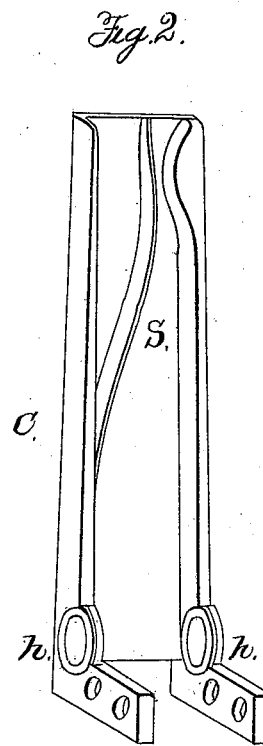
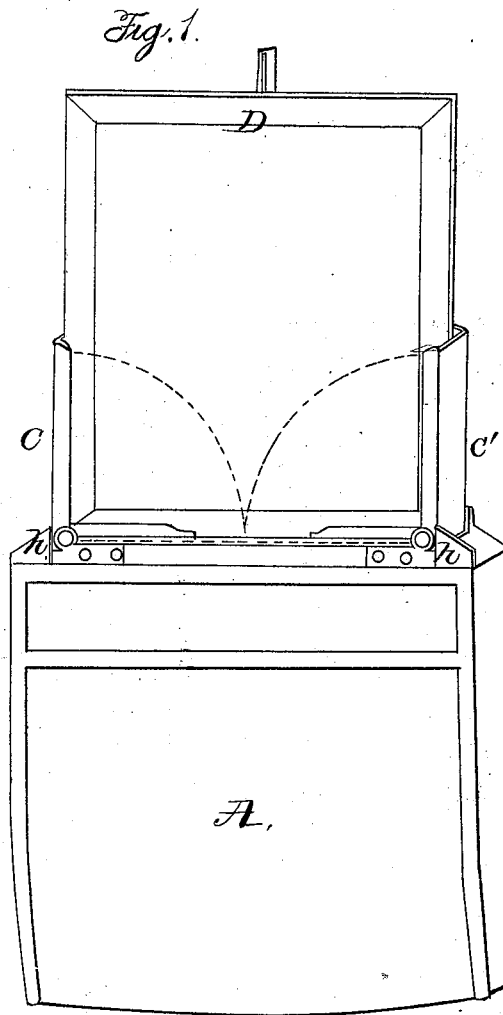

IMPROVEMENT IN LANDAU-CARRIAGE DOORS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 53,075, dated March 6, 1866.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FREDERICK WOOD, of Bridgeport, Fairfield county, Connecticut, have invented a new and Improved Attachment for Landau-Carriage Doors; and I do hereby declare that the within is a full and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings.

The object of my invention is to enable the doors of landau and other similarly-constructed carriages to be opened while the glass is up, and without the necessity of first letting down the glass.

To accomplish this I attach to the carriage-door A, Figure 1, the frame-holders C C', projecting upward from the door, and in which the glass and frame B slide when drawn up

or let down. The form and construction of these frame-holders are shown more fully in Fig. 2, which represents one of them detached. For convenience and beauty they are hinged at *h h*, so as to close downward over the glass when this is down, making a neater finish to the door. The spring S keeps the glass, when up, from rattling.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The glass-frame holders C C', constructed and operating as described.
