

IMPROVEMENT IN CHILDREN'S CARRIAGES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 167,459, dated September 7, 1875; application filed June 26, 1875.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY C. MOODY, of the city and county of Oswego, New York, have invented a new and Improved Shade and Weather Protector for Children's Carriages, of which the following is a specification:

The invention consists in attaching a bent rod to the lower or free edge of the corner curtains of the carriage, as and for the purpose hereinafter specified.

The drawing shows a perspective view of the top of a child's carriage, provided with curtains, according to my invention.

The top A is of the kind known as square or flat, the curtains D hanging vertically from the edge thereof, as shown. Those attached

to the front corners of the top A have a rod, G, attached to their lower edge, the same being bent at an angle corresponding to those of the corners of said top. The rod preserves the desired form of the curtains, preventing their edges turning up or wrinkling, and enables the curtains to be neatly and expeditiously folded and looped up or secured to the top A by means of straps E.

I claim—
The combination of the bent rod G, with curtain D and square top A, as shown and described.
