



PANTALOONS-PROTECTOR.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 346,652, dated August 3, 1886.

Application filed May 10, 1886. Serial No. 201,704. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:
Be it known that I, James D. Hanan, of the city of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have invented a new 5 and Improved Pantaloons-Protector, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact descrip-

The invention consists of the special construction of the protector, as hereinafter de-10 scribed and claimed.

Reference is to be had to the accompanying drawings, forming a part of this specification, in which similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts in both the figures.

Figure 1 is a side elevation of my protector, shown in position for use; and Fig. 2 is a perspective view of the protector.

A represents the protector attached to the top of the shoe B by the tongue d, so that the 20 supporting-pieces cc elevate the bottom of the pantaloons, the same being retained thereon by the upwardly-projecting finger or point e.

In forming the protector I prefer to use a circular piece of wire with its ends welded to-

gether. This I bend to form the curved side 25 pieces, aa, the downwardly-projecting tongue d, and the upwardly-projecting retaining-finger e. This done I form the four sharp bends \bar{f} in the wire, and then curve the supportingpieces c thus formed outward, so they will fit 30 the heel of the shoe and set the retaining-finger e back from the heel, so there will be no difficulty in placing the bottom of the pantaloons upon the supports c, between the finger e and the heel of the shoe.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is-

As an improved article of manufacture, the pantaloons-protector A, made of wire bent to 40 form the side pieces, a, tongue d, outwardlycurved supports cc, and upwardly-projecting finger e, substantially as described.
