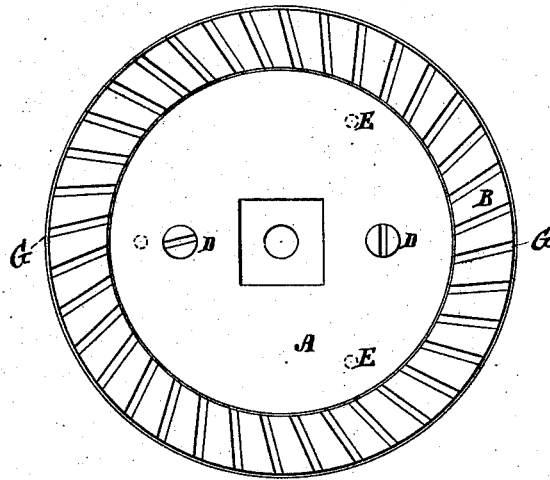
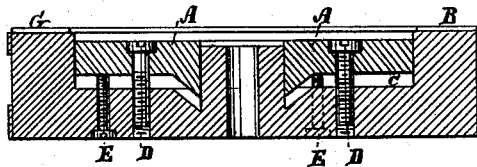

## IMPROVEMENT IN MILLSTONE-DRESS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 161,097, dated March 23, 1875; application filed January 18, 1875.

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that we, JEFFERSON CARVILL and JOHN CAVEN, of Kingston, in the county of Meeker and State of Minnesota, have invented a new and Improved Millstone-Dress, of which the following is a specification:

The invention will first be fully described, and then pointed out in the claim.

Figure 1 is a plan view of a stone contrived according to our invention, and Fig. 2 is a sectional elevation.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

A is the middle portion, which we arrange about an eighth of an inch, in the main, lower than the face B, but, in the practical construction, rising in concave shape up to the level of the inner margin of the face. The face we make about four inches wide for a three-and-a-half-foot stone, and in the same proportion for other sizes. G represents the furrows in

the face, which we make with six inches draft or pitch. This recess may, of course, be dressed out from time to time, as the stone wears away; but in order to save the labor of so dressing it, we propose to construct the part separate from the other, and arrange it in a recess, C, with adjusting-screws D, to lower it away from time to time, as the face of the stone wears away.

Having thus described our invention, what we claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The combination of the adjustable portion A with a stone having a recess, C, substantially as specified.
