IMPROVEMENT IN COMPOUNDS FOR TREATING LEATHER.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same,

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, SAMUEL S. WALBANK, of Superior City, Douglass county, State of Wisconsin, have invented a new and useful Compound or Mixture for Leather; and I do hereby declare the following to be an exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying specified quantities of the ingredients that I use, as follows:

I take, of India crude rubber, two ounces.

Gutta-percha, two ounces. Castor oil, two ounces. Neat's-foot oil, four ounces.

Crude or refined petroleum, one gallon.

Bichloride of mercury, sixty grains.

Ivory black, four ounces.

Prussia blue, one-fourth of an ounce.

I dissolve the rubber and gutta-percha in the petroleum by boiling in a close vessel, and then allowed

to cool, when I add the bichloride of mercury; then the castor and neat's foot oils, and lastly the ivory black and Prussian blue.

I use this compound or mixture by applying it with a brush or piece of sponge to the leather, which makes it not only water-proof, but preserves it, and I therefore style it the "liquid leather-preserver and waterproof blacking."

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure

by Letters Patent, is-

The combination of the ingredients, when mixed and used in the quantities and proportions as herein described, and for the purposes set forth.
