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
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Outsmart your smart devices



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What's New Online

Play Amazon's new online game

mazon has launched its first original big-budget online game, which is designed to be as fun to watch as it is to play. The sci-fithemed, team-based action shooter, called Crucible, has been in development for four years, with Amazon Game Studios hoping it will become as popular as Fortnite, Overwatch and League of Legends -

particularly with fans of Amazon's game-streaming service Twitch (www.twitch.tv).

You can download Crucible for free from Steam (bit.ly/crucible503), provided you have an account and, ideally, Windows 10. There are some payable options that give you different character skins, in-game credits and Battle Passes, which may



help you pit your wits in multiplayer online battle arenas. Fortunately, they're not essential.

As well as playing as one of 10 colourful hunters, you have three main modes to pick from: a last-manstanding Battle Royale blast-em-up; Heart of the Hives, which involves two sets of four players capturing a trio of items; and Harvester Command, where two teams of eight compete to drain each other's resources.

Interestingly, the developer, Relentless, consulted Twitch streamers about the design and feel of the game, and many users are already getting stuck in if you fancy taking a look.

Rediscover old PC game boxes

Downloading games digitally from the internet is convenient, but many of us feel nostalgic about the packaging that came with physical formats. Benjamin Winner has collected 653 big box games over the years and scanned them in 3D to display on his Big Box Collection website, so you can view the front, back and sides while zooming in for greater detail.

Classic titles including Broken Sword, Doom, Elite, Flight of the Amazon Queen, Ghouls 'n' Ghosts, Puzzle Bobble and loads more are displayed atop screenshots. In each case, you can export the boxes as a GIF and even download them to print as miniature papercraft models. There are boxes for

Bulk-delete Instagram comments

In its efforts to tackle bullying, Instagram has introduced a new anti-trolling feature that lets users quickly remove multiple comments from their posts. This ensures that anyone faced with a flurry of negative interactions can easily delete them, starting with a tap of View All Comments below a post.

The Android version lets you select up to 25 comments

before tapping the trashcan icon to delete them. In the iOS app, select the three-dot menu in the top-right corner, then tap Manage Comments before selecting and deleting the offending interactions.

In either version of the app, options exist to block or restrict accounts - and Instagram isn't stopping there. It's also rolling out controls that let you manage who can tag or mention you (including no one or only people you follow), and will eventually allow positive comments to be pinned to the top of a thread.

wares via stores created within the app. Look out for the Shop Now button on a

Facebook Page, story or advert. Items of interest can be saved, messages sent and deliveries tracked, but you're directed to the company's own website to place your order. If you have a business yourself, you can set up a shop for free using Facebook's new tools. Select Create Collection and add products manually or from an XML file. You can customise your shop with a cover image and accent colours.

Many TV shows start promisingly but then become complacent, repetitive and boring. If you're about to embark on a boxset and want a heads-up on when things take a turn for the worse, search for it on TV Chart to get a full episode-by-episode lowdown as determined by IMDb. For example, it shows that Game of Thrones tails off from episode 68 and The Good Place goes out on a major high. You can colour-code series for greater clarity, add trend lines and view individual episode to see its name and rating.

Need to Know

Trump and Twitter go headto-head over free speech

What happened?

US president Donald Trump has often raised eyebrows with his tweets, but Twitter has now sparked his outrage by putting a fact-check notice on one of his posts and a "glorifying violence" warning on another.

Amid conversations about how to manage the imminent US elections during the coronavirus pandemic, Trump tweeted: "There is NO WAY (ZERO!) that Mail-In Ballots will be anything less than substantially fraudulent" (bit.ly/ trumptweet503). Twitter annotated this tweet with a link saying: "Get the facts about mail-in ballots," directing readers to a fact-checking resource that stressed there is no evidence that mail-in ballots are linked to voter fraud. In response, the president accused Twitter of "stifling free speech".

Two days later, Trump addressed the protests against police brutality toward black communities with another tweet, which included the phrase "looting leads to shooting" (bit.ly/trumptweet2503). The president said his intention was not to direct police to target protesters, but Twitter hid the tweet behind a warning saying that it violated rules on glorifying violence. To see the tweet, followers had to click a button.

Trump retaliated with an executive order calling to review and repeal Section 230 - legislation that means websites aren't held liable for content posted by their users - saying that it gave them too much legal protection and let them escape responsibility for





their actions. Section 230 can't be repealed via executive order and would have to pass through Congress, but Trump's likely rival at the next election, Democrat Joe Biden, has also criticised Section 230, albeit for different reasons. This suggests that internet regulation is set for a change in the US, regardless of the outcome of the looming vote.

Meanwhile, both Trump's messages remain unaltered on Facebook, raising questions about the differences between the two leading social networks. Twitter has previously taken a light-touch approach to Trump's tweets, and has only removed one message posted by another political head: Iranian leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei.

How will it affect you?

In the short term, little has changed. Twitter countered Trump, but the action may have lead to even more people seeing the message. However, the ensuing furore indicates that social media is likely to once again be a sticking point in the US election and, regardless of who is elected, that changes are imminent. If Section 230 is wholly revoked, social-media companies - and any other website that allows user comments - will suddenly be liable for anything posted. Sites would be at risk if they didn't pre-moderate posts, and Twitter and Facebook would surely lose some appeal if users' status updates didn't show up for several days.

It's more likely that rather than scrapping Section 230, it will be updated or replaced with new rules. It seems unlikely that Congress will pass legislation that instantly destroys an entire section of online business.

What do we think?

Free speech is important, but so too is responsible speech. And it's worth noting that a private company has no requirement to publish everything that someone asks. Plenty of tweets and accounts get removed all the time because they're judged abusive or otherwise damaging.

While it's anyone's guess why Twitter chose specifically to flag these tweets from Trump rather than any of his previous posts, by leaving the messages online, Twitter hasn't impaired free speech. The first instance merely added facts, while the second warned about glorification of violence. There's no question Twitter is making a political statement, but it's hard to see how Twitter can police misinformation on its site without also applying its rules to big names with millions of followers.

That said, Section 230 has drawn much criticism over the years and is due for an update. We want to post freely while simultaneously enjoying protection against misinformation and online bullying. Balancing all of that while keeping the president happy - is no easy task.

5G 'protection key' nothing but a USB stick

What happened?

Trading Standards is working to shut down the website of a company selling a 5G "protection key" for £283, saying the product is a scam and nothing more than a standard USB drive.

5GBioShield (5gbioshield .com) claims its key protects you from "harmful radiation, electro-smog and biohazard pollution" using quantum holographic catalyser technology. There is no evidence that the radio signal used by mobile phones causes any health concerns, nor is there any such thing as quantum holographic



catalyst technology - it's faux-science gobbledygook.

Even if there was merit to the research and the science - and there isn't - the product is merely a standard USB key worth a few pounds.

The complaint comes as 5G conspiracy theories run rampant, with Openreach

saying its broadband engineers have been assaulted and spat at while working on upgrades, and 5G phone masts have been targeted with vandalism.

How will it affect you?

5G is already available in the UK, and the only difference between it and previous generations of mobile coverage is the signal frequency. There's no evidence that 5G or any other mobile signal causes ill health, and we've had decades to establish any concerns.

If you know someone who has purchased one of these scam USB sticks, or any other anti-5G product, tell them to

contact Trading Standards (bit.ly/trading503).

What do we think?

People are right to consider the health impact of any new technology, but they also need to be wary of having their fears exploited by conspiracy theories and fake news. Companies like 5GBioShield are no different to health scammers who have long used the internet to shill their tech-themed snake oil, and conspiracy theories like the 5G fearmongering only make their work easier.

Government seeks to secure smart devices

What happened?

The government has unveiled a £400,000 funding pot for the technology industry (bit.ly/ funding503) to improve the security of smart devices and the wider Internet of Things. The aim is to set up an assurance scheme, which would see such devices tested and accredited, so consumers know they have a basic level of protection.

The funding comes as the government said it planned to bring into law new security requirements for smart tech. The rules, announced earlier this year, would require device passwords to be unique rather than a shared default that hackers could discover simply by buying the device – and that

manufacturers must have a public point of contact for vulnerabilities to be reported, and state the length of time the item will continue to get security updates.

Smart devices have been hit by a series of security scandals, with connected cameras easily accessed using default passwords that people had forgotten to change. Such basic errors could have a big impact, as billions of web-connected devices are expected to come online in the next few years.

How will it affect you?

Once this assurance scheme is in place, you should be able to check whether a device complies with basic security protections, making it easier to choose the most secure product on offer. In the meantime, a quick



search online should bring up details of any flaws that have been spotted by security researchers.

If you have any smart home devices - such as connected lights, cameras or voice assistants - you should always ensure you set a new password and don't use the supplied default.

What do we think?

It's a shame the government

has to stump up cash to fund such basic security protections, and pass legislation to force companies to be more responsible with their security settings. The technology industry can and should do better.

Google launches scam-detection site

What happened?

Google has partnered with the Cybercrime Support Network to launch Scam Spotter (scamspotter.org), a website designed to help people detect and avoid online scams. According to the website, scammers are set to pilfer \$2bn this year alone. With that in mind, Google highlights three "golden rules" we should abide by to keep our money and data safe.

Rule number one, "Slow it down", explains how criminals - both online and in the real world - often seek to pressure you with a sense of urgency that clouds your judgement. "Spot check" highlights the need to verify anyone claiming to be contacting you from apparently official sources, such as your bank. Finally, "Stop! Don't send" reveals why you should be suspicious of demands for immediate on-the-spot payments (asking you to send money via gift cards and vouchers is a red flag). Each rule is accompanied by example messages, to help you recognise these scams out in the wild.

However, there's more to Scam Spotter than just a set of rules. The website is also packed with tips on how to spot and swerve a whole range of scams - each one neatly laid out and divided into clear sections according to the three golden rules.

There are also tips for avoiding scams



related to the coronavirus, alongside evergreen classics such as the 'Nigerian prince' emails. Scams also feature a 'share this tip' button, so you can send them on to susceptible friends and family members.

How will it affect you?

No matter how impervious to online fraud you think you are, cybercriminals are always working hard to stay one step ahead, so, it's worth visiting Google's site if only for a refresher course. While you're there, be sure to take the Scam Spotter quiz, which displays a series of potentially fake

messages (many will be familiar to anyone who's been online in the last 20 years) and asks you to decide whether they are safe or a scam. We got them all right, of course!

What do we think?

While 'stay safe online' sites are nothing new, Scam Spotters is one of the best. Visually appealing, uncluttered and easy to digest, it's ideal for all ages, though it is predominantly targeted at US web users (with references to dollars and IRS scams). We hope that with Google's involvement, vast numbers of users will be drawn to the site.



Evercade

Retro games console Evercade is a gift for anyone keen to indulge in some gaming nostalgia. Looking like a cross between a Game Boy and a Game Gear, this dinky handheld console features a colour 4.3in, 480 x 272p screen that's comfortable to hold, with control buttons that feel tight and responsive. Blaze, the company behind Evercade, has hinted that button remapping may come in the future - it needs to, because some games don't fit the current layout.

There's also the option to connect the portable unit to your TV via the mini HDMI port, though resolution is capped at 720p and playing in TV mode is also prone to the occasional audio drop-out and stutter. Battery

life clocks in at around 4 to 5 hours, which isn't amazing but is certainly enough for a decent session.

True to the retro spirit of the Evercade, the system uses game cartridges. Official collections from some of the big names in the video game world, including Namco, Atari, Data East and Interplay, are available,

with a catalogue totalling 122

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Before you roll your eyes in expectation of the usual slew of fillers that make up many retro collections, we're pleased to announce that there's a serious amount of quality here. Look out for Double Dragon, Asteroids, Pac Man,

Earthworm Jim and Dig Dug.

Currently, there are 10 cartridges available at a cost of £15 each. For the full Evercade experience, you'll want them all. More games are slated for release later this year, and we wouldn't be surprised to see Sega join the ranks.

The Evercade went on sale on 5 June. A £60 standard starter pack comes with the 11-game Namco

> Collection 1 cartridge, while the premium edition includes Namco, Interplay and Atari cartridges for £80. We've reviewed Evercade's accompanying website on page 15.





WHAT'S THE RUMOUR

Is Apple about to launch AR glasses?

It's long been rumoured that Apple is beavering away at its California base to create augmented-reality glasses, to show the muchmaligned Google Glass how it's done. We've caught glimpses of possible patents stretching back as far as five years. Now, one well-connected source has suggested the mysterious project finally has a name: Apple Glass.

In a YouTube video (bit.ly/ appleglass503), Jon Prosser dropped tons of details about Apple's AR glasses - apparently much to the company's chagrin. Alongside the potential (and wholly unoriginal) name, the tech journalist also claimed the base model will cost \$499 (around £403) plus the cost of your prescription. That's expensive, but not nearly as bad as fans feared, given that Apple typically charges a grand for a smartphone.

Prosser also claimed that, like the original Apple Watch, the device will offload all processes to a connected iPhone. Mindful of legal ramifications, the YouTuber says images of a plastic prototype show a more traditional approach. Due to privacy concerns, there's no built-in camera, and the device is controlled via gestures or on your phone. It's believed the wirelessly charged release version will be metal. There are even whispers of a Steve Jobs-style legacy edition.

It's not known precisely when the



glasses will be launched. However, Prosser states that a 'One More Thing' announcement is set to be made at the iPhone 12 event, due to take place towards the end of this year or at the start of 2021, and that Apple Glass will hit the shelves the following year.

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LIKELIHOOD RATING

Apple Glass seems very likely. Lately, Prosser has been spot-on with his leaks and Apple has, according to the presenter, been investigating him to find out how he's getting confidential information. The company has spent much of its post-Jobs era searching for a killer branddefining app or device. If these rumours are true, Apple Glass could be it.



EasyJet to be sued over customer data breach

Budget airline carrier EasyJet fell victim to a hack that exposed the personal



details of nine million customers. The company admitted that "highly sophisticated" hackers had breached its systems, accessing email addresses and travel details held by the organisation. A "very small subset of users" - up to 2,208 - also had their credit card details exposed.

EasyJet said it has seen "no evidence" that the stolen data has been misused, but has contacted affected customers and asked them to be cautious of any unsolicited communications purporting to come from EasyJet or EasyJet Holidays.

Commenting on the data breach, EasyJet CEO Johan Lundgren said:

"We take the cybersecurity of our system very seriously and have robust security measures in place. However, this is an evolving threat as cyber-attackers get ever more sophisticated."

The airline is now facing an £18bn class-action lawsuit, because although EasyJet announced the breach on 19 May, the incident occurred four months earlier in January. If successful, each affected customer could receive a payout of £2,000.

Beware of phishing emails containing Excel macros

Microsoft has warned of a "massive" phishing campaign that uses coronavirus-themed emails to deliver



attachments containing malicious Excel 4.0 macros. These malware-laced emails, which have the subject line "WHO COVID-19 SITUATION REPORT," claim to

come from the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security, according to Microsoft.

"The COVID-19 themed campaign started on May 12 and has so far used several hundreds of unique attachments," said Microsoft's Security Intelligence team in a series of urgent tweets. If opened, the emails' attached Excel files show a security warning and graph purporting to display coronavirus cases. But if they're allowed to run, the malicious macros download and run NetSupport Manager, a tool that Microsoft's security team says "is known for being abused by attackers to gain remote access to and run commands on compromised machines." The phishing attack then connects to a server that sends commands to the hacked PC.

Web users are advised to delete any such emails immediately and never to open unsolicited attachments.

Advancements in cyberthreats are constantly

evolving and one of the key issues that companies face in trying to deal with them is that threats can come from within an organisation itself or from a remote location, from unknown parties.

Locating the source of a cyberthreat is only half the battle because you also need to put into place prevention methods for the future, as well as implement damage control wherever possible.

Cyberthreats can be unintentional (caused by untrained or inattentive employees, software upgrades or maintenance and equipment failures) or intentional, with a specific function that is often critical.



Understanding cyberthreats helps companies avoid the costly repercussions of a security breach encrypted devices. Ideally,

Knowing what types of cyberthreats they might face helps companies better understand how to protect themselves, their customers and their data, and avoid the reputational damage and costly repercussions of a security breach.

The best way to protect data is to encrypt it, and companies should ensure they manage their encryption keys securely for all

data needs to be encrypted from a file level to a cloud level, with systems in place to prevent encrypted file transfer.

It's important to remember that cloud solutions do not provide ultimate protection; they provide a further level of recovery, but data should always be further backed up through third-party cybersecurity software.



Available via a new section of the supermarket's website, you can buy a box in just a few clicks, for £30, delivery included. While you get a flavour of what's inside the box, the list of pre-selected products varies and you have just 30 minutes to change your mind after placing an order. This is clearly explained on the site, with the FAQ answering most questions, and you can always pop back to check availability.

This marvellous Google Earth map by Professor Pete Stollery captures the COVID-19 soundscape by gathering recordings from across the world, from empty city centres to tannoy announcements and the weekly #clapforourcarers. Click a location name or map marker to zoom in, hear a place's sound and read a summary of where and when it was captured. Alternatively, click Present for an audio tour of the 168 recordings and submit your own through the

Sound Scotland website (bit.ly/sound503). You need to use Chrome or Edge on your

desktop, or the Google Earth app on your mobile device to access the sound map.

Need a specific sound effect to use in a personal or educational project or just fancy a sonic diversion? Then delve into the BBC's brilliant online archive of more than 16,000 audio snippets you can play in your browser and download for free, ranging from a few seconds in length to several minutes. As well as famous audio snippets such as Neil Armstrong's "That's one small step for (a) man..." and John Swigert's "Houston, we've had a problem", the free downloads include strange beeps and blips, lift-off samples and countdowns, and spooky Martian winds and "dinks" recorded by the InSight Lander. The audio files are available in MP3 and M4R format, and there's a link to NASA's excellent Soundcloud page (soundcloud .com/nasa), where you'll find podcasts, documentaries and much more.

Prepare for the next Google rejig

Google has announced a significant shake-up of its search results, though not until next year. This gives us plenty of time to get up to speed and adjust our



websites to prepare for the change. According to the official Google Webmaster Central

This is a combined measure of a variety of elements that Google believes users want from websites, such as fast page loading and mobilefriendliness. We test and compare the latest products

Mesh Wi-Fi

With your household locked down and everyone at home all day, you need strong Wi-Fi in every room. We test 19 mesh Wi-Fi systems to find the best kits for a stable connection

ost ISP routers manage to provide a Wi-Fi signal that's strong enough to reach from one room to another. However, if your telephone socket isn't positioned in a conveniently central spot in your home, your router may be relegated to a far corner or distant hallway, scuppering the signal in some areas of your property.

In these situations, mesh Wi-Fi provides a solution. This clever system connects to your existing modem or router and creates its own network of devices to extend your Wi-Fi signal to distant places it previously failed to reach. You can add more units to the mesh to create a powerful lattice of Wi-Fi signals that always provides exceptionally good reception.

HOW WE TESTED

We connected the base station of each system to our existing router, then added the nodes in appropriate places around the house to provide good coverage. We then took a test laptop to four rooms and recorded the average transfer speed when downloading a series of 100MB files from a NAS appliance, connected directly to the main router via Ethernet. You'll find the results for all 19 in our chart on the opposite page.

Netgear Orbi RBK50 | £299.99 | Buy from Amazon: bit.ly/orbi503

Netgear offers a whole family of Orbi systems and this original model has been available for more than three years. Despite its age, we think the RBK50 is the best of the bunch, unless you're desperate for next-generation 802.11ax (aka Wi-Fi 6) – in which case, be prepared to pay a king's ransom (see review, opposite).

The simple design of the units makes them more attractive than many rivals. Each unit has four Gigabit Ethernet ports, allowing plenty of scope for wired expansion, but the USB port is only there for maintenance, so you can't use it to share devices over the network.

Performance is excellent – in our tests, the Orbi RBK50 averaged lightning speeds of 30MB/s, placing it third overall in our performance tests. This is partly down its tri-band capability, which provides a dedicated 'backhaul' radio channel for the units to communicate with each other.

The RBK50 has fewer features than the Silver Award-winning Asus ZenWiFi, but manages to include all the key network-management tools you're likely to want. The web portal is clean and easy to navigate, with an impressively responsive smartphone app, and offers a handy fingerprint login option. You can also tweak your DHCP, DNS and port-forwarding settings to your heart's content and adjust the wireless channels for

2.4GHz and 5GHz radios, though you can't split them off into separate networks.

The system comes with a built-in VPN server, which lets you connect to your home network from anywhere on the internet using the OpenVPN standard. There are also optional paid-for services, such as Armor (£60 per year), which enables router-level scanning and blocking of malicious sites, and includes a Bitdefender Total Security licence for all your computers and mobile devices. The parental-control tool Circle lets you filter sites by appropriateness, but you have to pay £46 per year for its scheduling tools.

VERDICT ★★★★

The Orbi RBK50 is a brilliant package. Its power put it in the top three performers in this group, the units are more attractive than most and plenty of thought has been put into the design of the interface. It's pricey, particularly with the add-ons, and it's worth noting that it has been cheaper in the past. Prior to lockdown, this two unit pack had dropped to around £250, but we suspect that demand for better Wi-Fi has pushed it back up again. It's worth the high price, though.

Asus ZenWiFi AC | £279.99 Buy from Amazon: bit.ly/asus503

The ZenWiFi AC is an exceptional mesh system. It's even cheaper than the Gold Award-winning Orbi, which is doubly impressive because it's also faster. In fact, it was the fastest 802.11ac kit in this group in all four of our test locations, topping 30MB/s downloads in



The Asus mesh kit comes with plenty of features, including three guest networks, a visual traffic analyser showing which devices are using the most bandwidth and a network-level firewall. There are four Gigabit Ethernet ports and a USB port, into which you can insert and share a hard drive, printer or mobile modem. You can also set up a VPN on it. The only downside is that all this extra functionality could be daunting to casual users.

VERDICT

every room.



The strength of the signal created by the ZenWiFi mesh system should effortlessly power through your walls, and the fast backhaul channel – used by the units to communicate with each other – will have minimal impact on your Wi-Fi. However, setup is a little tricky, so it may be best left to advanced users.

BT Whole Home Wi-Fi | £171.99 Buy from Amazon: bit.ly/bthome503

Most mesh systems are designed to replace your old router but, uniquely in this group, BT's Whole Home Wi-Fi kit works alongside it. You hook up one of the three nodes to your current router via Ethernet, then position the others around your home. They work together as a mesh of



wireless access points for your existing network. As a result, setup requires just a few taps on the smartphone app.

These devices only use dual-band radios, so there's no dedicated frequency for the backhaul. However, BT makes up for it with 2.4GHz and 5GHz hardware that's rated twice as fast as other dual-band systems. This played out in our tests, where it proved its ability to outpace other dual-band systems. Its download speeds of almost 20MB/s across our house is impressive - a 4K Netflix stream only needs 2MB/s.

VERDICT



The price of mesh Wi-Fi can be prohibitive but, because these dual-band models don't have a third radio or extra router tools, they're a brilliant budget option. With this excess fat trimmed off, these lean machines are an affordable alternative to flaky Wi-Fi.

If you glance over to our performance charts on the right, you'll notice the Netgear Orbi WiFi 6 sitting resplendent at the top of the pile, around 25% faster than its next-nearest rival. This mesh system supports the 802.11ax standard, colloquially known as Wi-Fi 6, which is theoretically twice as fast as the previous best



standard, though it's worth bearing in mind that your devices will also need to be Wi-Fi 6-compatible to get the full benefit. However, the Orbi Wi-Fi 6 held its own with 802.11ac equipment, too, keeping pace with our Gold Award-winner.

Have a look at the price, though. That's not a typo - a pair of these devices will cost you as much as a new laptop. It certainly makes the other Orbi and Asus devices look like superb value for money.

VERDICT



If you want the fastest devices around, you'll have to pay for the privilege. There's no denying that this Orbi pushes Wi-Fi further and faster, which may just be worth paying for if you have chronic Wi-Fi problems. For most people, however, you can get a good chunk of the benefit for a fraction of the cost.



OUR VERDICT

We spotted the potential of Netgear's Orbi system from the day it was launched and it still hasn't been toppled from the Gold Award position in our Group Test. Netgear's networking know-how, coupled with simple setup and an easy-to-use interface, has kept this pioneer of mesh technology at the top of the tree.

If you're willing to sacrifice the looks and the ease-of-use, then you can eke a bit more speed from Asus's ZenWiFi AC system. We gave it our Silver Award because we were deeply impressed by the hardware. However, the overall package needs to be improved if it's going to beat the Orbi.

If our top two options are beyond your budget - and there's no denying they are far from cheap - you can still boost a single-router system with BT's Bronze Award winner. This doesn't have the router tools of its rivals but it does all the most important Wi-Fi boosting, and comes with more nodes for a lot less money.



The Security Guard section offers four modules to defend your system from malware tampering: Network Guard, File Guard, Startup Guard and Process Guard. The last two are enabled by default.

"Keeping you safe and secure online is part of Chrome's DNA," said Google as it rolled out improved security and privacy options to its browser. In a major overhaul that makes existing options more readily accessible, it's now easier to manage cookies, permissions and how your data is shared. Head to chrome://settings to begin exploring.

The 'You and Google' section now houses better account sync controls, and the browser also features opt-in Enhanced Safe Browsing and Secure DNS settings, but it's the 'Privacy and security' section that sees the biggest redesign. 'Clear browsing data' is placed within easy reach at the top of the page, and there's a new Safety Check feature that flags dangerous websites and extensions, and compromised passwords, and helps keep Chrome up to date.

Other extras include the ability to block third-party cookies in Incognito mode and a new home for extensions, which keeps your address bar tidy. We'll be taking a closer look at the new privacy features in our next issue.




Copy your clipboard across devices

Clipboard Paste Anywhere (bit.ly/clipboard503) saves you having to email notes and reminders to yourself when you want to get information from your

computer to your phone (and vice versa).

You can copy anything from a web page, then click the extension's toolbar button to view the clipboard. There's a space



To copy an entry, click its overlapping-pages icon or choose Send to share content with other, connected devices. This generates a time-limited code that you can type into the app to access the copied content instantly.

Archive your dormant tabs

The more tabs you have open, the more power Chrome saps from your computer to keep them

Text colour, as you'd expect, is also inverted, but no other swaps are made; it's still the same old Netflix you know, love and can't stop watching. The choice of background colour is a stroke of genius – it brightens up the streaming site while remaining easy on the eye.

Meet Edge's excellent new tools

Microsoft Edge version 83 is out now, and this latest update brings plenty of new features. First up is extension syncing. If you've been running Edge on multiple different devices, your extensions will now be available across all of them - just be sure to switch on Sync in the browser's settings.

Edge's Collections feature adds the ability to drag and drop sites and place multiple websites into your collections by right-clicking a tab, then selecting 'Add all tabs to a new collection'.

On the security side, Microsoft's Defender Smart Screen sees minor improvements. Notably, you can now stop cookies from being deleted from certain websites when closing the browser by visiting edge://settings/clearBrowsingDataOnClose.

Meanwhile, Immersive Reader now supports adverbs under 'Grammar tools', and lets you easily switch between your home, work and school profiles.



'Group tabs & share' (bit.ly/group503) is Microsoft's answer to the question 'How can I send website URLs without using email?'. The name is a little misleading because this isn't an Edge



substitute for Google's recently added Group Tabs feature. The focus here is on sharing.

Using the extension is easy. Websites are listed in the upper pane, where you

can use tick boxes to select individual pages or click the Select All button. You can then copy these to your clipboard or click the WhatsApp, LinkedIn and Microsoft Teams icons to share the links to each service.

At the bottom of the extension window, you can tweak your format preferences. In addition to titles and URLs, 'Group tabs & share' lets you export pages in HTML, CSV and JSON format.

Known as the Surf Game, you cruise across an obstacle-laden sea using only the arrow keys and spacebar. It's not an original idea - the developers openly admit it's based on SkiFree, an old Windows game from 1991 - but it's highly addictive. It's also not above inducing moments of (admittedly slight) panic when you find yourself chased by the Kraken.

Brightly coloured, with a familiar retro pixel style, Surf Game lets you choose from seven different surfers and three distinct game modes. Change game types and check your high scores by clicking the menu button on the startup screen. To play, just visit edge://surf. Hang ten!

Our guide to LiDAR

Augmented reality isn't just for games and silly photo filters. David Crookes looks at the technology that's taking AR to a new level

What is LiDAR?

Dating back to the 1960s, LiDAR - which stands for 'light detection and ranging' is a laser-scanning system that's capable of accurately measuring your immediate environment. It works by emitting a low-power laser light at a target, then recording the time it takes to bounce back - a technique that calculates the span between the sensor and the object to pinpoint the position of surrounding items. As such, the system is used to measure distances and create 3D maps, and will prove crucial in the next wave of augmented-reality apps.

How is it used?

When LiDAR was devised, meteorologists at the National Center for Atmospheric Research in the US used it to measure clouds by transmitting near-infrared laser beams from the bottom of aeroplanes. It's also been put to work creating topological maps and measuring water depth, and has had some high profile successes, such as mapping the Moon during the Apollo 15 mission in 1971 (in the guise of the Apollo Laser Altimeter). The resulting pointclouds (the 3D maps of the surrounding space) were made more accurate by teaming the measurements with GPS

data in the 1980s. It's led to great advances in science.

So it allows for groundbreaking research?

Oh, yes. Researchers have used LiDAR to delve deep into dense jungle to map hidden Mayan cities and, last month, experts from the University of Exeter used the technology to discover 30 prehistoric and Roman settlements, about 20 burial mounds and the remnants of hundreds of medieval quarries, farms and field systems in the South West of England. They did so by studying topographical maps and removing buildings and vegetation from the data to get a clearer picture of the shape of the land.

LiDAR has even been used to monitor daily mosquito activity in Tanzania in an effort to help prevent the spread of malaria. A scanning device situated between three and five metres above ground was able to observe 300,000 insects over a sizable patch of land.

Is this why we're talking about LiDAR now?

Actually, LiDAR has mainly been in the

news because Apple recently unveiled its new iPad Pro, which comes with a LiDAR scanner built into both its 11in and 12.9in models. According to the company, the tablet's depth sensors can measure the distance to surrounding objects located up to five metres away, and the scanner operates at the photon level at nanosecond speeds. Calculations are made via the new, cutting edge 64-bit ARM-based A12Z Bionic processor, which combines the depth points gleaned from the scanner with data from the iPad's cameras and motion sensors. Computer vision algorithms enhance the details of a





COULD LIDAR HELP US SOCIAL DISTANCE?

It's not easy to stay two metres apart from other people when you're out and about, not least because you have to estimate the distance while trying to keep safe (and alert). No surprise to learn, then, that some tech companies are figuring out ways to help. Quanergy (quanergy.com/ products) is looking at a combination of LiDAR and Alperception software to "anonymously track people flows" while measuring the distance between individuals. Created for use in retail locations, transport hubs and other public venues, the technology has been incorporated into a system called SafeDistance by motion-analytics company iinside (iinside.com). Sensors placed within a venue capture the necessary data and trigger alerts when there is the potential for overcrowding, so that venue managers can take action.



recorded scene, allowing for the fast and accurate generation of a 3D model.


Will it be used in phones?

It's likely that Apple will include the LiDAR scanner in the iPhone 12, which should be released later this year (a leak of iOS 14 points towards the feature being available on the Pro and Pro Max versions of the phone). As with the new iPad Pro (which is out now), the technology will go beyond the depth sensors that are currently in the smartphones and put them on a par with professional mapping systems.

The LiDAR system also improves Apple's existing Measure app (bit.ly/ measure503), which uses AR to turn an iPad or iPhone into a tape measure, to make calculating height, depth and length much easier and more accurate.

But why do we need LiDAR?

What we consider to be groundbreaking uses of LiDAR data today are likely to evolve over the coming years, but we can certainly expect to see more fluid AR games right now, as well as apps that let you visualise how a room will look with specific items of furniture in it (such as in the Studio Mode of the IKEA Place app). It will be possible to get speedy measurements and create 2D floor plans alongside 3D recreations of a room.

Apple has also highlighted an app called Complete Anatomy, which allows physiotherapists to measure the progress of their patients.

Will Android devices have LiDAR, too?

Some higher-end Android devices such as the Samsung Galaxy Note 10+ use a similar system called Time-of-Flight, in the form of a DepthVision Lens. This type of camera uses infrared light to measure

the distance from the handset to any objects it can view. However, Time-of-Flight only uses a single wide pulse of light, whereas Apple's LiDAR scanner uses multiple beams for greater accuracy. This makes Apple's approach more suitable for advanced AR, although the Android system works well in

adding depth to portrait photos, creating 3D images and background blurring when coupled with the right software.

Google has its own software development kit called ARCore (developers.google.com/ar), which allows virtual content to be overlaid on realworld visuals via an Android device's camera. However, it remains to be seen whether it will now create another system that uses LiDAR. Much is likely to depend on how successful Apple's involvement with the technology proves.

Will other consumer tech include LiDAR?

Most likely. In fact, you may have heard LiDAR mentioned in relation to

autonomous vehicles, as makers have been experimenting with the technology to see how effective it is at detecting and avoiding obstacles. By mounting a device on top of the vehicle, self-driving cars can use the 360-degree view of the surroundings to record the many thousands of laser pulses being emitted and reflected back as they trundle down the road. This builds into a 3D representation of the various points in rapid time, increasing safety and allowing

the vehicle to carry out crucial moves, such as braking or stopping when danger is sensed.

Tesla boss Elon Musk, however, calls LiDAR "a fool's errand" and, at a press conference last year, said: "Anyone relying on LiDAR is doomed. Doomed!

They are expensive sensors that are unnecessary." Tesla cars use radar, GPS, maps and ultrasonic sensors among other technology, as an alternative.

STOP GOOGLE & AMAZON SPYING ON YOU



Google and Amazon's apps and smart devices are getting cleverer by the day, but that's because they know so much about you. **Jane Hoskyn** reveals how to limit the snooping without giving up the tools you love



uring the coronavirus lockdown, we've become more reliant than ever on the tech giants to help us stay informed and keep in touch with loved ones. Imagine spending all these weeks under house arrest without Amazon's online shopping, streaming video service and ebooks, or Google's search and messaging tools, and mobile devices.

But the more we use their apps, the more these companies know about us and our habits, tastes, movements and even our intimate conversations. They exploit our personal secrets to shape their products, target us with adverts and even hobnob with government bodies - and hackers are always waiting to intercept the data.

So should we give up these useful tools? Of course not - they make life easier and just plain better. Instead, we can tweak their settings to stop them invading our privacy. In this feature, we show you how to view and delete the data your smart devices and apps have collected, then dramatically limit the information they can track and gather in future.

PREVENT SMART DEVICES FROM PRYING ON YOU



Stop Google's smart speakers spying on you

Google's Home and Nest AI-powered smart speakers let you control all manner of connected

devices around your house. Your wish, spoken out loud and picked up by the speaker's built-in microphone, is the device's command. With a quick "OK Google" and a few words ('Actions'), you can change TV channels, dim your smart lightbulbs, check the weather, play music and even order a takeaway from the local Chinese.

The Google Home (newer devices are called Nest) is a brilliant innovation that's made life much easier for people stuck indoors, not only for lockdown reasons. But there's a clear privacy downside to having an always-on microphone in your living room, kitchen or - yikes! - bedroom. The speaker's mic doesn't magically switch on when you speak, it has to be listening out for you all the time. And it records what it hears, and sends it back to the company servers, where Google employees listen to the recordings (bit.ly/ghome503).

The official line from Google is that these recordings are essential for improving its products, but that doesn't make it any less creepy. And your Home

or Nest is recording more than it should, according to a recent report which found that smart speakers accidentally record up to 19 times a day (bit.ly/ smartrec503). Sometimes it's triggered by TV dialogue, which is actually rather amusing, and sometimes by very private conversations, which is not funny at all.

To banish Google's eavesdropping without having to give up your smart speaker or disable the mic, go to your Google account's Activity Controls page on your PC or device (bit.ly/activity503) and untick 'Include voice and audio recordings'. This blocks voice recording via other sources, including Chrome, as well as via Home. Untick 'Include Chrome history and activity from sites, apps and devices that use Google services' to stop Google saving activity from right across your account.




Delete all Google's recordings of your voice

You don't need a fancy smart speaker to find that your voice is being

stored on Google's servers, because Google's voice-activated technology is already on your Android phone or tablet, in the form of Google Assistant. It's listening in case you ever say "OK Google" (or "Hey Google"), and may have been eavesdropping on and recording you for years.

To view and blitz these recordings, open Assistant and tap the compass icon to launch Explore. Tap your profile photo, then Settings and 'Your data in the Assistant'. Scroll down to 'Voice and audio recordings', 'See and delete activity'. This takes you to My Activity (bit.ly/myact503). Select 'Voice and

Audio' from the list, then go through your recordings, clicking 'details' to play them and using the bin icons to delete.

It's worth knowing that Assistant is no longer a compulsory feature on Android. If you don't use it, get rid of it. You can uninstall it via Apps in Settings. Also, go to Voice Match in Settings (under Google, 'Account services', 'Search, Assistant & voice') and switch off the Hey Google toggle, which is on by default.




Stop Amazon employees listening to your Alexa recordings

Amazon's Echo speakers respond to the word "Alexa" - which triggers the Alexa voice assistant - and then obey your

commands. Alexa's app does the same thing on your phone and tablet (bit.ly/ alexa503) and, as with Google, Amazon employees around the world listen to your voice recordings (bit.ly/listen503). The official reason is that this is to improve Alexa's speech recognition. Meanwhile Google and Amazon are evolving their smart speakers to glean data that's ever-more personal - and also happens to be valuable to advertisers (bit.ly/patents503).

You can minimise Echo's snooping with a couple of Settings tweaks in the Alexa app. Go to Alexa Privacy, Manage Your Alexa Data, then toggle off 'Use Voice Recordings to Improve Amazon Services to Develop New Features' to block the corporate eavesdropping.





If you're not happy to 'Help improve Alexa' by letting Amazon employees eavesdrop on you, switch off 'Use Voice

Recordings'

voice recordings is manually reviewed.

To hear and delete your voice recordings, go to Alexa Privacy, Review Voice History. On the same screen, toggle on 'Enable deletion by voice' to make Alexa delete the day's recordings when you tell it to do so out loud.



Stop your smart doorbell spying on you

Ring, the smart video doorbell owned by Amazon, works with Alexa to let you see who's at the door before you get off the sofa, or

even while you're away from home. This is great for security but also a potential privacy risk. Amazon records every motion Ring detects, so it knows when you go out, when you get home, who visits, how long they stay for – and what you all look and sound like. Privacy campaigners are not impressed (bit.ly/doorbell503).

Amazon responded to the outcry by adding a new Control Centre privacy dashboard to the Ring app (ring.com/gettheapp) that lets you opt out of personalised ads (enabled by default), manage linked devices and accounts, and deadlock Ring with two-factor authentication (2FA), so strangers can no longer access your data simply by creating a second login. There's no option to prevent recordings from being stored and nothing about encryption.

Google's Nest Hello smart doorbell (bit.ly/nesthello503) has better privacy credentials. Mozilla's 'Privacy not included' site gives Ring just 2 out of 5 for privacy (bit.ly/ringpriv503), while Nest scores 5 out of 5 (bit.ly/nestpriv503), not least because it comes with encryption and 2FA by default. The Nest app (bit.ly/nest503),

which also governs the brand's smart thermostats and smoke alarms, links to Google Activity Controls via Settings, so you can ban activity storage by unticking 'Include Chrome history and activity from sites, apps and devices that use Google services'.



Stop Amazon spying on your TV habits


Amazon is

watching you watch TV, and it's taking detailed notes. As Amazon admits in its Fire TV privacy settings FAQ (bit.ly/firetv503), the streaming device gathers data about when you watch, how you move around the home screen and what

language, display and internet settings you choose. The usual "improve services" justification is given, but it also mentions marketing uses.

Until a few months ago, there was nothing you could do to limit the snooping, but Amazon has now added two new privacy sections to Preferences in Fire TV Settings. First, go to Privacy Settings and turn off Device Usage Data, Collect App Usage Data and Interest-based Ads. Then go to Data Monitoring and tap to turn it off.

If you're a Prime Video user, you'll already know Amazon keeps note of everything you watch, and uses the info to persuade you to watch similar stuff. What you might not be aware of is that the data may also be shared with

advertising partners. To clear your watch history, albeit one entry at a time, go to your Watch History (bit.ly/ watched503) and scroll through the list clicking 'Hide this' to expunge items completely. To clear your video search history, open the Prime Video app (bit .ly/primeapp503) and tap My Stuff, Settings, Clear Video Search History.



Stop your Kindle spying on your reading habits

Amazon takes a lot more interest in your Kindle activity than


merely noting that you're browsing for books about garden sheds. The company also records, stores, uses and shares the location of your Kindle (or device with the Kindle app installed, bit.ly/kindle503); the times you start and stop reading; which books and

sections you share via other apps; and even which sentences you highlight and copy to your device's clipboard.

Amazon claims it doesn't share the insights gleaned from your reading habits with third parties, but the company recently signed a deal with the NHS that could have serious implications for your privacy (see box on page 44).

Some Kindle users have opted to download pirated books that bypass Amazon's approved file formats and hoodwink its monitoring, but there are safer ways to beat the spy system. If you only use Kindle software on one device, whether that's an Amazon device or your phone or tablet, then untick Whispersync in Settings. Whispersync keeps your reading position synced between devices, but it's also responsible for much of Amazon's reading over your shoulder.

PROTECT YOUR PRIVACY FROM MOBILE APPS

Block apps from using your microphone or camera

Revoking access to your device's microphone or camera (or both) dramatically limits snooping by Google, Amazon and their partner companies. In Android Settings, tap Apps then 'App permissions' or 'Permissions manager'. Select 'Microphone permissions', then toggle off the apps that don't need mic access to work properly. Most don't. Only your camera app and messaging apps need it, plus a digital assistant if you use one. Now tap 'Camera permissions', and only allow apps that

> you use to take photos or record videos.

The 'App permissions' list also lets you revoke access to

your location, call logs, calendar, body sensors and more. 'Additional permissions' reveals even sneakier spy strategies, including permission to read your instant messages and track your vehicle information.


Stop your fitness tracker sharing your health data

Google follows you everywhere, literally, with its fitness-tracking app Google Fit (google.com/fit). This turns your smartphone into a powerful health monitor that stores basic data such as your height, weight and age; measures your steps, distance and expended calories; and links to third-party wearables to measure blood pressure, heart rate and so on. And it's set to get even more powerful, following Google's \$2.1bn purchase of fitness tracker Fitbit (bit.ly/fitbit503).

But do you really want all that data - plus the details of everywhere you've walked - added to the vast trove of info Google already holds on you? You could banish Google Fit's snooping by disabling activity tracking and mapping in Settings (tap Profile then the cog), but this would stop the app measuring your everyday movements. It's worth doing, though, if you value your privacy and want to use Fit only for measuring certain events, such as a long weekly walk in the countryside.

If you do want to use Fit every day, you can still limit Google's data-

Clear your tracks by removing some or all of the data Google Fit has stored to your account



gathering by tapping 'Configure diagnostics' in Settings, then switching off that option. You should also clear some or all Fit-measured data from your Google account. To do this, tap 'Manage your data' and go through the dozen measurements, including 'Move minutes', 'Basal metabolic rate' and 'Calories expended', tapping each bin icon to delete that data. Finally, tap 'Manage connected apps', then Disconnect to stop other apps accessing your Fit data.

To lock down Google's locationstalking even further, head for 'Privacy Check-up' (bit.ly/checkup503) and



switch off automatically enabled tracking such as App Activity and Location History.

Stop Amazon selling your shopping secrets

One day you're looking at hedge trimmers on the Amazon shopping app or website and the next, you're seeing ads for hedge trimmers on every single site you visit. To cut this commercial stalking, disable Amazon's 'interestbased' ads permissions via its website. Click Accounts & Lists under your name, then 'Advertising preferences', 'Do not show me interest-based ads provided by Amazon' and then Submit. You'll need to do this again whenever you clear your browser's cookies.

To rid your Amazon homepage of irritating (and potentially embarrassing) reminders about recent purchases, weed them out via the Improve Your Recommendations page (bit.ly/ improve503).

Google offers a more wholesale opt-out of targeted ads. First, switch off the 'Ad personalisation' toggle at adssettings.google.com, then click Advanced and untick 'Also use your activity and information from Google services...'. Open your Android Settings app and go to Google, Ads, and switch on 'Opt out of Ads Personalisation'.

Untick Amazon's 'interestbased ads' setting to stop Amazon broadcasting the contents of your shopping basket



Go incognito when using **Google Maps**

Where have you been? Here's where: bit.ly/timeline503. Sign in as prompted, and Google will plot your movements on a Timeline map, in red dots, for all the months and years since you've had a device with Google Maps installed. It's wonderful and terrifying in equal measures.

You can pause Google's Timelinebuilding activities by launching Maps in Incognito mode, which stops any data being saved to your Location History.

Tap your profile photo in the Maps app, then 'Turn on Incognito mode'. To load your Location History map on your phone or tablet, tap 'Your data in Maps', then 'See and delete activity'.

Be aware that going incognito in Maps doesn't stop Google tracking your location, because Android has many system-wide location trackers. Go to Settings, 'Biometrics and security', Location to either switch off Location tracking completely or to check which apps have requested location access. If any of them make you uncomfortable, you can revoke access in Google Maps' Permissions in the 'Apps & notifications' section of the Settings app.

ARE YOUR HEALTH SECRETS IN SAFE HANDS?

Google and Amazon no longer just share your data with advertisers - they're now sharing it with the NHS. At the time of writing, the NHS hasn't confirmed if it will or won't use Google's coronavirus contact-tracing system. The government rejected the app in April and is trialling an independent tool, but it's reportedly conducting a feasibility study into Google's involvement


Amazon, meanwhile, has signed a deal to let the NHS and Alexa plunder each other for people's health data (bit.ly/alexanhs503). This is on top of Amazon sharing your info with other businesses and, according to privacy campaigners, the police (bit.ly/ampriv503).

Responding to complaints about the NHS deal, Amazon said: "Customer trust is of the utmost importance. Customers are in control of their voice history. They can review and delete voice recordings in the Alexa app."

Yes, but only if they know their data is being used in this way, which most people don't. Deals between vital government agencies and globally powerful

tech providers will become the norm the tech giants run the best digital services in the world, after all. So it has never been more important to understand how they collect and use your data, and how you can limit what they know and share.






STOP GOOGLE TRACKING YOUR TYPING

Stop Google's keyboard logging what you type

Google's Android keyboard Gboard (bit.ly/gboard503) is part keyboard, part new best friend and part privacy-




It's also worth stripping Gboard of a few permissions. By default, it has access to your contacts, location, microphone and more. Head to Gboard's Permissions in the 'Apps & notifications' section of the Android Settings app and switch these off.

Stop Google reading your Gmail messages

Google doesn't need keylogging software to know what you're typing, it just reads your Gmail messages. That was the gist of a 2018 Wall Street Journal exposé entitled 'Tech's Dirty Secret' (bit.ly/dirty503), which revealed that Google scans your emails for info about upcoming trips, recent purchases and more.


Google insists none of this info is used to target ads, but to improve Gmail. For example, it's how Google knows to add an Unsubscribe link above newsletters. Even so, Gmail is adding increasingly intrusive features such as 'Nudges', which remind you to reply to a message that Google judges to be important.

To disable these features, go to Gmail Settings, General, then switch off Smart



Compose (a kind of predictive text), Smart Reply, Auto-correct and Nudges. If you're still creeped out, you can delete Gmail completely (and download your entire Gmail archive) via bit.ly/ dashboard503.

If you're a Gmail user, you may recently have noticed the appearance of Meet (meet.google.com), Google's Zoom-rivalling video-chat service, which is now integrated into the desktop version of Gmail. You can launch it instantly by clicking 'Start a meeting'. However, before you get carried away and reveal more than you bargained for to the search giant, click the three vertical dots in the video window, then Settings, General, and untick 'Report additional diagnostics' to prevent Google gathering information about your Meet usage.

Best free online image editors

Depending on your skill level, those similarities are both good and bad news. At first glance, the layout looks nearly identical: image settings and options run along the top, with a bewildering number of tools on the left. If you're familiar with Adobe's august image editor, you'll feel right at home; if you're unversed in the art of Photoshop, you'll need time to experiment with these elements, even if it's just hovering over each tool to see what it actually is.

Understanding what Photopea can do is part of the fun, because it can do a lot – and that, too, is both good and bad news. Most people use online image editors for quick picture fixes and Photopea gives you those options, but it also bundles loads of expert tools, which can feel overwhelming. However, if you get to grips with this versatility, you'll find yourself producing impressively professional creations.

As well as providing tools for standard image editing, Photopea also comes packed with a huge array of templates. You can even give your

social-media profiles a visual makeover by selecting specially sized canvases designed for different platforms. These can then be customised by switching out images and adding stylised text. You can open a massive range of supported file types, and the selection of export formats is just as vast.

Arguably, Photopea's best feature is that it offers a great Photoshop alternative for older, slower computers.

How it could be improved:

It may take some time to fall in love with Photopea. Given its similarity to Photoshop, there's a steeper learning curve than with the other online image editors in this Group Test. Thankfully,

there's a whole host of tutorials on the website (www.photopea.com/tuts), with new articles added regularly. The main

there's a whole host of tutorials on the website (www.photopea.com/tuts), with new articles added regularly. The main drawback is that Photopea can fall between two stools: too oblique for regular users yet trying to attract Photoshop aficionados who may have no need for an online alternative.

OUR VERDICT

This stunning online image editor has all the tools with none of the cost. Photopea may overwhelm at first, but take time to learn its ways and you'll soon be doing far more than simply removing red-eye.

PixIr X - the personal counterpart to the more professional PixIr E - is pleasingly minimalist. Its deceptively sleek design provides plenty to get stuck

into without overwhelming the user. Hover over any of the sidebar tools to see one of PixIr's best mini-features: the keyboard shortcut key.

Basic tools include altering contrasts and making images smoother or sharper. You can also apply a good range of filters. Slightly more advanced are features such as Cutout, which let you crop elements of the image or remove backgrounds. None of these are particularly tricky to use - they just require a steady hand.

When uploading an image, you're offered a choice of resolutions, from Ultra HD to the web-friendly 1,280 pixels. This should, according to PixIr, help minimise lag when working on a project. Alternatively, you can also specify a custom size.

Exporting deserves a special shoutout: click Save and you're able to set the



image quality of your project with the easy-to-use slider.

How it could be improved:

PixIr X covers basic and intermediate editing tools, with file types for saving and exporting limited to JPG, PNG, WEBP and PXD. That won't be an issue for most casual users, but this isn't the right choice if you want to make seriously advanced tweaks to pictures.

OUR VERDICT

Quick and dependable, PixIr X has enough features to satisfy most users. Were it not for Photopea's impressive Photoshop clone, it would have won our Gold Award.

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BEST OF THE REST

Polarr

The more advanced Polarr is ideal for touching up images. That's not to say it's incapable of anything else, but exporting your photos is a

mixed bag. On the one hand. you're limited to saving images as



JPG, PNG and TIF. On the other hand, there's support for batch saves, adding watermarks and removing metadata using the toggle switches. The stand-out feature is its facial recognition, which makes touch-ups super easy.

There's a lot to like about Fotor, not least the '1-tap enhance', which

turns editing into a quick-click process. Its provision of stickers



adds some fun to the proceedings, but we're less keen on its inclusion of premium options in among the free ones. Accidentally choosing one of these can be frustrating, since it plasters an unsightly watermark across your cherished photos. Even some basic editing tools are locked behind this paywall.

Sumopaint

Sumopaint occupies a safe middleground between basic and advanced use - its layout is lacking in finesse but is intuitive to navigate. Many of Sumopaint's tools are variations on the same theme: draw on your pictures. Adding coloured stars or brushstrokes has never been so easy, though we question just how popular or necessary these are. Beyond that, there's a good array of filters and image adjustment is excellent.

We've long been fans of LunaPic, which offers basic photo editing in your browser and has all the classic tools to crop, rotate and toy with colour and contrast at will.

Upload your image to view key information such as file size, file type and image quality. Crucially, these can be modified simply by clicking the accompanying link - if you're after quick and simple edits, this is far simpler than wading through myriad menus.

Where LunaPic stands out is with its filters and effects, ranged across the top of the screen. Hovering over each of the seven options displays a long (arguably too long) list of additional effects, including an animation section for turning cherished pictures into GIFs or overlaying them with, for instance, an old time-y movie effect.

Once you've created your masterpiece, use the buttons at the bottom to either save it or instantly share it to your social-media accounts.



How it could be improved:

If you thought PixIr X was too rudimentary, LunaPic isn't for you because it's inescapably simple in function, although it has an overwhelming selection of effects to choose from. These are text-based, with no visual cues, so you'll just have to experiment to see which ones you like.

OUR VERDICT

LunaPic is good for quick edits and great when you want to get more creative with your snaps. It's easy to use but requires some playing around with the hundreds of effects to find the perfect one.

The Internet Archive is an incredible source of vintage freebies, but it's also sprawling in design. Wayne Williams reveals the site's many highlights in our two-part A-to-Z guide



he Internet Archive (archive.org) started life back in 1996, with the ambitious goal of archiving the internet. Today, it contains copies of more than 430 billion web pages, accessible through its famous Wayback Machine tool. But that's just a fraction of what you'll find on the site.

The archive features millions of books and texts, audio and video recordings, images, software and games, and

much much more, with most of the content available to access and even download for free. It's an amazing repository, but its rather dated and slow design is crammed with so much content that it can be a nightmare to browse.


In this two-part feature, we help you navigate the brilliant mess of the Internet Archive by revealing its best content and tools, all neatly organised alphabetically. Please let us know if we've missed any of your favourite finds.

The Internet Arcade (bit.ly/intarc503) has a fantastic collection of more than



1,700 arcade games from the 1970s to the 1990s that you can play directly in your web browser. Titles on offer include Defender, Paperboy, Tetris, Zaxxon and Pitfall II.

BOOKS

CARTOONS

The Vintage Cartoons collection (bit.ly/ cartoons503) includes early black-and-white animated cartoons from 1910 onwards, as

well as newer colour ones, featuring a huge range of popular characters such as Tom & Jerry, Popeye, The Pink

Panther, Bugs Bunny, Felix the Cat, Betty Boop and Mickey Mouse.

CD-ROMS

In the early 1990s, CD-Roms took over from floppy disks as the main way to distribute software. The Internet Archive's CD-ROM Software Library



(bit.ly/cdrom503) contains over 20,000 items covering operating systems, programs, coverdiscs and more. There's even an AOL CD-Rom Collection (bit.ly/aolcd503).

COMPUTER MAGAZINES

The Computer Magazine Archives at bit.ly/compmag503 includes thousands of issues of classic tech titles including BYTE, Amiga Format, Amiga Computing, CU Amiga, Crash, Zzap!64, MacWorld, Sinclair User, Your Sinclair, Amstrad Action and PC Magazine. You can read the magazines directly in your browser.



ARTWORK

You'll find images and art scattered far and wide across the Internet Archive, but there's also a specific collection (bit.ly/image503) of images uploaded by users. These include space images, artwork, maps and photos from Flickr.

AUDIOBOOKS

There are hundreds of free audiobooks to be found in the archive, including in the Audio Library and Talking Books collection (bit.ly/audlib503), which offers works by F Scott Fitzgerald, Leo Tolstoy, Agatha Christie, Frederick Forsyth and more. The LibriVox Free Audiobook Collection (bit.ly/libri503) features recordings made by volunteers.

CONSOLES

The Console Living Room (bit.ly/ console503) is a collection of games console titles you can play in your browser. Sorted into categories such as Atari 7800, Sega Genesis, PlayStation (PSX) and Amstrad GX-4000, the games on offer include Mortal Kombat, Sonic the Hedgehog, Golden Axe, Worms and Sensible Soccer. Nintendo is very protective of its copyright, so its titles are conspicuously absent.



DECENTRALISED VERSION


Although the Internet Archive has been around for many years, there's the danger that it could one day get taken down as a result of copyright claims, censorship or DDoS (Distributed Denial of Service) attacks. For that reason, the developers have created a decentralised - or distributed - version of its site at dweb.archive.org. This is delivered using peer-to-peer connections, so it's much slower, but it provids a way to access content when the main site isn't available for some reason.

Doom is the great granddaddy of the modern first-person shooter, and there's plenty of content related to the game (and Doom II) at the Internet Archive. Browse the Doom Level CD Collection (bit.ly/doom503) for levels, game editors, shareware releases and more.

DOS PROGRAMS

If you're seeking software from the 1990s, the Internet Archive has several fantastic collections to explore, such as Software Library: MS-DOS (bit.ly/ msdos503), and spin-offs Software Library: MS-DOS Games (bit.ly/ dosgame503) and Software Library:



MS-DOS Showcase (bit.ly/doscase503). The programs can be run in a browser.

ENCARTA

Pre-Wikipedia, the go-to encyclopaedia for your PC was Microsoft Encarta. The archive includes CD versions of Encarta 1994 (bit.ly/94enc503), Encarta 1997, (bit.ly/97enc503) and Encarta 1998 (bit .ly/98enc503), as well as other versions. The software comes in ISO format.

EPHEMERAL FILMS

Ephemeral films are non-fiction movies of their time, typically created for educational, industrial or



promotional purposes. The collections in this category (bit.ly/ephe503) include Educational Films, A/V Geeks, Drive-In Movie Ads and British Government Public Information Films.

FILM NOIR

The 1940s and 1950s were the golden age for Film Noir - Hollywood crime

movies featuring chainsmoking private eyes and doublecrossing



femme fatales. You can enjoy a number of these for free through the site's Film Noir collection (bit.ly/noir503). There's also a Film Noir Favourite section (bit.ly/ noirfav503).

FIRMWARE

Firmware is essentially the software found on a hardware device's ROM. It's so called because it stays "firmly" in place. You can find ROMs, Firmware and chip dumps from a wide variety of sources in the Firmware Library (bit.ly/ firm503).

Whether you're looking for arcade games (see A), console



games (see C), DOS games or PC or Mac games, you're spoiled for choice on the Internet Archive. A good place to start is the Classic PC Games collection (bit.ly/classicpc423) which includes freeware, shareware and demos.

GAMESMASTER

Remember the Dominik Diamond/ Dexter Fletcher-hosted *GamesMaster*? The Channel 4 programme ran from


1992 to 1998, and was the first UK TV show dedicated to computer and video games. If you fancy a hit of nostalgia (or want to experience it for



the first time), browse the collection of episodes at bit.ly/gmaster503 and rediscover the joy of Patrick Moore as the squishy-headed title character.

HANDHELD GAMES

We've mentioned that the Internet Archive has a section for living-room games consoles, but it also has one for handheld games. The Handheld History page (bit.ly/hheld503) has dedicated games for Pac-Man, Donkey Kong, and Sonic the Hedgehog, but also includes Tamagotchi, Speak & Spell, Simon and Merlin. The games play in your browser.



HISTORY

Much of the archive is dedicated to history. Whatever you're looking for, there's likely to be a category covering it. If you're just interested in history in general, the Natural History Museum Library, London collection (bit.ly/ nhml503) is a great place to start with journals, bulletins and books.

RAO WAR

You'll find all sorts of media for most of the major wars in the archive. The Iraq War Collection (bit.ly/iraq503) is a compilation of videos, audio clips, text and images focused on the conflict and the events surrounding it.

JAPAN

There's plenty to learn about the Japanese Earthquake of 2011 (bit.ly/jquake503) and other disasters that have hit the country (bit.ly/ japan503). If you're more interested in culture and art from the land of the rising sun, browse The Manga Library

(bit.ly/manga503), but note that it contains some adult content.

JAZZ

There's plenty of jazz content to be found on the Internet Archive. The David W Niven Collection of Early Jazz Legends, 1921-1991 (bit.ly/jazz503) is a great resource in particular and comprises 650 tapes, 1,000 hours and 1,378 WAV files, plus 691 scans of cassette liner cards and literature.



KIDS

There's plenty of content on the site for children to enjoy, including TV shows and magazines. The Children's Library (bit.ly/kids503) has books for kids from around the world although, admittedly,



many of the titles on offer will have more appeal for nostalgic adults than children. We're not sure how captivated today's kids would be by 'Old French Fairy Tales' or 'Vasco da Gama, His Voyages and Adventures'.

LIBRARY

The Open Library (openlibrary.org), run by the Internet Archive, lets you read classic novels and 'borrow' books. Titles available include best sellers from Stephen King, Douglas Adams, Bill Bryson, Tom Clancy, Dan Brown and George RR Martin. You can take out up to five books in one go, but only one person at a time can borrow a book.



LINUX

There's lots of Linux content to be found in the archive, including magazines, books and guides. In addition, the Linux Distribution Archive (bit.ly/linux503) offers various Linux distros from the past 20 years, including Red Hat, Puppy Linux, Ubuntu, Debian and Fedora.

LIVE MUSIC

You'll find live music recordings in all sorts of places across the site, but one of the best collections is the Live Music Archive (bit.ly/livemusic503), which features more than 224,000 entries. You can browse the collection by all artists, this date in history, average review rating and more.

MAGAZINES

We've already covered the Internet Archive's libraries of computer mags, but it also has numerous other magazine collections to browse through in the Magazine Rack (bit.ly/magrack503). There are issues of Starlog, Popular Mechanics, Sports

Illustrated, Smash Hits and Railway Modeller, to name but a handful.



MAGAZINE COVER DISCS

In the olden(ish) days, computer mags came with a coverdisc attached, providing free software, games, demos and videos. The Internet Archive has just under 50 collections of magazine cover discs for titles including PC Format (bit.ly/format503), Computer Buyer (bit.ly/buyer503), PC Review (bit.ly/review503), Amiga Format (bit.ly/amigaf503), Computer Shopper (bit.ly/shopper503) and Linux Format (bit.ly/lformat503).



MANUALS

The Archive.org Manual Library (bit.ly/manual503) is a large collection of manuals, instructions, walkthroughs and datasheets sorted into categories such as computers (hardware and software), consoles, electronics, television, computer games, laptops, tractors, printers and US military.

NASA IMAGES

A search for NASA presents a wealth of results, including audio files and technical documents. Our favourite is NASA Images (bit.ly/nasa504), which offers more than 180,000 photos of space, the Moon, rockets and more.

NEWSPAPERS

The Internet Archive's Newspapers collection (bit.ly/newspapers504) is a

mixed bag. There are various overseas publications, such as the Sydney Morning Herald, and San Francisco Bay Guardian, as well as local UK newspapers including Your Tunbridge Wells and Luton on Sunday.

LISTEN TO VINTAGE RECORDS

The Internet Archive's 78 RPMs and Cylinder Recordings (bit.ly/78rpm503) preserves all manner of digitised gramophone and cylinder recordings from the past. There are more than 230,000 audio recordings available to listen to and download, spanning a variety of genres from 1901 and 1966. Notable artists include Louis Armstrong, Glenn Miller, Dinah Shore, Peggy Lee, Noel Coward, Gracie Fields, Vera Lynn and Frank Sinatra.



Try future Chrome tools today

The Experiments page in Chromium browsers lets you try new tools that are still being tested. Robert Irvine rounds up the best hidden 'flags'

Tab Groups

#tab-groups

As mentioned in last issue's Best New Browser Tools, this 'flag' makes it easier to manage multiple web pages by




organising related tabs into groups. Right-click a tab, choose 'Add to new group' and assign the group a name and colour. You can then add further tabs and move the group to a new browser window. Tab Groups became a live feature in Chrome 83.

If you can't see it, enable it on the Experiments page. You can also activate the Tab Groups Collapse flag to quickly close and reopen your tab groups.

Enable Reader Mode

#enable-reader-mode

Most browsers now include the option to remove clutter from web pages to make them easier to read and print, but in Chrome this is (strangely) still an



experiment. Activate the flag and you can streamline web content on compatible pages by clicking the 'Toggle reader mode' button in

the address bar. Edge already offers this feature with its 'Immersive reader' mode.

Extensions Checkup

#extension-checkup

This new Chrome experiment prompts you to periodically review your extensions to ensure nothing dodgy is installed. Once enabled, a message will appear at the bottom of your New Tab page saying "Safety matters. Take a moment and check your extensions now". Click this to perform the checkup. If you see an add-on you don't recognise or that's accessing your personal data, disable or remove it.

Omnibox tab switch suggestions

#omnibox-tab-switch-suggestions

If you often have lots of tabs open in Chrome or Edge, this flag makes it



easier to find the one you want. Type the first few letters of the site's name in the address bar and click the 'Switch to this tab' button next to your browser's suggestion. Enable the 'Omnibox suggestion button row' experiment to place the 'Switch' button below it, too.

Parallel downloading

#enable-parallel-downloading This Chromium flag speeds up your downloads by grabbing several parts of

a single file simultaneously. Once


enabled, it kicks in automatically for every download that exceeds two seconds, which can make a significant speed difference with very large files.

Focus Mode

#focus-mode

Prevent distractions when you're writing an email or performing other important tasks online by using this experiment to focus your attention on the current tab.

Right-click a tab, choose 'Focus this tab' and the page will open in a new, app-like window with no borders, tabs, address bar or other distractions.



Click the three-dot menu and select 'Open in Chrome' to restore the tab to the main browser.

Smooth Scrolling

#smooth-scrolling

If your browser often feels jerky when you're scrolling through long, contentheavy web pages, try enabling the Smooth Scrolling experiment. This lets you scroll up and down web pages in a faster and more fluid manner. It's turned on by default in Chromium-based Edge.

Force Dark Mode for Web Contents

#enable-force-dark

The Chrome app for Android now offers a dark mode (in Settings, Themes), but this is still confined to an experiment in the desktop version. Turn it on, relaunch your browser and the content of all web


pages will now be displayed as white or grey text on a black background.

Annoyingly, there's no simple way to toggle the dark mode off again, other than disabling the flag and restarting. In Edge you're better off going to Settings, Appearance, Theme, Dark.

ENABLING CHROMIUM EXPERIMENTS

To access the Experiments page in Chrome, Edge or another Chromiumbased browser, type chrome: // flags in your address bar and press Enter. To activate an experiment, click its drop-down menu and choose Enabled, then click the Relaunch button at the bottom of the page. There are hundreds of experiments listed, so use the search box to jump



to the one you want. If you have any problems, disable the experiment or click 'Reset all' to return all flags to their default settings.




To create a free account, enter an email address and password or sign up with your Google, Microsoft, Apple or Facebook account. If you previously used Wunderlist, Microsoft To Do or Asana, click 'Import from other apps' 1 to copy over existing tasks. You can start adding individual tasks straight away.




To create a list, click the Create List button. 1 Give your new list a name, then click Create. This new list appears in the panel on the left. 2 Click its entry to open it in the pane on the right. 3 To add a task to your list, click the Add Task bar. 4






Give your first task a name 1 and either click Create 2 or press Enter on your keyboard. Add as many tasks as you like - each one appears in a list below. When you've completed a task, click the circle next to its name 1 to show that it's been carried out and move the task to the section marked Done. 4




Click a task in the list to add some details. You can add a due date and set a reminder, so you don't forget it.


If it's a task you do regularly – such as shopping – you can set it to repeat.

This creates a copy of the task at a frequency of your choice.




You can create any number of sub tasks for each main task. 1 As you mark them as done, 2 the entry in the main window changes colour to show the progress of the whole task so far. 3 You can also add notes, 4 include attachments 5 and write comments. 6 Important tasks can be starred. 7





Some tasks require collaboration with friends, colleagues or family members. To add people, click the Share button, 11 then click Add Member. 2 Search for the person by name or email address. If they aren't already signed up to Zenkit, invite them to join.



Click Manage Accesses 11 and click a person's name to transfer ownership of the task, change what involvement they have or remove them. Click Settings 2 to change the task icon colours, 3 and also to email, print, share, duplicate, archive or permanently delete the list. 4



Click your account icon 🗓 and select Click your account Icon 🛂 and sei Settings. Here, you can enable or disable sounds in General and switch to the paid-for version in Upgrade. 2 Theme **B** lets you change the app's look by applying Dark Mode or Transparent. 4 Alerts and subscriptions can be managed under Notifications. 5



Tweak hidden Windows settings with one handy tool

ack in Issue 462 (bit.ly/webuser462), we looked at how you could use Winaero Tweaker to configure the Windows 10 October 2018 update. Since then, Winaero Tweaker has been updated four times. In this Workshop, we look at the most useful new features that have been added since we last looked.

Winaero Tweaker is an all-in-one tool that provides easy access to Windows settings, which are often hidden away in sub menus, spread across the Settings app and the Control Panel, or even hidden away in the Registry where they're hard to find and access.


The software is available as a regular download that you can install, or as a portable tool you can keep on a USB memory stick and run on any PC.








Microsoft stopped creating automated backups of the Registry a couple of years ago, supposedly to save space, though the files are generally tiny. To restart the process, go to Behaviour, then Automatic Registry Backup 🗓 and tick the box. Backups are stored in C:\Windows\System32\ config\RegBack.



There are lots of tools for editing the right-click context menu. Open the Context Menu heading and find Remove Default Entries. 💶 The latest options let you remove Windows Media Player, 2 Print, 3 'Create a New Video' 4 and the OneDrive tools. 5




You can also add items to the context menu. Choose Advanced Startup Options 11 to add a shortcut that restarts your PC and takes you to the Advance Startup tools. This provides access to Troubleshoot and Startup Repair without the need to fuss about with function keys. Another good option to add is 'SFC /Scannow'.




By default, right-clicking an image and choosing Edit takes you straight to Windows Paint. If you'd prefer to use a different program, choose "App for 'Edit' Image Context Menu", 11 replacing Paint with the location and file of your preferred image editor. 2 Be sure to leave the "%1" on the end. **B**




If you regularly change the attributes of files (to make them read-only, for example) you can add an Attributes option to the right-click menu. Look for Attributes 11 in the Context Menu section and tick the box. 2




If you share your PC with other users and don't want anyone meddling with your settings, you can choose to hide certain pages of the Settings app. In 'Settings and Control Panel' 1 choose 'Hide Pages from Settings'. 2 You can choose whether to hide individual pages you select below **B** or hide everything except the selected pages. 4




Windows puts a drop shadow around image thumbnails in File Explorer but you can remove them by going to File Explorer, then Thumbnail Preview Border Shadow. 11 You can either keep the shadow, 2 remove it 3 or add the film border you normally only see if it's a video clip 4 (not recommended).



Go to Tools, 11 then Open Registry Key. 22 Type the address of a Registry key, **B** such as one you've seen in Web User. Click the Go button and the software opens Regedit at the correct place. A list of previous places visited is stored 4 to save you typing them again if you need to go back. Use shortcuts HKCU and HKLM.



If there's a tweak you use regularly, you can set it as the home tool. Whenever you open Tweaker, it will start on this tool. Click the tick. 1 Alternatively, use the Shortcut arrow icon 2 to create a desktop shortcut that takes you to a particular page when you double-click it. **B**



If you're looking for a specific tweak, use the search box 1 (this has been improved in the latest update). Available options are displayed below as you type. The parent folder of each option is shown, 2 which might help you find the option you're looking for.




Follow your favourite websites from your browser


ebsites are constantly publishing new content and a feed reader is a handy tool for managing your reading. Smart RSS integrates a feed reader into Chrome as an extension. It regularly casts an eye over your

favourite websites, keeping vou informed of new content and compressing the information into headlines you can view at a glance.

Install the Smart RSS add-on, then start adding your favourite sites. Click the Add RSS Source button 11 and type the URL in the box that pops up. 2 If you can't see a feed or RSS link on a site, try adding /feed or /rss to the end of its main URL.


If you already use a feed reader and want to try this with your existing list, go into your current tool and find the option to export your feeds as an OPML file. Click the Settings button (a spanner) and scroll down to Import. 1 Click 'Choose file' next to OPML 2 and load the exported file.






To create folders for organising feeds, click New Folder 1 and give it a name. To move a feed into a folder, right-click the feed and choose Properties, 2 then select the folder from the drop-down list labelled Parent. **B** If you add a new feed with a folder selected, it will be filed there automatically.

Once you've added some feeds, you can see everything listed chronologically under 'All feeds', 🚺 along with the number of unread articles. 🛭 Click the 'Update all' arrow 🖪 to refresh the list. The middle column 🛂 shows headlines of currently selected feeds. Click one for a preview on the right. 5





Unread articles are displayed in blue; 11 read articles are black. 2 Use the tick buttons 3 4 to switch the status between read and unread. Some feeds display the whole article so you don't need to go to the main site; others show a preview snippet. Click 'Full article' 5 to open it in a new tab.

Click the spanner button to go back to the Settings. You can change the layout 11 and the order in which content is displayed. 2 There are also options to control the way the software works. B Scroll down further to see a handy list of keyboard shortcuts that are well worth mastering.


oogle Lens is a clever app that can 'read', copy and even translate printed text and handwritten notes. The app was recently updated for the first time in a couple of years, introducing a range of new features that better

reflect how people use it. If you haven't tried Google Lens yet, it's worth having a fresh look because its new tools make scanning and searching much smarter.



To help you learn the correct pronunciation of a word, Google has added a Listen option. Tap the Auto Search button, 11 bring the words into focus, then press the Auto Search button again. Select any word and drag the selection handles 2 to highlight additional words. In the tray, 🖪 swipe across and press Listen 4 to hear the word spoken.




The Listen feature works with many foreign words but it's missing from Lens' dedicated translation tool. You can still hear pronunciations in Translate, but it's a longer process. Tap Translate, 11 choose the relevant languages 2 and select a word or phrase in the text. Now tap 'Open in Translate' **E** to listen to pronunciations when tapping the audio key.

It wouldn't be Google without search tools and that's what the new Look Up feature offers. Whether it's a word, phrase or even a concept, you can point your camera at it and let Google 'read' it. Press Auto Search 11 to lock on the words and then, as before, choose your word or words. 2



With your capture complete, drag the tray upwards 11 to see Google search results. 2 Tap any result to visit the relevant page. Google Lens is still running in the background, though, so you can quickly return to it by tapping back or pressing the X along the address bar.

Transfer all your files and programs to a new PC

If you're thinking of replacing your current PC, Wayne Williams explains what you need to do to move seamlessly to a new one




Drive options

When switching to a new computer, the simplest approach is to take the hard drive out of your old PC and put it in the new one. This gets you up and running on the modern device with a minimum of fuss, and you'll still have all your software and files where you left them.

The obvious downside to this is that you'd be replacing a faster and possibly larger modern hard drive or SSD with an older, inferior one. Other problems could also arise, such as your new PC or Windows not recognising the old drive. That's assuming you can remove both the old and new drives in the first place. Some laptop makers solder or glue components in place, making upgrades and repairs harder than they should be.

If you'd prefer to keep the new drive - which is the sensible choice - then you have three approaches. You can simply

start from scratch, installing software and copying over files from your old drive as and when you need them. Alternatively, you can back up the old drive and restore the files on the new one, or clone the old drive in its entirety. This last option is the preferred solution for most people because it offers the best of all worlds – all your programs and files, exactly as you had them, including any customisations, but on brand new hardware.

Finally, use a cleanup program such as CCleaner (www.ccleaner.com) to find and remove unwanted junk. Remember, a new computer is a chance to start afresh, so the more you can remove from the old drive before copying its contents over, the better.

Back up the old drive

There's certainly no shortage of free backup software and we rounded up our favourites back in Issue 495 (bit.ly/webuser495), giving the Gold Award to AOMEI Backupper Standard (bit.ly/backupper503), thanks to its ease of use and powerful features. The software can back up or clone your hard drives, and content can be backed up or synced to any attached storage device, which makes it perfect for our needs here. Restoring a backup of the old drive

on the new one is just a matter of clicking the Restore button and navigating to a saved Image file.

The one major downside of Backupper Standard is that its system clone feature (which can move an entire Windows system from one drive to another, including the operating system and apps) isn't available in the free version. That said, if you only need to use the feature this one time, you can download and run the trial of the paid-for edition.

Another option is EaseUS ToDo Backup Free (bit.ly/tbfree503), which took the Silver Award in the same issue and is also great at backing up hard drives.

Clone the old drive



Do some spring cleaning


Before you clone or back up a drive, take some time to remove unwanted apps, files and leftover junk. This will make the backup smaller and take less time to create. IObit Uninstaller (bit.ly/iobu503) can batch-remove unnecessary programs and clean up after them, clearing away junk that would normally be left behind. You can filter the list to show large programs or infrequently used ones. The uninstaller can also remove unwanted toolbars and plug-ins from your browser, and uninstall Windows apps, including those bundled with Windows 10.

Once you've removed any surplus software, go through and delete any files – photos, documents and the like – that you have no further use for. If you have a spare drive, you can copy them over, in case you need them at a later date.


MINI WORKSHOP | Clone your hard drive with Clonezilla



Specify the version of Clonezilla you need by using the drop-down menus. Select the CPU architecture 1 and change the file type to ISO. 2 Leave repository as 'auto' 1 and click Download. 4 When the download completes, burn it to CD or DVD or write it to a USB drive using Ventoy (www.ventoy.net) or Rufus (rufus.ie).



Boot into Clonezilla and choose an option from the menu. The top choice, 'Clonezilla live (Default settings, VGA 800x600)' 1 should be fine. Either select that or wait until the timer runs out. On the next screen, select English as your language and set the keyboard language, then click Start Clonezilla.



We're going to clone one drive to another, so select the second option to 'Work directly from a disk or partition to a disk or partition'. Next, choose between Beginner and Expert mode (Beginner is fine for most users). Finally, choose if you want to clone a disk 1 or a partition, 2 and complete the process.




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AOMEI Backupper Standard can back up or clone the contents of your old drive

Wizard Free (bit.ly/minitool503) took the Gold Award in Issue 498's partitioning software round-up (bit.ly/webuser498) and is ideal for the job.

Another program we'd recommend is the open source Clonezilla (clonezilla .org), which has been around since 2007 and does a fantastic job of cloning hard drives. There are three versions of the software available, but Clonezilla Live is the one you want. To use it, you need to write it to bootable media - a CD, DVD or USB flash drive - and then boot into it and choose what to copy. We show you how to do this in our Mini Workshop on page 59.

Set up your new PC

If you opted to start afresh or just backed up your personal files rather than the entire contents of your old PC, you now need to install your software. If you have


the original CDs, DVDs or digital files, this

is straightforward enough, though it

could be very time consuming.

There's a good chance that a lot of your favourite programs are free, so rather than downloading and installing each one in turn, you could use Ninite (ninite.com) to batch-download and silently install the latest versions. Aside from the ease of doing it this way, another benefit of using Ninite is that all the programs offered are completely free of bundled junk. We show you how to use Ninite in our Mini Workshop, below.

Ninite isn't the only tool that can do this job. IObit Software Updater (bit.ly/ iobitsu503) has a Recommendation section that lets you choose the programs you want from a list of popular applications.



IObit Software Updater helps you install programs from its 'Recommendation' list

MINI WORKSHOP | Install your favourite programs using Ninite



Ninite is designed to make installing software on a new PC as easy as possible. Open a browser on your new PC, go to ninite.com and select the software you want from the list. There are sections for web browsers, 11 messaging, 2 media, 3 imaging, 4 security 5 and more. Don't select too many security tools as they may clash.



Once you've chosen all the programs you want to install, scroll down and click the Get Your Ninite button. 11 This creates a custom tool that installs and updates your selected software. The name of this file contains the titles of the programs you selected, which means you can quickly identify the correct installer if you create more than one.



Run the installer and it will get to work fetching and installing each item in sequence. Once it starts, you can leave it to its own devices (you won't need to answer any questions). When you return, all your software should have been installed 11 in the default locations. You can retry any failed ones.

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
Block notifications, set quiet hours and avoid pop-up distractions

Control Windows notifications using 'Focus assist'

otifications that pop up on your screen when you're working or playing games are distracting, especially when they have to be clicked to be dismissed. To avoid these interruptions, you can use 'Focus assist' in Windows 10 to limit notifications or stop them altogether.

Open the Settings app (Windows+i) and click System, then 'Focus assist'. There are three options: the default Off setting, which shows all notifications; 'Priority only', which hides unimportant notifications and only shows those that need your attention; and 'Alarms only', which hides all notifications except for alarms that you've set for yourself.

Click the icon at the right-hand end of the taskbar's notification area to open the Action Centre, then click the Focus-assist button to cycle through the three notification settings.



Allow, block or show only important notifications in Windows 10

Set global notification settings

Notifications can pop up in a variety of locations – in the bottom-right corner of your screen, within the Action Centre and on the lock screen. Sometimes they're accompanied by a sound.

To configure these notifications, go to Settings, System, 'Notifications & actions' and look for the Notifications section. Tick or clear 'Show notifications on the lock screen' to suit your preference. This is a global setting, so it applies to everything. You can also set the global 'Allow notifications to play sounds' box, as you prefer.

Enable or disable app notifications

Most notifications come from apps bundled with Windows or downloaded from the Microsoft Store, but it's also possible for other programs to display them. To see which apps are able to pop up these distractions, open Settings, System, 'Notifications & actions', then scroll down to the list of apps. Here, you can use the switches to choose whether or not you want to see notifications from each app.

If you can't find a program on the list,

it may be because it can't display notifications in the official Windows 10 way. However, it may still show its own notification when the app is running. Some apps have their own settings that

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Look in app settings for additional customisation options for notifications

let you configure notifications from within the app.

For example, open Microsoft News from the Start menu and click the cog icon in the bottom-left corner to open its settings. Under the General tab, there is a Notifications section with three switches for 'Breaking news', 'Top stories' and 'Daily brief'. Turn them on or off as you prefer.

Open the Windows 10 Mail app and click the cog icon at the bottom. Select Notifications in the settings. If you have more than one email account, you can configure each one separately. For example, if you have both Outlook and Gmail, you can set one to show notifications while the other one doesn't, and one to play a sound while the other is set to silent.

If you see words that look like they've been typed in a typewriter, follow the instructions and type them exactly as they appear, paying close attention to spaces and punctuation.

Not all apps have notification options, but it's worth looking for them in their settings.

Customise notifications in the Action Centre

Some notifications are sent straight to the Action Centre, rather than popping up in the bottom-right corner of your screen. You might also miss notifications if you take a break, because some are on a short timer and may disappear before you get a chance to see them.

To see missed notifications, click the icon on the right-hand side of the taskbar to open the Action Centre. Move the cursor over a notification to see its controls. You can click the up and down buttons to expand or shrink the notification.

Expanding a notification may display more information or provide buttons to interact with it. Click the X to remove the notification and click the cog icon to display a menu with additional options.


Configure the Priority list

You can use the 'Priority only' setting to exclusively show important alerts (see main tip, left), but who decides what's important and what isn't? You do.

Go to Settings, System, 'Focus assist' and click the 'Customise your priority list' under the 'Priority only' setting. The 'Calls, texts and reminders' section lets you choose whether to show incoming calls, such as Skype or another video- or voice-calling app. Reminders can be shown regardless of the app.

In the People section, you can choose to always show notifications from contacts pinned to the taskbar. Use the plus button to add individuals.

At the bottom, in the Apps section, is a list of apps that you always want to see notifications from. You can add more apps to this list by clicking the plus button.

Set rules for notifications

As well as letting you choose which apps show notifications, focus assist lets you control when they appear. So you could, for example, set quiet times during work hours when only limited notifications are allowed.

Open the Settings app and click System, then 'Focus assist' and scroll down to the 'Automatic rules' section. If you play games, turn on the switch next to 'When I'm playing a game' so you won't be interrupted.

If you watch videos on your PC, turn on 'When I'm using an app in full screen mode'. Clicking the option after enabling this lets you choose whether to show only alarms or alarms and priority messages.

The 'During these times' option is particularly useful. Turn on the switch, then click the option. Set the start and end times for when you normally work, play games or watch videos. You can set the repeat to Daily, Weekends or Weekdays, and choose 'Alarms only' or 'Focus only' for the 'Focus level'.




Limit notifications during specific times and activities

Tweak advanced app notification options

Every app that displays notifications can be individually configured. Go to Settings, System, 'Notifications & actions' and click one of the apps in the list. There are separate tickboxes to choose whether notification banners display in the corner of the screen or in the Action Centre.

You can set the number of notifications you want displayed in the Action Centre, from 1 to 20 - set a

low number if you want to avoid over-active apps filling it up.

To ensure important notifications don't get pushed out of the Action Centre by less important alerts, scroll to the bottom of the section and select either Top or High for the priority, rather than Normal.

Control website notifications

As well as Windows and apps, websites and services can display notifications on your desktop. However, you need to be selective or you'll be inundated, so think carefully before clicking OK if a notice pops up when you're visiting a website asking to send notifications.

If you are seeing too many website notifications, open the menu in Chrome, click Settings and find the 'Privacy and security' section. Click Site settings, then Notifications. In Edge, go to Settings, 'Site permissions', then Notifications. There is a simple switch in both browsers. If you don't weant to see any notifications from websites, turn it off.

Both Chrome and Edge have a quiet switch. If notifications are allowed, turning this on shows a less intrusive style of notification. A normal pop-up stops you browsing the web until it's dismissed, but quieter notifications can be ignored. In fact, if Google detects that people often block a site, quiet notifications are automatically

With notifications turned on, when you visit a site and are asked whether to allow the site to send them, your response is added to the Block or Allow list. Use the controls to add or remove sites from these lists.

Access OneDrive's settings

Thanks for replying to my question on OneDrive (Issue 500, bit.ly/webuser500). Unfortunately, I can't access my OneDrive settings. When I right-click OneDrive in my C: drive, the list of options doesn't include Settings. Going via File Explorer also fails to display a Settings option and, similarly, trying this on OneDrive in my complete list of files under the This PC shortcut shows various options, including Move and Delete, but no Settings. Can you enlighten me on this, please?


There are several ways to access OneDrive's settings. When you open Explorer, OneDrive appears in the sidebar on the left. Right-click it to open a menu that includes a Settings

option. Alternatively, go to C:\ Users\Yourname, right-click the OneDrive folder and you'll see Settings in that menu, too.

Note that OneDrive used to be called SkyDrive, and an old PC upgraded to Windows 10 may have both OneDrive and SkyDrive folders. Your files will be in SkyDrive, but there is a OneDrive shortcut to redirect to SkyDrive.

If you're still having trouble accessing OneDrive's settings, click the OneDrive icon in the taskbar. Select More at the bottom of the window that appears, then Settings.

Recover missing space on a laptop's hard drive

My Medion laptop suddenly stopped working, so I took it to a repair shop to get it fixed. When it came back, it was working properly again, but now I've noticed that my hard drive is only 117GB in size. Before the repair, the C: drive was 1.6TB and the E: drive was 1.5TB. What happened to my C: drive and why can't I access my E: drive?



It sounds as if there was a problem A with your hard drive, which may have been misreporting the amount of space it had. Laptops don't generally have 1.6TB and 1.5TB drives. Perhaps yours has a 128GB drive, which - after formatting and space for Windows' hidden system and recovery partitions - leaves you with 117GB of usable space.


To check your available drives and partitions, open Explorer, right-click This PC in the sidebar and select Manage. In the Computer Management window, expand Storage (if necessary) and select Disk Management.

The graphical display in the lower part

of the main window shows how your drive is divided into partitions and what they're used for. The C: drive is where

Windows and your files are stored.

So what is your E: drive, and why can't you use it? There are two possibilities and the first is that the drive letter was accidentally assigned to one of Windows' hidden system partitions. This is an essential part of the PC so, if that's the case, don't try to use it just ignore it.

The other possibility is that it's unused space, in which case Windows will label it as such. We've occasionally seen unused drive partitions that are just a few tens of megabytes in size - such a small amount of space that it's barely useful - but, if you find gigabytes of unused space in a partition, you can right-click and format it.

Cut down on your trackers

My PC has been infested with trackers, which I want to eliminate permanently. I've gone from two trackers to 10 to 200 over a few months, and now it's rising exponentially. I'm running Windows 8.1 with Norton 360 and CCleaner Pro.

I've just run CCleaner Pro and it found 1,700 trackers, which is my current record, yet I'd removed all trackers just four hours previously! When I first ran CCleaner, it indicated that only 50 had been removed, so I ran it again and all but seven had been removed. I have run it yet again and it has removed eight, although it showed that only seven had to be removed.

I have three problems to solve. Is it possible to access a website without agreeing to accept trackers? Is there a way to find out which sites are generating trackers. And how can I eliminate them permanently?

Google. Neither the iPhone or iPad has any additional antivirus protection, so should I install Norton on those, too? Are they likely to be adding to the problem?

You can browse the web without A agreeing to accept trackers by blocking all cookies and JavaScript. In Chrome, go to Settings, find the 'Privacy and security' section and click 'Site settings'. Click JavaScript and 'Cookies and site data', and disallow them.

Unfortunately, blocking all cookies stops many websites working properly, so it's not a useful way to deal with the problem. A slightly better option is to open an incognito window when visiting a website. When you close that window, all browsing data is cleared. You can then open a new incognito window to browse the next site. Your browser never saves anything, and nothing can track you from site to site.

There are many Chrome extensions that block trackers without using

Print from an Android phone


I have a OnePlus 3 smartphone running Android 9 and a Samsung laser printer that's attached to my Windows 10 PC via USB. Is there a way to connect my phone directly to my laser printer so I can print from it?

The printer works well, even after lying unused for months, so I don't want to buy another one just to get wireless printing. Is there an app and cable combination I can buy, or some other device to connect wirelessly?

Support for connecting phones to printers is patchy, and many don't offer it. However, it's worth a try if you can find a cable with the right connectors. You may need a USB Type-A to USB Type-B cable, with a converter to attach your phone's socket to the Type-A end of the cable. Check the sockets on your phone and printer to see what you need.

A better option is to install Google Cloud Print on your computer and phone. First, open Chrome on your PC then go to the menu and choose Settings. Expand the Advanced section and click Printing, Google Cloud Print. Click 'Manage Cloud Print devices', followed by the Add Printers button. Make sure the printer is

plugged in and switched on, then follow the instructions to add the printer and test it.

Leaving your computer and printer switched on, go to the Google Play store on your phone and install the Google Cloud Print app (bit.ly/ cloud503) - some phones already have this installed. Now, when you print from your phone, you should be able to select Cloud Print and send the document, photo, email or whatever to your printer.

Cloud Print works by sending your photo or document to your Google account. From there, it goes to your computer, then to the printer. You should also see an option to save your document to Google Drive as a PDF, so if your PC isn't switched on, you can print the PDF next time you boot



incognito mode, such as Ghostery (bit.ly/ghost503), Privacy Badger (bit.ly/badger503) and DuckDuckGo Privacy Essentials (bit.ly/duck503). Install them from these Web Store links.

Other browsers have built-in features to block trackers, which makes them better at dealing with this problem than Chrome. In the latest version of Edge, for example, open Settings in the menu and go to 'Privacy and services'. Turn on 'Tracking prevention' and select the Strict option. This won't block everything, but it stops most trackers.

If blocking trackers causes a site not to work, click Exceptions and add the URL. This means trackers are allowed on that specific site, but if a site won't work without them and you have to visit it, there's nothing else you can do.


The iPad and iPhone are both very secure, so you don't need any additional security software for them. You can use a private-browsing window in Safari to limit tracking.

Save Edge tabs

I'm currently using the new Edge browser. Is there a way to save all my open tabs so I can pick up where I left off when I next open the browser? Something like a bookmark that, when clicked, opens all my tabs.

There are a couple of ways to do this. Open the menu and select Favorites, 'Show favorites bar'. Then right-click any tab and select 'Add all tabs to favorites'. Select the Bookmarks bar and name the folder you want to save your tabs in. When you next want to open all those tabs, right-click the folder in the favorites bar and you'll see options to open them all in the current window, a new window or an InPrivate window.

Microsoft has added a new Collections feature to the latest version of Edge, which you can use instead. When you want to save all your open tabs, right-click any tab and select 'Add all tabs to a new collection'. The Collections panel opens on the right, where you can give your collection a name. The Collections button in the toolbar opens or closes the panel. Right-clicking a collection reveals a menu with options to open all items in the current window, a new window or an InPrivate window.

Shut-down Your Phone

There are several programs I don't use in Windows 10, one of which is Your Phone. It has its own program tile and appears at the bottom of the Start menu, too. I've removed some items I don't use by right-clicking their program tiles or Start menu entries, but Your Phone doesn't have an Uninstall option. How do I remove it?

Not all bundled Windows apps can be removed, but you can at least stop Your Phone running in the background. Open the Settings app, click Apps and scroll to the bottom. Click Your Phone, then 'Advanced options' and click Terminate to stop it running, then turn off the 'Background apps' switch. When you restart Windows, Your Phone will no longer run in the background.

OneDrive will then sync your photos

As you suggest, you'll need to run a VPN. However, combining Tor with off-the-shelf VPNs can have security issues. Nothing major, but you may not be quite as well-protected as before. To get around this, run the browser alongside Orbot (bit .ly/orbot503). This is

an ultra-secure app, also developed by the Tor Project, with a VPN mode that lets you select a specific country. However, you should note that the BBC blocks Tor and many VPNs from accessing iPlayer from outside the UK.

Alternatively, you could try using multiple virtual desktops. This lets you leave Google Drive to download and zip folders in one desktop, while using your work apps in another without fear of interruption. For Windows 10, either click the Task View button next to Cortana, then switch between desktops at the top of the screen, or use the following

keyboard shortcuts: Ctrl+Windows+D to create a new desktop and Ctrl+Windows+Left or Right arrows to cycle through desktops. If you're using a Mac, virtual desktops are known as 'spaces' and can be created through the Mission Control (F3) key.


Improve Windows search

Like many PC users, I'm often in and out of the Registry Editor, making minor tweaks (and, occasionally, major edits). So I was delighted to discover that Winaero (winaero.com) has come up with a way to add the Registry Editor to the Control Panel. After all, there's only so many times I can search for it using the Start menu!

To start, download the files at bit.ly/ regcontrol503. Extract them and, if necessary, unblock them with Powershell, using the following command:

dir c:\[file location] -Recurse | Unblock-File

Depending on your computer setup, you may not need to do this. In any case, double-click the file named Add Registry Editor To Control Panel. Click Run,



When a program isn't working properly, it sometimes hogs too much processor or memory resources, or freezes altogether. Right-click an empty part of the taskbar and select Task Manager. On the Processes tab, right-click the program to see an option to 'End task'.

Underneath 'End task', there is a menu option called 'Provide feedback'. Before ending the errant process, or if you restart it, click 'Provide feedback' and the Feedback Hub opens. If you don't already have it, it's a free Microsoft app available from the Store. It automatically finds the program and lists everyone else's comments, questions and bug reports. So, if you right-click Chrome and click 'Provide feedback', you'll see lots of other people's comments about it, which may include a solution to your problem.





My experience with cancelling Sky TV

n reference to Barry's column in Issue 501, 'Why Sky was the limit for me', this is exactly what happened

I wanted to cancel Sky TV at the start of the lockdown but was put off by the 'leave us alone to help the NHS'-type plea. By week six or seven, this was wearing thin, so I contacted Sky anyway and, like Barry, managed to get through in record time – which was no surprise.

I was going to cancel Sky TV and buy a Freesat recorder, but Sky decided they could suddenly reduce my £37 per month fee (which they had



just increased) to £17 per month, on a new 18-month contract.

This made the cost of a new Freesat receiver only slightly less than staying with Sky over 18 months, so I kept Sky. I am sure that in 18 months time, there will undoubtedly be a new, faster, updated Freesat recorder – probably at lower price to buy. So I can then cancel Sky – if they're still around, and haven't been killed off by Netflix, Prime Video and BritBox.

In the end, I saved myself £20 per month, but had to pretend I was 'vulnerable' or a NHS worker to do so. I agree with Barry – this is shameful and disingenuous behaviour from Sky.

Eventually the voice changed and became grumpy, and I was told that I may not ever be able to subscribe to Sky again if I proceeded. I ended up having to return the decoder to the nearest agent (an 80km return trip) to save a \$50 pickup fee.

I have replaced Sky with YouTube, Freeview and other programs available on the web, and can now watch what interests me.

Being an avid Web User reader and a seasoned IT technician in my spare time,


I cannot help but notice a serious omission in your 'Web myths exposed' feature in Issue 501.



This is quite often (albeit not always) caused by the browser being stuck in a so-called 'cached mode' and can be easily rectified by pressing Ctrl+Shift+Del, then using the browser's Clear function to fix problems.
