

IMPROVEMENT IN CLOTHES-DRIERS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 164,733, dated June 22, 1875; application filed May 28, 1875.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CONRAD HAUSER, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and Improved Clothes-Drier, of which the following is a specification:

In the accompanying drawing, Figure 1 represents a side elevation of my improved clothes-drier, shown in folded up condition; and Fig. 2 is a side elevation of the same in position for use.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

The invention will first be described in connection with drawing, and then pointed out

In the drawing, A represents the rod-carrying standard, which is made with folding legs B, that may be spread to sufficient width to support steadily the standard and clothes suspended thereon. On being folded toward each other they take up a smaller space for storage. The clothes-carrying arms or rods C are supported at different height and direc-

tion in perforations a of the standard, and may be readily inserted and taken out as required. A base plate, D, above the folding legs, is recessed with as many socket-holes as there are rods C, for seating one end of the same therein, while the other end is attached, either by a strap, elastic band, or perforated disk, or any other suitable fastening device, E, to the standard, so that the whole clothesdrier may in this condition be readily and conveniently stored away, taking up small space, and forming a neat and readily adjustable implement for household use.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters

Patent-

The combination, with standard A, of the socket-plate D and fastener E to hold detachable arms C, in the manner described.
