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
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The best things online are free

Play free games on any device

ast smartphones running on 4G networks are now the standard in the UK, but that's not always the case in other parts of the world. Recognising this, Google's Area 120 experimental lab (area120.google .com) has been working with thirdparty developers to create free HTML5 games called GameSnacks that work on even the most underpowered phones, tablets and laptops.

None of the games are especially sophisticated, but they are good fun to play. You can choose from a Bejeweled clone called Jewelish Blitz, a tile-matching puzzler similar to Puzzle Bobble called Bubble Woods and the simple racing shoot-'em-up, Road Fury, along with Bridge of Doom, Jump With Justin and Groovy Ski. All of the GameSnacks can be played by touching the screen or using a keyboard and mouse, and none require instructions because they are simple to pick up and play.



Each game loads in a matter of seconds, thanks to a technique that reduces web-page sizes while putting scripts, images and sounds on standby until they're actually needed. If you like what you see and want more HTML5 titles to enjoy, you can click the logos of the five named developers. Since

we can expect more GameSnacks to be added in future.

Fly from Heathrow to Manchester online

Take a virtual flight north from Heathrow airport using this online tool created by the UK's air-traffic control service NATS, and you can see and hear how planes are guided from takeoff to landing. Featuring conversations between



air-traffic controllers and pilots, the visualisation puts each exchange into context, explaining what is being said and why.

The tool follows the journey using both 3D graphics and a map of the UK. As you scroll to bring each stage into view, it delivers

interesting information along with explanatory graphics including details of the effects of weather on flights, how the height of an aircraft is measured and a rundown of the International Radiotelephony Spelling Alphabet.

Once you reach your destination, you'll see a ream of statistics. If you then click More Stories, you can look through past projects, with new topics being regularly added.

If you're a songwriter, you can request your own page, though Spotify is currently only working directly with publishers.

retailers helped to shorten the length of your mortgage? Signing up is free and involves entering details about your mortgage, including when it expires (it uses that data to offer rates from rival providers). Just check first that your mortgage doesn't penalise you for overpayments.

Microsoft suffers yet more Windows 10 update problems

What happened?

Another round of updates for Windows 10 has been hit by bugs and errors. The February edition of the monthly 'Patch Tuesday' update – which is rolled out to fix security and performance flaws each month – has caused some computers to freeze and crash. The problem lies in one specific part of the update, which was pushed out for four days before being removed. Microsoft said only some devices were affected by the dodgy update: "This standalone security update has been removed due to an issue affecting a subset of devices".


But that's not the only problem. A separate update, issued to fix a range of security vulnerabilities, has been found to delete files or move them to a temporary folder, as well as causing boot failures, leaving users with a blue screen. Uninstalling the patch appears to solve the problem.

These bugs are the latest in a long line of problematic updates from Microsoft, with issues in nearly every single patch released by the company in the past year. Not all such bugs impact all users, but given the many millions who use Windows 10, a significant proportion of users are being affected.

Microsoft may be struggling to perfect updates on Windows 10, but it's made progress on Windows 10X, the dual-screen version of the operating system for upcoming tablets. Microsoft has built Windows 10X to update and reboot much faster, saying it will take less than 90 seconds. Hopefully, the faster update technology will soon

come to laptops and PCs, too.

Microsoft plans to change Windows 10 updates by introducing a new 'Optional updates' section to Windows Update for drivers, which are often a source of problems. Developers will be able to push out some driver updates automatically, to avoid systems suffering from non-working and out-of-date drivers. Other driver updates will be suggested as an optional installation to keep your system running smoothly.

How will it affect you?

The buggy section of the Patch Tuesday update removed by Microsoft will not be reissued, but the other security updates released alongside it are still installing fine. If you've had no problems running updates, either your PC wasn't affected by the bugs or you installed the update after the problematic patch was pulled.

If you did install the patches and are having problems with your computer, you can roll back updates by opening Settings in Windows 10 and going to Update & Security, then Update. Under View Update History, select 'Uninstall updates' and choose the one you want to remove. If you're having problems restarting your PC, boot into Safe Mode and head to Settings from there.

Windows updates aren't optional in Windows 10, which means users have no choice but to have these bugs foisted on them, unlike previous versions of Windows, which allowed updates to be put off until later. While that left users unprotected from security vulnerabilities, it meant they could delay updates by a few weeks to avoid unidentified bugs.

What do we think?

Despite the reported problems, it's best practice to install the latest updates. The Patch Tuesday updates fix security vulnerabilities that leave your PC at risk, while others come with useful feature upgrades. But it's no good fixing bugs if it breaks your computer in other ways. It's clear that Microsoft has an update problem it needs to tackle.

To be fair, Microsoft is providing code to many, many different types of computers, laptops and other devices. Patching isn't an easy task, and Microsoft usually gets it right, but the smallest mistake can have a big impact.

Microsoft needs to fix this problem or users will become so annoyed, they'll refuse to install such updates. Right now, that's not an option: Windows 10 updates are automatic. But if these problems continue, users will find ways to avoid updates or demand they be turned off. Patching millions of PCs each month is no easy task, but bugs should be the exception, not the norm.


Google moves UK data to the US after Brexit

What happened?

Google will move the data of its British users from servers based in Ireland to the US. The move comes following Brexit, with data agreements between the EU and the UK still to be decided, and means users will be faced with the choice of letting their data sit relatively unprotected on US servers or deleting their accounts entirely.

How will it affect you?

Before your data is moved, Google will ask you to agree to new Terms of Service in order to tranfer your account to the US. If you don't agree, there's only one alternative: delete your account and stop using Google. There is no



The move means your data will no longer be protected by the General Data **Protection Regulation** (GDPR), the EU's strict data-protection scheme, which still covers UK citizens during the transition period. The US has no nationwide data protection law and no privacy protections for non-US citizens. The move will also let British authorities

have more access to the data, thanks to agreements between the US and UK.

What do we think?

The UK and EU need a data-sharing agreement to keep such moves from happening across all US tech giants. The UK will hope to gain an adequacy agreement with the EU - which means

that the EU deems it good enough at protecting data to share with - but that could take months or even years. Indeed, if the UK waters down its own dataprotection laws, we may never get that approval.

It's no surprise,

then, that Google doesn't want to get stuck holding Brits' data in the EU. Of course, the company could have moved the data to another place: the UK itself. That it's chosen to shift everything to the US shows the future of our reduced data protections, if the government doesn't act

Facebook will pay to record your voice

What happened?

Last year, Facebook was caught using voice recordings from its Messenger app as part of its efforts to improve its transcription technology. It promised to stop the controversial practice but the social network clearly still wants your audio clips because it's now offering to pay for them.

Rather than surreptitiously harvesting voice messages, Facebook is asking for recordings via its Viewpoints marketresearch app (viewpoints .fb.com) as part of a new program called Pronunciations. Facebook will dole out 200 points for each recording, which



How will it affect you?

The Viewpoints app is limited to specific Facebook users in particular, those in the US over the age of 18 - and, so far, the request for recordings has only be made to some of those users. Whether it's worth sharing your voice and speaking style to Facebook

for a few dollars is up to you, but the company said the data won't be linked to your profile or shared elsewhere. It has yet to confirm

whether the Viewpoints voice-recording scheme will expand beyond the US.

What do we think?

Machine learning and artificial intelligence systems - such as Facebook's transcription tool - need high-quality data for training purposes, and this is increasingly harvested from

photos, text and even video recordings we've uploaded to the web. That's generally acceptable when it's used for academic research, designed to understand how we communicate or to control propaganda. However, in this case, Facebook is using it to develop its own products. Transcription is fairly benign, but scraped image data has been used to train facial recognition, too.

Paying for data is one way to get around that and, while no one will get rich taking part in this project, at least Facebook is no longer sneaking a peek at private messages. That's much more valuable.

Ring boosts security with two-factor authentication

What happened?

Ring, Amazon's smart home-security business, has made two-factor authentication (2FA) compulsory for all customers. In a statement on Ring's website, Leila Rouhi, company president, said: "we're making a second layer of verification mandatory for all users when they log into their Ring accounts. This added authentication helps prevent unauthorized users from gaining access to your Ring account, even if they have your username and password."

Ring already offered optional twofactor authentication, which requires users to confirm every sign-in using a second device, but making this compulsory should protect users from unauthorised account access should hackers try to take control of their home-security system. The company also announced plans to "temporarily pause the use of most third-party analytics services in the Ring apps and website," in a bid to protect users' data.

The move is a response to a string of hacks and negative headlines that have hit Ring where it hurts most: security. In December last year, hackers logged into Ring doorbells using stolen passwords. They then hurled abuse at unwitting residents and tripped alarm systems.

Those hacked passwords were taken from non-Amazon accounts, which Ring owners had reused.

January saw digital rights group the Electronic Frontier Foundation reveal that Ring's Android app was "packed with third-party trackers sending out a plethora of customers' personally identifiable information". Names, IP addresses, mobile networks and sensor data were sent to four marketing and analytics companies, including Facebook.

This, then, is Ring's straight answer to the question: 'if you can't keep our data safe, how can we trust you to keep our home safe?'.

How will it affect you?

As a Ring customer, expect to receive a one-time use, six-digit code every time you log into your account. This can be sent to either an email address or via text message - neither of which hackers should be able to access. Enter that code to verify the sign-in. Ring has already started rolling mandatory 2FA, so keep your eyes peeled.



What do we think?

With so much of our data now stored online, we say: the more security, the better - especially when that data includes cameras in our homes. 2FA should be mandatory for all datasensitive accounts. It's a reasonable requirement for users, and, from a business perspective, should stem the rising tide of privacy blunders.

Despite suffering security breaches, Ring and Amazon are generally good at encouraging sound security behaviour. At the time of the hacking, Ring was urging customers to enable 2FA. Seems like it's decided to now take matters into its own hands.



FIRST LOOK

Samsung Galaxy Z Flip bit.ly/flip496

The flip phone is back - sort of. Not to be outdone by Motorola's nostalgiabaiting reformed Razr (see First Look, Issue 494), Samsung's Galaxy Z Flip looks compact, snappy and really rather cool, which is just as well after the dismal debut of its Galaxy Fold.

The shimmering, square-ish clamshell design resembles the old Alcatel OT808, a budget phone with a QWERTY keyboard (remember those?). When closed, a minimalist 1.1in read-out displays time, date and notification icons. A double-tap activates the screen, while swipes access music controls and notifications.

Folding it out reveals a 6.7in screen on a par with any from the Samsung



stable - except, unfortunately, there's a noticeable crease running across the middle of the fold, catching the light and hampering the smooth action of scrolling, swiping, tapping and typing.

The Z Flip's folding action has nylon fibres layered within the hinge - to keep out dust and dirt, and maintain a fluid flip. This 'sweeper technology' feels strong, with Samsung claiming it'll withstand 200,000 folds. That remains to be seen away from sterile R&D labs

and out in the real world, but the adjustable folding angles certainly help you find a sweet spot for the perfect view and make hands-free video calls possible.

Make no mistake - with its £1,300 price tag, this is a premium smartphone. The specs include Samsung's modified version of Android 10 running on a Snapdragon 855+ processor with 8GB of RAM and 256GB of internal storage, along with a 10-megapixel front-facing camera supported by dual 12MP wide-angle rear cameras.

Samsung has certainly learned the lessons of the original Fold's failures. The Galaxy Z Flip features a superior design - one that slips neatly into any pocket or purse - but the hefty price tag will put it beyond that same pocket or purse of most buyers.

Is Apple about to launch AirTags?


Apple's AirTags tracker system is set to launch later this year, if sources are to believed. The physical tracker can be attached to items and monitored via iOS's Find My app. It's essentially a smart key-finder that you don't have to whistle for - and one that helps track lost and stolen goods.

Ming-Chi Kuo, an Apple analyst with a stellar track record, revealed in a research note that Apple is ramping up production of AirTags to make tens of millions by the end of the year. Industry watchers say this timeline could lead to an official announcement as early as June, at the Worldwide Developer Conference.

This sounds too soon to be likely, but it would give developers a chance to familiarise themselves with the tag before release. Others believe Apple's annual iPhone reveal in September is a more plausible date. Given multiple leaks surrounding the 'secret' AirTags, could this lead to a muted 'one more thing' moment?

The personal item tracker, a rival to Tile, is thought to be a white, circular disc imprinted with the Apple logo. Kuo previously stated that he expects the tag to feature ultra-wideband technology, which offers better precision and accuracy than Bluetooth.

Working within the Find My app, rumours suggest that items will be added and managed in a new Items tab where you "tag your everyday items



with AirTags and never lose them again". You then receive a phone alert when you move too far from the tag.

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LIKELIHOOD RATING

Kuo is very reliable with his leaks, so a 2020 release would seem a safe bet. However, this isn't a question of 'if', but 'when'. AirTags are one of tech's worstkept secrets. We expect to hear whispers of the tracker at Apple's developer conference in June, with a big, profile-raising reveal at September's broader, consumer-focused event. But Apple can always be counted on to surprise us, so an earlier reveal date isn't out of the question.

MGM hotel chain suffers data breach

The personal details of 10.6 million guests who stayed at MGM Resorts hotels have surfaced online after hackers accessed the chain's servers in July 2019. Names, addresses and passport details for guests up to 2017 were spotted on a hacking forum.

Mac malware infections overtake Windows

Cyber-threats aimed at Macs have overtaken those targeted at Windows PCs for the first time, signalling that Apple's computers are not as secure as they once might have been.

It was long believed that Apple Mac computers were virtually immune to malware, but the growth in popularity of Macs has seen them become a more attractive target for hackers. According to the latest data from Malwarebytes, in 2019 there were on average 11 threats per Mac compared to only 5.8 threats per Windows PC.

Malwarebytes noted that there has been a 400% year-on-year increase in Mac threats since 2018, making macOS significantly more at risk than Windows. "Part of that increase can

be attributed to an increase in our Malwarebytes for Mac userbase," said the company.

Reassuringly for Mac users, the types of infection were very different between the two operating systems. Whereas Windows computers suffered Trojans, backdoors, hijackers, worms and ransomware, threats on macOS systems were almost exclusively limited to adware and potentially unwanted programs (PUPs) such as toolbars.

Google purges harmful Chrome extensions

Google has removed at least 500 malware-ridden Chrome extensions from its Web Store following the findings of an independent security investigation. The add-ons used aggressive 'malvertisements' to steer users to websites susceptible to malware downloads and phishing attacks.

Concern originally rose after independent security researcher Jamila Kaya detected more than a dozen Chrome extensions that were redirecting users to the same malicious URL. Kaya contacted Cisco's Duo Security team, and together they identified the add-ons as belonging to "a network of copycat plugins sharing nearly identical functionality". Duo said the group behind the network has been operating since the early half of the 2010s.

Google swiftly removed the extensions, which had been installed more than 1.7 million times, from the Chrome Web Store. "We appreciate the work of the research community, and when we are alerted of extensions in the Web Store that violate our policies, we take action and use those incidents as training material to improve our automated and manual analyses," said a Google spokesperson. bit.ly/chrome496

How worried should Mac users be about the increase in malware threats (see story, above)?

Despite macOS traditionally being considered safer than Windows, cybercriminals are now

trying to profit from the platform by looking for new ways to deceive users, and actively using socialengineering techniques to spread their malware.

Luckily for macOS users, the most widespread threats currently revolve around pushing illicit advertising rather than more dangerous criminal activity, such as stealing financial data.

In 2019, Kaspersky prevented attacks carried out by Shlayer, a malware Trojan family, on at least one out of every 10 Macs using Kaspersky security software, making this threat the most widespread for macOS users.

It specialises in the installation of adware programs that plague users by feeding illicit ads, intercepting and gathering users' browser queries, and modifying search results to distribute even more advertising messages.

Shlayer uses a smart malware-distribution system to spread via a partner network, entertainment websites and even Wikipedia, demonstrating that even users who only visit legal

sites need additional protection online. Shlayer's infection algorithm has hardly changed since it was first detected, making it an especially relevant threat that users need protection from.

A reliable security solution, and only installing programs and updates from trusted sources, can protect macOS users from threats such as Shlayer, and make browsing the web a safer experience.








If you're not able to visit one of National Museums Liverpool's seven venues, you can now explore some of the collection online instead by browsing featured objects, viewing highlights from specific museums and art galleries or simply tapping in some search terms. It's a packed site that includes absorbing videos, details of forthcoming events, information on conservation and research, and a great set of learning resources for children. These include fun, downloadable PDFs on topics such as Ancient Egypt and Victorians.



We test and compare the latest products

Google Pixelbook Go

Google's latest ChromeOS laptop is perfect for those who do most of their computing in a browser window

hen ChromeOS first appeared, it seemed destined exclusively for low-spec and low-price laptops, but this hasn't turned out to be the case. Google's Pixelbook range is particularly highend, and the latest additions are no exception. These models are slim (14.5mm), light (1.06kg), well built and have big, bright 13.3in screens. Unlike many Chromebooks, they use full-powered Intel processors. With their comfy keyboards and large touchpads, they're proper laptops in every sense - it's just that they run ChromeOS instead of Windows or macOS.

Design, build and price

Pixelbook Go prices start at £629 for the Core m3-based Pixelbook Go, which comes with 8GB of memory and 128GB of storage. There are four models in the range and, as you progress through the ranks, the prices rise, too.

We've reviewed the Core i5-8200Y with 8GB of memory and 128GB of storage, which costs £829. It's a shame you don't get the model with the 4K "Molecular Display" until you get to the top-end Core i7 Pixelbook Go – all the others, like our review model, come with the more



basic 1080p screen.

Connectivity is minimal. You get a pair of USB Type-C ports, one on each side of the base towards the rear of the laptop, both of which can be used to charge, output video or connect peripherals.

There's also a 3.5mm headset jack on the left edge but that's your lot for physical ports - there's no microSD card slot or SIM card slot for on-the-go connectivity. Wireless connectivity is covered by

dual-band 802.11ac Wi-Fi and Bluetooth 4.2.

The keyboard is a highlight and is a delight to type on, whether you're a hunt-and-peck specialist or a high-speed touch-typing dynamo. It has a solid base, with a light and quiet key action that's just responsive enough to let you know your key presses have registered. Meanwhile, the key tops are large enough to keep typos to a minimum.

When it comes to layout, the usual Chromebook rules

apply. You get a Search button on the left-hand side where you'd normally find a Caps Lock key - something that continues to irritate a lot of Chromebook users - but, fortunately, the rest of the layout is pretty sensible. In the UK, you get a narrow but double-height Enter key, while the Shift keys have a decent width to them, as do the Backspace and Tab keys, and the cursor-key cluster isn't too cramped.

The touchpad works well, too. It's spacious enough to let you perform multi-touch gestures comfortably and the click doesn't feel either overly heavy or insubstantial. Note, however, that because it's mechanical, clicking doesn't work at the very top of the touchpad.

Screen

The Achilles heel of the Pixelbook Go is its display, though it's still perfectly adequate for most uses. The 1080p unit measures 13.3in across the diagonal and is perfectly sharp and reasonably bright. Our colorimeter measured it at 369cd/m² with the screen filled with white. That's not as bright as the brightest laptops but it should be good enough for most indoor situations and

even some outdoor use - as long as you stick to the shade and don't try to work in dazzling sunlight.

Its colour accuracy is also excellent, and it has a very high contrast ratio of 2,275:1, ensuring on-screen images have punch and presence.

The display isn't without its issues, though. The viewing angles are disappointing - if you tilt the screen more than 45-degrees in any direction, the display dims noticeably. It's also a little grainy and a touch more reflective than we'd like.

However, the touchscreen element works well enough - for the few times you're likely to want to use it clicking links, scrolling through web pages and so on. You're unlikely to ditch mouse control completely but it's good to have the option.

Performance and battery life

Diving deeper into the specifications, we were worried that our test unit wasn't going to have enough power, with Google sticking to the same range of processors it used in previous devices. However, we didn't notice any problems while using it. We tried it with dozens of tabs open in Chrome, with multiple large Google Sheets spreadsheets running, and it didn't faze the laptop at all. The Core m3 might struggle a bit more when you really load it up but it's clear you don't need anything faster than the Intel Core i5-8200Y or more than the 8GB memory our review device came supplied with.

In our benchmark tests, it performed similarly to last year's Google Pixel Slate, which was built around an identical processor and had the same amount of memory installed. It's a little less speedy than the Dell Inspiron Chromebook 14, however.

Where the Pixelbook Go demonstrates a significant lead over all its rivals is battery life. Quite simply, it's stunning in this regard. In our video rundown test, it lasted 14 hours and 15 minutes, which is almost five hours longer than the Dell Inspiron Chromebook 14 and nearly six hours longer than the Pixel Slate. This is a laptop you can work on all day without plugging it into the mains, perhaps more so than any other conventional laptop we've reviewed. The fact that you can charge it with any USB Type-C cable only adds to the convenience.

TP-Link Tapo P100 Mini Smart Wi-Fi Socket

You don't have to update every device in your home to make it smart – just plug them into a smart plug instead

onverting your domestic environment into a smart home sounds like an expensive undertaking. However, TP-Link has just launched a new range of smart plugs that can turn any compatible device (a lamp or other socket-powered electrical item with a physical switch) into a smart device, and they only cost £10.

It's worth noting that TP-Link already has a range of smart devices, including smart plugs, under its Kasa brand. This device, branded Tapo, is a completely new range and uses a new Tapo app, which isn't directly compatible with the Kasa devices. Having said that, both work with Google

Assistant and Alexa, so if you're using a smart speaker to control your devices with your voice, both systems can be easily integrated. It's only their base apps that are currently incompatible.

The new Tapo app doesn't work with IFTTT, either, and while this may change in the future, it's worth considering if you use the tool to create links between your devices.

Setup and functionality

One of the great things about the new Tapo P100 is its size. Space is often an issue when positioning smartplugs, which may need placing behind furniture or other devices, and although these extrude nearly 4cm from your socket, their footprint is small so you shouldn't have any problem plugging devices into neighbouring sockets.

Getting the plug working is straightforward. Simply download the app, plug the device into a wall socket and let the Bluetooth on your phone discover it, then tap in your Wi-Fi password and the the connection is set up. You can now name the device, identify the room it's in and give it an appropriate icon.

Anything you plug into the Tapo P100 can be controlled from the app and connected to Google Assistant or Alexa. Rename it to the object you're plugging into the smart plug ('living-room lamp', for example) and it's added to your other devices, so you can turn it on and off with

your voice; set it to come on at a particular time to deter burglars while you're out; and add it to groups with other devices, to save you walking around the house at night manually turning off all the lamps that have been left on.

Another useful addition to the smartplug is a button on

the side that you can use to manually switch a device on or off. While reaching down to wall sockets isn't ideal, it means you can still switch a light on, even if you aren't carrying a mobile device with the app installed or aren't within the hearing range of a smart speaker.

OUR VERDICT

These compact, affordable smart plugs are all you need to add a range of household items such as standard lamps to your smart home. It's slightly annoying that they aren't directly compatible with TP-Link's Kasa system but, if you already use Google Assistant or Alexa to control your home, it's no deal-breaker because they







There are plenty of tools that let you edit videos directly on your phone but if you want to produce high-quality movies, then a PC-based editor will deliver much better results. OpenShot is an open-source tool that offers all the features you need from a video editor, including a drag-and-drop timeline, transitions and a wide range of effects such as Blur, Brightness & Contrast, Negative and Colour Saturation. It can handle most common video, audio and image formats, including footage shot in 4K, and edited movies can be saved in a choice of formats and resolutions.

The latest update to the software is





described as the "largest release yet" by OpenShot's developers and includes experimental support for hardware acceleration, which transfers the "heavy lifting" from your PC's central processor to its graphics processor. This should significantly boost the performance of both encoding and decoding - provided you have compatible hardware. As an example, the developers say that when editing MP4/H.264 files, you can expect a 30-40% speed boost. Keyframe performance has been improved too,

thanks to a rewritten keyframe system.


OpenShot can now import and export data in EDL and XML (Adobe Premiere and Final Cut Pro) formats, and generate thumbnails of video frames more efficiently, and the software now supports Blender 2.8+. There's a new ability to recover previous saves, and auto-backup is now more reliable.

Finally, the new update should reduce the issue of flickering lines and bars in the preview window, which was a problem in previous releases.

CHROME

Hide your activity on Facebook Messenger

One glance and they can see that you've read their message and haven't bothered to reply. And you know that pretty soon an accusatory follow-up is coming. Then, when you finally decide to reply to a Facebook message, the recipient can see you're typing.

For some people, this can cause a fair amount of stress and worry. Others are mindful of their privacy. The new Chrome extension Messenger Unread (bit.ly/unread496) eliminates this problem at a stroke. The browser tool hides your Facebook Messenger activity, so your friends, family or Nigerian princes won't see a tick when you read their message, and can't see the hovering dot-dot-dots as you type your reply.

No setup is required and, by clicking the extension's toolbar button, you can switch it off at will. Best of all, the developers state that "we're firm believers in data privacy and don't collect or share any data". Unlike Facebook, of course ...








Block website distractions

Baitblock (bit.ly/bait496) helps you stay focused online by creating a distraction-free environment. Rather than stubbornly preventing you from visiting sites you've added to a block list, you're free to set daily limits of between five minutes and two hours. With a list of no-go sites, the tool's Intelligent Blocker then kicks in, preventing these links appearing on Google, DuckDuckGo, Bing, Facebook, Reddit and Twitter. It also strips away recommendations on YouTube - a notorious time thief and lets users add a 100-word summary of a site, so you don't waste a click.

And if that wasn't enough, Baitblock also blocks cookie notices, which are often enough to drive you to distraction.

Skip to the top of a page

Scrolly (bit.ly/scrolly496), like all good extensions, solves a simple problem many of us face online: in this case, the effort of scrolling back to the top of a web page. It adds an unobtrusive button



to the bottom right-hand corner of your screen. Click this and, as if by magic, you're taken back to the top. A minor nitpick: it's not possible to stop midscroll. It's all the way to the top or bust.

On night mode-style pages, the extension helpfully adds a glowing light around its button, so you can find it in the dark.

Get a different perspective online

The web, generally - and social media,

specifically - helps create bubbles: echo chambers where views aren't debated but accepted without question, and dissent will not be tolerated. That's what makes Unslant (bit.ly/unslant496) such an

intriguing proposition.

pro-this and, to the

right of the screen, you'll see a discreet pop-up directing you to a website that's pro-that. These sites are also labelled right-wing or left-wing. It's a clever way to burst online political bubbles without restricting content.

While most supported outlets are American (think Fox News and CNN), there are some UK ones, including The Economist and The Telegraph. Hopefully more will be added soon.




FIREFOX

Accept the bare minimum of cookies

Minimal Consent (bit.ly/ minimal496) is the latest addition to the growing range of cookie blockers. Whenever a website requests cookie access, the extension steps in, automatically accepting the basics required to visit the site, and nothing else.

The tool does away with annoying cookie banners - the ones we usually just click Accept on without checking - and rejects all third-



Since only the minimum number of cookies are allowed, there's no additional setup - or even any settings. Minimal Consent is also available for Chrome (bit.ly/minimalchrome496).



Check how long a site takes to read

The website Medium (medium.com) features an estimated read-time for articles, so you know if you've got time to get through it all. Now, you can take that functionality almost everywhere else with How Long to Read (bit.ly/ longread496).

Head to a web page and the extension calculates how many minutes it'll take to get from the first to the last word - this is displayed as a notification badge on its toolbar button. It's a subtle tool, which makes it great as an optional extra that won't bother you every time you visit a website, or when you have all the time in the world.


While it worked on most sites we tried, such as Wikipedia, there were a few on which it failed to estimate a reading time. The only other option we'd like to see is a Pocket-style ability to save the page for when we have more time to read it.



Jump straight to all **Google services**

Google Toolbox (bit.ly/toolbox496) is a black menu-style extension that lets you leap straight to 186 different Google services. Clicking the

extension's toolbar button reveals a short list of popular services, such as Gmail, YouTube, Docs and Photos. Select More and you'll be presented with the other 178 options, some of which you may



never have known existed (such as Arts & Culture, Scholar and cybersecurity R&D unit Jigsaw). The list is ordered alphabetically, with familiar logos to help guide you without overwhelming you.

True, most of us will only need the core services, and it's nice to have them instantly to hand. While many of the options are for businesses, it's interesting to see just how many products and services fall under the Google umbrella.

OTHER BROWSERS



Get picture-inpicture mode

Picture-in-picture has become a mainstay on browsers, thanks to dedicated extensions. The effect pops out your video into a small, always-on-top box that can be moved anywhere on the screen. Now, Video Picture in Picture (bit.ly/pip496) brings that ability to the new Chromium version of Edge. Try it now: play a video on YouTube, press the extension icon and picture-inpicture mode is instantly enabled. Another click and the video returns to normal. Controls are sparse, with just play/pause, and 'back to tab', but that's



really all you'll need.

Conjuring up unbreakable passwords is simple, but actually remembering them is another matter entirely. Memorable Passwords (bit.ly/password496) is a simple tool that creates strong passwords, using letters,

numbers and symbols, based on easy-toremember everyday words. Conforming with basic security



each password you make will be at least eight letters or more. Click the add-on's toolbar button to generate a random memorable word and, beneath this, the word translated into a password style. For example, the word 'electrical' becomes '3/ecTrical'. Beneath this are two options to copy the password in plain text or make a new one.

Are you the sort of person who likes to stay ahead of the pack? Someone who's always up for trying the latest tools and tech? If that sounds like you, then it's likely you've tried out preview or beta software and services in the past.

Beta apps are great because they let you experience new features ahead of their public release - often for free. The only trouble is that it's not always obvious whether there are beta programs available for the apps you use, and you



may not know how to sign up for them - or how to leave them, should you decide you want to go back to the standard version. To make matters worse, some beta tests are limited, meaning you have to act fast if you want to secure a chance to try them.

Beta Maniac is an app that's designed to make signing up for and enjoying beta programs much simpler. Its aim is to provide a centralised resource from where you can sign up to new beta programs for your favourite apps, as well as

manage any beta programs you're already signed up to. The app can also regularly scan for available places on limited beta tests, so you never lose out.

Clearly Beta Maniac won't be for everyone - apps that are in beta can be unstable, for a start. But if you consider yourself a tech enthusiast and regularly install preview apps - including those we recommend in these pages then Beta Maniac is well worth downloading.

The standard Google Play version of the

tool is free, but is ad-supported. If you'd prefer an ad-free version instead, then you can download it (also for free) from the XDA Developers forum (bit.ly/betafree496).



Everything you need to know about the most interesting new technology trends and events

Health sensors

Wearable devices are becoming smarter and more accurate at monitoring our health, as David Crookes explains

What are they?

Technological sensors are being used in an ever-growing number of wearable consumer devices to help us monitor and potentially diagnose a range of health conditions. They detect and collect our body's biological signals, allowing wearers to keep a check on their own wellbeing and be alerted to any problems. Medical professionals are also issuing them to patients to help manage their conditions, with their data being used to better personalise healthcare.

What sort of things are they sensing?

The most popular - and well-known - wellbeing

devices right now are those from Fitbit and

> Apple, which go beyond simply allowing you to set health and fitness goals. They can be used to monitor your heart rate and pick up on irregular rhythms and, by scanning the heart's electrical signals, echocardiograph (or ECG) to potentially diagnose

atrial fibrillation. Sleep habits can be monitored using sensors, too, and some of the wearables even alert you to loud noises to protect your hearing.

But how sophisticated are they?

Currently, the Apple Watch can predict 'VO2 max' (a measurement of the amount of oxygen breathed into your lungs) based on the changes to your heart rate during exercise, while in January, Fitbit rolled out a software update that can estimate the amount of oxygen in the blood. This uses an SpO2 sensor - which has been included in many Fitbit devices for the past three



years - to work out the fraction of oxygen-saturated haemoglobin relative to total haemoglobin. The data can be used to detect specific problems such as sleep apnoea and determine whether or not you're enjoying enough rest at night.

What other companies are involved?

As well as big names including Samsung and Garmin, companies such as French firm Withings (www.withings.com) have moved into the market, the latter heralding its Move ECG as the world's first analogue watch with a built-in

electrocardiogram last year. At the CES exhibition in January, it unveiled its classy-looking ScanWatch which, aside from having a SpO2 sensor, uses photoplethysmography (PPG) - a green LED paired with light-sensitive photodiodes - to monitor your heart. It works on the premise that blood absorbs green light, so the ScanWatch can constantly detect when the heart beats increase and blood flow is greater. If irregularity is picked up, the user is prompted to take an ECG reading using the device.

Is there much of an appetite for self-monitoring?

Yes. According to analysts Markets and Markets, in a report issued last December, the global medical-wearable market is likely to grow in value from \$6.22bn (£4.8bn) in 2017 to \$14.41bn (£11.8bn) in 2022. Research has also found that more than 80% of consumers would be happy to wear fitness technology that can monitor their health. This could be in the form of activity monitors, smartwatches, patches and even smart clothing - there have been numerous attempts to create a smart bra for the detection of breast cancer, for example.

What else can sensors measure?

Philips has produced wearable biosensors that are fixed to the chest using silicone or hydrocolloid adhesive (depending on how active someone is

likely to be), and these record heart and respiratory rates as well as skin temperature, body posture, ECGs, stepcounts and more (bit.ly/ philips496). It is also possible to take blood pressure measurements in fact, Omron has created a watch called HeartGuide that can take your blood pressure using an inflatable cuff within the watch band (bit.ly/omron496), while health-tech company

Valencell has been working for 10 years on a set of in-ear buds that can use a PPG sensor to detect high blood pressure (bit.ly/valen496).

Valencell hopes its device, which relies on the greater blood flow present in the inner ear to get a reading, can eventually replace cuffs and be integrated into consumer earbuds and hearing aids. Since 12.5 million people suffer from

hypertension in the UK alone, and high blood pressure kills an average of 75,000 each year, this could be a huge life-saver, especially given that millions of adults are going undiagnosed.

> What about combating obesity?

Gadget creator HealBe (healbe.com/eu) claims it can use bioimpedance sensors to pass a small electrical current through the body and measure the number of calories being

consumed. When this was announced at the CES in 2015, medical experts were sceptical

but HealBe - which uses the technology in its GoBe products - says the technique can measure fluid moving in and out of skin cells and base a reading on glucose curves. It says stress levels and water balance can be predicted, too, by taking into account attributes such as physical activity.

Could sensors help control diabetes?

There are some interesting developments here, too, including a new biosensing contact lens capable of detecting glucose levels (bit.ly/lens496) and another device, the K'Watch Glucose, which claims to check your sugar levels without needing to prick your finger for blood. It says it will do this using socalled "SkinTaste" technology, which it explains consists of a "biochemical and micro-points" on a disposable adhesive patch called a K'apsul. According to the company, the micro-points come into contact with interstitial fluid in the upper layer of the skin and allow for bloodless monitoring. You can sign up for updates at bit.ly/glucose496, but a release date has yet to be confirmed.

Can health sensors be used for research?

Yes. In 2018, Apple sought to monitor the symptoms of Parkinson's disease by adding an feature called Movement Disorder to its ResearchKit framework. This monitors for signs of tremor at rest among patients wearing an Apple Watch running watchOS 5 or later, as well as for known side-effects of treatments

> swaying. Fitbit also encourages use of its devices in research studies, while Garmin recently published the results of a sleep study (bit.ly/sleep496).

Private healthcare companies are also tapping into sensor-based tech: insurer Vitality has offered discounts on Apple Watches for people who earn enough points by staying active.

FALSE POSITIVES AND OVERDIAGNOSIS

People who buy wearables containing health sensors tend to be young and conscious of their overall wellbeing. The trouble is that these users tend to have fewer health problems so any positive alerts they receive tend not to be serious, and yet they cause more people to see a GP for reassurance, putting extra strain on the NHS.

The same is true for very young users. Wearable baby monitors that monitor heart rate, respiration, sleeping position, body temperature and blood oxygen levels can also lead

to overdiagnosis and panic. Could health sensors in consumer devices turn us all into hypochondriacs?



Will they keep our data secure?

The companies will certainly aim to do that although we have seen past examples of hackers accessing the data of wearable fitness devices, giving them access to GPS history and details of the times that people go to sleep or become active. There are also concerns that insurance companies may want to access the data gathered about our health but, perhaps most worrying, employers are taking an interest as well. Some companies, including insurer Aetna in the US, are already giving workers extra perks if they are seen to be getting enough rest. While such monitoring could make the workplace more productive and potentially reduce absenteeism, it could also be seen as an invasion of privacy.



e all know that there's lots of stuff to be found online for free, but much of it is free for a reason: namely, that nobody would consider paying for it in the first place. That doesn't stop us downloading, streaming and ordering things for free rather than forking out money for them, but it's always a pleasant surprise when a quality product or service that used to cost money becomes available for nothing. This is more common than

you'd think - you just need to know where to look.

In this feature, we round up the latest and greatest examples of paid-for stuff that you can now get for free from the web – safely and legally. We've picked the best big-name programs, apps and games that have ditched their price tags for 2020; TV series, films and music that you can enjoy without paying for a streaming subscription; and plenty of other fabulous freebies, too.





SOFTWARE & APPS

Upgrade to Windows 10 for free — yes, still!

Microsoft made Windows 10 available for free when it launched back in 2015, but the software giant made it clear this was a time-limited offer that would only be good for the first year. If you want to buy a copy of Windows 10 Pro now, it will cost you £219.99, while the Home edition is £119.99. However, it's still possible to get Windows 10 for free



 legally and direct from Microsoft.
 Provided you're

running a licensed version of Windows 7 or 8 or 8.1, you can upgrade to Windows 10 for free by downloading the Media Creation Tool (bit.ly/mct496). Be warned, though, that using this tool to upgrade your OS will wipe your apps and settings, so you'll need to reinstall and reconfigure them. Once installation is complete, you should receive a digital licence that you can view under Settings, Update & Security, Activation.

Burn discs with Ashampoo Burning Studio 2020

Ashampoo's Burning Studio discauthoring software originally sold for \$29.99 (£22.68) but the 2020 edition is now entirely free to download. This powerful software can write data to CDs, DVDs, Blu-rays and specialised media such as BDXL or M-Disc; rip and burn audio discs; create and write disc images; and print covers and labels. It also makes backups from smartphones and tablets at the click of a button,




and offers scratch protection, so you'll be able to access your data on a disc even if it has a damaged surface. Download the free program from bit.ly/ashampoo496.

Recover lost files with Seagate File Recovery Software

Premium Seagate File Recovery Software usually costs \$100 (£75.61) but you can currently get it for free. It's available for Windows and macOS, and although it's designed for Seagate hard drives, it will work with any local storage.

To get the program for free, go to bit .ly/seagate496, add it to the cart and proceed to checkout. Fill in your details (we'd suggest making something up using a temporary email address from



temp-mail.org) and click Place Order. Follow the link in the email, install and run the software, then activate it by clicking the link in the bottom left and filling in the details from the email. Alternatively, you can download the program directly from bit.ly/psfrs496.

Run any program safely with Sandboxie

Sandboxie (www.sandboxie.com) has been around since 2004 and lets you run any program in a secure and disposable section of your computer's hard drive, preventing malicious applications from taking control of Windows or making unwanted changes. Software running in the 'sandbox' is allowed to read data from the hard drive, but it can't write data outside of the sandbox. Sandboxie was acquired by Sophos in 2017. The company released the full paid-for version of the program, which used to cost \$21 (£15.90) a year, as freeware last September, and has announced plans to make Sandboxie open-source in the future.



Get paid-for software for free - legally!

Websites such as Tickcoupon Giveaway (giveaway.tickcoupon.com) and Giveaway of the Day (www .giveawayoftheday.com) offer paid-for licensed software for free. The former has Windows, macOS, phone and tablet downloads, as well as extended free subscriptions (three months of Malwarebytes Premium, for example), while the latter has giveaways for Windows, Android, iPhone and games. There are also money-off deals.

The offers change regularly, so you need to keep an eye on the sites and act quickly when you see something of interest, or subscribe to their newsletters. If you miss a giveaway,



there's a chance it will be repeated in the future.

Manage podcasts with Pocket Casts

If you enjoy listening to podcasts on your phone, there are a number of excellent apps that streamline the process. One of our favourites is Pocket Casts (www.pocketcasts.com), which is available for both iOS and Android, offers lots of customisation options and includes all you need to find, stream, download and listen to your preferred podcasts. It can even play local files.

Pocket Casts has been a paid-for product since it launched in 2010 but, last year, the developers decided to

drop the \$3.99 (£3) price tag and make it entirely free. There is a Plus version that adds additional features for \$11.99



(£9) a year, but the standard version should be enough for most users.

Get NetNewsWire for macOS

Feed readers aren't as popular as they once were, but they're still a great way to view all the latest articles from your favourite sites in one place. Launched in 2002, NetNewsWire for Mac (bit.ly/ nnwire496) has undergone a couple of changes of ownership. Now back in the hands of its original creator, the software - which previously cost \$19.99 (£15.12) - was relaunched in 2019 and made free and open-source. NetNewsWire 5's highlights include direct feed downloading, syncing via Feedbin, AppleScript support and keyboard shortcuts. There's also a dark mode and a Safari extension for easy adding of feeds.





ENTERTAINMENT

Enjoy Amazon Music for free

Amazon Prime costs £7.99 per month and offers a lot of perks beyond free next-day (or same-day) delivery, one of which is access to more than two million songs through the retail giant's musicstreaming service. The company also offers a paid-for version called Amazon Music Unlimited from £7.99 per month, which gives you access to 50 million songs. The good news is that you don't need to pay a penny to listen to Amazon Music - you can now enjoy an adsupported selection of playlists and thousands of stations based on song, artist, genre and more - for free (you can't select specific tracks). The service is accessible through the Amazon Music app on iOS, Android and FireTV, and also on the web (music.amazon.co.uk).



Get six months of BritBox free

BritBox is the new streaming service from the BBC and ITV that focuses on delivering British TV shows and films. It costs £5.99 a month after a 30-day free trial but, from 13 March, EE pay-monthly customers can get a free six-month subscription to the service. You aren't limited to watching on a phone or tablet, either – you can enjoy content on a TV or streaming device. The offer is part of Entertainment on EE (bit.ly/britbox496), which also gives you six




months of free Apple Music, six months of Apple News+, three months of BT Sport and six months of MTV Play.

Watch Classic Doctor Who

Doctor Who has been a staple of British telly for years, and continues to draw viewers. You'll no doubt have your favourite Doctor – Jon Pertwee or Tom Baker, perhaps, or maybe David Tennant or Matt Smith if you prefer the more recent incarnation of the show. 558 Doctor Who episodes, dating from 1963 to 1989 and spanning William Hartnell to Paul McGann, are now available to stream on BritBox, and you can watch them all with a free 30-day BritBox trial. Bear in mind that this equates to viewing nearly 19 episodes a day, so you may need to be selective!

You need to enter your credit-card details to sign up to BritBox, but as long as you remember to cancel your subscription before the 30 days are over, you won't be charged a penny. As




mentioned in the previous tip, EE customers can get six months of the streaming service for free.

All 165 episodes of the rebooted *Doctor Who* from the last 15 years are available to stream and download on BBC iPlayer (bit.ly/iplayerwho496).

Watch Impulse for free

YouTube has spent a lot of money on producing original shows, in a bid to compete with Netflix. While some series, such as the *Karate Kid* spin-off *Cobra Kai*, were a huge hit, YouTube failed to persuade enough people to pay for its content and, last year, made the decision to cancel a lot of its shows and make existing originals available to watch for free. *Cobra Kai* is still behind

(22 episodes) of the excellent – and criminally underappreciated – *Impulse* for free at bit.ly/impulse496.

Executive produced by Doug Liman (the director behind *Edge of Tomorrow* and *The Bourne Identity*), *Impulse* is a spiritual (and quite dark) sequel to the 2008 movie *Jumper*, and follows a teenage girl who discovers she has the ability to teleport.

Watch To All the Boys I've Loved Before for free

Netflix has launched a sequel to its hugely popular teen movie *To All the Boys I've Loved Before*, and to celebrate the arrival of *To All the Boys: P.S. I Still Love You*, the streaming giant has made the original free to watch on the internet, no Netflix subscription required (bit.ly/netflix496), which is great news for anyone with teenage children or grandchildren. This is a time-limited offer, however – you only have until 9 March to watch the film.



Watch free movies and TV shows with Plex

Plex (www.plex.tv) is a powerful media server that lets you stream movies stored in a central location to any device on your network, or beyond, as well as watch live TV and DVR content, web shows and more. At the end of last year, Plex added the ability to stream thousands of movies and TV shows for free -




no subscription required. There are a couple of catches to be aware of, however. First, the content is ad-supported and, secondly, although the new feature is a global addition, UK users have a disappointing selection of titles on offer. That said, if you use a VPN such as Windscribe (windscribe .com) to make it appear as if you're browsing from the US, you can unlock classic titles such as Thelma & Louise, Rain Man, Escape From New York, WarGames, Teen Wolf and Raging Bull.

Binge-watch every episode of Game of Thrones

After eight seasons and 73 episodes, Game of Thrones finally came to an end last year. If you missed the show - or would like to go back to the beginning and watch it all again - you can do so for free, rather than paying nearly £100 for the DVD box set. However, you'll need to be prepared to do some serious binge watching.

The trick is to sign up for a 7-day free



trial of a Now TV Entertainment Pass (www.nowtv.com). You need to be a new customer and cancel the plan before your trial runs out, otherwise you'll be paying £8.99 per month.

Now TV offers a wide range of shows beyond Game of Thrones, as well as live streaming of many Sky TV channels, which you can watch with your free trial - if you have any time left!

Watch all nine seasons of Seinfeld

The enduring popularity of *Friends* means many people view it as the best (American) sitcom of all time, but there are rival shows that are held in just as high - or even higher - regard, and Seinfeld is one of them. The show ran for 180 episodes between 1989 and 1998 and starred Jerry Seinfeld, Jason Alexander, Julia Louis-Dreyfus and Michael Richards. You can remind

yourself how good it was, or watch it for the first time, for free on All 4 (bit.ly/seinfeld496). You will have to sit through adverts, mind you, but it's worth it.

The first three series arrived on 7 February, with the rest following every Friday. By the time you read this, all 180 episodes from all nine seasons should be available. You'll want to start watching sooner rather than later, though, because Netflix has purchased the rights for five years starting in 2021.



Play free titles from the Epic **Games Store**

The Epic Games Store (bit.ly/epic496) gives its members a free game every week, as well as access to free-to-play games. To get a free game, sign up for an account, visit the Store page and select the game you want from the available choices. Once you've claimed a game, it's yours to keep forever. Free titles often have add-on content available to buy.

You can save a lot of money over the year because even the cheapest giveaway games usually cost from £7 to buy. At the time of writing, the time-limited freebies were the big-name Assassin's Creed: Syndicate and the lesser-known Faeria, so it's worth paying regular visits to check the latest offers.



Play the original Half-Life games for free

Games developer Valve is mostly focusing on its Steam gaming platform these days, but it has also been working

Download the original StarCraft for free

Blizzard's StarCraft is a real-time strategy game in which four alien species battle for supremacy. Originally released in 1998, Blizzard gave the game a graphical overhaul in 2017, while at the same time making StarCraft and the StarCraft :Brood War expansion free for PC and Mac owners to download and play. To get the game, go to bit.ly/scraft496 and click the download link. If you've never played the game, it's definitely worth righting that wrong. The remastered version of StarCraft is available to buy for £12.99.





on its first official Half-Life game in 13 years - Half-Life Alyx. This is a VR-only title, so not everyone

will get to play it. However, to celebrate the game's launch, Value has made both Half-Life and Half-Life 2, and the latter game's episodes, available for free for all Steam users. You need to have Steam installed to play them, and they will only be free until Half-Life Alyx launches on 23 March. To get the games, click the links at bit.ly/halflife496. They usually retail for £7.19 each.

Play Pandemic Express for free

Pandemic Express (www

.pandemicexpress.com) is a multiplayer survival game, in which up to 30 players

(including yourself) have to make it to a train in order zombie apocalypse, with the twist being that one of the group is already infected,



and can infect others. It's a great idea, and the game plays well, but unfortunately it failed to find enough people willing to pay £11.39 for it, so the developers have now made it free to play on Steam (bit.ly/pefree496).





Get a free credit score (with no catches)

When you go to borrow money, arrange a mortgage, or take out a credit or store card, the lender will check your credit score, which shows how well (or otherwise) you've handled credit in the past. The higher your score, the lower the risk you are, and the more favourably lenders will look upon you.


Credit scores are calculated by a credit reference agency (CRA) – in the UK, these are Experian, Equifax and Call Credit. Viewing your Equifax credit report and score is free for the first 30 days but costs £7.95 afterwards. However, ClearScore (www.clearscore)



.com) lets you view your Equifax credit score and report for free, and as many times as you like, without getting stung by follow-up fees.

Order free products from the web

There are lots of sites that offer products and samples for free, although there may be catches to be aware of – you might need to sign up for a service, or provide feedback or personal details, so always check the offers carefully before committing yourself. Some of the better sites to visit are Magic Freebies (www.magicfreebiesuk .co.uk), Get Me Free Samples (getmefreesamples.com/uk) and



MoneySavingExpert.com's Freebies forum (bit.ly/mse496).

Get 10 free stock images from Shutterstock

There are a number of excellent stock-image libraries on the web. Shutterstock is one of the best known, and you can get 10 images a month for £228 a year (the equivalent of £1.90 per image). However, you can try out the Shutterstock 10-images-per-month plan for free by entering the code PICK10FREE when you sign up.

As with most such offers, you need to remember to cancel the plan before the trial ends to avoid being charged.

Cancelling isn't simply a matter of clicking a button, though – you'll need to contact Shutterstock through the link on the page at bit.ly/sstock496 – but it's straightforward enough.



Get copyright-free images from Google

If you're looking for a photo to use on your website or in a project, then Google Images is a great resource. However, many of the results it returns aren't free to use, and you'll effectively be stealing them and breaching copyright if you incorporate them in your own work. Fortunately, you can filter the results to only show those that can legally be used.

Search for your topic on Google Images, then go to Tools, Usage Rights, 'Labelled for Reuse'. This means you will only see pictures that are in the public domain or licensed under Creative Commons CC 2.0 for private or commercial use.

Read The Call of the Wild for free

Jack London's classic 1903 novel about a pet pooch from California who becomes a sled dog in the wilds of the Yukon during the Klondike Gold Rush of the 1890s has been adapted for film and television a number of times. There's now a new version of The Call of the Wild starring Harrison Ford and Karen Gillan out at cinemas but, if you want to read the book before you see it (or just



want to read the book on its own merits), you can download an ebook copy for free from the brilliant **Project Gutenberg** (bit.ly/callwild496). You can view The Call of the Wild in HTML format online, or get a copy in EPUB, Kindle

or plain-text format, saving you £4.49 on its current paperback price.

Download the entire Flora Graeca

John Sibthorp's Flora Graeca (1806-1840) was one of the most lavish and expensive books of its age, and has been called "one of the most extraordinary botanical publications of all time". Cataloguing the plants of Greece and the eastern Mediterranean,



only 25 full copies were produced, and each sold for £254 (in 19th-century money), with the 10-volume set containing nearly 1,000 handcoloured illustrations. Now, the entire original work has been digitised and made available for free as part of the **Biodiversity Heritage** Library's Expanding

Listen to free Audible books through Alexa

If you own one of Amazon's Echo smart speakers, you can enjoy free audiobooks through Audible. Each month, Amazon makes three titles available to listen to, ranging from classics to recent titles. You can browse the choices at bit.ly/alexa496 or say "Alexa, what's free from Audible?" and ask for the title you want to be read aloud. You don't need an Audible account to access this service.

There are considerable savings to be made - in February, the three books on offer sold for a total of £90 when bought through the website.



Access to Biodiversity Literature project (bit.ly/flora496). You can download all 10 volumes from the site in various formats - it's written in Latin, but the beautifully reproduced plates mean you can just enjoy the floral pictures.

Borrow books from the Open Library

Open Library (openlibrary.org) is run by the non-profit Internet Archive, and its goal is to provide a page on the web for every book ever published. In addition to that, the site lets you read classic novels and 'borrow' books that you can read in your browser or on an iPad or Android device. Titles available to borrow include best sellers from Stephen King, Douglas Adams, Bill Bryson, Tom Clancy, Dan Brown and



George RR Martin. You can take out up to five books in one go, but there is a catch - only one person at a time can borrow a book. If the title is "out", you can add yourself to the waiting list. Loans expire after two weeks, although some books are returned early.

Discover free and discounted ebooks

BookBub (www.bookbub.com) lets you find and download free and discounted

ebooks from well-known publishers and independent authors. Sign up and the service will email you the best offers every day.



If you prefer, you can just browse the list and download free books found on the likes of Amazon, Google Play and Apple Books (bit.ly/bubfree496). You aren't going to find anything from big-name writers such as Stephen King or JK Rowling on the site, but you might discover a gem or two in the list.

Best free driver updaters



Drivers are the small but essential programs that help Windows control the hardware fitted in your PC. **Andy Shaw** tests six free tools designed to ensure they're always up to date

What we liked:

Once you've got past the hurdle of installing IObit Driver Booster (see 'How it can be improved', below) and launched the software, it starts its first scan. This only takes a few

seconds to complete.

There's a big button at the top that offers to upgrade all the out-of-date drivers it finds in one go, though we'd recommend scrolling down and doing them one-by-one instead – just click the Update button next to a driver to update it. Once you've updated one, it's best to run your PC for a while and check that everything's still working before you update the next one. This more cautious approach makes it much simpler to roll back the update if a new driver is incompatible with your particular configuration of components.

Driver Booster's interface looks modern and uses icons to help break up the design into sections that make it clear exactly which job the different drivers perform.

On our old PC, the software found and flagged 18 out-of-date drivers – a similar count to the Bronze Awardwinner Driver Easy Lite. Updating them is simple to do and didn't cause any problems on our PC.

There are a handful of extra tools included, such as the option to scan for the drivers of any unplugged hardware that you haven't used for a while, though ironically (but sensibly),

it doesn't uninstall them in case you change your mind and can't find the right drivers in the future.

You can run IObit Driver Booster as regularly as you like and it won't try to install itself and run in the background.

How it can be improved:

The software is heavy-handed in offering upgrades and extra paid-for tools, which means you have to tread a little carefully around its interface for fear of downloading something you don't want. Even the driver-scan results page entices you to upgrade so you can update even more files, though these

turned out to be Windows components rather than traditional drivers, so don't worry – you're not missing out on anything with the free version.

OUR VERDICT

IObit's driver updater nags you to upgrade with annoying frequency but it looks good and managed to root out the outdated drivers on our test PC. Installing drivers one at a time is a straightforward task and, if anything goes wrong, it's easy to roll them back again.

What we liked:

We installed DriverMax on our old PC, where it scanned for missing drivers and discovered 27 items - around 10 more than our other award-


winners. On close inspection, most of these extra files were actually third-party software updates, and some aren't vital if you're not running programs that specifically require them.

The software has tools for creating a system restore point and making a backup of existing drivers. The restore options are even more plentiful, offering access to Windows' own roll-back tools, and the option to choose versions of drivers you've downloaded previously.

It's not the slickest looking software we tested but its tab- and menu-based interface is familiar and simple to use. While there are a few nags and the occasional pop-up advertising the paid-for version, you can switch off most of its annoyances in the Settings.

How it can be improved:

We're not convinced that bundling software updates and system



components together with drivers and warning us that they need updating is quite what we want from a driverupdating tool, because it muddies the waters. We appreciate you can get something here that our other award winners aren't providing in their free versions, but we think software updates would be better left to a separate scan.

OUR VERDICT


DriverMax found more out-of-date software than any of the other tools. but the same number of drivers as our other award winners. The program includes a number of extras, but they aren't essential.




struggled to find any of the problems on our test PC. Where the award winners found a range of drivers in need of an update, Driver Talent only found one missing driver and one in need of an update.

The web page it creates captures a lot of information from your PC, including your hardware specification, so it can check whether the drivers you have installed are the latest and best options available. 

We saw DriverPack Solution mentioned regularly while researching software for this feature, but we got no further than downloading it because a significant

portion of the malwarescanning tools on VirusTotal (www .virustotal

.com)



flagged it up as potentially dangerous. It doesn't look like it contains a virus but it was so widely detected as potentially unwanted software that we decided not to risk it.

What we liked:

Driver Easy Lite discovered 17 out-of-date drivers on our test PC, along with three more that were listed as 'Unplugged devices'. These latter alerts

relate to drivers that only need updating if the devices are connected to the PC again.

There's an option to click a button that updates all 20 drivers, or you can update them individually. A drop-down menu lets you see more detail or hide the update if you decide that you need to keep the version you've got and don't want Driver Easy pestering you about it the next time you run a scan.

Driver Easy Lite comes with a collection of useful extra tools, including a driver backup you can run before you start, to make it easy to restore drivers in case something goes wrong. There's also an uninstall tool you could use if you want to restart your PC and have Windows find its preferred driver for a particular device.




How it can be improved:

If you don't select the custom install, the software may set up an automatic driver-scanning schedule, which is probably overkill if you aren't constantly switching around your hardware.

OUR VERDICT

Driver Easy's simple design makes it a good alternative if you don't like **Driver Booster's more cluttered** interface. However, the fact that it tries to run with Windows unless you opt out is a tad excessive.

lack me the Trello card, man". What are these trendy business types on about? Ironically, they're talking about tools that make communication simpler. They're just doing it in ridiculous marketing jargon which – like all jargon – is designed to befuddle outsiders like you and me.

Don't be fooled. These trendy apps are not just for

millennials who hand-sew their own coffee. Hidden within silly language about 'synergy', 'moonshots' and 'incentivising' are clever tools that can help you keep in touch, plan projects and organise trips far more easily than using email or WhatsApp groups. In this feature, we pull back the Wizard of Oz curtain to reveal the best tools the pros would rather keep secret.

They use it to:

Chat to colleagues without having to speak face to face.

You can use it to:

Organise events with friends and family all over the world, via this supremely feature-rich instant mass-messenger. You can create separate searchable public and private 'channels' (say, one for an upcoming party) and add people to them, then share photos, videos, GIFs, links and content from integrated tools, such as Google Calendar or oodles of widgets. You can even have a conversation with yourself, turning Slack into a memo pad (see screenshot).

Is there a free version?



Upload receipts and manage your household budget. The separate Wave Receipts app (www.waveapps.com/receipts) lets you scan receipts on the go.

Wave is so hip it doesn't even have a desktop version, and the Android app is an APK that bypasses the Play Store. However the service is security-conscious and uses banking-grade encryption to keep your data safe (my.waveapps.com/security).

Is there a free version?

Wave is entirely free for accounting, receipt scanning and even invoicing. You only have to pay to accept credit card payments.







Is there a free version?

The free plan gives you three editable boards and support for 'core' apps

including Adobe Creative Cloud. You can also invite unlimited collaborators, which could be handy for putting together a family memoir.

Create virtual 3D models of swanky new office blocks.

You can use it to:

Is there a free version?





Take the strain off your clicking finger, as Robert Irvine reveals the best alternative ways to get around online

Use Vimium's keyboard shortcuts


All web browsers let you use keyboard shortcuts for basic, everyday tasks such as opening new tabs (Ctrl+T), searching for text (Ctrl+F) and printing the current page (Ctrl+P), which saves you a bit of pointing and clicking. But to properly navigate the web without a mouse, you should install Vimium for Chrome (bit.ly/vimiumc496) or Firefox (bit.ly/ vimiumf496) - it also works in the new Edge browser.

This handy extension provides simple keyboard shortcuts for scrolling up, down and around web pages; opening, closing and switching tabs; and - best of all - opening links without clicking. Press f on your keyboard and every link on the current page will be highlighted yellow and assigned a letter code. Type the relevant letters to open links in the same tab - pressing F instead of f opens them in a new tab. You can view Vimium's full list of shortcuts by pressing? on your keyboard (Shift+/) and even create your own.



Try Vivaldi's mouse-free features

The brilliant browser Vivaldi has a Quick Commands feature that gives you speedy access to various tasks using only your keyboard. Press F2 to open the Quick Commands menu, then use your cursor keys to browse the list, which includes options such as Delete Browsing Data, Move Tab to New



Window and Capture Area to Clipboard, and lets you search across your bookmarks and tabs. There are also keyboard shortcuts for many of the tasks, which you can customise by going into Vivaldi's Settings (Ctrl+F12) and choosing Keyboard.

Another mouse-free feature, called Spatial Navigation, lets you move around a web page by pressing Shift and the arrow keys, then hit Enter to open a link. To activate this option, go to Settings, Webpages and select Vivaldi or Chromium/Blink under Spatial Navigation.

Open links on pages by typing

Excessive mouse use can lead to repetitive strain injury (RSI), so why not give your wrist a rest by using DeadMouse (bit.ly/dead496)? With this Chrome extension, rather than clicking links on a web page, you type a few

letters of a word that appears in a link to make it shake to show a match. You can then press



Enter to open the page in the same tab, or Ctrl+Enter to open it in a new one. If several links contain the same word. name or phrase, press the Tab key to move between them. Although DeadMouse hasn't been updated for over seven years, it still works well on most sites and is safe to use.

Browse the web using your voice

Bypass your keyboard and your mouse by installing the fantastic Chrome (and Edge) extension Handsfree for Web (bit.ly/handsfree496), which lets you do everything online using only your voice.

Its extensive range of commands allow you to open, scroll and bookmark web pages: 'click'



links and other elements (say "click" and all items on a page are assigned a number for you to speak); control audio and video playback; dictate, copy and paste text; search the web or within a page; download files; and much more.

Unlike many voice-recognition tools,

the add-on is completely free to use, with no premiumlocked features, although we couldn't change the default language from US English. If you're worried about privacy, you can make Handsfree stop

listening to your microphone after three minutes of silence, or opt to press Ctrl before each command.

Opera GX is a special version of the Opera browser that lets you control memory, processor power and bandwidth. Here's how to use it

eb browsers such as Chrome and Firefox consume a lot of resources. The more tabs you have open, the more memory and processor power they require, which can lead to your system slowing down or even crashing. Opera GX is a new browser that lets you set limits so it doesn't interfere with your other PC


activity. It's designed with gamers in mind, and even includes gamer-specific features such as Twitch integration and a games release calendar, but you don't need to be a Fortnite fanatic to benefit from it. Its resource-limiting features make it useful for anyone, especially if you're running an older PC or you often perform a lot of intensive multi-tasking.



The GX Corner includes the games release calendar **1** with links to new, upcoming and interesting games, trailers 2 and more. You can filter the games by platform. B Click the cog 4 to customise which gaming platforms and sections 5 are displayed on this page.



Open a new tab to see the Speed Dial page, which lets you quickly access favourite sites. The default selection are all games related 11 but, if you hover over a site and click the three-dot icon, 2 you can edit or remove an item. 3 You can also add new sites 4 and search the web. 5





The browser's most notable feature - which makes Opera GX appealing to gamers and non-gamers alike - is GX Control. Open it by clicking its button. 1 You can pin the sidebar to keep it open. The Network Limiter 🖪 is where you manage the amount of bandwidth used by the browser.



The current upload and download speeds are shown. 1 Toggle the feature on 2 and select one of the preset options in the drop-down menu. **1** These range from 64KB/s (512Kbps) to 25MB/s (300Mbps). You can also control processor usage. Its current percentage is displayed here. 11 Enable the CPU Limiter, 2 then use the slider 3 to set the maximum processor limit. You can increase the amount of processing power at any time.



Customise the browser by clicking the Settings cog in the vertical toolbar on the left 11 or click the button on the far right to open the 'Easy setup' bar. 2 From here, you can change the colour **3** and select a different wallpaper (including animated ones). 4 You can also add your own wallpaper. 5



You can also customise the style of the tile animation 1 and remove specific elements from the browser. 2 Opera GX has some interesting inbrowser sound effects and typing sounds **B** that you can toggle on or off. The browser can also block ads and trackers, and has a built-in VPN, too. 4



Secure your Google account with Advanced Protection


ecurity is paramount if you're going to venture online, and making sure your accounts are fully secure is a priority. These days, that means enabling two-factor authentication (2FA), which requires you to sign in twice to access an account.

In Issue 494 (bit.ly/webuser494), we ranked the best two-factor authentication apps and, here, we're looking at Google's Advanced Protection Program. This new opt-in service doesn't need an additional app but provides an extra layer of security by using your phone or physical keys to confirm your identity every time you log in. Google claims that its program goes even further than 2FA. By enrolling, your account should be protected against sophisticated phishing attacks, while Google safeguards which apps can access your data and blocks fraudulent account access.

EXPERT TIP

Steve Clark says

Google's Advanced Protection Program works best with Android 7+ but we show you how to use it on older phones, too. It also works on iPhones that run iOS 10 and above and, once you've download and set up the Google Smart Lock app (bit.ly/smartlock496), the enrolment process is the same as with Android, letting you use your phone's built-in security key.



Head to bit.ly/googleprotect496, where the website explains what the Google Advanced Protection Program is and how it works. In short, it keeps your accounts safer, defending against certain cyber-attacks and preventing other people from accessing your account. Click 'Get started'.



If you aren't already signed into your Google account, do so now. On the following screen, press Next to confirm that you wish to enrol in "Google's strongest account security". 1 You must then verify you're the account holder by re-entering your password.




Depending on the phone you have, the next screen may vary. Most modern phones - those running Android 7 and above - feature a built-in security key. 🚺 You can see what this means by clicking 'How will signing in to my account change?'. 2 When you're ready, click Enroll, 3 then Finish Enrollment, 4




If your phone is an older model or you'd rather use physical keys, click 'Can I enroll with another security key 📘 instead?', 🚺 then choose 'Use 2 keys'. 🔁 From here, you can buy **3** and register **4** the Titan Security Key Bundle. However, this will set you back £50.







Once you've enrolled, check your phone for confirmation. On your computer, ignore Google's attempts to sell you back-up keys by clicking 'Add key later'. Google now performs a Security Checkup. 11 Click each section 2 to view potential issues. Click Remove or 'Remove access' 12 to plug any security gaps.




At the foot of Security Checkup is Password Checkup. Click this, then select 'Check passwords' and sign in again. Google searches for compromised passwords 11 and suggests fixes for repeated and weak passwords. You can select 'Change password' **B** or click the relevant three-dot icon 4 to View, Update or Delete a password. 5




Check that the Advanced Protection Program is working by switching on Bluetooth and Location services on your phone, then open Gmail on your PC. Google prompts you to turn on your computer's Bluetooth, so press 'Turn on'. 11 You may also choose to sign in using a physical security key. 🛂





If you don't want to continue in the program any longer, go to myaccount.google.com/security. Under the Advanced Protection Program section, 11 click Unenroll. 2 As you'd expect, you need to sign in and click Unenroll again. On the next screen, select 'Change settings'.



Sign in again and you're greeted with Google's 2-step verification zone. Here, you can add additional security keys, 1 back up your passcodes, 2 enable Google sign-in prompts on your phone, **3** and so on. To remove a security key, first choose to Turn Off 4 the service, then Turn Off again. Finally, click the Trashcan icon. 5



Monitor your hard drive's health

ost modern hard drives use SMART (Self-Monitoring Analysis and Reporting Technology), which means they keep an eye on themselves and know if they're about to fail. Clear Disk Info gathers this list of numbers from your hard

drive and presents it in a clear, understandable way, highlighting the information that's particularly worth taking notice of.








The basic drive information is summarised here. You can see the temperature, 11 how many hours of service the drive has provided, 🛭 and whether it senses any imminent problems. 12 You can also find more detailed information in the Disk Information section. 4




Each attribute has a status: a blue 'i' (informative), 11 a yellow warning triangle (important) 2 or a red warning triangle (critical). El Yellow and red warnings are also highlighted in green. Although they sound bad, there's no need to panic - just keep an eye on anything that's flagged.



For example, on our hard drive, the Reallocated Sectors Count 🗓 gets a red warning because it's in the Critical Attributes section. At the moment, however, its Value of O is identical to the 'Ideal value' of 0. B Keep an eye on it, though, and make sure you're regularly backing up your data.



Other values to watch out for are the Power-On Hours Count, Power Cycle Count 11 and the Temperature and 'Failure predicted' attribute. 2 Our rating of 503,253 hours switched on is still comfortably below the 'Ideal value' threshold of 2,420,407 hours. El



Access the menu from the three-line button in the top-right corner. 11 From here, you can refresh the list of drives, 2 update the software 3 and run the 'chkdsk' and 'defrag' commands. 4

Recycle the best parts of an old computer

Don't just lob your old PC in the bin. Wayne Williams shows you what's worth salvaging and how best to dispose of the rest



INTERNAL HARD DRIVES


Mechanical hard disk drives (HDD) and solid-state drives (SSD) are the parts of your PC you should give the most thought to when it comes to recycling. If you plan to sell a drive on and don't properly wipe its contents, then there's a very real chance someone will be able to recover your personal files and gain access to your online accounts. Simply formatting a drive to wipe its data is

nowhere near secure enough because even free software such as Recuva (www.recuva.com) can easily be used to restore files from it.

The trick to wiping a drive is to use a program such as Darik's Boot And Nuke – DBAN for short (www.dban.org). This overwrites the drive's contents numerous times, making it impossible to restore the data. It can be run from a CD/DVD or USB memory stick and, ideally, you

should choose the strongest wipe method offered with the highest number of passes. The process takes several hours to complete, so you may need to leave it running overnight. Once the drive has been thoroughly wiped, you can install a new operating system on it, if you want or need to.

Popular system-cleaning tool CCleaner (www.ccleaner.com) also includes a Drive Wiper option that can securely overwrite

your drive. You'll find this under Tools.

For obvious reasons, you should make sure you've backed up absolutely everything you want to keep before proceeding because once the drive has been wiped, your data will be gone forever with no chance of restoring it.

If you want to keep your drive to use on another computer, that's an easy job – just buy a USB enclosure for the type of drive you have (desktop PC, laptop or SSD). You can find enclosures on Amazon for as little as £7. Place your old drive inside, connect the wires and plug the device into a PC using a USB cable.

CD/DVD DRIVE

Optical disc drives are much less common these days - most new desktop and laptop PCs don't come with them as standard, and people rarely write data to discs. But if your old PC has a CD, DVD or Blu-ray drive inside it, you can pop this out and buy an enclosure for it – just as we suggested for the hard drive in the previous section. You can write discs whenever you need to, and put the drive away when it's not required.

MEMORY


Removing (and, indeed, adding)
RAM modules is a straightforward
enough task although, annoyingly, some
laptops come with the memory soldered
in. If you find that the memory modules
can be easily extracted, you may be able
to use them to boost the amount of RAM
in a new system. However, there are a
number of issues to be aware of: the
32-bit version of Windows 10 can only

recognise a maximum of 4GB (and use a total of around 3.5GB), and while the 64-bit Windows 10 Pro supports up to 2TB of RAM, the 64-bit Windows 10 Home is limited to 128GB.

You can also only use memory that's compatible with your PC. Laptop RAM won't fit into a desktop computer, and vice versa. Also, if your old system uses DDR3 RAM (DDR stands for Double Data Rate) but your new PC uses DDR4, you won't be able to boost the total because the old modules won't fit in the new slots. If both systems use DDR4, then you can use the old RAM with the new, but there is a further caveat – the speeds need to match. If they don't, all the installed RAM will run at the slowest rate. You also need spare slots in the new system for the RAM to fit into.






Turn off and unplug your PC and then - if needed - install a graphics card with the required inputs. Connect both monitors using the relevant ports.

If your card has a DisplayPort connection, use this for your main screen because it offers 4K resolutions (8K on the newest standard) at a refresh rate of 6OHz.



Turn on your computer. Windows should automatically recognise both screens but it may not set them up at the correct resolution. To manage your screens, right-click the desktop and select 'Screen resolution'. If the second monitor isn't shown, click Detect. 1 Click Identify 2 to show the order in which Windows has arranged the screens.



You can reorder the screens by clicking and dragging them. If both monitors are showing the same image, change the setting from 'Duplicate these displays' to 'Extend these displays'. The process varies slightly depending on which version of Windows you're running, but the end result is the same.

MONITOR

There's nothing to stop you selling your old desktop screen, but it might make more sense to use it with your current PC (see our Mini Workshop on page 59). A dual- or multi-screen setup can really boost productivity, and Windows does most of the hard work for you. The two screens don't need to be the same make, model or size, but you will need a video card with multiple outputs that match the inputs on your screens. You will also need the physical space on your desk for a second screen with, ideally both monitors at the same height.

It's possible to remove the screen from a laptop but it's not particularly easy to do and you'll need to look for instructions online. If you're planning on scrapping the

laptop anyway, then it might be worth trying it as a fun project.

Recycle your e-waste


WEEE - Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment - is the name given to all electrical equipment that's no longer working or wanted. It's important to dispose of these items responsibly because a lot of e-waste contains harmful chemicals such as lead, mercury, cadmium, beryllium, chlorine, bromine and phosphors.

You can find local places to take your goods to on the Recycle Now site (www.recyclenow.com/local-recycling). Another option is WeeeCharity (weeecharity.co.uk) which takes electrical items with the aim of reusing, recycling or reselling them back into the community.


MINI WORKSHOP Dismantle an old desktop computer



Turn the power off at the wall, earth yourself by, for example, touching a radiator, then remove all internal cables to gain clear access to the components. Extracting the RAM is the easiest task. Open a memory slot by pressing down on the locking tab. 1 Carefully pull out the first module and set it aside, then remove the others in turn.



To remove a hard drive (make sure you wipe it first before selling it on), pull out the power cable from the rear of the drive, then disconnect the SATA cable. You should now be able to remove the drive. Some hard drives are screwed directly into the casing, while others – like the one above – use rails.



Removing a CD/DVD/Blu-ray drive is similar to taking out a hard drive. Unplug the power and SATA cables at the back, unscrew the drive and slide it out. If you're planning to reuse the case, bear in mind that removing the drive will leave a gap that needs covering.



Ditch WordPad for Word online

ordPad has been bundled with Windows for years as a cut-back version of Word. Recently, however, some users have reported seeing messages in WordPad telling them to use the Word web app instead, which suggests that Microsoft may be preparing to ditch it. This a sensible suggestion, too, because Word online has far more features than WordPad: it supports extensions, tracks changes, offers templates, has spelling and grammar checkers and – best of all – it's free.

Go to onedrive.com in your browser, open the Documents folder, click New and select Word document. Every few seconds, your work is automatically saved online to the OneDrive folder on your hard drive. It's almost impossible to lose any work.



Word in a web browser is free and provides all the features you're likely to need



Use a Word template

Go to onedrive.com and click

New, 'Word document'. You're presented with a blank sheet of paper. Now go to the File menu and click New to see a collection of templates including 'General notes', 'Open house flyer', 'Event flyer', 'Chronological resume', Report and more.



Get more Word templates

The Word web app at onedrive.com doesn't allow the use of Word document templates (.dotx), but if you go to templates.office.com in your browser, you'll find a large collection of Office templates organised by category.

Click Newsletters, for example, to see thumbnails of newsletter templates. The ones marked with a diamond in the

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

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Open templates at templates.office.com in your browser to edit in the Word web app

corner are paid-for but there are plenty of free ones, such as 'Family newsletter', 'Business newsletter', 'Fashion newsletter' and so on.

Ignore the Download button on the next page and click the 'Edit in Browser' button. A new document is created in your OneDrive Documents folder, which opens in the Word web app. There are document templates available in a wide range of categories, which are suitable for personal or business use.



Excel at Excel

Excel, Microsoft's spreadsheet software, is also available online as a web app running in your browser. Go to

onedrive.com, open the Documents folder, click New and select 'Excel workbook' to open a blank spreadsheet. It works just like the PC program - but for free, in a browser - and, although it doesn't have every feature included in the PC app, it's adequate for most purposes.

You can create your own spreadsheets from scratch or use a template. Click File, New and select one of the nine templates, such as 'Simple service invoice', 'Project tracker', 'Weekly timesheet' and others.

There are many more, far superior templates at templates.office.com.



Use templates from Office.com to create spreadsheets and edit them in Excel online

Type excel in the search box to see nearly 50 templates, or scroll down the page and click Excel under 'Favorites by app'. Click an Excel template thumbnail and you'll see that on some (but not all) there is an 'Open in Browser' button. Click this to create a new spreadsheet from the template in your OneDrive Documents folder online and on disk.

The Excel web app opens with the template ready for you to start entering data. The currency is often set to US dollars, but just select the cells and set them to UK pounds instead.


Try Google's office tools

Google has an online office suite to rival Microsoft's and it works in a similar way. If you have a Google account, such as Gmail or an Android phone, go to drive.google.com and click the New button. Select Google Docs for the word processor or Google Sheets for the spreadsheet.

To access the smart templates, click New to show the menu, then click the arrow at the right-hand side of the Docs or Sheet menu. There are dozens of documents including reports, essays, CVs, meeting notes, proposals, and spreadsheet templates such as travel and wedding planners, monthly budgets, calendars, invoices, expenses, and so on.

Documents and spreadsheets are stored in their own format that can't be read by other services, but if you go to File, Download, you can select from various formats such as Microsoft Word, PDF and EPUB (ebook), and save your files to your hard drive.

If you're sent a Word document in Gmail, click the attachment to view it, then click the button to open it in Google Docs. It is automatically saved to your Google Drive storage. Go to Google Drive in your browser, click the cog icon and select Settings for options to automatically convert uploaded files to Google Docs format (drag files and drop them on the browser), and to use Google Docs offline, when you are without an internet connection.

Check spelling and grammar in Word

You may find that a Word document or template defaults to US spelling and grammar, so 'colour' rather than 'color' is marked as a spelling error. To fix this, press Ctrl+A to select all text, then click Review and, in the toolbar, click the down arrow next to 'abc'. Choose 'Set proofing language' and select UK English.

Misspelt words are underlined in red. Right-click them to display suggested replacements, then click the correct word. A double blue underline indicates a grammatical error, which could be anything from a missing comma to the wrong use of 'their' or 'there', 'its' and 'it's', and so on. Right-click double-underlined words to see why Word thinks they are wrong, then click one of the suggested alternatives to apply it.



Improve your writing in Word

Word's spelling and grammar checkers are helpful, but there are more powerful tools for improving your writing. Go to onedrive.com, create a new Word document and click Insert, then Add-ins in the toolbar. Click Store and search for 'grammar', then click GradeProof's Add button. GradeProof is one of dozens of Word add-ins - some are paid-for, some are free, and many are only useful to businesses, but a few are handy for anyone.

After adding GradeProof (or any add-in), you'll see a new icon on the right-hand side of the Home toolbar. Click this to open a panel on the right that shows corrections and statistics. Click View Suggestions. On first use,

you're asked to create an account, but this is free to do.

Word web app has some useful add-ins, such as **GradeProof** spelling and grammar checker highlighted. All the features in the Essential section of the sidebar are free, but the Advanced section contains paid-for tools. Click highlighted words and phrases in the text to see suggested fixes and apply them. Click Apply at the top of the window to update the Word document with the corrections.



Boost Google Docs features


Google Docs has add-ons that bring useful new features. Open any document on Google Drive and click Add-ons, then 'Get add-ons' to display a highlighted collection. For more options, click the three-line menu button and select a category, such as Utilities, Creative Tools, Task Management, Academic Resources and more. Click a tile to view the details and click Install to add it. Use it by going to the Add-ons menu, where you will find a new menu item.



Try an online suite with desktop apps

SSuite Office (office.ssuiteoffice.com) has only a dozen applications but they work in an innovative way. In Chrome, visit the site and click Scaramouche or Fandango to open the word processor. Now select 'More tools' from Chrome's menu, then 'Create shortcut'. Tick the box to open it as a window. A desktop icon is created that opens the word processor web app in a window, like a regular PC program. Repeat this for the other online apps and create desktop shortcuts to open them as apps.

In Edge, visit the SSuite Office website and open Fandango, then open Edge's menu and select Apps, 'Install this site as an app' to add it to the Apps menu. Repeat this for the other apps. To run these office apps like desktop software, select them in

LINUX

Choose the right Linux version

As soon as I move the files from my Windows 7 laptop to my Windows 10 PC, I'm planning to switch the Windows 7 device over to Linux. The laptop is an HP Pavilion g6, with 6GB of memory and a 750GB hard drive.

I read your article about versions of Linux in Issue 487 (bit.ly/webuser487). I used to work with various Unix systems at work in the later part of my working life and I seem to recollect that names such as SUSE (www.suse .com, the one we used at work), Red Hat (www.redhat.com) and Debian (www.debian.org) were current in those days, but this was 14 years ago.

Is there a reason these and any other versions were not even briefly mentioned, other than the lack of space? Are these releases any good nowadays or do they come with disadvantages?


There are hundreds of variations of Linux and space limitations make it impossible to cover them all. The remit of that particular article was that the operating systems should be

suitable for lower spec PCs. We looked at a range of options and picked our top six.

SUSE and Red Hat are aimed at businesses and come with levels of paid-for support, so they are less suited to our typical reader looking for a free

operating system for an older computer. Debian is interesting, though, because many of the current popular versions of Linux (including Ubuntu and a version of Linux Mint) are adapted from it, so you may find the article's award winners Lubuntu (lubuntu.net) and Linux Mint (linuxmint.com) more familiar than you might expect.

DistroWatch (distrowatch.com) is a great resource, listing over 100 different versions of Linux. It has a Page Hit Ranking table on the right-hand side of the homepage that shows versions of Linux in order of popularity. Six of the top 10 most popular versions are based



If you aren't constrained by an older PC there are plenty of versions of Linux you can try

on Debian, and MX Linux (mxlinux .org) is currently the most popular by a wide margin.

Your computer's specifications are powerful enough to run any version of Linux, but the bigger and more popular ones probably have a wider support for different types of hardware. Linux is free, so download several distros and try them to see which ones work with your hardware and suit you the best.


Linux has changed a lot in the 14 years since you last used it, but some things are the same and your experience will certainly help.

SECURITY

Get a VPN working in Windows 10

My Surfshark VPN (surfshark.com) works with my Amazon Fire TV Box and Android TV box (with some occasional buffering) but I'm having problems with my desktop PC. I can't get the VPN to connect, even though I can get an ordinary connection with Opera VPN working. I had no problem at all prior to installing Surfshark. Having Opera VPN on or off makes no difference.

When I try to connect Surfshark,
Windows Security asks for my username
and password, but no usernames or
passwords I know of work. I have looked
into how to switch this off, but I've had

I have unticked the box for the feature.
I have been told that PowerShell should
be switched off because it causes
problems. Is this the case?

On one occasion, I couldn't get on the internet at all on my PC (via an Ethernet connection), yet I could stream on both Firebox, Android and even my laptop – all of which are wireless. I have restarted my router, just in case, but to no avail.

Windows 10 doesn't seem to like Surfshark for some reason. Perhaps I haven't set it up correctly, although I have reinstalled it a few times and tried the various settings that are available.

Windows Security displays messages if you or a program tries to change the security settings. Open Windows Security from the Start menu, then turn off 'Firewall & network protection', 'Virus & threat protection' and controlled folder access in the same section, and 'App & browser control'. Now try connecting and see if disabling the setting has fixed the problem. These security features are important so turn them back on as soon as you can.

We have used a few VPNs and sometimes they fail to connect for some unknown reason. Quite often, picking a different city, country or server solves the problem. Maybe too many people were trying to connect to the one you were using. Use the country list or the options to connect to the fastest or nearest server.

Another possible fix is to change the protocol, which has solved the problem for some people. Click Settings in the sidebar, then Advanced. Under Protocol, select a different option, then try connecting the VPN again. If it still doesn't work, return to this section and flip the switches below – on to off or off to on.

You can also try resetting Surfshark. Click Settings, scroll down and click Help. Click Diagnostics and you'll see two buttons displayed: one to reset the network connection and another to restore original settings. Try them both.

If nothing helps, go to support .surfshark.com, scroll down to the bottom of the page and click Live Chat to discuss the problem with a member of the technical support team.

Install software without a CD

I ordered Studio One (bit.ly/stud496) recording software from Amazon to use with Autotune Pro (bit.ly/auto496). It was delivered today but there was no CD with it.

With Autotune Pro, I entered the registration code as asked, but it said that the registration code was already applied to someone else. That someone else was me.

I was told I would need an iLok licence (www.ilok.com) to use Autotune Pro, but because of the registration problem, I'm now afraid that iLok might not work. I've got multiple problems to deal with right now and it's very frustrating.


Connect two monitors

I needed to move my TV/CCTV monitor next to my computer monitor and I then decided to use it as a second screen. I connected it to my GeForce GT 610 graphics card using a VGA cable because the computer monitor is already using the HDMI connector.

I turned on the TV, changed the input source and it was working perfectly. That was until the next day. It seems I have to keep changing the settings in Windows display settings from 'Show only on 1' to 'Extend these displays'. Is there something I am missing or a workaround that I can insert in the Registry?

The problem could be related to the VGA cable, which is a very old standard that hasn't been used by monitors for a long time. It doesn't

have the same communication capabilities as HDMI and it may be that the PC can't detect it, which is why you have to manually select the display settings each time it's used.

Try switching on the monitor before starting the computer and, when shutting down, wait until the PC is off before you turn off the monitor.

Some people have found that updating the graphics card drivers solved the problem. Go to www .geforce.co.uk/drivers and download and install the latest drivers for your graphics card.



A It's not unusual for a physical purchase to come with an empty box, although there's usually a serial number or product key and some instructions on how to use it to get the program from the PreSonus Studio One website.

Basically, you go to www.presonus .com and register with the product key. You can then log into the site and download the software to your computer. It can take some time, so be patient. Install it and, when it is first run, it can be activated. Go to bit.ly/ activate496 for more information on registration and setup.

Autotune Pro requires an iLok, which is a USB dongle that authorises the software. Go to bit.ly/ilok496 for a step-by-step guide to using it. Links on the right-hand side of the page offer help with registration and activation.



I have gone to Display Adapters in Device Manager and updated all drivers, and also checked Windows updates. The Lenovo website says there are no updated drivers available.

A fault with the screen display is rarely a hardware issue and is nearly always caused by software. Drivers are available from two sources: via Microsoft, using Device Manager; and from the hardware manufacturer. The drivers from the two sources are not always the same, and the latest version may not be the best.

Download the most recent display driver from the Lenovo website and install it. This will replace the Microsoft driver installed by Device Manager. It may be older, but it might also be more compatible. Try it and see.

WINDOWS 7

Download another final update

I still use Windows 7 - for now, at least - but I may get a new computer in the summer. In the meantime, an annoying problem has cropped up with my desktop wallpaper. When an image is selected for the desktop, there is an option to stretch it to fit, if it isn't quite the exact dimension of the screen. However, this no longer works and the desktop is black.

I've used this method for years and it's always worked. I know Windows 7 is no longer supported, but is there a solution?



Print web pages clutter-free

In the old version of Edge, this was very handy for removing ads and the like from a web page prior to printing. I would be truly grateful if you could show me how to reinstate this option.



Microsoft's new Edge browser certainly has a lot going for it but it's still missing a few key features. And, as you point out, clutter-free printing is one of them. However, there's a cheeky workaround that lets you print web pages without all those ink-wasting unwanted extras.

The trick is to use Microsoft's Immersive Reader option. By design, this strips out unnecessary details, letting you focus on the content as you would a book or magazine article. When you reach a page you'd like to print, look to the right-hand side of the address bar you should see a book icon. Click this to launch Immersive Reader mode.

Now, when you print the page, you'll note the preview has a lot less clutter. Like the original printing option, this Immersive Reader trick won't work on every site, but you should be able to print most web pages more efficiently.


With crooked calls being made using telephone numbers that mimic banks, software companies, the police and so on, can you recommend any apps that check and verify their validity?

Call spoofing - the act of making one phone number show up as another - has gone mainstream in recent years. It's not just conmen hoping to trick you into answering the phone - there are readily accessible online tools such as SpoofCard that let just about anyone get in on this nefarious action.

While there are plenty of apps that can help identify unknown or hidden caller IDs, and even automated spam calls, they can't always tackle call spoofing because,

by design, the phone numbers used make them look legitimate. Right now, the best way to avoid these calls is to rely on your own instincts. Ignore a call if you feel it's dodgy, and use the default Android or iOS calling apps, which have grown more sophisticated at

identifying rogue callers, and even give you the option to block further nuisance calls. Android is especially good at this.

Open the three-dot menu in your Phone app and, under Settings, select 'Caller ID & spam'. Be sure to turn on 'See caller ID and spam ID' and 'Filter spam calls' to help beat the spoofers.



Hide files and folders in File Explorer



Configure automatic maintenance

Windows can automatically run maintenance tasks in the background to check for updates, security problems, system diagnostics and so on. You can choose when this takes place and enable the checks to run, even if the computer is in Sleep mode. The settings are in the Control Panel.


Add more clocks

I can never remember whether Europe is an hour ahead or behind the UK, or in the same time zone, particularly when the clocks go forward and back in the spring and autumn. One way to quickly see what time it is elsewhere in the world is to add more clocks to the taskbar.

Open the Windows 10 Settings app and click 'Time & language' followed by 'Date & time', then click 'Add clocks for different time zones'. I think I used to do this in Date and Time in the Windows 7 Control Panel, but I haven't used Windows 7 for a while.

In the window that opens, select the Additional Clocks tab. There are two extra clocks that can be added. 

don't understand why people are so surprised that having a Ring smart doorbell might compromise their privacy (Need to Know, Issue 495). The whole point of these things is that they monitor and record what's going on around them, then transmit that data over the internet, through the relevant company's servers and back to the user. Does that really sound like a completely secure and private process? No, of course not!

If people want to have smart devices in their homes - or attached to them, in the case of Ring doorbells - they have to be prepared to share their private data or the things won't work properly. That's what smart technology is all about: providing a web-



connected service that's personalised to your needs using data you provide. If you don't like the sound of that, you might as well stick with a traditional doorbell.

The same principle applies to Amazon Echo and Google Home speakers, which are designed to respond to your voice and process your spoken requests through internet servers. How can they do this without gathering and sharing a certain amount of your personal data? If you're worried about your privacy, then don't ask them anything private - simple as that!

I'm not saying it's right for Ring doorbells to pass data to third-party companies without the user's permission, which is what the latest news stories are focusing on, especially where Google and Facebook are involved. But to believe that smart devices work independently of the web and don't gather and share your data strikes me as very naive.



Smart TV services are tracking you more closely than you think, says Barry Collins

Who's watching you watch them?



e value your privacy," says the big splash banner on the Daily Express website. shortly before you click "I Accept" to the recommended settings and it drops no fewer than 50 trackers on your computer.

Still, that's the well-known price of business on the web, right? We put up with a horrendous number of ad trackers, trying to sell us the thing we already bought on Amazon last Thursday, just so we can read the story about Princess Diana posthumously warning us not to eat Marmite on a Tuesday (or whatever other nonsense the Express is churning out today). And if we don't like it, we can use ad blockers to keep the worst of it at bay.

What about your TV? Surely the worst advertising excesses you've got to put up with there are the two minutes of pre-roll ads before you get to watch Gogglebox on catch-up? Afraid not. A new study called Watching You Watch (bit.ly/watching496), conducted by researchers from Princeton and the University of Chicago, has shed light on the trackers that are hidden within

internet television services such as Amazon Fire TV and Roku. The report makes for more shocking viewing than Channel 4's

Naked Attraction.

f No fewer than 89% of the channels on Amazon's Fire TV service have trackers built into them I

No fewer than 89% of the channels on Amazon's Fire TV service have trackers built into them, feeding information about your viewing habits and more back to companies such as Google. On Roku, it's 69% of channels. The information the trackers are feeding back includes what you're watching, which ads you've sat through, the



unique identifiers of your devices, your postcode and more. Four channels two on Amazon and two on Roku - even feed back the email address used to create your internet TV account to third-party advertisers.

Of course, you've probably agreed to

this in chapter VI, paragraph VIII of the 45-screen User Agreement you blithely clicked to accept when you first installed the hardware, because if

you actually bothered to fully read such documents, you wouldn't have time to watch TV in the first place. But I'm willing to bet my kids' savings accounts that fewer than 1% of viewers had any idea that their TV was relaying their personal information to advertisers.

Even if you've fiddled around in the Amazon or Roku settings and found the

options to switch off the tracking, the US researchers claim you might as well not have bothered, describing the TV services' privacy-protecting options as "practically ineffective".

What's to be done about this? The researchers recommend that the TV services come with a web browser-style private-browsing mode that allows viewers to watch without fear of their data being fed to the wolves. I'd go further. An outright ban on viewers' data being sent to any third parties unless they have explicitly agreed to it - not just clicked through a massive user agreement - in the first place.

Google has no more right to know what I'm watching than a bloke pressing his nose against my living room window, trying to catch a glimpse of my TV. I'd call the police if someone was doing that. It's time that sneakily tracking your viewing habits on internet devices was treated with equal force.



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
