact of mass account deletions. You'd think any social-media company would only make such a decision after asking its users first. Did none of the engineers working on this problem consider that people like to go back and read messages from lost loved ones - not least when Facebook has long offered memorialised accounts? It just shows how out of touch some big tech companies are.

Uber loses licence to operate in London

What happened?

The 3.5million Londoners who rely on Uber to get around may not realise it, but the cut-price taxi company's position in the city has long been a precarious one. Uber originally lost its licence back in 2017 and, since then, it has only been able to stay on the streets thanks to two extensions. The most recent ran out on 25 November, after Transport for London (TFL) declared that Uber had not done enough to improve standards and therefore its licence would not be renewed.

TFL is mainly concerned about passenger safety, having found that unauthorised and unlicensed drivers continued to work for Uber by illicitly using other drivers' accounts. There may have been as many of 14,000 of these fraudulent trips since late 2018. And it gets worse: some of the fraudulent drivers were people who had previously had their licences revoked for misconduct.

How will it affect you?

This isn't the end of the road for Uber if you're a Londoner who uses the app, you may already have received a phone notification letting you know that the service is still in operation. Unsurprisingly, the company has decided to appeal the decision - a

- Uber Eats is regulated separately and isn't affected by this decision.

during which Uber will continue to operate throughout the capital.

But is it safe? That's really down to individual discretion - while the issues highlighted by TFL are worrying, they only affect a small minority of the services overall rides. And, of course, there is always the chance that a traditional black cab could be driven by an unlicensed driver. It's fair to say that Uber is likely to be safe most of the time but you need to be aware of the potential problems.

If you use the service outside London, this doesn't affect you. And if you're more interested in tasty treats than cheap journeys, there's no need to worry

What do we think?

Nobody should get in a car with an uninsured driver, and it's Uber's responsibility to make sure this doesn't happen on their platform. That being said, we also believe that more consumer choice is a good thing, and the service offered by Uber's many legitimate drivers is unparallelled. Although the licence should be revoked if the service isn't safe, we hope that Uber will make the required improvements so customers can continue to enjoy the service.

Beyond Apple Watch and Fitbit, the wearable market has been thin on products of late, so we're pleased to see Huawei-owned Honor step up with an updated version of its excellent, ultra-thin Magic Watch.

The Honor Magic Watch 2 offers both a 42mm and 46mm version each featuring an always-on AMOLED display of 1.2in or 1.39in, depending on the model. Colours remain sharp, even outdoors, and it claims to let you add your own photos as a background, although we couldn't actually find a way to do this so the function may be planned for a future patch.

In every sense, this feels like a watch that's learnt from the mistakes of previous wearables. The only area

that needs work is the need to download MP3s via the Magic Watch 2 app - an antiquated process in this age of streaming media.

Size isn't the only difference between the two models. One of the core problems with most wearables is that, like your phone, they need to be charged every night, but

The 0.9mm-thick timepiece runs on Huawei's proprietary operating system and includes 4GB of storage, Bluetooth calling and impressively loud speakers. There are 15 different fitness modes to help you track, monitor and manage

Is Amazon launching a game-streaming service?


Game streaming looks set to be the next big thing in online entertainment. Google recently launched its Stadia service to mixed reviews, and Microsoft and Sony have confirmed streaming services are on the way.

Now, according to a new report, Amazon is primed to join them next year.
Rumours have long been

circulating that the online shopping giant has its eye on game streaming. Those in the know suggest the company has quietly been recruiting people from the games industry to fill new roles within Amazon Web Services, which sources say is involved in developing game-streaming technology.

According to one job ad, Amazon says it wants to "drive innovative new use cases like machine vision and game streaming". Another claimed: "We believe the evolution that began with arcade communities... growing to the live streams and e-sports of today, will continue to a future where everyone is a gamer and every gamer can create, compete, collaborate and connect with others at massive scales".

It's believed that the service will be delivered through the Amazon-owned Twitch, where gamers broadcast gaming sessions to millions of viewers. Like Google and Microsoft, Amazon already has much of the infrastructure in place, with servers located around the globe.



The benefits of game-streaming are clear: no need to buy prohibitively expensive consoles or update games before you can play them – so long as you have a decent internet connection, of course.



Security flaw found in Android camera

A vulnerability affecting Google and Samsung smartphones could allow hackers to



remotely spy on users through their phone's camera and speakers, according to researchers at security firm Checkmarx.

The team uncovered a way for attackers to take photos and videos, record phone conversations, identify users' locations and more. All this could be done covertly, the researchers said, even when the phone was locked. The loophole, which stemmed from permission-bypass issues, could have left hundreds of thousands of Android users open to spying.

Checkmarx submitted its vulnerability report to Google's

Android security team on 4 July and, on 29 August, Samsung confirmed that the vulnerability also affected its devices. "We appreciate Checkmarx bringing this to our attention and working with Google and Android partners to coordinate disclosure," said a Google spokesperson. "The issue was addressed on impacted Google devices via a Play store update to the Google Camera application in July 2019. A patch has also been made available to all partners." bit.ly/camera490

Disney Plus users targeted by hackers

Hackers reportedly hijacked thousands of Disney Plus accounts just



hours after the service launched in the US on 12 November (see FAQ on page 38). An investigation by tech-news site ZDNet found login details for many of the hacked accounts available for sale

and for free on hacking forums.

Disney Plus attracted 10 million customers in its first 24 hours, with the volume of traffic leading to several technical problems. Amid the flood of complaints, some users reported a total loss of access to their accounts, describing attacks in which hackers logged them out on every device and changed their email addresses and passwords.

Some users had reused passwords for their Disney Plus accounts, meaning hackers could have used details harvested from other security breaches. Others, however, used unique passwords, suggesting credentials were obtained through data-stealing malware.

Rival streaming services have been exploited in the same way, with Amazon Prime, Netflix and Hulu accounts frequently traded on hacking forums.





Aside from sporting the division's new logo, this revamped website takes a look back at its history, following a timeline from the late 1940s to the present day and peppering key events with lots of great archive photos. It also gives visitors a glimpse behind the scenes using a series of images, and lets you learn about the worldwide projects the company is involved with. It's a fun way to see how new Disney rides and fantasy lands are created by a very talented team, although it is a tad self-congratulatory.



We test and compare the latest products

Amazon Echo Studio

The Echo Studio smart speaker offers unique features and a powerful sound that belies its relatively small size

here's no doubting the usefulness of Amazon's existing range of smart speakers but, so far, they haven't been the best for listening to music. Compared to the Apple HomePod, for example, which focuses more on the speaker element than the smart artificial intelligence, the sound quality of Amazon's speakers has been disappointing.

The Echo Studio addresses this. It's nearly £100 cheaper than the £279 HomePod and, while it still can't match the superior audio, it delivers a bigger and more immersive sound than any Echo speaker to date, while offering many features that Apple's device is crying out for.

Build and functionality

As with any Echo speaker, the Studio is powered by Amazon's Alexa smart assistant and is controlled primarily by issuing voice commands. As well as using it to stream music from Spotify, Amazon Music and Apple Music, you can ask it to play audiobooks and radio, set timers and reminders, and call friends and family.

It's also aimed at people who might want to upgrade their TV audio. It connects wirelessly to both the Fire TV Stick 4K and Fire TV Cube,



and its 3.5mm jack doubles as a mini-optical connection, so you can hook it up to practically any TV. Failing that, you can connect it to anything else via Bluetooth.

As well as being compatible with a wide range of music formats, the Echo Studio can handle Dolby Atmos and Sony 360 Reality Audio for a kind of pseudo-surround sound. If you want even more volume and bass, it can be paired with a second Echo Studio and the Echo Sub.

The Echo Studio bears more than a slight resemblance to Apple's HomePod but it's considerably larger. Indeed,

No other smart speaker can compete with the Echo Studio for its combination of sound quality, features and connectivity

at 206 x 175mm, the Echo speaker is around 20% taller and 25% wider.

As with other Echo speakers, you can control it using voice commands, but the device also has an array of buttons around the top that let you change the volume, mute the microphone and give commands without needing to say the "Alexa" wake word.

Surrounding these is a multi-colour LED ring that indicates when the speaker is responding to requests and alerts you about messages





and notifications, among other things. On the rear of the device, flanking the power port, there's the 3.5mm jack.

Sound quality

One of the Echo Studio's key functions is that it can be used as a TV speaker as we've already mentioned, but it's worth pointing out that the device doesn't come with a remote control. This means that the only way to adjust the volume when it's connected via the optical input is to ask Alexa to do it, or walk up to it and use the physical controls. You can't even use the volume control in the Alexa app, although oddly - this option is available for streaming music.

This becomes a serious drawback when you're engrossed in a movie because Alexa momentarily mutes the audio to listen to commands, so using voice control to turn the volume up or down will interrupt the audio.

Elsewhere, the Echo Studio works just like any other Echo speaker. Setup is quick and easy via the Alexa app and lets you manage connected Bluetooth devices, customise alarm sounds and set up speaker groups for multiroom audio.

Irrespective of what you're playing, however, the Echo Studio still falls short on sound quality. Music is a bit boomy compared to Apple's HomePod and, when stood next to a set of £160 Dali Zensor 1 bookshelf speakers, it sounds a little muffled and lacks crispness, even if you

boost the mids and treble using the Amazon Alexa mobile app.

Where the Echo Studio does emphatically deliver, however, is in the sheer scale of the sound that it generates. The sound from most smart speakers quickly degenerates if you crank up the volume but, if anything, Amazon's new speaker sounds more impressive when played loud. If you want a single smart speaker that can easily fill a larger living room, the Echo Studio is in a league of its own and, if you're a fan of boosting the bass, it is, without doubt, the best option available at this price.

As a TV speaker, it suffers from the same problems as when streaming music. Watching a BBC wildlife documentary, we found we had to crank up the midrange frequencies as far as the Alexa app would let us to make the narration clear enough for our taste.

However, the scale of the sound was again impressive, and you get considerably more depth and presence than you would from most built-in TV speakers. On the other hand, if you're used to having your TV audio delivered via a soundbar across the bottom of your TV, a single Echo Studio may be a less attractive option because you'll have to get used to the sound coming from a single source on either the left or right of the screen.

It's also worth pointing out that although the Echo Studio pairs with the Amazon Fire TV Stick 4K and Fire TV Cube, this is only possible via Bluetooth and, when connected in this way, it only receives a stereo signal. Connecting the speaker to your TV via an optical cable is the only way to ensure 5.1 surround sound. Overall, it's a decent upgrade on your TV's speakers, but don't expect miracles.

OUR VERDICT

At £190, there's no other smart speaker on the market that can compete with the Echo Studio for its combination of sound quality, features and connectivity. As well as offering all the Alexasmarts you normally get from an Echo device, it delivers a powerful sound and can double up as a TV speaker, which puts it in a category of its own.

Cosmo Communicator


A new Android phone that channels the spirit of the Psion Series 5 PDA

f you're still mourning the loss of the much loved Psion Series 5 PDA (personal digital assistant), which launched in the Nineties, the Cosmo Communicator may bring a tear of nostalgia to your eye. This folding screen and keyboard combo looks like something from a bygone era, but as anyone who had one will tell you, the Psion Series 5 was a British design classic that's worth revisiting.

The Psion 5 wasn't a phone, it was a mini computer, but the Communicator has brought phone functionality to its redesign. It lets you make calls when folded closed, displaying a small screen that's good enough to show the first few lines of an email. Like most premium phones, it has a fingerprint reader for unlocking the device and a 24-megapixel camera.

Unfolding the device unleashes its killer feature: the keyboard. If you're a whizz with an onscreen keyboard, you may turn your nose up at something as archaic as a physical keyboard, but this is a vastly superior device to type on. Designed with the help of Martin Riddiford, who designed the original Psion Series 5 keyboard, this gets close to recreating the brilliance of the original. You won't find yourself typing as quickly as you might on a full-sized computer keyboard, but it's not far off.

The device runs Android but has a few apps of its own, specifically designed to take advantage of the keyboard and the Communicator's landscape screen. Chief among these is Agenda, which emulates Psion's old calendar but updated to sync with Google Calendar. There are also notepads, email software and other tools. However, it's worth checking whether your favourite Android apps work well in landscape mode on your existing device before committing to the Communicator, because not all of them do.



The screen is a 6in IPS display, with a resolution of 2,160 x 1,080 pixels. It's fine, but it doesn't rival the screens we've come to expect on similarly priced top-of-therange smartphones. The same can be said of the external camera, which lags behind the quality of the best phone cameras. There are no fancy extras – no optical zoom or

video stabilisation – but it can use HDR (High Dynamic Range) to capture highcontrast shots.

Because this is a niche device, not really targeted at the regular phone consumer, it's expensive. However, if it stops you needing a laptop or Chromebook to go alongside a traditional smartphone, you could still be quids-in.







Genealogy services such as Ancestry.co.uk can help with the research and let you build a tree from scratch, but if you want a more powerful offline solution, then look no further than My Family Tree.

Although this free software doesn't have any tools for researching your history (you'll have to look elsewhere for that), you can use it to build your tree for free and flag up possible errors, such as having marriages occurring





after deaths.



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
CHROME

Check if articles were written by robots

We live in an age increasingly dominated by artificial intelligence. But while 'deepfake' videos and photoshopped images get a lot of attention in the media, the proliferation of Al-generated articles doesn't.

The new Chrome extension GPTrue or False (bit.ly/ true490) helps you find out whether what you're reading was created by a bot - or not. If you're suspicious or curious about whether a human wrote what you're reading, highlight at least 50 words of the article, activate the extension and click Evaluate. After a brief moment, results are displayed at the foot of your selected text detailing the percentage chance that the copy was created by a human or Al. You'll also see how many factors (or 'tokens') were taken into consideration when assessing the article.


It's a handy tool to have at a time when bot-farms are churning out fake news designed to confuse, confound and conspire.



Add search functions to bookmarked tweets

Despite being one of the most popular social-media sites in the world, Twitter has a number of frustrating issues, such as refreshing the page while you're still scrolling through your timeline and the lack of a search box for your bookmarked tweets. Instead of scrolling through them all until you find the tweet you want, install Twitter Bookmarks Search.

With the extension added to Chrome (bit.ly/twitter490) or Firefox (bit.ly/ twitfire490), head over to Twitter and into the Bookmarks tab. Now, lingering above all those bookmarked tweets is a search bar that will scour those tweets you swore you'd come back to at a later date. Results are returned quickly and accurately, though you can only search for single words, rather than phrases.





Turn on reader mode for any web page

Reader Mode (bit.ly/reader490) is a great new browser tool if you're seeking a distraction-free browsing session. Because who wants adverts and design elements taking attention from the articles while you read?

Most browsers feature some form of reading mode but they don't work on every web page. Reader Mode solves this problem and also offers an

> impressive array of customisation options, including changing the font type, colour and size; turning off images (for a truly book-like browse) and adding an estimated reading time to articles. You can also add your own custom CSS to the page, switch to text-tospeech and activate dyslexia ruler for even more accessibility.

Hide 'likes' across social media

Be honest, do you really care what people on Facebook and Twitter think? It sometimes feels like, for some people, social media is not so much an opportunity to share experiences but a competition to get more 'likes' than anyone else.

Hide Likes Everywhere (bit.ly/ likes490) puts an end to that - at least for you. This browser tool does exactly what it claims: removes likes, dislikes and comment counts from your feeds. As a result, you can stop worrying about what everyone else thinks and their obsession with online validation, and concentrate on the content itself. The tool is compatible with Facebook, YouTube, Twitter, Reddit and Instagram.

FIREFOX

Hide cookie notifications on websites

Cookie notifications have become one of the internet's biggest bugbears. While they may be required by EU law, we'd like to think most people already know about cookies and why sites collect them. Or, more likely, they blindly click Accept just to access a website.

Cookies Notification Hider (bit.ly/ cookie490) does what it says on the tin by hiding those notifications for good. When you visit a page, the add-on quickly scours the site and,



when the offending notification appears, intervenes and hides it just before the notice has a chance to demand you accept or click Got It.

It won't work on every website, so you may still have to click Accept (and emit a deep sigh as you do so), but we found it usually did its job, getting to the content faster and saving a wasted click.

Block YouTube's recommended channels

YouTube has a nasty habit of throwing up recommended channels and suggested videos that superficially may be right up your alley, but frequently aren't. For example, watch just one video about that new laptop you're considering buying and, for the rest of time, YouTube will push for you to watch a hundred more reviews of the same device.

By adding 'X's alongside every video and channel, Channel Blocker (bit.ly/ blocker490) makes it incredibly easy to block these suggestions for good. With one click, you'll banish them to the add-on's blocked list, where they'll never bother you again.



Additionally, you can head into Channel Blocker's configuration settings and manually add channels, video titles and comments. This requires a little extra know-how, though.

Access an entire library

As society seemingly abandons text in favour of emoji, memes and GIFs, it

can be useful to have these on hand. After all, who has time to search



for a specific visual representation that adequately expresses our deepest thoughts?

In such cases, Jiff GIF (bit.ly/gif490) is ideal. Click the add-on's toolbar button to search through thousands of GIFs. Select one and you'll be given three options: copy URL, copy GitHub markdown and save to disk. In most instances, copying the URL and pasting it will suffice, although saving to disk is ideal if you find yourself repeatedly deploying the same GIF on multiple social-media threads and emails.


The library is extensive, drawing on multiple GIF catalogues, so there's one for every moment. You can also toggle on Dark Mode when you first open the add-on.

OTHER BROWSERS



As the full release of Edge Chromium nears, Microsoft has been beavering away on arguably one of the most important tools: importing your

data from Google Chrome. There are two ways to access this option either go to Settings, Profiles, 'Import



browser data'; or jump straight to it via edge://settings/ importData. Select Google Chrome from the drop-down menu, then choose your Chrome profile and which data you'd like to import. This doesn't just include the standard bookmarks and passwords - you can even bring over all your open tabs.

Monitor unread emails in Gmail

Badge Checker for Gmail (bit.ly/badge490) is a useful tool when you need to keep an eye on your inbox but don't want to keep your Gmail open. To save you jumping between tabs or repeatedly logging in, this add-on puts an icon on your toolbar with a badge count of unread emails. Once you're logged in, you don't even need to keep Gmail open in a tab. Clicking the browser tool whisks you to your Gmail account, then right-clicking it and selecting Options lets you tweak how often the count is updated, how many Gmail accounts to track and your primary account.

If you're fed up with targeted adverts and data-grabbing trackers following you around the web, then one solution is to install an ad blocker. Or you could opt for the new mobile version of Brave, the privacy-focused web browser, which has its very own built-in ad blocker that's switched on by default.

Based on Chrome, Brave feels instantly familiar and

offers all the features you need, including bookmarks and a basic password manager. Additional privacy options include HTTPS Everywhere and the ability to set DuckDuckGo as your default search engine.


Brave is lightweight and thrifty in its use of resources partly because it avoids loading a bunch of ads every time you visit a web page. The app's developers claim the browser consumes less data and less battery power than many of its rivals.

One of the browser's quirkier features is Brave Rewards - a system that lets you earn frequent flier-like tokens for

> viewing privacy-respecting adverts from trusted sources. Currently, you can only use these tokens to support certain websites but the idea is that, eventually, you'll be able to redeem them in the form of content and gift vouchers. Read more about Brave Rewards at brave.com/brave-rewards.

The new desktop version of Brave (brave.com), which we'll be taking a closer look at next issue, offers some useful additional features, including a genuinely private browsing mode that lets you open a new tab that uses Tor to mask your location and hide your browsing activity. This feature isn't yet available on the

mobile version but Brave promises it's on its way - meaning this already brilliant browser could soon be even better.







Disney Plus

There's another streaming service on its way, and it's more than just a Mickey Mouse offering. David Crookes explains all

What is it?

Disney Plus, or Disney+ as it is styled (preview.disneyplus.com/uk), is a new TV and film streaming service launched by the 'House of Mouse'. It is set to be a major rival to Netflix, providing an exclusive mix of new and classic movies and shows from the many Disney-owned entertainment studios, which include Marvel, Fox, Pixar and LucasFilm.

So another subscription to pay?

Afraid so. If you're a fan of Disney's movies and television shows, then you're going to have little choice but to fork out. The company has been pulling its content from rival streaming services

such as Netflix and Amazon Prime Video to ensure Disney Plus becomes the only place you can see them. The Marvel Originals shows for Netflix have already been canned, for instance, and Disney hasn't allowed its rivals to show last year's film releases.

What are the main attractions?

The service has more than 620 series including, in the US, all 30 seasons of The Simpsons, which Disney acquired when it snapped up Fox. Disney Plus is also the

new home of Star Wars, with the franchise's first ever live-action series, The Mandalorian, already proving a primary attraction (bit.ly/ mand490). Other launch shows include High School Musical: The Musical and Gravity Falls. There's also a six-episode documentary series about Disney theme parks called

The Imagineering Story.

Are there some great films, too?

Yes, indeed. Disney Plus has about 500 films, including Avatar (which is making

Revisit classic Disney titles such as its very first film Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs

its streaming debut), The Lion King, Who Framed Roger Rabbit?, The Muppet Christmas Carol and most of the Marvel Cinematic Universe films. All the Pixar movies and short films are on there, as is a new live action Lady And The *Tramp.* The first six Star Wars movies are available too, along with *The Force* Awakens. It is the first time the original trilogy has been made available in 4K HDR.

If you're more a fan of the classic Disney era, you can revisit all your favourites, including Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, Pinocchio, Bambi, Mary Poppins, The Jungle Book and many more. See the full list at bit.ly/ disneylist490.

What TV shows are planned for the future?

Star Wars: The Clone Wars is making a move to the service with 12 new episodes, and there's a show about Obi-Wan Kenobi in the planning stages, together with a prequel to Rogue One: A Star Wars Story (are you sensing a theme?). New Marvel shows will also be unveiled and it is said fans will need to watch them if they want to keep in the loop about plotlines for forthcoming Marvel films. One of the shows will include the Marvel character Loki and debut in 2021.

Disney also owns National Geographic so you can stream documentaries such as Gordon Ramsey Uncharted, Life below Zero and Brain Games, as well as brand new content including The World According to Jeff Goldblum.

So, how do I watch these shows?

Disney Plus is available as an app for Roku devices, Amazon Fire, Chromecast, PS4, Xbox One, iPhone, iPad, Apple TV, Android and Chromebooks, which means it can be watched on a television, laptop, tablet or phone. Shows and films can be streamed but you can also enjoy unlimited downloads if you want to watch content offline later when you don't have any internet access or can only get a poor signal.


Sounds great. How do I sign up?

Sadly, you'll have to wait. Although the service has launched in the US, Canada, Netherlands, Australia and New Zealand (and attracted 10 million subscribers already), it's not going to hit the UK until 31 March. This is probably because of the current deals Disney has with UK services. Sky, for instance, has a contract with Disney for its films and television shows, and there is even a dedicated Sky Cinema Disney channel. This is likely to be scrapped when the contract runs out in 2020. Sky also has a deal for Fox movies and, again, this will be coming to an end.

If you need a Disney fix now, you can check out DisneyLife (disneylife.com/uk) for £4.99 per month, which has more than 450 movies and 5,000 box set episodes.

How much is Disney charging?

In the US, subscribers are being asked to pay just \$6.99 per month or \$69.99 per year, which is - deliberately, we assume -\$2 cheaper than the bottom-tier Netflix price. This ploy will likely be replicated in the UK so we'd expect it to cost no more than £6.99 here. Whether we'll get the exact same content as elsewhere is

unknown at this stage but we should at least get to see all the Disney Plus Originals.

The good news is that Disney Plus subscriptions let you stream on up to four devices at the same time. As a bonus, the service is not charging extra for 4K HDR (although not all shows will be available in this format) and it also supports Dolby Atmos and Dolby Vision, which is great for anyone with compatible equipment. It requires 5Mbps broadband for HD content and 25Mbps for 4K UHD.

What next for Netflix and Amazon Prime Video?


These streaming services are likely to rely more and more on original series. Netflix, for instance, is losing *Friends* to the new WarnerMedia streaming service HBO Max but homegrown series such as Stranger Things remain hugely popular. Licensed content makes up two-thirds of Netflix's offering, however, which will be of concern. Amazon Prime Video, meanwhile, is hoping for big returns on a new \$250m Lord of the Rings series and a Premier League deal that will see 20 football matches being broadcast live this month.

CAN I WATCH DISNEY PLUS USING A VPN?

Yes and no. Certainly, you can use a virtual private network to get a US, Canadian, Netherlands, Australian or New Zealand IP address that will let you watch shows. But you'll need more than a VPN alone.

Disney Plus won't accept a UK payment method or address, for example, so you'll need some other way of subscribing to the service. One way is to get a friend in a Disney Plus country to pay on your behalf or get a US debit card from TransferWise (transferwise.com).

Another option is to try using a US Apple ID with an American iTunes account and make the payment using a US App Store gift card to get your subscription up and running. But be warned that such methods breach Disney Plus's terms and conditions, so your efforts could ultimately

Why not start 2020 by reclaiming your privacy and switching to web services that don't guzzle your data? Wayne Williams explains how to de-Google your life

















ike alcohol, sugar and anything else we indulge in even though we know it's bad for us, Google is a hard habit to break. While it's true that most of its products and services are great quality, easy to use and free, we're also well aware of its dubious privacy policies, bullying business practices and voracious desire to control all of our data, all of the time.

So why not make a New Year's resolution to try something different?


The problem is how to give up Google when it's such an integral part of our lives. Sure, it's not going to be easy, but it is possible and, by doing so, you'll open up a whole new world of online freedom, where you're not constantly being tracked, monetised and tied into Google's ecosystem.

In this feature, we explain how you can de-Google your life and reclaim your privacy in 2020 without missing out on the best bits of the web. Rather than just pick obvious alternatives to Google's tools from other big tech companies such as Microsoft and Apple, we've recommended options that you may not be familiar with.

RECLAIM YOUR DATA FROM GOOGLE

efore you make the switch from Google to less nosy alternatives, you should make sure you have a copy of all your data that is currently stored by Google, both for reference and also to import into other services, where possible.

Fortunately, Google makes it easy to export all the data it has gathered about you over the years, by using its Takeout service. Make sure you're logged into your Google account, then go to the Takeout page (takeout.google.com). By default, all the services offered by Google will be selected, but you probably won't want to download every




Google's Takeout service lets you download all your data from the company

single piece of archived data, especially because that will include services you don't recall using – such as Crisis User Reports, Google Help Communities and Google Input Tools. So, with this in mind, click the 'Deselect all' link.

Next, scroll down the list and select all the important services that you've used at some point – such as Bookmarks, Calendar, Chrome, Contacts, Drive, Google Photos, Mail and Maps. Click the Format button under an item to change the type of format that the data should be saved in (if it offers a choice). For items such as Mail, you can also specify which data categories should be included if you don't want to bother with, say, your Archive folder.

Scroll to the bottom and click the 'Next step' button. From here, you can choose a data-delivery method (a link via email or adding it to Drive, Dropbox, OneDrive or Box) and the archive

format to save the data in. This is ZIP by default. Click 'Create archive' to export your content. Data downloaded in this way can be browsed, but not restored or imported into a new Google account.

Alternative browsers to Chrome usually offer to import passwords and bookmarks when you first run them, and there should also be an option to do this somewhere in the browser. In Vivaldi, for example, click the V button, then go to File, Import Bookmarks and Settings. Select Chrome in the drop-down menu and you'll be able to import Bookmarks, Passwords and History. In Firefox, click the Library button on the toolbar, then click Bookmarks, 'Show all Bookmarks', 'Import and Backup' and choose 'Import Data from Another Browser'.

Finally, if you want to delete all the data Google has stored on you, go to your My Activity page at bit.ly/activity490 and choose what to scrub. Click the three dots to the right of the search box and select 'Delete activity by' to remove everything.

DELETE YOUR GOOGLE ACCOUNT

Quitting Google forever is a big step and not for the faint-hearted. Once you've deleted your account, there's no going back (although you can of course create a new account and start afresh). This is definitely not something you should jump into lightly – there's no reason why you can't keep your existing Google account but just not use it. You can also use Google services such as Search and YouTube without logging in, although certain features are restricted if you don't allow 'personalisation'.

If you're absolutely sure you're ready to ditch Google, and have backed up all your data and chosen Delete your Google

your alternative services, then deleting your account is actually very easy.
Simply go to your account page
(myaccount.google.com) and click
'Data & personalisation' in the left-hand panel, then scroll down to 'Download,

delete or make a plan for your data' and click 'Delete a service or your account'. Finally, click 'Delete your account' and say goodbye to Google.

If you change your mind within two days of deletion, there is a chance you can get back your Google

account by going to the 'Account recovery' page (bit.ly/recovery490). Enter the email address or phone number associated with the account that was deleted, then click 'Attempt to restore this account'.


SWITCH TO ALTERNATIVE TOOLS

GMAIL There are plenty of obvious replacements for Gmail, such as Outlook.com (outlook.com) and the recently redesigned Yahoo Mail (uk.mail .yahoo.com). If you'd prefer to avoid the bigger tech companies, then the open-source ProtonMail (protonmail .com) is the ideal solution. It looks not unlike Gmail - so you won't have to spend ages learning how to

use it – and it's available for the web, Android and iOS.

ProtonMail is based in Switzerland, and its focus is very much on privacy. It offers end-to-end encryption and you don't need to provide any personal information to create an account. However, there are some limitations with the free version to be aware of, including a cap of 150 messages per day, a maximum of three folders/labels, and just 500MB of online storage. Upgrading to the Plus plan for €48 (£40.48) a year gives you 5GB of storage, 1,000 messages per day and 200 folders/labels. See our workshop on page 54 to find out how to use ProtonMail.

Tutanota (tutanota.com) is another open-source solution which also provides secure email, offering end-to-end encryption and two-factor authentication (2FA), so that nobody can read the content of your messages. The free version gives you 1GB of storage and upgrading to Pro for €60 (£50.60) a year increases this to 10GB and unlocks useful features

including 20 email aliases, and a custom logo and colours.

SEARCH
Google is the most popular
search engine in the world (as of July
2019, it had an 88.61% market share) for
a good reason: it does a fantastic job of

finding the sites you're looking for.
Rivals, such as Bing (4.98%) seem very poor in comparison and, anyway,
Microsoft also tracks and collects your search data. However, it's possible to enjoy the quality of Google's results without going through its search site.

StartPage (www.startpage.com) sources its results from Google, but removes all trackers and logs, so your searches remain anonymous. System1/ Privacy One Group recently made a significant investment in StartPage, but the company insists that nothing will be changing regarding user privacy (bit.ly/startp490) and it will remain headquartered in the Netherlands. There's also the brilliant DuckDuckGo


(duckduckgo.com), which doesn't track you, store your searches or share any of your personal information.

Another option is Qwant (qwant.com), an excellent European search engine with a focus on privacy and neutrality – it doesn't store cookies, for example, or your search history. Its results come from Bing, but are bolstered with ones sourced using its own web crawlers. Android and iOS users can download the Qwant mobile app (bit.ly/qwantmobile490), while younger web users (aged 6-14) can use Qwant Junior.

DOCS/DRIVE

Swapping Google's cloudstorage service Drive for an alternative isn't difficult because there are plenty of options to choose from, such as Dropbox and Box. However, those don't come with the online office components found in Docs. NextCloud (nextcloud .com) is a better alternative - a free, open-source service that lets you store photos, videos, documents, calendar, contacts and more via either one of the recommended providers or on a server at home. You can add online office components such as Collabora Online (nextcloud.com/collaboraonline), a LibreOffice-based suite with collaborative editing, and Onlyoffice (nextcloud.com/onlyoffice), which offers full support for Microsoft Office formats such as DOCX and PPTX.

Another option is CryptPad (cryptpad.fr), which has its own office applications – including a rich text editor, spreadsheet and presentation creator – alongside encrypted storage. You can use the service for free as an anonymous user, which gives you access to all the main applications and limited access to CryptDrive storage.

MAPS

Google Maps is unquestionably a fantastic service - you can discover what an area looks like in real life, thanks to Street View; get turn-by-turn directions when you're out and about; and see alternative routes when roads are closed or traffic gets too heavy. If you've ever wondered how Google knows what the traffic situation is where you are, the answer is it records the location and speed of all users of its app (even if they aren't actively using it). And yes, that includes you.

For that reason alone, it's worth switching to an alternative service such as Open Street Map (www .openstreetmap.org). This is created and updated by ordinary would-be cartographers - and lets you make your own contributions if you want - and provides directions from one place to another by car, bicycle or on foot. OpenStreetMap is open data, which means you can use it in any way you like, provided you credit OpenStreetMap. You can also download a number of third-party apps that use its information.

For example, OsmAnd (osmand.net) includes data from both OpenStreetMap and Wikipedia, and is available for Android and iOS. It works totally offline, and includes turn-by-turn voice guidance. If you want additional features, such as frequent map updates and unlimited downloads, you can pay for a subscription, which costs €7.99 (£6.74) a year and helps support the project.

Another option is WeGo Here (wego .here.com), which lets you browse maps on the web, get directions and view traffic information, and provides free

apps for Android and iOS. It has offline maps of the UK, US, Germany, France, Spain, Italy, Canada, Australia and more than 100 other countries, and public transit information for more than 1,300 cities including London, New York, Sydney, Paris, Berlin, Rome and Toronto.

PHOTOS

Google Photos lets you store your images in the cloud for easy access from anywhere and offers lots of useful tools, but it's hard to shake the creepy feeling that Google is analysing your pictures. On an iPhone or iPad, you can use iCloud instead, but there are other third-party solutions available, such as the open-source Piwigo (piwigo.org). With this service, you can store photos on your own web host for free or pay for Piwigo's own cloud storage, which costs from €39 (£32.87) a year. You get unlimited storage for your images, access to hundreds of plugins that add extra features and you can create a personalised photo library and share it with the world. There is a mobile app available, too, but it's iOS only (there are third-party clients available for Android, though).

Recall (app.recall.photos) is another open-source alternative to Google Photos. To use it, you need to create a

free account with Blockstack (blockstack.org) and can store your photos there, or choose a different storage provider. There's also an iOS app.

CALENDAR

Google Calendar makes it easy to keep track of even the busiest of lives, but Apple provides iPhone users with a calendar of their own, and there are alternative services such as Fruux (fruux.com) and Cozi (www.cozi.com)

available for all major platforms, including Windows, macOS, Linux, Android, iOS and the web. As well as calendars with multiple views, Fruux includes contacts and tasks tools, and its free version is available to

use on up to two devices.

Cozi is described as a simple family organiser for Android, iOS and the web. It includes to-do and shopping lists, and a family calendar that lets you set reminders, organise events and send agenda emails. There's a place to store

recipes and plan meals, along with a family journal. Cozi is ad-supported, but you can remove the ads and gain access to additional features, such as contacts and birthdays, by subscribing to Cozi Gold for \$29.99 (£22.84) a year. There's a 14-day free

trial available.





ALTERNATIVE TOOLS continued

YOUTUBE

YouTube is undoubtedly one of the hardest Google services to quit, because most of the videos you encounter on the web will be hosted there. Vimeo (vimeo.com) and Dailymotion (dailymotion.com) are the closest alternatives, but there are other lesser known services that are worth taking a look at. First up is BitTubers (bittubers.com), which is a new-ish social network aimed at content creators and streamers. It borrows a little from YouTube's design, and offers videos, live streams, images and audio categories. It works well, but it's lacking in content at the moment, and some of its top videos have less than a thousand views.

Invidious (invidio.us) is another option, and lack of content isn't an issue here because it serves as an alternative front-end for YouTube. In many ways, it's better than Google's own service because there are no ads to spoil your enjoyment of videos, comments are from Reddit rather than YouTube and it comes with a dark mode, the ability to adjust the speed of playback and an audio-only option. While you can browse the site and watch content from the likes of PewDiePie, h3h3Productions and Last Week Tonight with John Oliver, Invidious lets you watch everything

found on YouTube. All you have to do is swap the 'youtube.com' part of a video's address with 'invidio.us'. For example, to watch the new Sonic the Hedgehog trailer, instead of going to https://youtube.com/watch?v=szby7ZHLnkA, you enter https://invidio.us/watch?v=szby7ZHLnkA. Invidious usefully provides a link to the same video on YouTube, so you can switch to watching it on the source site, should you need to.

ANDROID

The obvious alternative to Google's Android operating system is Apple's iOS but, if you can't justify the cost of an iPhone, there are some other options available.

LineageOS (lineageos.org) is a free,

open-source operating system that's based on Android and is essentially a continuation of CyanogenMod, which shut down in 2016. It's available for a number of devices, from companies including Google, HTC, Huawei, Motorola, OnePlus, Samsung and Sony. When you click the download button, you'll be able to browse for your particular make and model to find the relevant option. Installation instructions are provided.

Another benefit of LineageOS – beyond removing your phone from Google's snooping ecosystem – is that it works on many older handsets. The OS is highly customisable, comes with open-source apps and provides tools to safeguard your privacy. As an alternative, there's /e/ (e.foundation), which is a fork of LineageOS with even more focus on privacy.

There are other, lesser-known operating systems to consider, such as Resurrection Remix OS (www .resurrectionremix.com), which has just released a version based on Android Pie, and the privacy-focused Replicant (replicant.us).

MIUI (en.miui.com) is an Androidbased OS with an always-on display and its own apps. It's fast, looks amazing and comes packed with features, but the one big downside is that it's only

STOP GOOGLE CONTROLLING THE WEB

AMP - or Accelerated Mobile Pages, to give it its full name - is an opensource Google project (amp.dev) that aims to speed up the web on mobile devices by reducing the amount of code used. The benefit to Google is that these pages are easier to crawl and index, and it also hosts the pages through its Google AMP Cache (bit.ly/ampc490), which is a clear privacy concern. To encourage websites to get on board, Google rates AMP pages higher in its search results, so few sites can afford to ignore it, and some people see this as further evidence of Google trying to control the web.



One way you can avoid viewing AMP pages and see the original HTML versions instead is by using the Redirect AMP to HTML add-on for Firefox (bit.ly/ffamp490) and Chrome (bit.ly/gcamp490). When someone shares an AMP page with you from their mobile phone, this add-on will ensure you don't open that version on your computer.

To avoid visiting the AMP version of a page on your mobile phone, tap its URL in your browser's address bar and delete 'amp' from the address.



Replicant is an Android variant that emphasises privacy and security

available for Mi and Redmi phones produced by Chinese electronics firm Xiaomi. Don't dismiss the OS entirely, however, because you can buy many of these devices from eBay and Amazon for between £100-£200, depending on the model. Make sure you buy the Global version, though, unless you can read Chinese.

Owners of Huawei and

Honor phones have their own Androidbased operating system called EMUI (bit.ly/emui490). Huawei is currently working on a new Android alternative called Harmony OS, but it may be some time before phones running it are available.

Finally, Google maintains the Android Open Source Project (AOSP) (source .android.com), which allows anyone to create custom variants of Android, if they have the skills.

CHROME

Other than the obvious alternative of Firefox, there are lots of great non-Chrome browsers you can use, although a number of them - such as the new Microsoft Edge (www .microsoftedgeinsider.com), Vivaldi (vivaldi.com) and Brave (brave.com) -

are based on the Google-owned Chromium, which is the same opensource browser that Chrome is built on. If you don't mind running a Chromium browser (most of them ditch the Google features that make Chrome so invasive). then we'd definitely recommend Vivaldi, which is a new-ish creation from the former CEO of Opera. It offers a wealth of useful features not found in other browsers, such as floating web panels, customisation options and privacy tools, and recently launched an Android app.

If you'd prefer to completely move away from Google, then a browser based on Mozilla Firefox would be your best bet. Waterfox (www.waterfox.net) is a 64-bit version of Firefox, which is pretty much identical, but with some





welcome changes including limited data collection, no telemetry and support for plugins that are no longer allowed in Mozilla's browser. Pale Moon (www .palemoon.org) is also a good choice - the open-source browser was forked off Firefox years ago and has been developed independently ever since.

GOOGLE NEWS

You can get your daily news fix directly from sites such as BBC News (news.bbc.co.uk) but, if you prefer multiple perspectives, then give NewsNow (www.newsnow.co.uk) a try. It pulls its content from numerous respected sources, and you can browse stories by categories including UK, Entertainment, Sport and Technology. Clicking a link takes you to the originating site. The layout is quite bland compared to Google News, but free of distractions (other than a few ads).

Another service is Newstral (newstral .com/en/uk), which pulls the top three stories from sources including the likes of the BBC, The Guardian, The Sun, Daily Mail and The Independent. You can explore the stories in a list down the centre or use the links at the top to filter by region, people or topic.


The portable version of Opera is hidden among the browser's standard installation settings.

Download the software as normal and, on the

installation screen, click the drop-down menu next to 'Install for' and choose 'Stand-alone installation (USB)'. From here, you choose the folder or USB memory stick that you want to install it to. This portable version includes all the same tools and options as the desktop browser, but without hooking itself to your operating system.

Opera is perfectly suited to portability and its minimalist interface tucks away a wealth of features behind icons and panels. Take a look at the unobtrusive sidebar, narrowed to a single row of icons. Each icon, when clicked, reveals options that slide out over the page you're looking at, so you can choose your bookmark or item from the history, then hide everything away again. We particularly love the Instant Search option, which overlays a Google search box on the current page, expands to include the search results, then expands into a new tab, if you wish.

The browser is topped off with a selection of easily accessible privacy



features. You can remove ads and trackers from pages at the flick of a switch, and even switch on Opera's free VPN, though it's worth remembering that this doesn't claim to be as secure as paid-for VPNs. All these tools and more are available from the brilliant 'Easy setup' sidebar, which all browsers could learn a thing or two from.

How it can be improved:

Our main complaint about Opera is its insistence on placing Facebook
Messenger and WhatsApp icons at the top of the sidebar. You can remove them yourself by simply right-clicking and deselecting them, but it's disappointing

that they're still there, invisibly lurking in the background and using up valuable portable space.

OUR VERDICT

Opera feels like the perfect portable browser. Its interface is clean and focused on the content, but also rich in features – it simply chooses not to push too many options in your face. It also has elegant, built-in privacy tools to help you browse the web more carefully. Try it – with this portable version, you have nothing to lose.

Best portable browsers

Vivaldi | vivaldi.com | ★★★☆

What we liked:

To set up Vivaldi to be portable, rather than installed on your PC, just download the software as normal, run the installer and, on the first page of the

installation window, click Advanced. From the 'Installation type' menu, choose 'Install standalone', which is the portable version.

If you're after a lightweight and fast portable browser, this isn't it. Rather, Vivaldi is a connoisseur's browser, resplendent with luxurious features. While spun off from Opera and still reminiscent of it, Vivaldi's 2.9 versions have moved in interesting and innovative directions. The familiar feature-packed sidebar muscles its way on screen, presuming that its users are equipped with generous wide screens and want their browsing sessions accesorised with all the trimmings.

The portable version, then, is ideal for giving Vivaldi a serious trial run but, if you're seriously into your web browsing, you're better off installing the full browser on your computer of choice.



How it can be improved:

We love Vivaldi but it could never be described as a pocket browser and isn't best suited to being carried around and run on any device.

OUR VERDICT

Vivaldi's portable edition keeps the rich array of options you get in the installable version. It's a great way to try out the browser but isn't ideal for carrying around because it may not be very well suited to some of the screens and devices you end up using it on.

SRWare Iron | srware.net/iron | ★★★★☆

What we liked:

Iron is built on Chromium but it promises more privacy than Chrome. The portable version is available directly from the Iron website, so you don't

need to fiddle about with installers. In fact, you don't even have to install it, just move the files from the downloaded folder to wherever you want to keep the browser.

The interface is identical to Chrome but differs in that it has removed many of the privacy-compromising features that Google adds or leaves in its browser. It's a good balance between the speed and website-compatibility of Chrome, and the privacy options you get by moving away from Google.

How it can be improved:

On close inspection, the version of Iron we downloaded was one version behind regular Chrome. Also, it doesn't update automatically, so you have to keep an eye on the Twitter feed (twitter.com/ srware) and follow the instructions in a



text file to perform an update. You can't necessarily expect a smaller developer to keep up with Google's changes but being a step or more behind the latest updates left us feeling a bit uneasy.

OUR VERDICT

You could get a portable version of Chrome through the PortableApps system (see right) but why bother, when this version is more private? The downside is that you need to stay on top of updates so you don't end up with a compromised

BEST OF THE REST

Comodo IceDragon

Comodo IceDragon is based on Firefox but installed via the main download - there's a portable box you can tick during the installation.

However, now that Mozilla has added a slew of privacy settings to the official version of



Firefox, this Comodo version is less relevant. IceDragon has a site inspector to scan a page for malware and the option to link to Comodo's alternate DNS server but that's about it.

Maxthon

Maxthon is a favourite of some Web User readers but we didn't get on with the portable version. For a

start, it's archived in the 7-Zip format, which means you may need to download another



program just to open it. At first, we couldn't work out how to run the browser, until we eventually found the application file in a folder called Bin. It could hardly be less user-friendly.

PortableApps used to require that

you run a launcher containing your portable apps but, thankfully, that's no longer the



case. Now, using Chrome or Firefox through the service is as simple as downloading the browser and running it from the folder you save it to. If you're happy to stick with your current favourite browser, then go for it, but we think if you're going to go portable, it's more fun to choose something different.

What's your PC's problem?

Save money on computer repairs by diagnosing your PC's problems yourself. **Nik Rawlinson** reveals the questions you should ask to get the answers you need - before it's too late



Is your hard drive

The data on your hard drive is worth more than the drive itself. If you suspect your hard drive is failing, make a full backup of its contents and either swap it for a new one or, at the very least, check its SMART status right away.

SMART stands for Self-Monitoring, Analysis and Reporting Technology. It's been knocking around in various forms since the mid-1990s, so it's almost certain that your hard drive or SSD is supported. At its most basic level, SMART tells you whether your drive is working properly or failing. However, as there's no agreed way of reporting what's happening under the hood, individual manufacturers interpret the results - and their severity - differently. If there's even a hint that things are going awry, we would recommend implementing a backup-and-replace operation sooner rather than later.

All drives degrade over time and yours will fail eventually. If you're using a traditional hard drive, its firmware will

actively shuffle its contents around as sectors start to corrupt. Those sectors will be marked as out of bounds to prevent them from being used in the future. This reduces your drive's available capacity and, as the errors build up, slows it down.

On an SSD, spare capacity blocks are brought into play as the primary blocks fail. The drive has what's known as 'over-provisioning' – more memory cells than its capacity suggests – so you shouldn't notice any loss of capacity for a while and, because access on an SSD is almost instantaneous, you shouldn't detect any slowdown, either.

The question is: if failure can happen without any warning, how do you check your drive's SMART status? Our favourite diagnostic tool is CrystalDiskInfo (free to download from bit.ly/crystal490). Unzip it and launch DiskInfo64.exe. Everything you need to know is detailed on its opening screen including, most importantly, the hard drive's Health Status. If all is well, this should read Good. If not, you may need

to replace your drive.

You'll find the drive's temperature directly beneath the Health Status. If it shows a blue background, it's not too hot, but yellow or red are cause for concern. If the drive is overheating, make sure the fans in your PC's case are spinning, large enough and free of dust. If they aren't turning, check their connections and, if there's no problem there, investigate a fix or a replacement.


The temperature measurement is a bit abstract until you know your hard drive's optimal operating parameters. Make a note of the drive's model number – the long line of larger characters near the top of the window – and use it to search for the manufacturer's specification sheet. From this, we can see our drive should be between zero and 60°C, so its current temperature is just fine.

Has your battery taken a battering? Laptops, like people, feel the

effects of age: when they're young they have boundless energy but, as they get

older, they become slower and less responsive. If you find your laptop spends more time plugged into the mains than operating freely, your battery is probably on the way out. You can tell by comparing its current capacity with the capacity it had when it left the production line.

Click Start and type cmd, then right-click Command Prompt in the list of results and choose 'Run as administrator'. At the prompt, type powercfg /batteryreport. This command analyses your battery and, as its name suggests, writes a report. To open the result, launch your web browser, press Ctrl+O to open a local file and navigate to C:\Windows\ system32\battery-report.html.

Scroll down to the 'Installed batteries' section and compare the 'Design capacity' and 'Full charge capacity' results. The second will be less than the first, but if they're within 25% of each other, we'd be inclined to wait a while longer before sourcing a replacement.

If you do need to buy a new battery, be aware that you need to be sure not only that the battery fits, but that its capacity is appropriate for your laptop. If possible, employ the services of a professional to help you choose and install one.

The once-standard advice to fully discharge your battery before topping it up is now out of date and can, in fact, shorten the battery's lifespan. Ideally, plug in your laptop before the battery drops too far below 20% and disconnect as you pass 80%. Avoid spending long periods with your laptop fully charged but still running on mains power.

If you're buying a second-hand laptop, ask the seller to generate a battery report and send you the results so you can see the condition of the battery before you hand over your cash.

Is your memory failing?

We've already explained that SSDs fail over time so it should be no surprise, given the similar technological roots, that the same is true of memory - or RAM. Fortunately, this is one of the easiest components to test.

Click Start, type Windows Memory Diagnostic and click the top result. All the memory diagnostic software we've come across runs outside Windows and, despite its name, Windows Memory Diagnostic is no different.

Click 'Restart now and check for problems' to launch the test. Your PC will reboot into a white-on-blue text mode. The test itself is completely automated and your PC will restart

again - this time into Windows - once it's finished. Click Start again, type Event Viewer and click the top result. Click the arrow beside Windows Logs in the left-hand sidebar, then click the System header this displays.

Click Find in the Actions panel on the right and type MemoryDiagnostic into the Find box (make sure there is no space between the two words and both the M and D are capitalised, with everything else lowercase). Click Find Next, then read the result of the report on the lower part of the main window.

If the report says anything other than "The Windows Memory Diagnostic tested the computer's memory and detected no errors", there's a problem with your memory. Book in with a repair shop to investigate further.

ARE YOUR PIXELS GETTING STICKY?

Even the best displays suffer from sticky pixels - isolated dots on the screen that don't change colour. The result could be a red dot in the middle of your document, a blue blob on a photo or a tiny patch of green that shouldn't be seen. A small number of these is

to be expected, but they'll multiply over time. They're difficult to spot, so they're unlikely to interfere in regular screen use, but inspecting your monitor every couple of months and noting where they appear will help you track its slow, inevitable decline.


You can only do this easily when you get rid of screen clutter, so clean your display to remove any spots of

physical debris, then visit the LCDTech dead pixels site at bit.ly/ pixels490. Click 'Start test' and the screen will go completely white. Check over its surface for any pixels that don't conform, then press the spacebar to switch to black and check a second time. Repeat this test three times, pressing the spacebar to switch to red, green and blue.

Diagnose your PC's problems



HWinfo presents a huge amount of diagnostic information about your PC




Computer components are designed to work within specific tolerances, with limits on humidity, altitude, pressure and temperature. If your PC gets too hot, it will sometimes throttle the speed of the processor. Adequate cooling is therefore vital to the smooth functioning of any PC and, ideally, you want to keep your processor at around 80°C or lower. You can check how hot yours is running with HWinfo, which is free to download from www.hwinfo.com.

Click Sensors on the toolbar and, in the window that opens, scroll down to the processor temperatures, which show the heat level within each core. If they are running hot, power down your computer and, if you're using a PC with a removable case, carefully unlatch the cover and use the nozzle of a vacuum cleaner running on low power to suck away dust from the case vents, fans and accessible parts of the motherboard. Avoid placing the nozzle directly onto any components and resist the urge to blow stubborn fluff balls or dislodge them using a pen, pencil or finger - a soft brush is acceptable.

If you're using a laptop, accessing internal components is more difficult, but you can still vacuum external vents to improve airflow. Also consider vacuuming your laptop's keyboard to unclog any debris, because the gaps between the keys can help heat escape.


Once you've reassembled and rebooted your PC (don't run it with the cover off because this can impact directional airflow), check in with

HWinfo again. If the processor temperature is still high, consider replacing the thermal paste between your processor and its dedicated heatsink. The process involves unclipping the processor's dedicated fan from the motherboard or heatsink (a finned metal radiator), then removing the heatsink from the processor itself. This should be done very carefully because the heatsink and processor will be attached to one another by the existing thermal paste. Keep the processor in its socket if possible and, if it does come free, take care not to damage any of its pins.

Once you've separated the heatsink and processor, use rubbing alcohol to remove the existing thermal paste from both components, then apply a fresh layer of paste. There are several types available – Arctic Silver and Thermal Grizzly frequently get favourable reports in online reviews. It's important to use neither too little nor too much paste to avoid either burn out or leakage when the two components are sandwiched back together.



If your neighbour's Wi-Fi network is running on the same channel as yours, it may slow one or both of you down

Does your network not work?

Is your network running slow or dropping out? It might not be your PC that's at fault – or even your router. It could be interference from your neighbours.

Download and launch Wi-Fi Analyzer (free from the Microsoft Store at bit.ly/wifi490). This free app plots each of the networks within your PC's reach and shows which channels they're using. Think of Wi-Fi channels as similar to FM radio frequencies – when two stations broadcast on frequencies that are too close together, they interfere with each other. The same happens when two wireless networks use neighbouring channels.

If Wi-Fi Analyzer shows that your network is overlapping with a neighbour's, log into your router's settings and switch it to a less populated channel. The process for doing this varies from router to router, but begin by clicking Start and typing CMD. Click Command Prompt, type ipconfig and press Enter. Check the

results this delivers for 'Default gateway' and type the four sets of numbers beside this into a browser to access your router's settings.

You'll need to use an admin password to log in, which you should find on a label attached to the back or bottom of your router. Navigate to its wireless, LAN or Wi-Fi settings and use the options there to set your preferred channel to the one that WiFi Analyzer indicates is the least populated.

Don't fall for

'Tis the season to be vigilant online, as fraudsters try to cash in on Christmas. Robert Irvine unwraps five tricks to watch out for





The two weeks before Christmas invariably involve a rush of online shopping, which makes it hard to keep track of what you've bought, where from and when it's due to arrive. Fraudsters exploit this hectic time by sending emails supposedly about your order, either alerting you to a 'problem' that needs to be resolved or inviting you to track your package online, then directing you to log into a phishing site that steals your details. Always check the sender's email address and never click a link in these messages - go directly to the online store or delivery company's website and sign in there instead.



Mystery e-cards and gift cards

When you receive an anonymous email that reads "A friend has sent you a Christmas e-card/gift card", it's natural to wonder who is behind the lovely surprise. Sadly, the answer is often a scammer, who wants you to click the link to open your card so they can infect you with malware or harvest your data.

Similarly, you may receive a 'receipt' for a gift card that you don't remember




buying, which either prompts you to open an infected attachment or cancel the fake purchase by providing your credit card details.

In either case, you should ignore and delete the message, and not click anything in or attached to the email.

띁 Fake online charities

As Christmas is a time of giving, we're more likely to help those less fortunate than ourselves through charitable donations. Fraudsters are keen to cash in on this festive generosity and may set up web pages for fake charities, create social-media campaigns to raise money for non-existent causes or even use a real charity's name to funnel donations into their own accounts, and then flee. You can search a database of UKregistered charities at Charity Choice (www.charitychoice.co.uk), but otherwise use your common sense to verify who you're giving money to. Don't respond to requests to donate through a money-transfer company such as Western Union or MoneyGram, and visit a charity's website directly rather than by clicking a link.



끏 Social-media

People tend to share more on social media over the festive period, from amusing Christmas videos and animations to bargains found while shopping online and even pleas for financial help, which can make it harder to identify scams. By gaining access to someone's social account, hackers can post and send messages as that person,



and fool their friends into opening or sharing malicious links, entering personal data and spreading spam from their accounts. You should therefore be extra cautious about what you click or tap on Facebook, Twitter and other social networks and messaging apps over Christmas. If a message from a friend seems unusual or a giveaway looks too good to be true, don't touch it - and, if you do get fooled, change your account password immediately.

🎛 Malicious mobile apps

What better way to get in the Christmas mood than seasonal music, games, wallpapers, dancing elves and other festive fun? There's certainly no shortage of such apps available for Android and iOS but, sadly, some are designed to spread malware rather than goodwill, and are more "no no no" than "ho ho ho". A few years ago, for example, a hacking group called

Santa-APT used Christmas-themed apps to steal data from phones and capture victims' surroundings using their cameras and microphones. As ever, you should only install apps from official app stores. Even on



Google Play (which has suffered several security scares recently), check the reviews, developer details and permissions before downloading.


eeping your data private isn't always easy online. Even if your computer is armed with top security add-ons, you can still leak information without knowing it - especially via email, which despite its popularity is woefully unsecure. When standard email providers can't be trusted, it could be time to switch to ProtonMail.

We explored this fully encrypted email provider back in Issue 444 (bit.ly/webuser444), and it's now had a major update adding more privacy-focused extras to your inbox. Version 4 gives the developers more control over rolling out additional features so this beta is part of an ongoing process. In this Workshop, we examine the new features you can try right now, and those coming down the pipeline.


EXPERT TIP

Steve Clark says

The basic ProtonMail account is totally free to use. As with the free ProtonVPN, it won't compromise your security but there are limitations. For instance, you can only send up to 150 messages a day and create three folders or labels, while storage capacity is capped at 0.5GB. If you want the full Proton experience, consider upgrading to a ProtonMail Plus or Professional subscription for between £5 and £8 a month.




The first major change in ProtonMail 4 is a redesigned Settings menu. It's cleaner, more intuitive and should be faster to use than the old version. Click the icon in the bar along the top 1 to display a handy sidebar of categories. The same settings are also displayed on the main page, so you don't need to hunt around for the options.




You can link ProtonMail with ProtonVPN. In Settings, click the ProtonVPN category.

If you don't have the VPN installed, select your OS and download it, then use the onscreen credentials to sign in, linking the accounts. If you're connecting to ProtonVPN with a different client, the details you need are in the OpenVPN/IKEv2 section.




The settings now include an Account Overview. This appears at the top of the home screen and contains details of your username, recovery email, two-factor authentication and Proton product management.


Alternatively, go to Account and use the toggle switches to easily control and manage your account.




Another new feature due to launch soon is the ability to customise ProtonMail's appearance. For now, to give your inbox a new look, go to Settings, Appearance. Here, you can switch the layout, turn on Sticky Labels and select HTML or plain text in Composer Mode. At the foot of the page is the option to customise your own theme using CSS.




The Proton apps icons in the top-left corner are now jump buttons. Currently, the two icons let you quickly switch between your inbox 11 and Contacts, 22 bringing the button away from the top bar and closer to hand. In future, this area will also offer easy access to ProtonVPN and the updated Proton Calendar.




Select Contacts to view, add or import people. Clicking 'Add a contact' reveals a new page with Name and 'Email addresses' fields. 11 Click Email 2 to categorise the address as Personal, Work or Other. Click Add 1 to include more email addresses, switch their order by clicking and holding the Lines icon 4 or delete. 5 Finally, click Save. 6




To import existing contacts from Outlook, visit outlook.live .com/people, click Manage and choose 'Export contacts'. For Gmail, go to contacts.google.com and click Export. Next, choose 'Outlook CSV', 2 to ensure it's compatible with ProtonMail. However you do it, and whichever provider you're importing from, make sure the file you save is a CSV file.



Back in ProtonMail, select Contacts, then Import. 1 Although Gmail isn't listed as a supported provider, it should work as long as you choose to import it as an Outlook CSV file. Click 'Select file from computer' 2 and upload the CSV file via File Explorer. Press Import 🖪 to start the process.



Where once you could only change layout or skip between emails using the arrows keys above the email preview pane, you can now press 'Advanced options' 11 to 'Show all', 'Show unread' or 'Show read' emails; and 'use Sort view messages/conversations' 2 to tweak the inbox order based on size or date. 🖪



It's now much easier to get help, ask questions and submit feedback to Proton. Click your account icon 1 next to your email address to access 'Report bug' and 'I have a question', along with new options for Settings, ProtonMail Shop and the opportunity to support the development team. 2



Rename files faster with a new PowerToy

ack in Issue 485 (bit.ly/webuser485), we looked at the first of Microsoft's new PowerToys, the brilliant experimental tools for advanced users inspired by the original Windows 95 PowerToys. Microsoft has just added

another handy utility to the set, called PowerRename, which you can use to quickly and efficiently rename batches of files in one go.




Click the PowerToys icon in the notification area 🗓 to open the General Settings. The PowerRename PowerToy 2 should be listed along with FancyZones and Shortcut Guide. Make sure it's switched on.




In File Explorer, select the files and folders you want to rename. Right-click and choose PowerRename. 11 The PowerRename box appears, populated with the items you've selected. 2 This list includes folders 3 and the contents of any folders and subfolders that were selected.




To rename your files, type the part of their name you want to remove in the 'Search for' box, 11 then type the words you want to replace it with in the 'Replace with' box. The Preview box shows you the current filenames **3** and what they'll look like when you click the Rename button.



By default, all the files will be selected and run through the renaming filter if they match the criteria. If there are any individual files you don't want to rename, untick the boxes next to them in the Preview window. I Files that aren't selected won't appear in the Renamed column.



If there are too many files to select manually, use the Options to whittle down the list instead. For instance, you could exclude files in subfolders, 1 exclude all files or all folders, 2 or have the search term only appear in the name or extension of a file. **B**



To add consecutive numbers to each filename, 11 tick the box to Enumerate Items. 2 To use regular expressions in the search box - for wildcards, logical operators and more - tick Use Regular Expressions.



download the free WO Mic kit and use your phone's undoubtedly superior mic instead. You can even control the volume or mute the mic from the app's home screen.







Try software safely using a virtual machine

Wayne Williams explains how to set up a safe environment to test new software without harming your PC



What you need

There are several programs you can use to create a virtual environment in which to run your software, but Oracle VM VirtualBox (www.virtualbox.org) is arguably the best. It's entirely free, very easy to use and can handle every version of Windows – from 3.1 to 10 – provided you have a copy of the operating system. You're not limited to running Windows because it can also handle Linux

operating systems and macOS. Install as many operating systems as you want and then choose which one to run from the VirtualBox Manager.

Essentially, VirtualBox sets the new operating system to run within your current one. It operates entirely separately from your current OS, though you can enable features such as shared storage and shared clipboard, should you need to. There's an additional VirtualBox

Extension Pack (also free) that you can install to provide even more features.

You can resize the operating system window, running it scaled or full screen, which can come in useful depending on the sort of programs you intend to try on it. When you've finished, you can save the current state of the OS before exiting (so you can quickly pick up where you left off) or shut it down fully (freeing up system resources).

Go to File, Preferences, Input to view all the available keyboard shortcuts in both the Manager and Virtual Machine

In addition to VirtualBox, you need an ISO file of Windows. You can download a fresh copy of Windows 10 using Microsoft's Media Creation Tool (bit.ly/mmct490). Run the program and wait while it prepares everything, then accept the licence terms and wait a little longer.

When it's ready, select the option to create installation media for another PC. Click Next and the tool fills in all the details to match your current installation. If you want to change this, untick the 'Use the recommended options for this PC' box and select the language, edition and architecture (32-bit, 64-bit or both). It's worth noting that the edition needs to match your Windows licence if you plan to license the virtual machine. However, since we will only be using the OS in VirtualBox to install and run software, we don't need to bother licensing it. An unlicensed copy of Windows shows a watermark in the bottom-right corner and some settings will be disabled,

but this is nothing to worry about.

Click Next in the Media Creation Tool and select ISO file as the installation media, then click Next again to download the file. This is several gigabytes in size, so it will take a while to download, depending on the speed of your internet connection.


Once you've created your installation media, you can install it in VirtualBox. We show you how in our Mini Workshop, below. We'll then look at setting it up in our Mini Workshop on page 61.

Save Snapshots

VirtualBox can create snapshots that record a virtual machine's current state, so you can revert back at any time. It's similar to saving the machine state when you click the X in the program window, except that you can carry on working. For example, you might create a snapshot prior to installing a piece of software, and then revert back to that

snapshot once you've finished using the new program – so you can avoid the bother of uninstalling it. You should create a snapshot when you first install Windows in VirtualBox so you can instantly jump back to a clean install at any time. This is worth redoing when Windows updates, so your clean install has all the latest Windows updates.


To create a snapshot, go into Machine in the VirtualBox menu and select Take Snapshot. Alternatively, you can press Host+T to do this (by default, the Host

key is the Ctrl key to the right of the spacebar). In the window that opens, give your snapshot a name and an optional description, then click OK. The machine state will be saved at that point. The next time you want to power off the OS, you'll have the option of restoring your last snapshot.

To load a snapshot in the future, click the menu button to the right of the operating system in the VirtualBox


Manager, then click Snapshots. You're shown a list of available choices (in the order they were taken) and can restore one from there. You'll need to make sure the OS isn't currently running. You can also take a new snapshot and delete any unwanted ones.

Adjust the settings


To configure VirtualBox, select an OS in the Manager (but don't run it) and click the Settings cog. You can change the name of the virtual machine and enable features such as Shared Clipboard and Drag 'n' Drop through the General, Advanced section. You can adjust the settings for System, Display, Storage, Audio, Network, USB, Shared Folders and User Interface from the Settings sidebar.

Remove an operating system

As mentioned previously, you can install multiple operating systems in VirtualBox - Windows 7, 10, the latest Insider Preview, Ubuntu, Linux Mint and so on. If you no longer need an OS, you can remove it to free up disk space. Rightclick the name in the Manager and select Remove. You can choose to delete all files, to wipe the OS entirely, or just remove it, which leaves the files intact.



Once your OS is installed, run it and 🖶 it will load in a separate window. To resize it, click View 11 in VirtualBox and select Full-screen 2 or Scaled Mode. 1 You can drag the corner of the scaled window to resize it. 4 Right Ctrl+C toggles Scaled Mode on or off.



If your cursor gets trapped inside the virtual machine, pressing the Host key (which, by default, is the right Ctrl key on your keyboard) will free it. When in Scaled or Full-screen mode, the menu bar at the top vanishes. Pressing Host+Home displays a pop-up menu 1 with all the commands you need.



To change the resolution, right click the new OS desktop and select Display Settings. Change the resolution to the highest on offer. To shut down Windows 10, click the X in top-right corner of VirtualBox 🚺 and select either 'Save the machine state' or 'Power off the machine'.

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The standard tracking results are shown first but, to get the full alarming picture, click 'Show full results for fingerprinting' below the table to see what the site can tell about you. You can be tracked if it says "Your browser fingerprint appears to be unique".

Below this, you'll see the system settings that make up your fingerprint, such as fonts, screen resolution, extensions and so on. A good alternative test can be found at AmlUnique (amiunique.org).




See if your web browser's fingerprint is unique and can be tracked

Use basic privacy tools

The quickest and easiest way to increase your privacy is to browse the web using an incognito or private window. This won't make you invisible or prevent you from being tracked, but it hides some specific information and effectively acts as if you'd cleared your browser of caches, history and cookies.

You can see this demonstrated when you visit a website you need to log into, such as OneDrive or Netflix. You're asked to log in before any website content is displayed - the site won't know you until you enter your details.

Websites that use fingerprinting will still be able to identify you, but incognito or private browsing is still more private than standard browsing.



For basic hassle-free privacy, use incognito or private browsing modes

Hide your browser in the crowd

Fingerprinting, which is used to identify and track you, relies on your computer and browser being unique in some way (like your fingerprint). To foil the system, try to be more like everyone else so you can hide in the crowd.

For example, there are probably a billion Chrome users, but few people use SlimBrowser, Maxthon, Torch and others. An unusual browser won't uniquely identify you but, when combined with other factors, it certainly makes the job a lot easier.

Browsers need to know which fonts are installed on your computer so they can display web pages, and an unusual font collection makes you easier to spot. Limiting yourself to the Windows default fonts, or at least restricting any extras to commonly used alternatives, makes you less conspicuous.

Browsing the web on a super-sharp 4K monitor undoubtedly enhances your enjoyment of websites, but an unusual screen resolution sets you apart from other people. A common resolution, such as 1,920 x 1,080 pixels, does a much better job of hiding your identity.

Browser extensions also make you

stand out and a site may look at which ones you have installed. Using a small number of popular extensions and avoiding those with few users makes you less visible. Ironically, a browser's Do Not Track setting and whether cookies are allowed or blocked also add to the picture built by trackers to uniquely identify you.

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.


None of these features taken on their own will identify you but you may have a unique combination. For example, you may be the only person that uses browser X at screen resolution Y with extensions A, B and C and a handful of specific fonts, with Do Not Track set and cookies disabled.

Block trackers with Firefox

Chrome's rise has dented the popularity of Firefox (www.mozilla.org) but it's trying to win back users with its privacy tools and claims to block over 2,000 trackers, keeping a weekly tally of how many it's blocking. Click the menu button in the top-right corner and select Privacy Protections to see the number. It can run into thousands.

On the Privacy Protections page, click the cog icon to see the Privacy & Security settings tab. Choose between Standard, Strict and Custom enhanced tracking protection. Where other browsers require an extension in order to block trackers, Firefox has its tools built-in. It's the browser's best feature.

There are many other privacy and security settings that make Firefox worth considering, such as permissions for the camera, microphone, location, notifications, add-ons, auto-play sound and video, deceptive content on web pages and more.

Block trackers with Opera

Opera is based on the same engine as Chrome but its interface and range of features are very different. Click the top-right 'Easy setup' button and, halfway down, you'll see switches to block trackers and adverts. Turn them both on to increase your online privacy.

Click the menu button, select Settings and go to Privacy Protection in the Basic section. Enable 'Block trackers' and click the two items below to enter any exceptions, such as websites where you're happy to disable tracking and ad blocking, and to manage any individual block lists.

Block trackers with extensions

There are some great browser extensions that increase your privacy and prevent information leaks. A popular choice is Privacy Badger for Chrome (bit.ly/pribad490) and Firefox (bit.ly/pbff490). Once installed, it works instantly without the need for configuration.

Browse the web and Privacy Badger increases your privacy by blocking

the worst of the trackers. Go to a website you suspect of using trackers and click the toolbar icon. A panel is displayed that lists the trackers, with a switch next to each one. Most trackers are blocked, but a few are allowed. However, you can use the switches to block all trackers or use the option to disable Privacy Badger for this site and allow all trackers.

If you want to customise Privacy
Badger, click the toolbar button, then
click the cog icon in the top-right
corner. A new tab opens with settings
spread across five sub-tabs. The most
useful is Disabled Sites. Privacy
Badger is compatible with many
websites, but a few may break when it
is enabled. If you still want to access
those sites, enter them into the
Disabled Sites list.

uBlock Origin is another Chrome (bit.ly/ubl490) and Firefox (bit.ly/ublf490) extension for blocking trackers. Many people use it for its ad-blocking capabilities, but that's only half the story. It works well without any tinkering but there are configuration options for advanced users. If you click the toolbar icon in Chrome, you'll see a large Off switch that disables blocking for the current site. Click the sliders icon to open a settings tab where you'll find sub-tabs for settings, filter lists, whitelists of allowed sites and more.

Ghostery for Chrome (bit.ly/gho490) and Firefox (bit.ly/ghoff490) is a useful extension for blocking undesirable items on websites, which stops lots of trackers from monitoring your activities. When it's installed, a Ghostery tab opens to let you customise the settings or take a

tutorial explaining the main features.

Select Customize Setup in the sidebar and you can choose which categories of items to block, including advertising, website analytics and social media. Click the toolbar icon when browsing a website to see a handy control panel that shows trackers that are allowed or blocked. There are buttons to block or allow everything, too.

Block fingerprints

Your browser uses many different system attributes to create a digital fingerprint of your computer so trackers can identify you. Blocking some of those attributes can reduce or prevent fingerprinting.

In Chrome, consider Canvas
Defender (bit.ly/candef490), Canvas
Fingerprint Defender (bit.ly/
cafdef490), WebGL Fingerprint
Defender (bit.ly/wgdef490) and Font
Fingerprint Defender (bit.ly/
ffdef490). These extensions all
produce fake values when trackers try
to read your PC's configuration.

Disable JavaScript and Flash

JavaScript is the code that powers the web and it's essential for many websites. However, it can also be used to fingerprint your browser for tracking purposes. In Chrome, go to Settings, Advanced, 'Privacy and security', 'Site settings', then JavaScript. Turning it off increases privacy but it can break a lot of websites so don't be surprised if you have to turn it back on. Flash is rarely used these days and can be disabled.

Fix a System Restore error

For the past month, I've been unable to make a system restore point. All my previous points have disappeared, too. When I try running System Restore, it shows Searching for ages, then 'Can't revert to previous system restore point, System Restore encountered an error Ox81000203'.

A search for this error recommended I download TuneUp Utilities from AVG (bit.ly/avgtu490), which I did, but I still get the same error message.

Some people with this System Restore error found that TuneUp Utilities was actually the cause rather than the solution, but it may not be the only tool that does this, so uninstall it and any similar tune-up software you may have on your PC, then see if the problem goes away.

The error can also be caused by disabling a Windows service, which TuneUp Utilities or other software may have done for some unknown reason. Press Windows+R and enter


services.msc to open the configuration tool. Doubleclick the Microsoft Software Shadow Copy Provider and set the 'Startup type' to Automatic.

Now open the Control Panel, choose System and click 'System protection' to open the System Properties window. Select the C: drive and click Configure, then turn on System Protection and drag the slider to give System Restore at least a couple of gigabytes of hard-drive space. Click OK to close the windows.

Finally, press Windows+R and enter **regedit** to open the Registry Editor and go to:

HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\ SOFTWARE\Policies\Microsoft\ Windows NT


Expand it and check if there is a sub-key called SystemRestore. If there is, select it and see if it contains a value named DisableConfig. Double-click this and set the value to 0. You can actually

delete the whole SystemRestore key because it isn't normally needed.

Close the Registry Editor, restart Windows, return to Control Panel, System, 'System protection' and click the Create button. It should now create a restore point.

Solve an internet connection problem

My Dell desktop PC has started repeatedly displaying the message "HTTP Error 400. The request is badly formed" and it's driving me crazy. It happens when I simply try to view websites, regardless of which browser I'm using, and when I use links in emails.


I followed advice from the internet to clear the browser cache and DNS, but it didn't make any difference. I'm not

aware of any software added just before this started a few weeks ago, but I have upgraded my Norton software to Norton 360 (uk.norton.com). I welcome any ideas on where to look or some way of testing the PC to find the cause -I'm sure that it is a problem with my PC rather than the internet.

The first thing to do when an error A like this occurs is to try a different web browser, but you've already tried that and it made no difference. This implies it is not a browser problem. You also cleared the DNS cache, which is the second thing we would suggest because this converts domain names into IP addresses. For anyone who doesn't know how to do this, press Windows+R

and enter **cmd** to open a Command Prompt window. Enter ipconfig /flushdns to clear the cache.

Since Norton is your only recent upgrade, try uninstalling it - or at least disable everything in it to see if that's the cause of the error. Do the same with any other security software you have, including firewalls. Now restart Windows and try using the internet. Restore the security software afterwards if it makes no difference.

Next, try switching DNS servers. They don't cause HTTP error 400, but problems can sometimes be reported as HTTP error 400 by mistake. Open the Control Panel, then open 'Network and Sharing Centre'. Click the internet connection link, click Properties in the next window, then double-click Internet Protocol Version 4 in the following window. Select 'Use the following DNS server addresses' and enter 8.8.8.8 and 8.8.4.4 into the boxes below. Click OK to close the windows and restart the PC.

That's just about all you can do on the computer. If the problem persists, it could be external, such as a router fault. To check this, turn off your router, wait 10 seconds and turn it back on.

If you have a laptop, try using it in a different location, such as a café or a friend's house. If the internet works fine elsewhere, you probably need to talk to your ISP and possibly reset or replace the router. There may be a reset button on the back.

Set up a good backup strategy

The biggest problem when Drive C fails is reinstalling all the programs and trying to remember which apps you have. Could you please give me your thoughts on my backup strategy?

My Windows OS and apps are kept on the C: drive and I use the D: drive to store data. I installed a third drive and, using AOMEI Backupper, I cloned the C: drive to the new drive E. I then ran

Winmerge to check the source and destination were the same.

Then, to test if Windows will boot from drive E, I disconnected all the SATA cables from the C: and D: drives, then rebooted from Drive E. If this works, then I'll have a spare hard drive, which can replace the C: drive, should it ever break.

Are there likely to be any Windows licensing issues? Do you see any problems with this?

You have been very thorough with this and, if anything, you have done more than you need to. Cloning a drive is a type of backup, but it's a lot of work and is usually only necessary when swapping an old drive for a new one - for example, if it's broken or you're upgrading from a hard drive to an SSD.

Stick with this method if it's working for you, but you may find it easier to plug in an external USB drive and back up the whole drive to it using a tool such as AOMEI Backupper (www.aomeitech .com), Todo Backup Free (www.easeus .com) or MiniTool ShadowMaker Free (www.minitool.com).

Do you have a laptop or a desktop computer? If you have a laptop, you could go to a public Wi-Fi hotspot, such as a café, and use that when you need to download any major Windows updates. Some public Wi-Fi is quite fast, especially when there are few people around, so buy a coffee, pretend to be working and grab the update.

To stop Windows downloading the update at home over your mobile connection, open Settings, 'Network & Internet' and select Wi-Fi on the left. Click the Wi-Fi connection, scroll down and turn on the switch 'Set as metered connection'. Click the link to 'Set a data limit to help control data usage on this network'. Click 'Set limit' and enter a value, such as 15GB.

This method uses less space than cloning and any spare space on the backup drive can be used for other purposes. Create a boot CD or USB memory drive and, if there is ever a problem with your C: drive, you can boot from it and restore the C: drive.

Windows licensing problems may occur if you often switch between the clone drive and the normal drive, so only use it when the C: drive fails. You can replace a drive but it's not possible to use Windows on two separate drives.

I receive a lot of unwanted emails and, although many are automatically moved to the Junk Email folder, several still make it through to my inbox. It's annoying having to delete them every day.

My question is about the Unsubscribe link at the bottom of an email. Should I click it? I asked someone about this and they said: "No, it just confirms your email address to the spammer and they

will then send you even more spam".

Some unsubscribe links in emails are genuine and clicking them removes you from the sender's list, so you no longer receive emails from them.
Unfortunately, some other unsubscribe links either don't work or could send you to a dodgy website.

determine whether an

make a judgment as to
whether it's from a
reliable and responsible sender.

The sender's name or company name should be at the bottom of the email, where there should be an unsubscribe link and a postal address, although this is often just a PO box.


Speed up a VPN

My super-fast internet is rated at over 100Mbps but, when I use a VPN, I can't get more than 50Mbps. My first thought was that the problem is down to the VPN company, so I tried a different one, then another, but none of them managed any better than 50Mbps. Is Windows at fault or am I just using poor VPNs? It doesn't seem to matter which one I use, so I am guessing Windows is the problem.

Outdated Wi-Fi hardware in either your computer or router may be using an old Wi-Fi standard that's limiting your connection speed. A 10-year-old router or computer will not be as fast as a new one.

However, it's more likely to be the VPN and one factor affecting the speed is the server load, which is the number of people sharing it. Try using VPN software that shows the server load, so you can choose the lowest. The distance to a VPN server also affects the speed, so connecting to



Even the best VPN will be slower than your existing connection because of the increased distances and stronger encryption

a US server can be slower than a local connection.

VPNs are encrypted, which makes them slower, and there are different VPN protocols, such as TCP and UDP – the latter is faster. The level of security is another factor that affects speed and some VPNs route traffic through two

servers before it gets to the internet. Being doubly protected is slower than routing through just one VPN, which is in turn slower than no VPN.

With all that's going on, a VPN will never be as fast as a normal connection. You have to trade some speed for security and privacy.

Signed, sealed and delivered (if you're lucky)

Yes, nothing says Christmas more than a harassed-looking driver at your doorstep, asking if you'd mind taking in the three-piece suite for the couple at number 27, who won't be back until January.

January 2021, that is.

I've become something of an expert in the ways of the courier for two reasons. First, I work from home, which means I'm the top of the list when local couriers are trying to leave a parcel for my neighbours. Couriers such as the woman who delivers for Debenhams, who is surely only days away from beating the Guinness World Record for the number of parcels you can fit into the back of a Renault Espace.

"I knew you'd be in," she says, seemingly oblivious to my irritation at being disturbed for the eighth time this morning, just so I can look after a pashmina for Carol at number 12 and save the courier from a potentially fatal game of parcel Jenga if she tries to put it back in her boot.

The second reason is that I have a Ring doorbell on my front door, which captures video every time someone as much as sets foot on my property. Based on

two years of video evidence and the kind of big data crunching that would make Bill Gates jealous, I can now reveal the following findings about courier deliveries:

The average time between the courier pressing the doorbell and flinging a "sorry we missed you" card through the door is 0.8 seconds (0.3 seconds in December)
