COMPOUND FOR GRAINING WOOD.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 260,973, dated July 11, 1882.

Application filed April 20, 1882. (No specimens.)

To all whom it may concern:

Beit known that I, John T. Greenwood, Jr., a citizen of the United States, resident of Beloit, in the county of Rock and State of Wisconsin, have invented a new and valuable Improvement in Compounds for Graining Wood; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the same.

This invention has relation to compounds to for graining on wood; and it consists in a mixture of the ingredients hereinafter named, in the proportions set forth.

In preparing this graining compound I take one quart of malt vinegar, two ounces of brown sugar, one-quarter of an ounce of fish-glue, one-half an ounce of alcohol, and four drams of the oil of sassafras, and mix them together.

Mineral paints are used for ground-work,

and when the compound above set forth is used in connection with such paints a body is 20 formed suitable for graining in imitation of oak, maple, black-walnut, or French walnut.

Having described this invention, what I claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The graining compound consisting of malt vinegar, brown sugar, fish-glue, alcohol, and oil of sassafras, mixed together in the proportions substantially as specified.
