



# TV CAMERAS CAN PURSUE THE NEWS ONLY SO FAR

. . . and many journalists feel  
that current restrictions on them  
are an ominous sign

It was during the Senate Watergate hearings. A Watergate committee lawyer named Jill Wine Volner came home and found her house had been burglarized. Then she got a call from a network news correspondent, a woman.

"Sorry," said the lawyer, "I don't want to be interviewed, and I certainly don't want you and your film crew in my living room."

"All right," said the reporter, "then I'll bring over my camera crew and do my standup in the public street *in front* of your house. And I'll make damn sure my cameraman shows the house number!"

Call it blackmail, or call it a bluff (Volner's husband at the time, a communications lawyer, persuaded the correspondent to drop the idea), but this is the kind of aggressive reporting that is catapulting the First Amendment smack into a wall of privacy law. Befuddled news directors across the country are wondering just where, in pursuit of a story, their TV cameras are entitled to wander. Grateful lawyers, as WCKT (Miami) news director Dave Choate puts it, "are discovering a whole new sandbox to play in": journalism malpractice.

What are the rights of the camera-wielder—and the camera-way?

TV cameras are banned from the offices of U.S. Government agencies, Federal courts and the U.S. Senate. (The House of Representatives allows camera coverage, but only by its own fixed cameras and handpicked crews.) Local courts in 21 states now admit TV cameras (11 states do so on an experimental basis); in the rest, TV news must depend on its reporters' scribbles and sketches by courtroom artists.

At the levels of state and city government, an idiosyncratic grab bag of special privileges governs TV's access, ranging from anarchy to autocracy, depending on the state or city and the particular governing entity. Cameras are usually prohibited in publicly owned

nursing homes, utilities, prisons and hospitals. The city council of Detroit permits TV cameras. The New York City city council generally doesn't.

The Newark, N.J., city council barred cameras until early 1979, when camera crews from three New York City stations (covering a public council meeting on a controversial police-layoff ordinance) were tossed out as unceremoniously as drunks from a saloon. (Chastened by the furor that erupted, the council now allows television cameras to shoot from the Himalayas of the balcony.)

TV newsmen argue that cameras should be allowed wherever print journalists go. "When they say we can't use our cameras, they're making second-class citizens out of the electronic reporters," says Roseanne Colletti, who covers New Jersey for WCBS-TV, New York City.

Local politicians argue that TV cameras often are "disruptive and inhibiting." "The print guy comes in with his pencil—you can't tell him from an ordinary spectator," says one city-council president. "TV reporters come with their lights, their cables, their cameras—even in the age of the minicam, they're still a major distraction."

"The bottom line is," says Dale Spencer, a professor of journalism at the University of Missouri and an expert in privacy law, "what legal right do the politicians have to keep cameras out of a public meeting? None. The TV reporter is on public property. He has rights under the First Amendment."

The rules are different when the property involved is indisputably private.

The place is a posh resort in Utah. The sun is bright and searing. The resort's swimming pool is crowded with guests in every permutation of splash and sprawl. Meanwhile, as inconspicuously as possible, reporter Steve Wilson, of KGO-TV, San Francisco, is surveying the scene from his →

motel window. It isn't easy to be inconspicuous at a resort, not with a minicam crew in tow.

Wilson (the bulging "barger" who set a record at WCBS-TV in New York for number of doors slammed in his face) is investigating California legislators who use state-subsidized vehicles for their private pleasures. In the resort parking lot sits a \$12,500 customized van leased by the State of California. Lounging at poolside is the legislator who parked it there. If Wilson films the legislator frolicking, and if, after the film is telecast, the legislator is able to prove he was on a private vacation, not state business, Steve Wilson may be the one taking a vacation—a permanent one, caused by an invasion-of-privacy suit filed against his station. Wilson decides to film anyway.

"The gamble paid off," he says later. Subsequently the legislator claimed he was at the resort on state, rather than private, business. Therefore, no invasion of his privacy could have taken place.

The right to privacy is not a Constitutional right. "The first legal base for privacy in this country dates from a Harvard Law Review article in 1890, co-authored by Warren and Brandeis," says Prof. Spencer. Nevertheless, over the decades, a wall of privacy quarried out of accumulating legal precedents has arisen, transforming not only homes, but even department stores and parking lots—and Utah resorts—into havens safe from the press. Recently, two volatile areas of privacy law in particular have been sparking court cases against TV reporters. One area is the broadcasting of material "offensive to ordinary sensibilities"; the other is trespass.

"Offensive to ordinary sensibilities," says Dale Spencer, "means putting on TV something that may be true but puts the subject of the piece in an unflattering light."

Bill Applegate, the news director of KPIX, San Francisco, recalls: "When I was at KEZI-TV, in Eugene, Ore., we were doing a story on a nonprofit clinic to help people lose weight. To add some visuals, our reporter needed footage of fat people." The reporter traveled to a nearby shopping center. The reporter told his camera crew to film—behinds. "In one of the scenes," says Applegate, "two women, both fat, were walking away from the camera at a distance. Suddenly, one of them turned around. After we broadcast the film, the woman whose face appeared on camera sued for invasion of privacy. The station settled out of court."

But it is trespass—an unauthorized presence on private property—that has become the deadliest trap. On July 6, 1972, for instance, WCBS-TV reporter Lucille Rich and a camera crew visited (among a number of restaurants cited for health-code violations by the Health Services Administration of New York City) a restaurant called Le Mistral. Rich entered Le Mistral at about two in the afternoon, uninvited, unannounced, with camera rolling. According to sources at WCBS-TV, the glaring lights and the camera caused chaos. Diners lunching with women who weren't their wives ducked under tables. A Le Mistral employee was overheard yelling: "My God, Mr. Paley [CBS board chairman William Paley] eats here!" Ordered by Le Mistral's president to leave, Rich and her camera crew "took their sweet time," says one CBS source.

After the film was broadcast, Le Mistral sued WCBS-TV (and its parent company, CBS) for intrusion (trespass) and won. CBS was assessed \$12,000 in compensatory damages and \$250,000 in punitive damages. (A higher court has ordered the lower court to review that punitive-damage award.)

"WCBS-TV is basically arguing its First Amendment rights, its freedom to gather the news and the right of ac- →

cess to get the news that that freedom implies," says Prof. Spencer. "The opponents of WCBS-TV are saying: 'My home is my castle, and I can keep people out if I want to.' The courts are ruling that your business enjoys the privacy protections of your home."

The verdict on *Le Mistral v. CBS* doesn't mean a TV reporter cannot enter a restaurant to investigate it. Only that a code of etiquette as prim and proper as any ever devised by Emily Post must be observed. Instead of entering alone (as Rich and her crew did), in 1973, reporter Charles Duncan, then of KAKE-TV in Wichita, Kan., who also was following a trail of health-code violations, visited Doc's Steak House in Wichita in the company of a state health inspector. He had obtained written permission from one of the restaurant's owners beforehand. The next day the owners attempted to revoke their permission. Twenty-nine days after the news team's visit, the segment on Doc's Steak House was broadcast. The restaurant sued KAKE-TV for trespass—and lost.

If a TV reporter cannot cross your property line without your consent and must get out when you tell him to leave, what about the film he shoots up until you tell him to leave—those embarrassing pictures of you throwing your hands up in front of your face, or shutting the door in his? Can the TV station broadcast them? Every news director we queried said yes.

"The TV reporter hasn't trespassed till you tell him to get out," says a lawyer familiar with free press vs. privacy law. "He can use any film he's shot till you informed him he was trespassing—and anything he gets while he's promptly backing out."

When a station is convicted of trespass, however, film telecast that's deemed damaging to the property-owner's reputation may result in the lofty damages awarded to *Le Mistral*.

Some newsmen, like news director

Marty Haag of WFAA-TV in Dallas-Fort Worth, think that the press "is gradually losing some of the rights it felt it had, as the interpretation of privacy gets expanded."

Phil Nye, vice president of news for ABC's owned-and-operated stations, disagrees: "In one way, I think the Lucille Rich thing in New York had a positive influence," he says. "You don't have to knock the door down to get the news. You get more flies with honey than with vinegar."

Whether reluctant or willing, TV news directors across the country are gradually reaching a consensus on where the cameras can and cannot go without prior (and revocable) permission. TV crews, though barred from most Federal premises, may enter any public meeting of state or local government and shoot any genuine news event they can capture with cameras stationed in a public street.

Parking lots, airport terminals, restaurants, department stores, office reception rooms . . . all are open for business, but not (in the opinion of most news directors) for the business of making TV tapes. As for those truly private places—your office and, most emphatically, your home—any camera crew reckless enough to scale the white-picket barricade that surrounds your castle will soon be showered with arrows; legal arrows, raining down from your turrets, courtesy of marksmen dressed in black robes.

Recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions that seem to narrow the protections of the First Amendment, combined with a growing hostility toward the press among the public at large, have made most TV news executives wary of asking the court to rule on their rights.

Camera-shy litigants are less reluctant. More and more, they're queuing up in courts, anxious to prove that along with freedom of the press, there must be some freedom *from* it. **END**



She was just 16 and she sat there astride a motorcycle, sun-dappled and blue-eyed, sweated and jeaned, looking like the perfect California golden girl, smack-dab on the cover of Newsweek. It was 1966, a time when news-magazines feverishly sought to get a handle on youth trends, so Newsweek surveyed "what American teen-agers are really like," and the teen-ager picked to go on the cover was Jan Smithers.

Inside, the story reported that Jan "orbits between the worlds of the Surf and the Strip. At Malibu Beach she and the other bikini-clad golden girls take their places in the sun . . ."

"Actually," Jan says now, "I hardly ever got to the beach, I'd never been on a motorcycle before, and my mother made me be home by 9:30 when I went out at night."

And her life was not all that golden, especially for a girl who was tuning-fork sensitive. Two years before the Newsweek experience, her treasured family life had been disrupted when her parents were divorced and Jan and her three sisters were scattered between their parents' homes. Shortly after the divorce, swerving her car to avoid a car that ran a stop sign, Jan had hit a telephone pole, smashing her face into the steering wheel. She vividly remembers a nurse in the hospital emergency room gazing at her and commenting, "Oh, too bad—she used to be such a pretty girl." Jan was left with a permanent, prominent scar across her chin.

"The scar was just one more thing to make me feel unattractive," she recalls. "I felt ugly, and I had very little self-esteem to begin with—somewhere along the line I had become very introverted. Suddenly, I was not only terribly shy but, by people's usual standards, physically ruined. I came to accept the idea that negative things were going to happen to me."

More did. One of her sisters was killed in a car wreck, then her mother

died. Feeling adrift and alone—she'd never been able to communicate with her lawyer father—Jan was on the verge of buckling. In the midst of the setbacks, however, she took two positive steps. "First, I accepted some TV commercials offered as a result of the Newsweek cover. I'd get so nervous, I'd turn bright red and break out in a rash, but I forced myself to do them. It was a challenge I knew I had to tackle or I'd never break out of my shell. Also,

## 'I Felt Ugly'

Jan Smithers barely survived some horrible traumas before getting her break on 'WKRP'

I was studying at the California Institute of the Arts in Los Angeles. Art was my way at that time of really trying to communicate with people."

At 19 she decided to try to communicate in a way that would reach a larger audience than she ever could in art, by becoming an honest-to-goodness actress. Along the way she lost some jobs because of her scar. (On TV it can be hidden with makeup; in movies it often shows in closeups; in

person she doesn't try to cover it.) But she hung in, studying acting, doing more commercials and getting some film credits ("Where the Lilies Bloom," "Our Winning Season"). Then, in 1978, she auditioned for the part of Bailey Quarters, an assistant at a radio station in CBS's new series *WKRP in Cincinnati*. Creator and executive producer Hugh Wilson was patterning the role loosely after his own wife, whom he describes as "very shy but very smart

this is more important to me than the usual stuff about Gary [Sandy] or Howard [Hesseman] or the others—Jan was almost terminated last season. It was very close.

"People say to me now, 'Hey, I like Bailey, how come she wasn't on in the first season?' Of course, she was, but she was virtually invisible for a long time. Jan didn't have any volume, for one thing; half the time the studio audience couldn't even hear her. It all

seemed like an ordeal for her. So Jan and I had it out and ultimately she told me, 'I'm going to make this work.' Then she sucked in her guts and did it. She's got a lot of guts, that woman."

Jan herself notes, "Initially, I didn't have the comedy and TV experience of the other regulars; I was intimidated and almost wanted to get canned. Finally, I learned the technical part of it, the timing and rhythm you need to do a situation comedy. I took matters in my own hands and decided that Bailey,



—the sort of person people tend to dismiss as a jerk till they find out she's got so much to offer. Well, other actresses read better for the part, but they were *playing* shy. Jan was shy."

On the set of *WKRP*, with rehearsals in progress, Hugh Wilson gets downright evangelical on the subject of Smithers, spurring a reporter off to the side to confide, native Georgian accent still twanging, "Listen, I don't normally bother to talk to the press, but

while very insecure and totally unlike Jennifer [Loni Anderson] because she's not together and not naturally outgoing, *did* have a lot of ambition and the capacity to grow. I think lots of people can relate to that and root for Bailey. That's the kind of mail I get—people say, 'I'm trying to gain more freedom, too'."

There's that, but there are also those men who find that Bailey—with her hunched shoulders, her hair up, her →

oversized glasses and her prim attire—is the really sexy woman on the show, notwithstanding the palpitating presence of blond bombshell Jennifer. "We're fortunate," observes Gordon Jump (Carlson), "to have two women of the vastly different appeals of Loni and Jan. Men look at Loni's character in an animal-type way; they look at Jan's in a more reverent, woman-on-a-pedestal way."

When the reporter relates a series of admiring male comments about her sex appeal, Jan grins and says, "Oh, God, that's wonderful!" On second thought, hesitantly, "I guess . . . you know, I'm always asked what it's like being the 'other girl' on the series, whether there isn't competition with Loni. Honestly, Loni and I have always helped each other. The only problem is that there are eight regulars in the ensemble, so if you do 24 shows a season and try to feature everyone equally, that's only three big shows a year for each character."

From her perspective, Loni Anderson asserts, a little impatiently: "Who says there can't be more than one very attractive woman on a show without it becoming *Charlie's Angels*?" Jan, she continues, "is a totally different person from when she started on the show, much more secure, while retaining a lovely elusive quality—something very delicate and fragile. It's funny: I've been told some crew members don't like me. They think I really am like Jennifer, which is intimidating to a lot of men—that kind of striking, overwhelming woman. But men who won't go near me will walk right up to Jan, like she's a waif and needs someone to take care of her."

In the hillside house she owns near the CBS stages in Studio City, Jan stops in midsentence while talking about her personal problems to say, "I hope I don't sound self-pitying; I hate self-pity." Pause. Long breath. "I was just sitting here, trying to feel

if there's any pain left about the scar." She puts a hand on her stomach. "I used to feel the pain strongly here. . . . No, it doesn't hurt in my stomach any more. I think I'm past that."

"During the last couple of years I've had several operations to cut out scar tissue and make the scar less noticeable. I couldn't afford that before. I'll have another operation this year that will smooth it out more, so it's less obvious for film. I'd prefer to avoid losing any more roles because of the scar. But I know it'll never be gone completely." [The scar notwithstanding, she has a starring role in "The Love Tapes," an ABC TV-movie scheduled for this week.—Ed.]

In groping for remedies for her problems over the years, Jan says she was influenced by several religions she's studied. "A Hindu teacher helped me learn about enlightenment, which simply means lightening your emotional load and letting go. That sounds so simple it sounds dumb, but it's hard to achieve." Laughing, she adds: "I used to have to try to fix everything and everybody. Like, with boy friends, I was clutching. I tried to control and make the relationship happen. Now I find that they try to do that with me."

She does try to make things happen when it comes to influencing opinions on social issues, concentrating lately on campaigning against nuclear power. "I've always been very sensitive to world problems and political matters—I remember at the age of 5, in the mid-'50s, becoming terrified of The Bomb. My mother told me once that's when I became introverted; I decided the world couldn't be trusted."

Recently, Jan sat all of her *WKRP* colleagues down and made them watch two films on the dangers of nuclear power. That's the sort of initiative Bailey Quarters would have been much too bashful to undertake with her radio-station cohorts not long ago. But, like Jan, Bailey is branching out. **END**



# Scoring from the dugout



Baseball's bench jockeys wage verbal war with inspired —and telling— venom

Dick (The Dragon) Drago is a 34-year-old relief pitcher for the Boston Red Sox. During the course of a ball game, however, one seldom finds him in the bullpen. He never goes there until he's asked to warm up. At all other times, he is found rooted firmly to the dugout bench, well within the sight, the mind—and most critically—the eardrums of enemy pitchers and hitters.

Drago sometimes says the best things he has going for him are vocal cords like Johnny Weissmuller's. "My role," he adds, "is to irritate."

Few practices have a more hallowed place in baseball tradition. Those who subscribe to it see their work as no less vital than turning double plays and hitting cutoff men.

"You always look for an edge in this

game," says Drago. "If you can get on someone's nerves, he may not concentrate. Then he may screw up."

To look for that edge is to open the hunt to everything but good taste and civility. Accepted topics include players' looks, salaries, IQs and anything else that, Drago says, "can be used to outgross each other." Even the intimate details of a man's personal life? "Are you kidding? That makes the best material." It must be so, because when Johnny Bench was divorced from a model who claimed he'd spent their honeymoon playing billiards, some terrific sick jokes were born. And when Pete Rose was hit with a paternity suit last year, he couldn't show his face without some wag telling Pete a girl with a kid was waiting outside the park asking about him. Cruelty? "Hey," says Drago, "that's the *starting point*."

And a bench jockey can always find a rationalization for it. Drago, for one, insists he'll zap a guy only "if →

he's annoying me, like trying to show up my team."

Thus it was a few years ago when Al Hrabosky, then with Kansas City, went into his psych-up *shtick* behind the mound. Hrabosky, the best Hungarian relief pitcher in baseball, grandly pounded the ball in his glove and turned to the hitter. Then he realized Drago was the kind of jockey who does his homework. "I shot him a few Hungarian epithets," Drago recalls. "Then Carl Yastrzemski hit his first pitch out to win it. I let Yaz take the credit."

There was also the time Mike Hargrove, then with Texas, went into *his shtick*: stepping in and out of the batter's box, trying to rattle the pitcher. He was finally in and awaiting the pitch when Drago picked up three bats and smashed them loudly—very loudly—against the dugout steps. "Nonverbal jockeying, a perfectly acceptable procedure," Drago says. "He jumped about three miles in the air. Every time he stepped out he looked at me and saw those bats—and got right back in."

It isn't surprising that some of the game's best hatreds have stemmed from verbal darts. The blood feud between Kansas City's Hal McRae and Minnesota manager Gene Mauch—who long ago earned his Ph.D. in oral riot incitement—goes back to the final game of the '76 season when McRae was fighting for a batting title. "Mauch kept on trying to scare me, yelling, 'Knock him down' to his pitcher when I came up," McRae says. "I threw my bat away and went after him. I would've killed him if I wasn't headed off." Four years later, McRae can still say, "I wish Gene Mauch only the best—the best plague."

The bench-jockeying game is not limited to mere verbiage. Which is why Drago says, "You have to know who can take the garbage—and the psychos who can't. You leave the psychos alone."

St. Louis Cardinal Bernie Carbo, an-

other veteran jockey, found that out a few years ago. He was sniping at Tim Foli, a man as tightly strung as a watchspring. Foli, then with the Mets, is now the Pittsburgh shortstop. "I was going 'Cuckoo, cuckoo' at him after he went bananas at an umpire's call," Carbo says. "Then, when he was warming up before the next inning, he threw a ball at me on the bench. And when he grounded out his next time up, he took a right turn at first and made a beeline for me, cursing and spitting and screaming. I had to hide in the john before it was safe to come out. Now? Mostly, I just smile at him."

Mauch, while managing the Phillies in the 1960s, discovered that his normal venom—insulting a player's ability ("Who let you out of Double-A?" he likes to croak)—didn't apply to Pete Rose, then with the Reds. So Mauch tried psychology—bellowing to Rose that he'd tell Pete what pitch was coming. Rose, figuring a trap, looked for a fastball when Mauch yelled, "Here comes a curve"—and was an easy out when it was a curve. His next two times up, though, he listened to Mauch and belted hits. Then Pete strode to the plate for his last at-bat.

"I've got only one thing to say to you," the charming little manager said. "Bleep you." Much more to form—but Rose still got his third hit.

Rose, Carbo says, is always trying to psych guys out. But Drago can count Rose as a victim. In the '75 World Series, Drago recalls, "Pete was doing his thing, screaming at me, 'Throw harder. You can't beat me with that slow crap.' When I got him out, I told him, 'Way to hang with the slow crap, Pete.'"

Drago hasn't had to face Rose since. But should he again, he will be prepared. "That won't be difficult," says The Dragon, practicing his trade at longer range than usual. "He doesn't know any words with more than three letters." **END**

## Who Won the Season? ABC and CBS Agree That NBC Was Third

**Hollywood**—Who won the 1979-80 prime-time ratings crown? It depends on who is doing the tallying. ABC claims that the ratings stretch from Sept. 10 to April 20, or 32 weeks of Nielsen scores. That means ABC and CBS are in a dead heat with a 19.5 rating. NBC came in third with 17.3. At CBS, however, the champagne is flowing. That network's score card began Sept. 17 and ended April 20, or 31 weeks of Nielsen. Under this accounting, CBS squeaked past ABC, which had dominated prime time for the past few years, by one-tenth of a ratings point. CBS had 19.6, ABC 19.5 and NBC 17.4. The top 10 series for the season included eight CBS entries. The leaders were:

1. *60 Minutes*, CBS
2. *Three's Company*, ABC
3. *That's Incredible!*, ABC
4. *M\*A\*S\*H*, CBS
5. *Alice*, CBS
6. *Dallas*, CBS
7. *Flo*, CBS
8. *The Jeffersons*, CBS
9. *Dukes of Hazzard*, CBS
10. *One Day at a Time*, CBS

"Gauguin the Savage," the recent CBS biography of the French stockbroker who became a primitive artist, almost didn't make its air date because of a flap over too much frontal nudity. According to a network insider, CBS officials were shocked by a South Sea island scene that featured Gauguin (David Carradine) painting a nude woman on a beach in Tahiti. "She kept swatting flies off her breast," the CBS man said, "and she kept jiggling, three times. We felt once was enough to

make the point. Three jiggles was being a little lascivious." The CBS official went on to say that when his bosses objected to the two extra jiggles, the producer of the two-and-one-half-hour film, Bob Wood, a former president of CBS-TV, firmly rejected their suggestion that the excess jiggles be cut. "He threatened to withhold the show from us," the CBS source said. "Can you believe that? Our own Bob Wood pulling that trick?"

For the most part Wood played down the dispute. He said he thought the nudity was handled "with exquisite taste" and he did not see the need to cut anything out. "I told them they couldn't do it," said Wood. "I had to hang tough." He said the real issue wasn't the bare breast. "Breasts don't mean anything to the networks," said Wood. "It's the nipples they're worried about. The girl was slapping herself and her nipple was shown." The dejected CBS official shrugged off the flap after his bosses lost their shoot-out with Wood. "I guess you'd have to say the scene was very National Geographic. Brown skin is OK to show, but white wouldn't be."

Hugh Downs, former host of NBC's *Today*, former game-show emcee and former TV pitchman, is expanding his career and becoming a reporter on ABC's *20/20*. Roone Arledge, the president of ABC Sports and News, says Downs will come out from behind his anchor desk at *20/20* and go into the

□ Women in jail cells. A murderer, a convicted prostitute who has an affair with the jail's electrician, an ugly lesbian, a former cook who poisoned her employers and a kidnaper who swears she didn't try to bury an infant alive. Those are some of the charmers in *Prisoner: Cell Block H*, a sleazy soap opera produced in Australia that made its U.S. debut last January.

Violence, homosexuality, humiliation and tough-talking female convicts. It's hard enough to believe that adult viewers really want a series that panders to the shabbiest, most sadistic tastes. It's much harder—in fact, it's sickening—to think that in several large cities some stations don't mind if the kids watch, too.

□ The series was intended by its syndicator for *late-night* viewing. But in Minneapolis, this sordid trash is served up to viewers at 6:30 P.M.—to be enjoyed along with dinner, no doubt. In

Los Angeles, it's shown at 8 P.M., presumably on one station's theory that the folks in L.A. want to ooze into their serious viewing with a dose of *Slime Time*. Philadelphia, the City of Brotherly Love, is the worst offender of all: there, *Prisoner: Cell Block H* comes on at 5 P.M., when even the youngest kids can see it *before* dinner, thus losing their appetites but gaining a whole new appreciation of life in the gutter.

The manager of the Philadelphia station is reported to have said he slotted the series at 5 P.M. as a lead-in to help boost ratings of its 5:30 newscast. That's a pretty sorry reason for running this junk—and a surprising one for a Westinghouse Group W station.

□ The National Organization for Women (NOW) has objected to the "excessive violence" of the series and its depiction of women in general.

Television should serve the widest vagaries of American tastes—the *widest*, not the lowest. This ugly, tasteless series should be shipped back where it came from and buried—Down Under.

Salutes to John Huston and Johnny Cash highlight a rich and varied programming week that offers something of note almost every evening.

**SATURDAY.** Guest star George Burns best sums up an elaborately produced **Ann-Margret** special (9:30 ABC). "It's about the old Hollywood and the new Hollywood, but most of all it's about the Hollywood movie girls . . . hopeful starlets, pinup girls, sex symbols and glamour queens"—all portrayed by headliner Ann-Margret in music, comedy and dramatic spots with Dom DeLuise, Bill Saluga, Dean-Paul Martin and Roger Moore.

**MONDAY.** The ever-persevering Charlie Brown gets another shot at athletic greatness in a superb **Peanuts** rerun entitled "You're the Greatest, Charlie Brown" (8 CBS). This time around, he's representing his school in the Junior Olympics decathlon—and, wouldn't you know it, the meet is on the line. Will Charlie Brown win, or be the goat one more time? . . . Clips spanning the brilliant career of John Huston—from his directorial debut in 1941's "The Maltese Falcon," through "The Treasure of the Sierra Madre" (1948) and "The Asphalt Jungle" (1950), to his well-received current release "Wise Blood"—highlight a tribute to the director-screenwriter-actor on **Live from Lincoln Center** (8:30 PBS; taped in some areas). Also scheduled are comments from Lauren Bacall, Richard Burton and Jack Nicholson.

**WEDNESDAY.** One of the last **Shakespeare Plays**, "The Tempest" (8 PBS) is a work of mystery and fantasy set on an enchanted island, where the sorcerer

Prospero has shipwrecked his enemies. And it is Michael Hordern's performance as Prospero—the actor's favorite Shakespearean role—that dominates this production.

**THURSDAY.** Disappointment is the captain's lot once again: for the third time **Barney Miller** (9 ABC) fails to make deputy inspector. Well-written and excellently acted throughout, this seriocomic episode saves its best moment for the finale—a bit involving an incarcerated trumpet player who blows the blues one last time before his transfer to the Tombs . . . Music and memories combine in **Johnny Cash: The First 25 Years** (9:30 CBS), one of the season's best country specials. It's a silver-anniversary celebration with performances by gold-record artists Tom T. Hall, Waylon Jennings, Kris Kristofferson, Larry Gatlin, the Statler Brothers and, of course, Cash himself.

**FRIDAY.** "On Company Business," a three-part **Non Fiction Television** documentary (9 PBS) that chronicles the less-than-unblemished record of the CIA over the past 30 years, may seem like old business to those familiar with revelations about "the company" in newspapers, books and Congressional hearings. But as accumulated here, accounts of CIA participation in elections, coups and (in Part 1) sabotage and assassination attempts against Cuba's Fidel Castro add up to a disturbing portrait of the agency—and the Presidents who may have misused it.

**Hollywood**—Columbia Pictures, MCA/Universal, Paramount Pictures and 20th Century-Fox, along with the Getty Oil Co., have formed a partnership to set up their own pay-television network. The new service will utilize movies from the four companies, as well as those from other sources. It will begin operations in January 1981 as a satellite-delivered movie channel, challenging the present supremacy of Time Inc.'s Home Box Office in this field. Films shown on the movie companies' new channel would not be available to other pay-TV services until

nine months later.

Home Box Office reacted strongly to the announcement. A spokesman for HBO said, "The scheme violates the basic tenets of antitrust law. Companies in the film industry, as the U.S. Supreme Court has noted, have shown a marked proclivity to antitrust violations. We intend to contact the antitrust division of the Department of Justice about this patently illegal joint venture." HBO further charged that the new partnership is an attempt by "these movie companies, fueled by Getty Oil, to force the public and the cable industry to pay higher prices for their films."

The producers of pay-television shows have begun negotiating with the Directors Guild of America and the Writers Guild of America for an agreement that would allow directors and writers to work in pay-TV. The Guilds currently prohibit such activity by their members.

This is the network-movie week of **Breaking Away**, a wacky, wonderful and lovable comedy that is the feel-terrific (as opposed to a mere feel-good) movie of the year.

Fresh from its Oscar nomination for best picture of 1979, this film has probably set a speed record in theater-to-television transitions. Written by Steve Tesich, who won an Oscar for his original screenplay, the movie is concerned with four pals, recent high-school graduates, "townies" in the college town of Bloomington, Ind. The focus is on Dave, the romantic innocent of the quartet, whose instant and only ambition is to be an Italian bike-racer. For action, there's the constant conflict between the town boys and the college students, one that comes to a smashingly suspenseful climax under Peter Yates' direction with the Little 500 Bicycle Race, the social and sporting event of the year at Indiana University. But the deep pleasure of the movie lies in Dave's coming of age in relation to his parents. The family is trapped in that fortunately transient, inarticulate phase of family relations that both adult and child go through, with explorations and revelations still to come on both sides. All the outer trappings of situation-comedy parenthood cling as Dave's parents watch his maturing into the "real" world—but it's the glorious loving and sharing of a triumphant transition that give the film its final and lasting glow. Dennis Christopher shines as Dave, and Barbara Barrie and Paul Dooley are their usual perfection as his parents.

The dark side of adolescence and parent-child relations is explored with equal cogency and skill in **Off the Minnesota Strip**, a TV-movie produced by Meta Rosenberg and David Chase (of *The Rockford Files*), written by Chase and directed by Lamont Johnson. It is a probing, unsparring story of a 15-year-old runaway, taken by a pimp from Minneapolis to New York "to be a star lady," and, after a few months of prostitution, returned home by the police. Her attempt to make a new beginning in old surroundings is chillingly detailed. The film is, however, at its most brilliant in its dissection of the deadly and deadlocked triangle the girl and the parents she sees as "the original pod people" form. Mare Winningham, the sweet romantic of "Amber Waves," is simply brilliant as the child wise beyond anyone's years; Michael Learned as the unyielding mother, and Hal Holbrook as the guilt-ridden father, are excellent. It is an uncompromising story, honest and compassionate, devoid of sentimentality—and unforgettable.

A second TV-movie, **The Memory of Eva Ryker**, is a preposterous melodrama that gets off to a stunning start and continues as a mindless but engrossing entertainment. Adapted by Laurence Heath from a novel by Donald A. Stanwood that involved the Titanic, the story centers on a mystery aboard a luxury liner sunk by U-boats in 1939. Ralph Bellamy, as an aged billionaire whose wife did not survive the sinking, hires Robert Foxworth, an ex-

cop turned writer, to probe the mystery; Natalie Wood, as Bellamy's daughter who survived the sinking but has been mentally unbalanced ever since, has to be made to remember what she saw on board ship. And meanwhile other survivors are being murdered right and left, and we flit from Honolulu to Paris to Australia and Newfoundland in lush style, get flashbacks ad infinitum and a resolution that's as yummy as it's contrived. Ours not to reason—just to wallow.

Two other TV-movies were not available for preview. **The Love Tapes** involves Martin Balsam, Loretta Swit and others in a video dating service. **The Curse of King Tut's Tomb** involves Eva Marie Saint, Raymond Burr and others in the 1922 discovery of the tomb of Tutankhamen and the curse attached thereto. This movie will be offered in two parts as second half of a "double

bill" that starts with the two-part repeat of 1976's expanded-for-TV **King Kong**, a remake of the 1933 classic that updates and vulgarizes it for those who are familiar with the original, and provides a dumb entertainment for those who aren't.

The top of the week's theatrical repeats, however, is 1977's **Oh, God!**, with George Burns as "Big G" Himself, John Denver his latter-day Moses and irresistible entertainment for all ages. Then there's the fifth run of Howard Hawks' 1970 **Rio Lobo**, with John Wayne conducting a post-Civil War search for the guys who did his Union troop wrong. And for fire buffs, there's the second half of 1974's **The Towering Inferno**. The week's one TV-movie repeat is of 1978's **Like Mom, Like Me**, with Linda Lavin and Kristy McNichol wasted on an amoral story of mother and daughter deserted by dad.

Richard Burton, Lauren Bacall, Jack Nicholson and Jose Ferrer join the Film Society of Lincoln Center in paying tribute to director-screenwriter-actor John Huston.

"If there is a pattern to my work," Huston said, "it's that I haven't made any two pictures alike. I get bored too quickly." # Octopus cakes, sushi, live mud eel and beer-crazed antelope

And that's only the menu; the action is even stranger when you spend a day with Robin Williams

**"Sushi, sake, sayonara!"** Robin Williams commands, twisting his rubbery Mork face into a faintly inscrutable Doctor Wu mask.

The red-kimonoed waitress watches Williams' finger race down the list of many sushis, barely keeping up as he rattles off his order in kamikaze Japanese. The Hollywood restaurant quivers at the resonance of Williams' voice. "Octopus cakes," he raves. "And sushi all around! Lotus and bamboo too, and—so—of course," his voice drops to a toothy whisper, his eyes dangerous slits, "my velly *flavorites*—ah—beer-crazed antelope and live mud eel. And sake, please, for these Americans. But so I work this night, none for me," he demurs soberly. "However, the lady and the stranger must desire six flasks each."

"My God," our female accomplice murmurs, awed, as Williams now begins speaking in Japanese again to the

nodding waitress. "Robin can't utter a word of Japanese. Yet they're acting as if he makes complete sense. This always happens—he's got them totally into this scene he's imagining."

Results come fast. Over the next two hours, a train of waitresses bring tray after lacquered tray of food and drink to us, returning 10, 11, 12 times, like sorcerer's apprentices. Williams' order overflows our table to several others nearby, fairly enough to stuff 10 healthy people. He smiles gayly.

"Like so," he concludes after we have gorged ourselves, passing me the dinner check with a deft flourish. Inspection reveals I have purchased 70 dollars' worth of little Japanese rice rolls and wine. Pausing only to hand me three doggie bags of leftover sushi, Williams shakes hands with the entire restaurant staff, all of whom are grinning madly, swept up in his performance.

"To The Comedy Store!" he com-

Carlos and Carlotta. "Almost microscopic to the human eye. I feed them with a special corn laser."

Williams and the cast were busy rehearsing "Little Orphan Morkie," an episode in which Mork was discovered to be an illegal alien and faced deportation. "We're not sure where they'd send him," Williams cracked. "Maybe stuff him in a rocket and blast him into the sun, like atomic waste." When the scene ended, Robin Williams did not. He became baby Morkie, sidling up to his co-

mands as the door flies open before him. "I say let the evening begin!"

Robin Williams' day began 14 hours earlier, at 8 A.M. He and his wife, dancer Valerie Valardi, usually spend Sunday through Thursday nights at an apartment convenient to Paramount Studios, so that he can sleep as late as possible before coming to the set. But this Monday morning began at their weekend house in rustic Topanga Canyon. Williams rose at 8 and stumbled into the kitchen, greeting his animals—Sam the malamute and Bitchy Cora, The Evil Parrot. Then he ambled out into the canyon dew, clucking chicken-talk to a flock of Polish chickens. "Yes, that's right, Polish chickens," he told me later in the morning, on the *Mork & Mindy* set. "They all have heads like Phyllis Diller, but laying eggs is a feat they've not yet mastered." But his favorite pets, he assured me, are twin dwarf goats

star Tom Poston, who eyed him sadly, beagle-like. "Daddy, Daddy, can we go to the La Brea tar pits today?" Morkie whined. "No way, kid," Poston answered wearily. "Gold went through the roof at \$600 an ounce, and I gotta call my broker for a little taste of that action."

As the 1 o'clock lunch buzzer sounded, Williams picked up a guitar, scatting through a mock blues tune in a vibrant voice. He will sing 10 or so songs in his first movie—the musical comedy "Popeye," now filming in Malta—but not this one: "*No one knows you like I do, so lie, little sucker, lie. Wo! Tell the truth, tell the truth, I say! Tell a lie, tell a lie, tell a lie I say! Wo! Wo! You know the blues is truth, and you can't tell the truth 'thout lying. . . .*"

There are a thousand or so Robin Williamses, and the one lunching in his dressing trailer at 1:30 was serious, a rare calm eye in a whirling comic →

storm. His mood was in startling contrast to his outfit—a floppy Shakespearean hat, a T-shirt with a blue flying saucer and little pink piglets, a set of gaudy suspenders holding up outrageously baggy 1940s zoot-suit trousers. Somberly, he said that he'd been spending his weekends at the Topanga Canyon home doing nothing but sleeping late, watching old movies, visiting with good friends—recharging batteries that he drains almost recklessly Monday through Friday. It had been a tough second season for Mork from Ork. The rollercoaster success of the show in 1978-79, and near collapse this season, had toughened him, Williams said, made him more wary, taught him to guard his time and energies more carefully. "Everyone wants a piece when you're on top," he said. "And they'll take it even when you say no. Or they'll try. There are millions of little [unauthorized] Mork T-shirts and dolls walking around out there like

androids. And I didn't make a damned cent on them. I have enough money—but I don't like people *using* me." He had been particularly burned, he said, by widespread scandal-sheet tales accusing him of infidelity, a failing marriage and an inflated show-biz ego.

In firm, often salty language, he spoke of his disappointment with a series of changes in the show made by ABC-TV. "They messed with a solid success. Why do it? They took a first-year smash with a 55 share—that's phenomenal—one of the top five series, and changed the characters, the concept, introduced a blatantly 'sexy' element at a crucial time in November, and shifted the show from Thursday night to Sunday, up against *Archie Bunker's Place*. They jacked me around, the show around; and the mail and the ratings—we dropped to something like 35 or 40—showed it. That's *crap*."

"But what the hell," he smiled over a tuna sandwich, taking a vicious →



chomp. "A god at 27, a washout at 28. After you hit 30"—he laughed through the food—"you're just flab, falling hair and old drug flashes. Besides, there's the future. There's TV. And there's 'Popeye,' about which we cannot possibly speak. It's a vast secret, up to the very end."

He then proceeded to do a rapid-fire half hour on the secret project, a Robert Altman movie-in-progress. "I see Popeye as an extremely straight-ahead guy in a complex world—the sort who sinks ships and destroys bridges when Swee'pea starts wailing. The old cartoons are some help, but after talking with Chris Reeve, who did Superman, I realized I have to create Popeye through strong movement, physical action." His Popeye, Williams said, would do lots of mule-kicks, butterflies, handstands in musical cadence. To perfect his timing and moves, he'd been working two hours each day since last May, mainly with comic acrobatic dancer Lou Wills.

Back on the *Mork* set later in the afternoon, director Howard Storm supported Williams' complaints about ABC's handling of the show. "It started when they moved our slot from Thursday night to Sunday, putting us up against a sequence of NFL football, *60 Minutes* and *Archie Bunker*. It's hard for a single show to stop that sort of package. And TV audiences are a loyal bunch—they'll often shape an evening or a week around a favorite show. In a sense, we abandoned our fans. And they didn't like it."

Williams and Storm in particular resent ABC's handling of *Mork & Mindy* during the November "sweeps month," when the networks made maximal efforts to capture the largest audiences. A one-hour episode with Raquel Welch was a disaster for cast and viewers alike, and the period of filming during these sequences gave rise to the rumors of cast feuding—a charge with more than a little basis in fact. A fol-

lowing sequence in which Mork, in sequined drag, joined the Denver Broncos' cheerleaders, also lost viewers. "It was pure 'T and A,'" Williams simmered. "ABC tried to turn us into *Charlie's Angels*, to exploit a lot of jiggy female flesh."

Pam Dawber agrees. "It was disgusting. We got loads of mail asking what happened to the old *Mork & Mindy*?—the human quality? When our ratings dropped us down to about number 40, producer Garry Marshall said *enough*. It was like watching something close to us all about to die. And Robin felt the brunt of that distress. After all, the show had been built around him."

ABC officials will say only that "such matters are network-wide decisions." The ratings, however, speak for themselves, and *Mork & Mindy* has shown a steady increase in audience since being returned to the Thursday slot in early January.

At 5 o'clock the day's work ended on the set, and while Williams was at the Paramount gym for his two-hour workout, a close friend, one who has known him since his early club days, talked candidly about Williams' meteoric rise. "It happened so fast—Robin's sudden fame was more like a rock star's than a TV performer's. It took Henry Winkler and John Travolta a few years to get there, but Robin was an immediate hit.

"At the beginning of last year, he was hanging out with Winkler, John Ritter, Travolta, Chris Reeve. I think he was consciously *exploring* what it meant to be suddenly famous. He's a very social animal, likes people and parties, but he and Valerie have had to pull back for their own protection and sanity. When they were in New York on their honeymoon, they couldn't even go out to eat. They had room-service food for a week.

"A different breed could have become utterly intolerable from all the adulation. Hollywood is filled with such basket cases. But the fact is, he maintained →

his balance. Of course there have been pressures. Women do find him warm, attractive, and he likes women. His creativity can be exhausting to those around him. And he most certainly has fought the network and censors during this season. But he remains a very special person, a complete *wire*. It's as if his brand of lunacy frees people around him to be themselves, to reach those weird little corners that make us interesting and finally human. It's eerie. Sometimes, he really does seem like he's come from another galaxy."

On perfect cue, Williams danced into the room, unfazed from two hours of acrobatics, clad in still another T-shirt, this one emblazoned with a gigantic red pineapple. "Ready, ready, ready," he sang deep down in his throat. "Ready, ready, ready to . . . sushi roll."

It is 10 P.M., following the sushi meal, and Williams plunges into the night for The Comedy Store, where, for no fee, he periodically tries out new material. His unannounced appearances there are the worst-kept secrets in town, and the Mainroom is jammed to 500-seat capacity. Monday night is a smorgasbord—anyone can perform anything—but the crowd is here for Robin Williams and his pal Andy Kaufman of *Taxi*.

Midnight. The hip crowd is very high, giddy with laughter as Williams works several brilliant mimes and improvisations, much of his material too blue for TV. He cracks up the house with his impression of a semi-soused designer of the DC-10, "defending" his airplane on *The Phil Donahue Show*. Slouched buddy-buddy, his jacket on backward and his eyes wrapped in reflector sunglasses, he slurs through the interview. "Ish gooda be here and sober, a' lease for coupla minutes," he shouts at Donahue, trying to focus on him. "Oh, the DC-10, yeah, spota bother there. Ack-shully, I donno much about aerodynamics." He launches into a final desperate apology for the fact that parts fall from the plane with alarming frequency.

"Tail bone? Wash that? Oh, tail cone. Now there's a reason for that, young man—I drew that up to fall off like a little party favor. Suuuure it scares guys, but what the hell."

At 1:15, having gone strong for over 17 hours, Robin Williams comes back on stage with "The After Hours Midnight Choir" (a rhythm-and-blues group composed of local comics, sort of a West Coast Blues Brothers). Williams sings and plays a wicked mouth organ, getting loose on the group's properly unknown monster hit, "Liver and Onions," which he describes as "a lame white-boy blues about lack of deprivation."


But we're not done yet. At 2 A.M., 18 hours after launch, Williams speeds urgently back to Topanga to feed the leftover sushi to Carlos and Carlotta. He is still buzzing, and I am gasping beside him.

The man strides fearlessly through the brushy darkness like a spinached-up Popeye. A small cage looms at once in the night, apparently vacant. "Aho mates," Williams booms, scraping a hornpipe along the screen. "A late snack for me babies."

He scoots toward the "corn laser," a Rube Goldberg contraption that he says "atomizes" corn feed for his "near-microscopic dwarf goats." Breathlessly, he arms the device with a sushi roll. "An experiment—the goats've never eaten Japanese. Are you ready, kids?" Carlos and Carlotta are not visible in the little pen. Then a tiny bright beam slices the darkness, and what seems to be a faint animal squeak responds. "Good girl," Williams croons. "Now you, Carlos, open wide." Another squeak.

"Let the day end," Robin Williams finally sighs. "Our work on Earth is done. And my children," he pauses in a churchly murmur, "heed Father Robin. Let this be your path to truth, from the sage Popeye: 'I yam what I yam'." (END)

# Rerun Roulette— Predicting the Survivors

Here's why some of TV's top shows prosper in syndication while others don't

**I Love Lucy. The Brady Bunch. Gilligan's Island. Perry Mason.** These programs were top network series before they went into the rerun market to become some of the biggest hits in syndication history.

But *Marcus Welby, M.D. Peyton Place. The Rookies.* These programs were top network series before they went into the syndication rerun market to become relative disappointments in that field. Why?

That's the question that keeps the people who syndicate network shows up nights. The real pot of gold at the end of the TV rainbow is not really a hit series, although that helps; the big money comes when a show goes off the network and into syndication reruns.

But shows that everyone thought would hit big have too often, in the words of one syndicator, "sunk like dead weight to the bottom of the ocean"; others have unexpectedly proven evergreen.

While there are perhaps 3000 possible rerun series available, only about 100 sell in large numbers. The billion-dollar question is what makes for a hit or a flop in syndication. A survey of more than 25 of the major syndicators




in the country reveals that programs that consistently make it big in reruns have the following in common:

They are 30 minutes long. "A half hour is easy to watch and not as big a time commitment," says Steven Orr of 20th Century-Fox. On the whole, hour-long shows have done poorly in syndication. (*Star Trek, Perry Mason, Gunsmoke* and *Bonanza* are the exceptions.)

They are situation comedies. "These get the kids and the young adults and they deliver numbers," says Harvey Seslowsky of the Broadcast Information Bureau.

They are shows with mass appeal.



year a new crop of kids grows up who will want to watch the program."

They are shows that are capable of being "stripped." That means playing five days a week at the same time period, 260 weekdays a year. To strip a show successfully, a station needs between 100 and 160 episodes. Nowadays few shows are kept on the air long enough to qualify. Gone are the days of plenty when cheap, family, network products ran four or five years and offered 150 or more episodes.

The most successful syndicated show in the history of television is *I Love Lucy* (1951-57, 179 episodes, black and white, Viacom). The concept of reruns—that is, creating reusable filmed programs for later use—was pioneered by *Lucy*. Her visual comedy (as opposed to dialogue comedy) is expected to run forever.

*The Brady Bunch* (1969-74, 117 episodes, Paramount) is one of the last of the old-fashioned, innocent, family sitcoms. It lasted five years on the network and is now seen in more than 130 markets.

*Gilligan's Island* (1964-67, only 98 episodes, United Artists) is one of the biggest surprises in syndication history. "It's generating more revenue in the last three years than it did five years ago. It's a phenomenal success," says United Artists' Marty Robinson.

Other noteworthy successes include: *The Flintstones* (1960-66, Columbia), an "adult" cartoon set in prehistoric times that will never date and should have unlimited potential as new generations discover it; *The Honeymooners* (1955-56), an oddity with only 39 black-and-white episodes but very popular; *Leave It to Beaver* (1957-63, 234 MCA episodes), a family sitcom once enormously popular in syndication but now losing its appeal; *Bewitched* (1964-72, Columbia), ABC's biggest hit up to that time and still strong; *My Three Sons* (1960-72) and *I Dream of Jeannie* (1965-70).

Best new shows in syndication →

Because demographics—the breakdown of the audience into age, income and other segments—are an important part of ratings, the fewer demographics lost, the better. "Anytime you lose one particular demographic—a show that doesn't appeal to kids or women or whomever—you limit the success of that show by limiting the various time periods it can play," says Paramount's Randy Reiss.

They are shows with strong kid appeal. Most of these syndicated programs are scheduled between 4 and 8 P.M.—when children watch TV. "Kid appeal also gives you another edge," said Tandem's Robin French. "Every

seem to be *M\*A\*S\*H* (200-plus episodes after nine years on CBS, 20th-Century Fox); *All in the Family* (207 episodes, Viacom) and *Happy Days* (Paramount).

Some shows have reached "cult status" in syndication:

*Star Trek* (1966-69, 79 episodes, Paramount). Not a big network success, it surprised everyone. Its episodes have been seen 40 times in many markets.

*Twilight Zone* (1959-63, 134 episodes, Viacom). Rod Serling's half-hour suspense-fantasy-science fiction anthology can be played any time, day or night, and is popular with generation after generation of teen-agers.

*The Dick Van Dyke Show* (1961-66, 158 episodes, Viacom). This old black-and-white show is many syndicators' favorite for most reliable old series.

*Get Smart* (1965-70, 138 episodes, NTA). Don Adams as the James Bond takeoff created by Mel Brooks and Buck Henry is gaining in popularity. "It's enjoying a kind of renaissance," says Arthur Gross of National Telefilm Associates.

*The Avengers*, *The Prisoner*, *Mission: Impossible*, *Alfred Hitchcock Presents*, Groucho Marx's *You Bet Your Life* also are "cult" shows always guaranteed to deliver respectable ratings.

There have been disappointments. When *Marcus Welby, M.D.* (1969-76, 172 episodes, MCA) was ready for syndication, everybody predicted great success. It had done well on the network and Robert Young was enormously popular in *Father Knows Best*, a program that still sells. While *Welby* is now in 89 markets, why it never captured a mass audience in syndication is one of the great mysteries. Some syndicators blame its one-hour format.

*Green Acres* (1965-71, Filmways). This popular CBS network effort and *Petticoat Junction* did not meet expectations in syndication. To a lesser degree this was also true of *The Beverly Hillbillies*, the most successful network show of its time (1962-71) to come

into syndication.

*The Doris Day Show* (1968-73), *Ironside* (1967-75), and *The Fugitive* (1963-67) all suffered similar disappointing fates. Even though the last network episode of *The Fugitive* on Aug. 29, 1967, was seen by more people than any other single episode of a regular series in TV's annals up to that time—a 73.2 per-cent share—it died in syndication.

Meanwhile, the scarcity of long-running successful network programs has forced stations to buy programs far in advance and syndication prices have skyrocketed. "The money involved in syndication today [although prices are scaled to the sizes of the individual markets] resembles the mileage between planets," says Gross of National Telefilm Associates. The value of the inventory is well over a billion dollars and going up every day.

*All in the Family* has reached nearly \$100 million in sales. In Los Angeles, the No. 2 market in the country, comprising five per cent of the television audience, *The Brady Bunch*, one of the biggest-rated rerun draws available, sold in 1975 for \$6000-\$8000 an episode (unlimited runs for seven years). In 1976, *M\*A\*S\*H* sold for \$17,000 an episode. Just a year later, *Happy Days* pushed reruns into the stratosphere at \$35,000 an episode, quickly followed by *Sanford and Son* (\$35,000), *Welcome Back, Kotter* (\$42,000) and *Laverne & Shirley*, which broke all records when it was sold for use beginning in September 1981, for \$61,000 an episode (which pays for seven runs within an estimated period of five years). The projected number of episodes by 1981 is 140. For just Los Angeles and New York (140 times \$100,000), Paramount will gross \$14 million.

Syndicators privately admit that if programs such as *Laverne & Shirley* fool everyone and become syndication bombs, this inflated price structure could explode. **END**

## Some backwoods guile won a youngster his first look at TV

It was one of those bright yellow days that herald spring in southwest Oklahoma. I had taken advantage of the day by hieing me creekward with a pole, some fat grubs, a whiskey-cork bobber and a hook that could have anchored the Queen Elizabeth.

Well, perhaps I exaggerate a trifle. But it was big enough to hold the monster catfish that ruled the muddy pool on Big Beaver Creek, where I spent every free hour.

Not that there were many. My family sharecropped, and when there was no crop, as often happened in this red-

dirt area near Chickasha, we picked cotton for a living. That meant we were too poor to afford a newfangled gadget like a television set. I didn't know what that was, but I'd soon find out in a fishy sort of way.

When I first heard the word, I thought the kid who used it was saying "tell a vision." Being acquainted with backwoods preachers, who not only saw visions but could relate them in "tongues," I was impressed.

"Yes, sir, ol' Junior Fisher's dad done bought a television set," my informant repeated.

"Oh, *corn*," I said, using the current term for contempt. "Ain't nothin' can tell a vision 'cept a preacher."

"Boy, are you dumb, Billy Dee," he

said. "It ain't nothin' magic like preachin'. It's a reddio that gives off pitchers."

It was 1949 and I was 15, albeit with a body and mind of 12, which hampered me somewhat. I went on toward the creek, trying to figure how a radio could give off pictures. Finally, I shrugged it off. In my backward rural area, too many folks were too poor to dream about such things.

Except for one. Junior Fisher was the only son of the only rich farmer within miles. Junior was a chunky, obnoxious kid who was learning early that you don't get rich, and stay rich, by being generous. And now he had the first television set in the area. I had to admit I was curious about that set. What kid wouldn't be? In our area, anything new or unusual resulted in a gathering of gawkers from miles around.

# Review

"You're just determined not to be understanding, aren't you? Or forgiving."

"When you've been run over by a truck, you don't much care how the driver feels."

"I never mean to be rotten."

"I know. It's just a gift."

Richard and Libby Chapin (Beau Bridges and Helen Shaver) don't just bicker like any old married slobs. They top each other. Their fears, jealousies and misunderstandings are the universal ones, but the Chapins happen to be wordslingers and quick wits, and to them the unexamined marriage is not worth living. This quirky, clever new NBC series has the nerve to try a half hour of just talk, almost all of it between this restless pair, usually as they're lying in bed—joking, cuddling and arguing about sex, love, death and money—the stuff that really matters and really hurts. But they're smiling—or at least wisecracking—through the tears. "We've had this fight so many times I bet it goes on when we're not here," she says.

Larry Gelbart, who created the series, is after no less than a bedbug's-eye view of the "united state" of marriage. So he has cleared the decks—of music, laugh tracks, relatives and neighbors—to tune in on those middle-of-the-night exchanges when the domestic state is probed and tested. You don't get marriage without paying, Gelbart seems to be telling us, but if we're going to wince with the Chapins we may as well laugh with them.

Gelbart is trying for eloquence, too. Richard talks about an affair he has

had during the marriage. "Even with all the love in the world, marriage becomes a business. A family turns you into the Acme Marriage Company, with car pools, insurance policies, broken lawn mowers. . . . We dreamed of seeing Venice and we settled for root-canal work instead. Skateboards and homework aren't aphrodisiacs." And he recalls a fling his wife had with a professor when she was in college. "Affair? I hate that word, affair. It sounds like having a few people in for drinks and onion dip. It has nothing to do with sneaking around and fogging up windshields from the inside. It's even worse than 'sleeping' with someone. Sleeping is barely a verb. It's so passive."

Too much cleverness, in fact, could be the series' downfall. The Chapins (and Gelbart) can't resist a good line. And the viewer might start wondering: is anyone really that witty in the middle of the night? Sometimes the Chapins' marathon conversations sound more like writing than talking.

But who's perfect? Shaver is fiercely attractive and funny. Bridges is a fine, naturalistic actor who can underplay a line. They and Gelbart create two intelligent, caring, relatively secure people, no more afraid than the rest of us, who both happen to look nice in underwear. And beneath the wit, the weeping and writhing, the Chapins obviously have something solid but flexible and not easily broken. As Richard reassures one of his two sons, "This may be a noisy house sometimes. But it's a safe one." **END**


