



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


# What's New Online

# **Explore Google Maps' new features**

oogle Maps has been helping us find our bearings for 15 years, and as part of its celebrations for reaching this milestone it has added new features to its mobile app. Aside from a new logo, the most obvious change is an expanded set of tabs at the bottom of the screen. The Explore and Commute options are still there to help you find local information and plot travel routes, but they're joined by Saved and Contribute, while For You has moved to a new category called Updates.

The Saved tab puts your favourite places, restaurants, lists and maps within easy reach and shows where you've been, based on the location history detected by your device. Contribute encourages users to help make the app more useful by filling in gaps in maps, leaving reviews, sharing local knowledge and adding photos. Finally, Updates highlights



anything that is trending nearby, so you can keep track of local businesses and events, while the Messages option comes to the forefront, allowing you to chat directly with those companies.

### Stream your games over the web with Nvidia

Nvidia's new gaming service, GeForce Now, lets you stream games you've bought from stores such as Steam, Uplay and Epic Games Store to almost any device. This includes Windows PCs and laptops, Macs, Android devices and Nvidia Shield TVs, but not iPhone, iPad or Apple TV -



presumably because Apple has a rival service, Apple Arcade.

**GeForce Now supports** more than 400 titles so far, and provides access to 30 of the biggest free-to-play games, including Fortnite and Dota 2. The service saves your best in-game moments automatically as


you play, and manages driver and game updates, too. Before you get started, ensure your broadband connection is at least 15Mbps, then choose a membership plan. A free option allows gaming sessions of up to an hour. The other plan costs £4.99 per month and runs games on RTX graphics cards for better visuals, while allowing sessions of up to six hours and priority access.

### Access iCloud via a mobile browser

### www.icloud.com

Apple has introduced mobile browser support for iCloud.com, so you no longer have to access the full desktop site on your phone. This means you can use your iCloud account from any iOS or Android device and enjoy an improved user interface that's a lot easier to navigate.

After logging in with your Apple ID and password, you can launch one of four in-browser apps: Photos, Notes, Reminders and Find iPhone. The latter option offers all the features available in the desktop version, so you can use anyone else's mobile device to locate a lost iPhone. The other three apps let you view and edit



content saved in iCloud, albeit with limitations. For instance, you can add and edit notes and reminders but you can't upload photos. Inevitably, some functions work better on iPhones than on Android devices.

During a five-week expedition to Antarctica, explorer Ariel Waldman used microscopes to investigate the tiny 'extremophiles' that live under the




ice. Not only did she film her endeavours (which you can watch at bit.ly/ ariel495), she also created

More malicious apps found in the Google Play store

### What happened?

Google has again been forced to clean up its Play store after another tranche of dodgy Android apps was spotted by third-party researchers, raising the question of how so many are getting through the company's security checks.

Researchers at VPNpro spotted 24 suspicious apps, all with connections to the Chinese developer Shenzhen Hawk, which has previously been accused of releasing apps containing malicious code (bit.ly/vpnpro495). These rogue apps – which include Hi VPN, Virus Cleaner 2019 and Candy Selfie Camera, and have been installed hundreds of millions of times – were found to be harvesting user data by seeking dangerous permissions to access cameras, locations and more. Google has since removed them all from the app store.

But those weren't the only apps Google has had to purge from the Play store. Security company Bitdefender spotted 17 dodgy apps running adware that popped up ads at random intervals (bit.ly/bitdefender495). The apps had been downloaded half a million times and included file managers, racing games, and barcode and QR scanners.

And there's more. Trend Micro found nine apps – including Speed Clean-Phone Booster and its variants, LinkWorldVPN and Rocket Cleaner – masquerading as basic tools which, after installation, connected to a remote server to download malware (bit.ly/trend495). Google has since

removed these apps, too.

In response to VPNpro's findings, Google said: "If we find behavior that violates our policies, we take action". It's true that the company does act quickly to clean up such apps when notified, but it's clear that plenty are slipping through its approval nets to gain entrance to the Play store.

### How will it affect you?

Given the constant reports from security researchers, it's nearly impossible to keep up to date with all the latest warnings. But if you use any of the apps mentioned, uninstall them immediately. Google does entirely remove the worst offenders, so you should be safe as soon as the company is aware of any danger.

If you spot problems with your phone, such as the sudden appearance of adware, consider whether you've recently installed a new app. If so, delete it immediately and consider resetting your handset. It's a pain, but should help clean up any dodgy code left behind. This is one reason why it's worth always keeping your device backed up (see our cover feature on page 40).

Most of the offending apps are free tools but there are some games, too.
Before you download an app, check that the developer is trustworthy. If you've never heard of the company – which is likely to be the case with most Android developers – see how many downloads it's had and what the reviews say. That

said, the dodgy apps spotted by VPNpro had hundreds of millions of installations across them, with some topping 50 million.

Some of the offending apps weren't guilty of hacking but they pushed the boundaries of permissions. Don't just swipe past these settings during installation – consider why an app may need certain abilities, such as reading your files or accessing your camera. If it doesn't make sense, don't allow it.

### What do we think?

The Play store is supposed to offer a Google-approved selection of Android apps. It's impossible to avoid all problems given the sheer number of them - nearly three million at the last count - but more curation may be needed, and closer attention paid to security and privacy. The app store doesn't need to be locked down, but Google can afford to take the time to ensure apps aren't stealing our data. After all, there's no reason to rush through most of the trifling games and tools that were flagged by security researchers as dodgy - there are plenty of other QR code scanners and selfie apps already available.

Google needs to do a better job of ensuring that dodgy apps don't slip through, because it's simply too difficult for Android users to do it themselves. We trust Google to keep us safe, and it should work harder to deserve that trust.

### Google to ban intrusive ads in videos

### What happened?

Google has said it will

begin blocking certain types of intrusive adverts that appear on video content in Chrome, in response to a "common complaint" from users of the browser (bit.ly/ chromeads495). In particular, it plans to target pre-roll ads that you can't skip, those that pop up in the middle of a clip and any that obscure the video itself. The move follows the guidance outlined by the Coalition for Better Ads (www.betterads.org),



Coalition for Better Ads, Google will start banning three types of video advertising in Chrome, which means that ads that don't fall under these descriptions

will still be

allowed. The ban only applies to videos that are less than eight minutes in length, rather than full-length shows.

Google will ban ads that are shown at the beginning of videos, which are longer than half a minute and can't be skipped within five seconds. It will also block ads that start in the middle of



a video, interrupting it from playing. Additionally, Google will ban other ads, be they text or images, that take up more than a fifth of the screen or are situated in the middle of the video player.

### What do we think?

Video ads are certainly irritating, and no one is likely to miss them. However, Google conveniently doesn't use such in-yourface advertising in YouTube, which means that its own services won't take a hit from the ban.

While it's good that the worst types of video ads will disappear, there will still be pre-roll ads and other irritations clogging up online content - and the other problems with ads, such as behavioural tracking, will remain.

Google hopes that this partial tightening up of standards will reduce the use of ad blockers, but there are still plenty of reasons to filter advertising when you're browsing the web.

### Ring doorbell raises privacy concerns

### What happened?

Security and privacy concerns continue to surround the Amazon Ring doorbell. The device's web-connected camera lets you see who's at the door, but it also collects data such as names, addresses and phone numbers, sharing the information with internet giants such as Facebook and Google, according to research by the Electronic Frontier Foundation (EFF, bit.ly/effring495).

This news follows reports that Ring's camera was not only hackable, but that images captured by its camera could be requested by police. After a backlash, Amazon pushed out an update to Ring devices that introduced new security settings, allowing users to opt out of such video sharing.

### How will it affect you?

If you have a Ring doorbell, make sure you've installed the update and gone through the security settings. If you're fine with the view from your door being shared with police, by all means leave that feature enabled. But while you're fiddling with the settings, ensure you've enabled two-factor authentication, restricted other third-parties from accessing the data and are using a strong password.

Also, be a good neighbour, says the EFF, and ensure your Ring camera isn't pointed at anyone else's

home - they have a right to their privacy, after all.

### What do we think?

Being able to see who's at the door is handy, but it's clear that the data systems

behind Ring haven't been well thought out. Amazon bought the company in 2018, and it's been a headache for the retailer ever since, with high-profile hacks and privacy warnings. It's a reminder to think twice before letting any cameraequipped product into your home - if Amazon, with its tech abilities and billions in



revenue, can t get this right, don't assume any other company can.

If you're eager to equip your home with smart devices, take the time to research their privacy and security policies, find out exactly what data is gathered and make sure you secure the system with a strong password.



### Google shared private videos with strangers


### What happened?

Google has admitted that some of its users had their videos accidentally shared with other "unrelated" accounts. The error occurred between 21 and 25 November, although the company has only just acknowledged the nowresolved problem with its Google Takeout service (takeout.google.com), which lets you export and download data from Google services, including Photos.

In an email apology, Google explained to affected users that "some videos in Google Photos were incorrectly exported to unrelated users' archives." It added that "the underlying issue has been identified and resolved".

Later, a spokesperson told concerned users that "we are notifying people about a bug that may have affected users who used Google Takeout to export their Google Photos content between November 21 and November 25. These users may have received either an incomplete archive, or videos - not photos - that were not theirs. We fixed the underlying issue and have conducted an in-depth analysis to help prevent this from ever happening again. We are very sorry this happened."

Reports suggest that the issue involved 0.01% of Google Takeout users. While that may seem like small beer, Google Photos has over a billion users,



meaning potentially thousands could be affected by this technical hiccup.

### How will it affect you?

If you use both Google Photos and Google Takeout, check your inbox. If your media was sent to others, Google will have let you know. The search giant is also advising people to check any downloaded data between 21 and 25 November, as "it may be incomplete, and it may contain videos that are not yours". However, it doesn't seem to be possible to remove your videos from others' accounts. It's also recommended you "perform another export of your content and delete your prior export at this time" - although, it'd be understandable

if you think twice about using the Takeout service for the time being.

### What do we think?

Google should know better. This is a serious breach of privacy that shouldn't be happening in today's connected world, let alone to 'kings of the internet'. A five-day glitch is bad enough imagine, five free days for accessing someone else's personal videos - but waiting more than two months to inform users is inexcusable. We're just thankful that it was limited to those using Takeout; if the affected issue impacted all Google Photos users, we'd be worried about recommending the otherwise excellent service in future.

### FIRST LOOK

### **Fujifilm X100V** bit.ly/fuji495

After years of playing second fiddle to smartphones, standalone cameras are making a comeback. Fujifilm's new X100V is a beautiful-looking beast. Taking its cues from the 1950s, and building on the X100's nine-year heritage, this compact digital camera is built for simplicity - those out-andabout street shots that demand to be captured by more than a pixelimperfect smartphone camera.

Build quality is solid, in part due to the milled aluminium plating at the top and bottom, which give the device heft without sacrificing its lightweight feel. The X100V now comes with a USB-C connection, too, should you need to hook up a battery pack while taking pictures on the go.

The camera has received numerous upgrades compared to its predecessor. It now runs an X-Processor 4 with a 26.1-megapixel sensor. For those seeking high- or low-angle photos, the camera features a clever tilting touchscreen. However, this new design comes at the expense of a physical directional pad for quick actions instead, users must use touchscreen gestures to enter the menu.

Allowing you to see what you're capturing in real-time, the electronic viewfinder now features an impressive 3.69 million-dot resolution and 0.52X magnification, while the company suggests that the new 23mmF2.0 lens is "enhanced for better resolution, lower distortion and improved close focus performance". Speaking of enhancements, face and eye detection

has also been improved for this model, and videos have seen an upgrade, too. Expect to capture 4K at 30fps, or 120fps in 1080p.

Although the camera can capture higher quality photos in almost all environments, this doesn't apply to poor weather because, bizarrely, the Fujifilm X100V doesn't have weathersealing. You'll need to spend extra on a protector filter for this purpose.

The Fujifilm X100V is available in black or retro-looking silver. However, the price tag may put you off: expect to pay around £1,300 for the camera.


### Is Hulu finally coming to the UK?

Streaming service Hulu has been delighting American audiences since 2007 but it's probably most familiar to UK viewers for a message stating that "this content is not available in your country" when you try to watch one of its videos.

However, it's now rumoured that the service could finally be making its way to UK shores. Hulu is owned by Disney (because

what doesn't Disney own these days?), which is thought to be looking at an international launch sometime in 2021. Before you get too excited, though, it's worth noting that the Disney Plus global rollout is firmly taking precedence. Disney CEO Bob Iger stated that: "We feel that we need to concentrate on those launches - and the marketing and the creation of product for those - and then come in with Hulu, right after or soon after that".

While Disney Plus promises to be fun for all the family, Hulu's content is typically more adult-focused. Think *The* Handmaid's Tale and Family Guy, rather than superheroes and singing lions. In the States, the company is bundling Hulu alongside Disney Plus and premium sports channel ESPN Plus. Expect a similar package once the service finally makes its way across the pond to Britain.

### Hackers use coronavirus to spread malware

Security experts have warned that cybercriminals are using new phishing campaigns to exploit fears



about the coronavirus. Emails containing links and attachments purporting to provide updates and information about the virus, but which actually install malware, have been seen in dozens of countries, including the UK and US.

One campaign, detected by cybersecurity firm Mimecast, uses emails claiming to be from health specialists to trick recipients into opening attachments "about safety measures regarding the spreading of coronavirus". Opening the attachment launches malware called Emotet, which can steal personal

data such as login details, and use an infected device to launch further attacks.

"Threat actors exploit times of confusion to conduct cyberattacks and email phishing campaigns," said Francis Gaffney, director of threat intelligence at Mimecast. "The coronavirus has a global audience. So if you say 'Coronavirus is now more prevalent!', people are more likely to click on links, because they are concerned." Gaffney advised web users to remain vigilant about emails relating to the virus.

### Avast accused of selling users' browsing data

Antivirus company Avast has closed its data-analytics unit, Jumpshot, following accusations that it was collecting data about



users' browsing activities and selling the information to third parties. Avast has

denied the allegations made by PCMag and Motherboard that the data being sold "can be linked back to people's real identities, exposing every click and search they've made". Avast CEO Ondrej Vlcek claimed that both Avast and Jumpshot had "acted fully within legal bounds".

However, when announcing the decision to close Jumpshot, Vlcek said that the "data collection business is not in line with our privacy priorities as a company. Protecting people is Avast's top priority and must be embedded in everything we do. Anything to the contrary is unacceptable".

This is the second privacy scandal to hit Avast in recent months. At the end of last year, Avast browser extensions were found to be collecting browsing data to sell to advertising firms, prompting Chrome, Opera and Firefox to pull the add-ons from their stores. bit.ly/avast495

Google has been contacting users of its Photos app to inform them that it may

have given other users access to videos, in what looks to be a worrying new privacy breach.

Google's notification email warns Photos users that if they used the 'Download your data' feature between 21 and 25 November 2019, it's possible that they accidentally downloaded videos belonging to other users. This is very concerning for those affected, because their private videos may have been accessed by complete strangers.

The notification email describes the incident as a technical issue and doesn't tell users whether their videos have been removed ff This is a serious situation and Google must provide more information and support to affected users 🦰 🥊

from other users' accounts. Instead, it states that those affected should delete their previous download and try again, which suggests Google hasn't been able to claw these videos back.

The incident will be particularly worrying for any users who have stored videos of a personal or sensitive nature on Google Photos. These people will want to know if others have accessed their videos - particularly if their content potentially

opens them up to privacy or security concerns.

This is a serious situation, and Google must provide more information and support to affected users - as well as promises that it will do everything it can to rectify the situation. As a minimum, users will want to know which of their videos have been downloaded by strangers, and what, if anything, they can do about it.



This vast resource stretching back to 1992 looks chaotic, but it's actually well structured, with colour-coded sections grouping the band's work around their nine studio albums. Each section is full of videos, photos and even glimpses of past websites. You can read news, buy T-shirts, sign up for updates and download a Radiohead Library card, but it's the music that truly thrills. All the albums are available to buy and, 'Pablo Honey' aside, stream. Watch out for lovely inclusions such as the cassette version of OK Computer, 'OKNOTOK', complete with B-sides.





We've criticised IMDb for having too few words on its homepage (see right), but this free news-aggregation service takes the opposite approach. The site scans hundreds of world news sources using artificial intelligence, then displays the new stories as a dizzying mass of headlines grouped under headings, with barely any images. There's plenty to recommend it, from the prominence it gives story originators to the fact that it offers an alternative to Google News. It takes some getting used to and would benefit from a more streamlined design, but the ad-free approach, wide number of sources and promise of no clickbait has to be good news in anyone's book.

If IMDb's redesign were a movie, it would be a highly visual blockbuster. It's much less "talkie" than the old site, doing away with vast swathes of words in favour of a homepage that's dominated by images and video. This works reasonably well on mobile devices, where words can get in the way, but it feels clumsy in a desktop browser, where the design is better suited to streaming sites such as Netflix. The format makes news and features less prominent and removes links to useful information. However, it's still an invaluable site for discovering more about movies.



### **ESSENTIAL BOOKMARKS** THIS ISSUE: Tremendous transport sites



Started as a hobby in 2001 by former British Rail employee Mark Smith, this site is an invaluable resource for people who prefer trains to planes. It explains how to travel by rail or boat from the UK to almost any country in Europe, as well as the best ways to get around anywhere from Armenia to Zimbabwe. The Man in Seat Sixty-One (his favourite spot in First Class) provides recommended train times, approximate fares, photos showing what to expect, and information on buying tickets, as well as topics including luggage, accessibility and car hire. We especially like the section on epic routes such as the Trans-Siberian Railway. With a charmingly dated design, the site even has a guestbook so you can express your thanks for its excellent tips.



### Transport for London tfl.gov.uk

Even if you don't live in London, make the TfL website your first stop when visiting the capital so you don't get lost, delayed or overcharged. The journey planner on the homepage helps you find the fastest route from A to B by bus, Tube, train, boat and bike. You can see at a glance which lines and roads are experiencing problems, and view live arrival times for specific stops, stations and piers. There are downloadable maps of the Congestion and Low Emission zones, cycle routes and much more, as well as details of how to pay for your journey and what it costs. The site even advises you about the busiest times to travel so you can avoid the crush.

Don't risk spending five hours in the air with no legroom, armrests or window - instead, check this site to find the best place to sit on the plane without overpaying for the privilege. Its latest Editor X tool - which is in beta but accepting testers - takes this further, allowing anyone to create the kind of site usually reserved for talented CSS designers. ### Make your code look good

You may have noticed that websites devoted to coding sometimes format chunks of code with colours, making it easier to



understand and - let's be honest - less boring to look at. Carbon (carbon.now.sh) does the same for your code. Drag and drop your HTML, CSS or JavaScript file into the box on the Carbon website and it automatically formats the text. You can choose from a range of colour schemes, help the site work out what type of file it is and download the result as a perfectly formatted PNG image.

### Web-building Helpdesk

I keep an eye on search engine developments and have heard Google aficionados discussing something called BERT. What is it?

BERT stands for Bidirectional Encoder Representations from Transformers. We have no idea what that actually means but it's the latest addition to Google's search algorithm, which filters websites based on the search terms people type in to deliver what it determines are the best possible results. BERT in

particular looks out for high-quality answers to questions, so Google can send



searchers to the sites that will help them resolve their query rather than those that just talk about the problem.



Click the Compare URLs/Domains tab and enter the URLs of any websites you want to compare into the box, placing one on each line. Click the 'Process urls' button. There are more column headings available than those that appear by default - click the 'Add/ hide parameters' button 11 for more options.



SEOquake shows some of your SEO information in Google's search results, which can help you work out why your site is ranking where it is. 11 When you've finished working on your site's optimisation and just want to browse the web, turn off SEOquake by clicking the switch. 2

# Monitors under £250

Replacing a tired old monitor with a new, high-quality model needn't cost a fortune, as the four monitors we've tested show

hen we buy a new PC, we spend time poring over its specifications to ensure we get the best combination of processor, memory and storage for our money. However, many of us then simply accept the manufacturer's bundled monitor without question, even though it's the part of the PC we'll spend most of our time staring at. If your monitor isn't up to scratch, don't despair. We've tested four high-quality screens that offer a good range of features and cost less than £250.

### **HOW WE TESTED**

To test each monitor, we used a calibration device called a colorimeter, which measures the contrast, maximum brightness and range of colours each screen can produce. The colour range figure we quote tells you what percentage of the colours in Microsoft's sRGB standard each monitor can display.

BenQ BL2780T | £209.97 | Buy from Amazon: bit.ly/benq495

To a casual observer, the BenQ BL2780T is unlikely to stand out. Its design is unremarkable, it has no special gimmicks to grab the attention and its price places it in the middle of our range of affordable monitors. Its 60Hz frequency and 5ms response time aren't the fastest in this group test, either - both are bettered by liyama's Silver Award-winning model, although you're unlikely to spot the difference unless you're a keen gamer.

BenQ's decision to use a 27in screen with a 1080p resolution means the individual pixels are more obvious than they are on the smaller 24in liyama monitor, but this probably won't be a problem in everyday use because you'll be sitting too far away from the screen to notice such minute detail.

In our quality tests, however, this screen revealed itself to be superb for the price. It reproduced 92.5% of the colours in the sRGB standard, which was the best performance of all the monitors on test. Even more impressive was its contrast ratio of 1,190:1, which is significantly better than its nearest competitor the Acer, and five times higher than the Dell monitor. This combination of accuracy and high contrast means images have punchy colours and deep shadows.

The BenQ monitor provides a good selection of ports, with HDMI and DisplayPort, a D-SUB port and two audio jacks, although no USB ports. It also has a pair of 2W speakers built in, which are extremely bassy but still an improvement over the speakers in liyama's monitor, which were unpleasantly tinny.

This monitor offers more height adjustment than the others, as well as a good range of tilt and swivel, and you can even rotate the screen 90 degrees and use it in portrait mode.

BenQ's monitor is the best in this group test, offering excellent quality, particularly in its contrast and colour reproduction, at a reasonable price. It isn't the best performer in every area, such as display frequency and response time, but for general PC use its flaws are likely to go unnoticed. Design-wise it might not look like much, but its strengths make it a more useful and satisfying monitor than any of its rivals.

If you're looking for a bargain, the liyama ProLite may catch your eye - it's the cheapest monitor in this group test. It's also the smallest, measuring 24in across the diagonal, but with the same 1,920 x 1,080 pixels resolution as the 27in monitors we've reviewed, it has a higher pixel density of 92ppi. You can rotate the screen into portrait



mode if you wish, and adjust the height by 130mm.

In theory, the screen's 75Hz refresh rate is good for gamers, but there are no syncing technologies to further tie it in with particular brands of graphic cards. The liyama has more ports than Dell's monitor, with HDMI, DisplayPort and D-SUB ports, as well as two USB 2.0 ports. For performance, it lags behind BenQ's Gold Award winner, though, producing 82.2% of the sRGB colour standard and a lacklustre contrast ratio of 306:1.

### **VERDICT**



This is the cheapest monitor in this group test, so is a sensible choice if you're on a very tight budget. However, the screen's quality falls some way behind that of the BenQ monitor, so it's well worth spending the extra if you can afford it.

Dell's 27in monitor is slightly cheaper than BenQ's, but it looks pricier, with a slim build and a tiny bezel around the screen. However, its beauty is only skin deep. It doesn't have a DisplayPort connection, relying instead

on HDMI and D-SUB, and

built-in speakers, either. It

can tilt backwards and forwards, but you can't adjust the height or rotate it into portrait mode. Dell doesn't even include an HDMI cable to connect the screen to your PC.

The screen is reasonably bright at 191cd/m<sup>2</sup>, but its contrast ratio of 222:1 is poor - its black level of 0.87cd/m<sup>2</sup> is too high. In practice, this makes images look pallid and washed out, while black areas appear grey and colours are inaccurate. There's no punch or vibrancy to this screen.

### **VERDICT**



This Dell monitor looks good and isn't expensive, but with a lacklustre screen it's not great value, particularly when compared with the BenQ model. The liyama monitor also has a better screen and more generous features for less money.

### Acer RT280K | £249.97 Buy from Laptops Direct: bit.ly/acer495

This monitor costs more than the others we've tested, but it justifies the increase with a 4K resolution. That's a tempting proposition at this price, and means the 28in screen has a pixel density of 157ppi.

The compromise is that the monitor uses TN technology. While that makes it the fastest



screen in our tests, with a 1ms response time, its refresh rate is just 60Hz and it doesn't support syncing with graphics cards.

In our tests, it displayed 89.1% of sRGB colours, which is fine for gaming and watching videos, but although its maximum brightness was a decent 323cd/m², its base black point of 0.37cd/m<sup>2</sup> is too high. As a result, its contrast ratio is an underwhelming 872:1.


There are plenty of inputs, including HDMI, DisplayPort and DVI, but no USB ports. We found the built-in speakers sounded too tinny for listening to music or watching movies.


### VERDICT



This 4K-resolution screen seems attractive for the price, but disappointing image quality makes it a false economy. You'd be better off spending more on a better 4K screen, or opting for the cheaper but superior Full-HD BenQ monitor.

### **OUR VERDICT**

One screen stood head-and-shoulders above its rivals in this group test of affordable monitors, and it truly deserves our Gold Award. The main focus of the BenQ BL2780T is the quality of the display, which is exceptional for the price. It's bright, handles colour well and has a decent contrast ratio. Its design is rather boring but we think screen quality is vastly more important.

We gave our Silver Award to the liyama ProLite XUB2492HSU-W1. This has the lowest price but it balances the necessary reduction in screen size and quality with a raft of extras, such as USB ports and a fast refresh rate.

In third place, the Dell SE2719H snatched the Bronze Award. However, it's a relatively poor third place, with a lower-quality screen and fewer extra features than the cheaper liyama monitor.

### Navigate Gmail using keyboard shortcuts

HelpNinja's Gmail Flash (bit.ly/flash495) will change the way you navigate your emails, thanks to a single keyboard shortcut: Ctrl+K. Rather than memorising every keyboard shortcut, use Ctrl+K to display common actions such as read, delete, archive and snooze. These are accompanied by a single letter, allowing you to perform one of 13 actions. For ninja-like typists, there's also a search bar for locating specific shortcuts.

Gmail Flash doesn't support every Gmail shortcut – you'll need to remember that it's 'R' to reply, and so on. But as a way to familiarise yourself with the basics (and keep your hand off your mouse), it's ideal. After a while, you find yourself artfully cruising through your inbox, swiftly selecting messages and responding (or not) at maximum speed. The initial tutorial is also worth watching for a 30-second overview.




### Get a minimalist New Tab page

When trying out New Tab extensions, we usually click 'Add to Chrome' wondering if it will be packed with useful features, or so poorly designed that we remove it after opening two tabs. Minimalism has rarely entered into it - until now. Minim (bit.ly/minim495) lets you take a soothing breath before diving into the din of the internet. A simple clock stands against a calming backdrop. There are no search bars or shortcuts to recent sites - just a settings cog that you can use to tweak the view, switch to a custom message or select background colours with names like Mango Pulp and Green Sea. If you like, you can add arty rotating images of New York or snow-capped mountains. Whatever you choose, Minim offers a little calm before the online storm.



### Control YouTube from any tab

Regular readers may experience a feeling of déjà vu on seeing YouTube




Remote (bit.ly/remote495), which lets you control YouTube from any tab. Only last issue, we covered Google's latest innovation – the ability to control YouTube playback from anywhere in Chrome. However, Google's option is limited in comparison, offering only play/pause, forward and back.

YouTube Remote, on the other hand, throws in a playback slider, audio controls, shuffle and a list of recommendations nestling within the List control. Multi-video support makes it easy to switch between videos by clicking the extension's YouTube logo and there's an invaluable Skip Ads setting. Even though the search bar frequently failed, this

extension is still superior to Google's own YouTube playback control.

### Highlight adverts in Google search

Google Search Ads Highlighter (bit.ly/searchads495) is a browser tool for anyone - or, more likely, everyone - who's accidentally clicked on a Google ad while using the search engine. This handy extension identifies annoying Google adverts and sponsored links, and surrounds them with an unmissable coloured box. You can change the highlighter colour by selecting from the presets or using the colour wheel, and tweak the text's opacity, so you can literally block ads by making them unreadable. It's a highly effective way to avoid ads, although extensions like this have a tendency to mysteriously disappear - we can't imagine why. Get it quick, before Google pulls it from the Chrome Web Store.







### Create disposable email addresses

Back in Issue 491 (bit.ly/ webuser491), we looked at AnonAddy - a clever tool that lets you create temporary email accounts to use when signing up for websites or mailing lists. Messages are then funnelled through to your real email address, without websites knowing who you are.




BurnerMail (bit.ly/burner495)

offers much the same service, with the added advantage that you don't even need to touch the extension to create a fake address. When you visit a site that demands an email address, you'll see an icon that looks like a small envelope on fire. Click this and the tool generates a random email address along the lines of 'website.triffin490k@tryninja.io'. The free version lets you create up to five of these, which it stores for you. If you need to use them elsewhere, you can copy them from the extension. Protecting your privacy has never been so easy.

### Get an Opera-style speed dial tab

Toolbar Dial (bit.ly/ dial495) brings Opera's finest feature, Speed Dial, to Firefox, placing all your favourite websites within



Other than that, customisation is non-existent. Each speed-dial entry is given its own coloured box with the website's URL squeezed inside. Click the link to visit that page, or drag and drop a speed-dial box to open it in a new tab.


### Turn off the lights in WhatsApp Web

WhatsApp's mobile dark mode has finally arrived in beta. Reviews have been mixed, with many testers complaining that the dark backgrounds aren't dark enough. We can expect such



kinks to be ironed out before the setting is made available to everyone.


Still, the news isn't all bad for dark-theme lovers. WhatsApp Web Dark Mode (bit.ly/whatsapp495) brings night mode to the browserbased version of the chat app. Easy on the eyes and uniquely balanced, this extension swaps glaring whites for various shades of deep blue, which stops everything bleeding into everything else, while WhatsApp's familiar greens become a more tasteful ochre. No setup is required: just install the add-on and sign in (or refresh the page). To switch back to light mode, you need to open Firefox's Add-ons Manager.

**Block unwanted** 

apps in Edge If you're running the beta version of the new Edge, there's a setting you'll want to switch on immediately: 'Block potentially unwanted apps' (PUAs). Armed with this extra layer of security, Edge shields you from 'low-reputation' apps such as adware, spyware and bloatware, which are sneakily packaged with other programs. When it detects a PUA, Edge flashes a warning, so you can click Delete. If it's an app you potentially want, click the three-dot menu and select Keep. To activate this feature, open Settings, 'Privacy and services',



Services and switch on 'Block

potentially unwanted apps.'

### Open tabs in incognito mode As the range

of extensions for Edge continues to grow, one icon in particular stands out: a spy in sunglasses, with his trilby tipped and his collar turned up.



It's called Incognito This Tab (bit.ly/incognito495) and it does away with the need to copy links from web pages, then paste them into an incognito window.

When you find yourself on a site you'd rather open in Edge's InPrivate mode - perhaps to sign in using a new account, for example - click the extension's toolbar button. You can also activate Incognito This Tab through an option in the right-click menu, or by using the keyboard shortcut Alt+O.

### **CAMERA**

### **Doubletake**

There was a time when phones with built-in cameras were considered so unusual that they had their own special name. Now, of course, pretty much every smartphone is effectively a 'cameraphone' - in fact, these days it's common to find devices equipped with not just one but two, three or even more cameras. Sadly, in the majority of cases, these cameras are intended to serve distinctly separate purposes - it's almost never possible to use both front and rear cameras simultaneously, for example. But what if it was?

That's clearly the question the camera boffins at FiLMiC Pro asked themselves when they came up with the concept for Doubletake. This app works like many other videorecording tools, with the exception that it lets you use your device as a multi-camera setup, viewing and recording clips from all the cameras on your device, either separately or simultaneously.

This provides a range of benefits, including the ability to frame your shots better by comparing different camera views side by side. You can also capture a shot and reverse a shot (for example between an interviewer and an interviewee) simultaneously without the need for two cameras, which is very useful for editing. And, if your device supports it, you can capture footage at two separate focal lengths at the same time. Doubletake also lets you use picture-in-picture (PiP) and split-screen effects, and more.

Developer FiLMiC Pro has been known to produce apps for Android, but Doubletake is currently only available for iOS. Not only that, but some of the app's key functions

- including recording on two cameras at once
- are restricted to Apple's latest, most powerful devices, so be sure to check for compatibility with your model before downloading.

### MINI WORKSHOP Capture dual-camera photos using Doubletake

Download Doubletake from the App Store, then launch it. Tap Camera Permission 11 followed by OK, then Audio Permission and OK again, then press Continue. **1** Next, you'll be taken to the main camera view. It's worth noting that, while Doubletake supports both portrait and landscape mode, for the most part, the app works better when you hold your iPhone on its side horizontally, rather than vertically.





Doubletake's main interface is straightforward. ## What are loot boxes?

Loot boxes are a feature that's appearing in an ever-growing number of console and mobile games. They offer players a chance to gain special items, such as weapons or costumes for their character, which enhance the gaming experience and can even give players an advantage. Opening a loot box costs real money, however, and because players don't know exactly what they will receive in return, some people have deemed them a form of gambling. As a result, there are growing calls for them to be banned.

## How do they work?

During a game, players are given the option to obtain and open a loot box. This grand unveiling is accompanied by flashes of light, special effects and a cascade of items falling past the screen to increase the levels of excitement. You're guaranteed to get something each

time but not necessarily what you wanted, such as a particular weapon or a coveted rare item. This can encourage players to buy another loot box for another chance of success, drawing on the feelings of anticipation and release that are typical of gambling.

## Are they really a form of gambling?

That depends on who you talk to. In 2017, the Entertainment Software Rating Board in the US said it did not consider loot boxes to be gambling and justified its position by saying that players always receive *something*. Instead, it put loot boxes on a par with collecting cards or stickers, where duplicates and unwanted items are simply part and parcel of the hobby. However, NHS England's Mental Health Director Claire Murdoch said earlier this year that she believes loot boxes are "setting kids up for addiction by teaching them to gamble on the content", and many people agree.

## How prevalent are loot boxes?

According to researchers at the University of York (bit.ly/research495), 71.28% of gamers had encountered titles containing loot boxes by April 2019 - a rise from 4.27% of gamers in March 2010. These figures were based on the 463 most-played desktop titles on the

gaming platform Steam during that period, and were compiled after a report by the Gambling Commission in 2018 found that 31% of 11 to 16-year-olds had paid money or used in-game items to open loot boxes.

Juniper Research estimates that gamers spent £23 billion on loot boxes last year, and it forecasts that the revenue will almost double by 2022. The UK alone is said to account for £270 million of loot-box purchases.

## Do loot boxes only appear in free games?

No, you'll find them in some of the biggest paid-for games around. The annual football favourite FIFA 20 offers loot boxes in the guise of Ultimate Team Packs, with algorithms determining which

footballers players receive. You'll also find loot boxes in Call of Duty: Black Ops 4, Apex Legends, Halo 5: Guardians, Counter-Strike: Global Offensive and Magic: The Gathering, so the phenomenon spans many gaming genres.

Do players have to buy loot boxes?

In general, no. In many cases, loot boxes are awarded to players who complete certain missions, achieve particular feats or level up their characters. There have even been instances of loot boxes being given away in promotions, such as when Amazon Prime subscribers were handed five standard loot boxes for the game Overwatch in 2017. If loot boxes contain only cosmetic items - a new character costume, for instance - then deciding not to buy one has no impact on the game.

## What are the worst examples?

A major turning point in attitudes towards loot boxes came in 2017 with the release of Star Wars Battlefront II for PlayStation 4, Xbox One and PC. In this game, buying loot boxes with real money gave gamers a gameplay advantage, because they contained major characters such as Darth Vader as well as other enhancements. Although it was possible to unlock these for free by playing the game, doing so would take many dozens

of hours. Paying customers were also guaranteed more Star Cards and characters, which increased the chances of in-game victory - something that encouraged the shortcut of "paying to win".

## But don't some players actually enjoy loot boxes?

From a player's perspective, loot boxes generate excitement - it can be fun to open a mystery box and see what you've got. By paying, players can also avoid having to grind through a game to unlock items for free, but this transforms the items from a badge of honour to one of prestige. Indeed, in a report called Gaming The System (bit.ly/gaming495), Children's Commissioner Anne Longfield suggested some children were being labelled "poor" by their peers if their ingame characters were not wearing or using items gained from loot boxes.

There is a strong argument that loot boxes give players something that should be available to them from the start, particularly if they've already paid for the game. It's often unclear how likely a gamer is to win a rare item, which is what makes loot boxes so addictive.

## Are games publishers responding to criticism?

Yes, but slowly. For example, the latest

Call of Duty game, Modern Warfare, featured a Battle Pass system - which lets players know what they're buying - instead of loot boxes, while Fortnite changed its system so that players could see inside loot boxes before paying. Valve now publicises the escalating odds of finding a very rare item in Dota 2. Following the outcry against Star Wars Battlefront II, EA's chief

design officer Patrick Söderlund said its loot boxes would contain only cosmetic enhancements. "We can't afford to make similar mistakes. And we won't," he said.

There's even a satirical game about the issue from EastAsiaSoft: a first-personshooter called Shadow of Loot Box.

## How are loot boxes regulated?

Some countries - notably Belgium and the Netherlands - have banned loot boxes, while China is putting regulations in place to limit daily purchases and give players a better chance of obtaining rare items. Last year, the British government's Digital, Culture, Media and Sport Committee condemned a "lack of honesty and transparency" and called for loot boxes to be regulated under gambling laws. It also called for a ban on selling loot boxes to children and an in-depth report into the long-term effects of playing video games.

## What about the video-game industry?

The Association for UK Interactive Entertainment (UKIE) recently launched a campaign called Get Smart About PLAY to make parents and carers more aware of in-game transactions. The campaign offers guidance on its website Ask About Games (www.askaboutgames.com).

Meanwhile, in the US, the Entertainment Software Association has asked Microsoft, Sony and Nintendo to reveal details of the relative rarity of virtual items and the probability of players finding them. Publishers including Activision Blizzard, Bandai Namco, EA, Epic, Konami and Ubisoft have also promised to disclose such information.



Fortunately, there are lots of great tools available that make backing up your data quick, easy and free - which only leaves the problem of deciding which one to use. In this feature, we round up and compare the best backup options available to see what tools they offer to keep your precious files safe. 

### What we liked:

Backing up the contents of your computer doesn't have to be difficult, as AOMEI Backupper Standard proves. This excellent free tool has a streamlined interface that's easy to use and offers a wealth of useful options. It can back up your system drive, hard disks, partitions, files and folders, and also clone drives and partitions. You can back up and sync to a local or external drive, USB stick. network server, NAS device or even a cloud-storage service such as OneDrive.

The Standard edition lets you schedule regular backups at a time and frequency that suit you. It offers a choice of two backup types: Full, which backs up everything, and Incremental, which backs up only files that have changed since the last backup. A Differential backup option, which targets files that have changed since the last *full* backup, is available only to users who pay for the Pro edition.

If you choose, Backupper Standard installs a service that runs scheduled tasks, and can even run a missed backup when your PC next starts up. Alternatively, you can use Windows Task Scheduler for this. The latest version of

the software adds the ability to wake your PC from sleep or hibernation to run scheduled tasks, which it does two minutes before the task is due to run.

You have several options for how the software creates your backups. Intelligent Sector Backup is the recommended choice and produces smaller image files, while Exact Backups is more precise but results in larger files. Alternatively, you can use Microsoft's Volume Snapshot Service (VSS) method or AOMEI's own backup service. There are also three compression options - none, normal or high compression and you can divide backups into custom-sized chunks or choose from the predetermined sizes.


Restoring a backup is easy enough: click the Restore button and choose to restore from a previous task, or navigate to a saved Image file.

Additional tools in Backupper Standard include a backup image explorer and the ability to create an emergency boot disk that uses either Linux or Windows PE. The program can also run commands before or after performing a backup or synchronisation.







Not everyone will appreciate Backupper's basic interface, and some features - notably system clone (which can move your entire system from one drive to another, including the OS and apps), Differential backup, and SMS and email notifications - are available only in the Professional edition, which costs \$49.95 (£37.80)

While you can schedule daily, weekly or monthly backups for free, features such as event triggers, USB plug-in and real-time sync are all reserved for Professional users.

### **OUR VERDICT**

**AOMEI Backupper Standard** is easy to use and powerful enough to satisfy the backup needs of most home users. The free version lacks a few features we'd like to see, such as Differential backups, but otherwise it's a quick, thorough and reliable backup tool.

ToDo Backup Free is easy to use and can back up your hard drives, partitions, individual files or your entire operating system, as well as clone disks. The clean interface offers quick access to the tool's various options through a strip down the left-hand side.

The program offers Full, Incremental and Differential backups, which you can run manually or according to a schedule. You can set automatic updates to run daily, weekly or monthly, at a date, time and interval that suits you, and the software can wake your computer to run a backup if it's asleep. If you miss a backup, ToDo Backup can perform that task when you next power up your PC. An 'image-reserve strategy' ensures you have only as many backup


copies as you need, which helps minimise the amount of space used.

For further space savings, the software can compress your backups, offering a choice of normal, fast or high compression, and also encrypt them for security. You can adjust the priority and transfer speeds of backups on your network, although backup and restore speeds are limited for free users.

ToDo Backup Free also comes with a number of tools that let you check a disk image, create an emergency rescue disk, mount or unmount a drive and refresh a disk.

## How it can be improved:

EaseUS ToDo Backup has long been one of our favourite backup tools, but some of its most important features are now missing from the free version, which means it's not quite as easy to recommend as it was. You can't clone your entire system or transfer it to another PC for free, and the Smart Backup feature, which targets your most important locations, isn't available either. The free version can schedule backups at a time that suits you, but the Home edition, which costs from \$29.95

(£22.67) per year, can initiate a backup in response to an event, too, such as system startup or shutdown, or plugging in a USB stick.

Email notifications and file exclusions are two more features you have to pay for, which is disappointing.

MiniTool ShadowMaker lets you back up your hard drives and partitions, as well as folders and files. You can run backups manually or schedule them at a frequency that suits you, and also create a rescue disk that will restore your operating system to a previous state if your PC fails to boot.

The interface is simple but attractive, with a strip along the top that takes you to the Home, Backup, Sync and Restore screens, as well as the Manage, Logs and Tools sections. Creating a backup is

just a matter of selecting a source and a destination, then choosing to back up now or later. You can opt for high, medium or no compression, add comments to backups, receive email notifications when a backup is complete, exclude Windows Page File and Hibernation files, and password-protect and verify your backups.

If you want to sync files or folders, select the source and destination, then click Sync Now. The Tools section includes a media builder, and lets you add a boot menu, mount or dismount tasks and clone a disk.

## How it can be improved:

ShadowMaker Free looks good and is easy to use but, like a lot of similar tools, it reserves many of its more useful features for the paid-for Pro edition, which costs from \$29 (£22.08). To make matters worse, you can't really tell what's missing until you try to access something – such as remote backup, back up on event, the ability to change data encryption and more – which

brings up a table summarising the differences between the free and paid editions. It would be much less frustrating if the unavailable features were clearly labelled as such.

## **OUR VERDICT**

ShadowMaker offers many of the features we'd expect from a free backup tool, but the interface doesn't make it clear which options are unavailable in the free version. It would be useful if we could change the backup scheme, too.

## Best of the rest

### Macrium Reflect 7 Free Edition

It's very good at what it does, but if you want to back up individual files or folders, you'll need to upgrade to the paid edition. This costs £47.95, although a 30-day trial is available that reverts to the free edition



Back in 2013, Cobian Backup's creator sold the source code to a developer but kept the rights to version 11 (codenamed Gravity). This version is still available to download for free, and it works with Windows 10. It's easy enough to use - just create a new task, choose what to back up and where (directory, FTP or manual),


## SHOULD YOU PAY FOR BACKUP SOFTWARE?

The answer to this question largely depends on what data you have on your PC and how important it is. If you use a free tool to save a copy of your data to another drive, and also back up your photos and important documents to a cloud service such as OneDrive, that's probably all you need. We always recommend keeping backups in more than one location, just in case. You should also avoid backing up to a drive that's in or connected to your PC, because that won't help you if your PC is stolen or infected with ransomware.

If you have a large quantity of essential data on your PC, such as work documents, photos and invoices, paying for a cloud backup is a wise choice, and you won't need to worry about running out of storage space. One of our

favourite backup services is Backblaze (www.backblaze.com), which offers unlimited cloud backups with no restrictions on file sizes or how often you can restore data, and costs just \$6 (£4.54) a month or \$60 (£45.45) a year. It's available for Windows and macOS, and you can access your files on iOS and Android devices. It supports two-factor authentication (2FA) for additional security, too.

Carbonite (www.carbonite.com) is one of the better known cloud backup services. Backing up a single computer

costs \$6 (around £4.54) a month (billed annually) and provides unlimited storage. For \$9.34 a month (around £7.07) the Plus version adds external hard drive backup and automatic video backup. You can make further savings by switching from a one-year subscription to a two- or three-year plan.

then select a backup type (Full, Incremental, Differential or Dummy) and set a schedule. Backups can be compressed and encrypted, too. There are lots of settings to play with, and it works very well.

However, Cobian Backup looks rather dated – the developer is said to be planning a new backup program to replace it. As a result, this software can't really compete with newer tools that are updated more often.

## **DELETE YOUR OLD WINDOWS BACKUPS**

While it's important to back up your files regularly, you'll quickly fill your destination drive if you don't manage your backups properly. If you use Windows' own backup tools, such as File History, or 'Backup and Restore', it's all to easy to run out of space.

File History (pictured) is available in Windows 8 and



10, and backs up your desktop, documents, images, music and more. To delete old backups, type control panel into the Windows search box and press Enter. Open 'System and Security', then click File History and choose the Advanced Settings link on the left. From here, you can set how often to save copies of files, and how long to keep saved versions. Change this from Forever (the default option) to something like '1 month'. Click the 'Clean up versions' link to delete older backups. Your options range from 'All but the latest one' to 'Older than 2 years', but 'Older than 3 months' is probably best.

If you're using 'Backup and Restore', open Settings and select 'Update & security'. Click Backup on the left, then the 'Go to Backup and Restore (Windows 7)' link and choose 'Manage space'. The window that opens gives you the option to view backups and change settings. The second option lets you set how long Windows keeps older system images. Click 'View backups' and you'll be able to delete the older ones.





Similarly, iPhone users can back up to Apple iCloud or use Google's service instead. If you take a lot of snaps, you'll run out of free cloud storage space in no time, but upgrading to a larger amount doesn't cost much: 100GB of Google Drive storage (which includes photos) costs from £1.59 a month, while iCloud costs 79p a month for 50GB, £2.49 for 200GB and £6.99 a month for a massive 2TB of storage.

## Back up your phone and tablet

We've already recommended Apple iCloud and Google Drive for storing photos from iOS and Android devices. These services are all you need to back up other data on your phone or tablet, too, because they're included with the device as standard.



Use iCloud to back up your iPhone or iPad and protect yourself against loss and theft


files to it that way, or use a third-party cloud storage service and app such as OneDrive or Dropbox.

Back up your browser Browsers including Chrome and Firefox save your browsing history, favourites, add-ons, cookies, preferences and other settings in your user profile. You can back this up manually by exporting that data, or use a tool such as Simple Firefox Backup (bit.ly/ffback495) for Mozilla's browser, or FBackup (www.fbackup. com) for Chrome and Firefox profiles, Edge Favorites and more.

Back up messaging chats To back up WhatsApp chats on your mobile device, tap Settings, Chats and choose Chat Backup. If you use an iPhone, your chats are backed up to iCloud, while on an Android device, they're backed up to Google Drive. You can access these backups through your



web browser on a PC or Mac.

To back up Facebook messages, log into Facebook on your computer, click the down arrow in the top-right of the screen and open Settings. Click 'Your Facebook Information', then 'Download your information'. Deselect everything, then reselect Messages to download just those conversations.

Back up your SD cards Google Backup and Sync (bit.ly/ googlesync495) can upload copies of files from SD cards, cameras and folders to Google Drive/Photos. You need a Google account to use it, but you can sign up for a new one if you need to, which may be useful for keeping your images separate from other backups.

Back up a USB stick If you want to back up a USB flash drive, the easiest way is to open it in File Explorer and copy the contents of the drive to a new location. However, if you want to make an exact bit-level copy of your drive, use the free tool ImageUSB (bit.ly/imageusb495). This can clone a drive and write its contents to multiple USB sticks. The result is an exact copy, including the Master Boot Record (MBR) and any free space. Make sure your destination drive isn't much larger than the source, however, or you could lose a lot of usable space - copy

an 8GB drive to a 16GB drive using this software, for example, and you'll lose 8GB of the destination drive.

## Protect important files using OneDrive

Microsoft's cloud storage service offers a feature that automatically syncs your Windows documents, pictures and desktop folders. To use it, click the OneDrive icon in the Windows 10 system tray and choose More, Settings. Open the 'Back up' tab, then click 'Manage backup' and choose what you want to include by clicking any of the three options (Desktop, Pictures and Documents). Windows tells you how much space each item takes up, as well as how much free space you have on OneDrive.



## Clever uses for What3words


Traditional postcodes often prove vague and inaccurate, especially on roads and in rural areas. Barry Collins explains how What3words makes pinpointing locations much easier



hat3words (what3words com) has divided the entire globe into 3 x 3m squares around 57 trillion of them! Each square, even those slap bang in the middle of the Atlantic, has a three-word address. So, for example, the entrance to 10 Downing Street is at slurs.this.shark. To try it yourself, download the free What3words app for Android (bit.ly/w3wdroid495) or iOS (bit.ly/ w3wios495) or enter the address on its website. Here are just a few of the handy things you can do with What3words.

Report a breakdown Speaking as someone who

recently spent two hours on a freezing hard shoulder because my breakdown vehicle was sent to a location eight miles away, I was hugely relieved to hear that the AA has started accepting What3words addresses. If your car breaks down, open the What3words app, press the crosshairs button to get your precise location, then give the three-word address that appears on screen to the call handler. No more guesswork over which junctions of the M25 you're stuck between.



## Find friends and family in the open

Imagine you're on a walking holiday near Grasmere in the Lake District. You've split from your companions and



now you're trying to direct them towards you, but "over here by the big tree" doesn't really cut it. What3words doesn't care if you're nowhere near a road, a building or an obvious landmark. Press the location button and you can tell your companions you're at cheaper .umbrellas.broken and be reunited in minutes, as long as they have the app, too. The same applies in car parks, at festivals or anywhere else you might spend five minutes trying to describe where you are.

## Help identify vulnerable people

It's a sad fact of life that not everyone has an address. What3words is helping those who don't have a roof over their heads, let alone a postcode. The Sleep Pod charity (sleeppod.org.uk) provides emergency tents to help the homeless stay warm and dry in the wintry weather. It now accepts What3words addresses in cities such as Bristol so that members of the public can report a vulnerable person, and volunteers can easily locate them and offer shelter.

Talk to your sat-nav If you've ever tried using voice commands to set a destination in your car's sat-nav, you'll know that it can be a painfully slow process. Thankfully, What3words is working with car manufacturers such as Mercedes to integrate its service with their in-car navigation systems. This means you'll be able to tell the car to drive to forces.



draw.putty, for example, and receive directions to the car park behind Old Trafford, rather than trying to work out its address.

## Go orienteering offline

Now there's no need to worry about soggy maps. With What3words, you can create an orienteering course that directs people to different threeword locations. But what if they can't

receive a signal on their phone? Not a problem. What3words works offline, too. Even if there's no data signal to download the map, you can switch to compass mode and follow the pointer to your next destination. It tells you the distance to the next location, too.



Get a unique door sign

Want a door sign that stands out on the street? The What3words shop (shop.what3words.com) sells

personalised plaques bearing your three-word address, which you can fix to your front door or office building. It's certainly a talking point, and the signs are reasonably priced at £9 upwards.

Windows Movie Maker 6

Discontinued: 2009

Microsoft introduced its classic videoediting program with Windows Me in 2000. Movie Maker was included in XP and Vista, too, before Microsoft ditched it from Windows 7 in favour of an inferior version that appeared in the Windows Live Essentials suite. Following its final release in 2012, Movie Maker was removed from the web in 2017 and replaced by the video editor in Windows 10's Photos app.

If, like many users, you believe Movie Maker achieved perfection in version 6, you'll be pleased to learn that you can still download it from the blog in the link above. Optimised for PCs running 32-bit or 64-bit Windows 7, 8.1 or 10, it lets you enjoy all the benefits of the old software, including the timeline, effects, titles, narration and simple interface.

Be warned, however, that there are lots of dodgy downloads masquerading as Windows Movie Maker, which may contain malware, although this one was deemed completely clean by VirusTotal.

If you'd prefer a more modern take on the program that offers additional features and works with a wider range of video formats, MiniTool is a good free

alternative (moviemaker.minitool.com). We covered this excellent program in last issue's Best Free Software section.

The hugely popular Winamp media player was treated pretty shabbily after AOL bought its development company, Nullsoft, and the once-great program was soon usurped by iTunes. After abandoning Winamp in 2013, AOL sold it to the Belgian radio service Radionomy, which proceeded to do nothing with it for four-and-a-half years.

Finally, in 2018, there were rumours that Winamp was set to make a comeback in a more streaming-friendly version and an early build was leaked online. Radionomy responded to the leak by releasing an official beta through the Winamp website that had been updated to work on Windows 8.1 and 10.

We've heard nothing since, but if you want to reinstall Winamp and listen to your music through its pleasantly nostalgic interface, we'd recommend using the official download link for Winamp 5.8, which the developers

"guarantee is safe for you to use". As Radionomy closed its streaming service last month, it's possible that Winamp could change hands again and we may yet see a version 6. You can still get help with the software and its many plugins and skins by visiting the Winamp forums (forums.winamp.com).

Classic Shell had been around for years before it suddenly gained popularity in the wake of Microsoft's ill-advised plan to make Windows 8 without a Start button or menu. This handy free tool gave users a choice of three 'classic' Start-menu styles, all offering instant access to your important programs, documents and settings. Many users stuck with it even after the Start menu made its official return in Windows 10.

When Classic Shell's developer abandoned the program in 2017, he published the source code so others could continue the project, and it soon re-emerged as Classic Start, before changing its name (for copyright

reasons) to Open-Shell. This works in exactly the same way as the original software, allowing you to customise the Start menu and button to suit your taste and needs, no matter which version of Windows you're running.

TrueCrypt was the preferred encryption tool of security experts, until it was suddenly discontinued six years ago, with the developers warning of "unfixed security issues". They also suggested that the program was no longer necessary because Windows now offered built-in support for encrypted drives and virtual-disk images.

Plenty of loyal TrueCrypt fans disagreed, and the software was swiftly 'forked' into VeraCrypt, which looks almost exactly the same as its predecessor and is constantly updated to fix and prevent security flaws. This powerful free tool can encrypt any hard drive or partition and even transform a spare USB stick into a portable private vault for your most sensitive data. It also offers more algorithm options than TrueCrypt for encrypting your files, including AES, Twofish and Serpent.

## **DOWNLOAD SAFE OLD SOFTWARE**

When companies stop supporting a program and remove its official download links, scammers and hackers often try to trick web users into installing fake, malware-infected versions. If you're desperate to get hold of a discontinued tool, visit OldVersion.com (www.oldversion .com) or OldApps (www.oldapps com), rather than searching for it on Google. These repositories offer thousands of old versions of programs for Windows, macOS and Linux, "because newer is not always better", across categories such as Image Editing, Audio Utilities and Office. Just click the name of an



abandonware application and choose the version you want to download.

Remember that outdated editions of web-connected software, such as browsers, communication tools and security programs, put your PC at risk, so they're best avoided.



With so many clever online tools and mobile apps available to help you manage your money these days, you may be wondering what's so appealing about Microsoft's longdefunct Money software. However, there are plenty of people who'll tell you it's never been bettered.

Money Plus Sunset Deluxe was released in 2011 for users who were reluctant to ditch the original program, and you can still download it for free today. This cut-down version uses the same simple interface and lets you import financial data or enter it manually; use scheduled transactions to ensure you pay your bills on time; create and track a budget; and view and print reports of your income, expenses and savings. Despite what the web page says, the software works perfectly well in Windows 10, too, although it lacks any online tools or support.

On the downside, Sunset Deluxe isn't compatible with data files created using old, non-US editions of Microsoft Money you'll need to export those to Quicken (QIF) format to open them. It also overwrites any existing versions of Microsoft Money installed on your PC.



Hiren's Boot CD Discontinued: 2012 Get it from: bit.ly/hirens495

Hiren's Boot CD was once considered the king of free bootable-recovery disks - an essential all-in-one tool for any IT professional or computer buff looking to sort out a failing or faulty PC. Then, for a long time, the project was discontinued, until fans took up the challenge to bring it back and keep it in development for a new audience.

The resurrected Hiren's Boot CD uses Windows PE, a lightweight version of Windows 10, but it still provides every tool you need to repair or recover a broken or malware-infected PC. These include driver-management tools, a reset-password feature for when you're locked out, useful programs such as Rufus and Malwarebytes, and the ability to retrieve lost files from your hard drive. If your computer is particularly old, you can also download official, pre-discontinuation editions of the software from the website.

## Best free portable image viewers

There are better ways to browse and view your images than the Microsoft Photos app in Windows 10, especially if you need a tool you can take anywhere. Steve Clark puts six portable image viewers in the frame


Microsoft's latest Photos app now comes as part of Windows 10 whether you like it or not. As with most bundled programs, however, that

doesn't mean there aren't better options available. We set ourselves the task of finding alternative lightweight portable image viewers that offer faster and more efficient ways to view your photos.

Ask people to recommend an alternative image viewer and you won't have to wait long before someone mentions FastStone. Famous for its speed and simplicity, this hard-working program supports most image formats.

It's this simplicity that informs FastStone Image Viewer's design. A toolbar of quick actions along the top caters for most needs, while three icons at the far end let you switch layouts without having to scour drop-down menus. Double-click an image to open it in glorious, distraction-free full screen and to enable one-click grab-and-zoom.

FastStone Image Viewer is streamlined but not short of features. It offers a basic range of effects, including a couple that turn your photo into an oil painting or a sketch. This is perhaps a



little cheesy in the age of powerful PhotoShop filters, but you'll also find more useful tools for creating borders and adding watermarks. Colour tweaks, lighting adjustments and image sharpening are on hand in their most basic (though arguably more useful) forms, and FastStone handles image conversions with ease. With just a couple of clicks, your JPEG becomes a TIFF or a GIF.

The program also receives regular updates to iron out bugs, improve performance and add new filetypes.

## How it can be improved:

It's rare that we come across a piece of software that can't really be improved.

At the very least, we usually find a slight niggle. More often than not, we stumble on a glaring oversight or design flaw. FastStone Image Viewer, however, does its job perfectly. There's nothing to add to this well-oiled machine that the developers aren't probably already working on in the background.

## **OUR VERDICT**

FastStone Image Viewer is a streamlined and incredibly capable tool that meets every user's basic requirements. This is one portable image viewer that you'll want to use wherever you go.

### What we liked:

FastStone may be the first name on everyone's lips when it comes to image viewers, but IrfanView is never far behind. As quick and

lightweight as its rival, this single-pane tool places the focus solely on your photos. We love the Blade Runner-style effect of zeroing in on specific areas of photos, then clicking inside the box to zoom in further.

The interface places a handful of basic actions in a row above the image, while the more in-depth controls are hidden away in menu tabs. Don't let the design fool you: IrfanView packs in plenty of photo-enhancing options and effects. Visit the Image tab and you'll find a host of image-editing options - in fact, the list is so long that a few more sub-menus would make it easier to use. It's here that you can perform most tweaks, from rotation and panorama creation to colour corrections.

Like FastStone, IrfanView also receives frequent updates from its developers.



## How it can be improved:

There are a few minor tweaks IrfanView could make. For instance, it doesn't offer a tree-view layout - although once you've opened a photo in File Explorer, you can at least cycle through every image in the folder. Also, despite offering a plugin that can edit the date and time in a photo's EXIF data, there's no option to wipe the data, which seems odd in these security-conscious times.

## **OUR VERDICT**

If you want a truly basic tool - and we mean that as a compliment -IrfanView deserves space on your USB stick. Not only does it display photos, it lets you edit them, too.

## **BEST OF THE REST**

## **EZView**

At first glance, EZView may seem lacking compared with other tools in our test. For a start, its list of supported image formats isn't quite as encyclopaedic, although it can handle the most common file types,

so that shouldn't be a problem. There's a customisable ribbon of hot-keys, but with so few



options - and no editing tools whatsoever - it's hard to see what's worth removing. Used strictly as an image viewer, however, it's fast and easy to use.

## **JPEGView**

JPEGView is so super-light, it barely has an interface at all. Images open in full-screen with a few options at the bottom that are so faint, you could easily miss them to begin with. Once you get used to the

interface, you'll find this a surprisingly sophisticated tool that offers an



unprecedented range of image adjustment. It can be frustrating, though: exit the full-screen view, for example, and you need to load the entire tool again.

## **Void Image Viewer**

Void Image Viewer is an old favourite that looks similar to EZView. There isn't much on offer here other than a standard, if unimaginative, image viewer. This tool has a solid pedigree, though,

because it's from the same stable as the much-loved (and also



portable) Everything file locator (bit.ly/ every495). Void's selling point is its animation options, which allow the tool to cycle through photos according to your preferences.

## What we liked:

Like Microsoft Photos, Honeyview is an incredibly simple program

that mixes image viewing with basic editing tools in a svelte package. And the emphasis here is

firmly on 'basic'.

A playback-style bar at the foot of the screen lets you open photos and cycle between them using the 'fast-forward' and 'rewind' buttons. Zoom and rotate controls are within easy reach, too. In the centre of this bar is a handy slider control that lets you flick effortlessly between images. Or, if you're feeling playful, you can drag the slider back and forth to create the illusion of video.

There are no fancy tab menus here. Six buttons provide access to all HoneyView's other functions, such as the EXIF icon, which lets you view any data embedded in the photo, including when and where it was taken,



and the model of camera used.

Click the Edit button and you're hardly spoilt for choice: the only controls on offer are convert, copy, open, and set as background image.

## How it can be improved:

A few more editing options wouldn't go amiss, even if you don't need much more than the Windows 10 program offers. If you right-click a photo, you'll find a few extras in the context menu but Honeyview is not a practical choice for anything but the most basic uses.

## **OUR VERDICT**

If you want something just like Microsoft Photos, Honeyview is your best bet. The minimalist layout and foolproof playback bar are great, as is its wide format support. The lack of features lets it down, however.



loatware is the unwanted software that comes preinstalled on your PC when you first get it. If you don't take steps to remove it, you'll be stuck with it forever, polluting your Start menu and hard drive, tempting you to play vapid games and littering your menus with sponsored tools you'll never use.

You can uninstall some of these unwanted programs in the usual way, but others are more stubborn, so to shift them you'll need to type some commands into PowerShell. At the end of this Workshop we'll show you a neat PowerShell script that wipes all the bloatware from your PC – as long as you're happy to give up any choice about what stays and what goes.

Now take a look at your Start menu. If it's cluttered with unused icons that have been around since your PC was new, there's no better time to wipe it clean.



Here's a short list of some of the bloatware software names you'll need for step 3:




Whenever you want to uninstall some software, it's best to try the standard Windows method first. Find the unwanted program on your Start menu and right-click it. Choose Uninstall, 11 then click Uninstall again to confirm your decision. With a bit of luck, Windows will remove the program without any further complications.



There may be programs on your Start menu that you want to remove only for the current user. You can do this by hiding them. Although it may look a little advanced, the easiest way to achieve this is to use PowerShell. Find Windows PowerShell in the Start menu 1 and launch it in administrator mode. 2




Type the command: Get-AppxPackage 1 and press Enter. PowerShell presents you with a list of all the preinstalled apps you might want to remove. 2 Find the 'Name' entry for the app you want to get rid of. We've listed a few common examples in our Expert Tip at the top of this page.



Now type Get-AppxPackage \*name\*, 1 leaving the asterisks but changing name to the name of your chosen app. You don't have to type the whole thing - the asterisks will capture most of it. Press Enter. If PowerShell comes back with more than one app, type more of the name between the asterisks to ensure there's only one result. 2






Now you can remove the app by typing Get-AppxPackage \*name\* | Remove-AppxPackage 1 and pressing Enter. Remember, this only removes the link to the software from the current user account, so it's still available to your PC's other users.

To completely purge your PC of a particular piece of bloatware, type DISM /Online /Get-ProvisionedAppxPackages | select-string Packagename. 1 Look through the list of items PowerShell returns to find the app you want to remove. 2


Highlight the program's PackageName. 1 Note that this will remove the app completely for all users. Press Ctrl+C to copy its name to the clipboard. Then type DISM /Online /Remove-ProvisionedAppxPackage /PackageName: 2 but don't press Enter yet.



At the end of the line, paste the PackageName you copied earlier by pressing Ctrl+V. 1 Now press Enter. A message appears confirming that you have deleted the app. 2 You can check it's gone by re-entering DISM /Online /Get-ProvisionedAppxPackages |

If you'd rather remove all your bloatware in one go, download Windows 10 Debloater from Github at bit.ly/bloat495. Click the 'Clone or download' button, save the zip file and unpack it to a convenient folder. 11 Then run PowerShell as an administrator as you did in Step 2. 2




Type powershell.exe -ExecutionPolicy Unrestricted. 1 Use the cd command to switch to the folder you unpacked the files to - in our case cd c:\users\aannd\Desktop\Windows10Debloatermaster. Type .\Windows10Debloater 2 and agree to everything. Then wave goodbye to all your bloatware.



## View all your downloads in one place


irsoft's BrowserDownloadsView is a clever free tool that combines the download histories of the most popular browsers into a single list, so you don't have to switch between browsers to see the files you've downloaded.

It supports Firefox, Chrome and Chromiumbased browsers including Edge, Vivaldi and Opera. No setup is required – simply download the program and open it.






The program's familiar Windows list view shows you every file you've downloaded using a supported browser, 1 where you downloaded it from 2 and when. 3 Scroll right for more details. To open a file, right-click to view the context menu, then choose Open/Run Selected Filename. 4




The context menu contains other useful options, too.
With a right-click, you can open the URL of a downloaded file 1 or visit the web page it came from. 2 More useful - especially for security-conscious readers - is the option to 'Open File In VirusTotal Web Site'.




A toolbar at the top of the window lets you perform quick actions, such as saving, 1 refreshing 2 and copying. 3 You can locate specific files by selecting Find 4 and using the search box. Alternatively, click View, then Use Quick Filter 5 to narrow down the results.



A hash is a mathematical operation that lets you verify the authenticity of downloaded files. To calculate MD5, SHA1, SHA256 or SHA512 hashes of single or multiple files, right-click the file or files, then select your chosen hash. 1 Drag the scroll bar to the right to view the hash. 2



Keeping a list of current downloads across all your browsers is simple. To create a text file, click the Save icon. 1 Alternatively, click View 2 and look for the HTML Report section. 1 You can create a list of All Items or Selected Items. The list then opens in your browser. 4



Open the Options menu and select Advanced Options. 1
The 'Load downloads from' menu 2 lets you view downloads for all users, current users or specific folders or browsers. 3 You can even retrieve downloads from remote computers by using the Computer Name text field. 4



## Stop Facebook tracking your activities


t's no secret that Facebook collects information about us while we're using it, but the company revealed a while ago that it also collects information about us from businesses and websites it interacts with. Now you can opt out of this 'off-Facebook' data collection, anonymise your Facebook account and remove existing data the company has collected about your browsing habits.


From the menu in the top-right corner, choose Settings, 1 then click 'Your Facebook information'. 2 Find the (Off-Facebook Activity' section in the list and click the View link. **B** Two options appear in the box on the right. Select 'Manage your Off-Facebook activity'.




You'll see a long list of sites and apps that share your activity with Facebook. You can wipe all the data in one fell swoop by clicking the 'Clear history' button. 🚺 The number that appears over a website's icon 2 tells you how many times the site has reported your activity to Facebook.



If the number for a website is '20+', click to see an exact figure. 11 If you don't want Facebook to receive any more information from this source, click the link to 'Turn off future activity from...' Be aware, however, that if you use Facebook to log into the website, you may lose your account.



To see what data companies have shared, click the 'X interactions were received' section. Scroll down and select Download Activity Details. To see off-Facebook activity only, click 'Deselect all', scroll to 'Ads and businesses' 1 and tick the box. 2 Scroll back up and click Create File.



Facebook sends an email to confirm that it's creating the file and another when it's done. Click the link to the 'Download your information' page, then 'Available copies'. 1 Press the Download button, 2 unzip the file that downloads and drag the index.html file into your browser.



If you don't want Facebook to share your data with its partners, click the Manage Future Activity link, then the Manage Future Activity button. Switch off the 'Future off-Facebook activity' option. 11 Facebook will warn that you may lose your logins, but if you don't mind, click Turn Off.







## **Install walkie-talkie apps**

If you want to get through to the younger generation, the easiest way is through their phones. After all, if a child isn't near enough for you to see and speak to them, there's a good chance they're looking at a screen in a different room. You could call them or send a WhatsApp message, but a simpler solution is to install a walkie-talkie app on everyone's devices. This lets you send quick voice

messages to anyone at the click of a button, and has the benefit of being fun to use - initially, at least.

A number of 'push-to-talk' apps are available for iOS and Android. Zello (zello.com) is a paid-for tool aimed at businesses, but it also offers free cross-platform apps for home use. The app lets you speak to others over your network and send text messages and photos - perhaps a picture of the dinner that's waiting on the table, for example. There are no adverts to worry about, and if you need to speak to more than one person at a time, you can add several contacts to a group chat. This transmits everything you say to all the group's members simultaneously. Responses are also relayed to everyone, unless someone decides to reply to you only. We'll show you how to set up and use Zello in our Mini Workshop opposite.

Apple Watch has a built-in walkie-talkie that lets you chat with other Apple Watch-owning friends and family members

You can toggle between the various status settings (Available, Solo or Busy) at any time by tapping the link at the bottom of the talk screen. If you receive a message while you're busy or offline, the app stores it and then plays it to you when you're next available.

Other free walkie-talkie apps worth considering are Voxer (www.voxer.com/individuals) for iOS, Android and the web, and VoicePing (www.voicepingapp.com). Like Zello, VoicePing is a tool that's designed for businesses but can be used by anyone.

## Use Apple Watch

If you and at least one family member own Apple Watches, you can chat to each other using the walkie-talkie feature. For this to work, you also need iPhones running iOS 12.4 or later, with the FaceTime app set up to make and receive FaceTime audio calls. To start a chat, open the app, select your contact and wait for them to accept your invitation. The app works just like a typical walkietalkie: press and hold the talk button, start speaking, then let go of the button when you're finished. Saying "over" after each sentence and "over and out" when you've finished the conversation is entirely optional.


## Use your smart speakers

Many homes have one or more Amazon Echo or Google Home devices. Both systems offer a broadcast feature that lets you make announcements to all the smart speakers in your home - the modern equivalent of bellowing up the stairs. You don't need to install anything to use this feature, or even spend time setting it up. Simply say the relevant broadcast commands, followed by whatever it is you want to announce.


This approach does have some limitations compared with a walkie-talkie app on your phone. It's a one-way broadcast, for example. You can tell everyone "dinner's ready!" or "the film is about to start", but you won't receive a reply unless each person announces their response (which could get annoying). You also need compatible smart speakers throughout the house (although you can also make broadcasts – but not receive them – using the smartphone app).


## MINI WORKSHOP | Turn your phone into a walkie-talkie with Zello



Install Zello on your phone and give it the permissions it needs. If you want to use headsets, microphones and speakers, allow Bluetooth. Sign up by entering a username, password and email address. Once you've logged in, you can customise your account and change your status. Then you can start adding contacts.



Test your audio by selecting 'echo'. To add a new contact, tap the Add button. You can search for a Zello contact by username, use your phone contacts or, if your contact is nearby, scan a QR code. To view a person's QR code, tap their username, then the QR button.



When you add a contact, they need to accept your request before you can start communicating with them. To chat, press and hold the talk button, speak, then let go when you've finished. Click the camera button take and send photos. You can also play back the last message.

Use the Google Assistant app to broadcast a message through your Home speakers

If there are certain rooms you don't want to include in your broadcast perhaps because a baby is sleeping in one - you can use the Do Not Disturb setting to exclude a room (or rooms) from your announcement.

Alexa announces incoming messages with a chime to get your recipients' attention, followed by the message, which it broadcasts in your voice. Make sure you speak clearly when recording your message, especially if you're using an Echo to broadcast the announcement. For the clearest possible message, use the smartphone app and microphone on your phone.

## The benefits of a home intercom system

It may seem rather lazy to set up an intercom system to communicate with people in your own home. After all, shouting was good enough for our parents and grandparents. However, there are plenty of benefits besides simply saving your voice and your patience. An intercom is particularly useful if you have an elderly relative living with you, for example, because

they can make a voice announcement to Alexa or Google Assistant if they need help and can't reach their phone.


You can also use the system remotely to tell everyone in the house that you're on your way home, rather than having to send multiple texts or WhatsApp messages. The only downside with using Alexa or Google Assistant in this way is that you won't necessarily know whether anyone has received your announcement.




## MINI WORKSHOP | Broadcast a message to everyone in the house with Amazon Echo



**Broadcasting announcements** through your Echo speaker is easy - just say: "Alexa, announce" (or "broadcast") followed by your message. You can also make an announcement through the Alexa app. Simply press the Alexa button at the bottom, **1** then speak the command above followed by your message.



If a particular Echo device isn't broadcasting your announcements, open Settings in the Alexa app, then Device Settings. Tap the name of the unresponsive Echo, then scroll down and press Communication. Make sure the Communication setting is enabled for this device, 1 as well as the Announcements setting. 2



There's also a handy Do Not Disturb entry in the app's Device Settings. Enable this, 11 then configure start and end times 2 to stop any announcements coming through that particular Echo device. Remember to disable the feature when you no longer need it so that future broadcasts can be heard once more.

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

## Get more from your mobile device's lock screen

## Add important information to your lock screen

ndroid phones and tablets are much more customisable than Apple devices, with built-in settings and lots of apps that can completely change the way the operating system looks and behaves. Because there are so many different makes and models of phone, not to mention versions of Android, the features available may differ, but try opening Settings, 'Lock screen & security', 'Info and app shortcuts'. Tap 'Owner information' and enter some text you'd like to appear on the lock screen, such as "If lost, call 01234 56789", which could be your home phone or your partner's mobile number. Doing this could help you get your lost phone back. Alternatively, you could show important medical information in case someone checks your phone if you have an accident.

## Choose lock screen shortcuts

It's possible to place app icons on your lock screen so you can access them



Add apps to Android's lock screen for quick and easy access

quickly without having to unlock your phone. On Android phones, go to Settings, 'Lock screen & security', 'Info and App Shortcuts', then 'App shortcuts'.

The options available may vary depending on which phone and Android version you have, but look for left and right shortcuts for the bottom left and right corners of

your lock screen. Tap 'Left shortcut', activate the switch and select an app.

Most apps still require you to unlock your phone before you can use them, but at least this shortcut saves you hunting through screens of icons. The camera app is an exception: by adding it to the lock screen, you can take a quick snapshot without first having to unlock your phone and locate the app, which means you need never miss a photo opportunity.


## **Choose iPhone lock** screen options

Apple's iPad and iPhone offer less scope for customisation than Android devices, but there are some optional features that you can enable and disable. Open Settings and tap Face ID & Passcode. Swipe up, and at the bottom of the screen you'll see a section called Allow Access When Locked.

Here you'll find on/off switches for the Today View, Notification Centre, Wallet,

Siri and more. Activating any of these items lets you access them while your iPhone is locked - but bear in mind that anyone else who picks up your locked device can access these features too.

If you decide you want access to Siri from the lock screen, for example, flick the switch on.



Choose which features can be accessed from the iPhone lock screen

You can then perform all sorts of tasks without unlocking your iPhone. You could say "Hey Siri, tell me a joke," or ask a more serious question. Go to Settings, Siri & Search, and you can also enable or disable 'Suggestions on Lock Screen'.

As mentioned above, if you activate Siri on the lock screen, anyone who gets hold of your iPhone can try to use it too, potentially giving them access to all sorts of things. Siri shouldn't comply, but if you're worried, disable lock screen access.

Notes is another app you can access without unlocking. Open Settings, Notes, 'Access Notes from Lock Screen'. The options here include Resume Last Note, which is useful if you need to add to a note throughout the day. As with Siri, though, you need to consider the balance between convenience and security before enabling this option.

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

## Set the lock screen wallpaper

Fresh wallpaper can give your device a whole new look. Changing your lock screen's background image is easy, and you can use a different image on your home screen.

To do this on an Apple device, go to Settings, Wallpaper, 'Choose a New Wallpaper'. You have a choice of Dynamic, Stills and Live categories. Tap an image to see a full-screen preview, then tap Set. This gives you the option to use it on the lock screen, home screen or both. As well as the images supplied, you can select one of your own photos. Open a photo in the Photos app, press the actions button at the bottom of the screen, pull up the menu and select 'Use as Wallpaper'.

On an Android phone, go to Settings,



Select a photo in Google Photos and set it as the lock screen wallpaper

'Wallpaper and themes'. There are usually several to choose from. Select one, then choose whether to use it on the lock screen, the home screen or both. There may be additional wallpapers from your phone's manufacturer.

To use your own photos on the lock

screen, open Google Photos in Android and select a photo. Tap the three-dot menu in the top-right corner, then 'Use as'. The options include 'Lock screen' and 'Home screen'.

## Configure the Today screen

Swipe right on the lock screen on an iPhone or iPad to see the Today screen. Some apps have widgets you can add to show information, such as upcoming appointments, local places of interest, traffic information, weather and more.

On the home screen, swipe right and tap Edit at the bottom to see a long list of widgets. Tap the plus sign next to a widget to add it to the Today screen. Choose wisely, though, because anyone who picks up your phone can see your widgets. Most show general information rather than anything private, but check after adding anything new.

## Choose an Android unlock method

Open Settings, 'Lock screen & security' and select Lock Type. Here you'll find several unlock methods to choose from. Never select Swipe, because this disables Android Pay and you have to go through the hassle of authorising your phone with your bank all over again.

Pattern is an unusual way to unlock a phone using a grid of nine dots. Trace a pattern from dot to dot and store it. You must then trace the same pattern on your lock screen to access your phone. If you don't have this feature on your Android phone, install Pattern Lock Screen (bit.ly/ pattern495) or Lock Screen (bit.ly/ lock495) from the Play store.




Some versions of Android let you unlock your phone by swiping a pattern of dots

## Use a smart lock

Some Android phones have a Smart Lock feature that locks or unlocks your device automatically depending on certain conditions. For example, on-body detection keeps your phone unlocked while it's in motion, such as while you're holding it. Then when you put it down, it locks.

You can also set your phone to unlock in certain locations using the 'Trusted places' option. If you activate it while you're at home, your phone remembers the location using GPS and automatically stays unlocked. It locks when you leave.



## Automatically lock and unlock Android phones depending on conditions

'Trusted devices' can also unlock your phone when it's near another device such as your computer, car or smartwatch. Move away and it locks. This works using Bluetooth - simply pair your phone with the other device.

To activate these options, go to Settings, 'Lock screen & security', Secure Lock Settings, Smart Lock.



## Customise lock screen notifications

Some apps produce notifications. Messaging services, text messages and email are obvious examples, but there are many more. Both Android and iOS let you set which notifications can appear on the lock screen.

In Android, go to Apps, tap an app and select Notifications. Use the master switch at the top to allow or block notifications. Tap 'On lock screen' for three options. 'Do not show notifications' is obvious, but the other two are Hide and Show content. These let you decide whether notifications include part of your email, text message and so on. You may want to be notified without enabling others to read your texts when they appear on the lock screen.

On an iPhone, go to Settings then Notifications to choose which app notifications show on the lock screen.



## Get more options on older phones

Old versions of Android allow apps to modify the lock screen and add information and features. For versions of Android up to 7, try apps such as Floatify Lock Screen (bit.ly/float495). This lets you reply to messages from the lock screen, control your music and perform direct actions.

## Fix problems with an old tablet

I'm having trouble with my Samsung Galaxy Note 10.1 tablet. When I first switch it on, the home screen goes black and takes a long time to come back. Then it says I have no recently used apps. Swiping to get to the home screen is difficult, and often activates S Voice instead. If I do manage to get to the home screen, I find I can't connect to the internet.

I've tried various suggestions for solving this problem, such as resetting the device, and turning flight mode on and off. When I go into settings and try to connect to my home WiFi, the tablet won't let me enter a password.

I think this problem occurred after I connected the tablet to a new Sony TV to use screen mirroring. I don't know whether it's a hardware or software problem, and because it's a fairly old tablet, I don't know if it can be repaired. I have a few apps and


Amazon Kindle books on it, which I fear I may lose.

## Alison Dandy, via email

Is the tablet faulty or just very slow? We had an Android tablet that became slower with every operating system update until eventually it was unusable. The problem was that the processor, memory and storage simply weren't up to running the latest versions of Android and apps. Looking at your tablet's specification, however, that doesn't seem to be the case. It should be good enough.

You can't repair the hardware, so the only thing that might help is to erase the tablet and reset it to its factory defaults. This removes all your apps, settings, files, passwords and so on, and can breathe life into a slow Android device.

The location of the factory reset option varies depending on the version

of Android you're running, but look for it in Settings, General Management. Make sure there's nothing on the tablet that you need because everything will be erased. If you then set up the tablet using the same username and password as before, it will restore many items automatically. You can then restore other items manually, including free and paid apps such as Amazon Kindle and your books.

## **GENERAL PC**

## Reclaim space to update

I have an HP Stream 11 laptop that runs Windows 10 and has 2GB of memory. It also has 29.1GB of storage, of which 25.3GB is in use. There are only two programs on the PC, WordPad and CCleaner, both of which are installed on an SD card. When I try to download the Windows 1903 update, the PC tells me to remove 8GB from the C: drive, even though I've inserted a large SD card and memory stick. I've tried using Cleardisk but there's nothing left to remove, and the update still fails every time. Is there another way I can get the update or do I need to ditch the laptop?



We don't think manufacturers should sell laptops with just 32GB of storage because it causes problems like this. What usually happens during an update is that Windows downloads the necessary file, which is around 5GB. It

then backs up your system files, which may use up to 25GB. This means Windows needs 30GB of free drive space just to perform an update.

One thing you should do is compress the drive to free up space. Open Explorer and select This PC in the sidebar. Rightclick the C: drive, then select Properties from the menu. In the window that appears, tick the box next to 'Compress this drive

If you run out of space on a drive, tick 'Compress this drive to save disk space'

to save disk space'. Click Apply. When the process has finished, everything will look and work as it did before, but you'll have more free drive space.

Next, right-click OneDrive in Explorer and select Settings. On the Settings tab, tick 'Files on demand'. Click the Backup tab, then 'Manage backup'. Add Desktop, Documents and Pictures, then click 'Start backup'. Once you've done that, use Explorer to move any files in C:\Users\YourName\Desktop to the OneDrive Desktop folder. Repeat this for Documents and Pictures. When everything has synced, right-click OneDrive in Explorer and select 'Clear space'. This won't delete any files but it will clear some space.

Run Disk Clean-up from the Start menu and, in the next window, click 'Clean up system files'. Select all the options and delete everything. With luck, you may have recovered the 8GB you need to perform the update.

Finally, download the Windows Media Creation tool (bit.ly/wini495), which lets you turn a USB memory drive into a bootable drive with Windows on it. This saves you having to download the 5GB Windows Update to your PC's internal drive. Run Setup from the USB drive to install the update.

## Cover your tracks on an iPad

How do I delete all my browsing history, cookies and other traces of my web activities on my iPad? Is this even possible?

Yes, it's possible, and it's also easy to do. Open Safari and press the book icon in the toolbar. Tap the clock

icon to open the History tab, then tap Clear. Safari gives you the option to remove browsing data for 'The last hour', 'Today', 'Today and yesterday' or

'All time'. You'll also find an option to 'Clear History and Website Data' when you open the main iOS Settings and select Safari.

If you simply want to remove details of one particular website, go to Settings, Safari, Advanced, Website Data. Here you'll see a list of all the websites that have stored data on your device, either through browsing or adverts. Swipe left on an entry to delete it.

If you want to cover your tracks or appear anonymous on the web, open Safari and tap the two-squares icon. Select Private, followed by the plus sign to open a private browsing window. You have no history or cookies in this mode, and when you quit and return to normal browsing, any history or cookies saved during your private browsing session are deleted.

Similar options are available in Chrome. Tap the menu icon, select History, then Clear Browsing Data. You can choose exactly what you want to clear and how far back you'd like to clear it.


## **Block tracking** cookies

I've been using a program called HitmanPro (www.hitmanpro .com) to monitor my PC for malware and, if necessary, remove it. If I run it after browsing the web for a while, it finds dozens of tracking cookies, and I have to remove them. Other than HitmanPro, I only use Windows Defender for security. Is that why I keep getting this malware? Should I buy different security software instead?

Tracking cookies aren't considered malware, so security software tends not to block them. They are a privacy concern, however, because advertisers use them to record information about the adverts you've been shown while browsing. This might tell them which ads you've seen and how many times you've seen them. It might also report what other pages you've visited on the same site.

People don't like advertisers tracking their online activities, so they use browser tools to block trackers. The new Edge browser, based on




Tracking prevention is one of the features in Microsoft's new Edge browser


Chrome, has tracker-blocking features built in, so you don't have to install any extensions.

Go to the menu, Settings, 'Privacy and services'. Turn on the 'Tracking prevention' switch, then choose between Basic, Balanced and Strict. If you block too much, some websites may stop working. Try the Strict setting, but switch to Balanced if you run into problems.

If you use Chrome, try the Ghostery extension (bit.ly/ghost495). This has 2.6 million users and a high rating, and is one of the most popular extensions for blocking trackers. Privacy Badger (bit.ly/privbad495) is an alternative option. When it sees a tracker on three sites, it blocks it automatically.

## Choose whether to partition your hard drive

My new computer has a 1TB drive, which means I have plenty of free hard drive space. I was thinking of using a tool to create two or more partitions on the drive. What are the advantages of having two 500GB partitions instead of one 1TB partition? Would you recommend it?

A partition can be useful for storing media. For example, some people have over 100GB of photos and videos. It makes no difference to the computer where you put them, but you

may find it more convenient to organise them into folders on a separate disk partition.

If you can manage with 500GB or less of hard drive space for Windows and your files, you could create a second partition to store backups using backup software. This won't protect your data from a hardware fault, but hard drive problems are often software-based, such as corruption or malware. In either case, you could boot from a rescue disc or USB flash drive and restore your backup from the second partition.

Our preference, however, is to create a single partition for Windows and all our files, and use an external USB hard drive for storing backups.

## Fix a sleeping laptop error

My laptop goes into sleep mode when I shut the lid, and wakes when I open it again. However, it often crashes when resuming and displays a green screen that says it's gathering data to send a report to Microsoft. Then it restarts and works normally.

To avoid this, I shut down rather than using sleep mode, because the laptop has no trouble starting from cold. Is there anything I can do to stop the laptop crashing so I can just close the lid?

Try quitting all your open software before you close the lid. It may be that restoring a particular program is causing the green screen. In theory, your software should just resume where you left off, but you never know.

The cause is probably an incompatible driver or a bug that's generating an error when the PC wakes from sleep mode. Updating the drivers may be the solution. Click Start, type Device Manager, then open it. Expand each section all the way down to, but not including, 'System devices'. Right-click each item and click 'Update driver'. Select 'Search automatically for drivers'.

It's a long, tedious process and Driver Booster Free (bit.ly/driboo495) can do the job faster. Always create a backup before updating drivers, just to be safe.


If new drivers don't help, you'll just have to set the laptop to shut down when you close the lid, instead of sleeping. Open the Control Panel and click Power Options in 'Small icons' view. Click 'Choose what closing the lid does', then change the option next to 'When I close the lid' to 'Shut down'.

## Replace old email software

I can no longer send or receive messages in my email program, Windows Live Mail. When I contacted my email provider, they told me they no longer support it. What can I do?

Windows Live Mail is an old program that Microsoft created for Windows 7. The company has long since abandoned it, so it's no longer safe to use. Many people access their email in a web browser these days, so this may be a good option if your email service provider offers it. Alternatively, Windows 10 has a basic

Mail app you can use instead, although if you still use Windows 7, you would need to upgrade to 10 first.

Thunderbird (www.thunderbird.net) is a free email program from Mozilla, the makers of Firefox, that still works in Windows 7. Another good option is eM Client (www.emclient.com), which also offers a free version.



The only thing more annoying than nuisance emails is nuisance phone calls. Luckily, it's easier to put an end to unwanted email. If you receive mail from sites you have an account with, log in and see if you can change your email preferences. Look for an 'Unsubscribe' button at the bottom of the email, too.

Both Gmail and Outlook now offer tools for dealing with unwanted messages. Open and click the three-dot menu inside an unwanted email, and you should see options to block the sender or mark the email as spam. After a while, Gmail and Outlook remember this and automatically junk these emails for you.

If you're still having problems, create a rule telling your email provider to redirect messages from specific senders and addresses to the Junk or Trash folder. That way, you won't even see them arrive.





## **Use Word Online's editing** tools

I'm writing a book in Word Online (bit.ly/word495), which I hope will eventually be published as a Kindle ebook, although I still have a long way to go. When I get the chapter back, I can see the changes she's made alongside my original work. Rightclicking a change highlighted in red opens a menu with options to accept or reject the change. I find this very useful.

## Print lists of multiple PC files

In Roland Waddilove's solution to JR Pound's query "Print a list of PC files" (Issue 492, bit.ly/webuser492), he suggests entering the following command into the command line: dir \*.avi /b /s >files.txt.Iuse this command a lot for various file extensions. and add the result to the "files.txt" file. However, there are more extensions for



video files than just '.avi', and the same is true of images and other commonly used files. So, while the recommended command lists files with that particular file extension, subsequent uses would need to add their results to the same file.

This is where the double >> symbol should be used instead of >, because it adds subsequent searches to the result file. As such, if I'm searching for more than one file extension, the >> symbol is a good way to get all my images, videos and ebook filenames in the same file. The appropriate commands would be dir \*.mkv /b /s >>files.txt, dir \*.mp4 /b /s >>files.txt, and so on. This information may be useful to JR Pound, so he doesn't have to ask the follow-up question: "How do I get the titles of all my images and videos in one file without copying and pasting?"

## Make fewer mouse clicks

Open an Explorer window and click View to open the ribbon toolbar. Click Options, and the General tab lets you choose between single- and double-clicking items. Select single-click and save yourself a lot of mouse clicks.

## Cut, paste and clear

When you copy text from a web page or document, and paste it into an email you're writing, it often brings the font and style with it. This makes a mess of your email, because part of the message is in the usual font and size, while the rest is in the pasted style. If you then type some more, you can't be sure whether the new text will be in the pasted style or the original.

I don't know about other email services, but here's how I solve this problem in Gmail. First, click and drag over the text in the email you're writing to select it, then click the A symbol to reveal the formatting toolbar. Click the arrow on the right, then the T with a line through it. This clears the formatting and sets the text to the default style.





## Delete files from your Android bin

## Facial recognition treats us like criminals

fter reading your main news story in Issue 494, 'Police to roll out facial recognition despite concerns', I am alarmed and dismayed that this invasive and inaccurate technology is now being implemented on our streets without proper public consultation.

It's bad enough that wherever we go in this country we are spied on by CCTV cameras. Now we're supposed to tolerate having our faces automatically scanned to determine whether we're criminals or not - and without having given our consent for this information to be gathered. No other nation on Earth, not even oppressive regimes such as Russia and North Korea, invades the privacy of its citizens to such an unnecessary extent. Whatever happened to the notion that we are innocent until proven guilty?



The heavy-handed use of live facial recognition assumes the opposite, and is likely to lead to many innocent people being apprehended, interrogated and frightened by police for no good reason.

As you state in your story, tests of the technology have so far shown that it has a very poor accuracy rate, so why the

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rush to introduce an ineffective and intrusive system that's unlikely to yield the desired results. As the Liberal Democrat MP Sarah Olney said in a parliamentary debate on this issue last month, the use of facial recognition to identify criminals is questionable at best, and "we must not allow the UK to become a society where innocent people feel as though their every movement is being watched by the police" (bit.ly/facial495).

We all want protection against terrorists, knife crime and other threats on our streets, but we also have a right to privacy. I only hope the Metropolitan Police will be transparent about the success or failure of facial recognition in London before other police forces adopt the technology.

When will the police stop chipping away at our last remaining areas of privacy? Only when there's nothing left to chip away at, it seems. Robert Lindsay, via email


## Why I never click links in emails

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Free sat-nav apps could limit the dangers of so-called smart motorways, says **Barry Collins** 

# Smart motorways aren't smart enough

mart motorways, it turns out, are not so smart. Removing the hard shoulder from these busy roads has resulted in avoidable deaths and a sharp increase in the number of near misses. Who could possibly have foreseen that, eh?

However, the failure of smart motorways isn't necessarily down to the removal of that hard shoulder, even though that may seem an obvious cause. It's just as much due to a failure of technology – specifically, the technology that was supposed to put the "smart" in "smart motorway".

The introduction of smart motorways has been "conducted with a shocking degree of carelessness," according to Sir Mike Penning, the former Roads Minister who originally signed off on the idea of smart motorways back in 2010. Most significantly, the radar technology that was supposed to detect stationary cars and close their lanes immediately has been implemented on just 6% of the smart motorway network,

according to a report by *The Guardian*.

The rest of the network relies on drivers reporting that they're stranded, or CCTV operators spotting stationary vehicles. As the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Roadside Rescue and Recovery noted, "many motorists don't

know what to do in such situations". The recordings of 999 calls from drivers stranded in fastmoving traffic were described as "harrowing".

Transport Secretary Grant Shapps – a reader of this column, as I know from previous correspondence with him – is conducting an urgent review of smart motorways. But one thing's for sure: the government won't be replacing the hard shoulders or installing life-saving radar immediately. In the meantime, can I suggest to Mr Shapps that he urges the public to start using a free smartphone app that's smarter than the motorways

his government has rolled out?

Every time I set off on a longish road trip these days, I use the Google-owned sat-nav app Waze – even if I know where I'm going. Not only does its brilliant live traffic monitoring diligently reroute around jams, it also warns me of

> upcoming hazards in the road, whether it's roadworks, a pothole or - yes - a driver who has broken down. The accuracy of Waze's broken-down

vehicle reports is astonishing, and it gives you plenty of time to slow down, reducing the risk of collision.

Waze relies on other drivers reporting incidents – and I do have some safety concerns about drivers fiddling with their smartphones to do this while they're supposed to be driving. But the system also detects when a Waze user has suddenly stopped on an otherwise fast-flowing carriageway, and asks if they're caught up in traffic or an accident. This means reports can be near-instant if the affected driver is also using Waze.

In the absence of the radar that was supposed to be looking out for us on the roads, Mr Shapps and his department should be recommending that we all use apps such as Waze. Better still, the Highways Agency should start using the app to report brokendown vehicles – and to monitor the motorways, too.

A stretch of smart motorway is being installed near me on the M23. I won't be driving up it without Waze to warn me of impending dangers. Who'd have thought Google would be better at keeping us safe on the roads than our own government?







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
