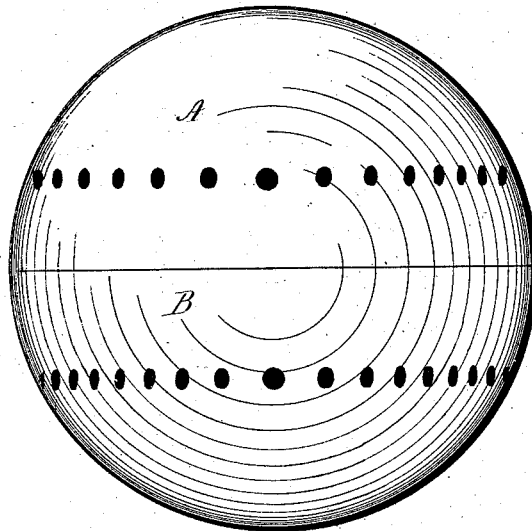
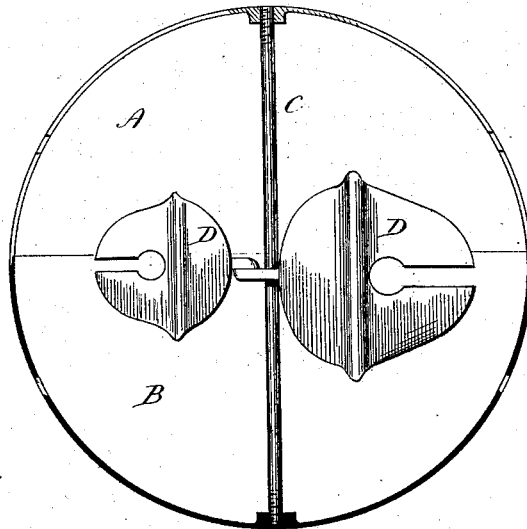

IMPROVEMENT IN TOYS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **164,791**, dated June 22, 1875; application filed May 31, 1875.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES A. BAILEY, of Cobalt, in the county of Middlesex and State of Connecticut, have invented a new Toy Ball; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent, in—

Figure 1, side view; Fig. 2, central section.

This invention relates to an improvement in toy balls, the object being to combine an internal bell with the ball; and it consists of a ball composed of two perforated hollow semi-spheres with a central bar, on which are supported one or more bells, as hereinafter described.

A is the one half, and B the other half, of the ball. These are preferably formed from

thin metal, and so that when brought together they form practically a perfect sphere. C is a rod, which passes through the center of the two parts, and preferably so as to secure them together. On this rod one or more bells, D, are permanently arranged, preferably of the class that are known as "sleigh-bells. These should be hung centrally within the ball.

The rolling of the ball over the floor, shaking, or any agitation will produce a ringing of the bell or bells within the ball, affording amusement to the child.

I claim—

The herein-described toy ball, consisting of the spherical shell with one or more bells permanently suspended therein, substantially as described.
