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

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
Don't be a danger to yourself

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

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

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


What's New Online

Download 2.8 million copyright-free images

or nearly 175 years, The **Smithsonian Institution** has been building a vast collection of objects, works of art and specimens, to document natural and cultural diversity all over the world. It has also amassed a vast library of 2D and 3D digital images, 2.8 million of which have now been placed in the public domain. This means they can be downloaded for free and without any restrictions on how they can be used.

The content, listed under a Creative Commons Zero (CCO) licence, has been drawn from across the Smithsonian's 19 museums, nine research centres, libraries, archives and the National Zoo. Items include portraits, placards, posters, contracts and images of fossils, nestled among curiosities such as boxing headgear



The 3D items can be examined using the website's 3D Voyager tool and you can also look at how the collections are being used by artists and innovators to create original works. Research datasets and collections metadata can

be downloaded and used, too, with the Smithsonian promising to add more great content over the coming months. bit.ly/smith497

Discover celebrity GIFs for any emotion

Have you ever wanted to quickly express a particular feeling online, only to find yourself searching long and hard for the perfect GIF? Well, a new set of visualisation tools based on data from Google's visual-expression search engine, Tenor (tenor.com), will soon help you find out which celebrity or character is most associated with the emotion or action you're seeking to convey. Simply choose a celebrity or character from a drop-down list to see how they're most

commonly used. Mickey Mouse, for instance, tends to be used most often to convey feelings of happiness. Singer Taylor Swift, on the other hand, typically displays love.

You can also search by emotions and actions, to find the celebrities most associated with them (Drake is the go-to for clapping, it seems). You can view where the celebrities lie on a GIF search spectrum, looking at ratios of sad to happy and cry to laughter.


Delve into a vault of VHS

Memories of past television content can be as fuzzy as the tapes we recorded them on. But with the recently expanded VHS Vault on the Internet Archive. long-forgotten

trailers, TV shows and other captures are being brought back to life.



There are now more than 20,700 entries including documentaries, children's programmes, portions of movies and key news events including Tiananmen Square in 1989. Most of the newer nuggets come from the US but there are close to 300 UK shows, including many made by the BBC.

To find what you're after, you can use the Internet Archive's filters to narrow your search by topic and year, or manually scour the metadata or text contents via the search engine. There's been no attempt to clean up the videos so they're presented in all their distorted, blurry glory.

Make photos 3D using Facebook

For the past few years, Facebook has let you take 3D photos using the dual-cameras on most higher-end mobile phones. Now its app is using machine learning to bring the 3D effect to handsets with a single camera - the iPhone 7 upwards and most mid-range Android phones. You can read the blog post linked to above for an explanation of the technique.



Draw anything on a map

Whether you want to express an artistic idea or simply need to highlight a location, you can grab one of four differently-sized brushes and draw on this interactive map. There's a



wide variety of colours to choose from, as well as an Undo button, should you make

a mistake. The browser-based tool also comes with a great choice of backgrounds, from Bing aerial photography and an OpenStreetMap to Esri World Imagery. Start by entering a street, city or country, or zoom into the map. Once you're done, you can click the Share button to send the URL to others.

Virgin Media leaked the details of 900,000 customers

What happened?

Broadband provider Virgin Media has admitted to a massive data breach in which a database containing 900,000 customers' personal information was left online for more than 10 months.

Virgin Media offered reassurances that the leak - which left the database viewable online because it was incorrectly configured by a member of staff - was not spotted as a result of a hack, but had been flagged by a security researcher at TurgenSec. It has since been taken down.

However, the database – intended for marketing use – had been openly online for more than 10 months, and was accessed at least once by an unknown party. The data included phone numbers, addresses and emails – but no financial details – and, more alarmingly, IP addresses, date of birth, and whether the person had requested to block or unblock adult websites. That suggests a list of Virgin customers who requested to view pornography could exist. Virgin Media has apologised for the incident, saying that "protecting our customers' data is a top priority".

The data leak came as Virgin Media and Sky both blamed large outages in the southeast UK on a break in fibre connections. This annoyance was exacerbated by scammers using the outage as an opportunity to steal payment details from confused customers, setting up a dodgy Twitter account claiming to be the official

customer-service contact point.

The fake @virgsmedia account, since suspended, asked customers to reply via direct message with login details and payment cards to confirm their identity for security purposes. Virgin Media said it would never ask for such information via email, so it's best not to share it via Twitter, either.

How will it affect you?

The leaked data pertained to Virgin Media customers and some Virgin Mobile account holders. The company has emailed anyone affected by the leak and reported itself for investigation to the UK's data watchdog, the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO).

After the data leak was reported, the database was immediately taken offline, the company said. It's unclear if anyone managed to download the data set.

Such information can be used in spam

and phishing scams, and Virgin Media has warned its customers not to click links in emails, but to go directly to Virgin Media's website to log in, and not to give any personal details to callers claiming to be from the company without any verification.

That advice holds true whether you were affected by Virgin's data leak or not. We all get overwhelmed by email in our inboxes and don't take the time to assess each message, but it's generally best practice to log into a site directly via a browser, rather than

following a link in an email, in case you've been sent a well-crafted phishing message that will try to steal your password or other key data. Taking the time for that extra step will increase your online security.

What do we think?

Wrongly configuring the settings on a database may be an honest mistake but it's not a good look for Virgin Media's security checks and operational processes that such a tranche of data was allowed to be left online for so long.

Such breaches are becoming more common as companies move to the cloud, not realising they've left a pile of data open for anyone to see, but these mistakes can't keep happening, especially not to corporate giants like Virgin Media who have ample means to hire staff to check such systems, and hundreds of thousands of customers who could be impacted when something goes wrong. Hopefully the ICO's action, if it takes any, will reflect both the foolishness of Virgin Media's mistake as well as the huge number of people potentially impacted.

It's particularly alarming that such data includes parental control settings, because that information could be used for blackmail and other harassment. Why that data was in a marketing database in the first place is confusing, and a question that the ICO will hopefully ask.

Twitter tests disappearing tweets

What happened?

Post something on Twitter, and - unless you specifically delete the message - it remains there forever. That can be intimidating for some, and means that something intended to be ephemeral sticks around to embarrass you later, as plenty of celebrities and politicians have discovered.

One solution now being tested by Twitter is an idea called "fleets". Such messages delete automatically after 24 hours, and can't be liked, retweeted or replied to. If someone wants to reply, they have to send a direct message. The "fleets" are different from other

messages in another way, too: they don't appear in timelines, but are only shown if someone taps your profile picture a feature similar to Instagram Stories.

The aim, says developer Kayvon Beykpour, is to help people share "the fleeting thoughts that they would have been unlikely to tweet".

How will it affect you?

So far, the feature has only been trialled in Brazil. If that test is deemed successful, it could be rolled out more widely, but it's a safe bet that Twitter will be wary of making "fleets" a permanent,



global tool, given that it would constitute a major change to the site.

As with Instagram Stories, fleets will be a sub-section to Twitter, so if you don't like the idea, they'll be easy to ignore. Indeed, to see the messages, you'll have to actively tap on someone's

profile picture rather than idly scroll through your feed.

What do we think?

Given the criticism levelled at Twitter for enabling abusive behaviour and failing to tackle trolls, racism

and other concerns, "fleets" seem like a bit of a distraction and they won't make the rest of Twitter a nicer place to be. In fact, they seem more of a benefit to the company - a scheme to keep users on the social network, away from rivals like Instagram.

Unfixable Intel flaw could break encryption

What happened?

Another flaw has been spotted in Intel processors with security researchers at Positive Technologies warning that it could be used to break key security technologies, including encryption, DRM and hardware authentication. The vulnerability is particularly dangerous because it's in a system that secures the firmware of a chip - in theory, leaving the security system at risk when it's booting up. That's a problem because such firmware is hardcoded into the system and can't be easily changed, so there's no update that will be able to fix this flaw.

Intel confirmed the flaw, but said it would be

difficult to take advantage of it, meaning most users should be safe from being targeted.

It's not the first processor flaw that security researchers have spotted in Intel products, coming after the Meltdown and Spectre vulnerabilities discovered in 2018, which have both since been patched.

How will it affect you?

This vulnerability affects Intel chips from the last five years, but not the most recent 10th-generation processors. There's no way to patch this particular flaw and, if hackers did manage to exploit the vulnerability, their malware would not be spotted by antivirus software and could interfere with encryption and other security systems.

That said, hackers wanting to exploit the flaw would require physical access to your computer, so most of us need not worry. Intel has issued mitigation guidance, which mostly consists of keeping systems up to date.

What do we think?

Such flaws are a sober reminder that there's no such thing as perfect security only 'good enough' security. Ironically, the system in question was

designed by Intel to make the entire processor more secure. Thankfully, it's been fixed in more recent chips and is difficult to exploit anyway. On the upside, the incident highlights the lengths that companies - and security researchers - go to in order to keep our computers safe.



A billion Android phones could be hacked

What happened?

Over a billion Android phones are at risk of hacking, according to *Which*. People using pre-2012 phones or Android 6.0 and below are most at risk, due to the lack of security updates.

The watchdog tested five older smartphone models - Samsung Galaxy A5, Samsung Galaxy S6, LG Google Nexus 5, Sony Xperia 72 and Motorola X - working with antivirus company AV Comparatives to intentionally infect them with malware. The attempt was successful every time. In some cases, phones were loaded with multiple viruses that hackers could use to access the phones, leaving users vulnerable to data theft and ransom demands.

Kate Bevan, Which Computing editor, said: "It's concerning that expensive Android devices have such a short shelf life before they lose security support. Google and phone manufacturers need to be upfront about security updates, with clear information about how long they will last and what customers should do when they run out."

The consumer group also said it was unimpressed by Google's failure "to provide reassurance that it has plans in place to help users whose devices were no longer supported".

Which wants tech firms to tell customers precisely how long they can expect security updates, and offer



support once they stop. Bevan also stated that "the government must also push ahead with planned legislation to ensure manufacturers are far more transparent about security updates for smart devices, and their impact on consumers."

How will it affect you?

You're most at risk if you use an old smartphone because vulnerabilities exist on all Android operating systems below version 7.0 - and Google believes that around 42% of Android users still use version 6.0 and below.

To check which Android version you're using, go to Settings, System, 'About phone' and scroll down to 'Android

version'. In the System menu, under Advanced, check 'System updates' to ensure you're on the latest version. If it's not possible to update your phone, you may want to buy a newer phone that accepts the latest security patches.

What do we think?

Tech security is paramount, so while a buying a new phone means parting with money, it pales in comparison to what it could cost if your phone gets hacked. However, we agree with *Which* that companies such as Google must make it clear how long a phone will receive updates. If in doubt, opt for an Android One device, which is guaranteed security updates for at least two years.

Around the back, you'll find a HDMI

Freesat 4K TV Box bit.ly/freesat497

'A little box with big features' is how Freesat describes its new 4K TV Box, a device designed to let you watch more than 180 TV channels in high quality.

For those not in the know, Freesat is the satellite equivalent of Freeview, and an alternative to Sky TV. Once you've paid to install a set-top box and plugged it into your satellite dish, there are no further costs. You get all the standard channels, including BBC and ITV, Sky News, Sony Movies, Film 4 and internet-based services such as iPlayer, Netflix and YouTube (for the full list, head to bit.ly/freesatchannel497).

After years in the wilderness,

the service is launching a comeback with a new range of set-top box boxes: the non-recording model is the first available, followed by ones with 500GB, 1TB and 2TB of internal storage.

The design of the TV Box isn't much to look at – a grey rectangle with rounded edges, featuring a matte finish, and a single button on the front – but that's as it should be. At 180 x 40mm, it's discreet enough to nestle beneath your television without drawing attention to itself, though the recordable versions are a fraction larger.

choose not to use the built-in Wi-Fi.

The device's chunky remote control feels comfortable to hold and has a sensible layout that includes four quick-action keys for the most popular channels. Navigating the on-screen electronic programme guide is effortless.

However, there's just one problem with the so-called 4K TV Box: while it

supports 4K on supported catch-up services, 4K broadcasts aren't yet available. And that might put a few folk off the whole idea.

Freesat's set-top box is available now, with prices starting at £125, up to £270.

Is Spotify launching a voice assistant?

If Twitter rumours are to be believed, Spotify is working on a voice assistant for its phone and computer apps.

In a recent tweet, the wellrespected reverse-engineer and all-round tech-head Jane Manchun Wong tweeted a screenshot apparently revealing a new Spotify feature (bit.ly/ spotifyvoice497). The option, under Voice Settings, is called "Hey Spotify" and enabling it lets the music streaming service listen for the 'Hey Spotify' wake word when the app is open.

Little is known about exactly what voice commands could become available, but we'd expect it to feature playback controls similar to those offered by Amazon Alexa and Google Assistant, both of which already perform this function.

Insiders believe that the voice assistant could be tied to the in-car device Spotify unveiled early last year. Nicknamed 'Car Thing', this has yet to be made available to all but a selected group of subscribers in the US, but given that there's little reason to use Spotify's own voice controls on your phone, this theory makes sense.

So far, there's no word on when you'll be able to say 'Hey Spotify' and actually get a response. But, if Wong is right, the company has already secreted the feature deep inside its software.

It makes sense for Spotify to include its own voice assistant, but we wonder how widely used it would be, given that modern smartphones already include an assistant capable of controlling music via the platform. Even Apple recently updated Siri to perform Spotify commands. For those on a computer or in a car, however, this could prove a handy way to listen to selected tracks and albums without even touching the mouse or dash controls.



Tesco Clubcard holders hit by fraud

Tesco has warned more than 600,000 of its Clubcard users that their accounts



may have been subject to 'fraudulent activity'. The supermarket said that combinations of usernames and passwords may have been stolen from other websites, then tried on Tesco sites, and that these may have worked in some cases. However, it added that no financial data was accessed and that its own systems had not been hacked.

Tesco has issued new Clubcards to all affected customers and asked them to reset their passwords. It also said that any points and vouchers accumulated by them will be transferred to their new accounts.

"We are aware of some fraudulent activity around the redemption of a

small proportion of our customers' Clubcard vouchers," said a Tesco spokesperson. "We have strict security measures in place and our priority is protecting our customers. Our internal systems picked this up quickly and we immediately took steps to protect our customers and restrict access to their accounts. We are sorry for any inconvenience this may cause." bit.ly/tesco497

Railway Wi-Fi provider exposed users' data

Railway station Wi-Fi provider C3UK exposed the personal data of around 10,000 people who signed up for its free service at major commuter hotspots including Chelmsford, Colchester, Norwich and London Bridge.

The company's database was not password-protected, despite containing 146 million records, including contact information and dates of birth. Security researcher Jeremiah Fowler discovered



the unsecured database, which reportedly contained information as specific as the software being used by devices connected to the Wi-Fi.

"Many of the records I saw contained customer email addresses, age range, device data, IP and reason for travel," Fowler wrote in a blog post. He warned that some of the available information, such as "IP addresses, ports, pathways, build and version, and storage information" could be used by hackers to "access deeper into the network".

C3UK said the exposed data had not been stolen or accessed by any other party, and had now been secured. bit.ly/c3uk497

The news that Amazon keeps records of every movement detected by its Ring doorbells doesn't surprise me. Home

assistants and other smart devices have the power to monitor aspects of our everyday lives. This gives companies access to lots of data, which is valuable even if that data is anonymised.

Smart devices can be a serious threat to people's privacy - consumers are handing valuable information over freely and often without realising it. In today's digital era, that data could be used by companies directly or shared with third parties, or stolen and misused by cybercriminals. It's therefore vital that companies selling such products are open and explicit about the data they

collect, and how they will use it.

Manufacturers eagerly put 'smart' devices on the market without ensuring that these products have sufficient security measures in place to protect their users. Many of these devices have become such an established part of our everyday lives that we rely on them without thinking beyond the benefits they provide. However, in today's evolving technology landscape - and with the

growing threat from cybercriminals - this way of thinking must change.

People should carefully consider the implications before buying smart devices. If they do purchase these products, they should always ensure that updates are available, create hard-to-guess passwords for the device and disable any feature they do not intend to use, or which causes them any privacy concerns.

We test and compare the latest products

Internet security suites

Security suites group all your security requirements into a single interface, making it much easier to keep your PCs safe online

ree security tools are perfectly adequate if you don't mind configuring and monitoring them yourself, and even Windows' built-in security software now does a decent job of keeping your PC free from malware. With a solid backup regime and a few key programs to protect and clean your computer, you're as safe on the internet as ever.

However, the level of maintenance involved isn't to everyone's liking and many people prefer an all-encompassing security package to manage all their security requirements in one place. For this, you need an internet security suite.

HOW WE TESTED

Our test results draw on the work of two of the most respected antivirustesting organisations in the world: AV-Comparatives (www.av-comparatives .org) and AV-Test (www .av-test.org). Both carry out extensive independent testing of security products and publish regular reports of protection scores, false positives and performance ratings.

Bitdefender offers one of the most effective security suites around. Its AV-Test results achieved a perfect 100% score for malware protection and it dropped only a few marks in the AV-Comparatives' tests. While this doesn't quite match Norton 360's flawless record, Bitdefender did better than Norton in the false-positive tests. The suite is nimble, too, with a creditable 94% rating for system performance.

Bitdefender's suite has loads of options to play around with. The customisable dashboard provides access to a selection of core features, and the Protection and Privacy panes offer plenty more to explore. For example, the Protection pane includes options for launching and configuring various types of scan, as well as settings for web-based and behavioural protection. It's also where you'll find the firewall, which runs quietly in the background, though you can also set up your own rules and definitions. There's also a Vulnerability Scan tool that warns you about missing updates (for Windows and other software), and highlights weak passwords and insecure networks.

Bitdefender provides two modules to help fight ransomware: Safe Files blocks untrusted apps from writing to selected folders, while Ransomware Remediation automatically makes



temporary backups of vulnerable files.

We were also impressed with the Rescue Environment, which avoids fiddly setup on a DVD or USB stick and instead reserves a section of your hard drive. This means you can't lose it and, when you find yourself worried about your security, allows you to reboot your system to launch a scan safely within seconds.

We found the parental controls to be the best in the group. Once you've added the software to your children's devices, you can monitor and approve apps and websites, and enforce screen-time limits. The Android app lets you keep an eye on their contacts and track their location, too.

VERDICT

This is a superb security suite that's extremely effective and comes loaded with tools and features. However, it's also lightweight and easy to use. The price is very reasonable for new users but it's worth noting that you'll be put on a recurring contract, so be sure to switch this off and check that the price is as good when the renewal date comes around the following year. If it isn't, shop around for a better option. The other suites in this round-up have their own strengths but, as a one-stop all-rounder, Bitdefender can't be beaten.

Norton's 360 suite is the only one here to include cloud backup, though this is aimed at essential files only, with a limited amount of storage – between 10GB and 75GB, depending on the number of devices you install it on.



The suite also comes with a

VPN (though this was disappointing compared to standalone alternatives) and parental controls. Most of the other features are hidden away in a confusing interface – the firewall, for example, is buried in the software's settings.

Norton achieved a 100% success rate at blocking malware in the tests by both AV-Test and AV-Comparatives. You can't argue with that: it's a brilliant result that none of the other tools managed. It wasn't quite so good at avoiding false positives, however, and got caught out by blocking seven safe programs across the two testing companies.

VERDICT



Norton's excellent protection rating is its best asset but it also offers a couple of attractive extras, including VPN and cloud backup. These aren't as good as standalone tools but they are handy to have in the mix of your security suite.



Kaspersky caught all the malware thrown at it by AV-Test, but didn't fare quite so well with AV-Comparatives, where it blocked 99.6% of threats. That's still impressive but it's the worst score of the four products reviewed here.

Where Kaspersky excelled



was in avoiding false positives, achieving a clean sheet in tests from both organisations.

The suite includes plenty of extras, such as the Safe Money browser, which you can use any time, not just when you're banking and buying; and the Network Monitor – a firewall that lets you control everything that accesses the internet. Trusted Applications mode only allows you to run programs vetted and approved by Kaspersky, while the suite's cleaning and maintenance tools get into your PC's nooks and crannies to clean non-standard settings and out-of-date applications.

VERDICT



Despite its many tools and features, Kaspersky's performance rating of 96.8% makes it the least draining of PC resources of the suites we tested. Shop around, though, because it's available from retailers for far less than Kaspersky charges.



Having parted ways with its former owner, Intel, McAfee has fixed its damaged reputation and now offers vastly improved protection at a very competitive price.

Ironically, the version named Total Protection doesn't have as many




features as its rivals – you get parental control but no backup or VPN options. However, the real meat of this product is in its virus scanner, Web Advisor browser extension (for Chrome and Firefox) and automatic software updater. These tools helped McAfee stop 99.4% of the malware in the tests but while Kaspersky fared worse in the AV-Comparatives test, Total Protection came last place in AV-Test's. It also recorded six false positives with AV-Comparatives, but scored a clean sheet with AV-Test. On the other hand, it did well in the performance tests, with only Kaspersky having a lesser impact on the test PC's operating system.


VERDICT



McAfee Total Protection isn't the most hawk-eyed security suite around and it's comparatively light on features. However, it's much better than it used to be, is very affordable and lightweight, and you can install it on twice as many devices.



OUR VERDICT

We gave our Gold Award to Bitdefender Internet Security 2020 because it performed well, and is brimming with useful features and protection options. All this comes at a very affordable price, though it's still worth shopping around when it comes to renewal time.

If you don't mind paying a little more, you might consider plumping for Norton 360 Deluxe instead. Its protection was excellent, earning it our Silver Award, and it comes with handy extras in the form of online backup and a VPN.

Our Bronze Award winner is Kaspersky, which offered the lightest tool with the least impact on the day-to-day running of the PC it's installed on. Its protection isn't quite up to Bitdefender and Norton standards in the most recent tests, but it was better at avoiding false positives.





The program has a retro-style interface that's supposed to remind you of the days when the web was in its infancy and people had personal websites, rather than Facebook and Twitter accounts. You can sort content into tabs, and set the importance - Realtime, Frequent, Occasional, Sometime


or Rarely - depending on how interested you are in something. Each addition gets a couple of lines on the main page and you can expand this to see a person or site's recent updates. Unlike Facebook, which chooses what you do and don't see, Fraidycat puts you in complete control.

Fraidycat launched last year but it has just received a major update that makes it much more useful. And no, we're not entirely sure about the signicance of its name, either, except that it lets you "follow from afar"!



Add a proper menu bar to your browser

Many browser developers hide the menu bar to streamline your browsing experience and provide more screen space, but now you can bring it back using Proper Menubar (bit.ly/proper497) and get instant access to options such as File, Edit, Bookmarks and more.

By default, this excellent extension adds a highly customisable menu bar to the top or bottom of the browser window. It's quicker than navigating

your way through the clutter of options under the usual menu button, which often demands some hit-and-miss guesswork. Head into the settings and you can add some colour, manage websites and switch between the classic menu bar or one that displays links to Google services.



When you click the extension's toolbar button, you might also note a few handy shortcuts to set links to YouTube, your inbox and social-media sites. It's a nice touch, proving that Proper Menubar is more than just a straight recreation of a bygone tool.

Control YouTube and Netflix with your voice

Voice Control for Video (bit.ly/voice497) lets you control YouTube and Netflix using a set of voice commands. With



your video open, click the extension's toolbar button and choose Start Recording to activate voice controls. You have four options: play, pause, skip and rewind. Once you're done binge-watching your favourite

shows, click the button again and select Stop Recording.

It's a handy tool for viewing without scrambling for your mouse – or, as the developer suggests: "Why get your keyboard and mouse dirty while you eat and watch videos?". Bear in mind that the add-on uses your computer's built-in microphone, so it's not as sensitive as a smart speaker, which means you may have to raise your voice to make it work.

Translate Japanese Manga comics into English

Anity (bit.ly/anity497) translates original Manga text into English - the



comic-book equivalent of watching anime dubs with the subtitles on. With your comic open, click the extension's toolbar button and select Translate. Depending on the size of the comic, this can take a while, but more impatient readers can instead tab single pages out individually to get a quicker translation.

Once the process is complete, speech bubbles will be highlighted blue, and clicking these opens a pop-up translation. Unfortunately, this takes up the whole screen, which rather breaks the flow.

If you have digital comics saved to your computer, you can also load these into the tool for translation. And Anity also lets users submit their own translations, so watch out for spelling mistakes and dodgy interpretations on some of the niche titles.

Alter websites for a joke

If nothing gives you the giggles more than inspecting a web page's source, making changes and passing the result off as the real deal, you'll get a kick out of HTML Prank (bit.ly/prank497). You simply click its button and choose to Start Prank.

Once it's running, HTML Prank lets you highlight and replace text on the page, and remove any element by clicking Delete. Prankster power users could also try copying and pasting images to the page, for added 'authenticity'.

It's a limited tool and eventually the 'Boris abducted by alien'-type headlines will start to wear thin. But it does its one trick very well, and has a handful of uses beyond basic HTML gags. Just don't forget to click Stop Prank once you've finished fooling around.







FIREFOX

Save web pages as single files

Firefox has an option to save the current page as an HTML file but web content these days is so complex that it's unlikely to retain the same formatting and appearance - in fact, the file will look a bit of a mess. SingleFile (bit.ly/single497) solves this problem by letting you save a complete copy of a web page to your hard drive, including CSS stylesheets, images, fonts, frames



and other elements. This allows you to browse the content offline, copy it to another device and share it with other people.

The add-on couldn't be easier to use – just click its toolbar button to download the page. It offers some useful extra options, which you can access by rightclicking, such as annotating the content before you save it, and saving all or selected tabs. You can also save pages using the keyboard shortcut Ctrl+Shift+Y.

Learn to play piano

If you fancy becoming adept at tinkling the ivories but aren't ready to splash out on a Steinway, Piano Prime (bit .ly/piano497) helps you learn your way around a keyboard. Install the add-on and click its toolbar button to bring the piano to your screen. The




software supports both mouse - which, admittedly, is slow and best suited to beginners - and keyboard, where a grid above the piano maps the layout and corresponding notes.

Using the arrow buttons, Piano Prime lets you select which keys are shown on screen, and even record what you play. For a more professional sound, head into the settings (click the square above the keys) and turn on 'Sustain control' to make each note ring out longer, as it would on a proper piano.

Hide online distractions

Hide Feed (bit.ly/hide497) is a neat tool for stripping out distractions from popular websites. What sets the tool apart from countless other productivity add-ons is that it's customisable, so there's no blanket ban on distractions. Instead, pop into Hide Feed's



After the trial, the free version of the tool lets you hide distractions on one site. If you don't fancy stumping up \$5 a month, just remember to switch between individual sites (or just block the one that distracts you the most).

Write on web pages Back in Issue 482 (bit.ly/webuser482),

we looked at the excellent Liner - a highlighter for Chrome that lets you 'write' on web pages. You can install it in Edge from the Chrome Web Store, but the developers have now created a version specifically for Microsoft's browser (bit.ly/ liner497). Double-click text on a page to display the Liner icon and instantly highlight the content. A second click on the highlighted word brings up further options, from changing the colour and adding comments to sharing your highlights. Sign up for a free account to save these to your Liner folder.



Once upon a time, only successful businesses could afford to use video as a promotional tool. These days, however, the format has been democratised since most of us carry a high-quality HD (or even 4K) video camera in our pockets. This makes it easy for small businesses and individuals to get great shots to promote themselves - or just show off on social media.



However, filming the footage is one thing - making it look like a proper piece of promotion is another skill altogether. That's why video-streaming service Vimeo has released this new app. Vimeo Create is fresh out of beta and it allows users to make professional-looking promo clips, either by starting with some of Vimeo's pre-built templates or by building one from scratch using your own footage.

Creating videos is a simple, step-by-step process - just select your clips, add a cool-looking style, then layer on some music and let the tool's smart video creator do the

rest. The results can be pretty attention-grabbing, and you can tweak any elements that aren't quite to your liking.

The app is completely free to download and use but, if you're not already signed up to one of Vimeo's paid-for subscription services, you'll need to upgrade your membership to save and publish your clips to Vimeo's streaming platform. Vimeo Pro costs £16 per month, though one way to get around this is to use the 30-day free trial you get when you first sign up. It's also worth noting that some features, including adding logos and branding to your

clips, require

Windows 10X

Microsoft has created a new, streamlined version of Windows for modern devices, but you can't try it just yet. David Crookes explains

What is it?

Microsoft has unveiled a new version of its Windows 10 operating system, which has been designed to run specifically on dual-screen laptops and folding PCs. The tech giant has noticed how popular these devices have become among manufacturers, and concluded that a streamlined OS tailored to make best use of their assets will make the perfect fit.

How does it differ from Windows 10?


For starters, this isn't simply about making a few tweaks here and there to an existing operating system. Instead, Windows 10X - which is based on the simplified Windows Core OS - is entirely geared towards getting apps to work well across two screens. This has meant introducing fresh features more in keeping with modern computing, so watch out for an interface redesign and some neat under-the-hood activity.

Will it look different, then?

Yes, and you'll notice the difference right from the start. When you set up Windows 10X, you'll be presented with a new user interface that not only introduces colourful animations but removes Cortana as a primary method of getting up and running. It simply lets you read and swipe your way through. But the changes don't stop there. You'll find that the entire shell has been rebuilt and that System Tray applets, File Explorer add-ins and desktop icons have

all been banished, along with Live Tiles. It all adds up to a much cleaner look.

But is the Start menu still there?

Yes, although that too has been redesigned and it looks set to be renamed the Launcher. When you activate it, you'll see a search bar at the top of a new menu that lets you look for files on a Windows 10X device, as well as scour the web. Immediately below, there are a series of icons showing your installed apps and favourite websites. All the icons can be rearranged to place your most-used ones to hand or organise

them into folders. Any recent and recommended items are listed, too.

So it makes Windows easier to use?

That's certainly the idea. Users can swipe up to show a minimised taskbar, for instance, and see any apps that are pinned or running, making it easier to switch between them. When selecting an app, it will open on the screen in which it was activated, yet it can also be spread across two screens with a quick finger gesture. If you need to make tweaks to how the system works, you can go straight to a new-look Action Centre where you'll find useful functions such as Bluetooth and network settings, volume controls and location permissions. Here, you'll find notifications in their own dialogue boxes, as well.

Are there specific dual-screen functions?

Yes, that's what this is all about. So as well as offering a gesture to spread an app across dual-screens (something that cleverly ensures the app can make good use of the two displays), it will adapt to any potential configuration of a

compatible device. For example, a user may want to use the device as a laptop, a book or a tablet, or work with screens that are double-portrait or doublelandscape, have a dual view or place different apps on different screens. Whichever way a user is planning to use their device, Windows 10X provides that flexibility.

Are these devices going to be touchscreen-only?


No. Although Windows 10X will use a virtual keyboard and trackpad (and can recognise a stylus), the operating system will be capable of adapting if a Bluetooth keyboard is placed over part of one of the displays. In this situation, the second screen will use the remaining bit of screen to display a so-called WonderBar. This can be used to show menus, a touchbar, emoji, mini versions of apps and a section that can be used as a trackpad. We're sure other uses for the WonderBar will be devised over time.

So how does it operate under the hood?

Unlike Windows 10, Windows 10X will better protect its system files by separating the OS from the drivers and applications it runs. Apps will only be able to read the operating system - there will be no write-access and, therefore, no way for them to make changes, which makes for a safer environment that's less prone to viruses and other malware. It also banishes any need to clean the Registry, stops startup apps from slowing your PC and should ensure the OS doesn't become bloated over time.

How does that work?

The new OS will run apps in containers, allowing them to share Windows 10X's resources while remaining separate, as if in a virtual machine. There will be three types: one will run Universal Windows Platform (UWP) apps and these will be the most efficient, thanks to low system overheads and a reduced burden on battery life; another will be reserved for apps packaged in the MSIX format; while the third allows traditional Win32

desktop apps to be run - effectively making them operate within a virtual OS. This allows users to install apps that have not been obtained from the Microsoft Store, as well as those designed to be run in a web browser. Win32 apps can access the mouse, keyboard, pen, touch, networking, printing, audio, media and DirectX graphics, and Microsoft says all traditional software will run in the exact same way as it does on Windows 10 Home or Professional.

Can Windows 10X still be updated?

Of course. Just because the apps are separate doesn't mean Microsoft won't be able to release updates. The tech giant has already said that OS updates could be downloaded in the background and made available on reboot in a process that mimics that of Android and Chrome OS. But a Windows 10X

So when will it be available?

Windows 10X is relying on the launch of compatible devices, but Microsoft is also keen for developers to play around with the operating system first so that any apps can be tweaked to work well with it. Dual-screen preview Software Development Kits have been made available for this very purpose, but the rollout of the actual devices and Windows 10X is expected this autumn. You can see how it will work by installing the Windows 10X Emulator image in

Microsoft's Emulator app (bit.ly/

emulator497)

Can I upgrade my existing device?

No. Windows 10X is not intended as an upgrade for Windows 10 users. It will only run on specific models, including the Surface Neo, as well as Microsoft Surface and new devices from companies such as Asus, Dell, HP and Lenovo. All will be powered by Intel.

MEET THE NEW SURFACE NEO

As well as announcing Windows 10X, Microsoft has showcased a device that is set to make good use of it: the dualscreen Surface Neo laptop. Essentially two 9in tablets connected with a hinge, it packs a new Intel Lakefield hybrid CPU - a processor that uses



Foveros 3D packaging technology to create an efficient chip that, in this case, is just 12 x 12 x 1mm in size.

It's certainly set to be a flexible product and a light one at that, weighing just 655g. The hinge means the Surface Neo could be used like a traditional laptop, put in tent mode or be flipped back on itself, with the operating system fluidly adapting for more seamless computing. There will also be a small magnetic keyboard that can be placed on the lower screen, leaving space for 10X's WonderBar, as well as a stylus that can attach magnetically when it's not

Unlock the secrets of your Wi-Fi

Are you tired of slow, weak and unreliable Wi-Fi? Wayne Williams rounds up the best free tools that can make your wireless connection faster, wider-reaching and more secure

Test the speed of your connection

There are a number of apps you can use to check your connection speed, the best known being Ookla Speedtest, which is available for iOS and Android (www

.speedtest.net/apps).

It can measure the speed of your

broadband, mobile or Wi-Fi connection; show your upload and download speeds, and ping rate; and test jitter and packet loss. You can select a testing server for anywhere in the world and compare past results. There's also an Ookla app available for Apple TV that you can use to test your connection.

Netflix offers an online speed-checking tool called Fast (fast.com), which works by performing a series of downloads and uploads from and to Netflix's servers, but you don't need to be a Netflix subscriber to use it. There are also free apps available for Android



(bit.ly/fast497) and iOS (bit.ly/fastios497).

Another useful tool is OpenSignal (www .opensignal .com/apps) -

OpenSignal compares your download and upload speeds with your neighbours


a free app that sets out to measure your online 'experience'. Run its speed test to check download, upload and ping speeds – not only for Wi-Fi but also for mobile data (3G, 4G and 5G). Once the test has completed, you're asked whether you ran the test indoors or outdoors.

OpenSignal also offers a video-speed test that measures loading, buffering and playback in either SD or HD resolution (chosen at random). Furthermore, the app can check network availability and data usage, and display network stats and average speeds recorded by other users in your area. It's available for both iOS and Android.

Finally, if you have a mesh wireless network such as Google Wifi, you can use its router app to measure your connection and performance across your home to make sure all the Wi-Fi points are functioning as intended.

Locate blackspots using a heat map

Wi-Fi can get blocked or degraded by all kinds of objects around your home, including walls, furniture, mirrors and


other electrical devices (such as microwave ovens). Placing your router away from solid objects, higher up and in a central location can all help, but there's still a chance you'll have dead zones around your home where the signal is patchy and unreliable.

The best way to solve this problem is to detect the weak areas using an app such as Wifi Analyser & Heatmap (bit.ly/heatmap497). This free, ad-supported app provides useful information about available wireless signals, identifies the best Wi-Fi channels and displays the signal strength over time. It can also create a heat map of your location. Find out how to do this in our Mini Workshop, opposite.

Detect intruders on your network

Provided you've secured your network with the latest and strongest encryption, you should be protected from anyone leeching off your signal, but it doesn't hurt to make sure – you might, for instance, have granted a friend or neighbour access to your network in the past and forgot about it. You can usually see who is connected to your network via your router, but another option is to use an app called Fing (www.fing.com),

Unlock Wi-Fi secrets which is available for both iOS and Android. Fing can detect intruders, Wi-Fi thieves and potential hackers,



You can filter the list of networks in a number of ways.

Recover forgotten Wi-Fi passwords

The first step to keeping your wireless network safe from intruders is to change your router's default password (it's often printed somewhere on the unit) to one that's long and impossible to guess. While that's great for security, it's a pain if you forget or mislay your password, and although your devices can store these logins for you, finding them isn't always easy.



NetSpot for Android (bit.ly/nspot497) isn't as powerful as its PC counterpart, but it's still a useful tool for analysing nearby wireless networks. The Discover column lists all the networks by name and provides information on their speed, band and channel - the latter is useful for making sure your Wi-Fi

isn't clashing with your neighbours'.

There are additional panels that show a timeline of the signals, along with detailed information about the channels.




MINI WORKSHOP | Map your home's Wi-Fi signal using Wifi Analyser

to access the information. It doesn't require installation – just run the software and it will list all your stored network names and passwords. There are 32- and 64-bit versions.

It's more difficult - but not impossible - to dig out this information from a mobile device. If you have an Android phone running Android 10 and up, open Settings, go to Network & internet, then Wi-Fi and explore the 'Saved networks' list. If you have an older version of Android, you will need to root your device and use an app such as WiFi Key Recovery (bit.ly/keyr497).

Share your Wi-Fi via a QR code

When a house guest asks for access to your Wi-Fi, you probably end up scribbling the password down on a piece of paper or reading it off the router as they type it in. A more convenient method is to use a QR code, and the process for this varies depending on your phone and operating system.

On iOS (12 or later), you can use the Shortcuts app which comes installed by default. The process is a little convoluted because although you can load the necessary shortcut from bit.ly/scut497, iOS's security settings won't allow it, so you'll first need to run any shortcut (it doesn't matter which), then go to Settings, Shortcuts and flick the toggle next to Allow Untrusted Shortcuts. You then need to add the requested details (the password itself) to the shortcut.

Android owners running Android 10 can share their Wi-Fi directly through the operating system. Go to Settings, 'Network & internet' and select your Wi-Fi network's name. Tap the cog to the right of your network and, in the 'Network details' window, tap the blue Share button. Verify your identity and a QR code will be generated. On older versions of Android, install QR Code Generator (bit.ly/qrcode497), tap the Text button and choose WiFi from the mode menu.




QiFi generates a QR code that lets you share your Wi-Fi with others

Another option is to use the online tool QiFi (qifi.org). Enter your network's SSID, encryption type and the key, then click Generate to get your code. No data is uploaded, so your details are perfectly safe.

Find the fastest nearby hotspots

As you gad about town, you'll find a bewildering number of Wi-Fi hotspots to connect to, but it's not obvious which ones are fast and safe. The communitypowered Wi-Fi Map for Android and iOS (www.wifimap.io) offers over 100 million Wi-Fi points to choose from across the globe, plotted on a map, with passwords for secured networks. The Android app has quite a few negative reviews but we've found it works fine. Like many 'free' apps, there are annoying ads to contend with, but you can pay to remove these. There's also a paid-for Pro version with extra features, but it's massively overpriced at £28.49.

WeFi (www.wefi.com/wefi-app) is



a similar community-driven tool for finding and verifying hotspots. It searches for any wireless connections in range and provides you

Finally, you may already unwittingly have an app installed on your phone that can help you find nearby hotspots. Facebook's mobile app has a secret feature called Find Wi-Fi, which can identify free and public hotspots wherever you are. To access the feature – available for iOS and Android – open the Facebook app and tap the three-line More menu, then scroll down to Find Wi-Fi. If you can't see it, you will need to expand the See More section.

One drawback to be aware of, however, is that using the feature requires you to enable location history, which allows the social network to build up a history of places you've been to. Facebook explains that this is "used to help you explore what's around you, improve your Facebook experience and get more relevant ads". But if you're already concerned about what Facebook knows about you, and you don't want more relevant ads, you may prefer to use a different service.

EXPOSE HIDDEN WI-FI CAMERAS

There have been several worrying stories in the press about hidden, Wi-Fi-connected cameras discovered in Airbnb properties that spy on and share footage of guests. The Atlantic covered this in a fascinating article last year (bit.ly/aircam497). Although Airbnb says it is cracking down on the problem, you should be wary when renting a property, and also look out for cameras in hotels, public toilets and changing rooms.

There are mobile apps available that can detect hidden Wi-Fi cameras, although some free versions have limitations and their reviews on the app stores are often a mixed bag. For Android phones, Detectify (bit.ly/detect497) is a good choice. It claims to be able to detect microphones, listening devices and spy bugs, as well as cameras. Hidden Camera Detector for iOS (bit.ly/hcdetect497) can detect pinhole spy cameras and is very easy to use, but some users say it fails to find nearby devices.



Protect Your Data



Don't be the biggest threat to your online privacy. Robert Irvine explains how to secure your accounts, remove personal info and change secret settings to take back control of your data

t's tempting to view online privacy as an unwinnable war between us (the web users) and them (the tech giants, hackers and other snoops). They want our personal data, we don't want to give it to them and round and round we go. But just as a soldier marching unarmed into battle sporting a Hi-Vis uniform wouldn't be held blameless for the

consequences, we are often guilty of leaving ourselves open to privacy invasion and making a difficult situation worse.

In this feature, we expose the careless practices that can make you your own worst privacy enemy such as forgetting about services you've granted access to your accounts, letting websites store

details of your activities indefinitely and neglecting to change dubious default settings - and explain how to fix them.

To make it easier to properly protect your data, we've organised our advice into three main sections: Disconnect, Delete and Disable. All you need to do in future is to remember those three Ds.



DISCONNECT


One of the biggest threats to your online privacy comes from third-party services you've granted access to your accounts, often without realising. Here's how to expose and kick out these unwanted guests

YOUR GOOGLE ACCOUNT

Many websites and apps let you sign up (and in) using your Google account, which saves you the time and hassle of registering and coming up with a new password. The downside to this convenience is that it also opens a potential backdoor to your personal data. You may not even remember which services you've connected to your account over the years, which puts you at risk if they 'turn rogue' and start abusing that privilege. Most third-party tools only request access to your basic account information, such as your name, email address and profile picture, but it's still worth reviewing who gets to view your data.

Go to your Google account page (myaccount.google.com) and select Security, then scroll down to 'Third-party apps with account access' and click 'Manage account access'. Here, you'll see a list of all the sites and apps that you've linked to your Google account, along with details of the data they can access. Select any entries that concern you and click Remove Access to disconnect them.

Alternatively, use Google's Security Checkup tool (bit.ly/checkup497) to remove apps and sites from your account via the 'Third-party access' drop-down menu.

YOUR FACEBOOK ACCOUNT

Facebook is notoriously cavalier with its users' data, but you don't help matters by granting third-party services access to your account, then forgetting about them. The information they can see may include your name, email address, date

of birth, profile picture and even your friends list and other content shared on your profile.

To protect your privacy on Facebook, click the down arrow in the top-right corner and choose Settings, then 'Apps and websites'. Look down the list of tools shown on the Active tab and click

Remove to get rid of any you don't want. Alternatively, choose 'View and edit' to limit the data they can access.

As we explained in Issue 494, you can now stop Facebook collecting info about you from any websites and apps it interacts with, which it does even when you're *not* using the social network. This is why, for example, you may see a Facebook ad for a product you've been shopping for elsewhere online.

To stop this, go to Settings, 'Your Facebook information', click View next to 'Off-Facebook activity' and choose 'Manage your Facebook activity'. Here, you'll see a long list of sites and apps that share your data with Facebook, which you can click to view further details, including the number of 'interactions' that have have taken place.

To disconnect a third-party tool from your account, select 'Turn off future activity', then Turn Off. To prevent all such sneaky spying, click Manage Future Activity and switch off 'Future off-Facebook activity'. You should also click 'Clear history' to wipe all the data that's already been shared.

DISCONNECT THIRD-PARTY TRACKERS

It's very difficult to avoid being tracked around the web by invisible, third-party sites, so don't blame yourself for failing to duck that privacy threat. Your browser's 'do-not-track' option relies on websites obeying that request, but most simply ignore it, which means your best bet is to install an extension that blocks connections from trackers. Popular ad blockers such as uBlock Origin (bit.ly/ublock497) and AdBlock (getadblock.com) do this by using comprehensive filter lists of known advertising and tracking servers but, for a more nuanced



approach, we prefer Privacy Badger (bit.ly/badger497).

Rather than keep lists of what to block, this tool from the Electronic Frontier Foundation (EFF, eff.org) learns by watching which domains appear to be tracking you as you browse the web, then sending them a do-not-track signal. If they refuse to comply, it blocks them, and also automatically blocks any trackers it's seen on three different sites.

Privacy Badger is less likely to cause page-loading problems and pop-up warnings than traditional ad blockers, while catching trackers that they miss, and gives you more control over which hidden sites can and can't connect.


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Protect your data from yourself



YOUR MICROSOFT OR APPLE ACCOUNT

Like Google, Microsoft lets you quickly sign into online services and apps (and not just the ones it owns) using your account details, which can compromise your privacy if left unchecked. To remedy this, log into your account at account.microsoft.com and click Privacy - you may need to request and enter an email security code to verify your identity. In the 'Other privacy settings' section, click 'Apps and services that can access your data', then select an entry to see which permissions you've given that tool. You may be surprised and even alarmed by the data you're sharing - such as your OneDrive photos and documents, or your Outlook contacts. Click 'Remove these permissions' to plug the privacy hole.

Similarly, you may have used your Apple ID to sign into third-party apps and websites, which you have since forgotten about. You can disconnect them by logging into your Apple ID account in your browser (appleid.apple.com) and going to Security, 'Apps & Websites using Apple ID'. Select Manage and click 'Stop using Apple ID' next to an undesirable entry. Alternatively, on an iPhone or iPad, open the Settings app, tap your name, then Password & Security and choose Apps Using Your Apple ID.

YOUR OTHER ACCOUNTS



even recognise that have access to your data. To check this, click More, 'Settings and privacy' and choose 'Apps and sessions'. Select an entry and click 'Revoke access' to disconnect it from your account.

For Instagram, log into your account in your browser, click the

cog icon in your profile and choose 'Apps and Websites'. Here, you can view any permissions you've granted to third-party tools and revoke their access to your photos, videos and other data.

Although 'Log in with Amazon' buttons are less common than those for Google and Facebook, you may still have saved time at some point by clicking one, which means your name, email address and home address are visible to third parties. To disconnect these websites and apps, sign into the 'Login with Amazon' page (www .amazon.co.uk/ap/adam) and remove them from there. Note that "even if you revoke access, the website or app can still use the information you previously provided", so you'll need to contact the the third-party services directly to unsubscribe from their databases.

YOUR FORGOTTEN ACCOUNTS

You've probably signed up for a lot of sites and services that you no longer



use, which means there's more of your personal data on the web than you realise, including your age, address, phone number and information about your friends, family and interests. For this reason, it's wise to deactivate old accounts to ensure your data doesn't fall into the hands of cybercriminals and snoops.

The easiest way to disconnect yourself from your web past is to visit JustDelete.me (justdelete.me), which provides advice and direct links for closing inactive accounts with hundreds of online services. Helpfully, the entries are colour-coded to show you how straightforward it will be to close an account: green for easy, red for hard and black for impossible. Members of the latter group include Evernote, GoDaddy, Netflix, Pinterest and Steam. There's also a JustDelete.me extension for Chrome (bit.ly/justdelete497) that lets you delete your details from the site you're currently viewing by clicking its toolbar button.

Another useful option is Deseat.me (deseat.me), which tells you all the online accounts you've signed up for using your Gmail or Outlook address, and lets you delete those you no longer use. If deletion isn't possible, Deseat.me will send the site or service a GDPR-compliant removal request. It doesn't store or share any of your data itself, and uses the OAuth security protocol to connect with servers.

The more data websites gather on you, the more they're able to invade your privacy, so it's worth performing regular online housekeeping. Here's how to wipe the slate clean on your favourite sites and services

GOOGLE

Google stores details of everything you've searched for while logged into your account and, although it says "Only you can see this data", anyone who uses your computer can go to myactivity.google.com to see exactly what you've been looking for online, as can Google itself.

To clear a particular day's search history, as well as details of your activity on other Google services including Chrome, Maps and the Play store, click the bin icon next to that day and choose Delete. Alternatively, select 'Delete activity by' in the left-hand menu to wipe the data for a specific time frame.

To stop Google storing your searches in future, click 'Activity controls', and move the slider next to Web & App Activity to Off.




Google now makes it easier to delete your search data manually or automatically

Last year, Google introduced new options that let you clear some of your

personal data automatically. To turn them on, click 'Manage activity' on the 'Activity controls' page, select 'Choose to delete automatically' and decide how long you want Google to keep your data - for three months, 18 months or until you delete it manually.

Also under 'Activity controls', Location History uses your phone or tablet to track and store details of where you've been, even when you aren't using a specific Google service, and displays the data on a timeline and map. Click 'Manage activity', then click the

cog in the bottom-right corner of the map and choose 'Delete all Location History' to clear all data now or 'Automatically delete Location History' to do so in three or 18 months.

FACEBOOK

Facebook stores an alarming amount of information about you, from your phone number, home address and marital status to your friends, interests and places you've been, as well as details of all your activities on the social network - visit your 'Your information' page to review the full horror (bit.ly/ fbinfo497). Unlike Google, it doesn't offer an easy way to wipe all this data, other than deleting your entire Facebook account, and even then your info is stored for up to three months on its servers.



You can delete or hide unwanted Facebook posts using Social Book Post Manager

Help is at hand from a Chrome extension called Social Book Post Manager (bit.ly/socialbook497), which lets you quickly purge your Facebook 'Activity log' of all unwanted posts in one go. Open your 'Activity log', click the add-on's toolbar button, then specify what you want to delete, such as all posts from a particular month or year, or ones that contain a particular word or name. You can run a 'Prescan' to review the results before clicking the 'Confirm to delete' button, and choose Backup to download your data from Facebook before it's wiped. Deleted posts can't be recovered, so you may prefer the less drastic option of hiding content from your timeline instead, or simply 'unliking' posts to withdraw your approval.

AMAZON

Amazon doesn't just remember which products you've purchased from the store, but also everything you've searched for and looked at, and it uses this information to recommend similar items. This can come across as pushy and may even compromise your privacy, if you've been shopping for presents or personal items and Amazon displays 'suggestions' on its homepage or as you


You can't delete your Amazon order history, because the store treats it as a transaction record in the same way as a bank or credit card company. However, you can conceal products you've bought, so other people can't see them, by clicking the Hide Order button by the item. Amazon lets you hide up to 100 orders but, annoyingly, they still show up in search results.

YOUTUBE

Click the History link in YouTube's left-hand menu and you're likely to be surprised by the sheer volume and variety of videos you've watched over the last few weeks, months and years. To wipe the slate clean, both to protect your privacy and to stop YouTube recommending content, either click the 'Clear all watch history' button or delete any embarrassing or incriminating videos individually. You can do the same for videos you've searched for by selecting 'Search history', then 'Clear all search history'.

To prevent YouTube from storing what you watch and search for in future, click 'Pause watch [or search] history'. While you're there, you can also review and delete every comment you've ever posted on YouTube.

To set your YouTube data to delete automatically after three or 18 months, click Manage All Activity, then 'Choose to delete automatically' and select your preferred option.

Netflix keeps a record of everything you've watched (and rated) and when, so it can recommend other shows and films it thinks you'll like. That data is also instantly available to anyone who accesses your account - with or without your permission. You can see this for yourself by hovering over your profile name, selecting Account then scrolling to the bottom and clicking 'Viewing activity', or by going straight to www.netflix.com/viewingactivity.

We found that even after cancelling our Netflix account, our My Activity page was still accessible by searching Google for 'Netflix history' (presumably because the Netflix cookie was still in our browser).

You can remove specific entries from your Netflix viewing history by clicking the 'Hide from

viewing history' icon next to each one. With TV shows, you also get the option to hide the whole series.

To clear your history completely, click

the 'Hide all' button at the bottom of the list. Note that it can take up to 24 hours for removed titles to disappear from all your devices.

DELETE YOUR VOICE RECORDINGS

For many of us, talking to a voice assistant – such as Alexa or Google Assistant on our Amazon Echo or Google Home speaker – has become second nature, so it's easy to forget that our voice commands are being stored and shared, rather than vanishing into the ether. Last year, Amazon, Google, Apple and Microsoft all admitted that audio snippets recorded by their smart assistants were being analysed by human contractors and, although the companies subsequently changed (or 'paused') this policy, the hoarding of our voices is still a major privacy concern.



You can delete your voice data from Alexa by opening the Android or iOS app and going to Settings, Alexa Privacy, Review Voice History. Choose a date range from the menu and select 'Delete All Recordings' or delete

> individual entries from the list below. If you select the 'Enable deletion by voice' option, you will in future be able to say: "Alexa, delete everything I said today" to wipe all your commands from midnight to

the present moment. You can also make Amazon auto-delete voice data after three or 18 months by selecting 'Automatically delete recordings' on the Manage Your Alexa Data screen. These options are also available in your browser through Amazon's Alexa Privacy hub (bit.ly/alexa497).

To clear your Google Assistant recordings, open the Google Home app on your phone or tablet, tap your profile picture and choose My Activity. Swipe down to delete individual commands or everything you said on a specific date, or choose to delete voice data automatically after three or 18 months. As with Alexa, it's also possible to wipe commands vocally by saying:

"Hey Google, delete my last conversation/today's (or this week's) activity" or "Hey Google, that wasn't for you". To erase all Google Assistant data in one go, visit bit.ly/assistant497, select 'Delete activity by' and choose a custom date range.

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


DISABLE

Leaving default settings enabled can have a significant impact on your online privacy. Here, we uncover the hidden options that sites and apps don't want you to know about, but which you should untick now

Lock down your privacy using Jumbo

Jumbo (www.jumboprivacy.com) is a new, free tool for Android and iOS that scans the apps on your phone to help you identify and plug privacy holes. It currently checks Google, Amazon, Facebook, Twitter and the dark web (sort of), with support for Instagram, LinkedIn and other services to be added soon. Here's how to use it.



Launch Jumbo, swipe through the welcome screens and read and agree to the privacy policy. Tap 'Scan your first app' and choose which app you want to check for privacy problems – Jumbo recommends Google or Facebook, 1 but you can select 'View other apps' for more options. 2



Sign into the relevant app and Jumbo will scan it and provide a report that lists which items need your attention and why.
For each one, it offers advice about improving your privacy, which you can either tap to ignore or perform the recommended action, such as Auto Delete or Stop Tracking.



Close the report to return to Jumbo's Protect screen, where you can scan other apps. Select Data Breach to search for your email address on haveibeenpwned.com to see if it's been involved in any data breaches. Tap Home to view alerts from Jumbo about privacy settings that need changing.

Edit your public Amazon profile

Amazon has thankfully (finally!) stopped making customers' wishlists public by default, but you still have a public profile on the online store that lets other people see all the reviews you've ever written. To hide this information, go to your profile page (bit.ly/profile497), click 'Edit your profile', then 'Edit your privacy settings'. Either deselect Reviews under 'Public activity' or choose 'Hide all activity on your profile'.

Stop Alexa shopping for strangers

By default, anyone in proximity to your Echo speaker can ask it to buy things from Amazon using your account details, no matter how ridiculous or expensive. To avoid this unauthorised ordering, open the Alexa app and go to Settings, Alexa Account, Voice Purchasing. Either turn off the feature completely or switch on 'Voice code' and set a code to prevent unwanted purchases.

Control who tags you on Facebook

Most of us have experienced a sense of dread after receiving a notification that "so-and-so has tagged you in a photo on Facebook", especially if the picture captures you looking worse for wear. To stop this

happening without your permission, open Facebook's Settings page and choose 'Timeline and Tagging'. Click Edit next to 'Review posts that friends tag you in before they appear on your timeline?' and select Enabled. Now, whenever someone tags you in a picture, you'll be given the option to 'Add to timeline' or Hide.

To 'untag' yourself from a post retrospectively, click the threedot button in its top-right corner and choose Remove Tag.

Turn off Facebook's facial recognition

Facebook now scans uploaded photos and videos using a deep-learning system called DeepFace, which recognises human faces and identifies who they are. Although this is useful for person-tagging and preventing image fraud, it's also rather creepy. To turn the feature off via the Facebook website or app, go to Settings, 'Face recognition', select 'Do you want Facebook to be able to recognise you in photos and videos?' and choose No.

Avoid appearing in Facebook

If there's one thing worse than adverts on Facebook, it's ads that include a personal endorsement from you, just because you once 'liked' that company's page.

To prevent your name from appearing in an ad without your permission, go to Settings, Ads and scroll down to 'Ad settings'.



Select 'Ads that include your social actions' and choose 'No one'.

Prevent photo-tagging on Twitter

As with Facebook, people on Twitter can tag you in photos without asking, which can sometimes cause embarrassment. To prevent this, click More, 'Settings and privacy', 'Privacy and safety' and select 'Photo tagging'. Either switch off the option altogether or choose 'Only people you follow can tag you'. If you've been tagged in a photo against your will, open the tweet you feature in, expand the menu in the upper-right corner and remove the tag.

Stop Spotify sharing your music

Even if you have impeccable taste in music, you probably don't want everyone knowing what you're listening to on Spotify. To protect your privacy, tap the cog icon to open the app's Settings and, in the Social section, disable the 'Listening activity' option - which shares what you play with other





people - and 'Recently played artists. You can also enable 'Private session' when you want to listen to, say, Barry Manilow, anonymously. To hide a specific playlist from nosy parkers, press down on it and choose Make Secret from the menu.

Prevent Google from recognising

After years of EU opposition on privacy grounds, Google finally added facialrecognition technology to its Photos app in the UK last year, under the less scary name of 'face grouping'. Although this only identifies and labels people within your own account (which means shared photos won't be tagged), you may still feel uncomfortable about Google knowing what you and your friends and family look like. To turn off the feature, open the main menu in Google Photos, choose Settings, 'Group similar faces' and switch off the 'Face grouping' option.

Obviously, Google will know what you

look like if you've ever used Face Unlock to secure your Android phone. To remove your face from its memory, go to Settings, Security, Face Unlock and choose 'Disable face unlock' to delete all facial scans.

Stop Windows 10 spying on you

We've discussed Windows 10's spying tendencies many times in the past and, although Microsoft has tried to make its privacy settings easier to access and understand, there are still several options you should ensure are disabled.

For example, to prevent Windows 10 storing and sharing everything you do, go to Settings, Privacy, click 'Activity history' and deselect the options 'Store my activity history on this device' and 'Send my activity history to Microsoft'.

You should also stop Windows apps accessing your data by clicking 'Account info' and switching off 'Allow apps to access your account info'. And to keep details of websites you visit and the apps you use secret from Microsoft, click 'Diagnostics & feedback' and choose Basic rather than Custom to limit the data it receives. You can also delete diagnostic data that's already been collected.

For more control over Windows 10's privacy settings, install the excellent free tool O&O ShutUp 10 (bit.ly/ shutup497).



What we liked:

If you're just starting out with code-editing software, whether to build a website in HTML or take on a more advanced project such as

JavaScript coding, then your best option is undoubtedly Microsoft's Visual Studio Code. The program – a halfway house between a basic text editor and professional Integrated Development Environment (IDE) – is a powerhouse for veteran coders, but welcoming enough for beginners. This is helped by its familiar Windows layout, which places a well-stocked toolbar at the top of the screen.


Running down the left-hand sidebar are crucial coding tools such as Source Control and 'Run and Debug' – which lets you isolate and monitor areas of code that may not be working as intended. This is also where you can search for specific lines of code or power up with optional extensions that allow the software to support a range of popular programming languages and let you save your work directly to your website via FTP.

The program itself is incredibly clean. Visual Studio Code opens with a welcome screen that immediately

makes it simple to create or open projects. If you've never used a code editor before, try the program's 'Interactive playground' to familiarise yourself with its methods.

To ease the burden of opening multiple files, Visual Studio Code operates a browser-like tabbed interface. And to help increase your productivity (not to mention learning), the software features the excellent IntelliSense autocomplete. When you start typing a command, it offers suggestions to complete the code, adding in the syntax the command needs to work. This means you can write code without memorising all the rules, and the software helps you get it right.

There's also a built-in tool to check your formatting, as well as a dizzying number of helpful keyboard shortcuts, each of which can be customised.



How it can be improved:

While the 'Interactive playground' helps ease you in, Visual Studio Code requires a base level of coding ability. It's also consistently slower than its rivals, from launching to searching larger projects.

Visual Studio Code is a wellequipped toolbox with everything you need to get a project off the ground, regardless of experience. A clutter-free design makes it effortlessly accessible, while extensions and integrations provide room for developing your skills.

Atom | atom.io | ★★★★☆

What we liked:

Developed by GitHub, Atom has been around for years. It offers all the same

basic features as Visual Studio Code extensions, autocomplete, tabbed layouts - and looks

almost identical, but what makes Atom different is that it lets you wildly customise any number of features that's why it's billed as "hackable". This makes it feel like your text editor and, if you're a beginner, helps familiarise you with the program.

Atom's Teletype, which you'll need to install separately, is a great way of sharing your code while you work.

How it can be improved:

Getting the most out of Atom means downloading extensions. For instance, to run a debugger, you need to install the correct debugging package.



If you're a novice at coding, dealing with these extras can seem daunting. On the other hand, it's a good excuse to delve into Atom's well-populated forums, and it's certainly in keeping with the program's 'hackable' philosophy.

Atom is designed with customisation in mind - because no two users are alike. However, that bonus is also its drawback, requiring extensions to do the heavy lifting that comes as standard elsewhere.


Brackets, the text editor from Adobe, focuses on website coding. It provides control over your

code while managing to avoid being impenetrable and over-designed. Beginners will benefit from its support for JSLint, an analysis tool that identifies problems with code, such as bad formatting and incorrect syntax.

Quick Edit is Brackets' jewel in the coding crown. This time-saving function - press Ctrl+E - lets you find, open and edit CSS files without exiting your other files. Coupled with Live Preview, it lets you see precisely how the changes you make to the code modify your website.

Regularly updated by its developers, the tool is also served by a good number of extensions, although most of these are best suited to pros rather than novices.

The extension manager also houses user-created themes for jazzing up the otherwise standard-issue black box.



How it can be improved:

Don't bother with Brackets if you want to code beyond JavaScript, HTML and CSS - it's not built for the job. The extension manager is slow to load and impeded by its lack of categories unless you know the extension's name, prepare for a labour-intensive scroll to find anything relevant. While the official web guide (bit.ly/bracketsguide497) is great, it's a wall of text and we'd prefer a more visual in-program guide to get to grips with the software's ins and outs.

OUR VERDICT

Brackets is a good tool, packed with fresh features, but it has a limited coding spectrum, focusing almost exclusively on web development.


Komodo Edit is a tasty freebie to tempt you into Komodo IDE, which offers more professional-level options. However, as a standalone tool it does more than enough. Like Visual Studio Code, it's pitched somewhere between a text editor and an IDE. Expect the usual features, such as auto-complete for a range of programming languages, colour-coded syntax and FTP support. Beginners will find its airy, modern design fuss-free and welcoming.



Notepad++

Eschewing almost all bells and whistles, Notepad++, a popular replacement for Microsoft Notepad, is about as basic as they come. However, we were surprised at how many useful extensions the tool features. A helpful community is on hand for direction and support, but given how streamlined Notepad++ is, it's best reserved for emergency or on-the-fly coding.

If you feel that even Notepad++ is too complex for your first foray into coding, try JS. It's a simple online JavaScript editor with support for a range of frameworks. The two-panel interface lets you view your code and see how it will look on the page, which is a great aid for learners - make tweaks to the dummy code, then click Run Code to see how different commands change the layout. Be sure to register for a free account first, so you can save your work.

Automatically transcribe and add subtitles to videos — for free

Subly automatically creates embedded subtitles for your videos. Here's what you need to know

ubtitles aren't only useful for making sense of foreign-language movies. They're also handy for clarifying dialogue filmed in a noisy environment, providing the gist of a clip's content when the sound is switched off and, most importantly, making it possible for someone with hearing difficulties to follow a conversation.

If you've ever tried to add subtitles to your own videos, you'll know it can be a time-consuming process. Subly makes things easy by letting you upload a video to its site and transcribing what's being said to produce editable subtitles.


You need to create an account to use the service - just enter your email address, name and a secure password.



Once you've logged in, you can upload your first video. You can only upload one video at a time. Either drag a video to the window or click the upload area and navigate to the file you want. You can preview the clip 1 or clear the selection 2 if you want to work on a different video.



Select a language from the dropdown menu. 1 Subly supports a range of English-speaking accents and many European languages. Click Upload, 2 then wait while the video is sent. A message lets you know when the upload is completed successfully and Subly can start transcribing the contents.






While this is happening, you can click the 'Upload a Video' button and choose a second clip, if required.


A message pops up once the current video has successfully been transcribed, and a green Ready label appears. Click the video thumbnail to view and edit the results.



All the subtitles are displayed on the left, next to a time code. 1 Click the Play button on the video 2 to preview it. The subtitles appear on screen as it plays. 3 Hopefully, they are correct, but there may be some mistakes. Listen out for anything that isn't right.




Click any box containing a subtitle that needs changing, then type in the correct words. Changes are saved automatically with a confirmation message. Watch the video again to make sure everything is as it should be. You can customise the look of the text in the 'Style editor'.





From here, you can change the font, size and colour of the subtitles. 1 An outline 2 makes the text stand out against the video, and you can pick a different colour for this, too. You can also format the subtitles, adding bold, italics and underline, **B** and adjust the alignment. 4



By default, as is the case with most subtitled movies, the text appears at the bottom of the video. However, you can change the location to place it at the top or in the centre, 11 if that suits your project better. You can also tweak the margins 2 to make sure everything looks



When you're happy with your finished movie, click the 'Add subtitles to video' button. 11 The subtitles will be 'burned' into the video - this takes quite a while, depending on how much text there is. You're alerted when the process is finished. 2 When it's done, you can download the video to your PC. [3]






Microsoft has also integrated its Lens technology into the app, which lets you use your mobile device's camera as a scanner to import photos and other images to your documents. 

The Microsoft Office app is available for Android and the iPhone version of iOS. Both apps are very similar and offer the same tools and options. However, the app has been designed to work on a tall, narrow, portrait screen so it's not best suited to iPad, where it simply displays in an iPhone-sized window. You can still download the individual Word, Excel and PowerPoint apps on the iPad, which work well in its larger landscape screen.






Launch the app and allow it to access your photos, media and files. Sign into your Microsoft account. If you already have documents in OneDrive, they're displayed as a list, 11 with the most recent at the top. Tap the folder 🔼 to explore other locations, or tap the magnifying glass 🖪 to search.



To create something new, tap the Plus button. You can choose between Notes. Lens and Documents. If you choose the latter, another menu appears from which you can create a new document, 11 spreadsheet **2** or presentation. 






Tap the 'A' button to access the mobile equivalent of the Microsoft Office ribbon menu. From here, you can select many of the options you'd expect to find in the full version of Office. The Home section 1 has most of the text-formatting options, including bold, italic and underline, 2 along with font colour, **B** bullet points, paragraph formatting and so on.





On the Home screen, tap the Plus button 🗓 and choose Notes. Type a reminder or some other type of note on the yellow notelet, then tap the Back arrow. You're returned to the Home screen where your note appears in the list of today's documents. 2






Tap the Plus button and choose Lens. This lets you use your camera as a scanner (or you can select an existing photo), so you can turn an image into a document. Swipe to choose between Document, Photo or Whiteboard and take the picture. The icons at the top 11 let you edit the image. You can add more images to make a multi-page document, 🔁 and choose between an image, Word document and PDF for the file type. **B** Tap Done. **4**





If you choose image or PDF, you can save the resulting file to an appropriate folder. Choosing 'Word document' performs optical character recognition (OCR) on the text and transfers it to a Word document that you can then edit as normal. 11






Collect info while browsing with Edge's new tool

dge's new Collections tool works in a similar way to bookmarking but it's more versatile and has several useful features. You aren't just restricted to links, you can also save pictures and snippets of text, and even add your own


notes. Collections has been included but not yet enabled in the latest stable version of Edge, so we show you how to activate it in Step 1 of this workshop.






Open Edge using the new shortcut and you'll see a new Collections icon on the toolbar. 11 Click it to open the Collections sidebar. 2 Click 'Start new collection' and give it a name. B Browse the web to find a page you'd like to add to your collection and click 'Add current page'. 4




To add more websites to the collection, simply visit the site and click the 'Add current page' link again. 11 Click the 'Add note' button 2 to add a text note as a separate card in the collection. You can format the text 🛢 or create a list. 🛂



To add individual elements from a page to your collection instead of the entire page, right-click an image 🚺 or select and right-click text. 🔁 Click 'Add to collections' and choose either an existing or new collection. 3 Clicking the card in the collection takes you back to the page it appeared in.



If you don't like the order of your cards, use click-anddrag to reposition them. The title of a card 11 is taken from the website heading but you can change this if you right-click the card, then choose Edit. 2 From here, you can also copy and delete cards, **3** and choose how they open. **4**



Click the Back arrow to return to the Collections home screen. All your Collections are displayed with thumbnails to remind you of what's in each one. 11 Right-click a collection to change its name, 2 delete it 3 or open all the sites you've saved within it into separate tabs. 4




To view an attribute's data, right-click it and select Properties. 1 Let's say you want to modify the author name on a Word document: right-click 'System.Author' 2 and choose Edit Selected Property, 3 then type the new name under Property Value. 4 This also works for dates.




If you're not sure what a property type is, right-click it and select Open Microsoft Web Page. 11 This leads you to a Microsoft Docs website explainer. 2 You can also find specific properties by clicking Edit, Find [3] (or press Ctrl+F) to search the current list.



To add extra properties to your file, click File, Add New Property 1 or right-click and select the option from the menu. Choose a Property Name 🛭 from the drop-down menu, assign a Property Value and click OK. Similarly, to delete an attribute, choose Remove Selected Properties. **B**



Instead of opening a file, you can drag and drop it to the software from File Explorer or manage a file's properties by clicking and dragging the Crosshair icon 11 to the target file. This automatically displays 'Load properties of the following window handle' with the file's code.



You can retain a copy of all current metadata for each file by right-clicking inside the pane and heading to the HTML Report section. Choose either All Items 11 or Selected Items 2 to open a fresh browser page with the relevant details, **B** which can then be saved.

Find new uses for an old tablet

Don't ditch your old iPad or Android tablet after you upgrade. **Wayne Williams** reveals lots of clever new uses for your old device

epending on the make and model, most smartphones have a fairly short lifespan. Damage, failing battery life, reduced performance and the desire for shiny new features mean most people will start considering an upgrade after two to three years.

Tablets are a different matter entirely. Users hang on to these for at least twice as long – six to seven years is

typical these days. If you have a tablet that's starting to get a little old, you might be thinking of consigning it to the bin. But just because it's no longer as fast and capable as it once was, it doesn't mean it can't continue to play a worthwhile part in your home. There are lots of different, dedicated uses for an old tablet, as we'll show you in this issue's Weekend Project.



Use it as a photo frame

Digital photo frames were hugely popular a decade or so ago. Having one of these in your home meant you were no longer limited to displaying just one image in a picture frame because the screen could cycle through a whole series of snaps, pulling them directly from an SD card, media server or the cloud.

You can still buy digital photo frames, and the latest smart speakers with

screens - such as the Google Nest Hub - operate as photo frames when not in use. However, if you have an old tablet, you can use that instead. It can display images from anywhere, including Google Photos, Facebook and Instagram.

What you need is an app that can manage everything for you. There are several good choices but, if you have an old iPad, then LiveFrame (www liveframeapp.com) is ideal. You can

choose which photo sources to use and set a time for when you want them displayed. You need to watch adverts to get free viewing time or you can pay a one-time fee of £4.99.

Framee (www.getframee.com) is a good alternative that turns your iPad or Android tablet into a digital photo frame you can update from your phone. The free version limits you to one photo a week, but upgrade to the Plus version for

£1.99 a year and you can send unlimited photos to the tablet. Friends and family members can send you photos, too. We show you how to set it up in our Mini Workshop, below.

Use it as a second screen for your computer

In last issue's Weekend Project (bit.ly/webuser496), we showed you how to turn an old (but still working) monitor into a second screen for your desktop computer. Having two (or more) displays can really boost your productivity – you can carry out your main work on one screen, then use the other for displaying your email, Facebook feed, news headlines and so on. But you can also transform an old tablet into a second, smaller display, which is ideal if you don't have room on your desk for

a full-size extra screen.

Air Display (bit.ly/aird497) has always been our preferred choice, but Air Display 2 (Android) and Air Display 3 (iOS) no longer work with Windows. It's definitely worth getting if you have an Apple Mac, but it costs £9.99 to unlock everything.

Splashtop Wired XDisplay (bit.ly/splash497) can connect an Android tablet, iPhone or iPad to a PC or Mac. You need to install the free XDisplay Agent on your computer, then install the app on your tablet. The app is free, but Android users are limited to 10-minute sessions and will need to pay £6.99 for the full service. The apps haven't been updated in a few years, either. We've found they still work fine but you may encounter a few glitches.

Given that neither of those options

does everything you might want it to do, a better choice could be Duet (www .duetdisplay.com), which works for iPadOS and Android devices, and on Windows and macOS. There isn't a free app (it costs £9.99 for iPad and £9.49 for Android) but it's updated regularly, which is a definite plus.

Security camera/baby monitor

You can use a spare tablet as a monitoring device for your home. This lets you keep an eye on things when you're at work or away on holiday, or you could use it as a baby or pet monitor, for instant peace of mind.

There are several free apps you can use for this and one of the best is Manything (manything.com, short for 'Monitor Anything'). It's a free app for iOS/iPadOS and Android that turns your tablet into

MINI WORKSHOP | Turn an old tablet into a photo frame with Framee



Install Framee on your phone and then on your tablet. Tap 'Get Started' on your phone and enter your name and the person you'd like to share photos with (yourself, probably), then tap Allow Access and grant the requested permissions. Pick a photo, optimise it for the tablet 1 and tap Share Photo. 2



Pramee displays a code on your phone. Open the app on your tablet and enter this code. As soon as you've typed in the last digit, the connection is made. You're asked if you want the app to notify you when new photos are sent. If you're the one doing the sending, just select No.



The first photo you sent appears on the tablet. 1 Tapping the screen hides or shows the menu at the bottom. You can tap the heart to show you like the image 2 or save a copy to your tablet's storage. 2 Open Settings 4 to set a time to turn the screen off and manage the slideshow mode.




a security camera. You can view a live video feed from it on your phone or via the web, and receive motion and sound alerts. There are a number of paid-for plans on offer that let you add additional cameras and save recorded video to the cloud. This costs from \$3.99 (around £3.10) a month. We show you how to use Manything in our Mini Workshop, below.

AtHome Camera (www.ichano.com) for iOS, Android and Windows, works in the same way. Set up the tablet as your camera, then use your smartphone to view the live feed. You can talk to anyone in the same room as the tablet (bear in

mind this would alert an intruder to the tablet's existence), record video on your phone, enable motion detection, mute the sound, switch to night vision and more.

Music server

Tablet screens are ideal for watching videos but they can also function as music servers. You can store your own collection of tracks on your tablet, then stream them through apps such as Apple Music, Amazon Music and Spotify. You need to connect your tablet to a compatible Bluetooth speaker to get the most from them.



Read books from Amazon on the free Kindle app

Dedicated ebook/magazine reader

You really can't beat Amazon's E-ink Kindles for reading books, but a spare tablet isn't a bad option. You can install the Kindle app on iPadOS or Android (bit.ly/kindle497) and enjoy your own books, or books straight from Amazon. Readly (gb.readly.com) lets you read unlimited magazines for £7.99 a month (with a 2-week free trial).

Install Manything on both your tablet and phone, then run it and grant the app any requested permissions. You need to sign up for a free account. Set your tablet as the Camera 1 and allow the additional permissions it needs. Sign into the same account on your phone (Android or iPhone).



Position the camera in your chosen location. You can switch between the front and rear cameras using the button at the top. 1 Tap Record 2 to start the camera streaming. You can now view it on your phone. Tap the cog 1 to customise the app, including enabling motion alerts.

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
Take control of Windows updates to delay or stop changes to your PC

Check for Windows update problems

ome problems with Windows updates are more obvious than others and, occasionally, updates can cause problems without you even realising. For this reason, it's worth checking that everything is working after an update, even if you haven't noticed any problems.

Open Settings, choose 'Update & Security' and click 'View update history' to see the most recent updates organised into categories. Expand each of the sections to see if any updates failed to install. Windows will try to install updates several times, so there's no need to panic if you notice something odd. Check back again in a week.

The big spring and autumn updates contain all the minor security and bug fixes, and they sometimes repair updates that previously failed. This means that Windows update problems sometimes go away without you having to do anything. This isn't always the case, but patience may be rewarded eventually, so it's often worth waiting for the next big update.



Keep an eye on your Windows Update history, which may highlight update problems

Auto-finish updates

There are three stages to a Windows update: first, your computer's operating system is prepared for the update when shutting down; second, the update is mostly installed on startup; and, lastly, the process is completed when you log into your account.

You can steamline this third step by allowing Windows to automatically use your account to finish the update. Open Settings, choose Accounts and select 'Sign-in options' in the sidebar. Scroll down to Privacy and turn on the switch next to 'Use my sign-in info to automatically finish setting up my device after an update or restart'.

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

Pause Windows updates

You can delay a Windows update for up to a week, so that the time-consuming process can be scheduled for a more convenient time. Open Settings, Windows Update and click 'Pause updates for 7 days'; or click 'Advanced options' and, under 'Pause updates', select a date to continue installing an update.

take hours to complete. It's therefore not always convenient to install an update as soon as it arrives because you may be busy using your computer for other things.

Thankfully, you can set active hours to put off updates until later. Open Settings, 'Update & Security' and click 'Change active hours'. Click the Change link next to the current active hours and set the end time to when you go to bed. You can then leave your computer turned on at the end of the day to update as you sleep.

Take care shutting down

Windows Update works in the background, downloading the update files without your knowledge. It only notifies you when the updates are ready to install, so if you don't want to do this right away, take care when shutting down your computer or restarting Windows to avoid the options 'Update and shut down' and 'Update and restart'. Choose either 'Shut down' or Restart instead.

Use a metered connection

Many internet providers offer unlimited downloads and don't charge for the data used. However, some budget plans impose download limits, and there are often chargeable limits when using a laptop with public Wi-Fi or using your phone as a hotspot. If you're using this kind of internet connection, it's worth letting Windows know.


Setting your home network as a metered connection lets you put off updates. Go to Settings, 'Update & Security' and click 'Advanced options'. Turn off the switch next to 'Download updates over metered connections'. Now go to Settings, 'Network & Internet' and click the Properties link under the network. Scroll down to 'Metered connection' and turn on the switch. It's another way to put off big updates.

Share Windows updates

If you have more than one Windows 10 PC, it doesn't make sense for them all to download the same update from the internet, thereby hogging your bandwidth, when they could share it instead. Go to Settings, 'Update & Security', 'Advanced options' and click the Delivery Optimisation link. If you have more than one PC, turn on the switch to 'Allow downloads from other PCs' and select 'PCs on my local network'. Now, when one PC downloads an update, it can share this over the network with other PCs.

There's another option here that lets you share updates on the local network and with other PCs on the internet. If Microsoft's servers are not working, or they've become overloaded with users, an update can be fetched from someone else's PC. Help others and get help yourself by selecting this option.

Click 'Activity monitor' to see how much vou've downloaded from Microsoft and how much came from other PCs. Click 'Advanced options' and, under 'Upload settings', choose how many gigabytes of updates you want to provide to other PCs on the internet. The minimum is 5GB.

Disable Windows update service

Windows Update service runs automatically in the background, checking for updates. Disabling it stops Windows checking for updates and downloading them.

Press Windows+R and enter services.msc. Look down the list of services and double-click Windows Update. If the service is running, click Stop. This isn't a permanent solution and Windows may automatically restart it, so set the 'Startup type' to Disabled to prevent Windows from doing this.

Windows updates may fix bugs or security flaws, so it's not a good idea to put them off forever. When you're ready for the update to install, return to services.msc and set the startup type to Manual, then start the service.

You can also disable Windows Update service from the command line. Click Start and type command, then click 'Run as administrator'. To stop it and disable it, enter:

net stop wuauserv sc config wuauserv start= disabled

Replace disabled with manual to restore the normal setting.

For an even simpler way to turn off Windows Update, download Windows Update Blocker from bit.ly/wubl497, select Disable Updates and click Apply Now. When you're ready to install the update, select Enable Updates.

EaseUS has free beta software called Tools M that provides a one-click Windows Update Enable/ Disable button. Download it direct from EaseUS at bit.ly/ease497 (note that this link takes you straight to the download) and install it. Run it, click Windows Update and use the Enable/ Disable button as necessary.

Once you've disabled updates, avoid opening the Settings app and looking at 'Update & Security' because this may restart the update service and undo your changes. Other actions, such as starting or restarting your computer, may also trigger the update service, so you may need to perform these update blocks daily.

Replace Windows Update

Tech savvy users who want more control over updates should try Windows Update MiniTool (bit.ly/ wumt497). Unzip it and run either the 64-bit or x86 (32-bit) version. The sidebar shows updates as Available, Installed or Hidden, while the Update History displays a log of all updates. You can set updates to Automatic, Disabled, 'Notification mode', 'Download only' and 'Administrator only', and use a tick box to include or exclude hardware drivers in updates.

WAU Manager (bit.ly/waum497) is another free tool worth considering. There's no installation, so you can run it from the download folder. A tick box at the top lets you disable Windows Update. There are three update settings below: Normal, Passive and Quiet. Normal is the best and it automatically searches for updates, but asks before downloading and installing them. You can therefore choose whether to go ahead or not.

Click the three-line menu button on the right to see options to show update history, manage hidden updates, update Windows or uninstall updates. Configure WAU Manager settings, then select the tickbox 'Create a Desktop shortcut'. When the configuration is saved, it creates an icon on the desktop to quickly apply the settings without having to run the program. Considering how often Windows re-enables updates and undoes your settings, this could be useful.

Stop unwanted phone calls

I've been receiving at least one phone call per day on my smartphone lately, from people who say they're returning a call that I've just made to them. The calls I receive are from both landlines and mobile phones, and I believe that these people claiming they are returning a call are genuine.

I suspect that someone is using my mobile phone number for an attempted scam and that if the recipient picks up the phone in a couple of rings, then the usual attempt at conning them takes place. Short of changing my phone number, which I'm reluctant to do, how can I stop this annoyance?

This is called 'number spoofing' or 'ID spoofing'. It could be used by scammers, but it is also used by companies that cold-call people to try to sell them things. In either case, the caller hides their number by using

someone else's. It is just bad luck that they've chosen yours.

The Ofcom website has a page about this at bit.ly/spoof497, but doesn't say how to solve the problem. It only offers advice for victims of scams, but you are not the victim and you don't even know if it is a scam - it could be a company disguising its number. There doesn't seem to be a way to identify or stop the culprit, or find out why they are doing it.

If you have an iPhone, go to the Settings, choose Phone and you should see an option to Silence Unknown Callers. Basically, if a person who isn't in your Contacts app calls you, they are sent to voicemail. You could then record a brief voicemail message telling unknown callers that if they are returning a call they've just received from your number, it's not you and may be a scam. Friends, family and other contacts can call you as normal.

If you have an Android phone, there

may be a similar feature, though this will vary depending on the manufacturer and model. For example, open the Phone app, tap the three-dot icon and select Settings. Tap Block or Block Numbers, then Block Unknown Callers. Make sure your contacts app contains everyone that you might want to talk to.

Fix hard-drive letter clash


I have a 2TB Seagate external hard drive but, for some reason, it no longer appears on my desktop PC or my laptop when I plug it into a USB port. I have tried using different sockets on both my PC and laptop to no avail. When I plug in other Seagate 2TB and 4TB external hard drives, they work fine. Is there any way I can get this particular hard drive working again?

This sometimes happens when you use several different external USB drives with a computer, whether they are hard drives or USB memory sticks. Windows allocates drives with the next available letters, starting with C: for the boot drive, then D:, E: and so on for extra drives. The trouble is that it can

software problems. Most often, errors with hardware components whether it's the network adapter or something else - are caused by drivers, which are the device-specific programs that keep all the hardware working. Updating, rolling back and removing the driver usually fixes the problem and there's most often no need to make any repairs to the hardware.

Click the Start button and type **device** manager then open it. Expand 'Network

adapters' and you may see one or more items listed. One should be recognisable as the network card - it will be called something like Broadcom 802.11ac Network Adapter and may be branded with a name such as Realtek. Right-click this and select Properties.

If the Roll Back Driver button is enabled on the Driver tab, use it and then restart Windows afterwards. This process deletes the current driver and reinstalls the previous one, which may restore the network adapter to its previously working state.

If you can't roll back, use the Update Driver button to get the latest version and then restart your computer.

If that still doesn't solve the problem, use the Uninstall Device button and restart your computer. This removes all the software drivers for your network card. When Windows restarts, it detects the hardware and automatically installs an appropriate driver for it. It's like a clean start for the device.

get in a muddle when one external drive is plugged in and assigned as E: (or any letter), and then replaced with another external drive that also uses E: (or whatever letter was assigned before). One of them will stop working.

The solution is to assign a different letter to each drive. Plug in each drive that works and make a note of its drive letter. Now plug in the one that doesn't work, right-click This PC in an Explorer window and select Manage. Under Storage, select Disk Management and, in the lower half of the right-hand pane you'll see a kind of map of drives and partitions. Right-click the drive that isn't working and select 'Change drive letter and paths', then click the Add button. Select a letter for the drive that's not being used by any other drives, such as 'G' or 'H'. The drive should immediately appear in Explorer and will, in future, always use this drive letter.

Reconnect a missing network

I haven't changed anything on my computer recently but it suddenly refuses to connect to the internet. It just says that there are no networks available. I know this isn't the case because I am emailing this on my phone over my home Wi-Fi network. My iPad is also able to connect to this same network, and yet my computer can't connect. Do I need to get it repaired? How much is that likely to cost?

Reset a tablet's browser

My wife has a Samsung Galaxy Tab A6, which she uses to browse fashion websites, shops and more. Last week, she asked me to help with a frozen screen. I tried everything to get rid of a static image in the corner of the screen, but there was no moving it. Eventually, I cleared the history, then the cache, and reset the Chrome browser. It cleared the frozen image, but also some settings. My better half said I had made it worse!

It seems I've managed to change the device in some way, and now she doesn't like it at all. She says that the top used to be black and all her previously visited sites were displayed down the left-hand side. Is it possible to create a separate pane for URLs you've visited in Chrome? Or maybe show stored tabs there?

I've searched the Samsung website and user manual for a solution and the closest I've come to finding anything is in Display/Appearance/Navigation, but I can't find anything else.

One way to make Chrome have a black bar at the top is to switch to incognito mode. Open Chrome's menu and select 'New incognito window', then close the normal window and when you now switch to




Show bookmarks in a pop-out panel with the Bookmark Sidebar extension

Chrome, the top bar will be black.

Chrome doesn't have sidebars or panes, but you can open a tab showing your browsing history via the browser's main the menu. History could be set as a startup page to make it convenient to access. Open the menu, go to Settings, find the 'On startup' section and select 'Open a specific page or set of pages'. Use 'Add new page' to add chrome:// history and your favourite startup page, such as www.google.co.uk.

Bookmark Sidebar is a Chrome extension that lets you display your bookmarks in a panel or sidebar. You'll find it in the Chrome Web Store at bit.ly/sidebar497. Once it's installed, you open the sidebar by clicking the left-hand edge of the browser window. The extension has a high rating and excellent reviews, and includes many useful features. The only downside is that extensions don't usually work on mobile devices, but it's worth a try, just in case.





Bookmark your favourite hotspots' login pages so you can access them quickly

WI-FI Connect to hotspots faster

I sometimes use my laptop in cafés and make use of the free Wi-Fi facilities. Sometimes, the Wi-Fi login page appears as soon as I open a browser but, occasionally, it doesn't and I have no connection, which is very frustrating. Is there a solution to this?

There are a couple of things you can do and one is to try visiting a few websites, such as a basic, no-frills site from your bookmarks - Google or Bing,

for example. If you have more than one browser on your laptop, you may find that one triggers the hotspot login page faster than the other. When you get a login page, save it by bookmarking it and use this in future, if the page doesn't appear automatically.

Remove unwanted Start menu items

I recently bought a new laptop because my old Windows 7 computer is no longer supported. There are a lot of squares on the Start menu for various programs I don't need, and I was wondering if it is safe – or even possible – to remove them.

Some of these tiles can be removed and others can be hidden. Right-click a tile on the Start menu and see if it displays an Uninstall menu item. If it does, it can be safely removed. For example, Calculator and Mail can be removed, but Photos and Maps cannot. For those that cannot be removed, right-click and select 'Unpin from Start' to hide the tile.

Speed up Windows updates

I dread the twice-yearly Windows updates – not because I have problems but because they are so slow. They can take three or four hours to download and install. Is there any way to speed up the process? There is another big update coming soon and it would be great if I could get it done without waiting half the day for it to finish. Why is it so slow?


The time taken to install an update depends on several factors and the most significant is whether the computer has a hard drive or a solid-state drive. SSDs are much faster to read and write to, especially when dealing with a large number of small files. Swapping the HDD for an SSD in your PC could

halve the time it takes to perform an update.

If your PC has a standard hard drive, keeping it defragmented in the run-up to a big update will help speed it up. Although Windows automatically defragments the hard drive in the background when the computer is idle, using a tool such as Defraggler

(www.ccleaner.com/defraggler) can still be beneficial. When you've finished using your computer for the day, launch the software, select 'Shutdown after Defrag' in the Settings menu and set a defrag going. The PC will switch off when it's finished.

The more memory your computer has, the faster the update speed. These days,

you need 8GB to run Windows 10 efficiently. It will manage to run with 4GB, but the memory is easily filled and the computer slows down as it swaps blocks of memory in and out, so it's worth upgrading with more memory if possible.


Stop getting Windows 7 updates

Fix Windows Update problems

Regarding CJ Holmes' problem with a laptop that won't update (Issue 495, bit.ly/webuser495), try using the Microsoft Update Catalog. You'll need to know the version of Windows 10 you're running. To view this, type winver in the Start menu, and the type of system you have - if you're not sure, press Windows+i and search 'About your PC' under Device Specifications and 'System type'.

Manually downloading the updates should make them install automatically. Go to Microsoft Update Catalog (bit.ly/ update497) and type Update for Windows 10 Version xxxx for x64/x86/ARM64 based systems

where 'xxxx' is your Windows version number. Next, choose from x64, x86 or ARM64, depending on what your system type was in 'About your PC'.

Click one of the downloaded updates to run it and accept the Microsoft End User Licence Agreement if prompted. Work your way through each update, restarting your computer if required. Feature updates require Windows 10 Update Assistant. Under the Windows 10 November 2019 update, click 'Update now' to download it.



Use Directory Printer like a pro

I heartily second Mike Smith's recommendation (Issue 494, bit.ly/webuser494) to use Karen's Directory Printer (bit.ly/karen497). However, it can look a bit overwhelming to a newcomer, so perhaps I can offer some help.

Here's how I use the software to list my music files. First, select the Print tab and navigate to the folder whose contents you want to list. Choose the file type in File Filter - I usually leave this as 'All files (*.*)', since I want to list everything inside the folder. Next, set the desired Print Options - if, like me, you prefer an uncluttered list, choose 'File info only', then set File Info and 'Sort Files by'. In both these instances, I choose File Name. Now select the 'Save to Disk' tab and click 'Save to Disk' at the bottom left.

Choose where to save your list and its title, click Save and your list appears as a TXT file. I then typically copy my list into Word to remove all the '.mp3' file extensions and it's ready to print.




Get dark mode for Notepad

It's not obvious how to create your own groups because it's not as simple as a left- or right-click. Instead, you have to click and drag a tile down past the bottom of the Start menu, below everything else. When a blue bar appears above, you can drop the tile. Now, when you hover the cursor between the tile you just dropped and the one above, a bar appears. Click this and enter a name for the new group.

To rearrange groups, along with all the tiles in them, click and drag the two bars that appear at the right of a group name when the mouse hovers over it. Whole groups of tiles can be deleted by rightclicking the group name and selecting 'Unpin group from Start'.



Click the link and you can set permissions, such as whether it can

run in the background. If you scroll down, you'll find buttons to Terminate, Reset and Uninstall.





Always read smart devices' privacy policies

lan McBride makes a good point that smart devices need to process our data to function properly (Star Email, Issue 496). However, that shouldn't give the likes of Google, Amazon and Facebook carte blanche to gather our personal information surreptitiously and pass it to third-party companies without our permission.

It's said that most people skip past privacy-policy pages when they set up their smart devices, without bothering to read them. But isn't that exactly what the data-peddling tech giants expect and want us to do? It doesn't take more than 30 seconds to scan these policies for details of what the



companies do with your data, and if you agree to them without checking, you really only have yourself to blame.

That said, I do think the manufacturers of smart devices should be more transparent about the data they collect

and who they share it with, in the same way that food packaging must provide nutritional and ingredient information. This may put some people off buying the devices, but at least it will pre-empt privacy scandals further down the line.

In the meantime, you should always read the privacy policy for any smart device you buy. If you don't like what you see, you have 14 days to return the item under the Consumer Contracts Regulations. If you're prepared to share your data in the way outlined in the policy, and agree to the company's terms, then you can't later accuse the device of 'spying on you'.

usually willing to pay! Antivirus is a necessity - not an option - for all web users, and Mac owners can't afford to deny that fact any more.



Earlier this month, like most of the south coast of England, I lost my Virgin Media broadband connection for the best part of the day. This was very inconvenient as I was not only unable to access the internet but couldn't watch TV either.

I was under the impression that all broadband customers were now entitled to automatic compensation for loss of service, but have since discovered there are a couple of caveats to this, which I



thought other readers should be aware of.

First, you will only be compensated by Virgin Media for a total loss of service

that lasts at least 48 hours, starting from the end of the day that the outage occurs. Second, you need to personally report the problem to Virgin Media either by phone or via its website though how you're supposed to do this if you can't get online, I don't know.

Provided you tick both those boxes, you should receive £8 of credit for each day you were without service. I suppose that's better than nothing, but it's a shame you can't claim compensation for shorter outages that can still prove very frustrating.

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Barry Collins doesn't get any better with age - but his Chromebook does

Chromebooks are the Benjamin Button of tech

omputers grow more useless as they get older, right? It's an immutable fact, akin to the sun always rising in the east and printers "running low" on ink about eight months before they actually do.

Well, Chromebooks have utterly spun this truism on its head. About three years ago, I brought a Google Pixelbook into our home. It had a lovely screen, woke up quicker than the dog does when a firework goes off outside, and its battery lasted forever. But nobody knew quite what to do with it.

The kids preferred to do their homework on a Windows laptop, because they found it easier to work in Microsoft Word and PowerPoint than they did in Google's clunky Docs and Slides. For sofa surfing and basic email use, my iPad was more convenient to hold, and the apps gave it a huge edge over Chrome OS. Consequently, the Chromebook became an expensive ornament, left uncharged on the shelf

while we got on with our lives.

Three years on, the Pixelbook is now one of the most used devices in our household. What changed? Well – incredibly – it got better. Much better. Google's online apps have vastly improved, to the point where my

to swiftly update something, without having to fire up the Mac in my office.

And then there's the games. Aside from all the Android games you can now access from the Play Store, Google

recently launched Stadia – a streaming service that allows you to play full-blown PC games such as *Red Dead Redemption II*, *Destiny II* or *Farming Simulator* (get behind the wheel of a John Deere tractor and you'll never feel so alive) from any Chrome browser.

My Saturday morning lie-ins have now been transformed. I sit for a blissful couple of hours, guiding Dulwich Hamlet to the Premier League title in Football Manager 2020, using a dead-silent laptop that barely even warms from playing a demanding game. If I did that with even my new MacBook Pro, we'd have to call the fire brigade within 20 minutes to put out my duvet.

Like the reverse-ageing Benjamin
Button in the Brad Pitt film,
Chromebooks are defying the laws of
computing by getting better as they get
older. And now they're getting cheaper,
too. The new Pixelbook Go – which,
colleagues assure me, has an equally
sensational keyboard as the original
Pixelbook, if not quite as good a screen
– is now only £629 for the base model.
As long-term tech investments go, I
can't think of any better.





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
