Decipher ancient Egyptian symbols

ith more than 1,000 distinct characters, the Egyptian hieroglyphic script was one of the earliest writing systems, dating back more than 4,000 years. Scribes would spend a large chunk of their lives learning this complex system, but now it's more accessible than ever thanks to a new **Google Arts & Culture** experiment called Fabricius.

Using machine learning, its primary aim is to allow experts to better translate the stories of ancient Egypt - there's a section called Work that lets researchers upload images for fast decoding.

Two other sections are accessible to everyone, however, with an emphasis on education and play. The first, Learn teaches you about hieroglyphics and how Google's AutoML system interprets them.



to trace, copy, identify, reconstruct, read and translate hieroglyphs before Al assesses the accuracy of your drawings and inputs, and gives you an overall score.

The next stage, Play, is even more entertaining, letting you create coded messages using hieroglyphs which you

can share on social media or via email. Type some words and the nearest matches

appear. Google says the translations won't be entirely accurate, but it's fun working with the emoji equivalents of the past.

Enjoy the view from someone else's window

Tired of staring out of your own window after months of lockdown? Then perhaps it's time for a change of scenery. WindowSwap lets you view recorded videos captured from the windows of other users around the world, giving you a glimpse of how other people live. We watched 10-minute clips of scenes from Montpellier, France; caught a dog barking in Ivano-Frankivsk, Ukraine; and saw rain dripping down a high-rise window in downtown New York.

Some of the more picturesque videos are sure to provoke window envy, but you can quickly nip past any you don't like by clicking the forward arrow. You can

> also submit horizontal HD videos of your own via email, but be aware that the videos are posted with sound, so you'll have to be careful what you say while the camera is rolling.



When solving

online jigsaw puzzles, you needn't worry about losing any pieces, but you do lose the fun of completing a

jigsaw with friends and family. This set of puzzles brings back the group fun by allowing you collaborate with other people.

Choose one of three difficulty settings and take your pick from

over 500 artworks, ranging from Andy Warhol's Grace Kelly to Kehinde Wiley's portrait of President Barack Obama. Just copy the link to invite other people to join, then start moving the pieces around the board and slot them into place.

You'll see a preview of the picture, but you can remove this if you're feeling confident. You can also darken the background to help the pieces stand out. After completing a puzzle, you'll be prompted to try another, and can also click to learn more about an artwork and the artist who created it.



Help NASA spot galactic disks

To better understand how long it takes planets to form, NASA is asking the public to help search for disks surrounding nearby stars. The space agency has relaunched its Disk Detective project using data from the



WISE mission, and wants volunteers to examine potential disks to help determine whether

planet-forming gas is present. A new dataset of 150,000 stars means there's plenty to get stuck into and you can start identifying disks as soon as you've read the instructions. Previous citizen scientists discovered a new class of disks in 2016, so who knows what you'll find?

Find new podcasts in **Spotify**

Spotify has made it easier to discover podcasts by introducing two new charts: Top and Trending. Available within the iOS and Android apps,



the former gives a rundown of the UK's 200 most popular podcasts, updated daily, while the latter highlights 50 new and emerging shows based on how fast-growing they currently are. You can also check out the most listened-to podcasts by category, delving into genres as diverse as the arts, business, comedy and fiction. To find these, just tap the Search tab in the Spotify app and select Podcasts, Podcast Charts.

NEW VOICE COMMANDS Play summer Spotify songs

With Spotify linked in the Google Home app, say: "Hey Google, play Your Summer Rewind playlist on Spotify" for a seasonal set of tunes drawn from your past listens.

Order a Big Mac

The McDonald's app now has Siri support. When you complete an order, select 'Add to Siri' to place your next order with your voice, without launching the app.

Activate Alexa hands-free

Tap the blue button in the updated Alexa app (iOS and Android) for a new hands-free option that lets you use the trigger word "Alexa" when your phone is unlocked and the app is open on the screen.

View bike-share info

www.google.co.uk/maps

Cycling directions in Google Maps will now include bike-share docks along the way, with live bike availability and walking directions to and from the docks. It only covers London at the moment, though.

Explore an expedition ship



Draw a perfect circle

Try drawing a perfect circle using your finger on a touchscreen device (or, for a true challenge, a mouse on your computer) and see how well this game rates your efforts. Google accused of spying on third-party Android apps


What happened?

Google is snooping on Android apps made by other developers and watching how we use them, to help make its own apps better and to decide which competing apps to create.


That's according to a report by tech-news website The Information (bit.ly/information507), which claims Google provides employees with a program known internally as Android Lockbox to monitor how often rival apps are opened and used on Android devices. The data is only made available to some – not all – Google employees, and has to be specifically requested, according to the report.

The Information said that Google used this data to develop its own version of TikTok – called Shorts – and to observe how people on Android devices use rival services such as Facebook. Google is able to access this info when users approve data sharing during the Android installation and setup – an option that is worded in such a way as to imply a more personalised experience.

In response, Google admitted that it does have the ability to access data about third-party apps, but stressed that any developer - including those not working at Google - can see the same information. "Since 2014, the Android App Usage Data API has been used by Google and Android developers who have been authorised by Android OEMs or users to access basic data about app usage - such as how often apps are

opened – to analyse and improve services," a Google spokesperson said.

How will it affect you?

The data being analysed by Google relates to how an app is used, how often it's opened and for how long – it isn't personalised or specific to you. This allows Google to decide whether it's worth developing a rival tool, and how it could improve on an existing version. For example, if an email app has a specific feature for clearing out old messages that seems popular with its users, Gmail may add a similar tool.

This data is known as 'telemetry', and it's often used by software developers to better understand how to improve their own products. For example, if Microsoft spots that people always have to search to find a specific setting, it may find a better way to present that option in the next Windows update.

If you find this data collection worrying, you can tweak your privacy settings in Android to limit how your data is shared. In your Android device's Settings app, select the Google entry, then tap the three-dot menu in the top-right corner of the screen and switch off 'Usage and diagnostics'.

What do we think?

Google is a data company, so it shouldn't surprise Android users that it collects and uses their data for its own benefit

- that's its business model, after all. That said, the use of the data in this case could affect third-party developers. We're all for Google making its own apps that work perfectly with Android, but this shouldn't come at the sacrifice of a healthy, competitive app marketplace. Google should be encouraging more developers to make apps and support their success, rather than undermining third-party creatives by making or improving their own. If Google is accessing data that thirdparty developers can't see, it isn't being fair to those creating apps for its platform.

This behaviour isn't new: Twitter, for example, encouraged developers to create tools for its platform, then hampered those efforts with API changes and launched its own versions.

With more than 2.5 billion people using Android devices, there's room for multiple versions of an app idea. But Google's versions will be inherently more trusted than an unknown rival, making the job for third-party developers harder. Plus, as Google makes its money through advertising, it doesn't need to entice users with in-app payments, which often infuriate users.

Google is welcome to make its own apps, many of which are very good, but it should level the playing field if it wants the app market to remain innovative, varied and successful.

What we think of this fortnight's top tech news stories and rumours, and how they affect you

Fake Chrome update targets bank accounts

What happened?

Researchers at security firm Proofpoint have warned Chrome users that hackers are using a fake update page to target the browser.

The malicious web page suggests that your version of Chrome is out of date, hoping to trick you into clicking a link to download a new version. If you do, malware will take over your computer, giving hackers access to everything you do online, including accessing your bank accounts, email and more.

Proofpoint analysis of the malware (bit.ly/ proof507) identified a banking Trojan called Chthonic, which is a variant of the notorious Zeus

banking Trojan. It also installs the legitimate remotecontrol software NetSupport, which can be exploited to give hackers remote access to

compromised systems.

How will it affect you?

Proofpoint said that thousands of Chrome users have seen the malicious page in the UK, Europe and US, but it doesn't necessarily follow that all those people have been infected.

It's worth remembering that Google never displays

chrome You are using an older version of Chrome

> a web page to entice you to update the Chrome browser. Instead, it either updates automatically when you open the browser or allows you to manually check for a new version by clicking the three-dot menu button in the top-right corner, then choosing Help, About Chrome.

There is no need to visit

a website to download a Chrome update.

What do we think?

Proofpoint's researchers noted that this attack takes advantage of people's valid belief that staying safe online means keeping their software updated.

The tactic may seem exceptionally sinister, but it's really no different to any malicious website that tries to convince you that it's the real deal. It's all too easy for hackers to mock up a convincing web page, so always double-check the URL. If you're not sure, go directly to the official website to see if an update is available. It's worth being cautious, even if it takes a few extra clicks.

Facebook lets you lock down Messenger

What happened?

Facebook has introduced a new privacy tool to help users lock down Messenger, the socialmedia platform's popular chat app. Rather than protect against hackers, App Lock adds a layer of security against anyone borrowing or picking up your iPhone - so far, the tool is only available for Apple devices and isn't yet supported on Android.

Once it's enabled, App Lock requires an extra verification measure for opening the Messenger app. This means that even if your phone is unlocked, you'll need to use Face ID or Touch ID to open that specific app, so you can



hand your phone to a friend to look at something and know that your messages are safe from prying eyes.

How will it affect you?

At the moment, App Lock is

only available on iPhones and iPads, though Facebook said it would be rolling the feature out to Android devices within the next few months.

To enable App Lock on an Apple device, open the Messenger app, head to Settings by tapping your profile photo, swipe down to Privacy and select App Lock. Choose either Require Face ID or Require Touch ID, and specify whether you want to lock Messenger immediately after you exit the chat tool, or after a set time of one minute, 15 minutes or an hour.

What do we think?

There are different types of security - some tools are designed to protect you from scammers and hackers, while

others focus on less impersonal invasions of privacy - someone in your household, say, or an over-inquisitive friend. This new Facebook feature acknowledges the latter threat, tackling the possibility that you might be at risk of snooping by a person you know.

Even if you don't feel the need to use App Lock yourself, it could be helpful for a teenager in your household who may want to protect sensitive conversations from a nosy sibling, or someone in a dangerous situation who is desperate for extra privacy. In such situations, this new feature is a welcome addition.




Gmail fights phishing using company logos

What happened?

Gmail will soon be getting a new way to combat phishing scams. In a blog post, which sees Google "recognise that email functions in a large, complex, interconnected ecosystem" (bit.ly/ gmail507), it announced trials for a handful of security measures.

Chief among these is Brand Indicators for Message Identification (BIMI). The pilot scheme lets companies digitally validate their logos with Google. These images will then replace the current BIMI-free avatars seen in your inbox, so you can be sure that senders are who they say they are. The idea is to increase trust in brands, while keeping people safe from phishing scams, which cost innocent victims millions every year through fake emails designed to capture customer data.

It's all part of a drive from the BIMI Group - a behind-the-scenes outfit that includes Google, Verizon and LinkedIn - to standardise logo displays in emails. Already, many companies have their emails authenticated, using DMARC (Domain-based Message Authentication, Reporting & Conformance), which checks that the sender domain is legitimate. BIMI simply adds an additional step by authenticating the logo at the same time. Google hopes the scheme will be fully rolled-out in a matter of months. After that, it's up to



brands to decide whether to adopt this new standard.

Along with authenticated avatars, Google is also introducing new Meet controls to keep unwanted guests out of your video calls, and phishing protections and new reporting measures in Chat.

How will it affect me?

Keep your eyes on your inbox for the newly validated brand logos - the BIMI pilot scheme begins rolling out in a couple of weeks. However, the trial will only be available to those companies already using DMARC to authenticate their emails, which means that even once BIMI gets a full launch, you'll

continue to receive genuine emails with unverified avatars and will need to stay vigilant. While measures are no doubt in place, we wouldn't put it past scammers to figure out a way to fake or circumvent Google's security measure.

What do we think?

Any boost to email security is good news, and a digital signature is a simple answer to the long-standing problem of emails purporting to be legitimate companies. No business wants their brands associated with phishing scams, so we'd expect this solution to be agreed on and picked up by all involved, particularly given Google's rapid time-frame for launch.



Mozilla VPN vpn.mozilla.org

Over the years, Mozilla has built its reputation on security, privacy and reliability - just the things you need to create a VPN. Which is precisely what the company has done.


After testing a built-in VPN for its Firefox browser, the company has released its standalone Mozilla VPN app "from a trusted pioneer of internet privacy". Offering devicelevel encryption, the tool is available for Windows, Android and iOS (Mac and Linux users will have to wait, but it's on its way).

As you'd expect from these 'trusted pioneers', the app itself is fantastically made. The design is clean to the point of basic, which makes it easy to navigate and use, and the back-end is

impressively secure. The VPN, which has servers in over 30 countries, including the US, UK and Japan, encrypts data and masks IP addresses using the advanced WireGuard protocol, which also delivers mostly decent speeds. Elsewhere, hardened VPN users will appreciate the range of

custom connection options.

So, what's the catch? For starters, it's only available in selected countries at the moment. It also sets a five-device limit, so you can't use the tool on a sixth device without first deregistering an existing one. Most of the big-name VPNs get around this problem by limiting the number of simultaneous connections, which seems like a fairer way to restrict



abuse with much less fuss for the user.

Although most people use VPNs to watch geographically locked content, if a movie isn't on Netflix UK, don't bother trying the US version because it won't work, as Netflix will detect and block the tool. In

such cases, you may have more luck with other streaming services.

Since Mozilla VPN only just came out of beta testing, there's a distinct lack of 'optional extras'. However, for a reasonable \$5 (£3.98) monthly subscription (and a no-catch 30-day money-back guarantee), it's a decent offer from one of the most trusted internet companies.





WHAT'S THE RUMOUR

Will the iPhone 12 be delayed?

Rumour has it that the upcoming iPhone 12 could be delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. For many years, Apple has revealed its latest handsets during its September keynote event, which gives the company the chance to show off its latest devices - and this year it's the turn of the much-anticipated iPhone 12.

However, Japanese blog Mac Otakara claims that multiple Chinese suppliers now expect the reveal to take place in mid-to-late October, with the base 4G model expected to be available shortly after. Disappointingly for Apple fans, the beefier and more modern 5G version could launch even later suppliers are suggesting a November release date.

The report goes on to discuss the iPhone 12's potential processor upgrade. For a while now, we've heard rumours that Apple is switching from the A13



chipset found in the iPhone 11 to the A14. Mac Otakara's sources appear to confirm that a more powerful and efficient processor is on the way in the form of Apple's first 5-nanometre node. It's believed that the manufacturing of these chipsets has been ongoing since around April this year.

LIKELIHOOD RATING

Rumours have been swirling about iPhone 12 delays for some time. Suppliers are often the first to hear about such delays, which gives the Mac Otakara report even more credibility.

The impact of the coronavirus on manufacturing has been particularly hard and unpredictable. Common sense alone tells us to expect

knock-on effects like this as companies try to get back on track. Frankly, we're impressed that Apple is only delaying release by a month (or two months, for those wanting the 5G model).

Some insiders believe that the iPhone 12 won't appear until next year, but we're not convinced that Apple will want to wait that long: pencil an October launch in your diaries.



'No-log' VPNs leaked 20 million users' data

Seven VPN services that claim not to keep any logs of their users' online activities were found to have leaked 1.2 terabytes of user data, according to



security researchers at website VpnMentor (www.vpnmentor.com).

The data was found on a single server shared by the VPNs and included activity logs as well as personally identifiable information such as email addresses, clear-text passwords, IP addresses, home addresses, phone models, device IDs and other technical details.

VpnMentor named the services involved, which are all based in Hong Kong, as UFO VPN, Fast VPN, Free VPN, Super VPN, Flash VPN, Secure

VPN and Rabbit VPN, and said they appear to be connected to the same app developer. The site believes that up to 20 million users may have had their data exposed by the "no-log" VPNs.

"This lack of basic security measures in an essential part of a cybersecurity product is not just shocking," said VpnMentor, "it also shows a total disregard for standard VPN practices that put [the services'] users at risk". bit.ly/vpnmentor507

Twitter hackers accessed direct messages

Twitter has admitted that hackers accessed private direct messages from 36 high-profile accounts during a major attack against



the social network last month. It has not revealed who these accounts belonged to, aside from one owned by an elected official in the Netherlands. This is

believed to be the far-right politician Geert Wilders, whose Twitter profile image was replaced with a caricature of a black man, while his account's background image was changed to the Moroccan flag.

The security breach involved the accounts of 130 celebrities and politicians - including Barack Obama, Elon Musk and Jeff Bezos - being taken over and used to tweet a Bitcoin scam, which tricked their followers into paying the hackers around \$120,000 (£93,600) in Bitcoin. Once notified, Twitter locked the affected accounts to prevent them from tweeting, but said: "We have no evidence that attackers accessed passwords".

The social network blamed the breach on a "coordinated social engineering attack by people who successfully targeted some of our employees with access to internal systems and tools".

The Russia Report confirms what cybersecurity

experts have warned for many years: that the

Russian government and its state-employed hackers are engaging in active cyber warfare against the West. This includes phishing attempts against government agencies, cover efforts to steal top-secret information and activities intended to influence the democratic elections of other nations.

Perhaps most damningly for the British government, the report reveals that the UK has been aware of Russia's ongoing cyberwarfare for around four years. Back in 2016, the Intelligence and Security Committee recommended that the government gain support from the



international community in finding ways to retaliate against Russian cyberattacks.

The report indicates that the UK is a primary target for Russian cyberwarfare, and its release indicates a shift towards actively identifying and assigning blame to cyber warfare performed by Russia, a move that reveals the urgency of the problem and the immediate threat it poses to the UK's national security.

Cybersecurity firms have

for many years detailed nefarious activities by Russian state-sponsored hackers such as Fancy Bear, APT28 and Pawn Storm, but this is the first time the UK government has formally acknowledged that those malicious actors have been targeting government agencies. It will be interesting to see how exactly the government proceeds and what it does to prevent future attacks.

Fake reviews fool us into thinking a product is better than it really is. Smart.Reviews seeks to address this, using AI to filter real reviews of items and businesses. However, Amazon. com and AO.com, according to the identical AI-generated reviews, use a "relitevely [sic] new" domain "which means that it could be a start-up business that does not yet have a huge amount of customers". In other cases, though, the site points to active social-media accounts and security features. You can also write reviews, if you can prove you've used the company or product.



ESSENTIAL BOOKMARKS THIS ISSUE: Stimulating simulator sites



Flight-simulator software lets you fly around the globe, controlling commercial airliners, military planes and even spaceships, while navigating real-time weather, air traffic and runways. Many such programs are huge but GeoFS works entirely in your browser - just click the blue Fly button, choose Autopilot and take to the virtual skies in one of 30 planes. The map is low-res unless you upgrade to GeoFS HD (10€/£9 per year after a free one-day trial, bit.ly/geohd507), which also ditches ads and includes cockpit views. Paid-up or not, you can configure controls, enter 'massive multiplayer' mode and launch a live map to see hundreds of players in action. Also check out the GeoFS wiki at bit.ly/geowiki507 and free mobile apps at bit.ly/geoapp507.



NASA's Eyes

NASA's Eyes lets you man the controls of real NASA mission spacecraft to explore our solar system in glorious interactive 3D. The main simulator has to be installed on your PC or mobile device, but the NASA's Eyes website offers a couple of fun, browser-based simulators, too. Choose between Experience InSight (bit.ly/insight507), which lets you take the reins of NASA's InSight Mars landing craft, and Experience Curiosity (bit.ly/ curiosity507), which lets you explore the red planet in a 4x4 rover. You can even take and download "selfies", though the images aren't actually of you (phew!), but instead show your virtual vehicle as you drive it across Mars.



SpaceX ISS Sim

Elon Musk's Space Exploration Technologies Corp - or SpaceX, for short - invites you to dock its second passenger spaceship, Dragon 2, with the International Space Station (ISS) in this new web simulator. You get to use the same controls and interface that NASA astronauts use to manually pilot the vehicle, and you'll know you've docked successfully when all the green numbers are below 0.2. Movement is slow (you're in space, after all) but it's not easy, so you have to be patient and precise. The result is an almost meditative experience, less frantic and stressful than standard plane simulators, and it's very satisfying when you do eventually dock. Like most online simulators, the site takes a few seconds to load initially.



Solar System Scope

Explore our solar system and beyond, in real time, using this stunning 3D simulator. Zoom in and around to inspect planets, spacecraft and distant constellations, all displayed in their current positions using live satellite data. You can also enter a celestial object's name or catalogue number to visit it, and set any date and time - past or future - to explore a model of the planets and stars at that moment. By default, the simulation exaggerates relative planet sizes, but you can switch this off in settings. The desktop version of Solar System Scope costs \$9.80 (£7.60), while the highly-rated free app (bit.ly/solar507) lets you fly through a live heavenly simulation when you point your device at the sky. Truly out of this world.



Google Earth Web

You may not think of Google Earth as a simulator but this incredible 3D tool is about as close as you can get to soaring over real-life streets, cities, mountains and oceans. If you're missing out on a holiday this year, why not explore your wish-list destinations in Google Earth instead, right down to the cafés and beaches? It's very easy to use - press Shift while dragging your mouse to tilt the globe, then zoom in with your mouse, clicking and dragging to swoop along like Superman. Place names are displayed, so you won't get lost, and everything is kept bang up to date through Google's mapping and Street View technology.







We test and compare the latest products

Tablets

It's official: tablets are making a comeback. We review five of the latest devices to find out which is the best value for money

ablets are the perfect middle ground when you want more than the tiny screen of a smartphone but don't need the full computing power of a laptop or desktop PC. For a while it seemed that tablet manufacturers had given up, leaving Apple to dominate the market with its top-of-the-range expensive iPads – only Amazon seemed to be offering cheaper alternatives. However, now that Apple has split its tablets into regular and Pro models, the basic iPad has become more affordable than ever, and a slew of new releases from Samsung, Amazon and Huawei means more choice for anyone who wants to upgrade their current tablet.

HOW WE TESTED

To compare the performance of both Android and iPadOS devices, we tested all the tablets using the latest cross-platform benchmark Geekbench 5 (www.primatelabs.com).

We also ran a battery test, which loops a video at a screen brightness of 170cd/m² (candles per square metre) and measures how long it runs before the battery dies.

To test the screen quality, we used a colorimeter to measure the maximum brightness, contrast and number of visible colours.

Apple's range of tablets remains by far the best available. The iPad 10.2in is wonderfully slim and light, just 7.5mm thick and weighing 483g. The broad bezel may seem a bit old-fashioned compared to modern smartphones, but it provides enough room for a fingerprint reader and webcam. However, the 1.2-megapixels camera is no different to the previous version, and the rear camera, too, is still only 8-megapixels.

The display is a Retina class 2,160 x 1,620 pixels screen, which means

you won't be able to make out individual pixels when it's held at a standard viewing distance. However, this is as good as it gets for the price, with brightness peaking at 492cd/m² and a contrast ratio of 1,060:1.

The tablet's dual-core A10 Fusion processor was first seen in the 2016 iPhone 7, but its performance stands up remarkably well. Its 769 single-core result in the Geekbench 5 benchmark is excellent and beats the Samsung Galaxy Tab S6's score, though its multicore test result of 1,412 is lower than the Samsung.

Even without considering the more expensive Pro series, the standard range of iPads has for

some time provided decent 2-in-1 features to bring some laptop-style functions to the device. This latest version takes things even further with the addition of a Smart Connector socket on the side, which makes it compatible with the Pro series' Smart Keyboard attachment.

The best thing about the iPad, however, is its iPadOS operating system. The latest version has a supercharged Files app, which lets you connect easily to external drives, including network and cloud drives. The latest version of Safari is also configured as a desktop browser rather than a mobile one, which provides much better service when using sophisticated websites.

VERDICT ★★★★

The superb quality of the 10.2in iPad makes it easily the best tablet available for the price. While you can still pay a lot for the top-of-the-range Pro models, all Apple's tablet know-how has now filtered down to its mid-priced tablet which, if your budget will stretch to it, is unbeatable for the money. Adding the Smart Keyboard costs another £159, but even this doesn't feel extortionate if you use it as a replacement for a laptop.

Amazon has pushed the boat out with its latest Fire tablet, adding more memory, more storage and USB Type-C charging. It's the fastest sub-£100 tablet we've seen, with a quad-core 2GHz MediaTek processor that was



30% faster than the previous model in our test.

Swiping between applications still isn't perfectly smooth but it's a vast improvement on previous models. The Fire HD 8 is even capable of gaming, running the GFXBench Manhattan 3 onscreen test at 24fps (frames per second) compared to the previous model's 7fps. Battery life is good, too, lasting 15 hours 23 minutes in our rundown test. The range of apps in Amazon's store remains limited compared to the Google Play and Apple Apps stores, though most popular apps are available.

The 8in IPS screen is the same as before, with a resolution of 1,280 x 800 pixels, and colours are muted, only managing 70% of the sRGB standard.

VERDICT



Amazon has upgraded 2018's Fire HD 8 with better hardware performance and an improved battery life. The screen is the same, and the software restrictions haven't improved much, but it's the best tablet you can buy for the price.

If you prefer Android to Apple's iPadOS, the Galaxy Tab 6 is a stunningly designed, if expensive, choice. The wafer-thin 5.7mm case houses a 10.5in display that's more compact than the 10.2in



iPad, thanks to its narrower bezels. You can expand the generous 128GB of storage via a microSD card slot, and its main 12-megapixel rear camera takes better photos than you would normally expect of a tablet. It also comes with a stylus included in the price.

Samsung uses an AMOLED panel, rather than an IPS screen, which makes watching videos a joy, with perfect contrast, vivid colours and a crisp resolution of 2,560 x 1,600 pixels.

The Galaxy Tab S6's performance is ultra-responsive, scoring 732 in the single-core Geekbench 5 test and 2,542 in the multi-core test, and the battery life (15 hours and 6 minutes in our test) is good, too.

VERDICT



Arguably the best Android tablet available, the Galaxy Tab S6 is a closer match to Apple's pricey 11in iPad Pro than the mid-range model that wins our Gold Award. The included stylus provides a significant cost saving, too.

If your budget won't stretch to the Galaxy Tab S6, but you still prefer Android over iPadOS, the smaller S6 Lite is a worthy contender. At £299, it's cheaper than the basic iPad, but with double the storage (64GB).



Like its pricier Bronze Award-winning sibling, it comes bundled with a stylus. Both cameras are less powerful - 5- and 8-megapixels - though you're unlikely to be buying a tablet primarily for its photographic prowess. The full S6's AMOLED screen has been downgraded to IPS, 10.4in across the diagonal. However, it's still a great screen, with a resolution of 2,000 x 1,200 pixels and rich, bold colours.

Where the S6 Lite lags behind is in its power. Scoring 343 and 1,335 in the Geekbench 5 tests, it's well behind its rivals. However, the battery life remains solid, lasting 14 hours and 56 minutes in our tests.

VERDICT



The S6 Lite has a fantastic screen and a good battery life, and is worth considering if you can't afford Samsung's top-of-the-range Android tablet and stylus. The slower processor takes its toll on performance, though.

Huawei MatePad Pro | £449 | Buy from Huawei: bit.ly/matepad507

The main drawback faced by all Huawei devices is that, in accordance with US trade sanctions, they can't access Google's Play store. Huawei's App Gallery goes some way to surmounting that obstacle, and you can



copy apps across from an Android phone if you have one, but it's a clunky workaround whichever way you look at it.

Another area where the MatePad Pro fails to rival its competitors is in the build quality. The glass-fibre back and lack of waterproofing feel a little sub-standard.

The MatePad has a 10.8in screen, which is slightly bigger than the standard iPad. It's an IPS model but is great quality. The tablet also managed impressive results in our performance tests, achieving 2,915 in Geekbench 5's multicore test - faster than the standard S6 and twice the score of the iPad. It's battery lasted for 12 hours and 21 minutes.

VERDICT



The Huawei MatePad Pro performed brilliantly in our tests. However, the Android OS is hamstrung without the Google app store and the build quality of the unit doesn't have the sophistication of its rivals.

You can spend a lot of money on its Pro range, but why pay a king's ransom when you can get a refined version of this design classic at a fraction of the price? The 10.2in model doesn't have the highest specification but with a long-running app store crammed with sophisticated software, the overall iPad experience remains the best, winning Apple our Gold Award.

However, not everyone can or wants to spend that much money on a tablet, in which case we'd recommend Amazon's Silver Award-winning Fire HD 8. The latest model is phenomenally good value at under £100.

If you prefer to stick with Android, the Bronze **Award-winning Samsung** Galaxy Tab S6 is a stunning option. It has a superb screen and super-fast processor, along with vast memory and the best cameras in this group, as well as a bundled stylus and access to the

full Android experience. In all respects, the S6 is a marvel - just be sure that you're happy to spend more on it than you would on Apple's iPad.



Although webmail services such as Gmail and Outlook.com are packed with features and let you access your email from anywhere, there are still plenty of benefits to using a desktop email client such as Thunderbird, including the ability to read messages and open attachments when offline.

Thunderbird also makes it easy to add multiple accounts from different providers, including non-webmail services, and comes with an integrated calendar, one-click address book and support for themes. One of its best features is tabbed email, which lets you open messages in separate tabs, making it easy to jump between different





messages. Thunderbird remembers which tabs you have open, so they can be reloaded when you close and later restart the program, and it offers a number of tools that make finding messages much easier.

Thunderbird 78 is the first major update to the program in nearly a year, and offers a number of new features and improvements, including tweaks to the interface and a new Account Hub which acts as a central portal for setting up email accounts.

The recipient address fields (To, Cc,

Bcc) have been redesigned, the method for selecting messages has changed, the Options/Preferences dialogue has been overhauled and different Thunderbird themes can now be previewed in the Add-ons Manager. One negative change is the software now only supports MailExtension add-ons, so other extensions you've used in the past may no longer work.



Passify (www.passify.io) brings password protection to Google Docs, Slides and Sheets. Because, believe it or not, despite its millions of users, there's still no built-in way to password-protect your Google Docs – a function Microsoft has offered since Word 95. While this extension won't let you add passwords to documents stored in your Drive – only Google can do that – it does secure files that are shared with others.

Visit Docs, Sheets or Slides, open a document, then click the add-on's toolbar button. After a quick setup for first-time

users, Passify lets you create a unique password for the item. Next, click the 'Open [file]' button (or, optionally, change the password), which generates a private link to the document that can only be accessed with your password.



Just make sure the file's permissions are set to let anyone with a link open it.

Free users can create three document links at a time, while the £8 premium version offers unlimited usage.

Control videos using your voice

Say Play (bit.ly/sayplay507) is specifically designed for controlling online videos, so you only get a few commands – Play, Pause, Forward and Rewind. Each one is customisable – the default voice commands are listed in text fields, where you can type your own replacements. Default commands are polysyllabic, and we suggest making your customised commands similarly so – to prevent 'hey' being misheard for 'play', for example. You can keep an eye on what Say Play hears using the action feed at the bottom.



Channel-surf on Netflix using Felix

Love streaming video, but want the flexibility of mindlessly hopping through



channels until you find something worth watching? That's what NetFelix (bit.ly/felix507) is for - yes, possibly to reflect a sense of playful adventurousness, it's named after the cartoon cat. NetFelix can be programmed to switch to random points in random TV shows and movies on Netflix.


The first time you use NetFelix, set your region and age restrictions if you don't want anything gory or fruity to pop up. Use the slider to determine how quickly Felix will 'change the channel'. Turning off auto-surf lets you manually switch to a new show, for a more authentic channel-surfing session.

Snippyly (snippyly.com) is "an external version of Google's most used internal productivity tool, built by an ex-Googler". The extension lets you capture, annotate and collaborate on screenshots in real-time.

Clicking the add-on's toolbar button takes a screenshot, while right-clicking the page adds a new option to your context menu for taking shots with a 3-second delay.

Either way, Snippyly opens your screenshot in a new tab with a ribbon of commands. You can add text and draw rectangles and arrows to highlight specific elements. The cleverest feature, though, is the option to visit the source link. When you're ready, click Share – as with Google Docs, other users can edit or view the screenshot, depending on the permissions you grant.







Bookmark sites to revisit forever

WebSatchel (bit.ly/ satchel507) could be the future of bookmarking your favourite websites. One of the biggest problems with bookmarks is that sites sometimes disappear, but this extension lets you "create a highly



accurate copy of any web page and view it forever, even if the original is modified or deleted", without needing to resort to the Internet Archive's Wayback Machine. Save a page, including any details, tags and keywords, and it's stored in your personal WebSatchel library. Here, you can either view the original or a copied and cloud-saved page, and search for specific bookmarks.

As well as saving - or copying - the page, you can save collections of tabs or save a link, which essentially bookmarks URLs in your 'satchel'. WebSatchel is also available for Chrome, Edge, Opera and Firefox for Android.

Control YouTube from your phone

YouTube Connect (bit.ly/connect507) introduces a new icon to the YouTube playback bar, which generates a QR code and 8-word mnemonic when clicked. Point your phone or tablet at the QR code and you'll almost



immediately open playback controls on your device.

The Remote **Application** option, meanwhile, lets you enter the mnemonic to gain access without using a camera.

The developer admits that the add-on is "a side project and is not perfect," but it worked well in our tests. Each tap of the button and swish of the slider worked as instantly as if we were using the desktop controls.

To round out your YouTube extensions collection, check out Old YouTube (bit.ly/oldyt507). It won't work with YouTube Connect, but it'll bring peace to those who think the site's recent redesign is overwhelmingly busy.

Say no to GDPR consent prompts

Accept this, deny that - we occasionally wonder how much time has been lost to the unceasing bombardment of cookie and GDPR prompts.



Like a *Grange Hill* schoolkid, the Never Consent extension (bit.ly/ consent507) just says no. Working unseen in the background, every time a website sends a GDPR consent prompt, the browser tool steps in to deny the request.

Provided the website uses a supported consent platform - and there are plenty on offer, with more updates on the way - you'll never again have to set eyes on a prompt because Never Consent will block it.


We'd like to see cookies denied consent at the same time but, for now, you'll need a separate browser tool for that. The open-source Never Consent can also be installed in Chromium browsers. Get it from bit.ly/chromeconsent507.

Turn on dark mode everywhere Dark Forest (bit.ly/

forest507) is one of the simplest dark-mode extensions yet, and it works on almost any website. By default, dark mode is switched on. Click the add-on's toolbar button to instantly disable the theme, or add the current page to your blacklist, which disables dark mode when you revisit. Right-clicking the page also lets you add and remove blacklisted sites. Given that it works on websites that aren't designed for dark themes, we found the results were pretty good, letting you read almost every word and




Discard tabs automatically

Having too many tabs open saps your computer's memory, grinding it to a juddering halt. Auto Tab Discard (bit.ly/discard507) monitors open tabs for inactivity and, after a set time limit, reduces a tab's memory and processor usage. You can manually discard tabs, with options to suspend one tab, all tabs or even those in another

window. Websites can be added to your whitelist, either for a single session forever.

As our smartphones become ever more powerful, they also get more power-hungry. But rather than include highercapacity batteries with their products, certain manufacturers have started relying on some rather dodgy tactics to keep their handsets running for longer - by killing off apps that are running in the background without telling you.

This can result in a number of unwanted side effects. Alarm clocks, health trackers or any number of other apps that rely on running background


processes to monitor or notify you of something important may just stop working without warning, effectively breaking key functionality. Not only that, but killing background apps has also been proven to have little or no positive impact on battery life.


Luckily, the people behind DontKillMyApp (dontkillmyapp .com) are on a mission to name and shame manufacturers who employ such underhand battery-saving techniques. You can visit the site to see how the manufacturer of your device rates - and now you can also download this app, which allows you to benchmark your phone to measure how aggressively it is killing background apps. Find out

> how to benchmark your phone in our Mini Workshop, right.

Once the benchmark has finished running, the app provides you with a report, along with some potential solutions to try. DontKillMyApp's benchmarks won't offer any profound insight into your device's processing power or memorymanagement abilities, but they will help you diagnose problems with background apps that terminate unexpectedly. The benchmarks are particularly useful for owners of handsets from manufacturers including OnePlus, Huawei and Samsung, which

rate among DontKillMyApp's worst offenders. The app is just out of Early Access and is completely free to use, with no ads or in-app purchases.






On the next screen, you're presented with a series of test durations, ranging from one hour to eight hours 11 - the longer the duration, the more thorough the benchmark. Select a duration, then tap OK on the warning on the next screen. Now leave your device while the test runs. The benchmark will run in the background. Try not to use your device, and don't plug it into its

charger.

When it's done, the results will show an overall Total score 11 and individual scores for the three tests carried out: Work, Main and Alarm. 2 Don't worry too much about the technicalities, but bear in mind that lower percentages could be a sign that there's a problem. Return to DontKillMyApp's initial screen to read any solutions that apply to your device. Try them, then run the benchmark again.

Rural broadband

Many parts of the UK still suffer from slow broadband. David Crookes looks at what's being done to tackle patchy countryside connections

What about it?

Rural broadband, as we're sure you know, is a term used to describe the internet infrastructure connecting homes and businesses in remote areas. It has long been a cause for concern among people living in the countryside, primarily because speeds are generally much slower than in towns and cities, and coverage is often patchy. The coronavirus pandemic has highlighted such problems, but numerous schemes are hoping to bridge the gap.

How slow exactly?

According to a report by Ofcom in May (bit.ly/ofcom507), the overall average speed for rural areas of the UK is 39Mbps as opposed to 76Mbps in towns, cities and their environs. This may not sound too bad - there are urban households that fail to reach the rural average. But this only tells part of the story.

A good number of rural areas are severely lagging behind: residents in Pandy, Wrexham, in the Ceiriog Valley, typically get broadband speeds of less than 1Mbps, for instance, and that's not an entirely isolated case. A broadband speed test by Which last year found that speeds in Argyll and Bute, Moray and Ceredigion averaged about 7Mbps, while the average speed in Orkney was just 3Mbps. Ofcom says that 11% of rural premises have connections of less than 10Mbps, while the National Farmers Union found that only 17% of farmers had



broadband of 24Mbps or more.

Why is there a problem?

It's all down to infrastructure - in particular, the rollout of fibre-optic cable, which has been slower in rural areas than in urban ones. With standard, coppercable broadband, data travels from an ISP to a nearby telecom cabinet before making its way to your home. The closer your house is to a cabinet, the faster your broadband will be, because copper cables are not very efficient and the speed at which data is transported deteriorates the further it has to travel.

Many rural properties still rely on copper cables, and are situated far from cabinets and telephone exchanges. Even when fibre-optic cables are laid to those points, data still has to get down vast distances of copper on the last leg of its journey, unless that part too is replaced (which is called "full-fibre").


So what's being done?

Well, the government's Universal Service Obligation for broadband (bit.ly/uso507) provides a legal right to request a decent connection - 'decent' being viewed as a 10Mbps download and 1Mbps upload speed. BT is responsible for fulfilling these requests (unless you're in Hull,

where it's down to KCOM), but if the cost of building or connecting your home exceeds £3,400, then you'll need to stump up the difference - and it may take as long as 24 months to get you sorted.

Last year, the government announced that it would roll out fibre broadband to rural public-sector and community buildings at a two-year cost of £200m. Named Rural Gigabit Connectivity, the scheme is being delivered by Building Digital UK (BDUK, bit.ly/bduk507), filling a hole that's unlikely to be tackled by commercial broadband providers any time before 2033.



CAN I MOVE AND IMPROVE?

Since many employers are becoming accustomed to their staff working from home on a permanent basis, some employees - freed from the constraints of a daily commute - may be considering moving to coastal or more rural locations. According to a survey by NetVoucherCodes.co.uk, there are decent broadband speeds in the seaside towns of Crosby, Tynemouth, Margate, Southwold and Aberystwyth, all boasting a minimum of 35.7Mbps. Good connections are also available in Altrincham, Witney, Ely, Knutsford and Bollington, though whether we'd class them as truly rural is another question.



(gigabitvoucher.culture.gov.uk), which offers money to help businesses and residents fund the installation of fast broadband.

How does that work?

If rural premises group together, they may be eligible for £1,500 per home and up to £3,500 for each small to mediumsize business. The money is applied for by a supplier and is used to fund (and incentivise) the installation of a full-fibre network offering speeds of up to 1Gbps. The Welsh government announced in June that it would top up these grants, because installation in Wales has proven trickier and more expensive due to the country's topography.

Which suppliers are involved?

Dozens of suppliers have provided connections, including Openreach, Virgin Media and the BT Group. Openreach said in January that it was widening its build programme to include 250,000 homes and businesses in more than 200 market towns and villages, following trials in 13 rural communities. The company has been experimenting with specialised equipment to increase efficiency, stretching fibre across rivers and valleys, using ground-penetrating radar to guide diggers and employing "diamond cutter" rotating-blade machines to cut into roads

and pavements, which have reduced installation times by months.

Are local people fully on board?

Definitely, and among the suppliers are many locally set-up groups including the non-profit community-benefit society Broadband for the Rural North (B4RN) (b4rn.org.uk), which is run with the support of landowners and volunteers. B4RN has so far connected 7,235 customers with a fibre-to-the-home network in many rural north-west villages, providing residents with 1Gbps download speeds.

What makes B4RN particularly interesting is that local people reduced the cost by helping secure permissions to use land, digging huge lengths of trenches to far-flung properties and laying the plastic ducting for the cable. They had to tackle obstacles as varied as rivers, stone walls, roads and railway lines, while also drawing expertise from computer engineers at the University of Lancaster. B4RN is now run by 56 permanent staff members, and its

success has led to similar schemes being set up in Devon, Somerset and Norfolk.


Has the coronavirus had an impact?

Yes. On the one hand, the increased reliance on the internet for shopping, services and entertainment has demonstrated the importance of a good broadband connection. On the other, it has slowed the implementation of new networks. In the case of B4RN - which now has an in-house civil engineering team and wants to connect 40,000 homes by 31 March 2022 - they've struggled to get the last bit of cable installed into homes. But volunteers were able to identify those most at need, so they could work on getting these homes connected as quickly as possible.

Are there alternatives to wired connections?

Satellite broadband is one alternative since it only requires a dish, but installation isn't cheap, streaming can be laggy and there are restrictions on data. That said, the government has taken a 45%, £400m stake in the satellite

OneWeb (www .oneweb.world), which intends to put 650 satellites into low orbit, paving the way for rural broadband from space. In doing so, it's going headto-head with SpaceX's Starlink (starlink.com), an initiative with pretty much the same aim.

Another alternative is mobile broadband using 4G and 5G networks, but signals are often patchy and 5G has been set back by the government's ban of Huawei.

Will certain areas benefit more than others?

There are schemes rolling out everywhere. Openreach, for example, announced in July that it was adding 94 rural villages and towns to its 1Gbps fibre-to-the-premises programme in Northern Ireland. Around the same time, Northumberland County Council announced a deal with BT to deliver gigabit fibre connection to public buildings in the county, with councillors claiming it will provide better connectivity in rural areas than in many city centres.

Whether you want to save your family video calls or demonstrate how to fix a tech problem, **Wayne Williams** reveals the best ways to capture anything you do on your PC, phone and tablet

the coronavirus lockdown, with millions of people across the UK taking part in video calls, business meetings and even consultations with their doctors. But the ephemeral nature of live video often means you can't revisit content to enjoy or analyse later, in the way that you can with text-based conversations.

Fortunately, it's easy to record what you do on your PC or phone, to give you a permanent copy that can be edited and shared in whatever way you want. In this feature, we reveal the best free ways to capture the contents of your screen to keep forever.

As well as recording your video chats with other people, we explain how to capture high-quality videos of yourself to post online (rather than just using your device's basic tools); create video tutorials to, for example, demonstrate how to solve tech problems; and record gameplay videos to show off your skills.



RECORD YOUR VIDEO CHATS



Record FaceTime chats on your iPhone or iPad

If you want to record FaceTime video chats on Apple devices, you can do so using the built-in screen recorder on

your iPhone or iPad. Open the Control Centre on your device (the method varies depending on the model), and tap the recording icon. You'll see a three-second countdown, then a red bar will appear at the top of the screen to indicate that it is being recorded.

Start your FaceTime call as normal and.

when you've finished chatting, open the Control Centre again and tap the button to end the recording. Your video will be saved to the Photos app on your device.

Record WhatsApp video calls

You can't record video calls directly through WhatsApp but, if you have an iPhone or iPad, you can use the same trick for recording FaceTime, as described above.

Android doesn't (currently) offer built-in screen recording, though some manufacturers include an option for this. Huawei, for example, includes a Screen Recorder in its phones that you can access by swiping down from the status bar to open the navigation panel, then swiping down again to reveal a shortcut for the feature. If it's not there



 or you just want a quicker way to start recording press the volume up and power buttons. Recordings are saved to your Gallery.

If your Android phone doesn't offer built-in recording, then you'll need to install an app from the Google Play store that will handle the task. MNML Screen Recorder (bit.ly/mnml507) is one of the simplest free options, though it's still at the 'early access' stage.



Record your Zoom video chats

Video chatting took off massively during the coronavirus lockdown, and Zoom was the service that benefited most from this boom, thanks to its ease of use and flexibility. Zoom lets you record chats directly within its desktop app, and the feature is available to both free users and paid-for subscribers, although it isn't supported on Android or iOS.

To use Zoom's recording feature, you first need to sign into the web portal as an administrator. Go to My Account, Settings and click the Recording tab. Navigate to Local Recording and make sure the option is enabled. Only the host

of a Zoom chat can record a video, though they can grant permission to a participant. All you have to do is click the Record button, then select 'Record on this Computer'. Paid-for Zoom subscribers can also record video to the cloud.



Record your Skype video calls


Skype may have been eclipsed somewhat by Zoom during the lockdown, but Microsoft's chat service remains hugely popular and

the good news is that it also allows you to record calls through its apps. Recording is cloud-based and available for Skype-to-Skype calls.

To record a call on desktop or mobile, start or join a meeting and click the Record button. A banner will appear to let everyone participating in the call know that it's being recorded. When the call completes, the recording will be posted to your chat and you'll be able to and save or share it at any time within the next 30 days.

IS IT LEGAL TO RECORD VIDEO CONVERSATIONS?

In the UK, it is perfectly legal to record a video chat and, while it's always polite to inform the people you're talking to that you will be cording them, there legal requirement for you to do so. Provided, that is, the recording is for personal use only. If you make it public, or share it without the consent of the participants, you could be hit with a civil claim for breach of privacy. The law is much stricter



when it comes to businesses recording conversations and they must abide by the Telecommunications Regulations 2000 act (bit.ly/telecom507).



CAPTURE YOUR SCREEN'S CONTENTS

Record your screen in Windows 10

There are various apps you can use to record what's on your PC screen in Windows 10, but the operating system also comes with its own tool for the job. The Xbox Game Bar, which you can open by pressing the Windows key+G, is primarily designed

for recording games, so you can show off your gaming prowess, demonstrate how to achieve high scores or help fellow gamers get past a particularly tricky part – but it's not limited to that purpose. However, it does have one major restriction, which is that it only records what's happening in the active window – be it Chrome, Zoom or VLC Media Player – not the entire screen.

If pressing Win+G doesn't open the Game Bar, check it's enabled by going to Start, Settings, Gaming, Game Bar. You can change the keyboard shortcuts that the Game Bar uses here, too. The feature can record a combination of on-screen sounds, browser audio and narration. Recordings are saved to the Captures folder (in PC, Videos).

Record your PC screen


The best way to record your PC screen – and then edit the video afterwards – is to use a third-party capture tool. Many of the better ones cost money, although there may be a feature-limited free version available. Bandicam (www




Windows 10's Game Bar lets you record videos and games

.bandicam.com) is one such example. The free edition limits you 10 minutes of recording time per file and includes a watermark. The full version removes these limitations for \$40 (£31).

If you want a free, unlimited tool, we recommend the brilliant open-source program OBS Studio (obsproject.com). This is available for Windows, macOS and Linux, and lets you record, edit and share all onscreen activity or stream it live. Like the built-in Xbox Game Bar on Windows 10, OBS Studio is primarily aimed at gamers – the popular gameplay streaming service Twitch is one of the software's main sponsors – but you can use it for any task.

If you don't want to download or install anything major, you can use Apowersoft's Free Online Screen Recorder (bit.ly/apower507). Click the Start Recording button and save and run the small launcher file. It can record full screen or a specified region, system sounds and your webcam. There is a desktop version of the tool, too.

Mirror and record your phone's screen

One way to record what's happening on your phone or tablet is to mirror its screen on your PC. You can do this using Vysor for Android (bit.ly/vysor507). Install the app on your phone, then install Vysor on your computer (www.vysor.io). It works with Windows, macOS and Linux. Windows users also need to install the ADB drivers from adb.clockworkmod.com.

RECORD YOUR PHONE CALLS

We've explained how you can record video calls on your phone, but what about audio conversations? This can be really useful if you want to refer back to what someone said at a later date – though, as with video calls, any recordings you make should be for personal use only.

You could record the audio using the same method as detailed with video calls, but a better option is to use an app such as TapeACall (www.tapeacall.com) for iPhone, which can record incoming and outgoing calls, including calls you're already on. It isn't free, however - you need to sign up for a paid-for monthly subscription (from £3.49) and it requires your



network to support three-way calling (which not all do).

For Android, there's ACR (Another Call Recorder - bit.ly/acrecord507), which lets you capture conversations on your phone for free. We found it worked well for us in the past but users report that it is currently having problems, especially with newer versions of Android.

Google is reportedly working on a recording feature for its Android Phone app that lets you record conversations by pressing a button on the call screen. You need at least Android 9, but we don't yet know when – and in which countries – it will be made available.

DON'T LET HACKERS RECORD YOU

You may have read news stories about hackers gaining remote access to the cameras and microphones built into computers and phones. The problem is relatively rare, but you shouldn't be complacent, and there are some simple steps you can take to ensure it doesn't happen to you. First, avoid using dedicated apps from the likes of Skype and Zoom, and stick with the web versions instead. This will give hackers fewer ways to compromise your camera and microphone. If you do have to use an app, make sure you're running the latest version.

Next, check which apps have permission for video and microphone access. On a Windows 10 PC, go to Settings, Privacy, Camera. You can 'Turn off Camera access' altogether, or select which apps are allowed to access it. Android users can check and revoke permissions

by going to Settings, Apps (or Apps & Notifications), Advanced, 'App permissions', Camera (there's also an App permissions page for the microphone). Finally, iPhone users can manage permissions under Settings, Privacy, Camera, and Settings, Privacy, Microphone.

Another simple option is to cover the camera when it's not in use with electrical tape or a piece of cardboard, or disable your webcam temporarily using the free tool Webcam On-Off (bit.ly/webcam507).

PC via USB, and enable USB debugging. The Vysor app will guide you through the process. You need to pair your phone or tablet with your computer. Once that's done, the device screen will appear mirrored on your PC and you can begin recording it using a program such as OBS Studio.

Although you can mirror and control Android video for free, the quality of the image won't be fantastic. For higher quality mirroring, plus built-in screen recording and other features, you need to upgrade to Vysor Pro for \$10 (£8) a year or \$40 (£31) for a lifetime licence.




Vysor lets you mirror your Android device on your PC to capture its screen

Use LaunchBox to record any game


LaunchBox (launchbox-app.com) is a games manager that was originally designed to make it easier to run DOS games in Windows, but can now handle everything from modern titles to older non-PC releases using emulators. The program was recently updated to version 11 (we featured it in last issue's Best Free Software) and introduces optional OBS Studio integration. This lets you record gameplay videos and associate multiple recordings (and screenshots) with each game.

YouTube has many examples of this type of video, so if you're really good at a particular game, why not show off your skills to the world?




LaunchBox now features OBS Studio Integration for recording gameplay

Record video from your desktop using OBS Studio




When you first run OBS Studio, you have the option to run the Auto-Configuration Wizard. Select 'Optimise just for recording', 1 click Next 2 and select your preferred resolution and frames per second (FPS). The default choices should be fine. Click Apply Settings and you're ready to begin.




Configure any other settings you require, including adding more sources such as images or a webcam. Click the Start Recording button. 1 You can pause and resume at any time. 2 Minimise OBS, and carry out the actions you want to record on your screen. When done, stop the recording, and go to File, Show Recordings 1 to view it.

CREATE VIDEOS TO SHARE ONLINE

Perfect your videos before sharing

Creating viral videos for YouTube,
TikTok and other services isn't as easy
as it might appear. Simply uploading
a video as it was shot on your phone
may attract views - depending on the
topic and the heading - but it's more
likely to vanish in a sea of similar
content. There are various ways to
make your video creations stand out,
whether they're simple chats to camera
or more sophisticated podcasts and
presentations.



While most decent smartphones will produce HD or 4K video, you might want to invest in a better microphone and a tripod (or selfie stick) to hold your phone/camera steady. If you're going to be shooting indoors, then you'll definitely need some quality lighting. Clamp lamps are perfect, versatile and affordable, and can be mounted in various ways.

Video-editing software can trim out boring bits and apply cuts, effects, filters and transitions. A lot of people watch videos on their phones without the sound on. To make sure you don't lose them, you need to add overlaid text or closed captions so viewers can understand what they are seeing without sound. You can add these as part of the editing process – or, if uploading to Facebook, use the social network's auto-captioning feature.

Finally, take some time to watch videos that have successfully found an audience to see if they are using any tricks that you can borrow and employ in your own videos.

Record yourself on your webcam

If your laptop (or desktop) has a good-quality webcam, you can use this to record yourself. Windows 10 comes with a built-in app for this purpose called Camera. Type camera into the




The Windows Camera app makes it easy to record yourself using your webcam

Windows search box and press Enter to open it. It should find and launch your webcam automatically. Get yourself ready and make any available adjustments to the video quality, then click the video button to start recording. Your finished video will be saved to your PC's camera roll (unless you've changed this in Settings).

Even if Camera is too basic, you don't need to install anything to record your webcam because there are browser-based tools for the job. Cam Recorder (www.cam-recorder.com) is one of the best choices – unlike some alternatives, it doesn't require you to pay to remove annoying limitations, and is entirely free.

Grant the app permission to access your camera, click the red Record button to begin, then click Stop when you're done. Your video is only ever stored locally – not in the cloud – which is good news if you're worried about privacy. You can save it for offline editing or upload it to YouTube for editing and/or sharing there. Icons at the top right let you switch to a different camera or microphone if you have more than one to choose from.

If your webcam isn't top quality but you have a good digital camera, you may be able to use that instead. Earlier in lockdown, Canon released its EOS Webcam Utility for Windows 10 (bit.ly/canon507), which converts compatible EOS and PowerShot cameras into webcams via a USB connection. Nikon has a similar tool (bit.ly/nikon507).

CREATE YOUR OWN VIDEO TUTORIALS

During lockdown, many people turned to online videos on sites such as YouTube and Facebook to learn how to perform DIY tasks, cut their own hair or master cooking skills. If you are particularly good at something, and want to share your knowledge and ability with others, there's nothing to stop you creating your own tutorials. As we've discussed elsewhere on this page, you'll need some good-quality equipment – a microphone, some way of

keeping your camera or phone steady and decent lighting. Captions and text overlays are essential here, too.

If you intend to record on-screen activity for your tutorial, then the aforementioned OBS Studio is ideal, but if you're going to be filming a video and then editing it, we'd recommend the free, open-source program Shotcut (shotcut.org). It's available for Windows, macOS and Linux, can handle all the main media formats and even supports 4K video. You can import content directly from a webcam, and capture audio separately as well. All the editing is done on a multi-track timeline and there are loads of effects, filters and transitions on offer.

Capture short looping videos

If you spend a lot of time on Instagram (or Facebook), you've no doubt encountered those short looping clips in the social network's Stories section, where the video plays forwards and backwards over and over again. Creating them is easier than you might imagine because all you need is Boomerang. There are separate apps for Android (bit.ly/boomand507) and iOS (bit.ly/

boomios507) and it's also an option in Instagram's camera.

The way Boomerang works is very straightforward find something interesting that's moving, press the camera button and Boomerang will record a burst of 10 images and animate them. You can use the front or back camera on your device, and the app was recently updated with

new features and three effects -Slowmo, Echo (adds a motion blur) and Duo (adds a glitchy fast-rewind effect). Creating Boomerang videos is great fun and more than a little addictive!

Turn your pictures into videos

There are lots of free tools you can use - on your computer, phone or tablet -



Turn your photos into videos with music using the excellent online tool Animoto

to turn photos into videos, complete with audio, transitions and effects. Animoto (animoto.com) is one of the best online choices. All you have to do is pick a template or start from scratch, upload some images and select some music to go with your video - Animoto does the rest. If you're not happy with the results, you can remix them or start again.

YouTube's Video Builder (bit.ly/ vidbuild502) is a good choice for PC or Mac owners, particularly if you're a business user and want to advertise your company. It offers a small selection of free, customisable layouts.

If you have an iPhone or iPad, then MuseWorks' VidLab (bit.ly/vidlab507) is an excellent multi-track, multi-clip video editor that can put together professional-looking creations from videos, photos, art, music and voiceovers.

Edit videos on your phone

If you're shooting videos on your phone, it makes sense to edit them there, too. Your device will offer some basic editing tools, to adjust the colours, apply filters, straighten a wonky clip, rotate a video, and so on. But for proper editing, you'll need a more advanced app. If you have

an iPhone, you can use Apple's iMovie app, which lets you make Hollywoodstyle trailers or movies with matching titles, transitions and music. There are better choices available, however.


The ad-supported Videoshop, for iPhone, iPad and Android (videoshop .net) lets you trim unwanted parts, merge clips, add sound effects and music (iOS users can import tracks from Apple Music), adjust the video speed, introduce subtitles and share the finished result with friends.

The free version of Videoshop adds a small watermark to the top-right corner, but you can remove this annoyance for £2.99. There's also a more advanced ad-free Pro version available for £3.49 a month (or a one-off payment of £84.99).

Adobe Premiere Rush (bit.ly/rush507) is an excellent video editor for both Android and iOS, but the free trial limits you three exports and 2GB of cloud

storage. If you want the full thing - with unlimited exports, 100GB of cloud storage, and all features unlocked - you'll need to pay £9.98 a month or £119.21 a year.

Remember that a large video will take longer to upload, so you may want to reduce its quality.

Best free personal banking software

Whether your finances are in disarray or you just like to keep track of every penny, personal banking software has many benefits. **Andy Shaw** tests six free tools to help you balance the books



of programs that help you manage your finances like a professional accountant. Thankfully, HomeBank is not one of them. You don't need to wade into accounting terminology and double-entry bookkeeping to keep an eye on your personal

accounts, and HomeBank is more than enough to balance budgets, avoid unpleasant surprises and help save up for necessary expenditure.

HomeBank breaks you in gently. You set up a single account – probably your current account – and either fill in some transactions manually or download them from your bank. Of all the programs we tested, HomeBank made this process the most straightforward, smoothly allowing us to import a file from a current account and intelligently draw information from it. It recognised codes for items such as Direct Debits and uses icons to highlight them.



It also knew the difference between income and expense without needing it spelled out. That might sound like an obvious requirement, but not all the software we reviewed managed it.

Once you've got your first account under control, you can add more, making connections between them to help you manage how money flows into your savings and investments.

The software provides a very basic reconciliation tool for checking that your statements line up with expectations. Dig a little deeper, however, and you'll find tools for managing a budget, seeing where your

money goes and generally keeping an eye on your cash.

How it can be improved:

HomeBank exposes its open-source roots with its interface, which has a decidedly Linux feel to it, particularly when it comes to loading and saving files. This can be a bit off-putting if you're expecting a more familiar Windows look.

We also wish the reconciliation tool was a bit more sophisticated because we couldn't find a way to

enter a balance that we could reconcile our accounts with.

OUR VERDICT

HomeBank gets the balance of personal banking just right. It has handy tools for making the most of your money but doesn't needlessly mire you in the murky world of small-business accounting. It's easy to import information about your accounts to get you started, and its clear, useful tools can help you manage and balance your budgets.


KMyMoney has a reasonably intuitive interface,

with a wizard to help get your accounts set up and an import tool that accepted our bank's

OPX file without too many problems.

The main screen looks rather like a web-page home screen, with a summary of your wealth (or otherwise), and account names you can click to view more detail. Scroll down to get forecasts, charts, summaries of cash flow and a host of further information. The language is a bit too close to accountant-speak for our liking ("liquid assets" and "cash flow") but it's certainly thorough.

The left-hand column contains a menu of icons that take you to a range of reports and payees. Behind all this, the software is thorough and consistent. We liked, for example, that you can give a payee a category so that any future



transactions are automatically assigned to it.

How it can be improved:

Before you go through and categorise your

transactions, your accounts are highlighted with warning triangles and red writing, which makes your bank account look in worse shape than it probably is.

OUR VERDICT

There's some solid accounting software running behind KMyMoney's facade but the interface is initially unfriendly and has far more upfront detail than most people need. If you want to delve deeper into your accounts, however, and aren't afraid of a bit of financial jargon, it's worth a look.



Once you've set up an account in the system, you get a statement-like view that keeps a tally of how much money you have and where it's come from. You can create as many accounts as you like and, of course, if you make real life transfers from one to another, you can reflect the changes in the accounts using the software.

GnuCash's software is geared towards much more than basic home accounts. To that end, it provides advanced tools,



including a database for keeping essential information on customers, and can help you create invoices.

How it can be improved:

If your only

requirement from a banking program is to balance your accounts and budget to save up for a new car, for example, GnuCash's advanced tools are overkill and may only end up confusing you.

OUR VERDICT

GnuCash is a capable tool for home banking, but its broader remit is to manage the accounts of a small business, which it does very well. However, it's a bit too busy for the basic task of controlling the family purse strings.



Give family members their own Prime Video watchlist

It's an open secret that many of us share our Amazon Prime accounts with friends and family to help spread the cost. It's a great idea, but not without its

downsides because your account sharers can mess up your Prime Video watchlist, change settings such as subtitles and - worse - move your viewing position so you can't pick up where you left off.

So we're delighted that
Amazon has finally introduced
user profiles to Prime Video to avoid
these hassles. You can now split one
account into up to six 'profiles', each
with its own separate viewing progress,
settings and lists. The profiles are
effectively free additional accounts.

To get set up, go to Prime Video in your browser and click 'Who's Watching?' (this appears under My Stuff in the app, bit.ly/prime507). You'll appear by default as the account holder. Click 'Add new' to create a separate new profile for, say, your spouse. You can then switch between profiles with one click in the same menu. The 'Kid's profile' option limits content to shows and films suitable for under-12s and

Lock down your Netflix profile with a PIN

Netflix, which introduced profiles seven years ago, says that the feature has actually helped boost subscriber numbers (bit.ly/numbers507) rather than diluting profits by allowing too many people to divvy up their subscriptions. Perhaps that's why Amazon finally added profiles, too.

But Netflix has kept ahead by adding a new PIN protection feature, which lets you lock down your profile and prevent other account users peeking at what you've been watching. Set it up via your Account page (www.netflix.com/YourAccount). Click the dropdown arrow for your profile, select Change next to Profile Lock, enter the account password, tick 'Require a PIN', then choose your four numbers.

It's also worth knowing that you can switch off autoplay via the Manage Profiles page (bit.ly/manage507). Untick the two boxes to banish Netflix's irritating habit of pressing Play at every opportunity.







separate extensions, but if you both (or all) use several similar extensions, you'll find them much easier to manage using the free Chrome add-on 'Extension Manager with Profiles' (bit.ly/ exman507).

Chromebooks can be split into profiles, too. On the sign-in screen, click 'Add person', enter their Google Account credentials, then follow the steps. Chrome and Chromebooks also have a Guest option - 'Guest' users can't change settings or add bookmarks, and their history isn't saved. It's a handy way to let a friend use your computer without having to sign into their Google account.

Discover Firefox's hidden Profiles Manager

Firefox lets you create profiles - not just for different people, but for different versions of the browser. For example you could have one profile for you, one for your sister and one for the beta version Firefox Nightly. To open the Create Profile Wizard, type about:profiles in the Firefox address



Creating a guest space in Windows 10 lets someone else share your PC without giving them access to your files or settings. Go to Settings, Accounts, 'Family & other people', then 'Add someone else to this PC', and enter their Microsoft account info. Or, to avoid the Microsoft sign-in, click 'I don't have this person's

sign-in information', then 'Add a user without a Microsoft account'. Give the new account a name (such as 'My guest') and password, which your guest will need to log in. To switch between accounts, click your profile picture in the Start menu, then select the account you want to switch to.

SET UP PROFILES ON YOUR PHONE

If your Android tablet or phone supports profiles, you'll see a person icon at the bottom-right of the Quick Settings panel (swipe down twice). Tap it to see Guest and 'Add new' options.

Apple iPhones and iPads don't support profiles at all (unless you're a school: bit.ly/shared507), but you can share your device's calendar, photo albums, App Store purchases and iTunes library with loved ones - without having to give them your Apple ID - by setting up Family Sharing, which you'll find under

iCloud in Settings. Just be aware that





Al experiments you can try online


Machine learning and neural networks may sound techy and dull, but they can actually prove lots of fun. We round up the best free examples that can be run in your browser

Get AI to guess your doodles

Quick, Draw (quickdraw.withgoogle .com) was one of Google's first public Al experiments and, even after three years, we still love playing this neural-network-powered game. It gives you 20 seconds to doodle different things using your mouse, then tries to identify them. There are six rounds in each game, and challenges include drawing a crocodile, palm tree and pizza, with the site guessing as you scribble. Doodles are added to Google's dataset of more than 50 million, to improve the accuracy of the Al, and you can view other people's attempts at drawing the same items.



Similar but more flexible is AutoDraw (autodraw.com), which guesses what you're sketching with your mouse (or your finger on a touchscreen), then replaces your amateur doodles with



professional-looking alternatives. Just choose the one that best matches your squiggles from the selection above the drawing pad.

For further artistic fun, Magic Sketchpad (bit.ly/sketch507) asks you to draw an animal or object from its category list, then uses its AI wizardy to complete your virtual pen strokes and create a collaborative picture.

Edit and enhance photos using Al

Why bother using an image editor to improve the quality of your photos, when artificial intelligence can do the hard work for you? Let's Enhance (letsenhance.io) uses neural networks to 'upscale' the resolution of your pictures by four times, producing results that are noticeably sharper, and fixes problems with colour and tone. It offers separate options for photos of faces and those of architecture, nature and crowds, as well as presets for optimising print quality. There's also a new Smart Enhance tool that removes blur and blemishes, and restores natural skin and hair texture.

You need to sign up for an account to

use Let's Enhance, which lets you upload, improve and save five photos for free. Paid-for plans cost from \$9 (£7.20) a month. Note that images can take a few minutes to process.


Equally impressive is Remove.bg (remove.bg), which uses AI to automatically identify the subject of a photo and strip away everything else, so you can place it against a different background. You can download one high-quality image and 50 previews (of up to 0.25 megapixels) per month, or purchase credits from 18p each.


Play text-based online games against Al

Classic text-based adventure games such as Zork relied on a limited range of commands and scenarios, but Al Dungeon (play.aidungeon.io) promises "a world of endless possibilities, where you can do absolutely anything you can imagine". Choose from settings including fantasy, mystery and apocalyptic, and characters such as noble, wizard or rogue, to generate a story, then type what you want to do at each prompt. The machine-learning

technology effectively makes things up as it goes along, creating a unique, absorbing experience that reacts to virtually anything you suggest. Al Dungeon is free to play and you can register with the site to save your progress.

If you fancy something livelier, Sematris (bit.ly/semantris507) is an addictive Al-powered word-association game. In its Arcade version, you're challenged to move words to the bottom of a list by typing other words related





to them, while the Tetris-style Blocks option involves suggesting 'clues' to words in coloured blocks, to try and clear complete lines.

Talk to AI bots in your browser

Lots of companies now use chatbots to reply to common customer queries, but if you'd prefer a more freeform and informal conversation, you can talk to a bot online. One of the most popular is



Cleverbot (cleverbot .com), which uses complex coding to hold textbased chinwags with humans, responding instantly to anything you type. If the chat becomes stilted, you

can use the 'think about it' and 'think for me' buttons to move things along. Cleverbot also has a 'human' face in the form of Eviebot (eviebot.com), which uses the same AI technology but lets you interact with an animated (and rather creepy) female avatar.

Among other notable examples are Elbot (elbot.com), whose chats involve "sarcasm and wit, along with a healthy dose of irony," and the impressively fluent Mitsuku (bit.ly/mitsuku507), who claims to have answers to nearly every question. There are also hundreds of bots for Facebook Messenger, including one launched in April by the World Health Organisation to answer coronavirus-related questions (bit.ly/whobot507).

Make amazing machine music


There are several clever online tools that let you create your own music by collaborating with a machine. For example, Google experiment The Infinite Drum Machine (bit.ly/drum507) offers thousands of everyday sounds that you can combine into a unique

WHAT IS TENSORFLOW?

Most of the experiments and games in this feature are based on TensorFlow, a Googledeveloped technology that makes creating machine-learning tools for desktop, mobile and the web relatively straightforward.




TensorFlow uses the programming language Python to let developers construct data-flow graphs of mathematical operations. These models, called neural networks, are composed of layers containing neurons, which can be trained to recognise patterns and abstract representations of data, and classify that data in a way that's understandable to humans. See the official TensorFlow website (tensorflow.org) for more information.



rhythm track by dragging the four circles over the coloured dots. Click the play button to hear the result, or the intertwined arrows for a random selection.

For budding pianists, there's AI Duet (bit.ly/duet507), which invites you to play a tune by clicking the on-screen keyboard or pressing keys on your physical one, then responds to your melody with a suitable musical response. Hit another few notes and it will respond again - and, because its neural network has been trained to recognise notes, rhythm and timing, the resulting duet will stay remarkably

If you're feeling more adventurous, Semi-Conductor (semiconductor .withgoogle.com) lets you conduct an Al orchestra by waving your arms in front of your webcam to control the tempo, volume and instrumentation of a piece. Then there's the highly amusing Giorgio Cam (bit.ly/giorgio507), which generates song lyrics about pictures



you capture with your PC's camera. We looked at Al-generated music in our FAQ in Issue 502 (bit.ly/ webuser502).

Play webcam games with **vour hands**

Actions can speak louder than words with AI tools, and allow for ingenious new takes on traditional pastimes. Shadow Art (shadowart.withgoogle .com), for example, challenges you to make shadow puppets of the 12 signs of the Chinese Zodiac, by replicating the on-screen illustrations in front of your webcam. Once it detects that your hands have created the puppet correctly, you move on to the next animal, but you need to be quick to complete them all!



Much simpler is TensorFire's webcam version of the classic game Rock Paper Scissors (bit.ly/rock507), which you play against the machine by forming one of the titular shapes with your hand. The neural network makes its own choice simultaneously and recognises whether you've blunted, wrapped or cut it, or vice versa. If you'd rather not grant permission to your webcam, an entirely browser-based AI version of the game is available at bit.ly/paper507.


Chat to friends & family using Discord

Discord lets you create multiple chat rooms and make voice and video calls. Here's how to use it


ockdown has led people to embrace new tools for communicating with friends and family online. While Zoom and Microsoft Teams lead the pack, the chat tool of choice for many in the gaming world is Discord. It's a brilliant communication platform – whether you're a gamer or not – and comes packed with useful features,

including the ability to set up private rooms for different groups, and support for bots.

There are paid-for Nitro and Nitro Classic versions, which add more features and improved quality, for \$9.99 (around £7.79) and \$4.99 (£3.89) a month respectively. However, the free version is perfectly adequate for most users.




Start by creating a Discord account and logging in (you may be asked to verify your email address). The next step is to add some contacts. If a person you know already uses Discord, you can add them with their tag. 1 Enter this and click Send Friend Request. 2 They need to accept your request.



Friends you add are shown on the left. Pepeat the process to add more. The Active Now section on the right alerts you when a contact performs an action, such as voice chatting. Discord can customise this and other elements – if you want it to do this, click the Yes box, otherwise click No. 3






Use the tabs at the top to filter your list of friends to see who is currently online, view any pending requests and see anyone you've blocked. Hover over someone's name to see their full tag Click the speech bubble 4 to send them a message, or the three-dot button 5 to start a call.




To begin a chat, just start typing.


Messages scroll up from the bottom.

You can send images by clicking the GIF or Emoji buttons and browsing through the available options. Use the buttons to switch between available GIFs and emoji. Use the search box 4 to find the image you need.




You can start a voice or video call at any time by choosing the option from the menu button. Once connected, you can switch between audio and video 1 and turn on Screen Share. 2 You can choose what part of the screen to share, adjust the quality and pick a frame rate.





Start a group chat by clicking the icon, 1 selecting some contacts and clicking Create Group DM. 2 Discord also supports servers - these are home to topic-based channels. Click the 'Add a Server' button, **1** then click 'Create a server'. Name it, click Create and invite some friends.



Once you've created a server, you can invite people to join, personalise it with an icon and send your first message. 1 From here, you can create separate text and voice channels. 2 Clicking the cog button next to a channel **3** lets you edit it, change its name, fill in a topic and set permissions and roles for people.



If you have lots of people on your server, managing and moderating conversations can get messy. Discord lets you use bots to handle this and perform other tasks. Find a bot you like at top.gg, 'Invite' it and add it to your server, so it appears in the list. 11 Type \$commands to see the commands it recognises. 2




Explore OneDrive's latest features

icrosoft has, over the last few weeks, introduced a number of welcome changes to its OneDrive cloud-storage platform. These are designed to make it even easier to share and collaborate on files.

Many of the latest features are aimed at those with work or school accounts, such as Teams sharing integration, synced metadata support and streamlined admin controls. These updates are also available to home users, along with an increase in the file upload limit, from 15GB to 100GB.

The update is still rolling out, so if you don't have all the options available yet, don't worry - they're on their way. Microsoft said that most of the new features should have arrived by the end of July, with the promise of more to come.






Sadly, it's no longer available in this latest update – you need to use device syncing and PC folder backup instead. Make sure you're set up for this by opening settings on the OneDrive desktop app. Under Account, choose the folders you want to sync across devices and, under 'Back up', select 'Manage back up'.




One of OneDrive's best new features is its ability to share files and folders with your Microsoft family and other groups. Before you can do this, you need to set them up. To set up a family, go to family.microsoft.com; for groups, head to outlook.com. Expand the left-hand pane by clicking the three-line icon 1 and scroll down to Groups.



Click 'New group', give the group a name and description, then click Create. Place the cursor in the 'Add members' field 1 and either start typing the name or email, or use the drop-down menu. Members are displayed below. Click Add 5 once you've selected all members. They need to accept your invitation before you can share with them.




Go to onedrive.live.com. In the left-hand pane, choose My Files 1 or Photos, 2 then select the files or folders you want to share. 3 Click Share, 4 then start typing the name of the group or family. Choose it when it appears, then click Send. Every member of the group is notified.




There's a new 'Add to OneDrive' shortcut – although, for now, it's only available for Work and School accounts.


Click the Shared tab 1 and select a file or folder. 2 This presents a new option: 'Add shortcut to My Files', 3 which does precisely that in the My Files tab. 4 To undo, select the file or folder again and click 'Remove shortcut from My Files'.




Introduced at the end of May, File Detail Pane lets you quickly see more information about your files. This includes a preview of the file or photo, • shared access status **2** and details of any activity. **3** Clicking the 'More details' button displays the file's metadata. To open the File Detail Pane, open any file and click the 'i' button.




Clicking the three dots beside the filename 11 lets you switch off user comments. The text field beneath this is where captions can be added. 2 The 'Has access' section shows who can see the file, while clicking the blank profile photo **B** lets you add people. The 'Manage access' link **4** lets you share to more people 5 and change access type. 6




File Activity, a new part of the File Detail Pane, displays everything from the first file upload onwards. By default, it shows 'All activity' 11 but you can click the arrow 2 to switch to only comments, which gives files a more social media-style emphasis. Comment notifications, if active, are turned on or off via the bell icon. **E**



The OneDrive desktop app has also received an added extra - you can now view the version history of any file. Open OneDrive in File Explorer, right-click a file and choose 'Version history'. 11 This presents a timeline displaying all changes to the document. 2 Click the three-dot button 3 to open the latest version, or restore or download 4 older versions.



Months after its introduction in the Android and iOS apps, OneDrive on the web is also set to get dark mode which, Microsoft says, "reduces eye strain and improves your device's battery life." It will sit in the Settings menu, as it does in Outlook.com - just click the cog icon, 11 then use the toggle switch to make the change. 2



Address-bar sharing, once available, will make it quicker to share. You can still open a file and share it the old-fashioned way - via an attachment or shareable link - but it's quicker and easier to place your cursor in the address bar, 🗓 highlight the URL and copy it. 🔼 This link can then be pasted to a recipient.



Keep passwords even safer with KeePassXC

he original KeePass software (keepass.info) spawned a number of offshoots, where developers used the code to create other software. KeePassXC is a great example. It started off as a way of making KeePass available on more

platforms, but has blossomed into a brilliant password manager that takes KeePass's core tools to a new level, with a smarter interface and additional security features.






If you haven't used the KeePassXC software before, you can click 'Create new database' 🚺 or import your password 🛮 files from elsewhere. 🔼 The CSV option B should work with anything, including a collection of passwords downloaded from a browser.




You can tweak the encryption settings if you wish, **1** but the defaults are fine for most people. You also need to give your password database a password of its own. Make sure it's a good one. KeePassXC lets you add additional security, such as a key file or YubiKey protection, if you wish.




Enter passwords manually with the plus button. 11 Fill in the details and type your password in the box. 2 You're warned if Caps Lock is on. El To generate a password, click the dice. 4 To include specific letters and symbols, click Advanced 5 and add them to 'Also choose from'.



Open the Database menu 🗓 and choose Database Reports. Health Check 2 gives each of your passwords a score based on complexity and checks if they've been used before. Hover over the entry in the Reason column **1** for more info about why a particular password has been flagged.



Click the HIBP tab 11 to check your passwords against the Have I Been Pwned database (haveibeenpwned.com). This is done safely and using encryption, so your passwords aren't put at risk. The 'Password exposed' column 2 tells you how many times your passwords may have been compromised.



There is a selection of new tools in the settings, \square including the option to run the software as soon as Windows starts. 2 To change the look of KeePassXC, click the View menu. 13 Under Theme, choose between Light and Dark. 4



Create slideshows and screensavers

rfanView is one of the best free image viewers available simple enough for novices but with powerful tools for pros. It's a firm favourite of both the Web User team and our readers, and the software can do a lot more than simply open your photos. Here, we show you how to use one of its tools to build a slideshow in seconds, which you can then turn into a personalised screensaver.






To create a screensaver with IrfanView, you first need to make a slideshow. Click File, 11 then Thumbnails (or press T) to open a File Explorer-type window with a directory on the left 2 and previews on the right. B Select multiple images by holding down Ctrl and clicking the ones you want.




Click File 11 in the Thumbnails window, then choose 'Save selected files as current slideshow'. 🔼 'Append selected files to current slideshow' 🛭 lets you add more images, and 'Start slideshow with selected files' 4 lets you preview the carousel of images (press Esc to end).




Back in the main window, click the Slideshow button 11 to open its settings. The 'Slide advancement' section 2 lets you set the image-cycle speed and randomise the order. Under 'Slideshow options', **B** tick 'Hide mouse cursor' 4 and untick 'Show text'. You can also 'Loop slideshow'. 5



The lower half of the right-hand panel displays currently selected images. 🗓 Use the Add, Remove and re-order buttons to organise them. 🔼 The top half is a File Explorer window 13 that you can use to navigate to other images and double-click to add them to your slideshow.



Once you've created your slideshow, save it by clicking 'Save slideshow as EXE/SCR'. 11 If you only want the slideshow, choose 'Create EXE file'; 2 to turn it into a screensaver, opt for an SCR file. Choose a save location and give it a title, 4 then click Create. 5



Locate and right-click your saved SCR file. In the menu, Test 11 lets you preview your work, while Install 2 makes it the default screensaver for the current Windows theme. If you change your theme (search Start for Theme), you must set it again.

Bring an old PC back to life using Android

Wayne Williams shows you how to breathe life into an old PC by installing a lightweight Android operating system on it

f you have an old PC that's sitting around gathering dust, there are a couple of ways you can put it to use. The obvious choice is to replace Windows with an alternative operating system that's leaner and faster. This usually means a version of Linux, such as **Puppy Linux (puppylinux** .com), Lunbuntu (lubuntu .net) or Linux Lite (www .linuxliteos.com), or a **Chromium OS such as** CloudReady (www .neverware.com).

However, there's another option that's becoming increasingly popular – Android. Yes, that's right, you can bring an old PC back to life using the same operating system that's found on mobile phones and tablets, and install apps on it directly from the Google Play Store.



What you need

Besides an old PC, you'll need an Android operating system to install on your computer, and there are a growing number to choose from. While they all essentially do the same thing – install and run Android on compatible AMD/Intel processors – they each have pros and cons to be aware of.


Android-x86 (www.android-x86.org) is probably the best known, with various

releases available for different versions of Android, including Nougat (7.1), Oreo (8.1) and Pie (9). It's basic, but offers a desktop menu and taskbar – so you can use it without a touchscreen – and lets you access the Google Play Store. It doesn't come bundled with junk, either, which is a welcome bonus.

Bliss OS (www.blissos.org) is another popular choice that you can customise to suit the size of your screen, and switch

between desktop or tablet mode, depending on whether you want to use it with a touchscreen or a keyboard and mouse. The current stable build is based on Android Pie (9).

We're big fans of PrimeOS (primeos.in) because it looks good and offers a desktop experience similar to Windows and macOS, with a Start menu and taskbar. It's powered by Android-x86 and the pre-installed DecaPro Gaming Centre





Android-x86 comes with a taskbar and Start menu for mouse users

Phoenix OS is promising but its Chinese apps might put you off

makes it easy to tweak games so they run better with a keyboard and mouse.

Finally, another operating system to consider is Phoenix OS (www.phoenixos .com/phoenixos). Its options are based on the older Android 7.1 and 5.1, and it offers a very solid desktop experience. Unfortunately, it also includes advertising, and its Chinese origins aren't hard to


spot. Some of the website is in Chinese, and it comes with Chinese apps, too. You can remove the ads by following some of the sneakier free methods found on the web. The ISO file is available to download from Google Drive or Mega, but the Google Drive option often isn't available due to high demand.

For this Weekend Project, we'll focus

on using PrimeOS because installation is easy and should be problem-free.

Download the right PrimeOS

There are currently three versions of PrimeOS available to choose from – Classic, Standard and Mainline. Classic is for older (pre-2011) 32-bit PCs, Standard is for newer (post-2011) 64-bit



Bliss OS is another good choice, which has a good desktop mode for using with a keyboard and mouse


MINI WORKSHOP | Install PrimeOS on an old PC



Download the PrimeOS ISO from the website and grab a copy of Rufus (rufus.akeo.ie). You need a spare USB flash drive (8GB minimum). Run Rufus, insert the USB drive and select it under Device. 1 Click the Select button 2 and navigate to the saved ISO. Click the Start button 3 and choose to write in ISO image mode.



When the OS has been written, restart your PC and make sure the secure boot feature is disabled (see the instructions in the boxout on page 61). Boot from the USB drive you created with Rufus. The PrimeOS menu loads and, from here, you can choose to test it by running it as a Live CD 1 or install it. 2



If you opt to install PrimeOS, you can create or modify partitions before proceeding. I Ideally, you need at least 8GB of free space. The process is straightforward – just follow the on-screen prompts to choose the partition size and create it. PrimeOS will install on the partition and you can run it from there.

The Windows Installer partitions the drive and installs PrimeOS

PCs, and Mainline is for 64-bit devices from 2014 onwards. For our workshops, we'll be using Mainline, but the process is much the same regardless of which edition you opt for.

When downloading, you can choose from a Windows Installer or an ISO image: the former is for installing PrimeOS alongside Windows; the latter is more flexible, and ideal if you want to install it as your main operating system or test it in a virtual environment using VirtualBox (www.virtualbox.org).

We show you how to install PrimeOS on an old PC in our Mini Workshop on page 59. We also show you how to get started with the OS, below.

Use the Windows installer

If you prefer to use the Windows installer, to install PrimeOS alongside your existing Microsoft operating system, download that instead. It's a large 1.1GB file.

Once it's downloaded, run it from within Windows. You'll need to have disabled Secure Boot - see the boxout, below, for details - or else the installation won't be able to proceed.

The installer uses a simple wizard interface. Read the welcome screen, then click Next to open the Install Options screen. From here, you can

select the size you want for your Android partition. The OS itself has very modest requirements - a minimum of 6GB. However, you'll probably want to install a decent number of apps, so it's better to set a larger figure, such as 20GB, if your hard drive has enough room.

Enter the size for the partition in the left-hand box, then choose the drive to partition in the right-hand box. Click

PrimeOS's notification panel lets you access and customise some of the Android settings (but good luck using the flashlight!)



Next and check the information is correct on the following

screen. Click the Start button to begin the installation process.

Your computer will reboot several times while this is going on, and Windows will load once the process has completed successfully. You can then choose between Windows and PrimeOS at bootup.

HOW TO DISABLE SECURE BOOT

.....


Secure Boot is a feature that was introduced with Windows 8 to help protect against rootkits and other forms of malware. It's found in UEFI (Unified Extensible Firmware Interface), the newer replacement for the traditional BIOS.

Some non-Windows operating systems, such as PrimeOS, require you to disable this feature before they can

be installed. To do this, turn your PC off and back on again, and press the key to be taken to Settings (this might be F2 or Del) before Windows loads.

When the UEFI screen appears, look for the Secure Boot setting - it will probably be under the Boot or Security tab. Select it and use + or to disable it. Press F10 to save the changes and exit. Your PC will reboot.

MINI WORKSHOP | Get started with PrimeOS



Enter a username, date of birth (make something up if you don't want to share this information) and gender, **1** and select your time zone, country and city. 2 Click Next. B Read and accept the licence terms, then wait while the desktop loads. This should happen very quickly.



PrimeOS looks a lot like Windows. There's a desktop with icons for the Play Store and Chrome, 11 and a taskbar at the bottom with a start button. Click this to open the start menu 4 for access to the apps you would typically find in an Android installation. You can also change the wallpaper from here. 5



Clicking an app opens it and adds 🔁 its icon to the taskbar. 🚺 Click the three-line icon 2 to close all the open windows. To install new software, open the Play Store and sign in with a Google Account. Find an app and click Install **1** to add it to the start menu and desktop.

Start programs by typing commands

o type a command into Windows, you normally have to open the command prompt, which we'll show you in our other tips below. However, Windows also has a command shortcut you can type into, called the Run box. To open it, press Windows+R, type a command and press Enter. Here are some programs you can launch by entering the relevant command:

Notepad: notepadPaint: mspaint

WordPad: writeChrome: chrome

•Edge: msedge


•VLC media player: vlc

•Open a browser and go to this address: type the URL

Control Panel's 'Programs and features': appwiz.cpl

•Device Manager: hdwwiz.cpl

Commands you've typed previously are remembered and suggestions are made as you type. So, when you see the command you want, press the up and down arrow keys and use Enter to run an app or go to a website again.




Start typing a command and, if you see a suggestion, click it or select it with the keyboard

Get a power report

If you're worried that your computer isn't using power efficiently or your laptop's battery is draining too quickly, a power report may help. It's quite technical and contains more information than most novices will understand, but if you want to have a look, right-click the Start button, enter cmd and click 'Run as administrator'. Enter:

cd \users\yourname\downloads
powercfg -energy

Replace yourname with the name of your current user profile. This goes to the Downloads folder and runs the 'powercfg' tool. The PC's energy requirements are monitored for the next

minute, so carry out activities such as web browsing, playing music, reading your email and so on. Once the minute is up, open Downloads in Explorer and double-click 'energy-report.html'.

Print files and folders

Sometimes you want a printed listing of all the files in a folder or subfolder – for example, to get a list of all the photos or music on your PC. Explorer can't do that, but the dir command can.

Press Windows+R and enter cmd, then type cd followed by a space. Drag any folder from Explorer and drop it on the command line, then press Enter. You are now in that folder and can use the dir command to create a list of files. Here are three examples:

dir *.* >Files.txt
dir *.jpg >Files.txt

dir *.jpg /b /s >Files.txt

The first creates a list of all the files in a folder and saves it in a text file called Files.txt. The second saves a list of all JPG files. The third adds /b, which stands for bare filenames, and /s to include all subfolders. Run that last one in the Pictures folder to create a list of all photos in a text file called Files.txt.

Load it into Notepad to print it.

Use the same command in the Music folder with .jpg changed to .mp3 or .m4a to create a list of music files that can be printed.

Use secret VLC commands

Instead of using static photos for your Windows desktop, you can use video wallpaper. Press Windows+R to open the Run box and enter:

vlc --qt-start-minimized
--video-wallpaper --no-videotitle-show --repeat

Add a space to the end, then drag a video from Explorer and drop it on the Run box. Press Enter and the video plays full screen on your desktop. Press the Windows key to show the Start menu and taskbar to

open programs in the usual way.

If you have a favourite scene in a video or movie, you can jump straight to it. Press Windows+R, type vlc followed by a space, then drag a video from Explorer and drop it on the Run box. Put the cursor at the end, type a space then:

--start-time 30 --stop-time 45 The numbers tell VLC when (in seconds) to start and stop playing. Add

--repeat to the end to loop it.

To play background radio with VLC, go to www.radiofeeds.co.uk/mp3.asp, find a station and click the red/yellow button on the right to save a file. Press Windows+R and type vlc followed by a space. Drag the file from Explorer and drop it on the Run box, place the cursor at the end, type a space and then type: --qt-start-minimized.

Press Enter and the radio station plays in the background without loading VLC. Right-click the taskbar, select Task Manager, find VLC, right-click it and select 'End task' to stop it.

Clean up malware

Go to www.malwarebytes.com/ adwcleaner and download AdwCleaner. This is a useful tool for cleaning unwanted programs, junk, adware and so on. Run it once and, from then on, you can run it either by clicking it in Explorer or from the command prompt. Press Windows+R and type cmd. At the command prompt, enter:

cd \users\yourname\downloads adw /clean

Replace yourname with your current user profile. The first command changes to the Downloads folder and the second runs adw to clean your PC (we renamed 'adwcleaner_8.0.6.exe' to 'adw.exe' to save typing). To only check for malware, use /scan instead of /clean. To prevent rebooting after cleaning, add /noreboot to the command.

Right-click AdwCleaner and select 'Send to', then 'Desktop (create shortcut)'. Right-click the desktop shortcut and select Properties. Add a space to the end of the Target box text and type /clean /noreboot, then click OK. You can now click the desktop

Recover lost files

Microsoft has released a brilliant command-line file-recovery tool that finds and recovers deleted files on your hard drive. You can install Windows File Recovery from the Microsoft Store (bit.ly/wfr507). This adds an item to the Start menu which, when clicked, opens a commandprompt window in admin mode, showing the Help info. The simplest way to use it is to type: winfr followed by the source drive and destination folder. For example:

winfr c: e:\

This instructs winfr (that is, Windows File Recovery) to scan the C: drive and save any deleted files it finds to the E: drive. It creates a folder called Recovery to put them in.

This next command limits recovery to a specific file type:

winfr c: e:\ /n *.jpg

The next command specifically recovers '.jpg' files in the Pictures folder. As above, the /n acts as a filter for recovered files:

winfr c: e:\ /n \users\ yourname\pictures*.jpg

Replace yourname with the name your current user profile. There are limitations and you need two drives one to recover deleted files from and another to save them to. USB drives and flash drives are fine if formatted with NTFS. More help is available at bit.ly/restore507.

Hide and protect files

Files have several attributes that control what you can see and what you can do with them. For example, the Read-only attribute (R) protects a file by preventing it from being

deleted or changed. The Hidden attribute (H) determines whether a file can be seen in Explorer windows.

To use these settings for a file, right-click them in Explorer and select Properties from the menu. The attributes are at the bottom of the window. This is useful for single files, but what about multiple files, files in subfolders and so on?


There are many more file attributes that can't be seen or set in Explorer, the most important of which are Archive (A) and System (S). Archive is used to show whether a file is ready to be backed up and System is for system files.

Press Windows+R to open the Run box and enter cmd. Type cd followed by a space, then drag a folder from Explorer and drop it on the command line. Press Enter to go to that folder. You can now use the attrib command to set the attributes of files, for example:

attrib +R MyDocument.docx The +R sets the Read-only attribute of the MyDocument.docx file, to stop it being changed or deleted. Using -R removes the read-only attribute to make it editable and deletable again. Here are a couple more commands:

attrib +R *.* attrib +R *.* /s

The first sets the read-only attribute of all files in the current folder (* . * is everything, *.jpg would be just JPG files). The second adds /s, which applies +R to all files in all subfolders. You can remove Read-only with -R, make all files hidden with +H, and make the files read-only and hidden with +R and +H. Type attrib /? to see a helpful guide.

Use partitions to organise your files

After reading your excellent "Partition your PC" feature in issue 498 (bit.ly/webuser498), I have now created some lovely partitions on my 500GB hard drive. However, I don't know how to populate them. How do I separate my operating system, documents and photos? How will Windows know where everything is?

You have lots of choices. You could, for example, use a partition for any new software you install. When you install a program, you're asked where you want it stored usually, the 'C:\Program Files' folder is suggested. But you can change this to a partition, such as 'D:\My Programs'.

If you download a lot of big files, you could create a new Downloads folder for them on a partition. In Chrome, open the menu, Settings,


then expand Advanced and find Downloads. In the Location section, click the Change button and select the new folder.

To create a new Photos folder, open the Photos app, click the three-dot button, select Settings from the menu and, in the Sources section, click 'Add a folder'. Select the partition – or the folder on a partition - where you want your photos stored.

To go a step further, open File Explorer and right-click

Pictures in the sidebar. Select Properties, then open the Location tab and use the Move button to select a folder on a partition. Any files saved to your Pictures folder will be stored in the new folder on the partition.

Partitions are particularly useful for this type of file organisation and you could even have a separate partition for each type of media - simply repeat the

previous step with your Videos, Music and Documents folders, to store them on a different partition to Windows so you always know exactly where your files are located.

If you use partitions in this way, remember to include them in backups. Don't just back up drive C: as this won't include the files you're now keeping in the new partitions.


Choose the right cloud storage

I have just bought a new laptop from PC World and it came with Cloud. I spent several hours on the telephone, mainly on hold, because I couldn't set up an account to activate the program. It kept refusing my credit card, which doesn't expire until 2023. The cloud service would have been for five years, but no one could help me get over this problem. After a lot of back and forth, PC World has given me my money back.


My question is: how do I go online and get cloud storage set up on this new laptop? I notice I have OneDrive already set up. Is this the same, or do I need Cloud storage, too?

I'm afraid we can't help with credit or debit card payment problems.



If you aren't sure whether you need cloud storage, try a free service first - Google provides a generous 15GB

If a card is not accepted when buying goods or services online, you need to talk to the relevant card company.

Upselling is common in many stores and you can end up with extras you don't need. To be fair, PC World cloud storage is cheaper than many popular rivals, particularly if you commit to five years. But do you really need it? It sounds like you aren't sure, so the glitch you experienced trying to buy it may be a blessing in disguise. Try a free cloud-storage service to see whether you actually need it before handing over any more money.

OneDrive is built into Windows and provides 5GB of cloud storage for free. We find it useful because files saved to the OneDrive folder on your computer are also stored online, and synced to every other computer and device you own that has OneDrive installed. This means you can access those files anywhere, on any device. If you need more space, 100GB of storage only costs £1.99 a month.

Alternatively, sign up for a free Google account (one.google.com) if you don't already have one, which provides 15GB of cloud storage for free. Download and install 'Google Backup and Sync' from drive.google.com to create a folder on your PC that is automatically synced with your online storage. Increasing storage to 100GB costs just £15.99 a year, and even 2TB is a reasonable £79.99 a year.

The main benefit with both options is that you can try them before you buy.

Restore a laptop disabled by an update

In April, I had to stop using my HP Envy 17 because it was disabled by

a Windows update. Back on my trusty HP Pavilion G6, with Windows 8.1 Pro, I'm very careful never to update in case I'm lumbered with Windows 10.

The Envy 17 started opening Windows

10 but, after about 15 seconds, the screen went blank and nothing further happened. I even left it running for two hours in the hope of it coming to life. Taking your advice, I waited for the next update to rectify the problem, but I realised after a month that if it can't open Windows, it can't receive updates.

I got the laptop into Safe mode by rapidly switching it off and on three times and went through the Troubleshoot process on the blue screens without success. I tried a Reset, but that failed halfway through and the computer went through the process of undoing changes.

On another HP laptop with an identical version of Windows 10, I created a recovery disc, but that didn't work on the Envy either. I am now at a loss as to what to do next. I have the original installation disc for Windows 8.1 and wondered if I could replace Windows 10 with that?

Get Gmail signatures on mobile devices

I recently set up a number of different Gmail signatures with pre-set responses. Unfortunately, these don't carry across to Gmail's mobile app, which only offers a single, mobile-specific signature.

I have found a workaround but it only works for the main account. When I try to switch to the account that uses the signatures in the mobile app, it doesn't work. I've tried logging into Google with the signature account first, but without success.

The workaround is to open the web version of Gmail, not the app, then click the menu button in the top-left corner. At the very bottom is a desktop link that takes me to the main web version of Gmail where the signatures work. However, when I then switch to the account I want to use the signatures with, it just stays on the

A Gmail on a computer is more powerful and has more features than Gmail on a phone. At the moment, you can't create multiple signatures in the mobile app, though we've heard that this will become possible in a future update.

The mobile app doesn't read the signatures created on a computer

using Gmail in a browser. Instead, it uses its own signature. Our workaround is to open the Gmail menu, press Settings, tap your account and tap Mobile Signature. Now type as many signatures as you require.

When you create a new email or reply to one, all your signatures are entered. You can then simply delete the ones you don't want.



thing you can try. Download the Media Creation Tool from the Microsoft website (bit.ly/winmed507) and create a Windows 10 installation disc or USB memory stick.

These are bootable and are used to start the computer and install Windows. During installation, you're asked to select one of three options: keep your personal files and apps, only keep your files or keep nothing. Try them in that order. One of them should work.

If something isn't working afterwards, such as the audio, go to the HP website and download the drivers for your computer model.

Install Wi-Fi in a church

My church, in light of the coronavirus pandemic, is looking to set up a Wi-Fi network so we can regularly stream live services to people who are unable to attend services, weddings, baptisms and so on. It would also be used to provide Wi-Fi access to the various community groups that use the premises. The system would need to cover the church's ground floor and the crypt.

Apart from getting a reliable provider, the biggest issue is getting a strong Wi-Fi network throughout the church, which is a large stone Victorian building. What would be the best option for the Wi-Fi

network? A mesh system or powerline plugs with Wi-Fi transmitters? Is there a better option for a large building?

The setup would also require parental controls, guest access, VPN and a robust security system to block malicious sites.

It's obviously cheaper if you set everything up yourself, but public Wi-Fi isn't the same as home Wi-Fi and, as you say, there is a need for content control, guest access and so on. There may also be legal issues that mean a regular home-internet service isn't the

best way to go.

For example, there are wireless routers for public Wi-Fi that force people to agree to terms and conditions before they can connect to the network. They may also require user registration. This is common for public hotspots in cafés and the like, and is very different to home Wi-Fi.

There could be 100 people in a church and everyone has a mobile phone that will connect to Wi-Fi, so you need an internet service that can cope with large numbers. You also need to restrict access to adult content and other undesirable websites.

Performance Networks (www .performancenetworks.co.uk) is one example of a company that provides public Wi-Fi hotspots, and a Google search will produce many more. There are some useful blog posts on the site that examine some of the problems you're likely to face.

If you choose the DIY route, which we wouldn't recommend, then get a wireless router and see what coverage is like where you need it. The stone walls of a church could be very thick and Wi-Fi may not reach very far. Powerline plugs with Wi-Fi would be the best way through those walls.

If all you want to do is stream services, then an affordable option might be to simply set up a mobile phone on a tripod in the church and livestream it to a private Facebook group over 4G. You would need everyone's permission, though.

A better option might be to get a security camera installed, that can stream to the internet and be hosted on a professional network, such as Church Services TV (www.churchservices.tv).

Upgrade a hard drive to a smaller SSD

I'm about to upgrade my old laptop's hard drive to an SSD, but I'm not sure about the required capacity of the new SSD. I have an Acer with a 750GB hard drive, but only about 70GB of it is used.

Does this mean I could use a smaller 250GB SSD? I'm looking at a Samsung 860 EVO. Would there be any problems with this?

A Some programs for cloning a drive, such as when replacing a hard drive with another hard drive or an SSD, perform a sector-by-sector copy. For this to work, the destination drive must be equal to or greater in size than the source drive.

However, some cloning tools are

able to use a different method, which means that the destination drive can be smaller than the source and the only requirement is that there's sufficient space for all the files. An example of this is EaseUS Disk Copy (bit.ly/easeus507) but there are others, if you want to shop around.

Fix problems entering creditcard details

I was recently unable to place orders with some retailers because of a problem entering the expiry date of my debit card. The expiry date on my Visa card is 02/22. When entering this date, I click '02' in the drop-down list, but only the 'O' appears in the relevant field, and I can't find any way to change it. In one case, I was able to get around the problem by resorting to PayPal, but not all retailers accept PayPal.

The most likely cause is poor web development - the site's drop-down menus have been badly coded, so either the second digit is missing or hidden from view. Using PayPal is an excellent alternative for most major e-shops.

Try switching browsers and doublecheck the drop-down menus in Chrome, Edge, Firefox and so on. If this doesn't help, try a different device - mobile phones tend to use OS-specific systems for numeric entries, so what fails to work on one may be fine on another.

This will give you some idea of whether the problem lies with the website itself or the e-commerce platform the shop is using. It's worth letting the websites in question know about the fault.

My experience with 4G routers

first got a 4G router about four years ago when we were living in a caravan and couldn't get a landline. We were then with EE and signal coverage was not great in the area downloading was slow and we couldn't stream anything, so it was only good for basic computing, such as emails and browsing.

After putting up with this for months, we heard that Three was offering a 4G router with unlimited data for only £22 a month. Before getting it, I asked a friend whose phone was on the Three network to come to my caravan so I could get an idea of what the signal strength would be like (a good tip for

anyone thinking of taking on a 4G contract). The signal wasn't perfect, but it was better than we were getting from EE, so we took the plunge and got 4G with Three. After setting it up, we found we could stream what we wanted and that downloads were faster, too.

A year ago, we moved from the caravan to a flat in a different area. We brought the 4G router with us as we were

still under contract. To our delight, the signal was much better. We now get around 30 to 35Mbps, so it is literally like having proper broadband. We do not have the added expense of paying for a landline, so have a fast, reliable connection for £22 per month. However, I would like to point out some downsides to only having 4G. We find at "peak times" between 4pm and 7pm, when lots of people are probably using the 4G network from our local transmitter, we see a big drop in speed to between

OneDrive wiped out my internet connection

My place of work is small and we only have one desktop PC. I needed to make sure its contents were safely backed up outside of the building, so I signed up for Microsoft OneDrive. After literally weeks of slowly uploading the contents of the computer, it completed the backup.

> I forgot about it and simply left OneDrive to back up whenever it needed to. My work involves creating a number of business adverts, using

Photoshop to touch up photos - images that are generally large. It seemed that all of a sudden the office internet kept dropping and the computer reported DNS error connections.

Our ISP suggested that sometimes routers drop connections and came to investigate potential Wi-Fi interference issues, including commercial microwaves and Christmas lights. They measured my office for potential electrical noise, and suggested moving the router to a neighbouring room, so a longer Ethernet cable was fitted. We also replaced the telephone master socket.

It seemed to work for a while but then things got sporadic again, even after the ISP sent a new router. Sometime later, it finally dawned on me that every time I made a new advert or edited a photo, it

uploaded to OneDrive and wiped out my internet connection. Once I stopped OneDrive uploading, the internet was very reliable again.

I thought I would try Google Drive instead, but the issue is just the same, albeit for 50p less a month. Every "cloud", eh?

Bloatware is a problem software developers need to deal with, says Barry Collins

Let's stick to the



et he who is without a chicken biryani's worth of extra body flubber cast the first stone, but there's an awful lot of flabby middle-aged software out there.

I've been in this game long enough to remember when Google Chrome was the nimble upstart, making established browsers such as Internet Explorer and Firefox look positively leaden. Nowadays, it's Chrome that's more likely to be binge-eating your computer's memory, while new browsers such as Microsoft's revamped Edge (ironically built on the same code base as Chrome) make it look like a wheezing old boiler.

Google repeatedly makes promises to make Chrome more lightweight, less memory-hungry and less prone to chug your laptop's battery like a shot of vodka, but I've read more of those press releases than I've had hot biryanis. Chrome can't shift its mid-life baggage.

The same criticism has been levelled

at other popular software packages. Microsoft Office is positively pensionable in software terms, with every version adding more and more features to the code base, like barnacles on the back of a whale.

Hence we arrive in 2020, when Microsoft Word - a program that for 90% of the people 90% of the time does

little more than slap words and the odd picture on a page - takes up more than 2GB of storage on my Mac.

Little wonder that a trend for

minimalist, lightweight word processors has erupted in recent years. Apps such as iA Writer (ia.net/writer) do almost nothing more than position black words on a white background, yet still command a £30 price tag that people will willingly pay. It's a 14.8MB download

on the Mac. Word is about 200 times its size.

You might argue - and with some justification - that none of this matters very much. Computers get more and more powerful with every generation, generally with more memory and more storage thrown in, so what does it matter if Chrome or Word or Photoshop


> or whatever uses more resources? There's plenty to go around.

Well, yes, but the reason we have to keep buying more powerful hardware is

because the continued software bloat makes your old computer feel less and less responsive with every passing day. And with software now on the autoupdate, subscription treadmill, you have little choice but to take the latest version. It's not like the good old days where you could stick with Office 95 until you decided to buy Office 97: Microsoft just stuffs the latest version down the pipe and your computer has to deal with it.

Legacy is the problem here. Software grows fatter and fatter because instead of taking the tough decision to start again from scratch, the developers keep adding to what's already there. Someone at Google and Microsoft needs to take the big decisions (as Microsoft has already done with Edge) to start with a clean slate and build browsers and word processors that do what people need them to do in 2020. Not what they did 10 or 20 years ago.

The big software developers must be braver more often. People get upset by change, it's true, but when they get the memory and storage back on their computers, that will soon be forgiven.
