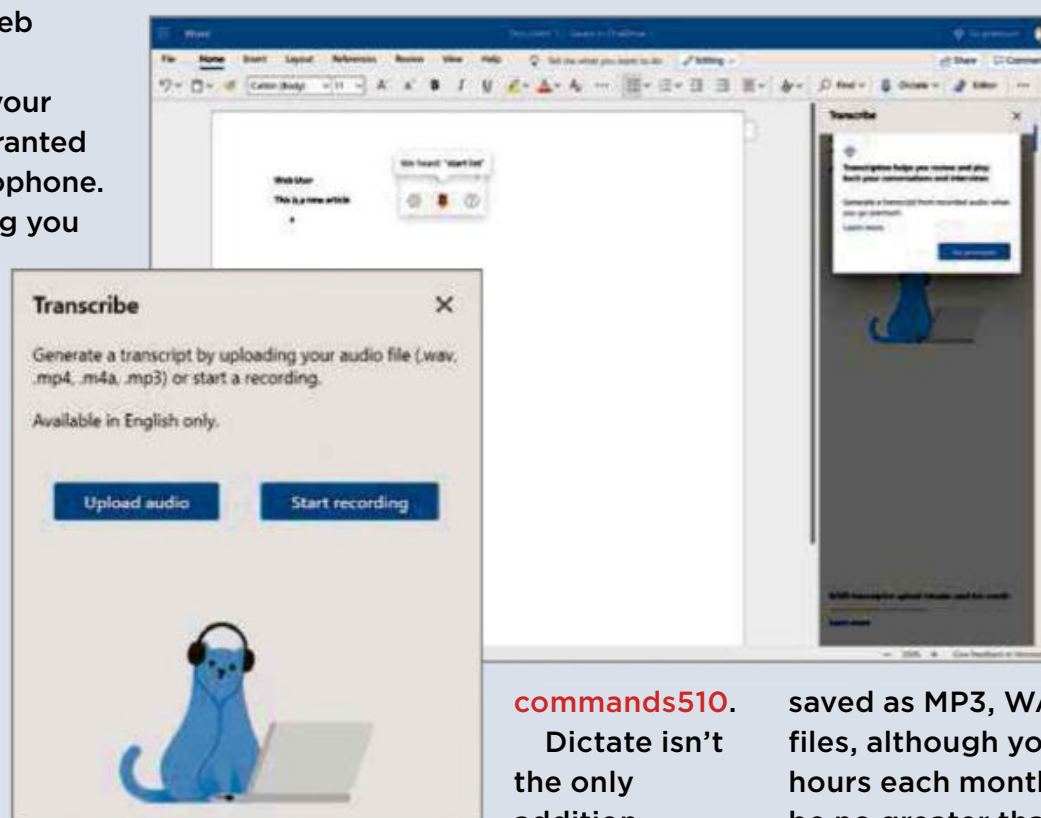


# What's New Online

## Dictate and transcribe in Word online

**M**icrosoft Word on the web already allowed you to dictate the content of your documents, provided you've granted it access to your device's microphone. Now it's going further by letting you manipulate your text using voice commands that can organise, format, edit and add various elements.

You can add punctuation (such as "full stop", "comma" and "question mark") or include symbols (for example, "percent sign" and "pound sterling sign") by simply uttering a command. Phrases for formatting – such as "bold last sentence" and "start list" – will help you avoid having to reach for your keyboard. You can even add emoji, clear formatting and align text. A full list of commands can be viewed at [bit.ly/](https://bit.ly/commands510)



[commands510](https://bit.ly/commands510). Dictate isn't the only addition

– Word now has a Transcribe function for (paid-for) Microsoft 365 subscribers, which works with real-time recordings so you can start editing the text of a

conversation right away. Similar to Otter.ai ([otter.ai](https://otter.ai)) and Trint ([trint.com](https://trint.com)), it can detect different speakers, time-stamp the audio, allow editing and let you insert quotes in a document. You can also work with pre-recorded conversations

saved as MP3, WAV, M4A or MP4 files, although you're limited to five hours each month and the files must be no greater than 200MB in size.

Both Dictate and Transcribe can be accessed from the main toolbar in Word online.

## Hack and slash through Google's dinosaur game

One of the best features in Chrome springs into life when the browser is in its least useful state: offline. The message indicating a lack of an internet connection shows a picture of a dinosaur which, when you press the Spacebar, turns into a fun running game that requires you to leap over cacti for as long as possible.

A group of developers has taken the concept a step further, equipping the dinosaur with 26 different items, weapons and actions in a new game called Dino Swords.



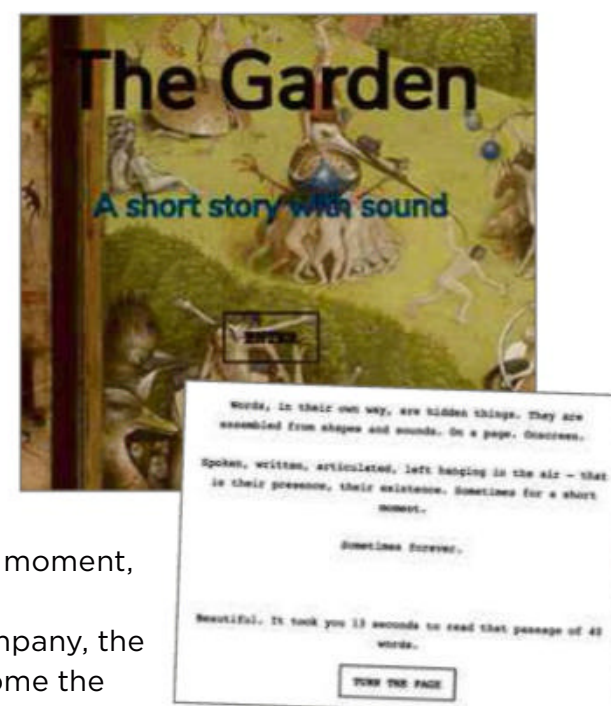
Accessed via a new website (you'll need to be online for this one), you amass your arsenal as you run, with each weapon assigned to a particular key shown at the bottom of the screen. These let you get past obstacles as you attempt to amass a high score. If you do particularly well, you may even end up on the leaderboard.

## Explore a story through words and sound

[bit.ly/garden510](https://bit.ly/garden510)

This immersive slice of fiction not only seeks to engage you with words but with audio, too. As such, The Garden suggests you grab a pair of headphones – claiming it helps lend a sense of imagined space – before playing out the narrative using words that appear and disappear at what's determined to be the right moment, often to dramatic effect.

Created by a theatre company, the idea is that the words become the actors but, before you get started, you're tested on how fast you can read. This determines the number of words that will appear every second and you're told how long the "performance" will take in total. As you read, sounds, music and images (from *The Garden of Earthly Delights* by Hieronymous Bosch) tie in with the story, making for a compelling interactive experience.



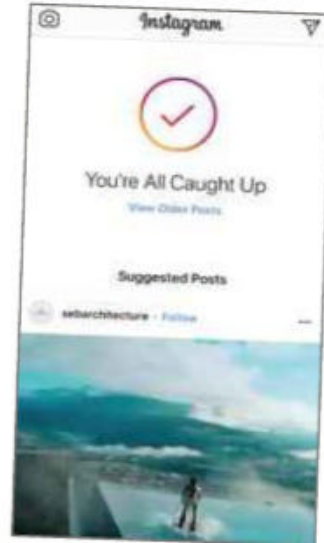

## View suggested Instagram posts

Keep scrolling on Instagram and, after seeing a message saying you're all caught up, you'll now be encouraged to keep swiping. A new Suggested Posts feature showcases accounts of potential interest (as well as ads). You can indicate your lack of interest in a particular post via the three-dot menu, and the option to view older posts remains.



## NEW VOICE COMMANDS



### Get a snapshot of your day

Say "Hey Google, show me my day" on an Android device to get a time-adjustable Snapshot summary of your tasks, reminders, the weather, info about your commute and even recipe recommendations.



### Check if it's raining

Siri can tell you the weather but you can now ask "Do I need an umbrella?" for a simple raincheck.



### Use voice commands with TikTok

Launch the Alexa app and you can now say "Open TikTok", search for a specific type of video or say "Ask TikTok to start recording" for when you're filming hands-free.

## Keep the Daleks at bay

The free-to-play CBBC online game Nightfall has introduced Doctor Who to one of its five "REM" zones, inviting young players aged between eight and 13 to work with their friends to take on the dastardly Daleks. Available until 29 September,



the game allows up to 20 players to style their Nightfaller characters as Jodie Whittaker's Doctor or one of the enemy Cybermen to do battle. The game explores a cartoon-like "dreamscape" and is controlled using your keyboard and mouse. It aims to teach youngsters that worries and fears can be conquered, particularly when they work with others.

## View ancient creatures in AR

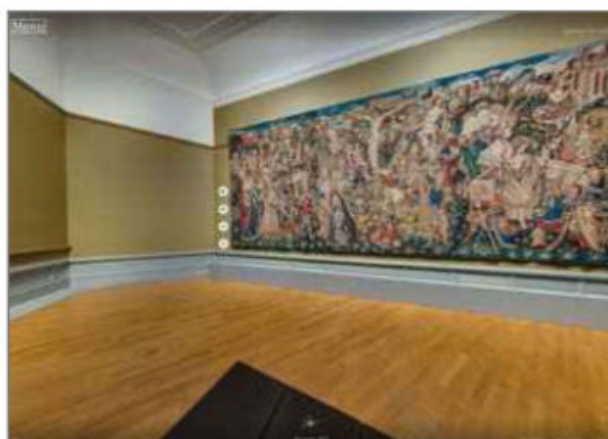
Google Arts & Culture is going back in time, allowing you to take a look at ancient creatures via the power of augmented reality. Having teamed up with museums in London, Moscow and Washington, DC, you can view a tiny crustacean called a cambropachycope, whose head was full of compound eyes, or check out a 480 million-year-old marine animal. The app for iOS and Android also includes a look at the blue whale and a spotted trunkfish, which all loom into view when you move your device in a circular motion. You can capture photos and videos, and share your discoveries with others.



## Explore Van Eyck's virtual exhibition

Take a look at the paintings of the 15th-century Flemish painter Jan van Eyck by embarking on a 360-degree tour around the Ghent Museum of Fine Arts. ### Look for great eBay prices

When searching for a product on eBay, look for a new Great Price badge that flags up competitively priced listings. This is based on a seller's status, newness of the product and comparison with similar listings, but sellers cannot actually request a badge.

### Filter words in Steam chats

Steam has rolled out a Labs experiment that lets you filter words in chats and supporting games. Go to your Account preferences and you can add words that you do and don't like. Profanities and slurs can be replaced with symbols.

### Find places in Google Maps

Tap the Saved tab in the Google Maps app to see your most recently saved places at the top of the page. By turning on Location History, you can also check where you've been and see nearby saved places.



## Amazon deletes 20,000 reviews following fraudulent activity

### What happened?

If you're shopping on Amazon and spot a product with a long list of five-star reviews, they may be fake, according to an investigation by the *Financial Times*, which has prompted the online store to delete 20,000 'customer' reviews.

The investigation revealed that the top-ranked reviewer on the Amazon.co.uk site was doling out a five-star score every few hours, covering £15,000 in products in August. His profile disappeared after the *FT* contacted him, while another two top-ranked reviewers also deleted their histories and profiles, with one changing their profile photo to the words "please go away".

Most of the products reviewed were from Chinese brands, some of whom offer free items in return for positive ratings via Facebook or messaging groups. The reviewer spotted by the *FT* said he wasn't paid for the reviews, but the products – ranging from laptops to gazebos – appeared to be listed for sale on eBay.

Amazon has since removed the questionable reviews and said it would investigate the report. The company says it analyses reviews before they go public, looking at 10 million each week. Amazon has previously said it uses AI for such moderation, and bans anyone who violates its terms.

Amazon's terms forbid users from posting reviews in exchange for free or discounted products, except via its own in-house Vine programme, which links product makers with reviewers. But those reviews need not be positive.

Figures from the Fakespot website ([www.fakespot.com](http://www.fakespot.com)), which analyses fraud on sites such as Amazon, found that the level of fake reviews was worse on Amazon.co.uk than elsewhere, with more than half of all products listed featuring false ratings.

The report comes as the Competition and Markets Authority (CMA) is investigating fake or manipulated reviews on online stores. The watchdog said in May that it was looking into suspicious reviews where a single user looks at an "unlikely range" of products or services – which is what the *FT* report seems to reveal – as well as businesses that manipulate reviews to come off better than intended. It's also examining how websites manage paid-for and incentivised reviews.

### How will it affect you?

Most of us consider the star rating and reviews when looking for a product to buy on Amazon or other retail platforms. This investigation – and others before it – suggests that those reviews aren't wholly trustworthy, so if you don't know the product or the manufacturer, be wary.

When shopping on Amazon, it's worth looking at the full range of reviews because whatever paid-for reviews a product may have, it won't stop

unimpressed customers posting a negative one. Scroll down the listing page to the reviews and click to see four-star or three-star write-ups, which may give a more realistic insight. You can also click to see what other products a reviewer has written about – if the list seems too random or lengthy to be a real person, perhaps disregard their comment. If you do spot a dodgy review, you can click the "report abuse" button to notify Amazon.

If you're still unsure, try searching for reviews of the product on sites other than Amazon. Alternatively, install the Fakespot browser extension to analyse reviews and determine if they can be trusted. And if you do buy a product you're not satisfied with, get a refund from the seller or Amazon.

### What do we think?

Sadly, this isn't a new problem. Amazon may be trying to stop dodgy reviews, but nine of its top 10 ranked reviewers were accepting free products for their posts, so it's clearly not doing enough.

Amazon uses AI and machine learning to watch for dodgy reviews, but it took a human reporter at the *FT* to spot that one reviewer was posting multiple times a day. It's clear that Amazon needs to do more to address these problems or the CMA may force its hand.

## Virgin offers budget broadband for the needy

### What happened?

Virgin Media has unveiled a new broadband package designed to help people facing financial uncertainty because of the coronavirus. The ISP's new Essential Broadband plan will cost just £15 a month, and have a speed limit of 15Mbps.

The package will only be available to web users who are claiming Universal Credit. As of July, there were 5.6 million people on the social security system, a figure that's significantly climbed throughout the pandemic.

### How will it affect you?

The Essential Broadband plan will begin later this year and initially be



available only to existing Virgin Media customers who are on Universal Credit. To sign up, customers fill in an online form proving their status.

Alongside the discount, the contract will have no price changes and no fixed term, so it can be cancelled at any time without penalty. If you

stop receiving Universal Credit, you can switch to any other Virgin Media package or stay on the Essential Broadband plan at £23 a month. If you're over 25

and on Universal Credit, you'll receive about £410 a month, which means every few pounds you save can make a real difference.

If you do switch to this plan, note that it's for broadband only: your existing phone or TV contract won't be retained, and will be billed separately.

### What do we think?

There are other broadband packages that cost less than £20 a month, but the consistency in pricing and no fixed-term contract are additional features that make this a particularly empathetic move from Virgin Media. Plenty of us are going through difficult times right now with a recession sparked by the pandemic, but broadband is an essential service for keeping in touch with friends and family, applying for jobs and keeping entertained when in quarantine. Making it a little easier for customers in tough times is a good idea that other broadband providers should offer, too.

## Security flaw found in Windows Defender

### What happened?

Security researchers have revealed that Defender, Microsoft's built-in security software, can be used to download malicious files. Researcher Mohammad Askar revealed on Twitter that he was able to use a command-line tool in Defender to download a threat-emulation program, while security site Bleeping Computer actually downloaded a ransomware sample ([bit.ly/334PKwT](https://bit.ly/334PKwT)).

This suggests that a piece of malware could use Defender to download files it needs to attack a PC, though that would require the malware getting past Defender or other antivirus software in the first place.

The report comes as

Microsoft has explained why it no longer lets users remove Defender, because it would allow an attacker to abuse the Registry to disable the security software.

### How will it affect you?

The Defender download attack is a clever workaround, but there's no evidence it's being used by hackers. If you're running Defender or another antivirus solution, it should stop malware being installed in the first place. Defender also scans downloaded files as a second layer of protection.

There's no reason to disable Defender. If you're using another piece of antivirus software, it will be automatically disabled; if you're not, Microsoft wants



you to have at least Defender as protection to help keep your PC safe.

### What do we think?

Keeping web-connected computers safe isn't easy. There's always a flaw that can be exploited or a bug someone hasn't yet spotted. So it's great that researchers are finding potential weak

points in systems such as Defender, so Microsoft can build in protections – and even better to know there's already a level of protection in place. We're not keen on losing any aspect of control over our computers, but it's sensible for Microsoft to lock down its protection, even if that means we can't wholly disable Defender.



# UK broadband speeds among slowest in Europe

## What happened?

An annual study charting worldwide broadband speeds has found the UK has the eighth slowest in Europe. To put it another way, out of 29 Western European states, the UK placed 22nd.

The report, from Cable.co.uk and M-Lab ([bit.ly/2Z3p8LG](https://bit.ly/2Z3p8LG)), is based on 577 million global speed tests across 221 countries. It suggests the UK has dropped from having the 34th fastest broadband in the world last year to 47th fastest in 2020. Meanwhile, countries such as Monaco and Gibraltar have shot up the table.

One of the biggest issues, according to Cable.co.uk's Dan Howdle, is Britain's failure to deliver full fibre broadband. The consumer telecoms analyst said: "The UK is comparatively late in its rollout of pure fibre networks, which is causing it to stagnate while other nations gain ground. It is obviously easier to upgrade a country or territory to full fibre, the smaller it happens to be. However, the UK still finds itself a long way behind many nations of equal or greater size".

After conducting 44,416,381 tests in the UK, using 12,266,029 unique IP addresses, the study confirmed that the average download speed here clocks in at 37.82 Mbps. In a country where 95% of residents regularly use the internet, that's not to be sniffed at.



But it pales in comparison to European countries such as Denmark (85.03Mbps) and Switzerland (110.45Mbps), and even the British island Jersey (218.37Mbps).

## How will it affect you?

Slower internet speeds means it takes slightly longer to reach websites, stream films and download videos. To put the report's findings into context, it takes an average of 18 minutes to download a 5GB file in the UK, whereas in Switzerland, it takes just six minutes. Until full fibre broadband reaches every corner of the country, those figures aren't likely to change any time soon.

If you're a reader in Lichtenstein, though, congratulations: you officially have the fastest broadband in the world.

With lightning-fast average speeds of almost 230Mbps, you can download a 5GB file in just under three minutes.

## What do we think?

This news will come as no surprise to many UK residents who have long complained about slow internet speeds. But it's not all doom and gloom. Average speeds may not be lightning fast but they're serviceable, especially when compared to places like Cambodia (5.2Mbps) or, at the bottom of the table, Southern Sudan (0.58Mbps).

Still, this poor ranking should serve as a prod to the UK government to make good on its promise of "gigabit broadband sprouting in every home" by the end of 2025.



## FIRST LOOK

### TCL 10 TabMax

[www.tcl.com](https://www.tcl.com)

You may not recognise the TCL brand, which manufactures TVs, mobile phones and audio gear, but you may have used it before – in the past, the company supplied the hardware for many Vodafone tablets and devices from Alcatel.

Now, TCL is launching two of its own branded tablets: the 10 TabMax and the 10 TabMid, both aimed at the affordable tablet market.

The 10 TabMax features a 10.3in IPS LCD screen that harnesses TCL's NxtVision. This system optimises the tablet's display, bringing crisper, more detailed images to the screen – a feature already used by some of TCL's smartphones. To protect users' eyes, the TabMax also features blue light

reduction and alerts when you get too close to the screen.

Inside the chassis, you'll find an octa-core MediaTek MT8768T processor, 4GB of RAM and a standard 64GB of internal storage, all running on a respectable 8000mAh battery.

The camera is equally impressive for the price, with a 13-megapixel rear camera and an 8-megapixel shooter on the front, so you won't have any difficulty capturing videos in 1080p.

Those specs drop when it comes to the 8in TabMid. Powered by a Snapdragon 665 processor on 4GB RAM, you get a barely passable 8-megapixel rear camera and a 5-megapixel front-facing one. On the



plus side, it also features the company's NxtVision technology – although you'll need to see past the thick bezels surrounding the screen.

The TCL 10 TabMax is set to be priced at around £249, with an upgraded 4G edition for £299. You'll also be able to buy a handful of accessories, including a stylus and keyboard case, once the tablet launches in the UK by the end of this year.

# Is Windows 10 introducing a Wonder Bar?

Apple's Touch Bar is one of the highlights of the MacBook Pro. Situated just above the keyboard, it provides quick access to commands and contextual shortcuts for different apps.

Images leaked online show a Windows 10 keyboard coupled with a similar feature called the Wonder Bar, fuelling rumours that, as part of Microsoft's plan to bring key Windows 10X features to its traditional operating system, we're about to see the arrival of the Touch Bar-style tool.

In Windows 10X, the Wonder Bar provides access to emoji, your clipboard and specific commands in apps. It's believed that the Windows 10 version will get a makeover to include optimised typing on dual-screen devices, access to GIFs and an updated emoji picker and, like Apple's Touch Bar, allow you to



control the cursor via the bar.

Alongside touchscreen support for dual-screen devices, the new and improved Wonder Bar is expected to be made available for single-screen devices via dedicated hardware.

### LIKELIHOOD RATING



There's good reason for Microsoft to make this move. The technology already exists, and the company is introducing other Windows 10X features such as an improved Start menu and Action Centre, and faster system updates, so introducing the Wonder Bar is a no-brainer.

With Microsoft's imminent Surface Duo launch, and the long-rumoured Surface Neo tablet, it's the perfect

time to bring the Wonder Bar to a wider audience. As the Surface laptop range shows, Microsoft is keen to compete with Apple hardware, and the Wonder Bar is part of that premium experience.

Only two questions linger over its arrival on traditional Windows 10 computers: are there any potential technical issues and how much extra will the inclusion of a Wonder Bar – if that is indeed what it ends up being called – add to the cost?

ZEF's developers claim it "helps reduce headaches, moisture, foggy glasses and itchy skin" and runs silently when turned on. It'll even make it easier to speak through your mask. On a full charge, which takes 30 minutes, battery life lasts around four hours. Back the project to get your own ZEF from £26, with double packs for £52.

Google and Apple have updated their contact-tracing capabilities so public health authorities can directly notify Android and iOS users if they've potentially been exposed to the coronavirus, without them needing to install a dedicated app.

### Android spyware disguised as COVID app

A new form of Android spyware has been discovered that uses explicit content and the COVID-19 pandemic to install remote-access malware on mobile devices. According to Kaspersky, two malicious apps are being distributed by a prolific hacking group based in India, called "Transparent Tribe".

Kaspersky said that the first app is a modified version of an open-source video player for Android. As it's installed, it uses an adult video to distract the user. The second app looks similar to the coronavirus tracking app developed by the Indian government's National Informatics Centre. Once downloaded, both apps attempt to install an Android-based Remote Access Tool (RAT), which has



been customised by the attackers to extract users' private data.

The researchers spotted the connection between the group and the two apps because the hackers used related domains to host the malicious files.

"To stay protected from such threats, users need to be more careful than ever in assessing the sources they download content from and make sure that their devices are secure," said Kaspersky.

### Joker malware continues to plague Play store

In other Android malware news, six apps have been removed from the Google Play store after it was discovered they were infected with Joker malware. Also known as "Bread", Joker is a form of 'fleeceware' that's designed to trick users into subscribing to unwanted



premium services. This type of malware tends to use as little code as possible, which makes its fraudulent activity difficult to spot.

The six infected apps have been downloaded more than 200,000 times and, although they're no longer available in the Play store, security researchers at Pradeo believe they are still installed on users' devices. The apps are Convenient Scanner 2, Separate Doc Scanner, Safety AppLock, Push Message-Texting & SMS, Emoji Wallpaper and Fingertip GameBox.

"Once running on users' devices, these apps automatically download malicious code," said a Pradeo researcher. "Then, they leverage their numerous permissions to execute the malicious code."

In January, it was revealed that Google had removed 17,000 Joker-infected Android apps, with 11 more deleted in July.

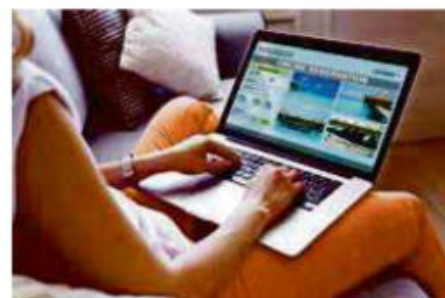
**Q** I am receiving a lot of scam emails about holiday bookings. Is this a growing trend?

Brian Goode, Facebook

**A** Yes, many Brits are at risk of falling for holiday scams as they prioritise cheap deals over security in the wake of the COVID-19 lockdown. It

is understandable that price is a factor in choosing which holiday providers to place bookings with, but cheap deals must not come at the cost of security. Scammers are clever and opportunistic and, as bookings increase, they'll try to cash in on unsuspecting sunseekers.

In spite of the inevitable rush to book an escape following months of lockdown restrictions,



I would advise everyone to remember good cybersecurity practices and check website authenticity before clicking Buy.

It may still be the holiday season for many Brits, but it's always hunting season for scammers. If something seems too good to be true, there's a good chance it's exactly that.

**Q** Do I need to install an antivirus app on my Android phone?

James Penn, Twitter

**A** It's almost second nature for people to ensure they install

antivirus software on the laptop or desktop PC that they use for online banking, but the same isn't true of smartphones or tablets.

With more than half of us choosing to use mobile banking, it's important to ask why we aren't protecting these devices in the same way. As mobile malware becomes more advanced, simply taking individual common-sense precautions to avoid being hacked is no longer enough.

When our mobile devices are protected by antivirus software, they are better able to defend against potential attacks.

### Tell a Web Story

Web Stories are a new content format designed by Google to help users find short, “snackable” snippets of information that could help you get more visitors to your site. Similar to the social media ‘stories’ you may have seen on Facebook or Instagram, it uses a series of portrait-oriented videos or slideshows, overlaid with short captions, to get your information across in a fast, mobile-friendly way. Google is pushing Stories hard on mobile searches and has published guidelines on how to create them. Find out more at [amp.dev/about/stories](https://amp.dev/about/stories).

### Update your Google Site

If you were building websites more than eight years ago, you may still have a ‘classic’ Google Site. Google Sites ([sites.google.com](https://sites.google.com)) updated a few years ago, but it allowed you to continue running older sites through its previous interface. However, this option is scheduled to shut down in 2021, so you’ll have to convert your classic sites, download them for posterity or let them disappear.

You can use the new Classic Sites Manager interface at [sites.google.com/classicsitesmanager](https://sites.google.com/classicsitesmanager) to download your site, or find out how to convert it to the newer system at [bit.ly/2EYcCWx](https://bit.ly/2EYcCWx).

**A** We can tell from your site’s footer that it was created using WordPress, so the only way to edit it is from the WordPress dashboard. To access this, go to [www.shaunivory.co.uk/wp-admin](https://www.shaunivory.co.uk/wp-admin) and enter your username and password. If you don’t have a username and password, you can’t access the site. The dashboard is a behind-the-scenes website that controls what visitors see. Explore the Pages and Posts sections of the menu on the left to find the pages you want to edit.

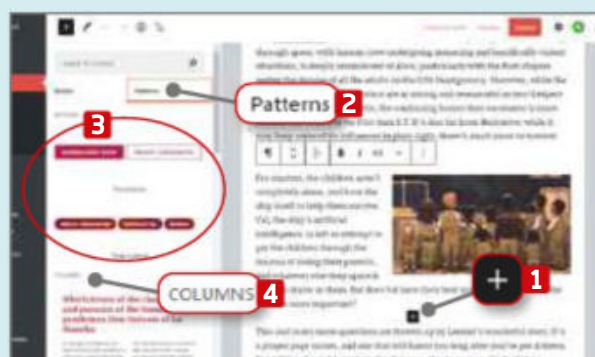
## MINI WORKSHOP | Master the new Block tools in WordPress 5.5

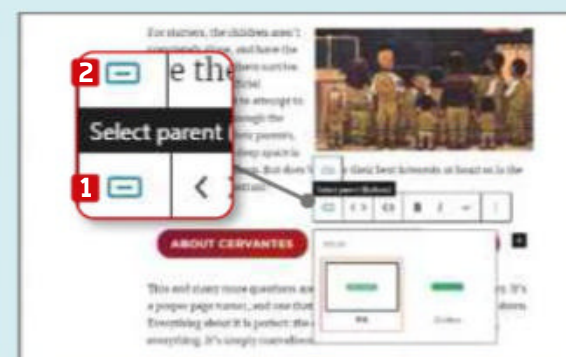
WordPress has been updated to version 5.5, which introduces some interesting new block tools for arranging the layout of your posts. In this workshop, we guide you through the highlights.



**1** WordPress has added some simple image-editing tools you can access from within the image block. Click the Crop icon to display two options: Zoom **1** lets you adjust the size of the image – you can make it up to 300% larger; Aspect Ratio **2** lets you choose from a range of standard ratios to make your images more regular.



**2** Click the ‘Add block’ button **1** and choose ‘Browse all’. Select the Patterns tab **2** to see various groups of blocks you can choose to add to your layout. For example, you could create a suite of buttons **3** or columns of text. **4** Click one to insert it as a new block on your post.



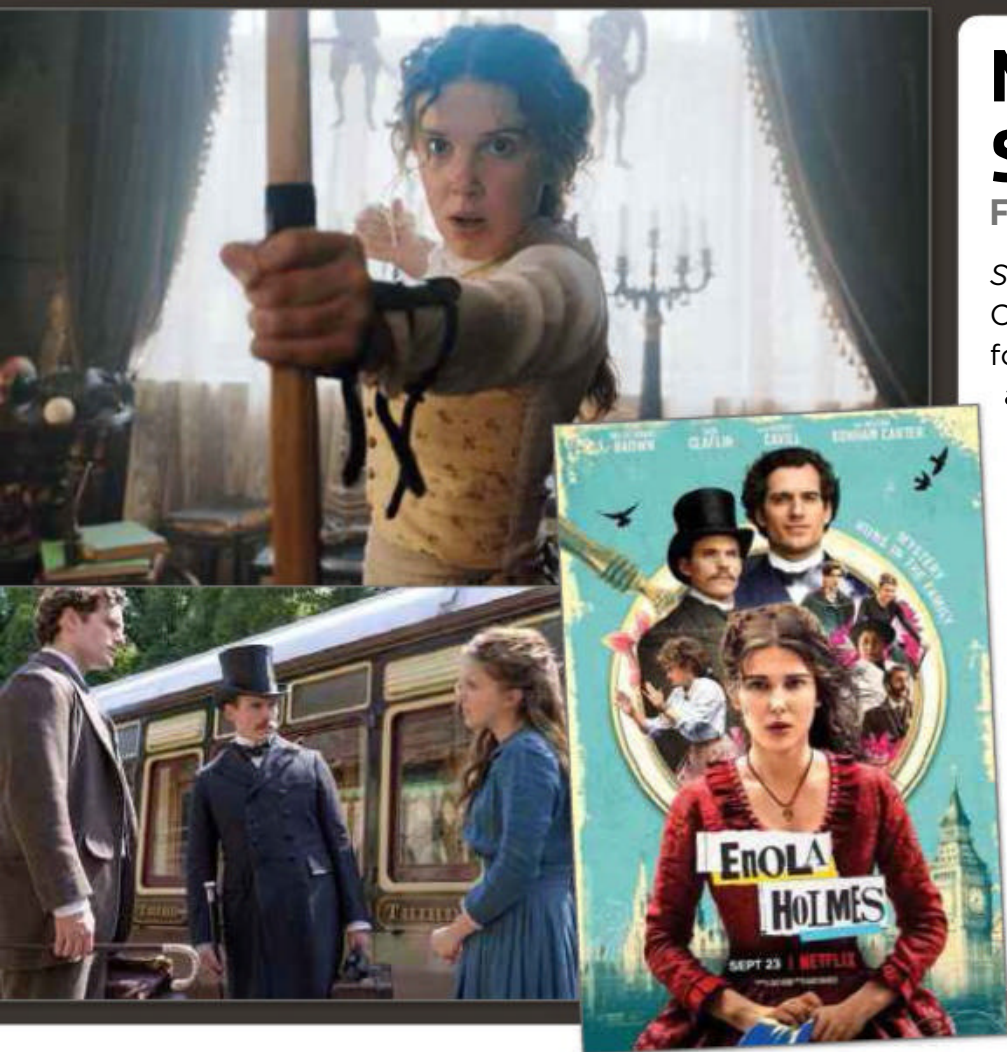
**3** These blocks within blocks can be tricky to navigate so new tools have been added to help make the process easier. If you’re adjusting a block within a block (such as a single button in a group of buttons), hover over the block type button **1** and a ‘Select parent’ button appears above, **2** so you can switch to editing the block as a whole.

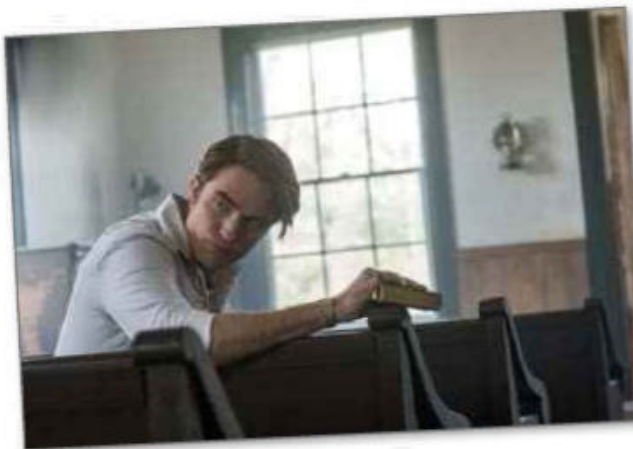
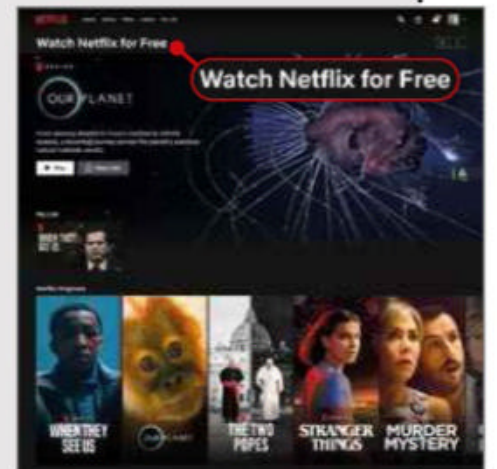

# Product Test

We test and compare the latest products

## Apple 27in iMac (2020)

The latest iMac retains the superb design of previous models and includes some useful upgraded specifications

**T**he design and exterior of the iMac haven't altered significantly for years – it's still the same elegant, slender, silver and black all-in-one it has been since the 2012 overhaul.

It says a lot about Apple's hardware design that iMacs remain among the most attractive and powerful all-in-ones on the market. The anodised silver finish, one-piece L-shaped stand and gently swelling rear tapering to ultra-thin 5mm edges cut a dash on any desk. You could make the argument that the rather broad 27mm bezels are beginning to look a little old hat and that Apple could do with adding height adjustability, but there's no denying that, despite its age, this is still an iconic piece of design.

### New and upgraded features

There are a few changes in this latest iMac update. A new "nano-texture" anti-reflective glass option helps reduce screen glare for those working in bright rooms or near windows, but it'll cost you an extra £500 to include it in your specs.

This is also the first iMac with Apple's 'True Tone' display tech, which adjusts



the screen's brightness to your surroundings, so your eyes don't need to adjust if you look away. Elsewhere, the system's audio and webcam have also had an upgrade.

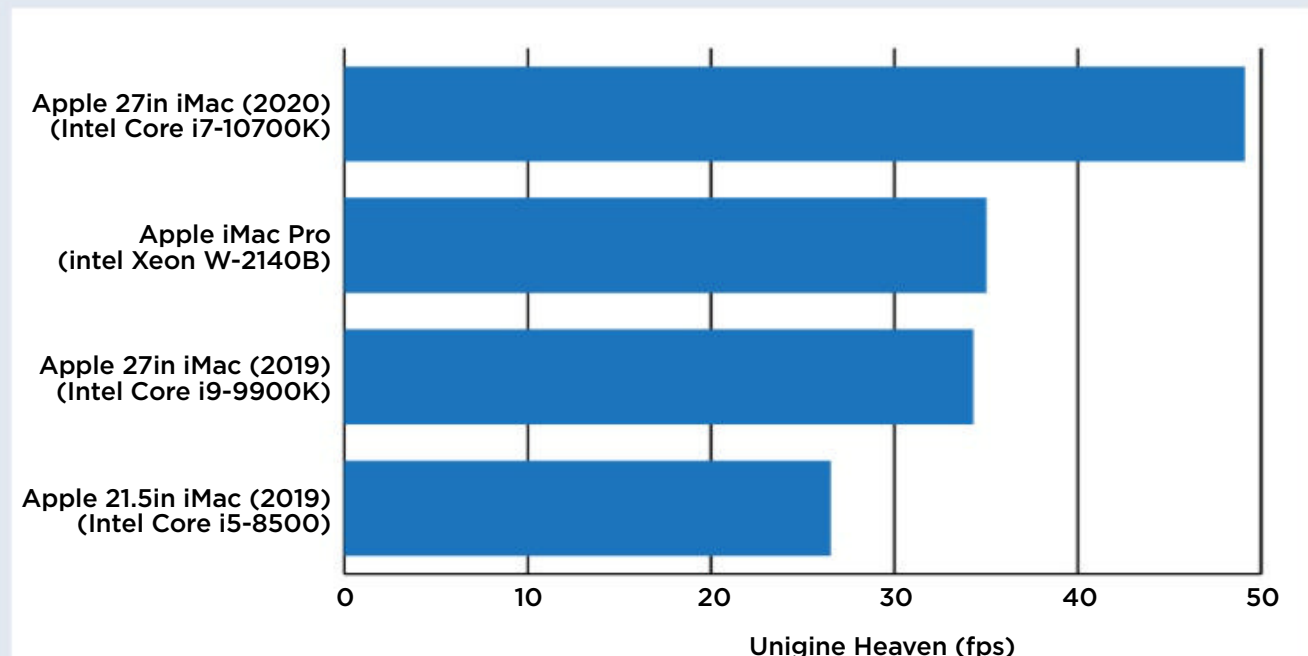
Otherwise, the new iMac is all about the performance increases brought about by the introduction of new high-performance 10th-generation Intel processors

and AMD Radeon Pro 5000 series graphics, along with new options to upgrade the memory and storage to the giddy heights of 128GB and 8TB. It's the first generation of iMac not to offer a Fusion drive (mixing both a traditional mechanical drive for size with an SSD for speed). Whichever iMac model you choose to buy, the whole system now runs from an SSD.

### Price

Let's not beat about the bush, iMacs are expensive. The base configuration for the 2020 iMac costs £1,799, which provides a 3.1GHz six-core Intel Core i5-10500 processor with 8GB of memory, an AMD Radeon Pro 5300 GPU with 4GB of dedicated graphics memory, and a 256GB SSD. Included by default is the glorious 27in 5K IPS display, but without the nano-texture, anti-glare glass option which, as mentioned before, costs an extra £500.

Prices rise steadily as you go up the range. Further processor options include the six-core 3.3GHz Core i5-10600, the octa-core 3.8GHz Core i7-10700K and the ten-core Intel Core i9. Memory options run from 8GB all the way up to 128GB, while SSDs are available in sizes up to 8TB. As for graphics, you can choose the AMD Radeon Pro 5300, the 5500XT (8GB of memory), the 5700 (8GB) or the 5700XT (16GB).

Pimp it out fully and the iMac 27in ends up costing a mammoth £8,799 – unsurprisingly, the biggest costs are the 128GB of memory and 8TB SSD upgrades. For this review, we were sent something slightly less expensive: the Core i7-10700K model with 8GB of memory, an AMD Radeon Pro 5500XT with 8GB of memory, and a 512GB SSD. This model costs £2,799.

### Build, screen and performance

The 2020 iMac has two USB Type-C Thunderbolt 3 ports to replace the original's Thunderbolt ports. It also has a faster SD card reader, boosted from SDHC to SDHX, which enables support for faster memory cards. You can also upgrade from Gigabit Ethernet to 10 Gigabit Ethernet for another £100.

Appearance-wise, however, it all looks more or less the same as it ever has, down to the ports, which are still situated in a neat row on the back of the screen in the bottom-right corner.

The new iMac also has an improved 1080p FaceTime HD webcam and “studio quality” microphones, similar to the 16in MacBook Pro. Given the increased number of people working from home, both are welcome improvements.

The quality of the 27in 5K IPS display is as unimpeachable as ever. The resolution is a super sharp 5,120 x 2,880 pixels with a density of 218ppi, which is calibrated in the factory. Colour accuracy is fantastic with a measured average Delta E of 0.81 (the lower the better). The screen is also super bright, reaching a measured peak of 533cd/m<sup>2</sup>, and has a decent contrast ratio of 1,046:1. It's a fabulous display that makes movies and games look beautifully vibrant.

We've come to expect the latest 10th generation Intel processors to deliver superlative overall performance, and the octa-core Intel Core i7-10700K in our review iMac was no disappointment. Although this is far from the fastest chip in the new series (and not the fastest you can specify in this year's 27in iMac), its performance matches 2019's top-end iMac CPU – the Intel Core i9-9900K.

The 2020 iMac performs at or above the level of last year's iMac in a variety of benchmarks, with overall better performance than the 2018 iMac Pro, especially in the graphics-heavy Unigine Valley and Heaven tests.

As for the performance of the SSD, that's a touch more consistent than in previous models, with the Blackmagic Disk Speed Test reporting an impressive 2,312MB/s and 2,342MB/s for sustained read and write speeds.

# Avita Pura 14

Avita packs decent specifications into an affordable, compact laptop – so what’s the catch?

**Y**ou may not be familiar with Avita but the laptop manufacturer is becoming more popular and undercutting established brands. Its latest offering, the Pura 14, is its cheapest model yet. For the very reasonable sum of £330, this laptop features an AMD Ryzen 5 3500U processor, 4GB of memory, 256GB of storage and runs Windows 10 Home.

## Build, screen and audio

To achieve such a low price, we expect compromises, and the first signs are evident in the build – it’s made from

cheap plastic and feels a bit creaky when you rest your wrists on it. It’s compact, though, measuring 322 x 221 x 15mm, and weighs around 1.3kg. Despite this, it manages to squeeze in a microSD slot (up to 256GB), a 3.5mm audio jack, two USB 3 ports, an HDMI output and a USB Type-C port.

The laptop’s keyboard isn’t bad. It has a compact layout and the keys don’t move far, but the overall typing experience is fine. We weren’t fond of the touchpad, though. It’s overly sensitive and frequently executes unwanted three-finger gestures when there are only two fingers on the pad. We tried to adjust its settings but it didn’t take well to our fine-tuning.

Avita’s pricier Liber 14 has a good IPS display, so we had high expectations for the Pura’s 14in 1,920 x 1,080 pixels IPS panel. Sadly, the screen is the dimmest and duller of any laptop we’ve ever tested, with a maximum brightness of only 194cd/m<sup>2</sup>. Colour performance is similarly poor, covering just 59.4% of the sRGB colour standard.

The audio quality is also disappointing. Located on the underside of the chassis, the laptop’s stereo speakers sound muted and tinny, even at maximum volume, and bass is virtually non-existent. It’ll suffice for Zoom or Skype calls but, if you’re listening to music or watching YouTube, you’ll need a good pair of headphones.

## Performance and battery

Ordinarily, we wouldn’t expect much from the processor

performance of a laptop this cheap but our test results were a pleasant surprise. In our 4K media benchmark, the Pura 14 reached an overall score of 80 – not far off recent laptops we’ve reviewed that cost £200 more. In standard daily use, it feels reasonably snappy – until we pushed our Chrome browser beyond 20 open tabs and it started to slow down.

The laptop has built-in graphics hardware, so don’t

expect great performance from the latest games, though it ran Minecraft well. The SSD was a bit slower than we’d hoped and the battery barely lasted five hours.

Overall, the Avita Pura 14 isn’t good enough to topple our current favourite budget model, the £549 Honor MagicBook 14, which also runs on an AMD Ryzen 5 3500U processor but doubles the memory to 8GB, making it well worth the extra £200.

This updated release fixes some bugs and improves performance. There are portable and installer versions available.

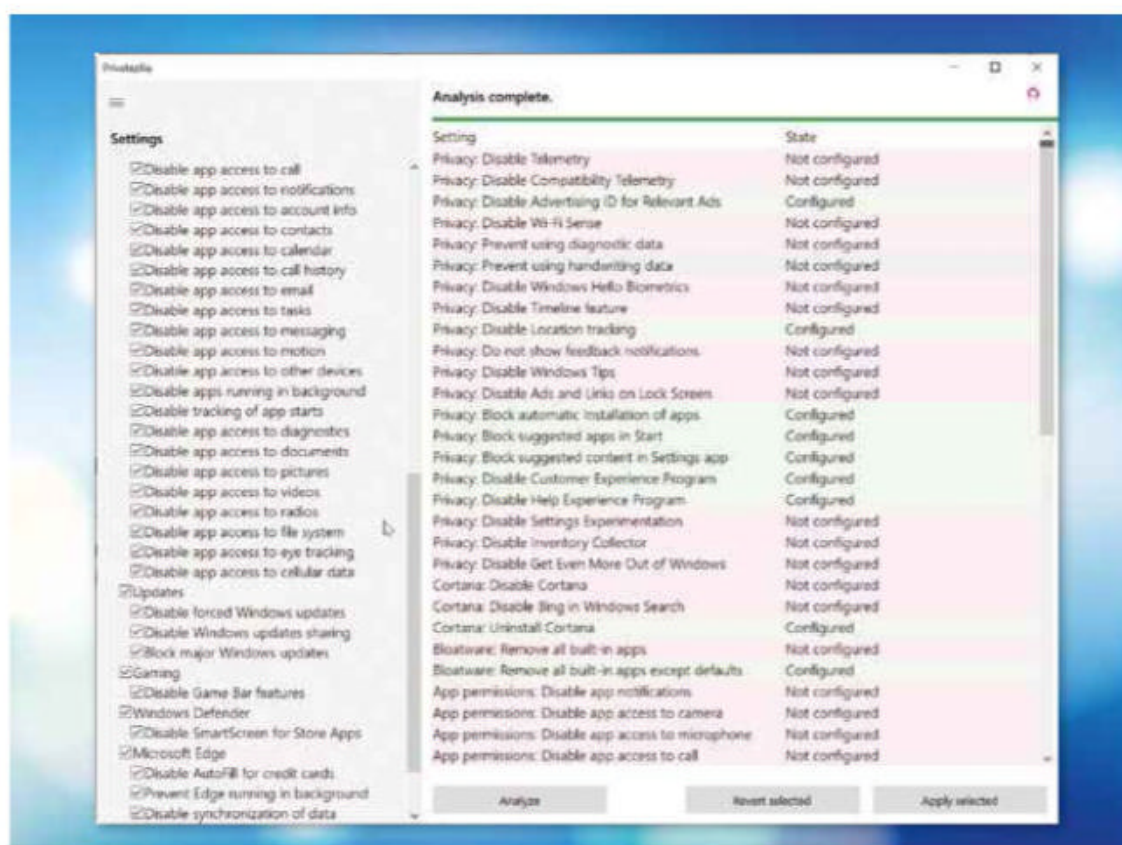

It will check the status of all of the settings and show them as either Configured (your privacy is protected) or Not Configured (inactive). All settings can be enabled or disabled.

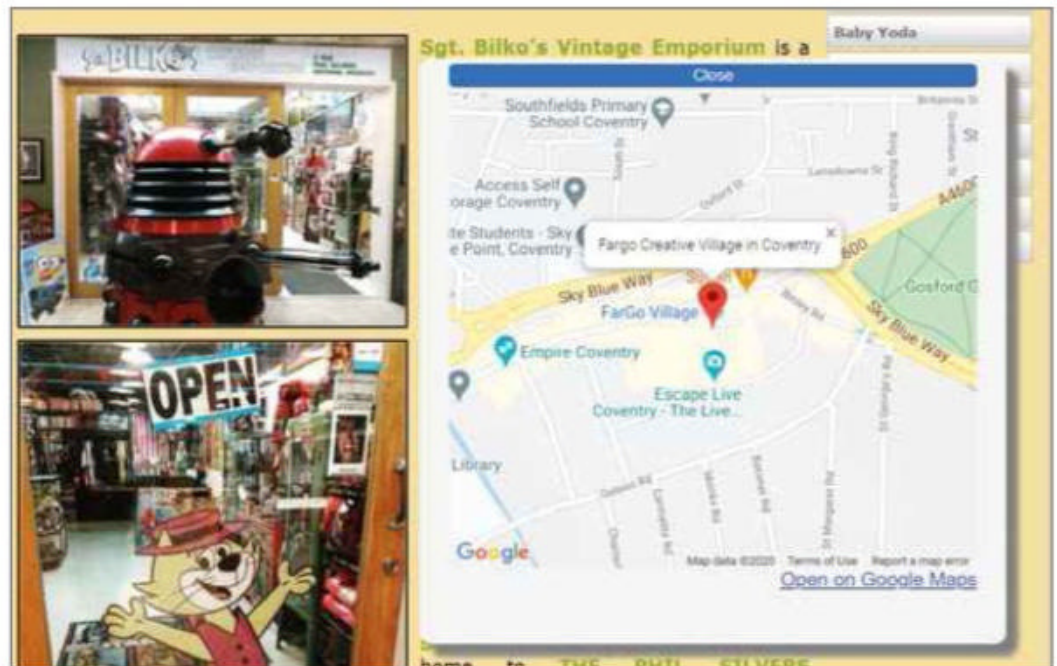


## CHROME

### Find addresses on Google Maps instantly

Imagine a world where you no longer have to copy an address from a company website, visit Google Maps, paste the address and then search for it. This is no wild fantasy, thanks to Easy Address Search ([bit.ly/2GfItUm](https://bit.ly/2GfItUm)), which makes finding addresses on Google Maps a doddle. You don't even have to navigate away from the page you're viewing to search. When you stumble across an address, simply highlight it and right-click. Select 'Find with Easy Address Search' and a small pop-up appears showing you where it is on the map. You can then close this or open the address in Google Maps proper.

The browser tool works for full or partial addresses, such as street names or postcodes, as well as business names. This function really should be built into Chrome by default.



### Improve your Google Meet video chats

The Google Meet Extension ([bit.ly/meet510](https://bit.ly/meet510)) – yes, boringly, that really is what it's called – promises to make your Google-based video calls slicker and more productive. It does so by eliminating many of the pre-call options you typically need to set, so you can dive straight into calls with minimal fuss.

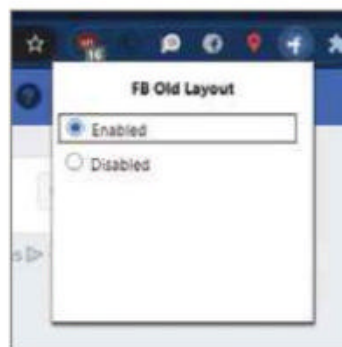
Open the add-on for a brief list of options, with more to come in future updates. These include Auto Join, 'Start a meeting' and Always Turn Off My Video. Click any of these to activate them – a green tick will appear next to them to show they're active. You can even use the tool during the setup or call stage, with options taking immediate effect.

Once your arrangements are set (and remembered for future calls), you can seamlessly slip into that socially

distanced family quiz night or engrossing Q4 financial presentation.

### Bring back the old Facebook

Remember the good old days of Facebook, before the 2020 interface update? Thanks to 'Old Layout for Facebook' ([bit.ly/3hTyh0O](https://bit.ly/3hTyh0O)), you no longer have to accept Mark Zuckerberg's vision of progressive design, with its bubbly buttons and app-like appearance.



With the extension installed, the site is immediately transformed to the more traditional version. As far as we can tell, this hasn't impacted performance – it's the same Facebook but with a

'nostalgic' skin. The design can be switched back to the new version by disabling the add-on.

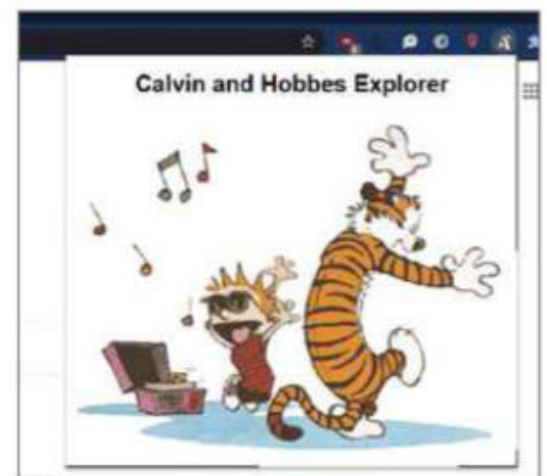
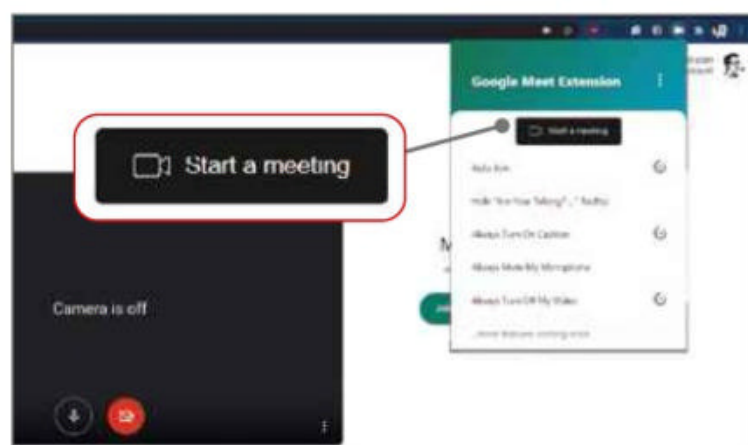
### Read Calvin and Hobbes comics

*Calvin and Hobbes* is often called "the last great newspaper comic strip". Not bad for a strip that only ran for 10 years, between 1985 and

1995. But while artist Bill Waterson no longer draws his most famous creation, you can still get your fix of stories about a precocious little boy and his stuffed toy tiger.

The Calvin and Hobbes Explorer ([bit.ly/3hTRkI6](https://bit.ly/3hTRkI6)) brings the comic straight to your browser. Click the add-on's toolbar button and, after a brief loading screen (featuring our heroes, of course), a random four-panel strip is displayed. If you're looking to binge-read, just click the toolbar button again to view another. Image quality is crisp, although the need to scroll to view the final panel can be a pane (geddit?!).

The comic strips are sourced from the long-running [gocomics.com](https://gocomics.com) website. Now can we have a *Peanuts* version as well, please?

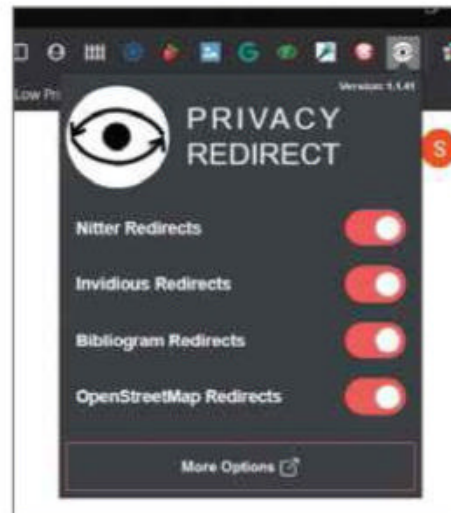


## FIREFOX

### Visit private versions of popular sites

*Web User* readers know better than most just how much data sites such as YouTube and Google Maps collect about us, but force of habit and convenience keep bringing us back to them. The Privacy Redirect extension ([mzl.la/34ZDWik](https://mzl.la/34ZDWik)) is built to automatically send you to websites that provide an alternative interface that won't mop up your personal data. So, head to Twitter and you'll find yourself on Nitter; search for Google Maps and you're taken to Open Street Map. The tool also offers redirects for YouTube (Invidious) and Instagram (Bibliogram) - see our feature on page 48 for more about these alternative front ends.

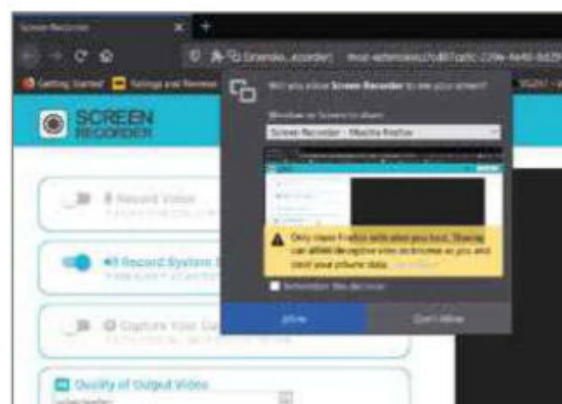
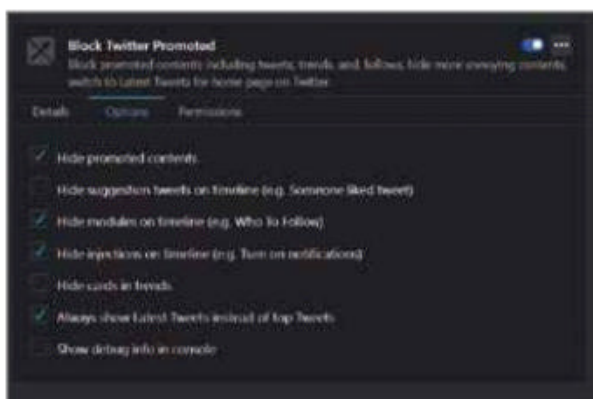
By opening the extension, any of these sites can be toggled on or off. You can also use advanced options to choose specific instances of each website, tweak video playback settings on Invidious and set website exceptions.



### Block promoted tweets on Twitter

We're big fans of any extension that filters out nefarious and annoying elements on social media, and that's exactly what Block Twitter Promoted ([mzl.la/34UtSqJ](https://mzl.la/34UtSqJ)) does.

By default, any promoted tweet (or 'advert', as they were once known) is stripped out of your timeline. But the fun doesn't stop there. This browser tool also hides the Who To Follow module, removes cards from tweets and trends, as well as 'suggested' tweets, which insert a random tweet on your timeline and tell you someone who you follow liked it. Best of all is 'Always show Latest Tweets instead of top Tweets' - something fans of the site constantly request. You can switch any of these settings on or off by going to browser tool's Options in the Firefox Add-ons Manager.



### Record what's on your screen

In Issue 509 ([bit.ly/webuser509](https://bit.ly/webuser509)), we looked at the Microsoft Edge extension Screen Recorder, which we considered "ideal for those looking for a simple-to-use screen-capture tool". The Screen Recorder browser tool ([mzl.la/2GgQpDK](https://mzl.la/2GgQpDK)) is now also available for Firefox. As you'd expect, it's just as uncomplicated and easy to use - in fact, it works exactly the same way as its Edge-based counterpart.

Open the add-on for three options: Record Voice, Record System Sound and Capture Your Camera. Of course, you don't have to choose any of these. Click Start Recording, then select which window to capture. This also displays a preview of what will be recorded. After you finish, you can download the video to your computer or save it to Google Drive.

## OTHER BROWSERS



### Make Bing your default

Remember when a Home button was an indispensable part of web browsing, instantly whisking you back to where you started? That's more or less how Microsoft's new Bing Homepage and Search Engine ([bit.ly/3jCJQd8](https://bit.ly/3jCJQd8)) functions. With the extension installed, one click of the toolbar button transports you back to [bing.com](https://bing.com), ready for your next search. Doing so also means you get to view stunning photography, which changes daily, and catch up on the latest news. You can tweak your current search settings and customise your homepage appearance, too.



### Get Xbox gaming themes

The Xbox New Tab ([bit.ly/32SWyxs](https://bit.ly/32SWyxs)) brings new themes (not to mention a dash of colour) to your new tabs. Choose between 10 of the biggest games on Microsoft's gaming console, plus the generic Xbox Games Pass. Each of these adds backgrounds to your new tabs, which can be cycled by pressing the arrow buttons. You'll also find links for live streams of your chosen game. Click the three-line button next to your profile picture to turn off top links (located beneath the search bar) and live streams, if you don't want any clutter obscuring the hi-res background images.

Nobody could accuse Mozilla of resting on its laurels. The developer recently released a number of new mobile apps, including its own VPN ([bit.ly/33OBLW](https://bit.ly/33OBLW)), and is continually updating its flagship product – Firefox – on both desktop and mobile.

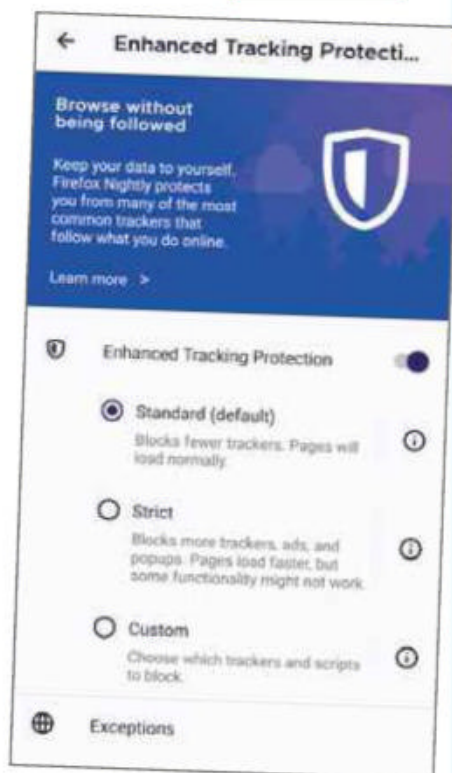
The latest update to the Android version of the browser (version 79, now out of beta) is a little different. It's effectively a major reimagining of Firefox – dubbed Firefox Daylight – similar to how the company overhauled its desktop browser a couple of years ago with its Firefox Quantum update. The new release has three main aims – to make the browser faster, more customisable and more private.

Under the hood, Firefox for Android is now powered by Mozilla's own browser engine, GeckoView, which Mozilla claims will make browsing much speedier and allow the company to implement further speed improvements on a quicker cycle.

Changes have also been made to how Firefox for Android looks and feels. Overall, the interface is cleaner, less cluttered and offers more ways to personalise your browsing experience, such as placing the address bar at the top or bottom of the screen, according to your preference. The latest version also introduces Collections as a smart way to organise bookmarks, shared links, frequent tasks and more. Picture-in-picture video and quick toggling between light and dark mode are also new. The only downside is that add-on support is currently limited in this new version. In terms of privacy, Firefox for Android now has Enhanced Tracking Protection switched on by

default. Mozilla has also incorporated the best bits of its dedicated privacy browser, Firefox Focus, into Firefox itself, including the ability to switch to Private Mode in a single tap.

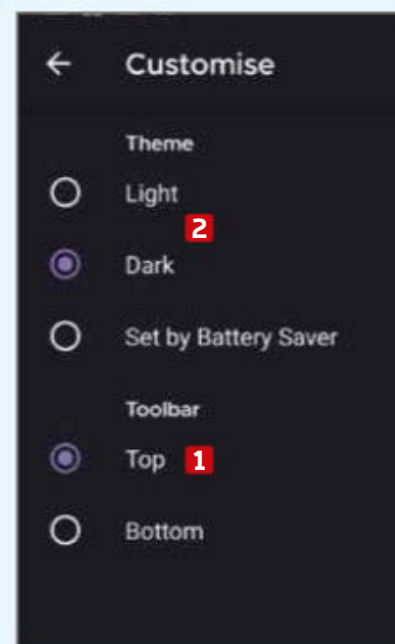

**2** Collections let you organise your saved tabs into groups. To add a tab to a Collection, visit the relevant page, tap the three-dot menu button next to the address bar and select 'Save to collection'. On the next screen, you can either choose an existing Collection **1** to save your tab to; or tap 'Add new collection,' **2** type a name for your new Collection and tap the tick button.

# Our guide to GPT-3

No AI was used in writing this article, but it could have been. **David Crookes** looks at the latest development in auto-generated text

## What is it?

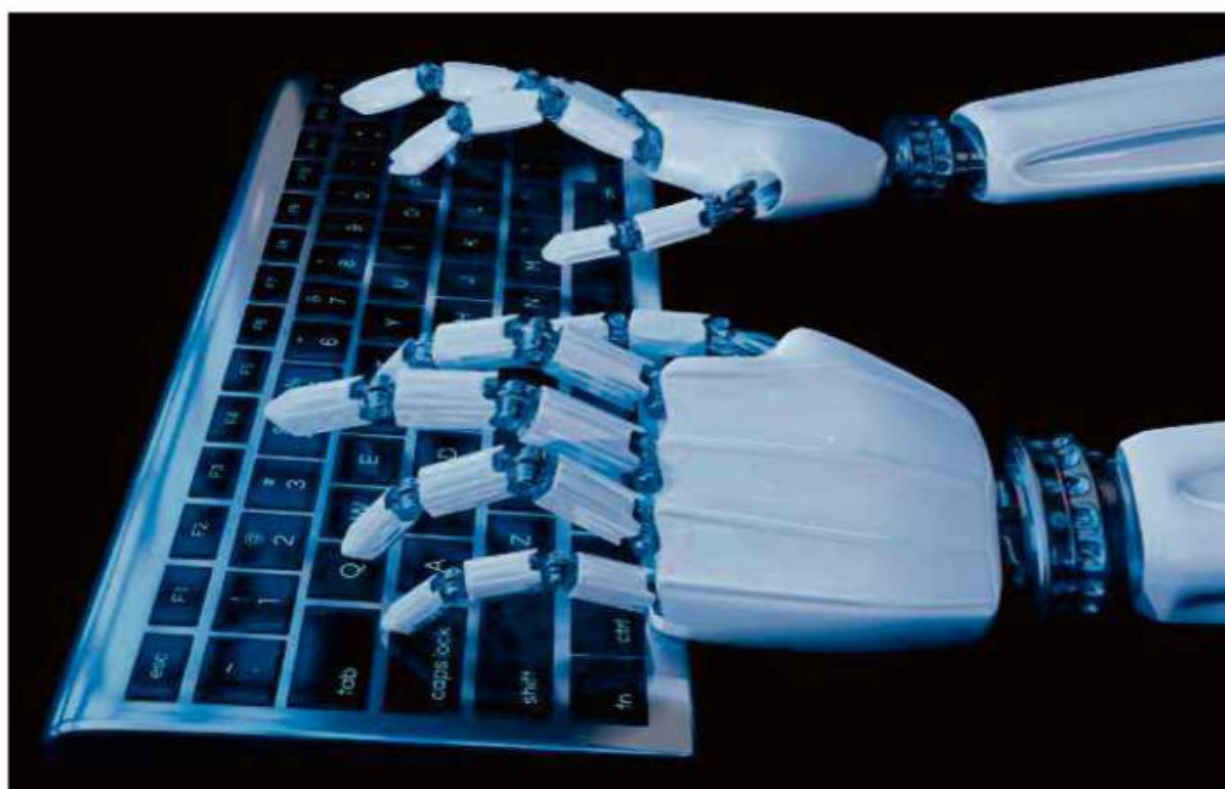
GPT-3 is an exciting but controversial machine-learning system that's capable of auto-generating text with a minimum of input. Standing for "generative pre-trained transformer" and now on its third version, GPT-3 has been dubbed the most powerful language model ever built – producing copious amounts of prose which, in many cases, reads as if it was written by a human.

## Where has it come from?

The software is the brainchild of OpenAI ([openai.com](https://openai.com)), an artificial-intelligence research and deployment company based in San Francisco. Founded as a non-profit organisation in 2015 with a \$1bn investment from SpaceX founder Elon Musk, among others, it has since become a for-profit business, with Microsoft alone pumping in \$1bn last year. The company created the basic premise of GPT in 2017 and announced GPT-2 last year. But it's the far more advanced GPT-3, unveiled in June this year, which has set the tech world ablaze.

## How does it work?

GPT-3 is best explained as an autocomplete program, similar to the type used by search engines and phone keyboards, which suggests words and phrases to follow text that you type in. It looks for patterns and works out which word is most likely to come next, building blocks of text as it goes along. All it needs is an initial steer as to what it



should be writing. From that point, it can crack on with the task at hand without further human intervention.

## Why is this seen as groundbreaking?

The main difference between GPT-3 and previous programs is the sheer amount of data it draws on. This tool has been trained on a staggering 45TB of data, which includes every single article from the English version of Wikipedia – although that only comprises 0.6% of the entire dataset. The rest is made up of other text-based sources – from blogs, Reddit posts and newspaper articles to digitised books, manuals and religious texts – literally anything that's written

online. 60% of the data has come from the Common Crawl ([commoncrawl.org](https://commoncrawl.org)) dataset, which includes 60 million domains.

## So what is it capable of writing?

Pretty much anything that can be written. It can string together original, creative prose, for example, or churn out poetry, legal documents and even programming code. For the program to figure what it's supposed to be writing, a human needs only to input a few words or phrases, and it'll work out the style and produce content accordingly.

## How is it currently being used?

OpenAI has released a paid-for API ([beta.openai.com](https://beta.openai.com)) that grants developers access to GPT-3's artificial intelligence models. This provides a "text in, text out" interface, allowing words to be inputted and completed text to be viewed, which suggests that GPT-3 could be used for semantic search, chatbots, creative writing and productivity.

## Any examples?

Well, we've seen GPT-3 use a URL and a description to code a mock website ([bit.ly/mock510](https://bit.ly/mock510)). Medical student Qasim

So @OpenAI have given me early access to a tool which allows developers to use what is essentially the most powerful text generator ever. I thought I'd test it by asking a medical question. The bold text is the text generated by the AI. Incredible... (1/2)

Question: A 10 year old boy presents with recurrent episodes of dyspnoea, cough and wheeze triggered by cold air and allergens. After performing tests he is diagnosed with an obstructive disease and given medication. Which receptor is the medication most likely to work on:

- A) muscarinic receptor
- B) G-protein coupled receptor
- C) Era
- D) Erb
- E) a-1 receptor

Correct answer is B

**Explanation: The patient is suffering from asthma, a disease of the airways. The drugs used to treat asthma are bronchodilators. The bronchodilators act on the beta-2 receptors. The beta-2 receptors are G-protein coupled receptors**

**A medical student asked GPT-3 a tricky question and was amazed by the accuracy of the answer**

Munye ([bit.ly/qasim510](https://bit.ly/qasim510)) asked the AI some health-related questions and received accurate answers with detailed explanations. You can see a guitar tab generated from a

fictional song and artist ([bit.ly/guitar510](https://bit.ly/guitar510)), and some legalese courtesy of Francis Jervis ([bit.ly/jervis510](https://bit.ly/jervis510)).

## Are there any apps that I can try myself?

Of course. A good place to start would be AI Dungeon ([play.aidungeon.io](https://play.aidungeon.io)) by Nick Walton, which we looked at in our AI experiments feature in Issue 507. This game now runs on a GPT-3 based model

to interpret your commands and generate a narrative – you can try it for free for seven days. Likewise, in Issue 490, we looked at a chatbot that uses GPT-2 to create documents based on what it reads ([talktotransformer.com](https://talktotransformer.com)). You can still use it, but you'll need to sign in and are now restricted to 20,000 characters in any given month on the free tier.

## Why aren't GPT-3 apps more open?

Mainly because the technology is still new and there are concerns about moving too fast, too soon. For example, a chatbot called Learn From Anyone ([learnfromanyone.com](https://learnfromanyone.com)) was shared online in July, allowing you to type the name of a 'teacher', such as Elon Musk or William Shakespeare, and indicate what you wanted to learn. Its creator said a security review was needed, so it's currently not available to try unless you're part of the testing team. You'll find many examples of what it's up to on Twitter, though.

## Why is a security review needed for the apps?

Biases and negatives can creep in with GPT-3. On 18 July, for instance, Jerome Pesenti, the head of AI at Facebook, used

GPT-3 to write tweets. He entered single words such as "Jews", "black", "women" and "holocaust", and was aghast at the resulting prejudice ([bit.ly/pesenti510](https://bit.ly/pesenti510)). Certain words tend to become connected to certain groups: for example, "naughty" often appears when discussing women. In response, OpenAI co-founder Sam Altman unveiled a 'toxicity filter' that is now enabled by default, which shows OpenAI is well aware of the issues.

## So it shouldn't go unsupervised?

That's right, and Altman has said that the hype around GPT-3 is "way too much". He tweeted: "It's impressive but it still has serious weaknesses and sometimes makes very silly mistakes". He called GPT-3 a "very early glimpse", and it's important to bear in mind that any jaw-dropping examples of the AI doing great things get promoted over less impressive results.

However, while tests for factual accuracy sometimes result in failure ("How many eyes does my foot have?" asked one researcher of GPT-3. "Your foot has two eyes," came the answer), it is possible to tease the tool into giving the correct response by steering it in the right direction via the initial prompts. This, however, could become an issue in itself. OpenAI has warned that text generation could fall prey to "misinformation, spam, phishing, abuse of legal and governmental processes, fraudulent essay writing and social engineering pretexting".



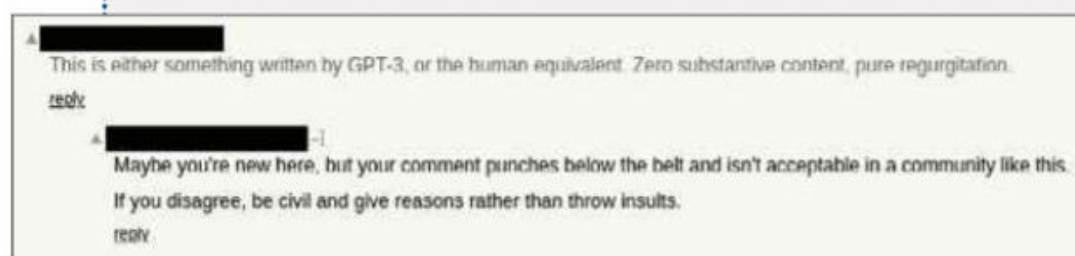

## DOES GPT-3 PASS THE TURING TEST?

Experts say GPT-3 falls short of passing the Turing Test – its overall output would not fool a human into believing the AI was a real person. However, to test the power of GPT-3, Liam Porr created a fake blog ([bit.ly/fakeblog510](https://bit.ly/fakeblog510)) and one of the posts not only reached the top slot on Hacker

News, but attracted 26,000 visitors in two weeks. Only a handful of visitors commented that it was perhaps written by GPT-3 – a suggestion that ended up being downvoted by the community. "I felt a little bad considering that it really was written by GPT-3, but it's still pretty funny,"

Liam wrote (for real) in a subsequent blog post ([bit.ly/liam510](https://bit.ly/liam510)).

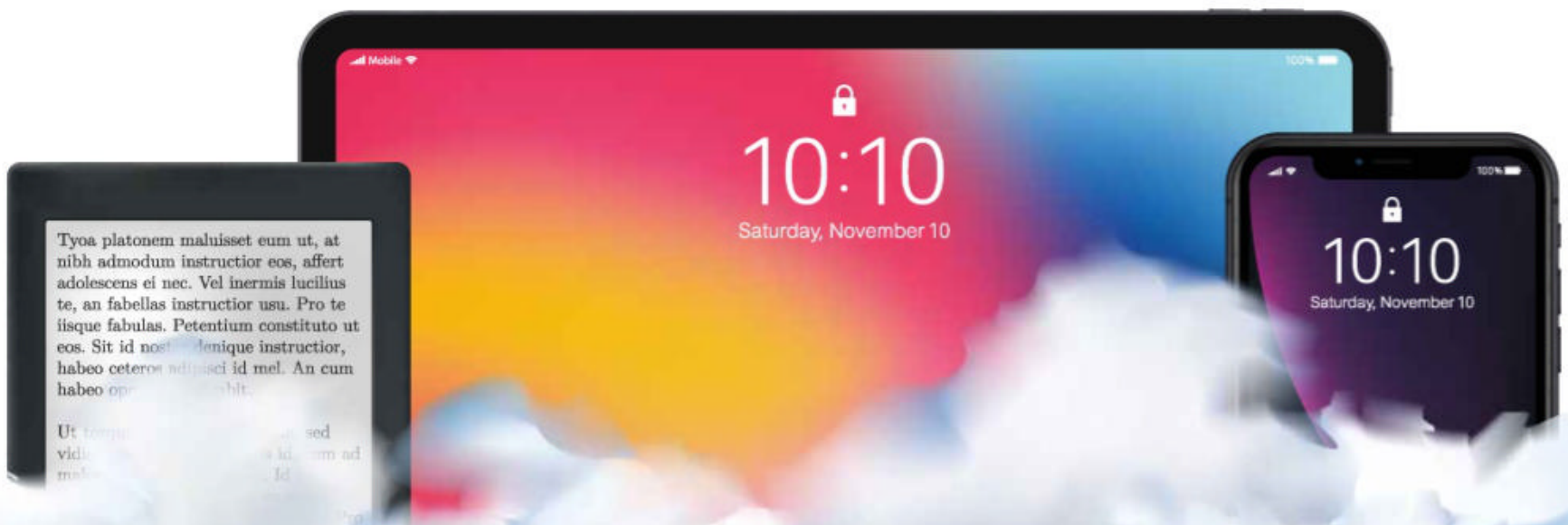




# Repair, Reuse & Recycle

Has your phone slowed to a crawl? Is your tablet on its last legs? Don't throw them away! **Jane Hoskyn** outlines three Rs that give your devices new life: Repair, Reuse and Recycle



**T**he TVs, cameras and video recorders of the 1980s may feel clunky by today's streamlined standards, but they lasted years. Your latest phone, however, may be up the spout by spring. The result is that half a million tonnes of electrical waste goes into UK bins – and then into landfill – every year. Another million tonnes is stashed at home and dumped in our lofts and drawers in favour of shiny new replacements ([bit.ly/waste510](https://bit.ly/waste510)).

And that's exactly what the manufacturers want. Our obsession with new stuff means more profit for Apple,

Samsung and co, so they encourage such profligate habits by making their devices ever more difficult for the average person to fix. But enough is enough. Following pressure from consumer groups, the EU recently adopted new requirements that enshrine your right to repair your gadgets yourself ([repair.eu](https://repair.eu)).

In this feature, we show you how to make your devices last longer – not only by carrying out DIY repairs, but also by recycling them safely, and reusing and repurposing them in ways you might never have imagined.



# REPAIR YOUR BROKEN DEVICES

## Rub out touchscreen scratches

Toothpaste and vegetable oil are the two best-known home remedies for “rubbing out” superficial touchscreen scratches. Well, save that minty freshness for your teeth because not only does toothpaste not fix scratches, it may even damage your screen further. Here’s a YouTube video debunking the myth: [bit.ly/paste510](https://bit.ly/paste510).

You’ll have more luck using a special solution such as G3 Pro (currently £7.55 from Amazon, [amzn.to/3gHPYz5](https://amzn.to/3gHPYz5)) or Glass Repair from UK site Scratch Doctor (£8.95, [bit.ly/scratchdoc510](https://bit.ly/scratchdoc510)). They won’t magically remove the damage, but they can smooth scratches on screens and optical glass, as shown here: [bit.ly/scratch510](https://bit.ly/scratch510).

## Use glue to make a screen last longer

A cracked display doesn’t necessarily spell doom or a whopping bill to get your screen replaced (Samsung charges £229: [bit.ly/samscreen510](https://bit.ly/samscreen510)). If the damage is to the touchscreen layer (‘digitiser’), rather than the LCD panel beneath it, then the device should still work. To prevent further damage, secure the crack with special screen glue (around £10, [amzn.to/2YGgGlF](https://amzn.to/2YGgGlF)).

Despite the YouTube videos extolling the screen-fixing virtues of superglue, epoxy resin and even nail varnish, please do not try this at home. Not unless you were planning to replace the screen anyway.

## HOW FIXABLE IS YOUR SMARTPHONE?

Ease of repair may not be a top feature on your priority list when choosing which phone to buy, but there’s a big gap between easiest and hardest. And with big companies cottoning on to the extra profits to be made from hard-to-fix devices, the gap is getting wider. See the full list at [bit.ly/repairability510](https://bit.ly/repairability510).

**Easiest:** Fairphone 3 (Android phone specially designed to be as easy as possible to take apart and fix using replaceable parts, [shop.fairphone.com](https://shop.fairphone.com))

**Easy:** Shift 6m (modular Android phone built in Germany, [www.shiftphones.com/en](https://www.shiftphones.com/en))

**Moderately easy:** iPhone (display is easy to replace, especially on old models); Huawei Mate (modular components, but front and back are glued down)

**Hard:** Google Pixel 3 and 4 (back panel glued on; display repair requires complete disassembly); Samsung Galaxy devices (parts all glued down)

**Hardest:** Motorola Razr (parts glued and soldered together, making disassembly near impossible)

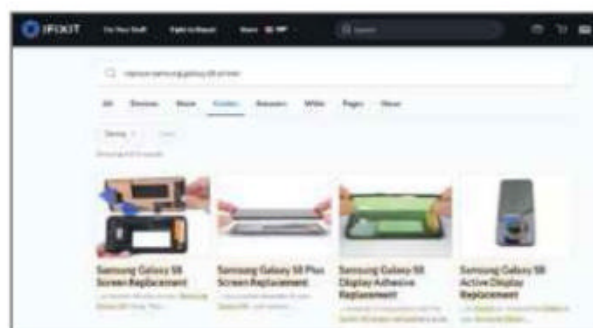


## Replace a phone or tablet display

Even if your cracked screen does need replacing, you may still be able to do this at home, especially on an older device that doesn’t have its components glued or soldered together. Visit the superb website iFixit ([www.ifixit.com](https://www.ifixit.com)) and look for guides specific to your device. Our search for ‘replace Samsung Galaxy S8 screen’ turned up six illustrated guides to fitting a screen in Samsung’s notoriously hard-to-fix devices: [bit.ly/samfix510](https://bit.ly/samfix510).

If you’ve read through the steps and think you can manage the task yourself, buy a replacement screen specific to your device’s model. These cost as little as £10 and sometimes come with device-specific tools for prying off the broken display.

A smartphone screwdriver set may also come in handy (this one’s just £5: [amzn.to/32yrvHi](https://amzn.to/32yrvHi)). iFixit also sells components and tools, and displays

prices in pounds when you switch to the Store section of the site.

## Rejuvenate your device with a new battery

Replacing a device’s rechargeable battery can add years to its lifespan, and it’s a simple task if we’re talking about an early Kindle, a digital camera or an older mobile phone. Tech World ([techworldonline.co.uk](https://techworldonline.co.uk)) lets you search by device or battery model to find new batteries and chargers. To recycle the old battery, order a free collection box from Recycle Now ([bit.ly/battbox510](https://bit.ly/battbox510)).

Newer devices are trickier to tackle because companies have gradually made batteries harder to replace. For example, to replace the battery in an e-reader from around the Kindle 3 onwards, you’ll need a mini screwdriver and a plastic ‘pry tool’ ([bit.ly/kinfix510](https://bit.ly/kinfix510)). Search iFixit for ‘replace battery’, plus your device, for illustrated steps.

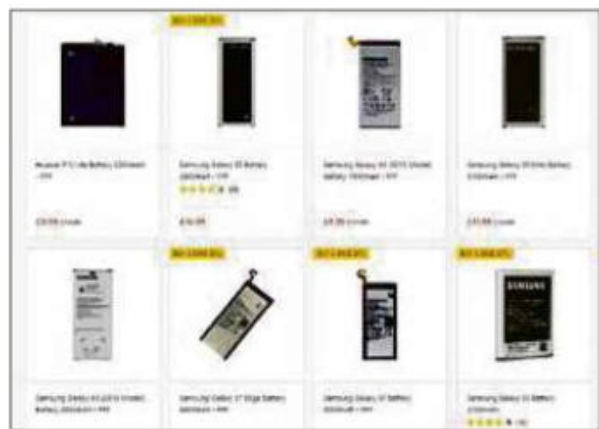


## Replace your smartphone's battery

Apple led the move away from removable batteries by sealing them inside iPhones and voiding your warranty if you tried replacing them ([bit.ly/ibatt510](http://bit.ly/ibatt510)). Samsung ditched removable batteries in 2014, and LG in 2015. Now, only sustainable Android devices such as a Shift ([www.shiftphones.com/en](http://www.shiftphones.com/en)) or Fairphone ([shop.fairphone.com](http://shop.fairphone.com)) make batteries and components easy to replace at home.

It's still possible to replace the battery in a big-brand device, though. First, check the battery's health using AccuBattery (Android, [bit.ly/accubatt510](http://bit.ly/accubatt510)), then go to iFixit for device-specific advice. Bear in mind that you'll need a fair bit of kit and plenty of patience. For example, to replace the battery in a hard-to-dismantle Google Pixel 3, you'll need an adhesive knife, suction cups, a heated 'iOpener' tool and device-specific adhesive strips ([bit.ly/pixfix510](http://bit.ly/pixfix510)). The same goes for recent iPhones, including the 11 Pro ([bit.ly/ifix510](http://bit.ly/ifix510)) and Samsung Galaxy devices (this YouTube video illustrates the process well: [bit.ly/samvid510](http://bit.ly/samvid510)).

To buy batteries, head to My Memory ([bit.ly/mymem510](http://bit.ly/mymem510)), where a new Samsung Galaxy battery costs less than £10. Compare that with the £59 Samsung charges to replace it for you ([bit.ly/sambatt510](http://bit.ly/sambatt510)). Apple charges £49-£69 plus £7.44 delivery ([apple.co/2YGlaXY](http://apple.co/2YGlaXY)).

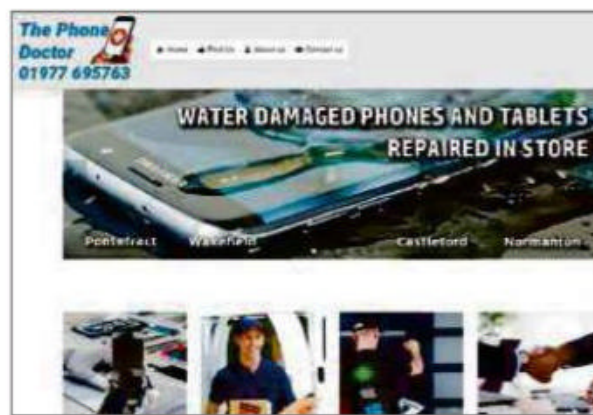
## Fix a water-damaged device

'Waterproof' smartphones are increasingly common, partly because of the very same internal seals that make DIY repairs so tricky. But no mainstream smartphone is truly waterproof. A Samsung Galaxy S10 or Huawei P30 is rain-proof, but you wouldn't want to leave it in the bath!

Certain damage-limitation basics are essential if your device has been soaked.

Switch it off if it's still on, and don't plug it in. Don't press any buttons, blow into ports or shake the phone, since this can push water further inside. Sit it on top of a disposable humidifier and let it dry out over a day or two. Water-damage rescue kits are inexpensive and worth a try (such as the AF Tech Rescue Kit, which costs £9 from [amzn.to/3hKttKZ](http://amzn.to/3hKttKZ)).

If none of that helps, you could risk taking the phone apart to let the insides dry out. Type `disassemble` into iFixit, along with the device's make and model, for guidance. If you'd rather let an expert handle the job, an independent UK repair shop such as The Phone Doctor (£36 to fix water damage, [bit.ly/phonedoc510](http://bit.ly/phonedoc510)) or FixFactor (£59, [bit.ly/fixfac510](http://bit.ly/fixfac510)) will do their best for your sodden gadget. They can't guarantee to repair it, but they will offer to recycle what isn't fixable.



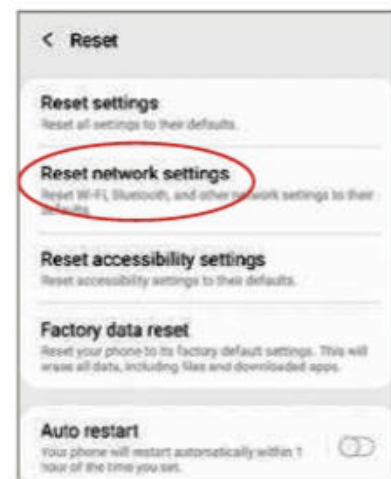

## Fix your phone's audio problems

The most likely cause of audio problems in a mobile device is a worn-out wire connection in your headphones. If the rest of the components are high-quality enough to be worth keeping, solder a replacement plug to the wire using the steps outlined at [bit.ly/fixplug510](http://bit.ly/fixplug510).

If you're sure the headphones are working, then clean the phone's socket to ensure the connection isn't hampered. As a last resort, you can replace the socket. iFixit runs through the process with a Samsung Galaxy S8 in this YouTube video: [bit.ly/s8vid510](http://bit.ly/s8vid510).

If Bluetooth suddenly refuses to work, even though both devices are charged and in range, then delete old devices from the Bluetooth pairing list (tap 'Forget this Device' in iOS Settings, and Unpair in Android). Android also lets you restore Bluetooth and other connections to factory settings: go to Settings, 'General management', Reset, 'Reset network settings' (on some devices it's in Advanced, Reset Options).

## BEST APPS TO TURN YOUR OLD DEVICE INTO A...

- **Timelapse camera:** Create a timelapse of your garden waking up and going to sleep each day. Leave your old device in your window and use Lapse It (Android and iOS, [www.lapseit.com](http://www.lapseit.com)) to take photos at set intervals, then turn them into a video.

- **Wireless webcam:** DroidCam (Android [bit.ly/droidcam510](http://bit.ly/droidcam510), iOS [bit.ly/ioscam510](http://bit.ly/ioscam510)) turns a spare smartphone into a webcam for your PC.

- **Dictaphone:** Easy Voice Recorder (Android [bit.ly/easydroid510](http://bit.ly/easydroid510), iOS [apple.co/31H3gHD](http://apple.co/31H3gHD)) lets you record anything from shopping lists to birdsong.

- **Interactive photo album:** Erase your old tablet, load it with family photos and videos, then use F-Stop Gallery (Android, [bit.ly/fstop510](http://bit.ly/fstop510)) to create albums and slideshows. It's a great idea for a family gift.

- **Digital photo frame:** Free app Scoompa (Android, [bit.ly/scoompa510](http://bit.ly/scoompa510)) lets you select hundreds of photos and videos on your device or cloud storage, then creates a customisable slideshow. LiveFrame (iOS, [www.liveframeapp.com](http://www.liveframeapp.com)) lets you include photos from your social media contacts.

- **Make-up or shaving mirror:** Get a well-lit magnified close-up of your face with Mirror (Android, [bit.ly/mirror510](http://bit.ly/mirror510)), which turns the tablet's front-facing camera into a powerfully configurable mirror.



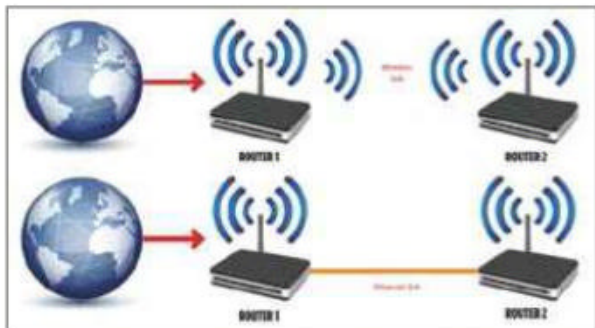


# REUSE AND REPURPOSE YOUR OLD TECH

## Turn your old router into a Wi-Fi network extender

If you still have an old router from when you last changed internet providers, dig it out of the loft and put it back to work as a network extender, solving your home's Wi-Fi black spots.

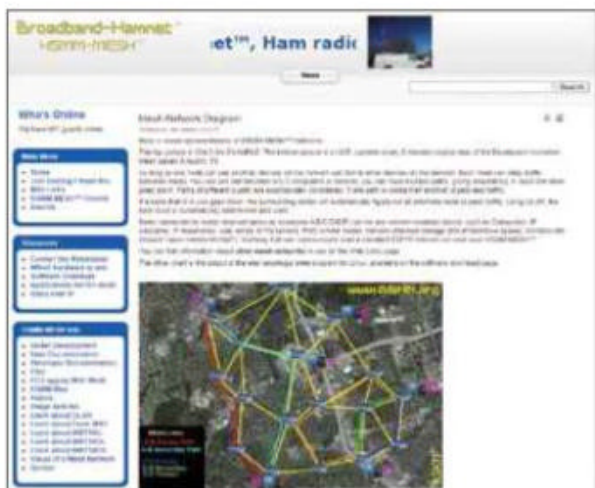
The process of hooking up multiple routers via Ethernet, to create a wireless distribution system (WDS) and spread your home's Wi-Fi to the shed, loft, basement or wherever, is fairly easy to do at home. However, it does involve several steps and checks, and tinkering with your PC's Network settings. So rather than go into too much detail here, we'll direct you to this excellent YouTube video, which includes numerous useful screenshots: [bit.ly/routvid510](http://bit.ly/routvid510). Ham-radio enthusiasts in the US have developed software that lets them use routers to create a 'mesh' radio network for broadcasting over long distances. 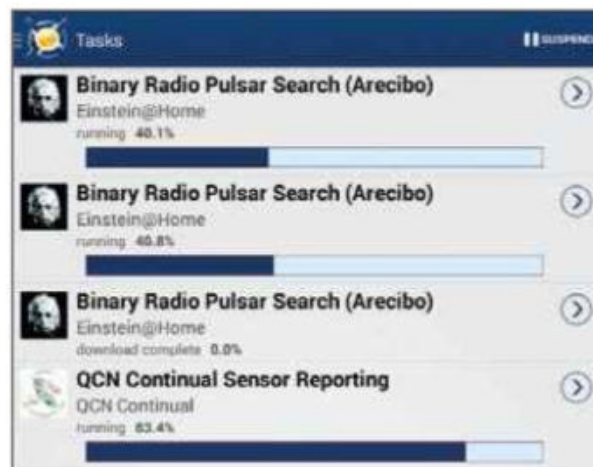

## 'Donate' your Android device to medical science

If your old Android phone or tablet still works but is gathering dust, then you can donate its unused power to medical (and other) science by installing the free app Boinc ([bit.ly/boinc510](http://bit.ly/boinc510)). The app automatically harnesses the computing power of unused devices and your Wi-Fi to help power crowdsourced science projects, notably medical trials and astronomy research. When you install the app, you get to choose which projects you want your old phone to help with – for example, to protect the planet from getting hit by an asteroid. Find out more at [boinc.berkeley.edu](http://boinc.berkeley.edu).

## Create a combined GPS, dashcam and car radio

Even if your old phone or tablet has no SIM – and, therefore, no internet access – while you're out and about, it will still work as a GPS navigator. You'll need to download apps and maps on your home Wi-Fi but once that's done, you don't need a connection to use them. Waze (Android and iOS, [www.waze.com/apps](http://www.waze.com/apps)) gives you turn-by-turn directions, estimated time of arrival, petrol prices, accident warnings and more. Offline GPS (Android, [bit.ly/offgps510](http://bit.ly/offgps510)) is particularly good for maps. To use the device's camera as a dashcam, get AutoGuard (Android, [bit.ly/aguard510](http://bit.ly/aguard510))

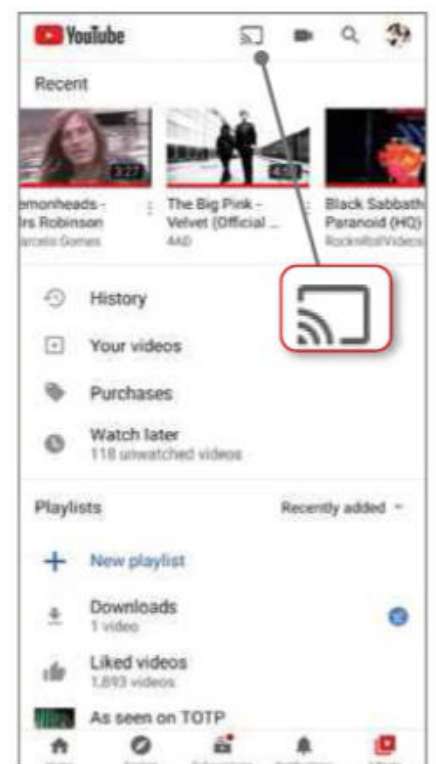
or RoadAR (iOS, [bit.ly/roadar510](http://bit.ly/roadar510)).

For in-car radio, pre-load music and radio via apps such as BBC Sounds (which lets you download entire radio shows for free, [bit.ly/sounds510](http://bit.ly/sounds510)); Castbox (best for podcasts, [bit.ly/castbox510](http://bit.ly/castbox510)); or Spotify (whose £9.99-per-month version lets you download unlimited music for offline listening, [www.spotify.com](http://www.spotify.com)).

## Turn a spare mobile device into a media hub

If your old or spare phone or tablet is new enough to support the latest app versions of your favourite streaming services, you can use it as a casting hub to stream films, TV shows and your own videos to your smart TV or TV stick.

For example, in YouTube's app ([bit.ly/youtube510](http://bit.ly/youtube510)), open a playlist or video, tap the cast icon and select your TV or streaming device (which will need to be switched on) to beam the action to the bigger screen. The wonderfully versatile VLC Media Player app lets you cast your own video files and photos to your TV from your old or spare Windows and Mac laptops, as well as from Android and iOS devices

You can also stream any web video via VLC, and use add-ons to integrate the player with other music and video services, including TuneIn Radio, YouTube and Dailymotion ([addons.videolan.org](http://addons.videolan.org)), and Spotify ([bit.ly/vlcspot510](http://bit.ly/vlcspot510)).

The casting capabilities of your old device needn't stop at video. Spotify, Amazon Music ([amzn.to/3gLS71h](http://amzn.to/3gLS71h)) and YouTube Music (Google's successor to Google Play Music, [music.youtube.com](http://music.youtube.com)) all let you stream your playlists via a Bluetooth speaker or smart speaker (such as Amazon Echo), creating a nifty stereo system that you can then control by voice via Alexa, Google Assistant or Siri.



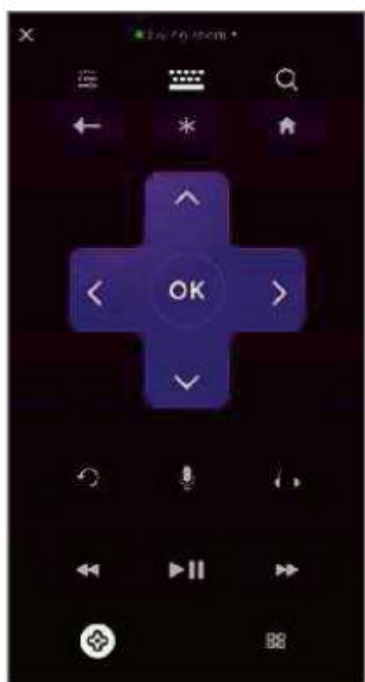


## Use an old phone or tablet as a universal remote

Numerous apps will turn your old mobile device into a touchscreen remote for your streaming services. Better still, they add keyboards and voice control to make searching infinitely easier than clicking with a standard remote.

There are official remote-control apps for Roku (Android and iOS, [bit.ly/roku510](https://bit.ly/roku510)) and Amazon Fire TV (Android [bit.ly/firedroid510](https://bit.ly/firedroid510), iOS [bit.ly/fireios510](https://bit.ly/fireios510)),

and you can use the Google Home app (Android and iOS, [bit.ly/home510](https://bit.ly/home510)) to control your Chromecast. Google Home, Alexa, Nest, Apple Home Kit ([bit.ly/homekit510](https://bit.ly/homekit510)) and others can extend this remote-control power to all supported devices, including smart speakers and thermostats.

## Use your old tablet as a second PC screen

Splashtop Personal (Android 4+ and iOS 11+, [bit.ly/splash510](https://bit.ly/splash510)) pairs your tablet (or phone, if you don't mind a second monitor being on the small side) with your Windows computer via Wi-Fi. You can then set the PC to treat the tablet as an extra monitor. The best of the

company's setup videos on YouTube is seven years old, but the basics and links still apply: [bit.ly/splashhow510](https://bit.ly/splashhow510).

Alternatively, load up the old tablet with app versions of tools that you also use on your PC, such as Gmail, Facebook, Amazon and RSS feeds (for example, Feedly, [feedly.com](https://feedly.com)), then use them to get updates without having to switch on your PC.

# RECYCLE AND SELL YOUR OLD TECH DEVICES

## Find local shops to recycle your gadgets

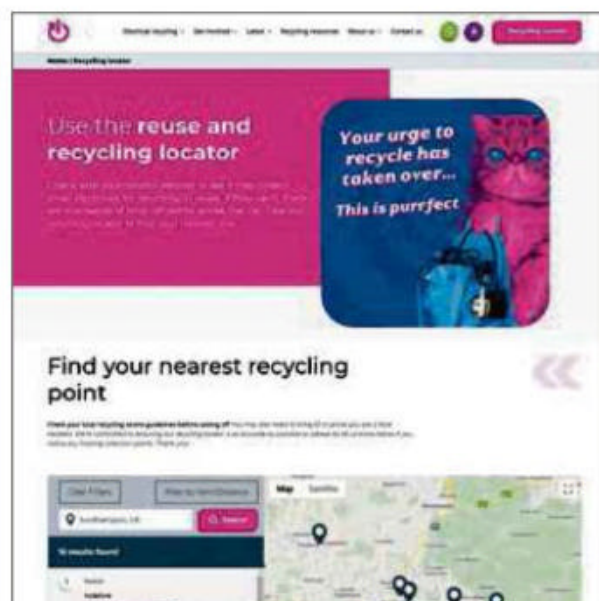
According to the Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE) Directive, unrecycled household electricals cost the UK over £370m per year in lost materials such as gold, copper, aluminium and steel. They also pollute our environment and harm wildlife.

Luckily, it's easy to get your gadgets recycled if they're beyond repair. Anything with a plug, battery or cable can be recycled, so your broken old chargers, gaming controllers and power tools can all find new life. Go to the Recycle Your Electricals Locator ([bit.ly/](https://bit.ly/)

[locator510](https://bit.ly/locator510)) to find local shops that accept various types of electrical rubbish. Click 'See more details' to check which type of item each shop will accept. For lithium-ion batteries and other small electricals, order a box from Recycle Now ([bit.ly/battbox510](https://bit.ly/battbox510)).

## Sell your old tech – even if it's broken

Before sending old devices to the knacker's yard, find out if they're worth anything. The easiest way is to enter an item's details into Sell My Mobile ([www.sellmymobile.com](https://www.sellmymobile.com)) to get a quote, then follow the steps to send them your devices. Also check Compare My Mobile ([bit.ly/compare510](https://bit.ly/compare510)), which lets you lock in a quote for up to 14 days; and look at second-hand entertainment retailers including CeX ([uk.webuy.com](https://uk.webuy.com)) and Music Magpie ([www.musicmagpie.co.uk](https://www.musicmagpie.co.uk)), whose Sell Phones & Tech page ([bit.ly/selltech510](https://bit.ly/selltech510)) delivers an instant quote.

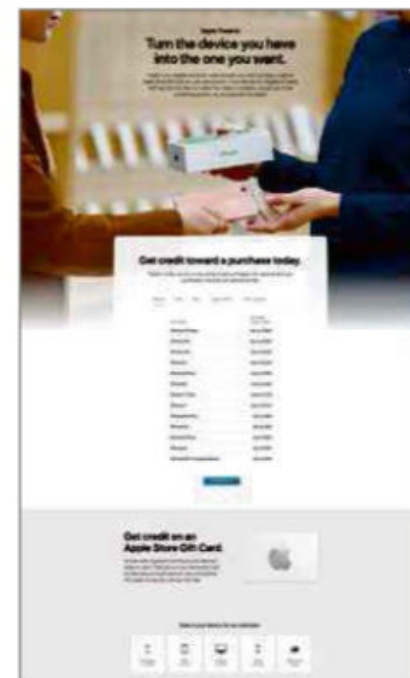

These middleman sellers will even give a quote for devices that don't work, although you're looking at about a tenth of the working price. However, phones that are water-damaged or have cracked screens aren't likely to net you any cash at all.

## Trade in old tech for Apple or Samsung credit

Apple's Trade In scheme lets you barter a computer or device for Apple Store credit – and it doesn't even have to be an i-device. If your unwanted item isn't eligible for credit, they'll still recycle it for free. Head to [apple.co/2GayFKj](https://apple.co/2GayFKj) to enter a few details about the item you want to trade in and get a quote. You can then take the stuff to an Apple Store or order a pre-paid postage pack, then send it

back within 14 days to get your credit.

Samsung now offers a similar trade-in service for phones, tablets and smart watches at [bit.ly/samtrade510](https://bit.ly/samtrade510), but the device needs to be a Samsung product in working order.

## Donate old devices to a good cause

Charity shops are far more welcoming of old electrical goods than they used to be, and their websites may even help you declutter by paying for postage.

Children's charity Little Lives UK has a free downloadable Royal Mail label for any weight of old phones and tablets ([bit.ly/littlelives510](https://bit.ly/littlelives510)). Their experts will then refurbish the devices, if possible, or send them for safe recycling.

To sell your phone and automatically split the proceeds with Oxfam, use the Fonebank website ([bit.ly/fonebank510](https://bit.ly/fonebank510)). You can also donate old phones, tablets, iPods and other small electricals to any Oxfam shop for refurbishment or recycling. WaterAid also works with Fonebank to sell your old phone, and will even take your old car ([bit.ly/](https://bit.ly/)

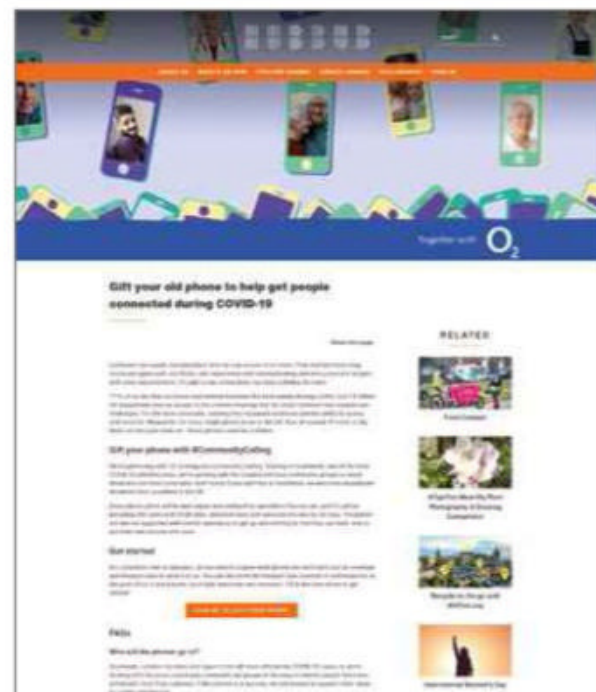
[wateraid510](https://bit.ly/wateraid510)), while the Institute of Cancer Research will accept your old printer ink cartridges as well as mobile phones ([bit.ly/ink510](https://bit.ly/ink510)).

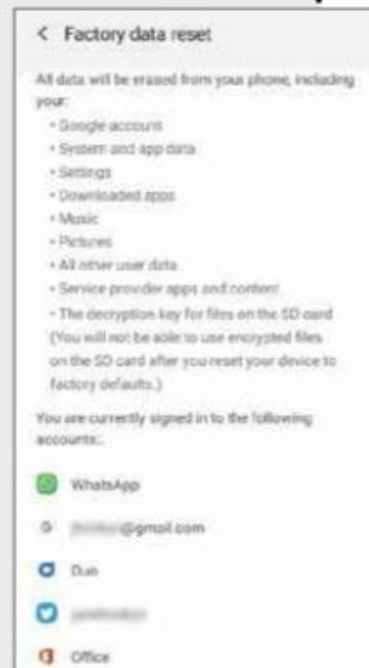

## DELETE YOUR DATA BEFORE DITCHING DEVICES

Wiping data from your old devices is essential, like shredding important paperwork before binning it. Some recycling centres offer to do it for you but for peace of mind, we recommend wiping the data yourself.

To erase data from a PC or laptop, use the open-source tool Permdelete ([bit.ly/permadele510](https://bit.ly/permadele510)). If your computer is on the vintage side, use SDelete, which works on versions of Windows going back to 2000 ([bit.ly/sdelete510](https://bit.ly/sdelete510)). For a Mac, use Permanent Eraser ([bit.ly/permeraser510](https://bit.ly/permeraser510)).

To wipe all data from your phone or tablet, go into Settings and perform a factory reset, which wipes data and removes any cloud-based protection such as iCloud and Google Find My Device. Also remember to remove any SIM and memory cards. Sell My Mobile outlines data-wiping steps for different devices in detail at [bit.ly/wipedata510](https://bit.ly/wipedata510).

# Best free audio-editing tools

Whether you're trimming old music tracks or recording a podcast, you want an audio editor that keeps sound quality high. **Steve Clark** tests six of the best free audio-editing tools

## What we liked:

Audacity has long been considered the premier free audio-editing software, and that's unlikely to change any time soon. For zero cost, you get all the features of professional, paid-for alternatives, with no annoying limitations or paywalled extras.

Editing audio in Audacity is easy, particularly if you're already familiar with video-editing software. Import your files (almost every audio format is supported), then trim, clip and mix your masterpiece across multiple channels with pinpoint accuracy. As well as importing files, you can also record directly in the tool. This lets you use multiple inputs or sources – ideal for recording a podcast with a friend, for instance – with each input given a separate channel.

Most of the work is carried out via the central control panel – a collection of nine core commands in a ribbon across the top. Lots of other complex options nestle within the toolbar headings, so



there's lots to explore for advanced users. Noise reduction, for example, is an absolute necessity. In just a few clicks, that low hiss of dead air that the microphone picks up is gone, giving a professional polish to productions.

If you enjoy toying with your audio, the extensive Effects section is a particular highlight, making it possible to create new, other-worldly sounds or mimic, say, a voice on an old-fashioned wireless.

To help you get the most out of your creations, Audacity has a wealth of plugins for adding extra abilities and features, such as adjusting tempos, detecting the pitch and creating new audio effects.

## How it can be improved:

Audacity is showing its age and its dated interface isn't just messy – it can be downright overwhelming if you're new to the game. There's also no context menu, for right-clicking a track to quickly splice, split or duplicate it.

However, the program's biggest failing is destructive editing – when you import a track, any changes made by the software directly modify the original file. Thankfully, there's an Undo button for backtracking on any mistakes you might make.

## OUR VERDICT

**Audacity continues its reign as king of the free audio editors. It ably competes with expensive professional software and, although there are minor flaws, it delivers all the features you need, whatever your skill level.**

## What we liked:

Ocenaudio, a program that began life as an internal tool for a Brazilian university research group, is designed “for people who need to edit and analyse audio files without complications”. On that promise, it delivers and, like Audacity, does so for free and without limits.

The software has an unfussy interface with modern trimmings that make it far more accessible than many in its field, including our Gold Award winner. And despite its apparent simplicity, Ocenaudio is almost as powerful as Audacity. Outside of basics such as noise reduction and audio analysis, you’ll find bags of filters and effects – just not quite as many. Multi-track editing is also supported. Meanwhile, audiophiles will appreciate being able to switch between waveform and spectral views, or a combination of both.

The controls are a bit fiddly and small, situated beside a searchable file bar. But at least right-clicking offers easy access to core controls.



## How it can be improved:

Ocenaudio doesn’t have a long list of features: for some, that’ll come as a relief; for others, it’s going to send them straight into the arms of Audacity (or paid-for alternatives such as Sound Forge and Adobe Audition). That’s not to say you can’t create professional-sounding tracks, but your options for doing so are slightly more limited.

## OUR VERDICT

**Ocenaudio is an uncomplicated audio editor with a slick interface, whether you’re trimming a clip for personal use or cutting your latest album. However, it’s less packed with features than other programs.**

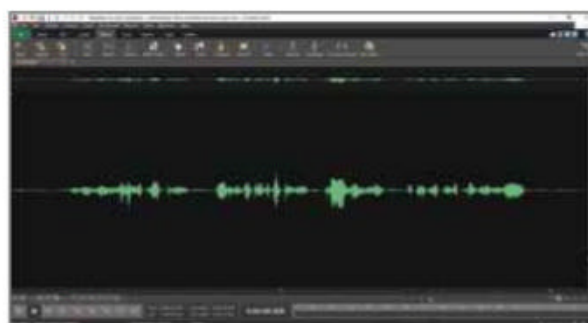


## What we liked:

WavePad is arguably the easiest tool to use in this round-up. Its toolbar ribbon is brimming with actions that make editing quick and easy and, unlike certain competitors, it won’t have you reaching for a YouTube tutorial every five seconds.

Trim a clip, batch-convert files, silence white noise in the background – it’s all done with clearly labelled one-click options. One of these, Paste Mix, is a clever tool that looks for audio copied to your computer’s clipboard. If none is found, it can take your text files and synthesise speech, which can then be pasted alongside your real audio tracks.

But don’t let the simplicity of the interface detract from what is otherwise a very powerful tool. There are also plenty of tutorials to help you learn the intricacies of performing various tasks, including assistance with the basics, as well as instructions for niche projects such as how to create a ringtone for your Android phone.



## How it can be improved:

WavePad’s multi-toolbar layout may not suit everyone: the lower bar lets you select common tools, while the top one houses more in-depth options, for fine-tuning your work. It isn’t particularly quick to finalise your audio, either. The free version of WavePad is missing a few features found in the paid-for edition, but most users won’t notice.

## OUR VERDICT

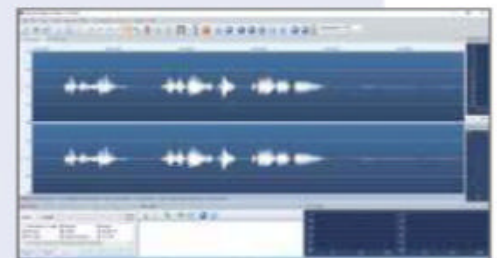
**WavePad is ideal for novices with a basic understanding of editing sound. It’s easy to use, with plenty of filters and effects, but there aren’t enough bells and whistles here for higher-level power users.**

### Acoustica 6

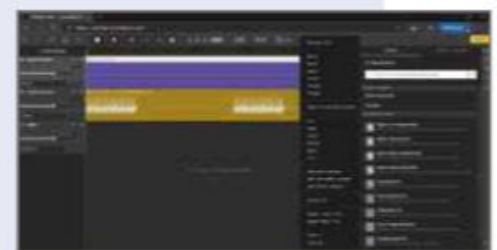
Acoustica 6 might not be the latest version of Acon Digital’s sound editor, but it’s free – for the basic version, at least. It’s a professional product, with an interface that’s chopped up into multiple panes, including the excellent Effects Chain for layering and managing multiple effects. Features are missing from the free version, though – for instance, you can open lots of audio files, navigable via a tab system, but there’s no multi-track editing.



### Soundation

[soundation.com](http://soundation.com)

Soundation is a simple browser-based audio editor that looks and performs as well as any paid-for alternative. However, features are sparse, as is its fun but not particularly well-stocked sounds library. As with any tiered subscription package, the free edition has restrictions: solo projects are limited to 10 and export quality is lo-fi. However, if you’re not an audiophile and don’t want to download programs, it’s worth exploring.



### HYA.WAVE

[hya.io/wave](http://hya.io/wave)

Open File Explorer, drag and drop a file on to the HYA.WAVE timeline and you’re good to go. Yes, this browser-based tool is really that basic. You’re lucky that you get a Record button. Editing is done via a draggable timeline and a right-click. That’s the tool’s true strength: it’s built for quick and dirty edits. Its main flaw is that exported files are only available in the WAV format.

## Wave a wand at Wikipedia

Wikipedia is an incredible free resource, but while its articles are interesting to read, the site's dated, monochrome, text-heavy layout can feel dull to browse. To make the encyclopedia more engaging, install the magical add-on Wikiwand ([www.wikiwand.com](http://www.wikiwand.com)) in Chrome or Firefox, or search for an article via its website in your desktop or mobile browser.

This alternative front end transforms Wikipedia's appearance with an attractive, modern look and fonts, and expands images to create large cover photos. It also converts each article's Contents list into a convenient side menu, and provides page previews when you hover your mouse over links and pop-up definitions when you Ctrl+click individual words. The main content is automatically made much easier to read, with further customisation options available, and you can switch back to standard Wikipedia at the click of a button.

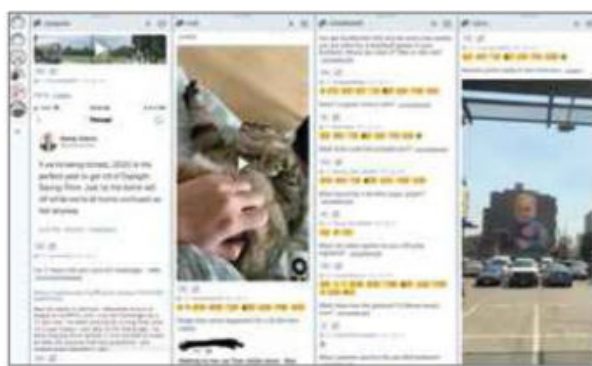

## Revolutionise your Reddit experience

Reddit redesigned its website in 2018 to such outcry from its users that it still offers the option to switch back to 'Old Reddit'. Fortunately, there are better ways to access the social network, via front ends created by third-party developers.

Deck for Reddit ([rdddeck.com](http://rdddeck.com)), for example, lets you browse multiple subreddits at once in resizable columns, similar to the Twitter app TweetDeck (see opposite). You can add as many subreddits as you like, and sign into your Reddit account for additional features such as dark mode and hiding NSFW (not safe for work) content.

Lots more options are available through the brilliant browser add-on Reddit Enhancement Suite ([redditenhancementsuite.com](http://redditenhancementsuite.com)), including auto-scroll, keyboard shortcuts for upvoting and downvoting posts, an inline image viewer, clearer presentation of comments and an automatic night mode.

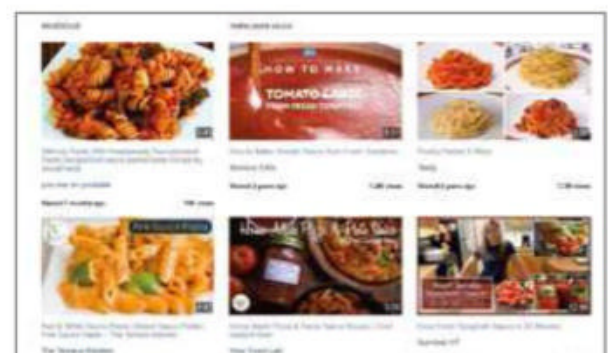
On Android and iOS devices, install Infinity ([bit.ly/infinityreddit510](http://bit.ly/infinityreddit510)) and Apollo ([apolloapp.io](http://apolloapp.io)), respectively, for a smoother and more elegant Reddit experience than its official app.



## Watch YouTube without ads or tracking

Viewing videos on YouTube usually means being watched yourself, as Google tracks your interests and targets you with adverts. Until recently, you could protect your privacy while enjoying all the benefits of YouTube using an ad- and tracker-free front end called Invidious ([invidio.us](http://invidio.us)), but the developer shut the site down on 1 September – not because of threats from Google, but because he was “tired and ready to move on”.

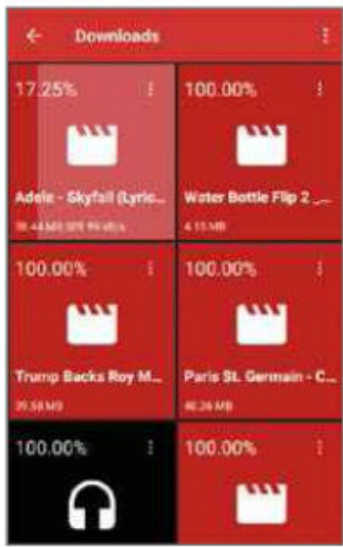
Happily, Invidious lives on through other ‘instances’ that use the same code ([instances.invidio.us](http://instances.invidio.us)) to offer a clean, Google-free YouTube experience, complete with a large video player, one-click dark mode and the ability to download audio and video content. On the downside, you can't sort your search results by ‘most recent’ and only 20 videos are displayed per page.

Alternatively, you can download FreeTube ([bit.ly/freetube510](http://bit.ly/freetube510)), an open-source YouTube player for Windows, macOS and Linux that lets you watch, search and download videos on your desktop, without ads or tracking. It also offers Chrome and

Firefox extensions that open YouTube videos directly in FreeTube.

The best ad-free YouTube front-end for Android is NewPipe, which – unsurprisingly –

isn't available in the Google Play store, but is free to download from alternative app store F-Droid ([bit.ly/newpipe510](http://bit.ly/newpipe510)). It's lightweight, privacy-focused and lets you download videos and play them in the background, but you'll need to allow your device to install 'unknown apps'.



## Make Twitter look and work better

Twitter's website is basic in its features and design, and even last year's revamp did little more than move things around and add a dark mode. To keep 'power users' happy, Twitter provides its own alternative front end called TweetDeck ([tweetdeck.twitter.com](http://tweetdeck.twitter.com)), for desktop and mobile devices. This lets you monitor your timeline, notifications, messages, trending topics and other activity side by side, manage multiple accounts and schedule tweets for later.

Twitter has clamped down on free third-party apps accessing its service, which is why tools such as HootSuite are now paid-for and business-orientated. Nitter ([nitter.net](http://nitter.net)), however, offers a streamlined way to browse tweets while maintaining your privacy. This site removes the JavaScript that Twitter uses to track you, as well as all ads, and makes the site much faster to load. You can't log into your Twitter account through Nitter – instead, you search for a username to view that feed anonymously. Install the browser add-on Nitter Redirect ([bit.ly/nitter510](http://bit.ly/nitter510))

## IMPROVE FACEBOOK'S NEW DESIGN



As we reported last issue, Facebook has disabled the option to revert to its 'classic' design. If you're not keen on the new layout, you can use FB Purity ([www.fbpurity.com](http://www.fbpurity.com)) to tweak it to your liking. Available for all the main browsers, this extension lets you remove unwanted elements such as posts about events, recommendation requests and sponsored content; hide photos, videos and chat features; reorder your news feed to display recent or close friends' posts first; customise the font size and background colour; and much more. FB Purity's developer warns that

some options may not work with the new Facebook design yet.

Alternatively, you can install the new Chrome extension 'Old Layout for Facebook' ([bit.ly/3hTyh00](http://bit.ly/3hTyh00)) to revert to the classic design - see page 32.

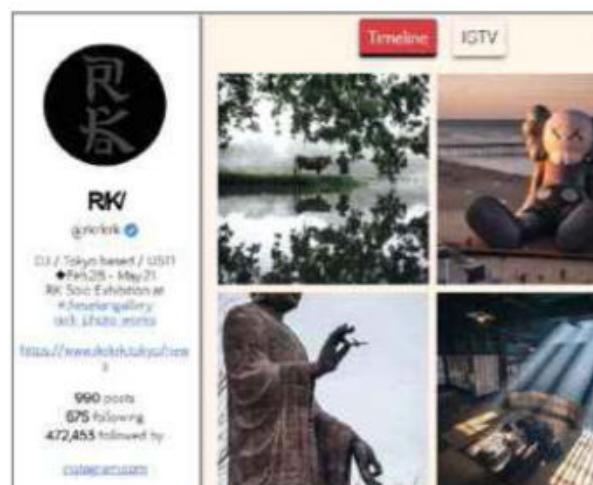
For a better Twitter experience on your phone or tablet, we recommend Albatross for Android and iOS ([bit.ly/albatross510](http://bit.ly/albatross510)), which is fully customisable, removes ads from Twitter and displays tweets in a genuinely chronological order.



## Access Instagram in your browser

Although it's possible to view Instagram feeds in your browser rather than the mobile app – just type [instagram.com/](http://instagram.com/) followed by the username – you can only scroll so far before being nagged to log in, and you can't view photos full size, or download them. Bibliogram ([bibliogram.art](http://bibliogram.art)) solves these problems by providing a simple, speedy front end for Instagram that removes ads and trackers. Just search for a username to access that person's timeline, with no obstructions, and see details of their posts and follower count. Click an image to open it and right-click to save it to your hard drive.

Note that Bibliogram doesn't let you post, comment or follow anonymously, or view private Instagram profiles.

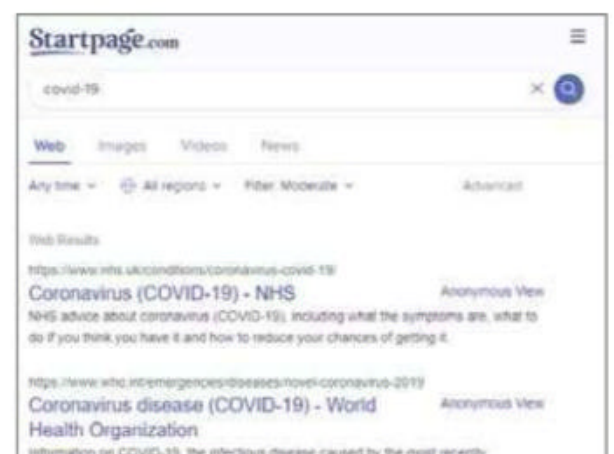
## Search Google without being spied on

If you like the speed, accuracy and convenience of Google search, but don't like being spied on and having information about you collected, consider switching to Startpage.com ([www.startpage.com](http://www.startpage.com)). This privacy-focused search engine uses Google search results, but with none of the intrusive data tracking and logging, so you can quickly find online content without online trackers finding you.

Unlike Google, Startpage.com doesn't store your searches, record your IP address, implant tracking cookies or share your personal information with third parties. It also offers a useful Anonymous View, which lets you open Google results using a proxy server.

To support its upkeep (Startpage.com pays Google to use its results), the site displays sponsored links at the top of your search results, but these are clearly labelled 'Ad' and have no access to your personal information.

There are also Startpage apps for Android ([bit.ly/startdroid510](http://bit.ly/startdroid510)) and iOS ([bit.ly/startios510](http://bit.ly/startios510)), and add-ons for all the main browsers. ■

# Why **Chrome OS** is better than **Windows**

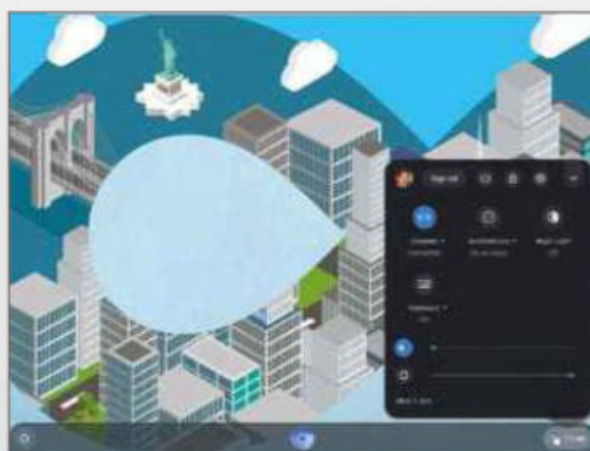


Why not make your next laptop a Chromebook instead of a Windows machine? **Wayne Williams** reveals the things that Google's operating system can do that Microsoft's can't



## It sets up in seconds

When you install a clean copy of Windows 10 or launch a new installation for the first time, you have to set up the operating system, choosing which features to allow and which to block. You only have to do this once (unless a new feature update requires you to do it again), but it's still time consuming. With Chrome OS, all you have to do is log into your Google account and you're ready to get going. You can start using apps such as Gmail, Drive and Docs instantly, with no need to sign in again or download anything.

Edition ([www.neverware.com](http://www.neverware.com)). This is a build of Chromium OS (the open-source development version of Chrome OS) that's designed to run on older PCs and Macs, and is free for personal use.



## It doesn't suffer update problems

It seems like every new Windows 10 update breaks something – Microsoft rolls out a fix for one problem and, in doing so, introduces a different issue elsewhere. A recent update that installed the new Chromium-based Edge was found to be causing system

slowdowns for many people, while another update unexpectedly removed Notepad and Paint for some users, and yet another disabled printing.

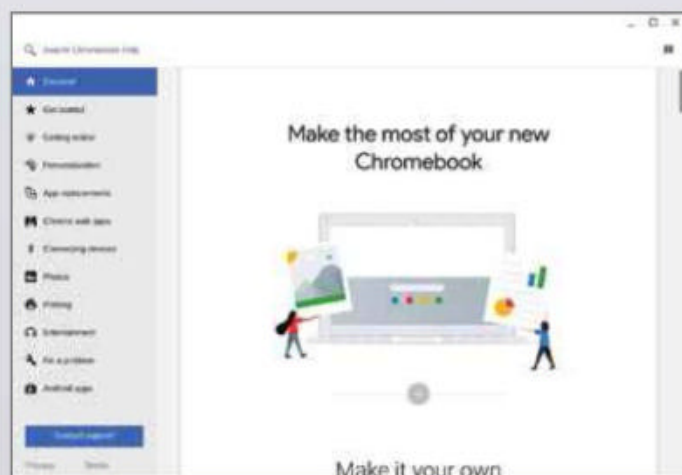
Chrome OS updates, on the other hand, are rarely problematic and you probably won't even notice them – they're installed automatically, but you can also update manually. Because the operating system is so lightweight, updates are very quick to install, unlike their Windows counterparts which can take an age to finish and may require one or more restarts.



## It's easy to move between Chromebooks

If you want to upgrade your Windows laptop to a new model running the latest operating system, you have three options: start from scratch; reinstall your programs and copy over your data; or use a third-party tool to clone and restore your drive.

With a Chromebook, all you need to do is log into your new device and you're ready to go, with all your apps and settings in place. It really couldn't be easier.



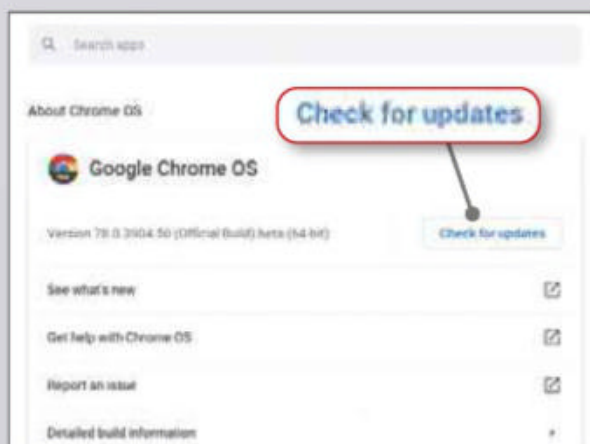

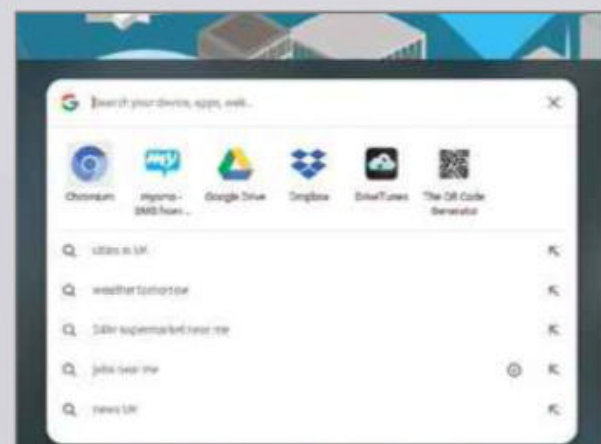
## It's lightweight and fast

Unlike Windows 10, which hogs resources and comes bundled with apps you will probably never use, Chrome OS is a lightweight operating system that can run on low-powered hardware. This in turn results in excellent battery life and a system that takes seconds to boot up, rather than several minutes – as is the case with most Windows computers.

If you want to get a taste of Chrome OS's speedy performance on your own PC, you can install CloudReady: Home

## It uses Google for search

Microsoft has integrated its own search engine into Windows 10. If you use the Windows search box to look for something on the web – or ask Cortana to carry out the job – the results you get will come from Bing. And, despite what Microsoft says, Bing really isn't that good.

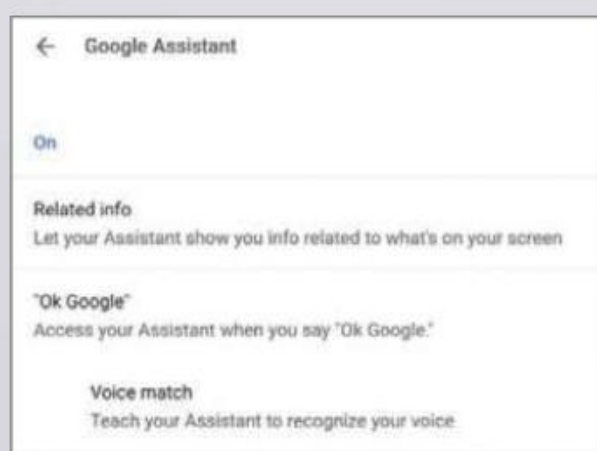
Chrome OS uses Google, which is much faster and more accurate, to search the web, as well as your files, apps and web history. Chromebooks include a useful Google Search button on their keyboards for instant access.



## It offers smart voice control

Some Chromebooks come with Google Assistant built in, which you can use to get quick answers to questions, manage tasks, control compatible smart-home devices and more, using your voice rather than typing. Windows 10 has a rival smart assistant in the form of Cortana, but it's nowhere near as good and is hampered by being powered by Bing. Due to its data-harvesting abilities, Google already knows a huge amount about you, which – while not great news if you're worried about your privacy – gives its Assistant a major head start in knowing what you like.

Assistant can also save you time by performing everyday tasks such as creating a new Google Docs document, searching for files, capturing screenshots and adjusting your screen's brightness.

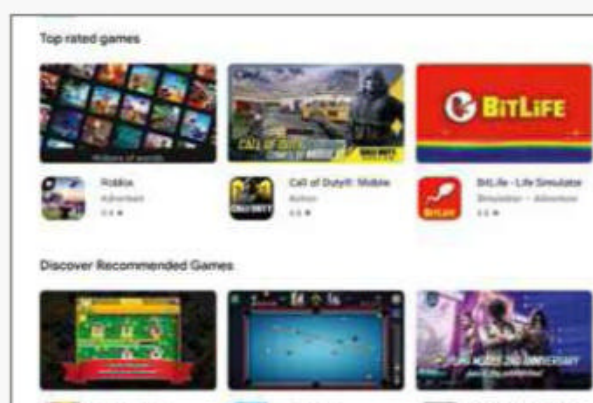


**Control your Chromebook using your voice with its built-in Google Assistant**



## It can run Android apps natively

Although you can use a third-party program such as BlueStacks ([www.bluestacks.com](http://www.bluestacks.com)) to run Android apps on your Windows PC, Chromebooks can install and run them natively, provided you have access to the Google Play Store, which the majority of Chromebooks released from 2019

onwards do (the feature has been available on some older models since 2016). Newer Chromebooks have touchscreens to help you get the most from Android apps without using your keyboard and mouse, so you can play your favourite mobile games on your desktop.



## It can run Linux apps

Chrome OS – like Google's other operating system, Android – is built on the Linux kernel, so it makes sense that you'd be able to run Linux apps on it. That said, running Linux apps on a Chromebook is only possible thanks to Google's Crostini Project, which uses container technology combined with virtual machines.

To use the feature, you first need to enable it on your Chromebook by going to Settings, looking for the Linux (Beta) option and turning it on. The installation process will begin and, afterwards, you'll be faced with a blank Terminal screen to type commands into. From here, you can install Linux apps. To install LibreOffice, for example, type `sudo apt install libreoffice -y`.

## It can run (some) Windows apps

Yes, it's possible to run Windows programs on Chrome OS, but there is a catch, which is that you'll need to buy CrossOver Chrome OS ([bit.ly/cochrome510](http://bit.ly/cochrome510)) to do so, and – perhaps

## ON THE OTHER HAND...

The main downside to Chrome OS is that you can't usually install third-party software on your Chromebook without going through the Google Play store (or using extensions from the Chrome Web Store). With Windows 10, you can install software from anywhere – and that includes superior paid-for tools such as Microsoft Office and the latest AAA games.

Although Chrome OS doesn't need an internet connection to work, the system and its apps are built for online use, which is less true of Windows. Also, Microsoft's operating system can recognise and use all manner of hardware devices thanks to its massive driver database, while Chrome OS only supports the basics.

Finally, Chromebooks used to be very cheap, and while that's still true in a lot of cases, premium models such as Google's Pixelbook Go can set you back up to £1,329. For that price, you could pick up a more capable Windows laptop.



most importantly of all – your Chromebook will need to have an Intel processor (which not all do) and support Google Play. CrossOver Chrome OS costs from £32 and can run more than 16,000 Windows programs, including Microsoft Office, Adobe Photoshop and Steam. It's still in beta, so you may encounter a few bugs and not everything will run quite as intended. ■

## Use DigiKam 7's face-finding tools to catalogue your photos

Photo organiser DigiKam has had a major update that's made it brilliant at recognising people in photos, like Picasa did. Here's how to use it

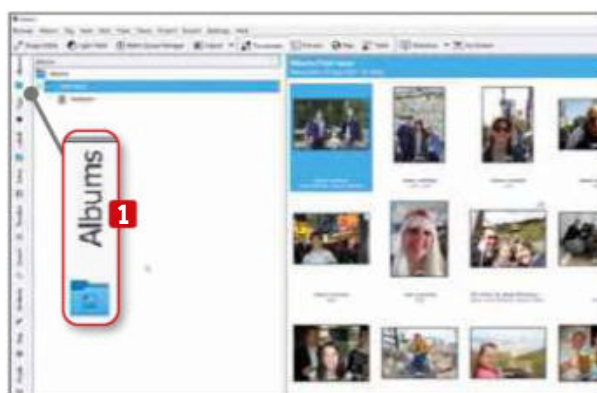

It's likely that you've accumulated a vast hoard of photos on your computer over the years, from various sources such as cameras, mobile phones and shared by other people. DigiKam is a powerful photo manager that can sort your collection into thumbnail albums, filter content by category, edit individual

images and share items across numerous services. The latest version comes with a new facial-recognition tool that uses machine learning to quickly and accurately identify faces in photos. And not just human faces, either – the tool is clever enough to also be able to identify dogs and other creatures, too.



**1** DigiKam is actually two separate tools: Showfoto is a standalone image editor; and DigiKam is a photo manager and editor. It's the latter you'll need. When you run it for the first time, you're asked where you keep your photos. **1** You can add more sources later.



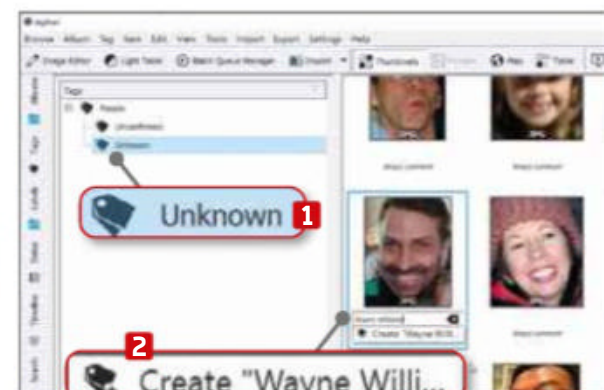
**2** Click Next, then select the type of database you want – the default SQLite option is fine – and choose a location for it. Click through the rest of the questions and DigiKam loads and imports your images. This takes a while. When it's finished, access your photos through the Albums view. **1**



**3** Select a photo and you can rate it out of five, **1** open it full screen **2** or rotate it left or right. **3** Right-clicking it brings up a context menu with more options, such as assigning a tag and a label.



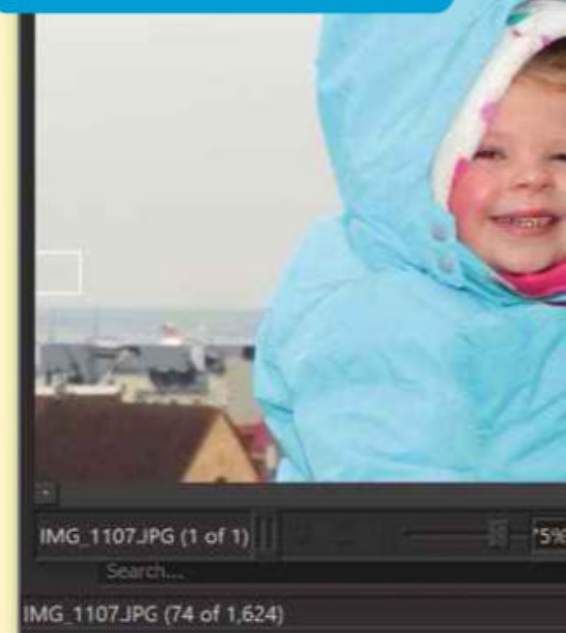
**4** To scan for faces, click the People tab. **1** Make sure 'Detect faces' **2** is selected and click the 'Scan collection for faces' button. **3** It goes to work, scouring all your photos for people. You can see how many photos have been processed in the status bar, below. **4**



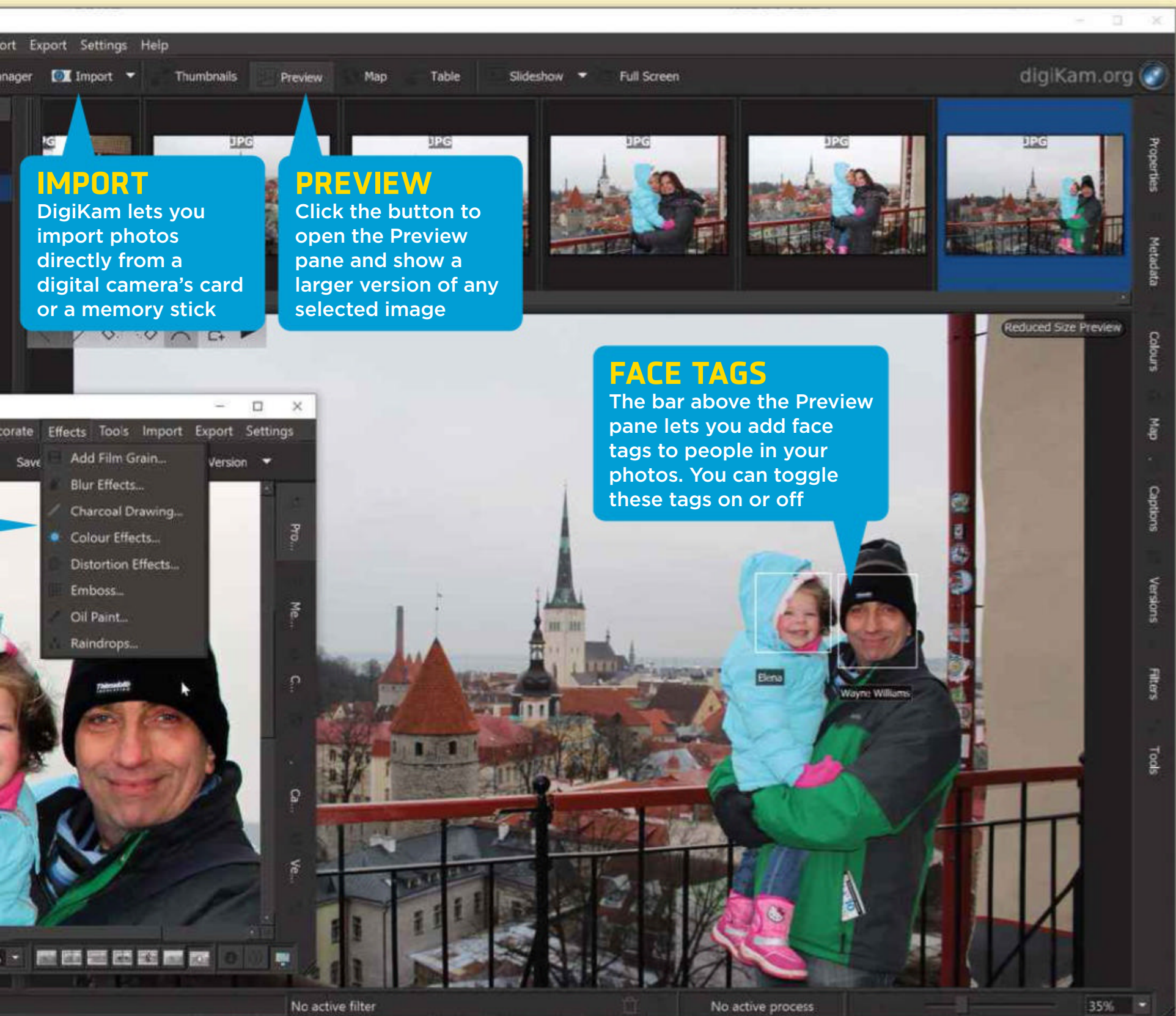
**5** Click the Unknown tag at the top **1** and DigiKam displays thumbnails of all of the faces it's found. Hover over a face and a 'Who is this?' box opens. Enter that person's name and click the option to create a tag for them. **2** Find more photos of that person in your collection.

Click the Image Editor button to fix and enhance your photos, and apply various effects



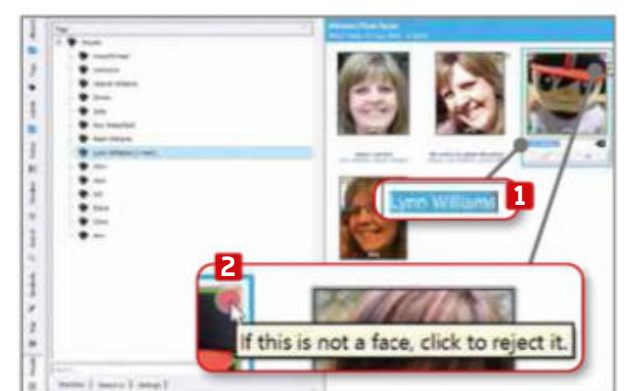




**6** Their name will be shown below. Click the tick to add them to that tag. Next, find someone else to identify. **7** DigiKam often identifies faces you may not recognise, such as people in the background or things that aren't real people. Remove any incorrect thumbnails by clicking the minus (-) button. **1** When you've added a few faces to each tag (it can work with just one, but more is better), click Recognise Faces. **2**



**8** Click 'Scan collection for faces' and DigiKam will tag your other photos with a name (or names, if it's unsure) from your list. Click a tag on the left to review all the faces. If you find any that are incorrectly identified, hover over them and change the tag **1** or reject the image. **2**

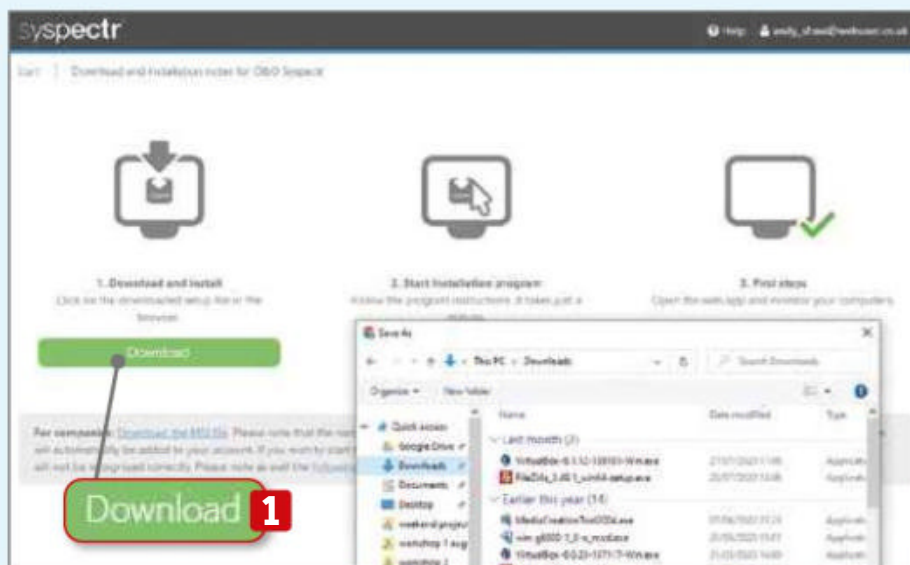

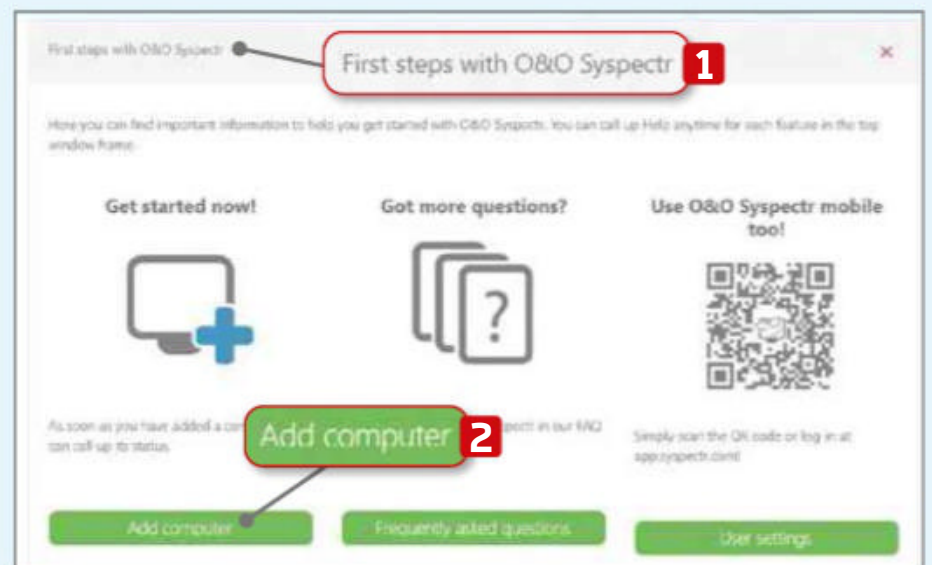
If you're watching over other people's PCs as well as your own, organise them into separate groups. From the main Overview screen, click 'Create new group'. Name the group, give it a description if you wish, then click the 'Add computer' box. Enter the details of each computer you want to include in the group, then click Add. You can then view different groups to see at a glance whether the problems are with your own PCs or ones you're monitoring for other people.

We know that *Web User* readers are often the most computer-savvy people among their families and friends, and get asked to fix problems when technology goes wrong. The trouble is that problems often get flagged long after action should have been taken.

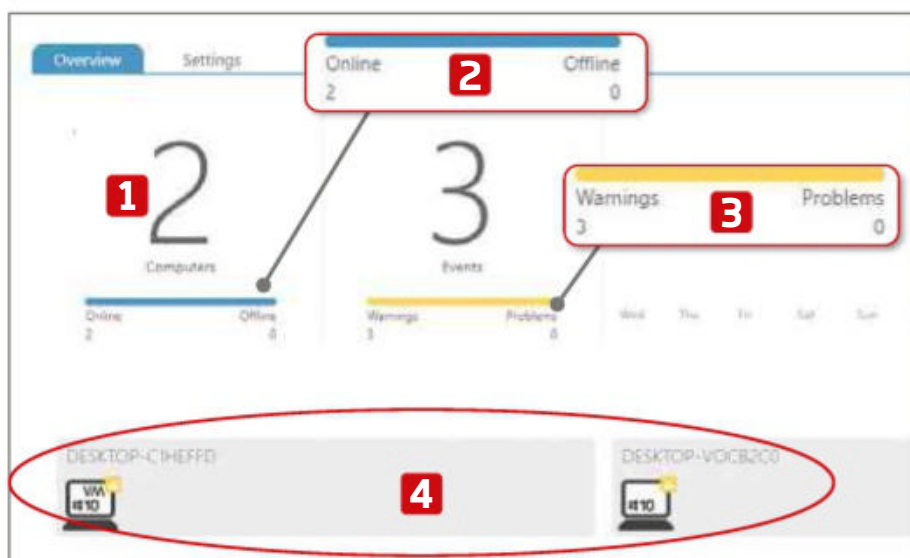
To make your tech-support role easier, install O&O Syspectr on all the PCs you look after. This handy free tool displays key information about each computer on a single dashboard you can access anywhere. You can see at a glance if there are any serious problems appearing on the PCs, check that security tools are working, ensure that updates have been installed and even connect to a PC remotely, to solve simple problems without leaving your seat.



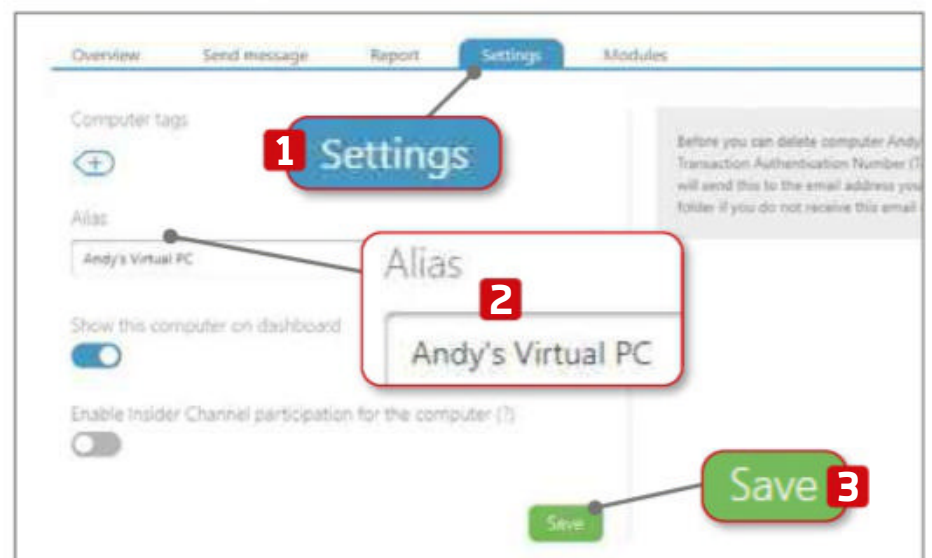
**1** Start on the first PC that you want to look after. Create an account by going to [www.syspectr.com](http://www.syspectr.com) in your browser, clicking the 'Sign up now' button and following the instructions. You're taken to a screen with a Download button. **1** Download the software to the PC and run it to install it.



**2** Repeat this process on all the PCs you want to monitor. Log into the dashboard on your own PC and a 'First steps' window appears. **1** Click the 'Add computer' button, **2** then the download button, to get the encrypted installation file that's associated with your account. If you've closed it, you can click the grey 'Add computer' button in the Overview screen.

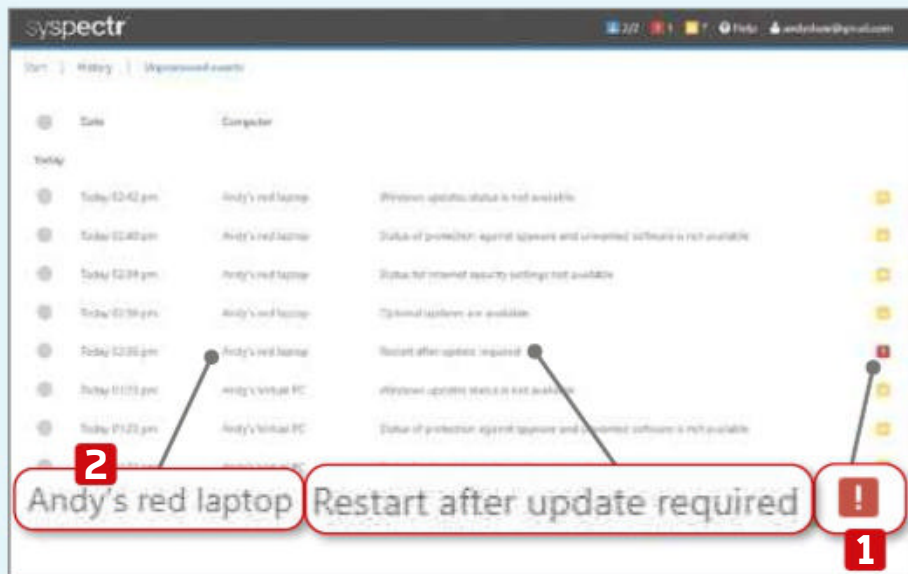


**3** Scroll down or close the First Steps window to see the overview of your current setup. This displays the number of PCs you have connected, **1** along with their online/offline status, **2** and any events and warnings. **3** The icons for individual PCs **4** are displayed below.

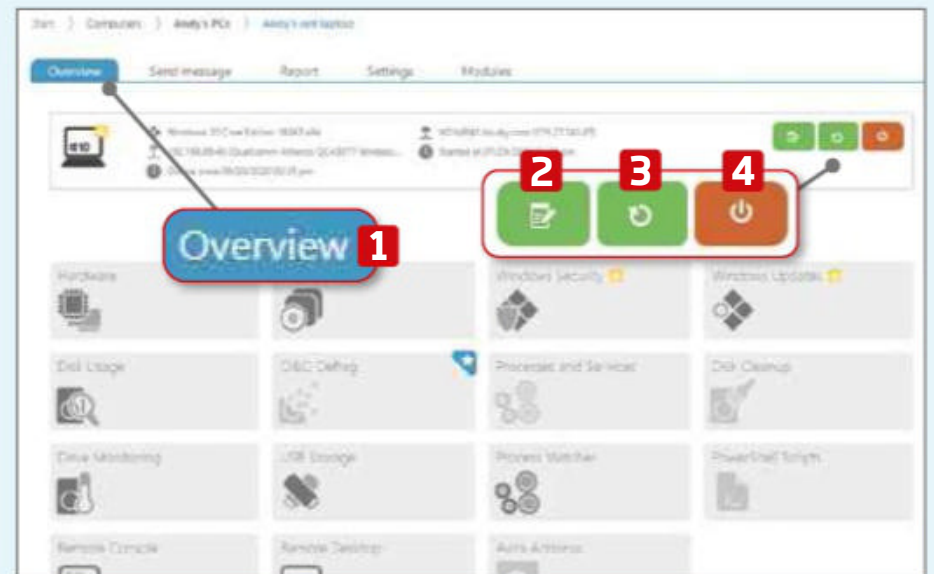


**4** Your computers are designated serial numbers, such as 'Desktop-CIHEFFD', which isn't very helpful for identifying which is which. Click the computer's icon and choose the Settings tab. **1** Under Alias, type in a more recognisable name for the computer. **2** Click Save. **3**





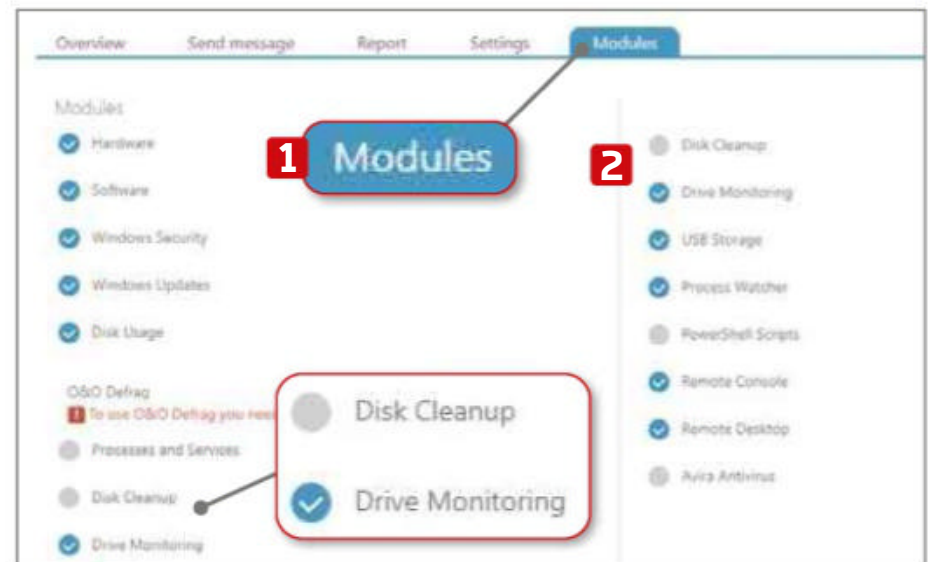
**5** Red items displayed in the Events area are worth examining. Click the number to open 'Unprocessed events'. Any problem events are flagged with a red icon in the right-hand column. **1** In this example, we have a PC that has downloaded and installed its updates, but needs restarting to apply them. Click the computer's name. **2**



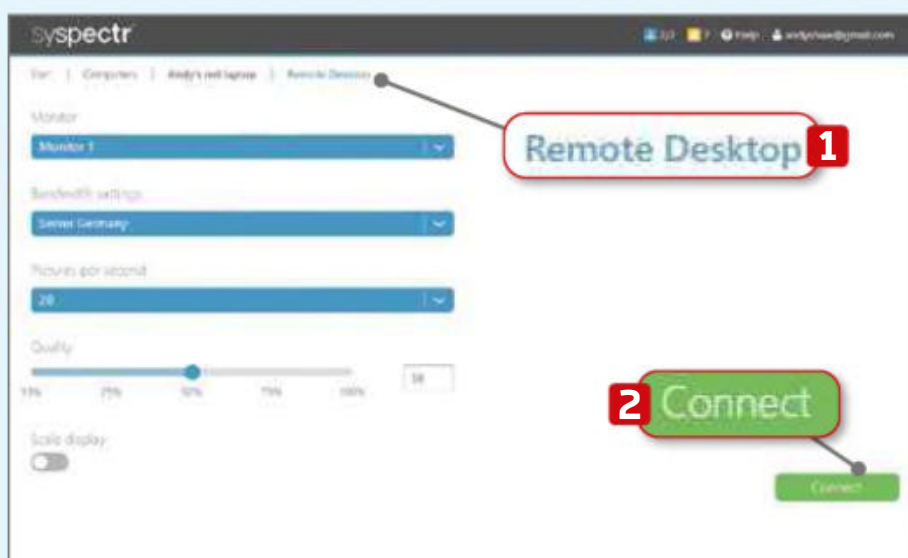
**6** The PC's overview tab **1** displays a page with three buttons that let you make a note about a PC, **2** restart it **3** or switch it off. **4** Here, we're clicking the Restart button. You're asked to confirm the action on the PC you're sitting at, which sends a message to the remote PC, warning anyone using it that it's about to restart.



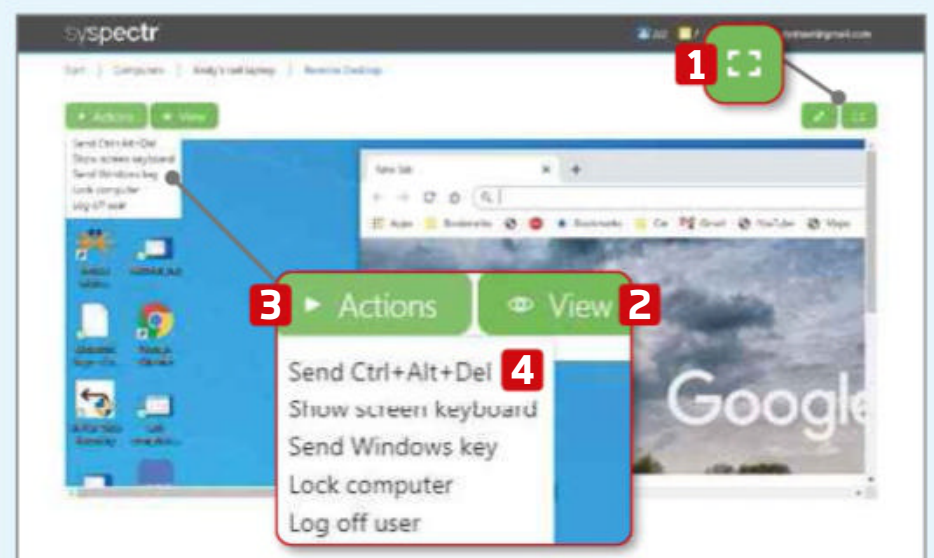
**7** The computer's Overview screen displays a grid of tools. Use these to check the hardware **1** and software **2** installed on the PC, all the security **3** and update information, **4** and a range of other tools. Some of the greyed-out boxes need premium O&O tools, but others, such as Disk Cleanup, **5** just need activating.



**8** To change which options are available for each computer, click one and choose the Modules tab. **1** Here, you can add any components that you think you might need (such as Disk Cleanup) by ticking the circles, **2** or remove any you don't need by clearing ticks that are already there.



**9** One particularly useful tool in O&O Syspectr is Remote Desktop. **1** Click this, then choose how you want the connection to work. The default settings should be fine. Click the Connect button. **2** A message appears on the remote PC allowing its user to accept or deny you access.



**10** Once you've taken over the PC, its desktop appears in a window. You can scroll around it or, if you prefer, click the Fullscreen button **1** to let it take over your entire screen. The View button **2** can be used to configure the size and resolution. Click Actions **3** for access to commands, such as Ctrl+Alt+Delete. **4**





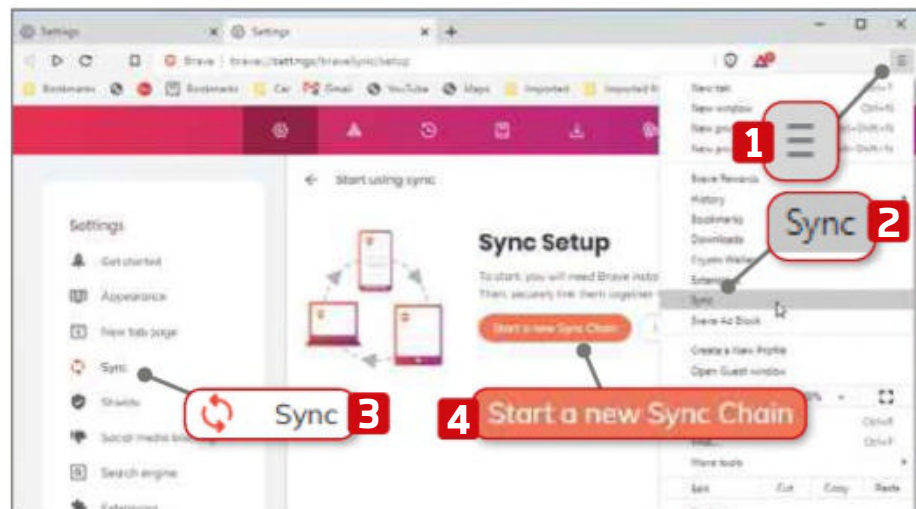
# Sync your Brave data between devices

The latest version of the Chromium-based Brave browser has dramatically overhauled its Sync tool, making it much better at syncing bookmarks, history and tabs between all your Windows and Android devices. The system is encrypted

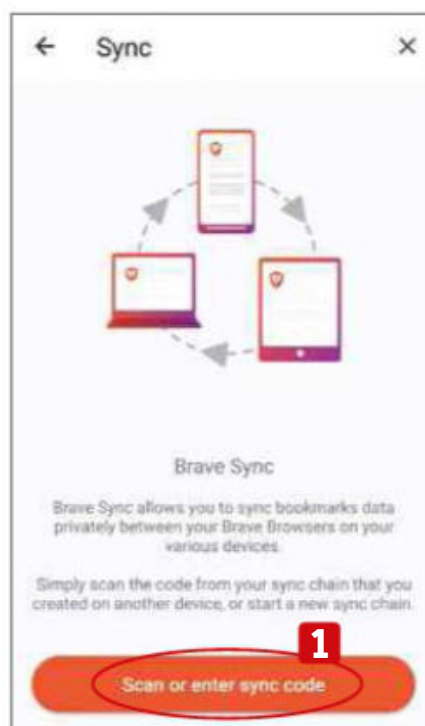
within the browser and doesn't require you to sign up for an account. The iOS version is still under development but is expected soon.



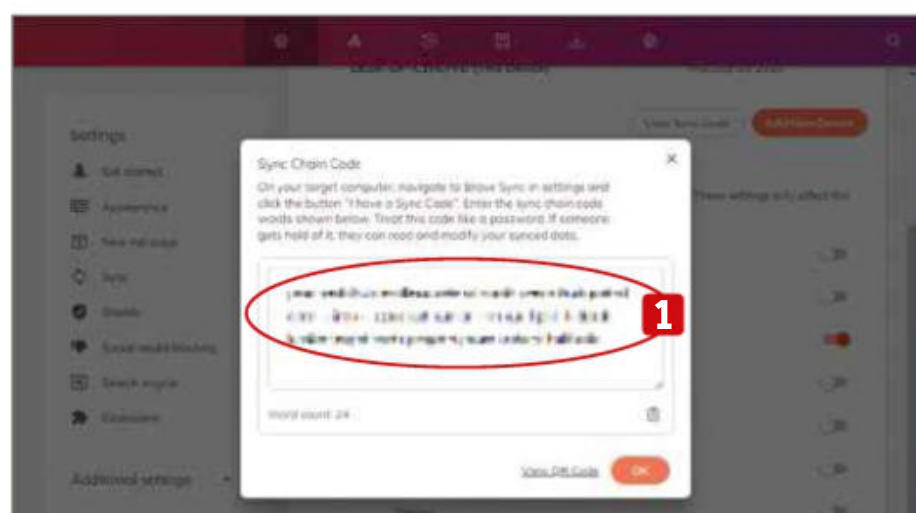

**1** In your main Brave browser, click the menu button **1** and choose Sync. **2** The Settings page opens with the Sync option selected. **3** Click the 'Start a new Sync Chain' button, **4** even if you've used sync tools in a previous version of Brave. You're asked what type of device you'd like to sync to.



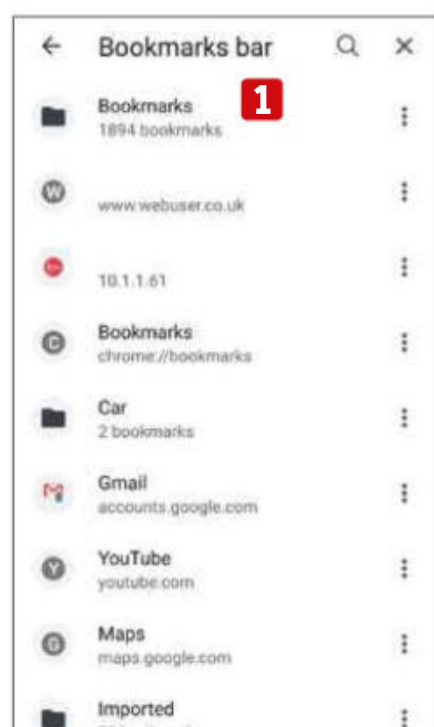
**2** If your second Brave browser is installed on a mobile device, open the menu and choose Settings. Scroll down and open the Sync section. Choose to 'Scan or enter sync code' **1** and hold your device's camera up to the QR code that should be displayed on your PC's screen. The phone will start syncing, which can take a few minutes.



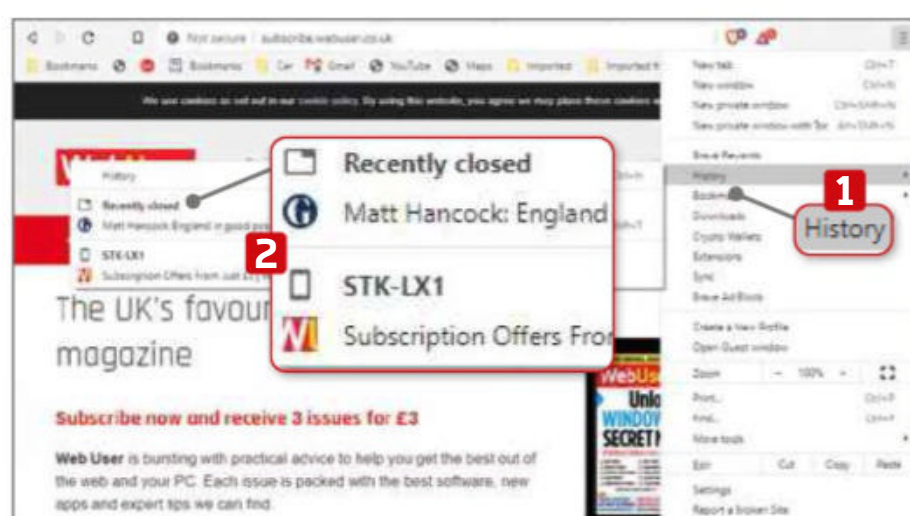
**3** Alternatively, if you're syncing to another PC, you're given a Sync Chain Code. This is a series of 24 words **1** and is effectively a very long password. Keep it private because anyone with access to it can sync their browser with yours, which means they will be able to use any saved passwords.



**4** On a mobile device, choose what to sync by tapping the Categories button. On a PC, choose 'Manage your synced devices' in the Sync settings. In both cases, you can turn on 'Sync everything' **1** or choose individual items in the list. **2** Some, such as Extensions, **3** are only available on desktop.



**5** Most elements should sync automatically, though we found that some, such as bookmarks, took a while to appear and only started syncing when we attempted to access them on a second browser. Be patient – it only takes a few seconds and your bookmarks will soon appear. **1**



**6** When syncing open tabs, you'll find your other browser's tabs in the menu. On mobile, Recent Tabs displays a list of the other browser's open tabs. In the desktop version, the list is accessed from the menu's History option. **1** In both cases, other browsers appear below the 'Recently closed' section. **2**



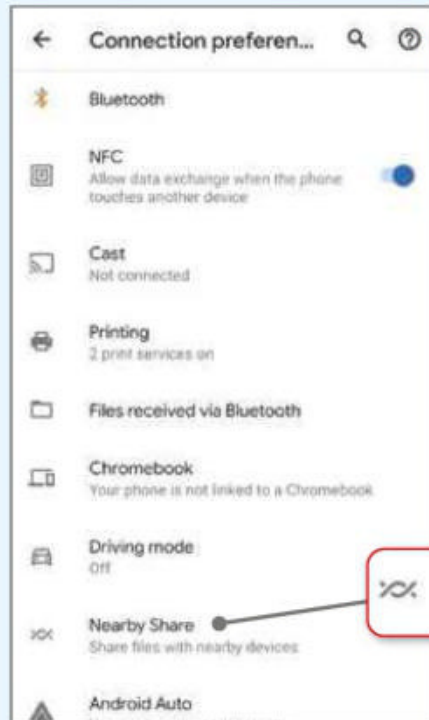


# Share files with Google's Nearby Share

Nearby Share is Google's answer to Apple's AirDrop – it lets you share files with devices that are physically close by. It's rolling out to most Android phones but if you haven't received the update yet, there's a workaround:

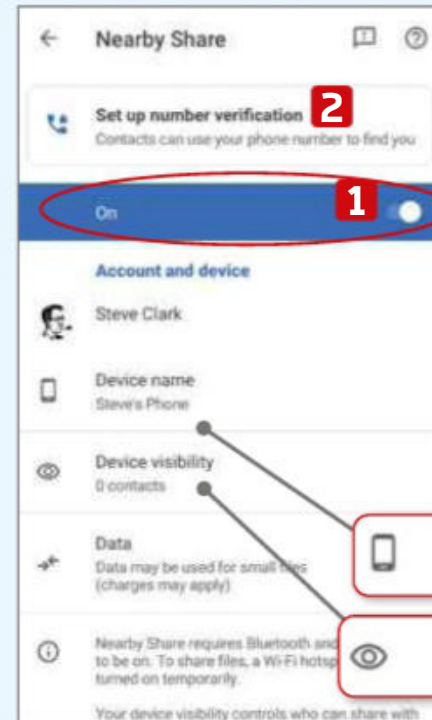

go to Settings, 'Apps and notifications', then select Google Play Services from the list. If that doesn't work, you could try signing up to become a beta tester.



**1** Check Nearby Share is on your phone by opening Settings, then choosing 'Connected devices' and 'Connection preferences'. If it's there, tap Nearby Share. **1** This lets you turn on the feature and select which contacts can share with you.

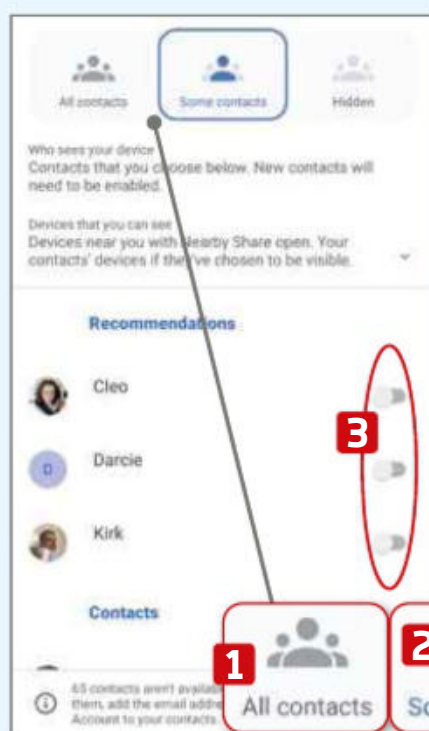

**2** Once Nearby Share is running, you can toggle it on and off. **1** The other main options are number verification, **2** which helps contacts find you via your phone number; 'Device name', **3** so your contacts know who to look for; and 'Device visibility', **4** for determining which contacts can 'see and share' with you.

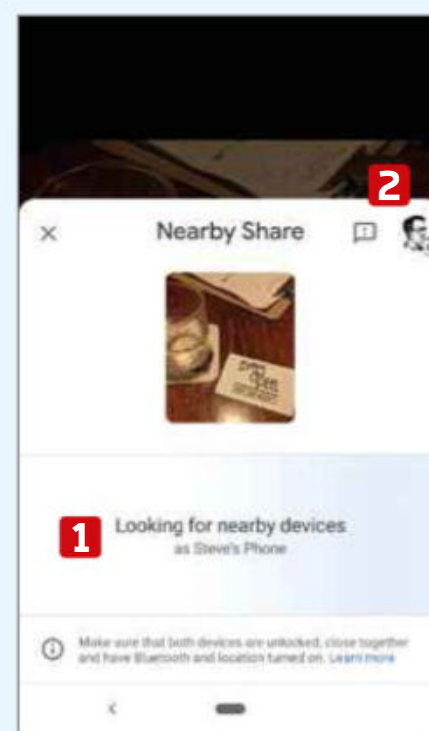

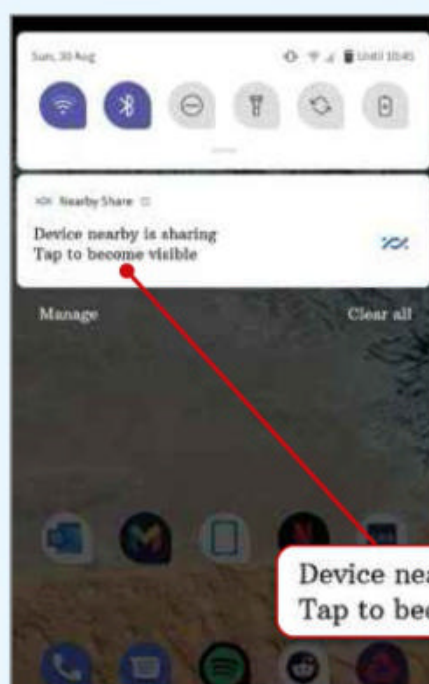


**3** Of these, 'Device visibility' is arguably the most important – you don't want random passers-by sharing files with you. By default, it's set to 'All contacts'. **1** Selecting 'Some contacts' **2** lets you toggle on (or off) **3** contacts on an individual basis. Hidden **4** means your device isn't visible to anyone.

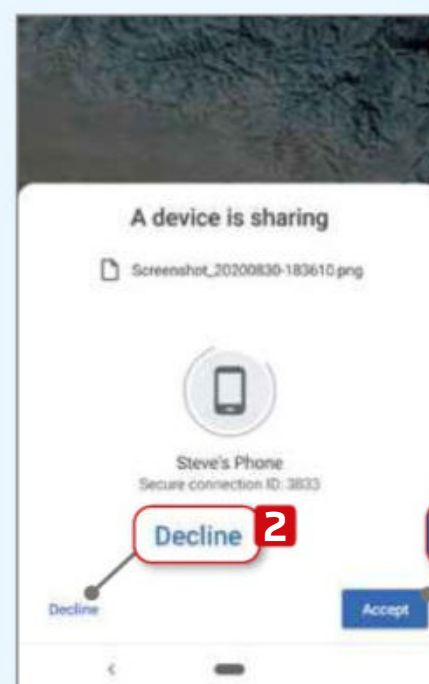


**4** When you're ready to share, open a file and tap the Share button. Select Nearby Share from the sharing options to begin searching for devices. **1** Make sure both sender and receiver phones are unlocked, with Bluetooth and location on. Tapping your profile picture **2** opens Nearby Share's settings, which is helpful for quickly changing 'Device visibility'.



**5** As Nearby Share searches for devices, your contact is sent a notification alerting them that a 'Device nearby is sharing'. **1** By tapping this, your contact turns on Nearby Share and is made visible on your (sender) device. Tap their device on your (sender) phone to select them as the recipient.

**6** The two devices now connect to each other. Before any files are copied, your contact must tap Accept **1** or Decline. **2** Sharing is near-instant and the files are sent to your Downloads library. You can stop share requests by pressing Cancel or leaving the request to time out.

How to...

## Move Windows 10 to an SSD

**Wayne Williams** shows you how to boost the performance of your Windows PC by upgrading to an SSD

**O**ne of the best ways to give your PC a performance boost is to swap the mechanical hard-disk drive (HDD) for a solid-state drive (SSD). Because SSDs use flash memory, your PC will start much quicker and everything will load faster. The lack of moving parts makes them significantly quieter, too, with none of the clunking and whirring you typically get from hard drives.

Compared to HDDs, SSDs are still quite pricey – especially for larger capacities – but they’re a lot more affordable now than they were a few years ago. If you’re upgrading a desktop PC, the ideal solution would be to buy an SSD for your operating system and keep the old hard drive for storage. You could even buy a new, larger hard drive while you’re at it. If you’re upgrading a laptop, you’ll just want to get an SSD that’s large enough to suit your personal storage needs.



### What you need

Buying an SSD isn’t simply a case of going online, finding one you like and purchasing it. There are two very different types to choose from. 2.5in SATA solid-state drives are the most common, and can be used in any PC. If you’re installing the SSD in a desktop PC, you also need to buy a mounting bracket so you can fit it into a spare 3.5in bay (although some SSDs include a

mounting bracket in the package).

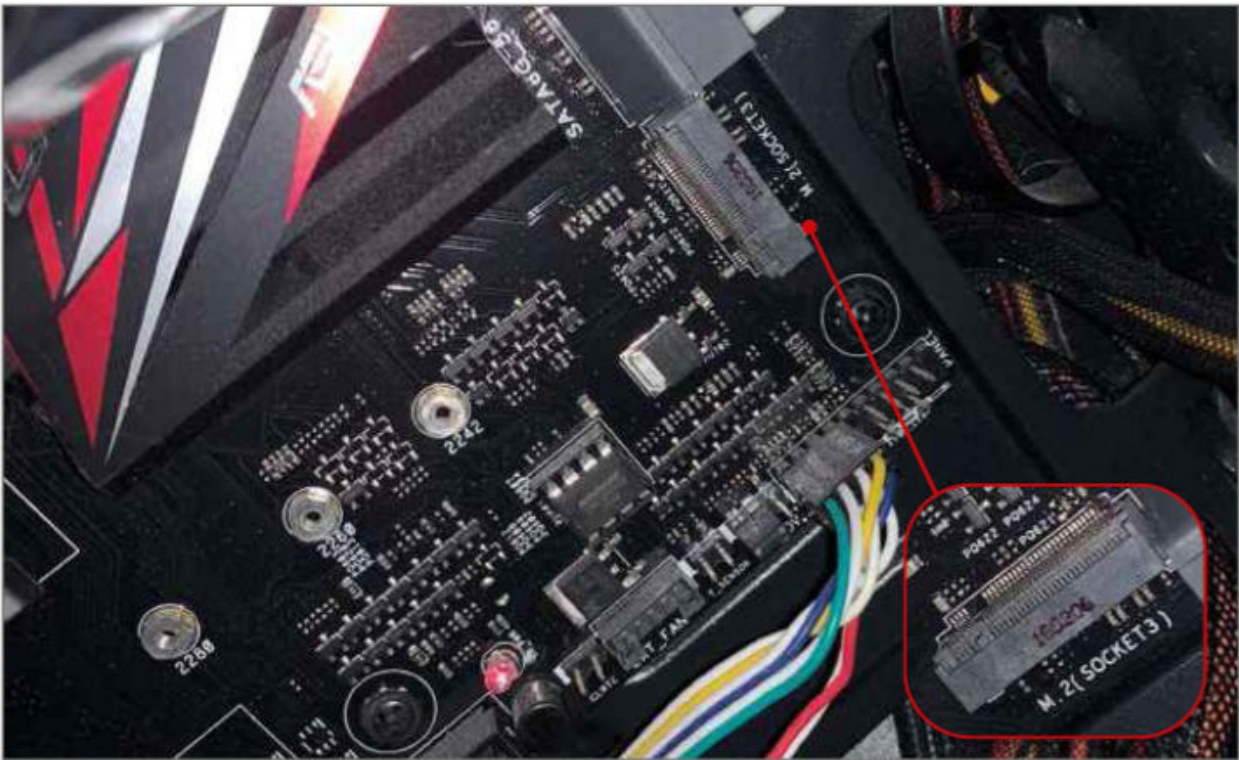
The other type of SSD is an M.2 PCIe NVMe drive. These offer significantly faster speeds than SATA drives but require your PC to have an NVMe M.2 slot on the motherboard, which older or cheaper systems may not have. If your computer does have one of these, we’d definitely recommend going down this route. Most of the NVMe solid-state drives you can buy now are based on PCIe (PCI

Express) 3.0, but drives for the new PCIe 4.0 standard are becoming more popular, though only the newest PCs support it.

To check whether your motherboard has an M.2 socket, open the case and look around inside for an inch-long port with some screw holes spaced a short distance apart. See the photo on the opposite page. The socket will be labelled M.2.

M.2 PCIe NVMe drives are more





If your motherboard has an M.2 slot, we recommend you choose an M.2 PCIe NVMe SSD, which is faster than a SATA SSD

time, even if you use them a lot.  
We show you how to fit an SSD drive in our Mini Workshop, below.

### Preparing to move Windows 10

Once you've installed your new SSD, you have a couple of options. If possible, we recommend you start with a clean install. Download the Windows 10 Media Creation Tool from [bit.ly/mct510](https://bit.ly/mct510) and save the installer in an ISO file. Burn it to DVD or write it to a USB flash using Rufus ([rufus.ie](https://rufus.ie)). Use this to boot your computer, then install the OS on your new drive.

Once that's complete, you need to reinstall all your old software, configure it all and copy over all your files. The process takes a while but it's worth the effort because Windows will run much better for it. That said, most people favour cloning the existing drive to the

expensive than SATA drives, but not by much. To give you an idea, the ADATA XPG SX8200 Pro 1TB M.2 Gaming Solid State Drive (SSD) will set you back £125 on Amazon, while the SATA-based ADATA Ultimate SU800 1TB Solid State Drive (SSD) costs £110.

So, what size SSD should you get? Well, that depends what you use your PC for, and whether you'll also be using a mechanical hard drive for storage. We would recommend a minimum of 500GB, but 1TB or more would be preferable. To get as much life as possible from the drive, you should aim to use no more than 50% of its capacity at any one time. Only use it for storing your operating system and important programs.

As with buying other solid-state memory products – such as standard

memory and SD cards – it's definitely worth buying your SSD from a well-known brand, such as SanDisk, Kingston, Corsair or Crucial. The memory chips that make up an SSD can only be written to a set number of times and a cheaper drive might develop faults or fail sooner. That said, SSDs can last a very long

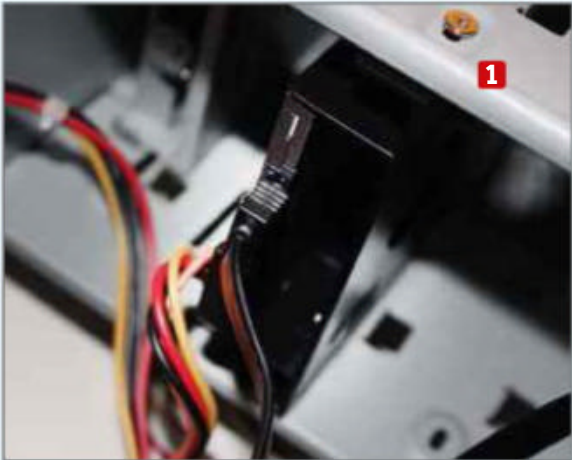
MINI WORKSHOP | Install a SATA SSD



**1** 2.5in SATA SSDs are the perfect size for installing in laptops. To replace your drive, earth yourself, shut down the laptop, remove the battery, unscrew the back of the case and remove the existing hard drive. Insert the SSD, attach the power and SATA connectors, then reassemble everything. **1**



**2** Desktop PCs have 3.5in drive bays, so installing a 2.5in SSD requires a 2.5-3.5in internal mounting kit. Your SSD may come with one but, if not, you can pick one up for around £6 from Amazon. Earth yourself, insert the SSD into the adapter and screw it in place. **1**







**3** Turn off your PC at the wall, then open the case. Find a spare bay and insert the drive. The process varies depending on the chassis design, but usually you slide the drive in and secure it with screws. **1** Once that's done, attach the power and SATA cables and you're all set.

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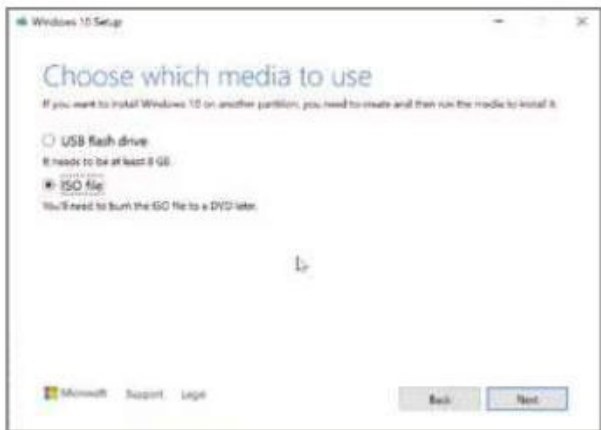
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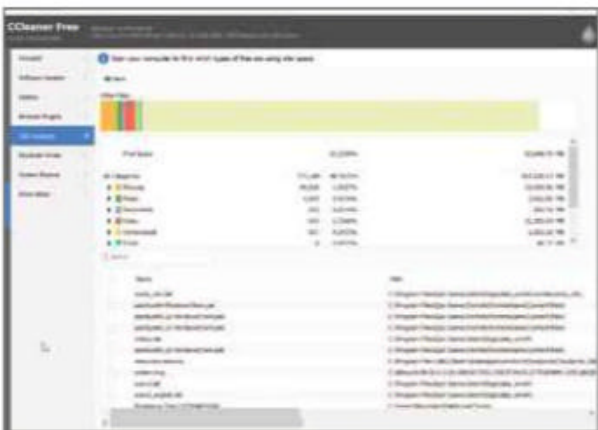

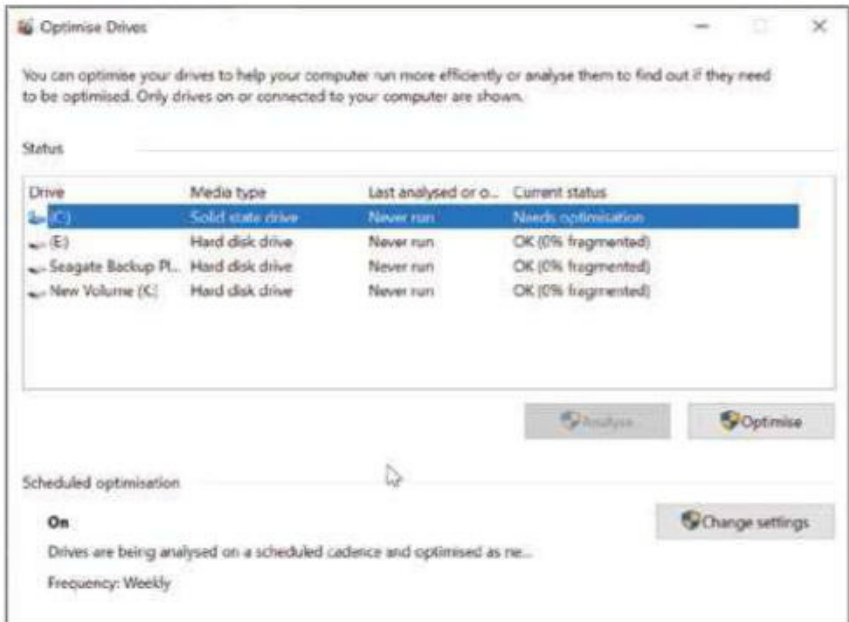

SSD because you can get on with using the drive immediately afterwards.

If you decide on the latter option, please take the time to indulge in a spot of housekeeping first, to make your cloned OS as small as possible. The recently updated IObit Uninstaller 10 ([iobit.com](http://iobit.com)) is a useful tool for this tidying-up process, because it can batch-remove unwanted programs and clean up after them, removing junk files and Registry entries that would normally be left behind. The tool can also uninstall Windows Store apps, including those bundled with Windows 10. To find and remove even more unwanted junk on your system, use CCleaner ([ccleaner.com](http://ccleaner.com)).

Once you've done that, move your personal files (such as photos, videos and documents) to another drive and delete anything you don't want. CCleaner has a useful Disk

Analyser – found under Tools – which can show you the biggest space hogs on your PC. This can help when trying to free up space. Once you've reduced the size of your Windows installation as much as possible, you'll be ready to clone it.



You can optimise your SSD after you've used it for a while, but it's not essential

Follow the steps in our Mini Workshop, below.

### Optimise your SSD

Defragging your hard drive reorders its contents so that the data is arranged into

neat contiguous sections, but this isn't something you need to do with an SSD. There's no speed benefit to be had and moving data around the drive in this way can shorten the SSD's lifespan. Thankfully, disk-defragmenting tools – including Windows 10's own 'Defragment and Optimise Drives' – can identify an SSD and won't let you defrag it. These tools typically offer an optimisation mode you can use instead, but it isn't necessary and it's unlikely that you'll notice any speed improvements, anyway. ■

**MINI WORKSHOP** | **Transfer Windows 10 to your new SSD**

**1** Some SSDs come with cloning software you can use to transfer Windows 10 (and any installed software) from your old drive to the new one. If software wasn't supplied, you can use a third-party program, such as the excellent AOMEI Backupper Standard ([bit.ly/backupper510](http://bit.ly/backupper510)). Select Clone. **1**

**2** System Clone **1** is a Pro-only feature (upgrading costs £43) and, while this makes it easier to migrate your operating system from the old drive to the new one, it's not essential. Choose Disk Clone **2** or Partition Clone **3** depending on whether your OS is stored in a separate system partition. We'll choose Disk Clone.

**3** Next, select the source drive (where the OS currently resides), click Next and select the destination drive (your new SSD). Click Next again and check the details are correct. **1** Tick the SSD Alignment option **2** and Sector By Sector Clone (if the source drive is healthy). **3** Click the Start Clone **4** button to begin cloning.

## Fix common printer problems and save money on running costs

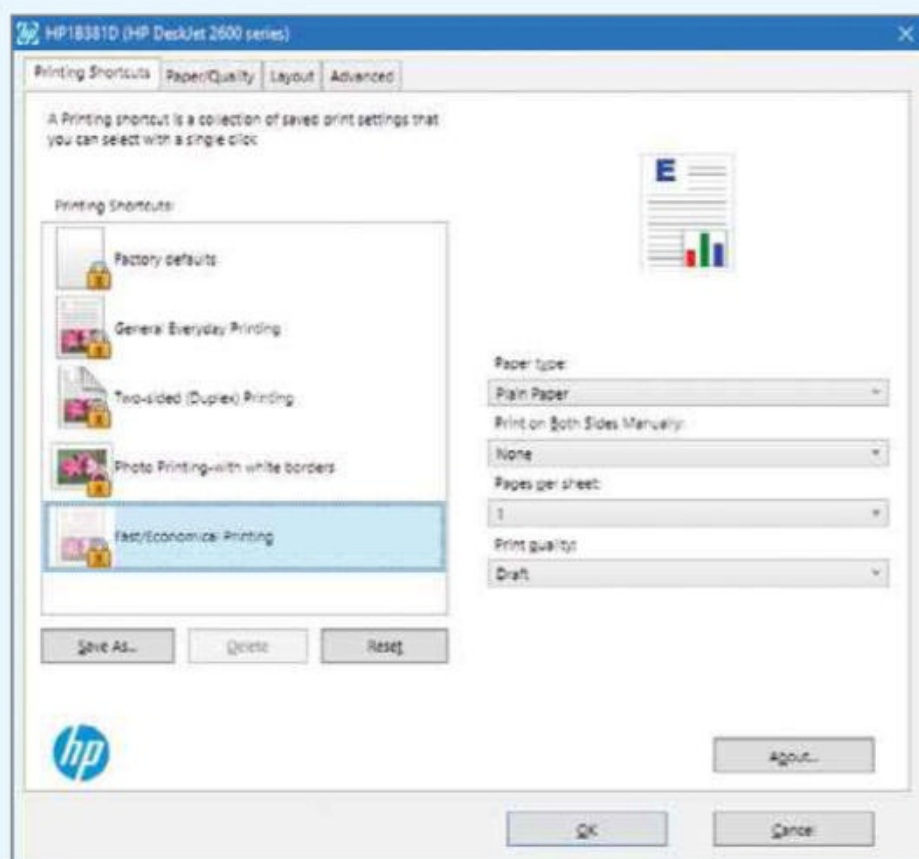
### Stop wasting printer ink

**P**rinter cartridges contain one of the most costly liquids you will ever buy – more expensive per millilitre than Chanel No 5 perfume or vintage Dom Perignon champagne. To save money, it's worth considering whether the document you're about to print really needs to be output at the highest possible quality.

Go to print your document in the usual way, then click Preferences in the print window. Many printers provide a quality setting with options for Draft, Normal and Best. Select Draft to use the least ink.

It depends on the printer software, but there may be other options for customising the quality, such as General Everyday Printing, Photo Printing and Fast/Economical Printing. Choose the latter option and avoid the others to save money. If you can, set it as the default.

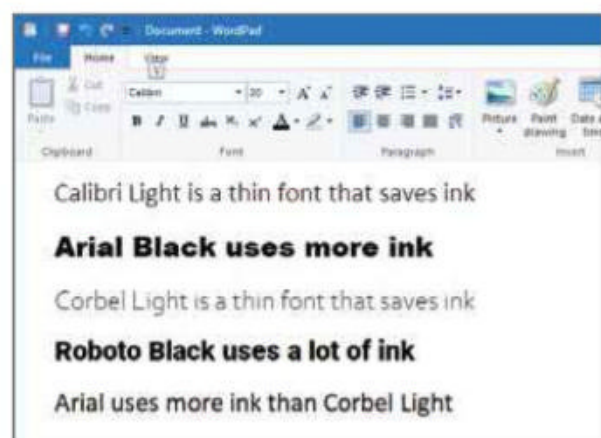
*Check the printer settings before printing and choose Draft or Economical printing*



### Use economic fonts

Ecofont ([www.ecofont.com](http://www.ecofont.com)) is a tool that replaces common computer fonts – such as Arial, Times New Roman, Calibri, Tahoma and Verdana – with lookalikes that use an average of 46% less ink. They do this by inserting 'micro holes' in the fonts – spots where no ink is used that are invisible to the human eye. Ecofont's subscription service costs £6.25 a year and is worth signing up to if you print a lot of text.

Simply selecting a thin font instead of a thick one can save money on ink, too. Next time you write a letter or document, choose Calibri Light, Corbel

Light or whatever thin fonts you have on your computer. Avoid thick ones such as Arial Black, Roboto Black and others.

### Stop wasting paper

Using less paper reduces running costs, so print on both sides of a sheet if you can by selecting two-sided printing in the Print window. Some printers provide the option to 'Print on both sides manually' – once the odd pages are printed, you flip them over and insert them in the paper tray upside down to print the even pages on the other side.

Try setting narrow margins in the Print window or in your word processor to fit more text on a single page and, if possible, use recycled paper. When you select Print in a program, click Preferences in the Print window and, in the next window, look for paper options, such as plain paper, photo paper and recycled paper. Less ink is used with plain and recycled paper settings because the sheets are more absorbent.

### Cancel from the print queue

Printing multiple items puts them in a queue that sends them to the printer one at a time. If you suddenly realise

you need to cancel one – perhaps because you've clicked the wrong document – simply open the Settings app in Windows 10 and click Devices. Select 'Printers & Scanners', click the printer name on the right and click the 'Open queue' button. Select an item in the queue, go to the Document menu and select Cancel or Pause.

This is especially useful for photos because they can take several minutes to print, so you have plenty of time to cancel your selection.

### Solve printing problems

If you run into a problem with printing, it can be difficult to discover whether the fault lies with your printer, with Windows or with the software you're printing from. Use the printer

troubleshooter to detect and fix any problems. Open the Settings app and click Devices, then click 'Printers & scanners' and 'Run the troubleshooter'. Follow the instructions to check Windows printing services.

## Install printer apps

Open the Microsoft Store app in Windows 10 and search for a printer manufacturer, such as HP, Canon, Epson and so on, or just search for 'printer'. Dedicated printer apps help manage various processes, such as configuring print options, printing photos and

scanning with all-in-one printers.

Phones and tablets often have manufacturer-specific printer apps. Search for 'print service plugin' in the Google Play Store, then select a manufacturer, such as HP Print Service Plugin, Canon Print Service and so on. On the iPhone or iPad, search the App Store for 'printer' to

see apps from Canon, HP, Epson, Brother and more. These tools simplify wireless printing over the network.

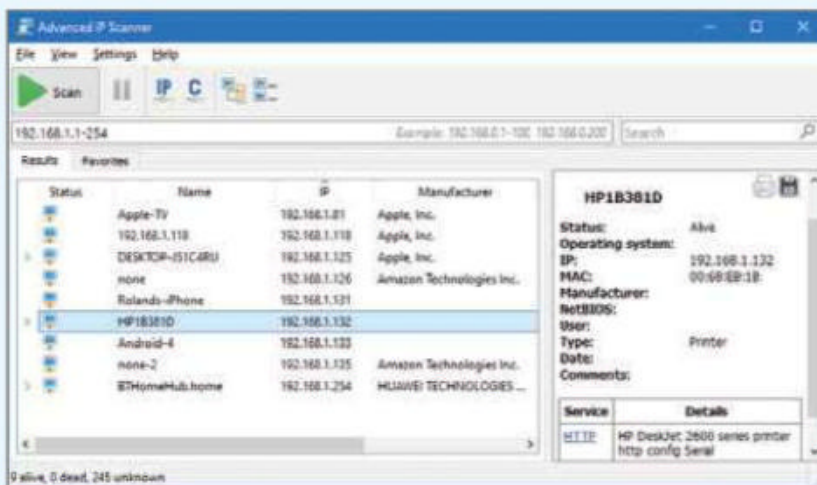
## Clean the print heads

Ink nozzles in inkjet printers can get clogged, but you can prevent this by printing something every week or two. It can be small, but it must be colourful.

If the print quality is poor, try cleaning the print heads. The process for this depends on the printer's make and model. If the printer has an app, as many do, run it and look for maintenance options. Some printers provide access to these options via the print window. Select Print in any application, click Preferences and a new window appears with printer settings and, possibly, print-head cleaning. Be aware, though, that this process uses a lot of ink, so only use it if it becomes necessary.

tablet, the browser interface is useful for customising settings that aren't available on mobile devices, and for accessing cleaning tools.

## Find a Wi-Fi printer's IP address

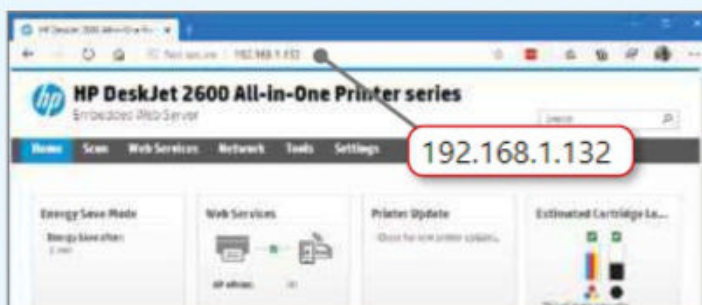
The advanced tips in this section require your printer's IP address. To find it, open Windows 10 Settings and click Devices, then 'Printers & Scanners'. Select the printer and click the Manage button, then 'Printer properties'. A window opens showing the IP address, for example `http://192.168.1.132:3911`. The first four sets of numbers are its IP address.

Advanced IP Scanner ([www.advanced-ip-scanner.com](http://www.advanced-ip-scanner.com)) shows IP addresses of devices on a network. You can run it without installing it, but give it a minute to scan your network.

Alternatively, if you know your router's IP address, enter it in your browser's address bar. Most routers have a status page or similar in the settings, where you can see a list of the IP addresses of connected devices, such as your printer.

## Browse your printer

Type your printer's IP address in a web browser and you may be surprised to see a web page appear. The availability, features and functions of a printer's built-in website vary with the make and model. HP inkjet printers, for example, provide an excellent browser interface where you can view the ink levels of cartridges, access tools and settings, check for printer firmware updates and more. When printing from a mobile phone or

## Check the printer response

If you're having problems printing, and you're not sure whether your printer is functioning normally or may have crashed, 'ping' the printer and check the response. Press Windows+R and enter `cmd` to open a command prompt window, then type `ping` followed by your printer's IP address. For example:

```
ping 192.168.1.132
```

This sends four packets of data to the printer, which should respond by returning them. Check that the response is "Packets: sent = 4, Received = 4, Lost = 0". If any are lost, it indicates a printer or network problem. Try switching everything off, including the PC, printer and router, then switch everything back on again.

## Update printer firmware

Your printer's built-in software enables it to print but, like all software, it may contain bugs or compatibility problems that need an update to fix. On rare occasions, these updates may even unlock new features.

A wireless printer on your home network may update itself automatically. For a USB printer or a wireless model that doesn't automatically update, go to the manufacturer's website and search for the model, then download and run the update on your computer.

If your wireless printer offers a built-in web page (see 'Browse your printer' tip, left), check this for update options. The websites for some HP printers, for example, have a Printer Update section with a button to manually check for updates, and a tick box to enable automatic updates.

### Fix Windows update errors

**Q** My aged Sony laptop, now upgraded from Windows 7 to Windows 10 Home 2004, is displaying error code 0x80070013. I researched the problem on the internet but don't feel confident solving the problem without some help. For your info, my latest successful updates were KB84565627 and KB84565503. I also have three failed updates: 0x8024001E (twice) and 0x80070013.

I read your Ask the Expert articles in issues 483 and 486, but I don't know whether these fixes would solve my current problem.

**Eric Worley, via email**

**A** Error code 0x80070013 means that your PC is trying to install a driver that's already working or is less compatible than the one it's trying to replace. Future updates may fail if this error is not fixed.

Type **disk cleanup** in the search box and select the option to run the tool as an administrator. Select your hard drive, click OK and tick every

box, then click OK again to clean up Windows Update and more.

Open Settings, choose 'Update & Security' and click Troubleshoot. Find 'Additional troubleshooters', then run Windows Update. Afterwards, type **command** in the Windows search box and run Command Prompt as an administrator. In the window that opens, type the following text, pressing Enter after each line, then restart Windows:

```
sfc /scannow
DISM.exe /Online /Cleanup-
image /Restorehealth
net stop wuauserv
net stop bits
rename c:\windows\
SoftwareDistribution
SoftwareDistribution.bak
net start wuauserv
net start bits
```

Another fix that worked for some people is to type the following at the admin command prompt (again, pressing Enter after each line):

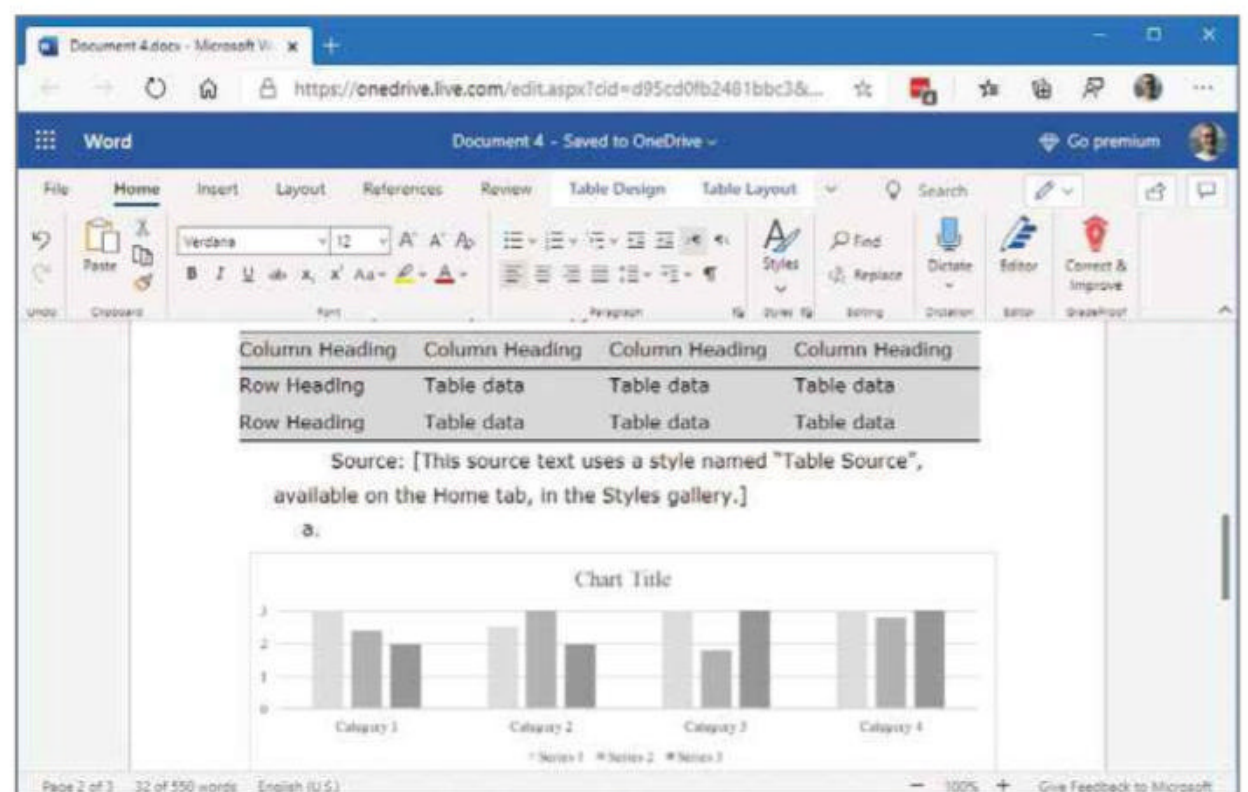
Restart Windows afterwards and the services restart. Windows Update should now work.

### Recover corrupted Word documents

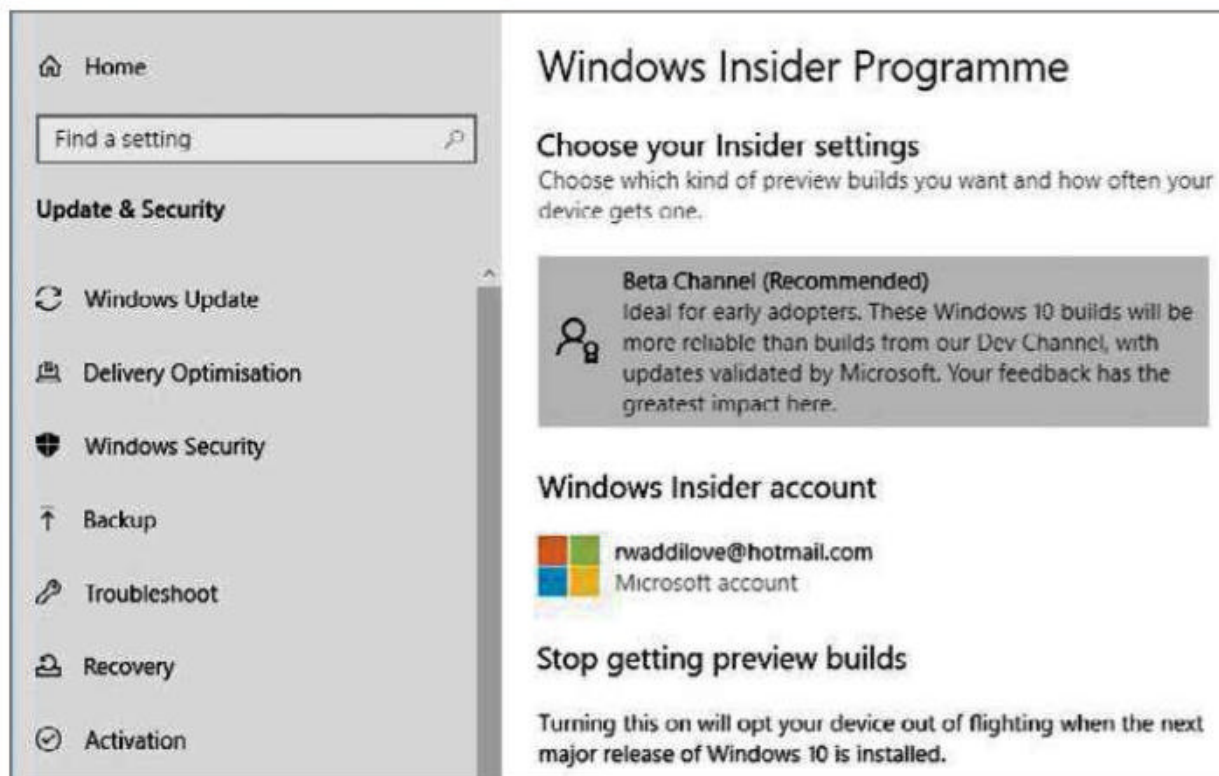
**Q** I created some research documents a few years ago using Word on an old Windows 7 PC. I use LibreOffice ([www.libreoffice.org](http://www.libreoffice.org)) instead of Word on my new PC, but the documents worked fine in the ODT (Open Document Text) format. However, I recently agreed to a prompt "Would you like to save in Word 97 format?", thinking it would be easier for sharing the documents with family members. Some of the files were corrupted leaving paragraphs of gobbledygook and some empty pages. I tried using Recuva ([www.ccleaner.com/recuva](http://www.ccleaner.com/recuva)) to retrieve the original files, but the outcome was the same garbage. Any suggestions would be gratefully received.

**A** The Word 97 file format is 23 years old and has been superseded by newer formats, so you should avoid using it. It doesn't support all the features of today's Word and LibreOffice software and, when you save documents, any content that isn't supported is removed or appears wrong. That might explain some of the problems you are seeing.

The file format is not supported by some applications. DOCX is the current Word format that most software will recognise. If you have the original ODT documents, load them and save them in DOCX format, if you want other people to be able to access them.

If you don't have the original files and only have the Word 97 files, go to [onedrive.com](https://onedrive.com) and upload the files or put them in the OneDrive folder on your PC to sync them. Now open your OneDrive in a browser, click the files and the Word web app will try to load them.

Microsoft can open and convert Word 97 files and this may be your best bet to recover the corrupted files. However, it may be worth trying some online file converters, such as Online-convert.com ([www.online-convert.com](https://www.online-convert.com)), ConvertFiles ([www.convertfiles.com](https://www.convertfiles.com)) and Convertio ([convertio.co](https://convertio.co)).

### Bypass version 2004 problems

**Q** The following notice has appeared in the Update section of my Settings app, and has been sitting there since the end of May: "The Windows 10 May 2020 Update is on its way. Once it's ready for your device, you'll see the update available on this page version 2004".

I ran various tests on my computer, but no errors were detected. When I tried to

download the update manually from the Microsoft's 'Learn more' site, it appeared to install normally, but stopped at 55% after about three hours of waiting. I have repeated this process four times.

My PC works normally, with Update KB4569751 downloaded successfully on 12 August. If version 2004 is not suitable

for this PC, does that mean that any future updates will also be blocked?

**A** The problem is not caused by errors on your computer, which can be running perfectly. It just isn't compatible with the current version of Windows. New versions of Windows are pushed out first to computers that are known to work with it, and delayed for PCs that are known to have problems. Although it's frustrating not to have the latest version, it's generally less annoying than having a broken PC.

As update problems surface, Microsoft fixes them, improving the compatibility of the current version of Windows so more computers can download the update. It can take a couple of months for Microsoft to produce a version that is compatible with some computers, so be patient. However, if you never receive the 2004 update, it's unlikely that you'll get any big updates in the future.

We had a computer that always seemed to be the last to update to new versions. The solution that worked for us was to open Settings, choose

### Install Flight Simulator on a second hard drive

**Q** I'm not a gamer but I was a fan of Microsoft Flight Simulator years ago and would like to try the latest version. My problem is that I only have 90GB of free space on my C: drive and the Microsoft Store says that simulator requires 127GB to install. I have a secondary hard drive (D:) that has more than enough space. How do I save and install Flight Simulator on the D: drive?

**A** There are a couple of options, one of which is to create more space on the C: drive. The folders for Music, Pictures and Videos are often many gigabytes each, so moving them to another drive may create sufficient space for Flight Simulator. Right-click each folder in the Explorer sidebar and select Properties, then select the Location tab and click Move.

Another way to increase space is to select This PC in the Explorer sidebar,

right-click the C: drive and select Properties. Tick the box, 'Compress this drive to save disk space'. The results vary, but you may be able to reclaim a few gigabytes.

Another option is to change the drive used by Microsoft Store apps. Open the Settings app and click System, followed by Storage. Scroll down and click 'Change where new content is saved'. Under 'New apps will save to', select the drive you want to use – in your case, the D: drive. New apps will now download and install to this drive instead, while existing apps will remain where they are.

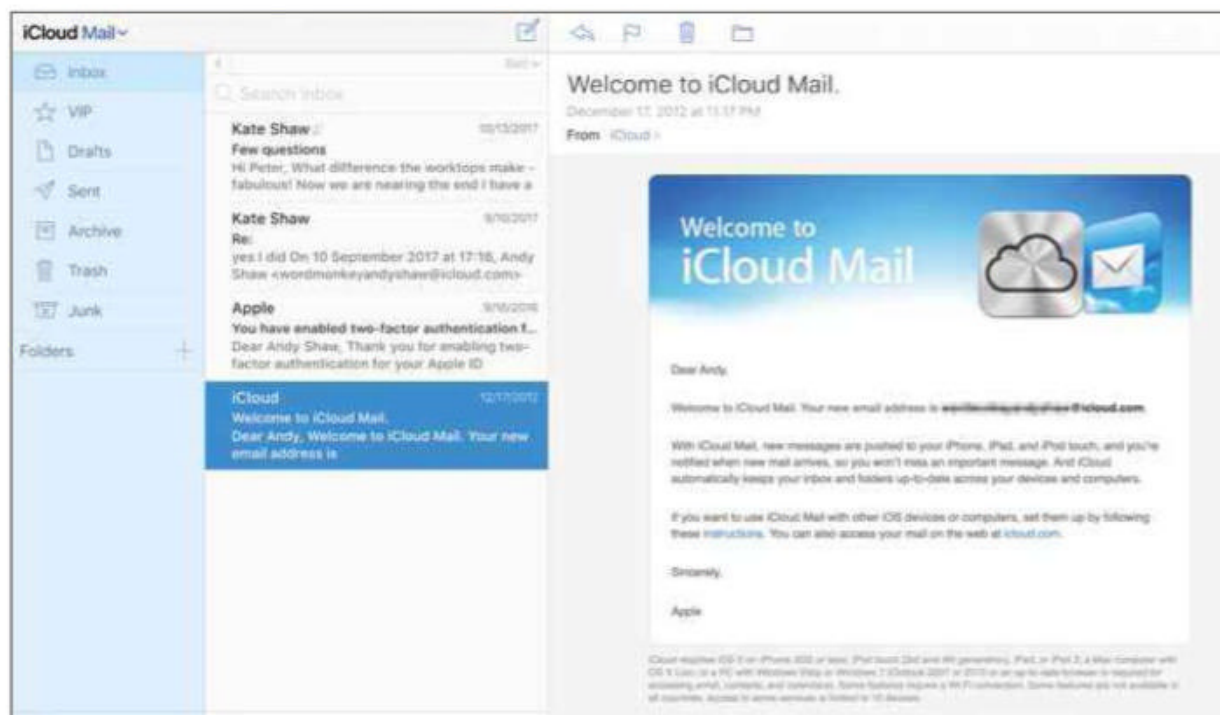
'Update & security', then select Windows Insider Programme and sign up for the beta channel.

Updates are installed from here before they are released to the public, and there are fewer compatibility checks. This means there is a chance the beta could cause problems, but we have found it to be stable. That said, there is a risk, so make sure you have backups if you choose this route.

**Q** Earlier this year, I decided to switch to a different energy supplier. I rang M&S Energy by Octopus Energy and gave my details to the agent, who said I

## No thumbnails on OneDrive photos

**Q** I have a problem with some thumbnails of photos not showing in Explorer. All the photos in my PC's Pictures folder display thumbnails but, in the other Pictures folder in OneDrive, some have thumbnail images, while others don't.

If I copy a photo that's missing a thumbnail from OneDrive's Pictures folder to the PC's Pictures folder, the thumbnail appears. I can then move it back to the OneDrive Pictures folder and the thumbnail is still there. Also, if I open a photo in any program to view it, the thumbnail appears. Is this a bug?

**A** It's not a bug, just a side effect of a OneDrive feature. OneDrive is an online storage service that provides space for your files in the cloud. The OneDrive folder on your computer mirrors your online files and shows everything stored in it.

A file in the OneDrive folder might look like it's on your PC's hard drive, but it may just be a link to the online file. When you click to view the file or open it in a program, OneDrive downloads it to your hard drive, at which point Windows can 'see' the contents of the file and create a thumbnail for it.

When you then move this file back to your PC's OneDrive folder (or you move any image file from your PC's

hard drive to your OneDrive folder), the file remains on your hard drive along with its thumbnail, because Windows already knows its contents. This is why some files have thumbnails and some don't.

Click the OneDrive icon in the notification area of the taskbar, choose 'Help & Settings', then Settings. Select the Settings tab and, in the Files On-Demand section, 'Save space and download files as you use them' will be ticked. This saves hard-drive space by keeping files you haven't viewed online, rather than on your PC's hard drive. This means that thumbnails of photos may not always appear.

Clear the tick next to 'Save space and download files as you use them' to download all online files to your PC. This lets Windows generate thumbnails, but uses extra hard-drive space. An alternative is to only select the files that don't have thumbnails in Explorer, right-click them and choose 'Always keep on this device'.

had a 14-day cooling off period and the terms and conditions would be emailed.

Three days later I had not received the email, so I contacted M&S Energy again. The agent I spoke to informed me that the email had bounced back from Virgin Media. After a few trials, it appears that the company's automatic system emails bounce back, but emails from agents come through. Their suggestion was to contact Virgin Media and ask why the automated emails bounced back.

After carrying out a few checks, Virgin Media said there doesn't appear to be any problem and that emails from M&S Energy and Octopus would, at worst, be sent to my Junk mailbox. I rang M&S Energy and, because their system relies on auto emails, I cancelled the order.

Annoyed that I couldn't take advantage of the M&S offer, I went direct to Octopus Energy and asked for a quote to be sent to my email. Two days later, there's still no email.

I am using the Mail app on an Apple MacBook. Is there something I can do to sort out this problem?

**A** You could try turning off spam filtering but it sounds like a problem with Virgin Media. Sign in at [mail.virginmedia.com](mailto:mail.virginmedia.com) and click Settings. Expand Mail, click Spam and select the option to turn off spam filtering. The changes are saved when you leave the Settings page.

You could also try using another email account. Since you have a MacBook, you must have an Apple ID and an iCloud email account, such as [someone@icloud.com](mailto:someone@icloud.com). Use that instead. Alternatively, you could get a free Gmail or Outlook account if you prefer.

### Keep bookmarks on your homepage

I've been on the lookout for an alternative for some time, but apps such as OneNote and Google Keep don't seem to be the best solution for me.

**A** It's always a shame to see long-standing websites disappear but it's particularly galling when they vanish without warning, taking your information with them. Finding an alternative is a tad tricky, though, because many such websites have gone the same way as [only2clicks.com](http://only2clicks.com) or else no longer work exactly as required ([start.io](http://start.io), for instance).

Modern browsers are partly to blame. Opera ([www.opera.com](http://www.opera.com)) and Vivaldi ([vivaldi.com](http://vivaldi.com)) have long offered a speed-dial start page for a limited number of bookmarks – the latter offers a service closest to what you require. Chrome, Edge and Firefox also let you add your own bookmark shortcuts to the New Tab page.

If you're not looking to switch browsers, though, try the Utab browser tool ([utab.io](http://utab.io)) for Chrome, Firefox and Edge. This lets you create and manage an unlimited number of bookmarks on your New Tab page.

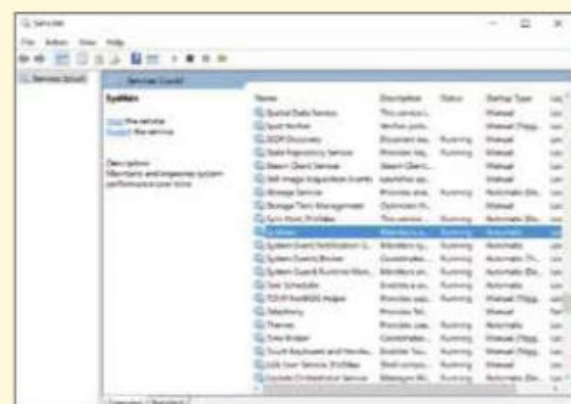

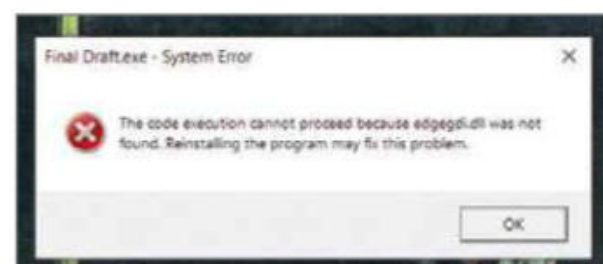

**A** Like you, we couldn't find any way to redownload the individual DLL file, so you have four options. Some DLL files can be fixed by restarting your computer. Others can be restored by opening Windows' Update & Security, Recovery,

'Advanced start-up', Restart Now and booting up in Safe Mode. More likely, you need to roll-back the system to a point prior to the update that caused the issue. Finally, try a full reinstallation of the problem programs. It's worth noting that while the error message is annoying, it usually doesn't affect the actual running of your programs.

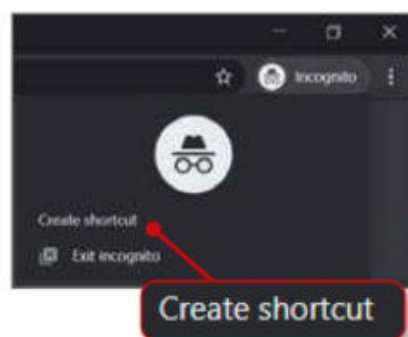

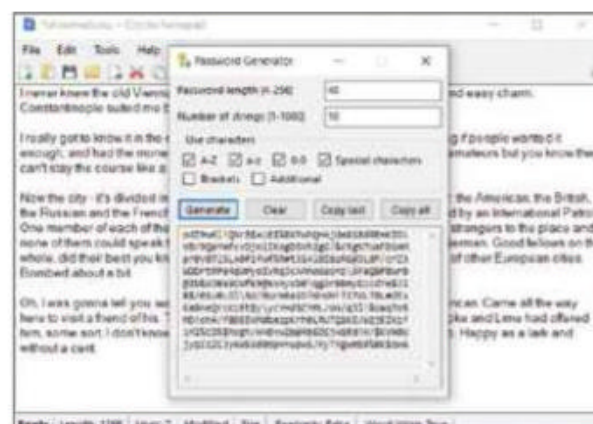

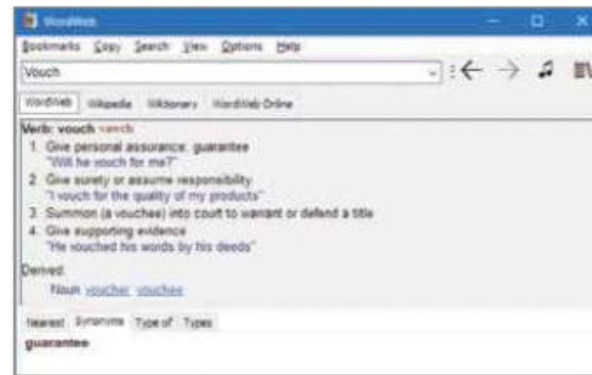
### Add a dictionary

I don't use a word processor very often and my needs are quite simple, so I just use WordPad. The one feature it doesn't have is a spellchecker, but I've found one that can be added. WordWeb ([wordweb.info/free](http://wordweb.info/free)) is a free program that claims to add a dictionary and thesaurus to almost any Windows program. I can't vouch for that, but it works in WordPad and Notepad, which are my main writing tools.

After installing it, Ctrl+right-click any word in WordPad or Notepad to check the spelling. It suggests the correct word if it's wrong and can replace it. If the word is correct, it shows the dictionary definition, and can also show synonyms and antonyms. It's not perfect but it's

certainly a help. The biggest problem is that it doesn't highlight misspelt words, so you have to look out for any you suspect might be wrong. It's great for looking up definitions, though.

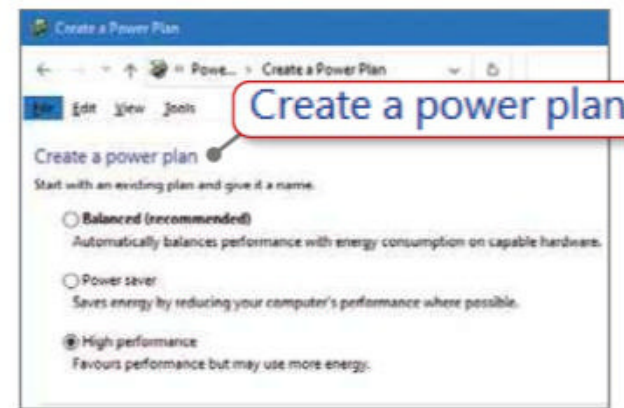

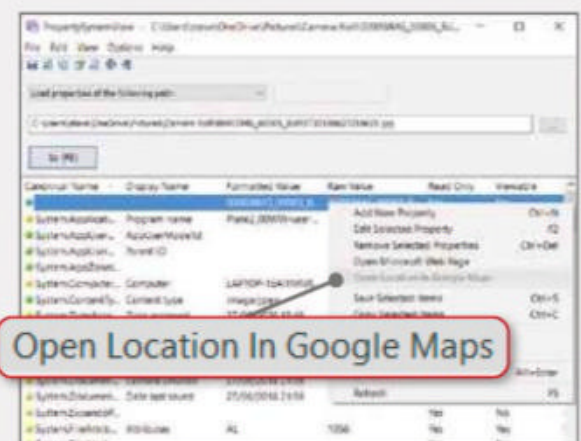

### See where you took your photos

I often scroll through the many photos on my computer and can't for the life of me place where they were taken. I'll remember that it was, say, George's 50th birthday party, but it's like a Countdown conundrum trying to remember which pub we were in.

As it happens, all I needed to do was download NirSoft's Property System View tool (search for it at [nirsoft.net](http://nirsoft.net)), whose latest update includes the option to 'Open Location in Google Maps'.

You could also try Exif Data View from NirSoft, which only works with photos, not all documents. Load a photo into either tool by pressing the three-dot button, selecting a file and clicking Go. Now right-click the file to open Google

Maps, which shows you exactly where the photo was taken. Just be aware that it only works with JPEG images that include geolocation data.

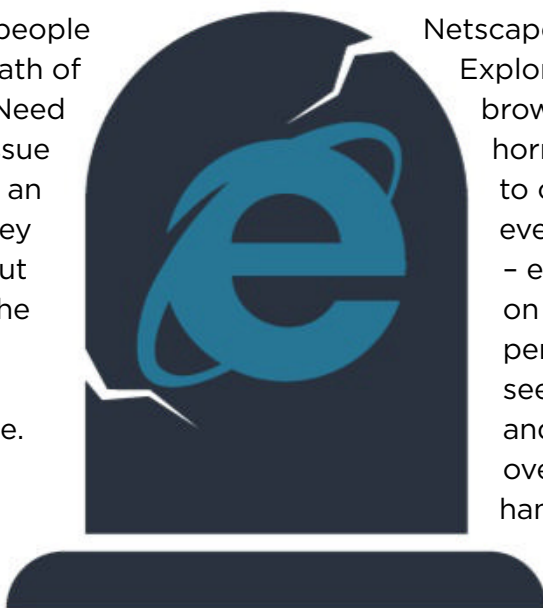

It wasn't algorithms that flunked this year's A-level results, says **Barry Collins**

## Don't blame algorithms for human error

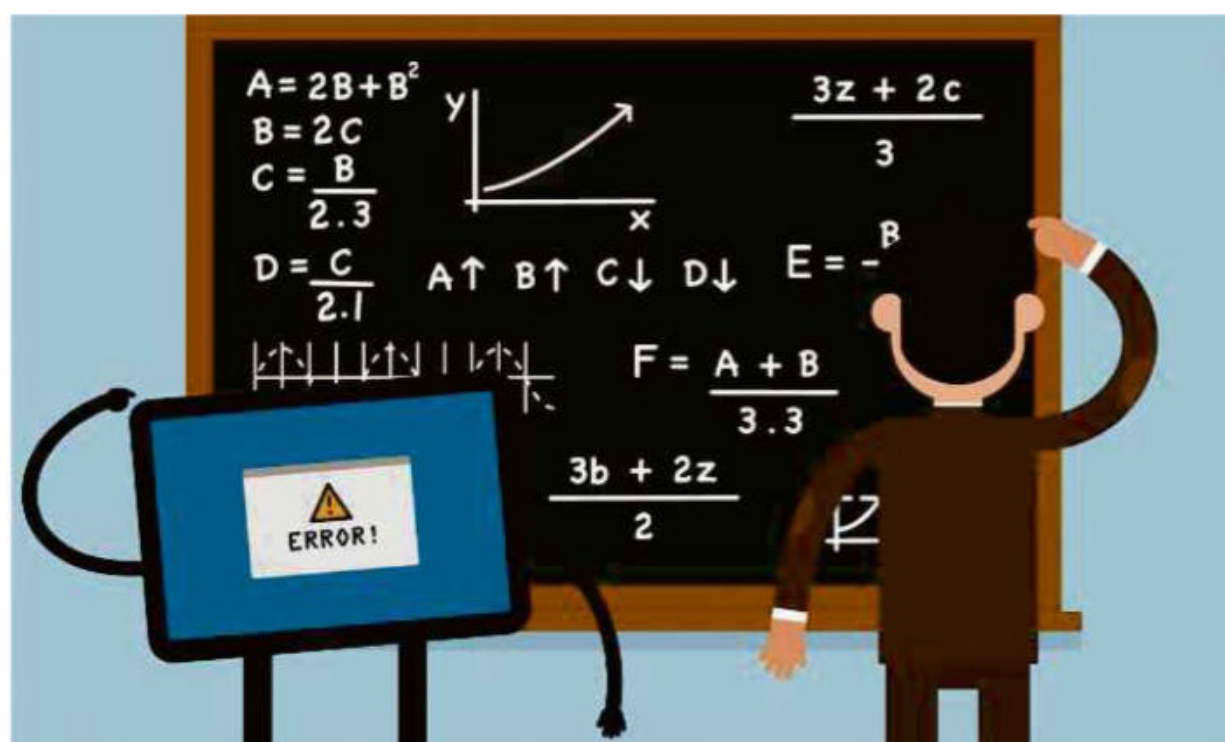
**S**pare a thought for the poor algorithms. There they were, going about their business, carrying out the orders of their human paymasters in the precise manner they always do, when suddenly they're being blamed for robbing millions of teenagers of their bright futures. "An algorithm decided my future," read one student protester's placard. "I'm \*\*\*\*\* off."

Now, with an exam-sitting teenager under my roof, I can well understand the protester's frustration. I can imagine how upsetting it must be to see your grades slashed by a piece of software. But the many, rightfully angry students and parents are picking on the wrong target: algorithms aren't to blame, humans are.

Firstly, algorithms are wonderful things. They look after us in ways that we're simply incapable of doing ourselves. It's highly trained algorithms that warn us when a life-endangering storm is brewing; it's an algorithm that stops your car smashing into the vehicle in front when it detects you're driving too close; it's an algorithm that decides that you might be at a greater risk of catching prostate cancer and prompts you to visit the doctor for a check-up. We could live without them, but not as safely.

However, an algorithm is only as good as its programmers and the data it's working with. Yes, the more advanced forms of AI are now capable of working things out for themselves – such as the Libratus computer in the USA, which was taught the rules of

Texas Hold 'em poker, then left to work out how to actually win the game by playing trillions of hands against itself until it worked out the best strategies. It wasn't influenced by how we humans normally play the game – it developed its own style and then beat several of the world's top players.

Normally, however, algorithms are guided by humans, bringing to bear our biases or desired outcomes. The A-level results of many promising state-school students weren't downgraded because an algorithm took a dislike to the kids from the local comprehensive. It was programmed to do so to prevent overall grade inflation. That was a human decision, not a computer one.

Even when left to simply chew over the data and reach their own conclusions, algorithms can pick up inherent biases that we've created.

There was the infamous case of Amazon using algorithms to pre-select candidates for interview, which was trained to vet applicants by analysing patterns in the company's recruitment over the past 10 years. The algorithm penalised candidates who had items such as "women's chess club captain" on their CV because it decided – looking at past successful candidates – that the company was primarily looking for men. It was rightly binned.

Yet, we shouldn't lob the baby out with the bathwater. A mad scramble is going on in the press now, looking for other cases of public-sector algorithms penalising minorities or reinforcing the status quo. That's not a bad thing, and there should definitely be more transparency about how algorithms are implemented and the resulting outcomes.

But we shouldn't demonise algorithms, either. Algorithms are like dogs: train them properly and they'll reward you. Train them badly, however, and they'll come back to bite you.
