#### PREFACE

This paper is a first-cut attempt to structure a consecutive pattern of decisions and actions in the South Vietnam situation. The purpose of issuing it is to see where we are and where we are going.

The following points are in order:

The chronology is incomplete, with many omissions and many loose ends hanging. I have only been through a small percent of the major documents. I have spotted hardly any Presidential actions, for example, and none of the Task Force deliberations.

The chief U.S. actors are shown as President, State, Defense, CINCPAC, and Country Team. It will ultimately be preferable to break up at least Defense and Country Team into several actors for each, to add other actors like Government of South Vietnam and the Communist Bloc countries, and to provide these actors with "scenery" in the sense of situational context.

The actions shown are a rather miscellaneous set, because

I do not yet have sufficiently matured clues as to what is going
to be important in the story.

Cross-referencing of the actions (numbers in parentheses) is an initial attempt to tie together some of the obvious subplots of the story.

### PREFACE

This paper is a first-cut attempt to structure a consecutive pattern of decisions and actions in the South Vietnam situation. The purpose of issuing it is to see where we are and where we are going.

The following points are in order:

The chronology is incomplete, with many omissions and many loose ends hanging. I have only been through a small percent of the major documents. I have spotted hardly any Presidential actions, for example, and none of the Task Force deliberations.

The chief U.S. actors are shown as President, State, Defense, CINCPAC, and Country Team. It will ultimately be preferable to break up at least Defense and Country Team into several actors for each, to add other actors like Government of South Vietnam and the Communist Bloc countries, and to provide these actors with "scenery" in the sense of situational context.


The actions shown are a rather miscellaneous set, because
